County sets budget

Polk County has its 2020 budget after commissioners unanimously approved a \$2.8 million general fund budget, citing statewide minimum wage increases as the driving factor in the county's mounting expenditures Friday, Jan. 24.

Minimum wage in 2023 is set to be \$12 per hour, according to the Department of Labor website.

While a 2018 ballot measure to increase the minimum wage passed statewide, Polk Countians parted ways with voters across the state by saying no to the proposition.

Roughly 51% of Polk County voters rejected the proposition, which saw about 62% statewide approval, according to previous BH-FP coverage.

"We are attempting to increase our wages as well to keep up, so that we can attract qualified employees," county clerk and chief budget officer Melinda Robertson wrote in her budget message. "This is going to be a tremendous strain on our budgets."

The county has historically paid around \$2.15 per hour above minimum wage, presiding commissioner Shannon Hancock said Friday, Feb. 7.

Polk County man charged with assault of law enforcement

A man from Halfway is charged with felony assault after allegedly hitting a jailer in the head this fall.

According to online court records, William James Wires, 33, is charged with class D felony third-degree assault — special victim in Polk County Circuit Court.

He's also charged with class D felony disarming a peace officer or correctional officer while performing official duty, class A misdemeanor fourth-degree assault and class A misdemeanor resisting and interfering with arrest in another Polk County case.

A probable cause statement filed by the Bolivar Police Department said officers encountered Wires on Saturday, Nov. 2, after a motor vehicle crash on Mo. 13.

He was the driver of the vehicle in the single-car crash and left the scene.

When an officer made contact with Wires in the 3100 block of South Springfield Avenue, Wires was "acting very erratically," the statement said.

The statement said he was "very anxious, pacing back and forth (and) stated, 'I hope I didn't hurt anyone.'"

Wires then ran away

from law enforcement.

When officers caught up to Wires further north on South Springfield Avenue, they struggled to detain him, the statement said.

He eventually pulled a stun gun from an officer's grip and "attempted to drive stun (the officer) with his own TASER."

The statement said Wires was not compliant with officers "even after being handcuffed."

The probable cause statement filed by the Polk County Sheriff's Office said Wires continued to have multiple altercations with correctional staff after he was taken to Polk County Jail.

When Wires refused to put on jail clothing, the statement said correctional officers sprayed him with pepper spray "due to resisting verbal commands."

After taking a shower in the jail's west pod to remove the pepper spray, Wires still refused to put on jail clothing, the statement said.

As two jail staff members moved him from the west pod to a safe cell, he continued to struggle.

Once in the safe cell, Wires remained combative. He "hit the right side of the head" of a correctional officer with his right elbow. See Assault, Page 6A

Gaining momentum

Gail Noggle knows economic development is all about the long game.

The executive director of Polk County's Economic Development Alliance hopes three years of work is starting to pay off for Bolivar's Industrial Development Authority property, a nearly 70-acre tract of land between Mo. 32 and Aldrich Road on the west side of Mo. 13 off Wommack Avenue.

Noggle said she's in the "very initial stages" of working with a business interested in locating at the long-vacant site.

"I'm working with a developer that's going to be submitting a proposal for certified sites with the state of Missouri for a project that could bring industry to one of several locations across the state," Noggle said.

While Noggle said she wouldn't go into further detail because of a confidentiality agreement, she said the IDA property's designation as a Missouri Certified Site has played an important role in the potential deal.

"Had we not gone through the certification process with the state, we would not even be qualified to be considered," she said.

The IDA property, certified in November 2017, was Missouri's 31st recognized development-ready land site, per previous coverage.

Certified land sites meet a set of standards designed to eliminate risk and expedite a company's move to a new location. Items reviewed include the availability of utilities, site access, environmental concerns, land use conformance and potential site development costs.

In essence, a certified site designation shows property owners completed and passed a phase one environmental survey and estab-

lished utilities at the site, Noggle previously told the BH-FP.

Certified sites, promoted statewide, save developers precious time.

"For all of these large projects, time is money," Noggle said. "As they say, the ready community wins."

Noggle said she's also working toward saving time and making the IDA property more appealing in another way. She said information from state economic development shows a need for completed work sites.

