Valuation rise to impact Berri Barmera Council rates

A LOCAL council expects to collect an extra \$800,000 in general rates due to valuation rises in the next financial year – and collect up to 12 per cent more from individual ratepayers – despite proposing to keep its rate in the dollar the same. Residential property valuations across the Berri Barmera Council district have risen more than 11 per cent in the past year, resulting in an expected 9.4 per cent jump in general rate revenue compared to 2021-22,

according to council's draft budget.

In the budget, presented at last night's ordinary meeting, council proposed a rate-capping system to ensure property owners pay no more than 12 per cent more on rates in 2022-23 compared to the previous financial year.

'This is the third consecutive

year council has elected for a zero increase (in the rate in the dollar) ..." said Berri Barmera Council CEO Dylan Strong.

"At the end of the day, council doesn't control the increase in capital values."





Renmark arrest follows Mildura stabbing

TWO people who led police on a chase through a Riverland town have been arrested in relation to a weekend Mildura stabbing.

Police used road spikes during the pursuit of a stolen Toyota RAV4 on the Sturt Highway, at Paringa, on Monday morning, however the car continued driving until the tyres came off and it came to a stop in Renmark. Two occupants -a 23-yearold man of no fixed address and a 24-year-old woman from Gulfview Heights - ran from the car into a nearby distillery, where they were arrested a short time later.

The male was interviewed by both SAPOL and Victorian Homicide Squad detectives, and was charged with theft of a motor vehicle and driving dangerously to escape police pursuit.

The female was arrested on interstate charges and will be extradited back to Victoria.

The arrests follow an incident where a 36-year-old Mildura man was taken to a Mildura hospital with suspected stab wounds at 4.45pm last Saturday, May 21.

He passed away a short time

after and an investigation remains ongoing.

A 20-year-old man also involved in the situation had been arrested in Mildura on Monday morning, following an alleged carjacking.

THE Waikerie Health Services' Covid-19 PCR testing service has been temporarily closed at a time when sectors of the local community have been reporting significant levels of cases.

SA Health told The Murray Pioneer on Monday that due to unplanned leave and the unavailability of alternate testing staff at Waikerie Health Service, the Covid PCR testing service had been temporarily closed since May 16.

The service usually operates from Monday to Friday.

A spokeswoman said the service at Waikerie would recommence today when additional staff would be available onsite to provide PCR testing services.

She said a temporary Covid-19 testing and vaccination clinic service would operate from 8.30am to 2.30pm today, tomorrow, Friday and Saturday.

The spokeswoman said PCR testing was also available at the Riverland General Hospital at Berri via a highcapacity, drive-through testing site.

She said people who are close contacts, but are minus symptoms can access free rapid antigen tests at collection sites at Glossop, Berri, Murray Bridge, Meningie, Pinnaroo and Lameroo.

RENMARK tourism businesses deserve credit for the Riverland town being recognised as SA's number one tourism destination, the local mayor says.

Renmark was last week named South Australia's Top Tourism Town for 2022 at a ceremony held at Government House, in Adelaide.

Renmark Paringa Mayor Neil Martinson said the award reflected contributions of all the town's tourism business operators.

"The award represents the strong and innovative tourism collective we have in our district," Mr Martinson said.

"We are fortunate to have progressive local operators, a diverse range of experiences, a naturally stunning river environment and a structure that supports and promotes the visitor experience."

Renmark is set to receive an extensive marketing and development package for winning the award, including advertising features from Adelady, FIVEaa, and the Adelaide Airport, an article in SA Life's June edition, and a training package from Shop Local SA.

Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone said the area to more new visitors.

Barker MP targets party's SA leaders

CALLS from senior SA Liberal, Senator Simon Birmingham, for the vanquished federal party to further embrace climate change action have been shot down by Barker MP Tony Pasin.

In a stinging rebuke of the Liberal Party's senior SA members, Mr Pasin - reelected for a fourth term on Saturday – said the election results proved that conservative faction MPs fare better with electorates than progressive candidates. "It's clear that conservative members like myself did exceptionally well and that's a message that I think the Liberal Party should heed very strongly," Mr Pasin told The Murray Pioneer.

Speaking on ABC TV's Insiders on Sunday, Mr Birmingham highlighted climate change "action" as among the policies the Coalition needed to get right in order to return to power.

"We acknowledge the need for Australia to play a leading role in action around the world and that we get our language as well as our policies right in that space," he said.

However, Mr Pasin said the results of the recent State Election, along with last Saturday's route, showed change was necessary within SA Liberal leadership team, and that being "Labor lite" was a plan doomed for failure. In addition, while speak-

ing to ABC Riverland this week, Mr Pasin had some pointed advice.

"I was critical of the state Liberal Party at the last state election, but my comments were directed at the operational wing of the Liberal Party in SA," he said.

"That operational wing was the same operational wing that took us into this election, and I should say, has lost us the seat of Boothby and taken an otherwise strong seat of Sturt right to the line in a white-knuckle ride.

"The reality is... in terms of the Liberal Party in South Australia, there needs to be change, and the people that are leading the Liberal Party in South Australia at the moment – I'm a member of parliament, I'm not leading the Liberal Party in South Australia – need to consider their position really seriously.

"Because we can't continue to cede ground to the Labor Party, particularly where I'm able to maintain a really strong position in Barker, but others seem to be crab-walking backwards, which is a bad outcome."

Mr Pasin's close friend, Liberal Senator for SA, Alex Antic, shared Mr Pasin's view on Sky News this week. "Ultimately the Liberal

Party has to be the Liberal Party – not an imitation of Labor and The Greens," he said.

THE Riverland's two state politicians say the SA Government's new Covid-19 laws, which include potential jail terms for serious breaches, are out of step with Australia's new direction. With the support

of the Greens and SA Best, Premier Peter Malinauskas rammed the public health legislation changes through parliament last week, enshrining maximum penalties for pandemic breaches of two years' jail or a \$75,000 fine for businesses and a \$20,000 fine for individuals.

While the changes also allowed SA's emergency declaration to be scrapped yesterday, the retention of heavy punishments has been criticised by Chaffey MP Tim Whetstone and his Liberal Party colleague, Legislative Council Member Nicola Centofanti.

"The Covid-19 legislation pushed through by the SA Labor Government is not in step with where Covid is today," Mr Whetstone said.

"We are in a new era of Covid, our communities have done the hard yards by getting vaccinated and complying with social reforms.

"Some penalties were necessary during the unknown phase of the pandemic; however, we have moved passed this and the excessive penalties are not in line with the rest of the country."

The Public Health Act enforces Covid isolation, plus vaccine mandates and mask use in high-risk settings, such as nursing home and hospitals.

Ms Centofanti said while the Liberal Party supported moving out of emergency declaration, the fines and potential jail terms were "disappointing", and ongoing intrusions on personal liberties

were worrying. "In addition, the removal of several key special principles regarding rights and liberties from this Covid-19 Amendment Bill that are adhered to under the Public Health Act is extremely concerning,' she said.

"Fortunately, some amendments to the Bill were successful, including a Covid response oversight committee, as well as a 'disallowance' mechanism that effectively allows the parliament to cancel legislation it does not agree with.

"Given orders can be made that intrude on people's liberties, it is important that the government demonstrates the evidence on which they are made.

"These amendments occurred because the Liberal Party refused to sacrifice common sense and just tick and flick this important legislation."

One Nation's inaugural SA Legislative Council Member, Sarah Game, said Labor, the Greens and SA Best were "not interested in protecting the basic rights and freedoms of the South Australian people"

"Instead of wielding power on behalf of the South Australian people as they're supposed to do, they want to wield power over the South Australian people," Ms Game said.

