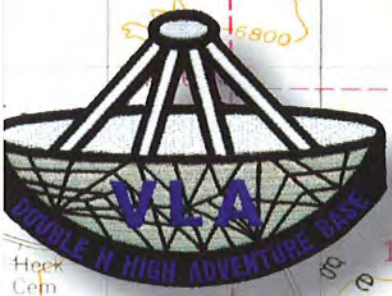


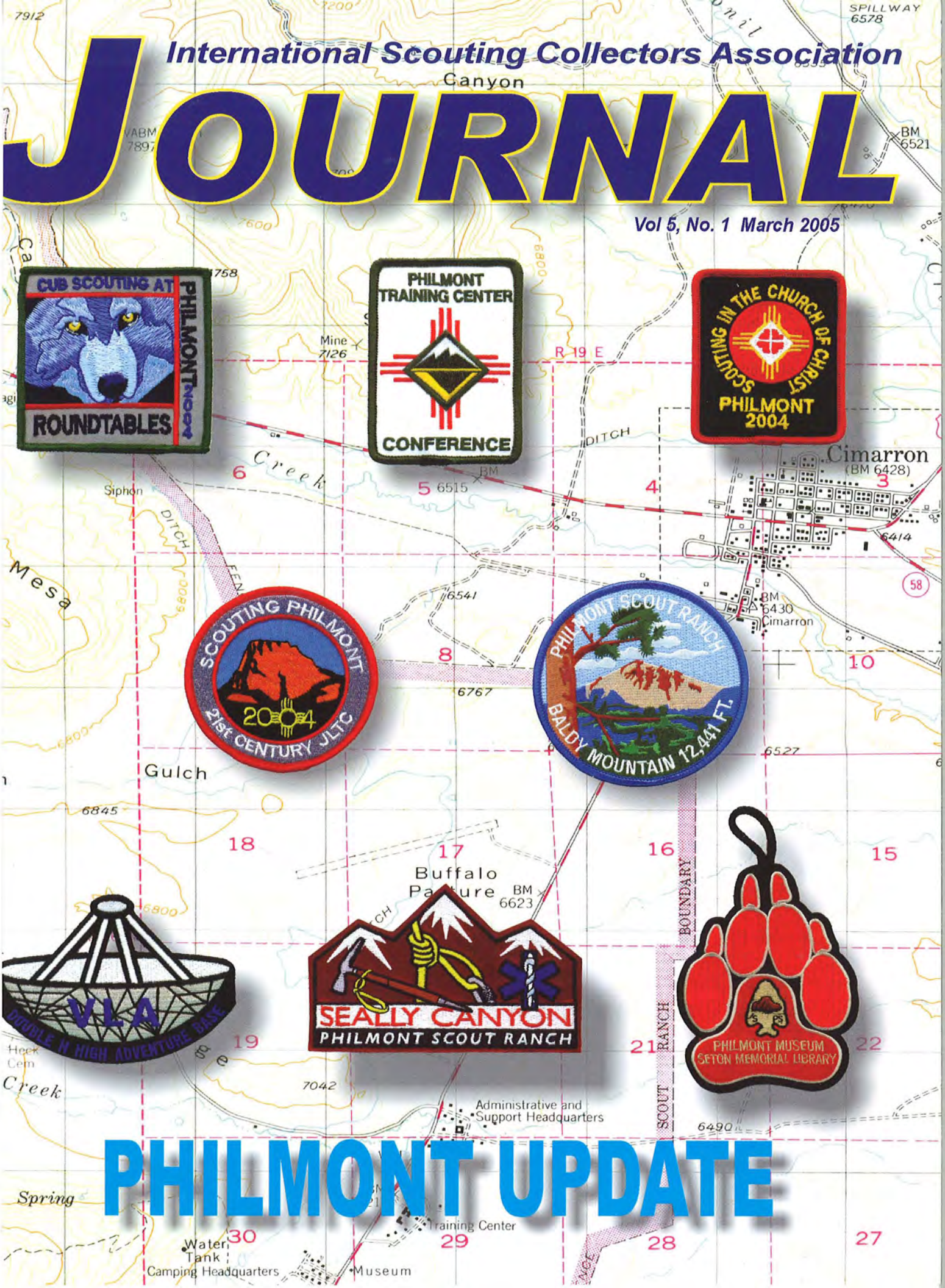

Submissions should be made to the ISCA Journal Editor. Materials should be submitted in the following manner, unless prior arrangements are made:

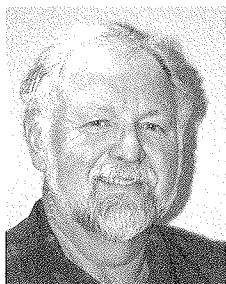
- Text should be submitted through e-mail, or on disk, in a text file or MS-WORD form. PC platform only.

- A desired layout can be submitted, but ISCA reserves the right to edit material or layout.
- All submissions must be made in advance of the submission deadline. No exceptions will be made.
- The Editor is available to assist writers regarding the preparation of articles and submission of materials.
- Submission materials will be returned if requested. The International Scouting Collectors Association, Inc. retains copyright over all materials published in the ISCA Journal, unless express written permission for use is given.

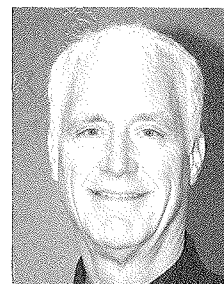
CHAIRMAN'S & PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Election of Officers: We're happy to announce that we've completed another round of elections for officers. All of the incumbents were re-elected including Bruce Dordick for the contested Administrative EVP position. In addition, Joe Schloss (who had served as the Marketing EVP) was elected to the EVP National Events position to fill the position that Chris Jensen vacated last year. Thank you Chris, for your support in this position during your term. As a result, this opened up the Marketing EVP position – Jef Heckinger has been appointed to this position and will serve until the next scheduled elections (which will be at the end of this year).

Second ISCA Convention and Dallas Trade-O-Ree: On the weekend of January 14th and 15th, ISCA held its "Second Convention" in conjunction with the 27th Annual Dallas Trade-O-Ree. We also held a Board meeting – members can see the minutes from this meeting on-line in the member's only section of the ISCA web-site. The Convention and Trade-O-Ree was very well attended with people coming from all over the country. All of the seminars were very well attended. A special thanks is given to the seminar presenters: Tracy Mesler – Collecting Texas OA Issues, Sam Fairchild – Scouting Museums, Chip Elliott and Mike McAdams – Philmont Patches and Memorabilia, Steve Austin – Collecting CSP's, Roy More and Blake Keasey – Collecting Red and Whites, and Terry Grove – Ceremonial History of the Wimachtendienk from 1915 – 1921. There are still a few of the ISCA "Second Convention" patches left at the time we were going to press – check the ISCA store on our web-site if you are interested in purchasing one or two.

ISCA Planning and Strategy Session: On January 13th, we held the second ISCA "Planning and Strategy session." We focused our brainstorming on the next "5 to 20 years" for our hobby. Of course, we considered growth, how things have been changing in our hobby, and ISCA's role going forward. We have formed a couple of committees to formulate some strategies and will be forming additional committees in the months to come. If you'd like to get involved, let either of us know.

ISCA Board Meeting: On Saturday, January 15, a Board meeting was held. Business transacted and/or key items of business discussed is as follows: ISCA hosted a very successful 2004 pre-NOAC Trade-O-Ree; ISCA also had a significant presence at NOAC itself and partnered with the Special Events Committee to help bring about a very successful Center for History (which also included the NOAC Museum); 2005 National Jamboree presence - we'll have one or two ISCA booths promoting the ethics of collecting and trading Scouting memorabilia and we'll also coordinate/sponsor the Collections Merit Badge on Merit Badge Midway (note: we're still looking for volunteers to help staff these areas – ISCA members can be part time NJ staff for as little as \$20.00 and 4 hours of your time – contact Jef Heckinger for details and to volunteer); a resolution was passed to pursue a 501(c)(3) application separate from ISCA to form a non-profit "charitable" organization for the hobby; a Certification Committee was appointed to look into establishing a process to certify the authenticity of Scouting memorabilia; there will be a strong marketing program put together this year (two areas of focus will be the formation of chapters and increasing our presence in council offices, trade-o-rees, conclaves, etc. across the country); and year end assets in excess of \$52,000 (\$38,000 of which is in our Life Member account). For a complete summary of the meeting and the financial report, see the ISCA web-site.

DSA Committee: The ISCA Distinguished Service Award Committee was appointed. Dave Thomas will chair the committee and Dave Minnihan and Paul Munscher will assist in the nominating and balloting process. Please see page 6 of this Journal for details about how to place a name for nomination.

Ethics Committee: The ISCA Ethics Committee received and processed ethical complaints during 2004. This is challenging work and was handled very well by Dave Thomas, Chair, Judge Mickey Wilson, Dave Oertle, Bill Topkis and Paul Munscher. We share a word of "thanks" to these folk who went the extra mile for the hobby.

Standards and Certification Committee: ISCA is studying the possibility of establishing people throughout the hobby who could be trusted to evaluate the authenticity of Scout memorabilia that is being sold, bought, or traded. We have asked John Pleasants to chair that study committee with Sam Fairchild, Roy More, Conley Williams, and Bill Topkis assisting on the committee. They will report their thoughts and possibilities to the ISCA Board at our next meeting just before the National Jamboree in Virginia.

GUY HATFIELD GONE HOME

Guy Hatfield has "gone home." Guy passed away on Friday February 4, 2005 from an apparent heart attack.

Guy was an Eagle Scout, Vigil Honor member of Kawida Lodge, Silver Beaver recipient, and lifelong member and supporter of the Boy Scouts of America. Guy took a personal interest in educating other collectors in the wonderful world of patch collecting, but he went beyond the mere collection cloth and instilled in them the love of (and quest for) the history behind each piece.

Guy was truly one of the best and most knowledgeable patrons in the patch trading hobby. His interest ranged from arguably the best KY/TN OA collection in the country, to definitely the best council patch collection in the country, to Region Four items, to Geer-shaped flaps, to KY community strips, and on and on. . .

