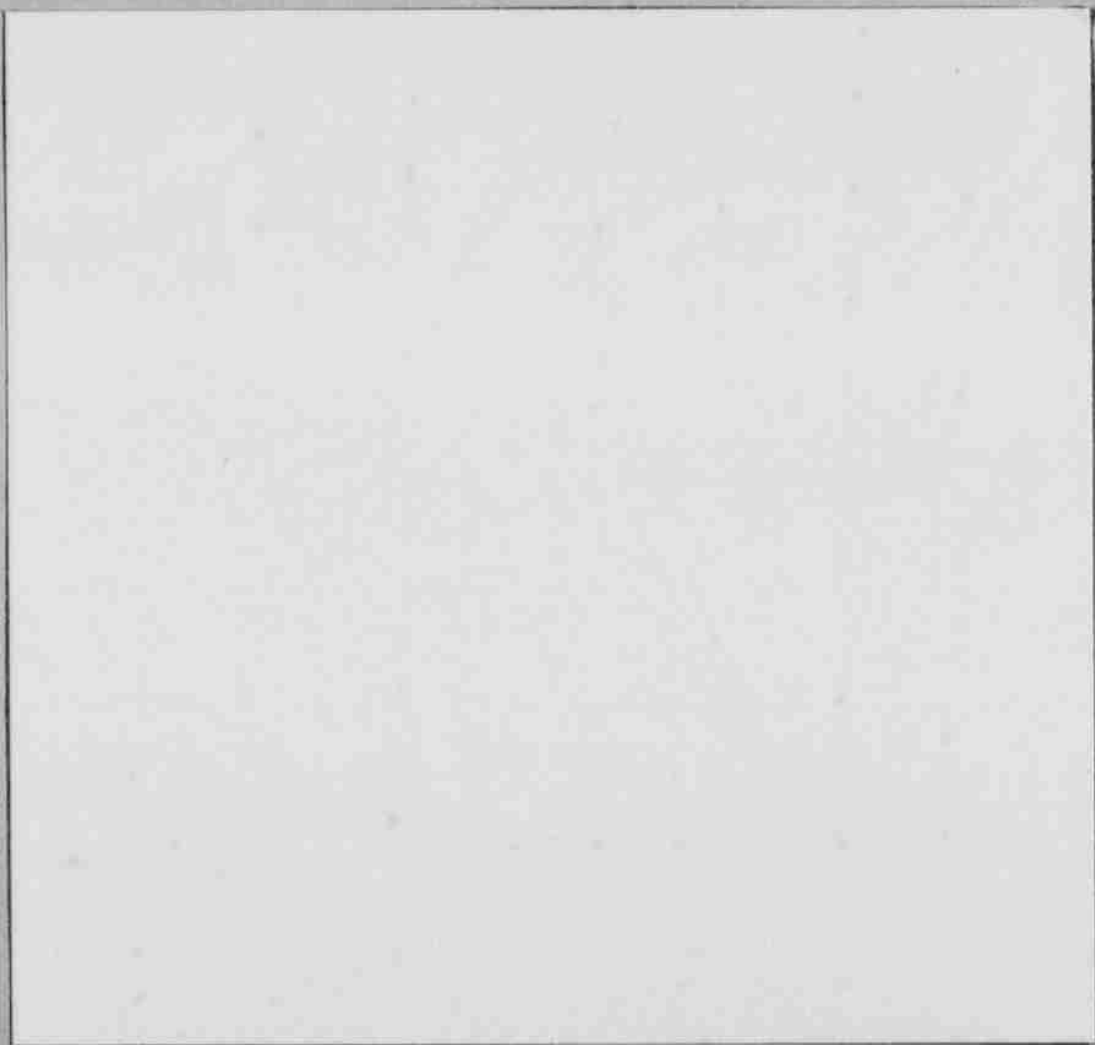

Memorandum:

DEPUTY MINISTER

Indian day schools will close for the Christmas holidays on December 22 and re-open on January 4, 1943. As you are aware, a teacher of an Indian day school resides on an Indian reserve and it is the usual custom to go home for the Christmas holidays.

We have always issued the salary cheque for the month of December in time for it to reach the school before the commencement of the Christmas holidays. However, I am advised by our Representative of the Treasury that the recent regulation regarding nonpayment of December salaries of temporary employees previous to Christmas this year also affects teachers of Indian day schools and, if no exception is made, these teachers will not receive their December salary until December 31.

I believe that in many cases this would cause a special hardship, as it would, in all probability, prevent many teachers from enjoying their Christmas holidays at home.

Taking everything into consideration, I believe that an exception should be made in their case and I appreciate it if you could arrange to have the salary cheques of the teachers of Indian day schools issued previous years. The number of cheques to be issued is slightly under 300.

You will recall that among other requests contained in the representations made by the Church delegation who interviewed the Minister on January 12, 1943, there was a request for payment of a special grant at the rate of \$10.00 per capita based on the average attendance to each of the Indian residential schools in Canada.

A similar payment was made last year (see P.C. 20/2057, March 16, 1942).

At the present time there is an amount of approximately \$92,000.00 unexpended in our appropriation for per capita grants to Indian residential schools.

The reason for making this special payment last year was outlined in my memorandum of February 9, 1942, and I feel that the same conditions prevail this year.

With the above in mind, I recommend that a similar payment be made and I, therefore, attach Memorandum to Council which I trust the Minister will find it possible to approve.

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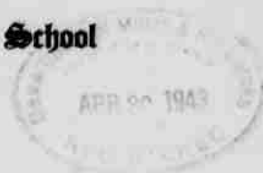

We are very grateful to you and to the officials of the Department, generally, for the help which the special grants are likely to prove to our Indian Residential School work. Your letter came whilst the Board was in progress and I had the pleasure of announcing to the members that the Government was making some additional grant to enable us to meet the cost of these schools.

We are also glad that the Department offers no objection to our making use of the money as we see fit - that is, there is no requirement for us to pay the amount to any particular school. However, most of our schools are in dire need, with the possible exception of Edmonton.

May I ask if further consideration is being given to the question of paying the schools the full amount of their just earnings? I think we are quite warranted in taking the position that the Department should pay one hundred cents on the dollar for the work which we do. I wish the Income Tax Department would allow me to get away with paying 92.24% of my income tax, but they require 100%. Further, they require this in advance - or at least when I get my pay cheque! I hope you can make some headway in connection with this vexatious matter.

Dear Mr. Phelan:

First of all I would like to express my gratitude for your kind assistance in expediting the cheque for the September quarter. I would not have troubled you, had it not been a matter of extreme importance. Now, I wish to lay the following situation before you, for your consideration and with the intention of asking for your good offices in helping solve the matter.

It is getting more and more difficult each month to finance this school. This is due to three things: the reduction in the grant; the increased cost of living; and above all to the extraordinary number of children that we are forced to maintain above the paid quota. You are well aware of the first two, as they have been discussed quite a bit between schools and the Department. However, it is about the third, that I wish to treat in this letter. We are carrying, at this time, 32 children above the quota, for whom we do not receive one cent from the Department. In dollars and cents, this means an added expense of about \$5440.00 each year. One might say, why carry so many over; or, why not get rid of some. The answer is that it is impossible to reduce the number. Far from soliciting enrolment, we have been, for the past years, discouraging and putting off the entrance of children into the school, and furthermore, trying to get the parents to try other schools more distant. This, in itself, is a really miserable business; especially when it has been the aim of the Department and the priests to encourage among Indians, the desire to send their children to school for education. Here we are destroying a principle that we have worked so long to establish. Yet, apparently it has to be done, and I mention it, not with any satisfaction, but merely to show that we have taken extraordinary measures to keep down our pupilage. I have taken abuse and plenty of it from Indians, whose children I could not admit into school, and God only knows that they needed it. It is, of course, the responsibility of the Department of Indian Affairs to provide educational facilities for the Indians; but the Indians take it out on the principal when they cannot get their children into school. I guess we can "take it" all right; it is part of our job; but it is well to note and note well, that, while in the past, there were only a few such scenes, they are now more frequent and the particular dissatisfaction of individual parents is working together into a general movement of unrest and consequent bitterness. I dare say that this is not a common condition among other schools; they may even have difficulty in getting enough children in to fill

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their minimum quota. Their difficulty is in getting the children in to school; ours, in keeping them out. The whole thing goes back to a problem that has been present in our area for years. There have never been adequate school facilities for the number of children in our district. And this is not some outlying district, remote and isolated, but the Fraser Valley, the most thickly populated portion of British Columbia. It is growing rapidly and war industry has given it added impetus; consequently, our Indians are in daily contact with white people. They discuss problems with them, see what they have and want the same for themselves. Education is important for everybody, but it is doubly important when it is needed not only for its aesthetic qualities, but for survival. Our young Indian boys and girls have to compete with others for jobs; what chance will they have if they have no education, and I am not referring to higher education, but merely grade school. The days are past when one could make a living panning gold, or trapping, along the Fraser.

It is not my intention to bring any religious issue into this discussion, but, since this is relative to the matter, here is a very pertinent point. Children apply to come into school -- we cannot take them in for maybe three years -- they are now ten and eleven years of age, instead of seven and eight -- the result: they leave school at sixteen with a five or six grade education instead of eight or nine. Therefore many of the Catholic children in our district are more poorly educated than others, because they have not had equal opportunities.

This crowded condition of our school continues, in spite of the fact that day schools have been erected by the Department, in our area, wherever possible. During the past years, I have not taken in a child from a day school district, unless for very special reasons, such as: 1. Very poor conditions at home and with recommendation of agent. 2. No responsible guardianship. 3. Parents living at considerable distance from day school. 4. Ill health and with recommendation of doctor. In other words, our residential school with its present limitations together with all the day schools possible are by no means adequate for the number of children.

Another point to be considered is, that we are so constantly filled up with pupils, we can never co-operate with the agents, should they have a special case arising during the year, where some child should be admitted to school. I imagine that the agents think that I am "stalling" sometimes, when I tell them I have no room for their emergency cases; however, they realize my great difficulty and are very understanding.

I have gone to great lengths here, merely to show how impossible it is to reduce the pupilage, because I can understand that this will be the Department's obvious answer to my problem. And I also maintain that this is a very definite and particular problem of our school. Hence, to solve it, I am not asking for an increase in the pupilage grant, but rather for a supernumerary grant for the children that we are maintaining over and above the paid quota.

The Department of Indian Affairs have willingly taken on the responsibility of providing education and care for Indian children at the rate of \$170.00 per year. In spite of this fact the same

Department allows us to provide for about thirty-two children, without it costing them one cent. Thus, we are burdened, at a time when expenses are so hard to meet, with an amount of \$5440, which, in all justice, should be the burden of the Department. Or, look at it this way. If I should turn out these children, quite apart from the loss of education, there would be the matter of maintaining them in dollars and cents. Many of them are orphans and some one would have to be paid for keeping them.

