We understand that the Tories over in Canada, are not all satisfied with the amount of punishment allotted to this gentleman. They do not deem it sufficient, and declare it is done for no other purpose than to soothe them into the belief that the "free and enlightened nation," as the Patriot terms us in derision, respect the laws and execute them in justice. But it will not go down; the Patriot only sneers, and scoffs the more, and enemy as it is to Mr. McKenzie asks triumphantly why we do not punish that gentleman alone, among the many who have been equally if not more guilty than him. Does the "free and enlightened" he says, think we are capable of being gulled after this fashion? and he scorns the idea in a manner that we would think, old enemy as he is to Mr. McKenzie, he really sympathize with him in the present case. We are come to a fine pass truly, when to please the authorities of Madame Victoria, and aid her in retaining the Canadas as a pretty appendage to her Crown, we pass laws to punish men who have been guilty of no crime—a breach of Moral Law, but who have only done what a Lafayette and a Franklin would have done had they lived in these times, and for our pains we get laughed at for our stupidity.

Such things would not be if General SCOTT was Chief Magistrate.

The clerks are about to petition to their employers, to close the stores on the 4th. This we think is quite unnecessary; for no person possessing an atom of the spirit of '76, or a spark of patriotism, would think of doing business on that great day.

We have the particulars of one of the most outrageous and infamous seduction cases that has ever taken place in this city. The young lady was sent here to finish her education; the seducer is a well known black-leg. The most systematic villainy has been practised upon the poor girl to accomplish her ruin. We shall give a full statement of the whole affair in a few days.

The Cincinnati Republican of Saturday last says that the steambot Albany, when about eight miles below that city on Thursday evening, suddenly came in collision with the Peru, Capt. RESURRECTION OF TIM. MONROE.

We judge from an article in the Albany Evening Journal that Timothy Monroe is again to be dug up, and hauled over the coals by a Court and Jury. The fate of poor Monroe is curious and instructive. He was drowned in Lake Ontario, picked up at the mouth of Oak Orchard Creek—served the cause of Anti-masonry at one election, was buried at Batavia as the veritable William Morgan—was exhumed and examined from stem to stern by Henry O'Reilly and Mrs. Monroe, and identified by the widow as Tim. himself, and yet thousands of the anti-masons yet believe the body to have been that of Morgan. As to the "transformation" or "transfiguration" of the body at Oak Orchard creek by Tharlow Weed, it is all a humbug. Such a charge was made at the time, but no one seriously believed it. Bad as Weed is, we do not think he "manufactured" Monroe's body into the resemblance of Morgan. But if he did, it is no worse than the attempt of Croswell to "manufacture" a great man of Martin Van Buren. The origin of the charge against Weed was thus: at the polls of the election in the Town of Yates, soon after the affair at Oak Orchard Creek, some one said to Weed in a jocular manner, "Are you the man that pulled the hair and shaved the whiskers of Monroe?" Weed replied in a similar strain of jocularity "Oh Yes, I am the chap that did it."—A worthless fellow who happened to hear this conversation, made an affidavit the same evening, that he heard Weed confess the "transformation" of Timothy Monroe's body. This affidavit was published in a handbill for political effect, but only added fire to the flame of Anti-Masonry. The expression, "good enough 'till after the election," originated with P. Whitney non Vice Chancellor and not with Weed.

If Weed has sued Croswell for a libel, and Croswell attempts to prove "the truth in justification," he will get flogged. He must be cautious how he repeats the State libels of Tucker and O'Reilly; it is undignified in the State Printer, and will lead him into trouble. We are no friends to Weed, but it is our motto to "Give the devil his due,"—and we think the charge of "transformation" a gross calumny.

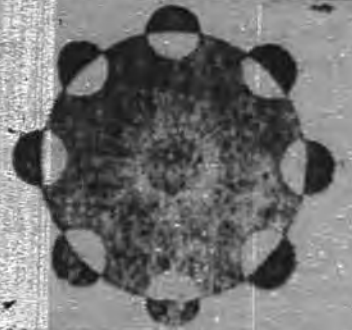

Lord Brougham has postponed his education Bill, and O'Connell has postponed a bill to allow Roman Catholics to hold the office of Lord Chancellor.

Ministers carried the First clause of the Jamaica Bill in Committee by a majority of 34. The remaining clauses were agreed to.

Sir John Conroy ceases to hold any situation under the Duchess of Kent.

WHIG RADICAL LOYALTY.—A certain liberal in this city (Exeter) stated publicly in High street last week, that if the Queen had not acted as she has, her head would have been chopped off in six months.—Western Luminary.

Queen Adelaide and suite arrived at Malborough House, from Portsmouth May 25th. Queen Victoria attended by the Barones Letzen, Miss Pitt, and Lord Alfred Paget, visited the Queen-Dowager soon after her arrival.

The Queen has refused to allow Sir James Clark's daughter to attend her drawing room.

The American Minister and Mrs. Stevenson have been passing a few days with Mrs. Murray at her delightful villa at Wimbledon.

Her Majesty has conferred on Mary Banim, the only living child of John Banim, the well known author of "Fables of the O'Hara Family," a pension for all the purposes of her education, and not terminating with her father's death.

Mr. Ridsdale has refused £4000 for his celebrated horse B oomsbury.

Green peas in pod, the produce of English gardens, were sold in Covent Garden Market, on Thursday morning, at two guineas the half sieve.

We have good reason to believe that the Marquis de Dalmatie, son of Marechal Soult, is to be French Ambassador in London, in the place of Gen. Comte Sebastian.—Morning Post.

According to a Belgian paper, a company is in course of formation for the establishment of a regular steam communication between Antwerp and New York. The requisite capital, we are told, has already been subscribed.

The exact number killed and wounded during the late *revolte* in Paris, on the 12th and 13th of May, were 50 dead on the side of the people, and 15 on that of the soldiers, and 61 civilians and 36 military wounded; in all, 171 killed and wounded.

The Queen and her mother have become thoroughly reconciled to each other. They have both made great concessions; the Queen has not only dismissed Sir George Clark, but discontinued his family; the Duchess of Kent has dismissed Sir John Conroy, and discontinued his family.

The Queen went to Wexford and the Ascot, and was rather coldly received. She continued to visit the theatres as frequently as ever.

The Duke of St. Albans has married Miss Gubbins.

Sir Benjamin Stevenson is dead.

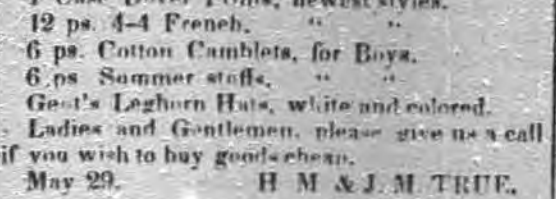

THE VICE PRESIDENT.

If there is a real thorough going Democrat in the Administration at Washington, Col. R. M. Johnson is the man. For more than thirty years he has served the Democratic cause with unflinching constancy, and has given practical evidence of his love of country, by periling his life in her defence on the field of battle. The booty which the U. S. Marshal will net by this grab will be something not to be sneezed in these dull times.—*Herald.*

YELLOW FEVER IMPORTED.—Admiral Baudin has arrived at Mobile, in the Neriside frigate, accompanied by the Brig Dunois. They came direct from Havana, and have yellow fever on board, which broke out after they left. The Admiral has requested permission to have his sick transferred to the naval hospital, which, we hear, "has been granted." Salutes were given and returned on Sunday morning. A French steam frigate, and also the American frigate Constitution, are shortly expected.

The above is the third instance of cases of an, doubted Havana yellow fever imported into southern cities this season.

1st. Three in the ship Braganza, permitted to come directly to the wharf at Charleston, S. C., and which were carried into the heart of the city, to the city hospital, where two died of black vomit.

2d. An officer of the French steam frigate Meteor, from Havana, and who died of yellow fever the same day, or day before she arrived at Norfolk Virginia.

3d. And lastly the cases brought directly as above, in Admiral Baudin's vessels.

In every instance, the utmost indifference appears to be shown to the introduction of the pestilence. We trust that our quarantine laws, at least, will be rigidly enforced.—*Star.*

THE LATE COUNTESS DE LIPONI.

Her Majesty has the head of Cromwell on the shoulders of a pretty woman.—TALLEYRAND. Caroline Marie Annonciade Bonaparte, the youngest sister of the Emperor Napoleon, was born at Ajaccio on the 25th of March, 1792. Her brother having attained the supreme power in France while she was yet in her girlhood, she had no participation in the humble fortunes of her family. She was educated by Madame Campan, of St. Germain, with Hortense, daughter of Josephine, and was remarkable for a greater degree of cleverness than was ever attributed to her sisters. In January 1803, she was married to Gen. Murat, and in the same year nearly fell a victim to the plot of the Infernal Machine, having followed close to the Emperor's carriage, in her own, and had every glass of its windows shattered by the explosion of that engine. In 1806 she was created Grand Duchess of Berg, and in two years after, Queen of Naples. In this last capacity she exhibited much ability, and was active in promoting industry among the people, and in establishing useful institutions.

When the Government of Murat was overthrown, and the city of Naples was on the verge of anarchy, Caroline assumed the uniform of the National Guard, placed herself at the head of the troops, and by her presence of mind, and untiring energy, maintained order until obliged to capitulate. Since then she has resided in Austria, as Countess de Liponi, under the protection of the Emperor. In June 1830, she visited her mother at Rome, by leave of the authorities, and remained there about two months. She went to Paris last year, to prosecute certain claims to property in that city, and the French Chambers voted her an annual allowance of 100,000 francs as a compensation for their relinquishment.

She died at Florence, on the 18th of May, aged 58, of a cancer.

Her husband, Murat, was condemned by a Commission, at shot at Pizzo, in Calabria, in 1815. She has left four children—Achille Napoleon, now residing in Florida, U. S., where he has a large estate, aged 38; Letitia Josephine; Marchioness of Popoli, residing at Bologna, aged 37; Lucien Charles Napoleon, living in the United States, aged 36; and Fousie Julie Caroline, Marchioness of Rasponi.

THE GREAT DAY—THE LITTLE PRESIDENT—THE GREAT PROCESSION—AS IT IS PROPOSED TO BE, AND AS IT WILL BE.

MY! HERE'S MAT!

Of I've heard my Granny say,  
She remembered little Mat,  
Among the cabbage boys, at play,  
With snooty nose, and slouchy hat,  
Ragged elbows, and all that.