Guy was also the first ever to put together a complete first flap set (circa 1980), as well as putting together several number sets. He was truly a "Patch Master."

Guy was a well-known newspaper owner and editor, and served as the president of the KY Newspaper Editors Association. He will be sorely missed by many throughout the Commonwealth of KY and the patch collecting community.

Guy leaves behind his wonderful wife, Teresa as well as two daughters, a son, and several grandchildren. Please keep them in your prayers during this most difficult time.

NOMINATIONS FOR THE 2005 ISCA DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Who:

Any active member of ISCA who has not received the award before or who is not serving on the 2005 Award Nominating Committee.

What:

The International Scouting Collectors Association's "Scouting Memorabilia Distinguished Service Award."

This award was created to recognize those individuals that have contributed significantly to the hobby of Scouting memorabilia collecting and to Scouting itself.

Recipients of this award are collectors of Scouting memorabilia who have distinguished themselves through their diligent work and involvement in Scouting; through the high quality of their memorabilia collections; through their unselfish contribution to the knowledge base of collecting by sharing information, displaying their collections, and writing articles and books; through their longstanding service to Scouting memorabilia organizations; and, overall, through their presence as a positive force in the Scouting memorabilia collecting hobby. They must be active members of ISCA.

When and Where:

The ISCA Distinguished Service Award is presented annually at a national event. Past venues have included the Dallas Trade-O-Ree and the pre-NOAC Trade-O-Ree. This year's presentation is expected to be at the Jambo TOR in Fredericksburg, the week of July 24th.

How:

Under ISCA's bylaws, the ISCA Chairman of the Board of Directors appoints the Chairman of the Nominating Committee for a fixed term. The Nominating Committee Chairman will then appoint a committee of members with the concurrence of the ISCA Chairman of the Board of Directors. Members can succeed themselves on the committee. This year's committee is chaired by Dave Thomas, and includes Dave Minnihan and Paul Munscher.

Nominations will be made to the Nominating Committee directly by the members of ISCA. The nomination deadline, determined by the Committee, is **April 10, 2005**. Nominations may be hand-delivered, mailed, or emailed and must be in writing to be considered. Each nomination should include the personal contact information for the candidate and a short synopsis of the nominee's involvement in Scouting and how this person has contributed to the hobby of Scouting memorabilia collecting.

Nominations should be sent to **Dave Thomas, 5335 Spring Valley Rd., Dallas, TX 75254** or emailed to **firstflaps@aol.com**.

Once the nominations are received:

- The Nominating Committee, based on the written materials presented on behalf of the candidates, will recommend no less than three candidates to the ISCA Chairman of the Board and the ISCA President for concurrence.
- Following concurrence by the ISCA Chairman and the ISCA President, the Nominating Committee will present the candidates to the membership of ISCA in the June issue of the *ISCA Journal* and on the ISCA Website.
- The voting deadline will be listed in the *Journal* and on the ISCA website.

Each member of ISCA may cast one vote. Voting will require ISCA membership number and name, and can be done in one of three ways:

- snail mail to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee
- email to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee
- voting on the ISCA website – the website will contain clear instructions for electronic ballots.

The person receiving the most votes – the plurality – will be the DSA recipient. In the case of a tie vote, a majority vote by the Nominating Committee with certification of the ISCA Chairman of the Board and ISCA President will determine the winner.

PHILMONT UPDATE THROUGH 2004

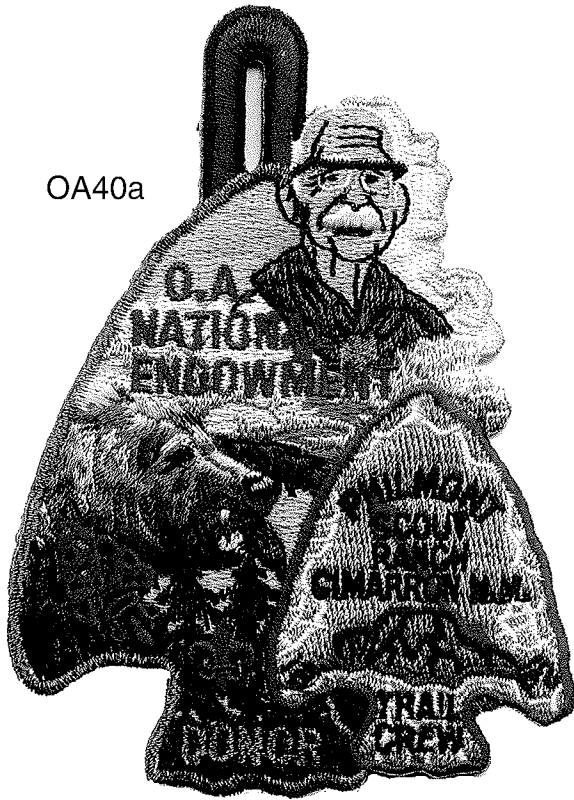

Since the production of Philmont Millennium 1, Chip Elliott and I have only provided a couple of these updates through the ISCA Journal. They did not follow our original numbering scheme, so this year, we have done a complete rework of all the patch charts from the original book adding known patches through the end of 2004. Those who attended the Dallas TOR were able to pick up copies of the new charts. They are also available for download from www.PhilmontM1.com/check-list.pdf. It's not too big, only 1,002 KB, so even on a dial-up modem, it won't take too long. It is 49 pages long. You will also notice a new designation when talking about the back of the patch - PBss stands for Plastic Back with Scout Stuff printed logo.

If you went to Philmont in 2004 with the intent to purchase every new patch (not counting ones that have been available before) you would have come away with 39 new items for your collection (34 of the new back country camps, 1 Adventure, 1 Leather, 1 Trading Post, and 2 Museum). But, if you are like many of us and have to have them ALL, your collection grew by a whopping 97 new issues (35 PTC, 2 Philbreak, 5 OA, 3 Religious, 2 staff, 3 PSA, & 8 Double H - but more on that later).

The Arrowhead Award is very special to Philmont. It is a symbol of seasonal staff members, or of completing a trek and fulfilling other demanding requirements. Let's admit it, participating in a Training Center conference does NOT qualify one for an Arrowhead Award. But, over the past several years, a few courses have created and presented their participants with very limited edition arrowheads. They have even told their participants not to wear them until after they leave Philmont. It is our understanding that one person responsible for producing them is no longer welcome at Philmont as a course instructor, but that did not stop him from sending along the patches with the other instructors in 2004. We have not listed them this year. As yet, we do not have the information on what was produced.

When designing a patch for your contingent or conference, please be mindful of the importance Philmont places on the arrowhead patch shape and design. Philmont only used the design on one other patch and changed their minds; quickly pulling the patch from the shelves. If you must use the Arrowhead, incorporate it into your design, but do not issue your own arrowhead.

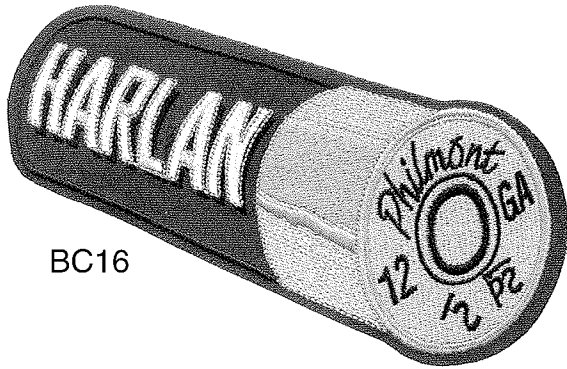

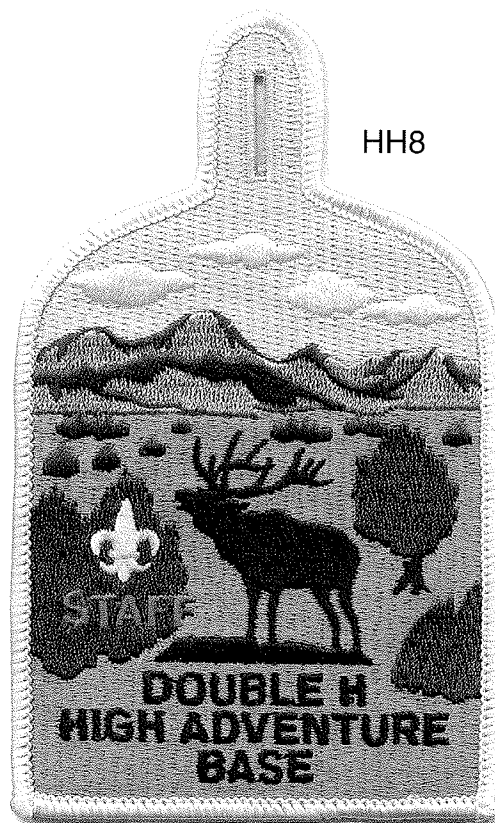
DOUBLE H RANCH

The biggest news to come out of Philmont is the opening of a new camp. Not just a new campground within Philmont, but a completely new camping area. Named the Double H High Adventure Base, it is located in Datil, New Mexico. Double H provides a rugged backpacking experience unlike any offered before. The Double H is made possible through a partnership with the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and the Boy Scouts of America. It is also operated by Philmont Scout Ranch and is a program of Philmont.

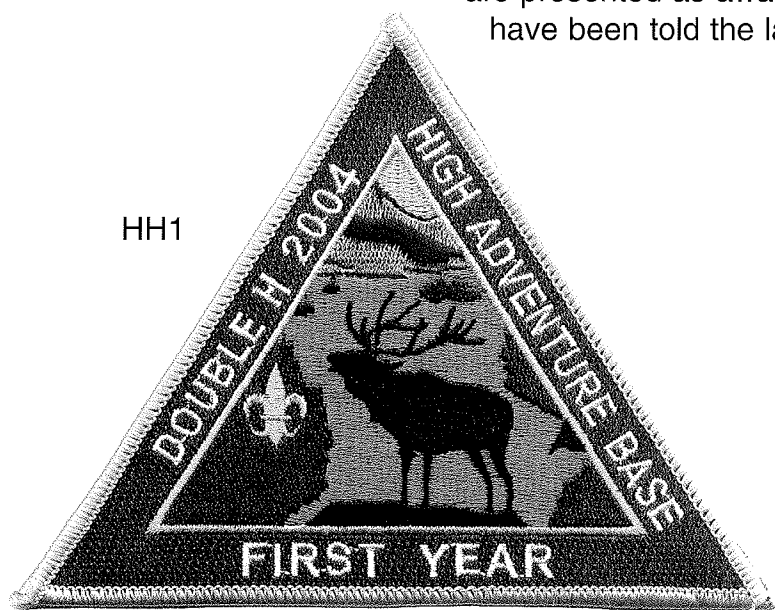
The crews arrive at the Base and are teamed with a Wilderness Guide; this Guide will spend the entire trek with the crew, providing training and program. The adventure is a strenuous one, which will require teamwork and preparation. With no established trail system, the Double H is a true rugged, southwestern experience.

