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Black women gain school jobs



Four women, including three blacks, have been named to top Wayne-Westland school district positions. The move comes after the district had been criticized for not having more minority representation in its top management posts.

In a landmark move, an Ann Arbor educator has become the first African-American ever hired for a cabinet-level post in the Wayne-Westland school district, which has been urged

to increase its minority ranks.

The decision to place Carol Johnson in charge of Wayne-Westland's elementary education department came Monday night as the school board hired four women — three of them black — for high-ranking ad-

ministrative positions.

Superintendent Larry Thomas, who recommended the women, said he hopes the appointments will send a strong message that his administration is striving to achieve more minority representation in a district that has a 13-percent minority student population.

"I think we have four administrators here who will make our team a lot stronger," he said.

Most appointments that Thomas has recommended in his 14 months as superintendent have been women

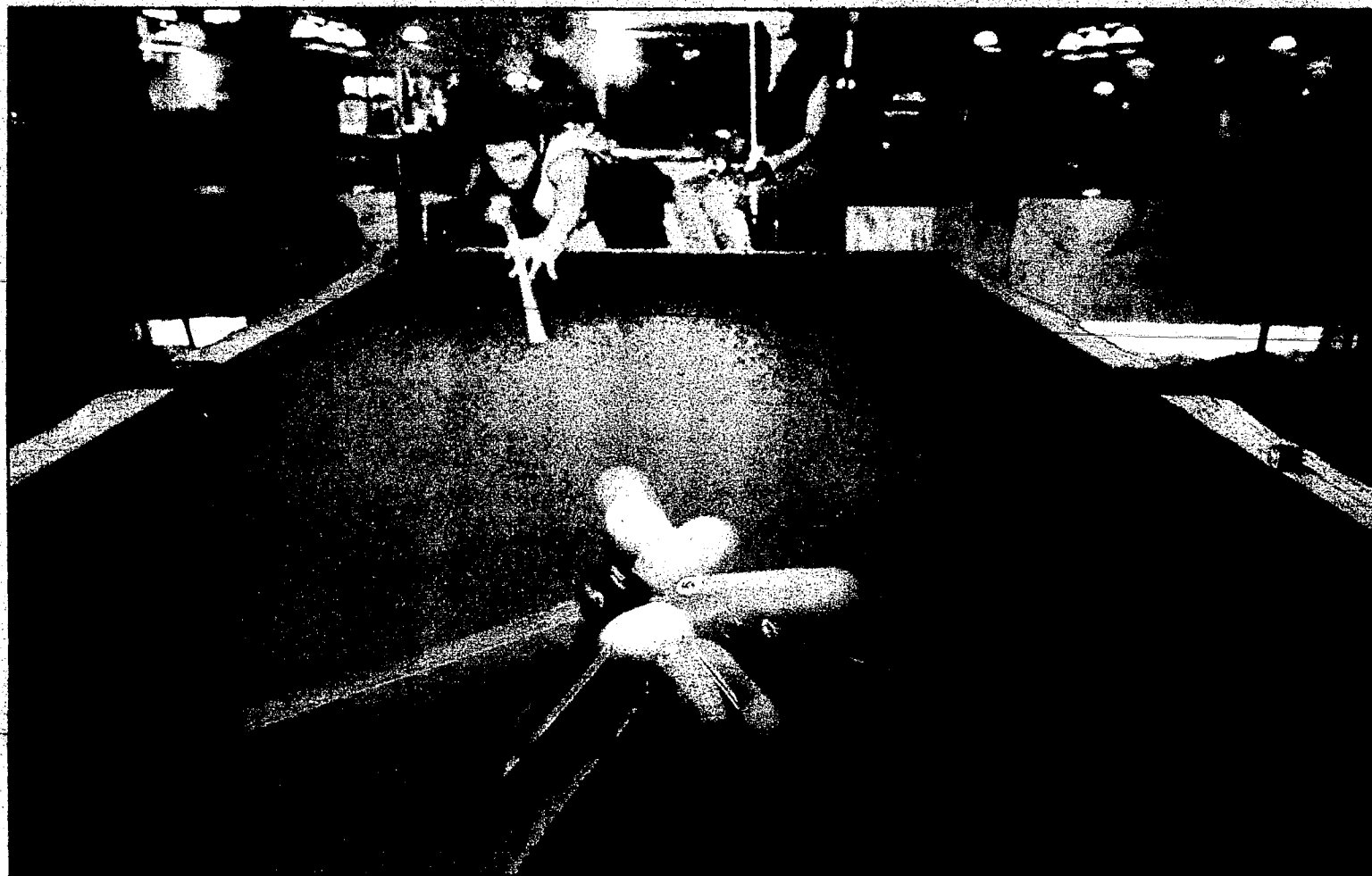
— a move that appeared to concern board president Francis "Bud" Winter.

"There's a gender problem beginning to surface," said Winter, a former Wayne Memorial High School principal who retired four years ago.

Monday's hirings included:
■ Johnson, a Belleville resident who has been an elementary principal for six years, most recently in Ann Arbor. She will be paid \$70,771 as Wayne-Westland's executive director of ele-

City pair feared shot, burned in rural home

Two Westland residents are feared to be among four bodies found shot and burned Sunday in a two-bedroom house destroyed by fire in Gladwin County.

Kathy Lane, a 38-year-old mother of two, and her longtime boyfriend, Bruce Tufnell, left their Crown Street residence in Westland on Saturday, on their way to a Tufnell family re-

union in Harrison, said Lane's mother, Jean Rose of Westland.

The couple intended to stop overnight to visit a cousin of Tufnell's who lived in the house that was destroyed by fire shortly after 7 a.m. Sunday on Pinconning Road in Bentley Township, Rose said.

Four bodies — two men and two women, all adults — were pulled from the house Sunday afternoon, and they had suffered multiple shotgun

wounds and had been burned beyond recognition, Gladwin County Sheriff Michael Hargrave told the Observer.

The identities hadn't been confirmed as of Wednesday morning, and the bodies had been sent to Sparrow Hospital in Lansing for examination by a pathologist, Hargrave said.

But Rose said she has no doubts that her daughter and her daughter's boyfriend are among the dead.

"We know that it's them," she said.

"They were in the wrong place at the wrong time."

Lane, a 1973 graduate of Wayne Memorial High School, was a substitute custodian for the Wayne-Westland school district, and Tufnell worked as a truck driver. They had lived together for about seven years, Rose said.

Plan to shift alternative ed students ignites feud

A proposal to shut down the Cherry Hill alternative education program and return unruly students to John Glenn and Wayne Memorial high schools has sparked controversy.

School administration officials have proposed closing the Cherry Hill center in Inkster to save money and to spur changes in an alternative program that officials say needs revamping.

But some school board members

Monday accused Superintendent Larry Thomas' administration of unilaterally planning the changes without adequately informing the board.

Most of the criticism came from trustees Mathew McCusker, Francis "Bud" Winter and Leonard Posey. But the superintendent reminded the board that the Cherry Hill program had been targeted for elimination months ago, when the board approved \$12 million in budget cuts.

Greg Baracy, assistant superintendent for general administration,

came to Monday's board meeting prepared to outline the new program, but the board refused to hear the report and demanded a special study session next Monday to discuss it.

In the past, students in grades nine through 12 who repeatedly misbehaved at their home schools were placed in the Cherry Hill center.

Under the new plan, some of those students would be placed in segregated programs at John Glenn and Wayne Memorial, while others would be returned to regular classrooms.

Some also would be allowed to attend classes at the William Ford Vocational-Technical Center.

Winter raised concerns that letting the students attend the Ford Center would amount to "rewarding failure."

But trustee Laurel Raisanen defended the administration's plan as "an opportunity to get a healthy program in our schools."

Several former Cherry Hill students addressed the board Monday

Observer editorial draws fire

The Westland Observer came under heavy fire Monday from two Wayne-Westland school board trustees for publishing an editorial that criticized the board's spending priorities amid a severe budget crunch.

The newspaper questioned the wisdom of a board decision to possibly spend \$60,000 in taxpayer money to help subsidize a pay-to-participate plan for Wayne-Westland extracurricular student activities.

Board trustee Leonard Posey said the Aug. 5 editorial amounted to "irresponsible journalism."

Board vice president Mathew McCusker accused the Observer of a lack of objectivity and said the newspaper has an "anti-

Wayne-Westland bias."

The editorial in question praised board trustee Richard LeBlanc for opposing his colleagues on the pay-to-participate issue. LeBlanc questioned the priorities of providing \$60,000 to support extracurricular activities when budget cuts have devastated elementary libraries and eliminated busing for junior high and high school students.

The district could face the \$60,000 expenditure unless a citizens group, Community Support for a Complete Education, succeeds at its goal of raising that amount. The \$60,000 would help to subsidize extracurricular activities, though the bulk of funding would come from student fees.

LeBlanc had stated, "I find it unacceptable that children have to find their own way to school, and yet they can be transported to an athletic program."

The Observer agreed and suggested that district residents want more academic results for their tax dollars — not athletic programs.

The Observer also indicated the board's "twisted" priorities could cause problems for a tax increase proposal that voters will decide Oct. 18. The board still hasn't announced a specific proposal, but is expected to decide the tax rate Aug. 23.

On Monday, Posey took offense to the editorial that he said praised LeBlanc but "lambasted" the rest of the board. He voiced disappointment with it and called it "irresponsible."

McCusker's criticism went even deeper when he accused the newspaper of "an anti-former administration bias," an apparent reference to former Superintendent Dennis O'Neill.

"I think the editorials in the past year have shown that," McCusker said.

O'Neill stepped down in late 1991 under pressure from board members who had a majority at that time. The Observer never published an editorial supporting the decision to pressure O'Neill to retire.

However, the newspaper has suggested in several subsequent editorials that the board should stop fighting old battles and move forward with issues that need to be addressed, such as curriculum improvements.

Big 11 set to bombard lawmakers

When state lawmakers return from summer recess, they can expect a barrage of lobbyists representing the more than 500 Michigan public school districts at their door to hammer out fiscal reform.

Administrators from the state's 11 largest school districts, representing a quarter of all public school students in Michigan, have banded together to convey their own agenda.

"The legislature will have to come back in with some property tax revenue," said Joseph Marinelli, Livonia school superintendent and a founder of the so-called Big 11.

"You can't take \$5.7 billion off the books and expect to replace it with income or sales tax. I don't believe it's possible," said Marinelli, who oversees a \$101-million budget and more than 17,000 students in the district which includes the northern section of Westland.

Lawmakers eliminated school property tax funding earlier this summer, effective for the 1994-95 school year. More pressing, the legislature still has not passed the state aid package for the school year beginning in just a few weeks.

The Big 11 represent a variety of districts, as urban as Detroit and Grand Rapids, as suburban as Livonia and Dearborn.

"The Big 11 districts alone are faced with budget deficits totaling nearly \$100 million," said Marinelli. "The districts have come together to work toward re-establishing education as the number-one priority in this state."

The Big 11 worry that without genuine reform, the state will slide into educational bankruptcy with repercussions for generations to come.

Meeting since last March, the Big 11 have reached a consensus on some issues:

be supported if every district is fully reimbursed by the state for losses in a timely fashion.

■ Reform must reduce the disparity in per-pupil expenditures between districts.

■ The state should use a planned, phased-in approach to significantly close the equity gap.

■ The state must give top priority to finding new revenue sources, and not supplant funds dedicated for education, as in the case of the lottery.

■ The state shouldn't take credit for property tax relief if it merely places the burden on local districts to increase taxes to maintain programs and services.

■ There can be no new mandates to local districts without full state funding.

■ Any reform must provide stability from year to year so districts can effectively plan programs and services.

■ The state should constitutionally guarantee educational opportunity for all students.

"We agreed to send our ideas and concerns to guide school finance reform in this state," Marinelli said. "We've observed for the past several years the failed efforts for adequate and equitable funding. Speaking with one voice, we hope to have impact."

Both the Democrats and Republicans are working informally in caucuses now on tax reform and equality.

Mom protests schools' pay-to-play plan

Jackie Wrybkowski has five children enrolled in Wayne-Westland schools, ranging from elementary to high school.

On Monday, she criticized the school board's pay-to-participate plan that will allow students in upper grades to pay a fee for sports, marching band and other activities.

She wants to know why her elementary students haven't been afforded the same opportunities in the wake of a budget crunch that ushered in pay-to-play.

"Just as in the case with little baby Jessica, no one is listening to these kids," she told the board Monday. "Go out to the elementary schools and listen to those kids. They think they've done

something wrong and they're being punished."

Wrybkowski was referring to the young child who, under court order, was removed from her adopted Ann Arbor parents and returned to her biological parents in Iowa.

Expressive arts and other programs have been taken away from elementary students, with no plan to restore them unless voters pass a tax rate increase in a special Oct. 18 election. The board still hasn't decided on a specific ballot proposal.

Under the pay-to-play plan, which has been approved, students in grades nine through 12 who participate in athletics, marching band or cheerleading will pay \$167.

Students participating in sec-

ondary instrumental and vocal music will pay \$25. Those involved in forensics, musicals, drama and newspapers will pay \$15. Intramural athletes in the seventh, eighth and ninth grades will pay \$10.

On Monday, parent Patricia Ducher told the board that it isn't fair that marching band students should pay the same amount as athletes. She has long been an advocate for fine arts and has said that athletic programs seem to receive special treatment.

In other developments at Monday's meeting:

■ Trustee Richard LeBlanc drew support from Ducher for his stance against the pay-to-participate plan. LeBlanc considered it unacceptable, for example, that students could be transported to

athletic events while busing to and from school has been eliminated for secondary students because of budget cuts.

■ Sharon Felan, Wayne resident and former board member, demanded team work from the board and urged the board to find "that magic number" — referring to a tax rate proposal — that voters will support.

■ District employee Susan Martin urged the board to adopt a Hepatitis B vaccination program for all employees, saying the district may be violating laws by not having a plan.

■ The board adopted a resolution urging the state Legislature to seek "fair and equitable funding" for all Michigan students in the wake of the state's decision to eliminate school property taxes.

Man faces sex charges

A Westland man has been charged with sex crimes amid allegations he fondled a 12-year-old neighbor girl at his Bay Court residence, southeast of Venoy and Palmer, in the city's south end.

Chester Vincent, 49, has been arraigned in 18th District Court on two counts of second-degree criminal sexual conduct. He could face up to 15 years in prison if convicted.

A plea of not guilty has been entered in court for Vincent. He has been ordered to return to court next Thursday for a preliminary examination to determine if he should stand trial on the

charges in Detroit Recorder's Court.

Vincent remained in the county jail this week in lieu of a \$20,000 cash bond. The unemployed man lives on Bay Court with his wife and two adult children, said Detective Sgt. Donald Haigh.

The case emerged after the girl reported that she was fondled on two separate occasions. She reported that she was fondled on her breasts and on her groin, Haigh said.

One incident allegedly occurred two weekends ago when the girl went to a man's house on Bay Court to return a radio that she had borrowed earlier, the detective said.

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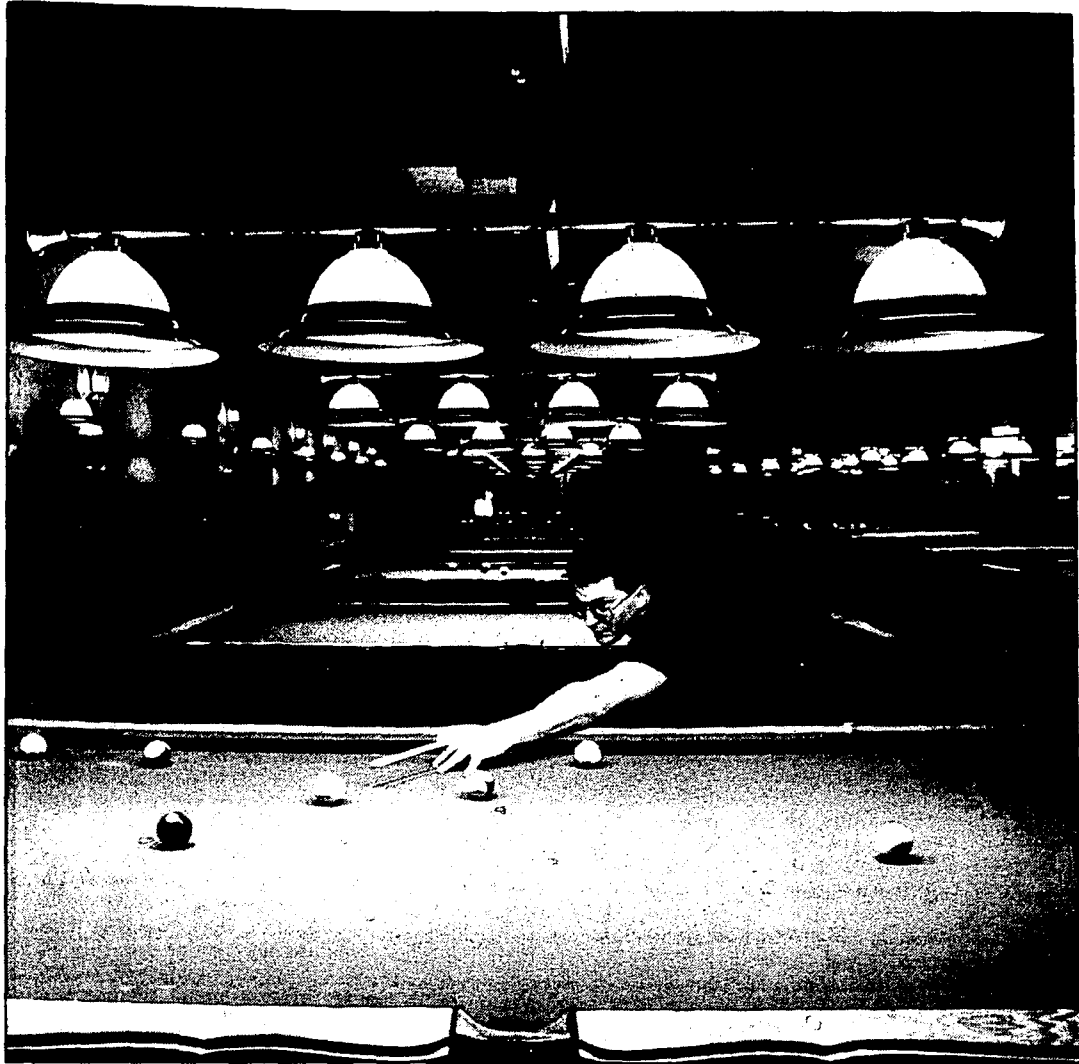

Seeing green: Pool hall cues up for big business

George Marvaso may have Tom Cruise to thank if his new Westland business succeeds.

Marvaso is hoping to capitalize on a resurging interest in pool halls spawned by Cruise's film "The Color of Money."

The movie may be nine years old, but it spurred a new pool hall economic climate that Marvaso said continues to improve in the '90s.

"There's been a big boom in the industry," he said.

Seeing green, Marvaso envisioned a potentially lucrative venture in a vacancy at Westland Plaza, a strip center on the northwest corner of Wayne Road and Hunter. Three weeks ago he opened Electric Stick, The Billiard Club.

If the name of Marvaso's business seems glitzy, it's not by accident. The newer billiard clubs have an upscale image, marking an evolution from the old musty halls where pool sharks hustled for money.

Done in brick and marble and sporting 24 custom-made oak billiard tables, The Electric Stick is glamorous compared to the dingy pool halls featured in "The Hustler," a 1961 film that starred Paul Newman and inspired "The Color of Money."