Meanwhile the state government yesterday also lifted the requirement on SA school students to wear masks, effective next week.

However, masks will still be "strongly recommended" for years 3 to 12 students, plus all adults on school grounds.

"This is a very positive step forward for students and teachers," Mr Malinauskas said in a statement.

22 December 2022, if there are no further detections.

If you live in the area, visit fruitfly.sa.gov.au to understand the restrictions in place.

Once purchased or picked from the garden, some fruit and vegetables cannot move from properties in the outbreak area.

An eradication program has begun in the area. PIRSA staff wearing orange overalls and carrying ID will be entering front and back yards to apply organic fruit fly bait and check fruit.

What you need to do:



Pasin's eye on higher honours

TONY Pasin hopes his record as Barker MP - during the past three terms and at election time - can lead him to higher honours in the new Coalition shadow ministry.

Despite the Morrison Government being swept from power at Saturday's Federal Election, Mr Pasin retained his seat for a fourth term with one of the strongest remaining Liberal majorities in the nation – approximately 65-35 under the twocandidate preferred system.

While new Labor Prime Minister Anthony Albanese was being sworn in this week, the Coalition was surveying the damage and preparing to elect a new leader, almost certain to be Queensland-based conservative Peter Dutton.

Mr Pasin was reluctant to speculate, but hinted that his long-held ambition to scale the Coalition ladder remained intact.

"I'd love to be given an opportunity to join shadow cabinet, but those are matters for other people," he said.

"I certainly won't be taking a backward step (and) I hope others assess my performance over the course of

eight and a half years, and particularly what we were able to achieve in Barker in the last three years.

"I note that (despite) significant swings all around the country, we managed to retain all but around 2.5 per cent of our two-party-preferred vote in Barker, which is a bit of a bright light on a dim night.

"But whatever is in store for me is a matter for others and I'll serve my electorate in any way that I'm asked to." Mr Pasin, who described

Mr Dutton as "a good bloke", is more factionally aligned with the re-elected Member for Dickson than former PM Scott Morrison.

Meanwhile the Barker election went as expected, with the 3.79 per cent twocandidate preferred swing against Mr Pasin well below the national figure of around 5.7 per cent.

Mr Pasin was again elected on first-preference votes alone, notching 53.29 per cent of the vote, a swing away from him of 4.59 per cent.

Candidate Mark Braes oversaw had a 0.74 per cent swing against Labor in Barker.

Greens candidate Rosa Hillam polled the third highest first-preference votes and effected a small swing her way (0.38 per cent), well below the nationwide swing to the Greens of 1.5 per cent.

From a standing start, One Nation's Carlos Quaremba polled 6.44 per cent of the vote, following on from the party's strong showing in Chaffey in the March State Election.

Of the 95,334 votes counted for Barker so far, 6335 – or 6.64 per cent – were informal, fractionally above the national average of 6.62 per cent.

Mr Pasin said his willingness to work across his entire electorate, which stretches from the state's South East to the Riverland, across to the Barossa Valley, and to Murray Bridge, con-

tributed to his re-election.

However, Mr Pasin said the overall result had left him with a feeling of "sadness" for what he claimed was a good government in difficult times.

"I know lots of people who have lost their roles, but that's democracy in action," he said. "The party will need to regroup federally, we'll need to choose a new leader, and we'll need to campaign strongly.

"It's a difficult day because I acknowledge and respect the will of the Australian people, but these have been very difficult times. "And for a moment I'd just like to say I think the government has handled the fires, the floods and the pandemic incredibly well and positioned Australia very well for a strong economic future. I hope the newly elected government doesn't do anything to (hinder) the recovery."

However, while the spelling of the Italian surname is identical, the new PM and the national media differ in their pronunciation to the local clan.

"I'm always intrigued when he's called Alba-neezee, because we've always called it Albanese," Sam said.

"I'm not sure, but maybe his background is from a different region in Italy and they say it a bit differently."

Sam is unaware of any family connection with the Prime Minister, but says the name is commonplace in Italy.

"Albanese is quite a popular name in Italy," he said.

"It's not quite as common as Brown or Smith here, but there's even a region in southern Italy called Spezzano Albanese, which is a municipality in Consenza, Calabria." Sam, 65, is more certain that his late father, Dominic, was the original Albanese to call the Riverland home. His dad arrived in postwar Australia around 1952, spending time in a Melbourne internment camp before being sent to Morgan to chop wood for steam trains and boats.

After repaying his fare, Dominic journeyed to Renmark, eventually working for the Rudiger and Heading families, before

buying a property at Pike River.

Sam says his father travelled to the Riverland with three other Italian men: two Albanese cousins and a Catalano.

Remarkably, his parents were married in separate countries, with Dominic's brother standing in for him in Italy, opposite new bride Maria.

"Mum had to be married before she could go anywhere, including joining Dad in Australia," Sam explained.

"Dad was one of the original Albaneses, but there's a lot up here now."

Meanwhile Sam is ready for his surname to dominate Australian media for at least the next three years. "Well, I've got no choice,"

he joked.

"But I just hope he does a good job, because that's what it's all about."

No safe seats in council elections

STRAP yourself in for a third election in 2022.

Yes, in November local government elections will be held across South Australia.

An increasing number of people bemoan living in a safe seat, like we occupy in the Riverland, both federally and at state level in Barker and Chaffey respectively.

However, on the latter, it was only as recently as 2010 that sometime Nationals MP Karlene Maywald was the state Member for Chaffey, while also a minister in the Rann Labor government. But since then state and federal elections have been largely predictable fare for Riverland voters, even allowing for the 2018 Chaffey election, which saw SA Best candidate Michelle Campbell emerge as some sort of threat to sitting Liberal MP Tim Whetstone.

Further, as re-elected Barker MP Tony Pasin pointed out this week, suggestions he has taken his electorate for granted and failed to lobby for funding are demonstrably false. He labelled an ABC report that suggested as much "an insult".

That aside, local government elections are always marginal and all locals yearning for a live contest will have their wish fulfilled in just a few months.

So, now is the time to become more engaged with council, its decisions and its elected members, many of whom will be putting their hand up for re-election. And they need your vote.

Annual budgets are currently being released and council plans unveiled. Much of it will affect many Riverlanders.

The message is clear: take an interest in what your council is doing. And when the elections roll around, request answers from these candidates.

Local politics is infinitely more accessible than the other two tiers of governance, and councillors – particularly here in the Riverland – are acutely aware they serve local ratepayers.

Now is the time to question and query your local councillors. And to remember their answers when it comes time to vote.

Are you happy with the developments in town? Do you think your rates notice is fair enough, particularly given the much-talked-about inflation figures hogging news headlines during the Federal Election campaign? Or do you think the rate increases are out of line with community expectations?

Those doubting the impact councillors can make need only think back a few months, when Renmark Paringa's elected members voted to demolish the old Westpac building in Renmark rather than develop the site, as was favoured by some council staff.

If you have strong feelings on that decision either way, and others around your town, remember that you have a chance to truly engage with the political process and help elect candidates you probably know personally.



THE YEARS GO BY

Centenarian Leslie Voigt (pictured in 2013): Les was born into a farming family at Robertstown in March 1922. Aged five, he daily walked three-and-a-half miles to school. Fruit fly making our harvest challenging

OVER recent weeks we have seen a number of new outbreaks of fruit fly in our community.

South Australia has a strong record of effectively managing fruit fly, but the complex nature of biosecurity threats means that from time-to-time outbreaks do occur. It has long been a priority of our state to contain and eradicate fruit fly outbreaks.

