County budget work underway

Stone County Quorum Court officials are assembling a 2021 budget much as they would a jigsaw puzzle as a result of a new mandate taking the hourly minimum wage to \$11.

Justice of the Peace and Budget Committee Chairman Stan Townsend said there were "late nights and long hours" that went into the new year's budget proposal that leaves just under \$30,000 in projected carryover.

The overall budget is about \$3.2 million.

"On a budget this size, that's pretty tight," Townsend said. "It's almost nothing."

The minimum wage mandate complicates the county's wage structure bringing low-seniority employees near the same wage as others with more experience, sometimes eliminating the gap that would normally exist. To retain a fair difference, Townsend said the committee recommended a 3 percent across-the-board raise for all county employees, which he acknowledged made the budget tight.

As a partial offset to

the increases, the court will entertain a proposal to eliminate part of a past wage and salary program that increased hourly wages by 15 cents and 10 cents respectively at 90 days and 12 months.

Fee increases in another area will make up the difference in the overall budget picture.

The court approved a 4 percent tonnage rate increase for sanitation services to offset a disparity between disposal costs and billing over the last four years.

It means a 3.5 cent per pound increase on large-volume tonnage to governmental agencies and private entities. Bag rates of \$2 per bag, or a maximum of \$5.41 for 160 pounds or less will remain the same.

Townsend said Covid-induced reductions in recycling have contributed to a 12 percent tonnage increase over last year, with another 6 percent projected for next year. The rate increase will take disposal charges to just more than \$70 per ton.

JPs will vote on the 2021 budget during the December meeting.

In other business at the regular meeting last week, the court:

- approved Christmas bonuses for full-time and part-time employees at \$300 and \$150, respectively.

- heard a jail progress report from County Judge Stacey Avey who said construction may begin as early as March. Avey said builders are studying the possibility of steel, unit-type cells for the jail.

- approved a fee of \$54.50 per day for housing "non-county" inmates. The move is prompted by actions of the Mountain View City Council and its desire to withdraw from an interlocal agreement regulating dispatch services and inmate housing. The agreement is set to terminate in February.

- agreed to purchase a one-ton cab and chassis from Mountain View Chevy in the amount of \$40,491, at state bid

Mountain View School District plans to request millage increase

Mountain View School District will propose a millage increase next spring in an attempt to head off an anticipated shortfall in the operating budget.

Supt. Brent Howard said the request – an increase of 7 mills on Stone County property tax – will most likely go before voters in May.

Arkansas has a constitutionally mandated minimum millage rate (or property tax rate) that school districts must levy for the maintenance and operation of schools. This rate is set at 25 mills and is called the Uniform Rate of Tax (URT).

Mountain View School District has a millage rate of 28.91 mills, which is the second lowest in the state and has not been increased in 16 years, according to Howard.

He noted that mandated teacher raises, along with minimum wage increases, are taking a toll.

"We've got to do something because over the 16 years, we've been stretching it, and it's just not working anymore," he said.

"The best figures that I've gotten for us to sustain where we're at is to go up 7 mills. Even at that, that doesn't even

put us at the state average," he said.

Howard said it has been remarkable what the county schools have been able to do with the district's relatively low millage, including their good test scores.

Howard provided the school board with copies of a letter to the public on the issue, and they briefly discussed it last week.

Board member Eric Perry questioned some points raised in the letter, including the mention of "operational inefficiencies."

"Maybe I'm looking at that too critically, but to me before we ask for a millage increase we have to first have our house in order," Perry said.

Board member Mark Bauerlein said he understood Perry's point that it makes it sound like the district is doing something wrong. But he feels the inefficiencies referenced in the letter result from the district's having three campuses and having to provide money for all of them.

"I mean, you can sugar coat it," Bauerlein said. "I run a business ... and you know from the way we're spread out it can't be efficient. If it were a pure business deal, a businessman would have already shut it

down and done something different years ago when they saw the losses start coming."

Howard then asked the board whether they wanted to pursue a federal grant for a safe room on the Rural Special campus, which was also discussed at last month's meeting.

Constructing a safe room at Fox has been a goal of the district for several years. If this grant is secured, the district will be committed to matching a portion of the funds, and construction cost is uncertain.

Lori Dobbins expressed some concern about committing to the project and said it would be good if they could delay it for some time and see what the community does on the millage.

"Bringing the elephant into the room here, the whole thing that concerns me, here we are wondering what we're gonna do with that school, and then we're gonna build something and we're gonna have that there. And then if it doesn't work out and we don't get the millage ... now we've got even more into it."