I am sorry that this letter is becoming so lengthy; but, it is necessary that you be aware of every angle so that my case will be well understood. I always felt that it was unfair for us to be placed in such a position, but I was willing to be patient as long as I could maintain the school even with its extra burden. Now, the situation has become critical. I had to appeal to you to try and have our last quarterly cheque rushed, because all my money was gone. It was bound to happen sooner or later, and the crisis was held off mainly by two things: 1. We provided from our Oblate farm to the utmost. 2. We cut down expenses to the absolute minimum. It took very little to upset the balance. A complete fruit failure and the present increase in prices did the job nicely.

I wish therefore, to obtain a supernumerary grant, extending back to the first of September, for twenty-five of the pupils, who are at present not maintained by the Department. I will have their names prepared and the agents' recommendations attached, with whatever other data, that the Department would require. This is, I believe, a very just request. But, because it so just and so minimal, I am exceedingly serious about its fulfilment. I would ask you, therefore, to take this matter up with the proper officials, so that our present acute situation may be speedily remedied.

Please remember the following points:

1. It is impossible to reduce the present pupilage.
2. It is not altogether merely a problem of education of children, but one of welfare and maintenance.
3. The situation has been present for some time.
4. The financial situation is serious.
5. The loss of staple produce and the very high cost of living.
6. It is a simple question of allocating responsibility for the children.

I sincerely hope that the Department will give full and just consideration to my request. I have tried very hard to build up a good school. It is held in high respect in the locality. It is the oldest Indian residential school in British Columbia. Your inspectors, agents and doctors have given us good reports. The care and affection of the fathers, sisters and brothers is something that cannot be reckoned in dollars and cents. Yet all this good redounds to the credit of the Department of Indian Affairs. Surely, where so much is given freely, it is not much to ask for simple justice. It is good to remember that the money asked for, is not for ourselves, but, for the Indian children, that they may be trained, clothed and fed.

DEPUTY MINISTER

An unusually large number of requests for an increased enrolment at Indian residential schools has reached the Department during the last two-year period. These requests can be attributed, in part, to the difficulty experienced by principals in financing the operation of their schools. Recent audit reports indicate that few of our schools have escaped deficits. These requests can also be attributed to the tendency, or, one might state, the insistence of the Department, that accommodation be provided at residential schools for orphans and neglected children. I am sending forward herewith a letter dated November 16, 1943, received by the Chief of the Training Division from the Principal of the St. Mary's Indian Residential School, Mission, British Columbia. This letter is typical of a number recently received.

I am sending forward also a statement showing the authorized pupilage at this date, the actual number of pupils in attendance at June 30, 1943, or at the close of the last academic year, and the actual number in attendance on the last of September, 1943, the opening date of the present academic year. These figures indicate that we have enrolled at residential schools at the present time 579 pupils for whom no grant is being paid. The average per capita grant amounts to \$171.00. This being the case, it would appear that the churches are providing food, clothing and instruction to pupils at an annual cost of approximately \$99,000.00. The representatives of the churches feel that they should not and cannot continue to assume this obligation. These representatives point out that the cost of living has increased at least 17% during the last two-year period and that this, coupled with the 8% reduction in the amount paid annually by

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the Government in the form of per capita grants, means that they are operating with a 25% reduction in their regular revenues. They remind us also that during the period 1914-18 they received cost-of-living bonus amounting in all to \$20.00 per pupil per annum.

The officials of the Welfare & Training Division find it difficult to convince themselves that an increased enrolment at any particular school, or group of schools, would prove adequate in the solution of this problem. They rather feel that the grants should be restored and paid on the 100% basis. In addition to this it is just possible that an adjustment in the enrolments now authorized may be necessary. It will be noted that Indian parents in the southern sections of the Dominion, who are gainfully employed, appear to be increasingly reluctant to send their children to these institutions. Enrolments at the Mount Elgin and Mohawk Institutes are far below the authorized figure. May I suggest, therefore, that consideration be given to:

1. The payment of per capita grants on the full authorized enrolment, rather than on a basis of 98.24%. To do this will require an additional appropriation of approximately \$70,000.00.
2. That representatives of the churches be called into conference to discuss certain adjustments that might be made in the authorized pupilage at a number of residential schools, particularly schools established on northern reserves.
3. That consideration be given to the desirability of having a thorough survey undertaken at our residential schools with the object of determining the number of pupils for which per capita grants should be paid and the number of day school pupils that might attend such schools, on the understanding that only a noonday lunch would be provided.

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The officials here feel that these are matters of extreme urgency. It is scarcely necessary to remind you again that our school population is increasing at the rate of 300 pupils per annum, while our school building programme has been practically suspended in recent years. In addition to this a large number of schools have been destroyed by fire during the war period. With the exception of two or three schools built to replace schools destroyed by fire, the last residential school (Shubenasadie) was built in the year 1930. It would appear, therefore, that, unless provision is made for the accommodation of Indian pupils in either Indian day schools or residential schools, the conditions to which I have referred are apt to become increasingly acute during the period immediately ahead of us.

Memorandum:

DEPUTY MINISTER.

In response to the suggestion made by the Minister, immediately following his interview with representatives of the Churches on December 1, I am submitting herewith, for your consideration, certain proposals relating to the payment of per capita grants and a cost-of-living bonus to Indian residential schools.

In this connection may I refer to my memorandum to you dated November 25, 1943?

You are probably aware that, in addition to the regular per capita grant payments, made in recent years on a 92.24% basis, we have during the last two years made an additional grant amounting to \$10.00 per pupil of the authorized enrolment at all residential schools. We recommend that a similar amount be paid for the fiscal year 1943-44 and that this payment be made at an early date. This extra disbursement would enable a number of the principals to purchase coal at this season of the year and other supplies in bulk and thus effect certain economies. There are sufficient funds in this year's appropriation to make this payment.

In addition, we recommend that provision be made in the 1944-45 estimates for the payment of a cost-of-living bonus to residential schools at the rate of \$15.00 per pupil. This payment, if approved, will amount to approximately \$125,000.00 and it will be necessary to make provision for this amount in the estimates now under consideration.

We have already intimated that in recent years per capita grants have been paid at the rate of 92.24%.

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We recommend that for the year 1944-45 these grants be paid at the rate of 100%. No provision has been made in the 1943-44 estimates for this payment, which will amount to \$70,000.00.

The officials of the Welfare and Training Division are constantly confronted with the spectacle of Indian pupils, many of them illegitimate children and others from disrupted homes, for whom it is necessary to provide accommodation and institutional care at residential schools. A number of such cases are invariably brought to the attention of the officials after the residential schools have recruited their full enrolment. For a time these children were accommodated by the discharge of senior pupils, but during the last two years there have been few senior pupils sufficiently advanced to be discharged from the schools, with the result that principals have been asked to provide, without remuneration, for an additional number of pupils. We recommend that a revision be made in next year's estimates for the sum of \$25,000.00. This sum would enable the officials, with ministerial approval, to pay supernumerary grants to certain residential schools that are at the present time, without cost to the Department, providing care and instruction for a number of Indian pupils.

It will be noted that the additional amount for which provision should be made in the 1944-45 estimates, should these recommendations be approved, would be \$220,000.

You may remember that the Churches, in presenting their case to the Minister, expressed the opinion that a cost-of-living bonus, in certain cases at least, should be voted to the Churches, as such, and not to individual schools. The representative of the United Church emphasized in his remarks that this procedure enabled him to extend a greater measure of assistance to certain schools where the need was most urgent, and that a distribution made in this way was on the whole the most equitable. We can see no serious objection to the payment of this cost-of-living bonus in the manner suggested. Cheques could be issued to the Home Mission Board of the United Church and to the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada.

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In the case of the Catholic Church it may be somewhat difficult to follow strictly this procedure. Where schools are grouped, however, under a particular Bishop, as in the case of Grouard, this method can be followed and it might be possible to work out this method with the Oblate Provincials in the case of the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia.

THAT there are 76 Indian residential schools in the Dominion of Canada;

THAT the Churches co-operating with the Department in the operation of these schools have directed our attention to the increased cost of many commodities and the higher wages now being paid to staff members;

THAT, as a result, the Indian residential schools have been obliged to incur extraordinary expenditures and consequently the Churches have appealed to the Department of Mines and Resources for a special grant in order to assist them to meet their obligations;

THAT, due to various causes, funds to an amount of \$72,000 are available in the appropriation for the current fiscal year and that this amount would be sufficient to make a payment of \$10 per pupil based on the average attendance as shown by the quarterly returns for the calendar year 1943.

The undersigned, therefore, recommends that approval be given for the expenditure of a sum not in excess of \$72,000 as a special grant at the rate of \$10 a head on the pupils at the Indian residential schools in the Dominion of Canada, same to be chargeable to Vote 164, Indian Affairs Branch, Department of Mines and Resources.

DEPUTY MINISTER

You will remember that among other representations made by the church delegation who interviewed the Minister on December 1, 1943, there was a request for payment of a special grant at the rate of \$10 per capita based on the average attendance at each of the Indian residential schools in Canada. A similar payment was made last year (see P.C. 31/2340 of March 24, 1943). In my memorandum of December 2, 1943, I recommended a similar payment for the fiscal year 1943-44.

At the present time there is an amount of approximately \$180,000 unexpended in our appropriation for per capita grants to Indian residential schools. I trust that the Minister will find it possible to approve this payment and I, therefore, attach Memorandum to Council.

Dear Doctor Dorey:

The estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1945, have been tabled in Parliament. I note that the appropriation under the heading "Grants to Residential Schools" has been increased from \$1,347,866.00, the amount voted last year, to \$1,522,774.00. This additional amount will enable us to pay our regular grants to residential schools at the rate of 100% rather than at the rate of 92.24%. It will enable us also to pay a cost-of-living bonus at the rate of \$15.00 per pupil for the calendar year 1944, based on the average attendance.

In addition to these payments, a cost-of-living bonus, amounting to \$10.00 per pupil and based on the average attendance, will be paid to residential schools for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1944.

I am naturally anxious to discuss the details of these payments and the effect they are likely to have on attendance at our residential schools, at the time of your next visit to Ottawa.

Dear Mr. Hoey: Re - Payment of Per Capita Grants

The other day when I was in Ottawa, in the course of conversation, the matter of the time of payment of per capita grants came up. Quite frankly, I do not see why the Church should finance the Schools. The United Church receives from the Department approximately \$120,000 a year - which is \$30,000 every quarter. We have to wait until the end of the quarter - and a couple of weeks beyond, before we get the payments. In the meantime, we have advanced to our Principals \$30,000, which we have had to borrow from the Bank. I think that the Department should pay us one-tenth of the per capita grants each month, making an adjustment at the end of every three months when the returns come in; or, as an alternative, pay one quarter in advance, with the understanding that there should be adjustments.

So far as we are concerned, we do not think it is fair for the Church, not only to have to provide grants in connection with some of our Schools and provide for the retirement of the Principals, including, in the case of ordained ministers, payment of \$100.00 to our Pension Fund, and at the same time to finance the Government to this extent. In view of the fact that taxation, including income tax, is collected on a pay-as-you-go basis, we expect the Department to put the Indian Schools on the same basis.

I should be very glad if you would take this matter up with the Treasury Department.

Dear Doctor Dorey:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of February 25, in which you discuss the desirability of certain adjustments in the payment of per capita grants to residential schools.

