A Message from Ed Cohen, EHNTJC President



"Our Future is in Our Hands"

Hard to believe it has been over two years since COVID-19 took over the world. COVID has surely put new and different twists on many of our daily activities. The safety of our community remains top of mind as we implement all protections. It is our goal to move safely towards the normal we once enjoyed.

We will be setting tables in the social hall and offering the opportunity for simple Kiddush snacks on Shabbat. We are looking at early June to get back to "serving" lunch after services. We would like to offer Onegs on Friday nights and will consider doing so on those Friday

evenings where the in-person attendance is stronger. We are currently offering the opportunity for sponsorships of the Onegs and Kiddush snacks /lunches on Shabbat and encourage you to call the office if interested.

We are considering and exploring outdoor activities this summer. This is a top priority, a must!

We will relax our masking policy, requiring masking when walking about the building. Once seated or enjoying your snack, masks can be removed.

Our use of technology gives you choice. All our services and programs have a virtual component and we ask you to join us as you feel most comfortable. If you are feeling under the weather for any reason, we ask that you join us virtually.

We are an innovative, strong, vibrant congregation, and full of activities. A truly supported and generous community.

We have a wonderful partnership that affords us the opportunity to remain EHNTJC at 4500 Dempster Street. We will remain in our building, today and in the future. How long of a future do we have in this building will depend on all of us?

I am optimistic, as I have been since we entered our partnership, that we have a bright and vibrant future. I am not one to sit and worry - I like action and creative thinking. We have a wonderful opportunity as a community, a congregation, and a synagogue - only we can make this a success.

Our future depends on financial support, affiliation, and activities. I will acknowledge our future is tied to our clergy that have been and remain a tremendous part, the center, of our success today and tomorrow.

Capital Funds, is it time for a building campaign? Strategic Planning, let's explore the work that has been done around the different scenarios I present.

Ways & Means, Men's Club, and our Sisterhood, please continue all the wonderful work you have been doing and we anticipate you will continue to do. We thank you and look forward to your wonderful programs. Family Programing, Adult Education, and Social Action have so many wonderful ideas for future activities and programs that we all look forward to being a part of.

Our clergy, always here for us, keeping us solid at our core, through services seven days a week to all their wonderful and creative classes held weekly.

We are strong, vibrant and have a solid future. We demonstrate that every day. Let us look at the glass as half-full, get excited, and move forward as EHNTJC at 4500 Dempster Street.

From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Friends,

We often express our values and our opinions about pressing issues of the day through emails and conversations. Some of those exchanges can be aggravating; some are fruitful. But it is certainly fruitful when we express our values through our deeds. We have been doing exactly that in recent weeks at EHNTJC.



On Wednesday, April 20, many of us attended a "Vigil for Ukraine," sponsored by the Niles Township Clergy Forum. EHNT congregant Joel Levin and I worked hard to make this happen, and it was a significant success. Held at the Skokie Village Green, it featured Representative Jan Schakowsky, the Ukrainian Consul General, Mayor George Van Dusen, many leaders of the Ukrainian community and local clergy. I extend my gratitude to Joel for all the work he put into this event.

In addition, EHNT and Congregation Kehillat Shalom are part of a small synagogue consortium that soon will be assisting a refugee family. I thank Fran Givertz and Paula Harris for their efforts; they put the consortium together and have been working closely with HIAS to take the steps required to welcome and help get "our" family settled into their home and their new country. We do not know where this family will come from, but we can be sure they have been in the midst of a very difficult journey. Welcoming the stranger – the *ger* – is a paramount mitzvah. Mickey Gordon has created a registry for items this family will need. You may find it at www.target.com/registry. Search for "Mickey Gordon HIAS." If you have other questions about this project, contact Fran at 847-677-3616.

Finally, our Social Action Committee, under the leadership of Marsha Brody, encourages congregants to make contributions to organizations that support Ukrainians, both those who have fled their country and those who remain in that war-ravaged land. We recently publicized links to some of those organizations, including JUF – Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago, JDC – Joint Distribution Committee, Jewish Agency for Israel, World

ORT, and International Rescue Committee. You are also welcome to send a contribution to my discretionary fund; I will forward the entire amount to one of these organizations.

