## Del Rio Dairy honored by DFA

The Gingg family, owners of Del Rio Dairy located in Friona, Texas, has been named a 2015 Member of Distinction family by Dairy Farmers of America.

The Members of Distinction program recognizes dairy farmers who excel on their operations, in their communities and in the industry. Honorees inspire others through their actions, leadership and involvement, and they represent the best of the dairy industry.

DFA comprises more than 14,000 farmer-owners across the United States. Each year, one notable member farm from each of DFA's seven Areas is selected to receive this honor. Del Rio Dairy represents the Cooperative's Southwest Area.

When Rocky and Liz Gingg started their dairy near Phoenix, Ariz., in 1982, they never expected to leave. But, as the city lights crept closer to their dairy, they knew they needed to explore other options.

"We were getting offers for our property for development, and the opportunity presented itself for us to relocate," Rocky said.

Moving to the Texas Panhandle in 2006, the Gings expanded their herd to 3,800 cows and built barns that are seldom found in the state. Known as Saudi-style barns, the structures consist of open corrals under one roof and typically are found in desert climates.

"You've got the protection over the

cows, but without the constraints of stalls," Rocky says. "The cows are able to lay out on regular ground on bedding."

As part of its sustainability effort, Del Rio Dairy began composting its waste, which is then used on the farm's 3,380 acres of crops or sold to neighboring operations.

Although Rocky still plays a large role in the operation, he has gained new managers in the form of two sons-in-law — Nathan Moroney and Garth Cummings.

"I guess I could have never planned it any better the way it has turned out, you know, with having both daughters here and both sons-in-law involved," Rocky said.

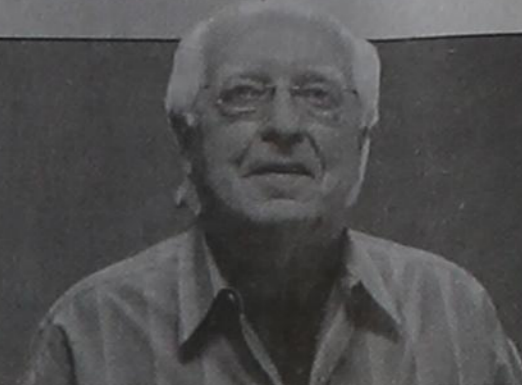

## taking the big leap

Reigniting the promise of America.

Texas Senator Ted Cruz used that slogan Monday to announce his candidacy for president of the U.S. Politicians like to promise to get America back on track, to make America stronger, to return America to our core values, and reignite America.

Some of us out here in the boon-docks think America, and Texas, is pretty okay, in spite of our current weak Democratic leaders. Our economy is chugging along, gasoline prices are down from last year, our school system is still turning out graduates, and our neighbors often help other neighbors in time of need.

Always called us when the apricots on his tree were ready; said, 'come and pick all you want,' which was more fun? Picking them or eating them...

