Introduction

In 2009, our daughter Daphne Michelle was born. Everyone who is a parent knows how having your first child affects your perspective on live. As much about the future, and that your children will have a good life, as about the past and that your children will have a sense of legacy carried forward from their ancestors.

Growing up in the Netherlands, I have always been interested in my family background. Encouraged by my father, who had collected much information in various places. In 2008 we printed the first "Family Smid-Roelofs" history book as a reference and memory for close relatives. I felt strongly that Daphne should have a similar kind of background from her mother's side.

Obviously the search began with the brother, sister, cousins, aunts and uncles of Tammy. Like most families in the United States with European roots, but contrary to my own family, who mostly have all lived within a 50 mile radius in the northern part of the Netherlands, Tammy's family has roots in many States and countries, and eventually trace back to Scotland and England from the McAlpine side, and to France from the Levan side of the family.






Figure 2 Wilfred McAlpine (2) and Wanda LeVan (3).




Figure 8 Wilfred Robert McAlpine (4).




Figure 10 McAlpine Family grave site at Woodlawn Cemetary, Detroit.


Figure 19 Pictures of ...




Figure 28 Hencie Levan (6) and Cora Lee Meeks (7).




Figure 33 School teacher with three Levn children on the right.

Stories and Anecdotes

ORIGIN OF THE SURNAME McALPINE

Adapted from McAlpine "Roots and All" [14]

Hereditary surnames (surnames that stay the same and are passed on from parents to children) were practically nonexistent until about 1100 A.D. In Ireland, surnames appeared in the 900's among royalty and clergy, and they had become hereditary by the thirteenth century. In Scotland, they were in limited use around 1150 A.D. for similar classes of people, and they became more or less stabilized in the period 1500-1700 A.D. However, it was not until the eighteenth century that consistent use of surnames became universally established in the Highlands of Scotland.

The surname, McAlpine, is a patronym based on Alpin or variations such as Alpine, Ailpean, Ailpein, Ailpin, Ailphin, Elphin and Elpin. The root name, Alpin, is of Pictish origin from the southern Strathearn or Strathclyde regions of Scotland. It seems probable that the origin of the surname Alpin itself, stems from Albyn or Alba (Scottish Pictland Highlands), the original name of the old Pictish kingdom adjacent to Dalriada. However some writers have suggested that the name Alpin is derived from the Gaelic word "ailpean", meaning elf. Still others feel that there is a connection between the names Alba, Alpin and the Celtic word alp, meaning "high mountain". Interestingly enough, that is the name applied to the Alps mountains of Europe which, from prehistoric times until the Roman conquest of the Gauls (60-52 B.C.), constituted part of the territory inhabited by the Celtic people.

Nora Chadwick5, noted that in early references to the death of Nial-of-the-Nine Hostages (a famous fifth century High King of Ireland) "i Alpi" probably means "in Alba" rather than "in the Alps".

According to the earliest historical records, there were several ancient Pictish/Dalriadic kings, or subkings, named Alpin, or Elpin, who ruled over certain areas of Pictland and/or Dalriada before the time of Alpin the Scot, a displaced eighth century king of Dalriada (see Chart 1). Alpin the Scot is especially significant because he was the father of King Kenneth McAlpin, who succeeded him in 841 A.D. and is generally recognized as the first King of both the Picts and the Scots (843). Kenneth, sometimes called Kenneth the Great or Kenneth the Hardy, is also generally accepted as the first one to whom the surname McAlpin was applied. The final e has been added and dropped repeatedly throughout the course of time. The prefixes Mc and Mac are simply contractions of the Gaelic word for "son of" or "grandson of". In Ireland it was usually transliterated as "Mc", and in Scotland as "Mac". Sometimes it appears simply as "M'". Many different spellings of McAlpine are found, including MacAlpin, MacAlpine, Macalpin, Macalpine, McAlpin, McAlpy, McAlpyne, etc.; and of course, there are other surnames derived from it such as Calpin, Kelpin, Elpin, Elphin, with and without the Mc or Mac.

The earliest records of the root name Alpin, or Elpin, are entries embedded in ancient Irish annal collections and king lists. These entries include such details as reign lengths, dates of death and genealogical data. Together, such documents give us an almost continuous framework for the history of both the Dalriadic kingdom, the birthplace of Kenneth McAlpin's maternal ancestors, and the Pictish kingdom, Alba. Of course, all of the original records for this period were hand written. They were made by early Christian monks and scribes, and date back to the time of St. Patrick in the fifth century.

Annal writing began with a practice of entering brief notes in blank spaces of the "Easter Tables" which were kept in every church or monastery of consequence. (For an explanatory account, see Anderson, M.O., 1973, pp. 205-2086). Most of the early tables were destroyed or lost, but, because of the annal notes that they contained, some were copied and recopied and have been preserved. The oldest of these, the "Annals of Innisfallen" was partly written about the end of the eleventh century. Others include the "Irish Synchronisms" by Fland Mainistrech, Fland of Monasterboice, also compiled in the eleventh century (Skene, 1887, I, p. 139)7 the "Annals of Ulster", whose principal manuscripts are of the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries; and the "Annals of Tigernach" (after an abbot of Clonmacnoise who died in 1088) written in the fourteenth century.

