Wilson said the move will be completed by Wednesday.


On hand in the staff's temporary offices near City Hall are boxes of paper work, computer equipment and related materials.



Sears dispute has roots that go back in time

Officials of Wayne County and the city of Detroit have their twin-stadium issue with opponents opposed to public funds being used for the benefit of private businesses.

If the projects become reality, there will be side-by-side stadiums for the Detroit Tigers and Detroit Lions on the north side of downtown Detroit.

In Westland, the issue is identical although the numbers and scope of a planned development are smaller.

The controversy, which ended last week with two related city council actions, involved a proposed Sears store on the northwest corner of the Westland Center property.

Sears will pay for its \$15 million-plus, two-story building and Westland Center will absorb a major chunk of the infrastructure costs.

But City Council member Charles

Pickering, a former mayor, is vehemently opposed to the use of \$1.3 million or more in Tax Increment Finance Authority funds to pay for parking lot improvement, utilities' relocation and other infrastructure changes.

He was joined by several homeowners who, like their counterparts in Detroit and Wayne County, object to the principle of spending public funds for the benefit of private businesses.

Pickering, in his third four-year term on the council, argued last week that the money could be better used for major public safety services, such as Advanced Life Support through the fire department's emergency medical services, and an expanded community policing program in neighborhoods.

The council member lost the battle, being the only dissenting vote when the council voted 6-1 last week to amend the TIFA plan so the Sears project would be included. Shortly after the council votes on the

TIFA plan and the related Sears site opposition to the proposal from both resplan, a mall spokesman said ground. breaking for the new building could be in mid-September with the doors to open in time for the holiday shopping season in 1997.

Taking issue with Pickering's position was Council member Glenn Anderson. who argued that the TIFA dollars represent a much smaller investment in economic development than the former state property tax abatement program supported by Pickering when he was mayor from 1982-85 and later as a council member.

Last week's council debate on whether public funds should be used for the benefit of businesses wasn't the first time that Sears was involved in the dispute.

In the early '90s, there was a proposal to build a multi-level parking structure, to pave the way for a Sears store at the mall.

But there was immediate and vocal in Canton Township.

idents and city council candidates seeking election in the fall of 1991.

The parking structure proposal was initiated by the mall and endorsed later by the TIFA board and the quasi-municipal Economic Development Corporation board of directors.

Some focused on the financial principle, although some officials and candidates running for office were also opposed because the parking structure would add to existing traffic problems in the Wayne Road-Warren Road area.

The council accepted the proposal and incorporated it into its revised longrange TIFA plan, but the money was never spent for that purpose.

One major supporter of the plan then was Mayor Robert Thomas, who was in his first term. He said he feared that if the parking structure wasn't built, Sears would drop its plan to expand in Westland and look elsewhere, probably

ANALYSIS

In private, city officials who support the use of TIFA, money for the Sears project point out that the funds are not collected from the city at large and later redirected for development purposes.

TIFA funds are created with the increased property assessment and tax increases in the city's northwest quadrant and used to finance or subsidize future projects which would encourage subsequent developments.

The city council and administration came under fire during the past 18 months because of using TIFA money to pay for and equip a \$8.5 million city library - all without voters' approval and following two overwhelming voters' rejections of millages in the late 1980s.

The first deliveries of some 60.000 books will start the week of Oct. 14 and continue the following week. After that, Wilson said, there will be 1,000 books delivered a week until the \$1.7 million appropriation has been spent. -

The building will cost \$6 million. Besides the books, other major expenditures are budgeted for furniture and shelving (\$600,000), and computer networks (\$50,000).

Wilson's "punch list" of things to do from now until the opening includes orientation of the building staff, installation of security and fire systems, installation of shelving and movement of the office equipment and furniture.

Other planned activities include the shelving of the 16,407 used books Westland received when the joint Wayne-Westland Public Library was closed this spring with the opening of the new City of Wayne Library, installation of telephones, and processing of audiovisual materials and equipment.

Another major piece of business to be handled this week is the receiving of bids for more computer equipment.

When the library opens in nine weeks, patrons will have free use of the Internet for data searches. E-mail service will be available for \$120 a year.

Wilson also noted the major contributors to the library.