The business is targeted for the clean-cut set, 18 to 35, and some couples are choosing to go on a date to The Electric Stick instead of seeing a movie or a concert, owner George Marvaso said.

"If you come in on a Friday night, you'll see as many women as men," he said.

Melissa Rozek, 29, recently offered an explanation as she shot pool with her friend, 20-year-old Eric McDonald.

"It's a nice atmosphere," said Rozek, a Garden City Hospital public relations employee. "I love to shoot pool, and it's a nice crowd here. You can end up running into people you know."

The Electric Stick also offers food and a full bar, although a sign near the bar warns patrons: "Stay sober or stay out."

"It's a good environment, between a bar and a straight pool hall," said McDonald, an employee who is setting up billiard leagues and tournaments.

He also commended a juke box

that plays compact discs.

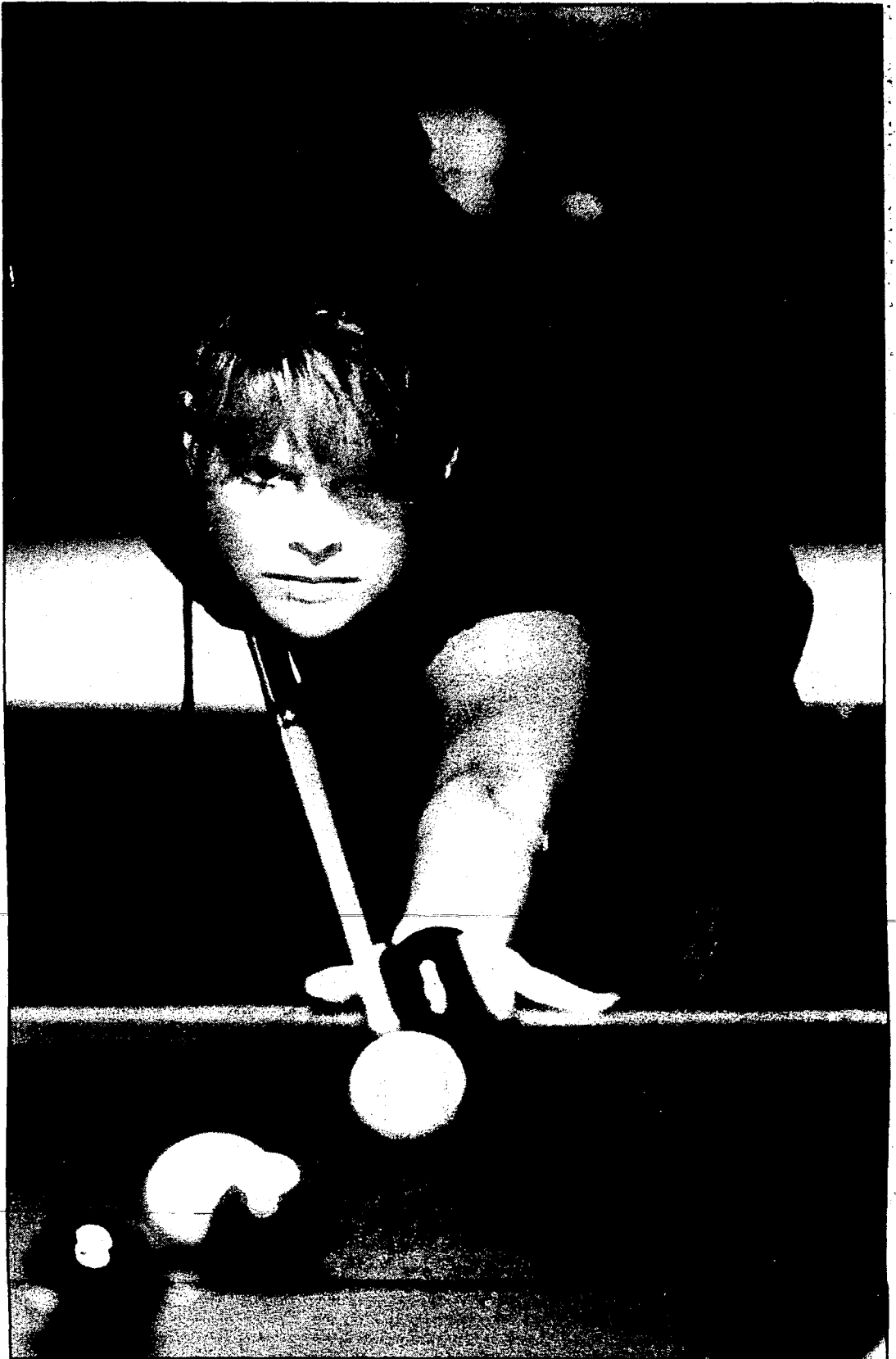
"You can hear everything from Motown classics to alternative rock, like Pearl Jam," he said.

With a seating capacity of 130, The Electric Stick also offers food such as "The Big Stick," a burger that Marvaso hopes will become one of Westland's favorites.

For patrons who need a break from billiards, Marvaso installed dart boards and 16 televisions for major sporting events. Altogether, he has pumped nearly \$500,000 into the business and hired 40 employees.

Now he's waiting to see if The Electric Stick — like Tom Cruise at the box office — will bring in the color of money.

Hourly rates apply to billiard tables, such as \$7.25 for two people or \$9.25 for four. Rates are lower before 6 p.m. Hours are 11 a.m. to 2 a.m. every day except Sunday, when the club opens at noon. Before 8 p.m., patrons under 18 years old are allowed with a parent or guardian, but the after-8 crowd must be 18.

mentary education. She has a doctorate degree in administration from Wayne State University.

■ Celestine Sanders, a black woman who has been promoted from Titus Elementary principal to Adams Junior High principal. She will be paid \$67,749. She has a master's degree from Eastern Michigan University and also has earned her administrative certification, and she is working on her doctorate. She has been a district employee since 1970, when she was hired as a teacher.

■ Sally Perkins, also black, who has been hired as an elementary principal at a salary of \$63,631. She is expected to be placed at Titus, replacing Sanders. She will leave her job as a middle school assistant principal in Detroit. She has a doctorate degree from the University of Michigan.

■ Diane Nichols, a white Garden City educator who has been an elementary principal and supervisor of continuing education. She is expected to be placed at Kettering Elementary School. Her salary will be \$55,901. She has a master's degree from EMU.

Board president Winter cast

the lone dissenting vote against Johnson for the cabinet position. He said he didn't oppose her personally, but noted that he has generally opposed an administrative reorganization plan by Thomas.

Board trustee Richard LeBlanc cast the only opposing vote against Perkins because he said she should have been brought in at a lower salary.

Monday's hirings came in the wake of criticism that Wayne-Westland school officials have received from some district residents, who had called for more intense efforts to recruit minority educators.

The district has fewer than 1 percent of minority educators, including teachers, compared to a 13-percent minority student population.

The latest hirings will bring to five the total number of minority educators in current administrative positions. The two others include Jose Muller, Taft-Galloway Elementary principal, the district's only Hispanic administrator, and Darlene Scott, an African-American who is assistant principal at Wayne Memorial.

The couple had driven Lane's Cadillac on the trip, and the car has been found near Flint.

"She was my little girl," Rose said of Lane. And Lane has two children of her own: Scott, 21, and Stacey, 18. She also has a 2½-year-old granddaughter, Shawna Marie.

Sheriff Hargrave confirmed that the four bodies had received multiple gunshot wounds before

the house was burned. The fire was believed to have been deliberately set, but the exact cause wasn't known Wednesday, Hargrave said.

The fire was reported to the sheriff's department by a neighbor who saw the blaze while passing by Sunday morning, Hargrave said.

The sheriff's department had no suspects as of Wednesday.

and spoke critically of the old program.

"It's like a prison, and you don't learn anything," said Robert Foster of Inkster. "There's something real wrong with the program."

He added later that high school officials "send us over there (to the Cherry Hill center) because they don't want to deal with the problems."

"Most of the (Cherry Hill) teachers act like they don't care," Foster added. "They just act like they want to come in and get their paycheck, and that's it."

Former Cherry Hill student Nathan Everden, consistently flunked at the alternative center but improved to a near-perfect grade point average when he returned to John Glenn. Teachers

confirmed his statements Monday.

Everden has since dropped out and received his GED. Both he and Foster said they plan to attend college.

They fared better than many other Cherry Hill students, who have a combined high school dropout rate of 60 percent. Cherry Hill's enrollment ranged from 60 students to 200 at any given time during the last school year.

At one point Monday, Superintendent Thomas appeared angry that some board trustees refused to even hear the administration's presentation on the proposed alternative program.

"I'm not going to take years to tell you we have a major problem, when it needs to be fixed today," he said.

Voice of charity

DJ quietly helps good causes

Ken Calvert is a familiar voice. His drive time show on WLLZ Radio and his once and future stint as the voice of the Detroit Pistons give him a high level of fame.

But there is another "voice" that he uses, a voice that benefits a number of charitable organizations.

His philanthropic efforts are generally low-key, though he contributes a good deal of time and money to his chosen causes during the year.

Calvert always is available to help Brother Rice, of which he is an alumni, the Association for Retarded Citizens (ARC) and the Leukemia Society of America. And there are a myriad of other causes that he can't say no to when asked for a hand.

He and wife Ann became involved with ARC when a friend of theirs asked them to put their name on the committee. The friend has a retarded daughter.

"The child lives at home and the mother devotes a lot of her life to taking care of that child's basic needs. It flipped me out when I heard what the costs and the time involved are," Calvert said.

Out of curiosity, he went to a board meeting and found out that ARC was having a difficult time raising money. The Calverts started a golf tournament for three years and this year was

replaced with a celebrity roast, with Ken Calvert as the first celebrity on the skewer.

"We got involved and we like seeing the results," he said.

Thomas Kendziorski, ARC executive director, speaks in superlatives when talking about Ken and Ann Calvert's involvement.

"I can't say enough about them," Kendziorski said. "They're just wonderful people."

The Calverts got involved five years ago and Kendziorski said the couple attended the board meetings, not satisfied to be an "in-name only" member. The more they learned about the organization and its need, the more they wanted to help.

They have spent so much time, effort and money in helping ARC that the board initiated the Ken and Ann Calvert Philanthropist Award to give attention to those who go beyond the call of duty. The Calverts also were the first recipients of the award.

"They've done a lot for us," Kendziorski said. "And the exposure has been wonderful. In his business, Ken gets the ARC name out there and that is invaluable."

The disc jockey will be using the airwaves next week to promote another charitable cause.

Calvert and his new radio partner Ed Kelly are holding a 28-hour radiothon to benefit the Leukemia Society. It's the two

of them auctioning special merchandise and trading donations for song requests for a day plus four hours. The radiothon starts at 6 a.m. on Thursday and goes until 10 a.m. Friday.

While the stretch itself is an exhausting effort, the Calverts spend months in preparation — gathering items, lining up celebrities to call in and gearing up for the arduous task of not only staying awake but staying alert and conversational. At the end of the radiothon, Calvert likened the seconds after the finale to "hitting a brick wall."

"But when you finish with a payoff of over \$100,000 — that's the pot at the end of the rainbow," Calvert said. "It's enough to keep an organization alive for a year. It's like Home Shopping Network for God. It's a chance to bid on something like an Eddie Van Halen autographed guitar and all that money goes to the Leukemia Foundation."

He expects his friends Mark Ridley of the Comedy Castle, comedians Tim Allen and Dave Coullier and singers Bob Seger and Ted Nugent to call in and help out. They're used to it, because he's tapped them in the past for other projects.

"If you're involved in something, you can get other people involved. The enthusiasm is contagious," Calvert said. "And I've got high quality friends and they can cough up the bucks or something."

If he's not at ARC, he's at a

celebrity golf tournament. He's looking forward to emceeding a pet show in late August at The Community House.

Calvert tries to downplay his charitable involvements. An admitted workaholic who does the 6-10 a.m. radio show, goes home to sleep and then reappears at any number of events in the early evening or will serve as the voice of the Pistons at the home games this coming season.

Calvert is the announcer who turned Joe Dumars' name into a 13 syllable pronunciation.

"I'm a sucker and I wear my heart on my sleeve but all this has given a balance to my life. A lot of times I sleep in two four-hour segments and it does get tough.

"But I wouldn't want it any different. In the time that's not taken up by work or the special events, we manage to have fun," Calvert said.

Calvert readily admits that Ann Calvert is the part of the team with strong organizational skills and does the tasks of reading myriads of mail ("Some letters would break your heart," he said) to proof reading programs.

"My wife is as good as it gets. She has more energy than any four humans. She does what I don't get done or what I don't like to do. She'll go to the printer to proof read an invitation. I'd rather muscle someone for a hundred bucks."

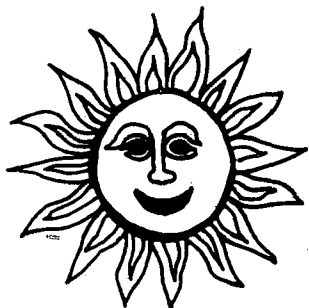
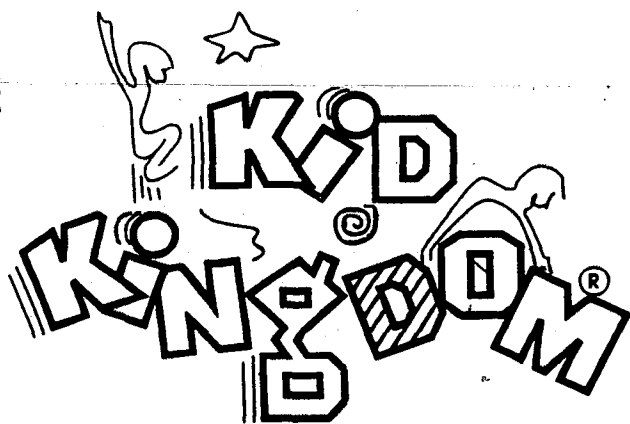
Urisko will also teach Special Problems: Computer Assisted Legal Research, Legal Assistant Orientation and Legal Research and Writing I.

'Madonnathon' hits Southfield

Like Madonna's tasselled brassiere her popularity is on again, off again.

It's off according to local bookstores and record stores selling her controversial photo book, "Sex" and record stores selling "Erotica," her faltering new album.

This weekend, however, Madonnomania may heat up one more time.

Madonnathon '93 is back in Southfield for the second consecutive year and promoters hope the hype over the girl next door — Rochester Hills' material girl — continues.

Bassline Entertainment predicts triple the number of fans that came to last year's Madonna extravaganza. And last year 1,200 people from as far away as Portugal and Sweden came to Southfield. This year fans will trek from Mexico, Quebec and England, said Bruce Baron, organizer and promoter for Bassline.

Perhaps her local popularity needs the boost. Her newest record release, "Erotica," a 14 cut selection that came out this year isn't selling well, at least not in the past two months.

"It sold really well at first, like phenomenally well, but right now it's not selling at all," said Harmony House salesperson Tom Barratta.

Michael Austin, manager of Waldenbooks at 12 Mile and Northwestern agreed, "I think we'll see her around for awhile."

And if anyone didn't see Madonna bare all in her controversial book "Sex," don't run out to get it now. It's unavailable since only a limited number were available, said Austin. The Southfield Waldenbook outlet sold out before Christmas, about a month after its release.

Promoter Baron said Madonna's popularity is far from fading and will pick up momentum when her fall tour "The Girly Show" begins in London next month. She already has U.S. concert dates set up in Miami, New York and Chicago. No news yet of a local performance, he said.

The Madonnathon has captured the interest of numerous media outlets including MTV, People magazine and the ABC News program Day One — all will all be in Southfield to cover the event.

The Madonnathon kicks off on Saturday morning with several two hour bus tours to Madonna's childhood sites — including the parochial school where she reportedly had her mouth taped shut by nuns. The bus leaves from the Southfield Plaza Hotel at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3:15 p.m. The 55-mile tour costs \$35.

Also on Saturday at Menjo's Nightclub in Detroit there will be an all-male Madonna drag-lip synch contest at 10:45 p.m. Madonna and Christopher Flynn went to Menjo's in the 1970s. Part of the proceeds will benefit the Midwest AIDS Prevention Project. Cover charge for the MAPP benefit is \$4 at the door.

A Collectors Expo will be from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday at the Plaza Hotel. Dealers will sell rare Madonna collectibles. Also, a Madonna art competition, lip synch and a female Madonna look-alike show will be featured. Cover is \$5.

On Monday — Madonna's 35th birthday — the Tel-X theater at Telegraph and 10 Mile Road will feature Madonna Movie-rama beginning at noon. Three Madonna films will be shown.

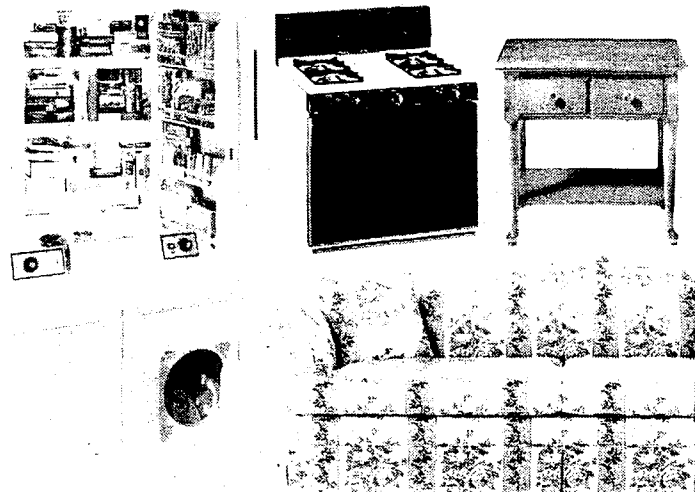

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Air affair

State officials dither on Clean Air Act

Regional and business leaders are getting nervous as the state House of Representatives delays voting on a local version of the federal Clean Air Act.

"It doesn't have any support," said Rep. Greg Kaza, R-Rochester Hills, of the bill that is languishing on the House calendar after months of committee work.

Gov. John Engler supports a clean air bill, though reluctantly. "We're caught in a squeeze play — Washington mandates that west Michigan clean up its air by 1996 or face stiff sanctions," Engler said.

Service station dealers are opposing it. An aide to Rep. Mary Brown, R-Kalamazoo, says the bill is a must-pass measure that needs an education effort.

Under the 1990 federal Clean Air Act, Michigan must clean up its air some more. The list of "non-attainment" counties is up to 10 and includes three near Lake Michigan — Kent, Ottawa and Muskegon.

The western counties are balking because they say their dirty air comes from the Chicago area. "Residents in this area should not be mandated to clean up problems over which they have no control," said Rep. Harold Voorhees, R-Wyoming.

Centralized tests

For the seven counties in southeastern Michigan, the federal law means they must reduce air emissions 15 percent below 1990 levels.

Currently in the tri-county area, 1,400 auto service stations perform the annual \$10-per-car chore of checking emissions levels. Under the Brown bill, advocated by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, centralized testing facilities would administer tougher emissions tests at a cost of about \$30 every two years. Local stations would lose the work.

"Asking consumers to wait for hours for the test, pay three times more for it and drive miles just to get one — all for a program that may not work — is ludicrous and bad policy," said Terry Burns of the Service Station Dealers Association.

If Michigan fails to meet federal standards, say SEMCOG chiefs, three bad things can happen:

- The state can lose \$500 million in federal highway aid.
- Smokestack permits for industries can be halted, throwing a monkey wrench in the state's economic recovery.
- The federal government would impose its own program.