In addition to the Annals, there are a number of Scottish and Pictish "Regnal Lists" (see Anderson, 1973, p.X6) which, since 1922, have been known by alphabetical names: List A, List B, List C, and so on, based on the order of the lists in one of W.F. Skene's works.8 The first of these, Regnal List A, deals with "the Poppleton Manuscript" (after Robert of Poppleton, a Carmelite friar who became prior of the convent of Hulne near Alnwick in 1364). It is a miscellaneous collection, in several hands including his own, in large part written at York by order of brother Robert of Poppleton (Anderson, 19736).

Besides the Annals and Regnal Lists there are a number of ancient "Chronicles" dealing with the same subject matter. These include the Verse Chronicle, the earliest version of a Regnal List. It is an elegiac poem in Latin, complete with chronicle notes listing the Scottish kings from Kenneth, son of Alpin the Scot, onward, copied into the margins and spaces of the Chronicle of Melrose, probably not later than 1264. (Anderson, 19736)

Documentary evidence other than Annals, Regnal Lists and chronicles, all of which deal primarily with royalty, is limited mainly to two writers, St. Adomnan and St. Bede. By painstakingly comparing the historical and genealogical data gleaned from all available sources, scholars and historians of recent times have been able to piece together a more or less complete account of the names, lives, deaths, regnal periods and genealogy of the kings of both the Dalriadic and Pictish kingdoms from the fifth century onward. The best documented and most complete synthesis yet provided is Anderson's Kings and Kingship in Early Scotland6.

Anderson's conclusions are summarized in Chart 1. Reference to this chart show the existence of several King Alpins prior to King Kenneth McAlpin's father, Alpin the Scot, and it is these Alpins who represent the oldest recorded bearers of the root-name Alpin. Probably there were other lesser individuals in Pictland in these and in previous generations who bore the same name, but of course, they were not recorded.

Perhaps it is of interest to provide some details of a few annal entries concerning these early Alpins. For example, in the Annals of Ulster it is noted that "Brudeus filius Bili, Rex Pictorum Albaniae, et filius Nechtani, Mortuus est 693", and "Bilius filius Alpini Rex Alcluidae Mortuuntur 792". In the Annals of Tigernac it is recorded that "Donaldus filius Alpini, Rex Alcluidensis, Mortuus est 694", and "Bilius filius Alpini, Rex Alcluidae Mortuunter 792". Also, in the Annals of Tigernach it is stated, in Latin, that one Elpin (=Alpin) succeeded his brother Brust, who was ousted from the kingship of the Picts in 726, after serving as king for two years; two years later (728) he was defeated by Angus (=Oengus) in one battle at Monid Crib, and again the same year, in another battle at Castellum Credi. In one of the Pictish Regnal Lists there is an entry of an Alpin, son of Wroid, a Pictish sub-king who was reigning in 775.

By combining these data and information from other sources, Anderson was able to postulate that the Alpin (=Elpin) who was king of the Picts from 726 to 728 is the same Alpin who was king of Dalriada (reign ended 736), and that the Alpin (=Elpin) who was king of the Saxons/Picts and died in the year






Figure 34 Map of the Argyll Shire in Scottland.




Figure 35 A more recent map of Argyll, Scottland

Brief History Of The Meek Family

Adapted from "Decendants of James Meeks Ca. 1700 ~ 1756" [10]

This is a letter written circa 1962 by Gray Meek (1889-1974). His grave in Roberts Cemetery, near Nicholls, Georgia, has the only tombstone for someone that d. in the 1900s in Coffee County, where the name is spelled MEEK, instead of MEEKS.

This is a letter to his granddaughter, Sandra Kay, who was about to be married. I could not make out the spelling of her fiancé's name. The copy I have is faint and I hope I have retyped it without making too many errors. My copy came from the Genealogy Department, Satilla Regional Library, Douglas, Georgia.

You will note that I have never used the "S" on my name. The story of how it came to be added and finally accepted by this particular segment of the family is a story within itself:

A Col. Nicholls from Blackshear, Georgia came up here and made a public address about the time of the Spanish-American War and during the course of the address he dropped the thought that inasmuch as there were so many by that name locally they should be called "MEEKS" instead. He surely was not very well versed in his English since there was provision for the carrying out of his suggestion already since Meeks is correct when speaking of them in the plural, or in forming the possessive case. I could not but wonder what this "learned" man could possibly know about what the family name should be that those belonging to the family did not already know. Any way they caught on fast and soon began adding the "S", which only led to confusion, and it compounded. If we accept the "S" as a part of the name and wish to form the plural then we must, of necessity, add still another "S".

Then the second "S" has as rightful a place as the first. So the question is, -"where would it finally end?" I recall distinctly many discussions as regards the merits of the lawyer's bright idea--whether we should continue using the "S", or go back to the original form of the name. Well, custom is most difficult to combat. I was old enough at the time to do some thinking for myself, and incidentally do a bit of research. Ancient head-stones in this region as well as Bible records all bore out my personal belief that the whole thing was a collosal [sic] error, so I declined to follow my relatives when they departed from the ways of their laurels. So this is the story of it. Right around here and in Missouri is the only places I know of where a sizable number of the family use the "S".

