Lloyd Environmental Conservation Council honors Donna Deeprose

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Last week, Jack Maguire, Chairman of the Lloyd Environmental Conservation Council [ECC], announced that his board selected Donna Deeprose for their Stewardship of the Land award for 2016. Maguire said the ECC has bestowed this honor for 22 years upon “someone who has done outstanding work to help conserve our natural resources and promote interest in the environment.”

Maguire said Deeprose has been a valued member of the ECC, has helped to create the Bob Shepard Highland Landing Park, and been an advocate for the Walkway Over the Hudson State Park and the Hudson Valley Rail Trail.

“Few people in this community are unaware of the breadth and depth of Donna’s talents and commitment in serving the community,” he said.

Maguire pointed out that Deeprose has worked diligently to acquire grant money for a boat launch and assisted in doing a survey at a vernal pool while he watched her sink up to her thighs in mud.

“Whatever she does she does it with determination, a professionalism, intelligence, generosity, grace, humor and diplomacy,” he said. “We in the ECC are very proud to have worked with her for many years and to have benefitted from her energy and just her great heart.”

Deeprose said she and her husband, Raphael, moved to Highland in 2003.

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Lloyd passes new tow law

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After lengthy and at times acrimonious discussions during the last 10 months, the Lloyd Town Board last week passed a new tow law by a vote of 3-1 with Supervisor Paul Hansut voting against the resolution and Councilman Joe Mazzetti abstaining due to a familial connection with one of the tow operators. Throughout the process Mazzetti recused himself when the tow law was being discussed by the board. Subsequently, comments were made that Mazzetti had approached Police Chief Daniel Waage on the side to offer input on the law, which Waage stated did not happen.

The need for revising the law came to the surface because of complaints made by several tow operators that the tow list was unfair and should be revised so that each of the 10 operators on the list received calls for service on an equal basis.

Councilmen Mike Guerriero and Kevin Brennie were charged with developing the new code. Guerriero said the new law is clearer and “there are a lot of things specified here that if you don’t do this, there is a penalty [and] everything is spelled out. Its self-explanatory compared to the previous code and some of the other codes that we looked at.”

Al Roberts, an attorney representing tow operator Joseph DiBlanca, pointed to several “fatal” deficiencies in the new tow law and how it runs counter to legal statutes. He said the Town Board does not have “unfettered power to adopt whatever laws you want,” stating that towns are controlled by town and federal laws. He said the new law limits the tow list to towing companies who are

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Matt Smith resigns as park manager

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In an announcement that caught many by surprise, Matt Smith informed the Lloyd Town Board last week that he was stepping down as the President of the Highland Landing Park Association and as the Park Project Manager and would be handing over the reigns to Lenny Auchmoody to move the undertaking forward. Smith said he would remain a board member.

Smith said 24 years ago "I had the bright idea as president of the Downtown Business Association, of building a park on the river. It turns out that when we looked into it that we were one of the few communities along the Hudson River that had no waterfront facilities." He said through controversy and much hard work volunteers persevered and today the park is a reality, with the expenditure of a minimum of tax money.

Smith said he has had good working relationships with past and present Town Boards and their Supervisors, who have let him and his volunteers do the work that is needed with little intrusion.

"I really appreciate that, all the Town Boards, anything you need they give you. They don't interfere and they're great," he said.

Smith alluded to some personal health issues, saying he feels confident that Auchmoody will be able to bring the park project to completion.

"Lenny has really stepped up and done a tremendous job down there," he said. "I think he is going to take over and do as good or better job than I did."

Supervisor Paul Hansut said he was saddened to learn that Smith was stepping back a bit. He said Smith has been true to his word that taxpayer money would not be used for the park and whenever he tried to allocate tax money for the park Smith wouldn't accept it.

"He has done a great, great job and we're really going to miss you," Hansut said. "Thank you for everything you've done."

As Auchmoody approached the podium to deliver the monthly park report, Hansut said, "well fella you've got some big shoes to fill." Auchmoody said "We could never repay this man for what he's done over the last twenty-four years." He added that Smith would always be available to offer his help and advice when needed.

Auchmoody said three months ago they decided to do the river walk that

runs alongside the bulkhead in concrete. He said the 10 foot wide walk runs from the north side of the park and is presently 240 feet in length. The rest of the walk will be done in the spring since cold weather is setting in. He also put in 200 feet of electrical conduit.

Auchmoody is hoping that Tim Baker will come down this week to prepare the soil for seeding on the northern side of the park down to the picnic tables.

Consideration is being given to finishing the outside of the brick

education building and a short sidewalk has been poured from the parking lot to the kayak launch that is also on the north side of the park.

The floating docks at the boat launch have been taken out of the river in preparation for winter and annual fundraising letters have been sent out.

The Town Board accepted "with deepest regrets" Smith's letter of resignation as the park project manager and appointed Auchmoody to fill his place.

Library abandons Cider Mill property

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Recently the Trustees for the Plattekill Library voted unanimously to cease their consideration of the Cider Mill property as a site for a new town library. The parcel, which is located across the street from their present location on Route 32 in Modena, has been under consideration for several years.

Trustee President Lynn Ridgeway read a resolution at the last board meeting that highlighted their reasons for ending their ties with property owner Vincent P. Nemeth. The board noted that after they signed a contract with Nemeth on April 10, 2014, he failed to appear at a scheduled closing the following November. For two more years the Library board continued to press Nemeth to sell them the property, even as he failed to show up to a second scheduled closing. As a result, earlier this year the library began discussing the possibility of buying their present location from the town.

At the meeting the board did not address what they would do to retrieve \$9,250 they gave Nemeth in 2014 as a down payment for his property. Ridgeway admitted that Nemeth cashed the check they sent him but on November 14, 2014 he sent a check of his own for that amount back to the library's attorney John Allen, of Whiteman, Osterman and Hanna, stating that he was terminating the contract. Ridgeway acknowledged that the library did not cash Nemeth's check but instead it was put into escrow. At this point the uncashed check may be void as it is two years old.

In a subsequent interview Ridgeway

denied that she or anyone on the library board instructed their attorney to place Nemeth's check in escrow but believes he did this of his own accord and informed the board of his action after the fact. She also acknowledged that no vote was taken by the board to give him direction on this matter.

"I think our attorney did that with the hopes of keeping the connection alive," she said. "Their attorney wrote a check to our attorney and our attorney apparently put it into an escrow account."

Ridgeway said the day after the library board met this month their attorney sent a letter to Nemeth's attorney requesting that he return the \$9,250 down payment in a new check. If the money is not returned

she said it would probably cost more to sue him than what they are owed.

"Once you go into the court, the sky's the limit, especially when you're dealing with a businessman," she said.

Ridgeway said the only other parcel suitable in size for a library is a lot near the Dollar General Store that was listed "at \$800,000 or \$900,000 so as you know we can't go that high." The Cider Mill property, which Ridgeway favored, would have cost more than \$800,000 in demolition and remediation costs to remove an old structure that is on the property just to get it ready for construction. According to trustee William Farrell the parcel near the Dollar General was never brought before the board for discussion. He also said that

for two years Ridgeway, as well as fellow trustee Valerie Smith, continued to tell the rest of their members that a contract did exist and that they had to pursue the matter or risk being brought to court by Nemeth. Farrell recently asked for proof of a contract, forcing Ridgeway to request an opinion in writing from their attorney who informed her that the library had no valid contract with Nemeth. Ridgeway has characterized the entire matter as a "misunderstanding."

