<u>May 27, 1875 (con't)</u>

-Ten Nights in a Bar Room will be played by the Literary Society on Thursday evening May 27<sup>th</sup>.

-The farmers are making good time in getting their crops in this fine weather, the prospect for fruit is very poor indeed, wheat is pretty thin. Some pieces have been plowed under and corn will be planted instead.

-We understand the German Methodists have started a Sabbath School here where the children are taught in their own language.

**OLMSTED** 

-Mr. Samuel Burgess died of inflamatory rheumatism at the house of N. Nelson in Olmsted, May 19th 1875, aged 24 years and 6 months. Mr. Burgess was a native of England, where he was born in December, 1850. When about 19 years of age, in company with about twenty other young men, he came to Canada, where he remained about three months. A part of his young friends were sober and religiously disposed, and the others rough and of loose habits; and finding that the latter were exerting too much influence over their fellows, and determining to be somebody and do something worthy of himself, and feeling under obligations to God and his fellow men, he left and came to Olmsted Falls, O., where he found employment for a short time. But disliking his associations, he quit and went to work for Mr. Charles Fitch, where he remained about two years.

In Sept. 1870 he united with the 2d Congregational Church of Olmsted, on Butternut Ridge, of which he was a very active and worthy member until his death. In the spring of 1874 he went to work for **Herbert Nelson**, where he remained about a year, after which he went to **Newell Nelson's** (father of Herbert), where he died.

During his painful illness of two weeks, which he bore with manly and Christian fortitude, he had the best of care and kindest treatment, not only from the family but from numerous friends who came in to see him and to minister to his wants.

Here let me say that Mr. Nelson and family are deserving of the thanks of this community for their kind treatment of the sick, not only in this case, but several others which they have had in their house.

The character of Mr. Burgess is well worthy the study and imitation of all young men. Friendly, cheerful, peaceable, industrious, ready to help at anything that was laudible and right, sober and regular in his habits, and avoiding bad influence and evil associations, he sought always to put himself within the influence of and to associate with the good, the intelligent and the worthy. He was particularly careful of his reputation and of his money, though never afraid to do what he believed to be right, or to buy what he needed ot give to a good cause. Practicing on these principles he made a larger place for himself in the hearts of his acquaintances than many men make in a lifetime, and though he had not a known relative this side the ocean, he was by no means without mourners at his funeral, which was largely attended and where there were more wet eyes than are usual on such occasions. Several good pieces were sung by Mr. G. N. Miner; Miss Bell Mead and Miss Hattie Kendall. The music was furnished by Rice's Band with an organ accompaniement by Miss Bell Mead.

-The property known as Barnum's Mill and Quarry has been purchased by **Mr. Caldwell** of Cleveland. The use he intends to make of it we have not learned.

-Business is still dull.

-The Railroad Company are fencing the Depot ground. -The Scarlet Fever has made its appearance here, but it

is to be hoped that it will not prove as fatal as it did in the Spring, on Butternut Ridge in the north part of the town.


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<u>June 10, 1875</u>

#### DIED

Emma E. Lemon was born at Olmsted Falls, O., February 22d, 1850. She was married to the late John T. Gilbert, October 25, 1873, and died in Norwalk May 24, 1875, five months after the decease of her husband, leaving an infant daughter nine months old. Her Christian spirit was manifested in all her relations as a daughter, sister, wife and mother. Her gentleness and patience through her protracted illness won the sympathy of all. She died triumphant in Christian faith. A large concourse of friends attended her obsequies at the M. E. Church, of which she was a member.

### July 10, 1875

### ROCKPORT

-C. S. Giddings and others are taking active steps to procure means to rebuild the M. E. Church, and also to build sheds for horses. They are having good success.

-The Board of Education met on Monday the 7<sup>th</sup>, and after hearing the report of the committee on buildings, etc., decided to establish two graded schools in the township, one at the Town Hall, which is to be fitted up for that purpose the present season, and the other to be located near the M. E. Church, a site for the same to be procured at once, and a building erected next year.

-Charles Wise has bought ten acres of land, a portion of the Mathew Jordan farm, consideration #2,000. Mr. Wise is putting up a dwelling thereon.

-It is rumored that Mr. John M. West has sold to the L. S. & M. S. Railway Co., one hundred acres of land to be used as stockyards. Hope 'tis true.

-The people of east Rockport are taking active measures to secure a terminus for the Rocky River Railroad at the Viaduct, and also to secure cheap fare, in both of which they will doubtless succeed. There is no good reason why the land between Cleveland and Rocky River, with its beautiful scenery and excellent fruit and water, should not be used ashomes for the People. Cheap and easy transit to the city will help to bring purchasers. -Rather cool for corn, but death to potato bugs. We can spare them. J.A. P.

June 10, 1875

DOVER

-The frequent showers we have had of late have set vegetation to growing at a remarkable rate. Grass and grain are doing finely. Potatoes have been planted more largely than for several years past.

Corn.-Some have hoed while others are still planting. Quite a breadth has been planted, and that which is up looks well, though there has been some complaints of cut worms.

Fruit promises to be uncommonly scarce. As far as I have observed there are almost no apples at all. I have seen a few scattering peaches on common seedling trees. Sour or common red cherries blowed out full and it was thought there would be an abundance of that kind, but the blows dropped off with very few cherries set.

-On Thursday evening, June 10<sup>th</sup>, the Olmsted Literary Society gave an entertainment in the Town Hall, Dover Center, which was well attended, notwithstanding the very busy season and the shortness of the evenings, which latter facts our Olmsted friends will please take into consideration. The Play, Ten Nights in a Bar Room, was played with general good satisfaction, after which a laughable farce entitled, The Haunted House, was presented, affording a good deal of laughter, which was perhaps its best compliment.

Good music by Rice's Band filled up the intevals between the acts. "Silver Threads among the Gold" was sung in a manner pleasing to all.