The history of the family has been traced back to Adam Meek of Lincolnshire [sic] England, b. 1640. Such genealogy is authentic. The name appears in English records for as far back as 1100 or 1200 A.D. You know how "fashionable" it is to claim that your ancestors came over on the Mayflower. I fail to see that this would help much. No one doing research into the history of the family ever made such a claim, but it is true that those taking passage on the Mayflower came from all around that beautiful province in "Merry Old England" where Adam Meek was b., lived his life out, and where all that is mortal of him still rests by the side of a little stone church in Lincolnshire [sic].

For this reason it is not impossible that someone by the name, or either their blood relatives might have taken passage on the Mayflower. I know of no one who claims they did, and I know of no one in the family who particularly cares. Some of the earliest settlers, by the name, who came to this Country

settled around Boston, and it is known that President Kennedy's strain and the Meek strain join forces somewhere back down the line.

There was a William Meek b. either in Hill or Bladen County, N.C. about the year 1750. He is evidently a grandson of Adam Meek. He was among the first to join forces with the American revolutionists and fought for our independence from the Mother Country for the duration. A son was b. to him by the name of Francis Meek about the year 1770. He came down into Emanuel County, Georgia about the year 1810, where he d. and was buried. Francis had a son, Chas. C. Meek, b. 1797. I have a record of his birth in the old family Bible which I still possess. It was published 1837. Chas C. Meek had a son (my grandfather) named Merritt. He settled two or three miles East of Nicholls. To him was b. Malcom Meek (my father). This brings things down to the writer who was b. Sept. 9, 1889. Then came Wilbert, b. June 8, 1916. I shall let you take up from here on.

Of one thing you may rest assured, and that is that while none of your ancestors on the Meek side belonged to the nobility, yet they qualified for what I like to think of as "The Brotherhood of True Nobles" which is not based upon inherited wealth. They were of the purest of Anglo-Saxon stock and were the very cream of the King's Domain. I can remember many of my elders who compared well with leaders of the Old South. They did not have much in the way of education (None was to be had at that time) but their personalities, and hereditary gifts made it possible for them to sit in the council of ministers and not be plagued by an inferiority complex.

My granddaughter, I have simply taken advantage of a rainy day to write you all this which I have merely conjured up out of my "leaky" mind. Have not taken time to refer to my records. I do not have anything in the form of bound book, but am accumulating quite a bit of history pertaining to the family. If I ever have the pleasure of meeting this lucky captain I will make anything I have available to the two of you.

Please be on the lookout for mistakes in this rather lengthy record. If what I have written does not read right you will know that I had in my mind to say the right thing any way. As I write I cannot distinguish all the keys I employ, but have been at this so long I just know they are there, because they were there the last time I used them.

I am working on the announcement but could use a bit more data. For instance, what was the name and location of the college you have been attending? And does Capt. Tomeling(sp?) have any other status, position, designation, or anything like that other than Capt., U.S. Army? If so please communicate such to me. Let me hear from you as soon as possible.

P.S. I forgot to tell you that you are a pretty thorough mixture of Scottish, Irish, and English. Your grandmother, about five times removed, and on my mother's side was b. in Dublin, Ireland. While I have not refreshed my memory on the historical facts I seem to recall that the Scots were engaged in a sort of hot war which went against them. It must have been with the English--they always paired off pretty well with them if a fight was in prospect. They came by the thousands, and lest they became lonesome for their towering mountain peaks, settled in Western, N.C. When the Seminoles were about the only remnant of the American Indians remaining in Georgia they saw an opportunity to acquire a State grant to virgin land down here, so moved on down into Emanuel County, and then on down here. This became all but a

Scottish settlement. My grandfather Meek married a Mary Ann Morrison, and I have always been told that she was full blood Scottish. My oldest brother now 84 has recollections of her and he always told me that she surely looked the part.

"Thomps" T. Levan, resident of Tracy City, Grundy County, Tenn. In Aug-Sept. 1862 he lost 1000 bu. corn, 10 beef cattle, 3 tons hay, 1 fine horse, 64 pork hogs all taken by McCooks Division, Army of the Cumberland.

In July-Aug. of 1863 he lost 100 bu corn form crib, 30 acres of corn from field, 1 ton hay, 4 beef cattle, 20 hogs, lost 100 bu corn from crib, 30 acres of corn from field, 1 ton hay, 4 beef cattle, 20 hogs, all taken by Gen. Wagner of Woods' Division. In 1864 he lost 8 wagon loads of corn, taken by Col. W.B. Stokes and Capt. Raulston of the 5th Tenn. Cav. Total amount claims is \$3,649. Levan swears his sympathies were with the Union and he never did anything against it. His witnesses were John P. Hefner and E.F. Colyar. His loyalty can be proved by Isaac Rust, Samuel B. Rust and Hiram Kilgore. The facts of the case can be proven by Isaac Samuel Rust and Samuel K. Levan.

(Same date?] John C. Rust age 26 resident of Pelham, Grundy Co., states he is not related to Levan but has known him about 14 years. Saw him often during the war and "often conversed with him as to the war its causes and progress. Have known the claimant to aid young men who had been conscripted into the Rebel army to get released and have known him to give advice and assistance to others to escape conscription. In the winter of 1862&3 I know of claimant piloting a Captain of the Federal Army around the Rebel lines to give him an opportunity to escape arrest. This was done, and by the efforts of the claimant the Captain (Pryor was his name) escaped what seemed certain capture.

