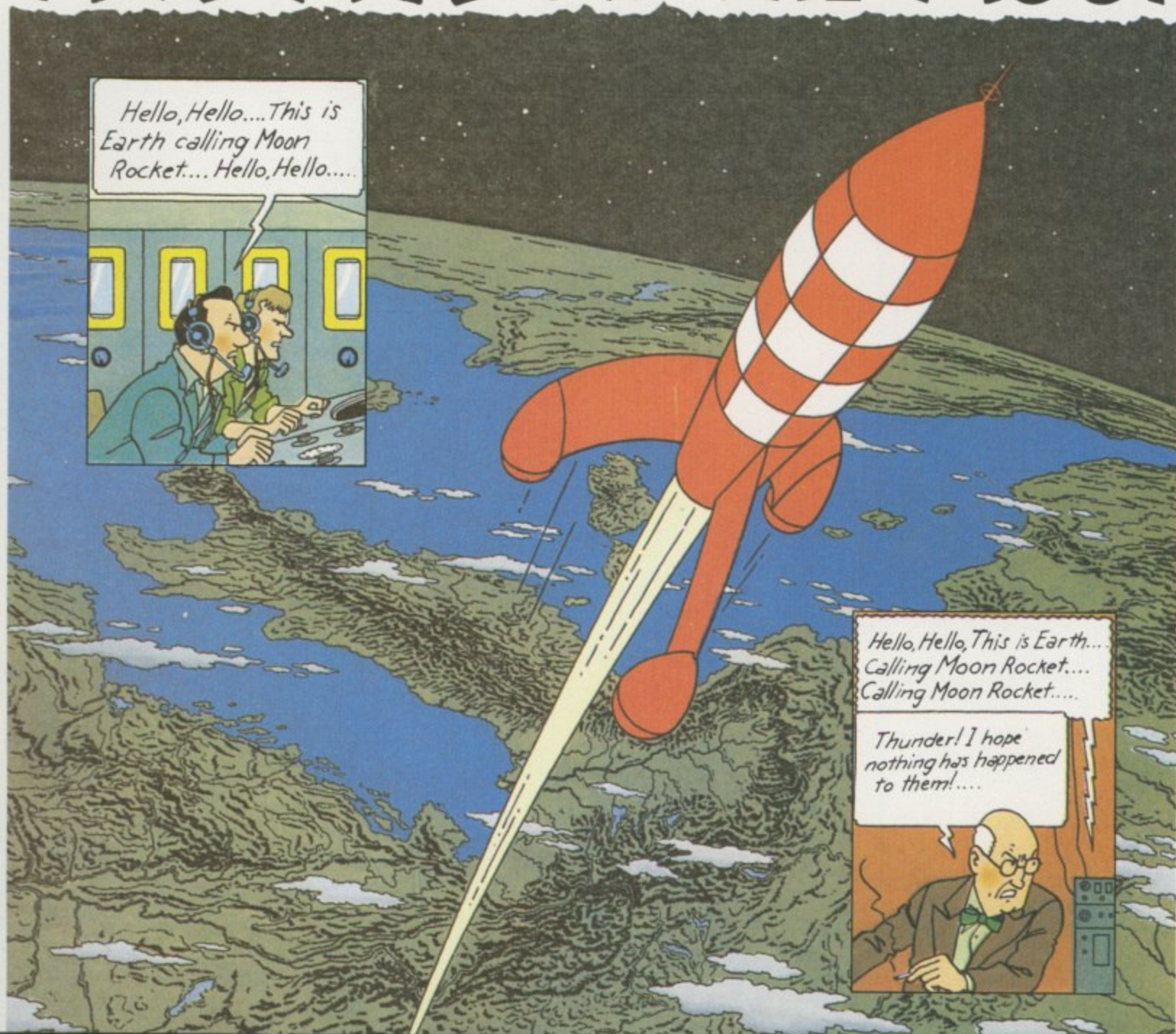



Education goes a bundle

DEMAND for Commodore's Class of the 90's education bundle featured in last month's *Amiga Computing* has been such that production has been more than trebled.