"There's a huge shortage of buildings ready for industrial and manufacturing to move into," she said. "So the trend right now is to have a spec building available."

She said developers are looking for buildings that are 100,000-square-feet or larger. Most have dirt floors and high ceilings.

Noggle said the spec buildings meet an immediate need.

"They want it right then and there," she said. "They can go in, and they know the building already exists, and they can modify it and retrofit it to their needs."

She said, while there is some risk involved for developers, she's "reaching out to some people to see if there'd be an interest in doing that."

Tackling a 'unique beast'

Noggle called Bolivar's IDA property a



"unique beast."

"It's a fantastic site, and it's certified," she said. "So we've done everything we can do to make that ready."

She admitted the property poses some challenges, namely its distance from Interstate 44, located around 30 miles to the south in Springfield. She said many industrial and manufacturing businesses want to be closer to the major highway.

"We can't do anything about the interstate, I-44, being where it is," she said. "It is what it is. So that really does narrow the margin of

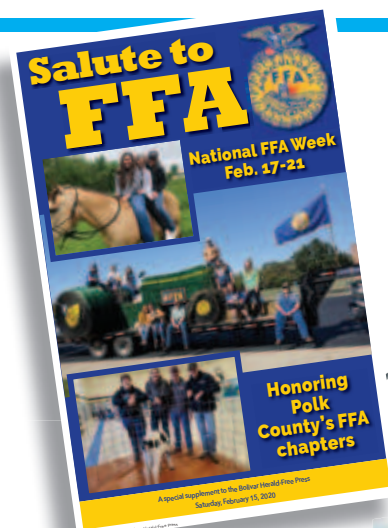

As a longtime runner and coach, Bolivar's Ron Bandy knows all too well that, sometimes, great events don't last.

"Most races last a couple of years, and then they're gone," the Bolivar High School cross country coach said.

New events can be hard to get off the ground, and a good first-year turnout doesn't guarantee a lasting impact, he said.

So, when The Marketing Bunch's Linda Bunch reached out to him 30 days ago about finding a way to keep the historic Polar Bear Run on the calendar, Bandy said he jumped at the opportunity.

The run has been hosted by the Roy Blunt YMCA of Bolivar in recent years.

According to previous BH-FP coverage, Citizens Memorial Hospital helped sponsor the race with Miller's Jewelry until the 15th race. After that, CMH, the Bolivar recreation department and the YMCA sponsored it.

Bunch said Friday, Feb. 7, she'd heard from the YMCA that it wouldn't be able to sponsor this year, and that the race, just one year after celebrating its 40th anniversary, was in danger of being dropped.

"We just kind of got our heads together, and I talked to the school and I talked to coach Bandy, and that's how he got involved," she said.

Roy Blunt YMCA executive director Paula Shepard told the

BH-FP Monday, Feb. 10, the organization has been proud to host the event for more than a decade.

"Each year during budgeting season, all programs and activities are evaluated," Shepard said. "This year, it was decided to transition the event to someone else to ensure its continued success."

Despite the transition, Shepard said the organization's goals are still paramount.

"We are so excited to have the Bolivar Running Club take over this great event," she said. "We are proud to be a part of this community and will continue to be guided by our mission to put Christian principles into practice through programs that build healthy spirit, mind and

body for all."

Bandy said the school's cross country team can't technically be associated with the race, per MSHSAA rules, so organizers created the Bolivar Running Club to host the event. According to a release from The Marketing Bunch, it will sponsor the event.

According to the release, the run is the "longest standing continuous road race in southwest Missouri."

This year's race starts at 9 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 22, at the Southwest Baptist University Student Union.

Both 10k and 5k options are available.

And you think you feed a litter ...

Hey, Grandma, were you a mite tuckered out after cooking your last holiday meal?

How many did you have at tables all 'round the house? 20? 35? More?

Well, whatever it was, just one farmer has you beat by a long shot.

According to Missouri Farm Bureau, one American farm provides food and fiber for 166 people. Of course, all of them aren't eating here; dinner tables around the world seat 60 of them.

