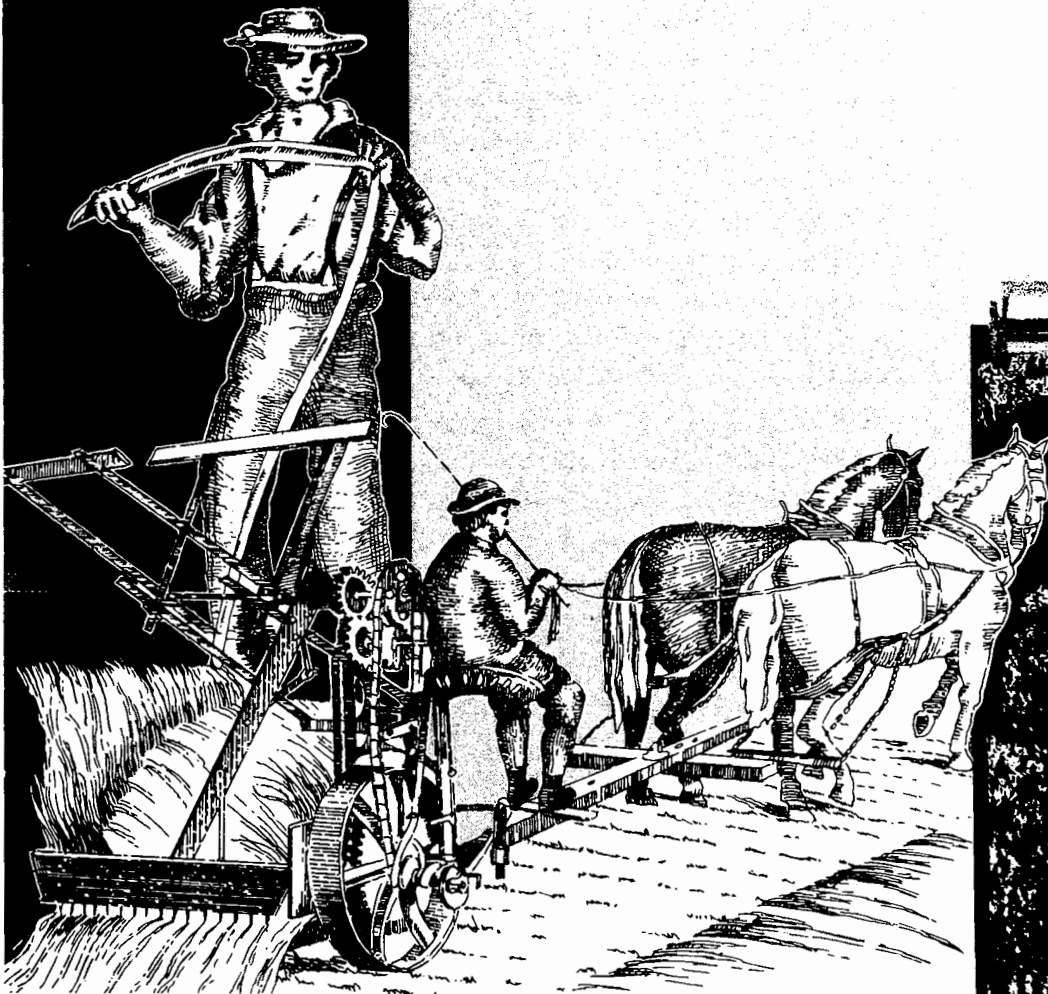

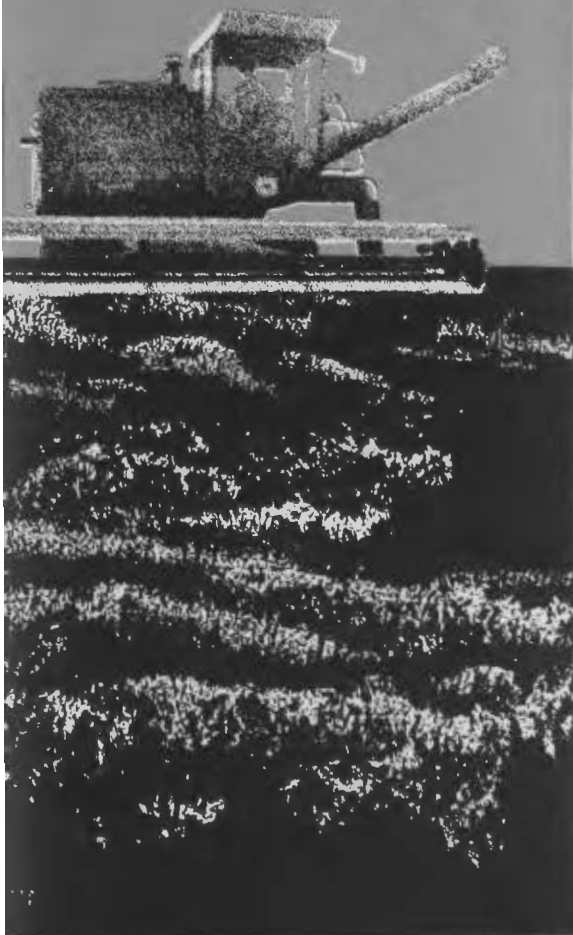

REPORTS OF 1974 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

Preliminary Reports. Four pages of data published separately for each county having 10 farms or more, and for each State, the four geographic regions, and the United States. *The statistics printed in these reports are superseded by those in the final reports, Volumes I through IV.*

Volume I, State and County Data. One for each State, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands, covering the area and its subdivisions. The reports for the States contain data for all farms and farms with sales of \$2,500 and over. *Chapter I* contains detailed data at the State level classified by size of farm, tenure and age of farm operator, type of organization, value of products sold, and major type of farm; *Chapter II*, county data summarized by subject; *Chapter III*, county data by subject for miscellaneous crop and livestock items found in relatively few counties; *Chapter IV*, county data by county.

Volume II, Statistics by Subject. Chapters containing total data for the United States, geographic regions and divisions, and States, for all farms and farms with sales of \$2,500 and over.

Volume III, Agricultural Services. Data by county for each State covering establishments whose primary activities are providing agricultural services. Data at the U.S., State, and county levels for all establishments are presented for selected four-digit standard industrial classification codes by size and type of organization. Data shown include dollar volume of business, gross receipts from products provided, gross receipts, labor and payroll by type of service performed, capital expenditures, and expenditures for electricity, gasoline, petroleum, and other fuels.

Volume IV, Special Reports.

Part 1. Graphic Summary. Profiles the Nation's agricultural system in a series of U.S. maps, a number of which are printed in color. The characteristics of America's farms in 1974 are illustrated for crops, livestock, and many other characteristics.

Part 2. Ranking Counties and States. Reports on the top ranking 100 counties and 10 States in descending order of importance for 88 selected items for 1974 with comparative data for 1969.

Part 3. Coverage Evaluation. Shows the completeness of the agriculture census for States, geographic divisions, and the United States. Data also show the characteristics of farms missed by value of sales and by selected standard industrial (type-of-farm) classifications. Sampling reliability of the estimate of coverage is shown by value of sales classifications.

Part 4. Procedural History. A comprehensive summary of the procedures used in conducting the 1974 Census of Agriculture in the 50 States, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands. The history explains the procedures used from early planning and testing through tabulation and publication of the final reports.

INTRODUCTION

Authority, Area Covered, and History

The 1974 Census of Agriculture was taken in accordance with the provisions of Title 13, United States Code, reaffirmed by Section 818 of the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 (Public Law 93-86). Sections 142(a) and 191 of Title 13 provide for a census of agriculture every 5 years in each State, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands.

The 1974 census is the 20th nationwide census of agriculture. The first agricultural census data were collected in 1840 as part of the sixth decennial census. From then to 1920, an agricultural census has been taken as a part of each decennial census and, since 1920, a national agricultural census has been taken every 5 years.

The first census of agriculture conducted in Puerto Rico by the United States was in 1910. From then to 1950, a census of agriculture was taken every 10 years in conjunction with the decennial censuses. In 1935, a special census of Puerto Rico was taken by the Puerto Rico Reconstruction Administration. In 1957, an amendment was made to the law to include Puerto Rico in the quinquennial national census of agriculture, and the first census under this amendment was taken in 1959, separately from the 1960 decennial census.

This report presents totals of statistics obtained from farm operators in Puerto Rico during July, August, and September of 1975. An agriculture questionnaire was used to record the data obtained from each farm operator; it is reproduced in appendix B. Additional background and a description of the procedures followed in taking the census are presented in section 1 of appendix A.

Farm Definition

The statistics gathered in this census relate to places with agricultural operations

qualifying as farms according to the census definition. In Puerto Rico, these included all places of 3 cuerdas or more on which agricultural products other than vegetables for home consumption were produced, or on which any livestock or 15 or more chickens or other poultry were kept on the place. Also included were places of less than 3 cuerdas, if their gross sales during the census year or expected gross sales during the following year were \$100 or more.