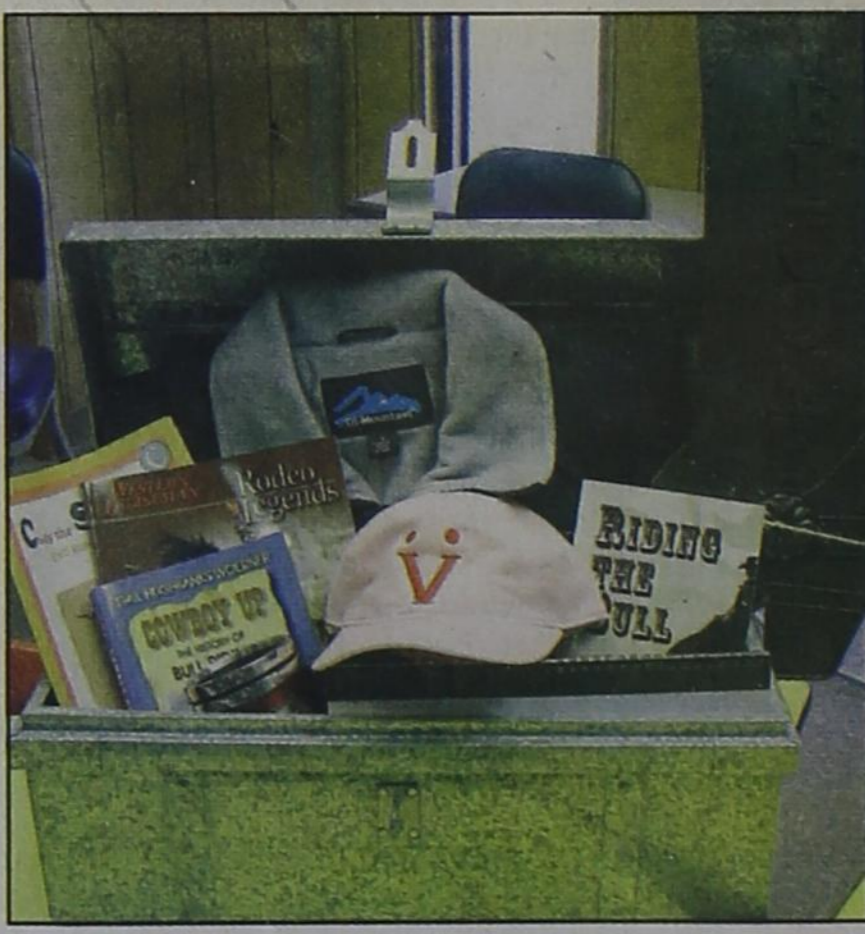
Then in the dead of winter when the north winds blew and the blizzards came, out he came with his little tractor to clean off his drive way and our parking lot! Many times

The county burn ban will be in effect at midnight Monday March 30 until further notice. We have had some nice weather but it is dry again. Friona firefighters answered a grass fire call about 2:00 p.m. Monday east of town on Hwy 60. County commissioners and Judge Trey Ellis voted to reinstate the burn ban at Monday's meeting.

We have been notified that Friona ISD will have classes on Friday April 3. That is Good Friday. Normally school is out but this must be a makeup snow day. So parents mark your calendars. The school calendar for the month of April is in this Star.

At Lions Club last week, John Jordan, who is employed at High Plains Dairy/Blue Sky Farms, said that dairy owner Harry DeWit has purchased some buffaloes. He said they had 21 pregnant buffaloes out there and might have plans to get a few more, including a bull. I spoke with Harry and he said eventually they will be pastured on Highway 86 across from the dairy. The baby calves should be arriving sometime in May. Should make for some interesting sightseeing.

At Monday's county commissioners meeting the following people were appointed to the Parmer County Historical Commission: Gladys and Don Spring, Richard Carson,

