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1 Overview

After Walter Bruno Henning's untimely death in Berkeley (CA, USA) in 1967, his work materials, correspondence, and personal library seem to have remained in his home for some years. Contemporaries of Henning's were convinced that his estate contained unpublished work of great value, and complained, sometimes bitterly, that they were prevented from making use of them. Yet some materials were in fact sent to colleagues, for at least several years after his death. For example, Mary Boyce used Henning's notebooks containing transliterations of Manichaean Turfan texts in preparing her *Reader*³ of Middle Persian and Parthian; these notebooks were subsequently sent back to his family and are now preserved in his Nachlass. Similarly, Henning's handwritten, partial draft of his Chorasmian dictionary was sent to David MacKenzie who published it in 1971⁴ and returned the draft; it too is in the Nachlass. Materials in the Nachlass suggest that Henning's extensive library was inventoried in the early 1970s, possibly in preparation for its sale. A handful of his books were actually sold by dealers in the UK. But after this time, it does not appear that Henning's unpublished work or other materials continued to be used by other scholars. Perhaps some knew that most of Henning's important unfinished projects had developed further in the hands of his capable students and colleagues; perhaps others were dissuaded by Henning's own sensitivity, shared by his student Ilya Gershevitch, about the posthumous publication of incomplete scholarship.

The Nachlass re-surfaces in 1992 in the *Guide to the Archival Materials of the German-speaking Emigration to the United States after 1933*, where it is listed as still in Berkeley in the possession of his son-in-law Theodor B. Kahle (1922–1988), son of the Arabist Paul Kahle (1875–1964).⁵ Another catalog, that of the American Council for Emigrés in the Professions, compiled in 2007, likewise gave the location of his Nachlass as privately held by Kahle in Berkeley.⁶ In both cases, Kahle was already deceased; the Nachlass seems to have remained in the possession of Henning's daughter Anne Kahle (née Henning) in Berkeley after 1988. By 2008, the Nachlass (including unpublished working materials, correspondence, and personal library) was

accessioned by the **Deutsches Exilarchiv 1933-1945**, part of the Deutsche Nationalbibliothek (Frankfurt, Germany). It has the Signatur EB 2008/076.

This inventory has been made on the basis of my personal inspection of the entire Nachlass at the Deutsches Exilarchiv during visits in 2022 and 2023. Thanks are due to the archivists and colleagues at the Exil-Archiv for facilitating my visits, especially Frau Regina Elzner. Many thanks also go to Anne Kahle.

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2 Walter B. Henning

Walter Bruno Henning (1908–1967) was one of the most renowned philologists of Iranian languages, and in many respects the inaugurator of 20th-century Iranian Studies. He made fundamental contributions to the study of Avestan, Bactrian, Chorasmian, Middle Persian, New Persian, Parthian, and Sogdian texts and to the study of the Manichaean and Zoroastrian religions, besides touching on languages from Aramaic to Chinese and disciplines such as epigraphy, paleography, and sigillography. Several of his students went on to become major scholars of their generation; such as Mary Boyce (1920-2006), Ilya Gershevitch (1914-2001), David N. MacKenzie (1926-2001), Martin Schwartz (1941-), and Ehsan Yarshater (1920-2018); or the Parsi priests Hormazdyar Dastur Kayoji Mirza (1907–2004) and Ervad Peshotan Anklesaria (1928–1969).⁷ Through them a significant number of active scholars in Iranian Studies can trace their academic lineages back to Henning. So impactful was his work and teaching that Werner Sundermann would write in a biography that "an appreciation of the work of Walter Bruno Henning would almost amount to writing a history of the study of Middle Iranian languages and cultures in the 20th century."8

Although details of Henning's career and scholarly accomplishments can be read in several detailed obituaries and biographies, it is worth giving here a brief biographical sketch as context to the following inventory. This sketch draws from the

published sources as well as Henning's own curricula vitae in German and English located in the Nachlass.

2.1 A Biographical Sketch

Walter Bruno Henning was born in Ragnit, Prussia (now Neman, Kaliningrad Oblast, Russia) on August 8, 1908 to Hermann Henning, a Katasterdirektor, and Katharina Witte. He was educated in Rawitsch in Posen (now Rawicz, Poland) and Köslin (now Koszalin, Poland), finishing the equivalent of high school in the latter in 1926. Matriculating at Göttingen, initially to study mathematics, he moved into the realm of languages and switched to the study of Iranian philology with Friedrich Carl Andreas (1846–1930), Indian with Emil Sieg (1866–1951), and Arabic with Mark Lidzbarski (1868–1928). In the meantime, Henning also worked in Leiden as a research assistant on A.J. Wensinck's *Concordance et Indices de la Tradition Musulmane*. Both Andreas and Lidzbarski died before Henning could finish his doctorate. He submitted his thesis "Das Verbum des Mittelpersischen der Turfantexte" at the end of 1930 and defended it in early 1931, earning highest honors.

