

# Woods plans three new parking lots, businesses protest

It seemed like a good idea — buy or lease property near Mack businesses in the Woods, build parking lots on the land and charge businesses in newly created special assessment districts 50 percent of the cost of building the lots. After all, they would be the main beneficiaries of the new construction.

Well, it's turned out not to be that simple. Businesses in the proposed districts are questioning the cost of the projects, who pays what and in one case, the need for the project.

Grosse Pointe Woods officials have been aware of the need for more parking along the

city's Mack business corridor for several years, said Mayor Robert Novitke. But because land is scarce, and Mack is so close to residential neighborhoods, purchasing the land needed for new lots has proved more difficult than expected.

Last May, Woods officials presented merchants and property owners in three areas along Mack with a plan that would establish three special assessment districts. The districts would be along Mack between Torrey and Huntington across from city hall, between Roslyn and Hampton on the east side of the street and between Beaufait and Lennon on the west side of the street.

Property owners in these districts would be charged half the cost of building the three designated parking lots, an estimated \$167,000. The city would pay the rest, providing businesses with more parking, and keeping the costs down for the rest of the Woods taxpayers.

While the plan sounds good in general, several business and building owners have problems with the particulars. Each proposed lot is very different from the others. The Beaufait-Lennon lot would be a parking bay, similar to one in front of the block that contains D.O.C. Buscemi's and Merit Pharmacy.

The Roslyn-Hampton lot would be behind the stores and be accessible through the alley that separates the businesses from the homes between the two blocks.

The Torrey-Huntington lot would actually be rented from Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church.

Businesses in the Beaufait-Lennon district don't feel there is a need for more parking, said Dan Lenahan, owner of Lenahan Insurance.

"I've spoken with all the merchants on this block and we don't see there's a problem with parking on this stretch of Mack," Lenahan said. "The

city spent a lot of money on landscaping in front of our businesses, and this adds to the quality of the buildings. Now they are proposing placing a parking lot in front of our stores, and they are asking that the landlords pay for them."

Lenahan said that the lot next to his business is empty and is used as a parking lot by his customers. He and other businesses pay for use of the lot and are afraid if a parking lot is built in front, the lot owner will put a building there.

"I counted cars for 10 days earlier this summer," said Lenahan. "And not once during that period did I see all the cur-

rent parking spaces being used. Now they want to charge us to put in more spaces. That's not right."

Frank King, an attorney who owns his office building in the proposed Roslyn-Hampton district feels that the formula the city is using to determine which lot owners pay what percentage of cost does not take into account building use.

"Office parking needs are different from retail parking needs," said King. "We have a new restaurant in the neighborhood, Trattoria Andiamos, that is across the street from the

## City, suburban effort to provide needed playscape at St. Ambrose

The St. Ambrose Community — church members, parents and neighbors — is collaborating on a project that will provide a much-needed play area for the children of the Jefferson-Alter neighborhood.

Plans to build a playscape have not gone beyond committee discussions. Where the structure will be built, what it will look like and how funds to pay for it will be raised are all

being discussed. The targeted date of completion is summer 1995.

"What we are trying to do now is get as many people involved as we can," said Sister Marie Cyril Delisi, principal of the St. Ambrose Academy. "We need to get the parents involved, the neighborhood involved and we'd like to see the children get involved."

The idea of a play area for St. Ambrose students and children in the surrounding neigh-

borhood has been a longtime wish of the school and the parish, Delisi said. It has only been in the last year that discussions have grown serious, she said.

"People are interested in seeing the children have a place to play," she said. "Right now the children don't have anywhere to play."

In the 74-year-history of the parish, students have had little

## Woods passes on in-line skate law

The Woods council expected large crowds at its meeting Monday night to protest a proposed ordinance affecting in-line skating in the city. So when the council said it would not pass the ordinance, they were surprised that very few residents were there to hear the announcement.

Woods Mayor Robert Novitke, as well as others in city government, thought that publicity in the Detroit media about the city's proposed in-line skating ordinance would bring people to the council meeting. Those who did attend heard chief of public safety Jack Patterson tell the council that the city already had an ordinance

on the books to cover the situation.

"In 1991, the city adopted the state's Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages," said Patterson. "This code was prepared by the state to provide cities with reasonably updated traffic laws. These cities have the option of adopting the total code, or not. If they do adopt the code and wish to make a change, the city council must adopt an ordinance. The code has been adopted by over 700 communities in the state."

Patterson said that members of the public safety department's traffic enforcement division felt that an ordinance dealing directly with in-line skating might be appropriate.

"When we looked at the uniform code, we noticed that the code dealt with 'use of coasters, roller skates and similar devices,'" said Patterson. "The code already forbids skaters from using the street unless crossing it. We don't want to beat people over the head with this; we want to educate people about the dangers of skating in the street where there is traffic."

If the city has issued four tickets in the last year, that would be a lot, Patterson said. If at all possible, in-line skaters should use the sidewalks in the city. They should wear helmets and pads and they should not wear headphones while skating. If you can't hear what's around you, you're increasing the chances of an accident.

## Police arrest suspect in church vandalism

Police are hoping the arrest of a Warren man will solve the mystery of who vandalized the First English Evangelical Lutheran Church in Grosse Pointe Woods.

Zbigniew Gromek, 36, was arrested by Grosse Pointe Shores police on July 26 for allegedly trespassing at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club. Knowing that he was scheduled to appear July 27 in Grosse Pointe Park Municipal Court on a vandalism charge, Shores police turned Gromek over to Park police.

Following his appearance in court, Gromek was turned over to Woods police.

At a July 28 arraignment before Woods Municipal Judge Lynne A. Pierce, Gromek pleaded innocent to three counts of breaking and entering and malicious destruction of property. He is free on \$1,000 personal bond and is scheduled to return to Woods court on Aug. 3 for a preliminary hearing.

Woods police detective Bob Kwiatkowski has been investigating the case since June 12, when Pastor Walter Schmidt reported to police that his church had been broken into and vandalized.

When Schmidt arrived at the church that day, he found tables, chairs and candleholders overturned. The wooden cross had been ripped from the wall, knocked around and tossed behind a row of pews. Various odds and ends — cut flowers, hymn books, pamphlets, items from the kitchen, stereo equipment — were strewn up and down the main aisle.

Each room in the building was ransacked and numerous pieces of property, including several items of historical significance to the church, were damaged. Losses are estimated to be between \$7,000 and \$10,000, Kwiatkowski said.

Woods police suspected Gromek after they matched his fin-

gerprints to those found on several pieces of property within the church, Kwiatkowski said.

Gromek apparently has been connected to at least one other incident of vandalism in the Pointes, Kwiatkowski said. A few weeks after the incident at First English, Woods police found Gromek walking in the area of Vernier and I-94, gave him a ride home and lifted his prints from the police car. Both sets of prints were sent to the Michigan State Police crime lab in Sterling Heights for analysis.

In addition, a neighbor who lives near the church on Vernier and Wedgewood said she saw a person acting suspiciously around 8 p.m. and again around 10:45 p.m. on June 11. Gromek apparently fit the description of the person

or no recreation facilities, said the Rev. Timothy Pelc, in a newsletter to the parishioners.

"I attribute this not to a lack of good will, but to a very real problem of space. In 1916, by the time Bishop John Foley decided that Catholics along the Jefferson corridor needed another parish to service their spiritual needs, most of the land around here had already been subdivided for housing, or was swampy and unsuitable at the time for building," Pelc said.

The situation had not changed in 1964 when the parish acquired the Detroit lot on Alter to build the new elementary school.

"Once again, expensive land in a highly populated area meant that superfluous such as playgrounds and practice fields were out of the question for St. Ambrose," Pelc said.

Now that a number of lots are opening up on Alter, the school has taken the opportunity to acquire the land and plan for a much-needed play area, Delisi said.


While open spaces are becoming available around the school, many of Detroit's recreation opportunities are disappearing. According to Pelc's newsletter, since 1969, Detroit's recreation facilities have gone from 125 playgrounds to 54; playing fields have been reduced from 40 to 14; recreation centers have dwindled from 186 to 50; and 101 playground programs have shrunk to seven.

"One of the points of the project is that the playscape will be not only for the students but for the neighborhood children," said Ned McGrath, communications director for the Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit. "This is a good example of urban-suburban cooperation."

Playscape project committee chairman Dan Sullivan said he is hoping St. Ambrose Academy can have a scaled-down version of what was built at Patterson Park in Grosse Pointe Park.

The committee has contacted the architectural firm of Leathers and Associates of New York to begin organizing the project. A "design day," in which students and children from the neighborhood give the architects ideas of how they'd like the playscape to look, is scheduled for September.

Between September and June the committee members will conduct fundraisers. Construction days are scheduled for sometime next June. Sullivan said it will take about 200 people per shift to build the playscape.



Sometime next summer, the children of St. Ambrose Academy and the surrounding neighborhood will have a similar playscape to frolic on, around and under.

proposed lot. The rear of my office is directly in front of the lot, but I don't see many clients here, and even if they did park in the lot, they would have to walk around the back of the building, around the corner along Hampton and halfway along Mack, between Roslyn and Hampton to get to my front door. Yet the city wants to assess Trattoria less because people would have to cross Hampton."

King does not fault Trattoria for the parking shortage. It was there before the restaurant opened, but he does feel that retail businesses have different parking needs than office buildings, and the proposed formula for assessing costs to building owners does not reflect this difference.

Robert Mothershead, president of Addison Group Inc., shares King's view. He owns the building he works in as well, and feels that his costs outweigh the benefits to his business.

seen by the neighbor, Kwiatkowski said.

Police theorized that the break-in occurred sometime between 5:30 p.m. June 11 and 6:30 a.m. June 12.

Woods police obtained an arrest warrant from the Wayne County prosecutor and were in the process of planning an arrest of Gromek with the help of Warren police when they learned he had been picked up at the yacht club.

"Based on the fingerprints, we're confident we have the right person," Kwiatkowski said. "The prints were found in places that would not have been accessible to a church member."

Kwiatkowski said there is another reason he is glad the case appears to be solved. On June 12, First English Evangelical Lutheran Church hosted a

"There is a shortage of parking for retail customers," said Mothershead. "I realize that, but my business does not have the kind of client base that needs parking. The city should put aside political convenience and make sure its cost formula properly reflects who needs the parking."

Bonnie Healy owns three lots in the Torrey-Huntington district, as well as operating Healy's Health Hut in the district. She believes, like King and Mothershead, that the city is charging too much for the lots.

"Because I own three lots in the district, I would have to pay for about a third of what businesses would be charged for the lot," said Healy. "Now two of my lots aren't high-volume businesses. If I'm going to pay that much, then spaces in that lot should be reserved for customers who are patronizing those businesses only. The city shouldn't be using some formula that determines cost based on what lot usage should be in 20 years."

baccalaureate service for graduating seniors at North and South high schools. There had been some speculation in the community that the vandalism may have been connected with someone's opposition to the prayer service.

"I'm glad it wasn't any of the kids in the community involved in this," he said. "I'm glad this turned out the way it did because some people were thinking it was related to the prayer service and this clears that up."

In his Grosse Pointe Park court appearance, Gromek waived his right to a preliminary hearing and the case was bound over to Wayne County Circuit Court. Gromek is charged with malicious destruction of property in connection with a June 15 incident in which he allegedly smashed a sun roof in order to get into a locked car at Jefferson and Barrington.

