## SALES IN '77 EXCEED \$4,000

Sales Manager Ivan Ley reports that during the last half of 1977, the Sales Department sold Perfins to the value of $\$ 2082.16$.

Of this total, $\$ 1221.60$ was from $A, B$, and C rated Perfins mounted in books, $\$ 363.38$ was from E and D rated Perfins and \$497.17 was from foreign Perfins.

Commission on the sales was $\$ 487.75$; expenses were $\$ 182.66$; turned over to the treasurer, J. A. Gooding, $\$ 305.09$.

85 different members received Perfins from the Sales Department.

For the entire year of 1977 , sales amounted to $\$ 4063.74$, including $\$ 2854.01$ in U.S. and $\$ 1209.73$ in foreign. Net commission to the Club for the year was $\$ 505.66$.

Ley reports that he has sent Auction Chairman Gooding over 900 items from the Bartleson collection to be entered in special auctions, and that he has mounted many C-rated Perfins in books to be sent out to customers of the Sales Department. $D$ and E rated Perfins will be sent out to customers in envelopes.

## SPECIAL AUCTIONS PLANNED

Auction Chairman Jack Gooding announces that there probably will be three separate auctions to dispose of the Perfins collection left to the Club by the late Al Bartleson. The first auction is expected to be held very shortly, and lively bidding competition is expected for the many $A$ and $B$ rated U.S. Perfins winich will be included.

## 'POKO' CATALOG AVAILABLE

Laurence Rehm (\#808) advises that the revised edition of Burt Bauder's "POKO Perfins of the Netherlands" is now out of print; all copies of this printing having been sold.

Rehm states, however, that due to the fact that this book has become the standard reference work on these issues, and that orders are still being received, a quantity of the original edition has been assembled, to which has been added a four-pageappendix which effectively brings it up equal in every respect to the revised edition.

Earliestreported usage of a Perfin inthe Faroe Islands is that of D.D.P.A. used at Thorshavn from 1928 to 1935 (Bergman, 1977). The Perfin represents Det Danske Petroleum A/S (The DanishPetroleum Co., Ltd.) and was used by their agent, Valdemar Liutzen A/S. After 1935 the V.L. Perfin of the agent was was used instead of D.D.P.A.

The V.L. Perfin appears to be the same as that illustrated by Bergman ( $\mathrm{n}_{\mathrm{o}} \mathrm{d}_{0}$ ) and recently reported by Baker (1976). However, perforations shown by Bergman ( $\mathrm{n} . \mathrm{d}_{0}$ ) measure 0.5 mm and those illustrated by Baker measure 0.75 mm . The Danish stamps on which the Perfins D.D.P.A. and V.L. (perforation 0.5 mm ) occurred were not listed (Bergman, n.d.; 1977).

Bergman (1977) also mentioned that he had seen the V.L. (no information on perforation diameter) Perfin used in 1944 on the first issue Barnahjalpin (children's welfare) seal on cover.

Danam Stamp Co. (1976a,b) offered for auction two Faroese Perfin lots (Nos. 818 and 819) accompanied by photos. Lot No. 818 consisted of Denmark Scott No. 274 (two copies), No. 224 (two copies), and No. 192 (one copy). Lot No. 819 consisted of No. 274 (seven copies) and No. 224 (one copy). Both lots were on piece with stamps tied by Thorshavn postmarks 12.12 .40 and 4.11 .40 respectively. Danam (1976) again offered for auction one Faroese Perfin lot (No. 599) with accompanying photo. Lot No. 599 consisted of three copies of Denmark Scott No. 274 tied to piece by a Thorshavn postmark 11.12.40.

All stamps in each lot had the V.L. Perfin which is identical to that reported by Baker (1976), even to the diameter of the perforations. Since only part of the covers were present, it can be assumed that these Perfins were used by Valdemar Lîtzen $\mathrm{A} / \mathrm{S}$ with the date of usage corresponding closely to those reported by Bergman (1977).

This does extend the documented usage of the V.L. perforation back to 4 November 1940 and its use on three Danish stamps. Scott No. 274 was surcharged for use only in the Faroe Islands and Van Lint, Van Lint, and Enschede (1956) does not list the Perfin. Therefore, a catalog listing of Faroese Perfins is presented in Figure 1.

## ARGENTINE AND COLOMBIAN FOLLOW-UP

As any philatelic writer should know, what he puts in print at one point in time may come back to haunt him later. Dr. Walter B. L. Bose, in the November-December issue of the Bulletin, set the record straight on the INUTILIZADO Perfin of Argentina - more correctly, that it was not a Perfin in the accepted sense, but a cancellation. As a researcher and cataloguer, I am very grateful for the correction, and only wish that my Spanish was good enough tohave translated a reference more correctly. To Dr. Bose - GRACIAS.

Since the article on Colombia Perfins appeared (October 1977), further information has been surfaced. Our Cover Sales Manager, Edwin Stuntzner, was kind enough to send me some Latin America covers, and one provided the positive identity of the CRT pattern as having been used by CAMACHO, ROLDAN AND TAMAYO of Bogota. Many thanks, Ed.
The ANULADA pattern described but not illustrated, the onewith 9 mm letters, is shown in the accompanying illustration. This was provided by Dr. Harvey Tilles. The item appears to be on revenue paper, but I have quite a few partials on stamps in my collection. I still believe the ANULADA was a cancel of some sort, and also that the complete word on one stamp is unlikely.


Members who are doing research into any area of Perfins--or who are just looking for some basic information--should start first with the Library List. If you're a new member, you received a copy of the list from me when you joined. If you were a member in December 1976, you received a copy of the list with the November/December 1976 Bulletin.

The Library is stuffed with all sorts of good information, but it sometimes takes a little looking to ferret out what you need. Start with the list and select files or books that are of interest to you. Sometimes the material you start with will give you some clues about where to look for more information.

Finally, the BAYER pattern listed as having been seen in the Van Iint collection in the Smithsonian, but with no other amplifying data, is now known to measure 8.75 9.0 mm in height and not 12 mm . Dr. Tilles again provided this writer with a partial photo of the word. I would like to ask that if anyone has partials of this Perfin, I would appreciate a photo or loan of a copy to photograph so that a complete illustration can be made. Any assistance would be greatly appreciated. Write to me at Box 5691, Virginia Beach, VA 23455.

While on the subject of asking for assistance, if you have any information on any of the countries of Ilatin and South American Perfins, such as idents or new patterns, then let me hear from you. There exists now almost enough information to consider seriously producing a catalog of I\&SA, and every additional amount of information would be most welcome.

## EDITOR'S CORNER

In connection with the census of Perfins on the 1902-03 issue, one member inquires as to what are the earliest and latest U.S. stamps on which Perfins are known. The editor thinks it is safe to say the answer to the latest is that current U. S. issues are being Perfinned as they come out. Who can provide information as to the earliest?

Another member, responding to the census, suggests that we conduct a similar census on the Kansas and Nebraska overprints. If the editor receives enough response from other membersin support of a Kansas-Nebraska census, it will be undertaken.

The editor has on hand several articles of some length that he simply has not found time to re-type and preparefor publication. If one of them is yours, please be patient. It probably will appear in the Bulletin in the near future.

In the meantime, additional articles for the stockpile will be most welcome.

Perfin covers for possible use as Perfin Cover of the Month also will be welcome, but please keep in mind that the cover needs to have some unusual, distinguishing or especially attractive feature about it. Just plain run-of-the-mill Perfin covers don't hold much appeal for our readers in thisrespect. If they did, the editor has enough in his own collection to furnisha Perfin Cover of the Month for many years to come.

## RESULTS OF NEW CENSUS: PERFINS ON 1902-03 ISSUE - by Ray Crow

Listed below are the results of the recent census of Perfins on the U. S. issues of 1902-03. The bulk of the credit for this census must go to William Corliss, who conducted the original census published in the January, February and March 1973 issues of the Bulletin. When your editor suggested a census in the Bulletin last year, several members were quick to write and point out thatMr. Corliss had conducted such a census just four years earlier - a fact which your editor had overlooked. However, response to the new census was good and substantial new listings have been added to the data published in 1973 - making the new census worth while.

To set the stage for the census findings given below, it may be well to repeat some of the comments with which Mr. Corliss prefaced his 1973 findings:
"The BureauIssue of 1902 (Scott 300-320) has always been of great interest to Perfin collectors. Called the 'ornamental series' in bygone days, it was in heavy use from 1902 through roughly 1909. Because Perfins were first authorized in 1908, the 1902 issue represents an excellent time marker indicating the earliest possible use of a Perfin type."
"Finding Perfins on the 1902 issue is difficult. One finds perhaps one 1902 Perfin for every 10,000 Perfins examined. I figure that any 1902 Perfin is worth a quarter, even if it is a common pattern. Perfins such as GE and TRAV, which are abundant on later issues, are scarce on the 1902 issue. Once I went through 25,000 copies of \#319, the $2 \phi$ shield design. I broke open the original bundles of 100 packaged by a worker in a Baltimore bank when the stamp was current. I found but 30 Perfins, mostly from railroads. I did the same for 15,000 copies of \#301, the short-lived $2 \phi$ flag design, and uncovered nary a Perfin! One has to face the fact that the great bulk of the Perfins on the 1902 issue long ago were thrown into the wastebasket by accumulators and dealers who thought them defective. The best present-day sources of 1902 Perfins are old-time Perfin collections, Perfins Club auctions and dealers stocks, where one occasionally finds some of the tough high values retained as space fillers."
"Roughly 10 percent of all known Perfins (patterns) occur on the 1902 issue. These Perfins were generated by companies that succumbed to the blandishments of the first perforator salesmen. Not surprisingly there are many railroads, banks, and large concerns represented, which needed their perforators for two reasons: their employees handled a great deal of high-value postage, or many employees at far-flung, relatively unsupervised stations had to be supplied with postage."

While some of the replies in the 1977 census did not indicate which 2 -cent value they were reporting (the 1902 flag type or

the 1903 shield type), it must be assumed that the great majority, if not all, of the unidentified 2 -cent values are of the shield type. It is interesting to note, however, that five different patterns were reported on the 2-cent flag type (Scott \#301), in contrast to the one pattern reported in 1973. These patterns are B235.5, C152, C152-C3, G141, and U91. Four of the five are in the collection of Joe Balough.

It may be of interest at this point to mention that the 2-cent shield type of 1903 was issued to replace the 2 -cent flag type of 1902 after much public complaint that the 2-cent flag type gave Washington a toper's nose and was otherwise "inartistic and clumsy." There also was some contention that the portraitwas not that of Washington, but of a certain Mr. Dooley.