I have already discussed the subject matter of your letter with the Chief Treasury Officer and it is my intention to send forward your communication to the Director, for submission to the Minister. The present payments, I may state, are made in conformity with the provisions of an agreement entered into by the Churches responsible for the operation of our residential schools and the Government, early in the year 1911. Article 2 (Section 1) of this agreement reads:-

MDH

"To pay the management at the rate of per annum for each pupil, but the number of pupils so to be paid for shall not exceed in accordance with the restrictions hereinbefore set out; the payments shall be made quarterly and each quarterly payment shall be computed on the average attendance of each pupil; provided, however, that the said grant shall be allowed and paid during the vacation; but no payments will be made until returns have been received by the Superintendent General duly certified by the Indian Agent for that the said school has been maintained and managed according to the true intent and meaning of this contract."

It is true that this contract or agreement

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was entered into for a period of five years, but it is also true that the agreement, as such, has never been formally rescinded or abrogated by either the Government or the Churches. I am disposed to think, therefore, that the passage already quoted is looked upon by the Treasury officials and the Auditor General as their authority and direction for the quarterly per capita grant payments.

It is just possible, of course, that the time has come when the payment of these per capita grants and more particularly the method of payment should be carefully reviewed and perhaps an agreement worked out, somewhat similar to the agreement in 1911. This is a matter that might be taken up by the representatives of the Churches with the Minister, at the time of their next visit to Ottawa.

Reverend Sir:

I have your letter of the 3rd instant, with reference to adjustments of per capita grant allowances to Indian residential schools.

The statement made in paragraph No. 1 of your letter is not exactly correct. Provision is being made for paying per capita allowance for the authorized pupilage at each school, provided the quarterly returns show that this number is in attendance. As you know, for some years past we have only been allowing 92.24% of the authorized pupilage at each residential school.

The cost-of-living bonus of \$15 per pupil will be for the calendar year 1944.

The bonus of \$10 per pupil for the year 1943 has been computed and paid to your General Treasurer in Toronto for all Indian residential schools conducted under the auspices of the M.S.C.C. whose returns have reached this office. As yet we have not received the return for the Whitefish Lake Residential School for the quarter ended December 31, 1943.

However, officials here have recently considered the matter and it has been decided to pay the bonus for the March and June quarters as soon as the June quarter returns are received and the bonus for the September and December quarters as soon as the December quarter returns are received.

I presume you are aware that our estimates have not yet been approved by Parliament and only one sixth of the appropriation has been voted. This amount has already been totally expended in paying the regular per capita allowance for the March quarter.

Dear Major MacKay:

In your annual report which recently reached the Branch I note you refer to salaries at the Indian day schools in British Columbia. We are well aware that throughout the Dominion there is an upward trend in teachers' salaries in the white schools and consequently we will have to give serious consideration to increasing the salaries at Indian day schools.

It is sometimes overlooked by our teachers that we are paying 17% bonus to unmarried teachers and a flat rate of \$16.48 a month to those with dependents. On several occasions the fact has been brought to my attention that many teachers compare their basic salary with the salary paid at white schools and do not allow for the bonus just mentioned. However, I simply mention this in passing, because I feel it is a point which should be kept in mind by all of us.

I enclose a list showing the day schools in British Columbia and the amount that we have provided for salaries for the academic year 1944-45. It would be appreciated if you would review this list and suggest any changes which you think should be made in order to bring all salaries in line with your ideas. When this is received your recommendations will have very careful and sympathetic consideration. Although it may not be possible to adjust all salaries during the coming year, changes could be made at those schools where new teachers are being appointed.

On this file you will find Commissioner MacKay's letter of August 9. You will remember that we wrote to him on June 9, suggesting that he submit a revision of the salaries of the day school teachers in British Columbia.

The amount involved to cover all the increases recommended on the attached list by Commissioner MacKay is \$3,790.00 for basic salary. In addition, of course, there would be the bonus.

To handle only the increases mentioned on the two pages of Commissioner MacKay's letter would involve an amount of \$650.00.

Both amounts - \$3,790 and \$650 - are annual amounts. For the balance of the current fiscal year we would only require to spend seven tenths of these amounts, which would mean 7/10 of \$3,790 and 7/10 of \$650.

I have today reviewed our expenditures under the headings of Salaries and Bonus for the three months of April, May and June and I feel certain that the appropriation provided in the current year's estimates is sufficiently large to handle all the increases suggested by Commissioner MacKay. I have not replied to his letter as I thought it advisable to have your opinion before doing so. If you wish to let the matter stand until I return on Friday or Saturday, I will discuss it further with you.

Memorandum:

DEPUTY MINISTER.

This Branch is in receipt of a letter from Reverend George Dorey, D.D., Associate Secretary, Board of Home Missions, United Church of Canada, requesting that the per capita rate at the Alberni Residential School be increased from \$170.00 to \$180.00 per annum. I understand that Dr. Dorey also spoke to Mr. Jackson regarding this matter.

There has been no radical change in the basic per capita rate at Indian residential schools since 1931. At that time certain basic rates were established at all residential schools and the rate at the Alberni School was set at \$170.00 per capita, while the rate at the Christie School, which is also on Vancouver Island but is more inaccessible, was placed at \$180.00. Dr. Dorey has pointed out to me that while, geographically, Christie appears more inaccessible, as a matter of fact it costs the United Church practically the same rate to ship their supplies to Alberni. Taking everything into consideration, I would appreciate receiving the Minister's approval to increase the per capita rate at Alberni from \$170.00 to \$180.00 per annum, effective January 1, 1945.

At this time it might be interesting for you to have a review of the per capita structure at Indian residential schools. An Order-in-Council, passed on October 22, 1932, authorized the per capita grant method of financing what is now known as "Indian Residential Schools". At that time per capita grants

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varied from \$60.00 to \$145.00 and the average grant for the succeeding twenty years was \$84.00.

In response to a request from the Churches for larger grants for residential schools, the Department in 1911 prepared a schedule by geographic divisions and types of buildings and a formal agreement was made between the Department and the management of the residential schools. This agreement was in effect from April 1, 1911, to April 1, 1916. The average grant during that period was \$115.00.

In 1919 a bonus or flat increase of \$10.00 on the basic rate was allowed all residential schools and in 1921 an additional \$10.00, or a total bonus of \$20.00, made the average rate for all residential schools in Canada \$135.00. In 1924 this bonus was incorporated in the regular scale of grants. In January, 1926, there was another upward revision and an effort was made to deal more fairly with the small school, also the school remote from markets and the school where farming and other facilities were inadequate. This particular revision was continued for five years, and by 1931 the average per capita grant paid to Indian residential schools in Canada amounted to \$172.00. Owing to economic conditions existing following the year 1930, the per capita rate was reduced by 10%, or, in other words, the average per capita grant in Canada for 1932-33 was approximately \$155.00. A further 5% deduction was made during the years 1933-34 and 1934-35, bringing the average to \$147.00.

In 1935-36 and subsequent years the 15% deduction was restored, bringing the average per capita rate back to the same as existed in 1931-32, namely approximately \$172.00. As a result of representations made by the Churches co-operating with the Department in the operation of residential schools, a special payment of \$10.00 per capita, over and above the regular per capita rate, was made for the calendar year 1942 and a similar amount for 1943. For the year 1944 this special allowance was increased to \$15.00. ¹⁴⁴⁵



To the Rural School Secretaries:

For the coming school year there will still be a very definite shortage of teachers. If advertising in a widely circulated paper like The Globe and Mail brings no results consult your local inspector, who, if necessary, will recommend that Temporary Permits be granted to suitable persons.

School Boards would be well advised not to dispense with the services of teachers who are giving satisfactory service as they are not easily replaced. Teachers must notify boards by June 1st if they wish to terminate their services at the end of June. This also applies to boards wishing to dispense with the services of teachers. When engaging experienced teachers it is always advisable to obtain confidential statements from their former inspectors.

It might be of some assistance when considering the salary of your teacher for 1945-46 to know the present trend of salaries. Below is a list of the average salaries paid to rural teachers in this Inspectorate at the beginning of each school year since 1931.

Salaries are continuing on the up-grade. The average for the coming year will probably be \$1,300. Three School Boards have already engaged teachers for next year at \$1500. If a new teacher is required, the earlier the Board advertises the less likelihood there is of difficulty in obtaining the services of one.

A questionnaire concerning your teacher for next year is inclosed. Contract forms have been mailed to each secretary this month.

For some time I have been intending to write you concerning the salaries being paid to the teachers in the Indian schools. At the present time it is extremely difficult and often impossible to obtain the services of teachers in the white schools even when salaries of \$1500.00 and \$1800.00 are offered. I am inclosing a circular showing the average salaries paid in my rural schools during the past years. I wish to recommend that your Department seriously consider raising the stipend of the Indian school teachers in the very near future. Unless something is done shortly it will be impossible to continue staffing these schools with teachers having the necessary qualifications. It is actually a fact even now that teachers with the lowest qualifications are not being attracted to the Indian schools.


School Teachers' Salary Rates.

I would direct your attention to Treasury Board Minute P.C.1/3087 of August 30, 1946, which establishes the new consolidated salary rates to be applied to new employees and continuing employees as at September 1, 1946.

Paragraph 7 reads as follows:- "On and after September 1, 1946, an appointee assigned to a classification involving a salary rate or salary rates of less than \$1,620 per annum, shall be assigned at a rate in the range established in accordance with the terms of subparagraph (b) of Paragraph (2), regardless of his status under the definition of head of household laid down by Order in Council of August 26, 1941, P.C.6702, as amended."

I take this to mean that all new appointees come under the class to receive the percentage bonus. Continuing employees will come under the flat rate (or partial bonus) or the percentage bonus according to what they were paid previously.

The consolidated salary rates appropriate to the present basic salary rates are taken from the schedule, but converted to a monthly rate, as per attached schedule.

The per capita allowance to Residential Schools was reduced by 10% during the fiscal year 1932-33. This reduction was increased to 15% in the fiscal years 1933-34 and 1934-35.

A restoration of 10% took place in the fiscal year 1935-36 and the remaining 5% was returned in the fiscal year 1939-40.

An extra allowance of \$10.00 over and above the regular per capita grant, based on the average attendance, was paid for the calendar years 1941, 1942 and 1943 and an extra amount of \$15.00 for the calendar years 1944, 1945 and 1946.

Manual Training Instructor's Grants

Provision was made in the Main and Supplementary Estimates for the fiscal years 1945-46 and 1946-47 for the payment of allowances towards the salaries of manual training instructors whose qualifications meet the requirements of the Department. In the appropriation for the fiscal year 1947-48 provision is being made for the payment of practically the whole salaries.

In your memorandum of the 20th instant it is suggested that perhaps representations should be made to Treasury Board on behalf of teachers in Indian Day Schools to permit their being paid December salary before Christmas.

