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

Woman shot by her husband in critical condition

According to Niles Police Sgt. Tom Davis investigators do not have a motive for why Gregory Vaughn, 46, of the 8100 block of Prospect Avenue, in Niles, shot his wife, Amy Vaughn, 46, in the face before turning the gun

"We don't really know what was going through his head," Davis said, stating only that the couple were going through a divorce. Court documents indicate Amy Vaughn had filed for divorce in mid-January.

Gregory Vaughn did not leave behind a note of any kind, Davis said.

According to police Amy Vaughn, who was staying with a relative in Northbrook, was inside her vehicle, waiting to pick up her children for a visitation about 3:40 p.m. when Gregory Vaughn approached her. 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


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


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Cheese sculptor does Leaning Tower Y — in cheddar

In the world of sculpting, Sarah Kaufmann is a big cheese. In the world of cheese sculpting, anyway.

For 14 years, her skills as an expert cheese carver have been sought for everything from tailgate parties to weddings. Her sculptures, numbering in the hundreds by now, are all made from 100 percent cheese.

She has done everything from trucks and trains to football and baseball players and cowboys to SpongeBob SquarePants. She has even done a dragon weighing more than six tons.

On Saturday, this cheese wiz was in Niles, carving the northwest suburb's skyline — complete with its Leaning Tower replica at its YMCA.

It's an unlikely career for someone who never ate cheese as a child — even though she's from Wisconsin.

"I didn't like cheese until college." Kaufmann said, "I didn't like it at all as a kid, but now I like all the different kinds of cheese, even the stinky ones like Gouda.'

Kaufmann, 58, counts gorgonzola and brie among her favorite foods. When she got married last summer, she designed the stone on her ring to resemble a piece of Swiss cheese holes included.

"Cheese really found me," Kaufmann said.

She studied commercial art at Madison Area Technical College before becoming an art director for the Wisconsin dairy two 150-pound blocks of Wisindustry. After going to some cheese trade shows for her job and seeing cheese sculptures cheese scrapings became samon display, Kaufmann decided to try doing it herself.

She now lives in Cincinnati and works as a full-time freelance cheese carver.

Kaufmann says cheddar is the best cheese to carve with because of its dense, uniform consistency. She also likes to work in other types of cheese, like provolone or pepper jack, to create accent inlays in her

"Yes, it might be. You could get lucky and it might be more. We're not so good here with numbers. Just check your paycheck each week. Whatever it says there is what your pay

OK, that's not what happened: Just an improvisation on a theme.

What District 89 officials think is that some teachers were mistakenly paid at a higher step on the salary scale than they should have

For instance, a less-experienced teacher, say at step I on the scale, might mistakenly be paid at a more experienced teacher level. say step 4.

some teachers have been overpaid by as much as \$20,000. And the school district

wants the money back. Which hardly seems fair.

Teachers already have paid income tax on some of those earnings. Are school district officials planning to adjust the amount the district wants returned?

And some teachers are saying they reported the overpayments to school district officials but that nothing was done to correct the matter.

How on earth did all this happen? District officials aren't saving. Ongoing investigation, you

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

Student art shines at North Shore Center

There are many opportunities for young singers, dancers and actors to shine. but Andrea Siegel of Skokie was concerned that kids in her town who are gifted visual artists weren't having their moment in the spotlight. Eight years ago, he chairman of the Skokie Fine Arts Commission came up with a solution --SOAR (Student Outstanding Artist Recognition).

Each year since then, art teachers at all of Skokie's schools have been invited to display work by their students in the lobby of the North Shore Center for the Performing Arts in Skokie. This year, the exhibit runs March 3-22, with a recognition ceremony open to the public on March 15. The exhibit is held every March because it's National Youth

Siegel, who is a visual arts teacher at Dawes and Lincoln schools in Evanston, noted that, "We have the YEA Festival (Young Evanston Artists) in Evanston. In May, there's a big outdoor exhibition where all the schools in Evanston participate. I always wanted something like that in Skokie."

Arts Month.

With this concept in mind, Siegel contacted the North Shore Center. "They were looking for ways of bringing the community into the building," she said. "That gave us a venue."

