

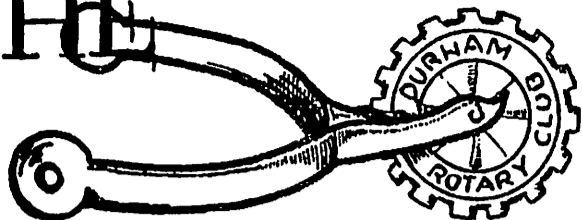

WILL THE REAL RONALD MCDONALD PLEASE STAND - - -

- - - MARV HASTY introduced our speaker last Monday, our own DR. FRED LANDIS. Now "Ronald McDonald" is hardly respectful enough for so serious and intellectual a speaker, but FRED himself so labelled himself, so how can I resist?

FRED gave us a most fascinating update on implant dentistry. Passing around actual color photos (not to be associated with the stewed tomatoes!) and actual implant frames, FRED described his procedures, successes, and an occasional disappointment. What are dental implants? They are devices for attaching replacement teeth firmly to the oral tissues (bone and gum). There are four types of dental implants, each used for a specific purpose.

1. The Subperiosteal Implant is a frame-like implant which is placed on the bone underneath the gum tissue. Posts from this frame extend through the tissue, and replacement teeth are attached to them. This type of implant is used most successfully where patients have had bone loss and can no longer function adequately with conventional dentures.

2. The Endosteal Implant is placed into the bone where there is sufficient bone remaining. It has posts projecting through the tissue to which the replacement teeth are attached. It is more often used with natural teeth and is helpful to people who cannot tolerate removable dentures.
3. The Endodontic-Endosteal Implant is used to help immobilize loose teeth. The implant passes through the root of the tooth into the surrounding bone. This implant effectively gives longer life to your own teeth which otherwise might have to be removed. As with all implants, an effective disease-control program must also be instituted.
4. Intramucosal Inserts are tissue implants used to stabilize removable dentures where other types of implants are not feasible. These are little button-shaped projections that are placed on the denture surface that touches the gum. Depressions are prepared in the tissues for these projections. The denture is now far more retentive and stable.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING (January 8, 1979) - - -

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 P.M. by President Jim Mitchell

Members Present: Jim Mitchell, President; Bob Birdseye, Immediate Past President; George Boggs, Secretary; Bruce Norlie, Treasurer; Clint Goss, Dwight Brinson, Bill Dempsey, Fred Landis, Rick Landess.

Members Absent: Hank Marsh, Vice President

Visitors Present: Roy Ellis, Jim Patterson

Minutes of the December 4, 1978 Board Meeting: The minutes of the December 4, 1978 Board meeting were approved as presented.

Fiscal Report: Bruce Norlie, Treasurer reported a club balance of \$1132.64 of which \$459.23 is designated for Rotary Foundation.

District Conference Committee Report: George Boggs reported that he is scheduling a meeting of the District Conference Committee for next week. The District Conference Committee membership includes George Boggs, Chairman, Garrie Starmer, Coordinator, Bob Birdseye, Hank Marsh, and Jim Dalton. One of the major functions of the committee will be to promote attendance at the upcoming District Conference in Chico. The Board members suggested that the Durham Club members should wear a specially designed shirt or vest which would identify them as Durham Rotary members. These garments would be individually financed and could be worn to other District Functions.

Community Projects: Clint Goss, Dwight Brinson, and Bill Dempsey reported on the progress of community projects. Clint reported that a platform for the Community sign is not feasible due to the position and construction of the sign. He suggested that we consider a trailer with a platform which could be parked temporarily in front of the sign for changing.

Forms for the picnic benches will cost \$93.10 and could be constructed soon. Construction of a drinking fountain and seat wall at the Swimming Pool would make good project for a work day. If a work day were scheduled for a weekend in February, the fountain could be constructed, if the weather permitted, if not the workers could move indoors and construct picnic benches. Jim Mitchell will set the date for the work day.

Sponsorship of Haunted House Exhibit: The Board voted unanimously (motion - Bob Birdseye, second - Bill Dempsey) to accept responsibility for the planning, construction, and running of the Haunted House Exhibit at the 1979 community Halloween Party, under the general direction of the Durham Junior Women's Club.

Rotary Foundation Scholarship: The Board appointed Rick Landess to meet with the appropriate personnel at the High School to determine whether we have any candidates for nomination for the Rotary Foundation Scholarship. Robin McMichael, the successful candidate from Durham this year, has decided not to accept her award due to personal reasons.

Rotary Scholarship Game: President Jim Mitchell reported that only half of the profits obtained from the Butte College Rotary Scholarship Game actually go towards student scholarships. Of the remaining fifty percent, half goes to the student body, and half to the general athletic budget. The Board expressed some concern over this distribution and suggested that President Jim Mitchell call the interclub committee together to discuss the Rotary Scholarship Game participation.

Executive Session: The Board directed that we complete the "in memorium" Paul Harris Fellowship in the name of Charlie Schaub and further, that we begin another sustaining fellowship this year. Bob Birdseye will accept nominations for sustaining Paul Harris Fellows.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 6:57 P.M.

