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

#### 1. (C) Overations: Significant Activities

#### a. <u>Mīssicii</u>:

- (1) During that portion of the reporting period from 1 November 1970 to 28 February 1971, the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) was located in three Brigade Areas of Operations. The 1st Brigade was in the center, encompassing Camp Gorvad (Division Headquarters) at Phuoc Vinh and extending East into War Zone D. 2d Brigade extended North to the Cambodian border, and 3d Brigade was East of Bien Hoa extending Southeaast to the South China Sea. Division missions were: Concentrate on the supply/infiltration routes cut of Cambodia; menitor MR-6 and War Zone D; locate enemy cache sites; eliminate the 33d NVA Regiment; destroy enemy base areas; counter enemy attempts to disrupt pacification; upgrade territorial Forces; and exploit ralliers and conduct extensive FSIOPS in support of the rallier program.
- (2) On 20 December 1970, the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) was notified that it had been selected as an element of the Sixth Increment RVM Redeployment Plan KEYSTONE ROBIN CHARLIE. The Division was directed to conduct a phased redeployment of the Division (-) from the Republic of Vietnam and concurrently organize the 3rd Brigade (SEP), 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) for continued operations in RVM under OPCON II FFORCEV. The Division (-) was programmed for redeployment during the 60-day period 1 March to 29 April 1971. The period 1 January to 28 Feb-

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runry was characterized by continued operations in the Division's 40 while concurrently the Division Staff planned, coordinated, and organized for redeployment.

#### b. GENERAL:

- (1) The 1 November 1970 to 28 February 1971 period saw no significant changes in boundaries or realignment of forces of the Division. The Division remained in the same operational area, stretching from the Cambodian border to the South China Sea, that it entered upon withdrawal from Cambodia in June 1970.
- (2) Energy activity within the Division's area of operations remained at a low level during the reporting period as energy main and local force units avoided contact. The intensity and frequency of attacks by fire on base camps further decreased over the previous reporting period.
- (3) The Division continued to emphasize location and evacuation or destruction of enemy caches. As during the previous reporting period, a significant number of enemy impressed laborers and Local Force VC continued to rally. In Phuse Long Province the continuing intensified psychological operations program in conjunction with combat operations, and a critical food shortage were primary reasons for rallying.
- (4) The Division program of upgrading territorial forces continued and ideluded combined operations, deployment of Combat Advisory Teams to train and fight alongside RF/FF soldiers, and formal training of Topular Forces officers and NCO's and ARVN units at the Division's First Text Academy in Bien Hoa.
- (5) During the month of February 1971, while the Division was planning and preparing for redeployment, it accounted for 609 enemy MA, 2 Prisoners of War, 16 Hoi Chanhs, and 335 individual weapons and 4 crew-served weapons captured or destroyed.
- (6) In preparation for redeployment, coordination was effected with ARVI forces to assume central of the 2d Brigade Area of Operations and partions of the 1st and 3d Brigade Areas of Operation. Elements of the 7th ARVN Regiment, 5th ARVN Division assumed responsibility for the 2d Brigade AO on 7 March, and on 11 March 1971, control of FSB Buttons at Song Be was assumed by the GVN forces, completing the 2d Brigade disengagement. Upon standdown of the 1st Brigade on 24 March 1971, the 3d Brigade Area of Operations encompassed major portions of the previous AO's of the

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1st and 3d Brigades. The remaining Area of Operation was turned over to GVN Forces. The sequence of Division AO changes and reduction can be followed by referring to overlays in Annex T.

(7) In retrospect, the successful interdiction of energy supply routes, location and destruction of enemy caches, successful operations directed towards influencing enemy and enemy impressed laborers to rally, and the smooth disengagement associated with redeployment were the most significant aspects of 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) operations during the period 1 November 1970 to 30 April 1971.

#### c. 1st Brigade Operations:

- (1) Mission: During the period 1 November 1970 through 24 March 1971, the 1st Brigade conducted operations in War Zone "D," along the MR2/MR3 boundary, Southern Phuce Long Province, Long Khanh Province, Northeastern Binh Duong Province, and Northeastern Bien Hoa Province. They were targeted against SR-5 and the Elst Rear Service Group, and tasked with closing infiltration routes between War Zone D and Eastern SR-5. The Brigade conducted operations to prevent enemy mortar/rocket attacks against Camp Gorvad. Additionally, Combat Advisory Teams were employed, and combined US-ARVN operations were conducted, to advance pacification and Vietnamization.
- (2) Execution: During the reporting period, ground activity was light to nederate. Normally the encountered enemy was in small groups throughout the area of operations. Enemy initiated contacts usually occurred in the vicinity of cache sites or enemy headquarters area, however, the vast majority of all contacts were friendly initiated. The general concept of operations employed during this reporting period was to keep one battalion targeted continually on the 81st RSG and its cache sites (1-7 Cav) and one battalion targeted on Hqs, SR-5 and the associated exciltration/infiltration routes from western War Zone "D" (2-7 Cav). The remaining battalion focused its efforts on the seasonal rice denial operations of Dinh Quan District and later the Hqs and operational elements of the J-95(logistical unit). Later when the Brigade received a fourth battalion (2-12 Cav) it was used to provide the enternal defense for Camp Gorvad. This entailed targeting on the K1/K2 DNR battalions and various local force units.
- (1) From 1-25 November the 1st Brigade with 1-7 Cav, 2-7 Cav, and 1-12 Cav conducted operations in War Zone "D." The mission was directed against Headquarters SR-5, 81st RSG and its cache sites, and the interdiction of enemy infiltration/exfiltration routes in War Zone "D."
- (b) From 26 November 13 January, the 1st Brigade with the 1-7 Cav, 2-7 Cav, and 1-12 Cav conducted operations in War Zone "D" and southern Long Khanh Province. The mission was directed against Headquarters of SR-5, the 81st RSG and its cache sites, infiltration/exfiltration routes in Ver Zone "D," and operations to support GVN pacification and rice denial programs in

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southern Long Khanh Province. During this period the 1st Brigade Combat Advisory Team was placed OFCON to 1-12 Cav to assist in combined operations consisting of eagle flights, and mobile check points in southern Long Khanh Province (Dinh Quan District).

- (c) From 14 January 6 February, the 1st Brigade with the 1-7 Cav, 2-7 Cav, and 1-12 Cav continued operations in War Zone "D" against SR-5 and the S1st RSG and conducted operations along MR2/MR3 boundary targeted on 1-95 Headquarters (previously the S4th RSG) and associated units while supporting PF training in IR-3. To accomplish the PF training mission in MR-3, D Co (-), 2-7 Cav was placed OPCON to Diverty and 1st Brigade received OPCON C Co, 1-5 Cav and B Co, 1-27 Inf, 25th lnf Div. The PF training units conducted operations in Bien Hoa and Gia Dinh Provinces.
- (d) During the period 7 February through 4 Morch, the 1st Brigade wath the 1-7 Cev, 2-7 Cev, 1-12 Cev and 2-12 Cev continued operations in War Zone "D" and northern Long Khanh Province, conducted operations in southern Phuoc Long and northern Binh Duong Provances, continued training of territorial forces and assumed the mission of defending Cemp Corvad and GVN installations in the Phuoc Vinh area from rocket/mortar attack.

#### d. 2d Brigade Operations:

(1) Mission: The 2d Brigade, in conjunction with the 7th ARVN Infantry Regiment, had the mission of conducting ground operations, air reconnaissance and pacification operations aimed at fixing and dostroying the energy, as well as interdicting energy supply lines, locating energy caches and pacifying Phuoc Long Province. The Brigade conducted combined operations with ARVN and Province Forces, supported land clearing operations in its area of operations, continued Combat Advisory Team support to territorial forces of Phuoc Long and Binh Long Provinces, continued its efforts to neutralize Base Areas 351 and 203, conducted ground operations against the K-28 and K-29 Local District Force Units, and upgraded resources control operations.

#### (2) Execution:

(a) During the period 1-17 November, the 2d Brigade continued operations to support the pacification and Vietnamization programs within its assigned area of operations. On 18 November the 2d Brigade conducted a combined operation in coordination with the 7th ARVN Regiment along the military boundary via TU 170365 to YU 217410. The ARVN pertion of the operation entailed employing three companies of the 7th Regiment

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in intensive reconnaissance operations which extended three kilometers into Cambodia. During this combined operation, the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry, the 1st Battalion, 8th Cavalry, and the 2d Battalion, 12th Cavalry performed interdiction, blocking, and supporting operations in conjunction with the airmobile assaults. The Brigade initiated Rome Plow operations along Highway 309 utilizing the 60th Land Clearing Company with security provided by A/1-11 ACR.

- (b) The 2d Brigade, during the month of December, employed the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry against the K-28 District Force, in Base Area 203. The 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry conducted their operations in the vicinity of FSBs NARISA, NGWYEN TRAI, and DJANGO. The 1st Battalion, 8th Cavalry performed the mission of interdicting enemy routes of communication and supply within their assigned AO, conducting combat operations against elements of MR 10, H-50, and the X-41 Communications/Liaison Base. The 2d Brigade prepared and upgraded contingency plans for the Duc Phong, Bunard, Dong Xoai, and Song Be areas. On 13 December the 2d Brigade increased aerial visual reconnaissance in its area of operations, with A and E Troop, 1st Squadron, 9th Cavalry in general support.
- (c) During the period 27-31 December, Battery B, 6th Battalion, 27th Artillery was moved from Duc Phong to FSB SNUFFY. The 60th Land Clearing Company, having completed its mission in the 2d Brigade AO, moved from FSB SNUFFY to Long Binh, and A Troop, 1st Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment moved to Di An and reverted to OPCON 11th ACR. The upgrading of Highway 309 continued with D/31st Engineers making an all weather road and emplacing culverts and ditches where needed.
- (d) Indications on 28 January 1971 were that for the next fortyfive days the enemy would attempt a major infiltration effort on the Adams and Jolley Trails leading from the Cambodian Base Area 351, through Phuoc Long Province into the heart of the 3d Military Region. The 2d Brigade intensified its operations during the period 29 January through 1 March. The operation was conducted in two phases: Phase I, 29 January through 5 February; Phase II, 6 February through 1 March. Phase I operations were conducted with maximum emphasis on aerial reconnaissance by 1-9 ACS elements, reconnaissance and surveillance by LRRP teams and Reconnaissance in Force and ambush by OPCON battalions. Phase II operations were highlighted by the reduployment of the 1st Battalion 8th Cavalry and the realignment of the 2d Brigade AO internal boundaries. Continued emphasis was placed on operations conducted by 1-9 ACS and LRRP teams. Infantry units conducted recommaissance, reconnaissance in force and ambush operations. The upgrading of Highway 309 was completed on 15 January to permit the passage of convoys to Bu Gia Map (FSB SNUFFY).

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- (e) During the period 10-24 February the 5th ARVN Division, elements of the 1st Cav Div (AM) and territorial Forces of Phono Long Sector executed the Dong Khoi Campaign. The objectives of the campaign were the destruction of the VC/VCI, Guerrilla/Local District Force Units, and enemy supply units. During the period of the campaign, the 2d Brigade continued operations in its assigned AO and conducted operations in support of the Dong Khoi Campaign. The 5th Battalion, 7th C valry initiated operations targeted against infiltration units: the & th Recr Service Group Units and K-28 District Force Units, the 1st B ttalion, Sth Cavalry initiated operations targeted against infiltration units and the 86th Rear Service Group. On 12 February 1971, the 2d Brigade executed an Economy of Force operation to limit the mining incidents along Route 309. Sniper Teams were employed along Route 309 by the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry and the 1st Battalion, 8th Cavalry. The 1st Battalion, 77th Field Artillery supported the operation by planning and firing at defensive targets on likely locations to impede mining ativities along Route 309. On 22 February the 2d Brigade realigned its internal boundaries to facilitate and insure complete exploitation of the extensive cache site vic YU 2745, and exploited the enemy bunker complexes vic YU 6535. 2d Brigade continued employment of LRRP and 4-9 ACS elements with primary emphasis on the Adams and Jolley Trails.
- (f) During the period 1-6 March, the 2d Brigade continued contact operations. Additionally the period 1-12 March 1971 found the 2d Brigade executing a disengagement of its forces from its area of operations in complaince with 1st Cav Div (AM) OPORD 183-70 Keystone Robin Charlie. On 1 March, the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry entered standdown at Bien Hoa Army Base. On 7 March, the 1st Battalion, 8th Cavalry entered standdown at Bien Hoa Army Base, followed by HHC, 2d Brigade, which entered standdown at Bien Hoa Army Base on 12 March. The 2d Brigade released OPCON of its battalions upon their entry into standdown.
- Impact of weather or weather support on combat operations:
  During this reporting period combat operations were not altered or
  so rerely hampered by the effects of weather. Combat Weather Team 2,
  5th Weather Group provided this Brigade with outstanding support.
- (h) Use of Composite and Split Artillery Batteries:
  Artillery batteries were split on many occasions to provide sufficient coverage to all elements operating within the AO. This was normally done by having the battery minus remain at a battalion CP FSB, while a 3 tube section with necessary FDC equipment moved to another. Although this was not the most desireable configuration, it provided the wide coverage which was required. This was augmented upon occasion by the reinforcement of the 105 half battery by 3 tubes of 155 to form a composite battery. Again, the logistical difficulties of separating a unit made this course acceptable only where a better solution was not available.

