A 57-year-old woman, owner of a Skokie Advertising Agency, was killed Monday, Feb. 29 when she drove into the wrong lane while making a left turn and was struck by a Metra commuter

train at the Lehigh-Howard crossing in Niles. Niles police said Gloria R. Olenick of Glenview was pronounced dead at Lutheran General Hospital at 9:53 a.m.

It was a lovely, sunny, pre-spring morning Tuesday. Two workmen were installing a new spotlight on the northwest side of the train tracks at Howard and Lehigh Avenues. Each individual light had a shade or shield atop it.

Monday morning was not dissimilar at the corner. Except there was death on the tracks. A Glenview advertising executive, heading for her job in Skokie, was killed by a loop-bound commuter train when her car was hit broadside on the passenger side. We were told she tried to turn around on the tracks to avoid the train. The image conveyed is she was locked between the gates when she was up on the tracks.

Two weeks ago a similar accident on Touhy Avenue resulted in the death of the driver. Like the Howard Street accident, the south-bound car on Lehigh turned left into the left hand lane going around the crossing gate which blocks one-half of the crossing.

Niles Police Sergeant Jim Gerhardt told the Bugle's Sylvia Dalrymple he contacted the Illinois Department of Transportation 19 years ago about installing gates across the entire train intersection. He said they never bothered to

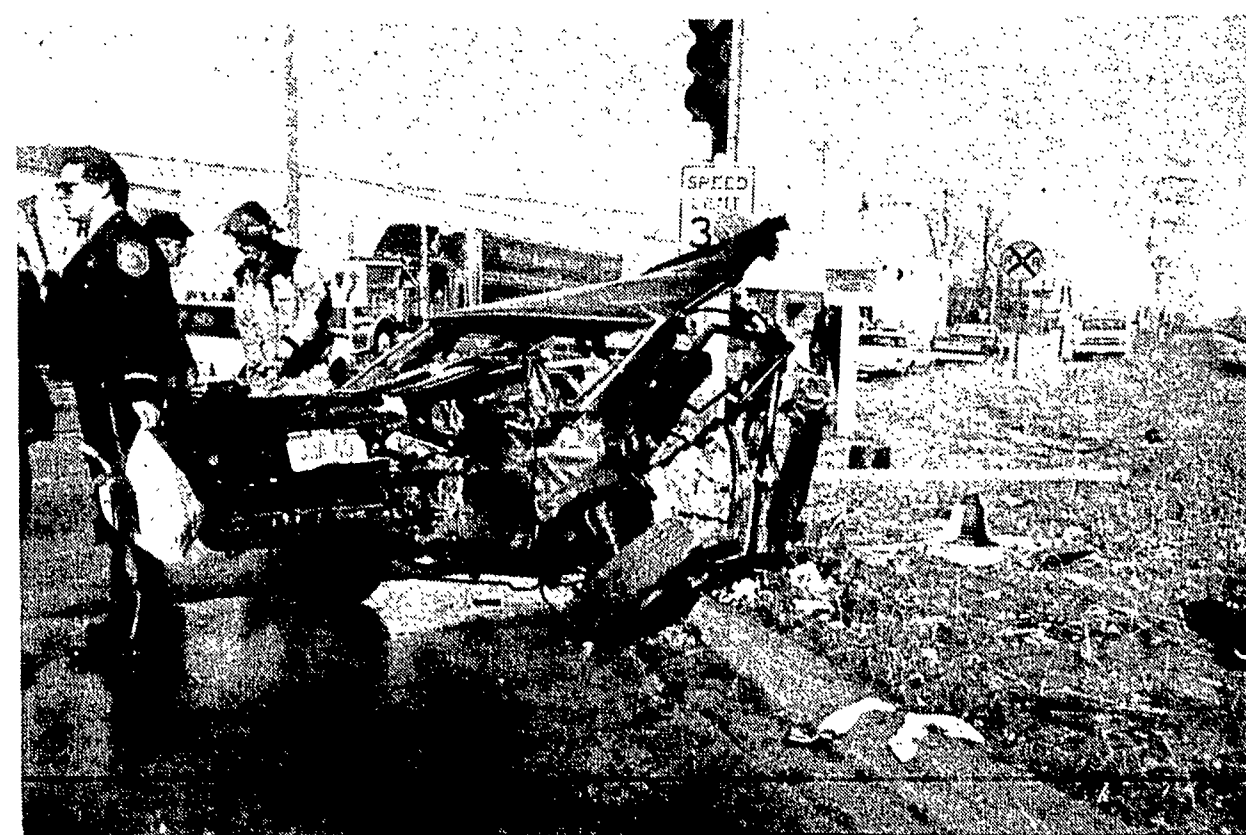

Voting "yes" for Library funds a 'must'

The Niles Public Library District is young, very young, as far as libraries go. For example, the Des Plaines Public Library celebrated its 80th anniversary two years ago, the Park Ridge Public Library is now celebrating its 75th anniversary, and the Morton Grove Public Library has been around for 50 years. The Niles Public Library District is only 29 years old.

Residents of Des Plaines, Park Ridge, and Morton Grove have memories of growing up in their local libraries, of using the library for their schoolwork, and now taking their children to the same library for story hours or homework. Residents of Des Plaines support a tax rate of .182; Park Ridge, .338, and Morton Grove, .269. Residents of Niles are paying .351.