The Friends of Senator Faust, a group which solicited donations shortly after the legislator's death in early 1995, donated \$10,000 for the Faust Reading Room. Relatives of the former



Coca-Cola worker believes in giving the job his best

Workers like Ken Channell don't come along very often.

While many men his age are basking in retirement, Channell, of.Redford Township, recently celebrated 50 years on the job at a Coca-Cola bottling plant in Detroit.

At 66, he shows no signs of going stale.

"I'm starting on my second 50 years," said Channell, green eyes twinkling, and face flashing a grin.

Channell started working at Coca-Cola at age 16. He seldom takes sick time, is cheerful and willing to work overtime if needed. At work, he is "Kenny" to his co-workers.

Since the plant went on flextime recently, Channell works his 40 hours Mondays through Thursdays, and his weekend begins on Friday.

"He enjoys his work; that's. why he does it," said wife Sondra, 55. "He is very self-willed and determined to make it big."

When Channell celebrated his 50th anniversary with Coca-Cola recently, a festive banner proclaimed, "Congratulations, Kenny - the Big 50."

"Watches and rings were available, but the book only went up to 45 years," said Channell.

Channell received a specially designed gold ring. The insignia on the ring is a classic contour Coca-Cola bottle, surrounded by five diamonds.

In an unusual move, production was shut down for about one hour so the employees could enjoy a catered lunch, complete with china plates and cloth napkins, with Channell and a few close family friends.

"I use it as an example," Channell said. "That's life. That's the way things go. It's there.'

Channell, the oldest of the siblings, has few memories of his early life. He was 9 when he

A social worker found him a job at Coca-Cola. There he met the late company vice president, W.R. Bernard, who took an interest in the youth. And the landlady where he lived looked out for him.



Voters to decide hotel, car rental tax

Voters get to decide in November whether to impose an excise tax on hotel'rooms and rental cars in Wayne County to help pay for a project to build two stadiums in Detroit.

A plan was unveiled last week to build a domed sports and entertainment complex in Detroit next to a previously planned new stadium for the Detroit Tigers baseball team. Under the new plan, however, the Tigers stadium would be built on the east side of Woodward rather than the west.

The domed stadium would house the Detroit Lions football team, which currently plays at the Silverdome in Pontiac.

The ballot question will ask voters for permission to put a 1 percent tax on hotel rooms and a 2 percent tax on rental cars.

During a specially called meeting Thursday, Wayne County commissioners voted 12-3 to put the proposal on the Nov. 5 general election ballot. Local commissioners split along party lines in the vote. Commissioner Michelle Plawecki, D-Dearborn Heights, and Vice Chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, voted in favor, while Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, and Bruce Patterson, R-Canton Township, voted against.

After hours of discussion and questions, commissioners voted on four aspects of the project. Besides voting to put the tax

proposal on the ballot, commissioners approved the Memoran- opposes new taxes. dum of Understanding between the city of Detroit, Wayne County, the Detroit Tigers and the Detroit Lions. They also approved the ordinance language to levy the excise taxes and the Articles of Incorporation forming a Detroit/Wayne County Stadium Authority.

"We cleared another hurdle, but we've got a long way to go," deputy county executive Mike Duggan said after the meeting, adding he was glad to see it approved by such a strong vote. The next step is forming the stadium authority, which will immediately begin "nailing down" the land acquisition, Duggan said.

Under the agreement, in the next 10 weeks the authority must have land acquisition costs nailed down and within budget. and the Lions must have \$50 million in corporate donations to meet a Nov. 1 deadline.

Patterson raised concerns that the ballot language on taxing hotel guests only says "transient guests" and that people living in hotel rooms would be subject to the tax, which has been referred to as a tourist tax.

Also, the tax on car rentals would affect Wayne County residents as many local residents rent cars when having their own cars serviced, he said.

McCotter also opposed the proposal. "While we call it a tourist tax there will still be Wayne County residents who will be affected by this tax," McCotter said.

McCotter said he also opposes \$20 million for the project coming out of the Northville Township property sale. McCotter also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

Plawecki and Beard voted in favor, but Plawecki moved to have the ballot language and the ordinance language reconsidered

A national retail survey says parents will spend about \$350 per child this back-toschool shopping season.

According to the American Express Retail Index, which monitors consumer retail spending trends, and is based on a survey of 1,000 consumers nationwide, parents will spend an average of \$363 per child for back-to-school items this year. This is an increase of 12-percent, compared to 1995 figures.