Following is a comparison of the 1973 and 1977 censuses:

## NEW REVENUE RESEARCH


#### Abstract

Revenue Perfins research has taken a major leap forward--thanks to Bill Richerson (\#1295).

Richerson has undertaken a project to compile a catalog of Revenue Perfins of the United States, and he has the basic information on computer so it can be expanded and revised easily.

As many members will recall, the late L. R. Murray and Robert Kenneth compiled a basic list of Revenue Perfins several years ago. However, neither followed up on their work and although there has been growing interest in the subject, there has been no one to carry on the work started by Murray and Kenneth.


Now Richerson has come along with some new information, coupled it with the listing compiled by Murray and Kenneth, and triggered new interest in a fascinating field.

A better knowledge of Revenue Perfins will pay dividends in our understanding of Perfins on postage stamps.

Perforators were used in most brokerage houses to cancel the revenue stamps affixed to stock certificates and other paperwork originated to show the payment of various types of taxes. Many of these brokerage houses also maintained perforators for use on postage stamps.

Sometimes the clerks responsible for handling the perforators got things confused..and perforated postage stamps with the machine made for revenue stamps... and punched some revenue stamps with the machine meant for postage stamps.

Philatelists have long contended that the accidental perforation of postage stamps with a perforator designed for revenue usage is responsible for the creation of some of the rarest of the "A-rated"U.S.Perfins.

On the other hand, the perforation of revenue stamps with the design intended for postage stamps has led to some interesting possibilities for research...and it is into this area that Richerson is plunging. At the same time, he is listing those Perfins known only on revenue stamps in an effort to make the listing complete.

Richerson's work is just beginning and heneeds additional information---especially from any other members who have done any research into Revenue Perfins. He also needs to purchase or borrow any Revenue Perfins anyone will allow him to work with. Most membershave at least afew such items tucked away somewhere and the information they carry could be important to the work Richerson is doing. He would very much appreciate hear-

Robert J. Woolley
As mentioned briefly in the January Bulletin, Robert J. Woolley (\#241), the world's foremost expert on Canadian Perfins, has received the Perfins Club's 1977 Hallock Card Award.

The Award is given annually to a member of the Club who has made outstanding contributions to the Club and to Perfins philately.

Woolley, who will be 80 on April 2, is the author of the Canadian Perfins Catalog published by the British North American Philatelic Society and has been responsible for dozens of articles on Canadian Perfins in philatelic journals worldwide.

In paying tribute to Woolley, Perfins Club President David Stump said, "Bob Woolley's name is synonymous with Canadian Perfins research and it is long past time when the Perfins Club and the Perfins fraternity pay tribute to this learned and generous philatelist."

Woolley got his start in Perfins in 1949 when he bought two million common stamps to sort...and became intrigued by those with perforations in them. With the help of other early Perfins collectors, Woolley classified the Canadian Perfins and turned his research into the first Canadian Perfins Catalog.

In a note to Secretary Floyd Walker, Woolley said he knows the Canadian Catalog needs revision, but added that he is unable to do the work.

Woolley has learned since that the Perfins Club's Canadian representative, Al Pearson, has undertaken the task of revising and updating the Canadian Perfins Catalog.

An active stamp collector since 1909, Woolley is a veteran of both world wars and is a retired valuator and negotiator for the Dominion Department of Transportin Canada. He lives in Toronto.

The Hallock Card Award, named for the founder of the Perfins Club, has gone to only 10 members since it was first awarded to the late K. F. Lougee, author of the U. S. Perfins Catalog. Other recipients of the award

## Perfin Cover of the Month

The Perfin Cover of the Month is a very unusual and interesting one submitted by Charles Schoeps (\#1315) of Saugerties, N.Y. It is unusual because the two $4-$ cent Taft stamps, between them, bear the "AMERICA" portion of the Perfin "AMERICAN APPRAISAL" sometimes used on the American Appraisal Company 's stamps, perhaps through error. This Milwaukee firm normally perforated its stamps with a conventional postal Perfin"AA/Co"

(A-18) as shown in the inset. The long "AMERICAN APPRAISAL" perforation would appear to be one generally used on checks or other documents. It is interesting to note that although the stamps are precancels, they are tied to the cover by a superfluous machine cancellation - which luckily in this instance gives positive proof of their actual postal use on cover. Shown at right is an interestingreconstruction of the long Perfin, made a few years ago and preserved in the Murray-Lougee Perfin Photo Collection. Other members who have unusual Perfin covers are invited to submit them to the editor for possible use as Perfin Cover of the Month.

If you'd like your own copy of the list, you may Xeroxthe copy inthe Library--or, if youhave access to a computer, Richerson says he can supply you with punched papertape or DEC tape so you can make your own reproduction on a line printer.

But you don't need a computer or a Xerox machine to help Richerson with his research. Dig out those Revenue perfins youhave tucked away in the back of the cabinet and send them along to Richerson sohe can check the information hidden on (and in) them and add it to his listing.

The result of Richerson's work--if you help-will be a major addition to our knowledge of United States Perfins.

Since the foreign census forms were published in the July/August Bulletin, 53 members have responded. In this census count an attempt was made to list only the number of different private (commercial) patterns and to avoid counting official, cancel and specimen Perfins. Because members do not always separate official and private Perfins in their country collections, and because it is not always easy to distinguish between the two types, the count that follows undoubtedly includes some official stamps---particularly in the counts of Canada, Great Britain, Sudan, Russia, Venezuela, and perhaps a few other countries. Papua and Northwest Pacific Islands were intentionally omitted from this list because only official Perfins have been reported from those places. A few countries on the census show no reported Perfins. Generally this means that none of the members reported owned Perfins from these places, NOT that Perfins don't exist from these countries. This writer knows from other sources (Bulletin reports, worksheets, articles) that Perfins do exist on the stamps of Cyprus, Malaysia, Sierra Leone, Lithuania, Memel, and Rouad Island, though none were reported here.

Some observations can be made from these census results. A division of the 53 reporters according to the number of countries collected:

Afew members are one country collectors, while others have a limited number of Perfins from many countries. This fact lowers the median count, which is the count that falls approximately midway between the extremes. The median was included in order to provide a realistic figure for the novice and for the average collector.

It can be seen from the tally that Perfins of more than 30 countries may be exceedingly rare, since they have each been reported by a single member only.

The maximum Perfin count according to this
census reaches 26,681 . Some of the collectors who reported in the 1972 census have added over 6,000 new patternsin intervening years, which fact suggests that Perfin collecting isfar from a dormantbranch of philately. Members can enjoy a nostalgic look at the past census reports by consulting the Perfins Bulletin of February 1973.

Several members reported the same top totalfor many countries, but only one collector's number is listedfor space and simplification. Those who wish to inquire about specific countriesor other matters relevant to this report should remember to enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope.

In summary, 198 countries (or subdivisions) have been reported on the 1978 census. The report includes 24 countries that have not been previously reported.

Verification of Perfins from the unreportedcountries or from any unlisted countries will be appreciated. Reports will be welcome from members who have totals greater than the top counts listed here. Please address all correspondence to the writer at 9 Memory Lane, Poughkeepsie, NY 12603.

## MORE ON THE STATE OF TEXAS PERFIN

The saga of the "C in Star" pattern of the State of Texas continues....

When I last reported on this subject (November/December 1977 Bulletin), I told members that correspondence from Tom Treadway, financial division director for the Texas state legislature in Austin, Texas, indicated that the old "C in Star" pattern (C-10) was being revived for use on state postage.

Now we have a new element to the story.
Shortly after my article appeared, I received a letter from a Texas member of the Perfins Club reporting that he had acquired a full mint sheet of $13 \phi$ definitives perforated with the C-10 pattern. He said he had paid face value for the stamps at a local stamp club meeting.

The seller reportedly had acquired the stamps in Austin and had traded a full sheet of regular (unPerfinned) stamps for them.

I wrote our Texas member that I planned to inform Treadway that a full sheet of Texas Perfins had wandered. Since Perfins are designed to protect postage from "unauthorized use," the fact that somebody had traded a sheet of Perfinned stamps for a sheet of unPerfinned ones struck meas being perhaps just a little on the questionable side.

At the same time, the trade may have been perfectly innocent--perhaps designed to help out a stamp collector.

However, considering the fact that the whole subject of reviving the Texas Perfin came up because some Texas legislators had stolen enough state-owned postage to buy, among other things, a pick-up truck, I thought Treadway should know about the stamps.

I wrote Treadway late in December. I did not reveal the name of the Perfins Club member involved, but I did trace the story much as I have traced it here.

In mid-January, I received a telephone call from a Captain Hugh Poage of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Captain Poage explained that he had been asked to look into the matter of the Perfins and that although there was not at that time any indication of wrongdoing, he did want to trace the stamps to their original source.

After chatting for a few moments to confirm the identity of the caller ( $I^{\prime} m$ from Texas and still have many friends there, including some Poages, none related to the Captain), I told Poage the name of our member in Texas.

I've learned since that the Texas member was contacted within the hour and, after assuring himself that Poage was who he said he was, revealed the name of his source.

That source in turn was contacted and apparently named his source. Beyond that I have no information at the moment.

I've asked both Treadway and Poage to in-
form me if any action istaken regarding the Perfins. I'm very curious to learn if the originaltrade was innocent orwas an attempt to rip off the state.

If it was the latter, it obviously did not succeed.

Perhaps we will find out that Perfins can still do what Joseph Sloper designed them to do--stop the unauthorized use of postage stamps.

Incidentally, Captain Poage assured both our Texas member and myself that it is perfectly all right to use the stamps with the C-l0 pattern on personal mail. The crime, if there was one, obviously lies in the original diversion of the stamps in Austin, not in the use of them on mail.

So, there will be some C-lOs floating around soon on current mail. I'm sure our Texas member will make good use of the stamps.

And I'll keep members informed if I hear anything further about the saga of the Texas Perfins.

## EDITOR'S CORNER

If the new "small size" U. S. stamps catch on, it's going to be rough on Perfinners.

Floyd Walker reports that he has a tough time getting his personal Perfin into one of the new stamps.

Walker's Perfin is $1 / 2$ by $1 / 2$ inch, which is what the Postal Service specifies as the maximum. But the new stamps are only about $5 / 8$ by $3 / 4$, and that doesn't leave much room for movement without the Perfin cutting into the edge of the stamp.

You can see the comparison between the new size stamp and the regular size definitive in the illustration below.


James Milne (\#809) an American who moved from Germany to Singapore a year or so ago, reports that he has had Perfins on exhibit in two local stamp shows in Singapore. He says no prizes are awarded at these shows, the primary purpose being to put on public interest exhibits. The exhibitors are asked to "hang around" as much as possible in order to answer questions from the public. Jim says that when you answer the question "why save holes" with the remark "it's fun, " the viewers just shake their heads sadiy -- the tropical heat has gotten to one more European. He says all Caucasians are regarded as Europeans first, then maybe they will break it down into Australians, Europeans and Americans.