Attorney John Allen did not return a phone call for comment on the check Nemeth returned in November 2014 and why it was placed in escrow.

Local 2017 town budgets approved

The towns of Lloyd, Plattekill and Marlborough approved their respective town budgets for 2017, each seeing a minimal increase from their previous budget.

Town of Lloyd

Last week the Lloyd Town Board approved their 2017 budget, with \$10,329,719 in expenses, \$2,666,942 in revenues and the allocation of \$270,000 from the fund balances, leaving \$7,417,777 to be raised by taxes.

These calculations will effect a zero increase in town taxes in 2017 for residents who are outside the water and

sewer district; a 6 cent increase per \$1,000 in assessed value for residents inside the water/sewer district; and a 3 cent increase per \$1,000 in assessed value for those who are just inside the water district.

Outside the water and sewer district the tax rate is 4.98, resulting in a tax bill of \$1,245 on a home assessed at \$250,000 [250 x 4.98].

Inside the water and sewer district the tax rate is 7.67, resulting in a tax bill of \$1,917 on a \$250,000 assessed home.

Only inside the water district, the tax rate is 6.02 with an accompanying tax bill of \$1,505 on an assessment of \$250,000.

In the unassigned fund balances, as of December

31, 2015, the General Fund stands at \$1,510,448 and the amount in the Highway fund is \$419,669. The use of \$270,000 for the 2017 town budget will be calculated at the end of 2016.

Supervisor Paul Hansut commented, "I am pleased to announce for the fifth year in a row we will be complying with the New York State property tax cap."

Hansut pointed out that under the NYS Comptroller's guidelines, towns can keep from 5% to 10% of their budget fund balances.

"At a \$10 million budget [and] a million in the General Fund, I don't think we're too far off," he said. "I don't

take credit for everything. This board has worked well together and everyone keeps an eye on the budget. I think we do a good job stewarding the money of the taxpayers of the Town of Lloyd.”

Hansut said it is hard to predict what will happen between now and when they will compile the 2018 town budget “but I feel confident that we’ve done a very conservative budget...We’re not out borrowing money and accruing debt for the town, we’re working within what we have.”

Town of Plattekill

In just under 30 minutes the Plattekill Town Board approved their 2017 town budget on November 9.

The General budget appropriation is \$2,115,862, the Highway budget is \$1,756,141. Revenues of \$1,295,205 and applying \$95,000 from the fund balances offsets this for a total of \$2,481,798. An additional \$1,589,987 is added to this to cover the costs of the special library and Fire Department districts and the lighting and drainage districts and brings the total needed to be raised in taxes to \$4,071,786.

The General fund for 2017 will see a minus 1.38% change from 2016 and the Highway fund has a 0.64% increase from this year. Factoring in the special district costs results in an overall tax levy amount that represents a .10% change from this year to 2017, which is within the 2% property tax cap.

residents of the Town of Lloyd that he says is a violation of section 80 of NY General Municipal Law, which deals with discrimination against non-residents.

Roberts said the new law also states that only one tow truck operator may operate out of any one lot, which Guerriero clarified is applicable to those operators who want to be on the town towing list. Roberts countered, saying that this provision is not about safety concerns and thus “is beyond the powers” of the town to stipulate and is actually a violation of federal statutes. Brennie pointed out that this provision has existed in the code that the town has operated under for 26 years. “You are challenging something that we actually didn’t change.”

Roberts noted that the new law states that an operator must have a shop registration but the new law does not define what this is “either in the law or in the DMV... when there is an ambiguity it is going to fall on the town to clarify it or remove it.” He also questioned what the purpose is for having this provision in the law since many companies “simply operate as independent tow truck companies and they deliver to whomever, to yards, to repair or body shops. Again this is not a safety concern.”

Roberts said in the laws inspection wording says “if it is a repair shop, it doesn’t say what if it is not a repair shop,” noting that this is inconsistent with other chapters

As of December 31, 2015 there is \$1,139,848 in the General Fund Balance and \$648,301 in the Highway Fund Balance.

Supervisor Joe Croce said he felt this was a “good and fair budget,” adding that most of the town employees received a 2% raise while keeping their department budgets in check.

“Making up this budget is definitely a team effort and when everyone works together, we end up with something we all can be proud of,” he said.

Town of Marlborough

On November 14 the Marlborough Town Board unanimously approved their 2017 town budget, however Councilman Howard Baker was absent.

The town expenses are estimated at \$9,160,903, with revenues of \$2,071,163. The board allocated \$175,050 from the unexpended General Fund Balance and after a few minor budget modifications were made in personnel services and in the drainage districts, the final tax levy is \$7,090,690. This represents a change from 0.30% in 2016 to 0.33% in 2017.

The town wide tax rate is 7.95; a resident with a house assessed at \$250,000 will pay \$1,987 [250 x 7.95].

As of December 31, 2015 the amount of fund balance left in the General Fund is \$898,882 and in the Highway Fund balance the amount remaining is \$497,888.

Supervisor Al Lanzetta said “we’re still under the cap,” adding that residents will see a minimal change in their town tax bill.

in the law.

Roberts said another provision “that doesn’t make any sense to me” states that a tow truck that was not called to tow a vehicle but comes within 500 feet of the accident scene is subject to removal from the tow list. He said a tow truck operator may be in the area of an accident but is passing by for some other unrelated reason; “That violates any sense of fairness and due process...fairness has to apply to everybody and it has to also comply with statutory and decisional law. That’s all I am suggesting; this can be worked out to the satisfaction I believe of all the tow truck operators, make your law legal [and] compliant with both federal and state statutes and most importantly with decisional law.”

Councilman Brennie reminded Roberts that nothing in the new tow law is unusual and that the town is not “challenging the entire system and creating a towing code that is different from everybody else. Actually we absorbed a lot of the codes that surround us so there is nothing in here that is revolutionary or unknown to the industry. Its pretty much standard.”

Brennie said the Town Board’s primary goal is to protect the local people who reside in Lloyd.

“We’re not going to write a code that’s going to take it from where its protected our local tow operators and open it up to other competition unless a judge tells us to,” he said.

Chiropractor hosts 23rd Community Appreciation Day

Highland Chiropractor Dr. Steven Auerbach held his annual Community Appreciation Day on November 12 at his office in the Bridgeview Plaza. He offered his services free of charge in exchange for donations of canned goods that he later brought to the Highland Community Action for their food pantry.

"This is our 23rd year straight that we're doing this. I started this the first year I opened this practice," Auerbach said. "It's been a lot of fun and I enjoy giving back to the community this way, I really do. Whenever I bring the big carload of food over to the pantry they always say Dr. Auerbach is here, the [holiday] season is beginning. Its nice and I enjoy serving my community in a lot of ways."