What a change in fifty years!  
Now he comes in coach and four!  
With colors, cavalry and cheers—  
Trumpet's clang, and cannon's roar!  
When, were folks such fools before!

This will be one of the most eventful days in the history of this city that has occurred since the visit of General Jackson. Such shouting—such sweating—such swearing—such riding, and rioting—and racing, and running to and fro—and knocking down, and dragging out—and broken heads, and broken tails, and broken breeches—and eating and drinking! and more firing, and fun, and folly, than we have had in five years.

The President of the twenty-six United States and three Territories, besides a vast number of Creeks, and Bays, and Islands, enters the waters of the State of New York at high noon. L'us Deo! God forgive us our sins, and send Mr. Van Buren a safe passage into the city, and a respectable exit from it. The "notion of preparation" for this great triumphal entry, has been sounding in this city for the last ten days; and at noon yesterday there was not a dozen pounds of soft soap left in the city, and Chatham street was completely swept of all the old boots and breeches that could be found in it. Small tooth combs were never in such great request, and there has actually been a considerable demand for nail brushes, tooth brushes, and tooth picks. All the pipe clay, chalk, fuller's earth, and blacking in the city was bought up on Saturday before dark; and on account of the large quantity of shirts that were washed last week, there was not a gallon of rain water left yesterday in any cistern in the city. In short, no pains have been spared by the loco focos to render themselves as sweet and as clean as they possibly could under the circumstances, considering the length of time that has elapsed since the last cleansing.

The whole of last week in this city was consumed by the various branches and grades, and casters of loco focos in talking and drinking gin, and cursing and quarrelling, about the order of precedence in the procession, and finally they have decided that the loco focos on foot shall march before the loafers on horse-back, this being considered purely democratic. Every loafer in the city to-morrow morning will be up by sunrise; some few will sleep on the Battery to be in readiness; some will breakfast and some will not; all will most likely become intoxicated, and not a few will get their heads broken, their eyes blackened, and their noses put out of joint. It will be an immense day, and the honors and dishonors paid to His Democratic Highness will exceed those paid to all the Allied sovereigns of Europe or their visit to England. We go in for all this; we consider His Republican Majesty to be a greater personage than all the kings, and potentates, and powers of the earth—and, therefore, fully entitled to have as much noise and honor, and shouting, and rioting, and glory paid to him as 500,000 souls can serve up for him.

These little preliminaries being passed through, he will discuss his breakfast, spend as much time as possible amongst the women, compliment the usual, and uncle, and grandmother of every one of them, talk to all the little girls and boys, mix up all sorts of caustic remarks, similar to cross-readings, in his conversation, take first one gentleman by the arm and then another, walk a few yards and pass half a dozen complimentary remarks with each, and finally enter his plain, republican carriage, with his shirts and clean breeches in two portmanteaus strapped behind, and in this way reach Jersey city exactly at noon.

In the mean time the following will be the programme of the performance in the city.

CARDINAL FESCH.

Our paper yesterday chronicled the death of Fesch, Arch-Bishop of Lyons—a member of the most illustrious family of the world.

Cardinal Joseph Fesch was a half-brother of the mother of Napoleon, born in 1763. In 1689, he was consecrated Arch-Bishop of Lyons by the Pope's Legate, and in the succeeding year made a Cardinal. In 1804 he accompanied the Pope to Paris, (being at that time Ambassador to the Holy See.) to assist in the Coronation of his nephew. In 1810 he was elected President of the Sacred Council of the French metropolis, and vigorously opposed all of Napoleon's schemes against the Court of Rome. In consequence of this opposition he was compelled to retire to Lyons, where he remained till 1814, when, after many vicissitudes, he reached Rome, and was

received with distinguished favor by his old friend Pius VII. During the Reign of a Hundred days he returned to Paris, where he was made a Peer, but at the end of the brief dominion of the King of Kings, he went back again to Rome and resided there till his death. He was kind and affable to strangers, tolerant to men of opposite belief, and constantly endeavoring to promote the happiness of those around him. His picture gallery, which the writer of this has visited, was one of the finest in Europe. It occupied three entire stories in the great palace in which the Cardinal resided, and contained nearly two thousand pictures—many of which were chief d'ouvres of the Flemish and Dutch schools; and the most celebrated Italian masters. These pictures are to be sold to buy various legacies; and not, as stated by a contemporary to be sent to Joseph Bonaparte, at Bordentown.—N. Y. Whig.

BLOODY AFFRAY.—On the evening of the 4th, a row occurred at the corner of Division and Elbridge streets, between a number of persons attached to two rival fire companies, and a regular fight ensued. After sundry blows had been passed between the parties, some cowardly rascal engaged in the melee drew a large dirk-knife from his pocket, and stabbed four or five persons in the crowd, among whom was Mr. Samuel Barlock, fireman of Fire Engine No. 2, who was severely wounded in the left side, the blade of the instrument passing just below his heart. FOR PRESIDENT  
GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

For the benefit of those who are paving State street with blocks, we would say that the pavement as it is laid now, will not last as long as they are putting it there.

A wooden pavement should be laid upon a macadamised foundation. We have seen too many wooden pavements laid in sand, not to know they are useless, or worse than useless, for in a few months the State street will be in a worse condition than it ever was before.

The experiment of laying blocks in sand has been tried repeatedly, in Broadway in New York, and proved to be a total failure, and also in front of the United States Bank Philadelphia, which has been taken up and a macadamised foundation placed beneath, and it now answers the expectation of those who placed it there. A wooden pavement laid in a proper manner, we have no doubt would last a century. Pavements of this description in all the principal drives of Paris, which has laid for years, are in as good order now as they were when first laid down. The blocks being laid now on State street, are not of the proper shape, they should be an octagon or a diamond.

When the trial of the Daily Advertiser for libel, is brought upon the carpet, the particulars of a voyage made from Wetumpka to New Orleans by the "Trading Company Claque" last Spring, will be given, which will show the rashness of those concerned in the mode they adopted to purchase cotton by allowing a heavy shave on their own money, and shipping the Cotton to New York instantly.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—Almost—Yesterday morning, one of our News boys in passing the new Aqueduct missed his footing, and was precipitated into the Genesee, and as the little fellow rose to the surface, some of the bystanders caught him by the seat of his inexpressible, and dragged him ashore; but not without the loss of about a dozen Suss, which were heard to make a hissing noise as they went into the water, owing probably to the warmth of the articles contained within them.

Twenty-two veterans of the Revolution, attended the celebration of the 4th of July, at Providence, the youngest of whom was 69, the oldest 92 years of age. They have lived to see the rich fulfilment of their brightest hopes, to behold the infant colonists a great and powerful, a united and happy people—and they have lived to see the lie given to the old proverb, that "republics are ungrateful."

MOURNFUL AND SUDDEN DEATH.—On Saturday at noon, a young man named Horace H. Terry, from Auburn, in this state, who was employed as a carpenter on the new House of Refuge at Bellevue, went in company with a man named Dunham to the basin at the foot of 29th street, for the purpose of bathing. Terry could not swim, and unfortunately got into deep water, and before assistance could be rendered was drowned. His body was recovered in about two hours afterwards, on which the coroner held an inquest.

The deceased was about 25 years of age, was a sober, industrious man, and was respected by all who had known him since his sojourn in this city. We understand he has an aged and widowed mother, and several sisters residing in his native place, who have been thus suddenly deprived of a son and brother.—N. Y. Whig.

FATAL CASUALTY.—A negro named John J. Beekman, on the morning of the 5th, accidentally fell from the second story window of the house 34 Centre street to the sidewalk, and was much injured on the head by the fall, but his skull was not fractured. He was taken to his residence 208 Hester street, where he died early on Saturday morning. The coroner held an inquest on the body, and Dr. Douglass, who had attended the deceased, gave it as his opinion that he had died in consequence of the spinal marrow having

been injured by the fall. The jury found a verdict in accordance.—H.

The Wetumpka Letters Journal says, Counterfeit 10's 20's and 50's, on the "Wetumpka Trading Company," are in circulation. They are easily detected by the defective execution. The signatures are excellent—as good as the genuine bills.

Boston was not without its explosions on the 4th inst. A men's fountain exploded in the city, which instantly killed Mr. Lyscom Bruce, and injured several others.

We received yesterday, files of the Wetumpka Argos, and also the Loefers Journal, published at Wetumpka. We shall now be enabled to give our readers a more correct account of Wetumpka matters than heretofore.

THE SEASON.—We have now the most delightful summer weather. And we can see nothing to prevent an abundant crop of the various grains, grass and vegetables. Although, two weeks ago the prospects for corn were rather dubious, yet the few past warm days that we have had has given it an uncommon start.—Louis (Cat.) Messenger.

At Yorktown, (Pa.), a few days since, on raising the frame of the new Presbyterian church one of the plates upon which fifteen men were standing to raise the rafters, suddenly broke, and the whole were precipitated to the ground. Of the whole fifteen, five only escaped without injury. Five or six of the others are since dead.

"IS THERE A HEART THAT NEVER LOVED?"—The editor of the New-Born Gazette, makes the following sweeping assertion:

"What! a man, and never loved! Pah! such a man must have a heart of ice; the gizzard of a goose; a soul as lifeless as a corn-cob, and a head as sappy as a coconut."

One of the buildings of Laughlin's Powder Manufactory, situated on the Casterskill, about seven miles from Catskill, was blown up on Saturday last. Three of the workmen were killed, and a fourth dangerously wounded.

DISASTERS ON THE FOURTH.—There were two dreadful Railroad accidents in Philadelphia on Thursday last, by which several men, women, and children were hurried into eternity. The number of street fights, &c. occurred.

A PECULIAR AFFAIR.—The Navy Department of this country is in a most miserable state. About two hundred of the gallant crew of the North Carolina, line of battle ship, now in our harbor, cannot get their money. Three or four of them called on us Saturday morning, and asked us if the Government was bankrupt, and added that there was at least \$70,000 due to the crew for pay. The party left us, and called on the President at his elegant apartments at the Washington Hall, and thus addressed him through their leader:—

Sailor—Beg your Honorable Majesty's pardon—but we're in a quandary.

President—What troubles you my friends?

Sailor—We belong to your Majesty's Ship North Carolina, and we hav'nt got our money, and can't get it.

President—How is that?

Sailor—Please your Highness's Majesty's Excellency, your Majesty's Government is bankrupt; and there isn't a shot in the locker.

President—There must be some mistake.

Sailor—D—d a bit, begging your Majesty's pardon; but as we don't want to be hard with your Highness's Government, just give us enough to pay our board bill for a week, and a little for coach rides and tobacco, and we'll let you off for the rest.