"Response has been so good that we had to expand the volume of the original bundle from 1,500 to 5,000", said Commodore's national sales manager for education, Peter Talbot.

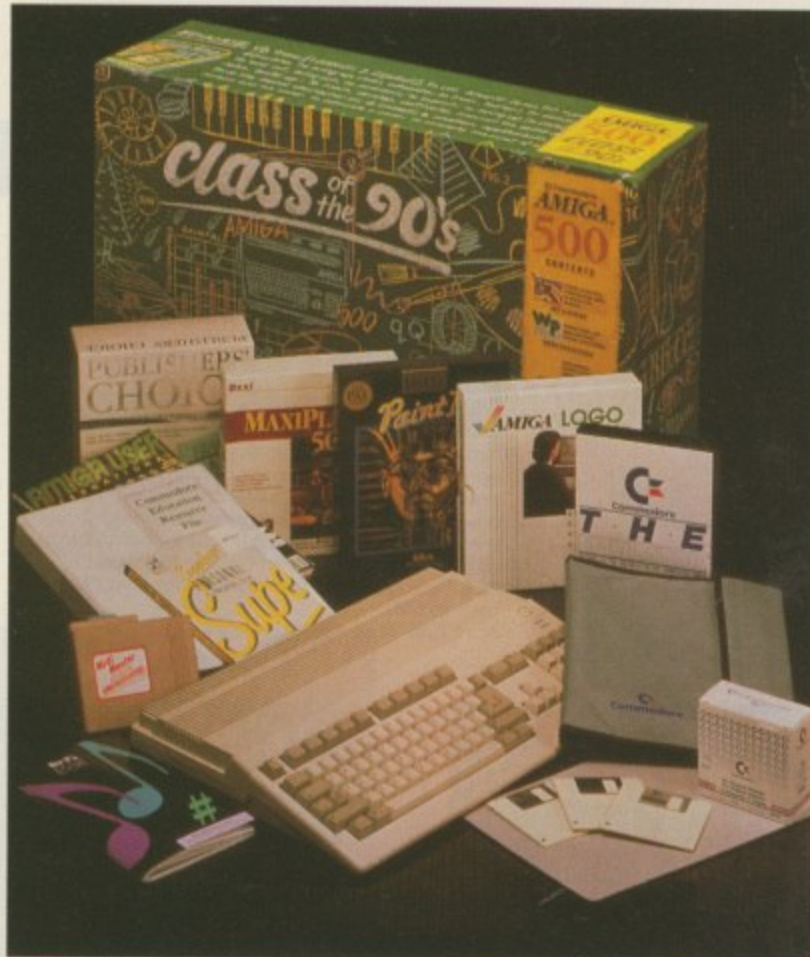
This success has brought a vote of confidence from top American software house, Dr.T's Music Software, whose Midi Recording Studio was part of the bundle – the first time an American software house has worked with Commodore UK in this way.

"I think that there are a number of ways software companies can work with the hardware manufacturers to expand the marketplace", said Dr.T. boss Al Hospers.

"We will be working closely with Commodore both in Europe and the US to expand Amiga computer sales".

Dr.T's was poised to back up its confidence in the Amiga with a number of new music products to be launched at Comdex in Las Vegas.

These were a new upgrade to its keyboard controlled sequencer now including SMPTE time code, full intuition interface and a direct link with other Dr.T. applications through its multi-program environment, Phantom SMPTE synchronizer box which allows KCS or other compatible video and music software to be synchronised with an audio or video tape and AutoMix, a computer controlled mixing panel for automated volume and controller mixes of music.