I would like to acknowledge the amazing work that PIRSA, key industry stakeholders and growers continue to do in response to these outbreaks.

PIRSA has implemented an eradication program that includes inspecting fruit trees, organically baiting, releasing sterile flies, and establishing suspension zones around detections.

Suspension zones impose restrictions on fruit movement, which can be an inconvenience and challenge for the community. However, restricting fruit movement is an effective and practical way we can prevent fruit fly from being unintentionally transported across neighbourhoods, regions or to an unaffected part of the state.

When you live in an outbreak zone it is important not to share or move any homegrown fruit or fruiting vegetables from your property.

All Riverlanders are encouraged to visit the PIRSA website at www.fruitfly.sa.gov.au and learn whether their residence is in an outbreak or suspension zone and the restrictions that may apply.

By containing fruit fly in outbreak and suspension zones, PIRSA can utilise specific tools such as releasing sterile flies to target wild flies in and around these areas. Sterile flies are a proven technology and an important tool in any government's

fight against fruit fly as it interrupts the lifecycle of the wild flies.

While these programs are critical to eradicate the current outbreaks and protect our fruitfly-free-status, it is also important that there is community co-operation when it comes to fighting this pest.

I want to thank everyone living in outbreak or suspension zones for following the fruit restrictions and stripping backyard trees of homegrown fruit and fruiting vegetables. These measures aim to remove the host material where fruit flies breed.

With the community's cooperation, the number of breeding locations for fruit fly will be significantly reduced, enhancing the effectiveness of PIRSA's baiting SIT programs.

Unfortunately, many Riverland growers who are currently in an outbreak or suspension zone face a challenging harvest.

To get their produce to market requires expensive treatment that is not typically required in the South Australian horticulture industry.

South Australian growers need our support now to overcome these fruit fly outbreaks.

Together, as a state and as a community, we can eradicate the fruit fly outbreaks and ensure that the Riverland and our growers continue to enjoy the premium market advantage of being a fruit-fly-free state for decades to come.



Since lizards are vulnerable to pollutants, their mere existence in the garden indicates low levels of pesticides and heavy metals. This ensures food grown in the garden will also have low levels of these particles.

For lizards to take up residency in the backyard they need an adequate habitat. Creating the right environment is essential for making lizard-friendly gardens. Begin by learning which species of lizards are native in your area Find out where they lay their eggs, what they eat, and which environmental elements they prefer. The following tips will help gardeners make a safe haven in their garden for lizards:

Avoid using chemical pesticides. Avoid using weed killer, especially on the lawn. Spot treat weed problems rather than using widespread application of weed killer in the yard. Mulch the garden, it not only deters weeds, but also conserves moisture and creates a humid environment for lizards. Give lizards plenty of hiding places. Lizards are low on the food chain, providing protection from their natural predators ensures their continued existence Plant bushy perennials, create a rock or brush pile, or use man-made items like stacks of bricks or pipes. Valuation rise to hit Berri Barmera residents' 2022-23 rates... **Balancing** act at **BBC**

A LOCAL council expects to collect an extra \$800,000 in general rates due to valuation rises in the next financial year - and collect up to 12 per cent more from individual ratepayers - despite proposing to keep its rate in the dollar the same.

Residential property valuations across the Berri Barmera Council district have risen more than 11 per cent in the past year, resulting in an expected 9.4 per cent jump in general rate revenue compared to 2021-22, according to council's draft budget.

In the budget, presented at last night's ordinary meeting, council proposed a ratecapping system to ensure property owners pay no more than 12 per cent more on rates in 2022-23 compared to the previous financial year.

Properties that have changed ownership since January 2020, increased in capital value due to improvements worth more than \$10,000, or changed land use are ineligible for rate capping.

An owner with a residential property worth \$200,000 in 2021-22 could pay as much as \$150 extra for rates in the 2022-23 financial year if their valuation has increased by 12 per cent or more.

Berri Barmera Council CEO Dylan Strong, who took over the role prior to council's final budget meeting, said the proposed rate modelling was the "most balanced approach", with council wary of "overmanipulating" through capping.

approach to rate raising in previous years and leading in to this one," he said. "This is the third consecutive year council

has elected for a zero increase (in the rate in the dollar)... "At the end of the day, council doesn't

control the increase in capital values." Mr Strong said council was "not immune"

to inflation and the increased costs of general services and project delivery.

"As an example, our input costs into infrastructure at the moment are in some cases 30 or 40 per cent more than pre-pandemic levels," he said.

"It's just the reality of the current operating environment.

While council needs to accommodate those costs and pressures, I think the approach from council again this year is to balance that with avoiding an unnecessary burden on people's hip pockets."

Council has also proposed increasing the remission for ratepayers on fixed incomes such as pensioners and self-funded retirees, from \$20 to \$50 per year for general rates.

Waste service charges have increased 2.5 per cent to \$240 for three bins and \$203 for two bins, while the Community Wastewater Management Service charge will also increase 2.5 per cent to \$779.

The rate in the dollar for industrial properties will drop about 1.6 per cent to match the rate in the dollar for commercial properties.

Council has also allocated funds to undertake a range of projects including \$200,000 to plan the relocation of the Berri Library, \$500,000 for streetscaping in Berri, and a \$1.2m grant-funded upgrade of changerooms and lighting at Barmera Oval.

The Barmera Oval upgrades, along with nine other projects, have been carried over from the 2021-22 financial year.

Mr Strong said he was "confident" council could deliver its project list, despite contractor and material shortages.

"I think the opportunity with me coming as new CEO and having a different perspective on things has allowed us to take stock of where we are at with projects that are behind where we'd ideally like to be when it comes to delivery," he said.

'We've been able to put a line through or put on hold a number of projects that we were not confident we were going to have the capacity to deliver, and that in turn gives us the ability to tackle what's proposed and deliver it confidently."

Council is currently projecting an overall operating surplus of \$270,904.

Dog days as council's aerodrome ban revisited

A RECENT council ruling that saw dogs banned from Loxton and Waikerie aerodromes is set to face public consultation to potentially reverse the decision.

After a complaint was received in April about dogs at the Waikerie aerodrome, Loxton Waikerie council recently declared – without public consultation – that Loxton and Waikerie aerodromes would be dog-prohibited areas.

The decision has received

backlash from several parties, prompting a formal public consultation.

At last Friday's Loxton Waikerie council meeting, a number of councillors admitted they should have undertaken further consultation with a wider group of people.

Councillor Deb Thiele said she acknowledged she should have spoken to more people.

"We need to have a few more discussions about it with a wider group of people then what is represented in here," she said.

Councillor Trevor Norton

agreed with Cr Thiele, saying he was apologetic about not considering more consultation.

"However, I was working on a theory that I did not want anything running around and I still hold that view," he said.

"I think with the extra information and a consultation it might be still that anything air-side should be on a leash and controlled."

Council's manager of environmental services Cheryle Pedler said council had two options. "It is recommended that council should acknowledge the original report and that both aerodromes remain dogprohibited areas," she said.

"However, it is also recommended that council acknowledges the report, revokes the original decision and undertakes public consultation on the proposal to declare the Loxton and Waikerie aerodromes as dogprohibited area's or dog-onleash areas."

Council is yet to indicate when it will begin public consultation.

Plea to road users ahead of Fatality Free Friday

RIVERLAND drivers are being urged to focus on road safety to drive down road deaths, after new research indicated an alarming level of ignorance and arrogance towards road safety.