President—It shall be soon to; and you shall be paid.

And, so saying, he bowed them out of the room. The Navy Department never was in such disgrace; and it is all owing to the mismanagement of Secretary Paulding, who is so busy trying to throw contracts into the hands of his relative at West Point, and writing critiques for the Courier & Enquirer, that he cannot attend to his duties.—Herald.

## THE POST MASTER OF ROCHESTER.

In drawing the Portrait of this functionary, we labor under great embarrassment. In delineating the human countenance created in the "image of God," it is the first duty of the artist to be true to nature; to draw each feature with accuracy; and endeavor to catch the prevalent expression, so that the portrait shall at once be recognized by all who know the original. When the countenance of an individual at one time wears a natural expression, and often an artificial one put on for the occasion—and where from peculiar circumstances the artificial expression becomes habitual, it is very difficult for the painter to satisfy the critical, or come up to the expectations of partial friends. A portrait of the poor maniac, who cherished the fantasy that he was a King, and who whilst strutting in his mock robes of royalty, wore the impress of majesty in his face; would not be recognized by those who knew him in his days of sanity. If we draw Henry O'Reilly the Printer, and editor of a Democratic paper, receiving his salary from the voluntary contributions of political friends; or from the Government, in the shape of pay as "Secret Inspector" of the Revenue department; if we paint him as he was, the amiable and smiling aspirant for political popularity, greeting every humble democrat he met with a hearty shake of the hand; drumming up recruits for Jackson meetings; writing paragraphs against federalism in "thoughts that breathe and words that burn;" and doing all that drudgery for the party that editors hired and paid for that purpose are expected to do; the portrait might be recognized by the old "Corporal's Guard," but it would be a strange visage to the bulk of the inhabitants of our now populous city. On the other hand, if we draw the Post Master of Rochester, the successful political aspirant, the "Historian" of Rochester and Western New York, the familiar correspondent of Senator Wright and President Van Buren; the founder of the Young Men's Association and the sustainer of that institution by his munificence; the Author of the great "wailing project;" the man whose fame is firmly established, and whose name is identified with the glory, welfare and "history" of the city as has immortalized; if we draw this man, will not his old but more humble acquaintances accuse us of want of skill in our profession? Is looking at the noble bearing, the military tread, the slightly elevated brow, the distended nostril, and proud glance of the successful aspirant for fame; as delineated in the Portrait; they would remember the humble goit, the quiet and subdued manner, the downcast eye, and the habitual hesitancy and deference of manner of the party *drudge*, who for a consideration in days of yore wrote the "resolutions"—cut and dried the proceedings of their public meetings—and threw mud at Thurlow Weed and the Morgan Committee; and would exclaim "the painter is a booby"—the "Portrait is no portrait at all." To free ourselves from the embarrassment under which we labor for the reasons above stated, we shall be obliged to draw two Portraits. If James Smith and Luther Tucker are worthy of being painted at all, surely Henry O'Reilly deserves to be painted twice. Janus had two faces, and why should not O'Reilly be entitled to the same number? Orator Puff had "two tones to his voice," and it was of course necessary to hear both tones in order to appreciate the oratorical powers of Puff. Perhaps our readers will say that we have already drawn the two Portraits in the preceding remarks. They are merely the outlines, and the filling up will require a further trespass upon the readers' time and attention. The first point worthy of the public attention in the brilliant and prosperous career of the Post Master in his

It was for a long time a custom with the European Powers waging war with each other, to call in the aid of foreign mercenaries in the sanguinary business of outting each other's throats. Hence the armies of France, Spain and Germany, were

filled with great numbers of Scotch and Irish adventurers attracted by pay and plunder to the standards of the belligerents. Since the prostration of the power of Napoleon, the long peace prevailing upon the Continent, has compelled these adventurers to seek other climes as a field for their chivalrous exploits. Their favorite resort is now to America the "land of the free, and the home of the brave," and their battle field is the political arena. Unfortunately, the political parties in the United States are so nearly balanced, that the services of these foreign troops, these European mercenaries are eagerly sought by both parties. Hence, we see the spade and the pickaxe frequently exchanged for the editorial quill, and the man who in his native land luxuriated upon three potatoes a day, in his "adopted" country, riots upon the "spoils" of the vanquished natives. Amongst the most fortunate of the "mercenaries" may be ranked the Post Master. He came to Rochester in 1826, and although an active political contest was going on, and he the editor of a Daily Paper, no bid of sufficient magnitude was made for his services, and he remained neutral. It was thought at one time from the tone of his paper, that the anti-masons had enlisted him under their banner, but he soon backed out, either because the pay was not sufficient, or the "anties" withheld the bounty. In 1828, when the success of Gen. Jackson was placed beyond any reasonable doubt, he entered the ranks of "Old Hickory," and has remained there ever since, excepting an occasional relapse into neutrality; and one or two absolute retirements from the Grand Army, as a stimulus to a further increase of pay and rations. His relapse into neutrality was cured by a subscription among the leading Republicans of this city, amounting to several hundred dollars, and he was drawn from his retirement by an appointment as *secret agent* of the Revenue, to look out for smugglers, whilst editing the organ of Democracy. No rational man can doubt the ability of the Post Master to edit a paper and attend to the organization of a political party, and keep a sharp look out for infractions of the Revenue Laws at the same time. The pay of \$700 a year was doubtless for the performance of the latter duty. That a man of genius can perform the duties of Deputy Collector, of the Port of Genesee, and travel in Florida in pursuit of pleasure and land speculations at the same time, no reasonable person can for a moment doubt. Some scrupulous individuals might hesitate to assent to the performance of one duty whilst performing another, but to the soldier of fortune, the real Dalgotty, securing is the least burthensome of duties.

Unfortunately, the accession of Gen. Jackson, (that purest and bravest of men) to the Presidency, was the signal for thousands of unprincipled individuals who had followed the Democratic Army to the great political battle for the sole purpose of plunder, to rush forward and claim the promised booty without the least regard to justice or to the public interest. During the first years of the Administration of the Hero of New Orleans the same reckless disregard of the principles of common honesty, and the same disposition to riot upon the "spoils" of an abused and plundered people was manifested, that at a later period led to the enormous defalcations of Swartwout and Price. The only difference we can see between the bold and shameless defaulter who absconds with the public monies in his pocket, and the sly and secret recipient of a salary for pretended services to the public, but intended in reality as a bonus for those political services which are always rendered freely by the honest politician, is, that the one courts the glory of being known as a public robber, and the other desires merely to fob his plunder in secrecy and silence.

That the appointment of the present incumbent to the office of Post Master, was intended as a reward for party services, who can doubt?—Will it be pretended that he possessed a single qualification for that important station? Did his most intimate friends consider him fitted, by his habits of punctuality and accuracy in business transactions, for a station requiring such habits? Let the precautions of his bail answer. Little did his confiding friends imagine, that when they waived all considerations of fitness in his behalf, and consulted alone the necessities of the aspirants and the reward due to party services, that their

confidence would be repaid with ingratitude, and that success would induce the Post Master to throw off the mask and play such "fantastic tricks before high Heaven, as would make the angels weep." Little did they think that he would set himself up as a dictator, and assume to control all the appointments to be made within the County; much less, procure such appointments to be made in defiance of the will of a large majority of the party whose creature he was.—But the viper has stung the bosom that warmed it into life and being, the humble recipient of the favors of the Democracy, has aimed his inveterate shaft, at its principles and its harmony.

In delineating the Post Master of Rochester, it is one unpleasant duty to record one of the most flagrant cases of political treachery, ever known. It is true that he still professes the Democratic faith, and continues nominally attached to the Democratic party. He "keeps the word of promise to the ear," but alas, it is but too evident that he has in fact abandoned the party and principles that have made him all he is.

Benedict Arnold the arch traitor of the Revolution, could plead disappointed ambition as an excuse for his apostasy—but the Post Master has been gratified in all his aspirations for office. Arnold coveted British gold, and was discontented with the hard fare and uncertain pay for the dangers and privations of the American service—but the Post Master has been well paid at all times, for services real or nominal. Arnold signalled his defection by a blow aimed at the prosperity of the cause he abandoned—the Post Master aimed a fatal blow at the harmony and prosperity of the Democratic party of Monroe county. Arnold was doomed to spend the residue of his days in ignominy and disgrace, and if we do not err in our estimate of the Post Master, a similar fate will ultimately complete the parallel. In proof of our assertion that the Post Master has abandoned the principles of Democracy, we need only point to his laboured advocacy of a State debt of thirty or forty millions of dollars, for wailing the Erie Canal with stone the whole distance from Albany to Buffalo. Opposition to an enormous public debt is a prominent item in the democratic creed. That a "national debt is a national blessing," is one of the dogmas of federalism. Whilst the Democratic press of the state is combating Gov. Seward's proposition for a forty million debt for public purposes—the Post Master of Rochester, with a visionary wildness far outstripping that of Governor Seward proposes an additional thirty or forty millions for a Canal wall! Shades of Jefferson and Tompkins, is this one of your disciples? As a further proof that the Post Master has abandoned all regard for the usages of the Democratic party, we will barely refer to the late appointment of Judge Smith as Collector of the Port of Genesee. That outrage is yet fresh in the remembrance of the Republicans of Rochester. It was perpetrated at the instigation of the Post Master. He it was who in opposition to the wishes of the entire Democratic party of Rochester, procured the appointment of the present Collector. The means made use of by him to deceive the President, are yet shrouded in mystery; but time will at length drag them to the light, and expose this impudent meddler in all his native baseness.

We shall on a future occasion, take a deliberate survey of the course pursued by this public functionary, in appointing an individual to an important public station in a manner unprecedented in the annals of Democracy. In the mean time we will take our leave of the Post Master, by saying that we have "nothing extenuated or set down aught in malice," but have endeavored to sketch his profile, so that the likeness will be acknowledged as faithful by the Democratic Republicans of Rochester.