On the seven-day trek the crews have a chance to hike through canyons, navigate cross-country with a GPS, or watch prize bull elk. They also experience great programs like Astronomy, Leave No Trace, Geocaching, Search and Rescue and Black Powder Shooting. On day four of the trek they journey to the Martin Camp to be resupplied and enjoy a hearty western dinner.

6 patches were available through the Philmont trading post and 2 are presented as awards - 1 for participation and 1 for staff. We have been told the last 2 will be changed for next year.

WIDE CRIMPED MERIT BADGES (TYPE B) - SCARCITY RANKING AND VALUE RANGE

INTRODUCTION

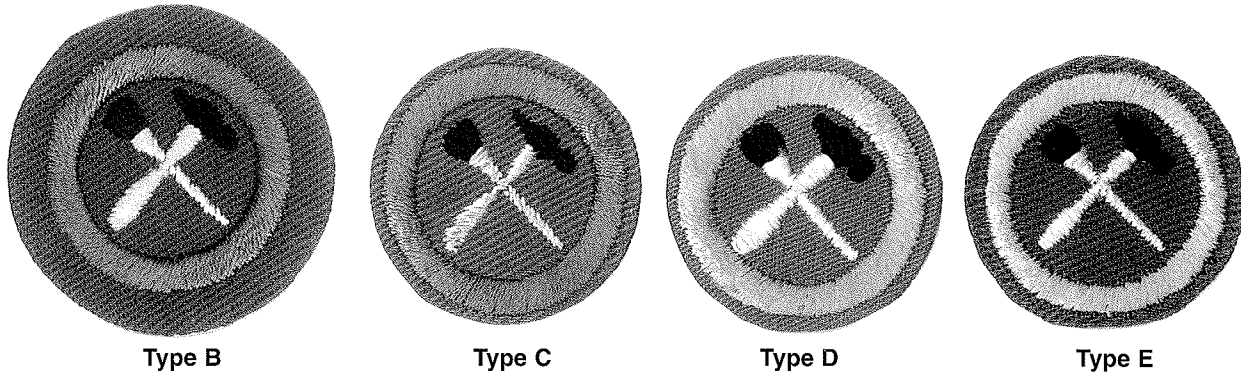


Figure 1 - Comparison of Type B, C, D, and E merit badges

Wide crimped merit badges, hereafter known as Type B, were made beginning in 1934 and produced at least through 1935. The exact cutoff date is uncertain, although, merit badge cards dated in early 1936 exist with tan narrow crimped merit badges, hereafter known as Type C. I've seen Type B merit badges on sashes that were awarded into the 1940's and beyond, especially from smaller councils. Figure 1 shows a comparison of Type B, C, D, and E merit badges.

CLOTH COLOR VARIATIONS

Type B merit badge cloth color varies in shade from a greener khaki to light brown similar to the earlier square merit badges, hereafter referred to as Type A. I believe this provides evidence that the same cloth material used to produce Type A merit badges continued with Type B. It appears the less commonly earned Type B merit badges mostly came with the light brown cloth although they may also exist in the greener khaki cloth. I have a nearly complete Type B collection which includes 18 with the light brown cloth, all of them among the less frequently earned.

SUBJECT COLOR VARIATIONS

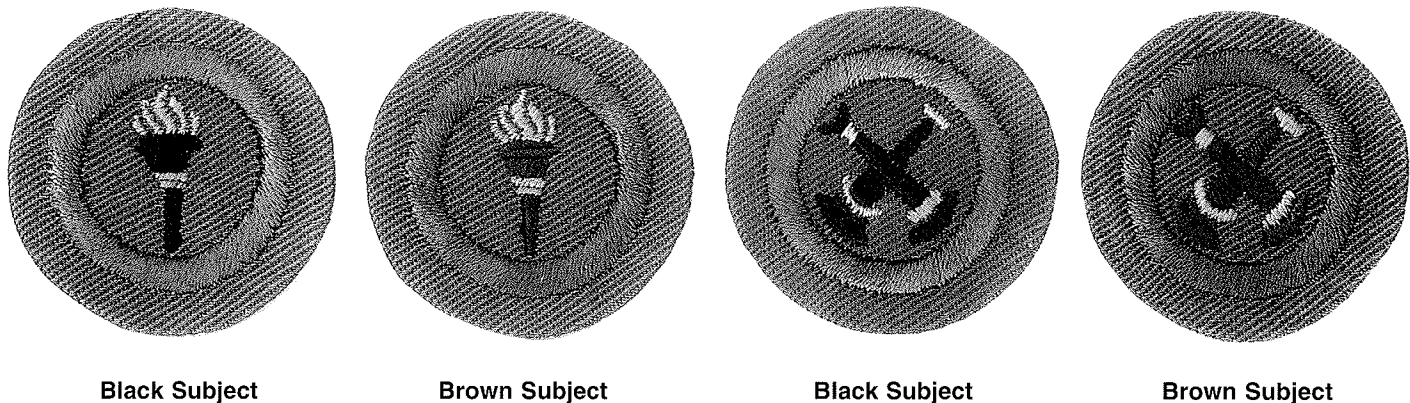
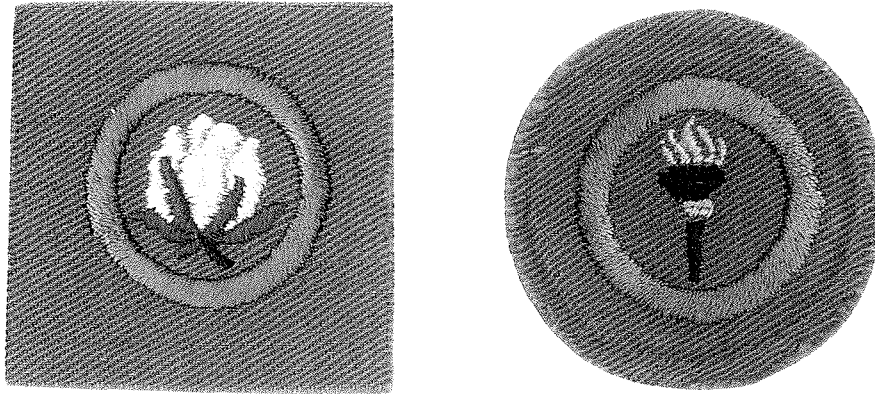


Figure 2 - Examples of Type B Subject Color Variations

Early on as I assembled my Type B merit badge collection I noticed many of the subjects existed in both brown and black so I started actively collecting them. I have about 14 examples in my collection including a brown and black kettle in Cooking, brown and black churn in Dairying, brown and black plow in Farm Mechanics, etc. Collectors may find collecting these varieties challenging and add spice to the hobby. Figure 2 shows some subject color examples.

OVERALL SIZE COMPARISONS

Type B merit badges are consistently 2 inches in diameter when they are opened and laid flat. Most Type A merit badges in mint unaltered condition are also at least 2 inches when measured across the square. This can vary depending on how they are cut from the cloth bolt. Figure 3 shows Type A and B size comparisons. I believe this is evidence for the belief by some serious merit

badge collectors that Type A merit badges were converted by the manufacturer into Type B, at least until remaining Type A supplies were exhausted. This also explains why cloth colors are similar between Type A and B merit badges.



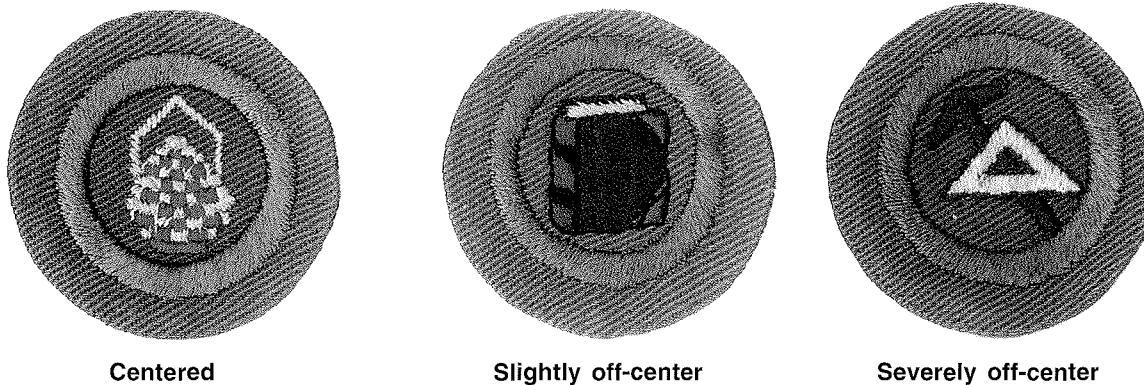

DESIGN CENTERING

Making Type B merit badges out of Type A may also explain why the design on Type B merit badges isn't always perfectly centered. Figure 4 shows examples of off-center Type B merit badges. I have found many genuine Type B merit badges with the design off-center. This is an indication that merit badge cutting and crimping was not an exact science. It may also indicate the manufacturer used as many surplus Type A merit badges as possible to convert into Type B. Off-center Type A merit badges are fairly common.