Northwest Suburban Chapter #311, Vietnam Veterans of America, is planning to participate in the weekend-long dedication ceremonies for the Illinois Vietnam Veterans Memorial, at Oak Ridge Cemetery in Springfield, Ill. The dedication activities will begin Friday evening, May 6, and end with a non-denominational memorial service on Sunday, May 8. An estimated 40,000 people will participate in various phases of the dedication.

Nearly one-half of District 63 students in category Students from non-English speaking homes increase

About 1,449 or 48.95 percent of the students in East Maine Elementary School District 63 come from homes where a language other than English is the primary language, according to a report by Associate Superintendent Dr. Donald Stetina. He said the number represents an increase of 134 students or 10.19 percent more than last year. About 212 or 14.63 percent of district students require specialized services which is a decrease of 39 students over 1987, according to Stetina.

A total of 46 languages are spoken in District 63 homes with the six major languages being: Korean, 198 students; Gujarati, 180 students; Spanish, 141 students; Greek, 131 students; Russian, 123 students and Polish, 113 students for 61.15 percent of the district total. District 63 operates the East Maine Multi-cultural Education (EMME) program for students needing language services. According to research, this "immersion" technique is more effective than teaching English as a Second Language (TESL), said Stetina. An example of TESL would be a Spanish teacher conducting almost all academic subjects in Spanish.

EMME is designed to place a youngster in the "mainstream" as early as possible while some research indicates that youngsters placed in TESL programs as late as 6th grade may never leave, he said. The federal government requires that the bilingual census report be filed by all school districts, according to Stetina. Elaine Lampros, Mark Twain teacher, added Stetina's report to a list of reasons why the district should not increase the student teacher ratio to alleviate crowded classrooms. Lampros indicated the education of about 48 percent of district students would be adversely affected.

BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENING

The pressure that the heart muscle must exert in order to pump blood through the body is expressed in two ways, the systolic and the diastolic blood pressure. Systolic pressure is recorded when the heart contracts while diastolic pressure is taken when the heart is resting. The lower the pressure the easier the work of the heart. Though the human body is very complex and there is a great deal of individual variation, most blood pressure experts would agree that at rest, the ideal systolic pressure for persons beyond age 40 is something less than 140mmHg while the diastolic pressure should not exceed 90mmHg. Laurie O'Reilly, the Village's Geriatric Nurse will conduct a free blood pressure clinic for residents from 9 to 10 am on Tuesday, March 8 in the Richard T. Flickinger Municipal Center.