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

The withdrawal of Daniel Webster confirms the nomination almost exclusively to Gen. Scott. We consider Gen. Harrison as entirely out of the question. With some few there is yet much shifting and turning and twisting in favor of Henry Clay. But that will be of very short duration. What can Mr. Clay or his friends do to secure his election even if he should get the nomination? No man in his right senses, and who will give an honest opinion, but what will very readily admit that if Mr. Clay gets the nomination, Mr. Van Buren is elected. This we deem to be emphatically true; and yet there are thousands who are so foolish as to believe, that Mr. Clay can carry the States of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Virginia. What nonsense! Because the two last elections in this State resulted in favor of the whigs, they have full confidence that Mr. Clay, that Old Party Hack, the man upon whom the party lines have been drawn repeatedly in the United States, has now become so short of all the objections the people ever had to him, that they will out come up and vote for him as readily as for any other man, because he is a good whig. To such persons who believe all this, allow us to say, you are deceiving yourselves; your great anxiety to elect Mr. Clay President of the United States, will defeat the election of a man true to his country, and worthy and well qualified to discharge the duties of Chief Magistrate with honor to himself, and satisfaction to the people. You had better let Old Party Hacks alone, and concentrate your forces upon some new man, like for instance General Scott, who is a tried Soldier, Patriot, and Philanthropist. He has secured the affection of the people and their approbation by his skillful management of all the affairs entrusted to him. He has been separated entirely from all the political squabbles of the country, and has not therefore like Henry Clay and other old worn out Politicians strong and bitter political enemies.

With Gen. Scott there is no strong sectional prejudice, no tariff, no abolition, no Bank questions to influence men to vote for or against him. He comes on the course free, and therefore, Freemen will zealously support him. We would advise every elector to consider these things, they are worthy of your most serious and candid attention, for upon the selection of a candidate, the election is decided.

A project was on foot a short time since for lighting all Paris, by means of a light placed on one of the highest monuments in the capital, and the result to be obtained was to have been derived from a combustion of gas with certain chemical substances. This idea was laughed at at the time, but it seems about to be reduced to practice, and the public are, it is said, shortly to witness the experiment.

The Detroit Gazette announces a diabolical outrage in the violation of the new Catholic Church, which was broken open during the night, and despoiled of every thing valuable. The sacred ornaments of the altar was not spared; and among the articles stolen, were a golden chalice, and a representation of the sun, of massive silver, of great beauty and value.

On Tuesday last the Presbyterian Church at Johnstown was struck by lightning. The Republican says it shivered the entire steeple, and after reaching the belfry, and carrying away about half of the ball wheel, it descended in one of the posts which supported the steeple, tearing off the clapboards, breaking the window glass, shivering the post from top to bottom, and occasionally breaking through the plaster, on the inside. The bell remains uninjured; and to the astonishment of all who saw it, the building did not ignite.

Gov. Sprague, of Rhode Island, and a party, celebrated the 4th with a clam bake, at Warwick, making sad havoc among the Narraganset soft shells. This "olden usage" was better than an "imperial pageant."

Several criminal examinations have taken place lately at the Police Office. We have thought of a mode of punishing criminal offenders, which would be more likely to deter them from crime than any thing else, that is, sentence them to read Hyatt's political leaders every morning. If they are brought up after that, turn them over to the Spanish Inquisition.

What a d-d (darned) rascal that Nobody is. There is not a dry passee but what he does some mischief, or performs something out of our office. Latterly he has been in the habit of taking our best exchanges before we can get a chance of peeping into them. So Mr. Nobody beware, for if we catch you, we shall take summary of vengeance.

We received yesterday another file of the Wetumpka Argus. Three columns of that paper is occupied by extracts of Lyon articles from the Sun and the Daily Advertiser.

Will it be believed that the Sheriff refused to admit a bouquet of flowers which had been sent by a lady to the cell of Nichols, on the 4th of July? It is so nevertheless.

For the honor of the Church, be it said that the Lyons have not been seen at the Communion table, for some time past.

The Grand Duke of Russia, spent half a million pounds sterling, during his visit to England.

SILK CULTURE.—As a new symptom in the morus multicaulis fever, it is said that a woman in Northampton, or somewhere in that neighborhood, has christened her child Morus Multicaulis.

Among the distinguished stangers in New York, are Gov. Hamilton, of South Carolina; and Gen. Danlap, Ambassador from Texas to the United States; and Dr. Moore, Mayor of Houston.

A PROFITABLE BUSINESS.—It is stated that the fees of the Clerk of the U. S. Circuit Court, in Mississippi, at the late term of the Court, amounted to \$40,000.

ABANDONMENT OF AN INFANT.—On the morning of the 2d inst., a woman named Catharine O'Conner, brought to the almshouse a fine looking male child, which she said she had found in an alley at 132 Walker-street. The child was taken in charge by Col. Mann, the agent, and given by him to the nurses of the establishment, as is usual in such cases.

Nothing more was thought of the matter till a few days after, when Col. Mann received thro' the post office an anonymous letter, addressed to the Alms House Commissioners, which stated that a woman named Elizabeth Hitchcock residing at 116 Duane street, was the mother of the child, and that the father's name was Minor L. Ray, agent for the General Passage Office, 78 Cortlandt street.

On the strength of this information, Mr. Mann proceeded to make the necessary inquiries, and found that the woman Hitchcock did reside as stated in the letter.

Affidavits were yesterday made of the facts before the police, and the woman arrested and brought up.

On her examination, she admitted that she was the mother of the child, and that Ray was the father; that she had abandoned and left the child in Walker street, where it was found; she was a widow, and had been for some years; had had four children, the eldest of whom was now 21 years of age.

She was thereupon fully committed for trial, and Ray brought up and held to bail in \$500. The punishment of the woman if convicted, will be 7 years in the state Prison.—Courier.

An inquest having been held over the body of a toper out south, the verdict was—"Died of the jug distemper."

This distemper is very prevalent in Rochester. Several of our friends experienced severe attacks of it on the fourth, at the Rochester House. Although none died of it, they were brought very low.

ROCHESTER MONEY MARKET.

SATURDAY JULY 13, 4 P. M.  
The complaint of the scarcity of money still continues. Our banks are doing literally nothing, and it is nearly impossible to negotiate business paper upon any terms. Several failures have occurred amongst mechanics and manufacturers, and more are anticipated unless relief is speedily afforded by the Banks. The difficulty of obtaining funds upon adequate security was not as great during the "panic" season, as now. The public has been completely disappointed in its expectations of relief from the Banks organized under the New Banking Law. These Banks cannot be regarded in any sense as public institutions; but are more private associations organized generally by money borrowers instead of capitalists. We shall hereafter give a sketch of the mode of getting up a "wild cat" or a "red back" Bank, and investigate the ability of such a concern to aid the wants of the Commercial and trading community. We understand that some alarm is felt in Wall-st., lest the Safety Fund Banks of this city should suffer loss by the millers and flour speculators. We are happy to learn that our Banks hold less millers' paper than at any former period. The heavy holders of produce have obtained their funds to a great extent from the New England Banks, and from Banks in the Middle and Eastern parts of this State. There are no safer or better managed Banks in the Union than the Safety Fund Banks of Rochester. The business of Rochester is at this moment, in as healthy a condition as that of any city in the State. The circulating notes issued by the City Corporation furnish a perfectly safe currency, though somewhat depreciated. No relief can be expected from the money pressure, till the crops are marketed. The wheat crop never looked more promising than now, and if it turns out well, it will throw an immense amount of money into the hands of the farmers. Notwithstanding the present gloomy aspect of monetary affairs, we anticipate for Rochester a brisk fall business. Counterfeit \$3 bills of the Banks of Steuben County and Commercial Bank of Oswego, are in circulation; they have a dark and greasy appearance. Exchange on New York 1 per cent premium and difficult to be obtained. The money market in New York & Philadelphia at the latest dates was very tight. Short loan on stocks were obtained at 9 to 12 per cent. The Banks under the General Law are now making their semi-annual reports to the Comptroller. These reports are published in the State Paper, and afford valuable information of the condition of these institutions. It will be perceived that they are generally lamentably deficient in means for the prompt redemption of their circulating notes, and we do not hesitate to say, that when another great revulsion shall occur in money affairs, the new Banks will be the first to suspend specie payments.

FOR PRESIDENT  
GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

We are informed that letters have been received in this city announcing that his Majesty Martin Van Buren accompanied by his Royal Highness Prince John Van Buren & his Highness Prince Smith Thompson Van Buren, will shortly honor our city with a visit. The sum of \$2,100 remains to be redeemed, for the redemption of which ample provision has been made by the Corporation.

ONE-HALF OF EASTPORT, (MAINE,) DESTROYED BY FIRE.

A fire broke out on the 6th at this place, and destroyed one-half the property of the town, comprising more than forty one places of public business. It commenced at No. 9 Water street, sweeping off every building on both sides of the street to the store of the Messrs. Hobbs.

Every wharf in the neighborhood was cleared except the two stores of the lower end of Hayden's wharf, Central wharf, Union Wharf, steamboat wharf, and Hobb's wharf. Two vessels, the Martha and the Abigail were totally destroyed, having been aground in the dock, and several others took fire, but were extinguished.

The list of sufferers is numerous, chiefly merchant dealers in West India dry goods, flour and corn, hat stores, jewellers, tailors, shoemakers, and every species of mechanics. The slip of the Eastport Sentinel says:—

Nothing remains of what was yesterday the centre, and in fact nearly the circumference of the business part of the town, but a heap of ruins, above which rise the blackened chimneys of the burnt buildings, and over which the smoke rises like a pall, as if to hide the hideous and a heinous. Since writing the above, which is put at \$240,000, of which \$86,000 are supposed to be insured.—N. Y. Whig.

FOR PRESIDENT  
GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

THE PRESIDENT.—What is Mr. Van Buren's object in visiting the State of New York this summer? It is to reclaim the State from whig domination; and bring it back under the control and management of the old Albany Regency? Or is it to reconcile those of his old friends, who have so decidedly and unequivocally expressed their preference for Gen. Scott? If the former be the object of his visit, he will have more labour to perform than can be accomplished in two or even four successive seasons. He has got to convince the people of this State that his measures have been truly Democratic—that he has followed in the footsteps of his illustrious predecessors—that he is the President of the whole people and not a party that he has not, nor will not allow any other Power on earth to invade our soil, or to encroach upon our rights with impunity—that he is the firm, straight forward, uncompromising Democrat they believed him to be—that he is not a Northern President with Southern feelings, that he's just the man they can rely upon in all and every emergency.

If he can convince the Republicans of this State that it is unnecessary for them to look any farther than he is exactly the man they want, then he may secure the State at the next Presidential election. But if not, no man can calculate what the majority will be against him.