## EARLY PERFINS WRTER JOINS CLUB

There's a name on the list of new members this month that should have a familiar ring to some of our old-timers--and the youngsters among us who are really alert to the history of Perfins philately.

New member \#1604 is listed as George H. Harnden of Schenectady, New York.

Does the name sound familiar?
George $H$. Harnden wrote a major article on "Perforated Initials" for the old Weekly Philatelic Gossip"--in 1936.

The Harnden article, which has been basic reading material for Perfins collectors for more than 40 years, was the first significant piece of literature on Perfins published in the United States.

Nearly a decade before the Perfins Club was founded, George Harnden worked out a classification system for Perfins based on the arrangement of the letters. The Harnden system served as the basis for the system now used in the U. S. Catalog. Indeed, a reading of the Harnden article of 1936 shows how well the author did his research. The article reads as factually today as it did then--and we've had 40 years to uncover material since then.

Despite his early interest in Perfins, George Harnden did not help found the Perfins Club, and never joined the Club until now. But all through the years he hasmaintained his interest in Perfins as he has pursued a career as a mechanical engineer.

When I received the application with the very familiar name, I located George Harnden by telephone to give him a personal welcome to the Perfins Club.

I learned that he is now 79 yearsold, retired, and living with his daughter in Schenectady. His wife is in a nursing home and Harnden himself has been 11l. But when I talked to him he was alert and appreciative of the call.

He still has his original Perfinscollection and his daughter is helping him once again get seriously involved in Perfins philately. And he's finally joining the or ganization that his early philatelic work helped trigger into reality.

It is both a privilege and a pleasure to welcome George H. Harnden to the Perfins Club. Floyd A. Walker, Secretary

The exhibit is open to all entrants, and all judges will be APS accredited, as VAPEX intends to become qualified for the APS "Champion of Cahmpions" competition. ## PERFINS ON "EARLY" U. S. ISSUES

U. S. Catalog Chairman Joe Balough has submitted the interesting array of Perfin photos shown below.

Photo 1 shows a copy of Scott \#635 which not only bears a Perfin, but a curious embossed design of a wreath and monogram. The Perfin appears to be a split of the $V$ pattern (V-1) of the Vitaphone Corporation. Can anyone provide enlightenment on the embossed design?

Photo 2 shows the 2-cent Pan-American issue bearing the UNION Perfin (U-47.5) of the Commercial Union Assurance Co., Itd., of San Francisco. Balough comments that the UNION pattern is common, but not on this issue. He says he also has seen the pattern on the 4 -cent Pan-American value, so it apparently was used postally.

Photo 3 shows a copy of Scott \#252, issued in 1894, bearing a curious \#0 Perfin. Balough theorizes that the stamp may not have been used as a Perfin, but that the perforation may have been added to a used stamp. Anyone care to comment?

Photo 4 shows a 4 -cent Columbian in Balough's collection which bears the NCB Perfin ( $\mathrm{N}-4 \mathrm{l}$ ) of National City Bank of New York. Photos 5 and 6 show 2 -cent Columbians bearing Perfin patterns not listed in the catalog. One appears to be an II pattern, and the other is open to conjecture. The only thing clearly perforated is a number symbol (\#) similar to the one shown in Photo 3. It appears to the editor that the remaining perforationsto the right may have been struck from two different Per-

Ivan Pfalser (\#765) of Caney Kansas, submitted the photo at left, showing a postcard issued in 1943 by the Breda (Netherlands) Stamp Club for their stamp show. The Perfin "P.Z. v. /50" (shown in the inset) is perforated through both stamp and card. It stands for "POSTZEGEL VERENNIGING," which ties in with the commemorative cancellation. The theme of the show was to commemorate the unity of the Netherlands against the rule of Spain.
Do you have a Perfin cover you think would be of interest for other members to see in the Bulletin? If so, please submit it to the editor. It should be a cover with some unusual feature, not just a run-of-the-mill one.

## MORE ON TEXAS PERFIN

Here's the latest on the "C in star" pattern of the State of Texas.

As we've reported previously (November/ December 1977 and February 1978 Bulletins), the "C-in-star"pattern (C-10) has been resurrected by the State of Texas for use on postage purchasedfor use by state officials. We also reported that a sheet of mint $13 \phi$ regulars with the pattern had been traded on the philatelic market and had triggered an investigation by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Now I've learned that Texas may soon add a new Perfin to the world of philately.

Alan Miskimin (LM-8) visited with Tom Treadway of the Texas legislature and learned that there are plans to come up with a new Perfin which can be used in all state agencies. The state has apparently arranged with Cummins to manufacture the perforator which would presumably be a multi-headelec trically operated type capable of perforating several sheets of stamps at one time.

During their visit, Treadway showed Miskimin the proposed new design..a "T-in-star." The T would, of course, stand for Texas. It should be noted that the "C-in-star" stood for Comptroller, which is the agency which originally used the Perfin.

Miskimim pointed out that the "T-in-star" is not a new design...that it bears a striking resemblance to the Texaco "T-in-star" pattern already listed inthe U.S. Catalog.

Instead, Miskimin suggested, why not replace the star with an outline map of Texas, thus creating a brand new easily identifiable pattern...the $T$ inside the Texas map. Treadway seemed impressed with the suggestion and indicated to Miskimin that the state very likely would use the outline map instead of the star.

Now, the same mail has brought word that the Texas Department of Public Safety investigation has turned up no wrongdoing of any sort. Apparently, the mint sheet of the "C-in-star" was acquired quite legally.

That information comes from Tom Stich of Amarillo who is the member who ultimately wound up with the mint sheet and first alerted me to the potential problem. Stich says he received a phone call fromthe Texas Department of Public Safety recently informing him that there was nothing illegal in the handling of the mint sheet.

Incidentally, Stich is using the "C-instar" Perfins on his personal mail and if any member would like a copy, they can drop him a note at 2514 Lawndale Drive, Amarillo, TX 79103 and he'll be glad to oblige as long as his supply lasts. A stamped envelope and an extra 136 stamp to pay forthe Texas pattern would be appropriate.

So...that's the story of the Texas Perfin thusfar. Now we can wait and see if we have a new "T-in-Texas" pattern.

## A "CONTROL" PERFIN

The stamp pictured below surely represents about as much "control" as could be applied in the use of postage stamps. To begin with, it bears the Kansas overprint, which was designed to prevent losses from post office burglaries. Secondly, it bears a Wichita, Kansas, precancel, and although the primary purpose of precancels is to facilitate the handling of bulk mail, it nevertheless represents a control of sorts, since only permit holders are supposed to use precancels. Thirdly, it bears the Perfin of Standard Oil Company's Wichita branch (S195-15).

This unusual Perfin was reported by Bob Schwerdt in response to the editor's recent query as to whether or not members would like a census of Perfin patterns on the Kansas and Nebraska overprints. Two or three members have responded with some lists of such Perfins in their collections. If you would like to see such a census, let the editor hear from you.

Occasionally, these letters come off the sheet and stick wherever they touch. The editor didn't notice that this one had sone astray until the Bulletin was printed.

Charles Schoeps (\#1315) has submitted the Perfin shown below, which appears to be a State of Michigan Perfin, but does not match any of the patterns shown in the Illustrated Catalog. It may have been listed in one of the Additions and Corrections Supplements, which the editor does not have at hand. Who can supply further information?

Charles points out that when this particular example is turned over, it becomes an EFO (Error, Freak or Oddity), because of the stamp's off-center perforation. He inquires as to whether there are any other members who collect Perfins on EFOs, as such. Step forward, you EFO Perfins colleotors!

Floyd also notesthat John Burns has provided him with a few copies of the program issued at last year's Perfins Club Convention at SESCAL. Floyd will send a copy to any member who sends along $35 \phi$ in postage.. or a 6x9-inch SASE.

If you are interested in the Perfins of Portugal, the secretary has some extra copies of a three-page illustrated listing of Portugal Perfins which he will send along to member who supplies either $13 \phi$ postage or a \#lo stamped return envelope.

The listing was prepared in 1963 by the late Al Bartleson in cooperation with W. J. Pieterse. Although the list is old and possibly very out of date, it still contains a wealth of information useful to anyone interested in the Perfins of Portugal.

The list also illustrates a few Perfins from Angola, Azores, Funchal, and the Philippines.

## NEW U.S. PERFIN

Just drop Walker a note and send along an envelope stamped with either $13 \phi$ return postage (if you want a mint SEPS Perfin) or $12 \phi$ return postage if you want Walker to affix the Ferfin to the letter so you will have a used copy.

## THE EDITOR'S CORNER

Therefore, as soon as the editor becomes sufficiently familiar with this machine, the Perfins Bulletin will get a facelifting. Severaltype faces will be available in place of the old Remington manual now being used.

If the editor may induldge a further personal note, he was given a roast, a la Dean Martin, at his retirement party - and, of course, was allowed to roast his roasters in return. It was a lot of fun and the editor was flattered by the large number of fellow employees who turned out for the party.

Vice President Dorothy Savage reports that she sent out 53 Perfin Primers during March, so response continues to come in from the editor's article in the October American Philatelist and the recent special Perfins edition of Linn's.

One of our new members attracted to the Club through the special Perfins edition of Linn's, was so impressed that he wrote his request for a Perfin Primer in verse. Dot Savage thought the membership might be interested in reading it. The poem was submitted by Tony Stanovich (\#1610). Following is the text, slightly edited:

> As I arise this morning,
> My daily life begins. I make a cup of coffee, Re-read the things in Linn's. The article I'm reading Sounds great for it begins A holey hobby challenging -
> That is, of course, Perfins.
> My son and I are new to this, I'm fifty-six, he's ten.

> Brought forth that old stamp yen.
> The paper says that you will send
> Info about Perfins,
> Which would be great, for it would change
> Our frowns of doubt to GRINS.

In looking through Billig's Philatelic Handbook No. VI, the editor recently saw a note to the effect that, in 1887, Italian stamps of 1865-79 were perforated with new values ( C .1 on 2 c red brown, C .4 on 5 c green, C. 8 on 10 c carmine, and C .18 on 20 c
yellow orange) for the purpose of being used only on advertising matters by a firm in Livorno. And, in 1890, the 20c yellow orange of 1879 was perforated with the initials "C C" (Cartolina Commerciale - Commercial Postcard). Does any member have examples of these Perfins?