According to the Australian Road Safety Foundation (ARSF), 100 per cent of South Australians claim to be safe road users, but 68 per cent are breaking road laws.

ARSF said "the juxtaposition highlights an urgent need for a renewed focus on road safety across the state".

ARSF issued a plea to road users last week, as it released the South Australian research from its annual Fatality Free Friday initiative.

A total of 99 people were killed on South Australian roads last year.

According to the research, the top two reasons for South Australians breaking road rules were losing focus on the road (50 per cent) and believing it was safe to do so (23 per cent).

ASRF founder and CEO, Russell White, said the research had raised a number of red flags.

flags. "Just over half of South Australians say they have taken a risk on the road, and yet we have a significantly higher portion who are breaking laws – laws that have been put in place for safety," Mr White said.

"This is not just about you as an individual, but all the people around you whose lives you put in jeopardy every time you fail to focus on road safety.

"We cannot afford to be complacent when the price is somebody's life."

Fatality Free Friday will be held this Friday, May 27 and operates on the belief that if South Australia can go one day without a death on the road, ARSF can demonstrate the impact a focus on road safety can have each and every day of the year.

A FOOTPATH connectivity plan for both Waikerie and Loxton will be developed by Loxton Waikerie council, amid calls by a 90-year-old Waikerie man for immediate action.

Richard Huhn has written to council complaining about two laneways between Edwards Crescent and West Road (Coombe Terrace), and Edwards Crescent and Mary Starr Drive.

Mr Huhn said it was the third time in two years he had approached council about the two "unsafe" laneways. He considers the two pathways so unsafe that he uses his car instead of his gopher to travel to the shops. "It is too dangerous and uneven," he said.

Mr Huhn said the laneway leading to West Road, which turns into Coombe Terrace opposite the Waikerie Primary School, is too narrow to allow both an elderly person on a gopher and a pedestrian to use it at the same time.

Families with young children live in the area around Edwards Crescent and Mary Starr Drive and often use the laneway leading to Coombe Terrace to walk to school and the shops.

"Does somebody have to have an accident before anything gets done?" Mr Huhn asked in his letter to Loxton Waikerie council CEO David Beaton.

At the side of the laneway from Edwards Crescent to West Road/Coombe Terrace is a steep descent.

Mr Huhn said both laneways should be paved to make them safer for elderly people on gophers and pedestrians.

He said the council needed to ensure other parts of Waikerie were maintained, beyond the river front.

"They pave everywhere in Waikerie where you can see," Mr Huhn said, "but where you can't see they ignore it."

The council's director of infrastructure services Greg Perry said the footpath connectivity plans for Waikerie and Loxton would examine safety issues.

"The plan will identify the high-use areas that people frequent and the footpaths they used to get there," he said

"These areas will include places such as the main street and the adjacent businesses, hospital, medical centres, and schools."

Waikerie-based advocate for older Australians Brent Bennett said most of the footpaths leading to facilities such as the bowling club, medical centre, Warrawee Lodge retirement village, and the CBD were substandard.

He said many of the footpaths were unsuitable for gophers.

"As soon as you have an uneven surface people driving gophers are at high risk of tiple ping over," he said.

"They need to create better footpaths, which are paved."

He said last month he witnessed an elderly man almost tip his gopher backwards when entering the McCoy Street footpath after crossing Francis Street adjacent to Foodland.

"As he went up into the little cut through into the footpath, his gopher tipped backwards about 20 degrees," he said

"I honestly thought he was going to tip over.

"It was quite a dangerous situation."

Mr Perry said the footpath connectivity plan would consider the current condition of footpaths and whether they meet the town's needs.

"It will also determine the estimated costs to upgrade the footpaths and how the works might be implemented," he said.

"This type of strategic planning will better inform future budgeting and allow proposed works to be undertaken in a way that may finish an area before moving on to another."

Waikerie's Covid-19 wave

THE Riverland West area appears to be experiencing a Covid-19 wave.

In recent days a significant number of cases has been reported among local school children and their parents, Waikerie Hotel staff, and the Cadell Training Centre.

Senior doctor at the Waikerie Medical Centre, Dr Ian Gartley, said while he was without access to official data, it was evident the virus had become prevalent in the area.

He said a large private social function at Waikerie earlier this month resulted in "quite a lot of Covid positive cases".

Dr Gartley said he was also aware of Waikerie netball teams finding it hard to source players because of Covid-19 absentees.

He said over the past few weeks the level of Covid-19 cases appeared to be "fairly constant".

"I do not have access to official numbers because a lot of people are doing it by self-reporting RAT tests or they are going to the Waikerie Hospital or to Berri to get a PCR done," he said.

"We don't get the results of those (however), my impression is that certainly there is a significant level of cases in Waikerie.

"Everyone seems to know at least someone who has got it or had it recently."

Dr Gartley said he was aware of a number of Waikerie parents who had contracted Covid-

19 because their children had brought it home from school.

However, he said he was uncertain about the number of cases among school students at Waikerie.

"We have to remember the proportion of five-to-11-year-olds who have been immunised is nowhere near the level of immunisation as their parents," he said. "There is still a significant pool

of unimmunised children who go to school."

Dr Gartley said people who thought the Covid-19 pandemic

was over were mistaken. He said even though the SA government had eased Covid-19 restrictions and mask wearing requirements, people should still consider taking precautions.

"Cautious people would still be wearing masks, practising social distancing and practising good hand hygiene," Dr Gartley said. "It is certainly far from over."

SA is consistently recording over 3000 new Covid-19 cases daily.

Meanwhile, the Cadell

Training Centre has confirmed last Friday that 18 of its inmates were Covid positive.

A Department for Correctional Services spokesperson said the first case, detected on May 6, had since recovered.

"The management of prisoners is supported by the SA Prison Health Service at each prison and the Communicable Diseases Control Branch," she said.

"This reflects a level of community equivalence with operations largely continuing as usual."

Hotel's Covid spike forces staff reshuffle

COVID-19 has caused a staff shortage at the Waikerie Hotel, with 10 of 38 staff so far testing positive this month. Waikerie Hotel Motel manager

Andrew Tyson said the biggest problem was when three out of five chefs simultaneously contracted the virus earlier this month.

He said the two chefs who dodged Covid-19 worked a six-to-seven-day week to ensure the dining room remained open.

"We were running two sittings to limit the pressure on the kitchen," he said. "We were able to stay open throughout that time by utilising everybody from other departments helping out in the kitchen with the two chefs cooking."

Mr Tyson said the first cases began at the start of the month in the food and bar area. He said multitasking by staff has enabled the hotel to stay open.

"It has just been a continual shuffling of rosters, shuffling of departments and making things work," Mr Tyson said.

"We haven't had to limit any of our opening or closing times or close down any of our departments. We have struggled through and the staff have been very stoic and fantastic through this period to jump in and help a community hotel."

Mr Tyson said the influx of Covid-19 amongst his staff and Waikerie was inevitable.

Mr Tyson has encouraged his staff to get vaccinated against Covid-19 and to also get immunised against the flu. Staff at the Waikerie Hotel Motel are also provided with rapid antigen tests. - CHRISTINE WEBSTER



"We've been recognising our own volunteers... however, it's important to get everyone involved," he said.


"This was the start of trying to get clubs to nominate someone specifically.