TYPE B MERIT BADGES ON SASHES

I have removed what appeared to be all Type A merit badges from sashes on a number of occasions only to discover one or more Type B merit badges that were folded under square to match their Type A cousins. This is to be expected, especially if the Scout earned his merit badges during the 1930's. I have also had sashes with Type B merit badges that were earned in the 1940's. Type B merit badges that were folded under to appear square will have both the square and round crimp lines, especially if the merit badges were on a sash for a number of years. The square crimp lines are almost impossible to totally remove, even with water. I just recrimp them to re-establish the circular crimp line and let it go at that. It is still considered a genuine Type B merit badge, even though the square crimp lines are still slightly visible.

CHANCE FOR DECEPTION

Because Type A and B merit badges were likely made from the same cloth batches, there is a chance for deception. It is possible to take a well-centered 2 inch by 2 inch or larger Type A merit badge and convert it into Type B. However, two immediate problems come to light. In my opinion, it would be extremely difficult to duplicate the crimp lines and perfect outer circle of Type B merit badges. Furthermore, converting a rare Type A merit badge to Type B doesn't make any economic sense. In most cases, the rarer Type A merit badges are worth as much or more. The more common Type B merit badges are plentiful enough at a reasonable cost that attempting to make them from Type A is a waste of time, not to mention the ethics issue. I have developed a recrimping technique that restores genuine Type B merit badges so that they look close to original. There are always stray threads when I finish that I remove with sewing scissors. The secret is to use very little water to restore the crimp line without flattening the merit badge. The goal is to restore the tiny wrinkles created from slight cloth bunching around the folded cloth when the merit badge was originally crimped. After recrimping, I immediately place the merit badge in a medallion-size cardboard

holder and staple just the open side. I allow the merit badge to set overnight and completely dry before stapling the remaining sides. My recrimping technique is most successful with mint-to-ear mint unwashed merit badges. I found it a waste of time to try and recrimp washed or well-used merit badges of any type. They will never look nice no matter what you do. I tried using starch to restore well used Type B merit badges but found it didn't work well and made the merit badge appear unnatural. Knowledgeable merit badge collectors will not be fooled.

STORING AND MOUNTING TYPE B MERIT BADGES

I want to emphasize that Type B merit badges came crimped and were also awarded that way. The crimp was maintained if the merit badge was sewn on a sash soon after it was awarded. However, excessive handling or misuse resulted in the crimped cloth unfolding. Perhaps a contributing factor in the problem is that Type B merit badges came without sizing on the back that was characteristic of Type C, D, and E merit badges. The sizing seemed to help the later crimped merit badges maintain their crimped appearance and is probably the reason the sizing was introduced. I believe Type B merit badges should be stored and displayed crimped as they were awarded. I didn't like the appearance of some of the uncrimped Type B merit badges in my collection which led me to develop my recrimping technique discussed earlier. I'm aware of a few collectors who prefer to display their Type B merit badges open and uncrimped. However, the majority of merit badge collectors I'm familiar with prefer to display them the way they were made and awarded. I have recrimped the Type B collections for a number of collectors and am not aware of a single one that was not pleased with the results. Following is a complete list of Type B merit badges along with scarcity rankings and suggested value range. Suggested value ranges were determined from number earned totals and known difficulty from my collection. Obviously, this is not an exact science and can be adjusted per individual collector preference. It is an attempt to bring some consistency in pricing and value. I welcome input from interested persons

1975 NOAC ARMBANDS

The official staff plastic armbands were the first major effort by the National office to produce tangible (and collectible) recognition for all of the major staff groups at a National Order of the Arrow Conference beyond paper nametags. National put their toe in the water a bit at a few of the early NOACs (1948, 50, 52, 54 and 56) by putting the official patch on a neckerchief and issuing it to a staff group or the National Committee. Patches were made for the Chorus in 1952 and for both the Band and Chorus in 1958 and 1961. The 1956 NOAC silk-screened neckerchief was actually made for the Conference Committee. Conference Committee and Chorus/Band items were regularly made from 1961 on.

To the great surprise of most memorabilia collectors who attended the 1975 NOAC, we saw white plastic armbands worn by all official staff members and some were very rare. It appears that in most cases, they only made enough for the projected staff members in each area. If someone didn't show up, they had a spare or two. If they tried to add additional staff members at the NOAC, some did not get armbands. Initially, the reaction by most collectors was to seek only one for their collection, as acquiring a full set seemed impossible. We were in a quandary. These armbands were clearly official as they were made and distributed by National. Was one armband enough to have a complete collection of all of the official items? No, it wasn't. But, with no extras available for staff to purchase; no one seemed to be interested in selling or trading their staff armband as it was the only one they had.

It took years for some of these armbands to become available to collectors and clearly some of them were VERY rare. To my knowledge, there are twelve different armbands to make a complete set. I say that because I wonder sometimes if there is another one hiding out there, waiting to surprise us all. The National Office published a staff list after the NOAC including pictures of youth staff, with the following breakdown:

Administration: 7	Special Events: 8
Recreation: 4	Indian Events: 5
Training: 13	Newspaper: 1
Host Lodge: 1	Chief and Vice Chief: 2
Shows: 11	Public Relations: 4

Obviously there must have been more staff than the 56 young people pictured in this flyer, so these must have been the key youth staff. The adult staff was not pictured. And, there must have been additional youth staff in order to look after the 4200 arrow-men present at the conference.

I made every effort to contact Scouting museums, major collections, and posted a request for information a couple of

times on both Patch-L and Tx-patch. The total numbers of armbands in the collections I found were as follows:

Arrowpower: 4	Duplication: 8
Band: 6	Excitement '75: 6
Challenge: 10	Exhibits: 4
Chorus: 6	Public Relations: 11
Dance Judge: 2	Security and First Aid: 5
Discussion: 9	Shows: 8

The above numbers jive with this collector's experience. The scarcest of all armbands is, of course, the "Dance Judge" (#1 group). I talked to both of the recipients of the two armbands currently in collections that I know of. They related that there were only 6 judges and they each had only one armband. That two of these have found their way into collections is amazing, given their scarcity.



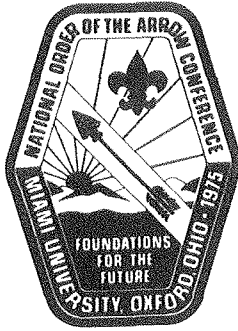
One the "Dance Judge" armbands rests in the permanent collection of the Las Vegas International Scouting Museum which has one of the two known complete sets of these armbands. There are at least four more "Dance Judge" armbands out there somewhere. The next group according to scarcity is "Arrowpower," "Exhibits," and "Security and First Aid" (#2 group). Then come "Excitement '75," "Band," and "Chorus" (#3 group). After that comes "Duplication," "Discussion," and "Shows" (#4 group), with "Public Relations" and "Challenge" being the most common (#5 group).

If I were to put a monetary value on these, it would be very difficult. I only know of 11 of the most common armband. How much is a one-of-eleven collectible worth? If it were a rare coin it might push a million dollars these days. Yet, the current price of the most common armbands seems to be \$125-\$150 each (#5 group). The #4 group would be around \$250-\$300 each, the #3 group \$400-\$450 each, the #2 group \$600-\$750 each and the "Dance Judge" is clearly up to the owner to set the price. Think how cheap these are compared to the number known.

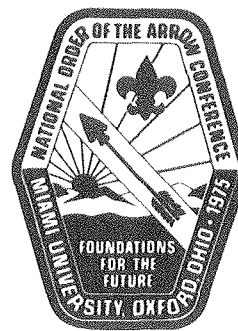
What does it take to have a complete set of NOAC Official National Issue NOAC memorabilia? A complete set of 12! But, every collection needs at least one of these. Of the 79 total armbands that I could locate, I suspect there may be another 79 or more in boxes, drawers, and quiet collections. I imagine that the common ones above will get more common as more are found, and the scarcest ones will continue to be rare. But, if the hunt were too easy, it wouldn't be any fun, would it? Happy hunting!!

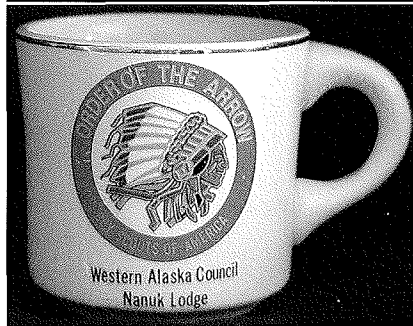
As with other BSA memorabilia cataloguing efforts, identification criteria requires tweaking from time to time, contingent upon apparent trends. In this case, there is more than one type of old national Order of the Arrow (OOA) along with multiple versions of the 1980's national Order of the Arrow (MGM) designs. Their differences are distinct enough to warrant separate listings.

For the OOA, there are two distinct designs. OOA1 has white lettering in the red outer circle and an approximate diameter of 45 mm (see example #1 – Lemolloillahee Lodge #415). OOA2 has dark yellow lettering in the red out circle and an observed design diameter ranging from 44 - 51mm (see example #2 – Nanuk Lodge #355).

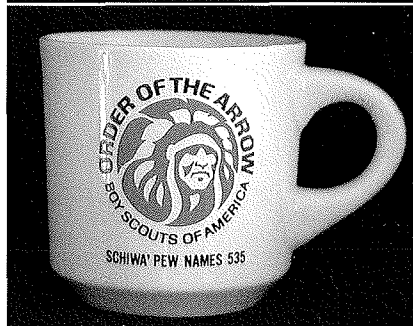
For the 1980's MGM generic Order of the Arrow design that succeeded the OOA, there appear to be at least three main types. MGM1 is roughly 51 mm in diameter with a red stylized Native American head & headdress bust as the



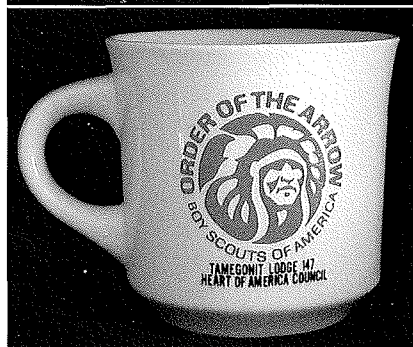

center of the design, with ORDER OF THE ARROW in blue curving around the upper portion of the bust and BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA in black curving around the lower portion in a smaller font (see example #3 – Shiwa'Pew Names Lodge #535).