Official word out now

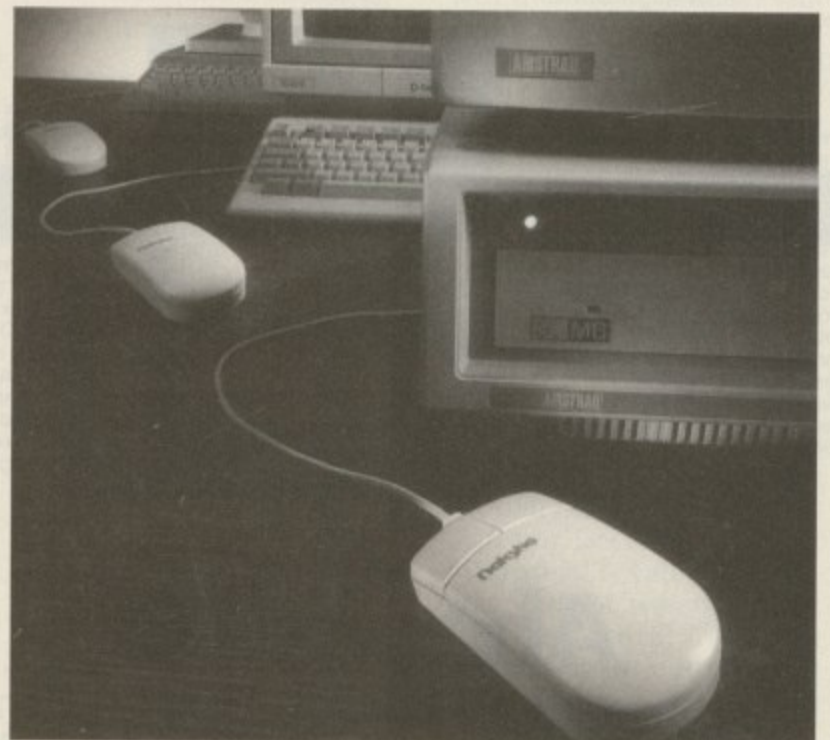
EVER since the dawn of the Amiga, Commodore has been very good at documenting the hardware and software in a way which helps developers to get the most out of the system. Unfortunately the documentation has always lagged behind the products.

Now Commodore has caught up with the hardware. The revised and updated Amiga Hardware manual, called by the techie cognoscenti "The one with the blue cover" is out now.

It is seriously techie. There is an introductory tutorial on writing safe, upwardly-compatible software directly to control the graphics, plus detailed descriptions of the copper, blitter, playfields, and sprites as well as sounds, system control and interfacing hardware.

Even if you write dangerous code you need this book. It is the Amiga pro-

grammers bible and worth every penny of the £23.95 Addison Wesley is charging. Even if the company does have a rather liberal view on exchange rates. A good technical bookshop should have it in stock, alternatively you can order from any bookshop by quoting the ISBN number 0-201-18157-6.



Roving rodent gets around

A UNIQUE three-in-one mouse has been launched by Naksha UK (0925 56398). It can be used with the Amiga, Atari ST and Amstrad PC. The Naksha Upgrade Mouse connects easily to all three machines.

Naksha UK is the recently founded specialist computer peripherals subsidiary of a Jersey company funded by a multi-million pound British electronics conglomerate. The three-in-one mouse is the result of a tie-up between Naksha and a high precision manufacturer in the Far East.

It is 100 per cent compatible with no additional drivers needed and comes complete with adaptors, mouse mat, mouse holder and a discount voucher for Electronic Arts software.

"Our market research has shown that there are an increasing number of end users who own more than one type of machine", said general manager Jay Savoor. "This is the perfect mouse either for the owners of one machine or a combination of the three most popular makes". The three-in-one mouse costs £39.99.

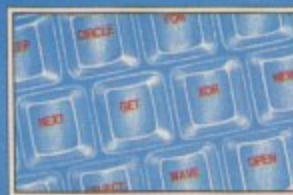

Stop thief

IF you are a software pirate you are a thief. Thieves will be prosecuted. This is the message from FAST (the Federation Against Software Theft) and ELSPA (the European Leisure Software Publishers Association).

You will see their advertisements in Amiga Computing and many local shops.

The theme of the advertising is to highlight the risk of prosecution if you are caught pirating software.

The penalties are extremely severe and include imprisonment.

Hackers will go to prison

HACKERS have taken a predictably strong stance over proposed new laws which could lead to stiff jail sentences for computer misuse. Attracting most criticism is a minor offence which could land the fun hacker with up to three months in prison.