## MORE ON THE TEXAS PERFIN

by Floyd Walker

When our story was last brought up to date (March 1978 Bulletin), indications were that the State of Texas would use a new Perfin in the form of an outline map of the State of Texas. However, subsequent events have changed that.

The latest word from Alan R. Miskimin, who has been offering guidance and counseling to the Texas officials involved in the new Perfin pattern selection, is that the Texas outline idea won't be acted upon. It seems that when the time came to order the new perforator, the manufacturer said the outline map of Texas would be too complicated and costly.

Why Texas is more complicated and costly as a Perfin than Illinois (see I-5) is perhaps best left to speculation and those with a ready wit...and no relatives in Texas!

At any rate, the latest idea seems to be to use a star outline similar to the one in the original ( $\mathrm{C}-10$ ) ( C in star), but to replace the C with a single hole---presumably to represent the location of Austin, the state capital, which is roughly in the center of the state. It also helps keep the new Texas star from looking like any of the other stars already existing as Perfin patterns.

Miskimin goes on to report that the new perforator will be a Cummins-Allison desk model with a foot switch (he says it actually is nothing but a check perforator with a different die set-up)/ The unit is designated as a Model 390, it weighs 50 pounds, is 8 inches wide, 13 inches deep, and 11 inches high. It will perforate five stamps at one time, and can take up to 20 sheets at one time...making the total onetime perforation capacity 100 stamps. The throat of the unit will take two rows of stamps at one time. Thus stamps will have to be either cut or folded into strips five stamps wide by four stamps deep. The top two rows can be perforated and then the bottom two rows perforated when the stamps are turned around.

Cost of the unit is $\$ 4,000$. The estimated hourly output of perforated stamps is, in Treadway's words, "mindboggling."

Presumably the new unit is, or soon will be, on order. Just when it will be ready, I don't venture to guess. Nor will I suggest that there might not be another change of design in the pattern.

But, thanks to Alan Miskimin, we'll be pretty sure to have a continuing report on this subject. And perhaps one day we will have a new Perfin from the State of Texas.

We'll keep you posted.

## PUBLICITY BRINGS NEW PERFINS

The February special issue of Linn's focused a lot of attention on the Perfins Club. We gained more than 100 new members as a result of the publicity.

And we've also gained a couple of new Perfins!

My article on "personal Perfins" has brought forth a KIS/NER pattern from Jacob Kisner of New York and a "square and compass logo" from Masonic philatelist Edward Walsh of Lexington, Massachusetts. Both new patterns are shown here.


These two new Perfins may bring an outcry from the purists, who will insist that they are hardly necessary to protect Messrs. Kisner's nd Walsh's postage from "unauthorized usage." And that is quite true. Both pstterns are clearly philatelic. Kisner is a dealer in stamps, autographs, and related material. He also operates the purely philatelic Park Avenue Local Post. Walsh is a dealer in Masonic philatelic material and the new $\frac{1}{4} e r f i n$ is obviously a nod to his business interests.

But the two Perfins do exist, they are readily available, and they are as much a part of Perfins philately as my own WAL/KER pattern, or the Club's PF patterns from last fall's convention.

Kisner will provide his pattern without charge to members who send him "up to three current mint U. S. stamps." An SASE must be enclosed, of course. We suspect that Mr. Kisner will perforate a block of four if you ask. And be sure to tell him if you want the stamps perforated from the reverse; otherwise you'll get them perforated from the front. Kisner's address is Jacob Kisner, 750 Park Avenue, New York, NY 10021.

Walsh prepared first day covers of the square and compass logo and he'11 provide a cover plus a mint copy of the Perfin for a $\$ 1.00$ postpaid. Walsh should be written at 28 Maple Street, Lexington, MA 02173.

In both cases, you should mention that you're a $\frac{1}{4} e r f i n s$ collector, and that you read about the new patterns in the Bulletin.

[^4]The Perfins of Hungary，a catalog com－ piled by Vojtech Maxa（非933）of Prague and published by David Malyon（非1104）of London， is the newest addition to the Perfins liter－ ature．

And it is a welcome one．
The 48－page volume is printed on a small （6 by 8 inch）format and illustrates，to exact size and with Maxa＇s usual superb craftsmanship，the more than 500 known Per－ fins of Hungary．The printing quality is excellent；the paper is high－grade white bond；and the volume is bound in bright yellow covers．

In his introduction，Maxa notes that the volume contains＂about 85 to 90 per－ cent＂of all the Perfin patterns ever used on Hungarian stamps．Many of the patterns illustrated in the catalog have not been identified，so there is still much work to be done．Perhaps one of you reading this will be able to help with new information． That＇s the thrill of Perfins：all the work is not done！

Copies of the catalog are available from publications manager Floyd Walker（Box 82， Grandview，MO 64030）for $\$ 3.00$ per copy．

A shipment of the catalogs is en route by surface mail from London and should have arrived by the time you read this note．How－ ever，there may be a slight delay in filling your order if the ship slows down．

The $\$ 3.00$ price per copy is premised on surface shipment to the U．S．from England and includes postage to you．If you are anxious，we can arrange fir a direct airmail shipment to you from London，but the price will be double－－to $\$ 6.00$ per copy．That＇s what the airmail cost is：roughly equal to the cost of the catalog itself！

Incidentally，a copy of the catalog is in the Library（courtesy of the publisher）and may be borrowed by any member．

Ralph L．Sloat（非942）has a favorite stamp．It＇s Scott CE－2，the bicolor airmail special delivery stamp．And Ralph has writ－ ten an intriguing handbook on his favorite stamp：The Airmail Special Delivery Stamps of the United States．

The 86 －page study is published by the Bureau Issues Association and is a superb piece of philatelic workmanship in every way－－from editorial quality to printing quality．

Sloat does not devote enough attention （in this writer＇s somewhat biased opinion） to Perfins on the two issues．But perhaps that leaves us some room to correspond with him－－to tell him what patterns we have that he doesn＇t list．It should be noted that Sloat does discuss CE－1 as a means of pro－ viding a foundation for his study of CE－2， but it is clearly CE－2 which is the subject of his study．

If your interest is strictly in Perfins， then this volume isn＇t worth the price．But if you are a U．S．specialist，or if you share Ralph＇s fascination with CE－2，then
by all means invest $\$ 7.50$ in this volume． Copies are available from the BIA＇s execu－ tive secretary，Esther H．Sullivan， 19 Maple Street，Arlington，VA 02174.

Incidentally，Ralph has kindly donated a copy of the handbook to the Library and you may borrow it on request．There may be a waiting list，so please be patient．

During the period of British mandate in Palestine (1923-1948), there were two users of Perfins on stamps issued under the mandate. The more prolific user was the AngloPalestine Company (now known as the Bank Leumi Le-Israel). The other user was the Keren Kayemet I'Israel (Jewish National Fund).

The Anglo-Palestine Company used the Perfin A.P.C. (Figure 1) at its offices in Jerusalem, Haifa, Tel Aviv and Jaffa. It was also used (on Lebanese stamps) at the firm's office in Beyrouth. The Keren Kayemet used the pattern KKL (perforated in Hebraic characters (Figure 2), only at its office in Jerusalem.


The A.P.C. Perfin generally was perforated at an angle. Due to variation in the way the stamps were inserted into the Perfin device, they may be found with the Perfin in any one of eight different positions. In his article of 1975 (see bibliography below), Dr. Werner Hoexter worked up a detailed classification of the A.P.C. Perfin positions by stamp issue and city of use. Hoexter's table was expanded slightly in a follow-up article by Marvin Siegel (see bibliography). The expanded table is reproduced in Figure 3. The position designations in the table are as follows (viewing the stamps from the front): A - normal, down ; B - normal, up; C - normal, up (stamp inverted); D - normal, down (stamp inverted); E-reversed, down; $F$ - reversed, up; G - reversed, down (stamp inverted); H - reversed, up (stamp inverted).

The KKL Perfin of Keren Kayemet l'Israel is generally found in a perpendicular position. Dr. Hoexter lists the positions of this Perfin as follows (viewing the stamp from the front): A - normal, down; B - normal, up; C-reversed, up; D - reversed, down. A table prepared by Siegel, showing the number of stamps reported in each Hoexter position, is reproduced in Figure 4.

Siegel states that the information in his article is based on an accumulation of

Perfinned pictorial stamps of Palestine bought by him, which had been formed by a collector, now deceased, who had been employed for over 20 years by a Jewish organization in New York which received a great deal of mail from the Jerusalem office of Keren Kayemet 1'Israel. Siegel's research in this material indicates that the Jerusalem KKL office Perfinned "at least some if not all of their stamps during the period 25 August 1927 until 6 December 1927."

Siegel adds that "as far as relative rarity is concerned, I would have to consider 3 \& 4 mil which do not appear in (Hoexter's) listing and only ONCE each in mine, as being the rarest."

The Hoexter and Siegel articles make it clear that the KKL Perfin is very scarce. In fact, Siegel states, "in all the years I have collected, seen, discussed, bought and sold Mandate stamps, I had seen only 2 or 3 of these Perfins. I happened to have been extremely lucky in purchasing this very large assemblage; which I can safely say is the largest group of these in existence ANYWHERE and I must confirm Zodiac's (catalog) valuation of 'from \$30 (each).'

## PERFIN COVER OF THE MONTH

This month's choice is a catapult cover from the North German Lloyd Steamship Company's "S.S. Bremen," which is franked with two U.S. 10-cent values (Scott \#642) bearing the Perfin of the steamship company (N89), shown in the inset. Catapult mail was an experiment of the late $1920^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$ in which airplanes were launched by catapult from ships several hundred miles from their destination port as a means of speeding the mail. The first catapult mails were from the French liner "Ile de France," but the best known ones were from the North German Lloyd's "Bremen" and "Europa." (cover from collection of Edwin C. Haack)

## THE EDITOR'S CORNER

It is encouraging to see that more members recently have been using the want ad column of the Bulletin to publicize their wants or their offers for sale or trade. For the benefit of our many new members, it should be pointed out that there is no charge for running such an ad in the Bulletin. The ads are run as space permits and, of course, are limited to members of the Club. We do not run paid ads of dealers or others, and the want ad column is not open to ads of dealers selling on a continuous basis. However, any member is entitled to run an ad to sell a particular collection or lot of Perfins.

In his handbook on the airmail special delivery stamps of the U.S. (which is reviewed in the Librarian's column in this issue), Member Ralph Sloat asks why it is that the USVA (Veterans Administration) used Perfins instead of penalty envelopes. Can any member provide enlightenment on this subject?

In response to Charles Schoeps' inquiry in the March Bulletin concerning an apparent State of Michigan Perfin which did not match any shown in the catalog, Vice President Dorothy Savage says she understands that this Perfin came about when every other pin was removed from the original perforator, and the feet were removed also, thus creating a new State of Michigan Perfin type.