MGM2 is an all red version of the MGM1, with an approximate diameter of 51 mm (see example #4- Tamegonit Lodge #147)

MGM3 is an all red version of the MGM1, but with a white Scout emblem superimposed in the lower left-hand corner of the bust and no wording. The design is round with an observed design diameter ranging from 44 - 52mm (see example #5 – Maka Ina Lodge #350).

OA Mug Market Conditions

As previously noted, eBay continues to be an excellent source of Boy Scout memorabilia, including OA lodge mugs. Listing for cups and mugs have become frequent enough that eBay has segregated them from other BSA memorabilia and into their own category.

On the average, there are 100-200 BSA related mugs listed on eBay at any one time, whether by individual mugs, in groups, or mixed in with other memorabilia. Most common final pricing ranges from \$0.99 to \$5.99.

To date, the most expensive mug sale of any kind was a 1966 Dixie Fellowship mug @ \$223.00.

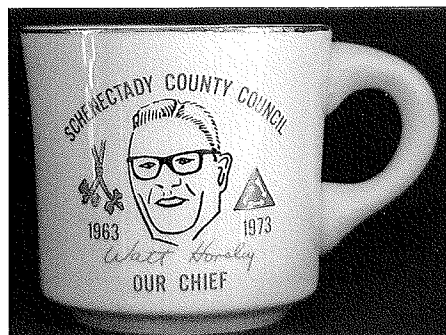
New listings

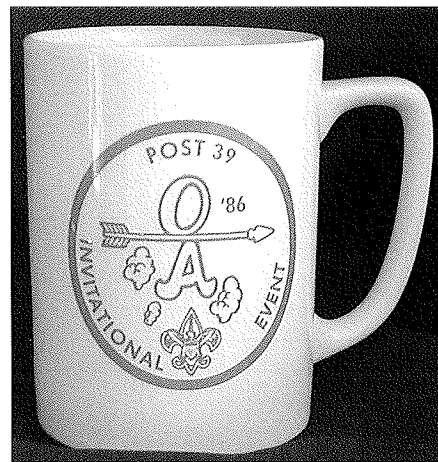
While this may be a west coast phenomenon, I have received a report of

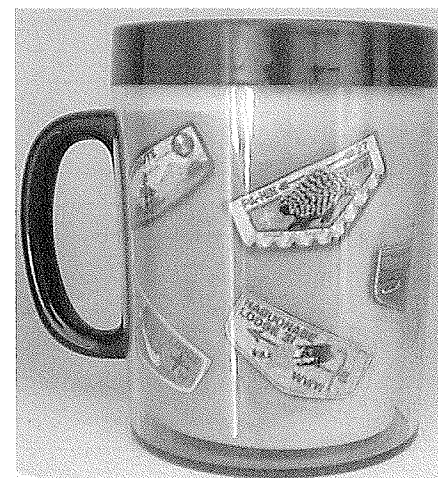

The next article will include a spreadsheet of all known OA conclave mugs. If you have any conclave mugs, please contact me in the next month or two, to compare against the existing image list. If images have not been already saved, please be prepared to supply a high quality scan.

In coming articles, I also want to report on known mugs, tumblers, and coffee cups made of plastic. If you are aware of

any of these, please pass on the information.

Results

This is by no means the absolute definitive listing for all existing OA lodge specific mugs, but rather a first attempt at a work in progress. For those who have worked on like projects or catalogued your own collection, the effort to get to this point represents many hours of data entry, investigation, and review. The value of this effort is, as with all other BSA memorabilia documentation, for the perpetuation of history for those wanting to know about it, now and in the future.

To date, 980+ unique and different Order of the Arrow lodge specific mugs have been identified using this technique. It is unknown just how many more ceramic or glass mugs remain uncatalogued or unknown due to age, scarcity, or simple oversight. Your assistance in reviewing what has been identified to date and contributing more information to the overall effort is greatly appreciated.

MUGOLOGY 101

- Over 980 mugs specific to a single OA lodge are documented to date, January 2005, with no end in sight.
- A complete OA lodge mug numbers set would include at least 346 different lodge numbers represented.
- A complete OA lodge mug name set would include at least 356 different lodge names represented.
- Blue Heron Lodge #349 continues to remain the most prolific individual mug producer to date, having issued at least 45 distinct and unique general lodge, lodge chapter, and lodge activity mugs, followed by Unami Lodge #1 with 16, Lekau Lodge #77 with 12, a tie between Marnoc Lodge #151 and T'Kope Kwiskwis Lodge #502 with 11, and another tie between Lekau Lodge #77 and Buckskin Lodge #412 with ten issues each.
- The highest amount paid for a mug on eBay during the past year remains \$223.71 for a 1966 Dixie Fellowship mug in October 2004.
- Approximately 40 new mugs were discovered since the last article.
- At least 78 mugs have the nondescript OOA design.
- At least 571 mugs have some OA lodge patch issue design featured on them.
- At least 45 mugs have the MGM design on them.
- Of the known mugs, over 800 of them are of the standard mug type.

WRONG AGAIN, AGAIN!

Well, I have heard that sometimes it is better to be wrong than right. Reporting another new RWS (contrary to my December 2003 prediction) seems to be a good example of that saying. This time we have 14th "small council" in MORRIS SUSSEX/COUNCIL (/45) RWS.

One new tan and red, PRAIRIE GOLD AREA 1/2TR and 1 new khaki and red, FRUIT BELT COUNCIL 1/2KR have surfaced. The 2 new red and whites are FORT ARMSTRONG 1/2RW and OLD COLONY 1/2RW. With these new reportings, there are a total of almost as many 1/2 KR as 1/2RW (255 versus 257).

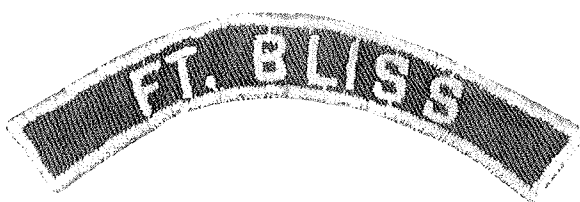
The validity of the Old Hickory 1/2BB (September 2004) was appropriately questioned by Randy Rogers who knew of an Old Hickory in Tennessee. Given that its current population is less than 10,000 it must have been a fairly small place 50 years ago when the 1/2BB community strips were replaced by red and white ones. Thus one wonders why such a small town would have an Air Scout Squadron. Can anyone help us out here? Not to worry folks, there really is an Air Scout Council strip. It is VERDUGO HILLS 1/2BB.

Two new Sea Scout patches have been found. They are WHITE RIVER COUNCIL/INDIANA BWS and WASHINGTON, D.C. 1/2WB. With their reporting, there are a total of 144 blue and whites (including 27 half strips) and 113 white and blues (including 15 half strips).

Six new mbs have been reported. The 4 red and white ones are BASE RAMEY (PR), REESE A.F.B. (TX), SELFRIDGE (MI), and YUMA PROVING GROUND (AZ). That now makes 4 strips from Ramey including 1 in the full-sized format. There is a small town in North Dakota by the name of Selfridge, but the patch turned up with a Michigan state strip and other Michigan patches. The last of the 4 is interesting as it lacks the "S" of the more commonly know Yuma Proving Grounds (maybe one of those tests made it smaller). The 2 odd color ones are FT. BLISS 1/2KR (TX) AND FORT SILL 1/2BY (OK).

Thanks go out to several collectors (Bill Loeble, Ed Holman, John Blair, and Dave Scocco) for explaining that Washington C.H. was used in Washington Court House, Ohio. Okay guys, what does N. Central Y.A. stand for? This question has remained unanswered for 2 years. Among the unusual and sometimes funny community strips, we have Accident, Bird City, Howey In The Hills, Port Jefferson Sta., Quicksand, Sandwich, and Valley Of The Moon.

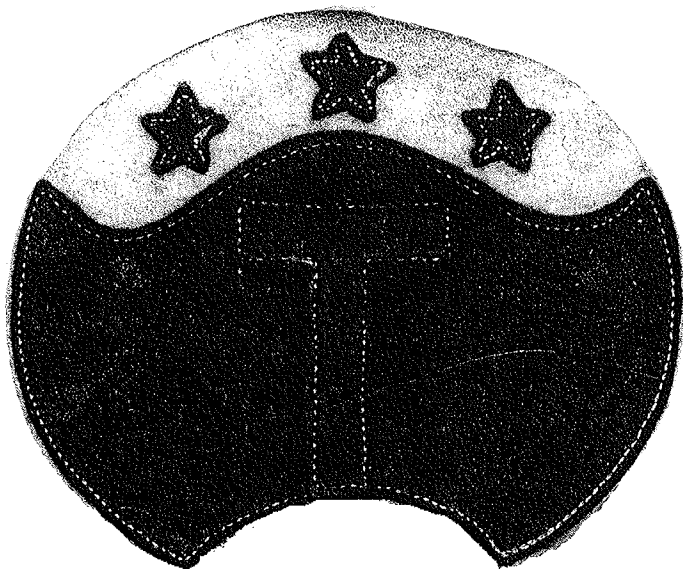




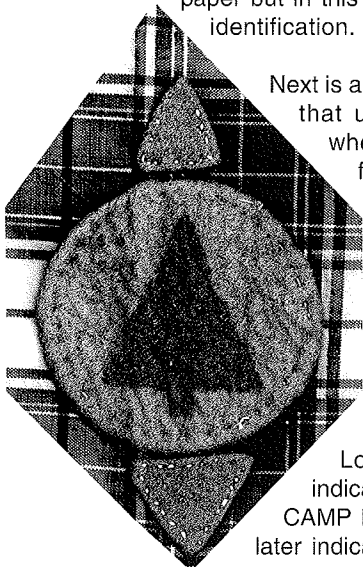
1924 CAMP TOWADENA PATCH

The featured camp patch for this column is the newest addition to my personal collection. It is hard to photocopy but I will describe it. The patch is round white felt with dark green felt "bat-wings" sewn across the patch with a brown felt "T" and three brown stars. What makes this patch special, aside from now being in my collection, is that ordinarily, old "mystery



patches" are hard to identify but not this one. It had been glued to an album with a neatly typed label under it along with a 1924 merit badge card with the same glued paper on the back so there is no question that this is a 1924 CAMP TOWADENA patch from North Hudson Council in NJ (council operated from 1919-36). Normally, I would prefer not having a patch glued onto paper but in this case, it does provide positive identification.



