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Sheet of Ice Covers Most Northeast U.S.

Windor Locks, Jan. 6 (AP)—The U.S. Weather Bureau's freezing rain warning: "Freezing rain is occurring in much of the interior of Connecticut and in the Springfield area while ordinary rain is falling at some coastal points. Very hazard- ous travel conditions are occurring especially inland.

Temperatures will rise a little this afternoon and freezing will probably end in most sections. Rain will return toward nightfall with tempera- tures probably above the critical point.

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Storms hurried snow, sleet and freezing rain at a broad area in the North today and lashed sections of the South with drenching rain and destructive winds.

A storm hit two rural areas near Jeffersonville, Ga., early in the day, toppling trees and cutting power and causing a 2-hour up- surge that reached from Texas to New England.

Freezing rain formed an ice blanket on much of the northeast- ern quarter of the nation, storm- ing travel and causing casualties.

Much of upstate New York re- ceived a heavy snowfall. Scores of highway accidents, many involving two or more cars, were reported. Three tractor- trailers jammed on a hill near Uxton, N.Y., causing a 2-hour up- surge that reached from Texas to New England.

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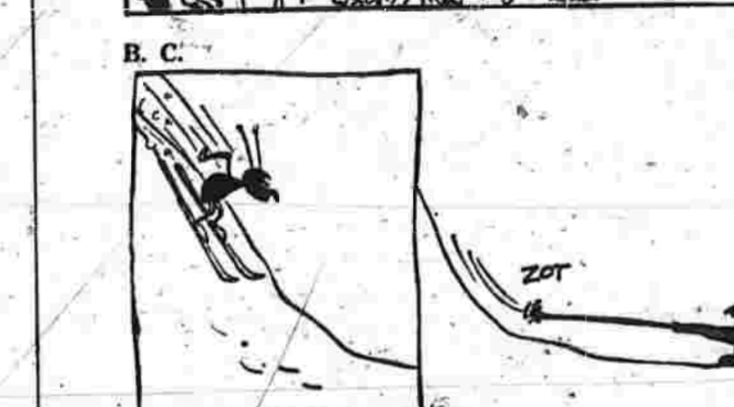
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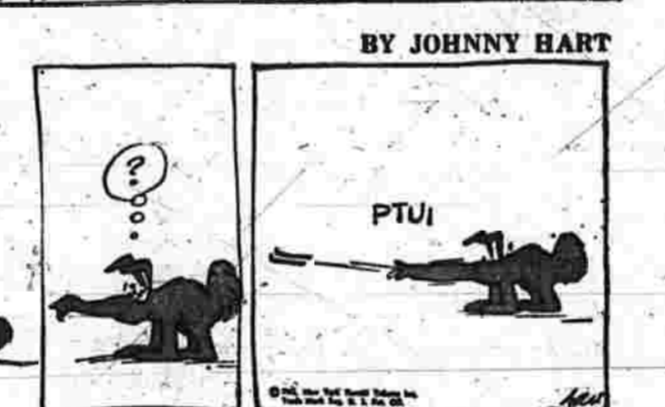
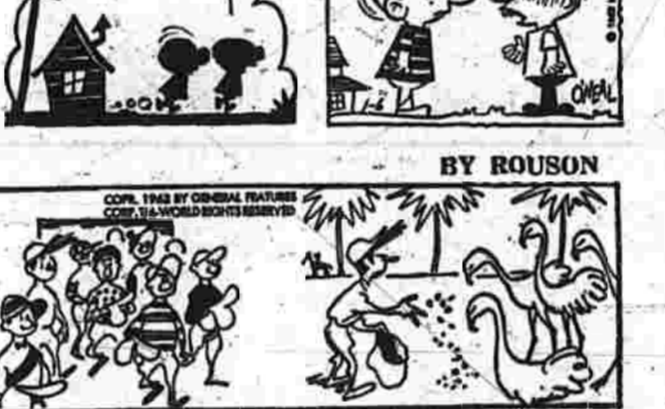

Hollywood-TV has brought back a true picture of the old west, according to Jack Kelley, who stars in Warner Bros. "Maverick" series.

Jack is proud of the authenticity incorporated in the scripts, and strives to make the character he plays, Bart Maverick, as genuine as possible.

"For the most part, motion pictures come about as close to the actual west of frontier times as a modern dude ranch," says Jack. "Glamour replaces the grim reality that really existed."

Kelley, whose next "Maverick" airing is "Poker Face" on Sunday, Jan. 7, over the ABC-TV network, points out that the tendency to "retro" about and otherwise make the west immaculate goes back a long way in films.

"G. M. Anderson created Broncho Billy, the first western hero in the old Flannery films," Kelley went on. "I've heard he was born in Brooklyn and I know the pictures were shot in Chicago. Anderson introduced the fad of wearing sheepskin chaps as a cowboy because they looked attractive. Actually, they were worn not by cowboys, but by cowmen who were ranchers and didn't spend much time in the saddle."

According to Kelley such stars of western movies as Harry Carey, Buck Jones and Art Acord followed this fake tradition, Bill Hart, an erstwhile Shakespearean actor, started out the same way, but later made an effort to dress more authentically.

"When Tom Mix came along he introduced the wing chaps of tanned hide, decorated with metal studs. Other actors elaborated on the ornamentation and the followers of the style enlarged it to musical comical proportions," he continued. "When Helt hit the studs, the boys sparked like a hard-hit anvil."

The real blow to western reality occurred when sound arrived in Hollywood, and the singing cowboy came in to vogue. Gene Au-

TV Notebook

New York — (NEA) — In almost everything, from politics to mixing martinis, there is a middle ground between two extremes. Ely Landau thinks the middle ground in television and movies has not yet been exploited.

Landau was, for many years one of the most successful innovators in television. As the head of National Telefilm Associates and that organization's station in the New York area, WNTA, Landau brought TV such tradition-shattering shows as the Mike Wallace Interview and The Play of the Week.

Some time ago, Landau sold out his interests in both and has subsequently turned movie producer. His first effort is the movie version of the great Eugene O'Neill play, "Long Day's Journey Into Night." This was shot in and around New York — for an incredibly low \$400,000 — with a cast headed by Katherine Hepburn, Sir Ralph Richardson, Jason Robards Jr. and Dean Stockwell. It will be released in the spring.

Landau's expressed intention with this and the several other projects he plans for the future is deceptively simple.

"I want to do high quality, low

budget films," he says, "to fill the gap between the art theaters and the big commercial theaters."

Landau believes that only rarely does a picture come along which aims at that gap. He thinks the majority of films are intended either for the vast audience who like spectacles and Jerry Lewis and Sandra Dee, or for the arty crowd who think that French and Italian films are the ultimate.

There is, he believes, a huge horde of people who are in between these extremes, people who wouldn't go to a Jerry Lewis or Sandra Dee film on a bet, and who often find the Europeans too arty to take. It is this mass of people, by and large ignored by movie makers, he intends to appeal to.

"The same middle ground exists on television, too," Landau says. "My own program, The Play of the Week, was one extreme. The regular filmed shows are at the other end. Very few television programs try to fill the gap between them."

Landau also feels there is a middle ground between the position of the networks: that "TV is just fine, thank you" and that of FCC Chairman Newton Minow with his "vast wasteland" theory. "They're both wrong," Landau says. "You can't make generalizations like that. Television is far from perfect, but it isn't all black, either."

Landau says he thinks one thing which would help TV immeasurably