Objectors plan to make their views known to Trade and Industry Secretary Nicholas Ridley who has invited public comment on the recent Law Commission report which recommends stiffer penalties for hacking. Despite this, it seems cer-

tain that the Government will bring in the new laws as soon as possible.

"The Commission are to be congratulated on an excellent report which sets out clearly the case for new legislation in certain areas", said Mr. Ridley. "I am inclined to accept the Commission's recommendations. The Government considers that legislation should be brought forward when a suitable opportunity arises.

"I should like to take into account the comments of all interested parties on the

detailed proposals. We will be contacting individuals and organisations known to be interested but I also want anyone with comments to write to my department as soon as possible".

Principle objections to the Law Lords' proposals are that they are too hard on the young hacker who may break into a computer for fun then be landed with a criminal record.

Widely covered in the national press, the Law Commission report suggests three new criminal offences to combat hacking. It was thought that patching up existing criminal law would not provide adequate deter-

First is a basic offence of unauthorised entry into a computer system which will apply to anyone who enters another's computer either for fun or to try and interfere with it. This will be a summary offence punishable with a maximum of three months imprisonment.

Second comes a more serious offence of unauthorised entry into a computer system with intent to commit or assist in the commission of a serious crime.

The third offence is of intentionally altering computer-held data or programs. It covers the use of worms, viruses or logic bombs and will include both attacks on a particular computer and the circulation of infected discs which could alter data. This also carries a maximum five years jail.

Key to the contents

IT is nothing new but it's certainly useful. Access Keyboards (0734 663333) has introduced another solution to the problem of altering wording on special function keys.

The clear-topped replacement keys hold appropriately printed labels which can be replaced when the function of the key is changed and do away with biro scribble on scraps of sticky paper. Prices vary with quantity from £1 each for 10 to 63p each for 100.



Now even Russia's linking up

EVEN the Iron Curtain is no barrier to MicroLink. The computer-based communications service is poised to welcome its first subscriber from the USSR.

Alexander Troukhanov has applied for details from his home in Moscow and the men in the know say there is no reason why he should not be linked up.

This underlines the truly international flavour of the new service provided for MicroLink subscribers. Once an official ID is allot-

ted, it can be used throughout the world, making MicroLink a boon for the busy traveller.

MicroLink users can take advantage of a communications network which services more than 200 metropolitan areas in America, Canada, Mexico, South America, Europe, Africa, Australia and the Asian Pacific rim. It links 20 major industrial countries with more than 175 communications processors and more than 190,000

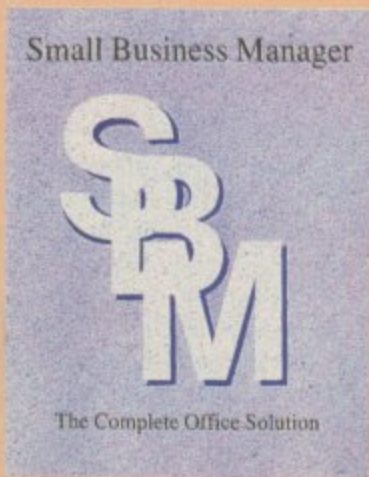
miles of dedicated circuits and satellite links.

Many of the access points now provide 300/300 up to 2400/2400 baud rate plus MNP level 5 error correction and data compression. Before its move to the Istel service in October last year only three European access points were available to MicroLink. From his flat in Moscovskaja Street, Alexander Troukhanov could soon find himself with the freedom he has always dreamed of.

YOU might have a tough time finding a Bat pack this month. Nearly 45 shopping days before Christmas Commodore announced that it had sold out of Amigas.

They won't all be neatly wrapped and hidden in a cupboard under the stairs. Or for our younger readers, sitting in Santa's grotto near the North Pole. Most of them will be in shops and warehouses waiting to be bought.

But when they have gone, all 100,000 of them, that will be it until the New Year. Commenting on the success of the bundles, David Pleasance, Commodore's man in charge of selling home computers, said: "At Commodore we set out to achieve a new standard in leisure computing by adding extra value and quality to the Amiga 500 and, for the first time, bundling - and launching - a major software title such as Batman simultaneously."