Club mourns, but remembers grand final heroics

TWO unforgettable chapters in the Berri Football Club's modern history have been relived in recent weeks, as the club mourns the death of one of its favourite sons and arguably the most successful Riverland indigenous athlete of his generation. The death of Ken Karpany Sr late last

month shocked and saddened the region's sporting community. Karpany was an outstanding sportsman who excelled in football, but was also a

supremely talented cricketer and later ten-pin bowler, among other sporting pursuits. He will go down in Berri Football Club

folklore as something of a legend, after playing key roles in the club's memorable premierships of 1992 and 2002. As a youngster, Karpany lit up Waikerie

Oval in the 1992 grand final against the Magpies with a blistering six-bounce run from deep in defence midway through the last quarter.

Karpany finished off his game-breaking

dash with a neat pass to Whillas Medallist Robbie Kent, who in turn found teammate Jon Simpson and resulted in the Demons kicking the sealer. Karpany's solo effort sat perfectly alongside his four crucial goals in what was an epic grand final, highlighted in part by Berri coach Brian Leckie successfully recalling injured star Allan Brand for his first and only game of the season.

Karpany was named third best in Berri's 20-point grand final win. He finished equal sixth in the Whillas Medal that year, and made his first Murray Pioneer Team of the Year.

Ten years later Karpany and Robert Price were the sole remaining Berri players from the 1992 flag to line up for the Demons in the 2002 grand final, also against Waikerie.

It was an equally epic decider, with Berri - playing at home – falling 44 points behind the Magpies in the second quarter.

Karpany copped a heavy knock in the third quarter, was carried from the ground and expected to take no further part in the game. Remarkably, he returned to the field in the final term to kick two goals and help Berri – under the guidance of coach Tim Jackson - seal an incredible 22-point victory.

Like 1992, Karpany kicked four goals in the grand final, with teammate Luke Taylor best on ground.

Club stalwart and former president Bob Warland said Karpany left an indelible mark on the Demons.

"(He was) blessed with lightning pace and outstanding skills," Mr Warland said.

"Who can forget a young Kenny's scintillating run down the wing with multiple bounces in the '92 grand final, a pass off and goal.

"Or the 2002 grand final when he was knocked into the boundary fence and went off injured, to return and kick crucial goals to seal the game for the Dees...

"Kenny was, sadly, keen to return for the reunions in July this year. He left us too voung."

All up, Karpany played 146 A grade games for Berri in two stints with the club (1991-1995 and 1997-2004), kicking 276 goals. He also played seven B grade games to tip him over the 150 mark, and played at several other local clubs, including a successful stint with Lyrup.

In addition to his feats on the football field, Karpany was a star cricketer, who remains the only player outside of the A grade competition to be named Riverland Cricketer of the Year.

He achieved the feat while playing for Gerard's B grade team, when the award winner was calculated on results (runs, wickets, catches) from both senior grades. A slippery opening bowler and big-hitting batsman, Karpany won the award despite B grade performances being weighted significantly less than A grade performances.

In addition, when Bowland was operating in Berri around a decade ago, Karpany quickly established himself as one of the best ten-pin bowlers in the region.



These outbreaks are separate to the existing Loxton North fruit fly outbreak, now called Loxton North A.


1.5 km radius outbreak areas have been established at Loxton North B and Loxton North C

These will apply until at least 20 December 2022, if there are no further detections.

If you live in the area, visit fruitfly.sa.gov.au to understand the restrictions in place where you live, work or go to school.

Once purchased or picked from the garden, some fruit and vegetables cannot move from your property within the outbreak area.

An eradication program has begun to keep your area fruit fly free and help protect our state's important horticultural industries.

Abbey and Sam feel the power

TWO locals tasted success at a recent bodybuilding event despite it being their first time at competition level.

Riverland couple Abbey Richards, 26, and Sam Atkins, 28, last month entered an I Compete Natural (ICN) bodybuilding event in Adelaide, followed by an event in Brisbane earlier this month.

Ms Richards – who placed third in the Ms Fitness Model First-timer and Ms Sports Model Open classes, and fourth in Ms Fitness Model Open – said the couple had motivated each other to participate.

"Sam had wanted to do it for a while and had spoken about it a few times, but I had never really wanted to compete myself," Ms Richards said.

"One day I said he should give it a go... and he asked me to do it with him.

"We did the first two weeks by ourselves, with the help of my boss who's a nutrition coach, then I found myself a coach.

"There's so much to it. Having that person to keep you accountable, and someone who's been in the industry competing in bodybuilding, was definitely an upperhand."

Mr Atkins came first in the Men's Physique Firsttimer and Men's Physique Open classes, and second in the Men's Physique Novice class.

However, Ms Richards said a 19-hour journey had negative effects on their performance in the ICN Brisbane competition.

"The Brisbane event was crazy compared to Adelaide," she said.

"Not only the number of competitors, but the arena where it was held was huge... that was really cool.

"Unfortunately from the travel we were both a little bit 'fluffier' than we were in Adelaide. We assume it was

excess water retention from the travel.

"(But) it was awesome. It was so upbeat, with so much energy, and there was never a moment where nothing was happening."

Ms Richards said nutrition and prioritising training had been key to the pair's preparations.

"You have to stick to your diet 100 per cent," she said.

"There's no going off track where you can have a sneaky treat... it was to the dot every single day.

"We're both very social people, but when you're doing something that takes that much energy, physically and mentally, you've got to learn to say no.

"Time management was important to fitting everything in."

Ms Richards – who currently manages the Riverland Fitness Centre – expected herself and Mr Atkins would continue competitive bodybuilding. "We were only thinking about doing it the once, but I think we will both compete

again now," she said. "I've already had a lot of interested people wanting to

be coached, but it's definitely not for the faint-hearted. "The mental battle that

comes with it is huge. Being ready for that is important as well."








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Pasin doubles down on extra 450GL warning

RE-ELECTED Barker MP Tony Pasin has doubled-down on his crusade against water buybacks following last weekend's Federal Election.

Prior to the election Mr Pasin was something of a lone voice among the Liberal Party in insisting that an extra 450GL of environmental flow allocated for South Australia should not be delivered at the expense of primary producers.

His viewpoint contrasts that of Labor and the Greens, and the public stances made by most of his party colleagues.

However, Mr Pasin predicted the election of an Anthony Albaneseled Labor government could spell trouble for Riverland irrigators.

"I'm worried very much about the potential for buybacks," he said.

"I made it very plain during the campaign that this question is real and I think it's a real concern for

people living in the Riverland, that the interests of metropolitan South Australians will be placed above those who live inside the Basin and in our river communities.

"But from my perspective I can assure them that I'm reasonably adept at banging the table on behalf of communities all through my electorate, including the Riverland.

"I wasn't always popular with my Liberal ministerial colleagues, because I was demanding outcomes. Nothing will change. I'll continue to demand outcomes, it's just that that different people occupy those ministerial offices now." - PAUL MITCHELL

Albo urged to appoint water minister from SA

MAKING a South Aussie the nation's next water minister would protect the River Murray, a Greens senator says.

SA Greens' Sarah Hanson-Young has called on the new Albanese Government to appoint a water minister from South Australia in Labor's new cabinet.

"I have a new found hope for our Murray River now that the National Party's reign over the water portfolio is finally over," Ms Hanson-Young said.

"But while Barnaby Joyce and the Nats are no longer in charge, the water wars between the Basin states are set to continue. "I urge Prime Minister Albanese to appoint a South Australian water minister which will be the biggest signal Labor can send that they won't let the upstream states rule the river's roost any longer.

"A South Australian water minister will be our best chance of ensuring the best interests of the Murray are represented, not those of upstream corporate irrigators."

Ms Hanson-Young said the Greens would use their position in balance of power in the Senate to fight for the delivery of the additional 450GL of environmental flow "promised to South Australia" in the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

Local celebration of enviro success

A DECADE-long initiative that funded the construction of environmental infrastructure at Riverland sites has ended.