The scenes in which little Mary Morgan, the drunkards daughter took part, were among the best of the play. Mrs. Mead as Mrs. Morgan was just the right person for the place and Mr. Vaughn as Joe Morgan acted his part well. He is a good speaker, but I don't think he ever had the real delirium tremens. Cliff Rathbun, as Slade the landlord, sustained his part well, as did "Switchel" and George Wilson, in the character of the traveler. George wants a little more practice in speaking and he would be tiptop.

DIED: In Middlebury, Summit county, Ohio, on the 7<sup>th</sup> of Jan. 1849, **Thomas Granger**, a soldier of the Revolution, aged 87 years.

Mr. Granger was in the battle of Bunker Hill, though but a boy. He shortly after enlisted for the War as a Fifer in Capt. Stone's company of Infantry in the 12<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts Regiment. He was soon after appointed Fife Major, in which capacity he served during the war. He was present and participated in the Battles of Long Island, Trenton, Princeton, Saratoga, Brandywine, and York Town-he was present at the execution of Major Andre, and was, perhaps the last surviving witness of that mournful event.

Thus surely and silently pass away from earth those spirits that dared to stay the tyrant's power, and battle for human liberty, uncared for and not thought of by those who enjoy the blessings purchased by their valor and toil; the fair fabric reared by their hands and consecrated by their blood, affords but poor shelter and nourishment to the worn out soldier. His wants are hardly supplied by the mean pittance afforded by government when enjoying good health-while in sickness it is wholly inadequate. This has been the case with Mr. Granger. For the last six years he was not able to leave his room-his nurse and attendant has been the last of his family-a son, who is decrepid, and has been for several years, from a paralytic attack. The additional pay belonging to him, by virtue of a law passed some time since, he has never received, in consequence of some informality in the records and the loss of his discharge. I would submit to the consideration of my countrymen whether it would not be just and proper to petition Government that the back pay due him be paid to the son for his support and benefit. W. D. 

Burnside has played out and we are under the immediate command of our corps commanders. The right and left are leaving and the old center grand division, the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> army corps are to remain and guard the fordings and protect the Capitol (and the thousands of cowards in it).

There is now a detail out of our regiment of 200 men, 3 captains, 12 sergeants, 24 corporals, making roads. They say that 'tis the intention of the authorities to fortify part of Virginia. I can see in the future many nights of picketing, reconnaisances, marches, etc. I suppose we will have to bear it and do the best we can. As you say, we can't better it by our personal exertions. Write soon. Give my love to all the folks and believe me ever your loving and affectionate

Camp 62<sup>nd</sup> Regt. P.V. Feb. 13, 1863

Dear Hattie

I see you are as tired of the war as I am. Now I am not sick of war, perhaps 'tis only the way the thing is carried on. I don't think I should have been contented if I had remained at home, but I am, like you, in hopes that the thing is now about drawing to a close. The picture you ask for I will send as soon as I can get it. There are two artists now in Falmouth and my friend J.C. Meanor and myself are going down tomorrow to try our luck. The correspondence I will send but 't will not be anything very interesting. I will wait until my return from Falmouth. Valentines are all the go and several have been favored on Stewarts Run, some nice, and some over-nice (The Howaths were favored, Brunt Lymas, Joe Green, and old Tom Howath. Say nothing about it and keep an ear open and if old Tom ain't mad, then I am fooled.) I had a notion to send Alf one, but concluded he might be offended and I don't wish to offend him. The others may become offended if they choose.

I will write oftener now. We have been paid and I sent to Washington and got some stamps. Now you will be a little richer for not having to send any more stamps. I will pay them back as soon as I can get a full supply.

Camp of 62<sup>nd</sup> Regt. P.V. Feb. 18, 1863

My dear Hattie

You asked me to write you a piece for your paper. I have done so. The acting was well done, the singing excellent, and we imagined many of the audience were wishing that the young men who boldly advocated the principles of temperance might in reality adhere to them in the future. Messrs. Rathburn furnished the amusements in the comic line. They evidently believe in the old adage that "A little nonsense now and then, is relished by the best of men." We were glad to see that the society, in arranging their programme for these entertainments, seem to have had the improvement of the audience in view as well as their amusement. Mr. Jeremiah Witham, an old man, 68 years of age, residing on the plank road in the southeast part of town died on Friday, March 26<sup>th</sup>. Funeral on Sunday.

On Wednesday, March 24<sup>th</sup>, a young child from the east part of Olmsted, (name not learned) was buried in the Ridge Cemetery.

A son of Asher and Emma Stearns, residing a little south of Butternut Ridge, died on Wednesday, March 24<sup>th</sup>; aged about six months. Funeral on Thursday.

Several old persons are lying very sick and are not expected to recover.

### Miss H.T. Rohrer

### Dear Hattie

I wrote a hasty line yesterday morning to ease if possible your apprehensions of evil and though I do not feel much like the task I am going to write some more today in compliance with your request to write often.

We left Hartwood Church about noon as the troops of the 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> Army Corps marched along very slowly, and then there were about two miles of very bad road that men walked over two and two, so that a great deal of time was taken up before we got started fairly, but when we did start you better think we did not let any grass grow under our feet. We marched over 12 miles and camped within two miles of the river. Next morning about eight o'clock we started again and crossed the river a little before noon. Time seemed to be very precious, but so many were crossing that our division did not get over as soon as we wished to.

We had eaten a luncheon while waiting and when over we set off at a "double quick" notwithstanding we had eight days rations in our knapsacks, which with our blankets and a change of clothing weighed 29 lbs.; then our gun and 60 rounds of cartridge completed our load. But scarcely any grumbling was heard for they all seemed to want to do all that was asked and cheerfully too if it would cause the war to end any quicker.

We forded a small stream but very rapid and about two feet deep. We got over and off again hardly stopping to take breath. On and on we went, mile after mile, and only stopping for a minute now and then. About six in the evening we came up along side of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Brigade and stopped to rest while the cavalry went to reconnoitre the ground on the other side of the Rapidon. They discovered the enemy's pickets and captured them. Then the 44<sup>th</sup> which was in advance was sent over to aid them. Soon we all advanced to the river, fixed up and forded the river though very rapid and three feet deep.