Combined with the light fantastic C64 pack, Commodore will sell £60 million worth of computers this Christmas, which



should bode well for the next set of results. Last month Commodore International announced a loss for the second quarter in a row. It looks like Commodore UK really is the jewel in the company's crown.

New Amigas launched

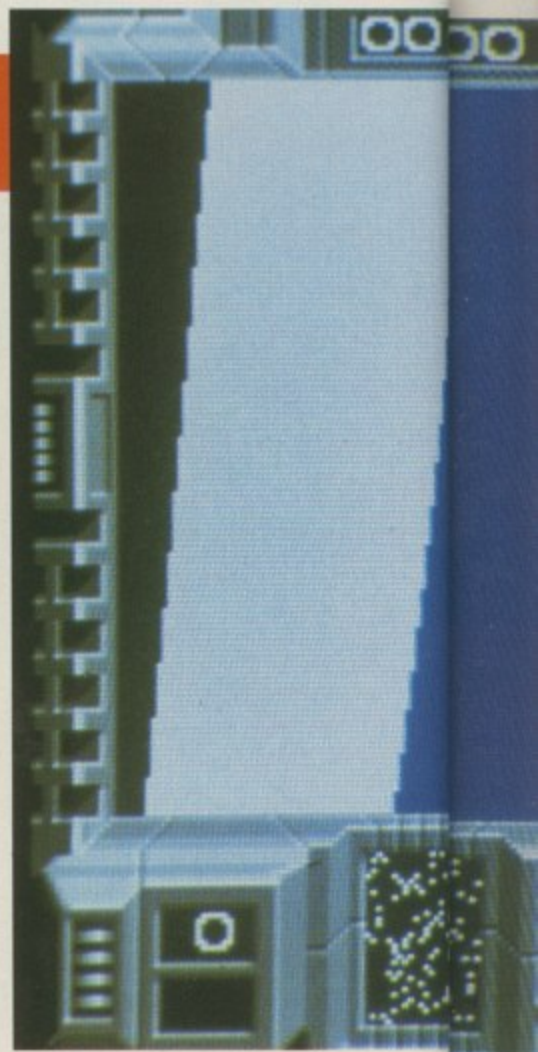
Any collision will cost energy, of which you have precious little and which can only be regained by docking with the sparse generators inside the machine.

In space you are on the menu

SO there you are, minding your own business, reading a copy of Intergalactic Playbeing, when a pod down in the cargo bay of your ship, the Mombassa Oak, breaks loose. Urk, wholesale damage. Total trashing of computer systems.

You manage to get the Oak to limp on to the mining colony, its original destination, and gratefully set down, expecting worried faces and a Sirius Slopshocker in the bar afterwards.

Hang on though, it's strangely quiet. Where is everyone? What's all this slimey stuff? What are these cocoons? And why is there a small alien scuttling down the corridor towards me? Oh no, it can't be...

But it is. And if you were too frightened to sit through Alien(s) then you better steer well clear of Xenomorph 'cos there's gonna be loads of little scuttly things and big chomping nasty beasties pouring down the corridors of the ship and the mining station, all heading for you.

Yes, that's where the staff of the mining station on Atargatis have gone - into the stomachs of the aliens, and so will you if you don't find the equipment necessary to repair the ship and take off again.

Before you do that, you better figure out whether you're going to be Sigourney Weaver or Michael Biehn by generating your vital statistics. Sex, hair, or lack of it, and even eye colour can be defined.

Having decided who you are, whether you like boys or girls or aliens, you make straight for the weapons shop to tool up for the

shoot out at the Mombassa Corral.

Stun guns and lasers, rifles and rocket launchers, grenades and mines, machine guns and even particle accelerators can be wielded wildly or stored in a 3D back pack, which is the strangest way to represent something so humble as a back pack.

Some weapons need power blocks, so make sure you store some of those as well, otherwise you'll end up using that particle accelerator as a club.

