MINN. WANTS ED. FULLER

FISH CULTURIST AT NORTHVILLE OFFERED BETTER JOB.

Ovation for Supt. Clark's Paper on Federal Control of Lakes.

Supt. Frank N. Clark and Fish Culturist Ed. Fuller of the Northville U. S. Fish station, arrived home from Washington last week where they had been attending the annual meeting of the American Fisheries Society. Mr. Clark's paper on the "Federal Control of the Great Lakes" received a regular ovation and it was the topic of discussion for a whole day and even then some more.

Ed. Fuller's exhibit of seven apparatuses in the fish culture work created considerable interest. In fact it was about the leading exhibit. The commissioner from Minnesota was so much interested in Fuller and his knowledge of fish culture work that he then and there offered him a salary of \$1,200 a year to go over to his state and take charge of a station. Fuller is now considering the offer and may accept it.

Seymour Bowers of Detroit, Superintendent of Michigan State hatcheries, was elected vice president of the society and next year will be in line for the honor of presidency.

Supt. Clark pronounced the Washington meeting as one of the most interesting ones ever held.

D. U. R. Freight Service to Plymouth.

Officials of the Detroit United Lines have brought the Plymouth and Northville division right up to date by the establishment of an express and freight service which began operation Tuesday morning.

HAVE BO'T YPSI MILLS

WILL H. YERKES TO MOVE BACK FROM OHIO.

He and Jack Trufant to Operate Duebell Flour Plant.

The many Northville friends of Mr. and Mrs. Will H. Yerkes will be glad to know they are to move back to Michigan from Seville, Ohio, where Will has been operating a flouring mill for some four or five years past. A \$15,000 stock company has been organized at Ypsilanti and the big Duebell flouring mills purchased. Will Yerkes and Jack Trufant take practically all the stock except about 300 shares of preferred which has been taken by the merchants of Ypsilanti. Yerkes will be the secretary and treasurer of the new company, Mr. Trufant, the president and Don P. Yerkes vice-president.

Mr. Trufant has been one of the head men in the Yerkes mills here for some years past and has demonstrated his ability as a miller and business man. He will move to Ypsilanti within a very short time to take hold of the work and improvements there.

W. H. will move from Seville as soon as he can arrange for the change in his property at that place.

Ypsilanti people have certainly made no mistake in offering inducements to Messrs. Yerkes and Trufant to take hold of the Duebell mill. The Yerkes brothers have been in the milling business for years and years and they have made it a great success. Their flour has gone into all parts of the United States and has no superior. The name of Yerkes is a household word in this part of the state and it stands for much, both in business and social walk of life. The people of that city are to be congratulated upon the acquisition of those gentlemen to their business circles and they and their families to the social life of the Normal town.

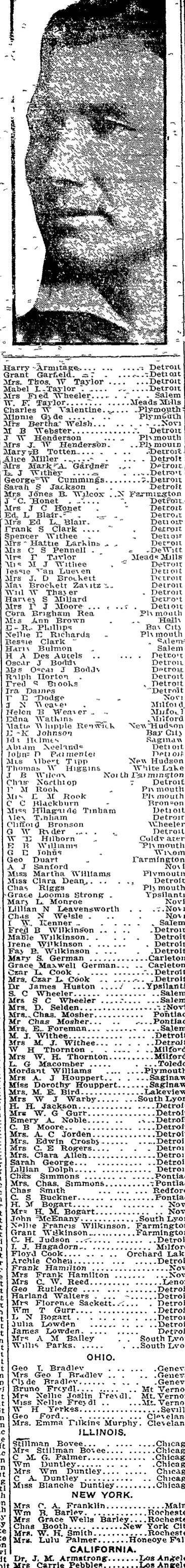

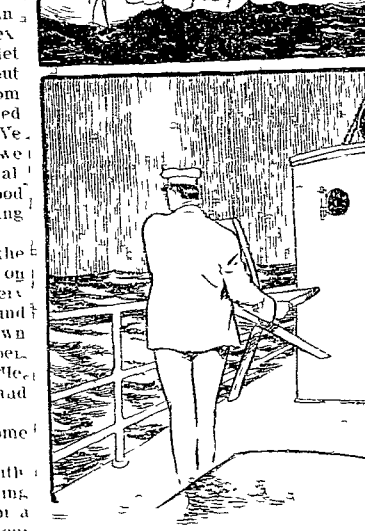

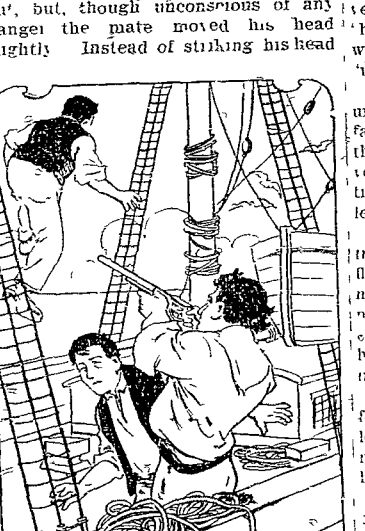
