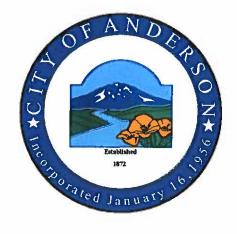

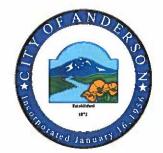

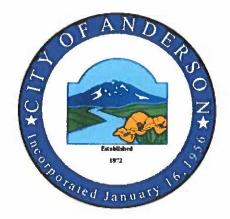

RECOMMENDATION

The City Manager recommends that the City Council:

- 1. Conduct a public hearing to review and finalize through adoption of resolutions, findings of the development impact fees pursuant to Government Code Section 66001(d); and
- 2. Adopt a resolution making findings for unexpended Development Fees in accordance with California Government Code Section 66011, and reviewing and accepting annual Development Fee Disclosure Information for the Corp yard and Police Improvement Fund.
- 3. Adopt a resolution making findings for unexpended Development Fees in accordance with California Government Code Section 66011, and reviewing and accepting annual Development Fee Disclosure Information for the Deschutes Interchange Improvement Fund.
- 4. Adopt a resolution making findings for unexpended Development Fees in accordance with California Government Code Section 66011, and reviewing and accepting annual Development Fee Disclosure Information for the Drainage Improvement Fund.

- 5. Adopt a resolution making findings for unexpended Development Fees in accordance with California Government Code Section 66011, and reviewing and accepting annual Development Fee Disclosure Information for the Traffic Impact Improvement Fund.
- 6. Adopt a resolution making findings for unexpended Development Fees in accordance with California Government Code Section 66011, and reviewing and accepting annual Development Fee Disclosure Information for the Wastewater Capital Improvement Fund.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is required under AB 1600, and a failure to make the listed findings could result in a loss of the development impact fees.

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

AB 1600 (Statutes of 1998, Mitigation Fee Act), codified as Section 66000 et seq. of the California Government Code, regulates how public agencies collect, maintain, and spend impact fees imposed on developers for the purpose of defraying costs of public facilities. It includes requirements for accounting, spending, and annually reporting the fees and related interest earnings, and for findings or refunds if fees remain unspent five or more years after receipt.

Pursuant to Government Code section 66001(d), for the first fiscal year following the first deposit of an impact fee into the designated account or fund, and every 5-years thereafter, the City is required to make the following findings of any portion of an account or fund remaining unexpended, whether committed or uncommitted:

- (A) Identify the purpose for which the fee is to be put.
- (B) Demonstrate a reasonable relationship between the fee and the purpose for which it is charged.
- (C) Identify all sources and amounts of funding anticipated to complete financing in incomplete improvements.
- (D) Designate the dates that the funding will be placed in the appropriate funds.

The annual review of the development impact fees was addressed at the June 2, 2020 regular City Council meeting, pursuant to Government Code section 66001(a), which went into detail about the particular fees. However, in order to ensure compliance with state law, the City Council will need to make these additional findings every five years to ensure the monies are not lost.

For edification, the parks development impact fees are not included in these findings, as the legislature specifically excluded the Quimby Act (which permits the impact fees for parks) from these requirements.

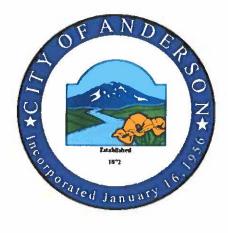

SUBJECT

Introduce an Ordinance amending Chapter 2.50 "Recreation and Parks" of the City of Anderson Municipal Code to remove Parks and Recreation Commission

RECOMMENDATION

The City Attorney recommends that the City Council:

Introduce Ordinance No. 832 (First Reading), Amending Chapter 2.50 "Recreation and Parks" of the City of Anderson Municipal Code to remove Parks and Recreation Commission and set for enactment on September 1, 2020 (second reading).

FISCAL IMPACT

This savings to the General Fund for removing the Parks and Recreation Commission is approximately \$ 3,000.00 annually.

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

In or around 1976, the Anderson City Council created, by ordinance, a Board of Recreation Commissioners, to oversee all matters concerning parks and recreation in the City of Anderson. The powers and duties of these commissioners included coordination with school districts regarding recreation activities, to inspect parks and recreation facilities, to receive

recommendations from the community on parks and recreation matters, and to issue recommendations to the City Council any related policies for adoption, among other tasks.