The survey also revealed that nearly one in five parents (18-percent) say they plan to spend \$500 or more for back-to-school gear.

Nearly half, 49-percent of parents, will use a combination of cash (65-percent), checks (16-percent) and credit cards (15-percent) to pay for such back-to-school items as clothing, classroom supplies, textbooks and electronics.

Parents say children will also contribute to the budget, pitching in an average of 19-percent from their own savings.


Surprisingly, and contrary to last year's backto-school survey, results showed that college boys are dramatically more style-conscious than college girls (547-percent versus 28-percent).

The survey-also-found that nearly half of all students are considered style-conscious by their parents. On a scale of 1 to 10, with "10" being extremely style-conscious, and "1" being not at all style-conscious, 45-percent of parents gave kids an "8" or higher.

Parents report that high-schoolers are the most brand-conscious about their clothing although elementary and college students also demonstrat-

ed strong preferences for certain brands.

The top brand names among all three groups of students were Levi's: 45-percent, followed by Nike: 39- percent, The Gap: 17-percent, Reebok: 16-percent, and Guess: 13-percent. Designer labels are also popular, with Tommy Hilfiger, Calvin Klein and Polo/Ralph Lauren each preferred by 5-percent of back-to-schoolers.

Wardrobe basics top the list of most-shoppedfor items in August, although clothing and general school supplies were each cited by 87-percent of respondents as the top two items on their backto-school shopping lists.

Clothing will account for more than half, 58 percent, of the back-to-school shopping budget.

Supplies will account for only 21 percent.

Top clothing items are back-to-school basics including jeans (61-percent), shirts and tops (57percent), underwear (30-percent), sneakers (26percent) and non-denim pants (20-percent).

Parents have more influence over where to shop for back-to-school (63-percent versus 31-percent) and their kids have more influence over what items are purchased (50-percent versus 39percent).

Nearly two-thirds (64-percent) of parents will shop with their kids, with parents of gradeschoolers doing the most shopping at discount department stores, (42-percent), and parents of high schoolers favoring malls (40-percent).

August brings harvest requests

Four calls and comments reflect the seasons. Last month's requests leaned toward outdoor cooking while this month's requests. concern gardens, and fresh Michigan fruits and vegetables.

My tomato plants are skyrocketing, and loaded with reddening globes, and my basil has bushed out beyond belief. I hope you too are enjoying the fruits of your garden labors.

Linda Rice of Plymouth called and raved about the fruited melon soup she recently enjoyed while dining at Matt Prentice's rave new restaurant, Relish in Farmington Hills. She was hoping I might have a good recipe. Well Linda, I do have a favorite recipe, and it came from a very old cookbook. We make it all the time in the Janes Gang kitchen, especially during summer when melons are sweet, ripe and plentiful. You can use honey, cassaba, Crenshaw or any other firm melon (not watermelon) or combine-two for an even better, complex flavor.

CANTALOUPE SOUP 1 large cantaloupe, skinned, seeded and diced 5 tablespoons butter 2 teaspoons sugar 1 teaspoon fresh grated lemon rind dash powdered ginger pinch salt. 2 1/2 cups half and half, heavy cream or milk Sprigs of mint, for garnish, optional

For centuries, people have sung the praises of pears. The ancient Greek poet Homer, for instance, held the pear in the highest esteem, calling it "the gift of the gods."

NOW'S THE TIME TO FALL FOR

According to John F. Mariani, author of "The Dictionary of American Food and Drink," (William Morrow and Co. Inc., copyright 1994), Pears originated in Asia, possibly China, and have been cultivated at least since 2000 B.C., with more than 15 thousand species having since been developed from either the "Chinese pear" or the "European pear."

Most American varieties developed from the European pear, which was brought to the Colonies in the 17th century by Jesuit missionaries, English settlers in Massachusetts, and the Dutch in Amsterdam. In the West the pear was introduced by Spanish missionar-



A Pick of the Pears

SUMMER PEARS Bartlett pears, are bell-shaped and the most familiar of the summer varieties. The new crop becomes available in August and continues into early winter. Bartletts change color from green to yellow as they ripen; ripe Red Bartletts have spectacular crimsoncolored skins; both have white, juicy flesh and superb flavor.