In floor debate last month, Rep. Vincent Joe Porreca, D-Trenton, objected: "We're doing this for industry. It's not fair to my constituents to have to stand in line three hours so someone (industry) can be left off the hook."

"I don't much like this bill," added Rep. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield. "I don't know if I'll vote for it, even if my amendments are adopted."

The bill was shoved aside late in July as the House passed 1994 budget bills and the school tax cut.

Bill supported

Michigan has until Nov. 15 to show the feds it is complying, and the clock is running. SEMCOG is fighting back, charging the service stations with a "self-serving scare campaign based on half-truths."

Joining with SEMCOG, the seven-county regional planning agency, are the American Automobile Manufacturers Association, the Michigan Association of Manufacturers, Michigan Chemical Council, Michigan Chamber of Commerce, Detroit Edison Co. and Consumers Power Co.

So are several environmental groups: Michigan United Conservation Clubs, Eastern Michigan Environmental Action Council and Sierra Club.

John Amberger, SEMCOG executive director, offered this rebuttal to the service station dealers:

"The current AET test is outdated and produces a false failure rate as high as 30 percent because of significant engineering improvements in vehicles made in the past several years. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency — charged with enforcing the Clean Air Act — will not count results of the current or basic AET program against the 15 percent required emissions reduction.

"If a significant portion of the 15 percent is not realized from this AET program, then severe and costly restrictions on industrial emissions will be required."

To the dealers' charge that drivers will face long waits for tests, Amberger said drivers in Minnesota, which has centralized tests, wait an average of two minutes. Most testing areas can be put within 10 minutes of residents.

While the test may cost more, it will be required every two years instead of the current once-a-year. And in a 1991 survey, 96 percent of Minnesotans rated the waiting time good or very good, Amberger said.

New gas tax won't help roads, group says

None of the 4.3 cents per gallon Michigan motorists soon will pay on a gallon of gasoline will fix roads and bridges or fund public transportation, says a state interest group.

Citizens for Improved Transportation, a Lansing-based group of organizations dedicated to raising adequate funds for Michigan roads, bridges and mass transit systems, wants Michigan residents to know that President Clinton's fuel tax hike "doesn't give a dime" to transportation.

"Michigan's roads, bridges and mass transit systems are woefully under-funded," said Larry Martin of CIT. "It is important that no one confuse the intent of this federal gas tax increase. All of it is to pay off some of the debt racked up by years of free-spending by the federal government."

"Not a dime, not a nickel, not a penny is for roads and bridges."

In contrast, Michigan's fuel taxes are constitutionally earmarked for roads and public transportation.

Martin said Michigan's roads and bridges continue to crumble faster than funds are available to fix them. "The fact is that Michigan is spending less now, in real dollars, on roads and bridges than 30 years ago. That's because the state gas tax has been locked at 15 cents a gallon for nearly a decade, while costs have skyrocketed and more fuel-efficient vehicles have taken to the roads."

Five other states now have lower gas tax rates than Michigan, according to a new survey by the

Highway Users Federation in Washington. The July 1 survey shows that the average state gas tax is 18.1 cents per gallon versus Michigan's 15.

The most recent state to increase its gas tax is Ohio (by a penny a gallon, to 22 cents, effective July 1).

CIT said it is studying ways to raise adequate funds for Michigan roads and bridges. A new report soon will be issued rating the condition of Michigan roads and bridges.

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Faust wins

Senator gets access to state accident fund

Democratic state Sen. William Faust has won access to Accident Fund records withheld by the Engler administration.

Ingham Circuit Judge William Collette ruled last week that state Insurance Commissioner David Dykhouse is required by the Freedom of Information Act to disclose contents of a financial analysis of the Accident Fund, a state-owned workers comp insurer.

"We believe that Gov. John Engler and Senate Republicans are covering up the fact that the fund is keeping rates higher than the law allows and is hiding a windfall profit of millions of dollars that would go to the purchaser of the fund," said Faust, of Westland.

Engler wants, and the Senate has passed, bills to allow sale of the Accident Fund, founded in 1912. Engler contends government shouldn't be in the insurance business.

Faust and some Democrats have fought the sale, arguing it would be a financial windfall to a favored buyer.

The accounting firm of Coopers & Lybrand made the financial analysis in 1991. The administration denied Faust's request on the ground that the Senate or a committee — not individual senators — should

have filed the request.

The administration also denied access on the ground that confidential information was involved. Faust argued that the Accident Fund, as a state agency, was subject to FOIA, not the Insurance Code.

Blues want to bid

Meanwhile, debate raged in House corridors about whether Blue Cross-Blue Shield should be allowed to bid on the Accident Fund, as allowed in a Senate bill.

Doug Cruce, president of the Michigan Insurance Federation, opposes a Blues bid. "Blue Cross was set up by state law and given special protection from competition to carry out a specific function — provide general health care to the widest possible group of Michigan residents. It was not established to provide workers' compensation insurance to state businesses," said Cruce, a former state senator from Troy.

MIF argues that Blue Cross is a quasi-public company with a board of directors appointed by the governor. Nancy McKeague, lobbyist for the Michigan Chamber of Commerce, said that selling to the Blues would fail to achieve the goal of privatizing the Accident Fund because the Blues "operate under legislative control as a quasi-public tax-exempt institution."

Under Blues ownership, she said, the Accident Fund "would continue to be subject to the same political pressure and premium manipulation the chamber first criticized under the Blanchard administration."

E.L. Cox, executive director of the Accident Fund, would not comment on the fund's value.

The Senate bills ask a minimum bid of \$100 million. Legislative analysts peg the value at \$275 million. The Blues reportedly has placed the value at \$250 million.

Local reps hold party lines on Clinton economic plan

Here's how *Observer & Eccentric-area members of Congress* were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Aug. 6

HOUSE

Clinton Economic Plan: The House approved, 218 for and 216 against, the Democratic plan to use higher taxes and slowed spending to restrain the growth of the national debt by \$496 billion over five years through fiscal 1998. The bill raises the federal levy on gasoline from 14.1 to 18.4 cents per gallon, taxes better-off Social Security recipients on a larger share of their benefits, and raises rates on taxable incomes above \$115,000 for singles and \$140,000 for couples, among other revenue measures. Its biggest restraint on entitlements is to slow Medicare payments to doctors and hospitals by \$56 billion over five years. It requires nearly \$150 billion in discretionary spending slowdowns, in defense and other programs, but delays most of that restraint until late in the five-year cycle. The measure also creates red ink. It increases spending for programs such as food stamps and childhood immunization. It forgoes future tax revenue by enlarging the earned income tax credit for the working poor, creating new tax breaks to attract economic development to blighted areas, and carving out several tax exemptions for a variety of special interests.

Supporter Robert Matsui, D-Calif., said: "Eighty-five percent of the tax increase will be paid by those families making \$180,000 or more a year. In fact, somebody making between \$30,000 and \$40,000 a year will only have a \$5-a-month increase in their taxes. Somebody making \$75,000 to \$100,000... an increase in their taxes of \$27 a month, and it's basically the gasoline tax." Opponent Peter King, R-N.Y., called the measure "a repudiation by the president of the promises he made in his campaign - not to have a gasoline tax, not to raise taxes on the middle class. It is because of budgets such as this that the economy is going to be damaged and the people lose faith in their government." A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Area representatives voting yes were: Bob Carr, D-Pontiac; Dale Kildee, D-Flint; Sander Levin, S-Southfield; William Ford, D-Ypsilanti. Voting no: Joseph Knollenberg, R-Birmingham.**

would get approximately minimum-wage pay, health and child-care benefits, and in some cases paid medical and family leave. National service is expected to enlist 47,000 workers by its third year. Supporter John Glenn, D-Ohio, called national service "a coherent and cost-effective program that addresses both the needs of our nation and... of our young people." Opponent Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., said, "With a national debt of over \$4.3 trillion, I question the advisability of authorizing a new, large program that we cannot afford." A yes vote was to pass the bill. **Michigan Sen. Carl Levin, D, voted yes. Sen. Donald Riegle, D, did not vote.**

National Service re-mains 3-year plan: By a vote of 41 for and 52 against, the Senate rejected a Republican amendment to authorize the national service bill (S 919) for two years rather than the three years sought by President Clinton.

Supporter Bob Dole, R-Kan., said, "The American people are not demanding new spending programs" and are "looking for us to keep them as lean and tight as possible, at least until we find out whether or not they are going to work." Opponent Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., said three years was necessary to give national service ample time to attract large numbers of participants and prove itself. A yes vote supported a two-year authorization for national service. **Sens. Levin and Riegle voted no.**

Not based on need: By a vote of 55 for and 31 against, the Senate killed a proposal to base national service educational vouchers on need, as is the case with most other federal payments for post-secondary education. Depending on family means, vouchers were to have ranged from \$1,500 to \$4,725 annually under the rejected amendment. The vote occurred during debate on S 919 (above).

Harris Wofford, D-Pa., said means testing of national service participants "undermines the central spirit of bringing Americans together in common service to the common good." Sponsor Hank Brown, R-Colo., said his amendment would make scarce federal dollars available to a larger number of national service participants. A yes vote opposed basing national service educational benefits on need. **Levin and Riegle voted yes.**

Ginsburg Confirmation: By a vote of 96 for and three against, the Senate confirmed Judge Ruth Ginsburg of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia as the 107th justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. Ginsburg, 60, will be paid \$164,000 as an associate justice. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., praised Ginsburg as "one of the foremost defenders of the twin ideals which lie at the heart of our nation and our Constitution, fairness and

equality." Jesse Helms, R-N.C., criticized Ginsburg for her "outrageously simplistic and callous position" in support of abortion rights. A yes vote was to put Ginsburg on the Supreme Court. **Levin voted yes. Riegle did not vote.**

Hackney Confirmation: By a vote of 76 for and 23 against, the Senate confirmed University of Pennsylvania President Sheldon Hackney to head the National Endowment for the Humanities. Hackney, 59, will earn \$123,100 in the post. Critics questioned his support of free speech in incidents on his campus involving insults shouted at black coeds and the confiscation of a newspaper press run by black students protesting an editorial position. Supporter James Jeffords, R-Vt., said Hackney "has assured me of his commitment to the freedom of expression, something he has adamantly advocated throughout his life."

SENATE

National Service plan OK'd: By a vote of 58 for and 41 against, the Senate sent to conference with the House a bill (S 919) to begin President Clinton's national-service program at a three-year cost of \$1.5 billion. Working for a new federal agency and local sponsoring organizations, participants 17 and older would perform up to 1,700 hours of community service each year, in return for up to \$4,775 annually in higher education or job-training vouchers. They

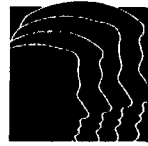

"If it hadn't been for Kmart we never would have been able to raise this much money."

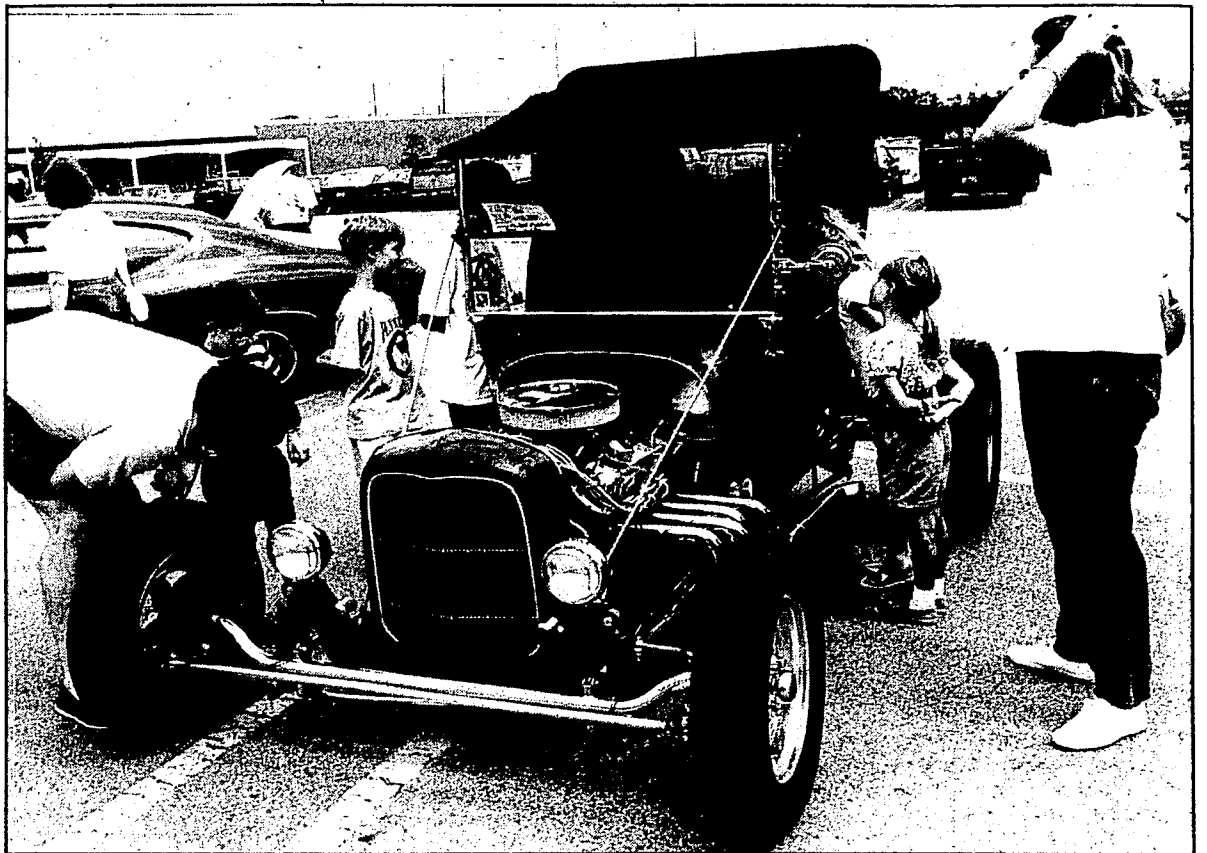
This is the third year for the car show which has been coordinated from the first by Kmart manager Chuck Wagner.

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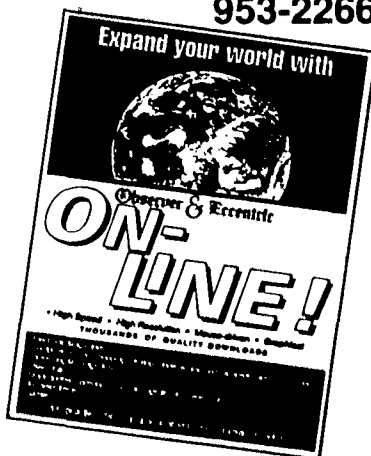

Livonia school tax is important

On Monday, Aug. 30, Westland residents in the Livonia school district will go to the polls to decide a request for additional millage for operating purposes.

The Westland Observer urges voters to approve the millage. The major reason the Observer backs the millage is because it is only for one year, because the classroom instructional program has been protected for a year, and because the negative alternatives are such that we do not want to avoid paying the added cost for just one year. That added cost for the owner of a \$110,000 house is \$55.

The request is to levy 1 mill (\$1 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation) to pay for extra-curricular activities, elementary art, music and physical education and learning specialists for the Reading Recovery program.

The levy is for three years, but because the Michigan Legislature eliminated school property tax beginning next year, the millage if approved could be collected for just one year.

The school board cannot lay off any teachers for the balance of the new school year, and so the sixth hour is preserved and the core instructional program is in place for the coming year.

If the state cuts more than the \$9 million anticipated, then reductions will come in non-instructional areas such as food service, transportation, custodial, office support or maintenance. If state cuts are less than \$8.7 million then the money saved will be used to restore instructional programs cut during the past two years.

And if the state delivers far more than expected, the board can collect only a portion of the millage or none of it depending upon Lansing's generosity.

The board, which represents the northern section of Westland, has made \$12 million in cuts in two years, has an additional \$8.7 million in cuts scheduled for 1993-94, has permanently laid off more than 100 employees and has reduced its fund equity from \$10 million to practically zero.

The administration has been cut by 24 percent (eight full-time positions in two years) and operations has been cut by 24 percent.

In looking at the millage, and the impact of extra-curricular activities, the reader will want to look at the whole child, not just the child with a book or a calculator or a microscope.

Readers will want to get a vision of what school would be like without school plays and musicals, intramurals, newspapers or year-books, debate, National Honor Society, Spanish Club, cheerleading or pompon, marching band, concert choir, glee club, student government, football, baseball, basketball, soccer, swimming, wrestling, cross country, track and field, volleyball and others.

The vision of that kind of school is an ugly picture, indeed.

To produce academic scholars who will contribute to society in the future, we must develop citizens who are more than computerized robots spitting out facts, figures, theorems and formulas.

To produce well-rounded, balanced, mentally healthy, productive adults, our schools need to offer activities that generate broad perspective, a competitive spirit, self-reliance, humor, curiosity, imagination, sensitivity, creativity, leadership skills, enthusiasm, team work, consensus building skills and confidence.

Can we afford to invest \$55 for one year only, to provide these human qualities for our young people for the coming school year? Can we afford not to?

Livonia Public Schools has the seventh lowest operating millage among 83 districts in the tri-county area. About 40 percent of the school tax bill is paid by non-homeowners (commercial-industrial). The impact of Headlee has limited property tax income growth to inflation, three to four percent a year, despite assessment increases.

Given these facts, a "yes" vote is the best choice on Aug. 30.

Paper's role makes sense

Newspaper: A regular publication, usually daily or weekly, containing news, opinion, advertising.

Webster's New World Dictionary

We are a newspaper.

We consider it our job to bring you the news of your community.

We cover government, schools, police and fire, business, sports, entertainment, the arts and the individual residents who make your community what it is.

We also give you our opinions on local issues. We know you look to us for this kind of information.

For us, this goes beyond being a business matter of dollars and cents, since our parent group of newspapers, Suburban Communications Corp., also publishes "shoppers." It is an issue of what constitutes a newspaper and what can be counted on to give the public legitimate notice on a regular basis.

Recently the state House of Representatives passed a pair of bills that would lower our standards for informing the public. They would allow your local "shopper" — that's a paper with little or no news content — to run the so-called legal and public notice advertising that up to now has been limited to newspapers which carry at least 25 percent editorial content.

That's contrary to the way other states and the federal government regulate this issue. And it's contrary to a number of state court rulings that have required that a publication be published regularly (usually daily or weekly) and that it contain information appealing to the general public.

The following area members of the state House voted to keep public notice in newspapers: Penny Crissman, R-Rochester Hills; John Jamian, R-Bloomfield Hills; Justine Barns, D-Westland; Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth.

Local representatives who said "shoppers" are an appropriate vehicle to provide the public with legitimate public notice are: Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills; Barbara Dobb, R-West Bloomfield; Shirley Johnson, R-Royal Oak; Richard Young, D-Dearborn Heights; Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia; Deborah Whyman, R-Canton; and Greg Kaza, R-Rochester Hills.

Reps. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield, and William Keith, D-Garden City, did not vote.

We are hopeful that the Senate will refuse to pass these bills once they come out of committee.

Area Sens. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, and George Hart, D-Dearborn are still uncommitted. So it's important to let them know that you want the legal public notices of your community, school district or county published in a newspaper you count on for news

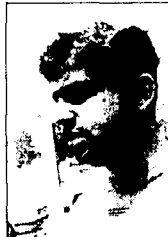

Adult illiteracy carries tragic human toll

About 27 million American adults — our friends, family, and neighbors — can't read or write well enough to fill out a job application, understand the label on a medicine bottle, support the learning of their children and exercise the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.