Howard said he could inquire about whether the grant might still be available later.

However, Dobbins made a motion that they

proceed with the grant application, and this was approved.

In other business, the board:

- approved a proposed after-school feeding program, which will provide evening meals for all students at no cost to the district. Meals will be sent home with students who are at school, and virtual students will have the opportunity to pick them up each day. This program will continue through the COVID-19 pandemic. It is subject to approval by the Arkansas Department of Education's Child Nutrition Unit.

- approved a \$500 Christmas bonus for all 246 staff members.

Howard commended the staff on how hard they have worked this year and recommended the bonuses. Bauerlein also commented on how hard the teachers have worked.

- hired Lisa Friddle as janitor at Rural Special and accepted the resignation of Tony Conley as bus driver.

- heard a report on enrollment: 1,594, which was down about four from the previous month. Howard said kids are coming and going. No bullying reports have been filed.

- approved one student transfer from Mountain View to Timbo.

City proceeds with citation plans

Mayor Roger Gardner plans to continue working with the city's sanitation department to create a trash citation ordinance to curb theft of services and illegal dumping.

Gardner explained businesses lease dumpsters and are having them filled and overflowing with trash from people in the county.

While he hates to fine people for throwing away trash, he explained it's not fair to the one who is paying to use the dumpster. He said businesses need to place "not for public use" on their

dumpsters, noting there is already wording in place allowing officers to cite offenders with theft of services.

Also, some households are putting out as many as 34 bags of trash to be picked up, he noted. The sanitation department recommended residential pickup to include a six-bag limit (40-gallon bags or equivalent), a 40-pound weight limit on trash cans, and no loose trash. Sanitation department employees reported trash cans being very heavy, requiring three men to lift them. Some cans are often full of cat litter, and some soaked with rain water.

Gardner noted that he doesn't want to raise

rates because a few people are abusing the system. He also noted the county has been discussing raising the sanitation tipping fee.

Gardner asked the council if the ordinance should include a warning first and then a citation.

Councilman Dana Woods said the council has been discussing the issues for months and needs to "go ahead and do something." He recommended Gardner to continue working with the sanitation department to create an ordinance and then bring it before the council for a vote.

Also at the meeting, the council agreed to move forward with building a basketball court and applying for grants to fund the tennis court rehab. Gardner said there are basketball goals on the tennis court and kids play out there a lot. He said he would like to see a new basketball court built behind the walking trail bathrooms. The council agreed to move forward with the plans. Woods stated the county should be asked to help fund the project.

In other business, the council:

- agreed to purchase a one-ton cab and chassis from Mountain View Chevy in the amount of \$40,491, at state bid

price. The truck will be used by the water department.

- agreed to move forward with having the old downtown water tower painted. The estimate for the tower to be power-washed and painted is \$58,000. Gardner said contrac-

tors will come to view the tower before placing bids. He also noted the water tower is not in service.

- agreed to pursue details of how the city can legally sell land. Bill and Kathy Oliphant

Issue with land purchase, water rates topic for city

The Fifty Six City Council debated problems with the purchase of a tract of land being sought for the pump station to provide water flow from the connection to the Mountain View water system during its regular meeting last week. Residents were also provided with a copy of new water rates that will go into effect when the new line goes into service.

Mayor Earnestine McDaniel reported that there are delays in the process of purchasing the 100 ft. x 100 ft. tract from Don Clements. The site is on Buck Pond Road, which is a county road with 60-foot easement. County Judge Stacey Avey had agreed that if the land purchase was not complete by the time the pump is ready to install, it could be placed temporarily, and possibly permanently, within the county road right-of-way.

Council members Aaron Byrd and Jake Owens asked if the county right-of-way plan could be pursued as the permanent solution and the land purchase be dropped. McDaniel said that Avey was to meet with Water Superintendent Delvin Freeman and Glen Crymes of the county's emergency management office to look at a potential site. It was requested that she ask about it being permanent.

The necessary permanent easement from the U.S. Forest Service for lines crossing federal land is under 30-day public input period, McDaniel said.

With Arkansas National Guard members planning to conclude their water hauling service at the end of the month, timing to get the temporary line in service is crucial. City Recorder-Treasurer Christina Byrd urged residents to contact the governor's office and request the service be extended.

the city has been able to achieve progress in eight to nine months what normally takes two to four years because of the emergency situation. The amount of loan on the \$2 million project will be less than \$400,000 at 1.75 percent interest.

In response to water customer Ralph Marshall who said the city was being run incompetently and officials should have acted sooner to solve the water issue, Aaron Byrd (the fire chief who was recently appointed to the council to fill a vacancy) noted that an emergency could not be declared until the system physically ran out of water.