Auerbach offered postural screenings, complimentary adjustments to his existing patients and new guests received a consultation and a basic screening with a follow up (at no charge). In addition, people received a five-minute mini-massage from a massage therapist.

Auerbach said his 8 Weeks to Wellness program is going well. His brochure says this comprehensive program "focuses on health not sickness and encompasses many of the fundamental wellness therapies including a total health and fitness assessment, two on-site personal training session per week, a weekly full body massage, two chiropractic adjustments, development of a personalized diet regime with vitamin therapy, meditation instruction, along with wellness education. He points out that most people lose weight and can lower or eliminate certain medications with the guidance of their primary care physician.

"Its impressive I must say and very fulfilling to me to be able to provide that level of service to the community. It gives me the ability to teach people all the things that they need to do in their lives that they know they should be doing but don't," he said. "We teach people personalized targeted nutrition, we teach them how to exercise for their particular body with the trainer and the chiropractic care is included. We teach them how to do some basic meditation techniques for stress management. All those components together are really a tremendous benefit and it comes down to learning how to eat well, move well and think well. We give people the know-how, the support [and] the structure to really

follow through and make it happen. The results are fantastic and when people can see what their body can accomplish, they really give themselves to the program. In a mere 8 weeks most people are not going back, they really learn some life skills, which is what I'm really trying to teach

them."

Laura Auerbach said the wellness program now has a relationship with Boston Heart Labs "doing some cutting edge blood work that gets into a little bit of genetics. We're not just measuring cholesterol we're looking at particle size

and it's helped us to really fine tune how we target the nutrition...now we have even more specific cardio and diabetes support."

Laura offered an undeniable truth; "When diet is wrong medicine is of no use and when diet is correct medicine is of no need."

Elizabeth Tolliver conducted foot scans using a high tech machine "that picks up the height and depth of your arches and of the surface of your feet. Its meant to determine if your arches have collapsed and when your arches collapse it causes pronation." This condition may cause the ankles to either roll inward or outward that causes instability "from your ankles up." The data collected from the scan is then sent to a lab that creates custom orthotics that corrects any imbalance and "essentially gets the foundation of your body working correctly." Tolliver said there are various types of orthotics designed for walking, running, industrial and for use even in wet environments.

Jesse Roth started as a personal trainer at Auerbach's in July and consulted with people who came to the Community Appreciation Day. He said he has always been interested in the field, played Rugby competitively in college "and I always wanted to make myself better, so I figured out how to do that," and obtained his Personal Trainer certificate.

Roth works on correcting posture – "everyone is slumped forward, everyone's hips are out of whack and a lot of people sit all day and their hips are tight, so we spend a lot of time correcting muscle imbalance, that's the majority of it." Before working at the center, Roth had been a patient of Dr. Auerbach's for more than a year "and when I heard there was a position I jumped at it as fast as I could. Within a week I knew this was it."

Wendi Bean is the second personal trainer at the center and holds Bachelors and Masters degrees in Exercise Science and Exercise Physiology, having combined her early and abiding interest in sports and science. She guides people through a program focused on building cardiovascular fitness, strength and flexibility training.

"We're going to do things that work your whole body [and] you get stronger in a way you can move better and use it every day to feel stronger, especially focusing on a good core strength," she said, adding that she sees significant improvements in how people walk, stand and in how they carry themselves within a relatively short time span.

School morning announcements get a makeover

For decades, traditional morning elementary school announcements were a predictable affair featuring the resuscitation of information that students needed to know for that day. Starting in September, that time-honored practice has been flipped on its head due to some creativity among the students and staff at the three elementary buildings in the Wallkill Central School District. Fifth- and sixth-grade students at Plattekill, Ostrander and Leptondale elementaries are producing elaborate videos that feature kids giving the school

announcements in imaginative ways.

In a presentation at the district's school board meeting on Thursday, a dozen Plattekill students presented video clips of the innovative work they've been doing under the PNN (Plattekill News Network) banner. For Halloween, the students used a spooky haunted house motif with floating heads as the kids relayed trick or treating safety tips. A sports segment utilized a superimposed backdrop of the new Wallkill football field, and another report

contained students interviewing Superintendent Kevin Castle about the collection of cars he's had throughout the years.

The students have taken the initiative with the TV studio program and have hit the ground running. "I like being with my friends and not being forced to 'do this or do that,'" sixth-grader Aaliyah Gaston said. "We're free, and we can just choose whatever subject we want to talk about. It's really fun." The video announcements were the brainchild of Stephan Cabarcas, the district's Library Media Technology Integrated Specialist. "It was the first day after spring break, and the morning announcements came on and there was no enthusiasm or excitement," he said. "So I got this idea that since Wallkill is getting the Smart Bond money and every classroom is going to have a smartboard, we could try and change it up a bit. I proposed this idea to the principals, and they accepted it and have been extremely supportive. They've been behind us 100 percent."

The program has even inspired some kids to think about pursuing a career in broadcasting. "Every Friday is a new adventure to record and do something I want to do for the rest of my life," sixth-grader Alexa Mirabal said. One obstacle for kids wanting to join in on the fun could be camera shyness, but the pupils have been able to overcome that roadblock in their screen appearances. "The most challenging thing is probably the first time you get in front of the camera without being embarrassed," fifth-grader Kendall Albrechtsen said.

The Plattekill announcements are filmed every Friday morning before school in the library with the aid of a green screen that enables the team to switch out the digital backgrounds for each movie. Cabarcas films the segments with an iPad and the clips are subsequently uploaded on TouchCast. "The plan was to see how it

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goes this year, and if it continues to develop maybe we could purchase some better software to use," Cabarcas. "Then maybe we could get a video camera." The kids' reports are broadcast in each homeroom on large high-def smartboards, so Plattekill students get to see their classmate's segments every Monday morning.

More than three dozen students have participated in the program so far, with additional pupils lining up for a shot at a starring role "I think it's been extremely successful," Cabarcas said. "It's November, and the response we've been getting from the faculty, staff, community and other students that want to join in has been only getting better. More and more kids want to join, so it's been great. Right now it's an overwhelming amount of kids who want to join, so we're going through that process." The word of mouth is strong with the program, with students recommending the TV studio to their classmates. "Yes, because they'd get to experience the stuff that we get to," sixth-grader Grace Mesuch replied when asked if other students should give the program a shot.

Castle has been impressed with the program in its first year. "It's working out very well," he said. "The kids are enthused about it. They're learning lifelong skills to

use when they move on to high school and beyond. It's increasing their confidence level, and it motivates their peers to want to do the same thing. We just heard that the Plattekill students, because of what they're doing, other students want to be a part of that. It's great that they're doing it and I'm very proud of them." Always on the lookout for a new angle in approaching the videos, PNN recently took part in a social media craze to help spice up the announcements. "We did the mannequin challenge," Cabarcas said. "We did it for every sixth-grade class in the building. So we had one class outside on the playground, we had one class walking into the building. So that was the craziest thing we've done so far. We're eight or nine deep with these, and it's only getting bigger and better."

The district's request for proposal with Valley Central for a potential new bus contract is active, and proposals for a possible joint transportation contract between the districts will be opened on Jan. 4 at 10 a.m. at the Valley Central office. "It's out to bid," Castle said. "There was a bid meeting today (Nov. 17). So we're going to be opening that bid in January. Hopefully we'll get someone in, and we'll sharpen our pencil and go from there. We're looking forward to seeing the outcome."