One in five American adults is functionally illiterate. In addition to the 20 percent functional illiteracy rate, another 34 percent of American adults are only marginally literate, according to the U.S. Department of Education. Adult illiteracy in the U.S. crosses all income, racial, gender, age, and employment lines.

In Wayne County, there are 400,000 persons who are functionally illiterate with many in this community.

The number of illiterate adults in the U.S. grows by about 2.3 million every year. This trend exacts an enormous cost on the economic, social, and psychological welfare of individuals in our society. More than one third of mothers receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) are functionally illiterate.

Sixty percent of America's prison inmates are functionally illiterate and 85 percent of juvenile offenders have difficulty reading. Youngsters whose parents are functionally illiterate are twice as likely as their peers to be functionally illiterate. It is estimated that adult illiteracy costs businesses and taxpayers \$225 billion annually.

Despite the bleak statistics and forecasts, the problem of adult illiteracy

should not be viewed as an incurable condition. Literacy Volunteers of America estimates that adult student reading scores improve approximately one grade level with 35-45 hours of tutoring.

All over the country, community vol-

unteer groups and school systems are working with adult students. Many of these programs are based on the "Each One Teach One" Laubach Literacy method developed over 50 years ago. The phonetically based Laubach method has resulted in the basic education of 60 million adults throughout the world.

Several local community programs train volunteers to become literacy tutors. One of the things stressed in a tutor training workshop is the differences between teaching the same basic reading material to adults vs. children. Adult students often have self-esteem problems because they know they haven't learned something that even children can do. Adults have a full lifetime of experience to draw upon.

Lessons can and should be geared to the student's major areas of interest and/or specific learning goals.

For example, a 60-year-old woman may know nothing about reading or writing, but may have a great deal of experience in child rearing. Reading and discussing materials having to do with children will make her feel like she's working on something that is part of her experience. If a student states that he wants to gain a specific promotion at work, the tutor and student should collect materials specifically relevant to that goal to work with.

Society, not the schools, is failing our students

QUESTION: I have taught in public schools for 26 years, in the profession I love. In my heart I know I've done a good job, that I have cared about and helped many children. Now all I hear on Michigan radio talk shows, on TV and in the papers is how bad public school teachers are. Are we that bad, is our public education system and our university system that poor? I am really getting discouraged.

ANSWER: You may be getting discouraged, but I am getting fed up with some talk show "authorities" and some new commentators who are on a public school board, administration and teacher feeding frenzy attack. Let them answer the following questions since they perceive public education as being so bad.

Why is it that the universities in our country are considered world class institutions throughout the world?

Why are the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and Wayne State University seen as educational oases by foreign students, who register by the thousands?

I don't see any great exodus of our public school trained students, including those children of the "talk show

jockeys," trying to get their kids into the University of Bangkok.

How is it that the vast majority of students selected by the University of Michigan (with its high standards) come from the Milfords, Pinckneys, Plymouths, Waterfords and Bloomfield Hills, all local public school systems? U-M's scholarly freshman class is not all Cranbrook and Country Day graduates, but represents a cross section of our public school students.

Why have Japanese, Taiwanese and Chinese families sought citizenship, placed their kids in our public schools and then sought admission for their children into our universities if our nation's public educational system is supposedly so poor? Hey — we even have boat people risking their lives to get their children into our country, into our public school system. We must have something to offer.

A power struggle

You sound like a caring teacher as, contrary to some public opinion, are most of your colleagues.

But you, public school classroom teachers are now caught up in a power struggle. Let's look at this historically. Prior to the UAW, auto workers could be fired on the spot and made minimal

wages while Henry Ford was building his estates.

Once the UAW became a reality, auto workers' wages and benefits went from better to very good to excellent. The UAW leadership and employees, initially, were most grateful. Then the UAW became so strong that the tail began wagging the dog, resulting in companies moving to Tennessee or to other countries. The auto industry corporate leaders said "enough."

You are part of the NEA and its affiliate, the MEA, which has performed magnificently for Michigan teachers. But you, the teacher, are caught up in the Michigan legislative property tax-school funding issue. The hidden agenda, to anyone who knows education in

Michigan, is to take the power base away — right or wrong — from the MEA.

The MEA and teachers have gone from a base of no power (no tenure, no money) to becoming a super power (meet our needs or we will close school doors). And you are caught in the middle of this power struggle.

Personally, I don't believe citizens perceive all classroom teachers as incompetent. A few teachers, yes, but not the majority. Conversely, however, when it comes to money too many citizens who, in the past, either paid up or faced a strike are saying "enough."

And as the UAW, being of sound mind, has backed off from its massive power moves, the MEA (being intelligent educators and of sound mind) will also now back off, assuming its leaders are not brain dead.

Society fails

No, public education in this country has not failed. Our society is failing, the drugs, the violence, the constant sexual bombardment on kids, the crime, the breakdown of family values.

Unfortunately, public education is the easiest, most accessible scapegoat

for society's problems because citizens can "dump" on school administrators and teachers so easily. Much easier than going after incompetent doctors, lawyers, bankers, insurance companies, who, if you haven't heard, made a bit more money than teachers.

Indeed it is unfortunate that too many high school graduates (who become taxpayers) talk only about the one or two "turkey teachers" they had in school. They forget about that elementary teacher they loved at one time, the social studies, English, science or math teacher who taught them to think, who worked so diligently with them . . . the many teachers who helped shape their careers and their lives.

Continue being a great teacher and let the power battle run its course. Really, the only reason to become a teacher is to care, nurture and teach the world's most precious asset, our children. That's where it all starts and that's where it all ends.

Engler's education costs containment is still alive

Back in March, when state legislators were negotiating Proposal A, I obtained an outline of one of the plans where item 9 was crossed over with black lines and labeled "OUT."

"That," said a lawmaker, "is what Engler wanted." Item 9 was labeled "Legislation to help contain K-12 operating costs."

Voters flushed down Proposal A on June 2, so now lawmakers have started over by repealing \$6 billion in school operating property taxes. Gov. John Engler's item 9 is very much alive. And the Michigan Education Association should be sweating.

Now, to understand collective bargaining, you need to grasp that there are three parties: management, the union and the workers. The union bargains not only for what workers want, but for what the union wants.

So it is with MEA. The school employees union bargains not just for health care benefits, but for the carrier. It insists the carrier be its subsidiary, MESSA, for Michigan Education Special Services Association.

I don't comprehend all the details, but it seems MESSA, with a staff of 200-plus, markets Blues health care. Then MESSA buys \$8 million in computer services from another MEA subsidiary. (I draw this data from the famed June 7 Forbes magazine article.) MEA, MESSA and the data subsidiary share the same switchboard.

So you see that MEA staff jobs, not just teachers' issues, are at stake here.

Engler has promised to reduce property taxes along with a net reduction in the cost of government in Michigan. Therefore, he cannot agree to replacing all \$6 billion in lost property taxes with other taxes. There must be a net reduction for him to use the slogan "Promises Made, Promises Kept."

The first point under item 9, containing school operating costs, is "Requirements to bid out health care insurance for school employees."

Next point is to "Reform teacher tenure laws." Senate Republicans have pushed through those bills. They would 1) lengthen the probationary period, 2) require annual performance evaluations during probation, 3) require individual development plans for the teacher and 4) revise the hearing process in teacher tenure cases, shortening it to 300 days from nearly 1,600 days. In the last point, the goal is to keep school boards from "buying out" bad teachers in order to avoid the prolonged hearing process.

The third point is to require school districts

to bid out such work as busing, maintenance, driver's education, nursing and social services rather than hire school employees (represented by MEA).

Fourth point is to penalize districts for 1/180th of their state aid for every day of a teachers' strike. As it is, MEA strikers are assured 180 days of work a year, unlike auto, steel and utilities workers.

Those are Engler's agenda points, not necessarily mine. If I were running the show, two other goals would emerge:

■ Reduce the number of school districts from 562 to maybe 200. The average school district in Michigan has 3,500 pupils and supports a superstructure of administrators and principals. A 200 district plan would save money and allow the offering of a more specialized high school curriculum.

■ Prohibit school district employees from serving on any board of education, college board or in the Legislature until 10 years after they have left the school payroll. We have too many school people sitting on both sides of the bargaining and budgeting tables.

Engler and the Legislature, by cutting school property taxes, have taken the most dramatic step in Michigan government since passage of the sales tax during the Great Depression. Even bigger changes are coming.

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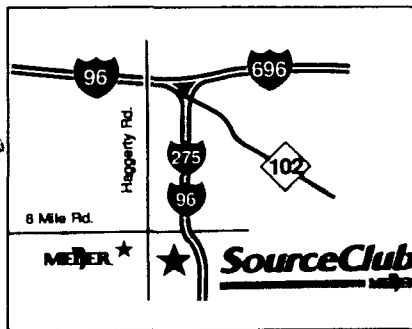
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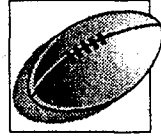

Linebacking duo

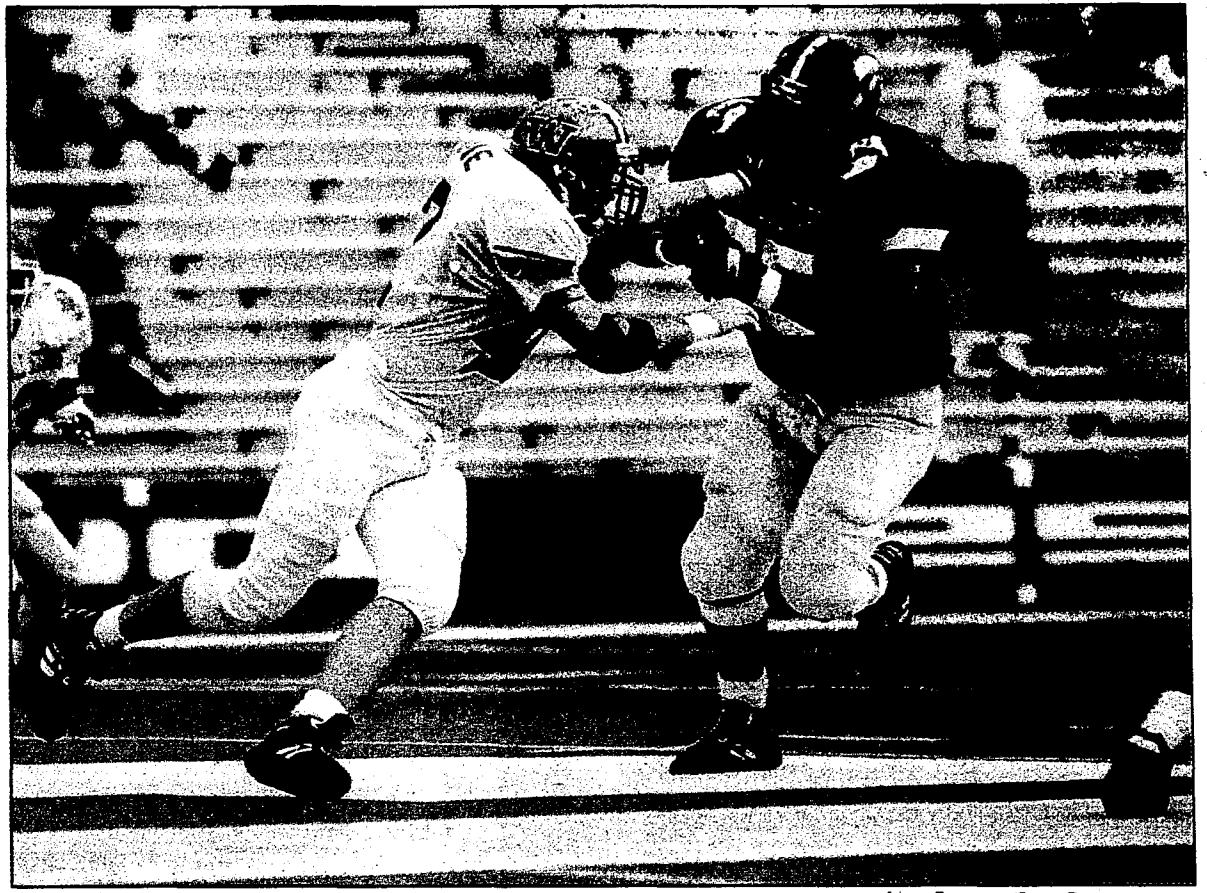

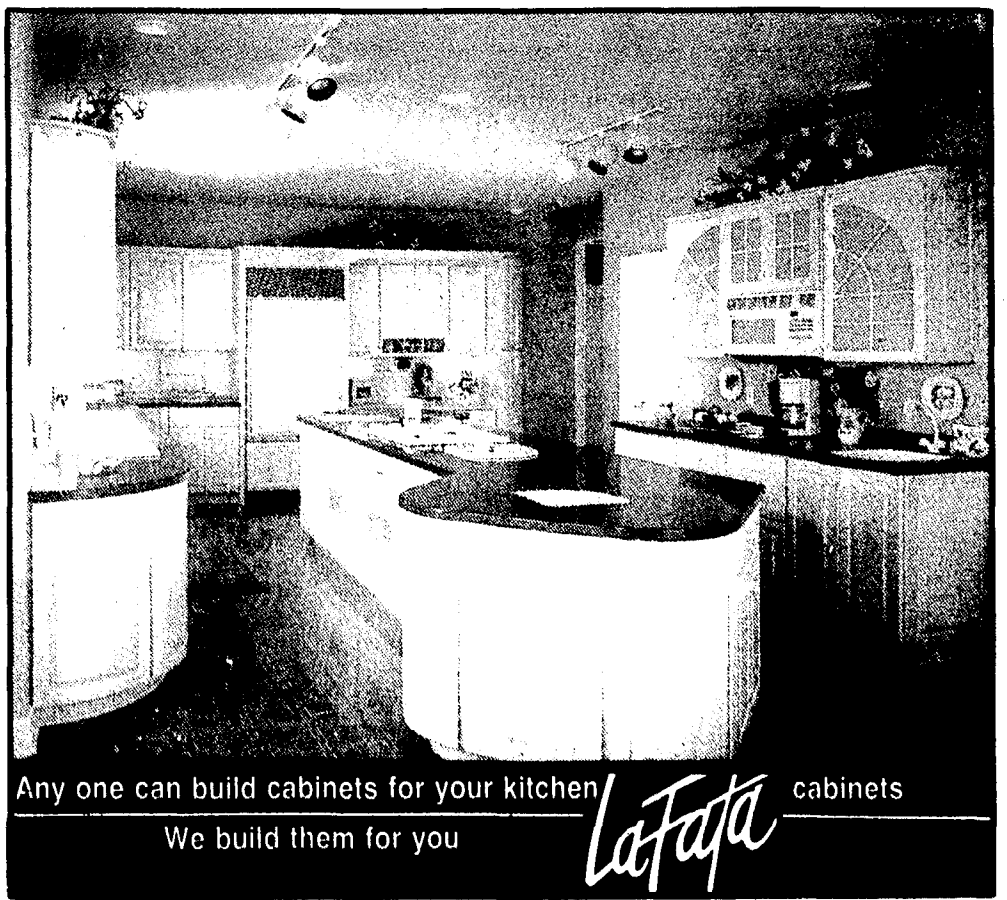

Champions again

Arsenal, Wings win

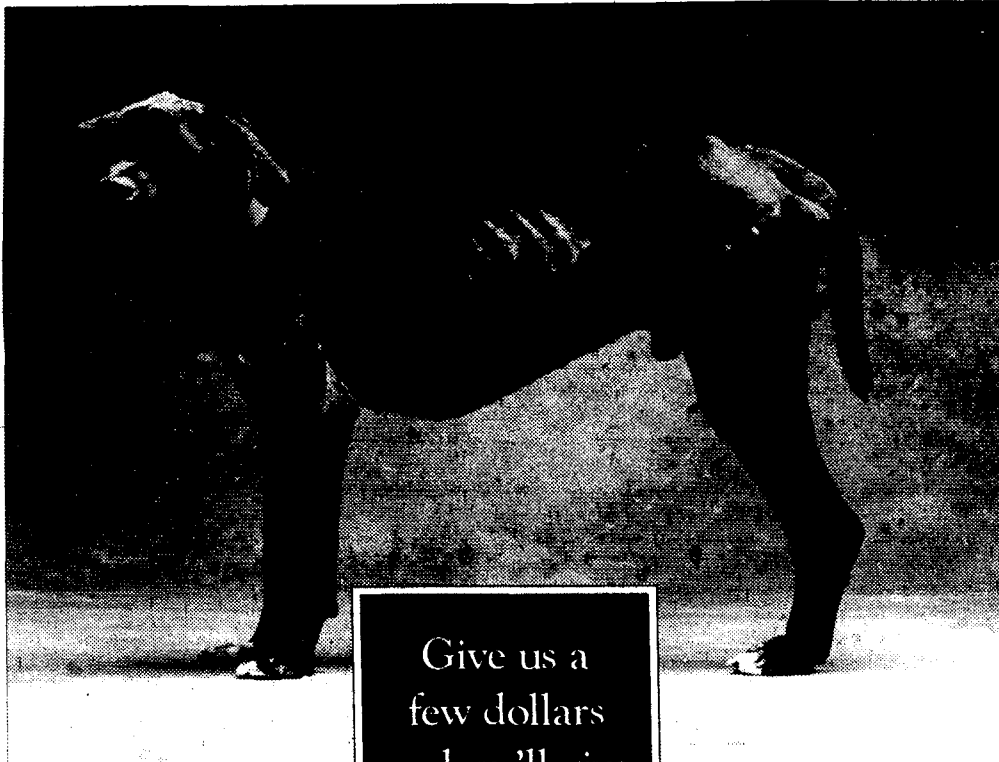

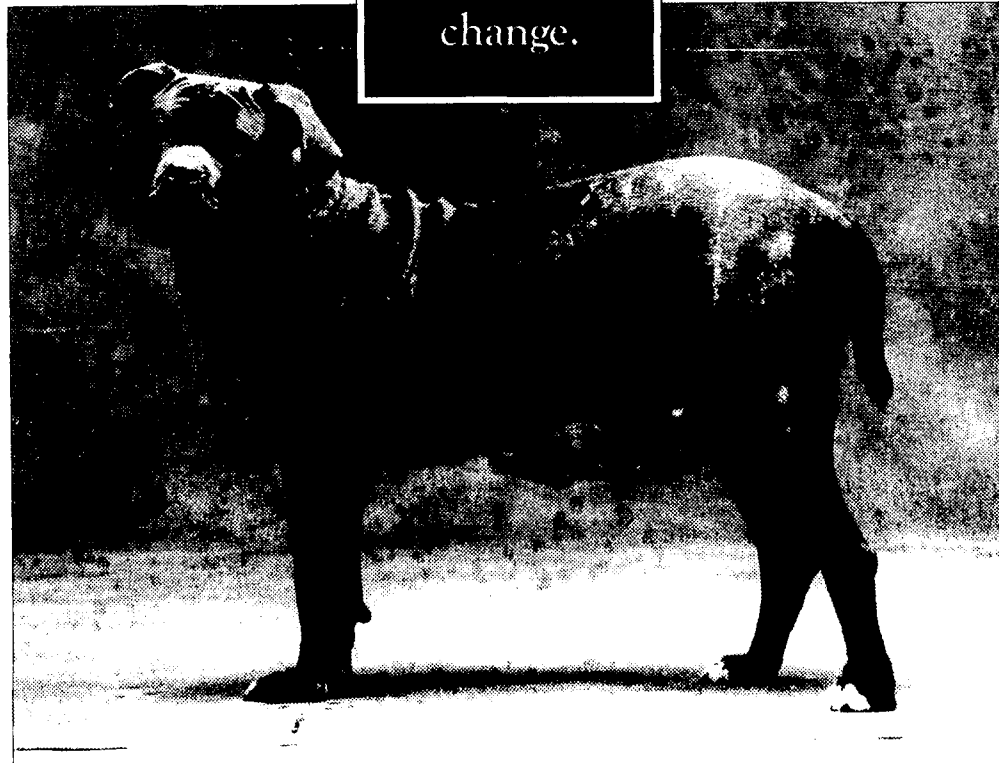

Top-seed Sistrunk wins at Grand Slam

The 5½-hour drive to-and-from Naperville, Ill., was well worth the trip for Herb Sistrunk.