If the letter (that is to reconcile the Scott men) be the object of his visit, it will be a fruitless attempt, for an act of men are more thoroughly convinced of his utter incompetency, anti-Democracy, and great want of principle than they are.—He has not performed a single act, recommended a single measure, nor made a single appointment to satisfy these noble and generous hearted Republicans. If he wants to make proselytes, his Majesty will have a more extended and feasible field for action, among that portion of the Whig party who were old Federalists, than among the truly Democratic Scott Republicans. Mr. Van Buren can present no argument sufficiently cogent, to satisfy these firm and unyielding Republicans, that in case, and under any circumstances, it is necessary for them to deviate from their firmly established Democratic doctrine of one term in office.

He will be incarcerated in a noisome dungeon in a hot climate, with the small satisfaction of knowing that he has fallen a victim to his own avarice.

Whoever receives the Presidential vote of this State, will be selected. Neither Clay nor Van Buren can get it, for the Abolitionists hold the balance of power, and they will "go dead set" against either of them, and in favor of Scott. Harrison is out of the question, and of course Scott takes the field, head up, seven feet and "well proportioned." Hurrah! for the hero of Chippewa!!

ANOTHER PATRIOT GONE TO REST.—Captain Jeremiah Harding, one of the defenders of Fort Griswold, died in this city on the 7th inst. and was buried with military honors by the Artillery and Flank companies. The procession, escorted by the soldiery with reversed arms, moving with the slow and solemn death-march, to the sound of the muffled drum, was unusually imposing. To see the hearse bearing to their last narrow home, the remains of the deceased warrior, enveloped in that banner his valor had defended when its stars were obscured in the cloud of battle, awakened emotions in the mind of the beholder of the highest moral sublimity.—*New London Gazette.*

A Frenchman named Joseph Roe has been arrested at Burlington, Vermont, on suspicion of having set fire to the Presbyterian Church, and after an investigation which occupied upwards of three days he was bound over to take his trial at the August term of the court. The Free Press says the evidence against him, as is usual in such cases, was altogether circumstantial, but of that clear and irresistible kind that leaves but the bar room for doubt; and the same evidence which brings the crime home to this individual, also proves that more than one person were concerned in it. Probably the Frenchman's act was retaliatory, as the Roman Catholic Church in the same place was recently destroyed, and suspicion among the ignorant foreigners rested on the Protestants, as instigators of the act.

A PASSENGER IN AN AWKWARD PREDICAMENT.—A gentleman, Mr. R., who went out in the Erie steamer last week from Buffalo, had taken a berth in one of the state rooms on deck, the state room next to his having been secured by a gentleman and his wife. Mr. R. wishing to retire early, went by mistake, into the married gentleman's state room, and thinking it to be his own, stowed himself away very snugly in the upper berth, and

was in a short time sound asleep. The lady who had been reading in the cabin, wishing to go to bed, and not seeing her husband at hand, went to her state room, and was surprised to find him (as she supposed) asleep in his berth. Not wishing to awake him, she addressed herself, and was just on the point of getting into her berth when the supposed husband sprang up and exclaimed, "Who's there?" As may naturally be supposed, the lady screamed and crouched in one corner of the small room; and it happened just at that moment that the husband made his appearance. Being rather a teaty gentleman, and perhaps with occasionally haunted by the "green-eyed monster," he did not wait for an explanation; but seizing the trespasser by the shirt collar, pulled him from his berth, and without even stopping to venture a remark upon his questionable situation, attempted to thrust him upon deck. Mr. R. on the other hand having too great a respect for decency to greet all his fellow passengers *sans culotte*, was compelled to defend himself against being thus summarily disposed of—and while endeavoring to push him through the door, the married man was himself forced upon deck, and lockout of his own room. The Captain and a crowd of passengers immediately assembled—Mr. R. throw open the window—rendered an explanation—it was accepted, and he permitted to dress and retire. The chagrin of the teaty gentleman cannot be described. He had not only made a fool of himself before all the passengers, but had very impolitely exposed a stranger in the very face of his own wife, who like a virtuous woman, sat passive during the whole ridiculous scene.

MR. EDITOR.—A writer over the signature of "Julia," in your paper seems very much inclined to favor the obnoxious principle of aristocratic parties, and exclusive assemblies to celebrate our National Jubilee. FOR PRESIDENT  
GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

The Albany Argus decides that Van Buren sent Gen. Scott into the North Western Territory among the Indians, with the view of impairing his growing popularity, as a Statesman and Soldier, and expediting his progress to the Presidency. Very well, Mr. Croswell, you have a right, from principle and practice, to deny the truth—it is the predominant trait in your character. You denied that Jackson could be elected, when you saw that he was at an immeasurable distance from the Presidency. You denied that you plundered the people's money, when you sold your house to the State for one third more than its actual value, and occupied it yourself for a annual sum. You denied that you had been for years robbing the State Treasury, when you had both in the constant practice of charging and receiving one third more than the legal fees, allowed you as State Printer. You denied that you were ever opposed to the construction of the Erie Canal, when you were in the constant practice of ridiculing the project, and abusing Clinton. Palmer of the United States Topographical Engineers, has the honor and been engaged during this week in making examination of Yellow River, and we are gratified to learn that he deems it practicable to open and improve the navigation of that stream, some distance beyond the Atlantic line. \$500 was appropriated at the last session of Congress for a survey of the Yellow River.

A bridge two hundred and twenty-four feet long, constructed on a single arch, resting upon solid stone abutments, each extremity, has been thrown across the Schoburn Kill Creek at the village of Platteville, Green County, in this State. It is believed to be the largest bridge made in the form of a single arch in this country.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—We learn that a laborer on the Genesee Valley Canal, was killed at the Portage Tunnel on Tuesday Rhine, and five others wounded, two dangerously. The accident occurred by a bank of earth caving down while they were at work underneath. The name of the deceased was James Hazy. GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

Mr. Clay.—The Schenectady Sentinel says Mr. Clay cannot receive the electoral vote of the State of New York. Mr. Scantion you are right and you might have added Pennsylvania, Ohio and Virginia. The editor of the Democrat says the Sentinel will be mistaken if Clay gets the nomination. We are confident the editor of the Democrat honestly knows better; and why it is he wishes to deceive his readers by making statements contrary to man and truth, we are at a loss to determine. It requires a man of no very great foresight to discover that Mr. Clay cannot get all out the full strength of the voters in this or any other State in the Union in opposition to Mr. Van Buren. Although the party opposed to Mr. Van Buren in this State, for instance, may be strong and would give a large majority for a man against a non nothing could be said—yet how many votes in each Town should it be necessary to change, to give the State to the administration? We will suppose for instance, that there are about 100 Towns in this State; and that in each town there are ten voters who would vote for Gen. Scott or some other man opposed to Mr. Van Buren, but would not vote for Henry Clay. It would make a difference in favor of Gen. Scott, if he should be the candidate of sixteen thousand votes—this number undoubtedly if Mr. Clay should be the candidate, would give the State to Mr. Van Buren. But there is a much greater difference than 10 votes changed in each town in this State, and in fact in every town in the Union, of Gen. Scott should be the candidate. The editor of the Democrat very truly remarked the other day, that if Gen. Scott should be nominated, no person on earth could prevent his election.

Hear how a country editor talks about his bid-dies. "Some confounded villain has been robbing our hen roost. Every old bird gone—he ones and she ones—those with families, and those without leaving some dozen little orphan biddies to pick their way alone and mannyless through a tender and delicate chickenhood. Shipwreck and Sinker Lives Lost.—The ship Ad-de-Camp, from Londonderry, bound to St. John's N. B., with 305 emigrants on board, was wrecked on Bear's Island on the 9th ult. Sixteen emigrants were drowned, of whom three were men and the remainder women and children. The survivors arrived at Halifax on the 23rd, in a wretchedly destitute situation, having lost their all in the wreck, some of them being half naked. Measures were immediately taken for their relief, and many of them obtained employment at Halifax.

Yellow Fever.—There have been several cases of yellow fever in New York, and one or two persons have died with it. It is said, however, that all the cases have been traced to vessels at quarantine, from West India ports. There is no occasion for alarm, if the citizens will aid the board of health in the necessary measures to prevent the spread of the pestilence. Our streets are filthy in all directions, and in some of the great thoroughfares the stench is almost insupportable. The health-wardens should double their force, if necessary, to provide a remedy. And the citizens instead of leaving every thing for the health officers to do, should themselves adopt active and immediate measures to guard against the impending danger.—N. Y. Whig.

NON-HERITATION OF MR. VAN BUREN.—Mr. Jenkins Chairman of the committee appointed by the citizens of New York, to wait upon Mr. Van Buren to Harlem in taking his leave in behalf of the Committee, made the following remarks, viz: "The Committee are aware, sir, that great personal fatigue has been endured by you, but trust that the ardour, enthusiasm and respect which has attended you throughout, will not only compensate you for the effort, but will have an impression on your mind abiding with life." "Permit us now, sir, on taking leave of you to express respectfully and sincerely, our best wishes for your happiness both in your public and private relations in life, and our assurances that your determination to urge the establishment of an Independent Treasury, will assure you the enduring affection and support of the Democracy of the Union."

To which Mr. Van Buren replied as follows:—"Gentlemen—You have justly interpreted my feelings in supposing that any personal fatigue or exertion to which I may have been exposed, have been for more than compensated by the generous warmth of my reception by my fellow-citizens; and I cannot forgo the occasion to speak of the great gratification which I have derived during my visit, not only from personal consideration, but also from the evidences which I have seen in every direction of the rapid growth and improvement of the city of New York, and of the prosperity of her citizens. They have my best wishes for a continuation of their success."

"Be assured gentlemen, that I am deeply sensible of obligations to you, and to those whom you represent, and that I shall ever remember them."

The reply of Mr. Van Buren has reference only to the remarks of the chairman of the Committee, when he sympathized with him for the great fatigue he has had to endure, and hopes the respect shown him is a sufficient compensation. Not a single word does Mr. Van Buren say in reply to the remarks of Mr. Jenkins upon the Independent Treasury. No, he remained perfectly silent upon the great and important subject which the Committee through their Chairman intended to draw out an unequivocal expression. He knew perfectly well that the Independent Treasury measure was held in utter contempt by the great majority of the people of this State; and that it would be both unpopular and unwise to commit himself upon that subject. How unlike his illustrious predecessor. Every body can imagine how Gen. Jackson would have answered the committee—and every body can picture to themselves with what decision Old Hickory would have acted on many other important subjects which Mr. Van Buren has evaded or declared.

The President satisfies the people of N. York upon the great question of an Independent Treasury by soft soaping them through the Committee about the rapid growth of the city and great prosperity of her citizens. This is Martin Van Buren to the very life.