The Department for Environment and Water (DEW) on Saturday held a function at the Berri Rowing Club to celebrate the completion of the South Australian Riverland Floodplains Integrated Infrastructure Program (SARFIIP).

DEW spokesperson Dr Glen Shimmin said the program – which ran for 10 years – was aimed at restoring the health Riverland floodplain areas that had "rapidly declined" due to the Millennium Drought

"Species such as frogs, turtles, and birdlife have really been thriving since regular environmental watering has taken place at the floodplains via the SARFIIP infrastructure," Dr Shimmin said.

"The frequent environmen-

tal watering is bringing the floodplains back to life.

"Throughout the landscape the smaller understorey vegetation and other plants, such as lignum, have responded extremely well to the watering, with many turning bright green and with new growth developing.

"(Last) weekend's celebration (was) about acknowledging the support of the community and to thank those staff and contractors involved in delivering the SARFIIP program over the past 10 years.

"(It was) a great day for those responsible for delivering the works to come together and celebrate the success of the program and the benefits it's brought to the Riverland, both environmentally and economically."

moving to Adelaide to raise their small army, then made the move to Renmark 30 years ago. "We met through our fathers in Australia.


It was always meant to be - he is my soulmate," Jean said.

Divided by politics, united by football

FOR more than two years Australia has been divided by the Covid-19 pandemic, mostly due to states having differing restrictions and living conditions to combat the spread of the disease.

We were locked off from the rest of the world by international quarantine and interstate seclusions, as state premiers and territory chiefs micromanaged their own security in an era benign of federation.

Just when these interstate separations seemed past, a federal election loomed and during the past six weeks of the campaign the country has again been subjected to broad division.

It is a division driven by two major political parties' supposed different beliefs on how our lives should be governed. Throw in a plethora of independent candidates, plus Climate 200 contenders, and a real political amalgam of conflict was rife.

Saturday's ballot, while changing the government, has done little to stop disunity in the short term.

The former Coalition government is in a blame game, wrestling internally. Liberals and Nationals are reportedly unsure of whether to remain together on opposition benches, an unfamiliar place for almost a decade.

Further to this and perhaps a driver to a Coalition split, is the tussle between moderate and conservative Liberals. It is a broad church teetering and in danger of crumbling if the foundations are not urgently underpinned by footings of common belief.

Large swings to now elected Independent candidates in traditional blue-ribbon Liberal seats have thrown a cat among the pigeons, while an almost 6 per cent national loss of support adds further blame to the moderates.

The new government is also scathed by this phenomenon, with Labor failing to increase its vote and in peril in some areas to the Greens.

With so much division swirling around us how comforting it was to go to Loxton Oval on Sunday and the comfort of community.

SAPOL warning of 'sextortion' scam

RIVERLANDERS have been warned against the sharing of private images online following the detection of an extortion scam in South Australia.

SAPOL has identified recent reports involving people sending intimate images or videos, then being threatened into paying money to stop offenders from releasing the material.

These offences - known as 'sextortion' - have seen victims as young as 16 targeted on social media through random friend requests.

Offenders then request intimate images or videos, and threaten to distribute these to the victim's family and friends unless a payment is made.

A SAPOL spokesperson said victims also receive emails claiming they have been filmed visiting adult websites, or performing intimate acts while online.

"To give some legitimacy to the claim, the email can contain an old password or username of the victim, that has been previously compromised," the spokesperson said.

"The victim believes the filming exists, although this is almost never true.'

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

Loxton hub for **Basin's** future



The Loxton Research Centre will be home base for one of four regional hubs being set up across Australia for a new consortium aimed at developing and commercialising opportunities for Australia's irrigated agriculture and rural water industries to be "more productive, resilient and sustainable".

LOXTON will house one of just four regional hubs being set-up Australia-wide to help safeguard the environmental and commercial future of the Murray-Darling Basin.

A \$50 million grant from the federal government's Cooperative Research Centre Program and another \$106.5 million from 85 partners will fund the newly announced One Basin Cooperative Research Centre (CRC).

The body will create and assess new sustainable water and agricultural solutions, plus drive adoption by water managers and farmers to increase agricultural output and improve environmental outcomes.

The Lower Basin Hub will be based at the Loxton Research Centre and will play a key role in "identifying and realising future opportunities for the Basin".

"The Lower Basin Hub will build on existing collaborations in the region to work on local priorities that inform outcomes for the entire basin," said Loxton Hub interim leader Kym Walton.

The hubs will be the focal point for place-based research and the demonstration

of new technologies and education and training activities, all of which will provide the knowledge and skills to support the prosperity of local communities into the future.'

Over its 10-year term, One Basin CRC's activities will be concentrated across four regional basin hubs located at Loxton, Mildura, Griffith in south-western NSW and Goondiwindi in southern Queensland.

The Loxton hub will include a consortium of local industries, plus partners and collaborators of the Goyder Institute, including the University of Adelaide, Flinders University, the South Australian Research and Development Institute, the CSIRO, the Department for Environment and Water and the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA).

Those behind the consortium believe the regionally based research and development will support innovation and adaptation by farmers and communities, resulting in more resilient farms and diversified income streams. They are adamant regions will benefit via subsequent job growth and socioeconomic improvements.

Interim CEO, Professor Mike Stewardson, said the One Basin CRC would pave the way to transform irrigation regions across Australia and internationally through innovation of water, agriculture and energy technology, enhanced forecasting and decisionmaking capacity, and pathways to adoption and commercialisation.

"Australia's irrigation regions are the powerhouse of Australia's agricultural sector, producing 50 per cent of Australia's agricultural profits, with the Murray-Darling Basin being the focus of two thirds of that irrigated agriculture," Prof Stewardson said.

The University of Adelaide's Professor Seth Westra, a lead researcher with the new body, said the group would "bring welcome benefits not only to South Australia but the entire Murray-Darling basin".

He will head up the Technology and Opportunities program: one of the three programs of the CRC.

"I'm incredibly excited by this once-ina-generation opportunity to build genuine partnerships between local communities, First Nations groups, governments, industry

and research organisations, and collectively shape a more resilient and productive future for the Basin," he said.

The national consortium also includes: the University of Melbourne; the Goyder Institute for Water Research and its affiliates; the Australian National University; Charles Sturt University; Hort Innovation; the Murray-Darling Basin Authority; Sensand Technologies and the University of Sydney.

THIS column is dedicated to tomboys.

The Oxford Dictionary describes a tomboy as "a girl who enjoys rough, noisy activities traditionally associated with boys"

Many girls like me often heard this description of us, mostly from adults who meant no harm, but who themselves had lived conventional expectations of females.

I quietly wrestled with it, not having the answers, but wondering why an active girl was thought of in boy terms. It felt unwarranted.

Having said that, it did help having brothers, because there was a lot to learn.'

Walking along the road one day with the boys, yet another contest fires up; the first one to hit the telegraph-pole with a rock from 10 yards.

Kym demonstrated that the elbow comes through first, essential apprehension for later ball sports, javelin throwing and the divine art of stone skimming.

Rocks didn't help with spoggies – and spoggies around ripening stone-fruits was a problem. So, after haplessly trying scareguns, scarecrows, and those flitting silver pieces, fathers allowed their kids to use slug guns.

The gun was first nestled against the shoulder then the sights lined up. For a socalled tomboy, I now happily report that most spoggies fluttered around our block, occasionally startled by a slug zinging past, some six inches away.