Comparability of Data

In general, data from the 1974 census and earlier censuses are comparable. Although the method of collecting data changed from personal interviews in earlier censuses to a combination of mail enumeration and personal interviews, the change does not affect comparability. However, inclusion of some places of less than 3 cuerdas in the 1969 and 1974 censuses, and a difference in timing, affects the comparability of some 1969 and 1974 data with that of earlier censuses.

Field enumeration for the 1974 Census of Agriculture in Puerto Rico began on July 1, 1975. An extensive supplemental mail enumeration (followup) procedure, described in section 2 of appendix A, extended the data collection phase through September 1976. Acreage, land use, location of land, crop and livestock production, irrigation, use of agricultural chemicals and fertilizers, expenses, and sales of farm products are all reported for the year 1974. Inventories for livestock, poultry, and other specified items are reported as of July 1, 1975.

Coverage

An extensive review and analysis of the data indicate that the coverage of the 1974 Census of Agriculture at the island and the municipio levels is equivalent to that of previous censuses.

Report Forms

One questionnaire was used in the 1974 Census of Agriculture in Puerto Rico as compared with two questionnaires in the 1969 census. The 1974 questionnaire had essentially the same questions as the 1969 A1 form. Most of the changes were made in the sections on land use and cattle and calves. They were made to improve the land use data and to obtain additional information on milk and egg operations.

The questionnaire was prepared by the staff of the Agriculture Division at the Census Bureau in cooperation with the Planning Board and Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

Enumerators used "Listing Books" as aids in the enumeration. Use of these books is explained in section 1 of appendix A.

Tabular Presentation

Tables are presented in this report for Puerto Rico as a whole and for each of the municipios separately. Island tables 1 through 10 present data for major items for all farms and tables 11 through 16 show more detailed information for farms in economic classes 1 through 6. Municipio tables 1 through 43 present data for major items for all farms.

