



/By the report in our commercial column from Capt. Ferries, it will be seen that the steamship Tarlar struck on a coral reef, on the passage from the Fijis. The accident was plainly caused by a failure to get necessary observations owing to thick weather, and the prevalence of an unexpected easterly current. A. G. 