Claimant was acquainted with they Bye paltes[?] in the mountains and I also know of his piloting Lieut Dickens a Federal Officer around the Rebel lines at Altamont I had a pass through the lines and claimant went around with this officer and I met them beyond the Rebel lines both of these officers remained in the Union Army until the close of the war."

Did not see the Federals take Levan's property in 1862, but when Gen. Buell's army passed Levan's farm in Sept. Rust saw the soldiers of his army kill and carry off 15 or 20 of his hogs, and knows that all of his hogs except 8 or 10 were taken at this time. "Claimant had a large property and had the kind the Army needed."

17 Aug. 1872. Thomps T. Levan deposition. Age 56, farmer, etails what was taken and when. Says that Isaac and Samuel Rust and his family were all present when it was taken (in one instance). States he had 224 acres on the plantation where the property was taken, and 150 acres on the mountain side. Says he was appointed Enrolling Officer for the Confederates by the County Court in his absence and without his knowledge, but "did not accept the position and had nothing to do with that or any other department of the Military or Civil service of the Confederacy." Says he had a son James who was in the rebel army. "He was grown and married and did not live with me when he went into the army.

He now lives in Grundy County. I give him no aid, but when he come home I kept him from going back. I had 2 nephews in the federal army James and Jeremiah Levan. They now live in Marion County Tenn.

"At the beginning of the rebellion in 1861 I voted for the Union and against separation. My sympathies and all my talk was against the rebellion. After the State seceded and the Confederate government was organized I did not go with the State but adhered to the Union throughout the war."

Feb. 28, 1874. John H. Wager, Special Agent, to Commissioner of Pensions. "I have the honor to state T was informed that Thomas T. Levan who has a claim filed before the Claims Commission was a rebel sympathizer he resides in Grundy County Tenn. by Robert Sanders of that county."

22 Oct. 1875. Jno. 13. Brownlow, New Market, Jefferson Co. Term., to "Friend Burkett." "In August 1873 while I was at Decherd investigating claims, 1 heard that one T.T. Levan of Grundy County, who has a claim before the Southern Claims Commission, was a Rebel. My recollection is that you were my informant. If I am correct in this I have to request that you will go before some Notary and have your deposition taken setting forth the facts and giving your information as to the course pursued by this claimant, T.T. Levan, during the war. If you do not personally know the course pursued by this claimant you can give your deposition as to his general reputation among his loyal neighbors as you learned it while in Grundy Co. Enclosed I send a form of deposition.

Undated notes on card. "T.T. Levan, Grundy County Term., reported disloyal by Wm, H. Hampton, Altamont, Grundy Co. Letter to Mr. Hampton calling for particulars Oct. 12, 1875 and letter marked for return in 3 days."

[Undated] Deposition of Isaac Rust. Age 59 resident of Grundy Co. States he is not related to Levan.

Lived within on-half mile of Levan during war. Save the Federal Army in Aug. 1862 take about 1200 bushels corn from Levan's cribs, and drive 10-12 head of Levan's cattle and 25-30 hogs into their camp.

Also saw same army take 3 to 5 tons of hay, fodder and oats away in wagons from Levan's farm. In 1862 saw Gen. Buel's army take at least 1000 bushels old corn from crib, 10 head of beef cattle, 3 to 4 tons of fodder or hay and 75 to 80 hogs. Did not see horse taken at that time, but heard that claimant had one taken. In July-Aug. 1863 Gen. Wagner [?] of Gen. Wood's division took from Levan 100 bushels corn from crib, 28 to 30 acres of corn from field, 3 to 4 head of beef cattle and 25-30 hogs. In 1 864 he saw Capt. Raulston of 5th Tenn. Cavalry take 8 or 9 wagon loads of corn from Levan, each holding about 15 bushels. Provides estimates of value for each group of items taken. Says Levan has 200 acres bottom land and more land on mountain. "There was a time when Union men had to remain at home and did keep close. But claimant did, when a Rebel Company was being raised in our neighborhood, persuade young men not to join and piloted my son with other young men through the country to escape conscription. I consider such acts the best of proof. I was myself and out and out Union man, and made myself so obnoxious to the Rebels that I was compelled to save my life and hide myself in the mountains, and the claimant assisted me at all times when in his power." Says the objects were taken in daytime publicly by the soldiers in the presence of the officers. "I do not remember the name of any of the officers who was present except Frank Rust who was a foraging master

[?]. He asked me who lived over there pointing to the claimant's place and I told him Mr. Levan. He then said he was going over there to get his forage and I saw him do it and carrying it to camps. They were camped in about I mile of Altamont - they commenced taking the property in a day or two after they got there and remained two or three months. I do not remember any other citizen who saw the taking unless it be some members of my own family. "I lived near the claimant all through the war and talked to him often both publicly and privately and think I am well acquainted with his sentiments and sympathist and I never heard him utter a sentiment or exhibit a feeling or do an act that showed anything but loyalty to the government of the United States. His whole reputation among his acquaintances of all classes of opinion was that of a Union man to and he was so well known to be so that he could not prove his loyalty to the government of the Confederacy. I do not now remember any particular thing he ever said for the government during the whole war, but his whole sentiments as expressed to me are now remembered by me as being for the Union and against the rebellion. On one occasion he helped a son of mine to escape from the rebels. "I was a Union man myself and he knew I was and I know he was. He was appointed a Conscript officer by the rebels but instead of doing them good on the position he done them injury by keeping the young men out of their way."