The next morning we advanced and drove in their pickets, capturing some near a brick house at a cross roads, one of the old Virginia mansions. We went some 3½ miles that evening on a reconnaissance toward Fredericksburg, came back and camped just below the brick house.


Yesterday we (our division) went 7½ miles down the river toward Fredericksburg and came back near camp. The Rebs came in on us and separated the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> brigades from the 3<sup>rd</sup> which was in the lead. The 1<sup>st</sup> Brigade fought them for dear life, or skirmished and then charged, driving them back. They (1<sup>st</sup> Brigade) went on to camp and we fell back to defend the flank and picketed all night, getting into our present position at daylight. We immediately set to work and felled the timber in our front and formed a strong abbattis of brush and logs and the boys are now putting dirt to it. I must hurry and help again as they are calling on Monks. The line is a good one and woe to the Rebels that venture in reach of it. While I have been writing the 2<sup>nd</sup> division of this corps has been fighting them. Quite a

While I have been writing the 2<sup>rd</sup> division of this corps has been fighting them. Quite a battle has been fought since 4 o'clock and is still going on in and near the brick house where we first were placed. "Tis about a mile and a half from here. The cheers of both sides can be heard and the musketry is awful, but the cannonading is fully equal to Fredericksburg. There is no danger of our going up there to help them as they have the 3<sup>rd</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> Army Corps up there and our corps alone holds the left flank. I will write more soon. My love to all the folks and yourself included, of course. I remain as ever yours in love

### Church of the Nativity, 1848-1852 Superior Street east of Erie (Superior Ave. east of East Ninth Street) Pastor: Rev. Peter McLaughlin

Cleveland had only one Catholic church when the first bishop of the newly formed Diocese of Cleveland arrived in the city in 1847. Known as St. Mary's on-the-Flats, the frame church stood at the corner of Columbus and Girard Streets. The Most Reverend Bishop, Amadeus Rappe, determined to build a cathedral worthy of the diocese. In October 1848, he bought five lots to the east adjoining some land already bought for a church at the corner of Superior and Erie (East 9th) Streets by the Rev. Peter McLaughlin. On one of the east lots he immediately had built a temporary frame structure and on Christmas Day, 1848, the first services were conducted in the church and, for that reason, it was called the Church of the Nativity. The temporary church was known as a "chapel of ease," for it served as a relief chapel for the members of St. Mary's congregation. Such scattered chapels were needed at a time when distances were great and many parishioners could not easily attend the central church.

The modest chapel also served as Cleveland's first parochial school. From the beginning the sanctuary of the chapel was closed from view by folding doors on week days and the school was held in the nave.

The Church of the Nativity existed until November 1852, when St. John's Cathedral was completed on the adjoining land. At that time the English members came to St. John's while the Germans, who had had a German priest for alternative services at St. Mary's, were assigned to St. Mary's on-the-Flats.



The Most Rev. Amadeus Rappe, first Bishop of Cleveland, took possession of his diocese on October 10, 1847. At that time there was but one church in the city, the historic St. Mary's on-the-Flats. Though numerous, the immigrant Catholics were poverty-stricken and, after the foundation of St. John's Cathedral was built in the fall of

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### north Presbyterian Church.

T the suggestion of Dr. Aiken, pastor of the First Church, a Sunday-school was started in 1859 on the north side of St. Clair street near Lyman street. Charles W. Noble, Esq., was its first superintendent. At that time the community was called Wasonville, a name taken from the car shops owned by Charles Wason.

In 1860 the school moved to the south side of St. Clair street, to a place now owned by the Lake Shore Welsh Church Society. Here the school continued until it entered a church, erected on Aaron street in the spring of 1867. This was its abiding place for a period of twenty years, until it entered the present building on the corner of Case avenue and Superior street.

During this time the school had six superintendents, as follows: Charles W. Noble, Esq., from 1859 to 1864; Hon. T. D. Crocker, 1864 to 1872; Henry Nash, 1872 to 1873; T. D. Crocker



again, 1873 to 1874; H. S. Davis, 1874 to 1875; W. B. Porter, 1875 to 1876; L. J. Talbot, 1876 to 1879.

In 1879, Mr. S. P. Fenn was elected superintendent, and for almost seventeen years he has been the greatly beloved and remarkably successful superintendent of this school, which for many years has been one of the largest in Cleveland. The number now on the roll is somewhat over 1200.

preaching services began at the mission, with Rev. Aaron Peck as supply for one year. Rev. B. P. Johnson supplied from 1867 to 1868; Rev. D. W. Sharts, from 1868 to 1870.

Rev. Dr. Goodrich, and Elders R. F. Smith and George H. Ely, by order of Presbytery, organized the church September 19, 1870. The church started with fifty-one members, all of whom

brought their letters from the First Church. James Geekie was made its first ruling elder. Dr. Goodrich named the organization the North Church, after the old North Church in Boston. Rev. Anson Smyth, D. D., was called as the first pastor of the church. He remained two years, but was never installed. He was an excellent preacher, a tenderhearted and kind man, and a successful worker. Dr. Smyth was succeeded by Rev. H. R. Hoisington, who was installed, as pastor, June 2, 1872. Mr. Hoisington was a man of fine Christian



### Woodland Avenue Presbyterian Church.

IN 1855 the Mayflower Sunday-school, which had been organized two years before, was adopted as a Mission of the Second Presbyterian Church, and a building was erected on a lot, given by Mr. Joseph Perkins of the Euclid Avenue Presbyterian Church. Messrs. T. P. Handy, T. Dwight, Dan P. Eells, and C. J. Dockstader, were successively Superintendents. Reverends Little and Day preached, and otherwise fostered this work, which issued at last in the formation of the Woodland Avenue Presbyterian Church. The first effectual step toward the organization of this church was taken at a small meeting held in the autumn of 1870, at the Willson School-house. A committee was appointed to act with the Presbyterian Union in raising money. If this committee should be successful it was authorized to procure a site, and to proceed to the erection of a chapel. Generous friends responded promptly and liberally to the call, and the lot was pur-

chased, and the work on the building commenced the next summer. The lower room was ready for occupancy early in April,