Now, I realize those figures can't be taken literally. One farmer doesn't actually sit 106 people down at a long table in his hay barn. But, when the number of people fed by American farmers is divided by the number producing their food, that's what it comes out to.

And it makes a valid point: If you enjoy eating, thank a farmer. Heck, even if you don't enjoy it, but just eat because you must, thank a farmer.

You might also thank him for the 90 cents of every dollar you don't have to spend on food. Thank him for your bass boat, summer vacation or winter condo in Florida.

All of what we eat and many of the luxuries we enjoy in the United States are made possible by the productivity and efficiency of just 2 percent of our population on more than 2 million farms.

Missouri, alone, claims a

big part of that production, ranking second in the nation in farms with 95,320, according to the 2017 USDA Census of Agriculture. Additionally, Missouri is third in beef cattle, with 2.06 million head, fourth in rice, fifth in goats and cotton, sixth in hay production and turkeys, seventh in hogs and soybeans and 10th in corn, horses and chickens.

Farm Bureau also notes 96 percent of Missouri farms are family operations, providing 378,232 jobs and having an economic impact of \$88.4 billion on the state's economy.

And, Grandma, we'll understand if all of that leaves you more than a little frazzled after feeding all of your family, too. The Ag Census tells us you're a big part of feeding that 166 people around the world, with the average age of Missouri farmers at 59.3.

So, for my part, thanks Grandpa, Grandma and all your kin who make us the best-fed country in the world.

I hope you all reading this will do the same.

Farm Bureau's Thank a Farmer Week was Feb. 2-8. We salute our veterans, so how about a sincere "Thank You For Your Service" for farmers, too.

Conserving Thoughts

'Smallies' earn big reputation

For a variety of reasons, smallmouth bass have earned a reputation that sets them apart from many other popular Ozarks gamefish species.

Smallmouth belong to the sunfish family (family Centrarchidae) and are one of several species that comprise the group of fish known as black bass. The term "black bass" dates back to early chroniclers who used the name to distinguish these dark-backed fish with black markings from other bass that have silvery, lighter colors.

One reason for the smallmouth's popularity is where it lives. Some are found in lakes, but smallmouth are best known as a stream fish. They're not just any stream fish, either. Smallmouth bass are known as hard-fighting, aggressive fish — traits that make them enjoyable for anglers to catch.

Surveys show that, on average, anglers who enjoy fishing for smallmouth take an average of 10 smallmouth-focused fishing trips per year and catch seven smallmouth per trip.

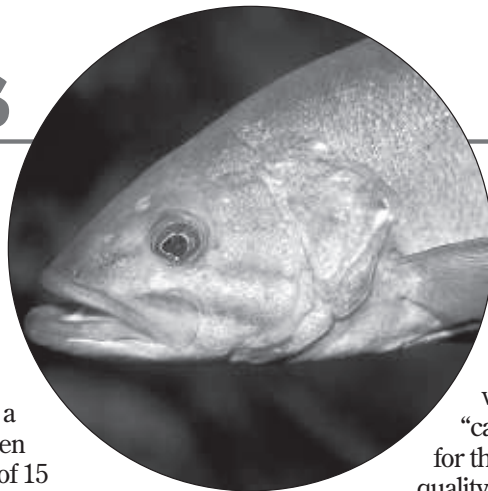
Life isn't easy for smallmouth in a stream. Disease, difficulty finding food, floods, changing water temperatures, natural predators and angler harvest are all factors that impact a small-

mouth's life expectancy. Studies show that in an Ozarks stream, it takes smallmouth bass five years to attain a length of 12 inches, seven years to attain a length of 15 inches and nine-10 years to attain a length of 18 inches.

At present, due to existing rates of mortality, few smallmouth live more than seven or eight years.

Though the state-record smallmouth is 7 pounds, 2 ounces, it's uncommon for "smallies" to approach those sizes in Ozarks streams. (To further prove this point, it should be noted the above-mentioned state-record smallmouth was caught at Stockton Lake, not in a stream.)

Nonetheless, combine their fighting ability with

good size potential and it's easy to see why smallmouth are a prized catch for those who fish rivers and streams.