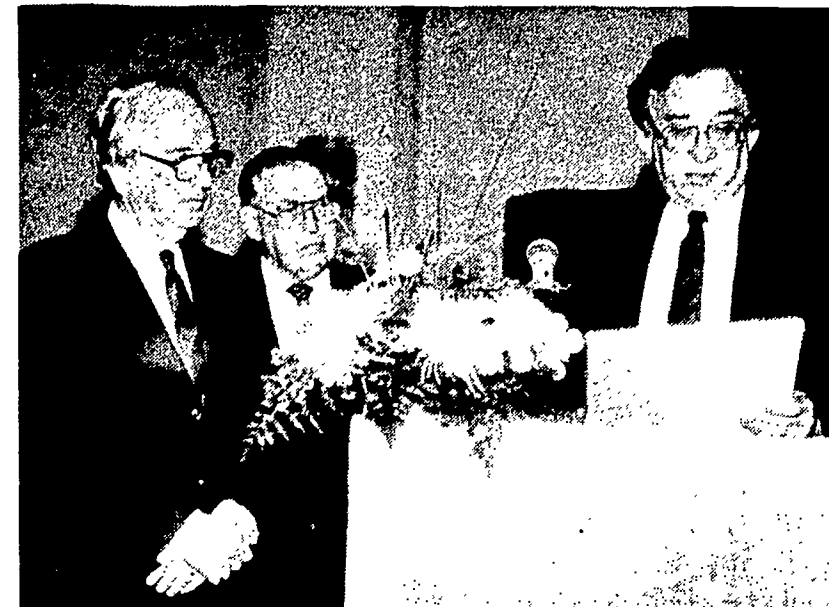

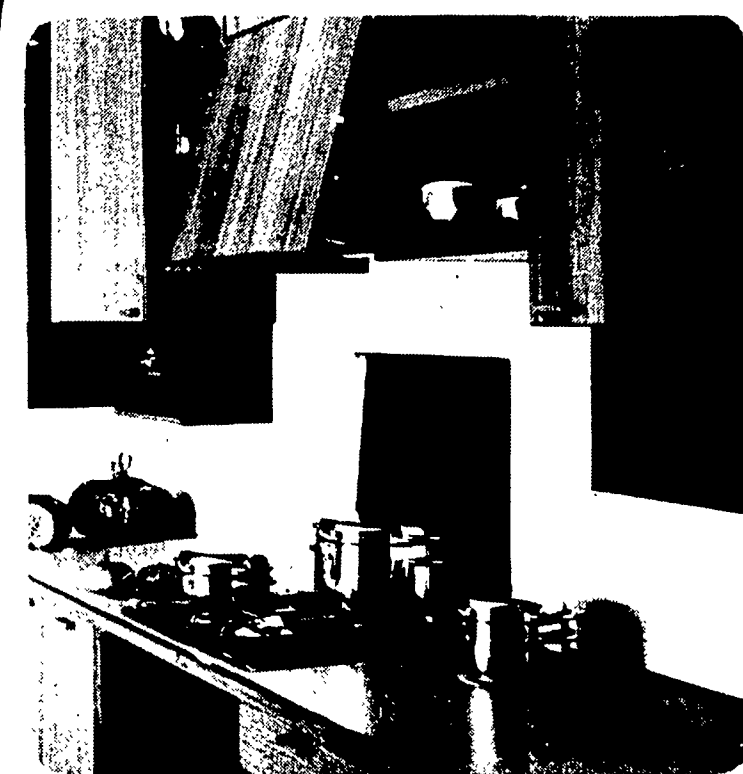

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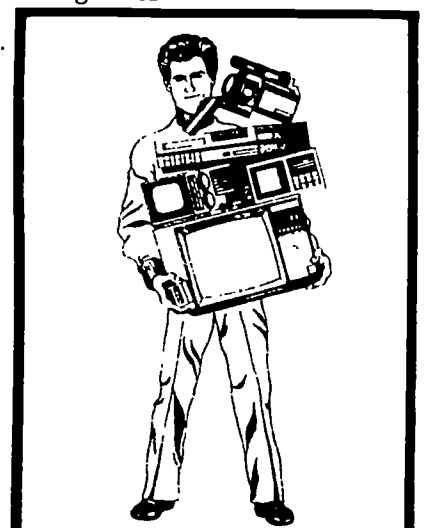

Consumer lawsuit filed against suburban contractor

A consumer fraud lawsuit was filed Tuesday by Cook County State's Attorney Richard M. Daley against a north suburban home contractor accused of bilking area residents while allegedly doing business under at least four unregistered business aliases.

Gene Mucciola, the defendant in Daley's lawsuit, allegedly took large sums of money from homeowners over the past 16 months for remodeling work that was not completed or performed with the proper building permits.

He is also accused of operating at least four home repair businesses— including "Lake Shore Builders" in Northbrook and "Dependable Construction Co." in Glenview— which were not properly registered either with the Illinois Secretary of State's office or the Cook County Clerk.

"Based on the complaints we've received from Mucciola's customers, it appears he spent more time creating phony business entities than he did carrying out the work for which he was paid," Daley said.

Mucciola also allegedly operated under the business names of "Nu-Glaze" and "Residential Remodeling Specialists."

Mucciola is believed to be a Northbrook resident, but neither prosecutors nor the defendant's customers have been able to locate any actual addresses for the businesses.