> 1872, and the chapel was completed in May, the total cost being over \$27,000. The first available funds that came into the hands of this committee

> consisted of a legacy of \$1,000, left for this purpose by Mrs. Sarah C. Adams, for twenty years a missionary among the Zulus at Port Natal, South Africa. The society was organized at the Cleveland Protestant Orphan Asylum, at the corner of Woodland and Willson avenues, on the 18th of January, 1872. Early in

> April a Sabbath-school was

formed, and the Mayflower Mission School was turned over to its care. The church was organized April 18, 1872, with fifty-four members. Of these twenty-eight were from Presbyterian churches, chiefly from the Second Church, and twenty-three were from

Congregational churches, chiefly from Plymouth Church. Three persons united upon confession of faith.

The first pastor, Rev. E. P. Gardner, was installed June 30th, 1872. He was well fitted for the work of laying the foundation of the church. His deep piety and fervent zeal for the Master soon permeated the whole church, and during the four years pastorate there were added to the church, from congregation and from Sunday-school, 246 members. In the spring of 1876 Mr. Gardner's health

failed, and he did not resume the ministry for several years. He is, at present, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Chatham, New Jersey.



The second pastor, Rev. S. Leroy Blake, D.D., was called from Concord, N H., and installed December 12, 1877. Mr. Blake remained pastor until March, 1880. His genial manner, earnest appeals and activity in the work soon won the favor of

the congregation, and during his pastorate, under the blessing of the Spirit, 252 were added to the church on confession of faith, and 104 by letter. At present Dr. Blake is pastor of a Congregational church at New London, Conn.

The third pastor, Rev. George L. Spining, D.D., was called from Kalamazoo, Mich., and was installed June 16, 1881. His earnest and eloquent presentation of the gospel was blessed by the addition of 316 mem-





The fourth pastor, Rev. Paul F. Sutphen, D.D., was called in January, 1886, from the Third Presbyterian Church of Elizabeth, N. J. This pastorate of seven years was richly blessed, there being added to the church nearly 1,000 souls. Rev. Mr. Sutphen preached his last sermon December 11, 1892, having accepted a call to the Second Church of Newark, N. 

Mr. Sutphen was succeeded in the Woodland Avenue Church by Rev. Charles Townsend, who had been pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Lansingburgh, N. Y. He assumed charge of the pastorate the first Sunday of May, 1893, and was installed the following Tuesday evening. After a very successful pastorate of two years, with an addition of nearly 200 to the roll, Mr. Townsend accepted a call to the First Presbyterian Church of Orange, N. J. The church then called the


Rev. Robert G. Hutchins, D.D., formerly pastor of a church in Los Angeles, he having just returned from a visit to the Hawaiian Islands. He was installed October 22d, 1895.

The Sunday-school of this church has long been the largest in Cleveland, reaching one year a membership of 1623, and adding to the church in all 911. The membership of the church in twenty years increased from fifty-four to 1141.

From the beginning 1135 have been received on confession of faith, and 770 by certificate, a total of 1905. It is not surprising that, with a growth so phenomenal,

the original chapel should have been soon outgrown. The present church edifice was dedicated November 17, 1878, at a



cost of \$26,369. The old Sunday-school building, or the original chapel, was replaced by a new one, large and commodious, at a cost of \$32,447. The corner-stone was laid May 27, 1890, and the building was dedicated December 28, 1890. The records of this church are so perfectly kept that the growth, year by year, and a statement of all moneys contributed, are instantly available, and the grand total is : For church property, \$86,025; expenses of the church, \$141,285; benevolent account. \$19,748;

for Sunday-school, \$8,105; by Sunday-school, \$9,071; by auxiliary societies within the church, \$28,809—a total of \$296,559, of which about \$16,672 was received from without. Such a record is unparalleled. Although the Woodland Avenue Church has suffered somewhat by the eastward trend of population, there is a large field of usefulness remaining, and under wise leadership this very successful church will accomplish still greater things for the Master.



### 1848-49 Marriages & Deaths from CLEVELAND DAILY PLAIN DEALER

<u>Issue date</u> <u>Tues., Dec. 26, 1848; p2 c4</u> (con't)

DIED: On Tuesday morning, Dec. 19<sup>th</sup>, Mr. **Dudley Humphrey**, of Parma, Cuyahoga County, O., aged 78 years and 2 months.

Mr. Humphrey was born in Goshen, Litchfield county, Conn., Oct. 20, 1770. In 1835 he removed to Parma, where he resided till his death. This was occasioned by injuries received by falling into a water course during the prevalence of a flood which threatened the destruction of a dam on the premises of his sons, Messrs. W. & D. S. Humphrey.

He was engaged in removing some obstructions to the passage of the water, and the object was nearly completed, when the earth on which he was standing, undermined by the water, gave way beneath him and he was precipitated into the boiling flood. With the greatest difficulty he was rescued from a watery grave, but only to endure a painful existence a few days longer-such injuries having been received as rendered amputation of the right limbs necessary. This was skillfully performed by Dr. Ackley-but it is believed that internal injury of the abdominal region received at the time of his fall, was the moving cause of his death. He lingered for a week after the operation, and then expired with resignation and Christian confidence in his Redeemer. ### The Case of Young Hayes

Our citizens will remember that in August last, Mr. Edmond Hayes, a young man from Portland, Me. was accidently drowned at our wharf:-and that the young men of the city, hearing of the sad event, interested themselves in the matter and gave to the stranger a decent and respectable burial.