Another reason many anglers have a special affection for smallmouth stems from the habitat they represent — clear, pristine streams that have a steady flow of water. Smallmouth have little tolerance for siltation and turbidity and occur only in streams that maintain flow.

For these reasons, non-anglers have an interest in smallmouth, too. The fish's preference for clear, clean water makes it a "canary in a coal mine" for those who study water quality in streams.

Unlike some other fish species, stocking doesn't seem to help smallmouth populations. Studies have shown that supplemental stocking of small, native smallmouth bass yields only a small increase in adult numbers. Alterations to available habitat are the

prime reasons for decreasing smallmouth numbers, and adding more fish into poorer habitats rarely means more fish for the angler.

Smallmouth reside in a number of southern Missouri streams. Parts of some streams have been designated as smallmouth management areas by the Missouri Department of Conservation. Information about these areas can be found at mdc.mo.gov or in the free MDC publication "Smallmouth Bass and Goggle-Eye Special Management Areas," a free booklet that can be found at a number of MDC offices.

Dental clinic owner sentenced for tax fraud

A Marshfield man, who co-owned a chain of area dental clinics, including one in Bolivar, was sentenced Tuesday, Feb. 4, to two years and eight months in federal prison without parole for his role in several financial fraud schemes.

According to a news release from the U.S. Attorney's office of the Western District of Missouri, Lorin G. Van Drie, 61, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge M. Douglas Harpool after being convicted in February 2019 of stealing public money, participating in a conspiracy to defraud the government and 18 counts of failing to pay over employment taxes.

The court also ordered him to pay restitution in an amount yet to be determined, the release stated.

According to the release, in addition to the payroll tax conspiracy, Van Drie was also found guilty of one count of theft of public money related to \$26,880

in unemployment benefits that he was not entitled to receive from October 2010 through June 2012.

Van Drie's wife, Pamela Van Drie, was sentenced in October to four years and nine months in federal prison without parole for her role in the schemes.

The court also ordered her to pay \$1,139,794 in restitution.

Together, the couple were convicted last year of all 40 counts contained in a federal indictment, the release stated.

The two owned All About Smiles, LLC, a Springfield company that provided dental services at clinics in Springfield, Mountain Grove and Bolivar. The last clinic closed in 2015. According to the release, they also owned PL Family Management Company LLC, which managed the staff for the clinics.

According to the release, between 2013 and 2015, the Van Dries failed to pay over to the IRS about \$194,751 in payroll taxes, despite withholding the taxes from em-

ployee checks.

The couple "diverted a substantial amount of money from their businesses during this period," living a "lavish lifestyle while some of their employees' paychecks bounced," the release stated.

Multiple vehicles, vacations, a boat, trailers, golf carts and a motorcycle were purchased, the release stated, including "a pulling truck called 'Momma's Money,' which their son used in pulling competitions throughout Missouri."

Health care fraud scheme

According to the release, Lorin Van Drie was not charged with health care fraud like his wife, however, "he was aware of the schemes and that the billing practices of his companies violated Medicaid regulations."

According to the release, Pamela Van Drie participat-

ed in a conspiracy to commit health care fraud from Oct. 6, 2010, to Aug. 19, 2015.

The release said Pamela Van Drie and James R. Dye, a dentist at the clinics, arranged for All About Smiles to provide dentures and other dental services to adults who did not qualify for Medicaid reimbursement. They submitted claims to Medicaid for those dentures and other dental services, knowing that Medicaid's requirements were not met.

Through All About Smiles, Pamela Van Drie submitted and received \$720,048 on numerous claims for dentures and other dental services that lacked the required written referral from a physician, the release said.

Additionally, Pamela Van Drie and Dye purchased Ortho-Tain orthodontic appliances, designed to straighten teeth without

braces, for about \$50 each, provided them to Medicaid pediatric beneficiaries and billed each such appliance to Medicaid as a speech aid prosthesis for around \$695, the release said.

Between Oct. 6, 2010, and Aug. 19, 2015, the release said Pamela Van Drie submitted and received payment for around 241 claims submitted for speech aid prosthesis. On each claim, All About Smiles, or its predecessor company, was paid

possibilities out there.” She said, to her knowledge, access to the property from Mo. 32 and availability of natural gas on the site haven't deterred businesses.