School teachers appear to be in exactly the same position as other temporary employees of the Dominion Government and there would seem to be a matter of general policy involved in that apparently pre-Christmas spending is not to be encouraged. It is realized that provincial public school teachers usually receive the December salary cheques at the completion of the term which occurs before Christmas but an early payment in their case is made to facilitate closing the books for audit prior to the end of the calendar year. In any event it would not appear that receiving the salary cheque on the 21st or 31st of December will make much difference in the actual securing of qualified teachers.

Increased per Capita Grants
for Indian Residential Schools

Further to our meeting on Monday morning, I submit herewith recommendations of this Service for increased grants to Indian Residential Schools.

Where at all possible, these have been based upon Auditors' reports. Where recent auditors' reports have not been available, we have settled the amount by placing the school in the same category as other schools in the same geographic locality. For example, in the Far North, we have recommended an increased grant of \$50.00 for Fort George C.E., Fort George R.C., Moose Fort, Aklavik C.E., Aklavik R.C., Fort Resolution and Providence Mission. This brings the total grant for these schools to \$265.00 per pupil. The only school exceeding this amount is the Carcross School in the Yukon, for which we have recommended a grant of \$315.00.

In accordance with your recommendations, we have endeavoured to keep this emergency grant to a reasonable figure. As it now stands the increased sum required in the Estimates would be \$248,350.00.

Increased per capita Costs
for Indian Residential Schools

On November 29, 1946, I received a delegation from the four denominations who are operating our Indian Residential Schools. They presented to me a long brief detailing the rising expenditures with which the managements of these schools are faced. Their operating costs are largely concerned with the purchase of food and the hiring of teachers, cooks, farming instructors and other staffs for these schools. The recent prices in food alone have resulted in much heavier expenditures at these institutions. For example, a recent Treasury Auditor's report on one of these schools reveals the following increases in food costs:

Rising labour costs have also made it very difficult for these schools to operate. This is especially the case in the payment of salaries for teachers.

particularly The picture they painted was indeed a very black one, especially in the instance of the Church of England. In spite of every effort to cut expenditures as low as possible, the Indian School Administration of this Church finds itself faced with an operating deficit of \$143,226.00 in the 1947-48 year. Our auditors' reports show that during the fiscal year ending on 31 December, 1945, this denomination lost \$73,890.81 in the operation of its Indian residential schools. This is indeed a serious situation for this Missionary Society and they are greatly worried

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as to whether or not they will have to withdraw entirely from the operation of these schools and let the Dominion Government carry on this educational duty.

The Chairman of the delegation was the Reverend Doctor George Dorey, Secretary of the Board of Home Missions of the United Church of Canada. He has recently written to the Indian Affairs Branch as follows:

"I should also like to say that we are anxious to hear from the proper authorities as to what has happened to our request for increased per capita grants. This is the time of the year when we are dealing with our church budgets; and I may say that we do not contemplate, with any sort of happy feeling, having to put in church money to do the Government's work; and further, that any request for an increased grant of church funds for the operation of Indian Schools is going to create quite a feeling in our Board that the Government is not discharging its obligation for the educational needs of the Indian people".

Other delegates represented the Roman Catholic Church and the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The information which they presented is very much the same as that of the other two denominations.

I have attached herewith for your information recommendations for increased grants to Indian residential schools. These figures have, where at all possible, been based upon our own auditors' reports. Where recent auditors' reports were not available, the amount was decided by placing the school in the same category as other schools in the same geographic locality. For example, in the Northwest Territories, we have recommended an increased grant of \$85.00 for the four schools in this area. This will bring the total grant for these schools to \$300.00 per

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pupil, an amount exceeded only by the Carcross School in the Yukon, for which a grant of \$315.00 is recommended. The reason for this large increase is partially based upon a recent ordinance of the Northwest Territories Council whereby a restriction has been placed upon the number of moose which can now be shot annually in the Territories. This will mean the importing of large quantities of meat from Alberta and a resultant sharp increase in operating expenses.

Every effort has been made to keep this emergency grant to a reasonable figure. It is felt that this need is temporary and you will note in the attached scale that it is entitled "Emergency Grant". It is hoped that this grant can be eliminated when living costs are reduced.

I would emphasize the need for immediate decision in this matter. The Churches are now preparing their annual budgets and they are frankly in a quandary as to how to plan their expenses for the coming year. It is recommended therefore that the Treasury Board approve now a sum of \$256,575.00 for inclusion in the Supplementary Estimates for this expenditure, as detailed herewith.

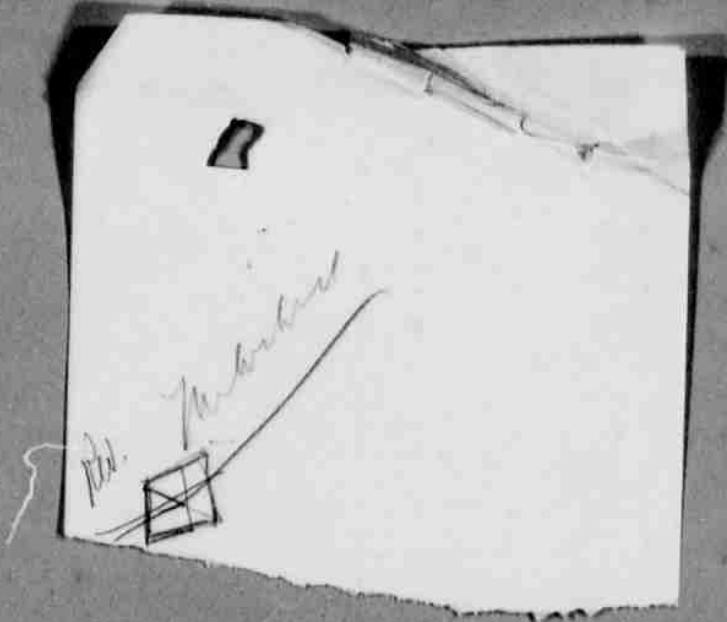



As you know, one of their strongest demands was for the provision of labour saving devices. It is my feeling that if the Minister is further approached by the denominations for additional per capita grant increases, we should consider advising him that such an increase should come in the form of a mechanical equipment grant.

If, for example, it was decided to bring the amount of the increase in per capita grants from \$256,000 to approximately \$300,000, then I would suggest that we allot a sum of \$5.00 for each student for whom a school is entitled to receive grant.

For example, Kamloops School is entitled to 300 students. Then the Reverend Father O'Grady would be entitled to request that we purchase through the Departmental Purchasing Agent mechanical devices to the extent of \$1,500. (300 x 5). These labour saving devices permitted would only be those listed by the Nutritionists of the Department of National Health and Welfare as previously submitted by this Branch to the Minister's office.

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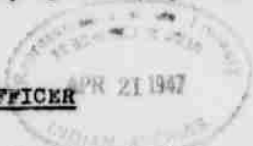

REGULATIONS

1. No teacher to be required to accept a salary on this schedule lower than that received on present schedule.
2. Change of status (marital—undergraduate to graduate) salary to be the same as it would have been had new status applied from time of appointment.
3. Probation—one year—all new teachers to receive minimum salary for their classification during this period.
4. (A) Teachers transferring from one district to another shall receive one year's credit on schedule for each two years' experience up to a limit of three years' credit on schedule. A maximum of three years' credit is to be allowed for experience of six years or more limited to classification to which teacher is being appointed.
(B) In the case of teachers who are already on the staff, credit shall be given for experience on the staff plus outside experience as outlined in the clause above.
5. All teachers must take, at least once every five years, some course of study to improve or refresh his or her academic or professional qualifications in order to advance on schedule or to maintain schedule level if on maximum.
6. In all cases, "number of rooms" means total number, both High School and Elementary.

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The General Secretary later addressed one hundred representative students at a special assembly in the Normal School which resulted in a resolution of thanks from the group and a request that the special meeting with the Executive of the M.T.S. be cancelled.

It was agreed also that the Rural Questionnaire be studied in order that additions be made to it if necessary. It is the hope of the Committee that more rural teachers will reply to these questionnaires in future thereby giving us a more adequate sampling of conditions and trends.

Pensions

The first meeting of the Pensions Committee was held on Thursday, April 17th with the following members present: Mr. H. Murphy, Chairman, Mrs. L. Houston, Misses E. Miller, E. Dewar, and Messrs. Gray, Quelch, MacKay, Sigurdson, Wallace and the General Secretary. Apologies for non-attendance were received from Mr. W. Hawn, Mr. F. D. Baragar and Miss Hilda K. Kinney.

Finance

The first meeting of the Finance Committee was held on April 28th with the following members present: Miss M. R. Conway, Chairman, Messrs. Beer, Gendron, Hall, MacDonell, Marshall and the General Secretary.

The Chairman welcomed all members, old and new, and proceeded with a resumé of the work of the Committee for the past year.

Rulings were made in connection with certain claims for expenses other than those provided by the authority of Provincial Council. In all cases, the policy laid down by Council was maintained.

A general discussion re plans for the coming year took up the major part of the two-hour meeting.

The setting-up of a new system of bookkeeping was discussed at length. The society's business has developed to such an extent that more frequent audits and a more streamlined, up-to-date method of posting seemed necessary.

Research

The first meeting of the Research Committee was held on April 12th with the following in attendance: Mr. C. S. Quelch, Chairman, Misses Hilda K. Kinney, Sybil Shack, Messrs. Laurie, McMurchy, Newfield, Shearer and the General Secretary.

A special sub-committee of Messrs. Gendron, Beer, Herron and the General Secretary was appointed to work with a firm of Chartered Accountants in order that the new system be established on a perfectly adequate and sound basis.

The Chairman outlined two immediate projects for the consideration of the Committee, viz:

A. An enquiry into teacher-shortage, initiated primarily by a sub-committee of the C.T.F.

B. An enquiry into the distribution of the new provincial grants to education, initiated by the Provincial Executive and requested by June 7th.



Further to our conversation and in reply to your letter of December 15, we have calculated an index on the basis of the breakdown of the Residential School dollar over January, 1947, and this shows a cost increase of 17 per cent.

The indexes we have used to determine this figure are quite accurate, with the exception of salaries. We were unable to obtain any information concerning teachers' salaries in 1946, and we took as the closest approximation an index of salaries paid in financial institutions. Similarly, domestic help is based on an index of salaries paid to waitresses in hotels and restaurants. The latest dollar figure obtainable for these two groups is October 1. In the case of farm labour, the figures are quite representative, and the latest available are for August 15. The resultant figure showed a salary increase of 10.9 per cent.

Increased Per Capita Grants for Residential Schools.

You will recall that it was decided to work out an overall cost increase for the various items included in the normal budget of an Indian Residential School. This was done as follows:

- (a) Working with the Auditor's reports our Treasury and Schools officials worked out the items listed as to how the Residential School dollar is spent. These figures are based on a sampling of twenty Residential Schools selected across Canada and representatives of all the various denominations.