Next is another new acquisition of mine that unfortunately, I am not sure where it is from so I am asking for your help to ID it. The patch is a yellow felt round patch with a green tree or arrowhead silkscreened in the center with two yellow felt triangles all sewn on a plaid neckerchief. The source of this n/c said it came with a uniform that had a 201 F-1 (Kootaga Lodge) from Parkersburg, WV indicating the patch could be from CAMP KOOTAGA although the seller later indicated that another source said

it might be from CAMP WOLHONDE of Charleston Area Council (the predecessor to Buckskin Reservation).

As tempting as it is to keep writing about my own collection, I will move on to other material. Dr. Bob Kravecs, a lodge brother of mine came up with a spectacular addition to his Connecticut camp-patch collection. He obtained a uniform on a "certain auction" because it had a Guilford (CT) KRS on the shoulder. In a pocket was a Quinnipiac Council advancement card for a Star Scout from Troop One in Guilford dated June 5, 1930. In addition to the KRS, the uniform also had a small red and yellow felt and canvas patch with an "S" in the center that would appear to be a 1930's CAMP SEQUASSEN patch from Quinnipiac Council.



Rob Kutz of VA discovered an early Cub camp patch from Greater Lowell Council named CAMP SO-KEE-TAY. This camp is adjacent to CAMP WAH-TUT-CA and is still in operation and is considered to be a part of Wah-tut-ca.

The design of the Camp So-Kee-Tay patch is one that has been used by many camps in the 1940's. An example is the illustrated patch from CAMP CLAYBANKS. Does anyone know if that is a BSA camp and if so, where is it from?

Rob also recently acquired a round felt patch with a "C" and an Indian brave in a canoe. This patch came with a group of old New England camp patches and may be a very early patch from CAMP COLLIER of Monadnock Council. Can anyone confirm this or provide a positive ID if it is from another camp?

John Bradley sent a photocopy of an old merit badge sash with some old felt patches that need an ID. An example would be the orange shield with a large black "H" and "32" There were other similar "H" patches with 26, 28, 29 and 33. The sash came to John from Kansas City although in 70+ years, it could have traveled quite a distance from the home town of the original Scout who earned the merit badges and went to camp. I am not aware of any camps beginning with the letter "H" from Kansas City Area Council.

Don Kiper of NY sent a 1933 booklet from CAMP HO-DAH-WE owned by McKean-Potter-Cameron Council headquartered in Bradford, PA. Being in the heart of the Great Depression, the camp fee was \$4.50 per week and there was a mention of "Noah" being the skipper of the "Ark" for the 10th straight year, indicating

the camp existed at least as early as 1924. Under the "Health" section of the booklet, it said that each Scout must have a physical exam by a physician not more than 24 hours before arriving at camp. In parentheses, it said "Doctors usually do this free of charge." I can just imagine all these Scouts scheduling appointments with their primary care physicians for the day before they leave for camp, not expecting to pay for these exams.

Don also wrote about a set of 26 newsletters in his possession from 1925 from the above-mentioned McKean-Potter-Cameron Council that refers to a CAMP DEKANAWIDA.

Bob Shortwell of NJ wondered if anyone knows anything about the small round patch with a "C" and an "1" in the center?

Rob Kutz of VA sent a scan of a felt arrowhead patch with a block "W" which he identified as being a 1937 issue from CAMP WAH TUT CA of Greater Lowell Council in MA. Rob, if you are undecided about what to get me for my next birthday....



Paul Myers of IN is one of the finest researchers of old camp, OA and insignia in our hobby and came up with some information about CAMP COPEN-NUCK-BEE. Paul found that the camp was operated by the St. Joseph Valley Council with headquarters in South Bend, IN. The camp opened in 1931 for scouts in the southern territory of the council who found it too far to travel to CAMP BRYAN that was located in Michigan. The camp closed after vandalism occurred during the winter of 1946. The southern division Scouts were able to travel to Camp Bryan because of improved roads and the closing of Copen-Nuck-Bee. As you can see, the 1943 patch from the camp did not have hyphens.

Dave Wolverton of NJ sent an excerpt of a 1968 publication about 50 years of Delaware Valley Scout History which mentioned a camp at Cedar Lake near Blairstown, NJ in 1919 to 1928 that preceded CAMP WEYGADT which was acquired from a bank in 1928 for the sum of \$12,500 for 1280 acres of land, about \$10 an acre (or two CSP's.)

How many camp patches have a fruit on them? I know of one, for sure. CAMP DEL MONTE of Maui County Council has a pineapple. Does anyone have a camp patch with another fruit? Inquiring minds want to know (actually ISCA columnists who want to fill a column want to know!)

Bill Cooper of CA joined the BSA some 67 years ago and is still active and very sharp of mind. He embraces 21st century technology including email and scanning which I think is terrific. Bill told me about his old camp experiences at CAMP STEPHENS of Alameda Council and sent a scan of one of his

old patches that was used for several years before he entered the service in 1943.

On SNE_NET@yahoo.com, the Scouting New England listserve, there was news that the Colonial Virginia Council sold CAMP CHICKAHOMINY to the U.S. Home Corporation in 2001 for over 5 million dollars and will be developing a new "SuperCamp" on the Rappahannock River in Middlesex County. In addition, Greater Alabama Council will be selling CAMPS COMER, SEQUOYA, AND JACKSON and creating a "SuperCamp" in the Island Lake area of Blount County.

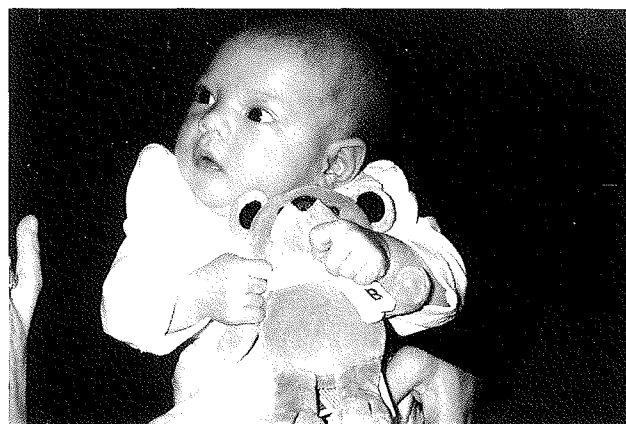
Bruce Shelley of IL discovered a patch name previously unknown (to me) – CAMP POWHATTAN. Yes, the name may sound familiar to Virginia camp collectors but NOT with two "T's." This may be a mis-spelling or perhaps a camp we were not aware of – has anyone seen a similar patch, hopefully with a council name on it?

Has anyone ever seen the round CTS with buttonhole patch? Those were my mother's initials and she had monogrammed towels from her wedding that had a similar design embroidered but with the "S" in the center. When I was growing up, I remember those towels hanging in our bathroom that were NOT to be used by the family. I supposed they were being saved for "celebrities" who might have stopped in for a quick shower at our house.

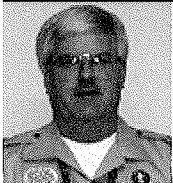

Connie Johns of OH identified the round "M" with '32 shown in the December column as being the first patch from CAMP MANATOC of Akron Area Council. Connie and Neil Johnson run the Manatoc Museum and is an authority on the camp. Several readers identified the CS inside a circle patch shown in the last issue as being a U.S. Army patch for Officer Candidate School. Sorry, Bill, that it wasn't from an old Brooklyn BSA camp. Thank you to those who responded.

DVDs, COINS AND COOKING

Hi, I want to welcome you to our eighteenth column! Last issue, we had a reader participation column. I asked the readers of our column and Scout memorabilia collectors from different forums about their ideas or plans for disposing of their collection as they enter the time of life when they begin to divest some of the items that have been so important to them. I was amazed at the number of ideas that came in and the comments I received after the issue hit reader's mailboxes. From the comments, it was an eye-opener to a number of collectors who had not given much thought to this issue.

One reader wrote "What a super article in the December 2004 ISCA Journal. It makes you think. What do I do with all of the patches, neckerchiefs, photo albums and jamboree items I have collected over 25 years? The article was a nice wake up call. We should publish that article in the ISCA Journal every so often." I appreciated the reader's comment and any comments about our column and always welcome potential topics for exploration in future columns.

Q. We just rented the movie *Mr. & Mrs. Bridge* and saw that there were Boy Scouts in old uniforms featured in the movie. What other movies are about Boy Scouting or feature Boy Scouts in them?

A. I am not a movie expert – in fact I only know a few movies that feature Boy Scouts in them. My favorite all-time Boy Scout movie is "Follow Me, Boys!" The movie stars Fred MacMurray, Vera Miles, Lillian Gish and Kurt Russell. It was issued in 1966 by Disney, is a sought after item in VHS and has been recently reissued in DVD. It is a great family movie set in the 1930's filled with Disney's warmth and humor. It was based on the book "God and My Country" by Mackinley Kantor. I would highly recommend that all Scouters grab a copy of



the DVD before it is withdrawn from the market. It is a Scouting classic!

The other movies that I know are about Scouting include *Mr. Scoutmaster*, a 1953 movie starring Clifton Webb as a reluctant Scoutmaster leading a troop of Scouts into adventures and misadventures. I also found a reference to a 1940's movie starring James Lydon and Richard Haydon titled "Henry Aldrich, Boy Scout. If our readers know of other movies featuring or about Boy Scouting, let me know and I will include them in an upcoming column.

Q. I just picked up a small coin that is dated 1960. It appears to have been issued to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. What do you know about it and is it valuable?



A. The small one-inch token that you picked up was issued by the BSA to commemorate its fiftieth anniversary. It has the "50th anniversary" logo on the front and the Scout oath on the reverse. I remember them being sold for about a quarter in 1960 at Hudson's Department Store, our local Scout Distributor in Detroit. I think every Scout of my era had one. It is a nice token and probably worth a dollar or two today.

I have two other tokens from that year in my collection. The second token measures just under an inch-and-a-half and was issued to commemorate the 1960 National Jamboree in Colorado Springs, Colorado. The reverse has three images of a city, government buildings, and the countryside. These coins usually sell for \$5 – 10.

The last token I have from 1960 is a Commemorative medallion issued by Heraldic Art of Cleveland, Ohio. It is .925 fine silver and has a standing Boy Scout on the front and a first-class badge on the reverse. I have seen it sell for upwards of \$25 – 35 today. It was issued in a small gray envelope with a 50th anniversary Scout seal enclosed.

If you are interested in Scouting coins or tokens or want to learn more about tokens issued in 1960, you might still be able to find a copy of Rudy Dioszegi's book "Scouting Exonomia Worldwide" from a memorabilia dealer or on the Internet.

Q. What can you tell me about the groups like the American Boy Scouts who were in existence when the Boy Scouts of America were incorporated?

A. William Murray, author of the book "The History of the Boy Scouts of America" which was published for the twenty-fifth anniversary of the BSA has some interesting information on the early days of the BSA involving those other youth groups. We all know the story of the foundation of the BSA – how William D. Boyce was in London in a dense fog when a boy in uniform approached him, saluted and said "Sir, may I be of service to you?" After the boy led Boyce to the address that he had been searching for, Boyce tried to give the youth a shilling tip. The boy saluted again and said "Sir, I thank you. I am a Scout. A Scout does not accept tips for courtesies and Good Turns."

Boyce would later say that this experience with the British youth was a high point in his life. Boyce was a publisher of a number of publications and employed thousands of youth for his weekly publications. He had never had an experience like the one he had with the youth on the foggy London street. After conducting his business on that foggy day, he traveled to the office of Baden-Powell to find out more about the British Boy Scouts. Boyce was so impressed with what he learned that he took the initial steps to make Scouting available to American youth.

There were several other groups for youth existing in our country in 1910. They included the Big Brother Movement, Play Ground Associations, Athletic League, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, Knights of King Arthur, Knights of the Holy Grail, the Woodcraft Indians and the Sons of Daniel Boone – among others less known.

Ernest Thompson Seton started the Woodcraft Indians just after the turn of the century. Baden – Powell obtained a copy of Seton's handbook "The Birch Bark Roll" in 1904 and may have incorporated it when he wrote "Scouting for Boys" in 1908. His Woodcraft Indians had a chief, braves, and scouts and had many tribes in the United States at the time of the BSA founding.

Daniel Carter Beard founded "The Society of the Sons of Daniel Boone" in 1905. Officers took the names of American heroes and naturalists (Daniel Boone, Davy Crockett, Audubon) and the fort was composed of four eight-boy groups called stockades.

This group pushed manliness, the elevation of sport, woodcraft and outdoor recreation.

After the incorporation of the BSA on February 8, 1910, William Randolph Hearst called a meeting in New York to turn his "American Boy Scouts" into a national organization. Even though he was advised that there was another national organization called the "Boy Scouts of the United States" (not the Boy Scouts of America) in existence, he moved forward with the incorporation. Hearst's group was called the "American Boy Scout" but the name was later modified to the "United States Boy Scout" after the Boy Scouts of America, because of the name confusion, sued the group. Due to funding problems, Hearst later dropped his support for this organization.

In June 1910, representatives of several organizations gathered in New York City to learn of the plans of the Boy Scouts of America. Organizations represented included: Pioneers and the Sons of Daniel Boone, Woodcraft Indians, Playground Association of America, American Red Cross, Y.M.C.A., Young Men's Hebrew Association, Big Brother Movement, Settlement Movement, and the Public School Athletic League. Other individuals and foundation representatives with an interest in youth also attended the meeting. Many of the individuals attending this meeting saw the power of a national, united organization and either folded their own organizations into the BSA and/or became officers of the new movement.

Q. The Boy Scouts have presented awards called the Silver Beaver, Silver Antelope, Silver Fawn and Silver Buffalo to adults who have impacted Scouts or the Scouting organization. I thought I saw reference to the "Silver Fish" once in an article about Scouting. Do you have any information about this award?

A. I was not able to find a reference about the "Silver Fish" in any of my Boy Scout books. I have a reference about Girl Scout memorabilia that does add some light to help answer this question. The Silver Fish was an early Girl Guide award given as a token of appreciation to adults who made significant efforts on behalf of the British Girl Guide movement. It is said that Baden-Powell suggested this award as a symbol of the great majestic salmon – swimming upstream, overcoming every waterfall and boundary in its way in pursuit of a quiet place to spawn. It symbolized the great effort and achievement necessary to overcome tremendous difficulties to produce outstanding results. The award was presented to adults who had been major contributors in supporting the Girl Guide movement.

In May, 1919 Sir Robert Baden-Powell presented a Silver Fish to Juliette Low, the founder of the Girl Scouts of America at a national convention in Washington D.C. Over the next few years, Silver Fish awards were presented to other heads of similar movements in other countries. Shortly after, the custom of presenting this award was restricted to those with the British Girl Guide organization.

With camping season coming on in earnest, I have been asked for another old recipe. I was in my local grocery store the other day and noticed soup bones packaged for sale in the meat department. I asked the butcher who bought the bones and he said "people that make soup from scratch." Being one who thought most soup came out of a can today, I dug into a World

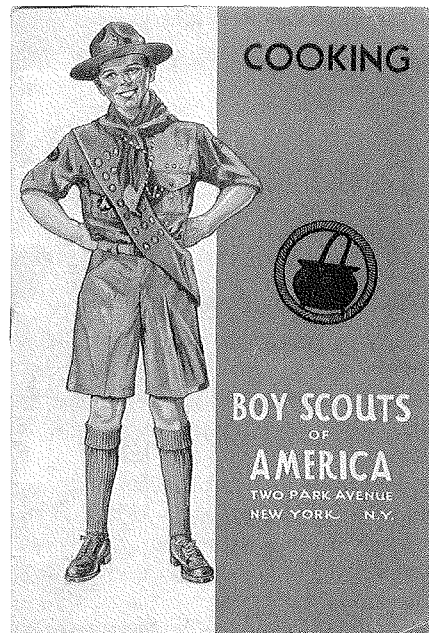
War II cooking merit badge pamphlet and found a recipe suitable for my soup bone discovery. It makes soup for ten campers.

Barley Soup

- ¾ lb. Of barley
- Cold water
- 1 lb. Bacon
- 2 onions
- 2 lbs. of soup bone
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 4 tablespoons water
- Salt to season
- Pepper.

Wash the barley, add four quarts of cold water, bacon (cut in small pieces), bones and onions and cook until the barley kernels are soft, about one hour. Remove the bones, add the flour and water, which should be pre-mixed along with the seasoning and enjoy!

VARIANT FOUND FOR BLAZING ARROW TYPE-4A BSA PATROL MEDALLION

A new variety of an old felt, type 4 Blazing Arrow (sometimes called "Flaming Arrow" nowadays) has surfaced. The 'find' comes to us courtesy of Chris Jensen.

Shown at right-top is a typical Type-3 medallion (embroidered felt, no-BSA). We show it aiming to the right because the later versions that included "BSA" (the Type-4 embroidered red felt with BSA and Type-5 embroidered red twill with BSA) typically showed the arrow aimed to the right. (The Type-6 colored twills and Type-7 tan twill do not include the BSA letters). The typical Type-4 (the "a" variety has all black silk threads and fine gauze mesh backing; the "b" variety has black and white embroidered cotton backing threads) Blazing Arrow shows the arrow aimed right.

The new discovery is of a Type-4a (felt – all black backing threads) with the arrow aiming left (see right-bottom). You can see a color scan on the web at <http://www.gilwell.com/patrolPatch/> along with scans of most BSA patrol medallion varieties. I have no idea of how many of these may have been produced or how many might have survived. The Type-4 felt medallions were used from 1933 when they were introduced until 1952 when BSA replaced them with embroidered twill medallions. The all black silk thread version was introduced first. It's not been identified when BSA made the transition to cotton thread that resulted in black and white backing thread to the embroidered image, but given the relative scarcity of the all black back thread version (04-a), it was probably closer to 1933 than 1952. LODGE NUMBERING REVISITED

Bruce Lee writes that he has been following the lodge numbering controversy and picked up a few NOAC 2004 flaps that show different ways of using lodge/council numbers. Ajapeu 351's NOAC flap shows the number 592 together with their council name, Green Mountain. Tiwahe 45 has both their lodge and council name (Desert Pacific) on their flap, but no number. Ho-Nan-Ne-Ho-Ont 165 lists both lodge name and number and council name and number (Allegheny Highland 382). Achpeteuny 498 issued some NOAC flaps with the number 498, and some with their council number, 803. Bruce tells us he wrote to National Headquarters specifically asking what number should go on a flap. They were blunt in saying no direction is coming.

Bill Roseland writes that Siwinis Lodge 252 issued three flaps for their recent trade-o-ree. The flap with an olive border was an attendee flap that sold for \$10. Flaps with silver and gold mylar borders were given for donations of \$50 and \$100 in memorabilia to the trade-o-ree auction. At their lodge banquet in December, the lodge authorized two odd shaped patches that had been manufactured (but not authorized) the for the lodge's 60th anniversary and 2004 NOAC. They made 100 sets that included both the small (x29) and large (x30) sizes of the patch, and an additional 100 of the larger patch (x30).

Ta Tanka 488 has issued new feather shaped patches for each of their five chapters. These are unrestricted but members can only buy the one from their chapter. It was thought that this would encourage members to meet and trade with members of other chapters to complete a set. The lodge has also issued a new flap showing buffalo on an open range.

