A Sermon. BY REV. J. O'B. LOWRY.

"He saith unto them, But whom say ye tha successors. I am? And Simon Peter answered and said, Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God. And Jesus answered and FLESH AND BLOOD HAVE And I say al so-unto thee That thou art Peter, and UPON THIS ROCK I. WILL BUILD MY CHURCH; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."-Matt. 16:15-18.

In investigating a subject, about which opinions are so diverse, respectfulness should be joined to earnestness-and both should be made sub servient to truth.

We begin with a review. 1-It has been claimed by some that there is no reference, in the language before us, to the person of the Apostle Peter.

Those who belong to this class claim, 1) That, in saying, "Upon this rock I will build my church," Christ, in some way, pointed to himself. Only the dignity of its advocates could have secured respect for the view itself. Those who deny reference to the person of Peter, but cannot resort to the explanation just stated, claim 2) That our Lord referred to the Confession of the Apostle, and not the Apostle himself.

· Let us examine this view. (f) It betrays a disregard of the context. There the pronouns 'thou' and 'thee' are used too designedly to warrant an impersonal reference. (2) It betrays a dogmatic prejudice. 

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

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