The final inventory of items find at the cache site included: 47/.51 cal rds, 118,140/7.62mm rds, numerous 82mm mtr propellent charges and fuses, 200 lbs of medical supplies, 3 tons of rice, 1200 lbs of salt, 2,500 lbs of corn and 2 ind weapons.
  - e. 3d Brigade Operations:
- (1) Mission: During the reporting period, the missions for 3d Brigade were many, with the primary mission being destruction of the 33d NVA Regiment. Other major missions included targeting MQ, MR-7 and enemy local force elements within the AO. On 24 March, as the 1st Brigade, 1st Cav Div (AM), completed standdown, the 3d Brigade assumed the additional missions of targeting HQ, SR-5, and the 81st Rear Service Group in War Zone "D." Also on 24 March, the responsibility for defense of Camp Gorvad was assigned to 3d Brigade.
- (2) Execution: During the reporting period, operations can best be separated into two periods: the first from 1 November 1970 to 24 March 1971 when the 3d Brigade operated primarily in Binh Tuy Province with three airmobile battalions and one armored cavalry squadron; the second period from 24 March 1971 to 10 April 1971 when the Brigade assumed OPCON of three additional airmobile battalions and the responsibility for the old 1st Brigade and Camp Gorvad AO's.
  - (a) Period I (1 November 1970 24 March 1971).
- 1 During this period of almost five months, the 3d Brigade operated in virtually all areas of the assigned AO, with the exception of the Northeastern section and the extreme Southwestern section of the AO. Operations were conducted utilizing the 1-5 Cav, 2-5 Cav, 2-8 Cav and 2-11 ACR as principle maneuver elements. During all operations, emphasis was placed on small unit tactics, with individual companies breaking down to platoon, squad and sometimes half-squad size units. The enemy continued

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to travel in 02-05 man elements and continued to avoid contact with U.S. units. Activity remained light, with only a few exceptions, during the entire reporting period.

There were many different types of operations conducted during the reporting period. These varied from widely separated ground reconnaissance by individual battalions to concentrated offerts by all four battalions massing in one area. One significant operation was called the "Rice Denial Program". Beginning in late Nevember, two battalions, the 1-5 Cav and 2-5 Cav, were employed in the area of the Vo Dat - Tenh Linh "Rice Bowl". The U.S. units operated on the fringes of the "Rice Bowl" and RF-PF Units operated within the "Rice Bowl" itself. The objective was to deny the rice produced in the "Rice Bowl" to the enemy. In the past this area had been an entremely good source of food, However, the success of the "Rice Denial Program" was unquestioned. The enemy managed to take some rice out of the area, but for the first time in many years, the villagers in the "Rice Bowl" area had sufficient food for themselves and had excess rice to sell in Seigen.

#### (b) Period II (24 March 1971 - 10 April 1971):

- 1 With the standdown of the 1st Brigade, more responsibility fell to the 3d Brigade. Concurrently with the addition of these battalions to the Task Organization, the 3d Brigade assumed the 1st Brigade's former AO, thereby increasing the 3d Brigade's AO to include virtually all of Long Khanh Province in addition to Binh Tuy Province.
- 2 There was no significant change in operations with the assumption of control over the new units and AO. The 1-7 Cav, 1-12 Cav, and 2-12 Cav continued operations in southern War Zone "D", and the 2-5 Cav, 2-8 Cav and 2-11 ACR continued operations in Bink Tuy Province. The 1-5 Cav began standdown on 19 March and was passed OFCON from 3d Brigade at that time. On 27 March 1971, the 2-12 Cav began standdown operations, reducing the Task Organization to four airmobile battalions and one armored cavalry squadron. On 10 April 1971, the 3d Brigade was redesignated as a separate brigade and passed OPCON to II Field Force.

#### (2) General:

- (a) Vietnemization Program: Throughout all operations during the reporting period, emphasis was increasingly placed on the Vietnamization Program. Combined and coordinated operations were conducted periodically with GVN Forces. Training programs were conducted by both CAT-MTT teams and line companies. Response by the GVN Forces showed that they were becoming increasingly capable of conducting their own operations.
- (b) Population/Resources Control: Continued emphasis was placed on this program in an effort to disrupt and disorganize the Shadow Supply System, operating primarily along Route QL#1. Mobile checkpoints and Engle Flights were the primary means of checking the daily traffic on QL#1 in an effort to curtail enemy transhipment of supplies. No definite

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success can be elaimed in this program, but it is fult that the Shadew Supply System was hampered by this operation.

- (4) Discission and Analysis of Significent Eventor
  - (a) Contacts during the month of November:
- 1 On 1 November, the 2-5 Cav closed FSB Silver and began construction of FSB Cheyenno (YT926536). The 2-5 Cav began operations in the Northern portion of the Brigade AO. The period 1-6 November was one of negligable activity. At 051530/AN 767475, B/1-9 Cav observed and engaged 3 individuals while on VR resulting in 3 energy KBH. While conducting VR in the same area on 6 November, B/1-9 Cav received 8 rounds of S/A fire with negative hits. Area was engaged with negative enemy assessment.
- 2 A total of two significant events were reported during the period 7-8 November. At 071815/YT 059032 F Troop/2-11 ACR reported an automatic ambush detonation resulting in 3 VC MIA and 1 AK-47 cptt. On VR, B/1-9 observed and engaged 2 individuals near a bunker complex resulting in 2 VC NVA KBH.
- 3 The period 9-13 November was one of very light activity. At 091500/YT 656025 F Troop/2-11 ACR reported an automatic embush detonation resulting in 2 VC KIA. At 101350/YT 117462 while on VR, B/1-9 Cav observed and engaged 1 individual resulting in 1 KBH:
- 4 The poriod 14-15 November was one of light activity. On 14 November a series of automatic ambushes emplaced by F Troop/2-11 ACR detonated resulting in 5 VC KIA. B/1-9 Cav made one sighting at 151725/YT 973387 resulting in 1 KBH.
- \_5 At 161145/YT 856523 B/2-5 Cav observed and engaged 1 individual resulting in 1 NVA KIA. An automatic ambush detonation was reported by F Troop/2-11 ACR resulting in 01 VC KIA.
- 6 The period 17-18 November was one of light contact. At 171445/YS 674947 LRRP Team 75 observed and engaged 1 individual resulting in 01 VC KIA. At 181120/YT 746122 1/D/2-8 Cav observed and engaged 5-'8 individuals. Enemy returned fire with 10-15 rounds AK-47 fire resulting in 1 US WIA. Negative enemy assessment. At 181545/YT 675041 F Troop/2-11 ACR reported 5 VC KIA's resulting from an automatic ambush detonation.
- The period 19-27 November was one of very light activity with a total of 10 fleeting contacts with 1-3 individuals resulting in negative friendly casualties and 1 AK-47 cptd. Two instances of groundair fire were reported resulting in light damage to a LCH from B/1-9 Cav. Negative friendly casualties. On 21 November, 2-5 Cav conducted retrograde of FSB Cheyenne and opened FSB Peggy, vicinity YT 860330, beginning operations in the nothern "Rice Bowl".

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- 8 On 28 November, activity increased somewhat. At 280930/YT 768224 C/2-5 Cav made contact with 03 individuals. While sweeping the area, C Company received heavy small arms and B-40 fire. Artillery, AFA and air strikes supported the contact. Results: 3 NVA KIA 3 US WIA. While supporting the contact, a B/3-17 LOH received ground-air fire on two occasions resulting in minor demage to the aircraft. The 2-5 Cav cormand and control helicopter also received ground-air fire resulting in 1 US WIA.
- 9 At approximately 291550, the 3d Brigade INO at Ham Ten reported that an RF convoy had been ambushed at Y3 068849. 3d Brigade supported the contact with AFA and Pink teams. During the contact with an estimated NVA Company the supporting aircraft of C/2-20 AFA and B/3-17 Cav received ground-air fire on five occasions, one of which was .51 cal. Results of the contact were 8 NVA KEH and minor damage to a LON from B/3-17 Cav.
- 10 At 301530/YT 752078 D/2-8 Car abserved and engaged 3 individuals resulting in 1 VC WIB POW.
  - (b) Contacts during the month of December:
- 1 The period 1-5 December was one of light activity, characterized by seven fleeting contacts with 1-3 individuals. There was no enemy assessment from the contacts and 1 US was slightly wounded. A groundair fire at 041530/AN 764425 resulted in 1 US KIA and light demage to the aircraft. At 051130/YT 655032, an M-551 from F Troop/2-11 ACR detonated an anti-tank mine resulting in severe damage to the N-551 and 1 US WIA.
- 2 At 061715/YT 694094, IRRP Team 51 moved into a bunker complex and began receiving heavy small arms fire, The B/1-9 Cav Aerial Rifle Platoon (Blues) was inserted in support at 061715. Sporadic contact continued until approximately 1800 hours, resulting in 3 US WIA. Negative enemy assessment, At 061000/YT 837447, E RCN/2-8 Cav spotted and engaged '2 individuals resulting in 2 VC KIA.
- 3 On 7 December, the 1-5 Cav concluded operations in AD Chief and passed OPCON to 3d Brigade at 1710 hours. The 1-5 Cav opened FSE Apache (YT 730245) in conjunction with the 3d Brigade's "Rice Denial Operation". At 070930/YT 891201, an APC from G Troop/2-11 ACR detonated a mine resulting in 04 US WIA and loss of the vehicle. Also, there were 2 incidents of ground-air fire during the day with negative damage to the aircraft involved.
- 4 The period 8-10 December was one of light activity. There were a total of five ground contacts with 1-3 individuals resulting in 3

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VC KIA and negative friendly casualties. At 082310, the radio relay station on Nui Chua Chan received 1 round of mortar fire resulting in 1 US WIA. On 10 December, B/1-9 Cav sightings resulted in 12 enemy KBH at ZT 035520.

- 5 The period 11-15 December was one of nogligable ground activity with only two ground contacts occurring. 4 NVA KIA resulted from these contacts. There was a significant increase in ground-air firing incidents. A total of six occured during this period resulting in 4 US WIA and 1 LOH combat loss. Enemy firing sites were engaged with negative assessment.
- 6 activity was light during the period 16-20 December with three fleeting contacts reported. There were negative injuries and negative enemy assessment resulting from the contacts. On 192135, FSB Mace received 6/60mm mortar rounds impacting inside the perimeter. At 192225, an additional 50mm mortar round impacted at FSB Macc. Suspected enemy firing sites were engaged with counter-mortar fire, AFA, and Nighthawk. Negative damage or friendly casualties resulted from the standoff attacks. On 201220/ YT 784049 C/2-8 Cav was engaged by a possible command detonated mine resulting in 5 US WIA.
- 7 Light activity continued during the period 21-24 December. On 211445/YT 616250, IRRP Team 42 engaged '2 VC resulting in 02 VC KIA. At 221550/YT 799245, B/1-5 Cav was engaged by an USEF. Friendlies returned fire and AFA and pink team supported. Results: Eng. work i US 1 KIA, 2 WIA. Two other light contacts and two ground-air fires were reported with negative friendly casualties and negative energy assessment.
- 8 On 24 December at 1745 hours, the 3d Brigade began the observance of the 1970 Christmas Truce. No hostile activity marred the truce and elements of the 3d Brigade spent Christmas day in stationary positions. At 1800 hours, 25 December, combat operations were resumed.
- 9 Only two ground contacts were reported during the remainder of December, resulting in 1 VC KIA and negative friendly casualties. Two automatic ambushes employed by A/2-8 Cav detonated on 28 and 29 December, accounting for 8 VC KIA and 04 enemy weapons captured. At 1755 hours on 31 December, 3d Brigade ceased combat operation in observance of the New Year\*s Truce.
  - (c) Contacts during the month of January:
- 1 New Year's day passed with no offensive operations on the part of 3d Brigade. The truce terminated at 1800 hours on 1 Jenuary and preparations were made to begin a new operation on 2 Jenuary. Beginning an

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operation against NQ, MR-7, all elements of the Brigade were massed in the area east of FSB Mace, but contacts remained relatively light for the period 1-10 January. On 2 January, 1A/2-8 Cav engaged 7-10 individuals resulting in 1 NVA KJA. One US was wounded during the contact. Also on 2 January, 1D/1-5 Cav was engaged by an USEF utilizing B-40 and AK-47 fire. AFA and Arty supported the contact. The contact resulted in 02 US WIA and 2 US KIA with negative enemy assessment. On 5 January, in order to support the operation in progress, the 1-5 Cav opened mini-FSB Trap. At 060955/YT 795009, 2B/2-8 Cav engaged 2 individuals resulting in 1 VC KIA. At 091442/YT 720088, D/2-5 Cav was engaged by an USEF resulting in 4 US WIA and negative enemy assessment.

- 2 There was negative contact on 11 and 12 January and only one contact reported on 13 January. D/2-8 Cav observed and engaged 6 individuals resulting in 1 enemy KIA. A total of four contacts were reported on 14 January. These contacts were fleeting engagements and there was negative enemy assessment. 1 US WIA. Also on 14 January, mini-FSB Trap was closed and the 1-5 Cav reconsolidated at FSB Apache.
- 2 The period 15-22 January was one of light contact. B/1-5 Cav made contact with 6-8 individuals at 160905/YT 769267. The enemy was in a bunker complex and pink team and Arty supported. There was negative energy assessment and 3 US WIA. At 161523, B/1-5 Cav was sweeting the contact area, they were again engaged by the enemy resulting in 1 US KIA. Negative enemy assessment. At 182155/ZS 025782, 2C/2-8 Cav and the 15th and 8th PF Platoons from Binh Tuy Province, while on a combined operation, observed and engaged 8 VC, resulting in 1 VC KIA and negative friendly casualties. Four other light contacts were reported during this period with negative results.
- 4 At 231110/YT 777289, 2B/1-5 Cav engaged 5 individuals resulting in 1 NVA KTA. During the period 24-28 January, most activity resulted from B/1-9 Cav operations. On 24 January, visual sightings by a pink team resulted in 3 VC KBH. Also on 24 January, ground sightings by the B/1-9 Blues resulted in 2 VC KTA. On 28 January, a visual sighting by B/1-9 Cav resulted in 1 enemy KBH. The B/1-9 Cav Blues were inserted on the sighting and made contact with an USEF resulting on 1 US WIA and 1 US KIA.
- 5 Due to intelligence data obtained during January, the 2-8 Cav was displaced from FSB Silver on 28 January and established FSB Fontaine in order to support an operation against HQ, IM-7 on the Nui Be complex.
- 6 The period 29-31 January was characterized by continued light activity. On 29 January, the 1-5 Cav shifted its operations to the area north of the Vo Dat "Rice Bowl" and established mini-FSB Claire (YT 820455). FSB lpache continued to be maintained by the 1-5 Cav. At 301134/TS 829939, G Treop/2-11 ACR made contact with 2 individuals resulting in 1 VC KTA.