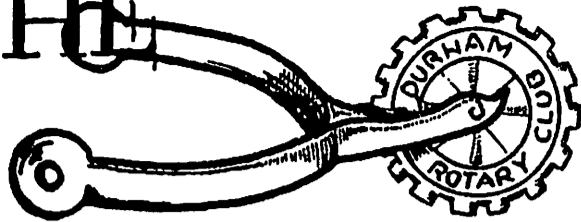

AS OUR WHEEL TURNS - - -

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE R.I. CLIPSHEET - - -

- - - 1. Looking beneath the surface At a speech given at a Rotary regional institute in Italy in 1977, Clem Renouf, president of R.I., spoke of past efforts to find mineral wealth in his home country of Australia, and then compared them to community service in Rotary: "For 200 years we were content to till the top 18 inches of soil, and have measured the potential of our country in terms of what we could do with that 18 inches. We have been ploughing when we should have been digging....And isn't that, in large measure, the story of Rotary? Don't we tend to till the top 18 inches--to tackle the task that is apparent, the community service project that can be seen, that gives an immediate and visible return for our labors? Let us not make the mistake of ploughing when we should have been digging. Let us look below the surface, for we have the responsibility and the opportunity to help shape Rotary's future."
2. Good actions their own reward Democritus, an ancient Greek author, once expressed the following philosophy: "Good actions should be done, not out of compulsion, but from conviction; not for hope of reward, but for their own sake. A man should feel more shame in doing evil in his own sight than before all the world."
3. World understanding week This year, world understanding week (18-24 February, 1979) encompasses the date of Rotary's 74th anniversary, 23 February, 1979. Holding these two major events during the same period stresses Rotary's internationality. Rotary offers many opportunities for the individual Rotarian to "reach out" to people in other lands. He can contribute to The Rotary Foundation, helping to send good-will ambassadors abroad; host youth exchange students; initiate correspondence with a Rotarian in another country; or contribute in various ways to world community service or the Health, Hunger and Humanity Program. These are just a few ways for Rotarians to make world understanding week one of the out standing events of the year.
4. International service "Rotary presents acquaintanceship as the door to fellowship and friendship, and it has incorporated this...principle into the structure of a world organization. From the level of club fellowship through the activities of the district, and climaxed by the international assembly or convention, Rotary creates worldwide fellowship. Differences in race, creed or nationality are wiped out in a deluge of common interests."
--from "Fifty years of service"
5. What is most important An East Indian sage once remarked, "Light is good in whatever lamp it may burn, even as a rose is beautiful in whatever garden it may bloom."

6. The Rotary Foundation - an opportunity Is your club searching for a good growth investment? It would be hard to top the record of The Rotary Foundation. The seed of the Foundation was planted in 1917, by Arch Klumph. In 1947, the death of Paul Harris brought in more than U.S. \$1,000,000 in memorial contributions. Now more than 30 years have passed, and the Foundation has become a great tree. It appears as if the total number of educational awards granted for study in 1979-80 will reach over 990--an all-time high! Where does the funding come from? Mostly through voluntary contributions from Rotarians, through their own clubs. Supporting The Rotary Foundation is an opportunity for international service, that is uniquely ours as Rotarians.

7. Rotary's 75th anniversary - February, 1980 Participation by Rotarians in a 75th anniversary program can be rewarding for them as well as the community at large. When they participate, they are reminded that they belong to a worldwide organization and that their project is one more link in a long chain of acts of service. This reminder can encourage renewed efforts to help others. Likewise, the community will benefit, not only from Rotarian activities commemorating the approaching anniversary, but through a greater exposure to the ideal of "service above self." Such community knowledge, in turn, will better enable Rotarians to carry out effective anniversary projects.

8. Vocational service "The classification plan gives the movement the very thing which all ethically minded men, within and without, demand--the opportunity to project its beneficial influences far beyond the limits of membership, out into the rank and file of every trade, profession and occupation by which men earn their daily bread."

9. Club service "Friendship should be an inseparable part of fellowship. Friendship involves a spirit of give and take, the ability to make allowances for human failings and the cultivation of toleration. If we as Rotarians can cultivate these virtues, surely then the effect of our fellowship will extend far beyond the confines of our immediate circle, and, like the stone thrown into the pool whose ripples extend in ever widening circumference, we shall find our movement exerting an ever greater influence."

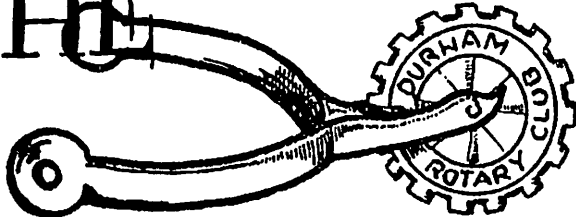

OUR FRENCH CONNECTION !

IT WAS AN EVENING - - -

- - - - - of warm congeniality, recognitions, and welcome. The celebration - a "ladies night" - generated a near-record attendance which filled every table. And there were surprises.....

In his "one and only 'free speech' in Rotary" (HANK MARSH presiding at that point), AL LOTSPIECH told us about himself. He is the new owners of the Aus and LOTSPIECH Accountancy Corporation in Chico. He is the father of three boys - and the reason his wife, Nancy, was unable to be there is the fact that the youngest is a two week old breast feeder! (wet-nurse baby sitters are hard to find). Nancy is the former Nancy Rounavara of Healdsburg and is a graduate Speech Pathologist from CSUC. We missed you, Nancy! Welcome, AL - may your tenure be as long as the following two men we honor!!

.....CHARLIE SCHAB was presented with a PAUL HARRIS FELLOW award. I put that in the present tense because I believe CHARLIE was with us last Monday night. Presented by VICE PRESIDENT HANK MARSH, the award document and plaque were accepted for CHARLIE by his long-time friend and neighbor, LLOYD ABSHIER. LLOYD recalled some of those things that made CHARLIE special - why he was loved, liked, and respected. He was a living definition of that elusive word 'friend'. There were moist eyes and lumpy throats. "We miss him a heck of a lot on our street".....

.....MEL FRENCH - our only "honorary" member - came out of "retirement" to honor CHARLIE'S memory. Many of our newer members had never met MEL. But there he was up front, stage right! Maybe he thought it was odd when LLOYD came back to talk about a man who "never walked behind a horse in his life!" But the surprise

really hit him when E. G. "PROF" ENGLAND spoke this tribute:

"In his years of active membership in Rotary, Mel French has set some records that will be hard to equal. He has served in every Rotary office from Song Leader to President. During his year as president he also edited the club bulletin, The Rowel.

After that year as president he continued to put out the Rowel, serving almost as many years as all the other editors combined and probably setting a world record.

He was an inspiring and effective Song Leader with a unique style; he was known throughout the district as "One-Finger Mel", and was often asked to lead singing for special district meetings.

He was chairman for the annual Christmas parties and set a tough example to follow. He was often asked to induct new members and always did it effectively and impressively.

A superb musician himself, and an outstanding band director, Mel provided music countless times for Rotary programs, including one memorable occasion when he took his High School Band to the Western Pacific Depot at Oroville to give Durham's District Governor Nominee a rousing send-off to Lake Placid.

Mel entered Rotary as a charter member of the Durham club in 1945, at a time when Rotary emphasized the mottoes "Service Above Self" and "He Profits Most Who Serves Best". Mel's Rotary career is a superb example of that kind of service.