Thanksgiving wishes

We are grateful to the Father of us all for the innumerable daily manifestations of His beneficent mercy in affairs both public and private, for the bounties of the harvest, for opportunities to labor and to serve, and for the continuation of those homely joys and satisfactions which enrich our lives.

**President Franklin D. Roosevelt,
Thanksgiving Proclamation, 1941**

The above words, written 75 years ago, were delivered less than a month before the attack on Pearl Harbor, but the president saw it as a time of hope. America was, at long last, climbing out of the Great Depression and here was an opportunity to not only give “thanks to the Heavenly Source of our earthly blessings,” but also to call for “the establishment on earth of freedom, brotherhood, and justice for enduring time.”

There are, or course, many parallels between that time and the times in which we now live. These are indeed troubled times. We see it in the harried and stressed every man and woman struggling to provide for their families. We see it in the face of the homeless or those barely getting by. And we see it in the turmoil that has engulfed our streets: the protests over the surprising outcome of the recent election, the clashes between citizens and police. But in our uniquely American Thanksgiving we will turn away from our worries, our fears our personal darkness and find gratitude and thankfulness.

And yet we can still give thanks. Roosevelt was thankful that “we have not lost our faith in the spiritual dignity of man, our proud belief in the right of all people to live out their lives in freedom and with equal treatment.” In 2016, we can give thanks for our diversity and tolerance, even as some citizens fear that a change in that level of tolerance may be imminent. But America today remains a nation of many faces, beliefs and cultures. Diversity and tolerance is often reflected within the families that will gather on Thursday at the dinner table.

The words of FDR, as well as those of his predecessors and successors, remind us that we don’t give thanks only in times of peace and prosperity. That’s the easy part. We also count our blessings during the times of turmoil. Those blessings may shine more brightly. We can still be thankful for the

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Highland, Marlboro and New Paltz have had diversity issues

The recent Trump-Clinton Presidential election was about diversity, but this was not the first time it has been an issue in Highland, Marlboro and New Paltz. About 1900, Livingston Rhodes became ostracized in Highland for selling lots to Italians on what was then Mile Hill Road. later it was renamed Little Italy Road as the Caninos, Phillips, Lombardis, Robertos, Cappillinos, Gregorios, and other Italian families that had moved to Highland from New York City to have a better life bought them.

The Frank Zammiello family bought land near what is now Toc Drive. Their third son, Louis, who was born in 1889, made news in Highland in 1912 when he had a mixed marriage with an Irish-Catholic woman. It was the talk of Highland's Catholic community and its Italian Catholics did not approve of it. Then Louis got into the car business and in 1925 applied for a Chevrolet dealership for Highland, but was turned down because he was Italian. He changed his name to Louis Smith and got the dealership, which opened in the village of Highland in 1927 about the time that his son Louis was born. Young Louis later had a marriage, which got the attention of the Highland community, when first he dated Nancy Rathgeb and then when she and her close friend Peggy Relyea, who loved Lindy Paladino, were sent to Europe to think about it. They did and when they got back, married their guys. Louis's and Nancy's wedding was in the Highland Presbyterian Church, which again was news. Louis and Nancy have both passed away and Peggy and Lindy have been wed

for over 65 years. Nancy's first cousin was Dr. Irving Rathgeb of Highland, who died in World War II. She and Louis had four children, the oldest, Steven Rathgeb Smith, was the valedictorian of his high school class, graduated from Brown, earned a doctorate, and is a retired professor from the University of Washington.

There was more local history about diversity. The late Kay Brescia Castano can recall sitting in class at Highland High School in the 1930s and had to listen to bigoted comments about Italian kids from a boy sitting behind her, so she turned around and slammed him hard in his face, shutting him up. He did. She refused to say what his name was.

Frank Brescia was an original member of the Highland Hose Company when it was raising money and building a fire house in Highland about 1916. For the next 20 years not one Italian was accepted into the department because they were all black balled by a department member. That stopped when a youngster by the name of Al Roberts applied. No one knew he was a member of the Roberta family. Blackballs ended after the end of World War II when David Murphy was elected as a member of the Highland Fire Commission and forced the end of the blackball practice. There were non-Italians in Highland, who would not accept that their sister, brother, or cousin had married an Italian, and then would say that a nephew or niece was not their relative. These events were rare as almost all of the new Italian members were welcomed with open arms.

New Paltz had a diversity issue when Julius McClain and his wife in 1950 bought a farm in Gardiner, near their relatives the Gardner family. The McClains and the Gardners are black. The McClains had doctorates in social work. Their daughter Susie was very bright. At New Paltz High School she encountered racist teachers, who were southerners. Her parents transferred her to Oakwood and the teachers, who had been a problem, were not rehired for the next year. She then went to

Sarah Lawrence College, where she made national news when she became the first black student to be the president of the student counsel of a college with a predominantly white student body. After graduating she worked in Boston, married a professor from MIT, and became an associate dean at Harvard. Her cousin, Ann Marie McLain of Highland is a graduate of Williams College and has a Masters degree in education from Harvard.

There are other local diversity stories.

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Religious community meets to discuss refugee resettlement

They gathered together, from diverse backgrounds and religions, to find out how to help refugees coming to the Hudson Valley. "These are people fleeing persecution," said Brianne Casey.

Casey is the community and ecumenical engagement coordinator for the Immigrant and Refugee Program of the Church World Service, a global humanitarian organization serving as one of nine refugee resettlement agencies in the U.S. The agency has set up an office in Poughkeepsie to resettle refugees from Syria and other countries beginning in January.

"There are now an estimated 65 million displaced people around the world," Casey said. "This is greater than at any time since WWII."

Casey met with local religious leaders to discuss the resettlement program at a meeting sponsored by the Greater Newburgh Interfaith Council at St. George's Episcopal Church on Thursday.

"We're expecting 80 individuals in the coming year," said Casey, from countries including Syria, Iraq and the Democratic Republic of Congo. Each family will receive resettlement services through the Poughkeepsie office, she said.

"CWS Poughkeepsie will offer newly arrived refugees comprehensive case management and employment services aimed at building a foundation for long-term self-sufficiency and success in the U.S.," CWS states. "Services will entail basic-needs support, case management, cultural orientation, health access assistance, job preparation and placement help."

The agency will match families with "welcoming teams" - formed by community leaders, religious groups and

others - to assist in the first four months of their arrival, Casey said. "This country was founded on religious freedom and diversity," she said. "We can share that message with them."

Casey said team trainings will take place in December and January. Melody

Rashada asked what the main concerns are in trying to resettle the families. Casey replied that each refugee must be thoroughly vetted before entering the country, which helps a great deal to streamline the process.

Communities have shown an "outpouring of support" for the program, Casey added. "I really think refugees do benefit the community," she said. "They'll be shopping in stores, renting apartments... paying taxes."

Approximately 85,000 refugees came to the U.S. from 79 countries last year, Casey said. The majority of the refugees came from war-torn countries such as Syria, Iraq and Somalia.