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4C/2-8 Cav received uniper fire at 310900/YS 850907 resulting in 1 US WIA. Friendly element returned fire with negative results. Also on 31 January, an automatic ambush established by F Troop/2-11 ACR detonated at YS 914912 resulting in 31 VC KIA.

- (d) Contacts during the month of February:
- 1 On 1 February, the 2-5 Cav conducted retrograde operations at FSB Peggy and began construction at FSB Sendra (ZT 096195) in support of an operation begun against HQ and 1st Bn, 33d NVA Regiment.
- 2 Light activity continued during the period 2-5 February. At 020935/YS 860917, 2D/2-8 Cav engaged 2 individuals resulting in 1 VC KIA and 1 US WIA. Also on 2 February, FSB Sandra received 14-20 rounds of 81mm morter fire at 0645 hours. All rounds impacted outside the perimeter and caused no damage. At 041330/ZT 176175, the B/1-9 Cav Blues engaged an USEF resulting in 2 VC KIA and 1 VC POW (WIA). Two other light contacts were reported during this period with negative results.
- A significant contact took place on 6 February. 11/2-5 Cav at 0849 hours moved into a bunker complex and observed 2-3 individuals. Contact was initiated and the enemy returned fire with small arms. At 1130, hours, 14 again reconned by fire and received small arms and 3/B-40 rockets in return. Contact was broken and was reinitiated at 1440 hours when the friendly element again reconned the area by fire and again received small arms and B-40 fire in return. The contact was supported by air strike, pink team, AFA and Arty. Results: Enemy 5 VC KIA; Friendly 3 US WIA.
- 4 Another significant contact took place on 7 February. At 070930/YS 796902, 2B/2-8 Cav found an enemy commo wire and began following the wire to the south. Recon by fire was conducted with negative return fire. At 1005 hours 2B triggered an enemy booby trap resulting in 3 US WIA. Also at this time the unit received a light volume of small arms fire. As the platoon began maneuvering towards the enemy, it began receiving a heavy volume of small arms, automatic weapons, and B-40 fire. Contact continued throughout the day although the intensity lessened to sporadic fire shortly after the initial period of contact. AFA, Arty, pink teams, eir strikes and MEDEVAC supported the contact. Results: Enemy Unknown; Friendly 5 US KIA, 8 US WIA.
- 5 Activity in the AO decreased considerably during the period 8-13 February. A total of six minor contacts were reported with only one yielding any significant results. E recon/2-5 engaged one individual resulting in 1 NVA KIA. ESB Fontaine received 2 standoff attacks during this period. At 082330, 3 rounds of enemy launched 105mm rounds were received causing 4 US wounded, The second attack was received at 102236 when 4 rounds of enemy launched 155mm rounds were reported, causing negative casualties or damage.

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- Light activity continued from 14-17 February. On 14 February, the 1-5 Crv conducted retrograde of mini-FSB Clairs and reconsolidated the CF at FSB Apachs. A/2-8 Cav at 140912/YS 820927, received 20-30 rounds of sniper fire resulting in 2 US WIA. Suspected area was engaged with negative results. At 150835/ZT 065311, 2A/2-5 Cav observed 5-7 individuals and engaged with organics, resulting in 1 NVA KIA. E recent/2-5 Cav engaged 2 individuals at 171630/ZT 014144, resulting in 1 NVA KIA.
- I Ground activity during the period 18-23 February centered in the 2-8 Cav's AO. At 182050 hours, FSB Fontaine received 6/60mm norter rounds, 5 impacting within the perimeter and 1 impacting without detenating. Five US were wounded in the attack. Counter-mortar fire, AFA, and Nighthawk reacted to the attack. At 191012/YS 848932, E Recon/2-8 Cav engaged 5 individuals resulting in 1 NVA KIA. Enemy KIA was later identified as an NVA Captain. There were negative friendly losses. E Recon/2-8 Cav at 201016/YS 850932 was engaged by an USEF utilizing small arms and B-40 rockets, resulting in 1 US KIA and 3 US WIA. Friendlies returned fire with negative results. Two other contacts were reported in the 2-8 Cav's AO with negative significant results. Also during this time period, the 1-5 Cav opened mini-FSB Cheryl (YT 861173) to support operations against the 2d Bn, 33d NVA Regiment.
- 8 The remainder of February was extremely quiet with only two contacts reported. There were negative significant results from either contact.
  - (e) Contacts during the month of March:
- 1 The lull in activity that began in late February continued in early March. During the period 1-9 March, only one significant contact occurred. At 051445/YS 865925, E Recon/2-8 Cav observed and engaged 13 individuals in a bunker complex. The enemy returned fire with small arms. Contact broke almost immediately, but was reestablished sporadically until 1700 hours. The 2-8 Cav's command and control helicopter received fire while over the contact area and had to make an emergency landing at 1530 hours. Negative injuries. A LCM from F/1-9 Cav also received ground-air fire while supporting the contact and made a forced landing at 1600 hours. Negative injuries. The contact was supported by AFA, Arty, pink teams, and Rash FACs. Results: En Unit; Filly -
- 2 On 9 March; the 1-5 Cav began prepositioning forces for an operation south of FSB Mace. On 10 March, the 1-5 Cav began moving into the area south of FSB Mace and D(-)/1-5 Cav made contact with 3 individuals at 101545/YT 623023 resulting in 1 NVA KTA and negative friendly casualties. On 11 March, the 1-5 Cav closed FSB Apache and moved the OP to FSB Mace. On 13 March at 1417 hours/YS 609991, E Recon/1-5 Cav engaged 1-2 individuals resulting in 1 VC KrA.

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- 2 During the period 14-17 March, one minor contact and two significant contacts were reported. At 141210/ZT 195162. 1A/2-5 Cav received small arms fire while in log posture, resulting 1 US WIA. 3D/1-5 Cav at 151548/YS 635940, engaged 2 individuals in a bunker complex. Received return fire from 10-12 enemy utilizing light automatic weapons, small arms and B-40 fire. AFA, Arty, pink team and air strike supported the contact: Results: En Unk; Fdly 6 US VIA. At 170045/ZT 070170, LRRP Team 22 engaged 4 individuals with claymores and small arms resulting in 4 NVA KIAs. While searching the bodies, the team received small arms fire from 3 individuals. Contact broke at 0830 hours and the LRLP team was extracted at 1145 hours with negative casualties. Pink team and B'1-9 Cev Blues supported the contact. Negative enemy assessment.
- 4 The period 18-22 March showed a marked increase in enemy activity. On 18 March, a total of five ground contacts occurred. E Recon/(-)/1-5 Cav engaged 02-03 individuals at 181200/YS 655035 resulting in 1 VC KIA. At 181530/YS 842961, 26/2-11 ACR engaged 2 individuals resulting in 1 VC KIA. There were negative results from the other three contacts. Four contacts were reported on 19 March resulting in 2 VC KIA by 3B/2-8 Cav at YS 848930 and 1 VC KIA by by 2G/2-11 ACR at YS 843957. Also on 19 March, the 1-5 Cav ceased combat operations in RVN and began standdown at Bien Hoa. The unit was released OPCON from 3d Brigsde at 191530 hours.
- 5 On 20 March there were three instances of ground-air fire that resulted in negative damage or casualties. Three ground contacts were reported on 21 March resulting in 1 VC KIA by 2E/2-11 ACR at YS 867964, 22 VC KIA and 1 VC POW by the 513 RF Company, OPCON to the 2-8 Cav and 2 US from 2D/2-5 Cav were WIA in a contact at ZT 021173.
- 6 Activity again became light during the period 23-25 March. At 241100/YT 836066, a LOH from F/1-9 Cav received ground-air fire, receiving an unknown number of hits to the aircraft. The aircraft lost direction control and crashed resulting in 2 US KIA and 1 US WIA.
- 7 On 24 March, as the 1st Brigade Headquarters began standdown, the 3d Brigade assumed OPCON of the 1-7 Cav, the 1-12 Cav and the 2-12 Cav. The 3d Brigade also assumed control of the 1st Brigade's AO and the Camp Gorvad AO. On 27 March, the 2-12 Cav ceased combet operations in RVN and began standdown at Bien Hoa. The 2-12 Cav was released OPCON from 3d Brigade at 270810 hours. Also on 27 March, the 1-12 Cav assumed deponsibility for defense of Camp Gorvad and moved a TAC CP to that boation.
- 8 Activity for the remainder of the month remained relatively light. A 260915/YS 827897, 3A/2-8 Cav engaged 3 individuals resulting in 1 V. KIA. Recon/2-8 Cav at 270937/YS 834925, engaged 4 individuals resulting

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in 1 NVA KIA. At 271210/YS 634925, A/2-8 Cav received small arms fire from 2 individuals resulting in 1 US WIA. Return fire by A Company produced negative results. At 311150/ZT 095105, E Recon 2-5 Cav engaged 2 individuals. Enemy returned fire with small arms. Results: EN-2 VC KIA; Fdly - 1 US WIA.

### (f) Contacts during month of April:

- 1 The period 1-6 April was characterized by light activity. 3D/2-5 Cav was engaged by 1 individual at 011100/ZT 097287 resulting in 1 US WIA. 4E/2-11 ACR at 021315/YS 929954 engaged 4 individuals resulting in 2 VC KIA. 1C/2-5 Cav at 051330/YT 974137 engaged an USEF resulting in 1 VC KIA. Four other fleeting contacts were reported with negative results.
- 2 On 7 Arril, in response to recent intelligence, the 1-7 Cav received operations from War Zone "D" to an area south of FSB Mace. To support the operation, the 1-7 Cav CP relocated to FSB Mace.
- After the arrival of the 1-7 Cav, activity in the area south of FSB Nace increased. At 081025/YT 572007, C/1-7 Cav engaged 3 individuals. AFA, Arty, pink team, and air strike supported. 1 enemy was reported killed as a result of the air strike. At 090715/YT 643007, 1A/1-7 Cav was ambushed as it left its night position. The unit received small arms, automatic weapons, and B-40 fire from approximately 15 individuals. 1A returned fire with organics and AFA, Arty, pink team and air strike supported, resulting in 1 enemy KBA/S. Friendly losses were 1 US KIA and 6 US WIA. Due to this increased activity, the 2-5 Cav was relocated from the eastern portion of the AO to the area south of the contacts. The 2-5 Cav moved a TAC CF to FSB lace to control operations.
- 4 At 1200 hours on 10 April, the 3d Brigade was redesignated 3d Brigade (Separate), 1st Cavalry Division (AM) and became OFCON to II Field Force. Two contacts were reported on 10 April resulting in 1 enemy KIA at ZS 084934 by the 513 RF Company, OFCON to 2-11 ACE, and 1 enemy KIA at YS 817956 by D/2-8 Cav.

## f. 1st Squadron, 9th Air Cavalry Cperations.

(1) Mission: The 1st Squadron, 9th Air Cavalry romained in general support of the Division, continuing to provide visual reconnaissance throughout the Division Area of Operation. In addition, the 1/9 ACS provided convoy escort and cover and had responsibility for Ranger Team and Combet Tracker Team insertions and extractions. During the lattement of December, 1-9 Cav, with 3-17 Cav (-) OPCON, was assigned the additional missions of supporting the 7th and 9th ARVN Regiments and the 2d ARVN Airborne Brigade. On 22 February, TF 1-9th was assigned

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the mission of supporting the ARVN operations in Cambodia under RQ M2-3 with four troops of Air Cavelry.

#### (2) Execution:

(a) On 5 December 1970 the 9th Cavalry Brigade (Provisional) was formed, and included the newly created F Troop (Prov) 1-9 AGS and E Troop (Prov). Both Lir Cavalry Squadrons were placed OPUCI to the provisional 9th Cavalry Brigade, and the brigade test organised on follows:

During the remaining 26 days of December the Brigade restructured the task organization three times and conducted one independent operation.