The New Orleans Bulletin states that the lessee of a house in Camp-street, who commenced business last winter apparently as a commission merchant, left the city under suspicious circumstances. When the owner broke open the premises, instead of a store filled with goods, he found a gambling establishment, fitted up in a style the like of which is not often to be met with. In the centre of the room was a table, and directly above, in the ceiling, were cut several holes through which wires led down towards the spot where the proprietor is supposed to take his seat. These wires were so arranged that they could be used to convey information as to the kinds of cards of his victim.

We feel sorry that Hyatt has been so deceived in regard to the Daily Advertiser. The poor man is growing quite thin in consequence of his overwhelming difficulties with which he is surrounded.

FRAUD ON THE "DE MERRITT" PLAN.—Between one and two weeks since, Mr. George W. Wilton, of Waterbury, Connecticut, received a letter through the Post Office which contained \$100 in spurious bills, purporting to be issued by the "Mechanics' Exchange Company," New York, and payable at the Bank of St. Albans, Vermont. The bills were dated December 15th, 1839, and signed by J. Roadart, Cashier, and W. K. James, President.

The following is a verbatim copy of the letter: "New-York, June 29th, 1839. "Sir,—I received yours this day and have sent you not you out for in the New Haven Steam Boat enclosed. You wish to now the Lowest price for \$300 inclose me \$27 and I will send you that amount. You had better send soon as they will all be gone for they go like hot cakes and then there will be no more of them "Yours Resp. "M. H. B."

It appears the letter was intended for some other person, and was misdirected, and received by Mr. Wilton, who sent on information to the police of this city, together with one of the bills.

It is needless to say that there is no such banking institution as the "Mechanics Exchange Company" in this city, and the bills are intended to defraud and cheat the public. We believe that these bills were first issued during the suspension of specie payments by De Merritt and others; and hundreds of persons are now employed in different sections of the Union putting these and similar bills in circulation. We advise our country friends to be on the look out for the rogues who are engaged in this business; a few years in the State prison would do them no harm; they would then receive their deserts.—N. Y. Whig

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

The following letter is one of several, that was found in the vault of the "Wetumpka Trading Company" by the Sheriff, when he took possession. We shall give another to-morrow:

Dear Son—I found your esteemed favor of the 11th ult. on my return from Providence, and in answer have to say that I regret that you have used my name in the Wetumpka Trading Company, as it would be better for all of us that I should be entirely disconnected, in as much I may be acquired of in the premises, and also in case of any difficulty it might involve me in a Law suit. I have no idea that you would knowingly bring me into difficulty, but in case of accident, it strikes me that enquiries might be made into the situation of the Stockholders, and who and what they have paid into the concern, and besides I am owing money here, and should it be known that I have an interest directly or indirectly in a concern at the south it would operate very much to my injury, as you know they are a shy people in New England. I am willing to do any thing I can consistently for my children, and their interest lays near my heart, but at my time of life I can't think of embarking in any thing that may in any way lead to difficulty. I have no doubt your Co. is got up in good faith, and if properly managed will do well, but you must be aware you will find many difficulties to encounter in getting a credit established that will be permanent. I wish therefore if you can consistently transfer the stock set to me to some other person you would do it, should you even have occasion to transmit any funds to me for safe keeping, or any other purpose, you may rely on any confidential business confided to me, and should I be enquired of concerning the Co., I should give a favorable account of it as far as I know. On my return from Providence I called on Isaac Champlin-Stonington, he is well, and was very anxious I should go out with him this fall, but it will not be possible for me, he said you wished him to take a concern with you in an Engine and Screw, I have no doubt it would do well, but I suppose you are aware that he is not worth a cent, and he could do nothing towards getting one on a credit. I mention this in confidence to put you on guard, as he is rather an insinuating man. I have a letter from his Son to him, in which he observed that if Trading Co. worked well he should be willing to engage in most any thing, and I found Mr. C. had borrowed of the amount of Bills he had shipped on to you, these things amongst a shrewd calculating people as they are at Stonington, will not help your cause, they have communication all over the States, and it would be well to caution Mr. Champlin about boasting to much, as they all know he nor his Son are very strong, I don't say this to prejudice you against them, for the son I don't know, and the old man and I are friends, but I do it for your benefit, I hope you will not tell them that I have said any thing. During service at the Chatham Chapel, in New York on last Sunday afternoon: a curious circumstance transpired? It was noticed that there was considerable excitement among the ladies. They rose from their seats, and gazed anxiously downwards, as if heaven were below instead of above. The whisper went around, some smiled, some frowned, some blushed, and drew down their veils, and some sobbed. An eye that had no business there was gazing through perforations made in the floor. Two of the male members of the Church, descended and secured this peeping tom, and carried him to the police office where he gave his name as Benjamin Hill. He was a young man about 19 or 20 years of age. The manner in which he effected an entrance beneath the chapel was by picking the cellar door lock. The gentleman procured what funds he wanted from a bank in a neighboring county, came in town and by some means or other about \$200 of this same "Red Dog" fell into hands, and not knowing whether it was safe or not he called for the specie, and strange to tell, they had it NOT. The gentleman waited until they prepared it from one of the "Safety Funds." This person was asked what he intended to do with the funds, he had applied for previously, he stated that he wished to take it west. He was then told he could be accommodated, whether this "saber second thought" was a wish to have their funds circulated, or to buy silence on the subject of having to run out for specie, the deponent saith not.

A curious circumstance transpired at a Factory which was burnt some few years since, in relation to some wool, one of the partners asked another, on the morning subsequent to the fire, if any thing had been saved, he replied there was not, however several stacks of wool was found in the loft of a certain store house a short time after, and identified as some that was in the factory the day previous to the fire. By what ledger-main they were conveyed from one place to the other has never been ascertained.

We have acceded to the wishes of friends and concluded not to suspend our paper not even for a day. We have our office now under new regulations, so there will be necessity for it.

The Lewiston Telegraph says:—When the two hundred women and children were roasting in the Chapel at St. Eustache, the cries of the sufferers in some measure softened the hearts of the soldiers, and they ceased firing at those who were endeavoring to escape from the windows. "Nearer mind their crying," said Sir John Colborne, "kill them and they will not breed rebels!"

A hail storm which visited Baltimore on Thursday last, it appears, also swept through the valley of the Patuxent, and did great injury to the crops. It was extremely violent at the Spring Gardens, and many of the stones were upwards of three inches in circumference, and could be gathered in handfuls from the ground. The windows were battered out of the house of Mr. Bailey, at the foot of Patuxent street, scarcely a whole pane remaining in the house. The storm extended about a mile in width. The extensive and valuable peach orchard of Mr. Crowwell, near Spring Gardens, has been almost entirely destroyed by the hail. This loss is almost irreparable.

At the celebration of the 4th of Columbus, Ohio, the scaffolding gave away, and landed the orator and attendants on the ground, in elegant confusion. Nobody hurt.

FIFTY YEARS AGO.—In these degenerate days it is sometimes useful to review the past, and compare the present with our former state. A friend has handed us a No. of the "New Haven Gazette and Connecticut Magazine," for the year 1837, published by Josiah Meigs, formerly Professor of Mathematics in Yale College, which contains a great many curious reminiscences.—Among others we observe the following:  
"To be Sold.—A healthy, strong, and active Negro Boy, about 11 years of age.—Inquire of the Printer."  
"To be Hanged.—A likely young negro, about 18 years of age. He is hanged for no fault, but for want of employ, and to preserve him from the greater evil of being sold as a slave for life."

REVIEW OF A REGIMENT OF BRITISH TROOPS BY GEN. P. B. PORTER.

In the late War with England Gen. Porter acquired bright and unfading laurels by his patriotism and gallantry. It will be seen by the following article from the Buffalo Journal, that this Veteran has had the appropriate honor of Reviewing a British Regiment, on that spot where, just a quarter of a century ago, he encountered at the head of his Brigade, the legions of Lord Wellington:

Mr. Clay in company with his intimate friend Gen. Porter, crossed over the river yesterday, at the Falls, to witness the parade of the 43d regiment, and were received with all military etiquette by the Colonel and his staff. The Col. very politely invited his distinguished visitors to review the regiment. But though Mr. Secretary Forsyth, a year or two ago, complied with a similar invitation, by reviewing a body of troops at Montreal, Mr. Clay seemed to think, notwithstanding the precedent, that such occupation of arms belonged to the soldier rather than to the statesman; and therefore declined his share of the intended honor in favor of his war worn friend, whose title to the name and honors of a soldier, more than one English regiment has before now had occasion to appreciate and acknowledge; and Gen. Porter took position and reviewed the troops. As the columns passed him in review, his thoughts must have reverted to the times when on this same frontier, and in the very vicinity of the spot where he stood, British columns were displayed before him for far different purposes.

Amid the battles and bloodshed of the Niagara frontier, he little dreamed that in the very neighborhood of Lundy's Lane, and almost on a trampled sward of the battlefield, a British Regiment would honor him and the statesman whose eloquence and labors in the cabinet, co-operated with his own bravery and services in the field, with the peaceful pageant of a gala day review. Henry Clay and Peter B. Porter are entitled to the respect of Englishmen, scarcely less than to the gratitude of Americans; and as long as the splendid Diplomacy at Ghent, of the one, and the bravery on the Niagara frontier, of the other, are remembered, they will enjoy it. In honoring such men, the gallant "Forty Third" honored themselves and the glorious country which they serve, and which is the common mother of us all."

Wetumpka July 4, 1839.

DEAR SIR—Yours directed to Mr. D. Simpson deceased has been attended to, and the papers sent that contained any information relative to the Wetumpka Trading were properly styled Thinking Company. The report of the committee to advertise the trading gang by some manufacture, keeps back issuing as required by the public. Much stir is making, and all must come out—at the next court the Lyon & Welpe will be presented to the Grand Jury for distorting the community—and it is the general opinion they must be given up if in the U. S. to Alabama. I enclose you a sample of their pictures in hopes that you can collect from Lyon as the last letter from Champlin to his father, states South and Lyon got all the cash—Sir I have upwards of \$2,000 of their trash taken in good faith.