Another resident asked about rates going up, and McDaniel provided information showing current rates and increased rates that were determined by the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission. The base rate inside the city limits will increase from \$29.31 per 1,000 gallons to \$45.50 per 1,000 gallons. The base rate outside the city limits will increase from \$30.68 to \$52. Similar increases are designated for three extensions outside the city limits and

for commercial customers.

Later in the meeting, incoming council member Megan Freeman suggested the community could have fundraisers to help pay down loans and meet other obligations. McDaniel said residents being off work during the pandemic might limit their ability to contribute. Aaron Byrd agreed, saying he can't get residents to pay fire dues. "Everyone is squeezing money." McDaniel suggested waiting until the final numbers are in for the system and consider holding fundraisers in the spring.

Freeman also posed other questions regarding city hall hours, and the possibility of using the city truck to help with hauling trash when the trash truck is out of service.

Action needed to avoid fiscal distress

In recent years, Mountain View School District has experienced a steady decline in operational and building fund balances. The decline in balances does not pose an immediate threat to the financial security of the district, but the financial shortfalls must be addressed at a steady and calculated pace to avoid future fiscal problems.

The financial decline is not a product of mismanagement of funds but a combination of funding shortages due to a loss of students, operational inefficiencies inherent in the structure of the district, inefficiencies in the funding formula for small schools within a district, and low millage rates.

The sum of the operating fund and building fund has declined from \$7,153,000 in 2017 to \$5,285,000 in 2020 and is projected to drop to \$3,800,000-\$4,000,000 at the end of the current school year. At this rate, it is very likely that the district will be in some level of fiscal distress as recognized by the Arkansas Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) in 2-3 years.

Depending on the level of financial instability, DESE will be involved in the financial decisions of the district. The DESE fiscal distress levels range from a watch list to a complete state takeover. In the last levels of fiscal distress, the State Board of Education has the statutory authority to terminate the contract of the Superintendent and remove the local board. State takeover is very unlikely, but intermediate steps before the takeover are very possible without some corrective action.

The funds that must be monitored closely are the operation fund and building fund in order to get an accurate picture. Both of these funds must be monitored individually and cumulatively. The operating fund is based on a funding matrix that is intended to provide each student with an adequate and equitable education. It is calculated on an average daily membership (ADM), and funding amount for each child in the state is the same each year. Local mills above the state required minimum mills (25 mills) can be used for other purposes that are usually unrestricted.

The millage for Mountain View School District is 28.91 and the state average is 38.76. Mountain View's millage rate is among the lowest in the state.

If the district had the state average millage rate, it would generate an additional 1.6 million for the operation of the district based on current assessment and 100% collection. Based on the current financial status and current structure, approximately 7.0 additional mills will be needed to adequately fund the district. This will generate an additional \$1,125,000 for the operation and maintenance.

Local taxes to fund school districts are based on real, personal, and utility assessments and the local millage rate.

A mill equals 0.1 percent of the assessed value. This translates into \$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value. In Arkansas, property is assessed at 20 percent of its market value.

As an example of the financial impact to an individual taxpayer, if the district millage is raised an additional 7.0 mills:

If your real property is valued at: \$100,000, your property should be assessed at 20 percent, and 1 mill would cost you annually \$20.

Taxes owed = (Assessed Value X 20%) X (Millage rate/1000)

Taxes owed = (\$100,000 X 0.2) X (28.91/1000)

Taxes owed = \$578 at current tax rate

Each additional mill will cost \$20 based on a \$100,000 assessment. An additional 7.0 mills will make the total millage for the school district 35.91 which is 2.85 mills below the state average. This increase will cost the individual taxpayer \$140 annually.

Current tax (28.91 mills) - \$578

Tax with additional 7.0 mills - \$140

New tax - \$718 (based on \$100,000 assessment and 35.91 mills)

If the homeowner is eligible for the Homestead Tax Credit, the amount of taxes owed may be reduced by \$375.

Other options to consider to address the financial shortfall include:

- Achieve maximum efficiency with current operating practices and structure
- Compress and freeze the current salary schedule
- Combine schools within the district and the possibility of positions being absorbed or eliminated
- A combination of these options may be more appropriate for the district.

Favorite Christmas things

We're rapidly moving into the holiday season, y'all. Thirty-six shopping days left until Christmas.