Kimberly Lawler, an employee for Goodis Endodontic, which is housed in one of Healy's lots, said there is a need for parking. Patients and employees often complain about the lack of parking, said Lawler.

Peter Karamanos, owner of Bob's Drugs in the Roslyn-Hampton district, said that he loses customers because of a lack of parking.

"My customers tell me that they circle the block for 10 minutes and can't find a spot so they drive away," Karamanos said.

His landlord, Patricia Iannace, is happy that there will be more parking, but is not pleased with the assessment. However she feels that it is inevitable, the need for parking is there, and the city must do something.

City comptroller Cliff Maison said that the city will hold two hearings, on Aug. 8 and Aug. 15, in the Woods city hall at 7:30 p.m. on establishing the districts. The public is invited to attend. Novitke said the council will listen to the public, and will "fine tune" the plan

then. The plan as it currently stands has not been finalized, and is subject to change if the council so desires.

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## Number of offices located in Pointes gradually increasing

For years Grosse Pointe has been known as a bedroom community — so it might surprise many people to find out that, quietly, more and more offices have opened up in the Pointes.

"It's a way to service our clients," said Joseph Melnick of the law firm Butzel Long. "When we opened our Grosse Pointe Farms office last year, we did it because we wanted to be more sensitive to our client's needs. We saw the need, and felt that opening a Grosse Pointe office would provide a real benefit. In this day and age, service oriented businesses have to do more to satisfy clients, and this is one way to do so."

Park city manager Dale Krajniak said the Park actively encourages offices to open in the city's Jefferson business district. Krajniak said the city's master plan, which was developed in the 1980s, called for rezoning the Jefferson area commercial district to commercial office only.

"The plan stated that the Jefferson business district is the 'most important point of entry from the west into the Grosse Pointe communities,'" said Krajniak. "By redesignating the area for office use, the nearby residential neighbor-

hoods would be better served."

Since the Park council rezoned the area, a number of office buildings have been built on Jefferson. John Gelle, who works for Ferlito Construction in St. Clair Shores, said the advantage of offices in that area are many.

"We are planning on building an office complex at Jefferson and Pemberton," said Gelle. "The reason is that we want to be able to serve the residents of the Park. Plus it's very attractive for the many doctors and lawyers in the Park to have an office two minutes from their house."

Gelle said the company has found almost all the tenants it needs to fill the proposed 6,600 square-foot office building. He noted that Ferlito deals with a lot of doctors who want offices closer to where their patients live. Under today's healthcare market, that is becoming more important.

Grosse Pointe real estate expert Butch Edgar said that he expects the trend toward more offices in Grosse Pointe to continue.

"There is a greater demand," said Edgar. "The changes in electronic communications mean that attorneys, financial specialists and others who formerly needed to be downtown, can set up office in Grosse

Pointe. The future is here, and that's created a demand for office space."

Edgar also agrees with Melnick that Grosse Pointers like being serviced where they live. Why go downtown, when you can go to an office two minutes away, he said.

"Technology has definitely played a role in opening our Grosse Pointe office," said Melnick. "Twenty years ago, the Grosse Pointe office would have been an outpost. But now attorneys there can take full advantage of the firm's resources. That's due to improvements in electronic communications, fax machines and telephone service."

Edgar said that another reason Pointers might see more commercial property dedicated to office use is because small "mom and pop" retail businesses are finding it harder to compete with large retail chains. The economies of scale are against the small retailer, so it frees up more commercial space for offices.

Not all Pointe communities blindly encourage offices to open up. The City of Grosse Pointe severely limits offices in the Village. According to City assessor Dennis Foran, offices can only be placed on the first floor and back part of busi-

nesses in the Village. The reason, Foran said, is because City officials felt that the Village should remain a retail business area.

Grosse Pointe Woods, on the other hand, strongly believes in keeping the balance between retail and office space. Assistant city administrator Jane

Bais-DiSessa said that the Woods requires all businesses in the city to renew their business licenses every year.

The city limits the number of particular businesses, said Bais-DiSessa. For example, there can only be 17 hair salons. The city does not do anything to attract or favor one kind of busi-

ness over another.

The Farms is currently working on a master plan for businesses along Mack, but has not released any details to the public yet.

"The trend toward offices in the Pointes should continue," said Gelle. "This is where people want to be."



## Most commonly made errors of investing are easily corrected

As you work to achieve your most important long-range goals (building wealth, preserving capital, planning for retirement or a change in lifestyle or funding college for your children or grandchildren), some education about the basic principles of investing can help make that journey easier.

Your first step before beginning any investment program should be to define your goals. What are you trying to achieve with your money? Are you seeking to build wealth over time? Do you need to preserve capital and use it to generate a current income stream? What are your tax concerns? Focus on your long-term needs and

shorter-term requirements for income.

Once you have established your goals, the next step is to have a full understanding of all the investments you're considering for your portfolio. Ask questions...and keep asking questions until you get answers that make sense to you.

- How does this investment fit into your overall portfolio?
- How does it compare with other investments with a similar rate of return or potential for growth?
- What are the risks involved?
- When will you have access to the money?

Just as your objectives may change over time, so may the long-term prospects of financial markets and economies. In addition, from time to time, individual securities and industry groups may experience an increasing or decreasing amount of investor acceptance. While long-term investing tends to smooth out the short-term fluctuations and cycles of the financial markets, investors should be mindful of and responsive to fundamental trends. Review your holdings periodically with this in mind.

Once you are clear about what you want to achieve through your investments, you still need to make selections for your portfolio that are consistent with those goals. Your selections should be based on the extent to which you are seeking to build wealth and/or generate current income. These factors would determine the amount of risk you are willing to accept. The more risk you choose and are able to assume, the greater the potential for

profit...or loss. Conservative investors would be wise to invest in higher-quality securities that offer a greater degree of safety and a reasonable return; aggressive investors may select as part of their portfolios more volatile securities, sacrificing safety for potentially greater profits.

Within every portfolio there exists a relationship between number of securities and the dollar amount each security represents. Overdiversification — selecting too many different securities — diminishes the significance of an individual holding. Good performers can get "lost in the crowd," minimizing their positive impact on the overall portfolio. In addition, overdiversification can increase the costs of investing and can make it difficult to maintain and manage your portfolio.

Underdiversification places a disproportionate amount of risk on a single investment (a portfolio could have an overconcentration in any one holding, industry group or type of investment).

Many investors are unaware of how tax legislation may have an impact on their investments. Changing tax laws only complicate this problem. We recommend that you continually review your investment strategies with your financial consultant and tax adviser.

Some investors consistently take profits early for short-term gains. This practice, better defined as trading rather than investing, can diminish overall profit potential by limiting participation in a good investment. While trading may be a valid strategy for a portion of your portfolio, investing is a long-term process, and a fundamental principle of financial planning.

If an investment performs poorly and its value decreases, you are often better off cutting your losses quickly rather than waiting for a turnaround that may never come.

The true worth of certain investments — those in which interest or dividends earned are compounded over time — is of-

ten overlooked. In essence, as an investment generates interest or dividends and as you reinvest those earnings, that new money may also earn income. The earning potential of these long-term investments is even greater if interest is allowed to accrue on a tax-free or tax-deferred basis.

While the compounding effect impacts an investment positively, inflation can often be a negative force that reduces the purchasing power of your dollars over time. Many investors want to create a hedge against inflation. To them, an investment is successful when its total rate of return (interest or dividend yield plus capital appreciation) is greater than the rate of inflation.

There is no magic formula for investing successfully. In the world of investments, building wealth takes patience, discipline and a basic education in the fundamental principles of investing. Setting goals, asking questions and developing a sound financial plan are part of that process.

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
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## Woods acts to regulate valet parking

In order to prevent future problems with valet parking, the Woods city council passed an ordinance that will regulate the service.

"The ordinance should handle any problems that valet parking causes," said Mayor Robert Novitke. "Until recently there were no places in the city that offered the service. When Trattoria Andiamo started it, there were some problems finding spaces, as well as some complaints from neighboring businesses. With this proposed ordinance, the city should be prepared in the future. I do want to say that the restaurant

people have been very cooperative with the city over this."

The ordinance will require businesses to have a city license before offering the service, said city attorney George Catlin. It also will allow valet parkers to use metered spots provided the city receives a fee.

"Parkers will be able to use metered spots, but they will pay for the privilege," Catlin said. "They aren't getting anything for free."

Catlin said city officials must approve the sites parkers will use before any business can be licensed for valet parking.

Joe Serventi, owner of Trattoria Andiamo, said that he does not expect the ordinance

to affect his business that much.

"We've been working with the city and done pretty much all they've asked," said Serventi. "We're no longer allowed to take cars in the front of the restaurant by our door, and this has hindered the valet part of the business a little, but business overall has stayed steady, even over the summer months."

Catlin said that the ordinance does not provide any "grandfather" protection to businesses that currently offer valet service. They must get a city license to continue the service.

### 2 homes burgled

An intruder entered a house in the 700 block of Berkshire on July 27 by breaking the glass door and reaching through to unlock it. The house was searched and the homeowner reported coins and jewelry were missing.

On July 24, someone walked into an unlocked house in the 1000 block of Yorkshire and stole a purse containing identification and credit cards.

The homeowner said the theft occurred sometime between 3 and 6 p.m. while she was in the back yard. The purse had been left on the couch in the living room.

### Shores case moves to circuit court

A former Grosse Pointe Shores resident, accused of pay-

ing for groceries in two communities with checks drawn against closed accounts, waived her right to a preliminary hearing on July 28 in Shores Municipal Court.

Monica Crillo pleaded innocent to two separate charges of uttering and publishing at a June 27 arraignment before Shores Municipal Judge Lynne A. Pierce. She is free on \$10,000 bond.

A June 30 preliminary hearing was postponed in order to allow police to schedule a second line-up. A photo line-up had been used the first time to help a Grosse Pointe Park store owner identify the woman who had given him the check for groceries on May 23. When the check was returned as drawn on a closed account, the store owner pressed charges against the woman.

At the second line-up, the Park store owner and a Farms store owner, who subsequently received a bad check and pressed charges against Crillo, both picked Crillo out of a group of women gathered in the Shores courtroom.

She is scheduled to be arraigned Aug. 11 in Wayne County Circuit Court.

## U.S. surveys area households

Local representatives of the U.S. Census Bureau will visit selected area households beginning Aug. 1 to conduct its Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP), said Dwight P. Dean, director of the bureau's Detroit regional office.

SIPP is a continuing nationwide survey introduced in the fall of 1983. It is one of the nation's largest, with about 60,000 households participating.

The Census Bureau publishes periodic reports with information from the survey. Subjects covered include the following:

- Jobs and earnings.
  - The economic effects of unemployment, disability, and retirement.
  - How taxes affect personal spending.
  - Participation in programs such as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, food stamps, and pension plans.
- Information from SIPP helps policy-makers and administrators determine how well government programs are serving the public and how changes in programs and policies will affect the public.

Here are some facts about persons and their health insurance between 1987 and 1990, based upon findings from the survey. (The sample size limits accurate reporting to national figures only):

• Twenty-one percent of all U.S. residents — approximately 50 million — lacked health insurance for at least a month during 1987.

• The average monthly total of uninsured persons in the final quarter of 1990 was 13 percent of the population or about 32 million.

• Twenty-eight percent of men lacked continuous health insurance between 1987 and 1989 compared with 25 percent of women because of higher levels of Medicaid and Medicare coverage among women.