Each school is given a 7foot by 4-foot board to fill with artwork by their students. That holds 16-20 pieces, depending on the size of the work.

"It's a feel-good opportunity for everybody involved," said Tarryl Saipe,



Stenson School. She noted that the annual exhibit shows "what it is that we teach the children and what the children are able to accomplish in their art classes."

In selecting work for SOAR, Saipe chooses pieces from all five grades that she teaches. "I also try to display examples which show a variety of media and art concepts that the students learn about," she said.

Saipe emphasized that she doesn't consider SOAR a contest. "I try to avoid competition in art," she said. "The kids don't know that I am selecting work for SOAR until they get an invitation telling them that their work has been selected and that they're invited to the reception. The kids glow with pride when they find out that something of theirs has been recognized."

That annual reception is a thrilling experience for the young artists, chairman Siegel said. "They're so proud to be acknowledged for their work. They come dressed up. They get to

receives a recognition certificate and is photographed with the mayor and the other artists from their school.

Siegel believes that beyond showcasing the talents of young Skokie artists, SOAR serves a larger purpose. She noted that fine arts studies have sometimes been in jeopardy in the Skokie schools. "A few years ago, in one of the school districts in Skokie, they had to pass a referendum raising taxes in order to keep the fine arts," Siegel said. "You have to be able to see what you'd lose. It's a way to promote the arts. There's always performances that parents go to but they don't get to actively participate in visual arts."

Saipe said that SOAR benefits Jane Stenson School because, "It's a chance for us to show off our art program and the great artwork that the kids do. It gives us an opportunity to let the public know that a total education is more than the three R's. Art plays a really important role in the total education." Comment: pioneerlocal.com

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

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
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

Actor hops into 'Max & Ruby' role



If you can cover the XF's sticker (\$61,800 to \$85,300), Jaguar has a sedan in the XF and XFR that might interest you. Performance and race-bred technology have played key roles in establishing the sporting character of Jaguars. This tradition continues in the XF sedans; they feature sophisticated 5.0-liter direct-injection V-8 engines delivering increased power and torque with comparable emissions and fuel consumption: 15-16 mpg city and 23-24 mpg highway depending on

The 5.0-liter AJ-V-8 Gen III engines come in two forms: a 385-horsepower/380-poundfeet-of-torque naturally aspirated version and a 510-horsepower/461-pound-feet supercharged "R" screamer that brings a whole new layer of

performance to the XF line.

All Jaguar V-8 engines are built using aluminum blocks with cast-in iron liners and crossbolted main bearing caps to help reduce noise, vibration and harshness. Jaguar engine blocks are high-pressure die cast to yield a superior finish and greater dimensional accuracy. The engines use aluminum heads with four valves per cylinder and spheroidal graphite, cast-iron crankshafts and forged steel connecting rods. The cylinder heads are specified with a secondary (recycled) aluminum alloy to help reduce the environmental impact involved in producing the engine.

Jaguar's V-8s were designed in-house and tight packaging is a key factor as engineers have developed more power using a smaller and lighter engine. Overall engine length has been reduced (by 0.94 inches) by relocation of the oil pump within the engine architecture. This length reduction improves engine bay packaging in support of enhanced safety cell performance.

Malcolm Sandford, Jaguar engine group chief engineer, explained, "The emphasis was on delivering efficiency, superior dynamic response and highly accessible low-end torque suited to real-world driving without compromising power at higher engine speeds."

Jaguar indicates performance has improved by 29 percent and 23 percent (87 and 94 bhp) on both naturally aspirated and supercharged engines. Even with these upgrades, both the

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

naturally aspirated and supercharged engines meet U.S. ULEV II emissions regulations. Despite the significant increases in power, CO2 emissions of the naturally aspirated engine are comparable to the 4.2-liter V-8 and the supercharged engine produces 2 percent less CO2 than its predecessor.

Jaguar has developed an industry-first, centrallymounted, multihole, spray-guided fuel-injection system. This system has a big effect on low-speed, dynamic response. The positioning of the injectors delivering fuel is precisely to the center of the combustion chamber, maximizing air-fuel mixing and improving combustion control. Fuel is delivered via dual, high-pressure fuel pumps that are driven via an auxiliary shaft in the engine block.