"I hate to put pressure on the new coach, but they should have the strongest pitching and strongest outfield since I've been there," Racer said. "It should be a good team."

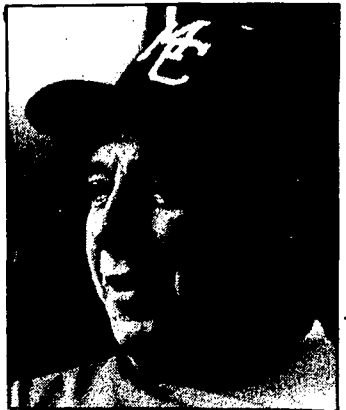
Summers said he will "conduct a thorough search" to find a replacement.

who must legally share Joe.

Commercials interrupt the stories, such as the memorable "Mmm, Mmm, Good" Campbell's Soup ad which features a quartet of gifted singers including Michelle Cloutier, Maggie Savage, Marc Rosati and Kevin Branson. The quartet also sings such longtime standards as "Sentimental Journey" and "The Trolley Song." The lovely arrangement of these songs also lends to the 1940's atmosphere.

Ralph Rosati and Judie Rosati make it easy to laugh at the foibles of John and Blanche, perhaps the most famous miserable married couple on radio. "The Bickersons" is a very funny skit with such marital bantering as John's proclamation that "Mar-

riage isn't a word. It's a sentence."

As Blanche readies for slumber and says, "I have to finish my face," John grumpily retorts, "Your face is finished." The Rosatis' comedic timing while delivering these lines make them all the more entertaining.

Act II reacquaints the audience with one genre of radio that was perhaps the most effective during its heyday. Left to the imagination, the mystery theatre drew pictures sometimes more horrifying or thrilling than can be created on the big screen today.

"The Dying Detective," a Sherlock Holmes mystery, lends itself to a sense of urgency as Greg Morgan skillfully executes a British accent in one of Dr. Watson's famous narratives. Steve Zizka also does a wonderful job as the dying Sherlock Holmes, complete with

wheezing and coughing.

Marc Rosati also enhances a terrific element of mystery with intriguing British characterizations of cabbies; as well as Culverton Holmes, an enemy of Sherlock Holmes who is perhaps the only man who can save him from certain death.

SRO is contemplating making "WSRO On The Air" an annual summer event. With such abundant treasured material as "The Green Hornet," "The Shadow," and Red Skelton as "The Bad Little Boy," and Fanny Brice as "Baby Snooks," it would be an annual event to anticipate with pleasure. Sally Dubats of Madison Heights is an actress, director and teacher, who teaches at community theaters in the metropolitan area. 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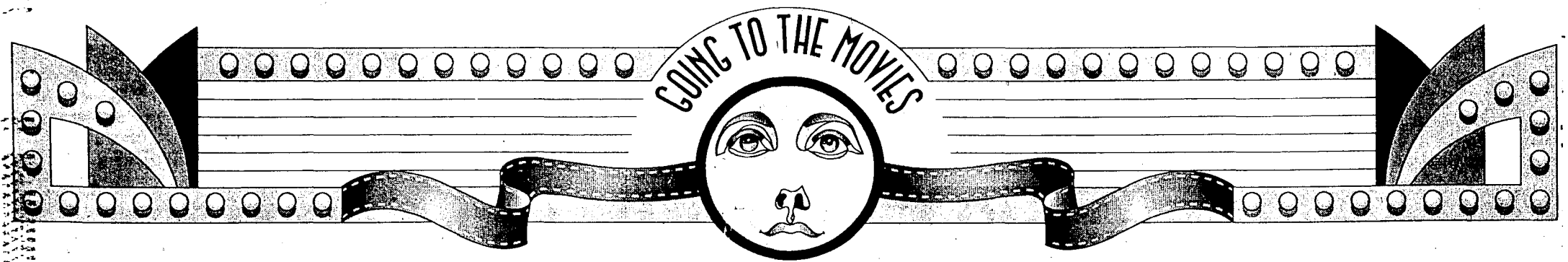
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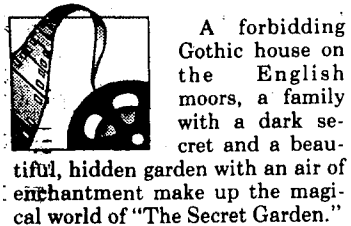
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'The Secret Garden': tale of spiritual, physical uplifting



A forbidding Gothic house on the English moors, a family with a dark secret and a beautiful, hidden garden with an air of enchantment make up the magical world of "The Secret Garden."

Based on the 1908 children's classic by Frances Hodgson Burnett, the movie opens Friday at suburban theaters.

In a story of physical rejuvenation and spiritual renewal, the lives of three lonely children and an embittered adult are changed through their involvement in restoring an old walled garden.

The role of truculent, independent Mary Lennox is played by Kate Maberly, who at 10 is already a veteran of British television productions.

While living with her self-involved parents in India, Mary endures their lack of interest. Orphaned when they die of a plague, Mary returns to England as a lonely, wild child. Through friendships forged in the garden, she evolves from a spoiled, angry child to a happy, creative young girl.

Mary learns to follow her own instincts and defies her adult guardians when she tries to help another angry, spoiled youngster, Colin Craven, played by newcomer Heydon Prowse. It's Colin's father, Lord Craven (John Lynch), who owns the estate on which the garden is rediscovered by the children.

Drowning in his grief over his young wife's death, Lord Craven

gives over much of the bedridden Colin's care to the housekeeper, Mrs. Medlock, played by Academy Award winner Maggie Smith.

Together, Colin and Mary befriend two local children, Dickon (Andrew Knott) and his sister Martha (Laura Crossley), who works in Craven's house. Knott and Crossley are both young veterans of the BBC soap, "Coronation Street," seen in the Detroit area on CBC Channel 9 from Windsor.

The garden, with its pivotal role in the story, almost qualifies as another cast member. Instead of using an existing garden, production designer Stuart Craig decided to build one. After studying both famous and obscure gardens, Craig and the filmmakers decided to construct their walled paradise around a ruined abbey reminiscent of Yorkshire's historic Fountains Abbey, a popular attraction in northern England.

"We looked into the possibility of building the garden at Fountains, but it's one of the country's most visited places and it made more sense to build a ruin in the gardens at Pinewood Studios and construct our garden there," Craig said.

In addition, Dickon's love of animals required filmmakers to fill the garden with oh-so-cute lambs, goats, squirrels, crows, geese, ducks, rabbits, foxes and "Albert the deer."

Special effects came into play to help the garden bloom.

"From the moment Mary and Dickon put the first lily bulb into the ground together, we wanted to show they were creating something unusual and not completely of this world," said producer Fred Fuchs.

"Their ability to replant and cultivate this enormous garden, their success in helping Colin become strong and healthy - all of these events are metaphors for the internal blossoming of their spirits."

Time-lapse photography was used to lend a fairy-tale quality to the blooming garden.

The film's director, Agnieszka Holland, a native of Poland, won international acclaim for her films, "Europa Europa," and "Olivier Olivier."

A participant in the Prague Spring of 1968 and a survivor of Communist repression of her work, Holland's films are usually far from lighthearted.

As a child in Poland, "The Secret Garden" was one of her favorite books. She's turned it into perhaps her most optimistic film to date with an unabashedly joyous ending.

"The children in this story experience loss, pain, loneliness and anger and they learn to love, trust and help one another," she said. "These emotions and experiences are central to adults and children; I think they're one reason this story has been so well loved by entire families through the years."

Made under the aegis of executive producer Francis Ford Cop-

pola's American Zoetrope for Warner Bros., "The Secret Garden" is Holland's first big budget Hollywood film.

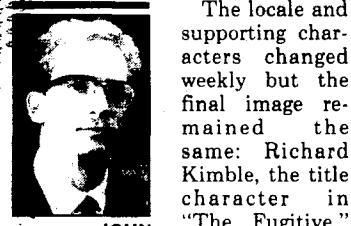

Kinetic energy keeps viewers caught up in 'The Fugitive'

The locale and supporting characters changed weekly but the final image remained the same: Richard Kimble, the title character in "The Fugitive," walking alone toward an uncertain future.

A new film version of the existential and wildly popular 1960s television series crams four seasons of action into just over two hours. And though the movie doesn't know when to quit, it should keep you planted on the edge of your seat.

Harrison Ford now plays Richard Kimble, the prominent Chicago surgeon who arrived home one night to find his wife being assaulted by a one-armed man. When the police arrive, evidence mounts against the innocent

Kimble, who is tried and sentenced to death by lethal injection.

A mishap en route to Death Row sends Kimble's prison bus tumbling in front of an oncoming train. The doctor escapes and heads back to Chicago to find the real killer.

Ford, who starts the film with a shaggy professor's beard, brings surprising depth to Kimble. He fills in emotional gaps left untouched by TV's David Janssen, whose stiffness and stoicism defined that oh-so-serious show.

Character actor Tommy Lee Jones ("Lonesome Dove"), meanwhile, brings humor to his part of Sam Gerard, the U.S. marshal determined to get his man.

Early in the chase, the tempo-

rarily trapped Kimble makes it clear once again that he didn't kill his wife. Gerard answers equally honestly, "I don't care."

For the tenacious Gerard, just like the makers of this movie, Kimble is simply an excuse to mount an epic chase. After all, the fugitive is no mad-dog killer on the loose. Time and again, he shows how humane he really is.

The filmmakers give nods to Alfred Hitchcock, from the wrong man theme to the use of familiar locations, here Chicago's St. Patrick's Day parade and a massive dam. The movie also has its own kinetic energy that keeps it run-

ning almost to the final frame.

I say almost because "The Fugitive," like so many Hollywood projects, isn't satisfied with one slam-bang ending. There are no fewer than four climaxes here, giving the audience its movie's worth but also dragging the money out longer than it deserves.

This is nothing compared to the mistakes "The Fugitive" could have made, such as adding romantic interest to Richard's already complicated life. There are also more brains and less bloodshed than in your typical movie of this type.

Cleverly plotted and engagingly

acted, "The Fugitive" is something rare: a trip back to TV's golden age that in many ways improves upon its source.

According to Petersen, founder of "A Minor Consideration," an organization dedicated to the support of child actors who have had trouble due to a lack of knowledge about the entertainment business, show business can be risky.

"There's an investment of time and money, and you have to make sure your kid has the interest. It's something you have to weigh carefully," said Petersen in a phone interview from his home in Los Angeles.

Petersen said you don't have to go to LA or New York to find work. There are many opportunities in this region for people who want to act, and work behind the scenes.

"We have a program that can save people thousands of dollars in the beginning," he said. "One woman we met in Cleveland was

fresh out of high school and her parents spent almost \$5,000 on an audio tape, that's outrageous."

Often times, people starting out in show business are talked into paying agents an annual fee, and getting expensive photographs taken.

"There are some agents you don't have to pay," said Petersen. At the seminar he and Matthews offer participants pointers on succeeding at an audition, explain who hires talent and where to find them, where to get the most inexpensive head shots, resumes and demo tapes, how to find agents, managers and casting directors, how to protect children from exploitation, labor laws and money management, and how to avoid scams.

Participants will also have the opportunity to make video screen tests which will be viewed by one of the largest talent agencies in New York and Los Angeles.

Petersen said in addition to young people and their families

who want to learn the ins and outs of the entertainment industry, several people in their 40s and 50s have attended the seminar. Participants including actors, dancers, singers and musicians, have ranged in age from six to 60.

Cleaning the tongue effectively reduced decay causing plaque and odor causing bacteria, Syal said. "People here aren't aware of that. They need to be educated."

Syal said the frequent suggestion that people brush their tongue with a toothbrush doesn't wash. Cleaning the tongue with a toothbrush often triggers a "gag reflex."

Making changes

Inventors, Broccardo said, may have a great idea, but a great idea isn't always enough.

"Where do they go?" he said. "Who should they see? How should it be packaged for shipment? For display? What should be the price? What type of deal do you give the retailer? What should be the percentage for profit?"

Those are just some of the questions that have to be answered, Broccardo said. Large manufacturers have all this information, but small guys who just starting out need a hand.

In the case of the Sakool tongue cleaner, Broccardo made several recommendations. First, change the packaging. "People have no idea how important that can be."

Packaging must explain the product very succinctly so buyers can quickly ascertain what the product's about, why they should buy it, and how it should be used.

Broccardo also suggested the addition of flavors to the tongue

cleaner, since toothpaste and mouthwashes have conditioned people to expect flavoring in oral hygiene products.

Other changes not quite as obvious to the consumer include package design that allows the product to be easily displayed, a marketing plan, finding purchasers and casing packaging that allows the Sakool tongue cleaner to be distributed more easily.

He then uses his contacts within the retail industry to get the product into the hands of the consumer. There's no mystery in why Broccardo works in mainly medically related products and services.

Until starting Consumer Product Consulting years ago he was a purchaser for more than 15 years,

most recently for pharmaceutical company. "You do what you know."

As a purchaser, he was constantly beset by company and salespeople with products that were difficult to market or poorly displayed.

His company also represents already developed products and processes that are being introduced in this area.

Selling ADAPath

Another company Broccardo is currently working with is the Pasadena, Maryland-based ADAPath. ADAPath has developed a "detectable pathway" that helps facilities meet the requirements of the American Disabilities Act.

ADAPath national sales manager Bob Shigenaka said under the American Disabilities Act, wherever pedestrian walkways, ramps or blended sidewalks meet traffic areas and there's no curb present — for example, curb cuts at crosswalks — it must be distinguishable from the regular pavement to warn pedestrians that they should be careful.

"If a blind person comes out and there's no curb, he doesn't know where to stand," he said. "This solves that."

Up until now, contractors have attempted to use cement overlays or tiles embedded into the pavement. The overlays have had cracking problems and embedded tiles break up or come loose to easily.

ADAPath covers the existing concrete with a newly developed material that alerts pedestrians by color and by small ridges detectable to a blind person with their feet, a cane or a seeing-eye dog.

All new and existing construction was supposed to be in compliance with the American Disabilities Act by July 26, 1993. Obviously, Shigenaka said, very little headway has been made, but that's partially because no practical, cost effective way has been available — until ADAPath.

Shigenaka said Consumer Product Consultants job will be to act as ADAPath's representative in the area.

At Saturn, Gill was able to make an appointment and he was assured the repairs wouldn't take longer than 20 minutes.

"What's the problem?" said Emerson Russell of Detroit, who also had his Saturn fixed at Plymouth Wednesday. "You come in, get an appointment and they give you good service. Why complain?"

All of the Saturns sold before last April, some 380,000 nationally, have been recalled by GM. The repair should take about a half hour and customers have been asked to make an appointment to have the work done.

Reid said that about 200 were fixed at his dealership Monday and Tuesday.

Parker hired temporary clerical help to answer phones and he moved a couple of technicians from an Oldsmobile dealership under common ownership to assist with the repairs.

"It's a very simple repair. We can handle 12 an hour," Parker said.

"We've committed to 90 percent completion in 90 days," Scicluna said. "It's been a real good team-building process."

Dealers reportedly were notified about the company recall last week a few days before notices were mailed to customers.

"You never like to hear of a problem with a product," Reid said. "You say, 'How can we make it as best we can for the custom-

ers so we can get it resolved as quickly as possible.'"

The dealerships said it remains to be worked out with GM who will pay for the extra expenses like temporary help and food associated with the recall.

"We've just got to take care of people," Parker said.

The dealers are optimistic that the massive recall won't affect future sales.

"I think our reputation will come out untarnished," Scicluna said.

Saturn owners, at least those who were waiting on repairs at the Plymouth dealership Wednesday, echo that sentiment.

"I have no problem with this," said Russell. "This could happen with any car, and as far as I'm concerned, this is just a precaution they are taking on my behalf. These people have given me the best service I've ever had since I've owned a car and until I get bad service, I won't complain."

Said Gill: "I'm very happy with this car. But I'd be even happier if I could drive it more. My wife takes it most of the time."

Saturn of Plymouth has sold about 5,000 cars since opening in November, 1990; Saturn of Troy 3,500 since January, 1991; and Saturn of Southfield 950 since opening last December, the dealerships reported.

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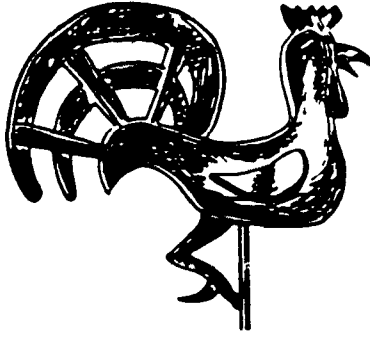

With props, kids learn through play

As mentioned in previous articles, play time for children offers learning as well as fun opportunities for children to put into practice what they observe in the real/adult world.

Children are able to create something new, problem solve, experiment and manipulate to their satisfaction. Observing children while engaged in socio-dramatic play experiences gives adults a preview of how children see the world around them through familiar settings, places and people.

Childcare professionals and parents can assist children in getting the best out of socio-dramatic play by providing resources and give a hint as to what to play through theme development and props.

A good way for parents to tell whether or not socio-dramatic play, which can be called life skills play, is being promoted effectively in their child's kindergarten classroom, day care home or center, is to look around for plenty of props. The more props available and accessible to children provide for a better starting point to build or expand upon.

The likelihood of realistic learning experiences relating to life skills and appropriate dialogue that may go along with these experiences can come with play.

Say, for example, the theme of play is house painter. It would be easier for a child to get into the role of painter, if a painter's hat and overalls were accessible. A painter should have something to paint with, so provide brushes, paint sticks and the like. It's not mandatory paint should be included — at least not real paint. Try water and food coloring.

Now, most children will be able to think of other things and/or items that go along with the theme. A starting point has been provided — the props.

If you were to ask a child or three or may be four years, what did he or she do at preschool or day care, he or she would probably tell you what they ate for lunch or talk about what they played — usually a socio-dramatic learning-play activity.

Therefore, it might suggest that these experiences are ones that successfully impact children in a way that influences their thinking because it was significant enough for them to recall as part of their activity involvement.

Since socio-dramatic play experiences are significant and illustrated through child-to-adult conversation as children tell of their day, then adults should take pride and strive to enhance as well as create ways to make such play experiences meaningful and fun. Focus on the theme development work in appropriate props to match the theme.

Here are some themes and props for socio-dramatic play:

Restaurant — To create an appropriate theme have such props as tables and chairs, menus, play dishes, silverware, order pad, trays, aprons, placemats, paper money, cash register, paper napkins and snack food on hand.