- (b) In late December, there was a noticeable increase in activity in the 7th and 9th ARVN areas of operation. Additionally, the 9th ARVN Regiment was conducting cross-border operations into Cambodia. A/1-9 ACS was diverted into the 7th and 9th ARVN Regimental AOs during the period 23-29 December to assist A/3-17 ACS in locating the enemy forces that had moved across the border.
- (c) At 242000 December 1970 the Brigade received a varning order to send two air cavalry troops to Tay Ninh to support operations by the 2nd ARVN Airborne Brigade. At 242100 December TF 3-17 was notified to release C/1-9 ACS from OFCON on order. TF 1-9 was also informed to be prepared to receive OFCON C/1-9 ACS on order and be prepared to send E and C/1-9 ACS to Tay Ninh. Initial coordination was made by TF 1-9 Commander and the S-3 with the 2nd ARVN Airborne Brigade, when orders were received 25083C December to commit one air cavalry troop in support of the Airborne Brigade. By 1410 hours, C troop, 1-9 ACS had already made contact in the new area of operations. In the space of two days the Bdc had moved five air cavalry troops into new areas of operation and each troop was operational upon arrival. A recapitulation of the moves are as follows:

- (d) At 252000 December 1970 the task organization was changed again by placing E/3-17 ACS under OPCON to TF 3-17. This troop was further placed in support of the 2nd Bde, 1st Cav Div (AM). At the same time B/1-9 ACS returned to OPCON of TF 3-17. This organization was retained until 31 December 1970.
- (c) On 29 December 1970 the brigade received a warning order to locate and free some allied prisoners of war supposedly located in the Ranor Back area. At 302000 December the order to execute the plan was received. At 310645 December Task Force Novins arrived at an abandoned air strip at Dau Tieng and established a forward operation AC base. Two Air Cavalry troops and an Infantry Battalion (-) were OPCON to the Task Force. Rearm and refuel points were established and operational by 0745 hours. The operation resulted in one heavy contact, but due to the heliday cease fire the operation had to terminate at 1800 hours that day. By 1930 hours all elements of the TF had cleared Dau Tieng and the air strip.
- (f) The task organization in the beginning of Jamuary remained the same. A Troop 1/9 ACS was in support of the 2rd Bdc, 1st Cav Div (AM). A Troop 3/17 ACS continued to support the 7th and 9th ARVN Regiments, C 1/9 ACS was supporting the 2rd ARVN Bde in Tay Ninh Frovince, E Troop 3/17 ACS worked in support of the 2/12 Cav, F Troop 1/9 ACS was in support of the 1st Bde, 1st Cav Div (AM), and E Troop supported 3d Bde, 1st Cav Div (AM).
- (g) On 17 January, E Troop (Prev) 3/17 ACS was inactivated with its assets reverting to the 334th Attack Melicopter Company. F Troop was then given the mission of supporting the Divarty AO.
- (h) Because of increased activity in the 5th ARVN Division and 2rd ARVN ABN Bdc AO: and the 6th ARVN Ranger Group's move to eastern Tay Ninh, a further alignment of Air Cavalry assets was necessary. C Troop 1/9 ACS continued in support of the 2rd ARVN ABN Bdc in western Tay Ninh while A Troop 3/17 ACS was tasked to support the 6th Ranger

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Group in eastern Tay Ninh. E Troop 1/9 ACS was then moved to support the 7th and 9th ARVN Regiments. A Troop 1/9 ACS continued to support the 2nd Ede, 1st Cav Div (AM). F Troop 1/9 ACS was in support of the DIVARTY AC and additionally supported the 8th ARVN Regiment in its AC.

- (i) The 1-9 ACS continued its mission supporting the 1st Cav Div (AM) with little change in its mission or operations throughout the remainder of January and into February. 22 February 1971, TF 1-9 commons, operations in support of ARVN forces in Cambodia. Four air cavalry troops supporting four ARVN task forces were to operate under HQ NR-3. Major energy units, including the 5th and 9th VC and the 7th NVA Divisions, were located from Kampong Cham to Snucl.
- (j) The two OPCON troops of the 3/17th ACS (-), in addition to the 1/9 ACS, had been tasked to provide aerial recommissance along the entire northern border between NR-3 and Cambodia. Area responsibilities were divided between the two squadron headquarters; however, CO 1/9 ACS remained as the overall coordinator of air cavalry operations for the Division.
- 1 To support the operation, rearm/refuel points were established at Katum and Thion Ngon and B Troop 1/9 ACS moved closer to the Combodian border from Bear Cat to Quan Ioi. Headquarters, 1/9 ACS, established a tactical command post at Katum to facilitate coordination with Headquarters, NR-3, and the supporting Task Forces.
- 2 Because of the unique rules of engagement in Cambodia, minor modifications to normal air cavalry tactical manouvers were required. ARVN ground forces called "Browns" were trained in air cavalry tactics to act as Quick Reaction Forces. They replaced the "Blues" (Aerial Rifle Platoons) normally employed by Air Cavalry troops. Some of the "Browns" had previous experience in operating with the Air Cavalry units along the MR-3 Cambodian border, thus easing the transition from "Blues" to "Browns". To be responsive to ARVN ground forces and to provide close in air cavalry support, it was necessary to establish a system for direct communications between the air cavalry and the ground commanders. This was accomplished through the use of command and control helicopters continuously on station with a senior officer of the air cavalry troop and an ARVN liaison officer on board to coordinate operations with the ground commanders. The APVN liaison officer also coordinated the clearance to engage targets.
- 2 On 24 February the Air Cavalry Troop of the 11th ACR was placed OPCON to the 1/9 ACS and immediately deployed into Cambodia.

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- 4 On 26 February E Troop (Prov), 1/9 ACS, inactivated, and D.Go, 227th AHB was reorganized using E Troop assets.
- 5 A Troop, 1/9 ACS, commenced to move its permanent location from Fire Support Base Buttons at Song Bo to Camp Gorvad at Phuce Vinh in preparation for the scheduled standdown of the 1-9 ACS. The troop completed its move on 8 March and continued its tactical operations charing the entire move.
- (k) On 1 March, the 62nd Combat Tracker Platoon entered standdown at Phone Vinh and was completed on 6 March. Delta Troop, 1/9 ACS, entered standdown on 8 March and was completed on 16 March. On 8 Merch it was anneunced that the remaining troops of the 1/9 ACS would not enter standdown but would continue with their commitment to support MR-3 in its Cambodian operation with the exception of B Troop which would become a part of the 3d Bde (Sop) and F Troop (Frov) which would inactivate. The responsibility for F Troop's AO was assumed on 28 Merch by B Troop, 1/9 ACS, which was released OFCON to the 3d Bde (Sop) 28 March and moved from Quan Ioi to Beer Cat. B Troop's Cambodian commitment was assumed by B Troop 3/17 ACS. Troop AOS were then realigned to compensate for these changes. A Troop 1/9 ACS joined C Troop 1/9 ACS in Tay Ninh while both A Troop 3/17 ACS and B Troop 3/17 ACS were based in Quan Loi.
- (1) On 1 April F Troop, 3-4 Cavalry, was placed OFCON to the 1/9 ACS. They deployed to Cambodia from Lai Khe. This brought the total number of Air Cavalry troops supporting NR-3 in Cambodia to six under the control of Headquarters, 1/9 ACS. Additionally, A Battery, 2/20 Aerial Field Artillery, was placed in direct support of the task force.
- 1 The rear headquarters for 1/9 ACS including A Troop, C Troop, and Headquarters Company was moved on 2 April from Phuoc Vinh to Di Am.
- 2 Following the move to Di An, the 1/9th ACS (-) was reassigned to the 12th Combat Aviation Group, First Aviation Brigade, from the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile). This reassignment was completed on 10 April 1971.
  - g. 11th Combat Aviation Group
- (1) Mission: During the period 1 November 1970 to 5 April 1971, the 11th Combat Aviation Group centimed operational control of Aviation units in support of the 1st Cavalry Division (Airnobile). The Group units were the 227th and 229th Assault Helicopter buttalions, the 228th Assault Support Belicopter Bettalion, and the 11th Aviation Company (GS). The elements of 11th Group provided direct and general support for the 1st Cavalry Division (Airnobile), the 5th ARVN Division, 11th ACR, and other ARVN, RF, and FF elements located in MR III. These missions com-

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sisted of opening and closing tire support bases, field resupply, combat assault, guaship escent, command and control, aircraft recovery, spray (insecticide), flore support, observation, and transportation administrative missions. The 11th Aviation Group provided all hather finder, traffic and airfield control for the Division and supported ARVN units.

#### (2) Execution:

- (a) The Aerial Weapons Company (D Company) of the 227th ARB was redeployed to MR I during the period to reinforce the gunship support required by XXIV Corps during Operation Lam Son 719. Upon redeployment to MR I, D/227th was attached to the 101st Airborne Division (Airmobile). The area of operations covered III Corps, Southern II Corps, Cambodia, Laos, and the reinforcement of XXIV Corps.
- (b) Execution of "Keystene Robin Charlie" redemloyment called for the inactivation of E Troop (Frov) and F Troop (Frov) 1/9th Cavalry and their reorganization as D/227th and D/229th respectively. 229th AEB was reorganized as the 229th Aviation Battalion (Composite) with the mission to support the 3rd Brigade (Separate), upon redeployment of the 1st Cavalry Division (-). The Group also redeployed A/228th, C/228th, A/227th, B/227th, and C/227th to the 1st Aviation Brigade with station in II Corps. Transfer of B/229th to the 1st Aviation Brigade with station in III Corps will be completed under supervision of the 229th Aviation Battalion (Composite). HHC/227th AHB and HHC/228th ASHB were inactivated in-country. HHC, 11th Combat Aviation Group, has been morrganized and relocated in IR I under the 1st Aviation Brigade.

## h. Division Artillery.

- (1) Mission:
- (a) The 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) Artillery and its assigned units provided fire support to the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) maneuver forces within the Division's assigned AO and took action to advance pacification and Vietnamization efforts.
- (b) The 1st Cavelry Division (Airmobile) Artillery continued to act as meneuver headquarters for AO Chief and to central the 1st Cavelry Division (Airmobile) Base Camp (Camp Gorvad) at Thuoe Vinh until 7 Pebruary 1971. On that date responsibility for AO Chief was assigned to the 1st Brigade. Division Artillery retained responsibility for Camp Gorvad base defense. On 18 January 1971, Division Artillery assumed responsibility for Popular Forces training in Mau Nghia Province; on 15

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Fobruary responsibility one capassed Binh Duong and Tay Ninh Provinces.

### (2) Exocution:

- (a) 2/19th Artillery continued its princry mission of direct support to the 1st Brigade. All batteries to include the Battalion Abadquarters successfully completed the Divarty combat operations test. The battalion also underwent its annual CMMI and received outstanding ratings. The unit prepared for and completed standown on 31 March 1971.
- (b) 1/77th Artillory continued its primary mission of direct support to the 2d Brigade. Firing batteries A and B successfully completed the Divarty combat operations test and the Battalion underwent its Annual General Inspection earning a satisfactory rating in all areas. The unit prepared for and completed standdown on 20 March 1971.
- (c) 1/21st Artillery continued its primary mission of direct support of the 3d Brigade. By 30 March 1971 the Battalian assumed the mission of direct support for the 3d Brigade (Separate), 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile). Two additional batteries were assigned on that date: A Battery 2d Bn 19th Arty and C Battery 2d Bn 20th Arty.
- (d) 1/30 Artillery continued its mission of general support of the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile). The Battalion (-) continued in direct support of AO Chief. Two of three batteries were split throughout the period. The battalion headquarters received its CAI and passed with a satisfactory overall rating. The battalion prepared for and completed standdown on 6 April 1971.
- (c) 2/20th (AFA) continued in general support of the Division. Battery A reinforced the fires of 2/19th Artillery, Battery B reinforced the fires of 1/77th Artillery, and Battery C reinforced the fires of the 1/21st Artillery. In February the Battalion received a classified mission to support operations in Cambodia on a selected basis; later, the battalion supported 1/9 Cavalry operations in Cambodia. On 8 December 1970, the 2/20 Artillery assumed the mission of armed aerial escert of troop carrying aircraft. To accomplish this mission six AH-16 helicopters and 20 personnel were attached to the Battalion from D 30, 229th AHB.
- (f) E Battery, 82d Artillery (AVN) continued to support Division Artillery units throughout the reporting period. Aviation assets continued to be fully utilized. The fixed wing section continued the mission of supplying convoy cover for the Division TACR. During the first part of this period 4 LOH aircraft were transferred to the 1/9 Cav to enable then to support their missions.

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(g) AO Chief (Rinh Duong Province and Phuoc Long Province).
Activity within AO Chief remained extremely light during the reporting period. In the southern portion of the AO several contacts were initiated against elements of K1, Dong Nai Regiment; C510, SR-5; and local guerrilla forces. The C2 Company, K33 Artillery Battalion was identified in the northern portion of the AO, along with H2, C11 Supply entrance and exit control unit of the S1st Rear Service Group. The primary threat against Cump Gorvad during the reporting period was from standoff attacks, with 6 conducted against the installation. The total enemy losses for the reporting period were 31 KIA, 1 PW, and 5 Hoi Chanhs. On 7 February 1971 responsibility for AO Chief was transferred to the 1st Brigade.

#### (h) Training:

- 1 General: In addition to the normal recurring training periods required by 1st Cavalry Division Regulation 350-1, the 1st Cavalry Division Artillery conducted Forward Observer and Fire Direction Center Schools, Battalion/Battery Combat Operations Tests, and training and assistance to ARVN artillery units. Fire support coordination and Forward Observer Classes were taught at the First Toam Academy while Division Artillery battalion liaison officers and forward observers conducted informal artillery training for supported US/ARVN units on a bantimuing basis. During the period, Division Artillery was tasked to train Popular Forces in Hau Hghia, Tow Winh, and Binh Duong Provinces using two OPCON airmobile rifle companies.
- 2 Formal training was conducted at Division Artillery Headquarters for personnel being assigned as part of a forward observer party. The purpose of the instruction was to familiarize forward observer personnel with artillery adjusting techniques used in Vietnamese operations. The course of instruction consisted of two days of classroom instruction and one day of practical exercise in adjustment of both tube and aerial field artillery. During the period 1 Nov 70 4 April 71, four classes were conducted, graduating 54 students. One class on Fire Direction Center procedures was taught with four fire direction officers in attendance.
- 3 Fire support coordination: During this period fire support coordination and forward observer classes were conducted at the First Team Academy. The purpose of the classes was to discuss and illustrate effective fire support by the Artillery Liaison Officer. The classes consisted of a discussion of fire support coordination followed by a live demonstration by aerial field artillery.