The charge-cooling effects of the direct-injection fuel system have allowed the compression ratio of the naturally aspirated engine to be raised to a high 11.5:1, which helps improve engine economy. The supercharged engine also benefits from an increase from 9.1:1 on the previous 4.2-liter version to 9.5:1.

During the engine warm-up phase, Jaguar indicates that the combustion system employs multiple injection mode strategies to deliver 50 percent more heat for fast catalyst warm-up and substantially reduced emissions.

The technology advances continue with a new type of variable camshaft timing system (VCT). Jaguar indicates that the four VCT units are activated by the positive and negative torques generated by opening and closing the intake and exhaust valves instead of by oil pressure. This has allowed the engine oil pump to be reduced in size, saving energy and reducing fuel consumption.

The response rate of the new VCT units is up to three times faster than before, with actuation rates in excess of 150 degrees per second. This means more of an immediate engine response to

Standard naturally aspirated engines are also equipped with camshaft profile switching (CPS) on the inlet camshaft. Depending on the engine's running conditions and the demands drivers might place on it, the CPS will switch between a profile that is set for low-speed driving and another that sets increased valve lift for high performance.

The variable inlet manifold (VIM) optimizes torque through the rev range. The VIM can vary the length of its eight inlet tracts to optimize power and torque throughout the rev range on the naturally aspirated engine. Vacuum-operated actuators open valves to select a longer, 27-inch inlet tract at low revs, increasing the rate of both the airflow and the engine torque. As the revs climb beyond 4.700 rpm, the actuators select a shorter, 14-inch path allowing a greater volume of air into the

engine, again to optimize power. If you want to improve fuel consumption and CO2 emissions, one area of concentration involves minimizing internal friction. All engine bearings received an extensive optimization program, reducing friction without compromising reliability. A diamond-like carbon coating has been used to reduce friction on the fuel pump tappets and a solid film lubricant has been used to coat the piston skirts.

Jaguar has developed a unique, intelligent oilpump pressure relief valve that senses oil pressure deep in the engine's oil galleries to control the oil pump delivery. As a result, oil pump frictional losses are reduced during the warm-up period.


The slick R version features a sixth-generation, twin vortex system supercharger specified to give the XFR 510 horsepower. The supercharger is a compact Roots-type unit that feeds air through twin intercoolers that are water cooled by their own cooling circuit. The Root's high helix rotor design improves the supercharger thermodynamic efficiency by 16 percent. It also virtually removes

supercharger "whine" so that you have to really listen for it. The intercoolers reduce the temperature of the pressurized intake air and so optimize power and efficiency.

The R's new air intake has been radically redesigned compared to the previous V-8. The intake air path is a direct feed to the supercharger inlet from the centrally mounted front throttle body. Air is delivered through twin air boxes, which reduce flow loss and further increase efficiency.

Mechanically, the new supercharger and its intercoolers are efficiently packaged in the "V" of the engine to deliver a low overall engine height in support of pedestrian safety requirements.

The result of all this technology is that drivers will notice how good the XF moves in standard and R forms. The technology advances in Jaguar's engines allow drivers to step up to another level of instant responses, seamless power and smooth, refined performance with no compromise to fuel efficiency. And, of course, drivers are surrounded by all that rich Jaguar leather, high-quality interior components, interior gadgetry and comfort for four or five in a pinch.



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Builders forecast an improved housing market in 2010

Low interest rates, tax credits and pent-up demand driving home sales

In the sales

In onebuilders who have weathered the recession are now forecasting better days ahead for buyers, selbers and the industry. A recent round-table conference was attended by representatives of large initional companies active in the Chicago market as well as independent and enston builders.

All are optimistic about 2010, and several are introducing new floor plans and new home communities.