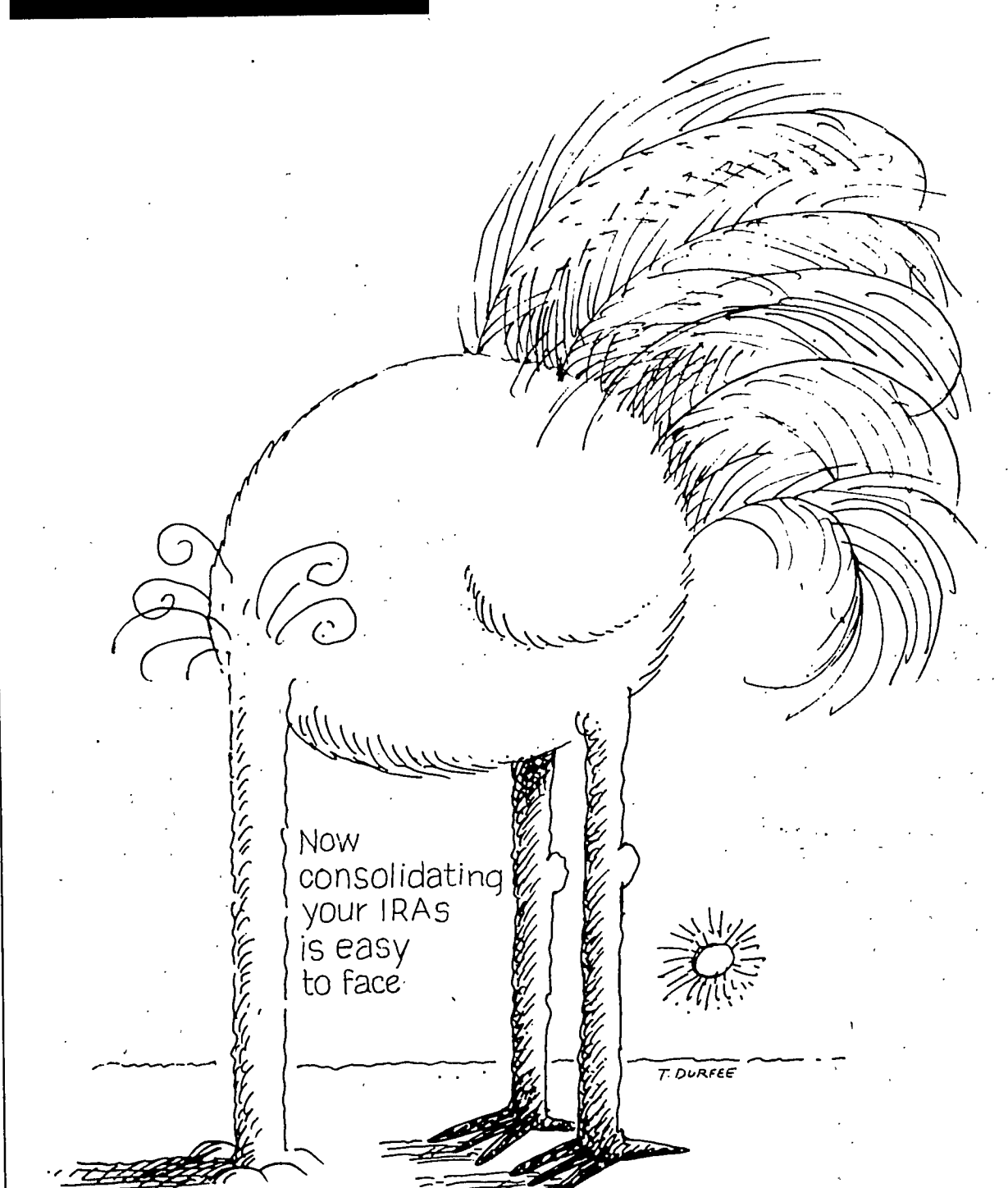

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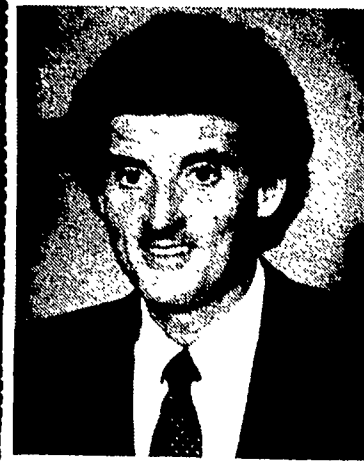

Late-Bloomer comes on strong for Oakton

Mike Simon's first encounter with Oakton Community College basketball coach Tom Jorndt was brief and to the point.

"It was my first day of classes at Oakton last year," says Simon. "Coach walked by me in the hall, looked up and said, 'basketball?' I said, 'yep,' and he told me to come to his office and talk to him."

It seemed obvious to Jorndt when he looked up at all 6-4 of Simon that the then Oakton freshman might be a basketball player. But even with his above-average height and interest in the game, Simon never got the opportunity to play at Notre Dame High School in Niles, from which he graduated in 1986.

"I tried out for the team every year, except when I had knee problems as a sophomore," Simon says, "but I got cut each time I tried out. I continued to play outside of school on my own, but I was discouraged because I wanted to play in high school. It wasn't a question of thinking I should play just because I was tall, I just loved the game."

Jorndt was initially intrigued because of Simon's height, but it didn't take long for the veteran Raider coach to spot additional pluses.

BATTERIES

A battery is a cell which produces electricity as the result of a chemical reaction occurring within it. With a battery in place, the reaction will run and current will pass whenever the switch is turned on. The power output of a battery depends on the quantity of chemicals it holds. Batteries come in two forms: dry cells and wet cells. Cars have lead-acid wet cells. Dry cells are available in a variety of sizes and shapes and provide power for a large array of appliances and items such as flashlights, portable radios, toys, and cordless tools.

Batteries are classified as primary or secondary cells. A primary cell has an irreversible chemical reaction and cannot be recharged when the reaction has run its course. Carbon-zinc, alkaline, mercury, and silver are the most common primary batteries. All are dry cells. Since batteries are relatively expensive, unscrupulous advertisers sell rechargers for primary cells to unsuspecting buyers who soon find that they have wasted their money.

Secondary cells have reversible chemical systems that can be recharged hundreds, even thousands of times. The lead-acid cells in our cars are the most familiar examples. Nicad (nickel-cadmium) batteries are the only available dry cell secondaries. Although nicads cost three to five times as much as ordinary batteries, they plus their recharger will be a good investment if you use lots of batteries.

HOUSEHOLD HUMIDIFIERS

The relative humidity of the air in our homes may be as low as 10 to 15 percent in winter, inducing static electricity shocks and causing furniture and doors to warp and crack, and clothes to cling. Also, many people feel "cold" in a warm room and the incidence of upper respiratory ailments increases. These conditions can be dramatically improved if humidifiers are installed. The lead-acid cells in our cars are the most familiar examples. Nicad (nickel-cadmium) batteries are the only available dry cell secondaries. Although nicads cost three to five times as much as ordinary batteries, they plus their recharger will be a good investment if you use lots of batteries.

Ultrasonic units contain no moving parts. The ultrasonic transducer turns the water in its reservoir into a mist and expels it. As the water droplets evaporate, they leave behind a white dust. To prevent dusting, some models have demineralizer cartridges to remove dissolved solids. These cartridges are expensive and must be changed often. If distilled water is used in these units, crust build-up and dusting are eliminated. Although the distilled water bill may be high, its use will extend the life of an evaporative unit and will cost less than the replacement demineralizer cartridges.

OVEN CLEANERS

Cleaning home ovens is a difficult and messy task. With continued long term use, baked-on grime accumulates and gets harder to remove. Not only is the cleaning job unpleasant, it can be harmful to the kitchen, and dangerous to the cleaner. Supermarkets sell a variety of cleaning products in aerosol, spray, or brush-on form.

With one exception, all the cleaners contain sodium hydroxide which reacts with the baked-on coatings and converts them to easily removable, water-soluble compounds. Sodium hydroxide is also called caustic soda and lye. Great care must be exercised when using these cleaners, particularly aerosols. They should not be allowed to contact aluminum, copper, or painted surfaces outside the oven, and heating coils, gaskets, and light fixtures inside it. Also, never use them in self-cleaning ovens since the caustic soda will destroy the catalytic cleaning surfaces. Sodium hydroxide can cause severe and permanent damage to skin, eyes, lungs, and mucous tissues. Always wear long, hole-free rubber gloves plus a face mask when using aerosols. If you can't take proper precautions, leave the oven dirty. It really won't hurt anything other than your sensibilities.