• Forty-six percent of Hispanics lacked insurance for at least a month between 1987 and 1989. Among racial groups, the percentages lacking insurance for at least a month were 40 percent for African Americans and 24 percent for whites.

• Private health insurance covered 91 percent of whites and about 75 percent of African Americans and Hispanics for at least one month between 1987 and 1989.

• One-half of persons aged 18 to 21 had no insurance for a month or more. For those aged 25 to 44, 73 percent had continuous coverage compared with 82 percent of those aged 45 to 64, and 99 percent of those aged 65 and over.

## New Park printer costs city \$6,300

While it sounds like a lot of money, Park city manager Dale Krajniak told the Park city council last week that paying \$6,300 for a new printer for the city would be money well spent.

"This is not just a standard computer printer that people can buy for home use," Krajniak told the council. "It is a high-speed printer that we will use to print the utility bills the city sends out to Park residents."

When asked by council members why he was recommending purchasing a new printer instead of getting the old one repaired, Krajniak said that a new printer was more cost effective.

"Our current printer has broken down three times in the last 18 months," Krajniak said. "The last estimate we received

for repairing it was in the neighborhood of \$1,200. After a certain point it makes sense to buy a new machine, and I think we've reached that point."

The city bought its current printer in 1990, when it switched computer formats, said city clerk Jane Blahut. In '90, the city switched to an IBM personal computer network. This change eliminated the need for a mainframe computer, like the one the city had been using with the NCR sys-

tem it purchased in 1983. "We send out 2,500 bills a month," said Blahut. "We will also be able to use the new printer, a Genicom, for printing high volume reports and voter registration cards. It's quick — 800 lines a minute."

The money for the new printer will come from the city's general fund, said Krajniak. Every year, the city sets aside money to cover unexpected repairs and costs, and that's how the printer will be paid for, he said.

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
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# It's a long way from Falklands for owner of charter air service

It may have taken Marc Branch a few years and thousands of miles to find his calling, but the City resident's career now is flying high, literally.

After fighting in the Falkland Islands conflict and traveling around the world, Branch has founded Great Lakes Corporate Air, a Pontiac-based air charter service offering business and vacation flights.

Born in Windsor, England, Branch joined the Royal Marines at age 16.

"My whole family has an extensive military background," he said. "It was only natural that I went into the armed forces."

In his 3 1/2-year career with the Royal Marines, Branch was in a mountain and Arctic warfare unit, conducted anti-terrorist training in Belfast, Northern Ireland, and was part of a specialized tour that traveled each year to the Falkland Islands.

"It was known to be a good gig, and that's why I applied for it," he said. "It was a pretty desolate piece of the world, almost in the Antarctic."

That was in April 1982. Four days after arriving in the Falklands, the CIA in Buenos Aires notified the British that Argentina would be invading the islands.

A few days later, 2,000 Argentinean marines landed on the Falklands.

"It resulted in eight hours of fire fight before we were ordered to surrender by the government of the Falkland Islands," Branch said.

He was taken as a prisoner to Argentina. From there he was transported to Uruguay and subsequently repatriated back to England.

Branch was sent to an island off the coast of North Africa and then back to the Falklands when England took the islands back.

After a brief stint in the jungle in Malaysia in 1983, Branch left the Royal Marines and went into the Special Air Service.

"I discovered while I was in the SAS that I didn't want to stay in the military any longer," he said.

Branch worked for his cousin's air conditioning business before starting his own business in the same field.

"After a couple years of that I realized I didn't want to do that either," he said.

Branch sold everything and traveled around the world.

"The first stop was Bombay, India," he said. "I had this goal where I wanted to be part of a climbing expedition on Mount Everest until I got to Nepal and woke up and smelled the coffee beans. I realized it wasn't quite that simple."

Branch made it as far as the Mount Everest base camp. He spent some time in Nepal and India before journeying to Australia, where he stayed for a year working in the air conditioning business.

After a while, he quit that job and traveled around the continent. While on a safari in the northern territories, near where "Crocodile Dundee" was filmed, he met his wife, Susan, from Warren, who was on vacation for six months.

The two mountain-biked around New Zealand and got engaged.

Plans were made for a wedding in England, but the British government wouldn't let her in. She would have to wait three months for a fiancée's visa.

"We then hit Detroit with a vengeance," Branch said. "It was the first time I met her mother. It was the first time she had heard of me, literally, which was quite a surprise for her."

Mark and Susan were married in Detroit in 1990.

"We went from here out to Colorado, where my wife had lived for eight years before going to Australia," he said. "While I was out there, I attended Emery Aviation Col-

lege."

Branch had always had an interest in flying, but in England, he said, it wasn't an option.

"It's so expensive," he said. "It's mainly for the elite. When I looked into it here and realized it was a reasonable option, I had a revelation that this is what I wanted to do."

When Susan's mother became ill, the Branches returned to Grosse Pointe to be closer to her.

He started his primary flight training at Detroit City Airport. His flight instructor, Craig Kerr, is now his business partner.

"We saw a big future in air charter service," Branch said, "especially with the continuing inflating of prices by the airlines, the lack of good service and the frivolous waste of time, specifically in corporate travel."

"But because we realized that most of the public is 'charter illiterate,' it would be up to us to educate them."

Out of their office in Grosse Pointe, Branch and Kerr sold air charter services.

"We cold-called large corporations, trying to educate them on the sense that it makes to charter a plane with groups of people rather than fly airlines because of the elimination of such time-consuming things like baggage claims, driving to and from the airport," he said.

"The whole boarding process is such a waste of time. With a charter plane, you service 17,000 more airports than the

airlines."

Great Lakes Corporate Air officially debuted in January of this year, opening an office at the Oakland-Pontiac Airport. They now have taken over a wing of the airport and have a sales office at Detroit City Airport.

"As a matter of convenience we fly out of both airports," Branch said, "but our hub and global headquarters are in Pontiac."

"There's a big need for corporate travel service within the state of Michigan."

Flying Super King Air 200 turbo-prop planes, which seat eight passengers, Great Lakes Corporate Air transported 48 Cadillac employees between the Garland Resort (in Lewiston) and Mackinac Island.

They have also done flights for charity, auctioning them off for the Children's Leukemia Foundation. For a WCSX-FM telethon, Great Lakes Corporate Air gave away a flight package to see the Rolling Stones in Cleveland.

They fly all over the world, but are concentrating on travel within Michigan.

"The main flight we will be focusing on next is between Detroit City Airport and Harbor Springs," Branch said. "Our initial plans are to start in October. We have the capability to do it now, but as far as scheduling, we will test market beginning in October."

The flights to Harbor Springs will be aboard Super King Air 200s with leather-upholstered interiors, and a catered breakfast. The flight will be about 55 minutes. When a passenger returns to Detroit, his car will be washed, the gas tank will be filled.

"If it's summertime, the air conditioner will be turned on," he said, "if it's winter, the heater will be on. So it's really going to be a first-class service."

"The price will be competitive, if not cheaper than the airlines. And there will be more flexibility."

Great Lakes Corporate Air will gross about \$1 million for its first year. They hope to have 13 planes over the next five years (they have three now) and expand to Columbus, Ohio, and Denver.

"We find that the typical company who charters aircraft grosses between \$15 million and \$30 million a year," Branch said. "Above that, they normally have their own flight department. If they don't, they fly charter a lot and are beginning to realize they need their own air transportation capability."

"We're trying to make it pos-

sible for smaller companies who need to travel to have access to charter planes without having to pay a fortune."

Southwest Airlines' pullout from Detroit City Airport has hurt travelers on the eastside, Branch said.

"A lot of them used City Airport, and now that's gone," he said. "It's a shame because now they have to go all the way out to Metro."

Great Lakes Corporate Air is a custom vacation specialist as well as a corporate travel service.

With an in-house travel agency, "if you want to climb K2 in Pakistan, we'll hook it up for you," Branch said.

Branch enjoys ice climbing, when he can find the time, and

is training for the Hawaii Iron Man triathlon competition in October 1995. He has completed three triathlons so far.

He enjoys living in Grosse Pointe, where he swims three times a week at Neff Park.

"The concept of having a city park that is free and accessible to residents is excellent," he said.

His charter service will give the opportunity for climbers, triathletes, skiers or golfers to travel to follow these pursuits.

"We want to create an awareness to the public that the airlines aren't the only way out," Branch said. "Airlines serve a purpose, but there's a void that needs to be filled. We see ourselves bringing aviation into the next century."

# State 'reform' requires G.P. library vote

As one result of the adoption of the state's new school "reform" financing plan, voters on Sept. 20 will be asked to approve a maximum levy of 1.7 mills to support the new Grosse Pointe District Library starting July 1, 1995.

The rationale for the library financing campaign is that the new library board is asking the same maximum levy of 1.7 mills that was authorized by vote of the people when the school board directed the library.

In effect, however, if the people of the Pointes (and the part of Harper Woods in the library district) want to maintain a public library — as we think they do and should do — a vote of support is needed either on Sept. 20 or a later date, if the first proposal should be defeated.

During the current school year, however, the public library will continue to

be funded chiefly by \$2.4 million provided by the school board as contrasted with past annual school board funding of \$2.7 million.

The cut in funding has forced the library into several economies. Among them are leaving staff vacancies open, approving early retirements, and hiring some employees at lower pay than senior employees who transferred to the school system.

Another new state law permits the new district libraries being organized to levy up to 4 mills, with the first 2 mills in perpetuity and the second 2 mills limited to 10 years.

However, the Grosse Pointe District Library board already has decided to seek approval only of the 1.7-mill levy, the same as authorized by the school district

but never fully levied in the past.

While the maximum 1.7-mill levy currently would raise \$3.5 million, the board will not set the exact levy for next year until after it adopts its budget sometime this month.

In appointing the library board, the school board sought to assure Harper Woods of representation but this fall is expected to take a look at the "ward" method of electing library board members. That could insure a public election as well as representation by Harper Woods.

While the new library board became effective July 1, the school board is still required by state law to run the Sept. 20 election. However, the shift in library management has had so little visible effect that most people have not noticed

any change, superintendent Edward J. Shine says.

Ironically, the library vote is just one of the important effects of the adoption of a new system of funding public education. Another important effect will be a vote later in the current school year on a replacement property levy required to help finance the Grosse Pointe School District.

As we have said, the changes in the financing of both the schools and the library in the Grosse Pointe School District stemmed from the Legislature's repeal of the property tax that had supported public education, the public's adoption of Proposal A and the Legislature's approval of enabling legislation.

The actions did result in a property tax cut, but, more significantly, the net effect is a shift that cut property taxes but boosted sales taxes by 50 percent and added a number of new taxes. So for many people, there is no net tax saving.

Yet both Sen. Debbie Stabenow, Democratic candidate for governor, and GOP Gov. John Engler, the two people most responsible for repeal of the old school financing system, campaigned on the basis of tax saving.

Who's kidding whom?

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## Will gambling play outstate?

Just the promotion of a Detroit vote on two casino gambling ventures has raised the question of whether the gaming plague will spread to outstate Michigan communities.

Just before the Aug. 2 Detroit vote on legalizing two Detroit casino gambling proposals, the Detroit Free Press reported it found strong pressure to approve more forms of gambling in Michigan.