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- 4 Battalion/Battery Combat Operations Test: During this period Division Artillory conducted combat operations tests for the batteries and battalions subordinate to this headquarters. The purpose of the tests were to assess the combat readiness posture and state of training of the cannon/serial field artillery battalions dedicated to the delivery of timely and accurate artillery fire in the support of maneuver forces.
- 5 Artillory Assistance/Training: During this reporting period, Division Artillery units continued to follow an active program of training and assistance to the ARVN artillery units.
- 6 Popular Forces Training: On 18 Jan 71 Division Artillery assumed the task of Popular Forces training in Nau Nghia, Tay Minh, and Binh Duong Provinces under the direction of the S5. Training consisted of an American airmobile rifle company moving to a district within the assigned provinces and conducting the training in all aspects of counterinsurgency warfare at various popular forces compounds. Rifle companies utilized in this training were D Co, 2nd Bn, 7th Cav and F Co (Prov), 2nd Bn, 12th Cav. Popular Forces trained under this program rembored 2,375 individuals.
- 7 Acrial Field Artillery Training: A program was instituted within this command to effectively evaluate and test the three individual aerial firing batteries in all phases of combat operations. This was adopted as the operational readiness test; through successive examinations of the operations section, mission responses, aviation safety, and quality control maintenance. A complete and accurate evaluation of the bettalion's overall effectiveness in its general support rule was determined. In addition a firing test was conducted to determine the battery with the highest rocket firing accuracy. The operational readiness test has significantly increased the professional attitude and morale of all battalion personnel. It has provided an accurate evaluation of the battalion's over-all effectiveness and has helped maintain a high level of Proficiency.
  - (1) Pertinent statistical data:
- 1 Aircraft utilization: During the reporting period, E Battery, 82d Artillery (Aviation) flew a total of 8,946 hours and 13,500 sorties averaging 40 minutes per sortie.

#### i. 8th Engineer Battalion

- (1) During the reporting period, the 8th Engineer Battalion continued its efforts in support of the 1st Cav Div (AM) in combat operations. The end of the reporting period saw the completion of the stand down of the Battalion Headquarters, Headquarters Company, and Companies A and B. Company C was reorganized, reinforced and continued its mission of combat support of the 3rd Brigade (Separate).
- (2) Non-Divisional engineer support, coordinated by the 8th Engineer Battalion, was directed toward upgrading roads, and the construction of facilities within the Bien Hoa complex to support the 3rd Brigade. Non-Divisional Engineers continued work on the Special Intelligence bunker, Communications bunker, modification of the Bde TOC, and construction of a refuel facility. A rearm-refuel point was also completed at Katum.

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- (3) ETC, 8th Engineer Buttalion remained at Phuce Vinh until completion of standdown on 2 April 71. Maintenance was conducted on the tactical difficids at Tanh Jinh, Quen Loi, Song Be, and Vo Dat. Airmobile construction configuration and provided to open, maintain, and close 27 FSBs in the Division AO. Over 600 helicopter sortics were utilized to move equipment in response to combat support and standdown missions. At Camp Gorvad, BHC personnel repaired facilities, assisted. Post Engineer personnel in proparing house trailers for movement, and conducted daily mine sweeps. In addition, personnel were assigned to the Division Roll-Up Force to close Camp Gorvad as a US Installation. HHC water points provided Division units with over 1,000,000 gallons of potable water during the period. At the close of the period the head-quarters had completed the transfer of all equipment within the Battallion, either transferring it to Company, returning it to Comus, or turning it in for Keystene disposal.
  - (4) Company A remained in direct support of the 1st Ede with its CP at Bien Hoa. Until stand down on 25 Merch 71, Company A provided demolition and mine sweep terms; opened, maintained, and closed 13 FSBs. Company A also provided engineer support for upgrading of facilities at Bien Hoa. Building rehabilitation, work on drainage, construction of athletic facilities, and penepriming heliports and roads were continuing projects in the Bien Hoa area.
  - (5) Company B remained in direct support of the 2d Bde with base camp at FSB Buttons at Song Bo. On 11 March 71 Company B moved from Song Be to Phuoe Vinh and completed standdown at Phuoe Vinh on 18 March 71. During the reporting period Company B opened and closed 6 FSBs and provided support for FSB Buttons. Ungrading of facilities and penepriming areas within the FSB were completed prior to the turnover of the FSB to ARVN authorities.
  - (6) Company C continued support of the 3rd Bde at FSB Mace and completed the move from FSB Mace to Men Hoa on 2 April. Company C, reinforced with an equipment plateon, an operations section, water point section, and one additional line plateon, continued in support of the 1st Cav Div (AM) residual Bdo. Company C continued support at Mace to include relocating a new berm and construction of new ASF and rearm-refuel facilities. Europairs at the sirfield at Tanh Linh were completed. The rearm-refuel facility was begun at Rock/la Ngs. On completion of the facility, penepriming was begun. Prior to Company C's move from Mace, personnel essential for operations at Bien Hoa were moved to Bien Foa where they began support of standdown operations of the Davision and preparation for support of the 3rd Bde (Sep). Assuming projects of Company A, the unit began upgrading facilities at Bien Moa.

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These projects included athletic facilities, road maintenance and drainage, and renovation and modification of the 3rd Bde (Sep) HQs area.

#### j. 13th Signel Battalion.

- (1) During November, 1970, the 13th Signal Battalion provided support to separate battalions in the Division by deploying VHF Jump terms to provide the firebases with radio relay access to MARS facilities. Utilizing the AU/GRC-163 radio, the terms established a four channel system from various firebases back to brigade base camps. The shots were terminated at the brigade base camps and patched through to the local PARS station. Three VHF terms were deployed at the beginning of November, FSE Audio, FSE Pershing, and FSE Silver. By 25 November, these terms were redeployed to Camp Gorvad and three new teams were deployed to FSE Snuffy, FSE Andro, and FSE Peggy.
- (?) There were two new circuits activated during November. A teletype circuit was activated on channel 5 of the SO1 system (Phuoc Vinh to Bien Hoa). The circuit is a hotline from the 371st RRU at Phuoc Vinh to the 371st RRU in Bien Hoa. The circuit is carried on AN/GRC-163 equipment and is the only teletype channel in use on any of the Battalion's GRC-163 equipment. The second activation was on channel 5 of the 307 system (Phuoc Vinh to Nace). It is a hotline from Air Force Weather at Phuoc Vinh to Air Ferce Weather at FSB Nace.
- (3) At the beginning of December 1970, the 13th Signal had VWF Jump Teams deployed at Fire Support Bases Snuffy, Peggy, and Andre for the purpose of providing radio relay access to MARS facilities. In mid-December, these teams were extracted and redeployed to Fire Support Bases Dragonhead, Apache, and Jupiter. These teams remained in place for the rest of the month with the exception of the teams at FSB Dragonhead. This team attempted to establish a 4 channel system from Dragonhead to Finor Vinh, a distance of fifty-four miles. The planning range for the AN/GRC-163 is fifty miles, but due to the termain and distance, the shot was not of patch quality. The Dragonhead team was extracted when the shot failed and plans were made to re-establish the system at a later date with a relay at FSB Green.
- (4) The AN/MRC-69 twelve channel system from Phuoc Vinh to the 2nd Brigade located at FSB Buttons was down several times during the month due to frequency blocks. To alleviate this problem, clearance was obtained from II FFV to operate the system on C Band frequencies rather than B Band frequencies. This made the frequencies in use much higher and further out of range of interferring FM frequencies. This system has functioned perfectly since this change.

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- (5) Utilizing the AN/GRC-163, a four channel system was established from Comp derved to the 3rd Briggdout FSB Mace. This system includes a relay on Bui Chan Chan and serves as a hadr-up system for the AN/MC-69 twolve channel system. The back-up system was operational on 20 December 1970.
- (a) On 23 December, the 13th Signal deployed a three man team and an AN/VSC-2 complete with back-up to AG hear Located in Bion Hear. The purpose of this deployment was to establish a station in the D-3 Radio feletype Pet. By entering the D-3 RATE Net, personnel data essential to AG operations was readily available.
- (7) January began with V.F. Juan Teams deployed to Fire Support Bases Juniter and Apache. These teams were entracted on 16 January. On 9 January, a team was deployed to ESD Bolan. The teams established four channel systems to provide radio relay access to MARS facilities. The Bolan team was extracted on 26 January.
- (8) A major training exercise was conducted on 19 January when the Battalien established a practise forward signal center at Bien Hoa. The order to establish the Signal Center was issued at 0800 hours on 19 January. The men and equipment moved to Bien Hoa in convoy and established the following: a four channel VHF system, secure and non-secure FH radio nots to include an airborno relay for FM transmission from Bien Hoa to Finee Vinh; an AM radio teletypestation in the D-3 net; a switchboard for telephone communications within the CP and circuits into 1st Brigade's Scorpion Switch; and trunks to Phuce Vinh via the VEF system; and COMCEN circuits to the Division COMCEN in Phuce Vinh. All systems were operational by 1330 hours on 19 January.
- (9) On 1 February, a VHF team was sent to FSB Green to establish a four channel VHF system from Green to Pinuoc Vinh to provide radio relay access to MARS facilities. The team was entracted on 17 February. On 10 February, a three man VHF team was deployed to FSB Betty. The team remained at Betty until 28 February.
- (10) On 21 February the Battalion installed a relay on Nui Ba Den in support of 1/9 Cav's operations in the vicinity of Tay Ninh. The relay was established to accommodate the D-1 Command Net, the D-2 Operations and Intelligence Net, and the 1/9 Command Net. The relay was operational at 1330 hours on 22 February. On 24 February, 3 men were sent to Tay Ninh East in support of the G3 INO and on 3 March one man was sent to Katum to provide radio support to the 1/9. When the relay on Mui Ba Den was initially installed, there was a problem with the secure nets going off squelch during transmission. The problem was found to be one of the frequencies in use. The frequency was changed and the net was operational loud and clear.

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- 2. (C) Lessons Learned: Commander's Observations, Evaluations and Recommendations.
  - a. Personnel. None
  - b. Intelligence. Use of CMEC Teams.
- (1) OBSERVATION: Personnel in the field frequently lack the expertise required to make a mudgement about how long cache sites have been in place.
- (2) EVALUATION: The MACV Combined Material Exploitation Center (CMEC) has personnel on call who are experts in the field of captured material. Use of CMEC Teams by this Division has proven highly beneficial and successful, and has provided more timely intelligence readouts on captured enemy material and caches in those instances where the teams were deployed directly into the cache sites.
- (3) RECOMMENDATION: Emphasis be placed on calling for a CMEC Team whenever its services would be of benefit, particularly upon discovering large enemy caches.
  - c. Operations.
  - (1) Control of Woodcutters.
- (a) OBSERVATION: One brigade encountered significant difficulties coordinating with the respective GVN district headquarters to find a workable solution to control activities of legal woodcutters and isolate them from the illegal Shadow Supply System.
- (b) EVALUATION: GVN province and district officials establish and announce the authorized areas for woodcutting normally with insufficient coordination with the US tactical headquarters within whose AO the area lies. The control of these woodcutters (the enforcement of existing GVN regulations) is the responsibility of the district officials. In all cases encountered by the brigade it was beyond the capability of the territorial forces to control the woodcutters. As a result, the Shadow Supply System flourished among those woodcutters who can be exploited while earning a living. All attempts at an effective resources control program by the brigade met with only limited success, mainly due to the magnitude of the problem. There were simply too many loggers working in small groups over too large an area to be effectively controlled in the jungle.
- (c) RECOMMENDATION: A joint plan should be established by the GVN officials and US Force Commander to control the woodcutters as they enter and leave the authorized areas since it is obviously impossible to control them once they have dispersed. This would require a very limited number

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of entry and exit points (and some engineer support to close the additional ones normally now in existence), an inspection team to insure all vehicles are sanitized when entering and exiting the forest area, and sufficient aerial surveillance to apprehend violators. It may even be feasible to except the cutters utilizing escorts to avoid intimidation while in the

#### (2) Searchlight Employment.

- (a) OBSERVATION: In an area where there are no RVN installations, an effective Chieu Hoi program involves rallying to US units. Leading prospective raliers to US units is a problem which requires attention.
- (b) EVALUATION: Searchlights can be employed on US fire support bases to guide individuals into the bases. The employment of searchlights in conjunction with PSYOPS aircraft and leaflet drops, telling prospective Hoi Chanhs to rally at the source of light, has proven to be an effective means of leading ralliers to US units.
- (c) RECOMMENDATION: Use searchlights in psychological operations wherever possible.
  - (3) Employment of a Composite 105/155mm Battery.
- (a) OBSERVATION: A concept recently employed by the 1st Cavalry Division Artillery may have application beyond the current Vietnam situation and should be evaluated by the Field Artillery School for inclusion in the program of instruction relating to counterinsurgency and stability operations.
- (b) EVALUATION: The First Cavalry Division (Airmobile) has been operating in an extremely large area of operations. The Division has made extensive use of its mobility to conduct wide ranging small unit operations. The composite 105/155mm battery concept has been employed in certain instances for limited periods of time.
- l When the tactical situation necessitates that the maneuver element work beyond the range capability of the direct support 105mm battery located at the fire base providing support to the maneuver element, the 105mm battery displaces a platoon of three howitzers with an FDC element to a light fire base. The platoon that is split away from the original battery position is augmented with additional communications and fire direction equipment from DS battalion resources as required. As a result of the large area covered by the split 105mm battery, the 155mm battery, normally in a GS-R role to the DS battalion, is no longer able to reinforce

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the fires of the DS units from a single battery position. This is true not only because of the need to cover a largor operational area but also due to the increased requirement for mutual support of the three gun fire support bases.

- 2 To meet the increased fire support requirements a composite battery is formed by attaching three 155mm howitzers to the 105mm battery thus placing three howitzers of each caliber on a selected fire support base under command of the DS 105mm battery commander. The composite battery operates a combined FDS, composed of appropriate personnel from both caliber units for efficient 24-hour operation. The firing charts of the 105mm unit are modified to include deflection indices for the 155mm howitzers M1441. The FADAC is used to provide primary firing data and is programmed to include both 105mm and 155mm calibers.
- 3 The advantages and disadvantages listed below pertain in forming the composite battery.

#### a Advantages:

First, the two calibers can be easily and promptly massed or separate missions can be fired simultaneously. When massed the speed of adjustment and volume of fire of the 105mm howitzer is combined with the greater shock effect and bunker destruction capabilities of the 155mm howitzer.