CWS is seeking community interpreters who speak languages including Arabic, French and Swahili to assist in the resettlement process. The agency is also hiring people to staff the new Poughkeepsie office. "There are lots of opportunities for folks in Newburgh to get involved," Casey said.

The Initiative seeks to encourage victims to report crimes committed against them; to assist victims to understand what is happening in their cases; and to achieve more just outcomes in criminal cases where immigrants have been victimized.

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Valley Central seeks Healthy Kids nutrition grant

Children in the Valley Central School District could soon have the chance to take part in a complimentary after-school program that focuses on reading skills and nutrition. The district announced at its Nov. 14 board meeting that it has applied for a state grant to be part of the Healthy Kids, Healthy New York program, and if Valley Central is selected, eligible elementary school students could take part in the after-school sessions. The participants receive a healthy snack each day, and the kids engage in various educational and physical activities.

The program has been implemented successfully in Highland Falls, and Valley Central has been working with the program on a pay-as-you-go basis in East Coldenham. If the grant is approved, the Healthy Kids initiative would be coming to the district for a free, five-year run. "It would be for 30 kids," Superintendent John Xanthis said of the enterprise. "They pay for the teachers, and they use local people first. They have someone to oversee it. It's 10 weeks, five days a week, three hours a day, and they do two sessions. It's about literacy. They do a pre-

test, and they've found that in 10 weeks they can raise scores by a minimum of half a grade."

The grant application for the initiative has already gone out, and the five-year term would begin next year if it's approved. "The kids go there every day from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m.," Xanthis said. "There's some homework help, they do enrichment activities. They bring people in for musical-type things. Every once in awhile they take them on a road trip on Fridays. They interview the parents and the family, so it's really a well-run program. They've had great success."

Indian Point

New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo has long called for the shuttering of the Indian Point Nuclear Facility as a litany of safety incidents at the site have raised concerns about the possibility of a nuclear incident taking place in the shadow of the country's largest city. An oil spill at the Buchanan plant in October was the latest accident at the 50-year-old power facility. But New York City wouldn't be the only place affected by a major incident at the site.

If a serious accident at the nuclear plant caused evacuations in the region, the parking lot at the High

School/Middle School site could be used as a staging ground to deal with a potential emergency. Brendan Casey, the Orange County Commissioner of Emergency Services, is asking to use the lot as a landing site in the case of an accident at the nuclear facility, which Xanthis notes is only 14 miles from the district as the crow flies. In the case of an emergency, the school grounds could be commandeered by the county anyway, so the district decided to work with the department.

The district could approve the plan at an upcoming meeting. Valley Central has been in talks with the agency (which will carry out emergency drills at the school) for the past year. "They have to apply to the state for approval, but they came to us," Xanthis said. "They needed a site, and asked us if we'd be willing to do that. They will do all the training, and we'll have some of our people there to see it and witness it. We know if it ever happened we wouldn't have a big role, but we'd certainly be there to open the building or get them whatever they needed. It's very well planned."

Capital project update

The board meeting also included a presentation from Barone Construction Group and Bernier, Carr & Associates, as the contractors provided an update on the district's capital project. The first phase of the project saw the team rid Berea Elementary of asbestos, and new bathrooms, floors, ventilators and heating systems were also installed at the school. A total of 21 classrooms at Berea were remediated over the summer.

With the first round of the construction finished, the district will have between \$11.4 and \$12 million to complete the second and final phase of the work. The second phase will include new windows throughout Berea Elementary, and the High School will also receive new windows and revamped bathrooms and locker rooms. The district is waiting for the go-ahead from the State Education Department for the second part of the renovations, which would start at the end of the school year. "What we completed this summer is done, so they're just doing the paperwork and they reconciled the money," Xanthis said. "We're waiting for the state approval for phase two, then the planning for that will start."

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Orange County Fuel Fund offers home heating assistance

The Orange County Fuel Fund, a partnership between Orange County Government and United Way of the Dutchess-Orange Region, is now accepting applications from Orange County residents who need assistance to pay a portion of their home heating expenses, but who do not qualify for the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP).

“As winter approaches, many Orange County residents are beginning to think about the reality of heating expenses,” said Jeannie Montano, President & CEO of United Way of the Dutchess-Orange Region. “Consumers at risk should find out if they are eligible for assistance through the Orange County Fuel Fund, so they do not have to make the difficult choice between heating their homes or other basic necessities. Last winter, thanks to funding from the Orange County Government, the Fuel Fund contributed almost \$55,000 to help 372 households stay warm.”

Orange County residents may apply for a one-time annual assistance grant to pay for all types of home heating fuel expenses including electric, natural gas, kerosene, oil, and propane. Grant amounts range from \$700.00 to \$1100.00, depending on the type of heating fuel used. Grants to applicants who are eligible for heating assistance will be paid upon approval directly to the consumer’s heating provider. The Orange County Fuel Fund operates on a first-come, first-served basis and is not set up as an emergency fund.

Carolyn* and her husband John*, 79-year-old residents of the New Hampton/Middletown area, found themselves making the choice between necessities and paying for heat and each winter found John cutting trees in his back yard to feed their wood stove for warmth as they could not afford fuel. The grant from the Orange County Fuel Fund was a “life saver.” Even though they were reluctant to apply for help as they had always been self-sufficient,

during the application process they were relieved to hear that this grant was a “hand-up, not a hand-out” and are incredibly thankful to both United Way and the Orange County Government for this needed support. (*not their real names)

Each year, the Fuel Fund eligibility requirements change, so if you applied in the past and did not receive a grant, please apply again. Raymond, a senior citizen from Middletown, was not eligible in 2015 and went without fuel all February when it was so cold. He said he was afraid he’d catch pneumonia and that his pet companions would die. Although his neighbors gave him electric blankets and heaters his income was \$75 too much to qualify for the Fuel Fund. Pat Fayó, Director of Energy Initiatives at United Way, called him last fall when the income guidelines changed and Raymond qualified for assistance for winter 2016. He now calls her his “guardian angel,” as he doesn’t think he could have gone through another winter running out of fuel during the coldest month. “United Way, Orange County and Pat

Fayo really care about people.”

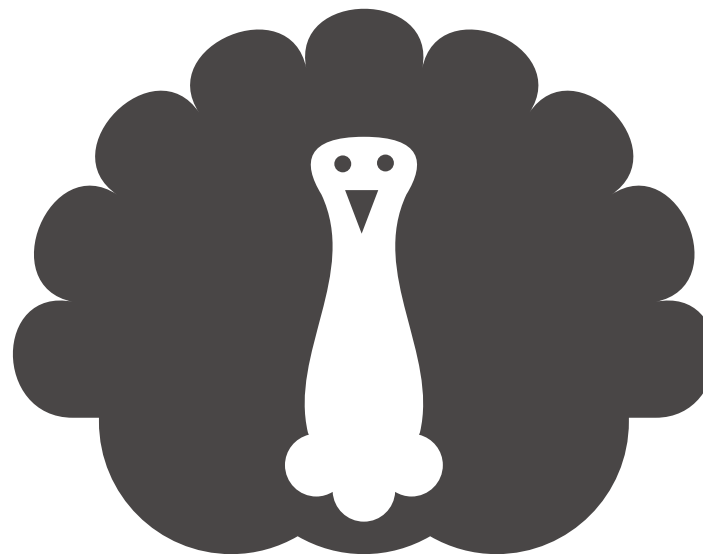
Orange County Fuel Fund personnel also can help with HEAP, SNAP, and Medicaid applications.