When you buy and/or use oven cleaners, read the labels and proceed cautiously.

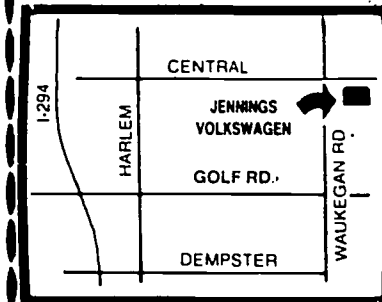

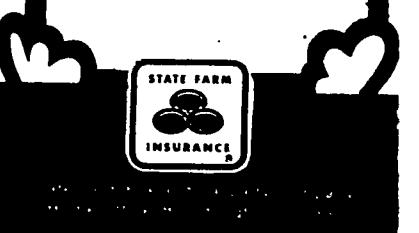

Match Adjustable Mortgage To Personal Financial Needs

No longer does a home buyer simply choose between an adjustable rate mortgage (ARM) and a traditional fixed rate mortgage.

Now that savings and loans offer a wider variety of ARMs, you can shop for the right one to fit your personal situation and financial plan.

ARMs usually are categorized as one-year and three-year loans, meaning the interest rate remains stable for one-year and three-year periods. A one-year ARM may have a lower starting interest rate, while a three-year ARM may feature lower ceilings or caps on the extent to which the interest rate can rise over the life of the loan.

And ARMs have lower starting interest rates than fixed rate mortgages. The five-year ARM is the newest mortgage product introduced this year by lenders and it should gain rapid popularity among consumers because it has a lower starting rate than a fixed rate loan, yet it acts like a fixed rate loan for the first five years.

Before deciding which way to turn, look at such personal factors as: reason for buying the house, length of planned occupancy, tax considerations, future income, current age and career expectations (both yours and your employer's).

The three-year ARM is the favored choice for most home buyers. It offers a degree of stability characteristic of the traditional fixed rate, yet gives you a break for the first three years with a lower interest rate. Most three-year ARMs have a cap of 5 percent—meaning the mortgage won't increase more than a total of 5 percent.

A three-year fixed interest rate is particularly attractive to those planning to resell the home in a few years—either the first-time home buyer who views it as a starter home or the mobile career person who will be transferred in a few years. Young career people also like this type of ARM if they need an initial break in house payments and expect future salary increases to keep up with possible payment increases.

The one-year ARM appeals to more sophisticated mortgage shoppers or the home buyers who plan on trading up or transferring within a few years. The interest rate on the one-year ARM starts significantly lower than the other mortgages but adjusts annually with the market.

Convertible ARMs offer advantages to home buyers whose income has stabilized or young buyers who need the break the first year and want to avoid increases later. The first year starts at a lower rate, typical of one-year ARMs, but the contract specifies a date after which the loan can be converted to a fixed rate mortgage.

Today's ARMs are much more advantageous to the home buyer than when first introduced eight to ten years ago. Most have caps on the periodic adjustment rate and the maximum interest rate for the life of the loan. Plus, adjustments are tied to less volatile indexes.

Just as finding the right home to fit your personal needs and budget is important, choosing the right adjustable rate mortgage can be financially rewarding.

Task Force recommends break on tuition costs

The Parental Property Tax Relief Task Force has issued its report calling for some type of financial relief for parents sending their children to tuition-charging schools. Their recommendations suggest several options - the voucher system, a property tax break, an income tax deduction or an income tax credit.

The Parental Property Tax Relief Task Force was created last summer following the introduction of SB-1237 by Senator Walter Dudyecz (R-7, Chicago). In response to constituent requests, Senator Dudyecz introduced his bill in April, 1987 which would allow for homeowners with children enrolled in tuition-charging schools to claim either one half of the amount of tuition paid, \$1,000 per child, or the amount of property tax devoted to public education - whichever is less. Claims would be made to the local school district.

The introduction of SB-1237

resulted in a significant amount of attention and comment, both pro and con and both inside and outside of the Legislature. Realizing the need for further indepth study, Senate Minority Leader James "Fate" Philip appointed Senator Dudyecz task force chairman. Other members were Assistant Minority Leader Senator Aldo DeAngelis (R-40, Olympia Fields) and Republican Spokesman, Senate Elementary and Secondary Education Committee, Bob Kustra (R-28, Des Plaines).

Two public hearings were held. The first on September 22 at Resurrection High School on Chicago's Northwest side and a second hearing was held on October 26 at the State of Illinois Center in downtown Chicago.

Parents supporting the concept claimed that public education, for which their tax dollars are going, is not providing the type of quality education they want for their children. They are therefore

forced to incur an often severe financial burden in tuition charges at a private or parochial school. They argue that they are paying for both while saving the public schools the expense of educating their youngsters. Many who testified stated a preference for a break on income tax rather than on property tax since many rent and are not homeowners.

Dudyecz explained that SB-1237 remains in committee. He plans to introduce several additional bills - one to allow for a voucher system. Under that plan, parents would receive a voucher allowing them to "purchase" the educational program best suited to their child - private or public. Other bills will offer the options of a state income tax credit or income tax deduction.

Currently both Iowa and Minnesota have laws allowing for income tax breaks for tuition payment.

Tax relief renewals sent to seniors

Over 200,000 senior citizens in Cook County will soon be receiving renewal forms in the mail for the 1987 Senior Citizen's Exemption, County Assessor Thomas C. Hynes announced today.