The obligation to assist the needy is hard-baked into our Jewish consciousness and commanded by Torah. Let us continue to do acts of repair for our fractured world.

CANTOR'S NOTE

Wir zaynen do! We are still here!

Dear Friends,

As I write these words, we are approaching *Yom HaShoah*, Holocaust Memorial Day, and I'd like to share a remarkable Holocaust-related project I was recently privileged to participate in.

Two months ago, an old college theater buddy contacted me about a play he was working on. As Dean of the Fine Arts Department at the University of Nebraska/Omaha, Jack had become involved in a local theatrical adaption of a BBC teleplay entitled "God on Trial" aired in 2008. (We believe this to be the first theatrical adaption of the original BBC broadcast.)

Jack wanted my advice on certain aspects of Jewish ritual and theology related to his character, one of the Jewish prisoners participating in the remarkable *Bet Din*, or trial. Our initial discussions gradually became a more formal consultation to the director and cast, allowing me to become familiar with this challenging and troubling production.

The play takes place in a Jewish prisoner block in the Nazi death camp Auschwitz-Birkenau, where we find a group of Jewish prisoners awaiting their inevitable death. As they discuss their impending fate, the prisoners begin to explore the question of where God is in Auschwitz, and what God's responsibility may or may not be in the horrors that daily surround them. The prisoners decide to convene a *Bet Din*, a Jewish court of law to formally address God's "responsibility" for the Holocaust. (There is some question as to whether Elie Wiesel *z'tz'l* may have actually witnessed such a "trial" while at Auschwitz.) Through the words and arguments of the actors, "God on Trial" explores the difficult theological questions about how/why/if God would "allow" such evil to be perpetrated in the world, and in particular against God's "chosen people".

The characters represent Jews of many backgrounds, from German secular, non-religious "modern" Jews, to devout Polish Jews and even a Rabbi who is something of a mystic. Even the Kapo discloses that he didn't know he was Jewish until he was taken to Auschwitz by the Nazis. Throughout the play, we hear arguments from the book of Job, and other traditional Jewish sources as the characters try to make sense of the horror of their surroundings and attempt to understand whether in fact the God of Creation can be held to account for seeming to abandon God's people. The play ends with a harrowing scene of a "selection" of those prisoners who will be murdered that day, with the Kapo calling the prisoner numbers of those who will die. I have never been in a theater that was so tense and so silent as during that last painful scene.

Of course, "God on Trial" presents only questions and challenges. But no answers - just as the innumerable books and essays exploring "theodicy" in the Holocaust, or the question of evil in God's world are similarly unresolved or largely unsatisfactory in their conclusions.

And yet, if there was a glimmer of hope in "God on Trial", it was for me the final line of the play spoken by my friend's character, Kuhn. After the terrifying scene of the selection and exit of the condemned Jews, Kuhn utters the play's final words, which for me are far more significant than any theological debate about the Holocaust: We are still here! Wir zaynen do!

Yom Ha'Atzmaut by Bobbie Levin

Yom Ha'Atzmaut, commemorating May 14, 1948 (the 5th of Iyar), is the national day of Israel's Independence after 2,000 years of exile and wars.

Yom Ha'Atzmaut starts a few minutes after sundown of Yom Hazikaron, Israel's Memorial Day for the fallen soldiers--those who sacrificed their lives for the State of Israel. Sometimes a more convenient date is chosen to avoid Yom Ha'Atzmaut occurring on Shabbat or to attract more people to the celebration.

In Israel, it is a formal holiday and the celebration takes place on Mt. Herzl with a Knesset speaker, artistic performances, flags of Israel, ceremonial lighting of 12 torches, one for each tribe, and honoring Israeli citizens who have made significant social contributions. Many Israeli cities have outdoor performances, speakers, singing and dancing. Many Israelis celebrate with picnics and barbecues.

The juxtaposition of Yom Hazikaron and Yom Ha'Atzmaut is key. For American Jews celebrating Yom Ha'Atzmaut has been a way to express solidarity with the State of Israel and strengthen their alliance with it.