Dorothy also states that she has been sending Stamp Collector subscription blanks in correspondence to members; that for each new or renewal subscription thus obtained the Perfins Club gets $\$ 1.00$. Dorothy states that any member who wants one of these subscription forms in order to help the Club, should send a small SASE to her.

Your editor can wholeheartedly recommend Stamp Collector as a greatly improved and very informative stamp publication - and not because he happens to have a column and a philatelic crossword puzzle in it each month.

To give equal space, your editor also recommends Linn's (which gave us the nice special edition in February) and Stamps. The editor has no knowledge as to whether or not the latter two publications would also give us the $\$ 1.00$ subscription commission. But he does know that many serious collectors find it worthwhile to subscribe to all three of these major U.S. weekly stamp publications.

Member A1 Spencer has a want ad in this issue seeking certain Perfins on and off cover that he needs for his exhibit of MUSICAL Perfins. Al has put together a great exhibit of Perfins on this theme. In fact, he won a gold award with it at SESCAL last year. Al did not ask for this pitch by the editor, but the editor believes that any
member who has done such a good job on his exhibit and has brought Perfins such good publicity, deserves the cooperation of his fellow members in making his exhibit even better. Therefore, it is hoped that any of you who can help Al with his wants will get in touch with him.

## CANADIAN NOTE

In a recent article in the BNAPS Journal, Perfins Club Member Michael Dicketts (非1440) points out that Perfins on the Small Queens of Canada are very elusive and eagerly sought after.

Dicketts' article notes that the first recorded Canadian Perfin user was W. J. Gage Co., Ltd., of Toronto. He states that the Gage Perfin (Figure 1) is known on seven values of the Small Queens. In ascending order of scarcity, he names these as the 3 c , $1 c, 2 c, 10 c, 5 c, 6 c$ and $8 c$. He adds, "fortunate is the collector who has more than the first three."


According to the article, the next confirmed user to perforate the Small Queen issue was the Intercolonial Railway of Montreal and Moncton, whose two-line design $I C / R$ (Figure 2) is reported on the $3 ¢$ value.

Figure 3 illustrates a J.H.S. pattern which Dicketts says is known on the 1 c Small Queen bearing Montreal cancellations. He adds that some collectors think this Perfin may have been used by J. H. Semple of Montreal, but no cover has come to light to positively identify its user.

Dicketts states that many years ago a report was received that the Sun Life Assurance Co. of Montreal used its S.L/AC? Perfin (Figure 4) on the Small Queens, but that he has not seen anything to confirm this. He points out that the Sun Life Perfin is known on the 15 c Large Queen and the two higher value Widow's Weeds.

## AUCTION NETS CLUB \＄1，900

The Perfins Club has netted some \＄1，900 from the first sale of material from the collection left to the Club by the late A1 Bartleson．The material was offered in Auction 非22，results of which are published in this issue．Additional material will be offered in future auctions．

The majority of the lots offered in Auc－ tion 非22 consisted of B－rated or better Per－ fins．The fact that members recognized this as an excellent opportunity to add rarities to their ollections is reflected in the high amount netted by the Club．

Among the $468 \mathrm{U} . \mathrm{S}$ ．lots offered， 79 brought $\$ 5.00$ or more each．The highest bid on any U．S．lot was \＄1I．60，which was the bid on Lot 57 （B55 on Scott 非319）and on Lot 168 （C303 on Scott ⿰⿰三丨⿰丨三一319）．Both of these are A－rated Perfins．

Two of the mint copies of France C6b（the EIPA 30 Perfin）brought $\$ 120$ each and the third copy brought \＄110．The collection of 1660 France and colonies Perfins brought \＄176．Lot 481，the Germany elephant design， brought $\$ 28.60$ ，the highest price for any single stamp bearing a commercial Perfin．

Many members no doubt will be looking for－ ward to the next auction of Bartleson mater－ ial，which should be coming up within the next two or three months．The bidding prom－ ises to be very spirited．

## CANADIAN ACTIVITY

Thanks to the energy and enthusiasm of Al Pearson，our Canadian representative，the Perfins interest among Canadian collectors seems to be picking up by leaps and bounds．

Dues are $\$ 4$ per year and members are in－ vited to pay as many years in advance as they wish．Of course the best buy remains the $\$ 60$ iife membership－－which frees the member forever from the burden of annual dues．

There are no plans at this time to raise the dues of the Perfins Club．

But，says Secretary Floyd Walker，he and Treasurer Jack Gooding are keeping careful watch of the situation in the light of pos－ tage increases and some steady increases in the price of everything from printing to drawing ink and paper clips．

Walker says it is important that the Club not get in the position of spending more than $\$ 4$ a year on member services or the long－term consequences could be quite se－ vere．
＂Right now，says Walker，＂we are in su－ perb financial shape．The Bartleson collec－ tion is bringing us in some money that will make our financial statement look great．＂
＂But，＂adds the secretary，＂let us not forget that we have a U．S．Catalog to print sometime this year，and that will take a large chunk of money．＂
＂We must remain aware of the importance of balancing our expenses against our pre－ dictable dues income；otherwise，we will find ourselves with a deficit one of these days and have to do some fast shuffling to keep from going under．That＇s happened to a number of groups and we must make sure it doesn＇t happen to us．＂

The treasurer issues regular reports on the finances of the Club and these reports are printed for all to see．It is worth looking at the reports to get a feel your－ self for the financial position of the Club．

In the meantime，Walker，Gooding and the other Club officers will continue to watch expenses，and income，and all the other factors that help ensure a healthy organi－ zation．

In the Editor's Corner of the May Bulletin the question was posed as to why the Veterans Administration did not use penalty envelopes, like some other government agencies, instead of Perfins. George Fisher, Jr. (非1152) offers the following comment:
"It is my understanding that only those government agencies that were specifically permitted by Congress to use franked mail (penalty envelopes) did so. Other agencies pay postage. The present Government agency for which I work (the National Park Service, Department of the Interior) does not have the franking privilege, so we pay for our mailings, as does the whole Interior Department. Postage is paid to the Postal Service every year based on samples of mailings taken periodically through the year -- some years ago it was quarterly, and I suspect it still is, but I haven't checked on this activity for a while. Agencies which pay for their postage use envelopes that usually say something like 'Postage and Fees Paid,' followed by the name of the department, in the upper right corner of their envelopes. The eagle symbol is also usually imprinted alongside this indicia to provide a sufficiently solid inked area for automatic sorters to face government mail just like the machines face your mail bearing stamps.
"This printed indicia is a relatively new phenomenon insofar as the Department of the Interior is concerned. Until 1963, the National Park Service used ordinary stamps for its mail, which created untold accounting absurdities, like spending tens of dollars every month in clerks' salaries to keep track of a few cents' worth of stamps. And then the safeguarding--they had to be kept in strongboxes or safes so that nobody could filch a nickel stamp now and then. Which, of course, is what we wanted, but was the cost worth it? And just think -- any theft of U.S. Government property is a federal offense, so technically a Government employee was obliged to call in the F.B.I. if a fivecent stamp was discovered missing.
"Anyway, back in the sixties, the Department (or at least the Park Service part of it) got permission to use the 'Postage and Fees Paid' indicia -- not the 'Penalty for Private Use to Avoid Payment of Postage, $\$ 300^{\prime}$ one -- which meant what it said: the Department of the Interior pays in cash for its postal services.
"But it hasn't always been thus. I have a few old Interior Department envelopes from the period 1899 to 1919 with the oval-framed eagle indicia which bear the words 'OFFICIAL BUSINESS PENALTY FOR PRIVATE USE $\$ 300^{\prime}$ within the design. Somebody with the time and inclination to research this subject could

## SALES REPORT

The value of Perfins sold by the Sales Department for the first half of 1978 was was $\$ 4,460.24$. This is $83 \%$ greater than was sold during the preceding six months. The large increase was due to the Perfins from the Bartleson collection.

Book sales were $\$ 2,033.95, E$ and $D$ envelopes $\$ 741.65$, and foreign $\$ 1.684 .44$, for a total of $\$ 4,460.24$.

Sales from the Bartleson collection accounted for $\$ 2,383.87$ of the total, and there are many Perfins still to be sold from the Bartleson holdings.

Commission on the sales was $\$ 892.04$, and expenses $\$ 304.03$, leaving a net of $\$ 588.01$ turned over to J. A. Gooding, Club treasurer.

The new pin, pictured above, incorporates the Perfins Club logo that is used on letterheads and membership certificates. The pin is arranged to represent a Perfin on a stamp. The actual size of the pin is $15 \times 18 \mathrm{~mm}$, and the border is not black, as pictured, but of a silver metallic color. The face of the pin is white.

## PERFIN VALUES RISING

Sales Manager Ivan Ley reports some interesting statistics from the last auction.

Ivan got out his pencil and figured out that the average A-rated U. S. Perfin brought $\$ 5.55$. The average $B$-rated one brought $\$ 2.55$, and the average C-rated item brought \$1.46.

Those are average figures....there were, of course, some in each group which brought more and some which brought less.

But a quick check of the files reveals this comparison:

The average A-rated Perfin in Auction ; 4 (spring. 1973) brought $\$ 2.00$. The average B-rated item in that auction brought \$1.10; and the average C-rated Perfin brought only 47 c.

Not a bad increase over five years for items that were long considered nothing but junk.

## NEW U. OF MISSOURI TYPE

Norman Touchette (非1035) of
 St. Louis has submitted for the editor's inspection a cover bearing a new Perfin type from the University of Missouri, as illustrated at left. The illustration is not the actual Perfin, but a hand drawing to show its general character.
Norman also submitted a copy of a letter he has written to the University, seeking details concerning the new Perfin device. As soon as further information is developed, it will be published in the Bulletin.

Continuing the theme that postmarks identify owners (see Bulletin April 1975), as always there are those that are exceptions to the rule.

In the instance of the Perfinned adhesives shown on postcards in the above illustration, the cancellation is of no help whatsoever. Or is it?

Throughout the membership of the U.P.U. there was a service known as reply-paid postcards. Any reply-oaid postcard, whether officially used or privately produced, had to have on the front half the printed heading "CARTE POSTALE AVEC REPONSE PAYEE," and on the second half "CARTE POSTALE'REPONSE." The cards were made up so that the fold formed the upper edge. The address side for the reply half fell inside of the fold. Nothing could be enclosed, but the sender could address the reply half to themselves, and on the back of this half, they could add a questionnaire to be filled in by the addressee.

As can be seen, this service lent itself very nicely to the operation of reservations in connection with running a travel business.