With the exemption, a senior homeowner can save as much as \$200 on property taxes that will be due this summer.

Renewal applications, which must be filed each year, are mailed to those seniors who were registered for the exemption for the previous year.

The applications are letter size with a detachable form at the bottom. Senior homeowners can verify the information and complete the renewal process simply by signing and returning the lower portion of the form to Hynes' office.

Those who turned 65 in 1987 are eligible to receive the Senior Citizen's Exemption for the first time. "If a senior homeowner already registered for 1987, they will not receive any notice in the mail at this time," Hynes said. "However, if a person turned 65 in 1987 and has not yet registered, I urge them to contact my office immediately. We want to make sure that those who qualify for the exemption will receive it."

Homeowners receiving the Senior Citizen's Exemption automatically qualify for the general Homeowner's Exemption and will not have to apply for it when those forms are mailed at a later date.

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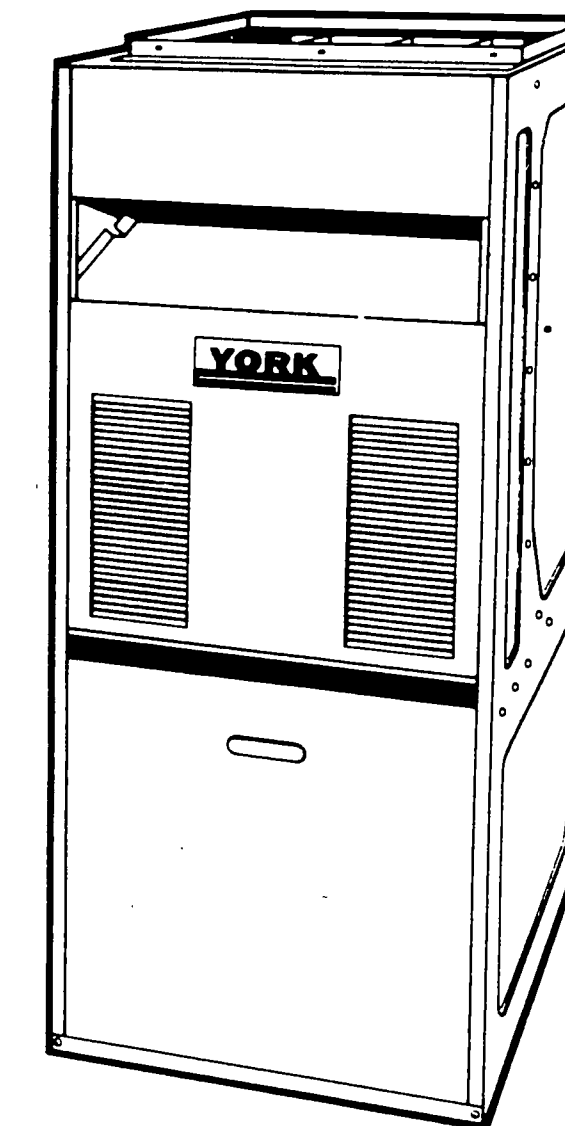

Finally, the Metropolitan Sanitary District should be at the forefront of securing an important long term solution which is state legislation to require Lake County to adopt a responsible flood water detention plan so that the Cook County suburbs are not victims of flood waters which should have been detained upstream."

Schoenberg supports merit selection of judges

Legislative candidate Jeff Schoenberg (D-56) today called for merit selection of judges in Illinois, and promised to co-sponsor the necessary legislation once elected.

Schoenberg also cited merit selection as a major difference between himself and his primary opponent, Calvin Sutker. "The Greyford investigation and the convictions of 13 sitting judges demonstrates that we need to change the current system," Schoenberg said. "Sutker's silence on merit selection comes as no surprise, since he cannot be independent of a process which he has faithfully supported for many years."

He cited Sutker's failure to tackle the issue of merit selection of judges as an example of Sutker's failure to "demonstrate vision and act constructively" on behalf of his constituents. "Not pursuing the merit selection of judges," Schoenberg added, "is just another example of Sutker failing to show leadership on a very important issue."

Judges in most states throughout the country are selected on the basis of their

qualifications as legal scholars and attorneys. Their reputations also are closely scrutinized during the selection process. In Illinois, judges are elected, often without voters knowing who the judicial candidates are or how well qualified they are.

"In Illinois, judicial candidates are far too often slanted by the party as a reward for work well done for the party. In many instances, their selection to run for a judicial seat has nothing to do with their qualifications," Schoenberg said.

"Opponents of merit selection are committed to retaining a political system that serves those with the power to decide who gets to run for election to become judge," Schmidt said.

That change can be brought about by legislation to put the question to Illinois voters. "Any member of the legislature can introduce a bill to accomplish that goal, including Cal Sutker," Schoenberg said.