Once TVs emerged, sports-loving families like ours devoured the SANFL coverage, all in black and white, with Jimmy

Billie Jean King once said, "You have to see it to be it".

And since she and Margaret Court were the only sportswomen we saw, once a year at Wimbledon, I turned my mind to the raw power of Port Adelaide centreman Russell Ebert, the Riverland's Russell Ebert, our Russell Ebert.

On our front lawn, I wanted to be like him, mark the footy like him and effect the 'droppie' like him. If the stab-kick was timed like Russell's were, the ball would fly flat and direct.

Bouncing the footy was also an inspired art, firstly bouncing it nose down so it came

back, then doing it while walking and then jogging.

Dad took us kids to many SANFL grand finals at Adelaide Oval, the girls as keen as the boys. We were there in 1973 with 55,000 others, when Graham Cornes, socks down, took that flying screamer to put Glenelg in front in the dying moments.

Years later, The Advertiser covered my appointment as a Crows' specialist coach. Brother Mark, then a Crows' assistant coach, was quoted as saying, "She's the best dropkick I've seen".

But he swears that he said to the journalist, "She's got the best dropkick I've seen". Oh well!

In summer, front-yard cricket with brothers was downright demanding; either bowl straight or be consigned to wicketkeeper. "Arrogant," I thought, but they held all the cards, the challenge made clear.

Kym was such an attacking leg-spinner that I felt under constant duress facing him, refusing to give up the bat when out, as I hadn't even hit the ball yet.

Standing one's ground became essential against the boys' competitive drive.

If not searching for cricket balls among the orange trees, there were Cowboy and Indian wars. First rule, when shot you dropped to the ground and counted to 20, the last 10 finished with indefinable, impatient speed.

Not being a tree-climbing 'tomboy', nor finding joy in spotlighting or rabbit trapping, the pleasure was in physical expression.

So, Russell Ebert will never know his influence for girls like us. I'm indeed grateful to him, as I am now, that females are role models too, for girls and boys. All, as the term tomboy slowly fades

THE Mid Murray Council has seen significant cost of living proposed a 6 per cent average general rate increase in its Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget for 2022-23.

The council released the draft business plan and budget, plus its draft long-term financial plan for 2022-23 to 2031-32 for community consultation last week.

The plan proposes raising additional rates income due to the creation of new assessments and new/ additional building development.

Mid Murray Mayor Dave Burgess said council had carefully considered both the financial challenges facing its own operations and those of the Mid Murray community in setting the draft budget.

"In the past year alone we've

increases – from the CPI of 1.5 per cent, we initially budgeted for to over 5 per cent," he said.

"The cost of items like fuel and construction materials have risen dramatically.

"That, combined with reduced rate increases over recent years to support our community from the economic impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, has placed additional strain on council's sustainability and long-term financial planning."

Mr Burgess said council understood households and businesses faced increasing costs, but said it could no longer carry that cost burden without increasing rates or cutting necessary services and infrastructure spending.

"We will be looking at ways we can increase efficiencies and reduce costs without impacting on the delivery of essential services that our community relies on," he said.

He said Mid Murray Council needed to ensure the capital investments it was undertaking to strengthen its local economy were not jeopardised.

Mr Burgess said council also wanted to support local businesses as they continued to recover from the impact of Covid-19.

"We will also continue to offer relief options for ratepayers who are struggling by implementing a rates hardship policy or postponing rates for State Seniors Card holders on their principal place of residence," he said.



Council said its plan was based on a 3 per cent CPI increase in line with federal government projections.

It said this also took into account an additional 1 per cent, to cover the associated cost increases from the current financial year due to the unexpectedly sharp CPI rise over the past year.

The council said a further 2 per cent was included in line with the council's draft long-term financial

plan for 2022-23 to 2031-32 to ensure the council remained financially sustainable into the future.

It said the total proposed 6 per cent general average rate increase was equivalent to an overall average of an additional \$84 per existing assessment for the year.

However, it said the actual increase payable for any individual property may be more or less than that figure, depending on the value and movement in the capital valuation of each property.

Community consultation on the council's business and financial plans closes at noon on June 2.

Vocal Locals to spread wellbeing messages through Loxton

A NEW initiative aimed at spreading positive mental health and wellbeing-related messages among the Loxton community has been unveiled.

Vocal Locals – an initiative of Loxton locals and the successful online farmer wellbeing program ifarmwell - will see 10 prominent Loxton community members participate in the program in the coming months.

The project is supported through the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) through funding from the federal Future Drought Fund. At least half of the 10 participants will be farmers, and will complete free, evidencebased online if armwell modules, plus a faceto-face mental health workshop, which community members are welcome to join.

Founder of ifarmwell, Dr Kate Gunn, said the project reinforces the messages of the popular Kick Off Ya Boots production, written by Loxton grain grower John Gladigau.

"Kick Off Ya Boots was all about celebrating rural life, exploring challenges commonly faced by farming families, such as succession planning, and demonstrating practical ways that farmers can effectively manage in



difficult circumstances," Dr Gunn said.

"Vocal Locals will build on that by continuing the conversation, strengthening social connection and showing others the value of taking time to look after their own wellbeing."

Mr Gladigau will serve as the Vocal Locals local co-ordinator, while Riverland local Tanya Lehmann will be the Vocal Locals wellbeing coach.

Dr Gunn said ifarmwell research through the University of South Australia's department of rural health highlighted the fact farmers prioritise looking after their farms over looking after themselves.

The research also found farmers can be hesitant about engaging with mental health services which are perceived as failing to understand the unique challenges farmers face.

"Importantly, this research has also indicated that rural community members are willing to consult known local community members and to engage in health and wellbeing initiatives that they perceive as culturally appropriate," she said.

"Normalising conversations about mental

health and demonstrating the importance of investing time in maintaining wellbeing will help break down stigma and stoicism that is characteristic of Australian farmers and can make it difficult for them to invest in themselves, and to use mental health services.

"We are also hoping that Vocal Locals will help to open up conversations on social media that deepen and strengthen social support networks within the community, and empower Loxton locals to help each other with maintaining or improving their wellbeing.'

RIVERLANDERS have been urged to prepare for severe weather ahead of the coming winter months.

The SA State Emergency Service (SASES) is reminding people to be proactive and act now to prepare for severe weather ahead of the coming winter season.

Robert Charlton, SASES state duty officer, said preparing for extreme weather can minimise the impact on communities and individuals.

"Nobody wants to see water running down their walls inside their house or be without power because a tree or branch has fallen through their roof," Mr Charlton said.

"The SA State Emergency Service will always be available to help the community in times of emergency, but prevention is always better than cure.

"We are asking the people of South Australia to work with us to better understand what they can do before an extreme weather event strikes and contribute to building resilient communities."

Mr Charlton said developing an emergency plan with house members was an important first step.

"People should be asking themselves do they know what to do if a flood or storm warning is issued? Or where to go for safety and how to get there?" he said.

"Many of the risks can be reduced or avoided by spending a little time planning and getting your property storm ready.

"Our major emergency event in the state's north and west coast regions earlier this year showed us how homes and communities can quickly become isolated. "It also showed how people are willing to take unnecessary and dangerous risks by driving through floodwaters. During a flooding event, driving through flood waters is the number one cause of death."

The SASES advises the following, to get ready for winter:

Trim trees or branches that overhang buildings.

Check your insurance policy is current and adequate.

Inspect and fix any damage to your roof.
 Check your gutters, downpipes and drains are clear.

Put together an emergency kit.

Ask your local council if your area is prone to flooding.

☐ Monitor the local conditions by following emergency services or Bureau of Meteorology social media.