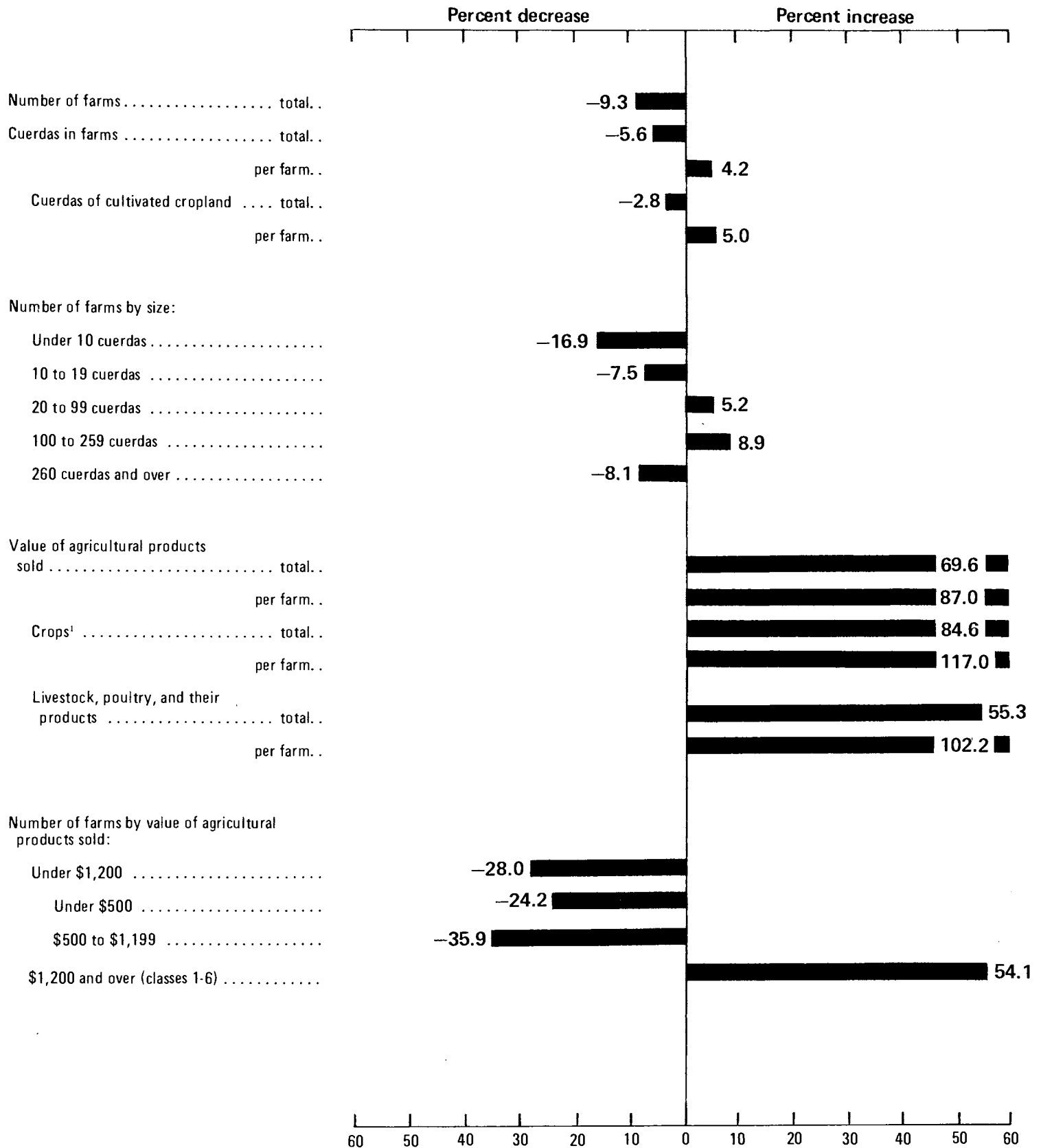

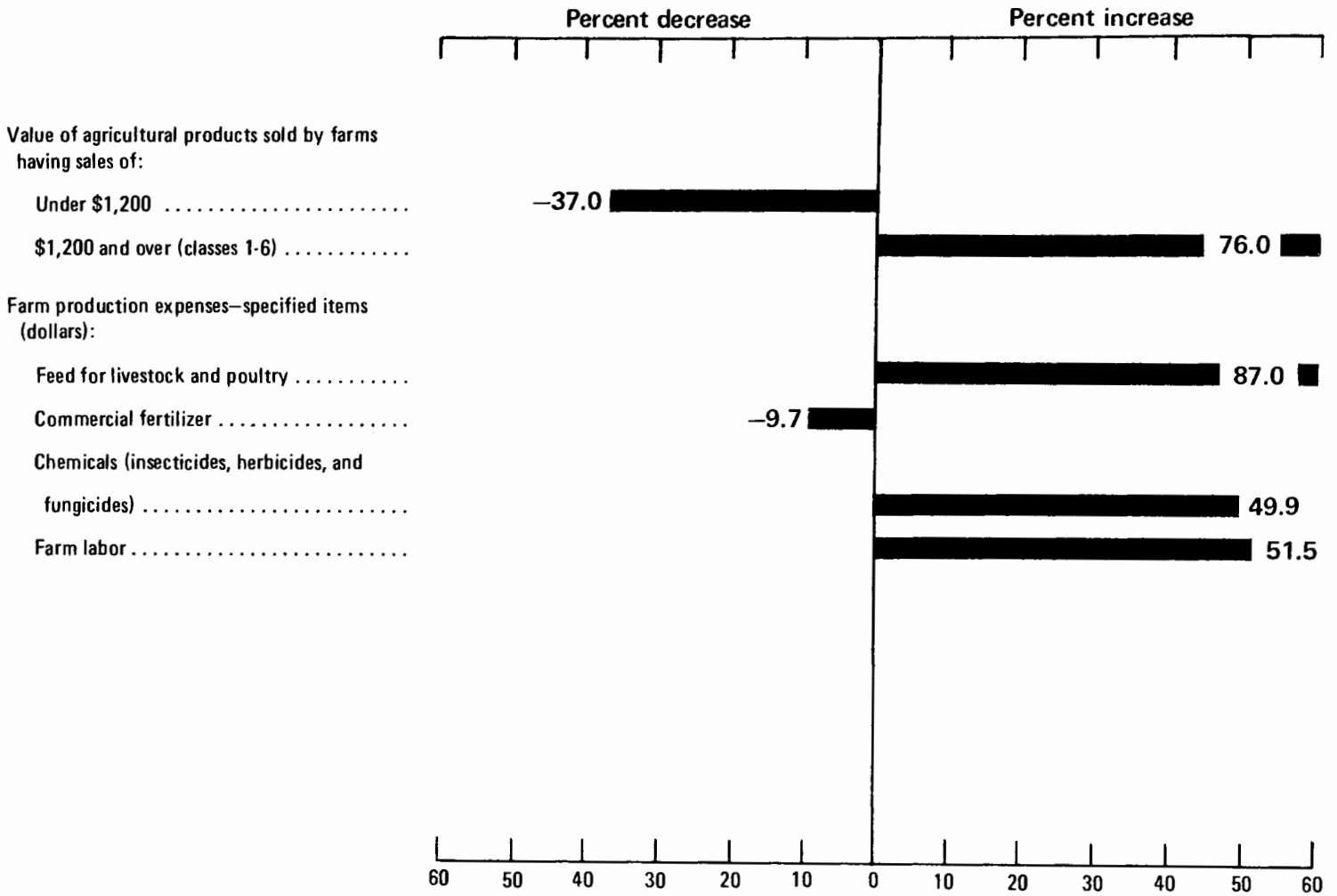

CHART 1. Changes in Puerto Rico's Agriculture—All Farms: 1974 From 1969

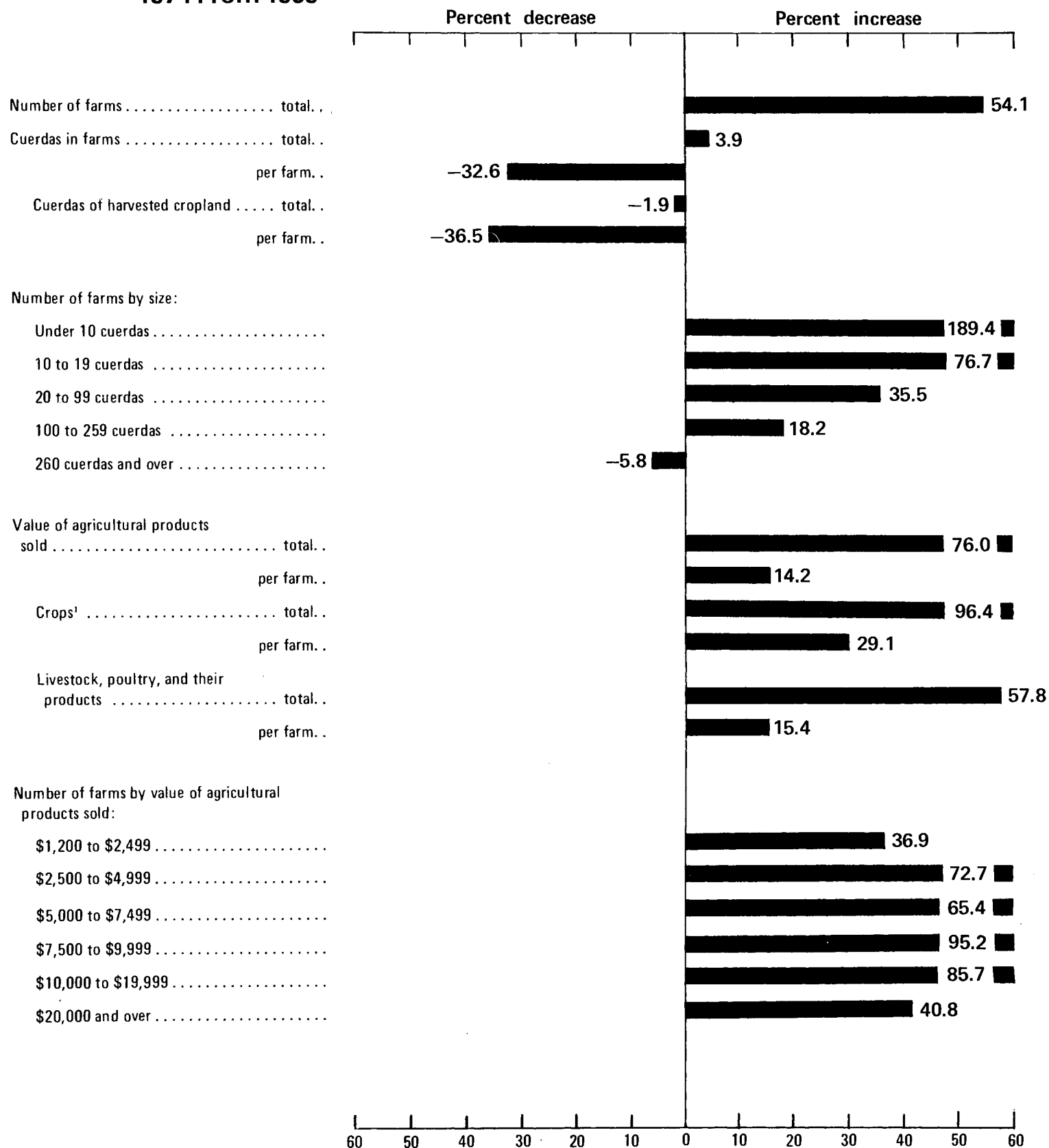

CHART 2. Changes in Puerto Rico's Agriculture — Economic Classes 1-6: 1974 From 1969 — Continued