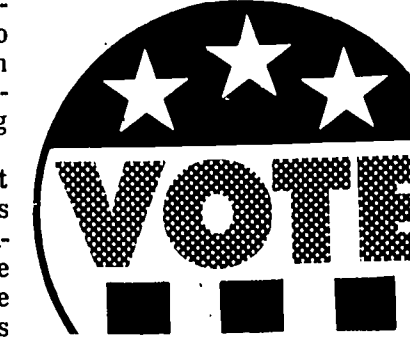

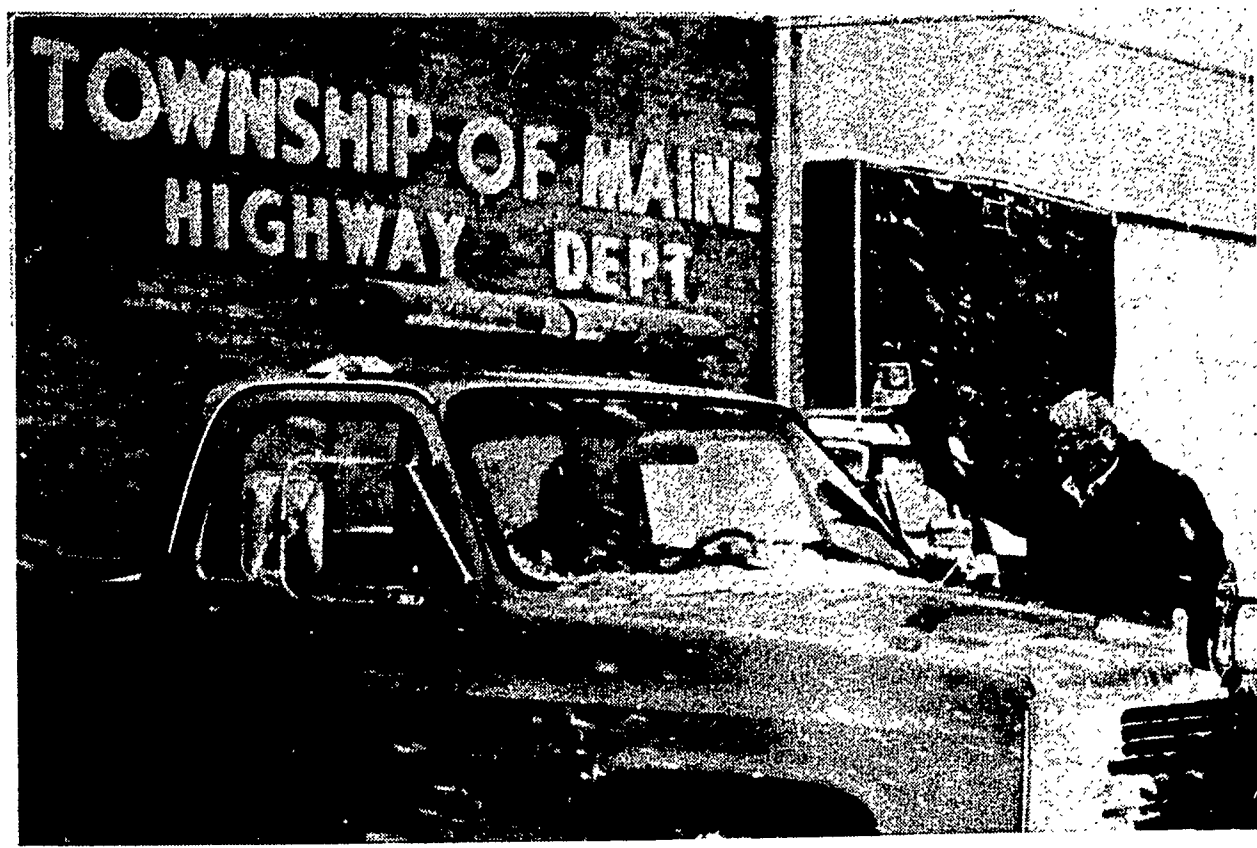

Bonifas said Derived Local Channel also improves upon the level of line security features presently provided to subscribers that use private lines, and at a lower cost.

"Digital dialer alarm systems cannot detect when a telephone line has been cut," Bonifas said. "With Derived Local Channel, if a telephone line is cut, a signal is sent to the alarm company's office."

Upon the request for Derived Local Channel service from a state-licensed alarm company, Illinois Bell will install the equipment that provides the service in a switching center, Illinois Bell Product Manager Michael Egan said.

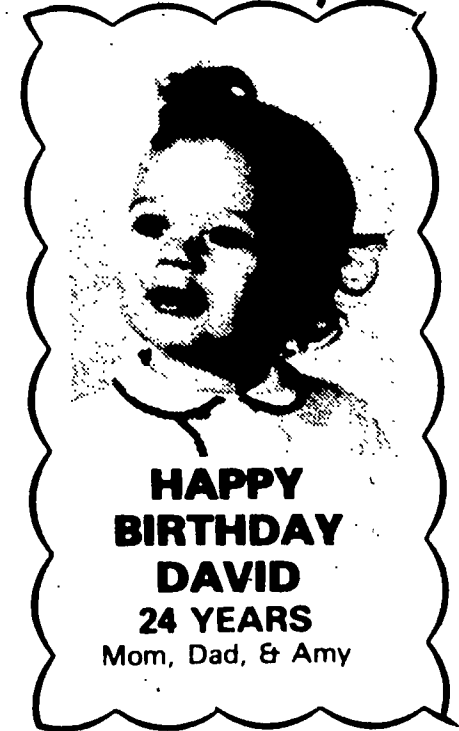

ronically, LeRoy Kwiat, a Glenview Bugle reader, stopped by the office Monday morning and said he was concerned about this problem many years ago. He wrote letters and was told it was the railroad's responsibility. He made little progress in pursuing the matter.

Sergeant Gerhart noted there are bells as well as lights at Howard and Lehigh. But he said the bells are not audible. He also noted on a sunny day it is difficult to read the color of the lights because of the reflections.