These commissioners, per section 2.50.040 of the Anderson Municipal Code, are appointed in the following fashion: one voting member appointed by the City Council; one voting member appointed by each school board (Anderson High School District, Cascade Elementary School District, and Happy Valley Union School District- 3 total); and the final commissioner chosen by the other 4 by majority vote.

Since 2017 the Parks Commission has functioned with 4 Commissioners when Mr. Kraft resigned. The City had reached out to possible interested parties and posted the opening with no luck in filling that position. In 2019 City was notified another commissioner would be leaving and a 3rd was unable to attend. As such the Parks Commission has not been able to have a quorum since August 18, 2019. As with some of the other commissions and appointments is it becoming difficult to fill the required positions.

The continued existence of the Parks Commission does place some burdens on staff. The meetings continued to be calendared and agendized, but ultimately result in a cancellation of the meeting due to the lack of quorum. The City Clerk is required to spend time performing these tasks, even though no meeting ever occurs. Similarly, these meetings create conflicts in the calendar, as other events cannot be scheduled to use the Council Chambers at the time to commission is supposed to meet.

The proposed amendment to Chapter 2.50 would eliminate the commission altogether, leaving on a reference to the Recreation Department, which will continue to consist of a Recreation Director, who reports directly to the City Manager. If the motion does not go forward, the commission will continue to exist until enough willing participants can be located to establish a quorum.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANDERSON AMENDING CHAPTER 2.50 "RECREATION AND PARKS" OF THE CITY OF ANDERSON MUNICIPAL CODE TO REMOVE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ANDERSON does hereby find, determine and declare as follows:

WHEREAS, Chapter 2.50 of the Anderson Municipal Code established a Parks and Recreation Commission for the City wherein Commission members are selected as follows: one member by the City Council, one member by the Anderson Union High School District, one member by the Cascade Union Elementary School District; one member from the Happy Valley Union School District, and the final member selected by the other four appointed members; and

WHEREAS, attendance at the Parks and Recreation Commission meetings has been minimal wherein a quorum of the Commission has not existed since August 18, 2019, which prevents the meetings from proceeding forward conducting any business; and;

WHEREAS, staff time is used in preparation for and attendance at these meetings, which becomes a waste of City resources when no meeting occurs; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment removes the Parks and Recreation Commission from the municipal code, effectively dissolving the Commission, and placing the hiring of the Recreation Director under the authority of the City Manager; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Anderson does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 2.50 "Recreation and Parks" of Title 8 "Administration and Personnel" of the City of Anderson Municipal Code is hereby repealed and replaced to read as follows:

Chapter 2.50 - RECREATION AND PARKS

2.50.010 - Established.

To carry out the purposes of this chapter, there is established a recreation department.

2.50.020 - Function.

The functions of the recreation department shall include:

- A. The provision of opportunities through a recreation program for all ages and the administration of such program;
- B. The scheduling of the use of recreation and park facilities;

C. Making recommendations on the operation and maintenance of recreation and park facilities and programs.

2.50.030 - Director.

The recreation department shall be headed by a recreation director hired by the City Manager. They shall be responsible for the direction and control of all functions assigned to that department. The recreation department shall be organized, maintained and operated by the recreation director under the general administrative direction of the city manager.

2.50.040 - Funding.

The cost of the operation of the recreation department shall be funded in accordance with the terms of the joint powers agreement adopted pursuant to Title I, Division 7, Chapter 5, (Sections 6500-6514 inclusive) of the California Government Code.

The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause it to be posted and/or published in accordance with the law.

Chapter 2.50 - RECREATION AND PARKS

I. - Recreation and Parks Commission

2.50.010 - Establishment

The Anderson City Council may establish a Recreation and Parks Commission as necessary to coordinate all of the park and recreation activities of the city and the school districts, other than those activities included within the regular program of activities of the school districts. The Recreation and Parks Commission shall be created by resolution, which will set forth the number of commission members, the terms of the commission members, the manner of appointment, and the responsibilities held by each member.

• 2.50.010 - Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section.

A. "Boards" means the board of trustees of the Anderson Union High School District, Cascade Union Elementary School District and the Happy Valley Union School District.