Illustrated are examples of the system so used. All the Danish adhesives are Perfinned DSB and show postmarks of England, Wales, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Italy, respectively. The Italians apparently were a bit unsure of the system, as all of the reply cards I have seen mailed by them have an additional Italian adhesive affixed.

The last day that reply cards could be bought in the British Isles was October 2nd

1970 (the first British card was sold in 1882). The cards were abolished internationally following a decision of the U.P.C. in Tokyo in October ;969. The British service ended on July 1st 1971, but the date when the service ended internationally seems to have been neglected in the philatelic press. Perhaps someone can fill in this blank in my knowledge?

Historical note on the D.S.B.: by 1885 all the Danish railways then built came under one management, thereby creating the Danish State Railways. Probably the ferry system that evolved is the best known monument to the early pioneers.

When the D.S.B. first used Perfins, I am not aware. In 1956,*Van Lint listed:

## 48 DSB 30 H 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ Kbh Danske Staats Bahn

In the corrections and additions issued later appears:

## 47a DSB 33 H 6 Kbh

This is the same as that found on the re-ply-paid postcards. To put the description into today's standards, it reads:

## THE EDITOR＇S CORNER

Dr．Gary Weiss（LM15）of Galveston， Texas，reports that he won a large silver at Capex for his exhibit of Canal Zone officials．The bulk of his exhibit consisted of Canal Zone stamps perforated $P$ for official use．

Gary also sent along a clipping from Linn＇s（September 26， 1977 issue） showing a misperfed copy of the \＄1．00 Wilson stamp（Scott 非32）．

According to the item，the stamp， shown below，is certified by the Amer－ ican Philatelic Expertizing Service as ＂Scott No．832，used with perf（orated） initials，genuine，horizontal perfs misplaced，stamp cut apart．＂


Also submitted by Gary was the recent auction list of a midwestern firm in which there is listed and pictured a Perfinned $\$ 5.00$ Marshall stamp，described as＂非312， fine，Perfin．＂However，it appears to the editor that this stamp is 非480，perf 10 ，and that the auction firm has misdescribed it． Shown above，top right，is the auction photo， below which is a photo of a 非480 from the editor＇s collection，for comparison．The Perfin pattern on the auction item cannot be determined from the photo，but the one on the editor＇s copy is FNB／NY．


The editor recently acquired the Victoria postal card of Great Britain pictured above，posted in 1874，which bears what was described by the seller as an experimental punched＂arrow＂cancellation， used at Liverpool．The bottom hole of the design is missing on the actual card，but has been added to the above photo to show the full cancellation． Perhaps one of our members in Great Britain can shed further light on this interesting item．

Larry Owen（非606）of Dallas，Texas，sug－ gests that it would be helpful to the mem－ bership if all defective D and E rated Per－ fins were discarded．Probably some members will agree with Larry＇s suggestion，while others will not．The editor would be glad to hear from members with arguments pro and con．

Larry will have a letter in the September Bulletin on another interesting subject．

＂In the course of this correspondence，I also learned that there were three banks in Minneapolis with the initials MNB during the same period．Since patterns M－181（M／NB）， M－182（M／NB），M－183．5（MNB）and M－186（M（NB）） are unidentified，possibly one or more of these patterns are from one or more of these Minneapolis banks．
＂But I need help．Does anyone have a copy of M－181，M－182，M183． 5 or M－186 postmarked or precancelled？Eliminating or confirming the use of these patterns by Minnesota users would help in tracking the identifications．

## Northern Ireland Regionals

The first regional definitive issued for the area designated Northern Ireland made its appearance on 18th August 1958. Since that time several different values and varieties have been issued.

However, these emissions do not seem to have a very prolific use as Perfins. In the recent census the highest count was three. These being in the Jack Brandt collection.

Although intended for use in the appropriate area, the regional issues can be used anywhere within the United Kingdom. So it follows that any G.B. Perfin could be used on the $N$. Ireland regionals. An appropriate example of this usage is the publicity Perfin used by the Security Endorsement \& Perfin Society of Great Britain:

All the postal stationery envelopes that I have seen emanating from the A\&N/CSL have been perforated before make-up. Over the years I have seen two different Perfins on the envelope; dates are:

2. FRAME LIMIT: Entries of less than two or more than ten frames must be approved by the Exhibit Committee.
3. The VAPEX ${ }^{1} 78$ Exhibit Camittee reserves the right to decline, at any time, any entry in whole or in part without assigning any reason for such rejection; all fees paid will be refunded in full. All rulings of the Exhibit Camnittee are final. Applicants will be notified of acceptance or rejection.
4. The frames are $36^{\prime \prime} \times 48^{\prime \prime}$ and are designed to hold 16 album pages up to 9 " $\times 12$ " exclusive of page hinges. The fee for each frame is $\$ 4.00$ ( $\$ 2.00$ in Junior Section) and must be paid in full with the official entry application. Entries received without proper fee will be rejected. Failure to sulmit an exhibit after entry application has been accepted will result in forfeiture of all fees paid.
5. Exhibitors desiring insurance must make their own arrangements. ## IDENTIFYING THE FAKE OF CANADA'S OH/MS, TYPE 1

Through the courtesy of Ken Pugh, and thanks to the efforts of Bob Schwerdt, the data below is reprinted from Pugh's "Reference Manual of BNA Fakes, Forgeries and Counterfeits - Release No. 4."

CANADA 1923.39
PERFORATED O.H.M.S. (5 HOLE)

T.A. Morrow

Fake Type I

1. Measurements:

- Height $-0-6.2 \mathrm{~mm}, \mathrm{H}-6.4 \mathrm{~mm}, \mathrm{M}-6.2 \mathrm{~mm}$, $-\mathrm{S}-6.7 \mathrm{~mm}$. - HS - $13.9 \mathrm{~mm}, \mathrm{OM}$ - 13.4 mm .
- Width - HO - $10.0 \mathrm{~mm}, \mathrm{SM}-10.8 \mathrm{~mm}$.

2. Characteristics:

- The left and right vertical legs of the 'H' are even at the top, but the base of the left leg extends well below the right leg.
- The left leg of the 'H' almost touches the 'S'.
- The holes are slightly smaller than the genuine.
- The shape of the ' $S$ ' is too tall and thin.

CANADA 1923-39 PERFORATED O.H.M.S. (5 HOLE)

The genuine were perforated by machines made by a Chicago die making firm. The holes should show no variation in position but some copies may not be clearly punched. as the pins did wear out.

- Width - HO - 10.0 mm , SM - 10.8 mm .

2. Characteristics:

- The left vertical leg of the ' $H$ ' should be slightly higher than the right leg, but the base of the legs should be even.
- There is a considerable space between the ' H ' and the ' S '.

## Olympic Precancels and Perfins

by Joseph E. Schirmer

The following article is reprinted, with permission, from the July 1978 issue of the Precancel Forum, official organ of the Precancel Stamp Society. Mr. Schirmer recently became a member of the Perfins Club.

Like any topical collector, especially one who happens to specialize deeply into their subject, you at times either reach a point of saturation, or else suddenly discover an area of your specialization that you either did not know existed or else never gave it much thought. And this did happen to me sometime ago.

Not being a true precancel collector, I did however over the years gather together a few precancels of the U.S. Olympics issues (Scott 716, 718, 719). Then a bit later, I was fortunate enough tp purchase a lot containing well over 200 of these precancels. Again they were "accumulated" for future study. But recently while doing some research for a proposed article on the Perfinned sports issue of Salvador, much to my surprise I discovered that some of these US stamps were also Perfinned.

A search of my library and files did reveal some data, and enough to get started and also to whet my appetite for precancels, something I have long neglected. Contacting various dealers and collectors has given me a rather nice listing of these Olympic precancels, but little or nothing for those that were Perfinned.

Fortunately, some of my collecting friends have given me a few examples of these Perfinned precancels, and this just further added to whetting my appetite for precancels.

As we are all aware of the fact that precancel catalogues and information is not as plentiful as other areas of philately, it now leaves us with the hopes that fellow precancel collectors will take the time to check their collections and holdings and list for me whatever they have in this particular precancel (3 stamps). We will also hope that while doing this you will check for any of them being Perfinned and will list these separately along with noting the Perfin "wording" and a translation, if they are aware of same. Make certain the precancel and Perfin are identified together.

When this list is eventually compiled, with the help of the (Precancel) Forum editor, I will publish a complete (??) list in the Forum.

We invite your correspondence on this project and assure you that we will be very please with any data or stamps received.
(Editor's note: Mr. Schirmer is Associate Editor of the Journal of Sports Philately. Your editor considers his project one worthy of our support, with the results to be published in the Bulletin.

VAPEX 78 has released data and designs of the special pictorial cancels to be used at the show．Each cancel will be used only on the particular day it honors．The cancel for November 11，the Perfins Club Day at VAPEX， incorporates the VAPEX Perfins pattern in the cancel，as well as noting the 35 th Anni－ versary of the founding of the Club．The VAPEX Perfin will be used on all covers this day，too．A special cachet will be on the covers as well．The cachet will note his－ toric scenes in Virginia Beach．


Cacheted covers with special cancels are offered at 50 c each，three for $\$ 1.25$ ．The offer of three will include one from each day of the show．

## PUBLICITY AT SEPAD

Perfins and the Perfins Club received good publicity at SEPAD, held in Philadelphia, September 29-October 1 , thanks to the efforts of Irving Holloway, our eastern representative.

Irving had a corner table at a location along the mainstream of exhibition traffic (at no cost to the Perfins Club). Behind the table he mounted a sheet on which the name of the Club was spelled out with black buttons to resemble a Perfin. Three trays on the table contained exhibits of Perfins, and several Perfin publications also were displayed. A demonstrator Perfin device, loaned by David Stump, also was on display.

This marked the second time that Irving has had a table at SEPAD. He also has had a table recently at SOJEX, at the topical show in Atlantic City, and at the Bell Telephone stamp show.

President David Stump also was at SEPAD as chairman of the judging, and Ray Crow, editor of the Perfins Bulletin, was a member of the panel of judges.

## MEMBERS WIN AT PRAGA

Three members of the Perfins Club won awards for their exhibits at PRAGA 1978, held in Prague, Czechoslovakia, September 8-17. Catalog Chairman Joe Balough and Bulletin Editor Ray Crow each won a silver-bronze award, and L. S. Ettre won a bronze award.

It is assumed that Balough's entry was Perfins, but no confirmation of this has been received. The subject of Ettre's exhibit had not been ascertained as this edition of the Bulletin went to press.

Crow's exhibit was titled "A Postal Tour of United States Expositions, 1876-1915." It included three Perfin covers from the Pana-ma-Pacific Exposition of 1915.