We drove past the intersections alongside the tracks at Touhy, Howard, Oakton and Dempster. The intersection which seems safest is at Dempster Street. Despite the high volume of traffic, the incidence of train accidents at Dempster seems less than at the Howard and Touhy crossings.

Dempster has an additional road divider extending west from the crossing which is not

at the other intersections. We are only guessing this might be an additional deterrent. There's little doubt a full gate across the entire train crossing is a solution to this tragic problem.

Drivers have to be protected from themselves. That's the reason we have stop signs and stoplights.

The workmen installing the stoplight both related several incidents of drivers becoming confused when they cross train tracks. Despite their driving around the one-gate barrier, their judgment is often impaired when they get onto the tracks.

It's going to take a concerted effort by the village to correct this problem. Pressure is going to have to be placed on IDOT, the Illinois Department of Transportation, and possibly on the railroad company.

It has been a long time problem whose time has come. To idly stand-by and wait for the next accident is unconscionable.

The village has offered \$5.8 million for the 37-acre shopping center. Krilich has stated the offer is "ridiculous" and the property is worth much more than that.

Attorney Allan Brown, representing Krilich, told the board last year the center's value is in excess of \$10 million. Burke, in turn, stated the \$5.8 million is the appraised value by a real estate appraiser and it was a fair and equitable offer.

The village plans to consolidate its administrative offices on part of the parcel of land and then put the rest up for private development, according to a village official.

Burke said the recent court action is an attempt to get both sides together for a possible settlement. The village noted an appeal of a decision could take as long as three years to settle.

The village's offer to purchase the site preceded the filing of the condemnation suit last June.

Krilich at the time argued he had put together plans for redevelopment of the property and he had 65 percent of the property leased.

Under both plans, a large part of the center would be torn down and then rebuilt. The village plans on using tax increment financing (TIF) to help pay the cost for the infrastructure improvements, while Krilich said he was going to use private financing.

The court's move for a settlement on the Lawrencewood issue is a repeat of a 1981 legal hassle between the village and Krilich concerning development of a parcel of land then owned by

Krilich on Greenwood Ave. and Ballard Rd. After the village board denied a zoning request for a high density multi-family complex, Krilich filed a suit to appeal the board's decision.

During the court fight Circuit Court Judge Sheldon Brown advised Niles to reach an agreement by accepting an alternate proposal to save both parties time and money in pursuing the case.

The village accepted the alternate site plan which called for five medical buildings (one and two-stories in height with underground garage) on the 9.1 acre parcel of land with construction scheduled to begin in January of 1982. The plan, however, never got off the ground and the property was subsequently sold to the village.

In the early 1980's, the village brought suit against Krilich because of alleged violations at the shopping center. In court arguments, attorneys for the property owner claimed the shopping center was 78 percent unoccupied and that lack of revenue prevented Krilich from complying with fire and building violations.

The case ended with both sides claiming partial victory. However, the issue went back to court on several occasions because of Krilich's failure to allegedly comply with stipulations ordered by the court.

According to village officials, lack of action on Krilich's part to bring improvements to Lawrencewood was the major reason for filing the condemnation suit.

Those visiting the Niles Public Library within the past two weeks might have noticed that the staff are wearing buttons. One out of three of the buttons being worn reads "3 Out the Door!" The other buttons read "1 I'll be Here" and "2 I'll be Here." What's it all mean?

"This is a visual illustration of what we stand to lose in the upcoming referendum," explains Judith Besterfeldt, Chief of Children's Services. "The Library Board has decided that if the March 15 referendum fails, library services will be cut. These cuts will include laying off up to one-third of the library staff. How we'll continue our children's programs with fewer staff and less money is something I haven't yet been able to figure out. I don't want to disappoint the children."

One of the first places that visitors notice these buttons is at the library's check-out desk. Linda Weiss, Chief of Circulation Services remarked, "The circulation in this building is up over 50 percent, and the circulation district wide is up 11 percent. We are busier than ever. Some days our staff are handling over 180 transactions per hour per staff member. We know that more and more people are using the library and enjoying its services. We can only hope that they'll recognize the necessity of the referendum if we're to continue our present services."

"Some of the public visit other libraries, too," continued Weiss. They go to Des Plaines and notice three and four copies of popular fiction, four copies of popular records, compact disks and books on tape. They want to know why Des Plaines has them and we don't. The answer is the same old answer - money. Des Plaines residents pay more to support their library."

Staff salaries have long been a concern at the library. A job that pays \$15,000 at the Niles Library

pays \$21,072 at the Des Plaines Library. Looking within the Niles community, a job that pays \$10,000 at the library pays \$14,099 at the Park District.

Without the tax increase, the library will be faced with having to discontinue the bookmobile service, close on Sundays, and close two evenings and two mornings a week. "That will cut out service to a lot of people," said Besterfeldt, "but we can't stop buying books, and the staff can't work for free. We hope people can look at the average twelve dollar tax increase as meaningful for the school students, especially."


"One of our students read our handout about the referendum," said Weiss, "and felt bad that all staff would have to stay open two dollars a month if we could stay open. 'It means a lot to me' he said."

The district's residents will have an opportunity to vote on the referendum's tax increase on March 15. This is a primary and voters may ask for a Democratic, Republican, Illinois Solidarity or Nonpartisan ballot. Those asking for Nonpartisan ballots do not have to declare party affiliation and may still vote on the referendum. Application for absentee ballots, which must be received by the County Clerk by March 10, are available from Village and Township offices as well as the library's Administrative Office during office hours.

Film Series

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
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
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