And in Jan. 1837, he said Lyon palmed on me a Note for \$500, he was at that time made one of the Pillars of the Church (Deacon,) and having the confidence of the people. So well did he manage it, that I really believe he could have bought the town, on a credit. He purchased a stock of goods of a friend that was indebted to me, giving him this note to turn to me, he Lyon having promised to pay the same to me if the maker did not—the day before he bolted from Wetumpka he promised and appointed the hour next day to take up said note and redeem the Pictures I had on hand, he induced myself and Sons to take the trash till the last—always promising to make us safe—a short time previous to his leaving, he was turned out of the Church in due form. Any other proceedings that occur you will have in the Argus, all must come out. It is the prevailing opinion that some 4 or 5 hundred thousand has been palmed on this community—\$19,000 came from Florida a few days since, expecting to be paid by the Trustee. The Sheriff sold said property pledged for the redemption of their notes, except the 4 sections of land—unfortunately for us creditors, 3 sections belongs to Uncle Sam, and I never was known in this world. If York State will protect such scamps, she must have changed. 20 years ago they would not be allowed to stay in Monroe Co. These would be Bankers, must have been schooled upon the Silver Lake or Katchewan principle.

Sir, it would take 10 sheets to describe the unhappy results occasioned by this Company—they offered any price for all kinds of property, and those that sold are ruined. You can judge the results—hand them to this community and she will save them from committing the like again.

Lyon, bolted from the Sheriff or deputy, that will rain him; I am to get the particulars from him.

Next we find Old Champlin holding deeds of property belonging to his Son—and he to evade these letters, deeds the same to a Son-in-law, Win. Balden, who presumes he will hold the same, he arrived at the breaking up of the gang, having large claims against Champlin, at least \$600 belonging to his wife. Good for a Clock pedler, and merely imported at that. I expect the clock factories in Conn. could cause a true use of them, time will tell the tale. A few of your papers circulated in Stonington would be an act of justice.

I send you two papers by the mail. I will attend to any communication promptly that you may have, and shall be pleased to hear how the Lyons and Company progress in private life. I shall do me the pleasure of calling on you this fall. The wood cuts about to issue at Rochester are a ready jule bare. I shall be pleased to hear from you at any time. South Hadley should be presented with a Rochester paper or two. I sent to the P. M. of that place and Stouington enclosed 5 pictures that cost me \$35—the go under the name that these rogues ought to be brought to (general issue.) The Sheriff not arriving, he being 32 miles from this, I concluded not to wait

longer. My name better be kept quiet a while—describe any information you want, it shall be sent in due form of law.

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

The present position of the three rival candidates for the Presidency is characteristic. Mr. Van Buren is making a royal progress through the eastern counties, shaking hands with the office holders and their dependants, and stimulating them to increased exertions to carry the State at the next election. Mr. Clay, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the United States, is traversing the western part of the State for the purpose of hoodwinking the Anti-Masons, conciliating the abolitionists, and sparring on the masonic brotherhood to effect his nomination at the whig National Convention. General Scott is among the Winnebago Indians endeavoring to quell the warlike spirit of that tribe, and to preserve peace on our north western frontier. And thus has it always been. Whilst our miserable tribe of wire pulling, intriguing, speechifying politicians have been employed in furthering their own selfish views, the gallant Hero of Chippewa has been engaged in the service of his country. Who ever heard of Winfield Scott making political speeches or electioneering tours? His speeches are at the cannon's mouth to the enemies of his country—his tours are those of duty in the public service. Will Republics always prove ungrateful?

Among others who called to make the acquaintance of the Hon. Henry Clay, was our friend J. FATAL RECORD.—On Saturday afternoon last, an individual by the name of Green B. Mueslow was shot in the street, opposite to Mr. Huson's Hotel, by Mr. John L. Ragsdale, and died in a few minutes afterwards. Mr. Ragsdale immediately delivered himself up to the Justices of the Inferior Court who, after hearing testimony in the case, bound him over to appear at Court in a bond of one thousand dollars, and two securities for the like amount. A Coroner's inquest was held over the body of the deceased on Sunday morning which returned a verdict in effect "that the deceased was killed by the discharge of a double barreled gun, by John L. Ragsdale in self defence."—N. O. Courier.

He informs us that on Wednesday afternoon, when off Nahant, he and all his officers and crew had a fair view of the Sea Serpent. The appearance of this marine monster was such as has been often before described. The Serpent was only about twice the length of the vessel distant from them. After remaining in sight a few minutes, he sunk down into the water and disappeared.—Boston Gaz.

EXTRAORDINARY HOMICIDE.—We copy the following from the Crawfordville (Ga.) Examiner of the 4th inst. The events of which it speaks, are most extraordinary even in these days of strange things:

An unfortunate occurrence took place in Brown Township, in this county, a few days since, which resulted in the death of a human being, the circumstances of which have been detailed to us as follows:—A man named Moses Rush was married to Miss Jane Rush about three weeks ago, and upon the first night of their marriage the husband endeavored to choke the wife to death. She, however, contrived to prevent it, and they lived together about two weeks in a very unhappy manner—Rush beating her upon all occasions. At the time the act was committed Rush informed his wife that he had already killed two wives and one man for his money, and that he intended to kill her, and beat her most unmercifully.

She begged him not to kill her till next morning. He then told her he would wait awhile and take a sleep, and accordingly took his axe, and placing it under his arm, lay down crossways in the door to prevent her escape, assuring her that when he awoke he would execute his fiendish purpose. He fell asleep, and his wife fearing that her destruction would be inevitable if he awoke, seized the axe and despatched him by inflicting a mortal wound on his head with it. She gave herself up to a Justice of the Peace, who had her sent to prison. She was taken out, however, on a habeas corpus, and tried before his honor, Judge Naylor, who, from the insufficiency of the testimony, ordered her discharge.

Public opinion is in her favor, and justifies the act on the ground that it was committed in self defence. He was about eighty years of age, she about thirty.

We understand that the house of John Wiley, 2d. Eq. of this town, was struck by lightning on Wednesday of last week, about one o'clock at night. It struck the chimney making two holes in the chimney, and splitting the same ten feet down—it followed the rafter from the chimney to the chamber floor, splitting several boards into splinters and tearing the plastering and lathing very much—thence down the partition to the kitchen hearth, splitting the freestone under the stove into a thousand pieces. It also followed a tin eaves spout to both corners of the house and thence to the ground. There were eleven persons in the family at the time, all in bed in different parts of the house; and strange to say, no one was injured.—Two boys were in bed two feet from the boards that were split, and one of them said he heard a noise but was not much disturbed by it.

A barn near this village was struck—very little injured.

The lightning struck upon Fall mountain, opposite this place, loosening a large mass of the ledge, which afterwards came down the mountain with a tremendous noise, carrying trees and every thing before it for several rods, till stopped by an opposing ledge.

After all the matter prepared for to days paper was in type, it was announced that the Great Western was in the Quarantine, the weather being so foggy that she was not perceived from the telegraph, until she was close in upon us.

By this arrival we have received files of papers London and Liverpool to the 4th, and Bristol to the 6th of July. Our previous advices were London to the 13th and Liverpool to the 14th of June. The news is consequently twenty two days late. [Correspondence of the Commercial Advertiser.]

RELEASE OF THE CANADIAN PRISONERS.

It affords me great pleasure to inform you that the government have determined to release Mr. John G. Parker, and the seven other Canadian prisoners who pleaded guilty to the charge preferred against them in Upper Canada, in the hope of receiving her Majesty's pardon. My opinion is, that the order for their release will be issued this day.

Lord John Russell sent to them on Monday, demanding whether they would enter into security not to re-enter the province of Upper Canada, or to approach near its borders, provided the government release them. Yesterday the prisoner, returned an answer, which I read in manuscript. They say, that having no desire to enter Upper Canada, they are willing to enter into the required bonds, but ask to be permitted to enter the province at any future period, provided either of them can obtain the permission of the colonial government to do so.

I was sometime in Newgate with Mr. Parker, I never saw him look better. He appears deeply sensible of the kind attention shown to him by many who have taken an interest in the welfare of himself and his companions.

As she was loaded with cotton and molasses, the destructive element soon got such a hold on the cargo as to bid defiance to all the skill and courage of the crew, as well as the intrepidity of the Brooklyn boys. The latter, however, finding that they could not save the vessel from destruction, got up a row among themselves, and to such a height had the disturbance got at one time, that the Mayor and all the civil force of the city were obliged to go down and subdue the pugnaity of the fire boys. We believe that no other mischief occurred from the row except a few broken heads; but the vessel, we regret to say, will prove a total loss.

Her cargo consisted of 4,000 bushels corn, 45 hales cotton, 32 tierces molasses, 14 hhd. of tobacco, and a few packages of merchandise. The engines did not reach the ship for half an hour after the fire broke out. The firemen worked bravely till half past six o'clock, when the Mayor—not a very wise one—came and order them not to throw any more water on the fire, in consequence of the bit of riot above mentioned. This wise and sensible mandate on the part of the worthy Mayor of Brooklyn, lost the ship and cargo, valued at \$5,000. Had the engines been permitted to throw on water for half an hour longer than they did, the ship would have been saved. The firemen were anxious to put out the fire, but the Mayor said the "engines were out of order, and if they were worked much longer, the city of Brooklyn, of course, would be obliged to have them repaired!"

There were six persons on board when the fire broke out, who barely escaped with their lives.—Captain Brown only saved his chronometer, and his wife lost every thing, escaping from the ship with only her night clothes. The ship was valued at \$25,000, and was insured in Boston for \$17,000. She was owned by Mr. Philo Shelton, of Boston. Her cargo was worth about \$10,000. The principal part of her original cargo had been discharged previous of the fire.—*Herald.*

UNFORTUNATE ACCIDENT.—On Monday morning Mr. Stout's statue of Queen Victoria was removed from the Etayvesant Institute, N. York, and conveyed to the schooner Benjamin Bigelow, to be taken to Boston for exhibition. While the hands were hoisting the statue on board, the tackle gave way and it fell into the hold, and was so broken as to be a total loss. The statue was valued at \$3,000; and will prove a heavy loss to the young artist.

A man who called his name John Adams, was executed at Charleston, S. C., on the 5th inst. for the crime of murder. In consequence of the respectability of his relatives he refused to give his real name.

*Misadventure.*—On Saturday the 20th inst. Mr. Charles Sprang, a substantial farmer in Schoharie, was engaged in the machinery of a saw mill, and was killed almost instantaneously. We regret to learn that a wife and large family are left to deplore his sudden death.—*Daily Ad.*

STEAM VE SAIL SHIP IN A SQUALL.—The Wilmington Advertiser gives the following fact to show the superiority of steam over sail ships in a squall. The brig *Victress*, bound out from this Port, had crossed the bar at the mouth of the Cape Fear River, about four hours, when she was struck by a squall which carried away both masts, and did such further damage as to make it necessary to put her on immediately. Capt. Nicholas states that when the squall struck the *Victress*, there was a schooner and the steamboat *Vanderbilt* in sight, but that after it was over, he only saw the *Vanderbilt* (with her head to the wind), the schooner having entirely disappeared. Here, then, is an instance of a steamboat weathering without injury, a torado which snapped the spars and rigging of a sail ship like pack thread.