By all means, shop local if you can. Local merchants need our help now more than ever. But if you find yourself in a time crunch, feel like you're not ready for the crowds, or just need to make it about convenience this year, these are 15 of my favorite things. Some ideas for family and friends, or a gift to yourself, if you please. I shower myself with gifts some years.

In no particular order:

• **Stainless kitchen bowl set:** I'm a kitchen guy. Cooking is a way to make people happy, and it's also my therapy for the end of a stressful day, or writing or managing some project. There is nothing simpler and more practical than a nice set of stainless bowls for mixing or food prep. They hold up well, clean up well, and they look good as a part of any chef's ensemble. Get a nice set of six for under \$25.

• **Wind chimes:** A few days ago I was standing out on our front porch watching the mighty White River roll along, and there was a steady breeze from the southwest that felt so good. But something was missing. If there is one quality to Round Bottom Valley, it's the quiet. I needed something blowing in the wind to give it just the right accent. \$9 and three days later it arrived. A set of windchimes with just the right tone to add another bit of peace to the valley. I enjoy them enough that I'm ordering a second, larger set with a deeper tone.

• **CupFone by WeatherTech:** This is one of those conveniences I use daily, and wouldn't be without one. WeatherTech is the same company that makes durable, water resistant floor board covers for most vehicles. In recent years, they developed a smart phone display stand that has a custom fit to most vehicle

cup holders. It has every adjustment you need to see your phone's display, and is particularly handy when you're using your phone for directions. I've tried other display mechanisms that attach to your vents and every other place, but they all just make me cuss because none really work. CupFone hasn't let me down yet. Available for around \$35.

• **Bird feeder:** Whether you're just an amateur window watcher, or one who takes birding more seriously, Stone County is a birder's paradise with dozens of species from yellow-billed cuckoos to worm-eating warblers. For your seed feeders, go with standard black-oil sunflower seed available in bulk, or black thistle. These will bring cardinals, tufted titmice, wrens, chickadees, grosbeaks, nuthatches, and many more. The White River valley is prime territory for catching hummingbirds on southern migration during fall. And you can easily make your own food for the hummingbirds. Adequate feeders will range from \$10 to \$100.

• **Garden & Gun magazine subscription:**

A great magazine for rural folks who call the South home. Published six times yearly, *Garden & Gun* has great personality profiles on Southern figures, culture and trends. You'll rediscover old recipes like your grandmother's Watergate salad that you may just want to introduce to the family. Rick Bragg's columns

are always great reading. Subscribe for \$15 a year.

• **Flannel sheets:** Do I really need to say anything else? If we ever install a nap room at the *Stone County Leader*, my bed/rest area will have flannel sheets. I'm not looking for that to happen any time soon, mind you, but when it does, my choice is made. King and queen sets begin in the \$40 range.

• **Battery-powered leaf blower:** Okay, for the longest I had a complex about battery-powered garden tools. Real men use fuel, right. Not necessarily. Battery-powered tools have come a long way. Charges last longer and they are more powerful than ever. And they're clean. My 40-volt blower is perfect for cleaning the front porch and our pavilion deck in seconds. 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

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Options offered to test deer for CWD

News from the Arkansas Game & Fish Commission

The Arkansas Game and Fish Commission is offering a variety of options to have harvested deer tested for chronic wasting disease for free throughout the 2020-21 deer hunting season.

This year, the AGFC will continue its extensive system of drop-off containers throughout the state, as well as its work with taxidermists and regional offices to pull samples for hunters and have them tested. With regional offices and drop-off sites, hunters will have 100 locations around Arkansas to drop off their deer's head for testing. An additional 52 taxidermists also will be able to pull samples for hunters free of charge.

"Last year we took in 6,622 CWD samples from hunters," AJ Riggs, AGFC wildlife health biologist, said. "All testing on deer is completely voluntary, so we are very happy with the number of people taking advantage of the opportunity to have their deer tested."

Although no verified cases of CWD being transmitted to humans currently exist, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention strongly encourage everyone to have deer from a known CWD-positive area tested before consuming the meat. Testing also assists the AGFC with ongoing disease surveillance in the State's deer herd.

It is easy to get a deer tested through a drop-off location. Simply bring the deer's head with 4 to 6 inches of the neck attached and any antlers removed to the location and place it in one of the provided plastic bags with your name and contact information on the card provided. The AGFC will collect these samples and have them analyzed by the Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Commission laboratory. Testing results should be available within two to three weeks.

Test results will be posted through a secure system at www.agfc.com/cwd.

"We also will call the hunter personally for any test that comes back with CWD being detected," Riggs said. "We can make arrangements to dispose of the meat properly for them."