The editor has not yet received a copy of the awards booklet and does not know whether or not Vojtech Maxa, our Perfins expert from Czechoslovakia, had an entry in the show. It is hoped that more details can be provided in the November-December Bulletin.

## CAIN RATINGS EXPLAINED

Some of our newer members have inquired about the $A, B, C$, etc. ratings sometimes referred to in the Bulletin. These are the Cain Ratings (so called after a former member who developed them) by which degree of rarity of U. S. Perfins is measured.

The Cain Rating Sheets were available to Club members for several years, but the supply of copies has been exhausted for some time. It is probable that revised an updated rating sheets will be published in the not-so-distant future. However, this is going to require a lot of work - and perhaps the cooperation of members in a survey via the Bulletin.

In the meantime, here is a brief explanation of the rating system:

Each U.S. Perfin type is assigned a rating according to its scarcity. The ratings run from "A" for rare to "E" for very common. The breakdown of the ratings is as follows:
"A" RARE
"B" SCARCE
"C" DIFFICULT
"D" COMMON
"E" VERY COMMON
only about five copies
about 50 in existence
found in the 2400-3600 collections
found in collections up to 2400 types
make up the bulk of the "under 1200" group.
It is realized that the above explanation will not be of much practical help to members who don't have the rating sheets. However, it at least will give you some idea of what is meant when you see the ratings quoted in the Bulletin.

Another post office service that helps to confuse the Perfin collector, when trying to rationalize a postmarked Perfin that does not, at first glance, appear to be the correct or normal usage for a particular firm, is the Cash On Delivery scheme.

In Great Britain the scheme, or service, came into operation on 29 March 1926. Under this scheme a customer was able, without prepayment, to order goods to be sent to them and pay the postman on delivery. Providing the goods and charges were below 5 pounds. If above this amount and up to 40 pounds, the customer would be informed that their order had arrived at the post office and be requested to pay up and take delivery. However, should the customer have changed their minds, they were at liberty to refuse and the pos't office had to return the package to the consignor.

As is usual with new systems, it had its critics. The normal flood of protest and letters of opinion to editors of the national newspapers began to make their appearance. One such opinion was from A. E. Cowper, a director of Selfridge, who considered that, though the charges were high when compared with the charges for postal orders, the scheme would not pay. "I think," he wrote to the Evening News, "that the Government will be both shocked and startled at the difficulty and expense they will have to contend with."

The charges at that time were: a trade charge up to 10 s - 4 d. ; up to $玉$ - 6 d. ; up to $£ 2$ - 8d.; up to $£ 5$ - 10d.; up to $£ 10$ - 1 s .

After this rather scathing attack on the system, it might be thought that it was doomed to failure. Not so. Illustrated is a registered letter, sent COD, on the reverse of which is a label giving details of the amount to be collected - yes, from none ther than Selfridge. This carries a date of 5 January 1932.

As the COD items had to be presented to an official of the post, the postmarks will, most probably, be those used for counter work. Hence the conflict that can arise when encountering postmarks different from those normally seen on the same Perfin. The same circumstances also apply when the Perfin has been used to pay the postage and/or fee on a registered letter. Or used on a parcel label to pay the postage. A company which illustrates that aspect very nicely is, again, Selfridge. This enormous London department store complex came into being in 1909. Situated on the northside of 0xford Street, it was opened on 15 March 1909. Besides the usual departments there were Reception rooms, Library, Bureau de Exchange and a post office. The parcel labels illustrated were used at their own post office.

The COD letter sent from Edgeware Road in 1932, has a triangle in the top left hand corner, printed in black text INLAND/C.O.D. on a solid red, which unfortunately will not reproduce.

Perfin type $a$ is to be found on the early issues, whereas type $b$ appears to come into used with the KGV issues.

## Background on U．S．Perfin Users



Edwin C．Haack（非770）of Portland，Ore．， has submitted some interesting background information on two U．S．Perfin users，which is reproduced on this page．The users cov－ ered are the Portland Railway，Light \＆Power Company，and Elbert Hubbard．

It occurs to the editor that more such run－downs on Perfin users might be of con－ siderable interest to our membership．Any member who can provide information on on more users，is invited to submit it to the Bulletin．

## PORTLAND RAILWAY，LIGHT \＆POWER COMPANY

Southward and eastward out of Portland， the Portland Traction Company and its pred－ ecessors operated two major routes．The older route，one of the first interurban lines in the United States，extended southward 14 miles to Oregon City，and was placed in operation February 16，1893，as the East Side Railway．The second and longer route extended 36 miles southeastward to Cazadero． This was completed in 1903 after the East Side had been reorganized and absorbed by the Oregon Water Power and Railroad Company， with a new route built out of Portland para－ llel to the old line but closer to the river．

The Cazadero line was projected in part to facilitate the parent company＇s construc－ tion of a power plant on the Glackamas River，and was designed to handle carload freight from the beginning．In 1909 a branch was built to Troutdale from a point just west of Gresham，and in 1912 the company acquired the Mount Hood Railway and Power Company which，on August 1，1911，had completed an east－west line from Montavilla（northeast of Portland）to Bull Run，crossing the Trout dale branch at Ruby．The lines reached down－ town Portland on their own tracks，crossing the Willamette on a street bridge．

In 1906 the system was merged into the Portland Railway，Light and Power Company， together with the city lines（Portland Rail－
way）and the power system（Portland General Electric）．For several decades thereafter the company，controlled by the E．W．Clark interests of Philadelphia，provided an in－ tegrated transit，interurban，and electric system．In 1924 the company was renamed Portland Electric Power Co．（PEPCO）．In 1946，PEPCO sold the city system to the Portiand Transit Company．

From the above，it may be seen that Port－ land Railway，Light \＆Power Company lasted， as such，until 1924．Its corner card is shown above，along with its PR／LP Perfin pattern（P－195）．

## ELBERT HUBBARD

The Roycroft mark which comprises Perfin Design 非14 was first used by Cassiodorus，a monk who lived in the Middle Ages．He was one of the first book binders and on every book he placed his mark，which was the cross and circle representing Unity and Infinity．

When Elbert Hubbard adopted this colophon as his own mark，he divided the circle into three parts，signifying Faith，Hope and Love， and added the＂R＂to stand for Roycrofters． The name＂Roycrofters＂is coined from roi craft or Royal Craftsman，and as such may be interpreted as the King＇s Craft．

Elbert Hubbard（1854－1915）was an American philosopher and writer who was a master of pungent one－liners reflecting his views on life，education，the martial，and politics． Hubbard＇s corner card is shown below，along with his Perfin pattern（Design 非4）．

The Perfin pattern continued to be used after Hubbard＇s death by the Roycroft Shop in East Aurora，N．J．（as indicated by a 1918 cover in the editor＇s collection）．

## ITEMS OF INTEREST

"Perfins of Great Britain," the catalog/ album published by Dr. Harvey Tilles and edited by Basil Tomkins and Robert McKee, won a large silver medal in the recent APSWriters Unit No. 30 National Philatelic Literature Competition. The competition was held in conjunction with the APS annual convention and "Champion of Champions" exhibition, held at Indianapolis, September 21-24.

Melvin Stark, curator of the PhilaMatic Center at Father Flanagan's Boys' Home in Boys Town, Nebraska, has sent along part of a cover on which the stamps (and cover) have been perforated 'V'CH'R'D/+7•+6•78. " Presumably, this perforation means that the letter has been "vouchered" for receipt and/ or entry by the addressee. The name of the addressee does not appear on the piece. Can any member explain further?

Leif Bergman (非1109) of Lidingo, Sweden, has provided some additional information
concerning the DSB (Danish State Railroad) Perfins covered in Mike Burrows' "Used Abroad" article in the July-August Bulletin. He says there are three different DSB Perfins, as illustrated below:


Leif points out that the Danish state's first railway was taken over in 1867 from a private railroad which had opened the first line in 1862. DSB issued their first railway freight stamps in 1875, and Perfins can be found on both DSB and private railway freight stamps.

## PERFIN COVER OF THE MONTH



The Perfin cover shown above seems completely orthodox as far as the Perfin usage is concerned. The $2 \frac{1}{2} p$ stamp is perforated with the SLO Perfin of Sun Life Assurance Society, and the envelope bears Sun Life's inscription on the back. The interesting point is the "Banket Junction, S. Rhodesia" cancellation on the front. If there were Southern Rhodesia stamps on the front, one might assume that this is simply a reply envelope mailed back to Sun Life in London from a Southern Rhodesia customer or branch of fice. However, there is no stamp on the cover except for the $2 \frac{1}{2} p$ British stamp. Moreover, the London postmark is dated 3 December 1946, whereas the Southern Rhodesia postmark bears the earlier date of 4 November 1946, which seems to further complicate the matter. If it were a U.S. cover, one might theorize that it came from Southern Rhodesia by diplomatic pouch and received a postmark when it was placed in the mails at the receiving office. Could the same be true of a British cover? Who can enlighten us?

And while we are talking about votes of thanks, the membership certainly owes one to Irving Holloway for his publicity and recruitment efforts on behalf of the Club in his capacity as our eastern representative (see story on page 2). Not only has Irving devoted much time and effort to setting up attractive exhibits for his Perfins table, but he has spent many long hours sitting at the table to greet passing show visitors and explain Perfins to them.

If you check the secretary's report on page 8, you will see that some 73 members have just been dropped for non-payment of dues. Ordinarily this would seem like an alarming number of members to lose in one fell swoop. However, it should be remembered that we gained some 200 new members over the past two years as the result of extensive publicity achieved through articles and special editions in philatelic publications, along with the dedicated efforts of Vice President Dorothy Savage and Publicity Chairman Rudy Roy. With such a sudden increase in members, it is only natural that there would be a considerable dropping out at membership renewal time.

It seems likely that some of these 73 collectors dropped from membership will submit their dues payment late and be reinstated. Those of you who know any of the collectors on the list could certainly help by urging them to do so. And let's all try to help the continued growth of the Club by spreading the word about Perfins and soliciting new members.

> Lorne Bentham's "Canadian News and Comment" column in the October 7 issue of Stamp Collector discusses the challenge of collecting Canadian Perfins. It is an interesting and informative commentary - well worth reading by Club members.

Your editor's entry in PRAGA 1978, mentioned on page 1, apparently fell victim to language barriers when the Czechs erroneously placed it in the topical instead of the postal history classification. Therefore, it probably was lucky to receive even a silver-bronze award, as it was not set up
as a topical exhibit. The same exhibit had received a vermeil and a silver in two previous international shows - but as a postal history exhibit, not as a topical.