Possibly the most exciting weapon is the robo-mine, which lives to destroy. As soon as you set it off it chases after the nearest victim. Unfortunately this could be you if you don't get out of the way very quickly.

It's best used when there's a troop of Xenomorphs chasing you down a corridor and you're low on battery power. Quickly set it off, and run like hell as the sound of disintegrating aliens makes your kind of music.

While examining the contents of your goody bag, a smaller version of the main screen, which you have now obscured of course, pops up on the left side of the screen so that you can still have one eye on what's happening around you. Vigilance is everything in this game.

Once toolled up, off you set around the five level ship and the 20 level mining base. The viewpoint is 3D, but it doesn't scroll towards you, it is redrawn. It scrolls when you swivel around to look sideways though, which makes life a damn sight easier.

The ship is all hues of metallic grey, but there are these access tunnels lined with pipes running through everything, and it's down these that the sense of fear is amplified.

Just what is awaiting around the bend in the tunnel? It's a pity this isn't a two-player game, then you could get a "friend" to go first.

Because of this threat it is essential to find the motion detector as soon as possible otherwise you never know what you'll meet in the dark.

The aliens mutate, of course. Remember the pods from Alien? Remember John Hurt leaning over one as it opened? Urk! Those pods are here and you can see them split open to disgorge small larvae, or proto-morphs. These don't hang

around waiting for you to fry them - them scuttle off at a great rate of knots, looking for somewhere nice and warm to form cocoons.

Out of these the fully grown aliens slobber.

Then they come looking for you.

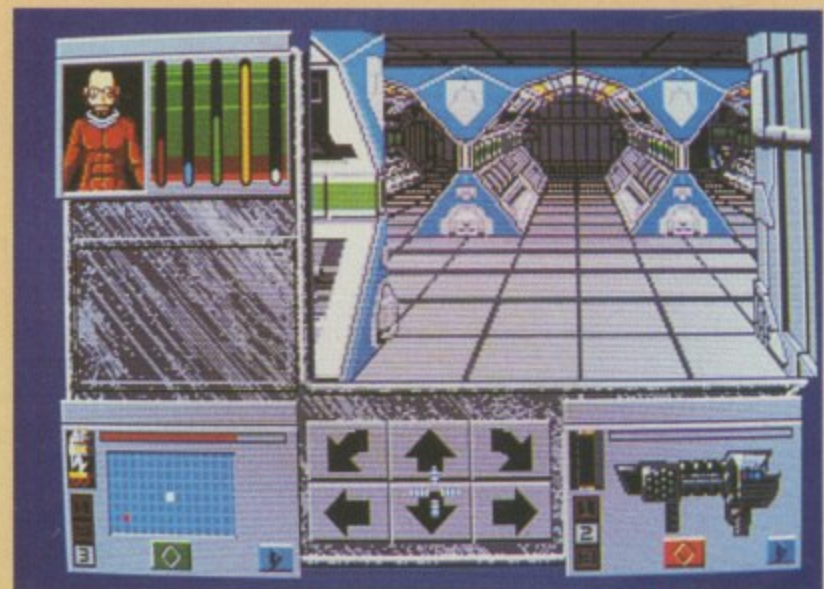

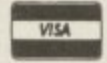

ROCK 'N' ROLL

Awopbopalooopbamboom

LIKE an epidemic that resurfaces at irregular intervals, the ball season is upon us again. You know the sort of thing – small ball versus holes, ramps and various ball-breaking devices in a quest to get to the other side.

Funny thing about this one is that it has a fairly original title. Rainbow Arts must've lost its marbles.

Anyways, the lowdown on the situation is this. You must guide your ball past various obstacles

and explore each of the 32 levels. The levels are divided up into seven continents, each with its own signature tune and particular terrain characteristics.

Graphically amazing, a lot of thought has gone into the backgrounds and the various features to enable them to be highly detailed and visually entertaining and yet prevent them from becoming confusing.

The path to enlightenment is not easy, for it is strewn with many

hazards and temptations. In some places the way is not only eight-fold, but is twisting the concepts of euclidian geometry.