For example, Michigan's racetrack industry, already ailing because of the Windsor opening, is seeking legislation to enable it to compete with casinos in Windsor and possibly Detroit by offering betting on races from other tracks across the country.

In addition, bar and restaurant owners who contend the Windsor opening has endangered their businesses want to install 32,000 lottery terminals in diners and taverns across the state to enable people to play casino games such as blackjack and video poker.

Under bills introduced in the Legislature last year, each of the state's 45,000 bars and taverns and restaurants with liquor licenses would be able to apply for as many as five licenses for gambling machines.

A couple of late developments might have halted the new drive for approval of casino gambling, however.

Mayor Dennis W. Archer's open letter

to the citizens of Detroit, published as a full-page ad in last Sunday's Detroit News and Free Press, expressed his strong opposition to casino gambling as "not the answer" to Detroit's problems.

Earlier The Detroit News had revealed that Greektown developers Ted Gatzaros and Jim Papas owed the city of Detroit \$421,000 in delinquent property taxes dating back to 1989, a fact that could affect their plans.

At the same time, however, the Free Press reported that Gatzaros and Papas contributed \$95,665 to Citizens for Casino Gambling Now, with Gatzaros reportedly giving another \$7,500 to Keep Detroit Alive, a separate pro-casino committee.

Nationally, the recent casino epidemic has led to excessive competition which has left some sponsors holding the bag for huge investments. That strengthens the economic criticism against casinos.

For if gambling is no substitute for more broadly based economic efforts among Indians, as the experts tell us, why is gambling an acceptable substitute for better economic development in Detroit or elsewhere in Michigan?

Our view is that relying on gambling to rescue Detroit or any other Michigan city from the economic doldrums is pinning future hopes on a will of the wisp that is unlikely to pay off for anyone, except the immediate promoters.

## One of our nastiest primaries

Whatever else happened in Tuesday's voting, it seems to be destined to go down in history as one of the nastiest Michigan primaries.

With three women making major races for important offices — two for the U.S. Senate nominations and one for the Democratic nomination for governor — we had expected the level of campaigning to be higher than it became in its final days.

Admittedly, our conclusion about nastiness is based more on the low level of the male opponents' charges against the women candidates than on the way the women responded.

In terms of personal attacks, we thought that Spencer Abraham's campaign staff produced the toughest commercials we read and heard in its U.S. Senate campaign against another Republican, Ronna Romney.

In fact, it was depressing to see that Abraham's popularity rose in the public opinion polls as the quality of his advertising declined, although that may have been incidental to his improved standing late in the race.

On the other hand, a different test of the quality of political electioneering in the primary was offered by state Rep. Lynn Jondahl who felt compelled to spend some of his scarce campaign funds to deny that he "is too nice a guy" to serve as governor.

We long have argued that the low level of public discourse discourages good candidates from filing for office.

Such campaign tactics also solidify

party and individual positions and thus contribute to the deadlock that too often occurs in Washington and Lansing.

We see no way out, however, than to have the public simply refuse to vote for candidates whose campaign committees consistently plumb the depths in selecting their campaign literature.

But when will they start?


## Lights on?

It now appears that South High School may play a partial season of night football to test public sentiment of the activity.

The Grosse Pointe school board opened the door to night football when it accepted a Boosters' Club offer to install the necessary lighting, but the Farms council, after failing to agree on a permanent installation, finally agreed to permit a trial season with temporary lights.

For North, however, a proposed variance to permit lights to be installed around the school's football field was unanimously rejected by the Woods city council, on the 4-to-3 recommendation of its planning commission.

We're sympathetic to home owners' concerns about property values, safety, noise pollution and glare from the lights in both the Farms and the Woods, but a partial season might help answer the questions raised in both communities.



## London? You can have it, guv'ner

LONDON — I've received several concerned calls from the states wanting to know if I was anywhere near the two bomb explosions that occurred here last week. Fortunately, I wasn't. I didn't even hear them.

One thing I have noticed, however, is the tightened security everywhere. Policemen are now seen in the Underground stations and on the platforms. Last week I was on the train to Birmingham when we made a rather long stop at one of the stations along the route. Five cops were watching passengers disembark.

Curious, I watched the police to see what they were up to. I guess I stared too long, because one officer looked up and made eye contact. I quickly went back to reading my book. The next thing I know, the officer had his nose up against the train window, giving me a good looking over. After what seemed like minutes but were probably seconds, I nodded to the officer. He finally went back about his business and I figured maybe I'd better do the same.

Someone once said the first casualty of war is truth, and it seems the first casualty of terrorism is liberty. While the Brits don't want to seal the borders and detain everyone, they are nevertheless in a quandary as to what to do.

In the wake of the bombings of two Jewish institutions, fingers are being pointed and blame is spreading all around. The police are blamed for lax security and for letting a very properly dressed woman carrying a Harrod's bag park her car with the bomb in an illegal parking spot. Britain's intelligence agencies, M15 and M16, are under fire for not knowing about and preventing the bombings and for ignoring tips

I boarded a train in London for Birmingham at 12:40 p.m. The strike had ended at noon. I got about half way to my destination when the train stopped in Bicester (pronounced *Bisster*) and everyone was ordered off. The signallers weren't back to work yet for the remainder of the trip.

I then had to board a coach to Banbury, where I waited two hours for an intercity train heading for Edinburgh but which stopped in Birmingham. I made it to my "mum" and dad's house at 5:30, just in time for dinner. I'm glad it wasn't my first train excursion here. At least I knew what direction to head.


Huang, of Grosse Pointe Park, was named valedictorian of the class of 1994; Stephens, of Grosse Pointe Shores, was named salutatorian.

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

She's 4 years old and now she only eats abandoned sandwiches, pizza crusts and ice cubes.


On Ashley's birthday, we rent movies for her. She's seen "Lassie Come Home" and "Benji" and "Homeward Bound."

## The lodge Grandma used to go to

A few years ago, Bob and I went hunting for the cabin he and Herb built 45 years ago. The search and the memories it evoked were so much fun that this year we did it again — different search, same nostalgia.

That first time, Bob knew exactly where the cabin should be — except that instead of the old war-surplus Quonset hut they had put up, there was a soaring A-frame. So we looked further, driving back and forth along a stretch of the Au Sable, Bob remembering how they drove up from Detroit with the Quonset in pieces on a four-wheel trailer that threatened to overwhelm their 1930-something LaSalle, chasing it on the downside of the hogback hills, dragging back on the upside.

Eventually we gave up and stopped at the A-frame to inquire. The owner, an elderly retired state representative from Hamtramck, kept us in conversation for 20 minutes, eyeing us suspiciously when we asked about the hut.

"What's a Quonset look like?" he asked finally. "Sort of a half-moon." We waved our arms to describe it. "I've got one of those in my livingroom," he admitted grudgingly, and took us inside to see the dark, cavelike space under the sky-reaching A of the exterior. That was it, all right.

Charmed with that surprise, we decided last year to look for the cabin Bob's grandmother used to visit every summer during the '30s. The Parmenter kids thrilled to the black-and-white pictures of Grandma in her chest waders, fishing for trout. But where?

The last time Bob saw the place was in the same decade as the Quonset hut. He and Larry went up to Luzerne with a vague idea of using the lodge as a boys' camp. Only when they saw the condition of the log foundation, they felt lucky not to own it, and went away congratulating themselves on massive repairs avoided.

Now neither Bob nor Larry could remember where it was. "There's lots of old lodges around here," people said when

we asked. We got into conversations about gypsy moths and evening grosbeaks, stump jumpers and flatlanders, one-room schoolhouses, the CCC, and who used to own various old lodges, but no one could remember the McFate place.

That was last year. This year we tried again. We had new information from Bob's cousin Jean. She used to walk to "Uncle Bobby's" dam to swim in the pond. The lodge rambled because it was two cabins connected by a breezeway.

This time we struck pay dirt. The first person we were sent to see still works at that very lodge.

"Oh, yes, it was the old McFate place, used to be two cabins, yes, and Uncle Bubby Royce owned the mill pond where the kids swam. You used to be able to see the cabin from the road, but that was before the woods grew up."

She sent us to the caretaker. Yup, he remembered the McFates. "Robert," I said. "Yup, but he was a lot older so I call him 'Mister.'"

He sent us over to meet the owners. And the darn lodge was right under our noses — a 10-minute walk from our own cabin.

We walked along a winding driveway through the woods that wasn't there 45 years ago, till suddenly we saw a rambling log lodge with cobblestone chimneys at each end. "That's it!" Bob cried, with a flash of recognition.

The new owners showed us around and told the stories they had heard about the place. We all puzzled over which parts had been built first or last and what things might have been like in Grandma's day. He told us how he had seen a bear just last year and we told him how the kids had gone swimming at Royce's mill. He told us how the creek had flooded when the dam at the mill pond broke four years ago. "Cleaned 'er right out!" he said.

We told him about Grandma's fishing prowess; he told us about the footbridge that spanned the creek so McFate and his friend and business partner could visit from cabin to cabin. We discovered a mutual friend (a funeral director) and swapped stories about the funeral business.

A couple of days later, Larry dropped by. We were brimming with our surprise.

"Hey," he said, "that place on the main road with the wooden gates, that looks like the lodge Grandma used to go to." Dang, how'd he figure that out? Last year he had no idea.

Well, never mind. Jean was coming over the next day. She probably thinks the old place isn't even there anymore. She'll be surprised.

"The gates are closed today," Jean says the minute she arrives. "I always look at those gates and think about the old place."

We crow that we have just been there and the lodge looks exactly the same. Jean looks puzzled.

She's surprised, all right. She's surprised we didn't know.

### A boat that tugs at your heart

I am looking for something else in the Grosse Pointe phone book when it catches my eye: "Tugboat Annie (boat)" and a number in the Farms.

A tugboat in the Farms? There's a story here, says I, and three rings later there is a friendly, if slightly incredulous, voice on the other end of the line while I try to explain why I am calling.

"You make a habit of reading the phone book?" Emory Ford chuckles, and then tells me it's not an actual tugboat but a smaller working replica (it's 37 feet) built for fun; its official type is a "Lord Nelson Victory Tug" and if I want to see it I'd better hurry because it's leaving from the dock a short hop out Jefferson in 20 minutes.

Fifteen minutes later I'm hurrying down the walk at the Little Club and noticing that it's the kind of late July day that makes you glad to be alive: The flag on the lawn is snapping smartly in a cool breeze that has just sprung up, the sun is sparkling on little whitecaps out in the lake and nestled among the cruisers and sailboats is the cutest tugboat I've ever seen, complete with smoke stack, engine house and a neat bearded rope bumper on the prow.

Anne Ford welcomes me aboard and tells me she's the "Annie" the boat is named after. While Wallie, the miniature dachshund, sniffs at my deck shoes, Anne shows me around.

The rear of the craft is a comfortable cabin lined in polished wood and fitted with glowing brass, sturdy and serviceable. When I remark how authentic it looks, Anne gently reminds me that in a real tugboat this space would be almost entirely filled with engine. Instead, there's a bunk, a bar, refrigerator and freezer, a three-burner stove — and it's air conditioned.

By then the jovial skipper is aboard and while he busily checks a bank of instruments and controls in the pilot house that include bow thrusters, loran, radio, auto pilot, depth finder and radar, Emory gives me highlights from 10 years of the ship's log: They've been to Cleveland, Boyne City, 10 miles past the Soo locks and up to Georgian Bay, with some cruises lasting as long as a month.