Attending the conference were David L. Smith, vice president of sales and marketing for Cambridge Homes; Christopher P. Shaxted, executive vice president of Lakewood Home Building Solutious; Curt Langille, president of Lanco Development; Chris Naatz, Midwest area director of marketing for Pulte, Centex and Del Webb; Jeffrey L. Samuels, president of Samuels Homes; Andrew B. Konovodoff, president of Town and Country Homes, and Patrick Curran, president of West Point Builders.

"The signs are positive, with low interest rates, lower home prices and tax credits," said Konovodoff. "Consumer confidence is growing and unemployment is starting to turn around. Abuyer purchasing a \$200,000 home today with wan FHA mortgage of 3½ percent down and a tax credit will have a monthly payment of about \$1,200, an affordable number for many first-time buyers. The coming year will definitely be better, and the builders who remain in the unarket-place are focused on customer satisfaction to a greater degree than every before."

Builders cited the extended first-time home-

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
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



I am a first-time home-buyer, and I was planning to apply for an FHA loan. I understand that some changes in FHA requirements will go into effect soon. What are the changes, and is an FHA loan still a good choice?

A: With many conventional martgages requiring a 20 percent dawn payment, an FHA loan, with a down payment as low as 3% percent, is not only a GOOD choice. For many features are the second of the control of first-time buyers who can qualify for an FHA loan, it's the ONLY choice.

irist-time buyers who can quanty for in FHA loan, it's the ONLY choice. There are some new requirements going into effect soon, including a FICO score of at least 580, but because must lenders already require a score of 620 or higher, this wan't be a change for most buyers. The cleange for most buyers. The cleange that will affect buyers the most is an increase in the "unfront" portion of the mortgage insurance, from 1% percent to 2% percent. This amount is rolled into your loan, and will cause a small increase your mouthly payment. Here's the good news: this increase doesn't go into effect until April 5, so if you have a contract signed before that date, your loan will be configured using the old rules. Combined with the April 30 expiration date of the Federal Income Tax Credit, this change in FHA rules creates a powerful meeting the observed search and contracts in the starget in the contracts.

Income Tax Credit, this change in FHA rules creates a powerful intentive to make your home-brying derision sooner rather than later.

Let's talk a little more about the accredit. 

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Tea makes appealing ingredient in recipes

Although average tea percapita consumption may only be about half a cup a day, according to Joe Simrany, president of the Tea Association, a national organization based in New York, nearby Tea Lula, a 2-year-old Park Ridge shop run by Sheila Duda, is doing its best to attract more converts. Duda stocks more than 100 teas from the world's five major growing

Growing regions

From China comes Dragon Well and Clouded Mist green tea and keemun black tea, regarded as the "Burgundy of tea" because of its distinct flavor. India is represented by Darjeeling and the maltier-flavored Assams; Sri Lanka, Ceylon tea; Taiwan, Oolong; and Japan, green tea.

"What's most important is that a person sample a number of teas," said Duda. "Many people insist that they don't care for green tea because of its bitterness. Most likely the reason they think along those lines is because their tea was improperly brewed. But once they do a tasting they discover how enjoyable it can be."

■ Health benefits. Its antioxidant content is just one of many

- Ready-to-drink tea's convenience and availability. This has appealed to younger consumers and turned tea's image into a family-oriented drink. Once primarily associated as a drink of older females, tea now has a demographic similar to the softdrinks market.
- The allure of specialty tea. Discerning drinkers are becoming more attuned to specific origins of teas. Consumers, accustomed to mass-market brands such as Lipton, a blend of many teas, are branching out and becoming more adventurous as they experiment with more exotic new products.

Healthfulness


Duda recognizes the healthfulness of tea, citing its high polyphenol content and amino acid l-theanine which has a calming effect. But she steers away from trying to match it to a health condition. "That's not our job," she said.

While Tea Lula focuses on tea from the camellia sinensis plant (tea's botanical name), its inventory also includes herbal options such as rooibos and chamomile for those who can't handle caf-

In addition, it stocks funflavored teas, said Duda. The shop, which has tables that can accommodate a total of 12 tea drinkers, is open weekdays from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. (Thursday until 8 p.m.) and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Its shelves also are filled with brewing accessories and tea-related books.

Tonia George's The Tea Cookbook (Ryland, Peters & Small) covers everything from baked goods and desserts to savory dishes involving meats and spices. Duda said George's recipe for Green Tea Panna Cotta is a standout.

Green Tea Panna Cotta

1:1/2 T Matcha powder 6 T whole milk 2 tsp. powdered gelatir 2 C heavy cream 4 (5.0z.) teacups or small round cooking molds

Gradually mix the Matcha powder with 1 to 2 tablespoons of the milk in a small bowl until smooth. Pour the remaining milk into a small heatproof bowl and sprinkle the gelatin over it. Set aside for about 5 minutes, then place the bowl over a shallow saucepan of hot water and stir until dissolved. Let cool.

Put the cream and sugar in a saucepan and heat over low heat until almost boiling. Remove from the heat and pour into a large glass measuring cup. Beat in the Matcha powder mixture, then the gelatin solution. Beat until fully blended. Pour the mixture into the teacups or cooking molds, Refrigerate for 1 to 2 hours until set. The panna cotta should wobble but it shouldn't look as though there's liquid in the

If you have made the panna cotta in cooking molds, dip the bases briefly in boiling water, then invert onto plates and give one short, sharp shake to loosen them. They should drop out easily. If you've made them in teacups, serve as they are. Serves 4.

"This program allows teachers to have a real science experience and incorporate that into their classes their students can also participate in this work," said Luisa Rebull, a Spitzer Science Center associate research scientist. "By influencing the teachers, we impact all the kids the teacher has this year, the kids they'll have next year and so on. It's hard to beat that multiplicative effect of changing the lives of all those kids the teachers come into contact

with over the years." The teachers and their students learn how real scientists spend their days and what tools they use. "This program breaks down a barrier of what a scientist does The number one thing that these students learn is that astronomers are normal, nice people," said Rebull who coordinates the NITARP program. "They also learn about the process of science.

Sometimes you get a result and sometimes you don't."

While being a wonderful way to share science with science teachers and students, the program is extremely helpful in terms of making use of massive amounts of data that have been collected by astronomers, but have never been analyzed.

"There's so much data that even the original astronomers who requested that data can't use it all." said Rebull. "There's all sorts of interesting science just waiting to be done.' The program began at the

American Astronomical Society meeting in January in Washington, D.C., where the teachers had a crash course in infrared astronomy, split up into four teams and learned about their general area of research for the project. The four teams are conducting the following research: seeking young stars in our galaxy, studying nearby active galaxies, studying Epsilon Aurigae (an eclipsing binary variable star — a star that dims when its partner obscures its light), and studying other stellar variability. 

Many deals offer declarer a choice of several lines of play. While it may not always be clear which approach is the best of the lot, it shouldn't be too difficult to decide which is the



The bidding:

North East South West 3♣ Pass

Opening lead -- Q♠

Today's deal from a duplicate game is of this type. At every table, South wound up in three no trump, and West led the Q♠ after having overcalled in spades.

At some tables, declarer won the first trick and immediately tried a club finesse. East won and returned a spade, and it was then just a matter of time before West gained the lead with the A♥ to cash his spades and set the contract.

Other declarers decided that since at least one heart trick would be needed to score nine tricks, hearts should be attacked before clubs. This would force West to take the A♥ — possibly his only entry — before his spades became

So these declarers won the first spade, crossed to dummy with a diamond, led the 10♥ and let it ride. West took the ace and returned a spade, but South was now in full control. Even though the club finesse lost, East was out of spades and had to return another suit. A repeat of the heart finesse then brought declarer to nine tricks in the form of two spades, two hearts, two diamonds and three clubs.

Yet another variation was found at other tables. These declarers ducked the first spade lead entirely, won the spade continuation and then tried the club finesse. East won but could not return a spade, so declarer had time to finesse East for the Q♥. West won the heart with the ace, but since South still had a spade stopper, these declarers also finished with nine tricks.

The relative merits of the second and third lines of play may be debatable, but one thing is certain: Those who chose the first line, making no effort whatsoever to defuse the threat of West's spades, clearly adopted the worst approach.


Sarkisian scored 493.4 points to win Saturday's New Trier Section-