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The Table is set for Thanksgiving

On a Friday afternoon, plates piled high with perhaps a turkey and fig Panini or truffle burger arrived with all kinds of fries—eggplant, green bean, pickle, or other—at tables of people who had been to The Table, in Montgomery, in previous locations and incarnations. Or The Table had traveled to them, whether with a whole “Thanksgiving to go” or catered dinner. Plus, a few diners had just happened in, noticing the sign and ample parking.

“There’s mostly people I know here, because people come back” said Ryan Mayo, owner of Take Flight Aviation at Orange County Airport. He brings his clients there, and the trio of chefs who own The Table, Philip Hopkins, his wife Michelle, and her identical twin Faith, will cater his Christmas party for the fourth time this year.

“I like their cakes,” Mayo said. “They look artificial, but they taste good.”

The chef trio met at the New England Culinary Institute in 1997, and after graduation, they opened Culinary Creations on Main Street in Pine Bush. But that was too small, said Phil, so they moved to Orange County Airport.

“That was good at the beginning,” he said. “But we wanted to close at times for catering, and they wanted us open for the pilots.”

So on October 21, they opened on Main Street in Montgomery, which is where they had wanted to open 10 years before.

“We go wherever Phil goes. We went to Pine Bush” said Lori Bickel, eating shrimp tacos. She also likes the eggplant wrap with red roasted peppers, balsamic dressing, asiago cheese, and chimichurri aioli.

“Nearby, Tim and Laura Hendrickson ate fish and chips wraps.

“Phil keeps saying he’ll take them off the menu, because that’s all we eat,” said Lauren. However, he makes grilled cheese sandwiches, not on the menu, for their children, Ella, 4, and Carter, 7, she said.

The Hendricksons serve The Table’s Thanksgiving to go at home, picking it up the day before, along with the centerpiece, Lauren said.

“She told them she made it!” said Tim.

“Everyone ate all the cranberry walnut bread,” said Lauren, “and they wondered why I didn’t have more.”

“My uncle took a whole plate of mashed potatoes, dug a whole in the

middle and poured in gravy,” said Tim. “He did that twice.”

“The stuffing is unique,” said Lauren.

Phil says their menu items evolve with food trends, “what makes people happy.”

“It’s casual contemporary American,” he said.

Growing up in Peru, New York, in the Adirondacks, he began cooking with his grandmother’s recipe for ginger cookies that he has since elaborated on. His first job, at 14, was at the Noonmark Diner, making 100 pies a day, and then, by the end of high school, working breakfast

and dinner shifts.

“Everything was made from scratch. I fell in love with the food business,” he said.

Meanwhile, growing up in Fairfield, Connecticut, says Michelle, “My sister and I started out making tuna fish salad with our grandmother, simple and not many ingredients. But it gave us the push to want to create. We spent many hours making stone soup with rocks and water, and playing in the tub, cooking up a storm with bubbles and bowls. That evolved into baking cookies on weekends and finding new ways to create simple dishes with few ingredients. When we were old enough, we took on the tradition of making pierogies during the holidays, using hand written, handed down recipes for filling.”

Phil and the twins found each other at New England Culinary Institute in Essex Junction, Vermont, in 1997. Afterward, he went on to icing cakes in Troy, New York, while they made pastries in Great Barrington, Massachusetts. They finally came together again in Montgomery. He was waiting tables at Perk-A-Deli Diner in Newburgh when he met Megan Devitt, who had just bought Winding Hills Golf Course.

“We all started working for Megan and eventually ran the restaurant for her,” said Phil. “I would say Megan has been the biggest influence on our career. She had a way of creating a unique menu with quality ingredients. Even back in the late 90’s she believed in sourcing ‘local.’”

He explained how they develop a menu.

“The three of us sit down and talk about what we are currently doing, what’s working, what’s selling, and what we want to change. We make sure every menu item has a balance of flavors and textures. A dish like the Blueberry Mahi Salad, was put on our menu to appeal to a healthier diner. We chose mahi over salmon because salmon has become expected on a menu. We chose blueberries because they have a tart freshness to them, and avocado brings healthy fat to a mild fish.”

As for their own meals, Phil says, “We eat a lot of salad. The three of us aren’t fancy when it comes to food. We like fresh, simple and easy. I personally love a romaine salad with a piece of salmon on it, sliced banana and jalopenos. Weird right? But if we had to pick a favorite food, we all unanimously say, CAKE.”

"They have never ever, ever, ever made us feel like outsiders; right from the beginning and it increases. We have felt drawn in, loved, friendship [and] all of the good things you could possibly feel from every one of you," she said.

Deeprise said she feels very appreciated, "overly sometimes for every single thing, the littlest things that I've done and total forgiveness for the mistakes I've made."

Deeprise joined the ECC at a time when interest was waning and membership was dwindling, claiming that she was "just a cheerleader" while it was Maguire's "force of personality" that has helped the ECC grow and move forward.

"It has become the right size and has been joined by the right people, people who knew so much more about the signs, the effects [and] the impact on the environment and how to take care of it," she said.

Deeprise urged the Town Board to utilize the accumulated knowledge of the ECC and not to think

of them as "unthinking tree huggers. They are people versed in the science and the impact and the effect of people on the environment. Please draw them into every decision you make...because it's a tremendous resource."

Supervisor Paul Hansut urged the public to also acknowledge Maguire's service to the community.

"He did take over a committee that had three or four and it's grown [and] bringing in people from the community who have moved here," he said. "You should be commended on your work, so thank you."

Swashbuckling Tales of a Civil War Naval Hero

At the November program of the Town of Lloyd Historical Preservation Society, speaker Jamie Malanowski told his audience that the life of his subject, Civil War Hero Will Cushing, was like a comic book with a new adventure in each episode. Speaking without slides, Malanowski drew detailed word pictures of Cushing's life from his rascally childhood to his bold and daring naval escapades.

A serious historian and satirical novelist, Malanowski was researching his subject for his book, *Commander Will Cushing: Daredevil Hero of the Civil War*, when he got sudden insight from a surprising source, an old Star Wars movie featuring a teen-age James Kirk, who was an underachiever, raced an old spaceship, flunked his courses, and got into bar fights. "Oh my God," thought Malanowski, "That's Will Cushing. Will Cushing is Captain Kirk."