Second, range capabilities from the respective fire support bases are enhanced, thus permitting the naneuver unit commander a greater radius of action.

Third, the mix of calibers provides flexibility to allow attack of targets by the most efficient weapon depending on the terrain, nature of target, and effect desired.

Finally, one fire direction officer can centrally control the fire of either weapons system.

#### b Disadvantages:

First, a greater number of helicopter sorties is required to establish the fire support base due to the weight and bulk of the howitzers and separate loading ammunition of the 155mm platoon. An increased number of sorties is also required for resupply purpose.

Second, the possibilities of gunnery errors are increased due to the production of both 105mm and 155mm range and deflection from the same firing chart. Additional training for placing the 105mm deflection indices onto the firing charts and to gain proficiency in processing simultaneously the firing data for both colibers is desired.

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(c) RECOMMENDATION: That the Field Artillery School evaluate the employment of the composite battery for inclusion in the program of instruction relating to stability operations.

#### (4) Air Delivery of Napalm.

- (a) Observation: A new concept was sought to improve the area coverage of CH47 delivered Napalm drops.
- (b) Evaluation: The method used to drop napalm from a CH47 was to sling load one or two cargo nets containing five to eight 55 gallon drums of napalm each and drop the drums from the cargo nets on the target area with an air speed of 60-65 knots. The slings were the same height from the aircraft and when dropped from the cargo hook of the CH47 tended to fall in the same area giving a coverage of about 35-40 meters in diameter. A method of improving the area coverage was desired. The solution chosen to accomplish better coverage was to sling two cargo nets one approximately five feet above the other. The first cargo net was rigged with six foot slings with one ten foot sling which is attached to the inside of the aircraft. The second cargo net is rigged with 12 foot slings with one 16 foot sling which is attached to the inside of the aircraft. Each set of slings was attached to the cargo hook of the CH47 with the longer slings being attached to the inside of the aircraft so the nets could be pulled inside the aircraft after the drums were dropped. The bottom of the net rigged with six foot slings will hang approximately seven and one half feet beneath the aircraft. The second net rigged with 12 foot slings will hang approximately 14 feet beneath the aircraft. This method of slinging and dropping napalm in 55 gallon drums resulted in an increase of approximately 80-85% in area coverage. The resulting target coverage using 10 drums of napalm, five in each net, was 40 by 75 meters.
- (c) RECOMMENDATION: The method described above should be adopted when dropping 55 gallon drums of napalm from a CH47.

### (5) Resources Control Check points:

- (a) OBSERVATION: Resources control checkpoints are only as effective as the communications link between check points.
- (b) EVALUATION: In any resources control program the effectiveness of the individual checkpoints will be directly dependent upon the amount of

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coordination and communication that takes place between two adjacent checkpoints. The vehicles should be searched and their contents radioed ahead so that any difference in the cargo will be readily noted. It is all too easy to stop along side a read and throw off supplies then destroy the bill of lading for those supplies. If there is no communication link between checkpoints, there will be no descrepancies noted for an operation such as that.

- (c) RECOMMENDATION: That there be more coordination between US and RVN checkpoints and especially between checkpoints of adjacent districts or provinces.
- (6) Use of ARVN Troops trained and formed into an orifle platoons for Air Cavalry missions.
- (a) OBSERVATION: ARVN Flatoons, called "Browns" wore employed to replace Air Cav aerorifle platoons (Blues) as quick reaction forces (QRF) in cross border operations. The Browns were employed without a US Advisor, and resulting language problems caused confusion during maneuver and inhibited effective fire support.
- Company of manouver battalions were trained to operate as aerorifle plateons. To compensate for the absence of an American advisor with the "Browns" the Air Cav commander and an ARVN command representative controlled the operations from a command and control of the "Browns."
- (c) RECOMMENDATION: An ARVN command representative should be OPCON to the Cav commander to assist in command and control of the Browns.
  - d. Training None.
  - e. <u>logistics</u>.
  - (1) Processing of Enemy Documents and Material.
- (a) OBSERVATION: Discrepencies in amounts of captured energy documents and material have been noted at forward collection and analysis points.
- (b) EVALUATION: Captured enemy documents and material reported, and the amount actually received by the Saigon Support Command collection agency differ greatly. Field leaders are poorly equipped and not trained to evaluate and estimate weights and measures of captured items
  - (c) RECOMMENDATIONS:
  - 1 Datailed procedures and responsibilities for document and material

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evacuation must be set down in rhunding operating procedures and disseminated through respective SP/SP spain sections at all levels.

- 2 Transportation of captured decrements and material from the field must be given immediate priority.
- 2 All items, once received by the battalion S2 and S4, must be reevaluated for nomenclature, size, are, and weight. Confections to reports must follow through charmels to the most senior staff level. This enables immediate dissembleation of corrections to other consends and agencies.
- 4 Equip field commenders with devices such as weight scales to facilitate more accurate reporting. The scale for measurement should be to the quarter ounce.
  - (2) Kongor Bearing Failure.
- (a) OBSERVATION: An unusually large number of hanger bearing failures was being experienced with Division helicopters.
- (b) EVAIUATION: Investigation revealed that units involved had recently been issued steam cleaning units. Improper use of steam cleaners was responsible for the premature failure of the hanger bearings. The high temperature and pressure forced cleaning material and foreign matter past the seals into the bearing causing contamination and lubrication breakdown.
- (c) RZCOMENDATION: All sircraft maintenance personnel be trained in the techniques and material to be used in cleaning sircraft.

  Techniques and materials are outlined in Chapter 3, TM 55-1500-204-25/1.
  - (3) Emergency Medical Teams.
- (a) OBSERVATION: Two omergency modical teams were deployed to cover Divisional operations. The composition of these consisted of one doctor, three medical aidmen, and one radio-telephone operator.
- (b) EVALUATION: In the event of mass cosmulties the size of this term would not be adequate.
- (e) RECOMENDATION: The composition of an emergency modical team should consist of two doctors, six medical aidmon and one radio-telo-phone operator.

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## (4) Forward Rofuel Foint.

- (a) ORSERVATION: A substantial amount of time is required to assemble valves, hoses, negates, tools, etc., necessary to establish a refuel point and pallotize there for adipment abound fixed wing aircraft.
- (b) EVALUATION: The motel bone: used to transport 10,000 gallon collapsible fuel tanks rake an ideal slipping container for those smallitems required for a refuel point. Two of these boxes can be banded on the same pallet to incilitate leading abound aircraft.
- (c) RECOMMENDATION: The organizations engaged in transporting equipment for forward refuel points stillize this technique.

## (A) Consolidation of Unit Supply at Battalion Level.

- (a) OBSERVATION: It was evident that there existed a more efficient method of conducting resupply operations which would release numerous personnel with MCS 11B to serve in the field.
- (b) EVALUATION: Proviously, resupply operations were conducted at company level, necessitating a supply sergeant, armorer, and surply clerk in the rear and a supply representative for each company at the Ferward FSB in addition to the regularly assigned personnel. The consolidation of supply at bittalion level climinated unnecessary duplication of effort, decreasing the chances of administrative error, handling of equipment and laundry loss. The company supply sergeant now communicates directly with the units from the Forward FSB and coordinates directly with the Service Flatoon Loader, establishing a closer resport with the soldier in the field and his company supply sergeant.
- (c) RECOLLENDATION: This program be considered for adoption by other units.

## f. Communications. Use of Lor Feriodic Antenna. AS-2159/G.

- .(1) OBSERVATION: Long-range FN radio communication over hilly or heavily forested terrain very often has been required for tactical operations. In these cases the distances over which communications must be established may considerably exceed the normal specified range of the radio equipment.
- (2) EVALUATION: One technique used to overcome the distance problem is the utilization of the log periodic autenna AS-2169/G. This entenne is normally used with the AN/GEC-163 multi-channel radio and would be available for employment on a limited basis down to battalion level. The log periodic antenna is directional and concentrates the

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AF output in one direction thus allowing a coverage of greater distances. One problem of using this system is that the omni-directional capability would be climinated.

(3) RECOMENDATION: The log periodic antenna AS-2169/O should be controlled at brigade or division level and a contingency package should be set aside for employment between headquarters when long-range FM radio is required.

### G. Material

#### (1) Damage to Slings.

- (a) OBSENVATION: Damage to three foot slings used in conjunction with the Type IV connector link has been observed while externally transporting CONEX containers and downed aircraft by CH-47.
- (b) EVALUATION: The most probable cause of sling damage is the instability of this type of load. The oscillation and rotation of the load twists the sling around the Type IV connector link causing the sling to be cut and/or burned.
- (c) RECOMMENDATION: A cover be fabricated utilizing unserviceable FOL hose four inches in diameter and 1/2 inch tubular nylon webbing. The sling is inserted through a ten inch section of POL hose prior to closing the Type IV connector link. After the link is closed, the POL hose is secured over the link utilizing the tubular nylon webbing.
  - (2) Hoalth Indicator Test System (HITS).
- (a) OBSERVATION: A test was made on the new Health Indicator Test System (XITS) engine testing procedures for holicopters.
- (b) EVALUATION: HITS proved to be more safe, simple, and accurate than other tests.
- (c) RECOMMENDATION: HITS be adopted universally to predict imminent engine failure on helicopters.

## h. Other. CS Minition E15ER2/P3 Canister.

(1) OBSERVATION: A CS mission on 13 February 1971 using E158R2/R3 CS Canisters, one functioned inside the aircraft, filling the aircraft cabin with CS, smoke, and a flash fire. As a result three people were burned and one was lost from the aircraft.

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- (2) EVALUATION: An accident investigation was conducted and determined the possible cause of the E158R2/R3 munition functioning inside the aircraft to be that the safety ring and pin assembly had been removed from all munitions before arriving at the target area and the arming wires of two munitions became entangled. As the first E158 was jettisioned from the aircraft, it removed the arming wire from a second E158 which was not observed by the bumbardier/handler and the second munition functioned inside the aircraft. The E158R2/R3 CS Canister will not function if either the safety ring and pin assembly or the arming wire has not been removed. The operating procedures are to remove the safety ring pin assembly on the munition immediately prior to its being jettisioned from the aircraft. This procedure has been redefined in writing to all units and a detailed check list provided on handling, storage and employment of this munition.
- (3) RECOMMENDATION: That the safety ring and rin assembly be removed from the E158 CS Canister as it is jettisoned from the aircraft and the arming wire be removed by the weight of the munition as the E158 falls away from the aircraft.

## 3. Keystone Robin Charlie Standdown

## a. War Trophy Registration

- (1) OBSERVATION: As the Division began standing down, war trophy registration increased considerably. This caused severe administrative problems and overwhelmed available registration facilities.
- (2) EVALUATION: Many units failed to immediately initiate applications as the trophies were acquired. Other units due to the tactical situation elected to delay the processing of war trophies until their units actually moved to the designated standdown site. In addition, many weapons were not obtained until standdown had commenced.

#### (3) RECOMMENDATIONS:

- (a) Major units nearing standdown should enlarge their registration facilities to handle unexpected influxes of war trophy registration applications.
- (b) Major subordinate units should stress registration as trophies are acquired by their men.

## b. <u>Decentralization of Control of Fersonnel</u>.

(1) OBSERVATION: Loss of control occurred where individuals, who had clready been cleared, processed through Division outprocessing points, were released or ordered to return to their former perent unit because transportation for shipment to their next unit was temporarily unavailable.

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(2) EVALUATION: Unauthorized or ill informed processing cadre often instructed personnel awaiting shipment, or had not fully processed to return to their former units. The parent unit, was often unaware that these personnel had returned to the unit area, and the shipping point lost control as well. This resulted in many enlisted men missing shipment to their next duty assignment while being beyond formal military control.

#### (3) RECOMMENDATIONS:

- (a) Each company/detachment should assign one officer to head a team of process controllers, with one NCO controller assigned to supervise 6-10 processes. This NCO would be responsible for knowing the status of all his personnel until they had physically shipped out.
- (b) Close liaison should be established between the unit standing down and the processing agency. The unit should be provided with a shipping roster and a roster of those men who are cleared but are not scheduled to ship. Those men in the latter category must be controlled by the processing agency until the individuals are turned over to a designated unit representative.
- (c) Those men cleared and requiring billets until shipment should be placed in a separate transient barracks and restricted to the limits of the billet area until shipment time.

#### c. Thievery

- (1) OBSERVATION: The incident rate for thievery increases prior to and during standdown.
- (2) EVALUATION: The explanation for the increase in thievery is two fold: First, there is an apparent feeling by thieves that the inherent confusion of standdown increases their chances of success, while decreasing their chances of being apprehended. Second, there is a tendency by some individuals and units to compensate for equipment shortages by "midnight requisitions."

#### (3) RECOMMENDATIONS:

- (a) Security precautions must be taken during the standdown period. The use of interior guards, dismounted military police patrols, and roving jeep patrols should be emphasized.
- (b) Safes, when available, should be used for securing wallets, cameras, watches, and other valuables.

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- (d) Additional storage containers/conexes should be provided with sufficient licks to insure that supply items are secured.
- (d) Weapons should be cleaned and turned in at the earliest possible time.
- (a) Security reminders to officers and men should continuously be incorporated into daily formations and briefings.

## d. tver Classification of Standdown/Inactivation OPORD.

- (1) OBSERVATION: The redeployment order was over classified thereby prohibiting subordinate units from making detailed plans and adequately briefing all personnel on the various phases of standdown/inactivation/redeployment.
- (2) EVALUATION: The classification restriction imposed on the 1st CAV DIV (AM) required the order to remain "SECRET" until nearly all the units were well into standown. Quite often key personnel were denied information needed to prepare the unit for standown because they lacked a secret clearance.
- (3) RECOMMENDATION: Units standing down or redeploying should be permitted to either classify their own standdown order as "Confidential" or be permitted to downgrade the order to "Confidential" once standdown has commenced.