Car wash — Use toy cars and trucks, bicycles, rags or wash cloths, a pail, plastic squeeze containers, paper money, a small amount of mild soap with a small amount of water in the pail.

Post Office letter carrier — Use old envelopes, shoulder bags, junk mail, old magazines, postcards and the like, stamps made by the children, a toy mail box or one made by the children, mail carriers hat and sweater, small boxes and pens and pencils.

Baby care — Use dolls of different ethnic groups, doll clothes or infant T-shirts (available at a resale store), plastic dish pans, mild soap and water, infant-sized diapers, small wash cloth, travel-sized powder and lotion, child-sized comb and brush and a blanket.

Singer or musical entertainer — Use a variety of clothing that can be mixed and matched, hats, scarves, shoes and boots (not too large, small enough to fit safely), costume jewelry, makeup, tissue or cotton balls to apply makeup, toy microphone or one made by the children, tape recorder, tapes and musical instruments.

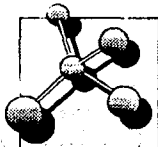

Kids get stuck on science at school

Obleck and ransom notes hardly sounds like things you'd experience in summer school. But at New Morning School's "Discovery Days Classes," youngsters were toughening up with a gooey mixture of corn starch, water and green food coloring and using ransom notes to find out what colors are used to create colored ink.

Joey Boumaroun's parents will be surprised to hear their son was "toughened up" at New Morning School's "Discovery

Days Classes."

"Ewe! I turned to stone," said Boumaroun as he smeared his arms with Obleck, a green gooey mixture of corn starch, water and food coloring.

"No, you're slime!" said classmate Bobby Hoernschemeyer in hysterics.

The experiment taught the kids about chemical properties — specifically liquids and solids and how some mixtures can be both.

The students also discovered through several notes written on paper towels that sometimes marker manufacturers use a mixture of colors to make the color black.

After reading the letters, which were ransom notes demanding money in exchange for the release of Batman, teacher's aide Carol Watson-Himm dipped the towels in a pan of water. When lifted out of the water, the colors separated.

"Discovery Days" classes teach children about a myriad of subjects through hands-on experiments, according to teacher Barbara Courtney of Plymouth.

"The children discover things on their own," Courtney said. "I think because they're doing the work they're more interested in learning."

"We're trying to make learning interesting and fun... especially with math and science. There's not very many people from the United States going into math and science in college," added teacher Carla Ratcliff of Livonia. "The numbers are way down."

Aside from physics, Science Camp I and II also include lessons in earth science, botany, chemistry, oceanography, birds and night creatures.

Later in the course, the children experiment with LEGO TC/Logo Sampler, a graphic computer language which allows students to use special LEGO blocks to create vehicles and

structures when they then operate via Logo programming.

The LEGO DACTA program teaches students to design and build devices which incorporate simple machines. To delve deeper into the subject, the students use project guidelines prepared by the Society of Automotive Engineers to investigate force, friction, air resistance, air pressure and mass and balance.

Math and science aren't the only subject taught during the school's summer program. "Student Involvement and Success" explains the importance of study and language skills.

New Morning School, a pre-kindergarten-eighth grade parent cooperative, has held "Discovery Days" classes since 1981. The school, established in 1973, carries its summer class philosophy into the regular school year.

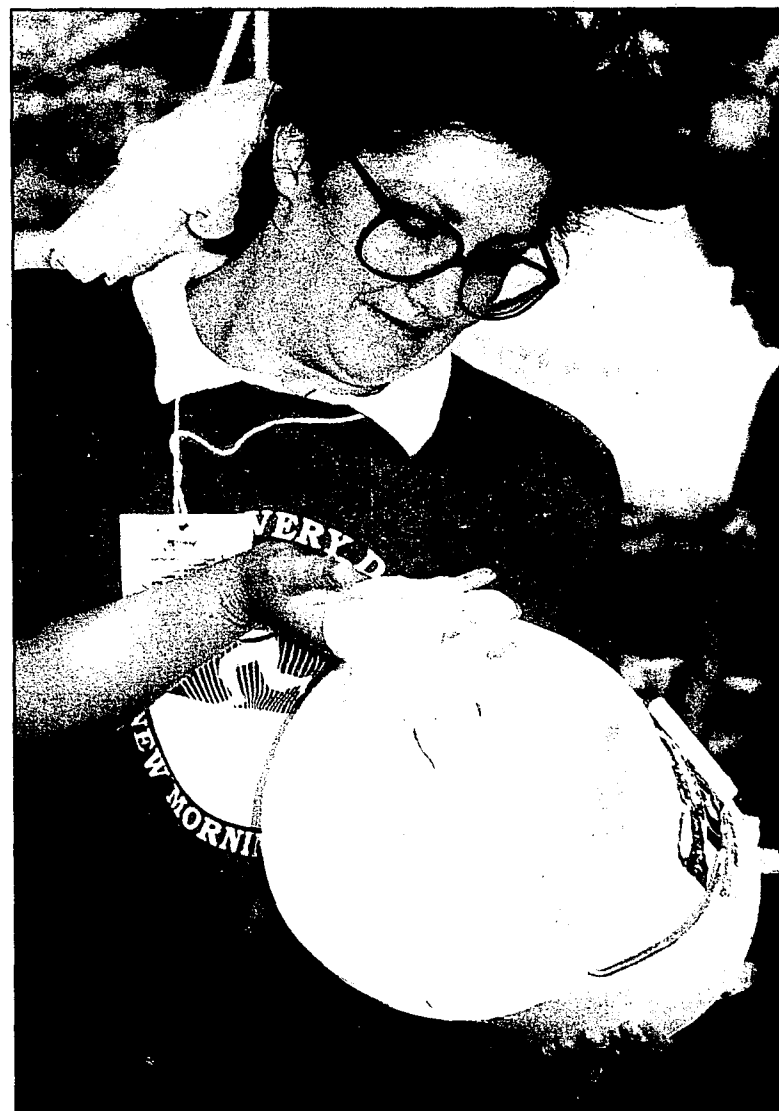
The non-profit school prides itself on stressing individualized learning, student decision-making, goal-setting and hands-on learning.

"Without the parents, we couldn't do the things we do," said teacher/summer director Marilyn Romack.

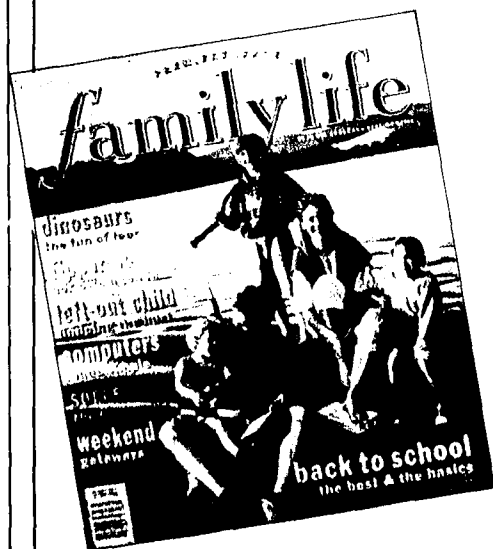

All of us have what we like to call quirks, but deep down inside we know they're habits. Some are good habits. And others... well, they're... not so good habits.

And we all know how difficult dumping those not so good habits can be. Give up smoking and turning into a walking, talking eating machine. Have a bad experience getting a job and, poof, you're locked into negative feelings about the employment picture.

But it doesn't have to be that way, according to Damon Reinbold, who with Dr. Douglas Ruben will be in Livonia and Southfield next week for a series of seminars designed to shed bad habits and get a better grip on your life.

"The mind is like a computer; it does what it's conditioned to do," said Reinbold. "It does it even when you don't want it to do it. My job is to get to the subconscious and change that program."

Reinbold will do two seminars — "Stop Smoking, Lose Weight" and "Get Your Mind off Your Ex," while Ruben serve up his family recovery seminar and "Rate Your Date." The seminars will run concurrently at 6 and 8 p.m. Aug. 16 at the Holiday Inn-West, Six Mile and I-275 in Livonia, and Aug. 19 at the Holiday Inn on Telegraph north of 10 Mile Road, Southfield.

Reinbold practices perception therapy, a non-medical therapy for fast paced people who know what they want and want it instantly.

"My technique is like an instant oil change," Reinbold said. "Positive thinking seminars are dynamite, but the problem is they tell people what to think, but they don't tell them how to think it. With my technique, I show people how to think in the first place so they take those perceptions into the real world."

According to Reinbold, change doesn't

have to take a long period of time or be painful. It can be as simple as helping people change how their perception of themselves. It can be as simple as providing an anchor — a feeling of being in control — to overcome a stressful situation.

Taking into consideration that no two people think alike, Reinbold individualizes within his seminars as much as possible. "Getting Your Mind Off Your Ex" doesn't necessarily mean an ex-spouse, but a former job or anything that has left the person with bad memories that hold them back in the present.

"I change how they feel about themselves, their self-esteem," he said. "I change their responses to bad self memories."

Reinbold didn't start out to be therapist. He was a seminarian when an older priest asked him to be a participant in an experiment he was doing for his master's degree. The subject was hypnosis and even though Reinbold thought he was faking it because he wasn't asleep, he discovered that the priest was able to plant a thought in his mind during a second session.

"He planted the idea in my mind that when he counted to three I would read the time on the clock on the wall behind him," Reinbold said. "I looked up and said 'My, it's quarter to four.' Then I went back under and he told me when he counted to three everything would be back to normal. I opened my eyes and saw that there wasn't a clock on the wall." he was hooked.

Reinbold left the seminary and eventually went on to study with Dr. Milton Erickson, the foremost medical therapist of his time. Erickson imparted some words of wisdom that have stuck with him since. He told his young friend that "every human being has every resource in them they need, the problem is they don't know how to reach them."

Reinbold, who now is the toast of the talk show circuit — "I've been on Sally Jesse Raphael more than anyone else." — and traverses the United States doing seminars, uses Erickson's beliefs in his therapy.

"If I say to people picture this, I only reach 40 percent, so actually I ask them to imagine it in their own way," he said. "I don't have to know what they're thinking, however, I can deal with how they think."

Ruben's approach to therapy is slightly different. He teaches a four-step program for family recovery — how to beat anxiety, how to get rid of shame and guilt, how to cope with anger and how to talk to your family and the people around you and the stages of recovery.

Like Reinbold, he is well known across the country. He is the best-selling author of more than 30 self-help books on family and addiction. His titles include "Guilt No More: 10-Step Guide to a Shame-Free life," "Avoidance Syndrome: Doing Things Out of Fear" and "Bratbusters: Say Goodbye to Tantrums and Disobedience." He has just finished work on yet another book, "One Minute Secrets to Feeling Great."

In his family seminar, Ruben teaches people "exactly what to do, what to expect and how to survive their worst enemies — fear and failure." In his "Rate Your Date" seminar, he will focus on actually how to choose the right person for you.

The peach tree outside our kitchen window is teaching us some valuable lessons this summer about the difference between abundance and overabundance.

This spring the tree grew taller and wider and had produced numerous blossoms. It was a sight to behold. We didn't want to do anything to the tree. Just let it grow and maybe it would produce even more peaches than before.

It did. But this year there are too many. These small hard peaches cluster like grapes and have weighed the tree down so much that a couple of the branches are splitting in two. There are simply too many and they crowd each other out so that none will have the chance to get as big as the few did last year.

We did not select certain buds to keep and discard other buds in the spring. Nor did we prune the smaller branches, so now the smaller branches carry loads that exceed their capacity to hold them. The formerly tall, upright peach tree is weighed down by its super-abundance so much that it looks more like a weeping willow!

Ironically, it is no longer healthy because of its unchecked proliferation. Disease has sat in and the leaves are curled. Little bugs bore holes in the rock hard peaches. Its overabundance has its costs! It will take a lot of time and care to help this super-producing tree.

And sometimes I wonder if our

current lifestyles might reflect similar signs of the costs of overabundance.

Are we so busy with our many activities that we simply don't take the time to simply enjoy the good gifts of creation and marvel at the wonder and majesty of pink tinted clouds at sunset or the profusion of purple pink flowers in the gardens?

Do we get so preoccupied with acquiring and taking care of the abundance of our possessions that we lose sight of the simple, meaningful moments that life pours out before us?

Do we ever get so caught up in the overabundance of scheduled plans and activities, that we hardly see and listen to the people that we are with?

What are we teaching our children when they feel pressure to

become overly productive and need to be super-stars in every arena of their lives? When can they simply take time to enjoy the life and the people around them and attend to the things that call out their interests, gifts and enthusiasm?

Overabundance in material things and in activities can weigh people down just as too many peaches can bend down a tree.

It becomes a moral issue to find the balance between a healthy abundance of resources and activities or non-productive overabundance.

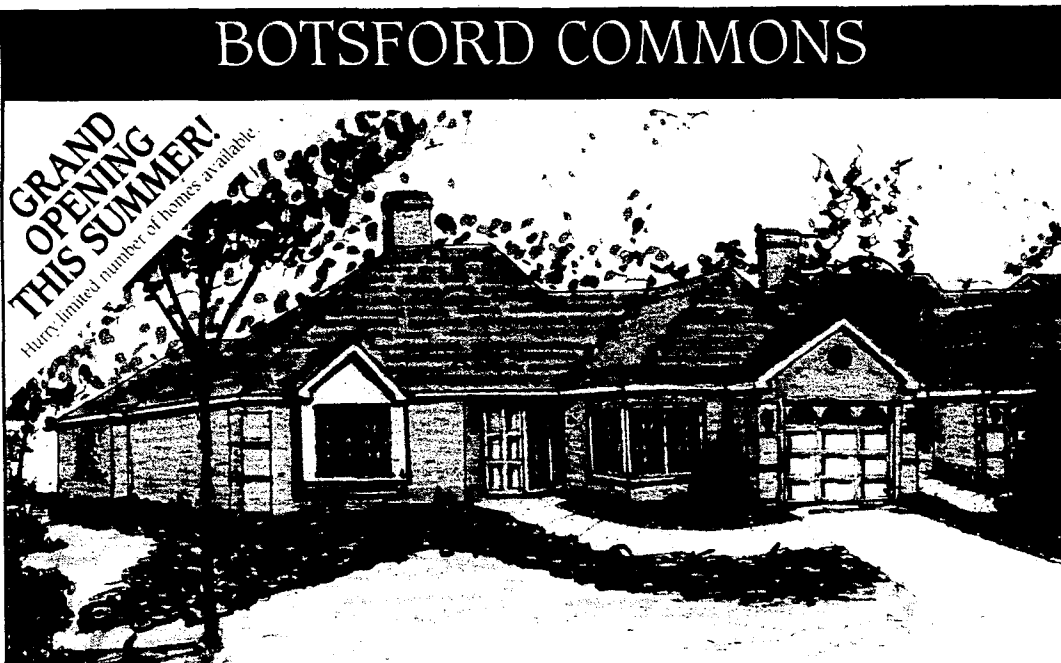

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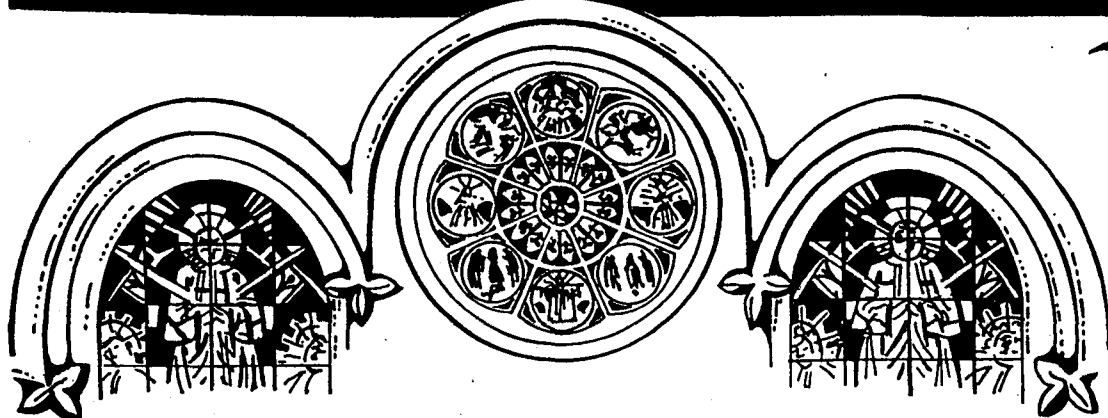

Nancy Fowler: Her life, visions

In a small town in Georgia, a soft-spoken woman claims she started having strange mystical experiences in 1983. By 1987, she says she was experiencing regular apparitions of Jesus and his mother, Mary. In 1990, she claims they asked her to reveal their words to the world.

Nancy Fowler has made Conyers, Ga., 20 miles southeast of Atlanta, a point of interest for an increasing number of people from throughout the United States and the world. They are the faithful, the doubtful, the miracle seekers, those hoping for cures or looking for signs, those seeking inner peace and those coming out of respect, expecting nothing in return.

They come by the thousands on the 13th of each month to hear Fowler reveal the message for the United States she claims Mary has given her. Now, Fowler talks about the visions she claims to have experienced, her personal beliefs and how it has affected her life.

What were your first visions?

"Actually, the first visions I had, or mystical experiences, were of the other kingdom. That was the kingdom I was denying. I denied the reality that Satan could manifest himself. I did not think that a demon really existed.

"Our Lord got my undivided attention in a big way by showing me the other kingdom first. There was nothing on this entire earth that could convince me otherwise, I can assure you. I was terrified. I didn't believe in that kingdom. My thoughts back then were that evil was a concept, not a reality."

Fowler says she has visions of Satan almost every day.

Why do you think you saw that dark side first?

"I think our Lord was showing me where I was walking by doing that. First of all, I thought myself to be very intelligent. I was deceived that I had the answers; the world had the answers. The career was important. I was a bench-warmer Catholic.

"That's when I questioned the reality of Satan and I thought, maybe I'm not sure about the existence of God either. I even started to question that and that's when . . . I had the rug pulled out from underneath my feet."

Did you ever ask, "Why me?"

"You know, probably because I'm the most wretched, the most undeserving of the bunch. Our Lord said He wants to show the world His love and mercy and so He picked someone most in need of mercy.

"All your readers must understand that I'm not deserving of these heavenly favors, that I'm the least deserving. At the moment when our Lord appeared to me, I would have been deserving to see Satan but not Jesus."

Fowler says she experienced her first vision of Jesus in February 1987. She claims her second vision didn't occur until November of that year.

What was it like to see Jesus?

"Beyond all words! He just walked through a door and stood in the room. He looked like His paintings that you see growing up. But I remember most his eyes. They were dark.

"I remember what I experienced first was the overwhelming love. I mean the embracing, all-encompassing, unconditional, perfect love. You're bathed in this love. It's such serenity and peace and joy and compassion and mercy and forgiveness all wrapped up in that moment. You know, our Lord wants us to know He's alive and living, that He lives within us, that He's everywhere, that we can go to Him any time, any moment. We have lost this reality."

During this same time period, Fowler says she began having visions of angels. She believes the angels were helping to prepare her for future apparitions. Her first

encounter was in 1987 during a time of personal strife. She was praying and crying in her room when she said an angel appeared on her closet door. "I was so shocked to see an angel, I instantly stopped crying."

Fowler describes the angels as "beautiful, spiritual creatures. They have majestic wings. They are in immense light whiter than dazzling white." She cannot tell the gender and she says that most of the time they are silent.