FOR PRESIDENT

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

The General (Scott), whose star seems in the ascendant in this region, would fear of success, even should he gain the high nomination since he has not the confidence of the Democracy. While the present incumbent shares it to the highest degree.—Advertiser.

This is a beautiful illustration of the accuracy and truth contained in the editorial writings of the Daily Advertiser. It is true so far as the General's prospects being in the ascendancy in this region, as they are in all other sections of this vast Republic, and the time is not far distant when the people (aside from the office holders and the designing demagogues) will individually and collectively elect Scott "thou art the man."

Where is the truth of the assertion that Winfield Scott has not the confidence of the Democracy? If Democracy means the people then he possesses it in a pre-eminent degree, above the present incumbent. But if it only means the office holders and their dependants, then he has it not, for they would not have confidence in any man, not even an angel from heaven. So long as their salary was paid regular every quarter. A few questions Mr. Advertiser, and if you can't answer them wait a bit and let the people do it. When did Gen. Scott ever betray the confidence of the Democracy? Did he betray them at Chippewa, and Landy's Lane, in the settlement of the Indian difficulties, in restoring peace and harmony on our frontier, or did he betray their confidence by amicably adjusting the North Eastern Boundary difficulties, and thereby preventing our country from being divided in two? If he has not betrayed their confidence in all this, then we will on you as the conductor of the public press, and in the name of sacred truth to direct us on a single instance during the public career of this great and good man, where in he has not been worthy of the most unbounded confidence of a free people.

Now for the other side of this picture. Does Martin Van Buren possess the confidence of the people in the highest degree? Was his conduct calculated to gain the confidence of the people when he continued to obtain an illegal appointment to a foreign court, and thereby augmenting the public expenditure by his audit and infit? Was the course he pursued when he was elected Governor of this State calculated to increase the confidence of the people in him, was it evidence of a trusty servant of the people for him after he had been elected Governor to betray that trust and leave the Government in the hands of a rascal? Did his recommendations and exertions to augment the number of exclusive privileges increase the confidence of the people in him, when he knew they were opposed to such measures, and finally was the course that he pursued in appointing Smith Collector of the Port of Genesee, calculated to inspire the confidence of the people in the highest degree in his favor. If they were then, he has the highest degree of the people's confidence. If they were not so calculated and have not had that effect, then what you have asserted is false, and you are guilty of attempting to deceive the community, for the sake of manufacturing political capital, for which offence you and your party will soon have to appear before the Bar of Justice—when the people will be the judges of the degree of confidence they possess in either individual.

The ladies know not half the interest we take in their welfare. A few days since we suggested the propriety of a delivery at the post office exclusively for ladies, the thing was no sooner said than done. The ladies delivery is now open, at which our polite friend, Ameson, is to be found ready to supply, as far as lies in his power, the wants of his fair customers. This arrangement is much better than the old plan of crowding ladies and gentlemen together at our delivery. We begin to think we shall be able to effect a revolution in the post office after all.

The Albany Argus of last Friday occupies nearly two columns in giving the details of His Majesty's reception at Albany. It reminds us of the accounts we have frequently seen in the European papers of the "Royal progress" of some crowned head in the old world. The immense procession, military display, firing of cannon, shouts of the multitude &c. &c. are in strict accordance with European etiquette. When Jefferson and Madison passed through the country, they used to travel like other citizens without ostentation or display. But then, Jefferson and Madison were plain Democrats—they practised what they professed, and set the people an example of Republican simplicity. Our democratic President, has been taught in a different school. He has the complete control of the public Money—the Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy—and through the efforts of his troops of office holders feels secure in his plans for a re-election. He is to all intents and purposes a Monarch and why should he not be treated as such? FOR PRESIDENT

GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT.

THE INDEPENDENT TREASURY.

We have said that Gen. Scott, the Democratic and People's candidate for the Presidency, is in favor of an Independent Treasury. This announcement has thrown the servile followers of the Executive into a panic. They know that the People have lost all confidence in the Banks as depositories of the public money, and they also know that the whigs are doomed to defeat for opposing the cause of the Banks. Hence their anxiety to claim for Van Buren an exclusive friendship for an Independent Treasury. But a truly Independent Treasury, which shall be under the control of the people's representatives in Congress, is as different from Van Buren's sub-treasury scheme, as it is from the 50-million bank plan of Mr. Clay, or the pet Bank plan of granny Rachel, of the Enquirer, Mr. Van Buren's great champion in Virginia. The President's famous sub-treasury plan contemplates leaving the public money in deposit with the thousands of speculating Revenue officers, alien Post Masters, villainous land office Receivers, and other executive departments that cover the land like the locusts of Egypt. These sub-treasurers are all mere creatures of the President, are appointed to office by him, electioneers for him, and do his bidding as implicitly as the Barbans and Pachas appointed by the Grand Turk. This is the system Van Buren is endeavoring to fasten upon the country; a system that embraces every feature constituting a despotism. The Federal Administration at Washington intend to await themselves of the known hostility of the People to the Banks, to establish under the name of an Independent Treasury, a perfect system of tyranny and usurpation. Will the People be cheated in this way? Will they consent to place in the hands of the President, powers which should be wielded only by an absolute monarch over a nation of slaves? We think not. Mr. Clay is for giving the control of the public money to a Mammoth Bank, with a capital of 50 millions. This plan we do not believe the people will ever subscribe to. The pet Bank plan is advocated by the Van Buren party in Virginia, and by the whig leaders in the city of New York. But the real democratic plan of an Independent Treasury is advocated by no Presidential candidate excepting Gen. Scott. We can now only give the outlines of the plan, and must omit details till another time. The cardinal principle of Democracy is that "all power emanates from the people." The public money raised by indirect taxes on the people—it is their money, raised for public purposes, and should be controlled alone by them through their representatives in Congress. The Banks have no business with the people's money to speculate and share with—the officer holders have no business to run off with it, like Price and Svertwout, or use it to corrupt the elective franchise as it is now used by Van Buren's sub-treasurers. The string of the public purse should be held only by Congress, and the Treasurer should be appointed by the House of Representatives. To rescue the public money from Bank control, the People rallied around the Hero of New Orleans—to rescue the public money from Executive control, the People will also rally around the Hero of Chippewa. The complete control of the people's money by their representatives in Congress assembled, free from Bank or Executive influence, is the only real and truly INDEPENDENT TREASURY SYSTEM. This is the system advocated by GEN. WINFIELD SCOTT. How do you like it?

STATE PRISON INVESTIGATION.—The investigation of the affairs of the Mount Pleasant State Prison, before the Senatorial Committee will be proceeded in at Auburn, on the 8th of August. The investigation is to be open to the public, and all who are disposed to do so can attend.

Capt. Parsons, of the schr. Mary Jane of New York, committed suicide at Rio Janeiro on the 23d May, by blowing his brains out with a pistol.

A few days since we had a conversation with a gentleman from Westport, who gives a faithful picture of the state of things since the explosion of the Trading Co. He says that the community were not rich before this swindling shop was opened; but now hundreds are plunged into ruin.

Those in business who had purchased goods in New York and Philadelphia sold them to those robbers who immediately shipped them to New York, and some to Rochester, the proceeds of which, in buying stocks, and wheat, building houses, adding wings to those already built, investing it in mortgages &c. &c. Yet these swindlers walk forth unblushing into our very streets.

A club has been organized for some length of time in this city, called the "Lazy Club," consisting of a President, Secretary, &c. The rules which are very rigid and strictly adhered to. On Monday however one of the members was detected in the flagrant act of laying two bricks into a hole in the sidewalk, he was immediately arrested, tried, and convicted after which he was sentenced to be kicked for a half hour by butterflies. Sentence will be put into execution this morning. Another is suspected of having stopped to talk in the street without leaning against a post. We shall report the trials at length for the future.

ARRIVAL OF THE BRITISH QUEEN.—This vessel arrived at Sandy Hook at 8 o'clock Sunday morning. She left London on the 11th and Portsmouth on the 12th inst.

There is nothing in the news from England to change very materially the aspect of affairs in the money market.

The prices in the stock market had rallied slightly, but showed a good deal of fluctuation.

The cotton market continues dull, and the demand very limited.

Arrest of the persons engaged in the bloody riots at Manchester, were still being made, and the city continued in a very unsettled state.

A great riot broke out at Ramsgate on the 8th inst. in consequence of the conviction of several fishermen for hawking fish about the street.

The remains of the Lady Flora Hastings were conveyed to Scotland, the last resting place of her Ladyship's maternal ancestors. At the request of her father a post mortem examination of her body was made, the result of which put to rest forever all doubts as to her innocence of the scandal which have been attached to her.

FRANCE.

The trial of the insurgents of the 12th and 13th of May, was progressing on the 8th inst.—which was the 12th day of the trials.

It is presumed from the number of insurgents yet to be tried, that the affair will not be concluded before the end of the year.

EGYPT.

The Turks and the Egyptians are fighting like devils. A Tartar arrived at Constantinople with despatches containing an account of an engagement between the advanced guard of the Turkish Army and the Egyptian cavalry, in which the latter were repulsed with great loss.

Mr. Uptonwood.—Our worst fears are realized in regard to this gentleman. We were informed, and we thought credibly, that he intended to alter his course of life, and be once more taken within the pale of society. But alas! we encountered him at the Museum a few evenings since, and we are now perfectly convinced that he is beyond reclaiming.

The Clerk of Centre Market has presented us with two ears of corn, the first in market this season.

They are from the farm of Mr. Hane, in the town of Macedon, Wayne Co.

The bridge has become a splendid race course for the hacks. A trial of speed comes off almost every evening. Those fond of the turf will do well to attend.

THE SAILOR'S FEDERAL.—Remind the young sailor, that in a fray on Thursday night was on Sunday morning, injured by his shipmate. Between two and three hundred of the late crew of the North Carolina, uniformly and neatly dressed, walked in the procession. They all wore blue roundabouts, white trousers and pumps, shirts with blue collars turned down, and tarpaolin hats. The body covered with the Union Jack, was carried on a bier, preceded by a tar carrying the American flag.