Steven Spielberg is an artist whose work is so ubiquitous and instantly identifiable that his name has inspired its very own adjective – "Spielbergian". One of the most commercially successful director of all time, Spielberg's modern classics include Jaws, Close Encounters of the Third Kind, E.T., and the Indiana Jones and Jurassic Park series. We examine the life and career of the grand storyteller, with a particular focus on his upbringing as an Orthodox Jew and his later Jewish re-awakening, which yielded such vital works as Schindler's List and Munich. His interests have also inspired the creation of the Shoah Foundation and Righteous Person Foundation, which make Jewish history and tradition more accessible to all.

Irv Slifkin has had a lifelong love for movies and popular culture. A native Philadelphian, Irv teaches film and journalism classes at Temple University and Rowan College. He is the author of the books Filmadelphia: A Celebration of a City's Movies and Groovy Movies: Far-Out Films of the Psychedelic Era. In addition to writing for such publications as the Philadelphia Inquirer, Entertainment Weekly, The Hollywood Reporter, Chicago Tribune and Los Angeles Times, Irv has lectured on film and popular culture, in person and on Zoom, for libraries, organizations and Jewish institutions throughout NJ and PA.

Laurence Lerman saw Alfred Hitchcock's North by Northwest when he was 13 years old and that's all it took. He has worked with MGM, Sony, Music Box Films, Cohen Media, Sterling Productions and Kino International, where he helped launch the home entertainment division. He has been writing about film and video for 30+ years for such outlets as Variety, Entertainment Weekly, The Morning Call, and Video Business Magazine, where he served as a Senior Editor for 15 years. He is the co-founder and editor-in-chief of DiscDish.com, a popular Blu-ray and DVD website offering reviews, news and interviews.

BELLA BRIEF FUND – This fund is used by our Rabbi to schedule programs and guest speakers for the congregation.

BIMA FUND – This fund provides financial support for our clergy, daveners, layning and accompanists.

CANTOR'S MUSIC FUND – This fund is designated for the Cantor's use to benefit the congregation's musical programs.

VIVIAN CHANNON SOCIAL ACTION/TZEDAKAH FUND – This fund is used for social action and/or tzedakah projects for people in need and disasters in the world.

CONGREGATION FUND – This fund is used by the congregation for general operating expenses.

GEMILITH CHESED – LOTTE GRUEN FUND – This fund *confidentially* assists needy members of the congregation. Funds are awarded by a committee.

HERMAN GREENBAUM CAMP RAMAH FUND – This fund assists needy members of the congregation to attend Camp Ramah. The scholarships are awarded by a committee.

HILLMAN LIBRARY FUND – This fund is used to purchase books and materials for the congregation's library.

GERALD MELTON SIMCHA FUND – This fund provides support of our *Onegs* and receptions – donations can commemorate a special event or *simcha*.

PRAYER BOOK FUND – This fund is used to purchased prayer books and Chumashim. Bookplates are inscribed and placed in the front of purchased books. (\$25 minimum donation)

RABBI EMERITUS FUND – This fund is designated for the Rabbi Emeritus' use at his discretion to promote the synagogue, for education or charitable organizations.

RABBI'S SPECIAL FUND – This fund is designated for the Rabbi's use at his discretion to promote the synagogue, for education or charitable organizations.

STEVE & MARGRIT REICH RELIGIOUS SCHOOL FUND - This fund provides confidential support to families who need scholarships for their children to attend our Religious School. It also helps the school to underwrite needed projects.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL EDUCATION FUND – This fund is used for the Religious School as needed with the approval of the Religious Education Committee.

RUBIN/LEVETON CAMP SCHOLARSHIP FUND – This fund assists children of the congregation to attend Jewish-oriented summer camps (other than Camp Ramah). The scholarships are awarded by a committee.

AVRAHM STAMPFER FUND – This fund assists member children who will be going on sponsored trips to Israel. Scholarships are awarded by a committee.

TALCOTT/LEVIN YOUTH ACTIVITIES FUND – This fund is used for youth activities and programs with the approval of the Youth Activities Committee.