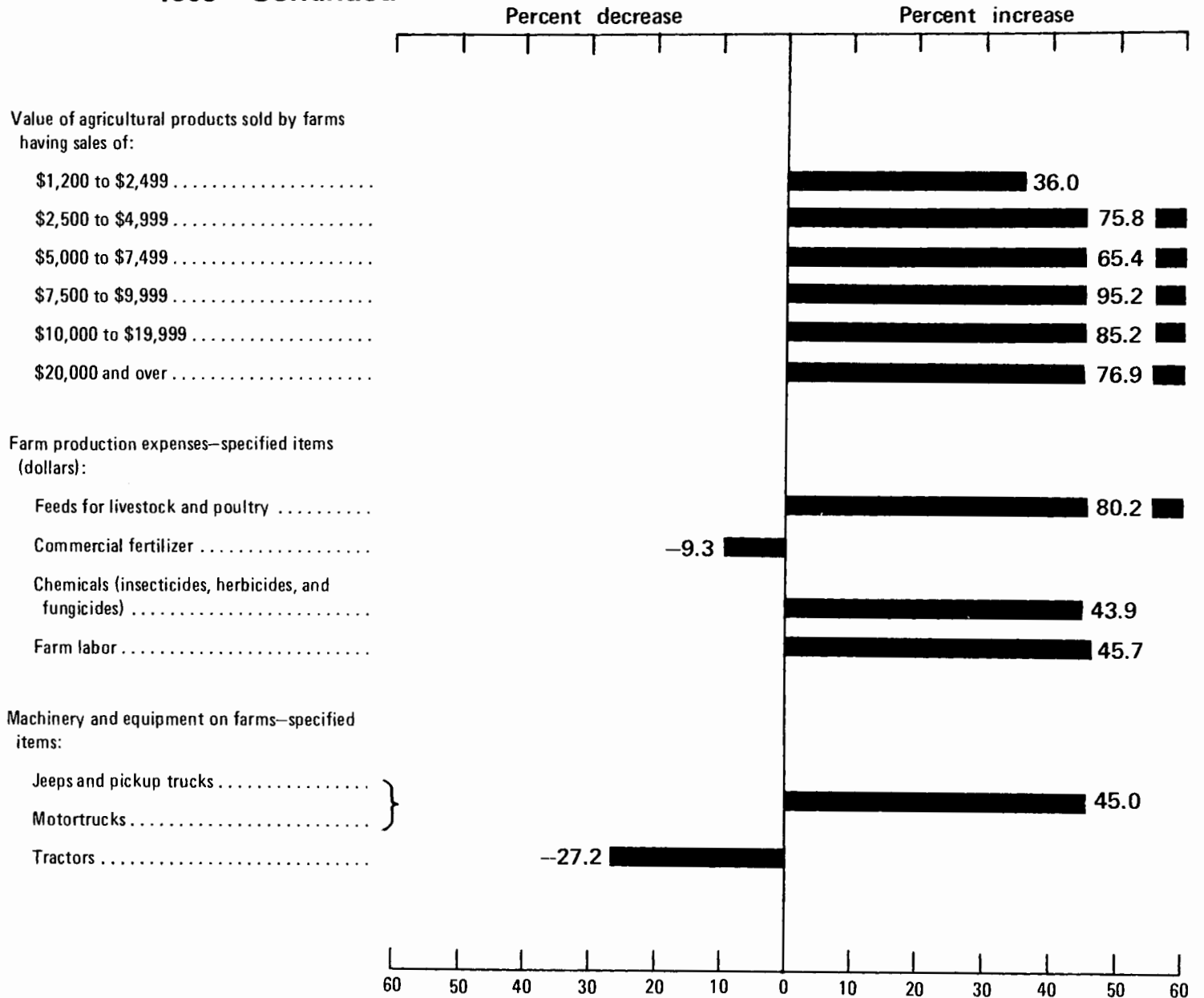


CHART 3. Profile of Puerto Rico's Agriculture— All Farms: 1974

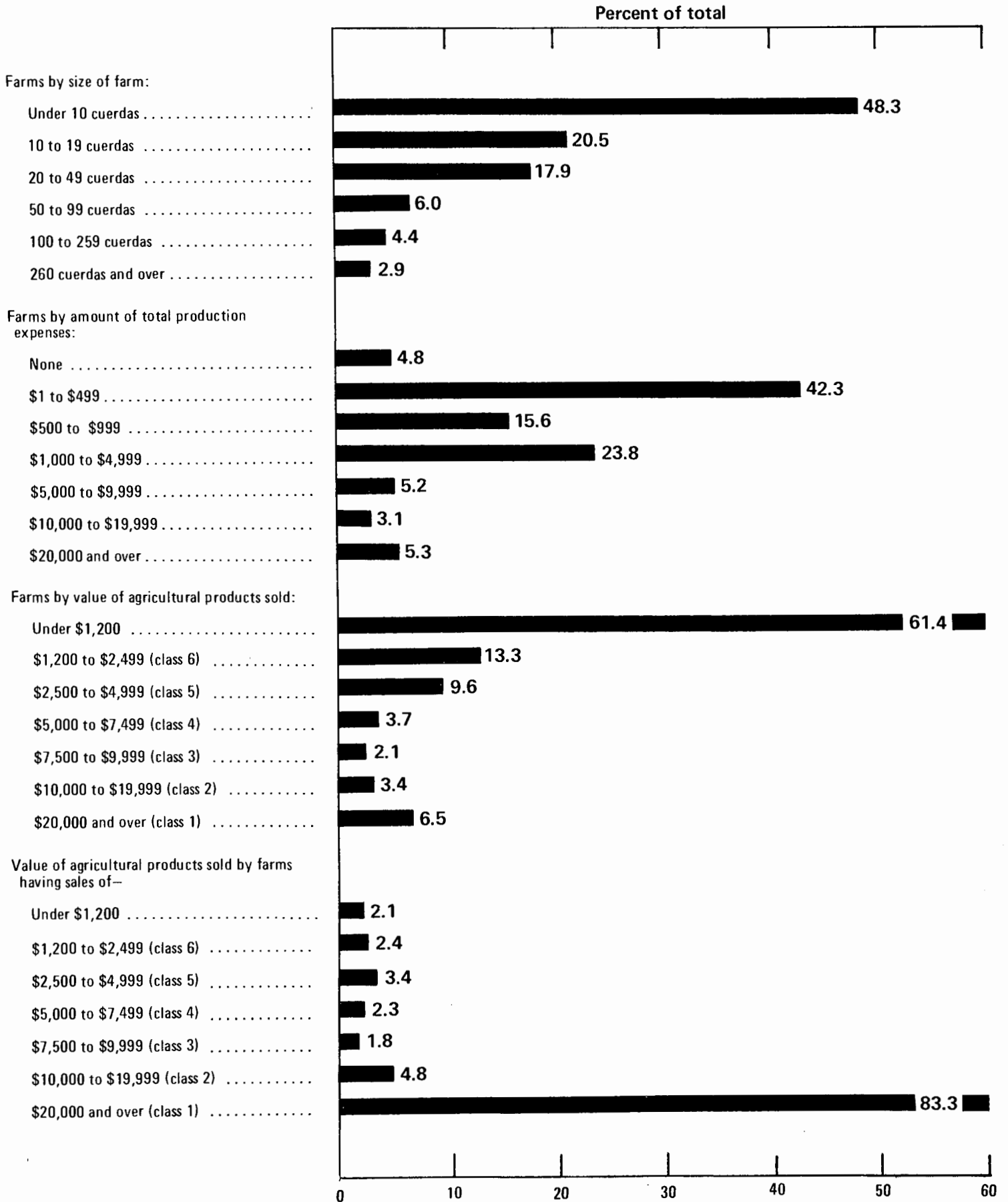
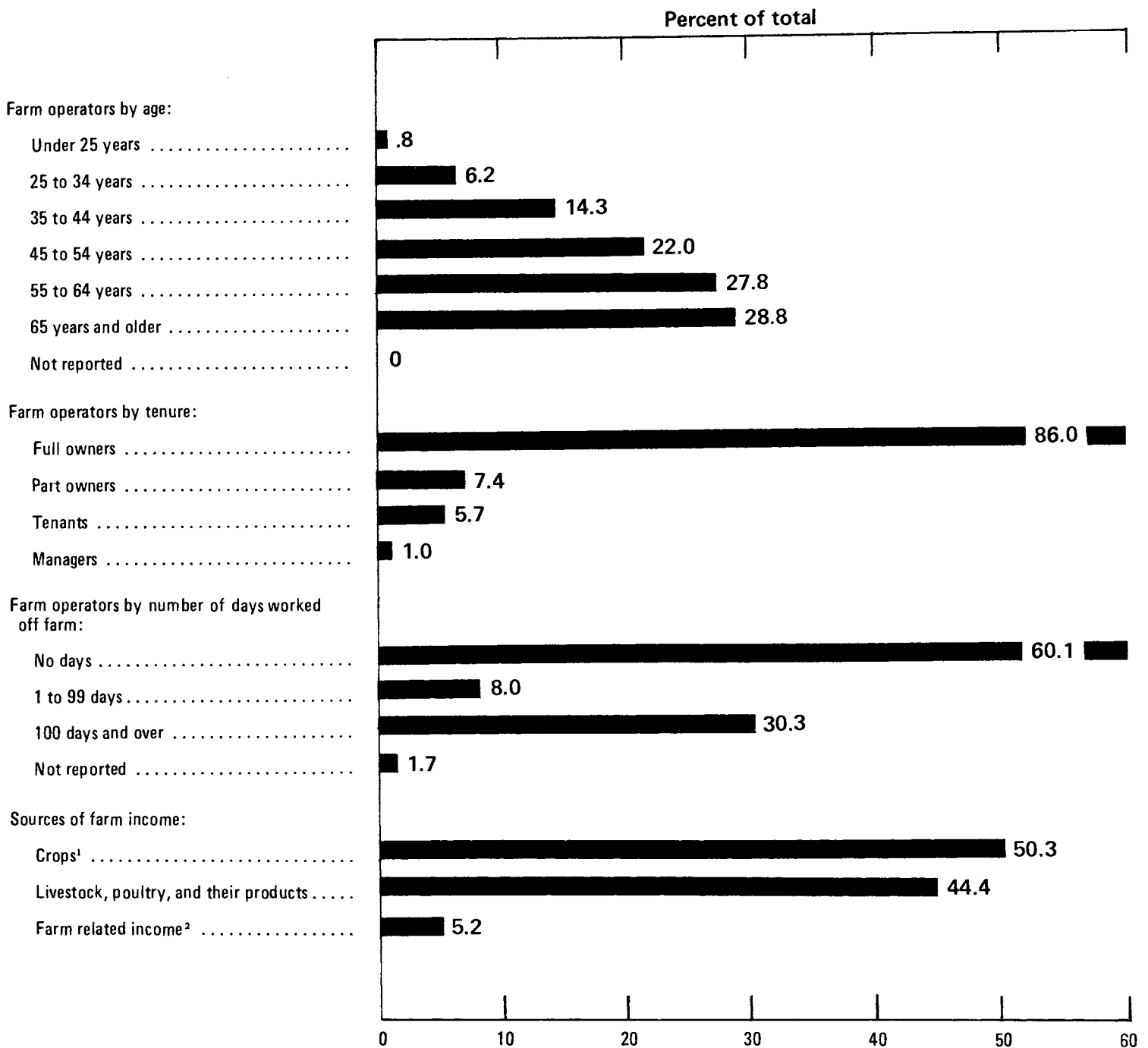


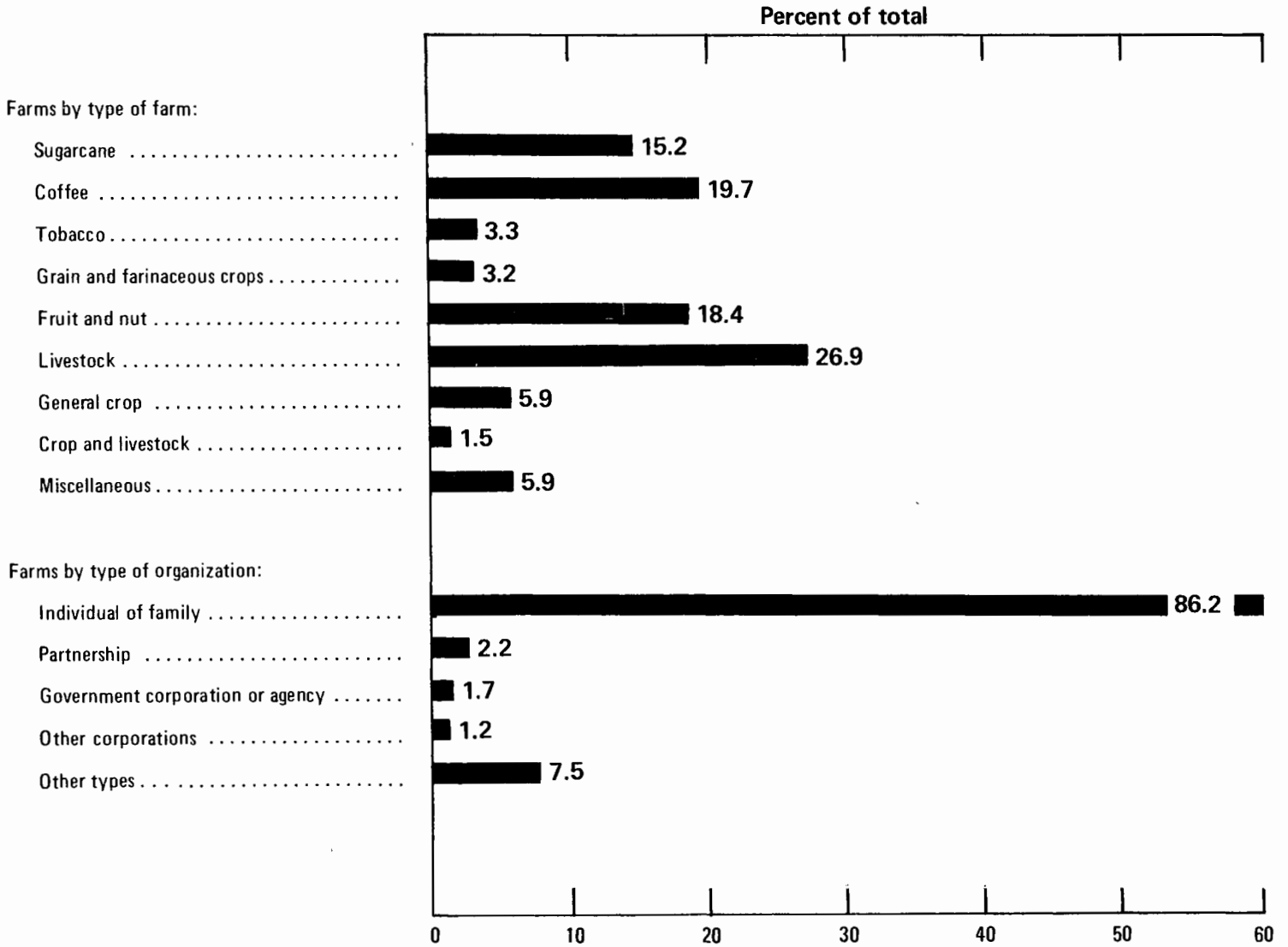
CHART 3. Profile of Puerto Rico's Agriculture—All Farms: 1974—Continued