B. "Commission" means the Anderson recreation and parks commission.

C. "Council" means the city council of Anderson.

D. "Department" means and refers to the administrative structure of the city in specific regards to the recreation and parks department.

- 2.50.020 - Established

There is established a board of recreation commissioners, pursuant to <u>Chapter 6</u>, <u>Division 12</u>, <u>Part 3 of the California Education Code</u>, to be known as the recreation and <u>parks commission</u>.

• -2.50.030 - Composition.

The commission shall consist of five members, and four nonvoting, ex officio members.

2.50.040 - Appointment of members.

One voting member of the commission shall be appointed by the council and three voting members shall be appointed by the boards, one voting member by each board. One voting member shall be appointed by a majority vote of the four members appointed to the commission by the council and boards. One ex officio member shall be appointed by

the council from its membership or staff and three ex officio members shall be appointed by the boards from their membership or staff, each board appointing one member.

• 2.50.050 - Manner of appointment, terms of office, removal of members.

A. The parks and recreation commission members are to serve for terms of three years and are to serve without compensation. Members of the first commission appointed shall determine their respective terms of office by lot, so that two shall serve for a term of one year, one shall serve for a term of two years and one shall serve for a term of three years.

- B. The initial appointment by the commission of one voting member shall be made at the first meeting of the commission following the initial appointment, to expire on the anniversary date one year from the date of appointment.
- C. Each appointment or reappointment made following the above described initial appointments shall be made effective upon the expiration of each initial term respectively and shall be for a term to expire on the anniversary date three years from the effective date of such appointment or reappointment.
- D. Members shall serve to the conclusion of the applicable three-year term or until a successor is named, whichever occurs later in time.
- E. Each ex officio member shall serve at the will of the appointing authority.
- F. Voting members of the commission may be removed by majority vote of the appointing authority.
- G. The appointment of a member to fill a vacancy on the commission shall be for the balance of the unexpired term of the incumbent member.

2.50.060 - Officers—Bylaws—Meetings.

A. The commission shall elect a chairman and vice-chairman from among its regular voting members. The secretary to the recreation and parks director shall serve as secretary to the commission. Officers shall serve for the terms and in the manner set forth in the rules of procedure adopted by the commission.

B. The commission shall adopt rules of procedure providing for the method of electing officers, time and place of regular meetings of the commission, which shall be held at least once each month, and such other rules as may be necessary for the transaction of the business of the commission, and shall keep a public record of its resolutions, transactions, findings and determinations.

2.50.070 - Powers and duties.

The powers and duties of the commission shall be as follows:

- A. To coordinate all of the park and recreation activities of the city and the school districts, other than those activities included within the regular program of activities of the school districts;
- B. To encourage a sound program of parks and playground acquisition, development and maintenance:
- C. To foster close coordination of school and playground development to avoid duplication of facilities;
- D. To interpret the community park and recreation programs to public officials and to the general citizenship in order to promote understanding and financial support from public and private sources;
- E. To recommend to the city council the establishment of general policies with respect to the recreation and parks department;
- F. To consider recommendations and requests originating from any source outside the recreation and parks department;
- G. To make periodic inspections of recreation and park facilities;
- H. To act in an advisory capacity to the city manager in making plans for and conducting recreational activities:
- I. To make such investigations or surveys in the general field of recreation and parks administration as may be deemed advisable by the council or school districts, or as may be deemed advisable by the city administrator, and to fully report its findings and recommendations;
- J. To assist the city council in the acquisition, development, beautification and maintenance of park and recreation facilities in the city, as part of a sound master recreation and park plan, in keeping with the community needs and future growth;
- K. To aid the city council in coordinating the recreation and parks services with the programs of other government agencies and voluntary organizations;

L. To advise, with the assistance of the city manager, in the preparation of the annual budget and long-range parks and recreation capital improvement program for submission to the city council;

M. To advise the city council on problems of development of recreation areas, facilities, programs and improved recreation services;

N. To prepare and recommend to the council and boards a master plan setting forth a comprehensive, long term general plan for the recreational development of the city and the school districts;

O. To act in an advisory capacity to the council and boards in planning, developing and administering recreation and park facilities and programs.

2.50.080 - Hiring procedures — Director of recreation.