## e. Steckpiling Awards and Decorations.

- (1) ØBSERVATION: A great shortage of decorations and citations developed during standown. Many individuals departing the Division left without having been physically presented with their earned decoration.
- (2) EVALUATION: As the Division neared standdown a stockpiling of common decorations was initiated, so as to insure that an adequate number of awards would be available for presentation to departing personnel. However, the Division never received an adequate number of decorations.
- (3) RECOMMENDATION: That those units singled out for standdown be given priority on requisitioning decorations.
- f. A detailed analysis and discussion of Keystone Robin Charlie Standdown can be found in the FIRST TEAM After Action Report published 28 May 1971.

- 1. (U) This headquarters has reviewed the Operational Report Lessons Learned for the period ending 30 April 1971 from Headquarters, 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile).
- 2. (C) Comments follow:
- a. Reference item concerning Control of Woodcutters; page 48, para 2c (1). The recommended method of controlling wood cutters is appropriate for small scale logging operations. In other cases a more effective system has been to establish checkpoints on access routes at the outskirts of logging villages. Workers and vehicles are then required to pass through these checkpoints as they depart for and return from work. In any system the weak link is the vulnerability of indigenous personnel manning the checkpoints to bribery and graft.
- b. Reference item concerning Employment of a Composite 105/155mm Battery, page 49, para 2c. The decision to use split batteries is directly related to the nature of the enemy threat. When the enemy operates in small, dispersed formations, the necessity to mass artillery is largely negated. To increase artillery coverage without unnecessary moves in such an environment, the split battery concept is valid. Against large scale regular forces the concept is not applicable.
- c. Reference item concerning Air Delivery of Napalm, page 51, para 2c (4); concur. This method is the most effective method when drums must be sling loaded. Internal loading and single drum dropping, as mentioned in II FFV ORLL, will yield a larger dispersion pattern but a less intense fire. When internal loading is not used or an intense flame is desired, the varied sling method is highly effective.
- d. Reference item concerning Resources Control Check Point, page 51, para 2c (5); concur. This recommendation was offered to the National Police and implemented during November 1970. The problem then as it is now is ineffectiveness of communications. Another problem results from personnel that lack integrity using these communications. Resource Control Check Points are only as effective as the integrity of the personnel manning them.

- e. Reference item concerning Health Indicator Test System (HITS), page 55, para 2g (1); concur. Recognizing the man-hour savings and the increased safety resulting from it's use, representatives of AVGO-Lycoming and Allison turbine engine divisions are closely monitoring the use of HITS. Reports on field experience with the system are being submitted to USAAVNC, Fort Rucker, Alabama, and to the manufacturers for further evaluation. Conversation with the aircraft maintenance representatives of the 3d Bde (Sep), 1st Cav Div (AM), revealed that action is being contemplated to brief all major units on the use and value of the HITS system. TRAC will monitor and take necessary action to insure the widest distribution of this information.
- f. Reference items concerning CS Munition E158 R2/R3 Canister, page 55, para 2h; concur. The 1st Cav Div (AM) published an updated SOP emphasizing the safety requirements for munition employment to include when the safety pins are removed from the munitions. The new SOP is in agreement with TM 3-1325-237-12. Because this is the first incident of its kind with the E158 munition, no further action is necessary as long as the procedures in the TM are followed.

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TAB D: Weather and Terrain

1. Tarrain - The terrain in the FIRST TEAM AO is generally flat. Bight. Duong Province has rice paddies and marsh lands to the south rising to the west and a mountain range dominating the northeast. The Province is heavily vegetated, primarily with multi-canopied forest. The northern portion of Long Khanh Province is for the most part heavily forested and steep, while in the south, the Province is relatively flat with scattered rubber plantations. Binh Tuy Province is lightly vegetated and is high-lighted by the 1302 meter high Nui Ong and the Rice Bowl, both located in the north central portion of the province. Three rivers - the Song Be, the Dong Nai, and the La Nga flow through the FIRST TEAM AO and present an obstacle to ground movement due to their depth and steep banks. Three mountains are prominent in the area: Nui Ba Ra, Nui Chan, and Nui Ong.

#### 2. Weather

a. Weather during November 1970 was somewhat more severe than usual. The best weather of the month occurred during the period 1 - 8 November, the worst problem during this time being occasional occurrences of dense fog during the early morning hours. Fog was perticularly prevalent on 7 November. During these eight days, the wind flow was from the north northeast and the air was relatively dry. After 8 November, the wind shifted more to the east, the moisture content of the air increased, and the monsoonal trough moved north of its usual position. These factors caused an increase in the amount of cloudiness and the amount of shower activity throughout the remainder of the month with the exception of the period 19-23 November, when almost no shower activity developed.

Even though the weather during the month was somewhat worse than expected, the detrimental effect of weather on operations was minimal. Morning fog did not usually cover a majority of the AO and was generally gunc by 0900H. Shower activity was light for the most part, was seldon accompanied by low ceilings, and was generally a late afternoon or early nighttime feature. Thus, the majority of hours during the month were

characterized by good weather.

b. During the month of December 1970, Military Region 3 was under the influence of the mortheast mensoonal flow. The month can be divided into two distinct parts, wet and dry. During the first half of the month the equitorial trough was north of its usual position for December. Even though it was 300 miles south of RVN, it still produced the instability needed to cause daily late-afternoon and early evening showers in the 1st Cav AO. By the middle of the month, this trough had moved further south towards the equator, thus depriving our area of any significant shower activity. Cloudiness was mainly scattered cumuliform with a thin cirrus shield covering most of the AO during the day ight hours.

AVAIGT-OT 13 May 1971 SUBJECT: Operational deport for Schleemual Period Ending 30 April 1971 T.B D: Weather and Terrain (cont)

Occurrences of fog were related to the rainfall pattern. During the first helf of the month, the northern portion of the AO experienced petchy meas of corrly norning rog, while the southern portion usually had widespread dense fog. During the second helf of the month, the northern half of the AO rerely had fog, while the southern portion had patchy errors of fog almost every day. The time of fog breakup in the first helf of the month was 1000H-1100H, while the time in the last part of the month was 0900-1000H.

On 26 December, a surge pushed down from the north, creating an area of 30-40 knot winds just off the coast of iM-3. This area of strong winds maintained itself through the end of December and as a result, much of the Cav AO experienced gusty surface winds and frequent turbulence aloft during hours of daylight.

- c. The weather furing Jenuery was generally very good. The most significant weather problem during the month was the occurrence of early norning fog, mainly in Binh Tuy and Long Khanh Trovinces. Here and stoke were trapped in a layer between 1000 and 5000 feet, restricting inflight visibilities to occasionally less than three miles during daylight hours. Surface winds during the first ten days of the month were relatively strong and occasionally gusty, particularly on 3 and 8 Jenuary. Strong, occasionally gusty southerly winds were observed on 26-30 January between 1900 and 2200H. These southerly winds were the result of the sea broke and are common during this time of year. Clouds were mainly scattered during the month. On 19-21 January, strategually ceilings were observed during the early norning, but only lasted until 0900-1000H each day. On several days, a circus shield developed, thus inhibiting the formation of lower clouds.
- d. Rostly favorable weather conditions provailed over the 40 during February. Skies were generally fair to partly cloudy with cirrus clouds, based at 30,000 feet being the predominant sky cover. Scattered cumulus clouds, usually formed during the morning, occasionally became broken ecilings with bases 3000 to 4000 feet during the afternoon and dissipated by 2000H. Restricted visibility due to fog and have continued to be a major weather problem. The visibility during daylight hours was usually three to seven niles with haze. Patchy conditions of visibility one half to three files in fog and have occurred during the early norning hours. During the period 14-17 February, there was increased cloudiness over the 40 with broken overcest ceilings generally based from 9000 to 13000 feet. From the 23rd to the 27th, unseasonable southeasterly flow at all levels up to 20,000 feet carried moist unstable air over the AO. This caused thunderstorms and rainshowers during the effermeen and evening and increased fog and streams during the corly norming. Winds were generally light and variable, becoming southerly with occasional

gusts to 17 knots during the afternoon. Gusting surface winds occurred in the vicinity of thunderstorms and rainshowers.

e. During Narch little day-to-day change occurred in the weather. Foor visibility in fog and haze continued to be the main weather problemover the 20. Skies were generally fair to partly cloudy with ceilings of 3000 feet, or greater, except for low ceilings in patchy stratus between 0500H and 1000H and in isolated thunderstorms and rainshowers during the late afternoon and evening. Winds were varible at 5-15 knots during the nonth with variable gusts to 25 knots vicinity thunderstorms. Northeasterly winds gusting 20-30 knots occurred between 1 and 15 herch.

- a. The FIRST TEAN Academy conducted individual training for all incoming replacements. A total of 14,201 United States officers and men underwent training during the reporting period in such diverse courses of instruction as Replacement Training, Sniper School, Combat Leadership Course, and Mines and Booby Trap Training. The training consisted of a 3 hour block of instruction, including 2 hours of practical work, designed to femiliarize Skytroopers with methods of detecting and avoiding energy mines and booby traps. A total of 2064 troops received this training.

It provides a means for a commander to locate friendly personnel positions in a standard grid system (UTM Coordinates) and to provide navigational assistance to helicopters. The airborne equipment is designed for installation in a Light Observation Helicopter (LOH). It selectively provides instantaneous UTM Coordinates of the helicopter, or steering data to enable the pilot to fly to a designated location. Equipment consists of a LORE air unit to retransmit LORAN to base station, a UHF data link to receive coordinates or steering information, and in the cockpit, a control panel and a display panel. The retransmission system was originally installed in Nui Chua Chan with the LORE sets installed on Scout Aircraft of B Troop, 1st Squadron 9th Air Cavalry. The system has proven to be quite effective.

### 2. Drug Abuse.

a. There were constant influxes of heroin addicts with a slight increase during the months of February and March. A drug abuse lecture team was appointed. It visited the fire support bases describing amnesty, prevention, rehabilitation, and abuse. The FIRST TEAM Academy continued "Drug Abuse" as a mandatory subject, which is given to all incoming junior grade officers and enlisted men. Enlisted men and rehabilitated addicts were also utilized to discuss drug problems with enlisted men from the various units.

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- b. Approximately 250 alleged addicts sought assistance, of which 13% were classified as successfully rehabilitated and 19% rehabilitation failures. 20 patients returned for rehabilitation as repeaters but were not treated under amnesty.
- c. Experience indicates that a less lemient approach to the program is required. A new program incorporating the following will therefore be instituted:
- (1) Hospitalization for abusers will be for a fixed period of time (seven days).
  - (2) Patients will enter rehabilitation, not amnesty, if repeaters.
- (3) Patients are required to return for a fixed number of follow-up sessions.
- 3. New Assignments. The Division had nine Medical Corps officers, three Medical Scrvice Corps officers, and seventy-seven medical service enlisted men newly assigned.

#### 4. Administration.

- a. There were 25 patients referred to the Division Surgeon for final disposition. An additional twelve patients were referred by the office of the Inspector General.
- b. 29 Presidential, Congressional, or Special Medical inquiries were processed on Division personnel. These inquiries included Congressional Medical correspondence addressed to both the Office of the Adjutant General and the Office of the Division Surgeon from USARV Surgeon. USARPAC Surgeon, and the Surgeon General.

#### 5. Preventive Medicine.

- a. Selected teams conducted sample checks of urine specimens from all units in the Division.
- b. Photodosimetry checks were maintained monthly from all X-ray facilities to insure safety.
- c. Intensive monthly inspections were made of 11 mess halls, unit areas, clubs, barber shops, and sanitary fills to insure proper health and sanitary standards.
- d. Chemical and biological purity checks were made of all water drawn within the FIRST TEAM AO.

#### Significant Activities

- 1. During the period 1 November 1970 to 9 April 1971, the Division Support Command (DISCOM) continued to support the 1st Cavalry Division (AM) in all operations. Combat service support provided by DISCOM to the FIRST TEAM included all classes of supply, maintenance (to include aircraft), medical services, evacuation of captured enemy material, technical assistance visits, and retrograde of excess equipment. In addition, training was provided to elements of the FIRST TEAM in rigging and slingout procedures, high velocity drop procedures, aeromedevac with horst and jungle penetrator, and Class I resupply. Combat service support coordinated by the DISCOM of the FIRST TEAM included bath, laundry, explosive ordnance disposal, and transportation, Weather had no impact on the support provided by DISCOM. A finale to the support provided by DISCOM was the organizing, manning, and equipping of the Composite Service Support Battalion (CSSB), which provides the same service support above to the 3d Brigade (Separate), 1st Cavalry Division (AM), DISCOM's mission was assumed by the CSSB on 10 April 1971.
- a. The 1st Forward Service Support Element (FSSE) provided logistical support to the elements of the 1st Brigade through 24 March 1971. Classes of supply I, II, III, IV, V, and IX, as well as direct support maintenance, medical service, and transportation were provided by DISCOM elements from the 1st Brigade base camp at Bien Hoa. Support was terminated on 24 March 1971 when the 1st Bde entered standdown.
- (1) Sling-out operations were conducted from Grizzly Pad at Phuoc Vinh and Sandy Pad at Bien Hoa. These operations were controlled by personnel from the 1st FSSE into 24 March when responsibility passed to the FSSE assigned to the Composite Service Support Battalion.
- (2) During the period 4 8 February, "D" Detachment, 27th Maint Bn, was absorbed into the Headquarters and A Company. After 8 February direct support maintenance (ground) was provided by Headquarters and A Company.
- b. The 2d FSSE continued to provide supply, maintenance, and medical support to elements of the 2d Brigade and attached units based at, and operating out of, FSB Buttons. DISCOM elements also coordinated all transportation requests generated by elements of the 2d Brigade. Combat service support was terminated on 11 March when all elements of the 2d Brigade were moved from FSB Buttons to Bien Hoa.
- (1) The forward supply points maintained at FSB Snuffy (Bu Gia Map) and LZ Caldwell (Duc Phong) were closed during February. Each location had a 300,000 gallon capacity JP-4 refuel point and an aircraft rearm facility.