Food	36 cents
Light, Fuel and Water	9 cents
Clothing	8 cents
Salaries	30 cents
Houses Expenses and Sundries	<u>17 cents</u>

Totals: \$1.00

- (b) I then went to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics with the above figures and requested that they calculate an index on the basis of a breakdown on the Residential School dollar. I requested them to work out this index as showing the increase in costs of the above items since January 1, 1947. Their index figure is seventeen percent. You will find attached hereunder a letter from Mr. Rowebottom, Statistician, Prices Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

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You will recall that this figure is exactly the same as that upon which we had previously based the increased grants. Therefore, the following will be required to provide such an increase in the grants to residential schools:

- (a) If the grant is to be dated from October 1, 1947 the sum of \$400,000.00 would be required.
- (b) \$70,000.00 of the above amount would be required to provide an increase from October 1 to January 1 and \$330,000.00 from January 1 onwards.

I would appreciate an indication from you as to whether I should prepare a memorandum to the Minister's office based on the above figures.

You will find attached hereunder a letter from Mr. Rowbottom, Statistician, Prices Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.



Re - Finance

I am enclosing a letter I have received from the Manager of the Bank of Montreal which carries our account. Mr. Wylie spoke to me about the increasing overdraft. He is not, of course, worried about the account, but only about the irregularity of permitting a \$7000.00 plus overdraft where the authorization is only for \$4000.00. You will remember that this matter came up before when I first took over. The prospects then, however, were that the overdraft could be reduced. This was done, down to the approximate amount of \$3000.00 at one time. The situation now has changed, however, and I see no prospect of anything but ever increasing expenditure if the present price and wage trend continues.

The overdraft for January is \$6221.00, with a total adverse Cash Book balance of \$7425.00. January accounts and salaries are still to be paid (on February 15th, when the remittance advance of \$4000.00 is received). This will approximate \$6000.00. The arrears of revenue due to the school amount to \$1500.00, leaving an overall deficit of some \$11,000.00, bringing us back to where we were three and one-half years ago.

First, there is the absolute necessity of increased Government revenue. Procrastination should no longer be tolerated. Also, the Government should either assume definite responsibility for the deficit to date, either by payment of the deficit or satisfying the carrying banks that it is a Government responsibility. In the meantime it is necessary that the Principal should have authorization to incur an overdraft to the amount of his expenditure under the present and prospective operating cost..... to what amount I cannot estimate, but I would say the authorization should be for \$10,000.00. I still suggest that the expenditure over revenue should be carried as a deficit and Bank overdraft. Subsidisation by the Church in the reduction of deficit or the augmentation of current revenue would simply encourage the Government to continue its policy of evading its Indian education responsibilities.

Further, may I suggest that the deferring of proper action on the part of the Government and the Church in dealing promptly and decisively with the matter of school finance tends to debase the functional value of the school

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personnel. I have already lost one of the best Boys' Supervisors in the educational system, a man who has made this work a vocation, because of lack of opportunity and security afforded in employment by the school. There is no inducement given to the teachers to continue employment in a residential school. They are sacrificing salary, experience scale increases and super-annuation by teaching in a residential school. It might be noted here that teachers in all the Alberni Public Schools have this week been awarded an "across the board" increase of \$200.00 (retroactive) by an Arbitration Board. I have been fortunate in obtaining a very good slate of teachers this term, but I cannot hope to engage them for another year. We must be able to offer teachers inducements at least the equal of the Public Schools, otherwise we must put up with the left-overs (if there are any) to the detriment of our standard of teaching.

Also there is the functional value of the Principal to consider. No Principal could be expected to continue to give efficient attention to all the many duties that make for the efficient operation of an institution such as Alberni School, and carry, at the same time, the constant burden of ever increasing debt, about which one can do nothing and of which there is no end in sight.

Surely the Churches ought to be able to impress the urgency of the emergency on the Government, so that immediate action can be taken. It is absolutely useless for the Government or the Church to counsel retrenchment or economy. This has been practiced to the limit beyond which we cannot go. It is false economy, and functional suicide, to attempt further economy in food. The late Principal of the Alert Bay School foolishly tried this experiment at the beginning of this term, resulting in his resignation, and a loss in prestige of that school with the Indian people from which it will take them a long time to recover. Salaries must be held down, at the cost of operating with a mediocre staff. The present supply situation in clothing, boots and shoes, soaps, and in practically every necessary line, is such that we cannot bargain or question either price or quality.

I will note some comparative costs as of January 1947 and January 1948:-

Dry Goods cannot be compared, as we are now replenishing supplies not obtainable a year ago. However, the Dry Goods account for January of this year is \$1106.56, and the Boots and Shoes account \$575.16. It can also be noted that stoker coal, which cost us \$12.20 per ton a year ago (\$9.45 per ton two years ago) is now \$19.50 per ton. May I say also that in the matter of food and fuel our consumption quantity has not been increased.

Overdrafts in the school account have been gradually increasing and the high point in December was \$5721, in January \$6221, and at present time \$7,181 with approximately ten days before you receive your next cheque. It is therefore reasonable to expect that this total will be in somewhat larger figures before this cheque arrives. The Executive meeting of Board of Home Missions of United Church of Canada, on 8th of June 1944, authorized you to borrow by way of overdraft up to but not exceeding four thousand dollars. Owing to increased cost of operation it is now apparently impossible for you to finance within this amount and in order to put the account on a proper basis we should now be furnished with a new authority authorizing the operation of the account within an amount which you consider will enable you to finance.

Re - Finance

I am enclosing a letter I have received from the Manager of the Bank of Montreal which carries our account. Mr. Wylie spoke to me about the increasing overdraft. He is not, of course, worried about the account, but only about the irregularity of permitting a \$7000.00 plus overdraft where the authorization is only for \$4000.00. You will remember that this matter came up before when I first took over. The prospects then, however, were that the overdraft could be reduced. This was done, down to the approximate amount of \$3000.00 at one time. The situation now has changed, however, and I see no prospect of anything but ever increasing expenditure if the present price and wage trend continues.

The overdraft for January is \$6221.00, with a total adverse Cash Book balance of \$7425.00. January accounts and salaries are still to be paid (on February 15th, when the remittance advance of \$4000.00 is received). This will approximate \$6000.00. The arrears of revenue due to the school amount to \$1500.00, leaving an overall deficit of some \$11,000.00, bringing us back to where we were three and one-half years ago.

First, there is the absolute necessity of increased Government revenue. Procrastination should no longer be tolerated. Also, the Government should either assume definite responsibility for the deficit to date, either by payment of the deficit or satisfying the carrying banks that it is a Government responsibility. In the meantime it is necessary that the Principal should have authorization to incur an overdraft to the amount of his expenditure under the present and prospective operating cost..... to what amount I cannot estimate, but I would say the authorization should be for \$10,000.00. I still suggest that the expenditure over revenue should be carried as a deficit and Bank overdraft. Subsidization by the Church in the reduction of deficit or the augmentation of current revenue would simply encourage the Government to continue its policy of evading its Indian education responsibilities.

Further, may I suggest that the deferring of proper action on the part of the Government and the Church in dealing promptly and decisively with the matter of school finance tends to debase the functional value of the school

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personnel. I have already lost one of the best Boys' Supervisors in the educational system, a man who has made this work a vocation, because of lack of opportunity and security afforded in employment by the school. There is no inducement given to the teachers to continue employment in a residential school. They are sacrificing salary, experience scale increases and superannuation by teaching in a residential school. It might be noted here that teachers in all the Alberni Public Schools have this week been awarded an "across the board" increase of \$200.00 (retroactive) by an Arbitration Board. I have been fortunate in obtaining a very good slate of teachers this term, but I cannot hope to engage them for another year. We must be able to offer teachers inducements at least the equal of the Public Schools, otherwise we must put up with the left-overs (if there are any) to the detriment of our standard of teaching.

Also there is the functional value of the Principal to consider. No Principal could be expected to continue to give efficient attention to all the many duties that make for the efficient operation of an institution such as Alberni School, and carry, at the same time, the constant burden of ever increasing debt, about which one can do nothing and of which there is no end in sight.

Surely the Churches ought to be able to impress the urgency of the emergency on the Government, so that immediate action can be taken. It is absolutely useless for the Government or the Church to counsel retrenchment or economy. This has been practiced to the limit beyond which we cannot go. It is false economy, and functional suicide, to attempt further economy in food. The late Principal of the Alert Bay School foolishly tried this experiment at the beginning of this term, resulting in his resignation, and a loss in prestige of that school with the Indian people from which it will take them a long time to recover. Salaries must be held down, at the cost of operating with a mediocre staff. The present supply situation in clothing, boots and shoes, soaps, and in practically every necessary line, is such that we cannot bargain or question either price or quality.

I will note some comparative costs as of January 1947 and January 1948:-

Dry Goods cannot be compared, as we are now replenishing supplies not obtainable a year ago. However, the Dry Goods account for January of this year is \$1106.56, and the Boots and Shoes account \$575.16. It can also be noted that stoker coal, which cost us \$12.20 per ton a year ago (\$9.45 per ton two years ago) is now \$19.50 per ton. May I say also that in the matter of food and fuel our consumption quantity has not been increased.

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Will you please attend to the matter of the Bank letter as soon as possible? Further than that, I would at least like to be assured that the condition of the finances of this school, and the deficit, is approved by the United Church as far as the efforts of the Principal is concerned.... or, of course, should a contrary viewpoint be taken, I would like to be advised.

I enclose Financial Statements for the Dec. quarter and the month of January. All accounts are paid with the exception of Fuel and Clothing. I am holding a carry-over in the fuel account of \$1092.30 as at the end of January, and in the Drygoods account \$982.36. These accounts continue in good standing.

Dear Mr. Caldwell:

Overdrafts in the school account have been gradually increasing and the high point in December was \$5721, in January \$6221, and at present time \$7,181 with approximately ten days before you receive your next cheque. It is therefore reasonable to expect that this total will be in somewhat larger figures before this cheque arrives. The Executive meeting of Board of Home Missions of United Church of Canada, on 8th of June 1944, authorized you to borrow by way of overdraft up to but not exceeding four thousand dollars. Owing to increased cost of operation it is now apparently impossible for you to finance within this amount and in order to put the account on a proper basis we should now be furnished with a new authority authorizing the operation of the account within an amount which you consider will enable you to finance.

We should be glad if this matter could be attended to without delay and a new authority in increased amount furnished under seal from the Board of Home Missions of the United Church of Canada.

Dear Doctor Dorey:

I have for acknowledgment your letter of February 11th and also copy of a letter received by you from the Principal of the Alberni Residential School sent forward therewith.

I have hesitated to reply to this communication until now in the hope that I would be in a position to state definitely the amount of additional assistance to residential schools authorized by the Government.

I am glad to be able to state that an increase in the present per capita grant to residential schools amounting to seventeen per cent was authorized by Order-in-Council, dated February 20, 1948, this addition to be retroactive to October 1, 1947. I am sure it will be gratifying to you to know that the additional financial assistance granted to the Churches this year is in conformity with the request made by the delegation which interviewed me on November 28th. It is the opinion of the officials of the Indian Affairs Branch that the grants now authorized should enable the Principals of residential schools to escape financial embarrassment at any time during the present fiscal year.

Honourable Sir:

At the recent meeting of our Executive Committee a report was made of our deputation to you on the 7th November, and of the letter to you from Canon Alderwood of the 8th November confirming the requests which the deputation had made.