.....There was a standing-ovation. The group quieted after MEL's response. Several members quickly removed the folding screens behind the head-table. And there - ready to play for MEL and his friends - were 33 members of the Durham High School Band - "his band"! Led by MEL's protege ARVEL ALLREAD, the group exploded with the DURHAM SCHOOL SONG - - and everyone was on his feet in true DURHAM school tradition! ALLREAD gave a brief summary of MEL'S accomplishments with music in the schools of Durham, how he had been hired by MEL, and what an honor and challenge it has been to follow his footsteps. Then he walked over to MEL and handed him the baton. "Lead one, Mel!" MEL hesitated for just a split second, then slowly walked over to the group. Looking intently at each musician, he drew those individuals with him - as though by empathic magic - into a single performing unit. He smartly raised the baton. And when it came down all hell broke loose! Where MEL'S thoughts were, only MEL knows. But for us - our spines tingled!.... Again, a standing ovation.

.....After the concert, MEL FRENCH was asked to say a few words to his friends. A choked-out "thank you" said it all. Then, pocketing the handkerchief, he told us the story of the Christmas Program. That beautiful light touch to help us all let out our emotions in laughter was a touch of class. And that's what MEL has

.....PRESIDENT JIM MITCHELL joined MEL at the podium and told him that a PAUL HARRIS FELLOWSHIP has been started in his name. It was a good evening!

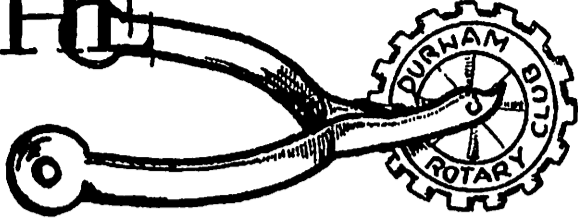

All worthy - but in competition with I. P. PREZBOB and his victims, it was cacophonous bedlam. Everyone talking at once - couldn't hear what was going on in the main ring. But fun seemed to be had by all, and the frolic of the dancing dollar encored in the treasurer's surplus, so - - March came in like a lion, and "IP", won't come back again this month!...Welcome back, LAMBYJIM!

CARL SELKIRK IS PROPOSED - - -

- - - as a new member by JOHN LEE. His classification has been approved as "insurance - Estate Planning". If no negative reports are officially heard within ten days, the processing of his membership will proceed.

JOHN LEE WAS OUR SPEAKER - - -

- - - last Monday, talking about his Classification favorite, "TAXES," introduced by Team Leader STEVE MCNELIS, JOHN spoke with ease and interest. Our Baby Rotarian, AL LOTSPIECH, a new member of the ROWEL Committee, reports the talk:

..... "The program was brought to us by our own Rotarian, John Lee (CPA-tax). The program was a review of some of the current tax changes which were enacted during 1978 and prior years. John stated that since 1969 the goal of congress has been to reform the tax laws, close tax loop-holes, simplify the tax forms and in general confuse the public. The accounting profession has always looked upon the changes as the accountant's full employment acts and with good cause. The tax law and form changes are more complicated, opened more loop-holes, created higher accounting fees and of course increased revenues for Uncle. Inflation has been the biggest tax raiser. A recent definition of inflation is that taxes take more of your wages before you get your check and at the end of the year with less money your tax due is again hit with higher taxes. Inflation at both ends with less in between.

Considerable interest was expressed for a summary of significant changes affecting farmers. John indicated that 1) farmers with inventoriable crops could go back to the cash basis of accounting 2) investment tax credits equal to 10% of the cost of special use building built after 1971 were eligible. Special use buildings are defined as hog sheds, milking parlors, etc. 3) the farmers' gas tax credit available for crop dusters fuel use now is to be taken by the crop duster and not the farmer (another loss) 4) farm syndication rules have been relaxed and 5) the at risk capital rules have been setup to disallow losses which would result in a negative capital position for any partner.

Other tax changes were highlighted, but due to the highly technical nature of many of the tax changes the talk was only a highlight of the 1978 tax law changes. John recommended that whenever you are involved with a large taxable transaction that you consult your accountant. It may cost a few dollars but the tax savings from the advice may result in significantly different tax consequences. Three examples were given of recent tax situations where had the accountant been contacted the tax due would have been materially less. Also see your accountant in November or December when tax planning can be done before year end rather than after December 31 when it is just too late to help.

Thanks again John for a most interesting program."

THISA 'N THATA FROM ROTARY INTERNATIONAL - - - (via the "Clipsheet")

- - - 1. Our responsibilities to others

Speaking at the 1978 international assembly, Clem Renouf, president of Rotary International, made the following comments: "We live in a world of men and women divided by artificial barriers of class and color and creed and national prejudice, and yet being drawn inevitably closer together by the swift-flowing tide of history. Each of us is challenged to take an active, personal interest in the affairs, not of nations or of governments, but of people...of men and women such as we are, with the same joys and sorrows, the same hopes and fears; of men and women who need to understand and to be understood."

2. Club service

"As one mingles, lunches and listens to others talk of their interests, their families, their jobs, their mistakes, their successes, and their travels, one learns. Everyone can improve himself in the many roles that he plays; husband, father, employer, employee, citizen, voluntary helper and so forth. Rotary throughout the world is full of teachers and students, and all learn from each other."

--from "The Golden Strand," a history of the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A.

3. The Rotary Foundation

For decades, The Rotary Foundation has contributed to human betterment by helping outstanding young men and women develop their abilities, so that they can help others. The following selections from a letter written by an award recipient in 1950 demonstrate this fact: "The idea of 'service above self' writ large in international affairs, has guided me through my graduate work and has prompted my application for a Rotary Foundation Fellowship. The world community of nations today suffers from a lack of understanding on a multi-national scale....I propose to utilize my fellowship to promote goodwill and international understanding--and then to bring the fruits of my intellectual labors back to my country..."

4. Vocational service

"The large contributions that vocational service can make to the world will not be accomplished through discussion, still less by solemn resolutions in Rotary clubs. The genius of Rotary is individual action. The product of Rotary is men. Particularly is this the case in vocational service."

--from "Service is my business"

5. International service

Writing on international service, Paul Harris remarked, "International amity is the loftiest aspiration which has ever captured the imagination of men. One had better suffer defeat...fighting for such a cause than to safeguard his right to say 'I told you so.'"