The next stage of Henning's career, between 1931 and 1936, was marked by uncertainty and instability, though one does not notice this in the quantity and quality of his publications from that period. Andreas and Sieg's connections to the Turfan texts in Berlin made it possible for Henning to begin working on the publication of Turfan materials, beginning with those from Andreas' Nachlass. Never having a contract or position with the (then) Preussische Akademie der Wissenschaften, Henning was awarded an honorarium of a few hundred marks for each finished publication he submitted to Heinrich Lüders (1869–1943), member of the Akademie and secretary of the "Philosophisch-historische Klasse". Between publications, Henning survived on a stipendium from the Notgemeinschaft der Deutschen Wissenschaft, to which he had applied knowing that stable positions in "Orientalistik" were few and far between, and the award of which Lüders' reputation had facilitated. During this time, Henning continued to live in Göttingen, where his goal was to complete his Habilitation under Sieg. But the worsening political conditions in Germany made much untenable for Henning:

Die nationalsozialistische Machtergreifung jedoch trübte meine Aussicht auf Habilitierung durch die Einführung des "Dozentenlagers" als zwangsweiser Vorbedingung zur Habilitation; schon wegen eines Körperfehlers war es mir unmöglich, ein solches zu besuchen. Meiner politischen Einstellung wegen fand ich es je länger je schwerer, in einer kleinen Stadt wie Göttingen, wo der Einzelne sich der Aufsicht schwer entziehen konnte, zu verbleiben... In 1934 Henning moved to Berlin at the advice of Hans Heinrich Schaeder (1896– 1957), who had offered him the possibility of finishing his Habilitation there, and he continued to work on Turfan texts with the goal of writing his Habilitation thereon, supported by a small stipend from the Kultusministerium. Towards the end of 1934 Henning became engaged to Maria Polotsky (1910–1970), sister of Hans Jakob Polotsky (1905–1991). The passing of the Nürnberger Gesetze in 1935 made conditions even more difficult for Henning and his Jewish fiancée. He gave up his hopes of a Habilitation and a career in higher education in Germany, and turned his energies towards finding a way out of Germany:

Es wurde mir klar, dass meine Gelehrtenlaufbahn, ja mein Dasein, nur dann fortgesetzt werden könnte, wenn es mir gelänge, eine Stelle im Ausland zu erlangen. Eine solche zu finden wurde mein Hauptziel.

Finally, "nach vielen fruchtlosen Bemühungen", Henning landed what would be a career-defining position as the Parsee Community's Lecturer in Iranian Studies at the School of Oriental Studies (now the School of Oriental and African Studies) in London. This was partially due to the encouragement of Sten Konow, the support of Harold W. Bailey (1899-1996), the previous holder of that position, and a spate of glowing letters of recommendation from major scholars of that time: Paul Kahle, Georg Morgenstierne (1892–1978, Heinrich Lüders, Eugen Mittwoch (1876– 1942), Enno Littmann (1875–1958), and Hans Reichelt (1877–1939). Despite this, it was difficult to get a work permit or papers for his fiancée, and immigrating to England was not easy. Eventually, Polotsky made it to the UK, and she and Henning were married in 1937 in London; their only child, Anne, was born a year later. Henning was to move up steadily through the ranks at SO(A)S, being promoted to Senior Lecturer in 1939, to Reader in 1947, and to Professor of Central Asian Studies in 1948. (He became head of the Department of the Near and Middle East in 1958.) In May 1940, Henning experienced another period of personal difficulty when he was interned for about six months on the Isle of Man as an "enemy alien"; his salary was suspended though the School sent his wife a meager 'compassionate allowance'. In the internment camp, Henning roomed with the husband of Taqizadeh's sister-in-law. Henning was released eventually, through the efforts of the School and the Society for the Protection of Science and Learning. Again these circumstances are little reflected in his publications; Bailey's foreword to Henning's Sogdica (1940) states laconically: "The preparation of this present volume was interrupted by the war. Dr. Henning was unable to complete his work. He was also unable, if he had wished it, to revise the text." By the 1950s, Henning seems to have intended to eventually return to Germany, and documents in his Nachlass attest that he actively sought academic employment there.