The purpose of this comment is not to bemoan the editor's own bad luck, but to point up the fact that members who exhibit should be certain that the title they select is not misleading. And while on the subject, it may be well to point out that the title page of your exhibit is very important because it sets the confines within which your exhibit will be judged. In other words, it tells the judges what story you propose to tell with your exhibit, and they then will judge you on how well you have told that story.

The editor's query in the July-August Bulletin concerning an experimental punched "arrow" cancellation used on postal cards at Liverpool, brought response from several members. Each of them cited an article by Abbot Lutz, entitled "Experimental Cancella tions on The First Post Card of Great Britain," which appreared in Volume 53, No. 2, of the Collectors Club Philatelist.

The article by Lutz covers several types of experimental cancellations, including the "arrow" perforation which was the subject of the editor's query. According to the article, the "arrow" canceliation was one of seven different methods tried on an experimental basis in the hope of achieving the faster cancelling methods that would be needed for large quantities of the newly introduced postal cards.

The article states that the "arrow" cancellation was applied with a device manufactured by Daniel Sloper, whose pioneering in Perfin devices is well known to Club members.

Through the efforts of Dr. Harvey Tilles, Mr. Lutz kindly gave permission for his article to be reprinted in its entirety in the Perfins Bulletin. It is an excellent 8-page article, and your editor would recommend it to any collector interested in British postal history. In the editor's judgment, however, not enough of the article is germane to Perfins, as such, to warrant publishing the entire article in the Bulletin.

A revised list of the membership and their collecting interests is expected to be published in the November-December issue of the Bulletin. If you've had a recent address change or wish to change the listing of your Perfin collecting interests, you should get off a notice to Secretary Floyd Walker, Box 82 , Grandview, MO 64030, without delay.

The editor hates to keep beating the same old drum, but articles for the Bulletin are consumed at such a rate that it is difficult to keep enough on hand. Perfins writers and prospective writers are urged to work up and submit articles, or ideas for articles, for consideration.

Last month at Southwestpex, the annual show of the New Mexico Philatelic Association, I was awarded a gold and the reserve grand for my Perfin exhibit.

The President's Award for the best Perfins exhibit, and a vermeil medal in the open competition, went to Ralph L. Stuntzner for "Perfins, Their Origin and Usage." The Karl Lougee Award for the best U.S. Perfins exhibit, and a bronze medal, went to Vernon Stroupe for his "Holey Stamps! A Study of U.S. Perfins." The Keith Misegades Award for the best foreign Perfins exhibit, and a bronze medal, went to Rudy Roy for his "Perforated Insignia of Latin America."

Dr. Harvey Tilles won a silver award in the open competition for his exhibit of "Postal Security Endorsements," which included Perfins but was not judged in the Perfins competition because it included other types of security endorsements. Bob Schwerdt won a bronze medal in the open competition for his "Potpourri of Perfin Pleasure." The other two Perfins exhibitors were Edwin Haack with his "Railroad Perfins," and Joseph P. Harowitz with his "A Selection of Canadian OHMS Perfins."

The Court of Honor, which consisted of four exhibits, included two by Perfins Club members. One was the "Musical Perfins" exhibit of Albert Spencer, which had won the President's Award and a vermeil medal at SESCAL in 1977. # PERFINS ON THE MAP STAMP OF CANADA 

Canada's Post Office Department first authorized the use of perforated initials (Perfins) back in January 1895. One of the earliest users of a perforating device was W. J. Gage \& Co., wholesale booksellers and stationers, of Toronto. The earliest known date of use of Perfins in Canada is a cover, dated 17 October 1889, showing the use of the 3-cent Small Queen (Scott No. 41) with the Perfin design W-8 (W.J.G.)

Soon to follow W. J. Gage \& Co. were four other firms, and their Perfin designs may be found on various issues of Small Queens, etc. The Map Stamp (Scott No. 85, 86 and 86 a) was first issued on 7 December 1898. Three Perfin designs are known, by the writer, on this stamp issue. These include the following:


W-8 - W.J.G (era of use 1889-99)


S-8 - S.L/A C? (Sun Life Assurance Co. era of use 1893-1912)


S-10 - SUN/LIFE (a second design of Sun Life Assurance Co., era of use 1912-1942. This indicates a late usage of the Map Stamp, as the main period of use was from Dec. 1898 until early 1900)

## MALING SERVICE AVALLABLE

If your monthly issues of the Bulletin don't arrive quickly enough for you, youcan speed them up with airmail service, if you live overseas, or first class mail service, if you live in the United States or Canada.

Overseas members normally receive their Bulletin issues by surface mail, and that can take two months or more. Such delays can make auction lists, for example, difficult to work with.

Here are the special rates:
$\$ 2.00$ per year extra will cover FIRST CLASS mail service on all issues to members in the U. S. and Canada. It will also provide AIRMAIL service on AUCTION issues for members living overseas. There are generally two or three auction issues per year. The balance of the issues will travel to overseas members, who make this payment, by surface mail.
\$10 per year will privide AIRMAIL service on ALL issues to an overseas member.

## FROM THE LIBRARIAN

Your Perfins Club Library continues to grow--thanks to the work of members who are cooperating in our foreign Perfins worksheet program, and thanks to several members who have made recent donations.

Our thanks go to Neilen Boatwright, Charles I. Ball, Ivan Ley, Ed Stunztner, John Needham, and Mrs. Grover C. Babbitt for some nice recent gifts. And our thanks go also to the estate of the late Al Bartleson. The literature in the Bartleson collections has been added to the Library files.

Ed Stuntzner and John Needham---with the assistance of quite a number of members both here and abroad--continue to make tremendous progress toward a standard catalog of German Perfins. It is clear from the work that I've seen that Stuntzner and Needham are devoting an incredible number of hours to the German project. Any of our members who are involved in Perfins catalog work would do well to imitate the work of these two members.

There is sometimes a tendency to "rush into print" with Perfins catalogs, only to have to issue huge "A\&C" packets later. Although no catalog will probably ever be complete when it is first issued, the German catalog will be a much better product because Stuntzner and Needham are going through the worksheet stages slowly and methodically.

I've divided the German worksheet files into three parts for easier handling, and I'11 probably have to go to four or five parts before the project is complete. If you're interested in German Perfins, it would be well worth your while to check the German worksheets. They're all coded in the Library as WS-45.

If you find German Perfins that aren't listed, then by all means contact Stuntzner
or Needham so your information can be added. That's what the worksheet program is all about.

There are other new worksheets in the files now for your use. They're the result of the work of our foreign research chairman, Bob Schwerdt. Once again, if you find new patterns, send them along to Bob so they can be included in the worksheets.

## POKO TYPE "IMPS"

When the Imperial Tobacco Co. (of Great Britain and Ireland), Ltd. - known on the stock market as IMPS - was formed in December 1901, their objective was to acquire the interests of all the major tobacco companies in the British Isles.

Their aims were soon realized and, in 1902, the export business was sold to British -American Tobacco Co., Ltd.

Several different Perfins are known to have been used by IMPS and the companies they took control of.

A "POKO" type stamp-affixing apparatus was in use on their mail emanating fromEire as well as Great Britain. The very nature of the automatic Perfinning and stamp-affixing operation makes it very unusual for offcover examples to have readable dated postmarks showing places of origin. The Perfinned stamp being affixed nearly all the time in the area where either the wavy lines or the slogan portion of the machine postmark would be impressed.

Examination of Perfins from the two sources (Great Britain and Ireland) shows slight differences in the dies. The IT/C Perfin is found on upright watermarked coils with joints every 20 th stamp. It has been noted on the following issues:

John Gulick（非1129）of Cedar Falls，Iowa， is interested in locating a Club member with whom he traded Perfin covers some time ago． John doesn＇t recall the collector＇s name， but he has some more covers to trade if the member will write to him．Consult the mem－ bership directory in this issue for Gulick＇s address．

Dr．H．D．Hillmann（非1453）won a vermeil medal in a recent exhibition in Lehrte， West Germany．The exhibit contained Perfins and Perfin covers of the Netherlands．

Gerard Connolly（非1345）writes to state that the explanation of the Cain Rating Sys－ tem in the October Bulletin was too short． He points out that the A and B ratings are based on Cain finding only 5 and 50 of them， respectively，in the number of collections he used as a base．Gerard＇s point is well taken． However，the editor intended the explanation only as a very brief one to give new members some idea as to what the Cain Ratings are， without going into all the specifics．

The Cain Rating System will be fully ex－ plained in the new U．S．Catalog，which Chair－ man Joe Balough has announced will be ready for sale in the spring（see Balough＇s column on page 2）．

William Allen（非629）of East Lansing， Mich．，offers the following comment regard－ ing the October Perfin Cover of the Month：
＂ 1 ．The cover left England as a SASE for a return of something－apparently the clerk was not aware the original was going out of the country．
＂2．The receiver in S．Rhodesia utilized the SASE thinking it was proper．
＂3．The S．Rhodesia post office did not recognize the stamp and so indicated by the manuscript＂T＂（the UPU marking for postage due）and cancelled the mail－not the stamp －to show country of origin．
＂4．When the mail got to England the pos－ tage due clerk，seeing the English postage stamp on the envelope and NOT cancelled，sent the mail on as paid（by the appearance of the English stamp）．
＂5．So the English post office cancelled the letter and processed it．
＂6．This is a not common（nor rare）prac－ tice，especially when the countries are border ones－in this case with the countries being in the Commonwealth or colony family． I＇m sure many such examples exist．I have such items from Canada to U．S．bearing U．S ． stamps（not cancelled）plus Canada postage due markings．This is not diplomatic mail， in my opinion．＂

Bill＇s theory sounds quite plausible and the editor is prepared to accept it and close the matter－unless some other member wants to write in with a different view．

Vice President Dorothy Savage reports that she sent out 13 Perfin Primers in Oct－ ober．Secretary Floyd Walker＇s report as
of October 31 （see page 20）shows 12 new members．That＇s a pretty high return on our Primers，even though all of the new members may not be attributable to the Primers sent out in October．

Several members have written to provide the editor with additional information on the census of Perfin types on the 1902－03 issue．The publication of the census has been completed，but perhaps an addendum can be published after the editor finds time to sort out the data．

If any statistics are needed to show that Perfins philately is participated in by nationally known and respected philatel－ ists，the following can be pointed out：

At least 8 Perfins Club members are APS－accredited judges
At least 9 Perfins Club members are members of the APS Speakers Bureau
At least 5 Perfins Club members are office holders in one or more other national philatelic societies
At least 2 Perfins Club members currently are columnists for a weekly stamp publication
Perfins Club members have written numer－ ous articles for leading stamp society publications on many different sub－ jects．
We wonder how many other specialized stamp societies can match this record．