Fowler said her first encounter with Mary, during the summer of 1987, was via an inner location where distinct words are experienced by the heart while the mind is at rest — "I didn't even know that word; it was foreign to me. I just knew that this was happening to me." She was awakened from a sound sleep by a lady's voice saying, "Please get up and pray. My Son and I are calling you to holiness."

What does Mary look like?

"Our Lady is lovelier than any picture, any statue in the world. A lot of them look like Our Lady, but she's much more beautiful than any of our human creations of her.

"Everything she points the way to her Son. Everything she attributes to God. She is the most humble of all the creatures, the most loving. She is very beautiful. It's the love of God, her oneness with God. She's such a mother, a mother, truly a mother in every sense of the word."

You talk about your family responsibilities. Has this brought a lot of hardships?

"The world doesn't realize the heavy cross that's being asked. Back in 1990, when the public began to find out about it, and that's only at the request of heaven. Heaven opened the door; I didn't. Our Lady said to me, 'Your private life has ended. Your public ministry begins and you will suffer more.' You know, I didn't know what it was to be in the public eye. I didn't even have a clue.

"She appeared one time and said, 'Do you accept the cross with the gift?' I just thought it was understood, so I didn't answer. I just thought it was automatic. And then she very gently said, 'I'm waiting for your answer.'"

But you didn't understand all that would be involved?

"I was so naive. I always thought, 'Gee, if you tell the truth, everybody is going to believe you.' That's all there is to it. I was very naive in my thinking. But what you know, you know,



and the gift is to be shared. And no matter what the people say or do or what they think, you keep your eyes on Jesus and you go forward because you know."

What changes have these vision caused in your life?

"You know what the visions have done to my life? When Our Lord would speak to me, my heart would just burn like fire and cause me to look at my own life. I would have to look at my own life and I would have to make the changes.

Fowler gave an example of how in the fall of 1987, she was praying before a tabernacle in the church when she said she heard Jesus say: 'Do not rejoice in the powers of darkness, rejoice in the Light of the Lord.'

Fowler associated those words with the approaching Halloween holiday. "It was like a sword pierced my heart." Fowler and her husband made immediate changes which she admitted were not easy with a "temper-tantrum child." She instituted in her own family and church an All-Saints party where the children choose a favorite saint and decorated T-shirts with the likeness of that

saint for a costume. What do you think the biggest change in your life has been?

"I think the biggest change is the Mass and the Eucharist being alive and most important in my life. Nothing surpasses the graces of the Mass, nothing. No apparition surpasses the graces of the Mass."

Fowler has said that, on a few occasions during Mass, she has witnessed the form of Jesus "walk up and merge with the priest. As He walks to the back of the priest, the priest becomes an aura of light."

What is the Mother of God trying to tell us?

"This life is so temporary. You tell people life is so temporary but it doesn't always register. It didn't with me. We don't know the hour which we will be called back home. And Our Lady is saying, 'Be prepared, children, to meet my Son any time. Lead your life this way. Live the gospel.' She's telling us to do this. She's not giving us new revelations. She's telling us things that we've already heard that maybe we've pushed aside.

Enthusiasts derive thrills from identifying butterflies

Butterfly-watching is a natural extension of bird-watching. Both activities deal with a colorful animal, many different areas can be involved, the subjects exhibit many of the same principles of biology, and there are a reasonable number of species to learn about. Attracting butterflies to a yard can also be done by planting the proper kinds of plants.

A similarity between bird-watching and butterfly-watching is the activity of counting and identifying. On July 17, 1993, the Farmington Area Naturalists conducted their third annual butterfly count at Heritage Park in Farmington Hills. Between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., participants walked the trails and counted butterflies.

As with any activity, when your attention is focused on a particular subject, you become much more aware of it. Over the past three years, 26 different species of butterflies have been counted by the group. Each year has yielded some new and different species, as well as variation in the total number of individuals.

In 1991, participants counted 349 butterflies; in 1992, 232; and in 1993, 190. Though all three counts were conducted at the same time of the year, prior weather conditions caused the differences in total number. Over time, it will be interesting to note any differences or similarities in the total number and diversity of butterflies in the park.

One of the most commonly counted butterflies is the large wood nymph. They are medium-sized butterflies that are very chocolate colored and can appear black in the shadows. Pearly crescent spots, common sulfurs and European cabbage butterflies are also commonly counted.

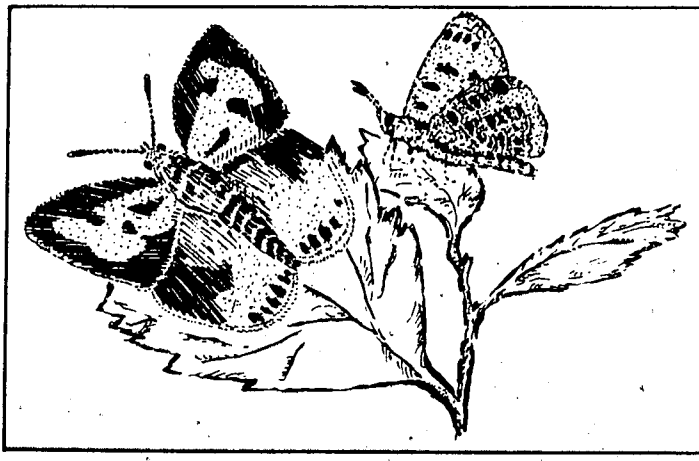
So when a new or seldom seen butterfly is identified, it sparks the interest of all those involved. During the 1993 count, a harvester butterfly was netted and later released. It was orange and black on the top and peach-colored with stripes on the underside of the hind wings. A nickel could cover

it when its wings were folded.

Though not a very splashy butterfly, what makes this butterfly interesting is that its larvae eats aphids, not plants as most larvae do. It was discovered in the woods near a stream where woolly aphids could be found. This was one of two new species identified on the count this year.

Holding a captured butterfly, identifying it and then releasing it is a marvelous feeling.

Canton Project Arts to showcase fine art

Lots of things help make a community special: schools, libraries, parks, public services, public safety, merchants.

And the arts.
As Canton treasurer Elaine Kirchgatter, active in Canton Project Arts and a Plymouth Community Arts Council past president, put it: "The arts are something that haven't been a priority among Canton residents in terms of organization and funding. We want to show that we're interested in the cultural aspect of what makes a community unique."

Within this backdrop, Project Arts will host a juried gallery showing and sale of fine art Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 6-7, in the Canton Administration Building, 1150 Canton Center. Admission is free. Artists, patrons and dignitaries will kick off the festive weekend at an invitation-only opening Friday night, Nov. 5.

Just one facet of Project Arts' cultural push, the fine arts show has a dual purpose: to give Michigan artists a chance to showcase their work and to heighten public awareness of the arts.

To request an application to enter the show, call the Canton treasurer's office: 397-5371. The deadline to enter original artwork (no slides or photos) is Oct. 11. The cost is \$15 per work for non-residents and \$10 per work for residents.

Susan Froelich, coordinator of the widely respected Ann Arbor Street Art Fair and past president of the Plymouth Community Arts Council, will jury paintings, drawings, sculpture, photography, clay, textiles, jewelry and mixed media.

Prizes will include a Jurors Choice Award, a Canton Project Arts Special Award and category merit awards. Businesses, groups and individuals who'd like to contribute prize money should call Kirchgatter.

Experience the arts

She's not an artist but Kirchgatter says she appreciates those who are. "I want to do what I can to encourage residents of all ages to be creative and to encourage the community to come out and experience the arts."

Project Arts member and show chairwoman Sharon Dillenbeck is a professional artist, art teacher and gallery owner. She does portraiture and creates realistic impressionism in pencil, watercolor and oil. She's co-juror of the Canton Liberty Fest summer fine art show at Heritage Park.

Dillenbeck sees the Project Arts fall show complementing Liberty Fest by "bringing artwork out of the street fair setting into a new environment."

The November show, just before the holiday gift-buying season, is especially good, she adds: "We gave a real splash of fine art this summer at Liberty Fest. Now, we'll come back and say, 'Here we are again. Come see us.' Project Arts is here to stay. We're going to take a stand in the Canton community and not quit."

About 60 Canton residents formed Project Arts last winter to promote the cultural arts: fine art, music, dance, stage, writing, poetry, storytelling, crafts and pottery. "That's what's good about Project Arts — it's spread out," Dillenbeck said. "And it has a strong nucleus of people who really care what happens with their community. They get right in there and work."

Art gallery planned

When the planned new Summit on the Park in Heritage Park opens in 1995, the multipurpose center will include a fine art gallery.

Project Arts will assist in fine-tuning Summit on the Park's cultural programming. It might, for example, consider whether the center should have an art rental gallery, non-stage entertainment or a poet, artist or philosopher in residence.

Meanwhile, the committee will work with the Canton Parks and Recreation Department to schedule cultural events at Heritage Park.

Supervisor Tom Yack sees township government stimulating volunteer initiatives like arts programming, then letting the folks involved advance the extras that help enrich a community.

As a signal of their commitment, township trustees budgeted \$5,000 for Project Arts this year. That should be enough to jump-start the committee in its bid to spur cultural diversity and inspire the forming of a Canton Friends of the Arts.

Kirchgatter envisions commissioned sculpture, paintings and fabric art at Summit on the Park and purchased artwork in the treasurer's office.

This spring, the township purchased the Best of Show from a fine arts show of work by Canton's park and recreation seniors. The painting now hangs in the township hall.

Fine art's moving to the forefront in Canton's cultural firmament. Says Dillenbeck: "Culturally we're growing and we need to let residents know the cultural opportunities we have right here so they don't have to drive all over the place to enjoy or buy fine art. We've got to do a better job of marketing."

Old World meets New in the Livonia Civic Center Library as a Polish native and Canton resident displays items from her collection reflecting her love of nationality and homeland.

"The collection sort of brings me closer to my homeland," said Krystyna Dryja, a Canton resident for seven years. "It helps me remember where I came from. Those were the fun years, as a child with no responsibilities."

Livonia Arts Commission will present this exhibition of Polish memorabilia through Aug. 31 in the cylindrical display cases on the second floor of the Livonia Civic Center Library, Farmington Road and Five Mile.

Twenty-five years ago, Dryja came to this country as a teenager from Starachowice, a city then with 70,000 residents in Poland's Kielce region, about two hours south of Warsaw.

Much of her collection — including crystal, jewelry, porcelain, platters, wood carvings and figurines — came from trips to Poland, but was mainly started with wedding gifts from relatives and friends.

Amber jewelry is from the Baltic Sea. Her fine china is from Cielow, from a factory founded in 1809. Some crystal are from the city of Szklarska Poreba under the factory name, "Julia."

"Porcelain from my husband's family is 70 years old and has stamps and names," Dryja said.

"The collection sort of brings me closer to my homeland. It helps me remember where I came from. Those were the fun years, as a child with no responsibilities."

Wooden figurines were purchased in Cepelia, an arts and crafts store specializing in selling crafts made by local artists. "They were handcarved in southern Poland," Dryja said.

"Over the years," she said, "I've been traveling back and forth. Every year, I've brought something back, either gifts or things I've bought. I like to collect things."

The items on display were chosen to depict various regions in Poland, Dryja said.

"I definitely want her to exhibit her costume," said arts commissioner Lee Alanskas, who handles the library display cases. "Krystyna and her family are members of a Polish dance troupe. She's very active in the Polish community. She has excellent taste, which reflects her personality."

wealth of various regions, Dryja said. Heavy wool dresses with much embroidery from the city of Lowicz, for example, are indicative of wealth. Ribbons on dresses and cotton dresses are found in regions with more moderate income. "I've learned more about the costumes by learning about the dancing," Dryja said. Family members are Radomian dancers. Dryja's husband and daughter plan a trip to Poland soon where they will perform ethnic dancing. Both children speak Polish. While crystals are important pieces in Dryja's collection, vases, whiskey glasses, wine glasses and candy dishes also will be displayed.

Dryja hopes viewers of the display are moved enough to one day visit Poland. "It's a beautiful country with a long history," she said. "Things are changing in Poland," Dryja said, referring to the fall of Communism within the last 10 years. "There's an abundance of everything as long as you have the money. "Things are changing for the better," she added. "It'll take time for things to really change because people have to change their way of thinking. But with free enterprise encouraging private business, things are getting better. They're heading the right way."

Dryja and Alankas know each other personally. Dryja is a hairdresser at Hair Happening in Livonia. Alankas hopes to continue the nationality displays. Last year, Ukrainian Easter eggs were featured. Remaining library displays this year are: pottery in September, contemporary dolls in October, student artwork in November and bookmarks in December. The exhibitor decides if items are for sale, Alankas said. Viewing hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

Redford sculptor lauded

Sergio De Giusti of Redford Township took an honorable mention for "Genesis," a 16-foot hydrostone relief, at the opening reception for Michigan Outdoor Sculpture IV at the Southfield Civic Center Plaza June 24. The exhibition, hosted by the city of Southfield and Business Consortium for the Arts, features large-scale sculpture, ranging from a whimsical wood cat to a sensual bronze figure practicing the art of dance. Sponsored by Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs and Arts Foundation of Michigan, the exhibition continues through Oct. 15 at the plaza, 26000 Evergreen, between 10 Mile and 11 Mile, Southfield. The relief of shroud-wrapped figures by the Italian-born sculptor deals with the expulsion from the garden. De Giusti, who earned bachelor and master of fine art degrees from Wayne State University, is best known for creating the 20-panel bas relief on permanent display in the rotunda of the State of Michigan Library, Museum and Archives Building in the Capitol complex in Lansing.

The Southfield exhibition, curated by sculpture professor Jay Holland at Center for Creative Studies in Detroit, was juried by Robert Youngman. A sculpture professor at the University of Illinois, Youngman is best known in this area for the concrete bas reliefs on the facade of the Michael Berry International Terminal at Detroit Metropolitan Airport. Youngman awarded three honorable mentions in addition to three monetary prizes. Other honorable mentions went to Tom Paul Fitzgerald for "Slant Grid Map," a steel puzzle of monumental scale, and Chung Bea Park for a bronze, "Waiting Period." First prize of \$1,000 from the Arts Foundation of Michigan was awarded to Tom Phardel, Ann Arbor artist and chairman of Center for Creative Studies ceramics department, for his stone and steel "Arc." Second prize of \$500 from Business Consortium for the Arts went to David Barr of Novi for "Avenue," steel. Third prize of \$300 from Redstone Architects in Southfield went to Birmingham sculptor Joseph Wesner for his expressionistic steel, "Birdwalker."

Learn how to be streetwise

Did you know that one of the most varied and rewarding of photographic subjects is literally right at your doorstep?

It's street-life! Whether it's the familiarity of your own town or the unexplored streets in a strange place, streetlife provides tremendous opportunity for you and your camera.

If you look through a photography book or at a collection of old photographs, you'll find some of the most interesting pictures are invariably of streetlife. This is largely because it is this aspect of our lives that most readily reflects the fashions, trends and lifestyles of a particular period.

A street is dynamic. Cars, buses and bicycles are all subjects with strong pictorial potential.

And, of course, there are the

people. People walking down the street, people engaging in animated conversation, people standing on the corner... all wonderful opportunities for streetlife photography. There is an almost irresistible appeal in people pictures and a subject preoccupied is easy prey to a photographer with a keen eye and a quick response.

A street market can be a treasure house of streetlife pictures. Market people are extroverts by nature and often have faces and mannerisms that can make great photos.

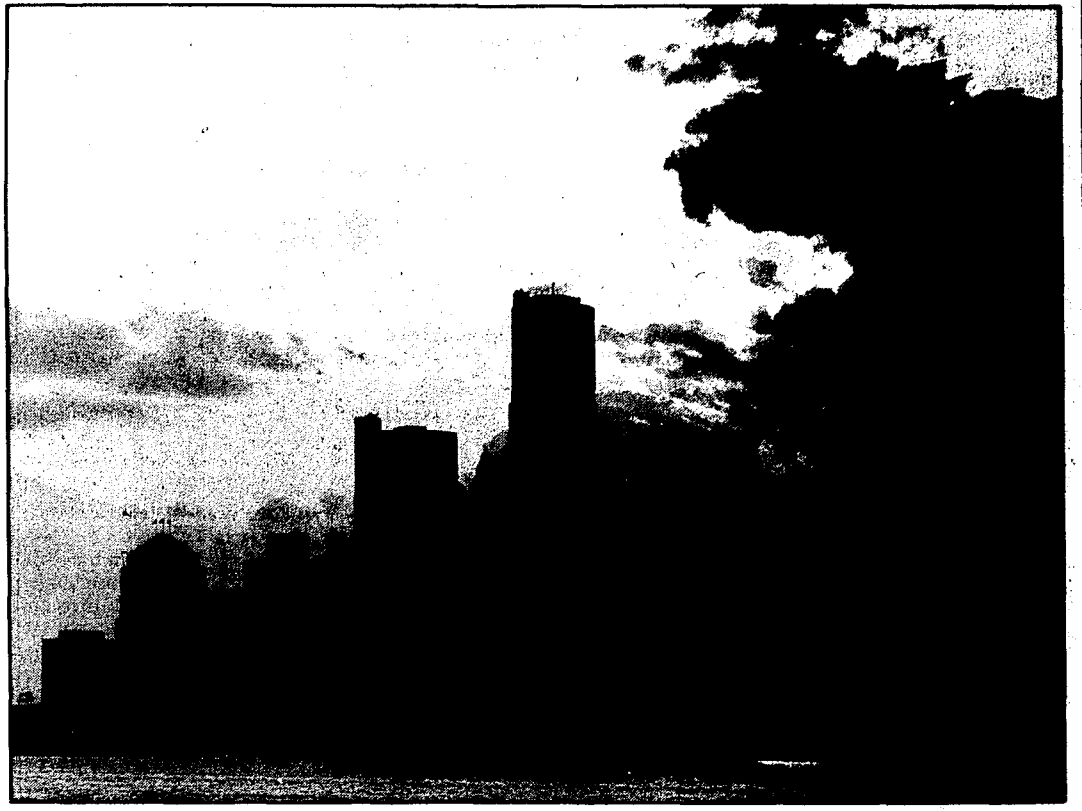
One of the problems that often occurs in streetlife photog-

raphy is confusing and busy backgrounds. Try to avoid this by choosing a camera position that isolates your subject from the surroundings. Use a telephoto lens to frame your picture tightly and by using a wide aperture, distractions in the background will be kept out of focus.

To minimize problems with contrast, photograph subjects that are out of direct sunlight. Better still, an overcast day provides the best lighting for streetlife people pictures. Bright colors are more saturated and lighting on faces is more flattering.

Use a fast film in the 400 ASA range, either color or black and white depending on your preference. The faster films will enable you to hand hold exposures under most circumstances.

Now's the month to nurture a rosy outlook

GARDEN SPOT

August is usually the time to take it easy in the garden, but there are still things that can be done, along with the ever-necessary weeding.

A good time to plan for next year's garden often begins as the summer flowers start to fade and we take stock of what has or hasn't worked.

Once the blooms have completely faded, it's sometimes difficult to imagine how the plant will look in another garden spot. So as you remove spent blooms, make notes about transplanting and other chores that need to be taken care of this fall.

Now and later on this month

the annuals will need to be pulled up and put in the compost. It might be fun to try your hand at late-season vegetables in these areas. Transplants of broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage and cauliflower can be put in the garden now for a late fall harvest. Or mulch the area to deter weeds.

As you walk around your property, look for bare spots in the lawn, or weedy patches that need to be reseeded. A light application of Roundup or Kleenup will kill the weeds, and then in about two weeks the soil will be ready to receive the new seeds. Be sure to keep the area mulched and moist so that there will be good germination.