Bonnie Howard, Tommie Fulcher, Mack Heald, Gay Goetsch, Sharon White, Mary Johnston, Hollis Horton, Joe Bob Mann, and Wendy Carthel. 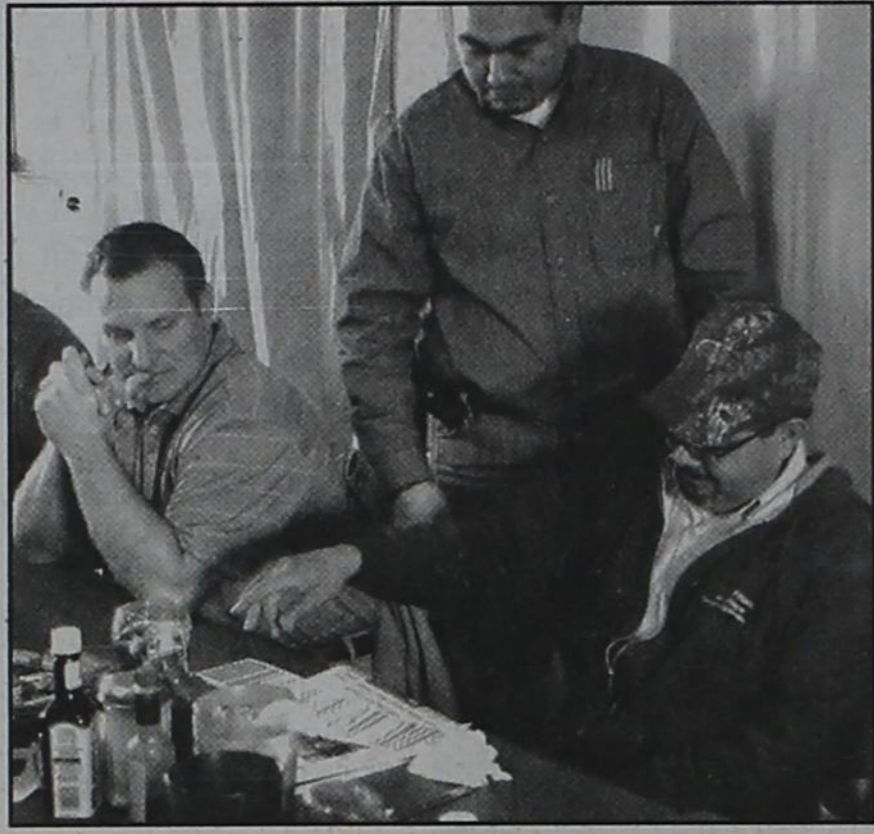

## Remembering 100 years

My father, L. A. Smith, came on a train to the Panhandle with his folks from Michigan in 1909. He rode with the horses in one boxcar while the family possessions were in another. I was born April 5, 1915 on a farm 5 miles north of Hereford in the Progressive community. My grandmother Smith acted as midwife.

When I was 5 years old, I began driving a horse and buggy 4 miles to the Askren School.

At age 9, I trusted Jesus as my Savior and was baptized in a horse tank. We held church services in the schoolhouse. Daddy was Sunday School Superintendent and sponsored singing schools with Stamps-Baxter Music. We were always attending singing conventions around the community.

We moved to another farm north of Dawn, where I helped milk lots of cows and then put most of the milk and cream in 10-gallon cans to ship them on the train.

After grade school in Dawn, I drove a Model A to Hereford High School until I graduated in 1932. I attended West Texas State Normal College in Canyon, working in the Randall Hall kitchen to help pay for room and board.

My family had moved into Dawn and I met Norman Miller at a program in the schoolhouse there. We married in 1935. My mother's maiden name was Miller and she married a man named Smith; I was a Smith and married a Miller.

Norman was a farmer. To survive the dust bowl and the depression, he planted trees (you might still see some of them) along highways around the Panhandle for the WPA.



He helped build the new church building in Dawn and became a deacon there.

We raised four children while I taught music and worked in the church and school cafeteria in Dawn. At one time, there were six women named Lois living in the tiny little Dawn, Texas community.

After Norman died in 1960, I finished college at WT and applied to teach school in Farwell. As I was driving through Friona, I noticed how pretty the trees on the school campus were, so I applied here. Mr. Gee hired me the next day. I moved to Friona and taught the 4th grade until 1983.

I was also a Sunday school teacher and helped start the Friona Public Library in the building on 7th Street across from the park. I sang in the church choir and was a member of the Women's Study Club.

I love the people in Friona and remember especially my good friends who have passed on: Wana Brewer, Carmaleet Truitt, Jessie Douglas, and Effie Hicks.

Lois will celebrate her 100th birthday April 5, 2015.

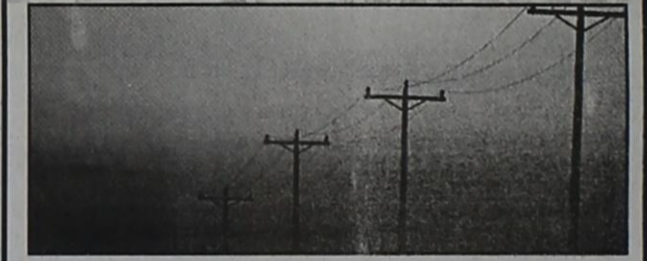

## TxDOT aims to save lives, curb deadly work zone crashes

With 146 people killed in Texas work zone crashes last year – an increase of more than 20 percent from 2013 – the Texas Department of Transportation urges drivers to slow down, pay attention and be extra cautious when driving through work zones and construction areas. TxDOT's call-to-action, "Drive Safe in Work Zones So We All Get Home," coincides with National Work Zone Awareness Week, March 23-27.