However, she said, “inquiries are very limited.”

Noggle said the IDA board is keeping an open mind when it comes to possible development.

“If the right retail or commercial project came in, then the IDA board of directors would certainly entertain that type of development, as well,” she said.

They've seen it happen before.

Tractor Supply, a rural lifestyle retail store chain, opened on a 1-acre parcel of the IDA property in November 2017. The 19,097-square-foot retail space includes a sales floor, external support service area and pet wash station.

Noggle said the IDA board also sold a piece of property along Morrisville Road to a developer last year.

“The anticipated use was for storage units,” she said. “It's activity, and it's property the IDA board decided was

By the numbers

Noggle said statistics reveal a community's strength. “That's your barometer on the health of the community, not how many buildings are going up,” she said. “... The data is what most smart business people want to back their decision on.”

In turn, over the last year, Noggle has worked to gather statistics for Polk County.

“We're starting to track our progress,” she said.

something with.” To continue building momentum and develop more possibilities, Noggle said she's spent the last year gathering building data and statistics for Polk County and

increasing marketing efforts.

“It's not a matter of selling the fluff of the city,” she said. “It's really delving in and giving them some statistics and data toward what they're needing to make a good business decision.”

With the help of the IDA board and community partners, Noggle completed an analysis in April 2019 to determine Polk County's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats.

Through that pro-

cess, the economic development alliance set four priorities -- first being manufacturing and industrial growth, second travel and tourism, third residential development and fourth retail development.

“For a community our size and the amount of money we have to work with, we have a pretty robust program going,” she said.

The key, she said, is to work through regional partners with larger budgets,

About the Economic Development Alliance

Gail Noggle, hired by the City of Bolivar in 2016, has moved beyond her original job title as economic development director for the city to executive director of Polk County's Economic Development Alliance.

According to a presentation provided by Noggle during the city's board of aldermen meeting Tuesday, Jan. 25, the EDA is a public and private partnership with the City of Bolivar, Polk County, the Industrial Development Authority, Bolivar Area Chamber of Commerce and private sector investors.

The organization's mission statement says it “coordinates and facilitates the development of a strong, diversified and competitive economy in the city and county.”

The EDA “focuses on addressing the needs and opportunities of existing businesses, providing assistance to new and expanding businesses, fostering workforce development, supporting an entrepreneurial culture while advocating for a business-friendly climate in Bolivar,” per the mission statement.

Noggle's presentation said the EDA's revenue is divided equally between private and public support.

between \$675 to \$695, for a total amount of around \$165,700.

Dye pleaded guilty on Feb. 11, 2016, to healthcare fraud in a separate but related case, the release said.

According to the release Pamela Van Drie was also found guilty of one count of theft of public money related to \$3,520 in unemployment benefits that she was not entitled to receive.

From June 2012 through January 2013, Pamela Van Drie falsely certified to the Missouri Department of Employment Security 31 times that she was not employed, was available and searching for work, and was not receiving any type of employment income.

The release stated Van Drie took a weeklong vacation to Florida during that period.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorneys Cindi S. Woolery and Steve Mohlhenrich and Special Assistant U.S. Attorney Shannon Kempf of the Missouri Attorney General's Office.

It was investigated by Health and Human Services – Office of Inspector General, the Missouri Attorney General's Office Medicaid Fraud Control Unit and IRS-Criminal Investigation.

