BOARD OF EDUCATION

The instructional program has been under constant revision in order to give the students an opportunity for a high standard of achievement.

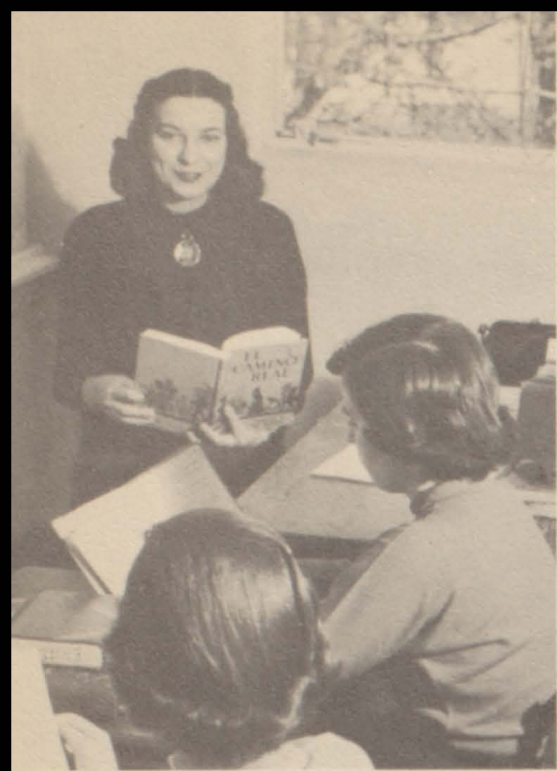