In 1950, at the invitation of the Iranian government and with arrangements made by Sayyed Hasan Taqizadeh (1878–1970), Henning traveled to Iran to document the Middle Persian inscriptions of the Fārs region; the squeezes and photographs he made of the inscriptions, including the hitherto poorly-known one at Sar-Mašhad, dramatically improved their understanding. In order to publish these, and set the footing of especially Old and Middle Iranian epigraphic material on firm ground, he and a group of scholars founded the Corpus Inscriptionum Iranicarum in 1955 in response to a resolution of the 22nd International Congress of Orientalists at Istanbul in 1951 and with generous funding from Iran. Henning served until his death as its first chairman, Taqizadeh as its honorary president, and Boyce as the first secretary.

In 1961, Henning accepted an offer to visit the University of California, Berkeley for a year; this sojourn turned into an invitation to become Professor of Iranian Studies in the department of Near Eastern Languages (now Middle Eastern Languages and Cultures) and Henning immediately moved to the USA. The decision was made chiefly on the grounds that the climate of northern California would be much better for Henning's poor health than that of England, but he was loathe to leave SOAS, writing that he "fully expected to spend the rest of [his life]" and that "it is bitter to have to leave an institute where one was perfectly happy and content". Despite those feelings, Henning had explored on several occasion the possibility of moving to the US; through the 1950s, American universities including Chicago and Columbia had been close to recruiting him. He had moreover spent a semester at Columbia in 1946 at the invitation of Louis H. Gray (1875-1955), and another at the Institute for Advanced Study in 1956, at which he then unsuccessfully sought a permanent position. Henning initially had the impression that Berkeley "seem[ed] to be easygoing and that people have time there." In fact, much to his chagrin, his teaching responsibilities were increased compared to what they were at SOAS. The department of Near Eastern Languages at Berkeley was in the process of expanding its areas of research and teaching and Iranian Studies came to be well-represented in the 1960s; fellow German Walter Fischel (1902–1973) specialized in Persian Jewry, and a few years after Henning's arrival, the department hired Guitty Azarpay, a specialist in Iranian art, and Hamid Algar, a scholar of Persian literature and Islam. Though Henning's colleagues praised his diligent preparation for teaching, his reputation as a demanding and difficult pedagogue persisted. For example, Jerrold Cooper, an undergraduate at Berkeley in Henning's time, was once warned off enrolling in his courses with the words "you don't take a class with Henning out of curiosity." But others, like Michael Morony who did manage to take undergraduate courses with Henning, recall mostly his sense of humor.

In the spring term of 1967, Henning had planned to take leave to finish his longawaited dictionary of Chorasmian (a second application for a visiting term at the IAS for the same purpose in 1964 was declined), but suffered a fatal infection after an accident and passed away in January of that year.

2.2 Unfinished Works

At the time of his death, Henning had been working on a number of major projects, including editions and glossaries of the Chorasmian texts he had been instrumental in deciphering, updated readings of Middle Persian inscriptions, and an etymological dictionary of New Persian. His contemporaries immediately lamented that these would perhaps never see the light of day. As Mary Boyce wrote, "It is a matter for the deepest regret that he did not live to publish his eagerly awaited editions of these texts [viz. Middle Persian inscriptions in Iran]".⁹ So definitive of a scholar was Henning that even decades after his death, specialists of Iranian philology continue to wonder what unpublished work of Henning's might still be found and made public. It is therefore both surprising—and, to some, frustrating—that his Nachlaß has never been located. This matter rankled D. N. MacKenzie in particular, who wrote on several occasions that the unfinished projects of rumor were "unseen in Henning's Nachlaß in California, jealously guarded by his heirs".¹⁰ Yet as far as I can tell, the Nachlass does not contain as much material for these projects as many had speculated.

Chorasmian: Henning's work on a dictionary was in fact the only of his materials to be edited and published posthumously, though only the first part thereof was ready for publication. It was edited by D. N. MacKenzie as *A Fragment of a Khwarezmian Dictionary* (1971), based on a handwritten draft still located in his Nachlaß, which must have been shared with MacKenzie by Henning's heirs and subsequently returned. There is also an extensive card catalogue of Chorasmian (see §3.4.1). In any case, Henning's work on a dictionary for that language has long been superceded by MacKenzie's own dictionary project—itself never published and now kept safely (and accessibly) in his Nachlaß in Hamburg.¹¹ There do not appear to be any (more or less prepared) editions of Chorasmian texts, other than working transcriptions of manuscripts. Again, in any case, MacKenzie's work on Chorasmian has doubtlessly superceded what unpublished materials Henning had at the time of his death.

Middle Persian: There do not appear to be editions of Middle Persian inscriptions in any state approaching completion. In any case, all the MP inscriptions which Henning had a hand in documenting (and other more recently discovered) have been published, in most cases multiples times, since then.