In addition to those procedures required by the terms of this code and the personnel rules, the director of recreation shall be hired according to the following procedures:

A. The applications submitted by an applicant for appointment to the director of recreation position shall be reviewed by a committee of six persons. Such committee shall be comprised of one member of the council, one member from each of the boards and two members of the commission. Each person shall be appointed to such review committee by the body of which he is a member.

B. Upon review of each application, such committee shall prepare a list of applicants, if any, who are thereby selected for an oral interview.

C. Each applicant selected for an oral interview shall be interviewed by a committee of five persons. Such committee shall be comprised of one member of the council, one member from each of the boards or staff, one member of the administrative staff of the city, one person, with the exception of the one administrative staff representative, shall be appointed to such oral interview committee by the body of which he is a member.

D. Upon the completion of such oral interview, the committee shall submit its recommendation to the city manager who shall make the appointment after consulting the committee.

II. - Recreation Department

2.50.0190 - Established.

To carry out the purposes of this chapter, there is established a recreation department.

2.50.020100 - Function.

The functions of the recreation department shall include:

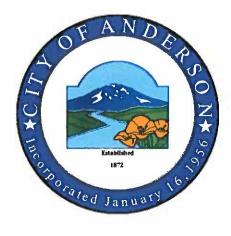
- A. The provision of opportunities through a recreation program for all ages and the administration of such program;
- B. The scheduling of the use of recreation and park facilities;
- C. Making recommendations on the operation and maintenance of recreation and park facilities and programs.

2.50.030110 - Director.

The recreation department shall be headed by a recreation director-hired by the City Managerappointed in accordance with Section 2.50.080. They He shall be responsible for the direction and control of all functions assigned to that department. The recreation department shall be organized, maintained and operated by the recreation director under the general administrative direction of the city manager.

2.50.120 - Funding.

The cost of the operation of the recreation department shall be funded in accordance with the terms of the joint powers agreement adopted pursuant to Title I, <u>Division</u> 7, <u>Chapter 5</u> (Sections 6500-6514 inclusive) of the California Government Code.

Susie Baugh Stan Neutze Melissa Hunt Michael Gallagher (two-year term spot)

The nomination papers were deemed to be complete and sufficient. In the event only one person has been nominated for an office, the City Council may take one of the following actions authorized by Section 10229 of the California Elections Code: 1) appoint to the office the person who has been nominated or 2) hold the election. If the Council chooses the first option, the Council should cancel the municipal election and the City Clerk shall not accept for filing any statement of write-in candidacy that is submitted after the appointment is made. The appointed persons will qualify, take office and serve exactly as if elected at the municipal election.

The City Clerk published in the Record Searchlight and posted at the three public posting places a notice specifying the facts concerning the nominations and the proposed appointments. Section 10229 provides after the fifth day following publication, the Council may make the appointment or direct an election. If by the 75th day before the municipal election, which is August 20, 2020, no person has been appointed to office, the election must be held.

If the resolution passes, the November 3, 2020 election will be cancelled as it pertains to the City of Anderson. The City Clerk will certify the passage, approval and adoption of the resolution, confirming with the County that the election will not go forward. The persons appointed will qualify, take office, and serve exactly as if elected at a municipal election for such office.

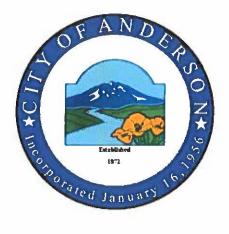

RECOMMENDATION

The Assistant City Manager recommends that the City Council:

Adopt a Resolution approving an application for funding and the execution of a Grant Agreement and any Amendments thereto from the 2020 Community Development Block Grant Program-Coronavirus response Round 1 (CDBG-CV1) NOFA dated June 5, 2020; approval of the Statement of Assurances; approve the submittal of the application.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact to the General Fund. The City is allocated \$86,899 for CDBG-CV1 Funding for COVID response.

DISCUSSION and BACKGROUND

On March 27, 2020, Congress passed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act in response to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The California State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) published a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for Community Development Block Grant Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and

Economic Security (CDBG-CV1) funds on June 5, 2020 for \$18.7 million in funds. Eligible cities and counties may submit applications for CDBG-CV1 funds under the NOFA for the allocation of \$86,899 to our community. A maximum of three (3) activities will be allowed under this application cycle. Each activity must expend all funds within 12 months of the contract execution.