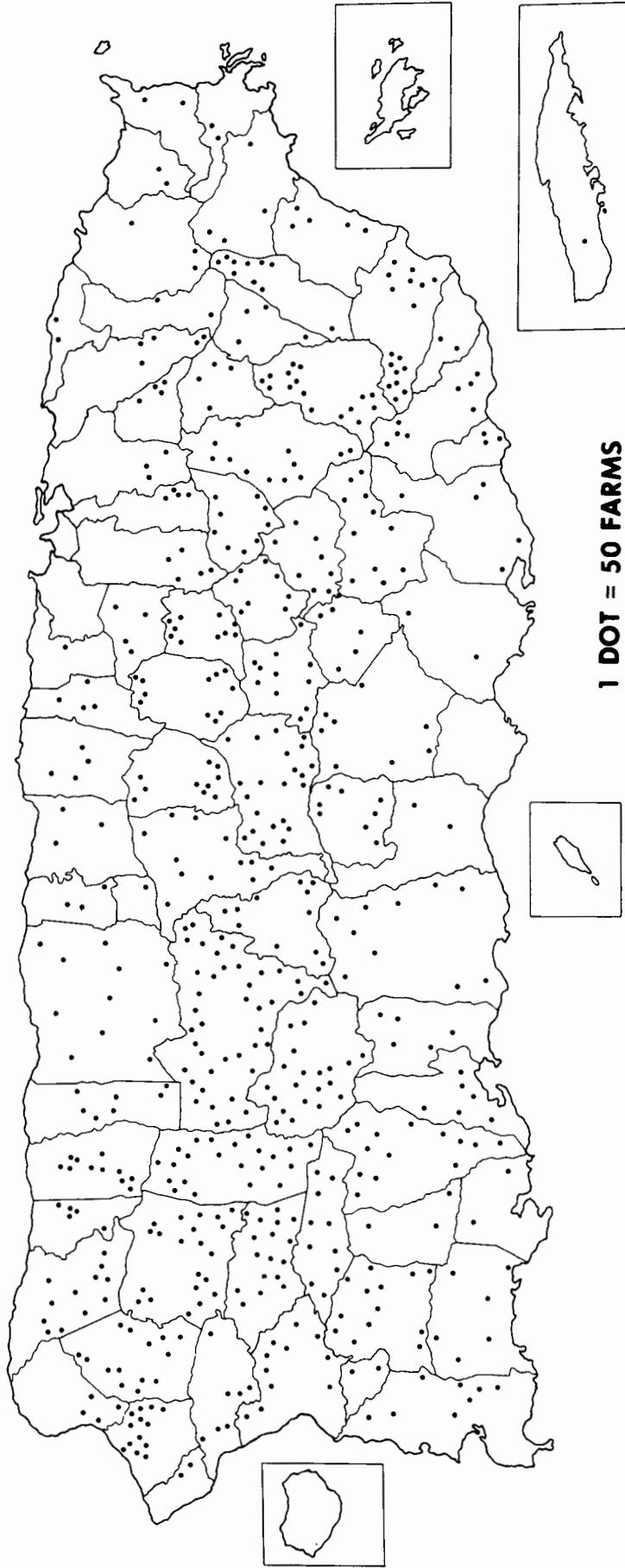

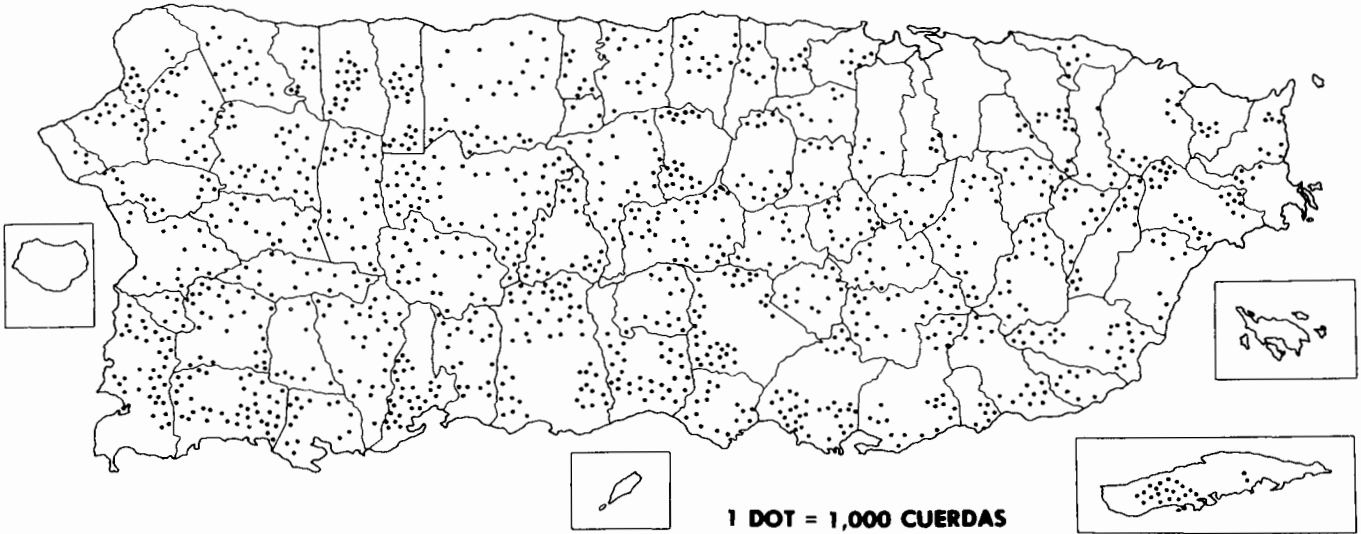
CHART 4. Profile of Puerto Rico's Agriculture—Economic Classes 1-6: 1974