A special moment came when the "Annie" was picked to start the tugboat race in the 1986 Freedom Festival.

Has anyone been fooled? "Once a guy ran out of gas in Lake Huron and asked us to tow him in," Emory laughs. "But I couldn't even give him any gas because we run on Diesel oil."

So, why did you buy this kind of boat, I ask.

Emory smiles. "Doesn't everyone want to own a tug?" he asks back.

Somewhere inside of me, a little boy answers "yes."

### Kaitlyn's totally tubular adventure

Kaitlyn Quigly is an honor student at St. Clare of Montefalco School and was just named "Rookie of the Year" by the St. Clare girls softball team. Now the 11-year-old can add lifesaving to her list of accomplishments.

Kaitlyn and her father, Dan Roach, were at a beach on Lake Michigan near Muskegon July 12 when they spotted a man and woman and three girls in trouble from the sudden undertow out near a buoy. While a cousin, Julie Roche, ran to call 911, Kaitlyn and her dad swam out with two big inner tubes to help the stranded group.

Her father helped get the nearly unconscious man partly up on his tube and Kaitlyn got the girls to hang onto her tube. "One girl wanted to go see if her dad was OK and I told her to stay," she said. When she saw one girl had trouble breathing, Kaitlyn pushed her up on the tube.

When the riptide kept them from paddling back to shore, the rescuers had to wait until the sheriff's marine patrol and

Coast Guard arrived. "... I was worried, but I was just so proud of my daughter," Dan said later.

Kaitlyn's mom, Sharon Quigly, is also proud. "That Saturday Kaitlyn received a commendation from Sen. Carl Levin for outstanding courage in her lifesaving effort," she told FYI.

Kaitlyn takes the modest approach herself: "It all happened so fast I didn't really think about it."

## Elm owners alert

**To the Editor:**  
Grosse Pointe Park is without a trained person to inspect its elm population for the first time in many years.

This successful program is geared to on-foot, detailed inspection of all elms public and private for early detection of Dutch elm disease.

When detected by trained personnel in early stages, an elm can be saved.

What can concerned elm owners do until the City of Grosse Pointe Park trains an individual? Most importantly, be aware of what Dutch elm disease symptoms are. Too many residents panic when they observe holes in their elm leaves, thinking it's the deadly fungus. What they are seeing is damage from the elm leaf beetle, unsightly but not deadly to the tree and inexpensive to treat.

Dutch elm disease is a fungus that the tree fights by not sending nutrients to the infected area. Some species of elms can successfully fight off the disease in this manner but in the Pointe the majority of our elms are American elm and its system is usually overcome in two to three years after initial infection. Depriving the area of infection causes a symptom called "flagging" — a whole branch of leaves becomes yellow, curls up and falls. As the fungus spreads, the flagging spreads inward to the trunk. Trained inspectors can nip this in the bud before it becomes fatal. Once the fungus enters the trunk it can spread through the root system to neighboring elms. These trees cannot be saved and the symptoms are very difficult to detect by untrained observers.

The primary vector of the disease is the elm bark beetles which are innocent carriers. They are attracted to trees for two reasons — the presence of a female bark beetle and because the tree may be in stress. While we can't do much

about the bark beetles' sex life, we can help elms (and other trees also) by:

- a) keeping their roots watered to a depth of 2-3 inches or deep root watering during hot weather
- b) fertilizing in fall or spring according to soil conditions. Clay soil which is predominant in the Pointes need only be fertilized every other year. Well drained soil can be fertilized annually.
- c) prune only infected branches during the growing season.
- d) preventive injection of systemic fungicide (but this is not foolproof).
- e) spraying but only if done when the tree is dormant.

Grosse Pointe Park has had an ongoing injection program since 1979. Annual injections beginning in late May when used in concert with watering and fertilizing can be a cost effective way of preserving our elms. Residents can inject their trees or have it professionally done.



## Lake levels

Shoreline residents on lakes St. Clair and Erie are cautioned to continue to be alert to possible adverse weather conditions, as these could compound an already high lake level situation.

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# Former Farms man survived horror of Bataan Death March

Few people have cheated death more often than Daniel Borodin.

The former Farms resident (now of Warren) was born in Vladivostok, Siberia, in 1920. His family were "White Russians," — not Communists or "Red Russians." They escaped to Harbin, China, when Borodin was 8 years old.

At age 13, he attended the Henry Lester Institute (which was run by the British) in Shanghai because his father, who had a soybean oil refining business in Harbin, was afraid Borodin would be kidnapped and held for ransom.

Borodin came to the Philippines to study aeronautical engineering at Far Eastern University in Manila.

He was in the ROTC program at Far Eastern when Japan invaded Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

"Since I was planning to come here (he had hoped to come to the United States to study at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology), I thought it would be embarrassing to me after the war if someone asked what I did during the war," Borodin said. "So I volunteered to serve in the Philippine army and was transferred into the 31st Infantry."

The 31st was the only American infantry regiment in the area.

Borodin was sent to Bataan, south of Manila, in December 1941 to protect the American forces withdrawing into the Bataan peninsula.

The Japanese made three landings on the southern tip of Bataan.

"They were not just thrown back into the sea," he said. "They were annihilated."

Borodin was stationed at Putot Point, where the Japanese bombed continuously.

"The glamour boys at Bataan were 31st Infantry," he said. "The real fighting unit was the 31st. I was 21 years old and I had to be there so I requested the transfer."

Borodin was assigned to Company M (heavy weapons) of

the 31st.

"We lasted about 100 days," he said. "Every day was like D-Day."

U.S. troops in the Pacific at this time were considered expendable, Borodin said. European forces were given top priority.

"To maintain morale, the official story was that in two weeks, supplies and more troops were coming," he said. "It was always two weeks away."

They later learned that the War Department was not to resupply the troops in the Philippines.

The 31st Infantry held the line at Bataan much longer than the U.S. government expected and earned three Presidential Citations. However, Singapore, Hong Kong and the Dutch East Indies were being taken by the Japanese. Japanese reinforcements from Singapore tilted the advantage away from the Allied troops.

"We were at the end of our rope," Borodin said. "The lack of food made everyone weak and there was malaria in the area."

The Japanese had food, fresh troops and air support. By April 1942, the 31st Infantry had only about 160 men (out of 1,750) left to defend Bataan.

Eventually, the U.S. government ordered the 31st to surrender to the Japanese.

"I don't know of any individual cases of surrender in our regiment," Borodin said.

He was separated from his unit when the surrender was ordered.

He and part of his outfit were walking down a road at night, but Borodin kept falling down, the result of an artillery shell explosion a day earlier that had thrown off his equilibrium.

He was put on a truck, but the truck's axle broke.

"I hadn't slept in about 40 hours," he said. "We lay down under a tree. I went to sleep, but I was awakened by an earthquake."

When another truck came by, Borodin thought another

line of defense would be established. It was then he learned of the surrender.

"I didn't like the idea," he said. "I thought we could get to Corregidor (an island at the mouth of Manila Bay)."

Borodin did not like the thought of being captured. He had an idea: His uncle lived in the Philippines. And since Borodin was not a U.S. citizen, he

tried to pretend he was a Filipino citizen trying to go home.

"I started walking and the Japanese didn't pay any attention to me," he said.

Borodin walked about 20 kilometers, but he was getting weaker. Suddenly, three Japanese soldiers grabbed him. They wanted him to drive a car for them, but in the opposite direction Borodin wanted to

head. None of the soldiers spoke English.

He saw a column of his men, who were now prisoners, walking by.

"I decided to join them," he said. "It was a stupid decision."

Borodin had joined the Bataan Death March.

His colonel said "it was too late for the cavalry to save us."

Most of those on the death march were Filipino. When someone would fall from exhaustion, fever or starvation, he would not be seen again.

"There was a lot of unnecessary meanness," Borodin said. "The Japanese would bayonet them or shoot them."

Once, when he broke ranks and filled his canteen with water from a well, a Japanese soldier thrust a bayonet at Borodin. It went between his elbow and his side, barely missing him.

The march lasted about six days.

"Most of the time I was in a daze," Borodin said.

Those who could walk were put into slit trenches. American and Filipino prisoners were ordered to bury them alive.

The march ended at a prison camp, where many of the men who survived the march eventually died.

At Cabanatuan, one of the Japanese prison camps, some of the prisoners received informa-

tion from a radio built with parts smuggled into the camp hidden in the mouth of a water buffalo. The Filipino men who went into town to get supplies were searched to make sure they weren't smuggling anything to the prisoners.

As the Allies began to regain control in the Pacific, prisoners were shipped to Japan.

"The Japanese did not want us to fall into Allied hands," he said.

In September 1944, Borodin was put aboard a prison ship for 38 days. Thirty-six men died from dehydration on his ship. Just three of eight prison ships completed the journey to Japan.

Since the Japanese did not differentiate prison ships from their other ships, the ships carrying prisoners were hit by U.S. submarine torpedoes.

Borodin stayed in a number of prison camps before being freed from a camp in northern Japan in October 1945, a month after the Japanese officially surrendered.

He received his U.S. citizenship after the war and moved to Detroit in 1951.

In 1961, Borodin founded U.S. Automation Co. in Warren.

"I never expected to make it," said Borodin of his experience in the Philippines and Japan. "All of the time since has been a bonus."

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
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## Changing life-styles killed 'woodies,' 4-door convertibles

Two Grosse Pointers will show their rare vehicles at this year's Meadow Brook Concours d'Elegance Sunday, Aug. 7, on the grounds of Oakland University.

The Meadow Brook Concours is considered one of the top three classic car shows in the world, ranking with Pebble Beach in California and the Paris show, both of which attract exhibitors from around the world, as does Meadow Brook.

Richard Thams, of Grosse Pointe Shores, will display his prize-winning '47 Chrysler Town and Country convertible and Gilbert A. Mack, of Grosse Pointe Woods, will show his rare 1937 Cadillac convertible sedan.

Both of these cars are representative of a type of car that is no longer produced in the United States. Thams' Chrysler Town & Country is a so-called "woodie," a car with a body made in part from wood, and Mack's Cadillac is a four-door convertible, a body style that enjoyed some popularity in the '30s but which died out around World War II.

Both woodies and four-door convertible sedans, or "phaetons" (named after an open carriage usually drawn by two horses), passed from the automotive scene as American life-styles changed rather rapidly during the Depression and World War II.

Woodies were magnificent vehicles, usually station wagons or convertibles, but a few woodie sedans were also built, most notably by Chrysler and Nash. Woodies were beautiful and impressive, identified with the rich and therefore with high status. But they didn't fit the post-World War II lifestyle. They were too expensive to build, too high-priced to buy and too much trouble to maintain. So they died.

But there are still some around, surprisingly many

when one considers how limited their production was and how vulnerable wood is to the harsh environment in which automobiles live.

The death of the woodie was a symptom of deep sociological change in the United States in those years between the woodie's birth in the late '20s and the post-World War II era. The woodie station wagon, or "depot wagon" as it was also called at first, was an elegant workhorse for the American gentry. Ford in particular built a series of woodie wagons during the '30s, employing craftsmen to hand-fit the hardwood panels to the steel bodies.

Cargo areas, tailgates and the doors were generally made out of wood in these Ford wagons and also on woodie wagons built by Chevrolet, Pontiac, Buick, Oldsmobile, Packard, Chrysler Corp., Studebaker, Willys and Hudson. Those woodie wagons were low-volume and more expensive than other models.

There were also wood-bodied sedans and, after World War II, woodie convertibles. Those woodie ragtops, the Ford and Mercury Sportsman and the Chrysler Town & Country, were designed to stimulate excitement while the makers prepared their first post-war models. They did. They are now among the most valuable and sought-after vehicles from their era, bringing prices approaching \$100,000 at auction.

The woodies appeared in their greatest volume in the

late '40s, on the eve of their death. The suburban explosion after the war created an enormous demand for station wagons, but the returning vets didn't want to varnish their cars every year.


The first handwriting on the wall was an all-steel wagon introduced in 1947, a Willys civilian version of the Jeep. The major makers were preparing steel wagons for this burgeoning market. They would use fiberglass panels and adhesive vinyl sheet to try to emulate the looks of the woodie without the drawbacks. It worked.

Four-door convertible sedans seem like a good idea, but they too died out as practicality in automotive buying won out over style and America became less socially stratified and more egalitarian as the crisis of World War II followed hard on the heels of the Great Depression.


"It's a lot of work to put the top up or down," said Cadillac convertible sedan owner Gilbert Mack, of Grosse Pointe Woods. Of course, in 1937, convertibles did not yet have power tops. The power top was introduced on the 1939 Plymouth convertible coupe. The Plymouth convertible sedan (which in fact used a Murray body which had been originally built for earlier model Chrysler Imperials) had a manual top.

But probably the main reason for the demise of the four-door convertible sedan was a

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# MADD pushes new law cracking down on underage drinking drivers

The message is clear and Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) wants it driven all the way home: If you're under the legal drinking age in Michigan and you drive, you lose your driver's license and face other penalties.

The days are over when the underage drinking driver is held to the same standard of illegal intoxication as the adult motorist who can purchase and consume alcohol legally.

On June 23 in Lansing Gov. John Engler signed into law what is being called "zero tolerance" for underage drinking and driving. As of Nov. 1, those under age 21 caught drinking and driving — even one beer in their system — may lose their licenses, face fines and be required to do community service.

House Rep. Frank Fitzgerald (R), District 71 (Grand Ledge), was the primary sponsor of the life-saving legislation.

The new law lowers the illegal Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) to .02 percent for underage drinking drivers. It is illegal for minors to purchase or consume alcohol yet they are not charged with an impaired driving violation until they reach the same illegal levels as adults (.08 and .10 BAC). This change to a lower BAC will make it easier to enforce and prosecute underage drinking and driving violations before the youths reach the deadlier

blood alcohol levels. MADD witnessed the bill signing ceremony as an endorsement of the hard-won changes. Bethany Goodman, executive director, MADD, Michigan, said, "This new law removes a deadly inconsistency that has made it too easy for too long for our teens to engage in a deadly game of 'beat the system.' Unfortunately, when they lost, too often it was the ultimate loss.

Let them face losing their driving privileges rather than a limb, a friend, their abilities through brain injury, their potential or their futures. "When adults finally get serious about this deadly mixed message we've been tolerating, we'll see a serious change in the way young people respond. To young people, it's inconceivable that they could possibly be injured or die in a drunk driving crash; maybe when enough

of their friends lose their driving privileges, they'll begin to think seriously about what they value and will change their behavior long enough to grow up safely." MADD supported the legislation as a method to deter underage drinking and driving and help prevent the related drunk driving crash deaths and injuries. Evidence shows that young people are impaired at lower

BAC levels than are older people. A teenage driver is at as great a risk of being in a crash at a low BAC, as the adult driver is at a much higher BAC. Experts cite the combination of driver inexperience and a lower tolerance of alcohol for the disproportionately high involvement of the underage drinking driver in traffic crashes. Involvement in a fatal crash increases as the amount of alco-

hol in the body increases. By the time the BAC reaches .08 for the 16- to 19-year-old driver, their crash risk is 40 times more than the adult risk, and at .10 BAC, the fatal crash risk increases to 400 times greater! These young drivers imperil not only themselves, but also all those they encounter. In 1991 in Michigan, 79 teens died in alcohol-involved crashes, with thousands more sustaining injury.

changing lifestyle. The convertible became the province of the young and the family needed a closed sedan or station wagon.

"There were only 1,001 of the Cadillac 70 Series convertible sedans made in 1937," Mack said. He guessed that its value was "somewhere between \$50,000 and \$100,000." He has not tried to sell it and has owned it since 1978. In any event, the market for a car as rare as Mack's is hard to pin down until a car is sold.

Convertible sedans appeared in the mid-'20s, but never did become a very large segment of the market. According to Old Cars Weekly, four-door convertible sedans never accounted for 1 percent of the market in any year from 1931 through 1941.

Most of the major makers offered four-door convertibles during the '30s, but they were all gone by the beginning of World War II. In post-war years, Kaiser-Fraser offered a four-door convertible Fraser in 1949, and Ford Motor Co. offered a four-door Lincoln Continental convertible from 1961 to 1968, the last four-door convertible and the last American car with "suicide doors," doors that open out from the forward post rather than the rear.

## Farms couple rolls out welcome mat for wildlife

Robert and Sophia Hull finally... finally... found a squirrel-proof bird feeder.

As the Hulls watched from the sun deck in the back yard of their Grosse Pointe Farms home, a local squirrel became increasingly frustrated. Every time it touched the feeder's perch, its weight made the door slam shut and the tantalizing array of wild bird seed was out of its reach.

The squirrel jumped off the perch and climbed to the peak of the feeder. Its tail switched back and forth as it hung upside down and tried to force the feeder's door open with his nose and front paws.

A passel of house finches and sparrows twittered nearby, waiting impatiently.

"That jay is heavier," Sophia said, as a sassy blue bird replaced the exasperated squirrel at the bird feeder. "The blue jay has

learned to keep to the sides and the edges of the perch, so the door stays open."

Sometimes five or six birds jostle each other for choice perch space. Their combined weight closes the feeder door. So Robert hangs a counterweight on the back of the feeder to hold the door open, temporarily.

The Hull's property has been registered as a certified Backyard Wildlife Habitat by the National Wildlife Federation.

They've lived in their home for five years, and have re-landscaped and re-planted most of the yard. Included in their plans: three bird houses, four bird feeders; four bird-baths; a hummingbird feeder surrounded by a profusion of red flowers to attract the tiny birds; an abundance of nesting material; and a compost pile.

"Birds are good company," Robert said. "They keep us amused for hours. In the evening, we often eat supper on the deck, when the yard is full of birds — 30 or more. They're most active from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., or until dusk."

"Birds lift your spirits," Sophia said.

The Hulls had been providing an inviting environment for suburban birds and animals and had been enjoying the results of their labors for many years. When they realized that they already met the requirements for National Wildlife Federation certification (trees, shrubs and flowers that provide cover and food, a water source, supplemental food and places for birds and small animals to build nests and raise their young), they decided to take the final step by applying for the certificate.

They filled out a questionnaire and submitted a scale drawing of their yard, with all the plants and trees identified. They made note of their added enticements designed to attract wildlife and birds. No fee was required.

"Yes, we get squirrels too. And rabbits," Sophia said. "We don't try to attract them, but they come. They're amusing to watch."

"We planted some flowers to attract butterflies and hummingbirds," Sophia said, "... anise hyssop and bee balm."

The Hulls said their garden is most commonly populated by house finches, purple finches, sparrows, cardinals, European starlings, robins, mourning doves and black-capped chickadees. They attract downy woodpeckers by putting out suet in the winter. They've also sighted red-breasted nuthatches, small birds with chestnut-colored breasts and blue feathers.

Robert said that last winter, they observed a white-crowned sparrow, a relatively rare sighting. Last spring, they attracted another un-

usual species: golden-crowned kinglets, insect-eating birds.

"For a while we had two Carolina wrens too," he said. "They like peanuts."

The Hulls would like to attract some pheasants, but have been unsuccessful so far. Each year, they add something new to their yard. Next year: brick edging around the flower beds and a walkway around the deck.


Sophia does most of the gardening herself. Robert built a pergola and a decorative trellis. They hire someone to cut the grass.

Robert said the garden and wildlife habitat is Sophia's hobby. "It keeps her out of trouble," he said, with a smile. "I like to watch them eat, watch them play, watch their babies grow. And I try to catch the rabbits eating my roses and tulips."

"It's being at one with nature," Sophia said. "Birds and animals are God's creation, like we are. Sometimes I talk to them," she said with a smile. "And I have a feeling birds aren't as dumb as we think they are."

Sophia's favorite Chinese proverb describes her view of the relationship between people and wild things: Keep a green tree in your heart and a singing bird will come.



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## Interest grows in Mackinac's floral displays

This is the time of year when Mackinac Island is abloom—literally. Perhaps it is because the season is so short that the flowers are so plentiful. It seems that in every bit of available ground a posy has been planted. Everywhere else there are large pots and window boxes galore.

If you combine all those flowers with the new paint on so many downtown buildings, the effect is ever so cheery.

And nowhere are the flowers more beautiful than in the gardens of the Grand Hotel. While most of us are familiar with the elegant and historic hotel itself, I, for one, had somewhat overlooked the gardens in my past visits. But this year they were so splendid that I wandered through them time and again and when I saw the lobby sign announcing a mid-morning garden tour, I joined in.

The facts presented by our guides Todd Fechner and John Szymczak, both members of the grounds staff, were fascinating. The most amazing was that, with very few exceptions, all—yes, all—of the flowers are pulled out each fall and new ones planted each spring. That includes 20,000 tulips. (The bulbs are given away, mostly to local residents, and the rest of the plants end up on the compost heap.)

"The gardens are very important to us," says Mimi Musser, vice president of the hotel. "We make them a priority."

The 12-member grounds crew works from April 15 to Nov. 15 of each year. "We begin by planting the entrance beds right in front of the main building. We will receive five semi-truckloads of plants, one each Monday, beginning the first week of May—about 100,000 plants, 107 different varieties," Todd says. Some 250 flats of flowers were used to fill just the West Entrance bed.

The gardens are designed by horticulturalist Deborah Silver of the Detroit area and are different each year. Plants are positioned closer together than necessary to provide instant display. "We want the beds to look full and in bloom when the hotel opens and we keep them looking that way all season," Todd explains. One way they accomplish this is to pull out plants that have finished blooming or gone to seed and replacing them with reserve plants from the greenhouse.

And although they use many perennials, like the delicate marguerite daisy, they treat most of them as annuals and pull them out at the end of the season. "That's because we'll probably put something different here next year," Todd says.

The tour moves along well, with Todd narrating at the front and John, who knows the botanical name of just about every specimen, bringing up the rear answering individual questions. You can tell the genuine garden buffs: they are the ones taking notes.

Several varieties of flowers are noteworthy: red geraniums are, of course, the trademark of the hotel. They adorn everything from T-shirts to toiletries. The variety in the large Chippendale-style boxes which line the long and beautiful porch (1,054 plants) is "Yours Truly." They are watered every three to four days and groomed every day. In fact, picking the dead-heads off petunias, marigolds, Jakkias and such is one of the gardeners' most-tedious, but necessary, chores.

And yes, that stuff planted with the geraniums in the lower boxes is parsley... "quite intentional, all part of the design," Todd points out that dill is used for effect in other beds.

The splendid pink roses which appear in several places are an old-fashioned variety, "Carefree Beauty." He explains that this past winter was so harsh that the roses had to be cut back severely, but they seem to be recovering. They were short but full of blooms.