The Executive was very appreciative of the sympathetic hearing which had been given to the deputation and of the acknowledgment of Canon Alderwood's letter received from the Acting Minister under date of 17th November addressed to General Turner.

As the financial situation which had alarmed our Board of Management in September has continued to get steadily worse, due to the continuing rise in the cost of maintaining the schools, and as it becomes increasingly evident that our Church cannot continue the present partnership with the Government without some additional relief, I was directed to write to you and point out again how necessary are the two requests which the deputation laid before you. They are:

1. That to meet the alarming deficit for 1947 which is impending, the emergency grant now being provided for 1947 be increased in accordance with the advance in the cost of living revealed in official statistics.
And
2. That for 1948 the per capita grants be paid in accordance with the actual cost of living so that we may be able

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to continue our administration of the schools with the assurance that it will not be necessary to place further burdens upon the missionary funds of our Church.

On behalf of our Society I would express the hope that Government may see fit to grant these requests and that it may thus be made possible for us to continue our partnership with Government in the service of the Indian children,

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MEMORANDUM of a PRESENTATION regarding the need for increased Grants to Indian Residential Schools, made by the Representatives of the Churches co-operating with the Government, to the Minister, the Honourable James A. Glen, Friday, November 28th, 1947.

The Committee representing the Churches which co-operate with the Government desires, first of all, to express thanks for the increase made during the year by the Department in the per capita grant. We trust that we shall not be misunderstood if we describe this increase as in the nature of 'small mercies' for which we should be thankful. To-day, however, we desire to put before you certain facts which make it necessary for us to ask for further increases in the per capita grant. The reason for the request for these increases is based on the following:-

I. SALARIES

The Schools have been paying a very low salary to the teachers and other personnel employed. As an example, The Church of England in Canada pays an average of \$600.00 in cash to its teachers. In addition, they receive board, etc., which is conservatively estimated to cost another \$400.00 a year, making a total salary for the teacher of \$1,000 as an average.

May we point out that we cannot expect to continue to engage teachers that are even modestly qualified unless salaries are raised very considerably, and we should point out to you that one reason why we cannot do this is because we have such competition from another section of the Department, namely, the Training Division, which employs day school teachers, and according to whose schedule a second-class teacher, with two years' experience -- which, after all, is just a modest professional qualification -- is to be paid \$1260 a year. If you deduct \$400 for board, that would mean that the Department is paying \$860 to a teacher as against the average of \$600 which is being paid currently by The Church of England.

The Department is continually pressing -- and we think rightly so -- for teachers with better professional qualifications; for more supervision; for more specialized activities; and this will add to the salary budget.

The Schools are also faced with the fact that they are paying salaries to other personnel, such as cooks, engineers and supervisors, etc., which are ridiculously low. Here, again, they come into competition with the Department of National Health in some cases. There has been brought to our notice an instance where the Church was paying a cook \$60.00 a month and she was offered and accepted a salary of \$125.00, which was paid by the Department of National Health.

May we point out with all due respect that if the Government of Canada can find money in the Estimates to pay teachers \$1260, and cooks

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at the rate at which they are being paid by the Department of National Health, there would seem to be, on the face of it, no reason why it could not find money to enable the Church to pay at least the same salaries to the same quality of personnel.

The Churches are also faced with the fact that in certain of the Provinces, Labour Relations Boards are insisting on minimum wages, beyond those which we are paying, and on hours of work which are very considerably less than our staffs are giving, and also on such general conditions as will make it necessary, not only to pay higher salaries, but to increase the personnel very greatly.

II. OTHER ITEMS OF EXPENDITURE: Food - Fuel - Clothing and Home Furnishings:

We are setting before you a Schedule extracted from a Dominion Bureau of Statistics Bulletin, which shows the increase in the cost of various items: first, in relation to 1939, and, secondly, the increase in the calendar year 1947.

From this table it will be seen that food costs have increased 71 per cent. over 1939, and also that there has been a further increase of 21.3 per cent. in this calendar year.

The figures for fuel, clothing and house furnishings show a similar sharp increase in 1947.

Special emphasis is now being placed on better diet in the schools, and the rations which are furnished by the schools have been examined by the Department of National Health and recommendations made that the ration of fish and meat should be increased by 25 per cent.; fats, by 40 per cent.; and that the consumption of milk should also be increased. This would, of course, mean a reduction in the amount of bread and certain other items, such as potatoes, which would be consumed.

Nevertheless, the Principal of a Residential School, with an enrolment of one hundred, operated by one of the Churches, has calculated that the change in the diet for his School would cost \$3,200 a year.

The Churches are honestly trying to raise the standard of operation of the schools, but up to the present the increase in the per capita grant has hardly met the increase in the cost of living, and has not made possible the higher standard of maintenance which is desired by everybody.

Clothing is an item which should be improved. The Principal of a School operated by one of the Churches estimates that it would cost, on the basis of the prices in a mail order catalogue, an average of \$55 to clothe a girl for a year, and \$70 to clothe a boy. This would mean that in a school of 125 pupils, the clothing budget would be \$7,868.00.

The Indians themselves are demanding that the children be sent from the School to their homes, at holiday time, with a complete new outfit, but they send them back after the holidays with very little clothing,

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and the School has to start all over again with a clothing issue.

The members of the deputation are quite well aware that the standard of clothing in the schools is not that mentioned above, nor can it be, because the policy of keeping per capita grants down to the minimum has simply meant that, in order to make ends meet, the Churches have had to find large sums of money from their missionary budgets and at the same time to keep the maintenance of the schools at a lower standard than is desired.

With regard to the estimated cost of higher standards, - we beg to place before you the estimates prepared for the Committee by the officials of the Indian School Administration of the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, which show that if salaries of teachers were to be raised \$200.00; if an average increase of \$10.00 were to be given to engineers, cooks, etc.; if 10 cents per day were to be added to the cost of diet; and if an increased staff of twelve were added to the whole of the Schools operated by that Church -- it would mean a total of \$93,000, which is 27 per cent. on the present per capita grant.

The figures submitted by the representatives of The Woman's Missionary Society of The Presbyterian Church in Canada show that, for the period January 1st, 1946, to November 30th, 1947, for the maintenance of the work at two residential schools and at the Mistawasis day school, the Society has contributed \$36,500.

The Church of England in Canada has already submitted to the Department figures showing how much it has contributed, in addition to the per capita grants, for the maintenance of its Indian Residential Schools.

The United Church of Canada in 1946 and 1947 spent, in addition to the per capita grants, an amount of \$32,000 from its Missionary Funds. The figure is considerably lower than it normally would be because the Norway House Residential School was destroyed by fire in the middle of 1946 and has not yet been rebuilt.

We therefore request the Minister to consider some way of tying up grants which are being paid for the maintenance of these Schools to the increased cost of living, and that these grants be adjusted half-yearly. Specifically, we request that there be a special grant for 1947 so that the actual costs of operating the Schools may be met.

From the figures which we have submitted, there is no question that the increase in the cost of operation is far more than was estimated when the figures were being prepared for submission to Parliament. With a jump of 21.3 per cent. in the cost of food in the period - January 1st, 1947, to October 1st, and in the prices of other commodities accordingly, it is quite obvious that, if the Government does not come to the help of the Schools by making grants to cover this increased cost, it will have to be met out of the Missionary funds of the Churches, or else by making

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further drastic cuts in the operation of the Schools, which simply cannot be faced.

The Committee further requests that, as a general policy, consideration be given to adjusting the per capita grant every half year so as to meet any increase in the cost of living. This might be done by making an examination of the expenditures of the Schools at the end of the first six months' period and a supplementary grant being paid, and the same thing being done at the end of the next six months. We feel that in a day of rapidly increasing cost of living, it is impossible for the Churches to bear the burden.

III. There are certain other matters which may be minor but which affect our operation of Schools, which we present for the attention of the Minister:

(a) Transportation of Pupils: The Act says that the Department "may" pay the cost of transportation of pupils to and from their homes, but we find that it is very difficult to get this item met. It is really thought that the Indians themselves should pay the amount necessary for the transportation of their children to their homes and back again to school -- and many of them are able to meet this, -- but, unfortunately, it is left to the Principal to collect this money and he has very little success. We think that this ought to be the responsibility of the Agent.

(b) Recruiting: We also believe that the onus for recruiting should be on the Agent and not on the Churches. We are quite prepared to co-operate to the fullest possible extent with the Department; but the law says that the children must go to school; it also lays on the Government, through the Indian Agent, the responsibility for enforcing attendance.

(c) Enforced Closing of Schools: There are cases in which Schools are closed, or attendance is seriously depleted, because of epidemics. The children are kept at home and not allowed to go to school, but the expenses of the school, apart from the actual expenditure on food, have to go on.

The same thing is true when a school is closed for a considerable time because of the need for major repairs, in which case the Church again has to bear the full brunt of the cost.

We would point out that, whilst it is an excellent principle that the Department should not be asked to pay for the education of children that are not actually in school, yet there are cases where the Churches have to keep the schools open even though the children may not be in attendance, and that works a hardship on the Church.

We believe that the Minister should have a wider latitude of authority so that he could authorize the payment of the grant where it is clearly proven that the lack of attendance is due to circumstances that are beyond the control of the Churches.

The representatives of the Churches would like again to thank the Minister, and everybody concerned, for the opportunity of presenting their case.

Further to our conversation and in reply to your letter of December 15, we have calculated an index on the basis of the breakdown of the Residential School dollar over January, 1947, and this shows a cost increase of 17 per cent.

The indexes we have used to determine this figure are quite accurate, with the exception of salaries. We were unable to obtain any information concerning teachers' salaries in 1946, and we took as the closest approximation an index of salaries paid in financial institutions. Similarly, domestic help is based on an index of salaries paid to waitresses in hotels and restaurants. The latest dollar figure obtainable for these two groups is October 1. In the case of farm labour, the figures are quite representative, and the latest available are for August 15. The resultant figure showed a salary increase of 10.9 per cent.

The Board had under consideration a memorandum from the Honourable the Minister of Mines and Resources reporting:

"That there have been requests and delegations to me from the various denominations operating Indian Residential Schools that an increase be made in the per capita grants made to them for the conduct of such schools;

That their requests were that this increase should be based upon the increased costs of operating such schools in view of the rise in prices;

That Treasury and Education officials of the Indian Affairs Branch considered a sampling of the auditors' report upon these residential schools in order to derive the various items upon which the average residential school dollar is spent;

That the figures below are based on a sampling of twenty (20) residential schools across Canada and representing all four denominations:

Food.....	36 cents
Light, Fuel and Water.....	9 cents
Clothing.....	8 cents
Salaries.....	30 cents
House Expenses and Sundries...	17 cents

That the Dominion Bureau of Statistics was then requested to calculate the cost increase index since January 1, 1947; based on the above breakdown of the residential school dollar;

That the Prices Branch, Dominion Bureau of Statistics, reported as follows:

"Further to our conversation and in reply to letter of December 15, we have calculated an index on the basis of the breakdown of the Residential School dollar over January, 1947, and this shows a cost increase of 17 per cent."