NUMBER OF FARMS: 1974



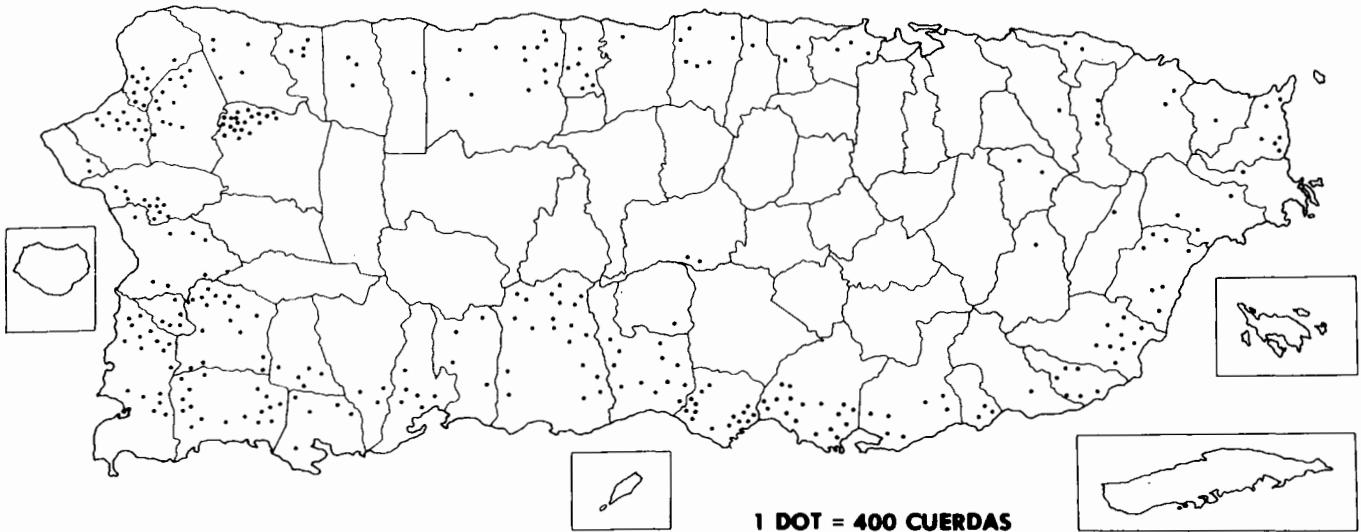
LAND IN FARMS: 1974

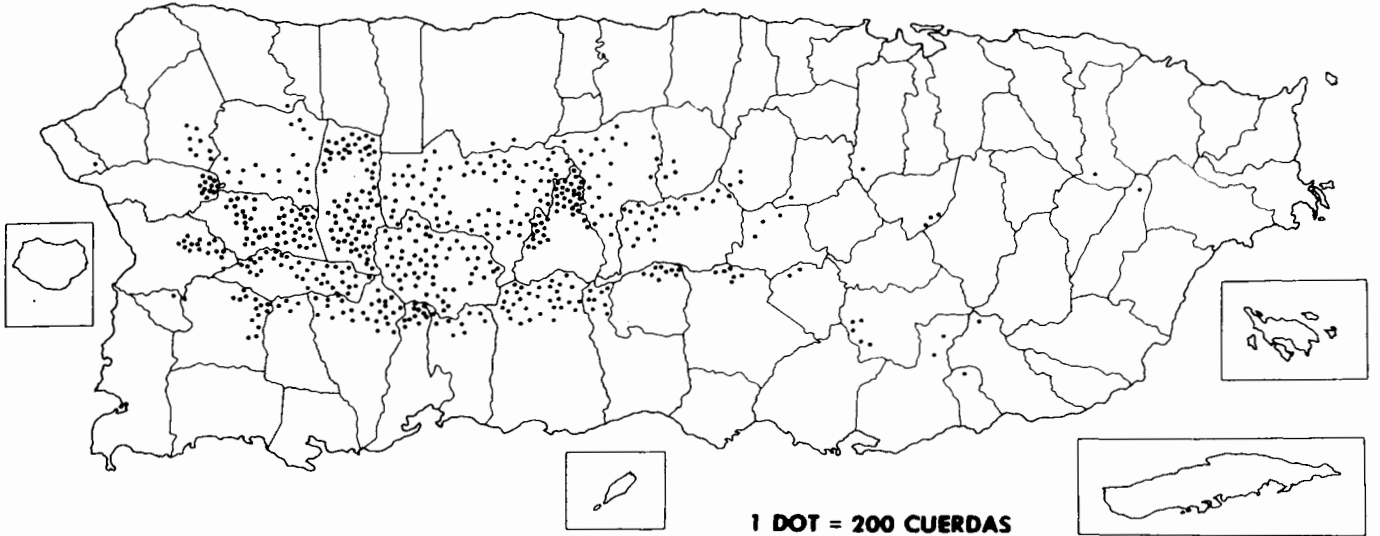
SUGARCANE: 1974

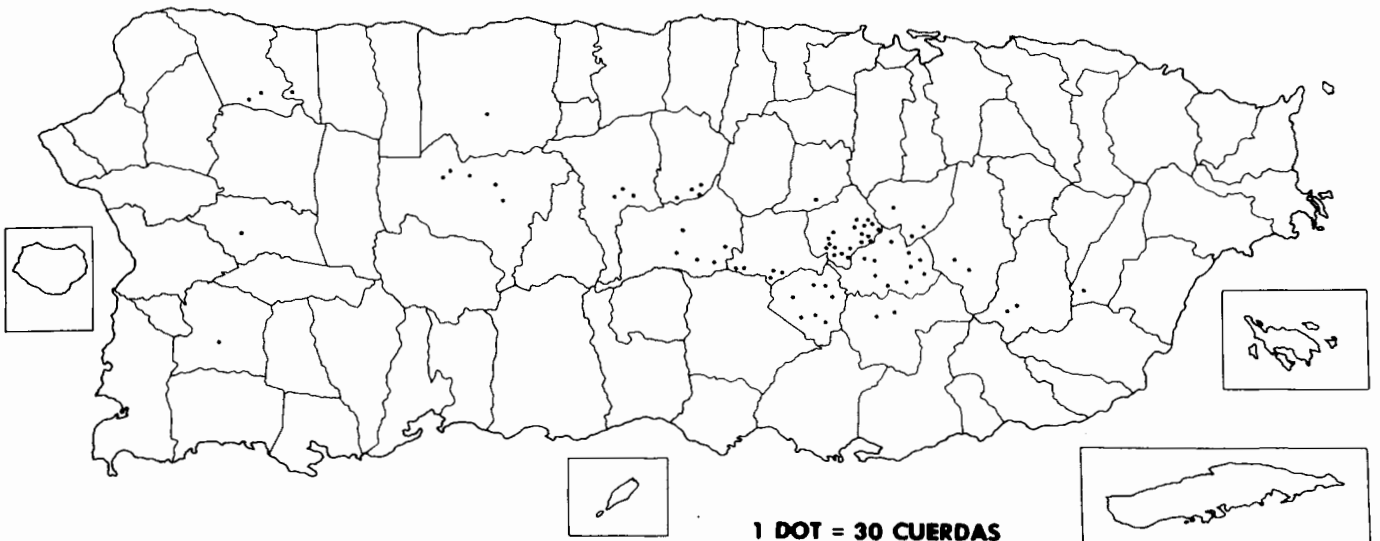
COFFEE: 1974

Regiones y Municipios - Regions and Municipios

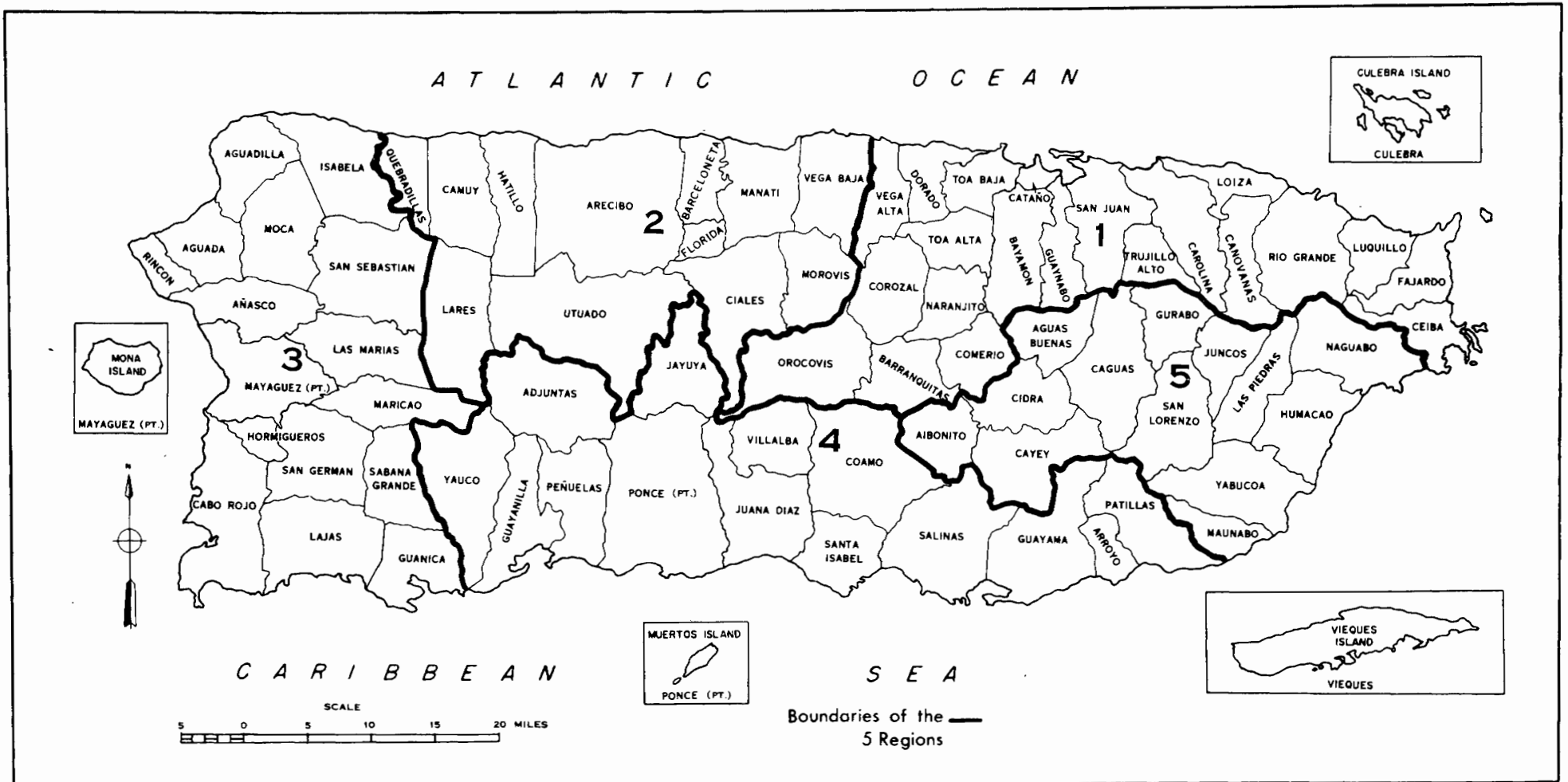

APPENDIX A. General Explanation

1. Taking the Census

The 1974 Puerto Rico Census of Agriculture was conducted largely by census enumerators assigned to specific geographic areas. In rural areas they were instructed to visit every household and/or dwelling (living) unit; in urbanized areas they were instructed to make inquiries of knowledgeable people to find persons conducting agricultural operations. To assist in obtaining as complete an enumeration as possible, enumerators were provided with detailed maps of their assigned areas. They were also given a Listing Book for each enumeration district (ED) or area to be canvassed. The book was used to record names, addresses, and additional data for each location visited, and whether a questionnaire was filled out. It also provided the enumerator with a series of questions. By asking them he could determine whether the housing unit was located on a place with sufficient agricultural operations to qualify it as a farm according to the census definition. When a place was located which qualified as a farm, the enumerator obtained a completed questionnaire and noted that in the Listing Book. When a place was located which qualified as a farm but on which the operator did not live, the enumerator entered the appropriate information for the place on a special form inside the Listing Book, and the operator was later located and a questionnaire completed for him.

A review of enumeration coverage by the Agriculture Division after the processing office in San Juan closed revealed that coverage in some ED's of the many municipios was incomplete, partially because of an incomplete field canvass

and partially because a questionnaire had not been obtained for all places identified as farms in the Listing Book. Therefore, a supplemental mail enumeration was developed and executed from Washington to cover 26 municipios that showed significant and unexplained reductions in the number of farms and/or land in farms since the previous census. The mail followup operation extended the enumeration through September 1976.

A list of special farms was prepared in 1964 from records of the Census Bureau and several agencies of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. It was updated for the 1974 census for use by crew leaders to control the enumeration of special farms in their districts. Farms missed were mailed questionnaires from Washington.

2. Office Processing

During the office processing at the San Juan central office, the agriculture questionnaires were checked in and reviewed for completeness. Reports from large farms were reviewed individually by agricultural economists or statisticians. Those that were incomplete or contained questionable data were given to special enumerators for completion and verification. From Puerto Rico, the questionnaires were shipped to the Census Operations Office in Jeffersonville, Indiana, where the data from each report were keyed onto magnetic tapes. The content of these tapes was then transmitted to the Bureau of the Census in Suitland, Maryland, where the data were subjected to a detailed item-by-item electronic computer edit for consistency and com-

pleteness. The computer was also used to classify the farms by tenure, type of organization, age of operator, size of farm, economic class, and type of farm. When the computer indicated that data were inconsistent or missing, it either corrected the error or printed a numbered code that indicated the type and location of the problem. These data were individually reviewed and corrected by agricultural economists or statisticians.

Following the review, data from all agricultural questionnaires were tabulated by computer and the tabulated data were again reviewed by statisticians for consistency, completeness, and possible disclosure of information for individual farms. Final corrections were made at this point prior to publication.

3. Census Coverage

Although complete and fully accurate measures of farm numbers, farm land, and farm production are the aim of each census of agriculture, the complexity of today's agriculture inevitably creates problems leading to some incompleteness and inaccuracies. Nevertheless, the data assembled from this and prior censuses can properly be characterized as serviceably accurate.

In various tables of this publication, substantial reductions from previous census figures will be noted in both the number of farms reported and the quantity reported for individual census items. This is due in part to a change in the manner in which large, multiunit operations reported. During the 1974 enumeration, many of them returned a combined report for the overall operation. The

data for these farms are tabulated in the municipio where the farm headquarters is located, substantially increasing figures for some municipios and decreasing figures for others.

Additionally, many tracts of land which qualified as farms in previous censuses did not in the 1974 enumeration. This land generally consisted of abandoned farms and much of it was being held for speculation.

Several factors have encouraged increased land speculation in Puerto Rico:

- a. Expansion of tourist facilities and airport development in the southwestern part of the island.
- b. Mining development in the west central part of Puerto Rico, which mainly has affected the municipios of Adjuntas, Utuado, Lares, Jayuya, and Ciales.