He continued “kicking the cell door, yelling through the jail and

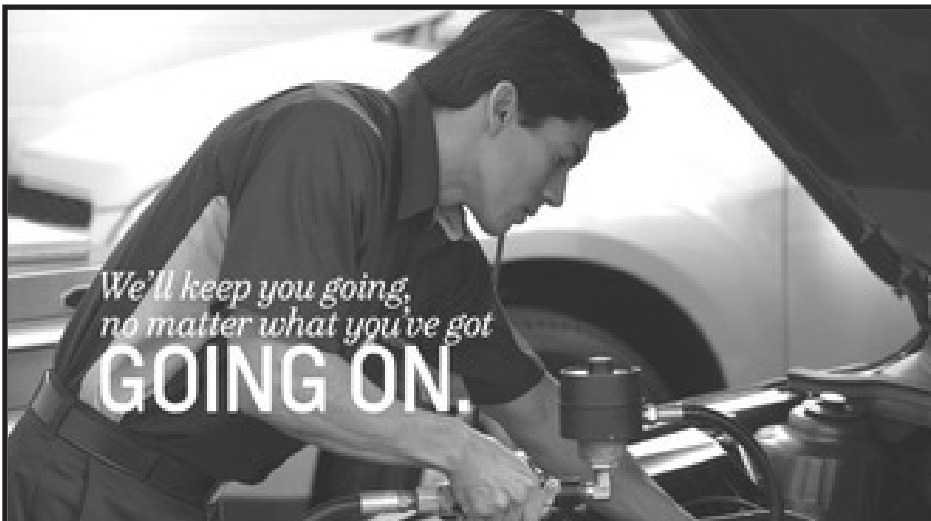

including the Springfield Convention and Visitors Bureau and Springfield Chamber of Commerce.

"Anything we can do to tie in and partner with them is going to allow us to reach far more people than we'd ever be able to reach," Noggle said. "And it's a very much more targeted approach."

That targeted approach is essential when dealing with a business park like the IDA property, she said.

"You have to be very specialized, very targeted, or you're wasting an awful lot of money," Noggle said. "And you have to realize what your limitations are. We have some limitations there. Not at any fault of our own, but just because geographically where we're at."

Persistence is essential, she said.

"You just have to keep plugging away at it, reaching out to as many people as you know, and be realistic," she said. "Tap into state resources, regional resources, and put yourself in networking situations that make sense."

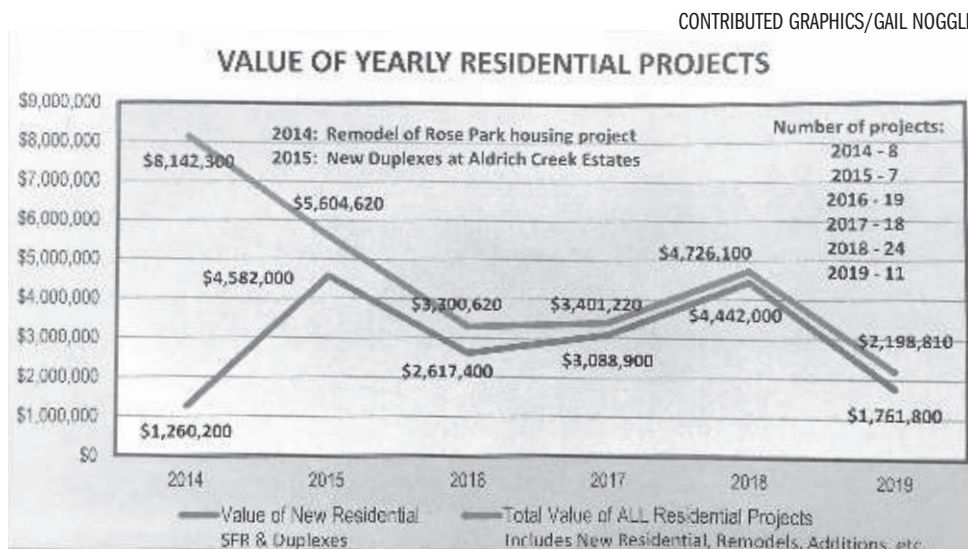
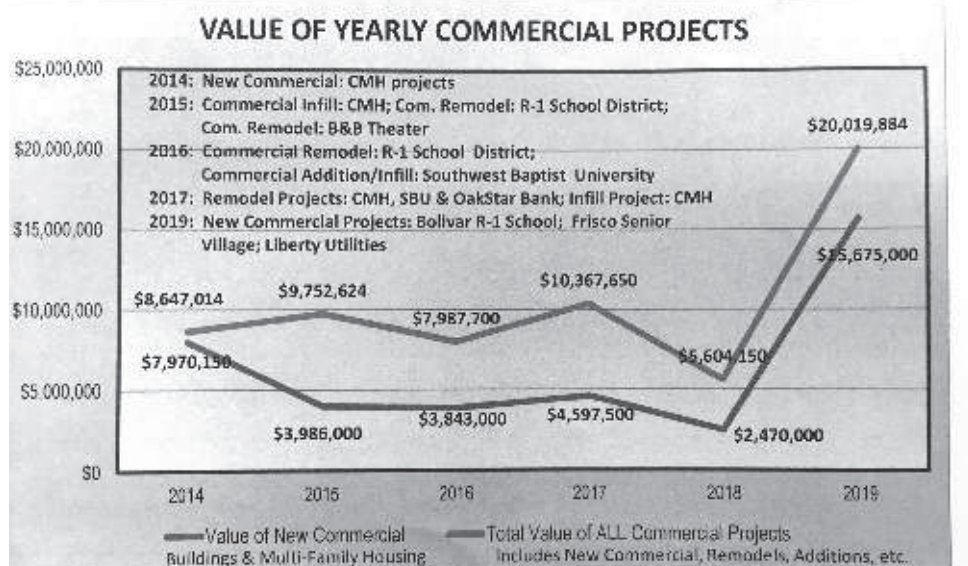
Noggle said success is "more about building relationships with your engineers, your architects, your developers, your manufacturing association."