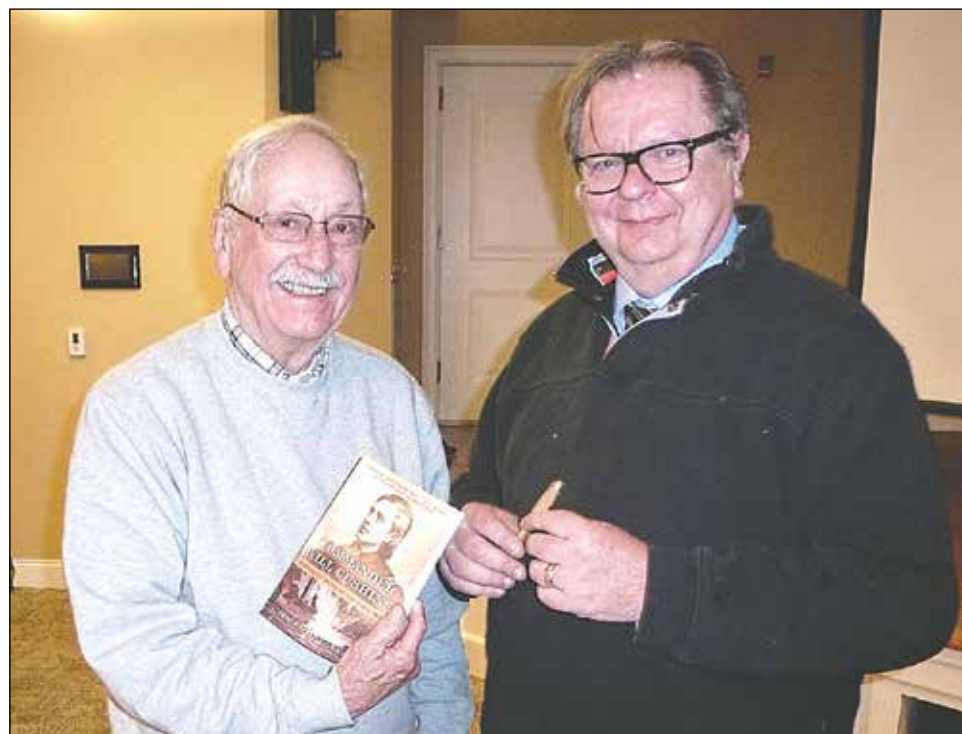
In Fredonia NY, where the young Will's mother moved her family from Wisconsin after Will's father's death, Will Cushing was known as the "pride and plague of all who knew him," Malanowski said. Among his exploits: driving his wagon up and down the street, too fast around the corners; taking a sailboat out on the lake in stormy weather; and chasing snakes. "If the snake was hiding in a hole, he'd go right in after it," Malanowski declared.

Will was the undisputed leader of a group of boys, some of whom – including his own brother Alonzo – were older than he. There were two schools in Fredonia, and Will attended the one where his mother taught. His school let the kids out a little earlier, and Will would go over to the other school and whistle at the window until his friends there got up and left before they were dismissed, to play in the schoolyard, often practicing military drills. Finally the teacher there complained to Will's mother.

According to Malanowski, Ma Cushing – a single mother of three sons and a daughter and stepmother of six older children from her husband's first marriage – retorted, "If you can't control your class, don't complain to me."

Ma Cushing had some important relatives, including a cousin who was able to get an appointment to the Naval Academy in Annapolis for Will and to West Point for his brother Alonzo. That was quite an accomplishment on Will's behalf since he was only 15 at the time, the youngest student ever to attend. But not even the Academy could not turn the young Will into a serious student.

"Will became the school's designated joker, distinguishing himself only in

demerits," Malanowski said. A typical Cushing prank: Once, the midshipmen were drilling under the direction of an Army sergeant who stuttered and could not get out the word "Halt." So Will led his classmates right into a river.

Midshipman Will Cushing survived being caught drawing a cartoon of a donkey and labelling it "Professor Rogers drawn from life." But that same Prof. Rogers, a strict disciplinarian and descendant of a noted naval family, finally found a way to oust young Will shortly before graduation when Will failed a Spanish midterm. It was an ignominious first for Will Cushing – nobody had ever before been kicked out of the Academy for failing Spanish.

Not even Ma Cushing's well-connected relatives could fix this one, Malanowski noted. Although another of her cousins took Will's case to the Secretary of the Navy, the secretary said there was nothing he could do. So Will went home, but not for long.

Civil War broke out and Will was invited back into the Navy at the lowly rank of master's mate. The duties were not very exciting – things like night watch and rowing into the middle of the bay looking for smugglers. But Will did as he was told, and as the war heated up his orders and opportunities changed. As he Malanowski told his hero's war stories, Malanowski's anecdotes changed from tales of youthful pranks to accounts of valor and derring-do. They frequently

sounded more daring and dangerous than those of his centuries-later fictional counterpart, Star Wars' Captain Kirk.

When the Army and Navy planned a joint operation in Central Virginia, Cushing was on a small gun boat that sailed down a narrow, overgrown, snaky river, thick with roots and vines, to get behind the Confederate troops. But the Union Army didn't attack from the front, and the Rebels turned and fired on the small boats at their backs. Cushing's little supply boat happened to be carrying a Howitzer tied to its bulkhead. Cushing cut it loose and fired at the Confederate troops. That was the first time he got mentioned for special merit in a naval dispatch.

From then on those mentions happened time and time again, when he was commended for initiative, valor, and creativity. Soon he got command of his own little boat, charged with going up and down winding rivers to do what damage he could – from burning buildings to freeing slaves. Once he got caught, and he and his crew loaded their gun boat with bombs and rowed away. They detonated the bombs when the Confederates boarded the abandoned boat.

Cushing's crowning achievement was the sinking of the Confederate's most successful ship, the ironclad Albemarle. The sinking of the Albemarle appears in most Civil War history books, but the way Malanowski told it probably includes some features you won't find everywhere.

The first plan was for Cushing and his people to sneak up to the Albemarle in two Indian rubber boats and plant a bomb. But when Cushing went to the New York Navy Yard to get the boats – well let Malanowski tell it his way: "You all know you can't tell a New Yorker anything," he stated with a big grin.

"The Navy Yard guy says, 'No, you want cutters and spar torpedoes' [bombs attached to the ends of long poles attached to the carrying boats].

"What do you detonate them with?" Cushing asked.

"Pull this little string here," was the reply. "You can test them on the Hudson."

So, although almost none of the ones Cushing tested worked, he agreed to the change in plan. "But as they got close to the Albemarle," said Malanowski, "a good Confederate dog started barking: Woof y'all, woof, woof." People woke up and lit a big bonfire. By the light of the fire, Cushing could see that the Albemarle was protected by a log boom. Cushing went around it, looking for a chink, and finally just charged it with the cutter, full speed ahead – only to get stuck right under the guns. While Cushing and crew tried to place their bomb under it, the captain of the Albemarle tried to get his guns in place. Cushing set off the torpedoes just as the Albemarle's guns fired. Cushing and his crew jumped in the river and began swimming, while the Albemarle remained upright with a big hole in its side – eventually to sink. Unfortunately, many of Cushing's crew died, but Cushing himself managed to swim ashore, eventually steal a boat, and arrive back at the base of the Union Navy to fireworks, congratulations, and soon a promotion to lieutenant commander. He received a Thanks of Congress, an award even higher than the Medal of Honor and usually reserved for senior officers.

In response to audience questions, Malanowski ended his upbeat and entertaining presentation on a sad note. The bold and heroic young officer died at 34, the speaker said, not of any military disaster, but instead, according to official records of the day, driven mad by the pain of rheumatism of the hip. He had packed a lot of living into a very few years.