After news of his death had reached his friends a very large meeting was held, and a funeral sermon was pronounced on the occasion. At the close of the services, the following resolutions were presented and adopted unanimously. They are communicated to the young of the City through **Rev. S. B. Canfield**, who at that time was especially interested in the case of the young man:

Resolved, That language is inadequate to express the grateful emotions of our hearts in view of the distinguished attention and generosity of the citizens of Cleveland, especially the young men, who, strangers to us, took the place of friends in an hour of sudden advesity, sheding for us the tears of sympathy, and making an honorable grave for our early beloved son, brother, and friend.

*Resolved*, That such an interest manifested for one entirely unknown to them to the moment of his death, is as magnanimous as it is unusual, and demands universal admiration.

*Resolved*, That we shall ever feel a sacred regard for the city of Cleveland, not only because the dust of one dear to us, reposes there, but also because we believe the spirit of human kindness and Christian sympathy eminently prevails there.

*Resolved*, that while it would afford us much satisfaction to have his remains placed in our own family burying ground, with those of his lamented mother; still, owing to the peculiar interest shown by the young men of Cleveland, we willingly entrust them to their keeping, and choose that they shall superintend the erection of such a memorial over the grave, as after consultation, shall be decided upon.

Resolved, That **Rev. S. H. Hayes**, father of the deceased, be requested to forward a copy of these resolutions to the Rev. S. B. Canfield, to be communicated by him as he may judge proper. S. H. HAYES

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catch him and bind him out to some trade, and for seven years he would get only his board and clothes. When I was only quite a chunk of youngster I was apprenticed to a cooper at Bridgeport, Conn., and for five vears I hammered away with adz and driver and hauled a draw-knife for just what I put in me and on me, but my older brother Sheldon, who had been away out west, near Buffalo, N.Y. came home to Connecticut on a visit. We used to think that western New York or western Pennsylvania was "out west." Ohio? That was away and gone. Well, my brother prevailed upon me to leave Bridgeport and go west, and after that another brother took up the same line of march, and another. You know one brother will lead another. That is the way the 'western country' was settled.

"Well, in 1809 I put a 32pound bundle on my back and started on foot to meet my brother Sheldon who was a joiner at Buffalo, and made the journey to Auburn, N. Y., 320 miles, in 16 days. That undertaking was nothing remarkable, for I had \$3 in money and a bundle of food. Many a young fellow started on a longer journey with nothing but an ax. I came by way of Albany, Schenectady, Utica and Onondago Hollow. When I got to Auburn I liked the country and stayed at Scipio three years and in 1812 reached Buffalo, then a thriving town about the size of Vermillion. My brothers, Sheldon, born in 1782, and William, born in 1786, were in the western country.

"In 1812, there were, I believe, but three vessels on the lakes, Cleveland, Sandusky and Erie were ports of entry, and there were only two lighthouses on the lakes, one at Buffalo, the first one built, and the other at Erie. Pittsburgh at that time was an important commercial town. She carried on quite a trade with the west by way of Erie. The merchandise was carted overland to Erie and then shipped to Buffalo, Detroit and Sandusky. The former

place was called Fort Erie and was a straggling little place until the War of 1812-14 gave it a start. My first trip as a sailor was made in the latter part of 1812 from Buffalo to Erie, then considered quite a trip; from Buffalo to Detroit was considerable of a voyage, and a vessel of 32 tons burden was about the largest sailing on the lakes. In 1813 I was one of a crew of four, Captain Dick O'Neil in command, that left Buffalo in the sloop Commencement, 32 tons, with a cargo of whisky for Erie, and while beating along the shore the English frigate Charlotte bore down upon us and captured us. Two boat loads of red coats boarded the Commencement and took us prisoners. We were immediately paroled and a small boat was placed at our disposal to reach shore, but we disliked to leave the sloop and whisky at their mercy. We asked to be allowed to remain around in the vicinity of the vessel, and were told by the English captain that if that was any consolation to us we were welcome to do so. We thereupon concocted a scheme to get the guard drunk and run the vessel ashore or out of the reach of the guns of the Charlotte. Well, it was mighty aggravating, for no sooner would we get the guard nicely drunk than they were relieved by a fresh squad and we had to commence anew. This thing kept on that way for several days, when we were packed in a boat and rowed ashore with orders not to return. The shore was lined with a dense forest, and we started for Erie, but we preferred the water to the woods, and dug up an old canoe which we found in the sand and made our way to Erie. After Perry's victory the owners of the Commencement were indemnified. I saw Perry often at Erie. He had his guns and munitions of war hauled from Pittsburgh. He used to laugh at our recounting our whiskey experience with the British guards.

"Prior to this time my father died and in 1813 my mother came west, and we settled in Cleveland, then a poverty-stricken little

huddle of not more than a dozen or fifteen houses, mostly down near the mouth of the river. On the hill above the village was a thick woods. Mother and I lived in a log house belonging to David Carter, on the east side of the river on Main St., near the top of the hill. It was the house that the Indian, Omick, was confined in the year previous. He was hanged in Cleveland in 1812. Carter was the justice who examined him on the charge of murder. The ring bolt to which he was chained remained in one of the logs of the house when we lived there. We lived in Cleveland until 1815.



"The first vessel I sailed as captain was the Perseverance of 31 tons, in 1816. The first trip I made in her was from Maumee to Mackinaw with

a load of beer for Vance & Meeker. Vance was afterward Governor of Ohio. The first time I ever saw Vermillion was that year, and although it was called Vermillion at that time it consisted of but one house, a sort of storehouse. It stood at the mouth of the river. Along about 1814 and 1815, Gen. Harrison had a regiment of soldiers quartered on the bank of the lake about five miles west of here, where Huron now stands, and the soldiers would go down to Vermillion in boats for victuals, tobacco and whisky-mostly whisky. Those expeditions gave Vermillion its first start. Shipbuilding commenced early in Vermillion. The Fairplay, a little schooner of 100 tons, was built here in 1819, I believe, by Marion, Merwin & Giddings. I sailed her for six years. She was then considered a large vessel. I came to Vermilion to live in 1821, and was married in 1822. I have lived in and about Vermillion ever since.