(New) Persian: Henning's project of an etymological dictionary of Persian seems to have been in the background during most of his career, though begun already in the early 1940s.¹² It was formalized in 1944 through an agreement the Iran's Ministry of Education, who was to publish the work and pay Henning an honorarium when completed. The dictionary never reached a more advanced state, however, than the compilation of an extensive card catalogue. Letters between Henning and Taqizadeh in particular (the main facilitator of Henning's work from the Iranian side) attest to the slow progress on the dictionary, Henning's own wavering motivation for it, and some of the uncertainties and miscommunications with the Iranian Ministry of Education regarding how it was to be published.¹³ To be completed by around 1948, already in 1947 Henning knew that he would not be able to meet any initial deadline and in subsequent letters he was to request further time and funding from the Iranian side. In a letter of 3.25.1949 he remarked in a letter to Tagizadeh, "that awful Dictionary - it is a subject I approach only with dread." Although he had devoted huge amounts of time to this research, by the early 1950s, he seemed to have thought it would no longer be possible to publish the dictionary and become frustrated, knowing that he would have needed a great deal of time to write up the material on his lexical cards into a publishable state. In a letter of 9.8.1953, Louis Gray, seemingly responding to these sentiments, asked him: "has the eclipse of Mossadegh made any difference about your Persian etymological dictionary, or can you still wangle out of it?" Yet a few years later, motivation seems to have returned—or at least Henning saw the possibility of publication as more real. In 1956, he and his wife went as far as creating a non-profit association in England ("Persian Dictionary Editors Limited") and in 1957 he obtained a contract—with the approval of Taqizadeh and the Iranian side and facilitation of Ehsan Yarshater-from Walter de Gruyter for a "Compendium



of Persian Etymology" with a deadline of 1961. This deadline of course was not met, partially due to administrative demands at work, partially to Henning's renewed efforts on Chorasmian. By the time he arrived at Berkeley, this project seems to have been more or less abandoned. Mary Boyce wrote with some regret on the matter: "One of the most important of his unpublished works is his etymological dictionary of the Persian language, over which he laboured for years, and which, even in its unfinished card-index form, must be a priceless treasure-house of fact and erudition."¹⁴ The only evidence of all Henning's work is the card catalogue.

3 Nachlass Contents

The organization of the materials in the Nachlaß seems to reflect their organization as it was prior to their acquisition by the Deutsches Exil-archiv. The materials are grouped in a large number of folders, bearing labels written (presumably) by Henning himself and probably reflecting his own filing system, further grouped into boxes (Archivschachtel) by the Exilarchiv for ease of storage. The arrangement of folders, especially those containing correspondence and studies, seems to have been confused posthumously.

The groups of materials can be roughly described as follows: i) photographs and facsimiles of manuscripts, ii) correspondence relating to publications, text editions, inscriptions, artefacts, and so forth, iii) correspondence with colleagues and friends, iv) working materials including notebooks and index cards. There are hardly any personal or family-related documents. The location of a given group of materials is provided in the following inventory with the label of the Archivschachtel in bold square brackets, e.g. [Mss 1].

3.1 Manuscript Photos & Facsimiles

Digitized versions linked to where available. An effort has been made, especially for the Turfan photos, to note any explanatory text written on the photos or facsimiles themselves.

3.1.1 Turfan Photos (pre-war)

See the Digitales Turfan-Archiv for digital images of all Turfan manuscripts. Henning had an extensive set of photographs prepared prior to his leaving Germany (Many of the older photos are stamped with the name "Dr. Fahrenberg" and a Hamburg address), which he brought with him to London and then to Berkeley. These enabled his continued work on Manichaean texts. Fragments of which the originals were lost during World War II, but for which a photograph exists in this Nachlaß, are marked with a dagger (†).¹⁵

3.1.2 Turfan Photos (post-war)

Henning was apparently able to get new photos of select Turfan fragments made for him in the early 1960s, though only of fragments in Manichaean script. Although he seemed to have maintained good contacts with various caretakers of the Turfan collection, in addition to his students who worked with the Turfan texts, after leaving Germany he himself only returned once to the Turfan archive, in 1958. The folders containing these newer photos are labeled "New photos 1964-65". All photos are roughly A4 size, black and white with ruler; R and V photos both present unless noted otherwise.

3.3 Working Materials

3.3.1 Correspondence related to publications

Henning's organization system was such that the original correspondence up through the final proofs of an article on a given topic were all filed together. In this way, his working method can be seen, as well as how he became aware of a given text (e.g. by being sent photos from someone) and its context. It is impossible to list these all in detail, but an overview is attempted. In most cases, the labels on the folders do not correspond to their contents (likely having been mixed up posthumously or in transit). In addition, the various folders containing these materials are scattered in various Archivschachtel.

