Branch library hours to be cut back

Voters turn down library

Voters turned down Tuesday's
Niles library district tax referendum to increase the rate from 15 cents to 25 cents per.\$100 assessed valuation. With 60 of 62 precincts accounted for, 5,631 voters opposed the increase and 4,187 approved it limiting hours and generally downsizing the branch operation.

Pestine emphasized this year's budget will not be affected by Tuesday's vote. But he did say planned increasing of book purchases of about \$250,000 next year would be cut-back by \$100,000.

This column is an abbreviated report of the 12 page document. In the coming weeks we will publish a morecomplete report comparing our local schools with other suburban, state and city of Chicago schools.

High Schools

Among all high schools in the state, Niles District 219 had, the highest average teacher salary, \$45,712 and the highest average spending per pupil, \$8,357 Maine High District 207 was second in the state with an average teacher salary of \$39,990. It was fifth in the state for average spending per spupil, \$6,067 Niles High had 17.8 students per teacher and Maine had 20.3 students per teacher.

Neither high school district was in the top ten districts in ACT scores, American College Testing, measuring aptitude for college work. The top ten districts averaged 22.8% (New) Trier) down to 22.0% for Libertyville with both districts having about 83% of their students participating in the tests: Niles North had a 21.2%; Maine South, 20.8%; Niles West. 20.1%; Maine East Continued on Page 42

The schools with the highest ratings, both in the top ten, as well as in our areas, had the least number of low income families compared with other schools. Top ten New Trier and: Deerfield both had less than 1% low income families living in their school districts. Maine South had the least number of low income families in our areas and was lower than most of the top ten schools. Only Lake Forest and Beecher had less low income families than Maine South.

Elementary Schools

Among eighth grade reading scores. Northbrook district 27 had 81.5% of its students in the top quarter among Illinois students. The Northbrook-Glenview District 30, rounded out the top ten with a 65.9%. In our area East Maine District 63 had 31.8%; Evanston 65 had 51.2%; Glenview 34-49.4%; Golf 67-59.4%; Morton Grove 70-61.7%; Niles 71-48.5%; Lincolnwood, 74-45.3%.

It could be assumed the districts with the highest percentage of low income families would have the lowest percentage of reading scores in the top 25% in Illinois. But, in-our area, East Maine District 63 has the second lowest number of low income families 3.7%, yet, has much lower reading scores, 31.8%, than other neighboring districts. Evanston, with 21.9% low income families, has 51.2% students in the top 25%. Niles District 71 students has 21.2% low income families but scored 48.5%. Golf District 67 has 5.9% low income families and scored 59.4%. Morton Grove District 70 has 7% low income families and scored 61.7%.

Teacher salaries in all these districts include Golf District 67-\$27,921; Glenview-\$28,629; Niles 71-\$29,385; East Maine

63-\$29,791 and Morton Grove

Average spending per child is a low \$4,346 for District 63 East Maine students; \$4,508 for Glenview 34; \$4,610 for Golf 67; \$4,702 for Lincolnwood 74; \$4,985 for Evanston 65; \$5,627 for Morton Grove 70 and \$6,820 for Niles 71.

pupils per teacher ratio at 19.3; Glenview-17.4; Evanston-16.6; Lincolnwood 74-16.7; Golf 67-15.4; Morton Grove 70-13.6 and Niles 71-12.2.

school board members will warn laymen against reading too much into these scores. But East Maine District 63 parents and school people should be concerned about these results. Since this area has among the least number of low income families, it has to recognize how poorly its reading scores were. Perhaps the large influx of families whose primary language may not be English may attribute

to these low reading scores. Since all teacher salaries among these districts are comparable, it must be assumed teachers have similar skills. Since District 63 has the highest pupil-teacher ratio, this must be a serious consideration in assessing the low scores. Emphasis on