"Oh, yes, my brothers and sisters are all dead. They died young. Sheldon was only about 75 when he died, and of the girls one was only 82, and I think another 84 when she died. Yes, I am getting along in years."

Crops are looking finely, the hay and wheat crops are much better about here than was expected early in the season. Oats are doing well, and if the weather continues favorable, there will be plenty of oat straw at least. I have been into Summit county, and as far as I have seen, there are no apples, cherries, or peaches to speak of. ED.

This summer he has taken hold of his old barn, which was looking rather shabby in comparison with other things, has built a good stone basement, made of bowlders from his fields, placed the barn upon it, given it a new covering of pine, and painted it in good style, much improving the appearance of the premises and the place.

Go on, Mr. Cooley, you are on the right road. This kind of work is both a present and permanent benefit to the place and to the State.

### ROCKPORT

-At about four P.M. of Saturday last, the dwelling of Mr. Silks, on North Ridge, was struck by lightning, and Mr. S. instantly killed. His wife was also stunned, but not seriously injured. The fluid entered the house by the chimney, dividing as it passed down, one portion, tearing off plastering and siding in the front part of the house, while the other passed to the rear, where mr. S. was standing near an outside door, striking on one side of his head passing down his body and limbs, and tearing to pieces one of his boots, his foot presenting the appearance of having been shot from the inside, with a large sized bullet. There was no damage done by fire.

-The sheds at the M. E. Church are nearly completed, and will prove a great convenience. The improvements to be made on the church building have not been commenced, but perhaps will be soon.

-Mr. Gideon Pease has commenced building a nice dwelling, another is to be built for Widow Giddings.

#### May 27, 1875

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#### In Memoriam-A Pioneer of OLMSTED FALLS

DIED, at Olmsted Falls, at the residence of her granddaughter, Mrs. John Lay, April 22d, 1875, Mrs. Lavina Stearns, aged eighty-four years and ten months. This estimable lady was born at Ballston, New York, June 21st, 1790. Her maiden name was Lavina Hovey. She was married to her first husband, Peter Romp, at the early age of fourteen years. The home of her childhood was left behind, and in the wilderness one hundred miles away, a new life was begun with her husband. He was often absent from home all day at his work and the young wife thus left alone would talk aloud to herself, for the sake of hearing the sound of a human voice. Their home was a small log house with one room, and here this devoted mother lived for many years, rearing her children, and suffering all a loving mother's sorrow at their loss; but she ever took up her burden and bore it bravely for the sake of those left behind.

The exact date of her emigration with her family to Ohio is not known, but it is certain that she was one of the first settlers of Olmsted. The house in which her daughter, **Mrs. Harry Barnum**, resided up to the year 1855 was the first frame house built in Olmsted, and that of Mr. **Peter Romp** was the second. For some years after his settlement in Ohio, Mr. Romp suffered from poor health, and the care of the family devolved mostly upon his wife, who was twelve years younger than himself. They had eleven children. Of the descendants now living there are four children, thirty-four grandchildren, fortyone great-grandchildren and three great-greatgrandchildren.

Mr. Peter Romp died in Olmsted, June 4, 1841, aged sixty-three years. Five years after, his widow married Alvah Stearns, a widower with several children. For these she lived and labored twenty-four years longer, until at last she saw her own and her step-children safely settled in homes of their own. Her second husband died with a cancer in the year 1870, and at that time being nearly eighty years of age, and her home broken up, she went to reside for the remainder of her life with her children.

Few women are now living who have labored so long and endured so much as "Grandma Stearns." In early times when the country was new she was in great demand as a female doctor, and riding on horseback over hill and dale, often going by marked trees, and, to use her own words, "fording rivers, on horseback, at dead of night, (her babe, too young to leave at home in her arms) whose swollen streams she was afraid to cross by the morning light." She went everywhere, she denied no one, and now when her good works are ended, "many rise up to call her blessed."

In addition to other things, she was a tailoress, and besides the care of her family she went out sewing by the day, among the farmers in the new country. The last few years of her life were spent among her friends and in the manufacture of patchwork quilts, in which she could not be excelled, even at the advanced age of eighty-four. She was a beautiful sewer and was never idle. Grandma would always make the button holes and "loved to do it." How many of us can say that? It is said that every one of \_\_\_\_\_ her descendants, down to the great-great grandchildren, possessed some specimen of her handiwork as a memento presented by her own kind hands. She was continually laboring for the good of others. Her last illness was very short, she being on a visit to the grand daughter at whose house she died. The last day she was able to sit up, she spent in knitting all day. How much more precious than the laurels of fame is the memory of this excellent woman, who did not outlive her usefulness.

Miss Mary Mead attired in Chinese costume, presided at the confectionery stand, and sold packages of tea and Chinese fans. Miss Lillie Perkins, dressed as a flower girl, and Miss Maggie Maddock, as a Swiss Peasant, attended to the floral department and provided the gentlemen with button-hole boquets. Mr. C. M. Rathburn and Miss Belle Mead, were attired in Indian costumes. We are not prepared to say whether their habilments were strictly accurate or not, but they succeeded in terrifying the small children and amusing the larger ones. The Old-fashioned table formed quite a feature of the evening. It was presided over by Mrs. Lorenzo Adams, as Queen Elizabeth, Mrs. Joseph Lay, as Martha Washington, and Mrs. Wm. The first, by Artemas Beebe, of Elyria, who spoke of his early life when driving stage between Cleveland and Detroit, at which time the Sperry tavern was one of the stopping places, a good place to stop, and an excellent landlady was our good Mother Sperry, as he was pleased to call her. M. C. Baker spoke of his imigration to Columbia, many years ago, and gave some of his experience in obtaining a wife. Said he believed something in the romance of love.

Spoke in high praise of them both, and concluded by telling some good stories of the olden time, when they went to meeting in ox carts and used buckskin whip-lashes for currency.

Frederick Wright said it gave him great pleasure to meet so many of his friends, and perhaps he felt it more as he was about to remove with his family to Mississippi, which he did for their health. 