WINTER PEARS

Anjou and Red Anjou pears are almost egg-shaped with a slight "shoulder" and short stem. They are wonderfully juicy when ripe and have a mild, spicy taste. Anjous are the most abundant of the varieties, excellent for salads and for juicing; available from October to June,

Bosc pears are symmetrical with a long tapering neck and slightly rough, golden-brown skin, which does not change color when ripe. Their creamy taste and attractive shape makes them ideal for poaching, baking or preserving; good for eating fresh too. Available from August through May.

Comice pears are greenish yellow with sometimes a rosy blush. They have a short neck and stem and are superbly sweet. Harvest starts in ctober so these are the pears fri

Saute canteloupe in hot butter with sugar, lemon rind, ginger and salt until soft and tender, about 5 minutes over medium heat. Add half and half, bring to a boil, then reduce heat to a simmer and simmer for 10 minutes.

Transfer contents to a blender or food processor and process until smooth and pureed. Cool and chill. Adjust seasonings with lemon juice or even a splash of dry white wine. Garnish with sprigs of mint. Serves 4.

Another anonymous reader called and reported that she is concerned about eating potato skins.

Seems her sources have told her to be cautious because the skins might be toxic because of chemicals and sprays being used in the fields. I contacted my sources at the Michigan State University Extension Service and their word is that anytime you prepare fruits, vegetables and potatoes purchased from a groger or farm market, they should always be cleaned or scrubbed before cooking. If your food is properly cleaned before cooking, there should be no problem. Look for Citri-Spray at health food stores — you spray on, and it cleans and reduces the wax shipping coating on many fruits and vegetables. It retails for about \$7.99.

Speaking of potato skins, here's a healthy recipe that tastes as good as the real thing!

CRISPY POTATO SKINS

Starting with leftover baked potatoes is a real timesaver.

- 2 cooked large baking potatoes (about 8 ounces each)
- 1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1 teaspoon salt free lemon herb seasoning blend
- 1 teaspoon butter flavored sprinkles
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional')
- 1 tablespoon fresh grated Provolone cheese

Preheat the broiler. Cut potatoes lengthwise into quarters. Scoop out potatoes, leaving about 1/4 inch shell of skin. Reserve insides of potatoes for another use. In a small bowl, combine oil, garlic, seasoning blend, butter sprinkles, paprika and salt. Brush over both sides of potato shells. Place potato skin side down on a large baking sheet. Sprinkle cheese evenly over the skins. Broil 3-5 minutes or

In his book Mariani writes, "by far the most widely cultivated variety in the United States is the "Bartlett," first mentioned in print in 1831.'

The Bartlett pear variety originated in Berkshire, England, in the 17th century by a schoolmaster named John Stair.

Stair sold some of his pear tree cuttings to a horticulturist named Williams who further developed the variety. The pear is still called. the Stair-Williams pear in some parts of England, but according to Mariani, acquired its American name thanks to Enoch Bartlett of Dorchester, Mass., who promoted the variety in the United States. The Bartlett now accounts for three quarters of U.S. pear production.

Today, the Bartlett is America's favorite pear for both eating and canning.

Now — as the bright, sunny days of summer begin to give way to autumn's cooler temperatures - is a perfect time to enjoy pears.

The largest producers of pears are California, Washington, Oregon, New York, Michigan, Illinois, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

California produces 60 percent of the nation's crop. Michigan pears are available at farm markets and stands through October. California Bartlett pears are also available

A medium-size Bartlett pear provides healthful amounts of dietary fiber (4 grams), vitamin C and potassium, at only 100 calories each. Pears contain no cholesterol or sodium and are virtually fatfree.

To pick the perfect pear, look for relatively smooth, unblemished skin. Degree of ripeness is subject to personal preference. Some people like the crunchy texture and taste of green pears; others want them tender, juicy and golden yellow.

Pears are picked mature (green and firm) because they develop an undesirable mealy texture if they are left to ripen on the tree. Green pears may take four to six days to ripen.

are "breaking" or green tinged with yellow, they will fully ripen in two to three days. If you prefer eating pears that are more firm, this is the perfect stage.

Always ripen pears by placingthem in a fruit bowl at room temperature. Once they reach your desired ripeness or turn yellow, place them in the refrigerator to slow further ripening. Depending on ripeness, they can hold for almost a week.

To help cut or sliced Bartlett pears retain their color, dip them into a mixture of 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1 cup water.