One super Sunday

When Kansas City Chiefs quarterback and former Texas Tech Red Raider Patrick Mahomes led his team to a thrilling fourth-quarter comeback to win Super Bowl LIV in Miami, Florida, on Sunday, Feb. 2, Polk County's Staci and Flint Wendland were there to take it all in.

The couple, who live just north of Bolivar, are lifelong Chiefs fans, Staci said, and started attending games with her family's season tickets 10 to 12 years ago.

On Monday, Jan. 19, the morning after Kansas City won the NFC championship game over the Tennessee Titans, Staci said she got a surprise phone call.

"My phone rang and it was the Kansas City Chiefs telling me that we needed to check our email, because our season tickets got drawn up on the lottery," she said.

The selection meant the couple was able to purchase their tickets at a reduced price — under \$2,000 apiece, she said. The couple declined to specify the exact price.

After thinking it over, and unsuccessfully, trying to contact

Flint, she said she made the call.

"Finally, I just said, 'Yeah, we're going to go,'" she said. "I didn't ask him. Yeah, we're going to go to the Superbowl."

Flint said the trip ended up an expensive experience, but it was worth it. It's a memory that will last forever.

"The trip was more with the flight and the hotel, but this was a once in a lifetime opportunity," he said.

Flint said the couple met other fans from across the country and across the globe.

"We met people from Germany, Australia and Ireland," he said. "They came from all over. It was really just a fun experience."

All around the airports and hotels in Miami, Flint said other travelers would ask the couple how long they'd been Chiefs fans.

"People would ask us if we'd just jumped on the Chiefs bandwagon," he said. "It was like,

The county's general fund revenue will increase, from about \$1.7 million in 2019 to \$1.8 million anticipated in 2020.

Its road and bridge fund will also see an increase, rising from \$3.1 million in 2019 to about \$4.2 million in 2020.

Missing out

Robertson's message did note that "again, federal and state mandates are not being fully reimbursed to the county. ..."

The reimbursements are for inmates housed in the county jail for the state, for which the county is owed about \$160,000, Hancock said. According to a Missouri News Network article, the state owes about \$35 million to Missouri counties whose jails have held state prisoners.

According to the article, county jails can request reimbursements from the Missouri Department of Corrections, including the costs associated with

transporting prisoners from local jails to state prisons, transporting extradited offenders back to Missouri and housing prisoners who are eventually sentenced to state incarceration.

Gov. Mike Parson has made a recommendation to the state's budget committee to allocate \$22 million for reimbursements, a big leap from his previous \$1.7 million allocation.

In the meantime, Hancock said the loss of funding will continue to affect the budget.

"There's money out there that we're not receiving," he said.

'No, we've been doing this a long time.'

In fact, the couple's fandom runs so strong, they've already rewatched the big game at least

once. They said they record every game, including the ones they attend.