**A**<sup>T</sup> the suggestion of Dr. Aiken, pastor of the First Church, a Sunday-school was started in 1859 on the north side of St. Clair street near Lyman street. Charles W. Noble, Esq., was its first superintendent. At that time the community was called Wasonville, a name taken from the car shops owned by Charles Wason.

In 1860 the school moved to the south side of St. Clair street, to a place now owned by the Lake Shore Welsh Church Society. Here the school continued until it entered a church, erected on Aaron street in the spring of 1867. This was its abiding place for a period of twenty years, until it entered the present building on the corner of Case avenue and Superior street.

#### HISTORY OF CLEVELAND PRESBYTERIANISM.

During this time the school had six superintendents, as follows: Charles W. Noble, Esq., from 1859 to 1864; Hon. T. D. Crocker, 1864 to 1872; Henry Nash, 1872 to 1873; T. D. Crocker



again, 1873 to 1874; H. S. Davis, 1874 to 1875; W. B. Porter, 1875 to 1876; L. J. Talbot, 1876 to 1879.

In 1879, Mr. S. P. Fenn was elected superintendent, and for almost seventeen years he has been the greatly beloved and remarkably successful superintendent of this school, which for many years has been one of the largest in Cleveland. The number now on the roll is somewhat over 1200.

As early as 1866, regular

preaching services began at the mission, with Rev. Aaron Peck as supply for one year. Rev. B. P. Johnson supplied from 1867 to 1868; Rev. D. W. Sharts, from 1868 to 1870.

Rev. Dr. Goodrich, and Elders R. F. Smith and George H. Ely, by order of Presbytery, organized the church September 19, 1870. The church started with fifty-one members, all of whom

brought their letters from the First Church. James Geekie was made its first ruling elder. Dr. Goodrich named the organization the North Church, after the old North Church in Boston. Rev. Anson Smyth, D. D., was called as the first pastor of the church. He remained two years, but was never installed. He was an excellent preacher, a tenderhearted and kind man, and a successful worker. Dr. Smyth was succeeded by Rev. H. R. Hoisington, who was installed, as pastor, June 2, 1872. Mr. Hoisington was a man of fine Christian

character, who had the affection of the congregation, laboring diligently and faithfully until July 11, 1880.

Dr. William Gaston, the present pastor, began his work in this field November 1, 1880, and under his wise executive, and indefatigable pastoral ability, the North Church has greatly prospered. Almost eighteen hundred persons have been received into membership in this church, of which number one-half have been added since the present church building was crected, eight years ago. In addition to the help of the ordinary membership in the past six years, the pastor has had valuable assistants,



namely, Miss M. J. Weaver for nearly three years, Rev. Charles L. Chalfant for a few months, and Miss Anna C. Stevens for nearly two years. One of the most powerful agencies for growth in this church has been the Christian Endeavor Society, or Societies, for there are three of these organizations, which have called out a wealth of talent among the young people who are coming into the church. Two Sunday-schools have been

started by the North Church, and have

grown into promising churches. The Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church is the result of a mission started on Becker avenue, and the second mission was organized in an unoccupied school house in Glenville July 3, 1893. This has grown into the Glenville Presbyterian Church.

The lot, corner of Case avenue and Superior street, which the present North Church occupies, was purchased by the congregation at a cost of \$10,000. The congregation purchased the organ, also, at an expense of \$2,700, but the building, which cost about \$27,000, was erected by the First Church with a little help from other churches. This building, admirably adapted for Sunday-school work, was dedicated October 23, 1887. During the past year, the church has been renovated at an expense of \$1,300. The congregations are large, especially at the evening service, and a large annual ingathering of souls is not an exceptional experience, but the rule.



## Case Avenue Presbyterian Church.

THE project of a new Presbyterian church, in the vicinity of Case avenue, had its rise among the members of the Euclid Avenue Presbyterian Church, under the pastorate of Dr. Lyman.



It was deemed advisable to occupy the field in advance by the establishment of a Sundayschool. Mr. and Mrs. Donley Hobart having obtained pledges enough to secure the regular attendance of a sufficient number of children to warrant the undertaking, two other members of the Euclid Avenue Church, Elders

Mrs. D. Hobart. Truman Hastings and Dr. F. S. Slosson, were appointed a committee to organize the school, and to superintend its progress. On the first Sabbath of November, 1867, in a small

brick grocery, the school was organized. The weather being inclement, there was a small gathering of eight teachers and fourteen scholars. With Mr. Hastings, as superintendent, were the following teachers: J. D. Crehore, Donley Hobart, Mrs. Donley Hobart, Mrs. T. Hastings, Fred Whittlesey, Mrs. Fred Whittlesey and Mrs. Louisa J. Patterson. The original roll of scholars was Newton B. Hobart, Clara Hobart, Ella Hobart, John B. Hobart, Herbert Loomis, Howard Loomis, Helen Patterson, Adelaide Patterson, Wallace W. Ludlow, Arthur C. Ludlow, Nelly Taber, Charles Diepold, Charles R. Chandler and Louise Chandler. Of this number of scholars, John B. Hobart and



Arthur C. Ludlow are Presbyterian clergymen; Miss Clara Hobart is the wife of Rev. H. A. Schauffler, D. D., and Miss Ella Hobart is a city missionary, engaged in the Congregational work among the Poles of Cleveland. The second Sunday over forty scholars were present. Truman Hastings, William G. Williams and I. B. Meriam were the superintendents of the school, while it was a mission of the Euclid Avenue Church. With an increase of scholars, the school

removed from Ford's grocery, at the southeastern corner of Case and Cedar avenues, to an unfinished dwelling on Case avenue. Early in 1868, a subscription was opened among the members of the Euclid Avenue Church, payable to Truman Hastings, H. R. Hatch, and George L. Ingersoll, in trust for the purchase or lease of a suitable lot, and for the erection of a chapel thereon, with a condition that the property should ultimately be conveyed to a new Presbyterian church, which it was supposed would be organized in that neighborhood. The amount subscribed was about \$2,000. With this a lot was purchased on Sibley street near Case avenue, and on this lot a wooden chapel was erected. Simultaneously with the starting of this Sunday-school, a weekly prayer-meeting was established, which was merged in time into the prayer-meeting of the church that grew out of the school.