6. World understanding week

Thirty-one years ago, Dr. Oswaldo Aranha, a past president of the General Assembly of the United Nations, delivered a talk before the 39th annual Rotary convention in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. As world understanding week (18-24 February, 1979) and Rotary's 74th anniversary (23 February, 1979) approach, his words are still relevant: "Rotary is, certainly, one of the denominators of peace. Persuasion should be the basis on which rests the Rotarian's task...Rotary possesses a suitable background for bringing together, harmonizing, and multiplying the pacific relations of men and peoples and establishing among them a field of understanding, of comprehension and of impressing on the life of the world...a sense of solidarity, of friendship, material progress and moral persuasion."

To him, the most valuable is a virgin queen. Some places they even auction them off if they can find enough of them. Natives go cheaper. For a

\$3 fine, he must have settled for an everyday one!

.....JIM EDWARDS told "The McGowan Story". "Do you know what they call 500 Indian maidens without nipples? Ans. The Indian nipples 500. (I don't get it, either, PoorAlice - honest!) Visitor George Worth went home with one of our popular Durham Rotary/McDembecs Bunch shirts. BOB DRULEY auctioned several for blood! JIM MITCHELL and HANK MARSH also paid about \$20 apiece for them. BOB BOYD was complimented by PREZJIM for all the fine "press" we've been getting.

JOHN PARKER SPOKE ABOUT ATTITUDES - - -

- - - toward the disabled. John knows about this. He was a collegiate wrestler for the University of Oregon, when during a collegiate meet his neck was broken. A year or so later, after hospitalization and a year in an intensive training rehab center, he was "reintroduced" into society. He got his needed qualifying experience as a Health Educator interne in Eugene, working for 18¢ then 27¢ an hour. The attitude was condescending - the attitude the disabled hate most. John got his scholarship to UC Berkeley, however, and then got his degree. For a number of years, John was Field Consultant to the California State Easter Seal Society, working with many of us in this area. When the Society dispensed with the field consultants, John decided to stay and live in Chico. He is now a licensed Real Estate broker specializing in Investment Properties.

Attitudes are changing, fortunately. In the past - even the recent past - the disabled have been the "cripples", the "handicapped", the "special people" cut off from the real world. More and more, awareness is getting them back into the real world. From the protectiveness of Agencies, the disabled are forming self-help groups. They've come a long way in the past ten years, reports John.

Architectural barriers continue to be a problem. Steps and steep ramps (the new City Hall in Chico was cited) prevent productive citizens from exercising their civil rights. And offering to provide "pushers" for those "special people" is condescending, though well intentioned.

John sees too many disabled people crowding into "Big Brother" government employment projects. Private enterprise has not opened its doors wide enough to accept the wheelchair. Insurance protection policies need to be reevaluated for employers of the disabled.

And the attitude of the disabled toward an often-times unaccepting society is changing, too. The self-help groups organize and assert their physical and emotional needs. John predicts - with mixed feelings - that those groups will become more militant than ever before.

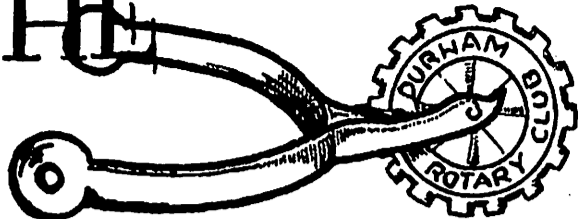

PROGRAM - - -

- - - BOB MORTELL reported on his rotary sponsored six week trip to JAPAN last fall. (He travelled with a team of Rotary sponsored visitors).

SOME GENERAL IMPRESSIONS: The Japanese are strong for world PEACE, they emphasise PROTOCOL, and do everthing in an orderly manner, cities like TOKYO are remarkably clean, with low rates of violence and crime. The natives like their SAKI, and drink quite a bit of it.

The JAPANESE ROTARY CLUBS were tremendous hosts to the visiting team. No "fining" -- lots of protocol, at one meeting, 3 clubs joined -- with 200 Rotarians standing and applauding them to open the meeting. The meetings ended in song.

On request, the hosts arranged individual interviews with persons of each team member's choice. Bob spent a day talking individually with high school students (Bob teaches high school in Gridley). The students were quite aware of Japan's position in the world economically and had much to say. Bob wonders if our students in this country could match the depth of the average conversation with the Japanese students.

The visiting team visited people and places, played volleyball victoriously with various levels of competition, from junior high girls teams to high jumping, slam spiking boys' high school team. The elevated trains, and a coal mine tour -- seven miles under the ocean -- to see the actual cutting edge of the mining equipment -- it was a cultural exchange par excellence. Bob and the visiting team could handle chop sticks quite well, and we are convinced that this type of intelligently sponsored tour helps produce goodwill and better understanding among people of different nations. Bob is working on his Masters degree, and the trip aids and abets him in his chosen field of interest. He will be able to invest the learning from this trip in the lives of many of his high school students-- for many years.

We have been reminded by Bob's presentation that as Rotarians we really are International, rather than provincial. Thank you Bob, and Bill Dempsey for inviting him.

George Boggs reminds us that at the District Conference, for which he urges your immediate registration. Bob Mortell and the other team members will report on the trip with slides for illustration. (April 6-8).

Reading The Rotarian is an especially good way to stay knowledgeable about Rotary.

The will to work together - "If the goal of Rotary is understanding, we must surely strive to find common ground, eliminating those differences which tend to divide us. Our standard club constitution and bylaws provide the basic framework for unity, but of themselves they must remain ineffective unless we have the will to work together--to build an organization which encourages its membership to think and act internationally, to the exclusion of national and regional biases."

Community service - Speaking at the 1964 international assembly, Ben N. Saltzman, a past R.I. director, and current chairman of the R.I. Health, Hunger, and Humanity committee, remarked: "Thomas Huxley, a scientist, said, 'We live in a world which is full of misery and ignorance, and the plain duty of each and all of us is to try and make the little corner we can influence somewhat less miserable and somewhat less ignorant than it was before we entered.'" Today, Rotary, through its Health, Hunger, and Humanity Program, is trying to expand that little corner to the entire world in an untiring effort to alleviate problems of disease, malnutrition, and other pervasive human problems.

Vocational service - Writing in The National Rotarian of April, 1912, David C. Farrar, then president of the Rotary Club of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, U.S.A., stated: "Business is service--this is the heart and soul of Rotary. In this complex world of trade, with its competition and strife, the Rotary idea stands out as a champion of the man in business and his personal obligation to his fellow man."