The lilac bushes, seven different varieties, were already finished blooming, as were the peonies.

The importance of the compost beds is explained: "We need to make our own dirt because there is only about one inch of topsoil on the island; everything else is rock."

The grounds crew not only cares for the nine major garden areas, but also for the greenhouse, 10 buildings downtown (mostly employee housing), the Jewel golf course and the owners' properties. After the hotel closes at the end of October, the groundskeepers set about their fall chores: pulling up beds, putting away lawn furniture, planting bulbs for the coming spring and clearing the irrigation systems.

The hotel publishes a very helpful map and brochure about the gardens which discusses them in detail.

Not to be overlooked is the Grand Hotel's lovely 18-hole

golf course, the Jewel. Early last month, the hotel opened a second nine holes to complete this championship course. I was privileged to play in the opening scramble of the Woods Nine and although my golf wasn't great, the course certainly is.

Designed by Jerry Matthews of Lansing, the new part of the course—reached by a carriage ride through the woods—is quite different than the short-and-sweet front nine. To compare: The Woods Nine is 4,889 yards from the white tees while the Grand Nine is 2,244 yards. You get the picture: serious golf.

The newly completed course is a definite asset to Mackinac Island and a great place to spend the day while you avoid the fudgies in town. The Jewel is a public golf course and tee times may be reserved by calling (906) 847-3331. For hotel guests, the fee is \$55 including cart and carriage rides; \$65 for non-hotel guests.

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
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## The Pastor's Corner

### Feeding the hungry

Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church

On a recent Sunday, our Catholic parishes reflected on the Gospel story of Jesus multiplying five loaves of bread and a couple of fish to feed a huge crowd of more than 5,000 people. Reflecting on the story, it occurred to me that our modern world faces a similar problem of food distribution.

The United States is currently involved in relief efforts in Rwanda, shipping food and medicine to starving refugees there. A few months ago, news reports called our attention to starvation, homelessness, and disease in besieged Bosnia. Before that, we sent troops to help with food distribution among the starving in Somalia. Those places just happened to be the current headlines of the moment.

Starvation continues in countless other less spectacular places throughout the world. It is estimated that more than 70 million of the world's people are suffering from acute malnutrition. Yet, while millions starve, experts assure us that there are enough food resources in the world to feed everyone.

Something is wrong somewhere!

When Christopher Columbus first came to the New World, he reported about the natives he found here, their culture and lifestyle. What struck him was that the Indians had little concept of the ownership of the necessities of life. Land was not owned; it belonged to all. Crops were not owned; food was not owned. Everyone had access to the staples of life.

The Indian view presents quite a contrast to our Western culture. We are so immersed in the cult of private property that everything is owned by somebody. Land is owned, as well as what's underneath it and what is above it. Crops are owned, even "futures" are bought and sold. The sea is staked out and fishing rights belong to this nation or that nation.

In Indian culture, the emphasis is on "ours." In our culture, the emphasis is on "mine" and "yours."

Even our generosity and charity are tinged with possessiveness. I may share what is "mine" out of a sense of charity toward someone in need; but I do not consider that anyone else has a right to what is "mine." I may choose to share, or not, depending on how charitable I feel. Private property, however, is not an absolute right. The right to the basic needs of life supersedes it. When I feed a starving person, I am doing so not out of charity, but out of justice. I share my food not out of generosity, but out of obligation.

America is the richest land on Earth. We can rightfully be proud of our success and the success of our ancestors in creating a society with the highest standard of living for the most number of people in the history of the world. By virtue of that abundance, we cannot stand by while millions starve. It is not charity or generosity; it is justice which compels us.

I realize that there are no simple answers. The complexities of world politics and geo-economics are staggering. But perhaps the traditions of the American Indians — that the staples of life belong to everyone — have something to tell us. Perhaps we can begin to think of food resources in terms of "ours" rather than dividing everything into "mine" and "yours." Perhaps we, as Americans, have to take on a more universal view of community like the Indians who preceded us on this continent.

What we actually do about world hunger takes a lot more study and consideration than I can give it in this column. But God help us if we become so insensitive as to think: "I feel sorry for them, but it isn't my problem!"

The just distribution of the staples of life is everyone's problem, especially those of us who have so much. The hungry are justly claiming what is rightfully theirs.

## Wayne County, Lutheran Social Services are partners

The Wayne County Family Center, formerly managed by Wayne County, will be managed by Lutheran Social Services of Michigan (LSSM).

Edward H. McNamara, Wayne County executive, and Carl E. Thomas, president of LSSM, marked the transfer of the transitional housing program July 14 at the center, 20600 Michigan Avenue in Westland.

"We believe we have found an outstanding organization to run this very important operation," McNamara said. "The

public and the families will be very well served."

"We are delighted that we have this opportunity to again work with the public sector in continuing a valuable and needed service," Thomas said. "It is especially pleasing to add another service in Wayne County to the many we now provide."

"The Wayne Family Center is a symbol of the dynamic kind of relationship that can exist when the public sector and the non-profit world join together to serve human needs. The ones who will benefit by

this relationship will be those who seek hope and a new life through this exciting program."

While LSSM will manage the program, Wayne County will retain ownership of the facility located on what was the Eloise complex. In addition to the building, the county will continue to provide monitoring and oversight of the operation. The county also is providing the existing furniture, equipment and supplies.

LSSM will be responsible for the \$612,000 annual budget and for obtaining continued funding through grants and contracts from federal, state and local sources.

Private charitable organizations will be a particularly important part of the overall funding package.

Three years ago the agency ran a successful homeless shelter in its senior center in northeast Detroit. LSSM also operates Heartline in Detroit, a residence for homeless women and women coming from the penal system.

Now marking its 60th year, LSSM is located in 38 cities in the Lower Peninsula with 58 program sites, and services totaling \$49.5 million. The administrative cost is 5 percent.

Last December, LSSM was named the best-managed non-profit agency in southeast

Michigan by Crain's Detroit Business.

The Wayne Family Center provides transitional housing for up to 24 families with minor children. In 1993 the center served more than 200 families.

In 1991, \$1 million was spent to renovate the second floor of what was the commissary building for the Eloise center into the transitional housing unit. Much of the money was donated by cities and townships through their Community Development Block Grant funds.

Families share a common kitchen, bath, dining/recreation and laundry rooms and have individual sleeping quarters. The length of stay depends on need, but averages four months.

During their stay families have a variety of support services available to them. In addition there is licensed day care, an infant and toddler room, a library and an equipped outdoor play area.

Recently the county opened a Head Start program next door. It serves up to 35 children from homeless shelters like the Wayne Family Center.

The Center also offers adult basic education and GED tutorial help; health screening; substance abuse counseling; help finding homes; job development and placement services.

## G.P. Garden Center presents scholarship, landscape awards

The Grosse Pointe Garden Center announced the recipients of its annual Landscape and Designated Scholarship Awards. Money for the grants was designated by the Garden Center's annual garden tour in the summer of 1993.

A total of \$3,200 was given to four of the Pointes for beautification projects. Criteria included community visibility, landscape design and suitability of plant material. The recipients were:

- Grosse Pointe Farms Beautification Commission — \$600 for bulbs to naturalize areas along Mack Avenue medians and the entrance to the Pier Park.

- Grosse Pointe Park Beautification Commission — \$900 for planting Japanese Scholar trees on the median islands of Windmill Pointe Drive.

- Grosse Pointe City Beauti-

fication Commission — \$300 for a small garden beside the Whiteley garage in the city's park.

- Grosse Pointe Woods Beautification Commission — \$1,500 for the plantings at bed L at the intersection of Mack and Vernier roads.

There were three applicants for the Designated Scholarship Grant of \$1,000. Deborah Hefka of Fraser, a Michigan State University senior, is an adult student who returned to her studies after working for many years in another field. She works as a departmental aide in the business office of the Department of Horticulture and has recently been nominated to serve as an ambassador of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, the student recruiting arm of the college.

The Garden Center also conducts horticulture workshops and lectures, maintains the Trial Gardens at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial and keeps an extensive library of books, magazines, catalogues and other resource material of interest to gardeners.

The Garden Center room in the War Memorial is open Tuesdays through Thursdays from 10 to 4 p.m., except during August. New members are welcome. Call 881-4594.

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## 'The Client' scores

Whenever a best-selling book, such as John Grisham's thriller "The Client," is made into a film, the question arises, "Is the movie as good as the book?"

This movie is not only better than the book, it is better in many ways than most of the films made from Grisham's earlier offerings. Director Joel Schumacher's eye for detail, his straightforward direction and the cast's terrific acting put it in a class by itself.

The 11-year-old protagonist, Mark Sway (Brad Renfro) and his younger brother live in a shabby trailer park in Memphis, with their young hard-luck mother, Dianne (Mary Louise Parker), whose husband and father of the children is in jail for abusing them. While taking a walk in the woods, Mark sees a man trying to kill himself with auto exhaust. Mark tries to save him, but the man, a mob lawyer on a hit list because he knows the location of the body of a murdered politician, kills himself anyway.

Mark reports the incident to authorities without saying he was in the car. He is immediately besieged by police, the FBI and mobsters who suspect that he is withholding crucial information and will use any method to wring it out of him. Mobsters in New Orleans want to make sure Mark keeps quiet. Roy Foltrigg (Tommy Lee Jones), a grandstanding United States attorney who aspires to

higher office, tries to break Mark down for his own purposes.

Mark needs help. His mother can't provide it because she is sitting in the hospital beside his sick little brother. Mark's watched enough television to know he needs a good lawyer. He finds one in feisty Reggie Love (Susan Sarandon) who has had a few hard knocks herself. A reformed substance abuser, she lost custody of her own children but, like Mark, she is tough and resourceful. When Foltrigg and his formidable-looking team of investigators bring Mark in for questioning without an adult present, Reggie wires him. The resulting tape becomes an important factor in both Mark's case and later, when in a last desperate bid to rescue Mark, Reggie acts illegally.

The relationship between Mark and Reggie is a flinty one. She knows he is not telling her the whole story, which makes it difficult for her when he is brought into court for concealing vital information. Ordered to tell what he knows by imperious Judge Harry Roosevelt (Owen Davis), he hesitates. If he tells, the mob will get him. If he doesn't, he goes to jail. Suspense builds while he ponders his choice. Afraid of retribution by the mob, he chooses jail.

A child in peril is a scary situation and there are scenes in which Mark is threatened by knife-wielding mobster Barry Maldano (Anthony LaPaglia).

Each time we feel like cheering for him, and then being sorry for his plight. Mark is too cocky to generate sympathy. He comes across as a Superkid hero.

Courtroom scenes are often highlights of films like this and "The Client" puts on a fine mini-drama as Foltrigg, with his riveting gaze and commanding presence, tries to overwhelm the judge and Reggie, who comes at him with well thought out rebuttals. The judge is one to watch here, too.

A jail break, a hurried trip to New Orleans and high tension action bring the electrifying film to a close.

"The Client" is well served by a terrific cast. Both Sarandon and Jones are in top form.

With all that talent, the weight of the film still falls on the shoulders of newcomer Renfro and he bears it well.

Director Schumacher adds depth to the film by playing characters against one another and in the process revealing backgrounds that make them interesting as people rather than just performers.

## Schroeder, Fincham lead Braves to title



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

## Tennis still a big part of McMahons' life

One of the metropolitan newspapers did a feature story 10 years ago on the tennis-playing McMahons of Grosse Pointe Park.

Its focus was on how 18-year-old Meghan McMahon, who had completed her freshman year on Yale's womens team, was working with her 8-year-old brother Cullen to improve his tennis game.

Tennis is still a big part of the McMahons' life, even though the family has moved to Old Saybrook, Conn.

Meghan was recently named head women's tennis coach at her alma mater and Cullen is

looking forward to his sophomore season on the Yale mens squad after missing most of his freshman year with a wrist injury.

"I'm delighted to be returning to Yale," said Meghan, who has a degree in English literature. "It's my opportunity to give a lot back to a program that gave a lot to me when I was a player there."

Meghan graduated from Yale in 1987 after an outstanding career that saw her named to the all-Ivy League team and All-American squad three times each. Playing No. 1 singles and doubles, she was Yale's most

valuable player in 1986 and 1987 and was a member of the 1984 Prentice Cup team, a squad comprising three Yale players and three Harvard players which competed against Oxford and Cambridge universities in England.

She was also a member of the 1985 United States National team, which was the first amateur tennis team to compete in the People's Republic of China.

Meghan and her husband, Ross Smith, are spending their second summer as head professionals at Wee Burn Country Club in Darien, Conn. Cullen is working as an assistant pro at the same club.

Meghan spent the last two seasons as head women's coach at Columbia University, directing the Lions to a 10-12 overall record. Her other coaching positions were at the University of Illinois-Chicago, where she received a master's degree from the Jane Addams College of Social Work, and at the Oak Park Tennis Club in Oak Park, Ill.

Next month she'll take over a Bulldog team that was 7-8 last season, but she has high hopes for the future of the squad.

"I think there's every reason to believe that the team can be nationally competitive," she said.

Meghan graduated from Grosse Pointe South in 1983 and won the girls Class A state champion in No. 1 singles.

Cullen, a 1993 South graduate, was an all-state selection all four of his seasons with the Blue Devils and was consistently ranked among the top 15

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# North places four on All-State squad

Ken Gutow has been coaching tennis at Grosse Pointe North since 1971 and he's never seen a better 1-2 punch at the school than this year's combination of Mark Levine and Craig Rogowski.

The two Norsemen made an impression on other coaches, too, as they each earned All-State honors on the team selected by the Michigan High School Tennis Coaches Association.

Joining Levine, who made the first team, and Rogowski, who received honorable mention, were Ajit Sarnaik and Jon Van Assche, who were one of only five doubles teams to make the All-State squad.

"Mark and Craig are the best No. 1 and No. 2 singles players I've coached," said Gutow, who was named regional coach of the year.

It could have been a touchy situation with Levine and Rogowski because they were so close in ability, but the two were mature enough to handle it.

"They could have been challenging each other every week," Gutow said, "but they played three times in the 11th grade and Craig realized that Mark was ahead of him and he accepted his role of No. 2. And Mark didn't gloat over playing No. 1. I talked with both of them and I was proud of the way each of them handled it.

"Now if they had played at the end of the year, I'm not sure who would have won. Craig was playing just super and Mark was down a little bit after a couple tough losses."

Levine, who'll play tennis at Michigan State, was a late

bloomer. He played third singles as a freshman, moved to No. 2 as a sophomore and was No. 1 the last two seasons, earning All-State honors both times.

"He was a joy to have for four years and I don't think he's reached his peak yet. He's all arms and legs and it took him a little longer to develop," Gutow said. "Mark's parents have been very supportive, too, without being pushy. He's a good basketball player, but when he gave that up to concentrate on tennis, they let him make the decision."

Levine was a regular at the junior tournaments in the summer and Gutow credits the hard work for his improvement as a player.

Rogowski, who was the first North player to play No. 1 singles as a freshman, held that spot for two seasons.

"It wasn't a case of Craig playing worse, but Mark just got so much better," Gutow said.

Rogowski, who also received All-State mention the last two seasons, made a lasting impression on Okemos coach Joe Powers.

"When we played Okemos Joe said to me, 'He just never gives up,'" Gutow said. "He plays it one point at a time and tries to make the most of every point."

A good illustration of that was Rogowski's quarterfinal match where he trailed 5-1 in the first set and came back to win 7-5.

North's first doubles team of Sarnaik and Van Assche had a 23-5 record and all but one of the defeats were to a team that earned All-State honors.

"They lost to Okemos' No. 1 twice on a tie-breaker and lost to Ann Arbor Huron's No. 1 on a tiebreaker. They also lost once to Peter Brown and Steve Verb of University Liggett, but beat them twice," Gutow said. "The only time they lost to somebody they should have beaten was when they lost to Traverse City in the state meet and they might have been looking ahead to the next match (against Huron)."

Sarnaik, a senior, was the leader of the doubles team and Van Assche, a junior, was a willing follower.

"They had some discussions, but they always worked them out," Gutow said. "A doubles team has to be compatible and they were. They had a series of hand signals that would take the opponents a set and a half to figure out. Each knew where the other was going even before the racquet hit the ball."

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"We're hopeful that Angela will become one of the leaders after this," he said.

Scheibner has set some modest goals for herself, despite moving up to the national ranks.


"(I want) to be in the top 10 in the DRYA (Detroit River Yachting Association) and to be the top female on the laser course each Thursday," she said.

Scheibner is a big booster of Crescent Sail's junior program.



Scheibner admits she's a bit apprehensive about her trip to Rochester to compete for the prestigious Leiter Cup.


"The regatta will give me a lot of experience," she said. "It will be very different from what I'm used to."



# South trio makes tennis dream team

Jeff Wheeler graduated from Grosse Pointe South as one of the best tennis players in the school's illustrious history, but it wasn't always that way.

"He didn't think he was good enough to play for us as a freshman," said coach Tom Berschback. "I think he would have been, but I couldn't convince him of that."

Wheeler polished his game and by the time he was a sophomore, he was unbeatable at the high school level, posting a 23-0 record while playing third singles.

He closed out his prep career as one of the best players in the state, earning a spot on the Class A All-State squad selected by the Michigan High School Tennis Coaches Association.

South's first doubles team of Andy Giraldo and Rob Hostetter was one of two doubles pairs to receive honorable mention.

"Jeff is the quickest player I've coached," Berschback said. "In three years at South, he lost only four matches. He had three losses as a junior playing No. 2 singles and his only loss this year, before the state meet, was by default. And playing No. 1, he was facing the best players in the state."

"Jeff doesn't have the power some players have, but he's much quicker than most, and he's improved his power strokes. He has the ability to manipulate his opponents. As a coach, it's fun to watch him because he's always thinking one or two shots ahead. He won every three-set match he played except for the last one because he learns from his losses."

Wheeler's final day of high school tennis was a grueling one. He was on the court for seven hours and finally just ran out of gas in the quarterfinals after playing four straight 7-6 sets.

"He could hardly walk and for a player who relies on his quickness like Jeff does, it was really difficult," Berschback said.

While Berschback expected Wheeler to earn All-State honors, he was surprised that his first doubles team got the nod.

"It's remarkable that they could rise to that level having played together for less than a whole season," the coach said.

"They complemented each other and respected each other's abilities. Usually my doubles players come to me 10 or 15 times a season and tell me 'I can't play with him,' but I think that only happened once or twice with Rob and Andy."

"One could always sense when the other one was down and he'd try to pick him up. They talked to each other well on the court, too."

Giraldo had a problem with his hip and couldn't cover the amount of the court needed to take on the top singles players, so the move to doubles was a godsend for him. Giraldo's experience also helped Hostetter, whose first love is golf and who has played less tennis than his partner.

"Andy has very good match sense and Rob is a very talented player," Berschback said. "Usually you don't find tennis All-Staters who participate in more than one sport."

South has now had an All-State doubles team each of the last four seasons.

# Fertilizing roses and fighting earwigs and beetles

**Q.** When is the best time to fertilize my roses?

**A.** Do not apply high nitrogen fertilizers to roses after Aug. 1. When applied late in the season, nitrogen may stimulate fresh growth and delay hardening of the wood before winter.

**Q.** What are these small, black, hard-shelled beetles that are coming into my home? They seem to have a snout, and do not fly?

**A.** You are describing the strawberry root weevil. These little guys do not do damage indoors, they are simply coming in to get out of the weather. Caulk and seal any possible openings in the foundation, around window sills and door jambs. You have the option to use Diazinon or Dursban around the foundation to create a chemical barrier. Boric acid or Orthoboric may be used around the baseboards for that indoor chemical barrier.

**Q.** A little metallic green beetle is feeding on anything and everything in my yard.

**A.** The half-inch iridescent beetle is the infamous Japanese beetle adult. During the summer they emerge from the ground where they spent the spring as a grub. The adults are best controlled by handpicking them and dropping them into a bucket of soapy water (this makes it easier for them to drown). They are not easily killed by sprays but many products are listed for them.



**Q.** The earwigs are back! What are the recommended controls?

**A.** Earwigs are reddish-brown, 1/4 to 1 1/4-inch insects that are easily recognized by prominent forceps-like appendages at the tip of the abdomen. They eat mostly plant material but will also consume insects, dead or alive. Fortunately, the damage by earwigs is generally much less severe than would be expected by the concentration of earwigs present. They are considered a nuisance pest and are found in and around homes, produce and shrubbery. Caulk and seal any openings under doors, screens and foundations to exclude them from getting indoors. Shake out and wash any produce or flowers brought in from the garden. Take measures to dry out

damp areas near the foundation. Reduce lighting around doors. Set out rolls of newspaper to trap the insect, then dispose of the rolls daily. A box with holes in the sides baited with oatmeal and set in the infested area is an efficient trap also. Malathion, Diazinon or Sevin may be used to treat foundations, especially near doors, ground level windows and mulch. Indoor invasions are temporary, a crawling insect spray will be effective.

**Q.** Why should I mulch my garden?

**A.** Mulching will help keep weeds down, keep moisture in and help maintain a more consistent soil temperature. In the vegetable garden use straw, newspaper compost and other biodegradable materials in the path and around plants about two to three inches thick. In the landscape you will want to use materials that will not decompose too quickly, so choose materials like shredded bark, woodchips and the landscaping fabrics. Avoid use of black plastic because it doesn't let the soil breathe and can destroy plant roots.

**Q.** Is this a good time to renovate my lawn?

**A.** Now is a good time to begin the process of lawn renovation. Apply your weed control product and allow it about two weeks to be taken into the system of the plants you are destroying. Next change the grade or enhance the soil quality. M.S.U. has advised

that the best time for seeding of turf is between Aug. 15 and Sept. 15. Choose a seed blend which incorporates an improved Kentucky bluegrass and fine fescue type of grass. For more information on seeding or reseeding a lawn contact the extension office and request bulletin E-1491 or for sodding, E-1490.

**Q.** There is a low-growing, matty-looking, grassy weed invading my lawn. It has a light blue hue and the grass is branched closely to the stem.

**A.** It sounds like you are looking at bent grass. This type of grass can be beautiful when properly cared for, but when it gets incorporated with bluegrass lawns it becomes a ratty looking mess. Because it is a perennial grass just like the bluegrass, there is not a good selective chemical control. In some cases it can be dug up. But the most effective method is to use a total kill product such as Round-up or Kleen-up, following label directions. After waiting the appropriate amount of time you can re-sod or re-seed the area.