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After reaching the state Class B semis in the 2015/2016 season, Marlboro's girls' basketball team returns with three starting players that helped the team go that far less than eight months ago.

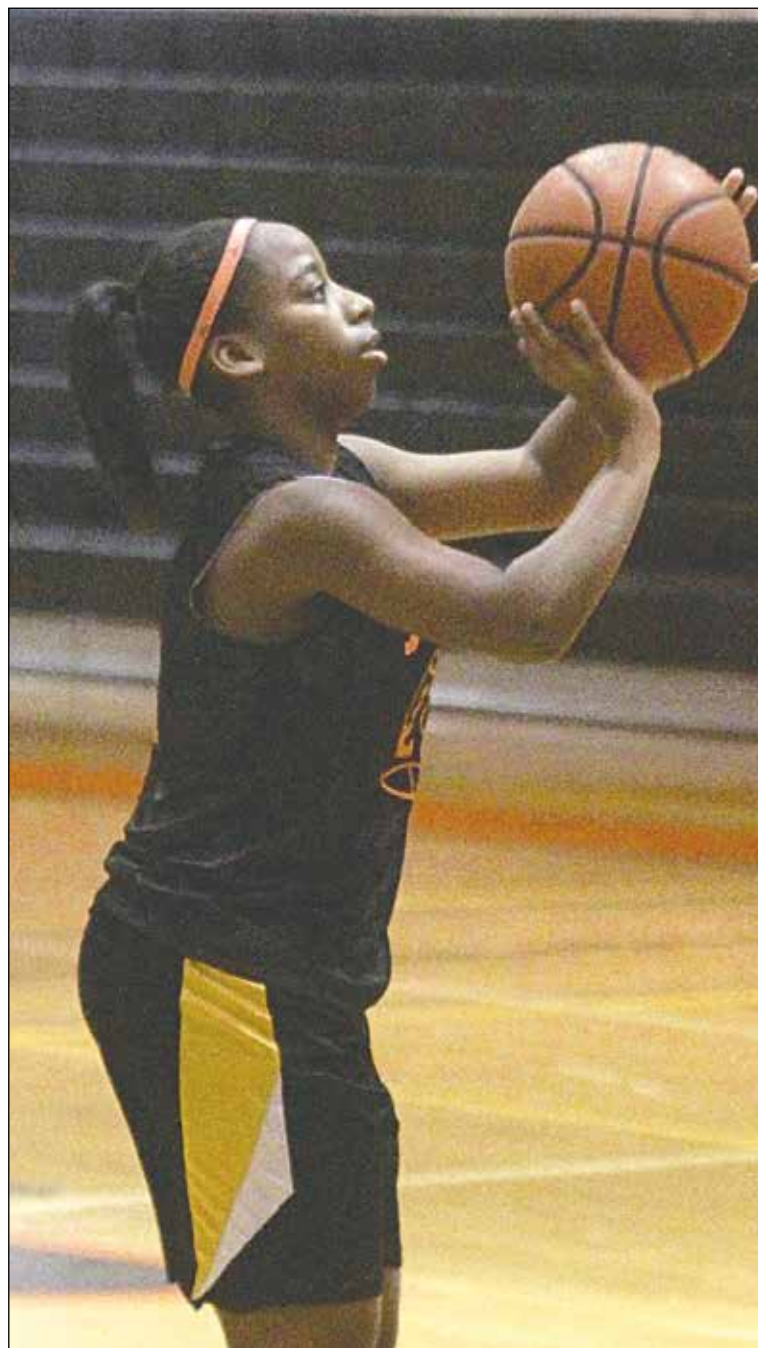

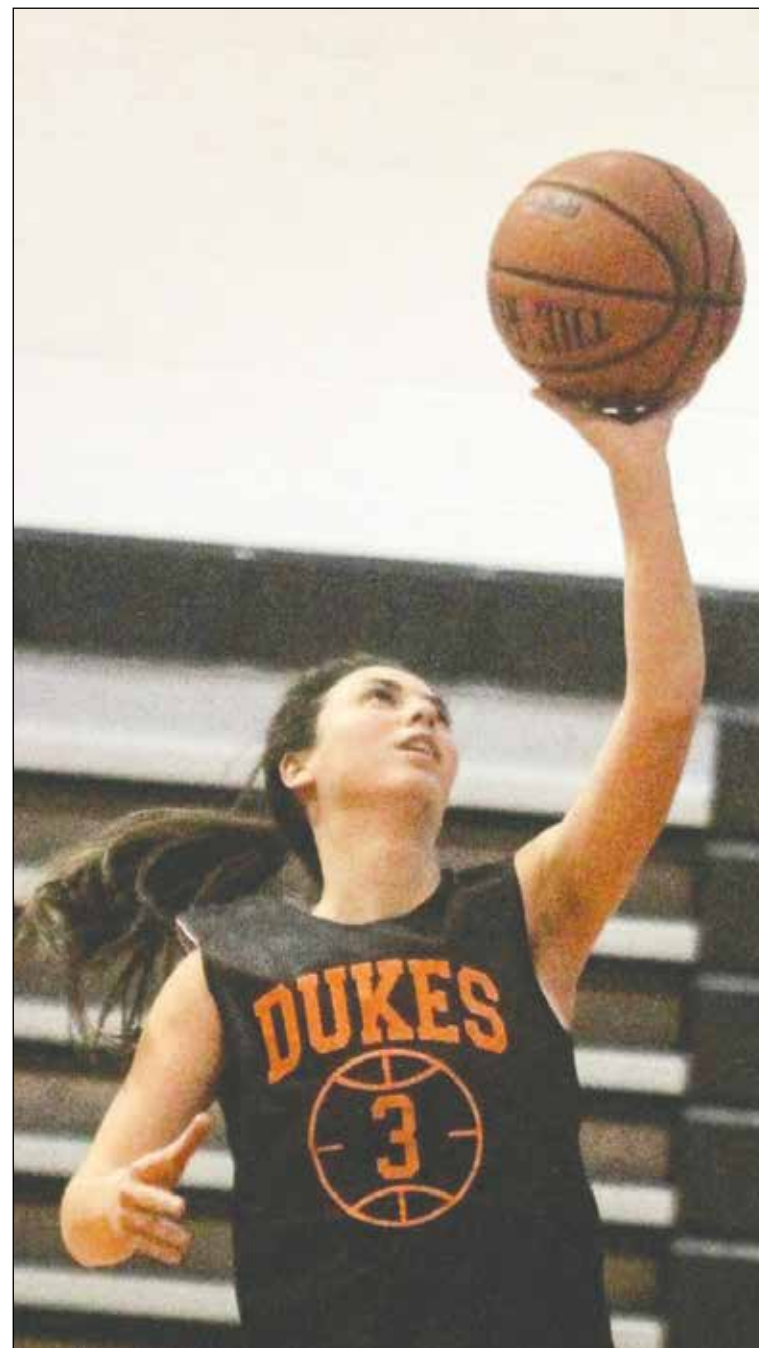


Talaya Lewis, a junior, returns to play guard for the Dukes.