- c. Urban and industrial development in the northern and eastern parts of the island near San Juan.
- d. Emigration of the farm population from rural to industrialized areas in Puerto Rico and the mainland in search of better paying jobs and living conditions.

4. Definitions and Explanations

The definitions and explanations that follow relate to those items considered to be inadequately described in the tables. Most of the definitions come from the questionnaire and the instructions to the enumerators. For an exact wording of the questions and instructions, see appendix B.

Farm operator—The term "Farm operator" is used to designate a person who operates a farm, either doing the work himself or directly supervising the work. He may be the owner, a member of the owner's household, a hired manager, or a tenant, but he may be neither an *agregado* nor a sharecropper (see definitions). If he rents land to others, he is considered the operator only of the land which he retains for his own operation. In the case of a partnership, only one partner is counted as an operator. The number of farm operators is the same as the number of farms.

Farms—For a specified item, figures for "farms" represent the number of farms (or farm operators) reporting. If a municipio contained 1,215 farms but only 254 had chicken hens on hand as of July 1, 1975, the figure for "Farms" for the item "chicken hens" would be 254. This definition is the same as "Farms" in the 1969 and 1964 censuses, and is equivalent to the term "Farms reporting" in the 1959 and prior censuses. Where applicable, figures are given for the number of farms (or operators) not reporting items when the intent was to report data for all farms e.g., main occupation of the operator.

Land area—The approximate land area of Puerto Rico is 2.3 million cuerdas. A cuerda is equivalent to 0.9712 of an acre or 0.3930 of a hectare. A centésimo is one-hundredth of a cuerda.

Land in farms—Except for managed farms, the land to be included in each farm was determined from answers to questions about the number of cuerdas owned, the number of cuerdas rented from others, and the number of cuerdas rented to others. The cuerdas owned and/or rented from others were added together, and then the cuerdas rented to others were subtracted, the result represented the number of cuerdas in the farm. The number of cuerdas in a managed farm was the difference between the total land managed and that part of the managed land that was rented to others.

The land area designated in the tables as "land in farms" consists primarily of "agricultural" land, i.e., land cultivated and used for pasture or grazing. It also includes considerable land used for other purposes, such as woodland not actually under cultivation or used for pasture or grazing. For example, the entire acreage of woodland and waterland owned or rented by farm operators is included in land in farms unless it was being held for nonagricultural purposes.

Land owned (full and part owners)—All land that the operator and/or his wife held under title, purchase contract or mortgage, or as heir or trustee of an undivided estate at the time of the enumeration was considered owned.

Land rented from others (tenants)—All land that the operator rented or leased from others or occupied rent free is included in this item.

Land operated as a salaried manager (managers)—This item covers all tracts of land managed for one or more employers by a person hired for a salary. A hired manager was considered to be the operator of the land he managed because he was responsible for the agricultural operations on that land and frequently supervised others in performing those operations.

Land rented to others—This item includes all land rented or leased to others for cash or a share of the crops, or livestock and land rented from others and then subleased to others.

Land in two or more municipios—An individual farm was always enumerated in only one municipio even when the land was located in two or more municipios. If the farm operator lived on the farm, the farm was enumerated in the municipio where he lived. If he did not live on the farm, the farm was enumerated in the municipio where the farm headquarters was located. If the location of the farm headquarters was questionable, the farm was enumerated in the municipio where the major portion of the land was located.

Land use—Land in farms was classified according to the way it was used during the 12-month period between July 1, 1974, and June 30, 1975.

Cultivated cropland—This classification includes land in crops as well as land used for crops, except land in cultivated and improved pasture. It includes:

- a. Land in sugarcane, pineapple, coffee, fruits, coconuts, etc., even though no crop was harvested from the land during the period between July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975.
- b. Idle cropland and cropland from which no crop was harvested during the census year because of crop failure.

APPENDIX A Continued

Land used for intercropping or successive cropping was recorded only once in this item.

The 1974 data for cultivated cropland are not comparable with the 1969 data for "cropland harvested"; in the 1969 census, cropland harvested included only cropland from which crops were harvested. The 1974 data for cultivated cropland is more comparable with the 1964 data for "land under cultivation."

Land in pasture—This item includes:

- a. Cultivated and/or improved pasture used for grazing, cutting of hay or silage, or both.
- b. Natural pasture.
- c. Other pasture.

Other land—This item includes:

- a. Land covered by woods, forests, and underbrush and not used for cultivated or pastured land.
- b. Land occupied by lakes, buildings, roads, fences, wasteland, trails, ponds, etc.