The CDBG-CV1 Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) provides funding ONLY for the following Activities, which are narrowly tailored as described in Section II.A and Section II.B of the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA):

- Assistance to businesses and microenterprises impacted by COVID-19 stay-at-home orders and shut-downs
- Public services related to COVID-19 support
- Facility improvements related to COVID-19 healthcare and homeless housing needs
- Acquisition of real property to be used for the treatment or recovery of infectious diseases in response to COVID-19

All activities are required to meet a National Objective as outlined under Section IV. of the attached NOFA.

The City held a Public Hearing on August 11, 2020, opened the Public Hearing, received comments. The following comments were received:

- 1. Is the money intended only for those within the City Limits of Anderson?
- 2. What is the cost of administrating the Grant? Who would administer the Grant?
- 3. Can funds be used for low income housing?
- 4. How many businesses in the City have 5 or less employees?
- 5. Could the grant be increased from \$5,000 to \$20,000, if not many applicants?
- 6. Is there a provision to change the 5-employee guideline?
- 7. If City applies for 3 activities can funds be moved between activities if needed?

Staff in recommending which activities to include in the grant application considered the comments received at the Public Hearing and is recommending applying for the following activity.

1. Micro Enterprise Business/Technical Assistance

Due to the low amount of funds allocated to the City and with regard to other options requiring a higher administrative cost staff believes this will be the best use of these funds. There will be other funding opportunities coming available whereas, the City can consider applying for future funds to assist with other mentioned options.

Staff is developing the required program design and application support to be submitted to the State not later than August 31, 2020 for the outlined program. The City is required to take action to approve the attached Resolution and Statement of Assurances for the application completion. We anticipate approval of a Sub-Recipient Agreement with the City of Redding Chamber of Commerce for implementation at a future meeting. The program is anticipated to include the following:

COVID-19 Relief Grant Program for Micro-Enterprise Businesses. The program is designed to provide \$5,000 in grant funding to the smallest businesses in the greater community – those that were likely hit the hardest during the pandemic. To qualify for the grant program, a business must have five or fewer employees, including the business owner, and must be a for-profit business that operates within City of Anderson. The organization will also service areas outside of the City limits using funds from other jurisdictions.

The program, funded by Community Development Block Grant Funds from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and allocated to the City of Anderson through the Department of Housing and Community Development CDBG program. This money will help to ensure that some of the smallest local businesses will survive the COVID-19 pandemic.

The funding must contribute to a micro-enterprise's ability to remain open and retain employees. Working capital can be used for a commercial mortgage, rent, and other accounts-payable and utility-based bills, employee wages, resources needed to establish or revamp an online presence, or replace perishable inventory that was lost due to the interruption of business.

There are specific guidelines and requirements that must be met for a business to be eligible for this Micro-Enterprise Business Grant.

Generally speaking, the business must:

- 1. Be a brick and mortar location or home-based business that provide goods or services in City of Anderson.
- 2. Have five employees or less, including the business owner.
- 3. Have been negatively affected by COVID-19.
- 4. Submit applications, documentation, tax and payroll information for approval.
- 5. Not have received a PPP loan or other SBA disaster funding, including an EIDL in the amount of \$5,000 or more during the COVID-19 crisis.
- 6. Retain at least one full-time employee that could be the business owner, who would have otherwise been laid off, for at least one year.

ALTERNATIVES:

The following alternatives are provided for consideration:

- Direct staff to solicit additional public input;
- 2. Direct staff to not prepare or submit an application for funding; or
- 3. Provide other direction to staff.

1. Legal Authority:

4. National Objective:

7. Growth Control:

It certifies that there is no plan, ordinance, or other measure in effect which directly limits, by number, the building permits that may be issued for residential construction or the buildable lots which may be developed for residential purposes; or if such a plan, ordinance, or measure is in effect, it will either be rescinded before receiving funds, or it need not be rescinded because it:

12. Architectural Barriers:

19. Procurement:

It will follow the federal procurement policies per 24 CFR §200.317 et seq.

20. Excessive Force:

It will adopt and enforce policies:

- A. Prohibiting the use of excessive force by its law enforcement agencies against individuals engaged in non-violent civil rights demonstrations; and
- B. Enforcing applicable State and local law against physically barring entrance to or exit from a facility or location which is the subject of such non-violent civil rights demonstration within its jurisdiction.