[Undated] Deposition of Samuel Rust, age 25, blacksmith, resident of Tracy City. Not related to claimant. Lived about one-quarter mile from Levan during the war. Repeats essentially the same list of items taken as given by Isaac Rust, with less detail. Says that the corn in the field "was cut down and hauled out stalk and all." "I know what the reputation of the claimant was for Loyalty.

My Father and our family were Loyal men. Claimant saved one Brother from the Rebel Army. He was conscripted and claimant got him off. I knew several other young men that claimant saved from the Rebel Army, and that he done all in his power to dissuade young men from joining the Rebels. I was too young to converse much with older persons but often heard my father speak of claimant's course as that of an ultra Union man."

[Undated] Remarks of Claims Committee. "Claimant was a farmer over 60 years of age. He resided in Grundy Co. Tenn. Had a son in the Confederate army. Says he fed the Union soldiers, piloted the federal army, saved several young men from conscription, kept his son from returning to the army when he came home, and claims to have always been a Union man. "Mr. Rust one of his witnesses to loyalty alleges that he himself was a Union man. He filed a claim which has been disallowed for want of

satisfactory proof of his loyalty. "Another witness was only 14 years of age when the war commenced and the third witness to loyalty resided 20 miles from the claimant. These are not witnesses likely to know much about the claimant's real status. Nothing appears to show that either the Federal or Confederates regarded him as a loyal man, that the latter did not is quite certain from the fact that the County Court appointed him enrolling officer for the Confederates." A special agent of the Pension Department reports to the Commissioner of Pensions that Mr. Levan 'was a rebel sympathizer.' "The proof of loyalty is not satisfactory and the claim is refused."

Thomas Thompkins Levan - Southern Claim Commission

1872, Grundy County, TN

I lost the property and much more material in my petition - the property was taken by Gen. Buell's Army in August and September 1862 and by Gen. Woods Division of Rosecranz Army in July and August 1863 and by Stokes Cavalry in October 1864 - I did not see each article actually taken – I saw the corn in Item 1 taken - I ascertain the quality by measurement of the cribs - there was 1000-1100 bush of old corn taken at that time by the Army of Gen. Buell. Item No 2. I saw 8 head of the cattle taken – they would average 450lb each they were driven off. Item No3- I saw the fodder oats and hay taken that goes to make up this item - it was taken from the lofts in my barn and from stocks - it was carried in wagons 4th Item – I did not see the horse taken - but saw it afterwards in possession of the army there was a cavalry soldier upon it.

Item No 5. I lost by Gen Buells Army 65 head of good fat pork hogs. I saw the larger portion of them taken - at least 45 head. All of the above was taken by Buells Army in 1862 at that time the Army was encamped about ½ a mile from me and remained there 8 to 10 days. At this time corn was worth \$1 per bush. Beef 8cents per pound. Hay \$20 per ton. The horse was worth \$150. Pork was worth 10cents per pound and the hogs I lost would average 150-160 nett each.

Items 6. 100 Bush corn from crib Item 7. 30 acres of corn in the field. I saw them cut down and haul away to camp in wagons.

Item No. 8 the same Item 9 - 4 Head of beef cattle was driven to camp by the army. The cattle would average 350 lbs each nett.

Item No. 10 - I saw the Army take 20 head of hogs ave. 100lbs each.

All of the above items from No. 6 to No 10. inclusive were taken by Gen Wagner's Brigade of Woods Division in the latter part of July and 1st of August 1863 and I saw each item taken. The value of the articles were the same as in 1862 with the exception of the corn in the field there was 30 acres of that taken - it would have made 30 bush per acre- and was worth including the corn fodder taken with it \$1 per bush. I paid \$1.50 for bush soon afterwards for corn.

Item No 11. was 8 wagon loads of corn taken by Capt Raulston - 5th Lewis Cavalry from by crib. The loads averaged 15 bush each and the corn was worth \$1 per bush. I saw it taken. Crop examination by special commission The corn in one of the cribs was shucked and that in the other crib was not shucked- and the balance was in the field. I did not measure or weigh any of the corn and only know the quantity by my measurement of the cribs and the best estimate I could make of the size and product of the field.

I arrived at the quantity of all of the other forage by making my best estimates of it from my knowledge of the articles and not from any actual weight or measurement. I counted what was taken and have correctly stated the number. The cattle were yokes of oxen and the balance grown cows except 2 years old. The hogs were a mixed lot some 65 of them were 2 years old and fat and the balance was smaller but in good order. The horse was 5 years old and a serviceable horse. I only saw that portion of the property taken that I mentioned and was not present when it was all taken. It was taken in day time probably by regular foraging parties when the respective armies were camped near my place within ½ mile. They carried the articles to their camps and used them on the army. Isaac Rust, Samuel and Rust and my own family were present when these articles were being taken. Forage was hauled away by the soldiers in the army wagons and the stock was drove away.

I went to the forage master and made complaint and he said they were obliged to have it - that they had come over the Mountain without supplies and were obliged to have the articles. I asked for voucher and he promised to give them to me but they went away and I got none - for the reason that they were unexpectedly ordered away and did leave before the morning in which I was to go after the vouchers. I had 224 acres in the plantation where this property was raised and 150 on the Mountainside. The 224 acre tract was then worth \$20 per acre and the Mountain land worth \$1 per acre - and the lands are worth that now.

JOHN LADD SHOT TO DEATH DURING STREET FRACAS

MONTEAGLE SCENE OF KILLING

Slain Man Was Well-Known In Marion County.—Often In Difficulties.

John Ladd, well-known in upper Marion county and often in difficulties with officers of the law because of alleged law violations, was shot and



instantly killed in Monteagie Tucseay, September 16, following a street encounter with Henry Norwood.

The killing took place at the railroad crossing near the old Fairmount college site.

Ladd, according to reports following the shooting, had lost a quantity of wine, and had charged sons of Henry Norwood with the theft. Ladd and the elder Norwood met at the grade crossing and a hot discussion followed.

Norwood, who was armed with a shotgun, fired on Ladd at short range, the charge striking him in the chest, killing him instantly. Norwood claimed that Ladd had made a gesture as if to draw a weapon, and that he fired in self-defense.

Both Ladd and Norwood are well-known in the Monteagle section. Ladd was at one time a prisoner in Marion county jail, and made his escape by taking out a section of brick wall. He was later resoluted.

The Tennessee General Assembly established Grundy County in 1844 from parts of Warren, Coffee, and later, Marion Counties. It was named in honor of Felix Grundy, a Virginian who migrated to Tennessee by way of Kentucky. Grundy served in both the U.S. House and U.S. Senate and was attorney general under President Martin Van Buren.

The first County Court was held at Beersheba Springs and then at several individual homes near the present site of Altamont, which was established as the permanent county seat in 1848. The founding of Beersheba Springs and Pelham predated the formation of Grundy County.

Long associated with the economic history of the county, coal was discovered in the area of present-day Tracy City in the 1840s while Ben Wooten's sons were digging out a groundhog from beneath a stump. In 1848 a young Irishman, Leslie Kennedy, followed the construction of the Nashville and Chattanooga Railroad in search of moneymaking opportunities. While hiking through the Cumberland Plateau he became

interested in coal outcroppings and returned to Nashville to seek financial backing for a coal mining venture. Nashville attorney William N. Bilbo listened to his scheme and bought the Wooten land and vast tracts belonging to the Samuel Barrell heirs, before heading to New York to find developers for the coal lands. Samuel Franklin Tracy and a group of financiers traveled to Tennessee and purchased Bilbo's holdings, which they used to form the Sewanee Mining Company with Tracy as president. When the Sewanee site proved less productive than expected, the mining company extended their tracks ten miles farther to the Wooten site, which became the town of Tracy City. The first coal was shipped from the site on November 8, 1858.

After the Civil War, creditors in New York and Tennessee won judgments against the company and bought the property. Arthur St. Clair Colyar, a Tennessee attorney, became the president of the new company, which became the Tennessee Coal, Iron, and Railroad Company in 1882. Colyar recognized the need for coke in the iron smelting industry and experimented with its production. In 1873 the company erected the famous Fiery Gizzard Coke Iron Furnace at Tracy City and produced fifteen tons of iron before it collapsed. That original furnace demonstrated the efficacy of Tracy City coal and determined the economic future of the city.

In 1869 developers Eugen H. Plumacher, John Hitz, and Peter Staub established a Swiss settlement, Gruetli. Among the Swiss immigrants to the settlement were the Angst, Amacher, Bonholzer, Schild, Flury, and Scholer families.

Monteagle, first called Moffat Station, was founded by John Moffat, an organizer in the temperance movement. In 1870 Moffat purchased the 1,146 acres of forest land on the Cumberland Plateau that became Monteagle. In 1882 the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly incorporated to promote the "advancement of science, literary attainment, Sunday school interest and promotion of the broadest popular culture in the interest of Christianity without regard to sect or denomination." Andrew Nelson Lytle, the Vanderbilt Agrarian, did much of his writing at Monteagle, including his biography of Nathan Bedford Forrest.

The Summerfield community lies between Tracy City and Monteagle. There May Justice wrote more than sixty children's books. The community was also the site of the controversial Highlander Folk

School from 1932 until 1962. This school, headed by Myles Horton, began as a training facility for labor organizers. In the 1950s, it became famous for its promotion of civil rights and the training of civil rights leaders.

In 1903 the Sewanee Coal, Coke and Land Company began mining coal in Coalmont, first called Coaldale. In 1908 the Sewanee Fuel and Iron Company bought the holdings and built coke ovens on the site. Coalmont is now the location of the new Grundy County High School and a privately operated state prison.

In 1918 the railroad was extended to Palmer, where the Tennessee Consolidated Coal Company opened up new coalmines. Pelham, located in the valley part of Grundy County, is a farming town and contains several small manufacturing businesses. In addition to these small industrial plants, Grundy County's economy includes a growing nursery industry and several hundred chicken broiler houses.

In 1972 the long efforts of Herman Baggenstoss of Tracy City led to the creation of the South Cumberland Recreation Area. It includes the Stone Door, Savage Gulf, Grundy Lakes, and Fiery Gizzard parks, which receive thousands of visitors each year.

Like so many Appalachian areas, Grundy County citizens have suffered through trying times, but continue to prosper. According to the 2000 census, 14,332 people lived in Grundy County.

Levan History

The following transcription is a speculation on the relationship between James Benjamin Levan and the original ancenstors Jacob and Daniel Levan.

Chart for Some Probable Descendants of Daniel Levan (c1705-1777).

Daniel Levan arrived 18 Sep 1727 at Philadelphia PA on ship William and Sarah.

Settled near his earlier arriving brother Jacob Levan in the area now known as Maxatawny Twsp, Berks County PA.

He was a German speaking French Huguenot. The Huguenots were Protestants and were refugees from Roman Catholic France and French controlled areas. They left and/or were expelled during the frequent religious conflicts and wars of that time period. The Levans were staunch members of the Reformed (Protestant) faith. See the book "The Trail of the Huguenots" by Dr. G. Elmore Reaman for more about the Huguenots. The Levan family is listed therein as a Huguenot family which first fled to Amsterdam, Holland in the late 1600's.

Descendants then later resettled in Berks County, Pennsylvania, in the early 1700's.

The Huguenots were attracted to Pennsylvania for the religious freedom it offered.

The original immigrant Le Vans were three brothers who were Hugenots who left France for the Netherlands, where they sailed for America. Four brothers LeVan sailed in 1699, one died at sea, and the survivors settled around Philadelphia.

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Daniel Levan (born 1660-1670 in France and died 1710-1725 in Holland.) He married Marie Beau, born 1682 in France and died in Holland)

They had 6 children: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Daniel, and Anna Elizabeth.

I think that James Benjamin LeVan was originally Jacob LeVan, and descended as follows:

Daniel LeVan (Sr) (~1665? – unk), b. Picardy, France, d. Amsterdam, Holland; m. ~1695? Marie (Beau) (~1672? – unk), They were Huguenots who fled France following revocation of the Edict of Nantes, which had guaranteed religious freedom to French Protestants. He was a weaver; good family on both sides.

Daniel (Sr) and Marie had seven children: 6 sons and 1 daughter. The children emigrated to America and PA about 1727.

Son Daniel (Jr) (\sim 1695? -6/1777) settled at Maxatawny twp, Berks Co PA; m \sim 1730? To Susanna (Siegfried) (\sim 1710? -5/2/1778). They had sixteen children: 5 sons, 11 daughters.

Son Abraham (Sr) (9/5/1748 - 5/27/1823) was b. Maxatawny twp and d. Siegfrieds, Northampton Co, PA. He had Revolutionary War service. Married 2/7/1769 to (Maria) Magdalena (Siegfried) (~1753? – unk). They had ten children: 9 sons, 1 daughter.

Son Jacob (~1775? - >1850) was b. at Allen twp, Northampton Co, later resided Marion, TN and is bur. At Mt Olive cem, Marion. There is no information on him with the Berks County LeVans. I think he changed his name from Jacob (which is German for James) and moved to TN. The dates fit. The lack of PA info fits. He m. ~1795? Frances Fanny (Unk) (There's the Frances of your inquiry) and they had twelve children: 5 sons, 7 daughters.

Elliott County, KY

Eliott County was named in honor of Captain John Lisle Elliott, who came to Kentucky from Scott County, Virginia, with his wife and children and located in what is now the central part of Elliott County, on a large farm toi which he gave the name "Highland Forest". He was a leading man in Elliott County during his life time, and one of its most honored and respected citizens.

He represented Elliott County in the Legislature for a number of years being its first representative. He also served a term as Senator. He married Miss Jane Richie, who was a cousin of Thomas Richie, of the Richmond Eagle Enquirer, who in his day was called the "Napoleon of the American Trees". John Lisle Elliott's mother was Nannah Scott, who was a cousin of Gov. Winfield Scott and also of Charles Scott – one of the early Governors of Kentucky. John Lisle Elliott was the father of nine children vis: Samuel R. Elliott, who served as a Commander in the Confederate Army for sevveral years, John Milton Elliott, who served his State as a Circuit Judge, Member of Congress, was a member of the Congress of Conffederate Statesof America and later was Judge of the Court of Appeals of Kentuckywhen he was assasinated in the year 1879. James Winfield Scott Elliott, who died rather young, Leonidea Hamilton Elliott, who served as a Captain in the Confederate Army and was killed near Jeffersonville, Virginia, in battl, Ephrain Blaine Elliott, who was one of Kentucky's most talented citizens, William Kinead Elliott, who was killed in the Civil War and Benjamin Franklin Elliott, the youngest, who when a mere boy, entered the Confederate Army and served until the close of the war.

His daughter Amanda Elliott married Jerry Richards of Carter County and many of her descendants lived in Carter County. Mary Jane Elliott, his sister married Littleton Harris, and moved to one of the southern states where she lived until her death several years ago.