International service - To be a true Rotarian does mean involvement in club affairs: but it also means involvement in the world at large. We cannot live in Rotary isolation. Understanding Rotary implies, too, Rotary understanding of world problems, world affairs. To be a living force, Rotary must relate to living in a world other than Rotary. Involvement must mean doing things--not just attending meetings.

Rotary's 70th convention - At the 1924 Rotary convention in Toronto, a speaker stated, "The greatest work of all for Rotary to do is to carry the message of friendship and goodwill to all the nations of the earth." There are many reasons to attend the international convention in Rome, Italy (10-13 June, 1979)--fellowship, Rotary inspiration, the chance to visit one of the most

lovely cities in the world. However, attending the convention also offers you the opportunity to contribute to world peace by sharing ideas with fellow Rotarians from all over the world, as well as making Rotary ideals known to the convention's host city.

Rotary's 75th anniversary - In 1905, the year Rotary was founded, the Wright brothers made one of their pioneering airplane flights. Today, Rotary clubs exist worldwide, and their projects readily find community support. As the 75th anniversary approaches (23 February, 1980), let us look back in appreciation at the pioneers of service who overcame so many obstacles to found Rotary. Let their difficulties inspire us to undertake pioneering projects, calling forth our best efforts, just as the obstacles impeding manned flight inspired its ultimate success.

The Rotary Foundation - Addressing the 69th annual Rotary convention in Tokyo, Japan, Dr. Edwin O. Reischauer remarked: "We have been tremendously impressed to learn of The Rotary Foundation and its work...I am particularly interested in the work of the Rotary fellowships, because it and other activities of that sort, I think, are the most significant thing in building a better future world...Young people, when they have this chance to experience a foreign country and a foreign culture, have a lifetime impression...they are going to be citizens of the world."

Club service - "Basically, we like to talk with our peers in the business and professional world. Rotary luncheons, committee meetings, fireside meetings, district conferences, and international conventions afford us this opportunity. But how much do we listen?...At your next Rotary meeting ask the man nearest you what he does, how he does it, what his problems are, what his interests are, and what are his rewards. When you travel, do the same at Rotary clubs you visit. You'll be surprised what you learn, whom you meet, and what the hidden returns are."

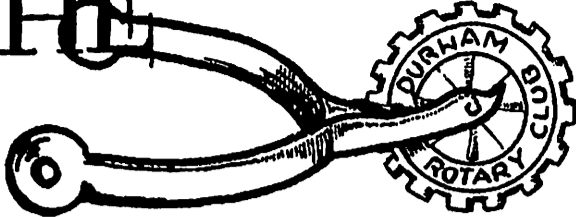

Also the high premiums on "savings" insurance keeps policies at a much lower cash value than straight term insurance. Some people cannot bring themselves to deal with their death, and intelligent planning for their survivors, and in some cases, because of this, the government, or someone who is not preferred by the deceased, becomes the beneficiary. Needless to say, the family of the deceased suffers. THANKS, CARL, for challenging us to a TOUGHER LOVE, and for evidence of your professional expertise.

HOWSDEN RETURNS - FROM AFRICA - - -

- - - WILL CAIN introduced our speaker for the evening, although Arley needed no introduction to most of us. Past member and President of the Durham Rotary Club, quarter-century veteran of Chico State, and currently Chairman of the School of Education at CSUC, Arley "came home" to tell us about his month in Africa, as a consultant on Education for UNESCO.

Leaving just before Christmas, Arley flew to the UNESCO headquarters in Paris, then on to Athens and then to the Sudan - arriving in the middle of the night! Without adequate planning or briefing, he found himself without a guide, a comrade, or a knowledge of the language! "Scary!" said Howsden. He was in the city of Khartoun, where it was 126 degrees that first morning at 6:00 A.M.

The Sudan is a grossly underpopulated land with little organizational structure. It is populated with tribes of vastly different cultures, languages, and religions. At one time it was considered as a homeland for the Jews. At the present time, the land is only 5% Christian. And life there is intimidating for an American - or any stranger - who is alone, without adequate sponsorship on the spot, and carrying \$2000 expense money around on his person! "Yes," said Arley, "I felt insecure as hell bordering on being scared!" But he later found the people to be extremely friendly and honest. There are no robbers there. There is no alcoholism. There is great inflation and low incomes.

The people don't understand why the U.S. gives aid to corrupt dictators (the now unseated Shah). They don't understand the secrecy of the CIA. The Moslem religion will have no part of communism, Arley feels. But they will have no part of U.S. democracy, either. Beurocracy may be bad in U.S., but the word must have been created in the Sudan!

Their Educational system of Universities? Arley feels they are unrealistic. Patterned after the Universities of England - Oxford, etc., - they are detached from the realities of their land and times. His multi-paged report of his findings has yet to be accepted by the various agencies that must approve it. It may never be approved because of red-tape, beaurocracy, politics. Arley hopes he will receive the second half of his expense and stipend money. We hope so, too, Arley!

Our thanks to Arley for an outstanding program. And it was great to have him back! Our thanks to Will Cain for obtaining him for us.

The Committee is also seeking host families for two inbound students. An 18 year old boy from Germany and an 18 year old boy from Mexico. They will arrive in August so early placement is needed.

.....Mark Churcher lives "in the highest spot in Melbourne". His mother is a family planning counselor and his father a Group Coordinator. Mark, too, attended a private school, uniforms and all. It has a student body of about 1,000 - a contrast to the 3,000 students in the Concord High School he has been attending this past year. Mark was particularly impressed with the fact that there seem to be only minor differences between American and Australian families and family life. 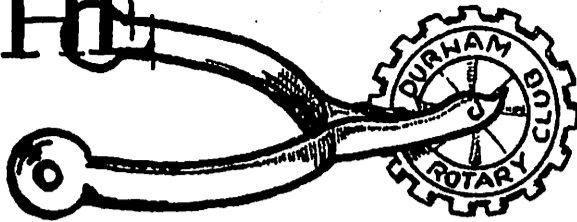