Land irrigated—Irrigated land represents land to which water was applied by means of ditches, sprinklers, or other artificial means for agricultural purposes. The land reported as irrigated included not only land under cultivation but also pastureland. Figures were obtained separately for areas irrigated by water from (1) irrigation systems owned or operated by agencies of the government, and/or (2) systems or facilities operated by farmers, individuals, or privately owned companies, etc. Some land was irrigated by water from systems or facilities operated by the government and also by water from one or more private systems. Such land was to be reported under both private and public systems.

Off-farm work by farm operators—Each farm operator was asked the number of days he worked off his farm during the census year. Off-farm work was defined to include work on someone else's farm for pay as well as all types of nonfarm jobs, businesses, and professions, whether the work was done on the farm premises or elsewhere. Exchange work was not to be included.

Machinery, buildings, and equipment—Operators were asked to report the number of various types of machinery, buildings, and equipment on the farm. Machinery and equipment were to be reported only if in working order at the time of enumeration.

Hired labor—This item refers to the number of paid workers employed on the farm during the census year. Data were gathered on those who worked on the farm 5 months or more and those who worked less than 5 months. Data relating to labor cost were also obtained; employees of labor contractors who did work for the farmer were excluded.

Agregados on place—An agregado is a member of a family which lives on a farm not operated by any member of the family. An agregado may or may not be an employee of the farm operator and he may or may not produce any agricultural products of his own. He may own, rent, or use rent free the house in which he lives. The land operated by, livestock belonging to, and products marketed by an agregado family was to be included with those of the farm operator.

Sharecroppers (medianeros)—A sharecropper is a person who works land under a definite arrangement with a farm operator, receiving a certain share of the crops, livestock, or livestock products in return for labor or other contribution. In reporting the number of sharecroppers working on the farm and the number of cuerdas cultivated or used by them, the farm operator was to include all their livestock and agricultural products. Since it is possible for the same person to work as a sharecropper on more than one farm, census figures may overstate their number. Likewise, a person might live as an agregado on one farm and work as a sharecropper on another and, therefore, be counted as both.

Agricultural chemicals—On the questionnaire, operators were asked for information on the usage and costs of agricultural chemicals, including lime, on the farm during the census year, excluding costs of

application. Application costs were to be included with expenses for labor (hired labor, contract labor, etc.).

Production expenses—Data on farm production expenses were obtained for:

- a. Purchase of livestock and poultry.
- b. Purchase of feed for livestock and poultry.
- c. Purchase of seeds, bulbs, plants, and trees.
- d. Purchase of commercial fertilizers.
- e. Purchase of gasoline and other fuel and oil products for the farm business.
- f. Wages and salaries paid to employees or hired farm workers.
- g. Contract labor.
- h. Machine hire and customwork.
- i. Purchase of agricultural chemicals.
- j. Other farm production expenses.

Expenses were to be reported for the last 12 months (July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975). The information was to include expenses incurred by agregados and sharecroppers living on the farm, but was not to include wages and salaries paid to domestic help or contract labor. The cost of applying fertilizer and lime and other agricultural chemicals was to be included with the cost of labor (hired labor, contract labor, etc.). Expenses relating to the family home or automobile were to be excluded.

Crops—The report form contained questions about crops of any importance in Puerto Rico and also a question about any "other agricultural products" cultivated that were not listed on the report form. The operator was asked to report on all crops that were harvested from the place by him or others in his family or employ during the last 12 months. He was also asked to report the area of each crop harvested, the amount harvested, the amount sold, and the value of sales (for vegetables, ornamental and flowering plants, and lawn grass) for the last 12 months. Information on the area planted or ready to be planted was requested to ascertain the use of the land at the time of enumeration.

APPENDIX A Continued

Land use data for the area harvested required considerable editing because of the failure of enumerators to understand how the number of scattered plants or trees and intercropping was to be recorded in the land use section of the questionnaire. However, this editing did not affect the data relating to individual crops. The extent of the editing varied by municipio and by type and size of farms.

Livestock and poultry—Data on livestock and poultry inventories were to be recorded for the number on the farm as of July 1, 1975, regardless of ownership. The farm operator was asked to include in his report animals belonging to him, his family, agregados, sharecroppers, and other persons living on his farm.

Sales of livestock, poultry, and livestock and poultry products relate to the last 12 months (July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975).

Market value of agricultural products sold (sales)—Data on the market value of agricultural products sold were to be gross figures (before taxes and expenses). Income from farm-related activities such as agricultural services provided for others, recreational services, renting out farm land, and participation in Government farm programs was not to be included in this section (21 of the questionnaire), but in section 22, Other farm related income.

5. Farm Classification

Farms by size—All farms were classified by size according to the total land area of each farm.

Farms by tenure of operator—Farm operators were classified according to the tenure under which they operated the land in their farms. The tenure was determined on the basis of land reported as owned, land rented from others, and land managed for others.

- a. Full owners own the land they operate; they do not rent any land from others. They may or may not rent land to others.

- b. Part owners own some land and also rent some land from others. They may also rent land to others.
- c. Tenants rent from others all the land they operate.
- d. Managers operate farms for others and are paid a wage or salary for their services. Persons acting merely as caretakers, "mayordomos" (foremen), or hired laborers are not classified as managers. If a farm operator manages land for others and also operates land on his own account, the land operated on his own account is considered as one farm and the land managed for others as another farm.

Farms by type of organization—Enumerators classified the farms on the basis of the operators' description of the organizational status of their farms. The classifications are:

- a. Individual or family farm, excluding partnership and corporation.
- b. Partnership, including family partnership.
- c. Corporation, including family corporation.
- d. Government corporation or agency.
- e. Other, such as estate and cooperative.

Farms by age of operator—Enumerators entered the operator's age, as of his last birthday, on the questionnaire. The computer edit classified the operator's age into one of the following age groups:

- a. Under 25 years
- b. 25 to 34 years
- c. 35 to 44 years
- d. 45 to 54 years
- e. 55 to 64 years
- f. 65 years and over

Farms by economic class—All farms were classified into 10 economic classes based on gross value of sales of farm products and days of off-farm work by the farm operator. This classification provided an accurate description of farms in each class

and basic data for an analysis of the organization of agriculture. Farm-related income was not included in the determination of this classification. As in 1969, farms operated by institutions or government agencies were included in the classification.

The first eight classes are on the basis of value of farm products sold; the last two, on value of products sold and days worked off-farm:

1. \$20,000 or more
2. \$10,000 to \$19,999
3. \$7,500 to \$9,999
4. \$5,000 to \$7,499
5. \$2,500 to \$4,999
6. \$1,200 to \$2,499
7. \$500 to \$1,199
8. \$150 to \$499
9. Less than \$150 and 75 days or more of work off-farm
10. Less than \$150 and less than 75 days of work off-farm

Farm operators were asked to provide data on the value of sales for each major crop group, animal and animal product group, and other products. When this information was not recorded on the questionnaire or obtained during the follow-up, it was estimated by multiplying the quantity indicated as having been sold for each item by a unit price. Most of the unit prices used were secured from the Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

Farms by type—For the 1974 and 1969 censuses, all farms were classified by type on the basis of the sources from which 50 percent or more of the value of all farm products sold was obtained. For the 1964 and 1959 censuses, only commercial farms were classified by type. The types and the product or group of products from which 50 percent or more of the total sales were to be derived are:

Grains and farinaceous crops Corn, pigeon peas, dry beans, taniers, dasheens, cassava, celeriac, yams, sweetpotatoes, and other minor field crops

Livestock Livestock, poultry, and livestock and poultry products

General crop All crops included in the sugarcane, coffee, tobacco, grain, and farinaceous crop, and fruit and nut types, but not including vegetables or nursery and greenhouse products.

Crop and livestock Crops as listed in the general-crop type together with the livestock, poultry, and livestock and poultry products in the livestock type.

Miscellaneous All farms not meeting any of the above classifications. These include farms with 50 percent or more of the total value of farm products sold coming from the sale of nursery and greenhouse products or vegetables.

Other classifications—Farms were also classified by residence of operator, main occupation (agricultural or non-agricultural) of operator, and number of days operator worked off the farm.

6. Enumeration Periods

All tables carry the headnote "See Text, Explanation of Enumeration Periods." The enumeration periods were either the 12-month period from July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975, or as of July 1, 1975. Whenever 1974 is used in a table title, boxhead, column heading, stub caption, etc., it refers to the census period July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975.

Whenever 1975 is used, it refers to July 1, 1975.

Data for the following items pertain to the 12-month period from July 1, 1974, to June 30, 1975:

- a. Tenure
- b. Land in farms
- c. Agricultural products harvested and sold
- d. Livestock, poultry, and their products sold
- e. Cultivated and/or improved pasture
- f. Land use
- g. Irrigation
- h. Hired workers
- i. Agricultural chemicals purchased and used
- j. Farm production expenses
- k. Farm-related income

Data for the following items pertain to July 1, 1975.

- a. Number of livestock and poultry on farms
- b. Machinery, buildings, and agricultural equipment on farms
- c. Number of agregado families and sharecroppers on farms