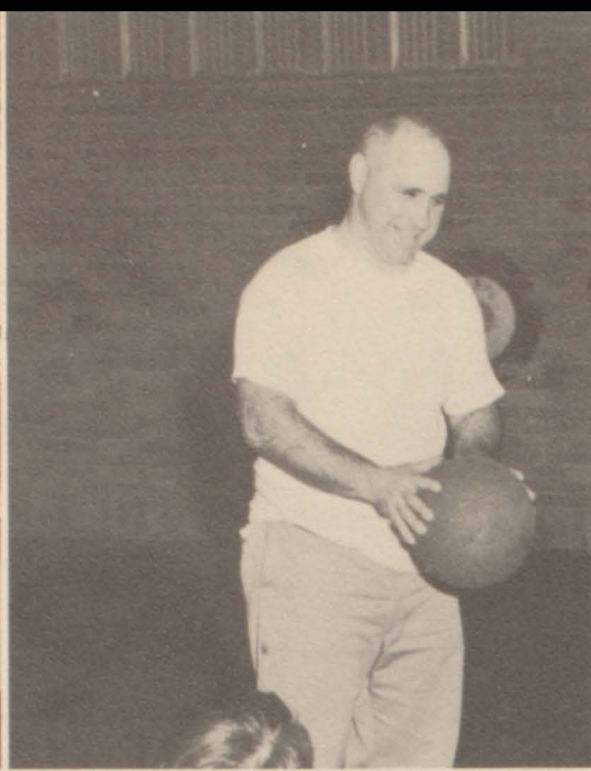
C. L. LUCE

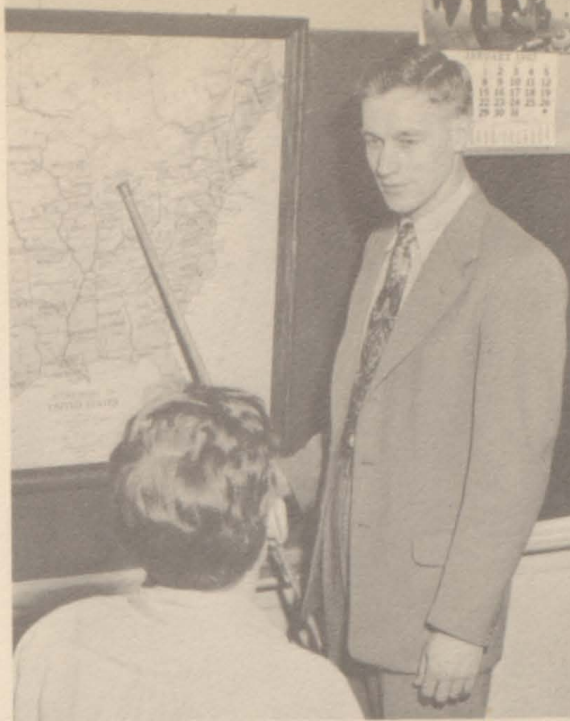

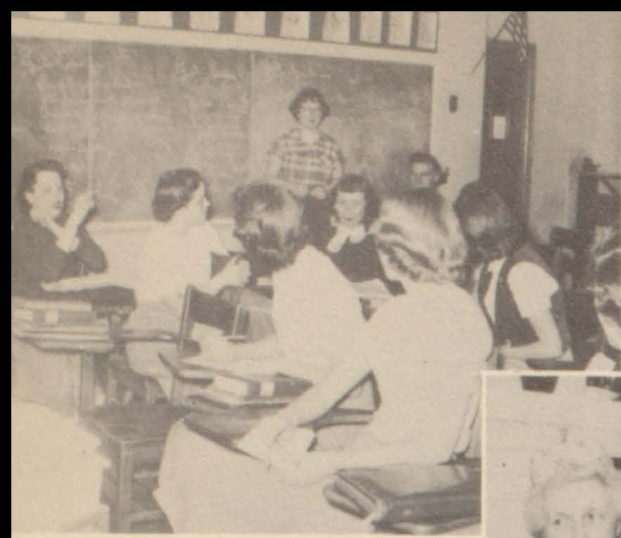

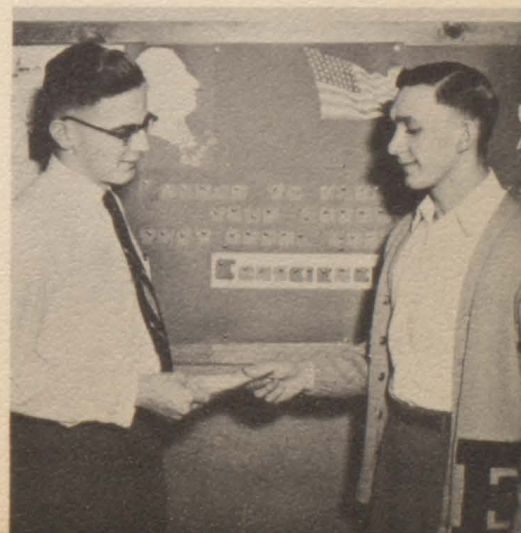

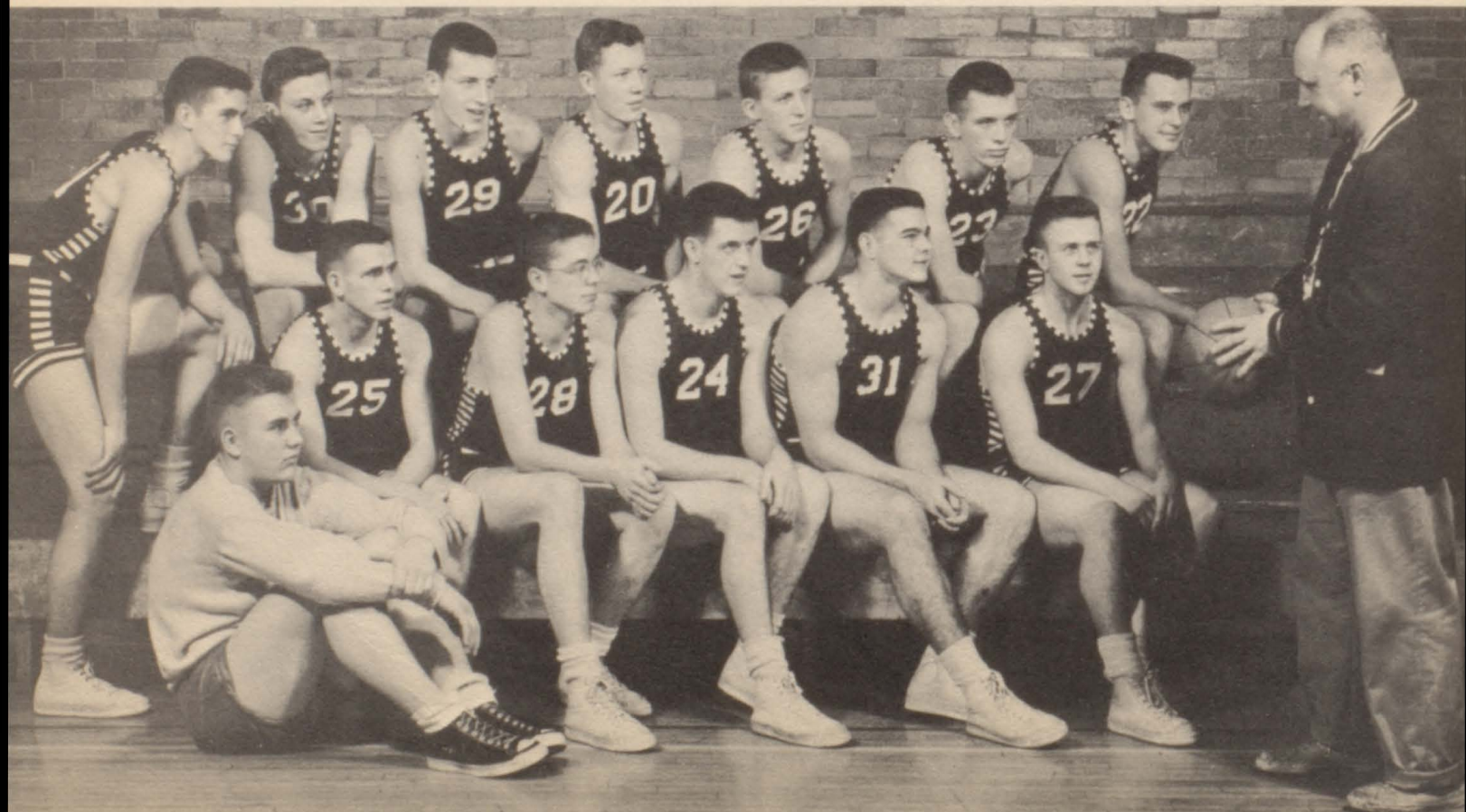


VARSITY BASKETBALL