LANDIS GOES HALF HOG - AGAIN - - -

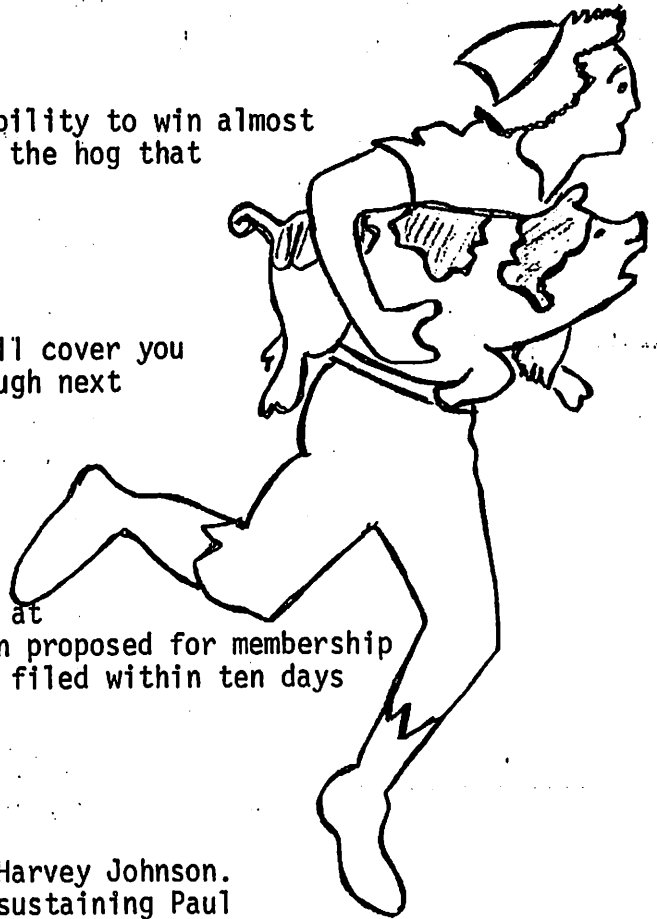
- - - Fred Landis continued his uncanny ability to win almost every raffle when he won the other half of the hog that Jim Moore won last week.

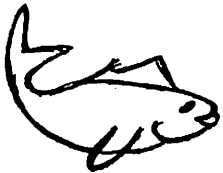


PAUL HARRIS - HERE WE COME - - -

This salute to Jim demonstrates that the cream doesn't always rise to the top (enter Landis and squirt him in the face). Thanks Jim for a wonderful year.

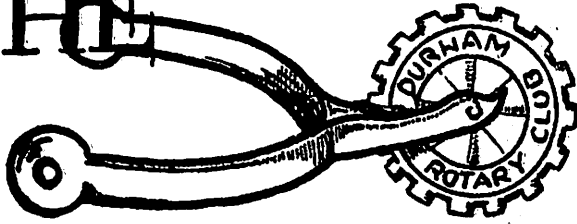

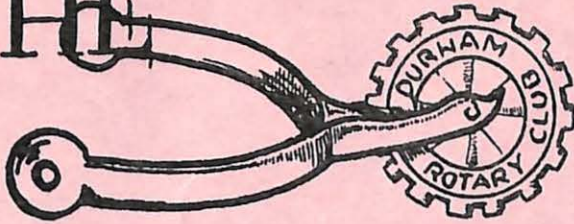

FRIENDS OF EDUCATION:

The three co-chairpersons of the Butte County Friends of Education, Jackie Schimmel, Barbara Berger, and Jan Holman, presented an excellent program on the effects of Proposition 13 on our local school system, and the grass roots Friends of Education lobby that has developed to press for long term school financing and to preserve local control.

The State and Federal government now fund local schools to the tune of 72% (as compared to 36% prior to Prop 13), and with this increase in funding comes greater probability of state control of our school systems. Proposition 13 has cost the Durham schools two maintenance and two secretarial positions. Bussing routes have been streamlined, and transportation to out of state sporting events has been eliminated. However, due to the great amount of local support for our schools, faculty have not been lost, bussing is still provided, and a sports booster organization is funding some sports costs.

The frustrations of school administrators was related in that they do not know what their funding will be for the year until three weeks before school starts in September. As a result some teachers must get notices in March that they may not be rehired for the following year. This lack of job security results in low teacher morale and a possible loss of valuable staff.

The ladies discussed their successful lobby for the continuation of school improvement funds which are used in Durham for teachers' aids in grades 1-4. Data was presented to show that Durham students are performing well above average in reading and arithmetic. They encouraged everyone to attend a town meeting August 22 at 7:45 P.M. at the Durham Elementary School. What was described as a marriage of education and politics may continue to be a necessity in these times of curtailment of funds for local services. We, in Durham, should be proud of the way we have responded to meet these challenges. Our thanks extend to these three ladies for an interesting and informative program.

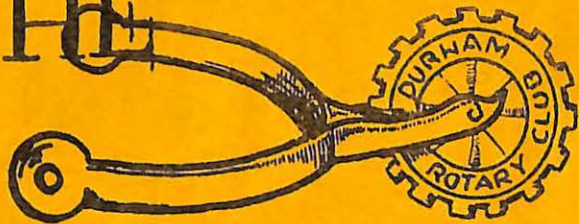

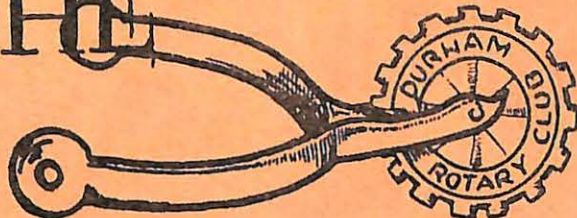

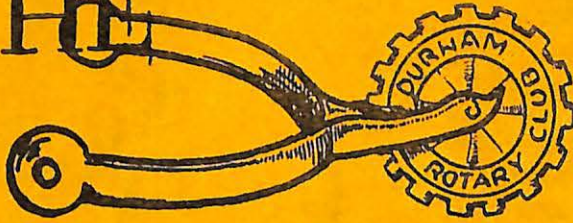

PROGRAM...KIWI

TOM JOAQUIN, the world traveler, introduced Rich Smith, son of Wayne Smith, a former Durham Rotarian, who brought us up-to-date on the KIWI industry in the United States. Fifty-five (55) years ago, the KIWI plant was introduced to the U.S. at the Chico Plant Garden. The original plants are still producing fruit. Rich gave us a brief history of the KIWI and used a slide presentation to illustrate the various steps needed to be a successful KIWI producer. Points of interest included:

- o It has been the last ten (10) years that KIWI plants have become of economic importance to California (Redding to San Diego).
- o An acre of mature plantings are bringing from \$12,000 to \$25,000/ 6 to 8 tons per acre/2,000 to 3,000 acres in California in production.
- o Gridley is considered the best place in California for KIWI production.
- o KIWI plants take between 5 to 6.5 PH soil conditions.
- o Growers are still learning about problems associated with the KIWI plants.
- o Although the pay-off is good now, it is expensive to get into the business and a sound U.S. market must be developed. Over 98% of the fruit now leave for foreign soil.

Thanks Rich and Tom for a good program on one aspect of our agricultural community.

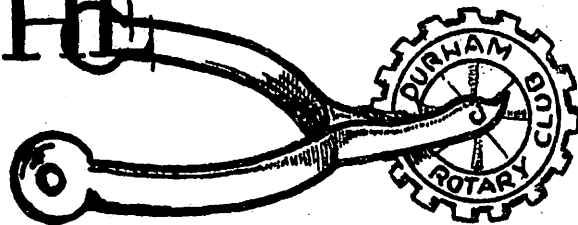

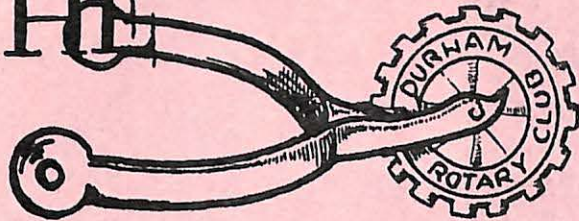

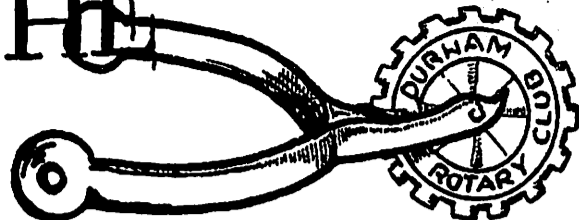

.....Our speaker for the evening was Mr. James Sweeney, Administrator of Enloe Hospital. JIM PATTERSON reviews the presentation below.

OUR PROGRAM (as reviewed by JIM PATTERSON) - - -

- - -JAMES SWEENEY, administrator of the N.T. ENLOE MEMORIAL HOSPITAL, with slides, beta max videotape, commentary, and the able assistance of assistant administrator ALICE STARMER (POOR ALICE of ROWEL FAME), brought us up-to-date on construction progress of the NEW HOSPITAL.

Some statistics: An \$8,700,000 contract was let to build the new facility, ground was broken October 7, 1978, to begin construction. The seismically safe, steel and (5,700 yards) concrete building is expected to be completed by March, 1980. At five stories, it will be the tallest and largest off-campus structure in Chico. The 109,000 square feet at \$73 per square foot cost compares to an average cost of \$100-\$140 per square foot nationally. \$10,000,000 (ten million dollars) was borrowed at 9.3% to finance the project. Construction has been progressing on schedule, at the contracted cost, and in the meantime, the borrowed money has been earning more interest than it costs, a nice bonus which was unexpected.

Slides of four previous facilities were shown, and Larry Gillick was on hand to tell about driving a pregnant lady through a snow storm (over a foot of snow) to the fifth and present facility on The Esplanade, the day the facility opened, in 1937.

Enloe Hospital already enjoys a reputation for sophisticated equipment and specialized care which compares to hospitals in metropolitan centers. The new facility will have space for 160 beds with some very special added features such as space for parents to stay with their children at the Pediatric Ward. Howard Sohnrey asked how prices would compare in the new facility with the present facility. He was told that prices would not increase. That means superior service for the present rates.

Enloe Hospital serves an area much larger than Chico. The maternity-obstetric department includes intensive care for infants, and serves much of Northern California in this specialized care.

"Wings of Rotary" -- the paramedic-life-support-staffed ambulance was the first such vehicle in the area, and matched the sophisticated units of the big cities and the units popularized on the TV programs.

Community support of the hospital is evidenced by the \$773,000 raised in a Capital Funds campaign and by the highly popular Enloe Follies, a yearly community event.

No one likes to go to the hospital, or have our friends there, but it is comforting to know that excellent medical care is available, and that soon the new facilities will match the already sophisticated equipment and specialized medical care. Thanks to Jim Sweeney and Alice Starmer for the program, and Al Lotspeich for scheduling it. Also thanks to Garrie Starmer for being responsible for any recognitions connected with this report.

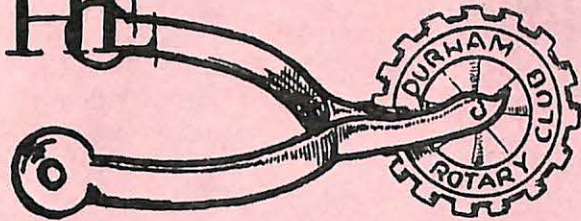

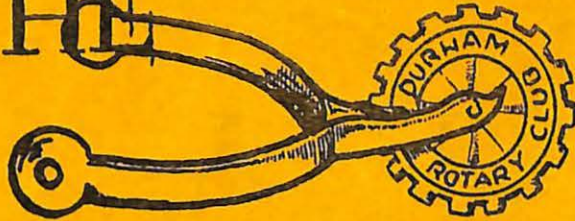

FROM THE GOVERNOR'S NEWSLETTER - - - (W. I. "Doc" Carmel, Governor, District 516, 10/79)

1. GOVERNOR'S REPRESENTATIVES: District 516 is once again privileged to have a dedicated group of nine past presidents serving as area representatives. They represent a wealth of Rotary knowledge and experience and are available for your use and guidance.
2. 75th ANNIVERSARY COMMITTEE: All clubs can receive 75th Anniversary literature and publicity materials by requesting them from Rotary International. It is suggested that each club have a 75th Anniversary Chairman and that his name be forwarded to Evanston so that he will receive information as it becomes available.
3. CONCORD-DIABLO GETS ITS CHARTER: Concord-Diablo officially received its Rotary International Charter on Wednesday night, October 17, at Holiday Inn, before an overflow crowd that exceeded all expectations. One hundred eighty persons (according to our figures) jammed the main banquet hall at the Holiday Inn; approximately 80 more people than originally expected... A large representation of Rotary Clubs from throughout Northern California helped make the evening something ver special.
4. The Rotarian Magazine gave the impression that the Rotary Float was a District 528 project. Actually, it is a Zone I and Zone VII project to celebrate the 75th Anniversary. The cost will be approximately \$50,000, an average of \$3.00 per Rotarian in these zones. PDG Aaron Rose (528) is in desperate need of money for the initial deposit. Please consult with your Boards of Directors to determine what help can be made available to Governor Rose. The monies should be sent to Rotary Rose Parade, 9818 Arkansas Avenue, Bellflower, CA 90706.