"People often think work zone crashes result in the deaths of roadside workers, but last year, 87 percent of work zone fatalities were motorists," said TxDOT Deputy Executive Director John Barton. "Our TxDOT employees and contractors are obviously at risk, but so too are drivers and their passengers. We urge everyone to be careful and responsible in work zones so our roadside workers and passing motorists, alike, can arrive safely at home to their loved ones."

With approximately 400,000 people moving to Texas each year, the price of progress can mean more than 2,500 active TxDOT work zones at any given time. Last year, 19,393 work zone crashes marked a 12-percent increase over 2013.

The top two factors of work zone crashes are failure to control speed and driver inattention. Traffic fines in work zones double when workers are present and can cost up to \$2,000.

By law, drivers are required to move over or slow down when approaching work crews, emergency vehicles or tow trucks stopped on the roadside or shoulder with flashing blue or amber lights.

During National Work Zone Awareness Week, TxDOT's permanent message signs along state highways and roadways will remind drivers to use caution in work zones.

### Intern enjoys wide open spaces of Texas

Bart De Bot could not believe all the wide open space he found when he came to do an internship at Optima Dairy owned by Koen and Els Ally. He has been in the United States for six weeks.

He requested the U.S. assignment from Holland Agri-Experience who then assigned him to Koen & Els Ally in Friona and Geoffrey Linszen in Pampa.

Bart, 20, is from Lennik, Belgium and finishing his Bachelor’s degree in Agri-technology and Bio-technology with this internship. He will graduate in June. He plans to be an Agri-business consultant in Belgium. A consultant advises farmers on rations for cows, hygiene, the raising of cattle, and tracking the lineage of the meat that is sold in the stores.

Bart, who speaks Dutch, said, “It is totally different here. Here there are beautiful landscapes and wide open spaces.”

When Bart came to the U.S., he had already had three internships in Belgium and wanted to learn more about American farming. In Belgium, cows live in a barn as opposed to here where the cattle are kept in open lots.

“It is much bigger here,” he said surprised.

His first week here he attended a sale at Hart where they sold 11,000 cows which was the second largest sale of cattle.

“No one in Belgium will believe me,” he said. “The biggest farm in Belgium has 500 milking cows.”

At Optima Dairy, he is up at 4 a.m. every day to treat and milk cows before bringing the calves into the barn to feed them. He also is charged with separating into pens the dairy cows that are in different

phases of lactation.

He will be leaving at the end of this week for Pampa where he will be continuing his internship at Linszen’s farm, which raises dairy calves, and farms. He plans to learn more about forage protection.

In Belgium, his neighbors are much closer than here. He lives 10 miles from Brussels and his parents, Michel and Marie-Christine, have only five cows they raise as a hobby.

In his spare time in Belgium, he works for a farm in his neighborhood that is about a mile from his home. The farmer has 150 milking cows and a total of 300 cows. He works the fields growing wheat, alfalfa, maize, beets and potatoes on 250 acres or two and half hectares. Bart

also feeds the cattle, spreads manure, mows the grass, cultivates and harvests wheat in the summer.

While here, he has taken the time to visit Albuquerque where he got to see a sunset at Sandia Peak followed by a road trip to Alamogordo to visit White Sands.

Bart will leave Pampa on May 20 to meet up with a classmate from Belgium that has been interning in Stephenville. They have planned a trip to Las Vegas, the Grand Canyon, Los Angeles and the Death Valley before traveling back to Belgium on May 25.

When asked what he would miss the most from his U.S. internship he stated, “I will miss all the nature, freedom and space in Texas.”