This history of the Elliott family was printed in the Norehead Independent Nov. 1, 1934. Benjamin Franklin Elliott was my father. Nancy Kegley Elliott was my mother. She was the daughter of Abraham Kegley and Rachel Leedy Kegley.

John L. Elliott, Alias Isaac Lowe

John L. Elliott will require no introduction to residents of Elliott Co., KY named for his son, Judge John M. Elliott who was assassinated at Frankfort, KY in 1879, and he should be recognized by other East Kentuckians. How many will know him as Isaac Lowe, an alias he used for about twelve years in Russell Co., VA and Scott Co., VA? In the biographical sketches which I have consulted, I found no mention of this; yet his use of this name seemed to be known by many residents of Eastern Kentucky who had lived previously in Southwest Virginia.

According to his own statements, John L. Elliott was born 30 September, 1794 (1850 census of Carter Co., KY, District 1, No. 520, gives his birthplace as Kentucky); he left Kentucky as a boy at which time his father lived in Bath Co., KY; went to Russell Co., VA and "changed his name to Isaac Lowe to avoid being found."

There was a John Elliott who bought 100 acres 7 January, 1808 in Russell County on waters of Clinch River, which he and wife Mary sold 6 February 1810. They bought 40 acres 1 February, 1814 on Copper Ridge, Russell County, which they sold in 1818; there is no apparent connection with John L. Elliott, alias Isaac Lowe; however, this may be the John Elliott charged with murder in 1816 in Russell County, dismissed because of extenuating circumstances. The author of an article on the assassination of Judge Elliott, in which he stated that the Judge's father once killed a man, may have been mislead by this event.

In Russell County Court Minutes, Book 4, page 421, there is a reference, 3 November, 1812, to Isaac Lowe, Samuel Ritchie, Jr., James Cook, and John Dunkin, all previously placed under a good behavior bond, which was extended six months for Isaac Lowe and Samuel Ritchie, Jr. About this time Isaac Lowe must have married Jane Ritchie, born 24 February, 1795 in Prince Edward County, VA, as census records indicate their first child was born 1812.

On 13 September, 1813, under the name of Isaac Lowe, John L. Elliott entered service in the War of 1812 at Dickensonville, Russell County. He was appointed a 4th corporal, but due to an injury he received while erecting barracks at Norfolk, he was unable to perform military duty and was discharged 12 March 1814.

Scott County, VA was created in 1814 from parts of Russell County, Lee County, and Washington County. On 17 February, 1815, Isaac Lowe was recommended as a Lieutenant in the Third Company of the county militia, and on 29 July 1816, Isaac Lowe of Scott County bought from John Alley and wife Mary of Franklin County, Indiana Territory, for \$360, 240 acres on south side of Clinch. Isaac Lowe (Low, Loe) was on the personal property tax lists of Scott County 1815 through 1822. The lengthy will of Samuel Rictchie who died about 1819 in Scott County named as a legatee Jane Lowe, formerly Jane Ritchie, daughter of friend Frances Kendrick (Kindrick); and the 1820 census of Scott County listed Isaac Lowe: one male and one fremale, 16 to 26, and four males under 10.

When Morgan County, KY was organized in 1823, John Elliott was taxed for 200 acres on North Fork of Licking. In Morgan County Court, 10 January 1825, on the motion of Peter Amyx, surveyor of Morgan County, John L. Elliott and William Lewis were qualified as his deputies. In 1829 John L. Elliott was taxed for 400 acres on North Fork, 1,430 acres on Sandy, and 200 acres on Grassy; his acreage continued to increase in ensuing years. He was listed in the census of Morgan County in 1830 and of Carter County in 1840 and 1850, and died in October 1855 soon after the rejection of his application for a pension (not for bounty land) because of the disability incurred during his service in the War of 1812.

Descendants of John L. Elliott say that he was a son of James S. Elliott (1770-1857) and his first wife, Hannah Scott, residents of Floyd County, KY (Morgan County area) before August 1809. If this is true, how was John L. Elliott related to Ephraim Blaine Elliott, born 1774 in Pennsylvania, who was taxed 1810 in Montgomery County, KY, "set off" 1811 to Bath County and taxed there until 1820, listed alone in 1820 census of Floyd County, over 45, taxed 1823 Morgan County and living 1830, 1840, and 1850 with the John L. Elliott family? A son of John L. Elliott was named for him. The only family date which I found regarding the older Ephraim B. Elliott was his consent, 22 December 1817, in Bath County for the marriage of his step-daughter, Polly Fitzjarrel, to Robert Warren.




Figure 39 Census 1850 - James Thomas Levan




Figure 40 Census 1880 - James J. Craig




Figure 41 Census 1880 - James Levan




Figure 48 Census 1910 - Emeline Fults




Figure 49 Census 1920 - Authur Meeks and Fannie Nunley




Figure 50 Census 1920 - Cora Meeks 1




Figure 51 Census 1920 - Cora Meeks 2




Figure 52 Census 1920 - Eveline Fulks




Figure 53 Death record of James McAlpine (32).




Figure 54 World War I draft registration card of Hence Levan




Figure 56 Marriage of Daniel Fults and Eveline Argo