Riggs says staff also will notify hunters via phone if their sample

• How to Walk the Tightrope When Raising Prices

Raising prices can be fraught with risk during good economic times. So what happens if you try to raise prices during bad economic times?

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

Budget issues top agenda

The 2021 Regular Session begins in less than two months. The Arkansas House of Representatives provides the following update on the ongoing budget hearings in preparation for the session.

Pre-session budget hearings have been extended. They began last month and will continue from now to November 19.

This week, members were presented with the General Revenue Forecast and the Governor's Balanced Budget Proposal. The Governor's plan calls for a reduction of sales tax on vehicles priced less than \$10,000. His proposal also calls for a reduction in the income tax rate for new residents moving into Arkansas.

The proposal includes recommendations for one-time funding from the \$240 million expected budget surplus. Those recommendations include a transfer of \$100 million to the Long Term Reserve Fund and a \$30 million transfer to the Department of Commerce for rural broadband.

By law, the governor is required to submit a balanced budget proposal.

While we take the proposal from the executive branch into consideration, appropriation bills and the budget are ultimately drafted and voted on by the legislature.

The House and Senate Education Committees have recommended an increase of \$99.7 million in funding for k-12 education for the next fiscal year.

The committees recommended an increase of \$86.9 million for fiscal year 2023.

Currently, state funding is \$6,985 per student. The committees' recommendation increases the amount to \$7,131 next year and to \$7,281 in Fiscal Year 2023. The committees' proposal is also reflected in the Governor's proposed budget.

This week, the Department of Finance and Administration issued its economic forecast. For the next fiscal year, the department expects state revenue to increase by \$172 million or 3 percent more than the current fiscal year.

The short-term outlook for the Arkansas economy remains mixed.

The forecast states there are noticeable lags in recovery by travel, conventions, and full-service restaurants.

As a reminder, members can begin filing bills for the upcoming legislative session on Monday, November 16.

Proposal would decrease used car tax

The governor presented a balanced budget proposal to the legislature for next fiscal year. It would authorize about \$5.8 billion in spending from the state's general revenue fund, about three percent more than this year.

The legislature has been working on balancing the budgets of state agencies since mid-October.

The final spending plan for Arkansas state government will be set when the legislature adjourns the 2021 regular session. It begins in January.

The governor's plan would reduce taxes by \$50 million a year for people in low and middle income brackets.

Under the governor's plan, the sales tax would go down on purchases of used cars that cost less than \$10,000. Now, used

cars sold for less than \$4,000 are exempt from the sales tax. The new rate would reduce the state sales tax from 6.5 percent to 3.5 percent on used vehicles sold for \$4,000 to \$9,999.

The proposal would encourage upper income families to establish a residence in Arkansas. The top income tax bracket for new residents would be reduced from 5.9 percent to 4.9 percent for the first five years they live in Arkansas.

Legislators questioned the fairness of creating a different income bracket for new residents, when people who have always lived in Arkansas

would pay a higher rate although their income is the same.

Spokesmen for the governor responded by saying that limiting the top bracket at 4.9 percent for new residents would create a clear goal for future reductions for people who have always lived in Arkansas.

When the pandemic hit earlier this year, state budget officials reduced the official forecast, in anticipation of an economic slowdown. Under our balanced budget law, when the economy slows and tax revenue drops off, spending is reduced accordingly. In April the forecast was lowered by more than \$200 million.

The governor's proposed budget would restore many of the spending cuts made necessary in April. Categories that would get funding increases include higher education, health care and human services.

Law enforcement categories scheduled to see increased funding include the state Crime Lab, reimbursements to county jails and crisis stabilization units. The budget for state prisons would increase next fiscal year by 3.9 percent under the governor's proposal, to \$375 million. It has more than 16,000 in custody, with 3,658 staff positions cur-

rently filled.

Community Corrections would get an increase of 6 percent, to \$97 million a year. Its officers supervise offenders on parole and probation. It operates drug courts and six residential treatment facilities. It has 1,304 staff positions now filled. More than 60,000 adult offenders are under the Department's supervision.

Under the governor's recommendation, the Public School Fund, from which state aid is distributed to local school districts, would increase by 1.4 percent, to \$2.25 billion.

The Human Services

Department would get a funding increase of 4.8 percent. It administers Medicaid, services for people with disabilities, long-term care facilities, drug treatment programs and benefits for low-income families such as food stamps.

State support of four-year universities would increase to \$612 million, from \$575 million this year. Support for two-year colleges would increase from \$112 million to \$118 million. In addition, five technical colleges would get a funding increase from \$31 million to \$32 million.