"We've already decided that we're going to start a Super

Bowl fund to start saving," Staci said. "Because we firmly believe that the Chiefs are going to go back to the Super Bowl, and we want to be there for it again."

"I feel like you need to keep up with the minimum wage to hire quality employees, but if you don't have the money, you don't have the money," Hancock said. "We got it in, but moving forward, I don't know."

The county is expecting \$1.8 million in revenue to the fund, and will carry over about \$2.1 million from 2019.

The county's road and bridge fund is also budgeted to see an increase in expenditures over previous years.

It was \$3.1 million in 2019, and is expected to be \$4.2 million in 2020.

That sum includes about \$640,000 in expenses related to rebuilding Mockingbird Hill Bridge on South 122nd Road north of Bolivar.

Northern district commissioner Kyle Legan said the county will see those expenses later reimbursed by the state, using federal bridge money.

The bridge, which sits between two sharp turns, is one lane and has begun to degrade, Legan previously told the BH-FP.

"It shouldn't cost us anything, is what they've said," Legan said.

Hancock said the program takes into account money the county has spent on other qualifying bridges, which apply toward assistance for this project.

"That's how we get up to it not really costing us anything," he said.

Overall, Robertson wrote that office budgets kept conservative in 2019, averaging 84.96% of their budgets.

Trending up

The county's sales tax revenues pointed positive in 2019, Robertson wrote in the message, showing a 1% increase over the year before.

The county is anticipating about \$3.35 million in sales tax revenue in 2020.

Skalicky named to MSHOF

Every so often, Francis Skalicky gets a call at his Springfield office from a close contact in Polk County, just to chat.

Skalicky, a Bolivar native and media specialist for the Missouri Department of Conservation's southwest region, is tasked with coordinating media coverage for the office's 17-county coverage area and assisting with media coverage elsewhere in the state.

"She's not a hunter," Skalicky said, referring to the caller. "She's not an angler. She just appreciates the outdoors. We'll talk about birds she's seen. Sometimes we'll get down to insects and plants. She always apologizes, but I say, 'No no. You are exactly the kind of people we are working for, because you appreciate the outdoors. You appreciate how nature fits together, and I always have time for people who appreciate nature.'"

In 24 years on the job, Skalicky said he's come to define conservation this way. While preservation is key, so is appreciation.

"It's somebody who appreciates the outdoors and appreciates how special things are around here," he said.

At a Missouri Sports Hall of Fame outdoor sports luncheon Wednesday, Feb. 26, Skalicky will be inducted into the hall for just that.

The 1980 Bolivar High School graduate is one of five who will receive the honor. Skalicky's induction is under the hall's conservation category. His sister-in-law, Bolivar's Gail Skalicky, will sing the national anthem at the luncheon.

"In one respect, you could say it's a long way from my family's milk barn in Polk County to the Missouri Sports Hall of

Fame," he said. "In a manner of years, yes. But in directness of connection, no. It has Bolivar stamped all over it."

That time spent on the family farm fueled a love for nature that's continued to grow today, he said.

"There still was that connection to the outdoors," he said. "Whether it was big stuff or little stuff, you had time out there to wonder how it all fits together."

After graduating high school, Skalicky attended Southwest Missouri State University, now Missouri State University. He spent summer stints at the Bolivar Herald-Free Press and the Springfield News-Leader before graduating in 1984.

Afterward, he worked for newspaper firm Gannett for 11 years, including six years at the News-Leader, before being hired by the Missouri Department of Conservation as its first media specialist for the state's southwest region in 1996.

He still holds the same job title today.

But, while the name has stayed the same, the responsibilities haven't, he said.

"Obviously, media has changed," he said. "When I started, there were more newspapers. It was radio and TV, and it was just interviews. Now, if I do a newspaper interview, they may want video too, for their website, so I send them video. I get calls from people who saw things on Facebook, because social media has become part of the media, too."

Through the changes, Skalicky's love of the work has stayed constant, he said.

"The good thing about my job also is that I am constantly learning," he said. "I prepare for an interview with a media outlet or

I research to write a story, and the interview comes and goes. The story is published, and the paper moves on, but the knowledge stays with me. I'm always learning, because the outdoors is always teaching."