That the total sum included in our Main and Supplementary Estimates for 1947-48 for the payment of per capita grants to Residential Schools was \$1,933,220.00;

That a 17% increase in these per capita grants would require an additional sum per fiscal year of \$330,000.00.

It is, therefore, recommended that approval be given for the inclusion in the 1948-49 Supplementary Estimates of \$330,000.00 for an increase in per capita grants to Indian Residential Schools.

- (b) As payments to Residential Schools are made at the end of each quarter, based on quarterly returns, payments can be made for the March 1948 quarter out of funds still available for 1947-48 and the balance from funds provided in the Main 1948-49 Estimates."

The Board concur in the above report and recommendation, and, submit the same for favourable consideration.

It is understood that Major Stevens of the Royal Canadian Engineers discussed at some length with Mr. R.A. Gibson, Director of our Lands and Development Services Branch, and other officials, the feasibility of having our 1948-49 school building program in the North carried out under supervision of your department.

Although our 1948-49 estimates have not as yet been finalized, we have included therein amounts for the construction of the following two-room schools and attached teachers' residences in the Mackenzie District of the Northwest Territories. These are listed in order of priority:

1. Fort Norman
2. Rocher River
3. Fort Franklin
4. Fort Good Hope
5. Arctic Red River

We have included an amount of \$40,000 for each of these buildings, which will be of standard type construction.

We are also contemplating the construction of a similar school at Coppermine, Northwest Territories, but it is not likely that much progress can be made with this particular project this year.

Under separate cover, I have already requested the supervision of army engineers for the construction of the Indian Residential School at Teslin, Y.T. What I would like to know is whether your department could assume responsibility for the construction of these schools provided we

Accountable Advances.

The Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, Section 32 (2), directs that accountable advances (such being standing advances and those issued for a specific purpose) outstanding at the end of the fiscal year shall be either repaid or accounted for within fifteen days thereafter.

The fiscal year 1947-48 ends on March 31st, and consideration should now be given by you to accounting for all advances whether made from Trust Fund or Vote.

Credit vouchers covering expenditures already made, and remittances covering the unexpended balance, should be forwarded to Ottawa as soon as possible, but in no case later than indicated in paragraph 1 above.

From this date forward, all vouchers representing payments made from standing advances will be applied to the advance upon arrival at Headquarters. To facilitate this work it is requested that you mark such vouchers as "Credit Voucher", the usual term used when reimbursement is not indicated.

Your prompt attention and co-operation will be appreciated.

We have now received from our Auditor the attached report with regard to the operating expenses of the schools conducted by the Indian School Administration of the M.S.C.C. The following table will illustrate the difference between the per capita grants paid and the operating expenses at the residential schools particularly mentioned by M.S.C.C. officials.

An audit of the books and records of the above-
noted organization for the fiscal (calendar) year ended
December 31, 1947 reveals the following information:

- (1) The Anglican Indian School Administration, 102 Bank St., Ottawa handles the accounting and administration of the following Anglican Indian Residential Schools: Carcross, Alert Bay, Aklavik, Whitefish Lake, Wabasca, Old Sun, Blood, St. Cyprian, Prince Albert, Elkhorn, Sioux Lookout, Shingwauk, Chapleau, Moose Factory, Fort George, Lac La Ronge and Gordon's. The Administration also handles the affairs of three Anglican Hospitals and two Missions.
- (2) The firm of Welch, Anderson & Co., Chartered Accountants of Toronto have been employed as auditors. Audits were conducted regularly (quarterly) and one was made at the end of the fiscal (calendar) year. Annual financial statements were prepared by the audit firm and will be presented to the Administration in the near future.
- (3) In the year ended December 31, 1947 the total expenditures for the 17 Indian Residential Schools and Head Office amounted to \$440,133.00 (1). The per capita grant earnings for the same period was \$337,344.63. The net difference (deficit) was \$102,788.37 (1).

....

- (1) The Administration also handles the accounts and administration of 3 Hospitals and 2 Missions. The total Head Office expense of \$20,297.00 is included in the amount \$440,133.00.

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- (4) The Residential school at Lac La Ronge was burned in February, 1947. Gordon's Residential School has been temporarily closed (July 1947) so that major repairs to the plumbing and heating equipment could be made.
 - (5) Statements prepared are as follows:
 - (a) Statement #1 - An analysis of per capita grant earnings and relative expenditures for the year ended December 31, 1947.
 - (b) Statement #2 - A comparative analysis of the Dollar cost per pupil and related information for the year ended December 31/47.
 - (c) Statement #3 - A budget picture of per capita grant earnings and relative expenditures for the year 1948.
 - (6) The cost analysis is concerned only with the per capita grant earnings and the relative expenditures. The Branch provided other assistance such as manual training grants, night watchman salaries, preventorium allowances, repairs etc. The cost of maintaining an Indian pupil would be influenced accordingly.
 - (7) In paragraph (3) a footnote qualifies the total expenditures in so far as it pertains to Head Office expense. There appears to be no satisfactory method to allocate the \$20,297.00 expense. It is felt that the part of this expense relative to the Hospitals and Missions was negligible.
 - (8) The W.A. Dorcas Society provided clothing, bales, bedding etc. to the various Residential schools which was valued at \$9,243.00. Information in this respect is shown in statements #1 and #2. The information is supplementary and not a part of the cost analysis.
 - (9) Freight rates in 1947 to some of the distant schools are shown below:

- (13) While the examination of the books and records was confined to a test-audit, it was sufficiently extensive to indicate the accounts were properly and accurately kept.
- (14) The staff and General Turner afforded every assistance during the course of the audit.

Re: Per Capita Allowances.

The increased per capita allowances from October 1st, 1947, were based on information obtained from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and in setting the new rates effective from the date mentioned, per capita grant at each residential school was increased by 17%. For instance, in the case of the Chapleau Residential School, per capita allowance paid to this school as of October 1st, 1947 was \$205.00. Owing to the 17% increase, the per capita rate at this school from October 1st, 1947 has been paid at the rate of \$239.85.

In a letter dated May 5th, 1948 from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics it is stated that there has been an additional increase of 7% since October 1st, 1947. If the schools were allowed this rate it would mean 24% increase over the amount allowed them previous to October 1st, 1947. In the case of the Chapleau School this would mean they they would be paid at the rate of \$254.20 (24% additional to the rate of \$205.00 which they were receiving previous to October 1st, 1947).

The provision of the 17% increase involved an additional expenditure of approximately \$330,000.00 which will be included in the supplementary estimates for 1948-49 as authorized by P.C. 86/666 dated February 20th, 1948. To allow all residential schools 24% effective from April 1st, 1948 would involve an additional expenditure of \$127,737.00.

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In a telephone conversation on Friday, May 7th, Mr. Jackson mentioned the Church of England Schools and I prepared a statement showing what amount they would draw if they kept the enrolment at each school up to the authorized amount.

The expenditure for the calendar year 1947 as shown on the attached statement, was prepared from the reports of our own auditors.

In reply to your letter of May 4th, we have calculated a cost index for maintaining residential schools as between October 1947 and April 1948. This index shows an increase of 7%.

The increase was calculated on the basis of the following changes:

As mentioned in my letter of December 18th our information on salaries is not very satisfactory for this purpose. For teacher's salaries we have used as most closely comparable those paid in financial institutions. For cooks we have used salaries and wages paid in hotels and restaurants. The wages paid in agriculture are only available for August 15, 1947 and January 15, 1948. They show the usual seasonal decline between these two periods.

Re: Per Capita Allowances.

The increased per capita allowances from October 1st, 1947, were based on information obtained from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and in setting the new rates effective from the date mentioned, per capita grant at each residential school was increased by 17%. For instance, in the case of the Chapleau Residential School, per capita allowance paid to this school as of October 1st, 1947 was \$205.00. Owing to the 17% increase, the per capita rate at this school from October 1st, 1947 has been paid at the rate of \$239.85.

In a letter dated May 5th, 1948 from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics it is stated that there has been an additional increase of 7% since October 1st, 1947. If the schools were allowed this rate it would mean 24% increase over the amount allowed them previous to October 1st, 1947. In the case of the Chapleau School this would mean they would be paid at the rate of \$254.20 (24% additional to the rate of \$205.00 which they were receiving previous to October 1st, 1947).

The provision of the 17% increase involved an additional expenditure of approximately \$330,000.00 which will be included in the supplementary estimates for 1948-49 as authorized by P.C. 86/666 dated February 20th, 1948. To allow all residential schools 24% effective from April 1st, 1948 would involve an additional expenditure of \$127,737.00.

We have now received a reply from the Statistician of the Prices Branch at the Dominion Bureau of Statistics indicating the increase in operating expenditures of seven percent between October 1, 1947 and April 1, 1948. In reply to your letter of May 4th, I have calculated a cost index for maintaining residential schools as between October 1947 and April 1948. This index shows an increase of 7%.

The increase was calculated on the basis of the following changes:

As mentioned in my letter of December 18th our information on salaries is not very satisfactory for this purpose. For teacher's salaries we have used as most closely comparable those paid in financial institutions. For cooks we have used salaries and wages paid in hotels and restaurants. The wages paid in agriculture are only available for August 15, 1947 and January 15, 1948. They show the usual seasonal decline between these two periods.

Attached is detailed information regarding each residential school. This was obtained from the Auditors' reports on the schools that are regularly visited by the auditors.

In conversation with Father Plourde he advised me that the Oblate schools under his jurisdiction have expended an amount of approximately \$40,000.00 in purchasing shoes, clothing, etc., from War Assets Corporation. Father Plourde states that if the same amount of goods had been purchased in the ordinary way, the expenditure would have been approximately \$200,000.00.

From the attached statement you will note that many of the schools have been financially assisted by the church under whose auspices they are operating, either by means of grants or loans. If this assistance had not been received, the deficits would have been much greater.

Please find attached a list showing the proposed per capita grants which have been recommended by the Department to the Treasury Board for approval. We hope to be able to advise you further concerning these grants in the near future.

You will note that considerable increases have been recommended for several of the schools and that the northern schools in particular have been selected for large adjustments.

Based on fourteen schools (excluding Chapleau, Lac la Ronge and Garden's) our Auditor's statements indicate that your total 1947 expenditure amounted to \$389,627.00. We have omitted Lac la Ronge and Garden's from these figures because they were closed during the 1947 calendar year. Under the new rate you should have an income from these fourteen schools (at authorized enrolment) of \$407,702.90. Last year (1947 calendar) the per capita grants paid the M.N.C.C. for these fourteen schools totalled \$302,404.00.

It is realized that one of your problems is the operation of schools with enrolled pupilages less than those authorized. It is our intention to send a circular letter to all our field officials, impressing upon them the importance of assisting actively in the recruiting for residential schools. It is felt that this matter is one for the utmost co-operation between the Departmental and Church Officials. We will again remind our field officials of this fact.

You will note that no reference has been made to the Chapleau Residential School in the above calculations. It is our feeling that this school should be closed at the end of June. We understand that the dollar cost per pupil at this school

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during the 1947 year amounted to \$339.35. This was based on an average attendance of 80, which is 20 under the authorized paylage. These children who cannot be looked after in day schools, can be accommodated at the Mohawk Institute, Brantford, Ontario, and at the Moose Fort Residential School.