At a meeting of the Presbyterian Union held January 10, 1870, this enterprise received hearty endorsement, and with the moral support of the Union, Rev. James A. Skinner, the third Sabbath of January, 1870, commenced holding Sabbath evening services in the chapel, and the first Sabbath of April, 1870, Mr. Skinner began to hold morning and evening services. The first Sabbath of September, 1870, at the close of the morning service, a committee con-

sisting of Messrs. Hastings, Taber, Preston, Van Tine, Hopkins, Hobart, Pierce, Walter, and Betts, was appointed to request the Presbytery to appoint a commission to make the necessary investigations, as the way seemed clear to organize a Presbyterian church. On the second day of October, 1870, the commission of Presbytery met in the chapel, and in the presence of a large congregation proceeded to organized the Memorial Presbyterian Church, with thirty-four charter members. The first Elders were Truman Hastings, Thomas Taber, and Dr. John C. Preston. Mr. Donley Hobart was elected Deacon, and the services were

concluded by the administration of the Lord's Supper. Sunday, November 6, 1870, the Case Avenue Mission Sundayschool was formally surrendered to the care of the session of the Memorial Presbyterian Church. From the beginning, this enterprise received the sympathy and most liberal support of the members of the mother church. The wooden chapel was soon outgrown, and the lot on the corner of Case and Cedar avenues was purchased, and in 1872 the brick chapel was built and occupied. Mr. Skinner

continued to labor in connection with this church, as stated supply, until some time in December, 1873. During his ministry

the church increased in strength and numbers. December 22, 1872, the church issued its first pastoral call, sending the



same to Rev. Francis A. Horton, then pastor of the Reformed Church, of Catskill, N. Y. Mr. Horton accepted the call, and began his labors on the second Sabbath of February, 1874, and was installed March 22, following. Mr. Horton's pastorate continued to March 25, 1883. During the years 1880-81, the present church edifice was built, and was dedicated July 3, 1881. Mr. Horton went from the Case Avenue Church (for the name was changed from Memorial to Case Avenue Presbyterian Church in

1878), to Oakland, California. The greater part of Mr. Horton's pastorate was in the brick chapel, but he labored to see what might have come earlier, had it not been for the panic in the early seventies, a new church building, and a prosperous congregation. Rev. Rollo Ogden, who had been an associate pastor of the First Church, but who had more recently labored in Mexico, had returned to Cleveland, on account of the critical illness of his wife, a daughter of Dr. Arthur Mitchell, about the time Mr. Horton departed. He was called to the Case Avenue Church, and

was installed April 29, 1883. He was a man of high talent, but left the ministry of the Presbyterian Church, April 1, 1887. He has since been engaged in literary work, and at present is connected with a New York paper. The church then called Rev. P. E. Kipp, who was installed July 5, 1887. Mr. Kipp, like Dr. Horton, came from the Dutch Reformed Church of New York State. Mr. Kipp labored in this church until November 15, 1894, when, on account of the ill-health of Mrs. Kipp, he was compelled to seek a

milder climate. He accepted a call to the Presbyterian Church at San Diego, California, where he is at present laboring suc-

cessfully. The present pastor, Rev. Finley F. Kennedy, was called from Baltimore, Md., and was installed May 7, 1895. He is thus in the beginning of his labors in this field, which has been weakened somewhat in recent years by the tide of population eastward, and the establishment of many churches in the vicinity, but the field is one which may yet, with vigorous, consecrated work, yield rich fruitage.







and proceeded to organize themselves into a Congregational Church. The name being left to the ladies, it was finally determined that the new organization should be known as "The Trinity Congregational Church."

Being disappointed in their arrangements for a place of worship, the erection of a building was commenced Friday noon, and by Saturday night

ship. The evening of the same day, Rev. Mr. George was installed pastor of the congregation.

It was soon seen on account of the rapid growth of the congregation that a church edifice would be needed. A lot was purchased and a building committee was appointed, consisting of Mr. J. C. McWatters, Mr. G. H. Barney, Mr. Z. B. Allee, Mr. J. G. James and Mr. E. E. Bauman.

The corner-stone of the new structure was laid May 5, 1895. On the first Sabbath of the following October the congregation worshipped for the first time in the Sunday-school of the new building. was completed, furnished with gas, steam heat, beauftiully decorated and ready for worship.


At the first meeting, a call was extended to Rev. R. A. George, who was present and preached for the people on the following Sabbath, Easter, March 25, 1894.

The organization was further completed, and on April 22, one hundred and sixty-three people entered into covenant together as the charter members of Trinity church. Rev. R. A. George the same day announced his acceptance of the call to be the pastor of the new organization.

Monday, April 23 a Council of Congregational churches formally recognized and received Trinity Church into their fellow-

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

#### CUYAHOGA COUNTY PIONEERS.

#### The Old Settler's Association Organized Last Evening.

A meeting of the Old-time residents of Cuyahoga county, who are interested in the organization of "the Old Settlers' Association" was held Wednesday evening in the Probate Court room. Hon. John W. Allen presided and Mr. H. M. Addison acted as Secretary of the meeting.

After considerable discussion a constitution was adopted. The first article requires that no one shall become a member of the Association unless he has resided in Cuyahoga county for at least forty years and fixes the membership fee at \$1. The officers of the Association shall consist of a President, two Vice Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer.

The object of the association shall be to meet annually, with the view of bringing its members into more intimate social relations and collecting all such interesting facts, incidents, relics and personal reminiscenses relative to the early history and settlement of the city as may be regarded of permanent value, and transferring the same to the Western Reserve Historical Society for preservation, and for the benefit of the present and future generations.

The annual meeting of the association for the election of officers will be held on the second Monday of January of each year.