I'm sure that each Rotarian who has chipped in \$3.00 will feel a glow of pride in watching the Rose Parade this year. Our float, commemorating the 75th Anniversary of Rotary, will be a beautiful spectacle witnessed by an estimated thirty million people around the world.

(NOTE: Kay Walters will be riding in the 1980 parade)

5. THE IRS IS HEARD FROM: While the Office of Commissioner of Internal Revenue of the Treasury Department of the U.S. has ruled that Rotary clubs in the USA are exempt from payment of federal income tax under provisions of Section 501(c) (4) of the Internal Revenue Code, the office has also ruled that Rotary clubs MUST FILE ANNUALLY AN INFORMATION RETURN on Form 990 with the district director of Internal Revenue for the district in which the club is located so long as the exemption from payment of income tax remains in effect.
6. 1979-80 DISTRICT 516 CLUB RECOGNITION AND SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS: At the end of August, a letter was mailed to all the Club Presidents detailing how the clubs will be scored for this year's recognition and achievement awards.
Chairman Werner Schwarz and committee members Jim Schofield, Fred Moore, and John Hussey would like to remind all the clubs that the requested materials are due on or before April 1, 1980.
7. GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE: The five team members for the Rotary Group Study Exchange District 182 with District 516 will arrive at San Francisco, Sunday 13 April 1980, 15:20, Lufthansa #452 non-stop from Frankfurt, Germany. Depart - Los Angeles, Monday 19 May 1980, 20:20, Lufthansa #451 non-stop to Frankfurt, Germany.

Presidents of our clubs should look for members of similar vocational backgrounds to house and entertain the team members and governor's representative.

8. ROTARY FOUNDATION FACT SHEET: Your Rotary Foundation Committee is continually hearing that there is not enough factual information given to members. Along with a lack of information there are apparent misunderstandings, misconceptions, questions of how to participate, where does the money go, administrative expenses, and other details that every Rotarian should know and be conversant with.

This condensed fact sheet, we hope, will answer many questions and is prepared in a very condensed form. To secure elaboration on any subject or to secure answers to other questions, call or ask any Committee member.

ITEM: WHAT IS "THE ROTARY FOUNDATION"?: The objective of the Rotary Foundation - to further understanding and friendly relations between peoples of different nations. It is carried out through six programs of the Foundation. The six programs are known collectively as "The Rotary Foundation Awards for International Understanding". They are: Graduate Fellowships; Undergraduate Scholarships; Technical Training; Teachers of the Handicapped; Group Study Exchange; and Journalism Awards.

ITEM: All monies contributed go directly to participants in the program. Administrative and collection expenses are supported 100% by interest generated from Foundation investments.

ITEM: SIZE AND SCOPE:

1. The Paul Harris Fellow program was started in 1947 and has accounted for nearly \$36,000,000 in voluntary contributions. (The name - "Paul Harris" - was selected to honor the name of the founder of Rotary.)
2. In the 1977/78 Rotary year \$11,928,204 was received in contributions. Market value of the Foundations long and short-term investments was \$24,678,294. Interest from investments was \$1,458,927.
3. Vital Statistics (September 1979): 18,251 Rotary Clubs, 851,500 Rotary Members; 152 Countries and geographical areas. Total Paul Harris Fellows 6/30/78 - 29,781 in 102 Countries. Total Paul Harris Sustaining Members - 25,467

It is important for all Rotarians to know that this is Rotary's #1 program. It is also important to know that the program requires that awardees study in a foreign land. Each award covers one school year. Awards cover R.T. transportation between the recipient's home and place of study, registration, tuition, laboratory and other school fees, books, limited educational travel during the study year. This is one, if not the largest, of any scholarship program. An average educational award has been approximately \$8,000. Last year nearly 900 young people studied outside of their native countries. Over 15,000 have received awards since the program started.

HOW DOES A ROTARIAN PARTICIPATE?

1. Any size contribution aids the program in its work. Payment may be made by cash or check drawn to the "Rotary Foundation" and given to a Committee member, to the Foundation table at meetings, or to the Secretary or Treasurer.
2. "Paul Harris Sustaining Member" is an individual who has made a minimum contribution of \$100 in one calendar year. When future contributions reach \$1,000, he will be recognized as a "Paul Harris Fellow".
3. "Paul Harris Fellow" is an individual who contributes, or in whose honor is contributed, \$1,000 or more in any one-year period.
4. "Memorial Contributor" - an individual who contributes \$100 or more in any 12-month period in memory of a deceased person. Such contributions (by a Rotarian or non-Rotarian) should be given to the Club Secretary; however, if sent directly to R.I it should be indicated that credit should be issued to your rotary club. (This will be acknowledged by R.I. by sending the donor a suitable certificate.) Any size Memorial Contribution is also welcome. Contributions should be made in the same manner as previously discussed.

5. Bequests - Members are encouraged to name the Rotary Foundation as a beneficiary in their wills or insurance policies. (Suggested wording may be secured from the Committee Chairman.)

AND --- ALL CONTRIBUTIONS ARE FULLY TAX EXEMPT.

The Rotary Foundation program has exceeded all expectations. Its purpose has been and continues to be achieved every day. The program works and works well. The quality of participants and alumni speaks loudly of its success.

The continued success, however, does depend on our continuing support. Your contributions are urgently solicited in any amount, and contributors can feel the warmth of personally participating in the Foundation's efforts to overcome political boundaries, language barriers, and differences in religion, age and customs peacefully.

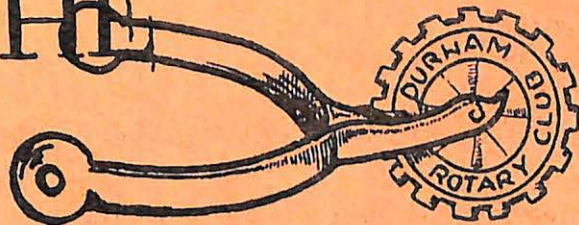