ACTING DEPUTY MINISTER

Increased Per Capita Grants.

On May 25, 1948, I sent to Dr. Keenleyside a submission to Treasury Board requesting \$128,000.00 in additional funds for the increase of residential school per capita grants. This submission was approved and this sum was included in our Supplementary Estimates for 1948-49.

You will recall that this amount of \$128,000 was arrived at by making adjustments in individual school grants. These adjustments were recommended by the officials of the Education Division and were based on

- (a) latest auditors' reports,
- (b) location of school and anticipated effect of increased freight rates,
- (c) availability of farming land at school site,
- (d) personal knowledge of local conditions at various schools.

Please find attached a statement (Appendix A) on these schools showing the rate of operation as revealed by the latest auditor's reports. You will recall that when we discussed this matter you felt that efforts should be made to get auditor's reports for every school. At that time 16 schools, due to their isolation, had not had auditor's reports.

Since then our Chief Treasury Officer reports that arrangements have been made to carry out audits in future in the

School Files

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Roman Catholic Indian Residential Schools in the Lesser Slave and Fort Vermilion Agencies. As soon as Reverend Father Flourde, O.M.I. returns to town, a meeting will be held with him to determine the best way of including the eleven other schools (all of which are R.C.) in future audits.

In the meantime it would be appreciated if we could have your direction as to whether the Minister would consider advising the denominations concerned as to the increases in per capita grants for which funds are now available. You will find attached as Appendix B a statement showing the new per capita grants recommended for each school.

MEMORANDUM TO MR. HOEY:

Referring to our telephone conversation of this afternoon, I am returning the statement marked Appendix "A" showing the operation of the Residential Schools as revealed by the latest auditors' reports. Also a statement marked Appendix "B" setting out the proposed new per capita grants recommended for each school.

You will recall that when this matter was last discussed by Colonel Neary and yourself with the Deputy Minister it was agreed that this additional grant was provided for the purpose of assisting only those schools which needed higher grants to cover the cost of operation. It should not be given to schools which were able to meet their expenses from the present grants.

Encl.

The proposed new grants as set out in Appendix "B" would seem to include a number of schools where there is no evidence to indicate that such additional assistance is needed.

PRICE MOVEMENTS, NOVEMBER, 1948 (PRELIMINARY)

COST OF LIVING: The Dominion Bureau of Statistics cost-of-living index remained unchanged between October 1 and November 1, 1948 at 159.6. This interruption came after a series of 21 consecutive increases dating from January, 1947. The food index fell from 205.4 on October 1 to 204.7 on November 1 as declines in meats and vegetables overbalanced further increases in egg prices; other food groups showed no appreciable changes. The decline in foods exactly balanced small advances in four other budget groups. Homefurnishings and services moved up from 165.1 to 166.0, clothing from 181.0 to 181.5, fuel and light from 128.8 to 129.0, and miscellaneous items from 124.4 to 124.6. The rent series is computed at approximately quarterly intervals and the next reckoning of the rent index will be for December 1; the latest figure is 121.0.

From August, 1939 to November 1, 1948, the increase in the cost-of-living index was 58.3 per cent.

WHOLESALE PRICES (WEEKLY): The index of Industrial Material Prices advanced from 161.6 (1926=100) for the week ending October 29 to 162.0 for the week ending November 26. Price movements were mixed, with cats, rosin, steel sheets, raw cotton and lead showing increases, while steers, hogs, raw rubber and linseed oil declined. The index for Canadian Farm Products fell from 143.2 to 142.6 in the same period. Tobacco, wool, hides and skins moved up, but lower quotations ruled for potatoes, onions, hay, livestock and eggs. Comparable indexes for the third week of August, 1939 were 64.0 and 58.2 respectively.

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SECURITIES: The October rally in common stock prices continued into the first week of November but thereafter prices generally registered a declining tendency. The Investors' index for 100 common stocks, which rose from 117.5 for the week of October 28 to 120.5 for the week of November 4, receded to 116.2 for the week of November 25. Weakness was evident in both industrials and utilities, an index for the former series declining 1.5 points to 111.5 and for the latter 2.1 points to 120.5. Bank shares, on the other hand, were slightly firmer during November, an index for this group registering an increase of 2.6 points to 132.0 between the weeks of October 28 and November 25. Mining stock price movements paralleled industrials and utilities and the composite index for 30 issues, after touching 86.7 in the first week of November, dropped back to 80.7 by the 25th for a net loss of 2.3 points. The gold shares index weakened 3.7 points to 58.2, while the base metals index stiffened 0.8 points to 126.5.

You will recall that instructions were given that at the end of October we were to approach the Bureau of Statistics with regard to the increased cost of maintaining Indian children at our residential schools.

Therefore, on October 22, the letter attached hereto was sent to the Statistician of the Prices Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. We have now received his reply which reads as follows:

In reply to your request of October 22 we have calculated an index on the cost of maintaining residential schools as between April 1 and October 1, 1948, on the basis of calculation similar to the type used in determining the increase between October, 1947 and April, 1948. We have established a cost increase of 5.5%. The breakdown of this total index is as follows:

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You are aware of representations which have been made that per capita grants be increased in accordance with the increased cost of maintenance of Indian children. We would appreciate your direction as to whether we should prepare a submission to Treasury Board requesting authority to include an amount of \$112,000.00 in our next supplementary estimates in order to provide for a 5.5% increase in the per capita rates paid to the various denominations operating these schools.

As decided in a recent conference in your office on per capita grants, we are carefully reviewing all residential school audit reports received here. I would recommend the following cases for increases for consideration by the Minister:

Kamloops Residential School (R.C.)

This is our largest school with a pupilage of 306. Unfortunately, the last audit available until recently was made in October, 1946. The new audit report has been received and shows the following:

Present Per Capita (effective 1 January, 1948)	\$239.85
Auditor's Report Cost per pupil per year (1 October, 1946, to 30 September, 1948)	220.52
Deficit	\$2,263.19

Unfortunately, the auditor's statement of cost per pupil per year covers a 24 month period and does not reveal the present cost of feeding and clothing the children.

In a letter of December 13, the Principal of the School states as follows:

"With reference to the recent audited statement of this School, I wish to advise that in computing the deficit the outstanding account of \$1968.85 for rental and grazing fees for the year 1947-48 only was taken into consideration.

"In arriving at a new per capita grant for this School I would appreciate having the above figures taken into consideration."

In view of the above I would recommend that the present rate of \$239.85 be increased by an amount of \$15.15 per pupil to total \$255.00 effective 1 January, 1948. The nearest school to Kamloops is St. George's (C.E.) at Lytton, B. C., now receiving \$257.00 per pupil.

Shubenasadie Residential School (R.C.)

This school has an authorized pupilage of 160. The latest audit report shows the cost per pupil for the period 1 August, 1947, to 31 July, 1948, was \$259.88. The present per capita rate effective 1 January, 1948, is \$240.00.

As you are personally aware, this school is operated directly by the Branch and does not come under the Oblate Marist or Jesuit Orders as is the case with our other R. C. schools. It has therefore no financial backing other than the per capita grant of the Department. Therefore I would recommend an increase in grant to \$265.00 effective 1 January, 1948.

Fort George (R.C.) Residential School.

The first audit report on this school has just been received and covers the period 1 September, 1947, to 31 August, 1948. As you are probably aware, this is a church-owned school with 8 Indian 9 Eskimo and 6 white pupils in attendance. The cost per pupil per year is shown by the auditor to be \$824.83. However, in making his

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report the auditor states that some of the factors for this very high cost per pupil are:

- (a) The very low average attendance (16.85 pupils).
- (b) Materials purchased for building and repairs amounted to \$323.28 per pupil per year. Building supplies to the amount of \$1519.37 were on hand as inventory. A large stock of food was also on hand.
- (c) Construction during the period under review included a laundry house, a baking house, foundation for the school and some work on the chapel.

Therefore it is recommended that the per capita rate at this school be set at the same as that allowed the Fort George C.E. Residential School, namely \$511.00 per pupil, effective 1 January, 1948. The present rate is \$310.05.

Albany Residential School (R.G.)

The first audit report on this school has also been received and covers the period September 1, 1947, to August 31, 1948. It shows 75 pupils in attendance with an average of 62.2. The cost per pupil per year is \$430.17. The present per capita rate is \$310.05.

I would recommend that the new rate for this school be set at \$411.00 which is the same amount allowed the Moose Factory C.E. Residential School. Unfortunately, the auditor was unable to isolate all costs in connection with this school as a small hospital is also operated in the same building by some of the same staff. I feel that the recommended rate of \$411.00 would therefore be fair and reasonable.

Alert Bay Residential School (C.E.)

We have received strong representations with regard to increasing the per capita rate at this school. We are now paying a grant of \$251.55 and the last audit report dated December 31, 1947, indicated an operating cost per pupil of \$230.35. However, this was under the former Principal, who has now been replaced and our inspector's reports indicate that a much higher standard of clothing and food is now being provided. This inadequate food and clothing was the cause of much dissension under the former principal and it has undoubtedly

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caused the M. S. C. C. a considerable expenditure to have conditions remedied. I would therefore recommend that the new rate for this school be set at \$255.00, effective 1 January, 1948.

As other auditors' reports are received, similar recommendations will be passed for your consideration. To summarize therefore, I would recommend that you authorize payment of the following per capita grants effective 1 January, 1948:

MEMORANDUM TO THE DIRECTOR

Increased per capita rates for
Indian Residential Schools

You will recall our recent discussion concerning the period covered by the last increase in per capita rates granted to Residential Schools.

I am sending you herewith the two files concerned. You will note (flag one) a memorandum sent to the Deputy Minister on November 12, 1948, concerning this increase and indicating that a sum of \$112,000.00 would be required. No action was taken as a result of this request. Another letter was sent to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and a reply was received from them on December 14, 1948 (flag 2).

Another memorandum was sent to the Deputy Minister on February 12, 1949 (flag 3). No decision was made and we again wrote to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics bringing the revised figure up to March 8, 1949.

On March 19, a further memorandum was sent to Dr. Keenleyside (flag 4) and finally a decision was reached to include a sum in the 1949/50 Supplementary Estimates.

You will recall that we then prepared a new statement of proposed grants and that this matter was discussed with Mr. Jackson in May.

Approval was given by the Minister for the new rates and the Churches were informed in August, 1949.

What I believe Canon Cook to be requesting is an increase covering the change in the cost-of-living index between January 1949 and February 1950.

Cost of Living Index and
Per Capita Grants

During the past few months we have drawn attention several times to the increasing cost-of-living indexes as published in the OFFICIAL DOMINION GOVERNMENT publications - the releases of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in their monthly Price Movements Circulars - and have pointed out the difficulty of operating residential schools on Per Capita grants established with effect from 1st April, 1948.

The latest of the above - mentioned circulars, released on 4th August, 1950, indicates clearly the enormous difficulty of even trying to operate these schools to a reasonable standard of feeding, clothing and general care of the children, as will be seen from the following figures:
