Judge House Takes Oath Of State Supreme Court

Chief Justice King said, "I consider it a high honor and a privilege to install the oath of office to my friend, Charles S. House or, Charlie, as we know him."

"It is a great pleasure for me personally, since I consider him my friend and a great lawyer."

"Justice House is no stranger to this court for we possess many of his opinions, written when he substituted for the late Justice William J. Shea, during his illness."

Justice King then administered the oath of office, shook Justice House's hand, and quipped, "Now you're on the payroll."

Justice House was appointed to the Supreme Court of Errors while serving as chief justice of the State Superior Court. He had been a member of that court since July 20, 1963, upon appointment by former Gov. John Lodge.

His 1953 appointment had followed a distinguished career in both state and local government.

He has served in the State Assembly as both representative and senator, as a former prosecutor and deputy judge of Manchester's Town Court, a former town counsel and a former assistant state's attorney for Hartford County.

In a brief ceremony, witnessed by about 50 state dignitaries, relatives and friends, Judge Charles S. House of 150 Westland St. was sworn in this morning as a justice of the State Supreme Court of Errors.

The oath of office was administered by Chief Justice John Hamilton King in the beautiful and stately high-ceilinged Supreme Court, its dignity softened, yet enhanced, by an array of baskets of flowers.

The 9 a.m. ceremony was followed by another at 9:30 a.m., when Justice King swore in John P. Coker of West Hartford as a justice of the same court.

On hand to witness the ceremony was Justice House's wife, Virginia, his daughter, Betsey, and his sister, Mrs. Ralph Maher.

Discharge Duty Swiftly, Dempsey Asks Delegates

Baldwin To Head Conclave

HARTFORD (AP) — Gov. John N. Dempsey called on delegates to the third constitutional convention in Connecticut history today to do their utmost toward "the swift and satisfactory discharge" of their duties facing them.

"Our Connecticut constitution does not, according to judicial opinion, give every citizen his right to an equal vote," Dempsey told the opening session that met in an atmosphere of tradition and bipartisan accord.

"The very first objective of this convention, then, must be to correct those portions of our constitution which have infringed upon these rights of the people."

"Let us apply our maximum efforts to the swift and satisfactory discharge of the precise duties facing us."

The opening session of the convention, the first since 1902, was held in the Old State House where the existing constitution was written at a convention in 1818.

Dempsey said the convention will give "new expression to our Connecticut tradition of Democracy and to the role of the citizens and their government."

He referred to the delegates to that session created the first written bill of rights in Connecticut's history, thereby guaranteeing civil liberties to each of our citizens."

UAC to Seek Positions for CANEL Staff

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Narrow Margin in House Easy Path Ahead For Housing Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — A housing bill containing a modified version of President Johnson's rent supplement plan headed for comparatively easy going in the Senate today after one of the closest votes in the House on any Johnson administration proposal.

The controversial portion of the \$2.9-billion measure — the provision for subsidizing rent of low-income families — survived a 208-202 vote in the House Wednesday after the Democrats handling it had drastically modified it from the original administration conception of a program for families above the actual needy level.

As the House finally passed it, on a 245-169 roll call vote, the bill closely resembles legislation already approved by the Senate Banking Committee. The Senate version carries a somewhat higher price tag, but estimates of the ultimate cost of a four-

grants, loans and loan guarantees are not precise.

Under the House bill, \$100 million would be provided over the next four years for rent supplements to families who could qualify for — but do not live in — low cost public housing. Regulations on income ceilings for families qualifying for such public housing now vary from city to city.

The help would go only to the needy whose rent exceeds 23 percent of the family income and who live in housing owned by nonprofit or limited dividend organizations. None of the supplements would go to tenants of private landlords.

President Johnson praised approval of the bill as an historic step. He said the provision for rent supplements will provide new homes for hundreds of thousands "condemned to slums." And he said it would give incentive to private industry.

In addition to the controversial rent supplement provision, the House bill contains a novel no-down-payment Federal Housing Administration home loan section benefiting peace-time veterans.

It also has mortgage insurance for land development, aid for needy owners of slum property to upgrade their housing and grants for neighborhood facilities, parks and playgrounds.

The bill also contains provisions to continue programs such as FHA, slum clearance and college dormitory construction.

The Senate tentatively is scheduled to take up its version of the housing bill about July 12.

Wednesday's crucial House test came on a Republican move to strike from the bill the provision under which needy families could be helped with their rent payments to the extent that those exceeded 25 percent of family income.

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Strike at Groton Halts Production On Nuclear Subs

GROTON (AP) — A strike halted production today at the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp., one of the nation's leading centers for the construction of nuclear submarines.

Picket lines went up outside the gates of the sprawling installation near the U.S. Submarine Base at 12:31 a.m. as the company's three-year contract with its 12,800 production workers expired.

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Morse Urges Peace Talks

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — A wounded Communist from North Viet Nam was under interrogation tonight as a member of the Viet Cong task force that killed three Americans, destroyed three planes and damaged three others in a hit-and-run attack on the Da Nang base. The damage is estimated at \$5 million.

A U.S. spokesman said the prisoner was identified as Do Xuan Hien, 29, of the North Vietnamese province of Thanh Hoa. He was quoted as saying he infiltrated into South Viet Nam in April with the 3rd Battalion of the 18th Regiment of North Viet Nam's 325th Division.

The spokesman said the prisoner reported he was attached to a special unit for the attack on the base, launched at 1:30 a.m. from a graveyard outside the perimeter wire. He was picked up by a search patrol. The rest of the band escaped, though blood trails suggested some were wounded if not dead.

The American killed was a young Air Policeman, who opened up with his pistol after apparently sighting the approach of the Viet Cong.

U.S. Air Force and Navy planes struck at North Viet Nam throughout the day without letup.

Bridges, barracks and radar installations were among the prime targets, and more propaganda leaflets were dropped over populated areas, a U.S. spokesman said. He said all planes returned safely.

More U.S. Marines landed in South Viet Nam, at the coastal city of Qui Nhon. A U.S. spokesman said between 400 and 500 were coming ashore from 7th Fleet ships and would provide security for the Qui Nhon area as well as "combat support for the Republic of South Viet Nam's armed forces."

Qui Nhon, 270 miles northeast of Saigon, is the fourth area to be defended by the Leathernecks. The others are the air bases at Da Nang, 380 miles northeast of Saigon; Chu Lai, 20 miles south of Da Nang, and Phu Bai, 55 miles north of Da Nang.

In the central highlands 150 miles south of Da Nang, four Americans and about 50 Vietnamese were killed in a Communist ambush near Cheo Reo.

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Pope Expected At UN Session

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Vatican's U.N. observer said today he expects Pope Paul VI to attend the next session of the U.N. General Assembly which starts in September.

Mgr. Alberto Giovannetti, the Holy See observer, told a reporter it is premature to speculate on just when the Pope might be here or how long he might stay. But he expressed the hope the Pope could address the 11-nation Assembly.

"We hope that the Holy Father will come during the 20th session of the General Assembly," he said. "The session will start Sept. 21. There will be a recess at Christmas time. Then the Assembly will resume in the new year. It is quite likely that the Holy Father will be here sometime during that period."

Jet Breaks In 3 Parts On Landing

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A Continental Airlines jet broke into three sections early today as it skidded off the end of a run-off runway at Municipal Airport and crashed into a Missouri River dike.

Four persons were injured. The plane carried 60 passengers and six crew members on a nonstop flight from Los Angeles to Kansas City.

A heavy rain was falling as the plane landed.

Capt. Lee Zarka, Los Angeles, the pilot, told newsmen "there was more water on the runway than we anticipated and we skidded."

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Heiress Gamble Benedict Weds Divorced Policeman

CLINTON, N.Y. (AP) — Heiress Gamble Benedict and once-divorced Thomas P. Gallagher, a New York State Police investigator, were married today in St. Mary's Roman Catholic church in this college community near Utica.

In Syracuse, Gallagher's ex-wife and mother of his 13-year-old daughter, Christine Ann, told a reporter the two had been divorced. The former Doris M. Kelly of Syracuse, who uses the name Doris Gallagher, declined to elaborate.

The Roman Catholic Church does not normally permit remarriage of divorced persons in the church but there have been exceptions.

The 24-year-old bride's runaway marriage in 1960 to chauffeur Andre Formbeau ended in an annulment after she had defied her millionaire grandmother to marry him and had borne him two sons.

Gallagher, 32, denied a few weeks ago that he and Miss Benedict were planning marriage. He told a reporter that he did not know where the rumor originated and that, in fact, he had another girl.

The two were married by the Rev. James Nicholson, pastor of the church.

Fifteen guests were present. The couple planned to fly to Ireland for a three-week honeymoon.

Gamble had been living recently with her brother Douglas in this area, and it was he who introduced the pair.

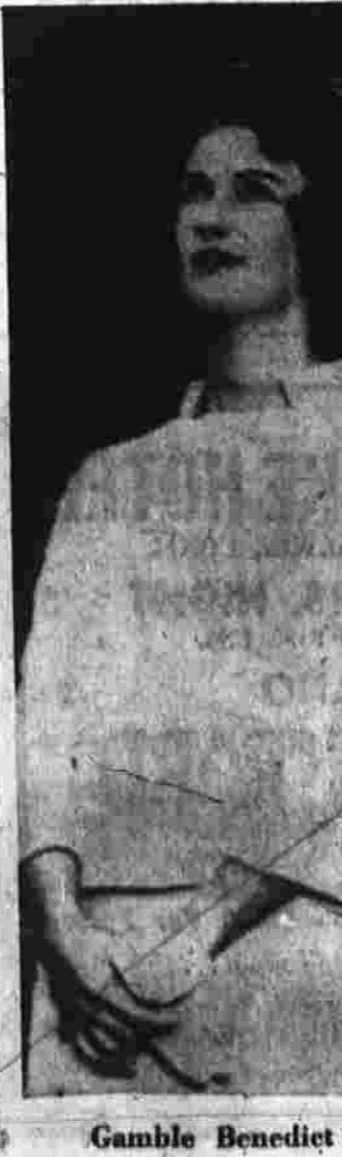

NEW YORK (AP) — Except for seven guests, the rooms with their rich decor were empty. On every floor the thick-carpeted hallways stretched long and silent beside wall mirrors and ivory panels. The magnificent Savoy Plaza was virtually a ghost hotel.

The remaining guests will have to get along without food, drink and room service, but a staff of about 50 will remain until the tenants find other abodes.

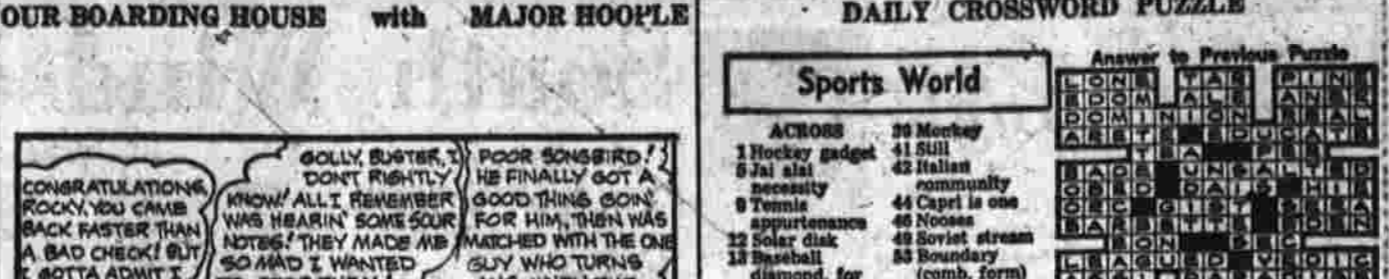