Examine the trees and make note of pruning that is necessary. Perhaps just opening up the branches and shaping is all that

will be necessary.

For small branches, Fiskars has developed a tool that will help tremendously with this project. It is the Wallace Tree Pruner, Model No. 9388. The fiberglas pole telescopes to 12 feet, and there is a special sliding hand grip in the pruner rope that helps provide a firm hold.

I used the tool this spring and especially like the fact that it's lightweight. The cutting head is made from a product that is lighter than steel — injection-molded glass-filled nylon.

Mid-August is the cutoff date for feeding roses. If you are planning to grow the latest and newest varieties, let your nurseryman know soon just what you want to avoid disappointment.

Three roses have been chosen as 1994 winners by All-America

Rose Selections Inc.:

Secret, a hybrid tea that will reach a height of 4 to 4-1/2 feet, grows on upright branches. The semi-glossy foliage is medium green. The 4-1/2-inch blooms are a blended pink color and have a scent of spice and fruit. AARS suggests growing this winner along with lavender and baby's breath. The Conard-Pyle Co. is the producer.

Caribbean, a grandiflora, sports 4-inch blooms that are warm orange brushed with sunny yellow. It will grow to 4-1/2 feet tall, especially in warmer climates, in an upright form. The foliage also is semi-glossy and medium green. Bright yellow yarrow will set the scene in the garden with this one.

Midas Touch, another hybrid tea, will grow to 5 feet in some climates and stands tall, with semi-glossy, dark green foliage. The rich, clear yellow color of the 4-

inch blooms emit the scent of musk. Grow this striking beauty with deep blue-purple delphiniums, or with other roses to set off the yellow.

These two winners were produced by Jackson & Perkins. It's almost bulb time. If you like to order bulbs from mail-order houses, send your orders in soon so that you will be assured of getting exactly what you want. A

mass planting of one color provides a great impact in the spring, while mixed colors create a more informal look.

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Michigan artists to showcase their works

It's a special time to celebrate at the Paint Creek Center for the Arts.

The center at 407 Pine, two blocks west of Main in downtown Rochester, will showcase its seventh annual Celebrate Michigan Artists exhibition in the second

floor Main Gallery Aug. 13 through Sept. 24. The all-media show opens with a public reception and awards ceremony 7-9 p.m. Saturday.

"I'm very pleased with it," said Kathleen English, PCCA exhibition coordinator. "There's a lot of new artists we've never shown before, a nice cross section."

"I thought it was very talented work. Very good artists had submitted work," said George N'Namdi, owner of the G.R. N'Namdi Gallery in Birmingham, who was juror for the event.

"It really is a celebration of Michigan artists. It speaks to some of the quality of work produced here. The work is creative.

It has a uniqueness about it... I was very pleased with it."

Three hundred artists from 57 communities in Michigan submitted entries to the competition. The show features 54 works by 28 artists.

For the first time in the event, a three-dimensional piece was

awarded first place (a \$1,000 prize). Carolyn Lautzenheiser of Royal Oak won the honor for her cast-iron architectural sculpture, "Apparition." The sculpture looks like a little building. Its different textures and gently shifting shades become apparent as it is viewed from different angles and sides.

The work will be reproduced on a limited edition fine art poster, to be sold at the PCCA and the Art 'n Apples Festival Sept. 11-12 in Rochester Municipal Park.

Second place (\$500) went to J.H. Dozier of Detroit, and third place (\$250) to Jeanne Bieri of Grosse Pointe. Both works were mixed media pieces.

Honorable mentions were awarded to Kyoung Ae Cho and Sally Kaplan of Birmingham, Christine Hagedorn of Troy and Sandra Cardew of Royal Oak. Each artist received \$50.

Cho's spare but eloquent work is an arrangement of six wooden

spheres of varying sizes that resemble planets. One features a partial coat of pine needles. Kaplan's bronze and steel "Sold Spirit" features a dog on a bed. The sculpture angles from the wall, offering a variety of perspectives for each view at the same time. "Transforming Storm" by Hagedorn, mixed media on canvas, is a passionate presentation of a tempestuous sky, filled with fire in animal shapes, stars and lightning.

Arts Foundation of Michigan contributed the \$1,000 first-place prize. The Avon Printing Co., the Balian Eye Center, Dillman & Upton and First of America Bank's Rochester Community Group each made \$1,000 contributions to help underwrite exhibition expenses. We have heard about the Americans with Disabilities Act and wonder if it applies to us. We have close to 27 employees and more than 700 units.

Your inquiry is well-timed. As of July 26, 1992, employers with 25 or more employees were affected by the law. Employers with 15 or more employees have to comply with the law by July 26, 1994.

Simply put, the ADA requires employers not to discriminate against anyone with a disability in hiring or promotion. Employers can ask about an applicant's ability to perform a job but cannot inquire if someone has a disability or subject a person to tests that tend to screen people with disabilities.

Employers have to provide "reasonable accommodation" to people with disabilities. This includes steps such as job restructuring and modification of equipment.

However, accommodations are not required if they would impose "undue hardship" on business operations.

The ADA applies to people with disabilities defined as people who have a mental or physical impairment that substantially limits a major life activity such as seeing, hearing or walking.

The term "reasonable accommodation" is defined as any adjustment or modification of the work site that enables the disabled person to do their job. This could be anything from getting a telephone amplifier, a magnifier lamp or raising a desk. There are tax credits or deductions for employers who remove barriers and make accommodations.

Finally, an "undue hardship" is generally defined as an accommodation that poses significant difficulty or expense, adversely affects the work product or poses a direct threat to other employees.

from 7.25 percent a week earlier and followed two consecutive increases.

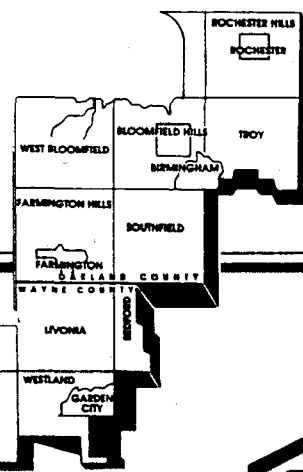
The rate had been falling for most of the year when it started

■ Land prices are up. Construction costs are up. Uprooting the family can be traumatic. These are just a few reasons why more and more people are remodeling and adding on to their existing home rather than buying and building anew.

Here's the scenario. It's a good house, a good neighborhood and good schools.

But it's too small. Should a homeowner give it all up, pull up stakes, rent a U-haul, pack the kids in the car and move?

Not necessarily. More homeowners are staying put and opting to build additions.

"In the 1980s, people wanted new and bigger," Keith Logsdon, an architect with CBI Design Professionals in Bloomfield Hills, said. "In the 1990s, people still want bigger, but they also like what they have."

CBI Design Professionals, which five years ago designed primarily new homes, has shifted much of its attention to remodeling. A good percentage of work performed by the firm is in remodeling, Logsdon said.

Logsdon said his clients have expressed a number of reasons for adding on instead of moving out. Certainly, a large number of people are motivated by a desire to stay where they are because they like the community.

Another reason is the price of land, which has increased so dramatically that an addition is more economical than moving to a larger home.

Another significant reason is that people have begun to reject the philosophy of the disposable home that had been so prevalent in the past, Logsdon said.

More than space

Space isn't the only factor involved. Frank Carnovale, president of architectural and building firm Carnovale Associates, Inc., said adding space is meaningless unless that space is "active space."

The Palm packs a punch in a smart one-level plan

Landmark Design's Palm is a mid-sized home (2,192 square feet) that wraps around a lush entry courtyard. Tropical plants grow luxuriant blooms and abundant foliage in this protected environment.

Bright, airy and spacious, the C-shaped single-level floor plan is ideal for families that like to entertain.

The pantry and two walk-in closets serve

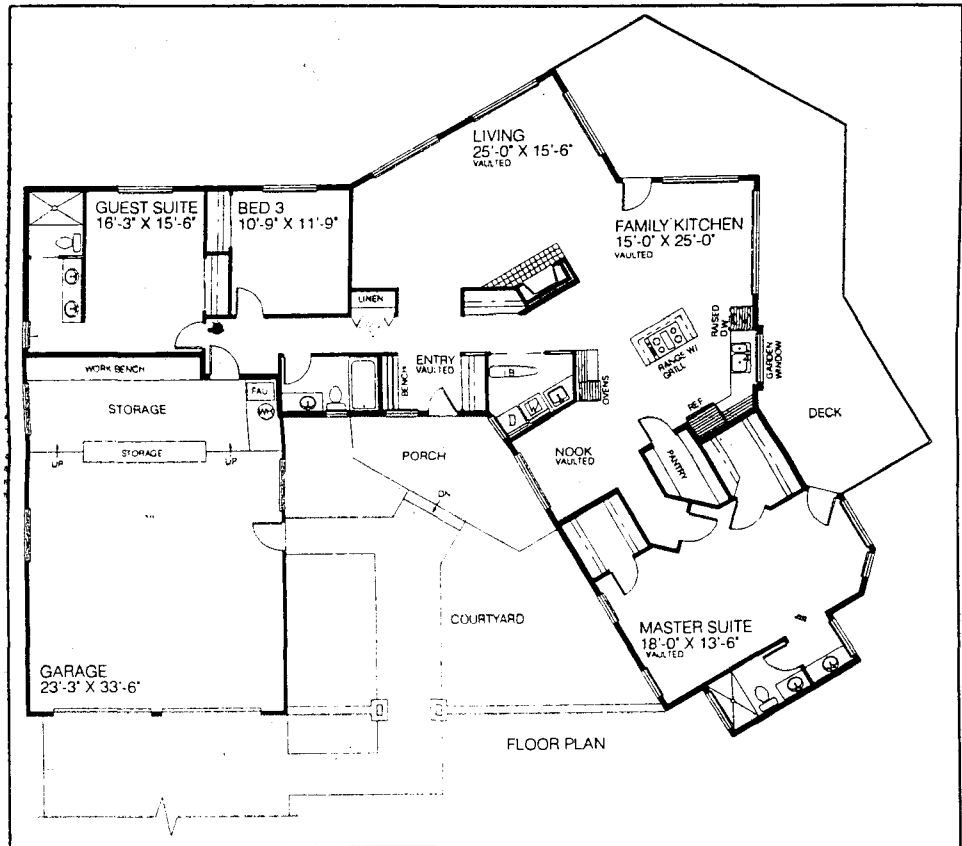

The guest bedroom is large and has a private bathroom. The main bath serve the family living area and the third bedroom. Its location is also convenient to the garage and front entry. Storage space and a workbench are at the back of the garage, one step up from the parking area.

The overall dimensions are 79-feet by 63-feet, nine inches. The garage is 800 square feet.

Battling ground water in basement

AP — Wet basements can often be corrected easily and inexpensively. The main exception is when the culprit is ground water.

In that case, the only sure solution is to install drainage tile around the outside of the wall, and sump pumps inside.

Bear in mind that water, not basement walls, causes leaks, and the presence of water is almost always the result of poor drainage and poorly maintained gutters. Problems like these must be corrected first.

There are two kinds of basement waterproofing materials.

The first are masonry patch items. These products work well when the basement is not leaking at the time of repair. They range from mortar caulk to premixed mortar to hydraulic putty. Adding a latex bonding agent to a standard masonry mix will improve bonding. Hydraulic putty works well if you're repairing a continuously seeping hole. The product bonds extremely well and cures quickly, even when wet and under pressure.

The second category includes a variety of rubberized coatings, which usually contain portland cement. As these products are expensive (more

than \$20 per gallon), cover only 75 to 125 square feet per gallon and produce noxious fumes while they cure, they should only be used when drainage improvements and wall repair come up short.

Highlights of the operation begin with checking the perimeter of your foundation for depressions in the fill-soil. Especially check areas around window wells. Add soil to build up these depressions, and tamp the soil firmly into place. Then plant grass seed.

Remove any blistered paint from the interior of your foundation wall with a wire brush and coarse sandpaper. Scrub mildew with an abrasive pad and a mix of household bleach and water. Use muriatic acid on efflorescence — a white chalky substance that is actually crystallized mineral salts that have leached from the concrete or mortar.

Caulk small leaky cracks with a silicone-mortar caulk and smooth

with a putty knife dipped in mineral spirits. If the cracks are larger, enlarge the crack with a tapered mason's chisel, clean the joint and wet with a mix of water and latex bonding agent.

Blend the premixed mortar with water and bonding agent until the mortar will stand up when you slice through it with a trowel. Then, stack a little mortar on the back of a small trowel, place the trowel against the crack and push the mortar into the joint with a pointing trowel.

Pack the entire joint, then scrape away the excess and smooth the joint with a joint-striking tool. Use the same methods to fill any gaps or cracks around utility pipe holes.

Before deciding to paint a wall with waterproofing, wait a few weeks: If it rains and your basement stays dry, chances are you won't need it. If you don't see any obvious leaks but the masonry surface is damp, then a sealant is a good idea.

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Mildew problems? Try air exchange

Questions from homeowners answered by Popular Mechanics Magazine:

Q. Our 16-year-old painted house has a terrible mildew problem, even during the periods of bright sunshine. The inside of the house seems to sweat and the inside surfaces of the window frames are peeling. We would eventually like to have aluminum siding, but first we must solve the mildew problem. What do you suggest?

A. You have probably checked the obvious sources of moisture such as a lack of kitchen and bath fans, and poor exterior landscaping that may allow rainwater to run into your basement and crawl space. Moisture rising from these areas is a common source of this problem.

If you do not know the source of excessive moisture in the house, you should introduce some dry air from the outside. There are a number of air exchangers on the market that are designed for do-it-yourself installation and are reasonably priced. These units usually have a fan that moves fresh air in, over or through ducts that are heated by heated air from the interior of the house moving out through the same unit.

This is not only a solution for excess interior moisture, but an answer to super tight homes that suffer a lack of fresh breathing air.

Q. Our house was built about 1925, with a cypress shingle roof installed on 1-by-4 inch wood strips, 8-inches on center. The attic has no ventilation or insulation. I would like to install a painted sheetmetal roof over the wood strips. My concern is condensation on the bottom of the sheetmetal. What is the best way to do this?

A. Providing ventilation and a vapor barrier in the attic will

control the moisture buildup and resulting attic condensation. You should also insulate the attic. Even though your house is located in a warm climate, insulation is cost-effective and will help make the house more comfortable.

During the summer, it's possible for the attic temperature to reach as high as 150-degrees F. Attic insulation and ventilation helps reduce the heat load on the ceilings of the rooms below. It also helps reduce air-conditioning costs.

Check with your local utility company to determine the recommended amount of insulation for your attic. It is more practical to install insulation batts with an attached vapor barrier rather than use a separate vapor barrier. Place the batts on the attic floor between the joists with the vapor barrier facing toward the rooms below.

You should also use at least two vent openings to allow for air movement. Installing watertight vents in the sheetmetal roof may be difficult, so your best bet would probably be to use gable vents. A combination of gable and soffit vents would be even more effective.

Since there will be a vapor barrier in the attic, the size of the vent openings can be less than it would be without a vapor barrier. Remember, the vent's effective area is less than its actual opening.

Screens or louvers can reduce airflow through a vent by as much as 50 percent. The effective area should be at least 1-300th of the attic floor area.

"Lifestyles are so different now," Carnovale said. Most homes that are candidates for additions are 25 years old, he said.

There have been a lot of changes in the way people live," Carnovale said. "People buy a starter home and then they have kids. They look around and see the lot they have has increased in value."

Unfortunately, so have all the other lots, he said. New construction costs have also risen dramatically.

"If you look at existing buildings and do a square foot comparison, you'll find a tremendous disparity," he said.

At the same time, older homes have limited function. "Today, people have more clothes, more cars, more electronics... more stuff."

Rooms that were once fairly small, like the kitchen, have become focal points for the house. Rooms that were once prominent, like the formal living room, have fallen into disuse, Carnovale said.

Some houses are so out of sync with current lifestyles, an addition necessitates a shift of the whole house, Carnovale said. The new kitchen goes into the addition, the kitchen becomes a dining room, the dining room and living room become a large family room — the possibilities are endless.

"A lot of people want multipur-

pose rooms," he said. "Someplace where they can eat, entertain and relax."

Primary concerns

When an architect sits down to design a house addition, one of his primary concerns is that it not look like an addition, Logsdon said. "We want to make certain it looks like it was always part of the house."

Granted, some homes built years ago are fairly nondescript and one wouldn't think adding an addition would be difficult. But Logsdon said that those can be the hardest.

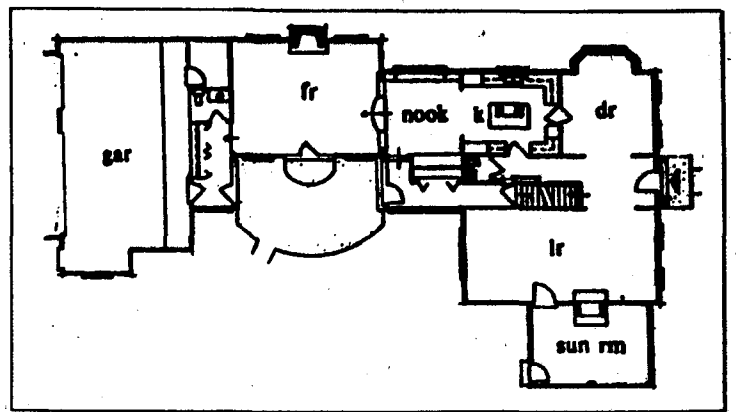
When an architect is hired to design an addition on an existing home of some architectural note, he or she will pick out the key elements and incorporate them into the addition, thereby joining the house.

Even commonplace homes have some architectural elements on which a good architect can base the addition. "You learn how to compliment what's there — you look at materials, roof lines, elevations, shape."

Harder than it looks

Carnovale said it takes a little while to get the hang of designing additions because it does differ from designing new homes.

Carnovale said while it's true that some people prefer to add on rather than move into a new home

to save money, additions aren't inexpensive.

"We generally budget for \$100 per square foot; a kitchen is considerably more, a garage is considerably less," he said.

That price actually puts the cost about par with high-end new construction, he said, because there are certain savings that are gained from starting from scratch.

Other considerations that add to the cost of renovation are disposing of waste materials, working around a house that is still being lived in and making allowances for problems.

"Even after we've been doing this for a while, we still find sur-

prises," Carnovale said.

A lot of things happen over a 25 year span, he said. Sometimes, people did work on their own, sometimes they hired out work that was done incorrectly and those things have to be fixed before the real work of adding an addition can be done.

An addition may necessitate a new furnace, new plumbing and new wiring or the contractors may find the existing systems are no longer adequate for even the existing home.

"The systems and technology we have available today far exceed what we had 25 years ago," Carnovale said.

Additions prove their value to sellers

An addition does more than make a home more livable or enjoyable for its present owner. It also makes it more valuable to its future owner.

According to the 1992 annual Remodeling Magazine cost vs. value analysis, the national average cost for a family room addition built by a professional remodeling contractor is \$28,455. Homeowners can expect to recoup \$24,069, or 85 percent of the cost, when they sell their home.

The cost does not take into account complex additions, further remodeling, cost overruns resulting from unforeseen problems or

architectural services.

In the Detroit area, the average cost is slightly higher at \$31,643, with the resale value slightly lower at \$22,444.

That cost includes a 16-by-25-foot, light-filled family room to be added to the existing house in style and location built on a new crawl space with wood joist floor framing, matching wood siding on exterior walls and matching fiberglass roof shingles.