Chancie Crowder wrote in late December/early January to report that e-Bay seller rdgchf was offering fakes of older OA insignia. They can be distinguished by Asian embroidery. Some badges that were originally twill were faked as solid embroidery. Some badges that were felt or sateen are embroidered onto twill. Chancie says it is possible that this is xflip97sales (reported previously) operating under a new name because the style of the new ones is very similar to the style we saw previously. Some of the issues he has seen faked include 7A1, 348F1, 348S1, 538P, 501F2, 501F3, 41F1, 41A1, 41S1, 446R1, 446C1, 555S1, and 555P1.

Back in the summer of 2004 the Northwest Traders Association merged into the International Scouting Collectors Association, becoming Chapter 1 of ISCA. This chapter continues to focus on patches, patch news, trade-o-rees, and other news of interest to collectors in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. Chapter dues are \$5 per year and they publish a nice newsletter. To learn more about this group and see some past newsletters, go here: <http://nwtatebege.net/>

Amangamek Wipit 470 issued in October the next in their C.O.N.T.A.C.S. series of flaps commemorating places in the

D.C. area. The new set features the World War II Memorial. As for all others in the series, the gold mylar flaps are individually numbered and 200 were made.

Suanhacky 49 offered by pre-order (cut-off date was 1/20/05) a 75th anniversary bullion badge. They were also selling a set of four keyhole shaped patches for the 75th for \$50. These used designs similar to previous keyhole shaped patches the lodge had issued for earlier anniversaries. There is also a two-piece set for the anniversary that takes place in 2005.

We tried to learn the origins of the keyhole design that Suanhacky has used for its anniversary patches with limited success. No current member that we could reach has a clear recollection of the origin of that design. The best one member could come up with was that the design was to commemorate "key" anniversaries (40th, 50th, 65th, 75th).

A Cayucos 304 F1 was offered in December on e-Bay but the high bid of \$2276 did not reach the seller's reserve. It had some paper glued on the back and the lodge number written in ink. The seller also misspelled the name as CUYUCOS.

Tracy Mesler reported in late December that the latest updates to The Warshield would be available at the Dallas TOR in January. The Warshield is an OA patch guide with pictures for the lodges in old Region 9 (Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Mexico). He, John Conley Williams, and others who maintain this guide have produced similar updates "once-every-two-years-following-NOAC."

A group of pre-WW II items from Kootaga Area Council including a shirt and sash sold on e-Bay in early January for \$1680. With only seconds to go the bid was at \$160 and then three different people entered bids. The key item in our view was a Tribe of Gimogash pre-OA society badge in excellent condition on the shirt.

Randy Rogers of Wahissa 118 has set up a Yahoo news group for traders and collectors of North Carolina Scouting memorabilia. If that area is of interest, go to <http://groups.yahoo.com/group/NCScoutCollectors> and click the "Join This Group" button.

A Ponus 521f1 first flap sold on e-Bay in late December for \$405. The badge was sewn onto a piece of felt that had been cut out of a red felt vest.

At its lodge banquet in early January Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan 40 surprised its members by giving everyone who attended one special

diamond shaped 75th anniversary patch. We're told that about 375 were made and 304 were distributed to attendees, one per person. The lodge did not announce the patch's existence or forthcoming distribution before the event. A week after the banquet they had not decided what to do with the remaining stock. Lodge members were not allowed to buy additional patches and the lodge was considering destroying the remainder to make those distributed a special reminder of the anniversary event.

O-Shot-Caw 265 has apparently issued two commemorative chenilles for its 50th anniversary. They are identical in design but vary some in colors and one says "LEC" for lodge executive committee. It seems unusual for such a committee to be noted on a chenille, but a quick look through the Blue Book listing for this lodge reveals many LEC patches. We hear 125 of the LEC chenilles were made but no word on the non-LEC variant. These chenilles may be just the beginning of many new issues from this lodge for their anniversary. They are one of the most prolific patch makers and for a while a few years ago they were issuing more than one new flap patch per month.

Also from O-Shot-Caw 265 is a flap to mark the lodge's Vigil Reunion and the passing of longtime member, Harold Hollis. Mr. Hollis is a past lodge advisor and was the founder of the Vigil Reunion. He is memorialized on the flap by the addition of his initials, "HH".

A possibly uncataloged badge from one of the lodge 159s has surfaced. This is a round twill patch with a red rolled edge. Writing on the badge says "The Conservation Trail/WWW/159". It is a dark yellow twill and looks to be from the 1960's or early 1970's.

A two-piece 50th anniversary set from Yokahu 506 sold on e-Bay in December for \$102. The flap itself has been around since early 2004 but we had never seen the pocket part before. This may be a tough need for collectors of two-piece sets.

In late November several reproductions of early OA sashes offered by the seller OATRADITIONS1 began appearing on e-Bay. We inquired about these and Bruce Montgomery responded to tell us he has reproduced four old sashes based on designs used in the early days of the Wimachtendeink WW and the OA. Available are two arrow variations and two felt sash colors (black and white). There is a Vigil variant available with three embroidered arrows on a felt triangle. Bruce had this to say about why he made them.

"I am a Vigil Honor recipient: 1967, and attended three NOACs in the 60s. I believe there is a place in the OA at conclaves and with ceremonial teams to wear sashes that reach back to the roots of the Brotherhood. That is the genesis for the four basic sashes: the ceremonial team members. The Vigil Sash Replica turned out to be a beautiful homage to the originals I have seen. It is my intention once I have recouped my costs to return 5% of the proceeds to the Order."

He has a web site offering the sashes directly and he hopes this site will become a repository for photographs and anecdotes from the history of the Order. This is the URL he gave us but it was not working in early January: www.oatraditions.com

We asked him how a collector could distinguish his reproductions from historic sashes and he offered several points. First, the snaps are modern metal faced rivets with stars stamped on

them. These are much larger than the small sewn on snaps he has seen on old sashes. He also says his embroidered arrows in the Vigil triangle are obviously machined and not hand done like the old sashes he has seen. He said if someone had a suggestion for how to further distinguish his replicas from real sashes, he would consider it.

We suggested embroidering in the word REPLICIA on the back. He countered by suggesting an ink stamp of the word. Our point was that someone could be taken by these, regardless of his best intentions.

Three different Friends of Scouting 2004 flap from Abake MI-Sa-Ma-Ki 393 were offered on e-Bay in early January. The flaps were identical except for having red, white, and blue borders. The seller claimed these were gifts for donation of \$10, \$25, and \$50, respectively. We have not confirmed these are actual lodge issues.

A few issues ago we mentioned how a few Chippanyonk 59S1 first flaps popped up on e-Bay with low opening bids, offered by sellers way outside Massachusetts. We were able to follow up with one of the sellers recently and he told us he got the Chippanyonk flaps in a large group of Scout and non-Scout patches he bought at a flea market. More recently several of 59S1s were offered within another large lot of modern Scout patches on e-Bay. This activity suggests that at least a few of these flaps have gotten into the patch market without passing through the owning lodge first.

David Fry sent us a high resolution scan of a new two-piece set from Kittatiny 5, issued for the 2005 National Jamboree. The bottom part of the set has no identification on it at all except an outline FDL and OA sash in the design. Owners will have to keep it with the flap to remember what it is.

The Scout Patch Auction has just announced a new web site where you can search for prices realized for Scout items on e-Bay. This is a collection of basic raw data that is not massaged in any way with improved descriptions or images when they are missing. Despite these handicaps, this is a great resource, especially for non-OA items. To access data more than 30 days old you must register. At this point the data is free. There is also a way to enter a need list, but we have not tried that. A test of several simple searches resulted in some pricing information, but not all of it was useful. As is a problem with the pricing data on oaimages.com, you can't always tell the condition of an item. Check it out here:

Quick comments:

- An Oh-Da-Ko-Ta 153S1 first flap (rarity 10) with a small thread break repaired by the manufacturer sold on e-Bay in late November for \$1825.
- The Sinawa 73 S1 FF that sold recently on e-Bay for \$1125 had paper glued on its back and so was not a truly mint patch, yet still brought a top price.
- A Manqzet 226f1 that was unused but with what looked like a serious border flaw sold for \$870 on e-Bay in early December.
- A Caldwell Vigil OA pin of an owl (Mikanakawa 101?) reached a high bid of \$493 on e-Bay in December but did not meet the Dallas based seller's reserve.

- Thanks to Doug Seaborne who sent us a copy of artwork for a new flap coming soon from Jacco's Town 21.
- A Canalino 90 S1 (one per life/numbered on back) first flap offered in December on e-Bay at a minimum of \$2400 and a buy-it-now option of \$2600 received no bids.
- Four different people bid over \$1000 recently on e-Bay for a Bison 313f1a first flap.
- Tonkawampus 16 issued a new flap (S20?) that does not mention the 2004 NOAC, but was worn as part of a NOAC two-piece set.

In late December e-Bay gave sellers a \$.10 listing day and many people responded by offering good OA badges. So we started off January with the sale (or not) of some excellent OA insignia. Rare OA that did not sell in those auctions when no bids met the sellers reserve included these.

We're back this time with a big deal, the sale of a Wetassa 227r1 felt for \$7730 on e-Bay in early November. The patch was offered by the son of the original owner, who was presented the patch as a gift when he became a Vigil member of Owassippe 7. It is not clear if he was ever a member of Wetassa. All of his Scouting memorabilia seems related to Owassippe lodge and the Chicago Area Council, including a past chapter chief pin. The 227R1 was in superb condition, one of the best examples of this patch known. The seller opened it at \$4.95 and was no doubt surprised and pleased at the selling price. We hear the seller thinks he got a great deal. The last two bids were entered with seconds to go by two leading collectors of Illinois OA. The winner already owned the only known example of the 227r0.5 on blue felt (the R1 is on black felt). The seller lived within 10 miles of the buyer and delivered the patch by hand (he preferred payment in cash). It's nice to see such a great local patch stay in Illinois.

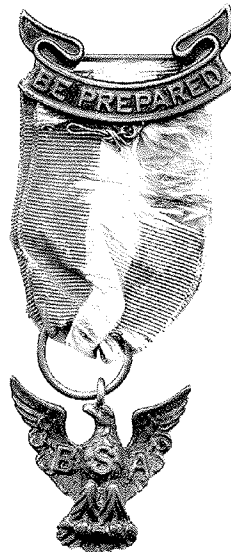