A slightly under ripe pear is perfect for poaching or baking. An overripe pear makes a great base for a blended drink.

Ocelots reload with new crew

Schoolcraft College men's soccer coach Van Dimitriou is looking forward to the 1996 season. The Ocelots have a talented cast of newcomers who could reach the NJCAA finals for the first time since 1990.

> With people like Van Dimitriou, the Schoolcraft College men's soccer program is always in good hands. Or is it good feet?

Despite losing virtually everybody off last year's squad; 15-3-1 overall and Region 12 finalists in the National Junior College Athletic Association (losing to DuPage, Ill.), Dimitriou recruited during the offseason like an insurance man, putting together another Allstate cast.

"Last year we were not quite as deep," said Dimitriou, now in his 13th season. "We had a good starting eight or nine, but not quite as solid with our marking backs or midfielders.

"These kids can play. They have more potential than any other team I've had as far as talent. And I think we'll gel."

Gone is Mo Hijazi, who set a Schoolcraft record last year for goals (31).

Also using up their JC eligibility are three Eastern Michigan University recruits, Livonia Franklin High products Victor Rodopoulos and Dave Binkiewicz, along with Plymouth Canton grad Eric Stoecklein. Dimitriou must also replace Israeli native George Abuamsha and goalkeeper Ari Mecholwicz.

Filling the void at forward will be two freshmen, Mike Dean, who scored 35 goals last spring for Dearborn Edsel Ford, and Dave York of Novi, a member of the first-place Birmingham Cobras of the Great Lakes Men's Soccer League.

"Dean can play a number of different positions," Dimitriou said. "He doesn't mind playing all over. He distributes the ball as well as any-

one. He can play defense and sweeps like it's his normal position. But he'll start out at forward."

Dimitriou will also use Garrett Maki (Dearborn Heights Crestwood), Mark Hill (East Kentwood) and possibly Movin Salame (Dearborn Fordson) at the forward spots as well.

"Mo (Hijazi) and Fadi (Bazzi) stood out individually, but this is the best I've ever had as a group,' Dimitriou said. "Last year Mo scored 31 and the next guy had nine, but this year I think we'll have four or five who will score 14 or 15 apiece. We've got a lot more balance."

Dimitriou says Maki "moves as well as anybody," while Hill provides a "good target up-front, which is real nice to have."

"I love the kid (Maki)," Dimitriou said. "He's short and stocky, like a German-type forward with good acceleration. He's good friends with Dean and you could see the two together."

Dimitriou, however, also has several midfielders to choose from.

Newcomers Pete Lechowicz (Livonia Stevenson) and Kevin Fritz

(Brighton) will share the left side. Matt Keller (Rochester Adams). Abdul Kerek (Fordson), Igli Vokopola (Royal Oak Kimball) and Mike Minicilli (Stevenson) and Paul Graves (Milford) will see playing time along with holdovers Mike Bona (Franklin) and George Abuamsha,

"Igli was rated one of the top 10 in Oakland County," said of the Kimball midfielder, who has been nursing a sore ankle. "And Mincilli has put on 15 pounds and has grown three or four inches. He looks good." Walk-on Bill Krips (Brighton) has been a pleasant surprise in preseason camp as a stopper.


"He's a perfect fit, I like everything about him," Dimitriou said. "He's tall and skinny, but very agile. He's great in the air."

Mazda MX-6 drives to be the best


The Mazda MX-6 sports coupe has a special place in my heart. It got a lot of people in the downriver and western communities of Metro Detroit working again when Mazda retooled a shuttered Ford plant and began building the MX-6 in the fall of 1987.

The best part of all of it was that Mazda gave laid-off Ford workers first crack at the jobs in the plant, now known as AutoAlliance International. A cousin of mine, laid off from Ford, joined Mazda's ranks at that time.

AutoAlliance, a joint venture with Ford Motor Co. presently employs 3,700 people who put together MX-6, sister-car Ford Probe and Mazda 626. The MX-6, by the way, is one of two import-badge cars to be classified by the EPA as a domestic vehicle. How 'bout that?

And as stylish and smart-look- ' ing as the MX-6 was when it was introduced in 1987 as a 1988 model, the tradition continues with the 1996 MX-6 LS. The last makeover of the MX-6 was as a 1993 model.