□ Call 132 500 if you need SASES assistance. Call Triple Zero (000) if the matter is life threatening.

□ Check the ses.sa.gov.au website for further advice on how to prepare for severe weather.

Kylie Egan from the Bureau of Meteorology said SA has an above-average chance of above-median rainfall for winter.

"This is linked to the chance of a negative Indian Ocean Dipole developing, which can result in higher rainfall for the state," he said.

"South Australia usually experiences a number of damaging weather systems such as cold fronts during winter, which can bring heavy rain, thunderstorms, hail and damaging winds."

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

The new section 41 committee replaces the Port of Morgan Heritage and Tourism board and the Mannum Dock Museum Board, which were also section 41 committees.

However, Mid Murray councillor and Eyre Ward representative, John Forrester, is concerned Morgan will be neglected following the board's disbandment in March.

Cr Forrester, the board's former chairperson, claimed the council's decision to establish the Mid Murray Heritage and Maritime Committee would mean less attention for Morgan's historical tourism sites.

Cr Forrester believes council's decision to form a district-wide tourism committee was due to him repeatedly raising concerns about the condition of Morgan's historical assets and buildings.

"I believe it is about the issues I kept raising about Morgan with council every two months," he said.

Cr Forrester told The Murray Pioneer last

week he had been raising concerns about the condition of Morgan's historical assets and buildings for the past three and a half years.

He is especially concerned about the condition of Morgan's former railway station buildings and railway carriages.

Termites have also been found in the Morgan Craft Shop building, while the town's former railway ticket office and the historic railway carriages need to be repainted.

Cr Forrester said he expressed his concerns about the plans to disband the Morgan organisation at previous Port of Morgan Heritage and Tourism board meetings.

He fears forming a section 41 tourism committee with Mannum will mean the Morgan community's calls for ratepayerowned heritage assets to be maintained will continue to be ignored.

Mid Murray Council CEO Ben Scales said the Mid Murray Heritage and Maritime Committee's role would be to drive the strategic direction of council's maritime and heritage assets.

He said under the committee, key operations groups would be established in both Morgan and Mannum, to look after historical assets in both towns, which in Morgan included both the PS Canally and



said the Mid Murray Heritage and Maritime Mid Murray councillor John Forrester wants Morgan's historic railway site to be repaired and treated Committee's role would be to drive the stra-

Morgan Museum.

"The committee has been put in place to make sure we are utilising volunteers and the knowledge and experience of the people involved," Mr Scales said.

"We want to really strategically drive and

look after the historical and maritime assets across the whole area.

"They need to have passion and commitment for the maritime and heritage assets across the district, whether that be in Morgan or Mannum."

"I am repaying my gratitude to the Cancer Council by organising these morning teas," she said.



Spotlight on controlling African boxthorn weed

THE Riverland's cool, damp weather means a declared weed has been thriving, but has also exposed itself to be controlled.

The African boxthorn will currently look green and healthy, which offers "the ideal time" for control as the weed is easily seen, according to Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board's Riverland district manager Hannah Spronk.

Ms Spronk said the season change and different weather conditions dictate what plants grow and weeds are no different.

She said African boxthorn remains a focus pest weed for control in priority locations across the region.

"Infestations left uncontrolled can invade roadsides and native vegetation," Ms Spronk said.

"Their thorns can be rather nasty if you get too close, and the plants can provide shelter for pest animals such as foxes and rabbits..

"While probably not their first choice, when there aren't too many other options around the small red berries of the African boxthorn offer refuge for fruit fly. This supports the fruit fly to stay long enough in our environment to attack other fruit crops.

"Roadsides and properties are a priority, especially any heavily infested areas and those with remnant native vegetation. Each winter district staff work with landholders and contractors on control in priority areas, and while the majority of efforts are effective, there are always new plants sneaking into the landscape.

"Now is the time to follow up and do targeted control of any new plants or regrowth."

Ms Spronk said district officers were always looking for any declared weeds that may need control work.

The most effective time to control African boxthorn - declared for control under the Landscape South Australia Act (2019) - in the Riverland is generally during the cooler, wetter months while the plant is actively growing.

This will improve the uptake and effectiveness of herbicide if used, and will be easier to manually remove plants with damp soil.

For advice on identification and control options or assistance with other pest plant or animal issues, landholders are encouraged to contact the Riverland Landscape Board office in Berri (phone 8580 1800).

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





Off-field, the ground teamed with supporters from all parts, with a who's who of Riverland footy looking on among SANFL club officials and diehard supporters who made the journey up the Sturt Highway for the match.

The woman behind the operation was

After a demanding weekend, Ms Wilson described the day as a "fantastic success".

"One of our life members, Robert Day, sent me a text Sunday night saying 'I felt proud Conny' and he's a stalwart of the club so for him to say that, I was rapt," Ms Wilson said.

"I heard Loxton sold out of grog and meat, and Les Lange was over the moon, so overall it was a fantastic day.

"I've said this before but I'm committed and I'm not letting the Riverland go like it was let go four or five years ago.

The festival of footy was played in front of a packed house of both supporters and distinguished guests, including a number of the Ebert family who sat in the grandstand as the Riverland and footy public paid tribute to Russell.

Russell's nephew and Port Adelaide and West Coast Eagles champion Brad Ebert was among those in attendance and described the event as a "fantastic day".

"It was a fantastic way to celebrate Russell's contribution to the Riverland, football in general and the wider community that he reached," he said.

"It was really well put together and well run by Westies and the way Loxton put on the show, was a great tribute.

"I thought it was a good way to showcase SA footy, and to be able to put it on in the town where there are still plenty of us Eberts around the place was fantastic."

Brad Ebert echoed Ms Wilson's sentiment, recalling bumping into some people who knew Russell growing up following the game.

"There was such a broad spectrum of mates and I even met a couple in the takeaway joint in Loxton on Sunday night," he said.

"My dad and uncle were all there and they were chuffed to be able to chat to all these people they grew up with, so it was great for us."







Loxton Basketball Club's failed AGM attempt a 'downer'

A SHORTAGE of volunteers has plunged one of the Riverland's most successful basketball clubs into short-term turmoil, with Loxton unable to hold its annual general meeting (AGM) earlier this month.

The meeting failed to muster a quorum, with less than nine people in attendance, leaving the club no choice but to reschedule.

Outgoing president Jason Hughes was disappointed with the turnout, particularly given the size of the club on the court.

"The reality is that we're a club with over 300 players but we couldn't even get 10 people to an AGM," Mr Hughes said.

"It's a bit of a downer when you have such a large and robust club and you can't get enough people and nobody seems to want to help out."

The club has enjoyed a fruitful nine years under Mr Hughes' leadership, with a steady increase of numbers and several on-court successes

Mr Hughes and a number of regular fixtures on the committee are ready to move on, but their departure is being held up due to nobody stepping up to replace them.

Hughes believes the committee's steadiness in the past decade is partly why people are reluctant to help out.

"We've had a stable and constant committee over the last ten years, so it's a real changing of the guard I guess," he said.

"There's lots of people that have been around for a while coming to the end of their time and what we haven't had has been that growth.

"We've had a strong committee, but it's been the same committee. "We've built the club from 28 teams to 40 in that period and

moved into a new venue... "Like a lot of clubs, people are

forgetting that it takes volunteers." Hughes has put the call out to the Loxton basketball community and is hoping to attract more people to the rescheduled meeting on Wednesday, June 1.

If a quorum is still unable to be attained, then Mr Hughes will again reschedule the meeting, with outgoing members of the commitbeing the time to move on.