3.4 Card Catalogues

The Nachlaß contains 7 Karteikästen and some bundles of cards stored in other Schachteln. The Karteikästen are partly mislabeled; the contents or labels must have been switched around at some point.

3.4.1 Chorasmian Lexical Cards

- Kaste I (labeled خورازمي): contains Chorasmian words and word-parts (including suffixes) along with examples and other comments, from 'd to fyzdk (about 1/3 of the box is blank cards).
- Kaste 2 (labeled *ε* ¹): is a continuation of the above, going from *γ'fyl* to *zryf*, with a couple of cards at the end with corrections and notes. Also contains some blank cards at end.

3.4.2 Persian Lexical Cards

There seem to be two different sets of Persian cards in 4 Kästen. These cards are no doubt the working material for his planned, and never materialized, etymological dictionary of (New) Persian. It seems to be the case that he did not move on to a subsequent stage of preparing this material for publication in book form (with the exception of a few sample pages composed in 1943 but not published til 1971).

Kaste I (labeled 'MacK'): A Persian comparative/etymological glossary in Persian alphabetical order from يوغ to آب with English definitions, other Ir. cognates, and ref. to literature. Accompanied by a sheet with biblio abbreviations. In rubber band, another smaller group of cards with what appears to be an earlier partial draft of this glossary in pencil.

- Kaste 2 (no label): Band of masking tape around box. Largely Persian lexica, including a number of plant names and the like. The first dozen or so cards contain bibliographic refs and abbreviations, to works on the botany etc of India/Iran/Central Asia both modern and medieval.
- Kaste 3 (labeled ف ع): seems to be a continuation of the Persian glossary, including also some normal words, going from فيه to جاباتان.
- Kaste 4 (labeled قاب): continuation of above card-box, going from بيهه to قاب to مقاب, with a few blank cards at end.

3.4.3 Sogdian Lexical Cards

- Kaste 1: A set of cards (that looks much older than the above sets) with Sogdian words and forms, with reference to texts and publications. These cards seem to be based largely on Buddhist Sogdian texts, to judge by the references.
- Cards labeled "Sogdica: Ilya's Index" [Unlabeled 1]
- Cards labeled "MPers.-Sogd. Glossaries Index by Lentz" [Unlabeled 2]

3.5 Scholarly Correspondence

Henning's Nachlass contains a large amount of correspondence in a number of languages, primarily English and German, but also French, Russian, Italian, and Persian. From this mass of letters and mailings, it is clear that he was, without hyperbole, the hub around which the study of Iranian texts and inscriptions turned in the mid-20th century. He was sent photos or originals of nearly every single Iranian text or inscription that was discovered in the 1940s through 1960s. The inquiries from a host of colleagues at all manner of institutions around the world is impressive: museums, professors, curators, archaeologists, private collectors, and rich individuals with antiquities all wrote to Henning to ask his opinion on the genuineness of an artefact or to entreat him to decipher and publish a text. Mary Boyce commented, "his large correspondence, which afflicted him in later years by its bulk, showed how many consulted him on how wide a range of subjects; nearly all of them received patient and detailed replies."¹⁸ It is not possible here to list every piece of correspondence, but an effort has been made to provide a relatively thorough overview.

The following simply lists the names of correspondents; the amount of correspondence varies a great deal from person to person, from a single short letter in

3.6 Personal Library

The Nachlass contains a large number of books (approximately 30 shelf-meters), probably forming most or all of Henning's working library. There are three guides to the library:

- A microfilm catalog labelled "The Henning Collection Book 1-6", consisting of 2508 photos of the title page of each book, divided into six 'books' organized by location in Henning's study, created in 1973 (with duplicate reel).
- 2) A single binder containing photocopies of title pages of books. The order does not correspond exactly to the microfilm catalog and it is shorter. Each page gives the binding and condition as well as a number (referring to shelf/location). Some marked "with WBH notes".
- 3) An old and possibly incomplete computer printout of a spreadsheet listing bibliographic information.

As far as I know, the books held in the Nachlass have not been checked against the catalogs. In the first few years after Henning's death, a few volumes from his library were sold via dealers in England; it is unclear whether these were included in the above inventories or not. There are also one or two large cardboard boxes of miscellaneous offprints and journal issues, uncatalogued.

- Records at the Institute for Advanced Studies, Princeton, relating to Henning's applications for the 1956 term (successful) and 1964 term (unsuccessful).²³