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- (2) During the movement of the 3d Bde and attached units from FSE Duttons to Bien Hoa over 25 S&P loads were backhaulded and over 2,000 passengers moved by fixed wing. This move occured during the period 1-11 March 1971.
- c. The 3d FSSE continued to support the 3d Brigade and attached units from FSB Mace. Classes I, II, III, IV, and V supplies as well as maintenance and medical support were provided. In addition, the 3d FSSE coordinated the requirements for wheeled vehicles, fixed wing, and rotary wing aircraft needed for various troop and fire base moves.
- (1) In addition to the FSSE operations at FSB Mace the 3d FSSE monitored the support functions at two forward locations, Tanh Linh and Phuong Lam. Support at these locations consited of rearm and refuel points
- (2) The refuel and rearm points were closed at Phuong Lam and refuel and rearm points opened at La Nga.
- d. The Division Band performed at 23 change-of-command and 13 award ceremonnes for both the FIRST TEAM and non-divisional units. The band played over 50 hours of music for the Skytroopers at every fire base in the Division's area of operations. The band enhanced Vietnamese-American relation by playing for the ARVN Training School during the Tet holidays. Over 4,000 ARVN soldiers and their families were entertained. During the period 1 March through 11 April the band played for 20 redeployment/inactivation awards ceremonies for the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) and the 2d Brigade, 25th Infantry Division. The highlight of all activities was on 26 March when the band played in the FIRST TEAM Farewell Ceremony.
- e. The Division Transportation Office recorded a total of 75,210 passengers moved by fixed wing aircraft. A total of 38,832 passengers were moved by common user aircraft (C-130 and C-123) and 36,378 passengers were moved by the seven dedicated C-7A (Caribou) aircraft.
- (1) CH-47 sorties for the period totaled 15,991 and were employed in the movement of passengers and cargo. CH-47s (based on a figure of 5000 lbs per sortie) accounted for movement of 39,928 short tons. Cargo tonnage moved by C-123 and C-130 aircraft was 6,005 short tons while 4,471 tons were moved by committed C-7A aircraft. Total tonnage moved by fixed wing aircraft was 10,476 short tons.
- (2) The use of ground lines of communication. (LOC) was a particularly significant aspect of moving supplies, retrograding cargo, and moving units. A total of 83,081 short tons of supplies, retrograde cargo, and unit equipment was moved by wheeled vehicle and convoy. This accounted for the majority of transportation provided by the Division Transportation Office during the period.

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f. OFERATION SCRUE, a USARV program, was initiated on 26 September 1970 in the FIRST TEAN and completed on 1 February 1971. This project was designed to facilitate the systematic elimination of excess supplies and equipment and TOE/. TOE equipment not required by the Division's units and DSUs. One of the rime characteristics of OPERATION SCHUB was the relaxation of paperwork to accomplish turn-in. The internal procedures adopted eased the administrative requirements even further on owning units by placing much of the burden on DISCOI receiving activities. Hence, owning units were given the incentive to turn-in excess and unneeded equipment which had only served to burden maintenance and transportation capabilities. Collection points were established at Rien Koa, Camp Gorvand, FSB Buttons, and FSB Mace and at seperate battalion/com any rear areas. These collection points were so located to facilitate the use of backhard aircraft and vehicles to the main collection point at Bien Moa. Into ally the 27th Maintenance Estation received all atoms and operated the collection point at Bien Rea. On 25 November 1970, the mission was transferred to the 15th Supply & Sorvice Buttalion. Free turn-in started on 6 October 1970, and the steady growth in accumulations was quite encouraging. On 28 December 1970, receiving facilities were closed at all collection points and OFERATION SCRUB terminated. When OFERATION SCRUB was completed there were 595 vehicles, 398 trailers, 514 generators, and some 34,600 miscellaneous items of Class II, Class VII, and Class IX supply processed and retrograded to CCAS, Depot, or PDO. It resulted in some 11.8 million dollars (acquisition cost) of equipment put back into the supply system. In addition, 683 items worth \$298,000 were redistributed within the Division. OPERATION SCRUB was a success. It enhanced the readiness posture of the Division and simplified and empedited standdown activities.

g. Changes in demand criteria for stockage of supply items at all Division Supply DSUs, the deletion of retention levels in authorizes stockage, and the employment of an artificial Order and Ship Time (15 days) in the computation of Requisitioning Objectives were among the more significant constraints placed upon supply operations in-country during the reporting period. All were simed at reducing stock levels maintained incountry while maximizing the employment of assets already here. Inferred in these actions were the attendant requirements for supply retailers to validate inventories, purify stocks and locations, and cross-level or retrograde excesses. In early October, DISCOM DSUs embarked upon an intensive program of upgrading supply operations and stock control activities. Over 3000 lines were deleted from the ASL and over 10,394 lines of serviceable excess, worth some 1.8 million dollars, was retrograded by the 27th Maintenance Battalion. Over 5000 lines were deleted (Aircraft Maintenance & Supply), and 22,590 lines worth 4.7 million dollars were retrograded. The 15th Supply & Service Battalion reduced its ASL to 1031 lines, a 40% reduction, and retrograded over 900 lines of serviceable excess worth 1.1 million dollars. Not upward inventory adjustments and reduced warehouse refusals have been peripheral benefits realized as a result of the effort.. Benefits obtained from the institution of this new criteria were to some extent off set by higher zero balances and shortages in high demand

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replends unent type items.

- h. The Division Assumption Office placed emphasis on the retrograde of recoverable brass and steel. During this period a total 1.1 million rounds of steel and 34,804 pounds of brass were retrograded. This is significant as the retrograde of recoverable brass and steel prior to October 1970 was negligible.
- 2. During the period 1 November 1970 through 2 April 1971, the 27th Maintenance Battaltion continued to provide direct support maintenance and repair parts supply for all ground equipment (less medical and cryptoraphic) of the FLAST TEAM. Direct support maintenance and repair parts supply for all ground equipment was provided by the Maintenance Company of the residual Brigade after 2 April 1971. Support rendered by the 27th Maintenance Eattalion was evident in the fact that the following percentages of equipment were operational at the end of the period.

- b. The 27th Maintenance Battalion was given the mission of gaging all of the Division's M-16 rifles for muzzle bore erosion and replacing barrels, as required. Although the project required considerable time and personnel resources, it was completed.
- c. At the start of the Division Drug Amnesty Program DISCOM received the mission of fabricating 100 amnesty boxes. The 27th Maintenance Battalion was given this project and in four weeks, 102 amnesty boxes were fabricated, painted, and turned over to the 15th Supply and Service Battalion for issue to Division units.
  - d. The 27th Maintenance Battalion assembled over 1,000 M203s (a

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40mm grenade launcher/4-15 mifle) and returned them to the 15th Supply and Service Battalion for issue to Division units.

- 3. The .15th Supply and Service Battalion continued to provide Class I through IV, Class VII, limited Class V, and derial equipment support to the FTAST TEAM through 1 April 1971. Support was provided after 1 April 1971 by the Supply and Transport Company of the residual Brigade.
- a. New refuel points were opened at Los Ninh, Katum, and La Nga in support of operations in those areas.
- b. Refuel points closed during the period were Ham Tan, Dong Xoai, Bu Gia May, Song Be, Due Phong, and Phuong Lam.
- c. The 15th Supply and Service Sattalion used 8,757 sorties to sling-out 34,818 short tons of supplies.
- d. The AES Company rigged 128 drums of POL in 32 A-22 bags for air drop from C-130 aircraft into an unknown drop zone. Thirty-two (32) cargo parachutes (G-12) were provided by the depot in Can Runh Bay.
- 4. The 15th Transportation Battalion (Aircraft Maintenance and Supply) continued to provide direct support and direct back-up maint-enance for all aircraft, avionics equipment, and aircraft armament while also maintaining the ASL for aircraft repair parts.

- 5. The 15th Medical B ttalion continued to provide emergency medical and dental treatment, NEDEVAC of casualties, both to its own elearing stations and uniquely, to field army evac and surgical facilities. Nedical supply, harited maintenance of medical equipment, and limited optometric and psychiatric service were provided for the FIRST TEAM through the period 1 November 1970 to 25 Nameh 1971. Continued support was revided by "C" Company, 15th Medical Battalion after 25 Nameh 1971.

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- a. On 26 December 1970, a temporary NEDLVAC helicopter field location was established at Tay Minh in support of "C" Proop, 1st Squadron, 9th Cavalry. A second field MEDEVAC helicopter standby location was established at Tay Minh on 22 February 1971.
- b. On 31 December 1970, an emergency medical term was deployed to Dan Pieng in support of a FIRST TEAM operation. This term treated a total of 22 casualties.
- e. The Air Ambulance Platoon flow 2,217 MEDEVAC missions, accrued 2526 hours flying time, and evacuated 2,705 patients. Of these a total of 334 were hoist patients. Four helicopters were damaged by hostile fire, one of which had to be retrograded. Two pilots and two crewien were wounded by hostile fire. On 1 January 1971, the Air Ambulance Platoon was relieved of the mission of providing MEDEVAC support to the 5th ARVN Division.
- d. The 15th Hedical Buttalion participated in 26 MEDCAPS treating a total of 907 putnerts and six DENTCAPS treating a total of 30 patients.
- 6. The DISCOM of the FIRST TEAM provided instruction in the following areas to elements of the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile):

- 1. Civic Action: In compliance with current Vietnamization objectives, FIRST TEAM assets in direct support of civic action projects were significantly reduced during the reporting period. Guidance for assistance as directed by MACV (515-1) provides that help will be rendered if (1) all attempts from GVN sources fail and (2) the project will fail without assistance. There were no major projects remaining to be accomplished nor were any new projects started. In response to a request by the Phack Long Province Chief, the FIRST TEAM provided four (4) dump trucks and one (1) scraper in the ground preparation for a market place in Song Be. Approximately 125 MEDCAPS were conducted because GVN medical personnel were not available.
- 2. Vietnamization/Resources Control. The newly activated Resources Control Vietnamization/Pacification Section, G5, had all vacancies filled by 15 November. The FIRST TEAM Civic Action Fund was dissolved as were the US/FWMAF Civic Action and PSYWAR funds during standdown.
- a. Vietnamization, on-the-job training and formal instruction given ARVN soldiors continued. 10 Combat Advisory Teams were deployed in the AO to upgrade RF, PF, PSDF performances. Added emphasis was stressed on mobile checkpoints along QL-1, QL-14, and QL-20. Eagle Flights were increased to approximately five (5) a week from the latter part of January through the month of February.
- b. PF Training. In January 1971 the FIRST TEAM was directed by IIFFV to conduct PF NCO refresher training utilizing the facilities and personnel of the First Team Academy. The 10-day course terminated in February 1971 with the graduation of 150 PF NCOs from 10 Provinces. Under the auspices of the "Dedicated Company Program," the Division was directed to provide four (4) companies to implement the expanded onside PF training. The training was broken down into 2 phases: Phase I, 18 January 14 February 1971, and Phase II, 15 February 15 March 1971. 1st Bde was responsible for control over B/1-27 Inf and C/1-5 Cav; 2nd Bde, E/2-12 Cav; and Prov 3rd Bde, C/2-8 Cav; and DIVARTY, D/2-7 Cov. - 1. (U) The FIRST TEAM had 256 Kit Carson Scouts assigned upon the termination of the reporting period. 11 scouts had transferred from the 11th Armored Cavelry Regiment, 26 from the 2d Bde, 25th Infantry Division, and 79 from miscellaneous units undergoing standdown.
- 2. (U) 113 KCSs terminated service based upon release requests and substandard performances.
- 3. (!!) One KCS was killed in action during ground operations.


- 1. General: During the period 1 November 1970 10 April 1971, Division Chemical Section, 26th Chemical Detachment, and 184th Chemical Platoon (DS), continued chemical support activities for the 1st Cavalry Division (AM). FIRST TEAM Chemical Personnel continued to support the Division in the following area: Airborne Personnel Detection, CS employment, Crop Lestruction, Flame Employment, Chemical Subjects Training, and Inspections.
- 2. Operational Highlights.
- n. In addition to their normal intelligence gathering process, Airborne Personnel Detector (Sniffer) missions resulted in the discovery of several heavily used trails, thirty-one enemy soldiers, one enemy truck, and numerous bunkers, hootches, and rafts.
- b. Persistent CS Drum Drops were continued throughout the FIRST TEAM AO. On 26-28 January 1971, CH-47 aircraft were used to drop persistent CS on trails used by NVA/VC. This operation greatly reduced energy movement around the target area.
- c. During November approval was granted to conduct crop destruction operations in certain section of Binh Tuy Province. Four sorties using C-123K (Provider) aircraft were flown in November and the remainder of the crops in the approved areas were destroyed on 8-10 December 1970 using helicoptors to spray herbicide. A total of 1259 gallons of 30% aqueous solution of agent BLUE were sprayed on enemy garden plots covering a total of 71 acres. The primary crops destroyed were rice, ranioc, vegetables, and corn.
- d. The combination of an active psychological operations and napalm crop destruction program during 1 November 1970 to 10 January 1971 resulted in approximately 140 Hoi Chanhs from the War Zone D.
- e. On 8 December 1970 a new technique was used to drop napalm from a CH-47 aircraft which improved the coverage by approximately 85%. The method developed was to sling two cargo nets of mapalm external on the CH-47 cargo drop mechanism and have the slings separated by a height of approximately five feet. This method proved to be very helpful in achieving larger area coverage and reducing the number of sorties needed to destroy the target area.
- 3. Operational Totals: Totals given for the reporting period include most, but not all of the wide variety of chemical support given the FIRST TEAM.