Waiting for someone or something to show you the way won't do much good. But you can always look at the map, where detail will be revealed to a depth indicated by the number of eyes you have picked up.

Consequently, on the first two levels you will find as much useful information on it as on the back of

a packet of Crunchy Nut Cornflakes.

The problems are mostly logical – you come across a hole in your path so you have to fill it in. Or there is a colour-coded lock so you need the corresponding key.

Some problems are a little more obscure. You discover an unpleasant acid bath in your way and there doesn't seem to be any other route. It's probably something to do with one of those mysterious levers that are hanging around.

Further doubt is cast on the *raison d'etre* of the eggs that appear occasionally. Rolling over them smashes them, but aside from that it appears to have no other effect. Perhaps you're just an Edwina fan.

There are not eight million ways to die, merely three. You can run out of energy by being hit by explosions or energy barriers and the like, you can run out of time on certain levels or you can just fall off the world. Not everything is out to get you – magnets, fans and arrows just want to tell you were to go.

It is a bad idea to get into the habit of doing the obvious. After racing through scores of electric barriers you will find that every time you see one you will have a

Pavlovian urge to dash through it. (For further reference look out for the Little Green Man theory in my forthcoming paper on the psychological aspects of crossing the road.) Often as not there is a way round it if you are cunning.

The only thing which quells my rampant enthusiasm for Rock 'n' Roll is the apparent lack of a save option. When you've made it to level six it would be nice to be able to start off from there. Perhaps this is a move to increase the durability of the game, something I feel is not necessary because there are always things to explore.

Mouse control is excellent. As soon as I got over the initial frantic paddling stage I found that pixel perfection was possible. The way the ball animates with spots going around helps the feeling of motion, and hence the ease of control.

Sound is not quite what you may have expected from the title but is nevertheless pleasing and plentiful. Worth hooking up to the hi-fi.

Rock 'n' Roll is the best of this genre so far, possibly due to its greater dependance on brain power than mouse power. One thing is confusing me though - where are the sex and drugs?

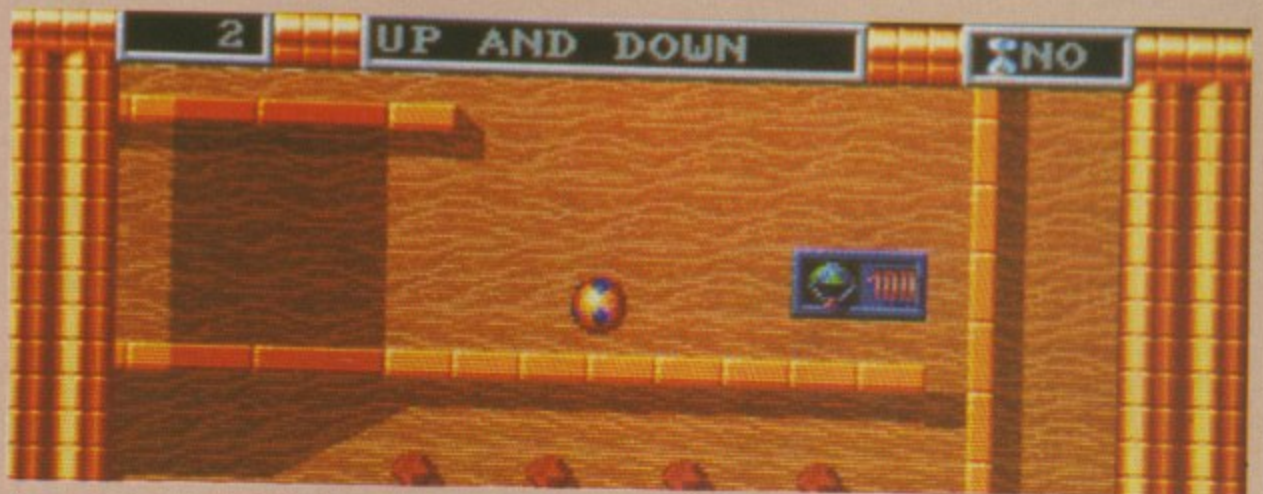

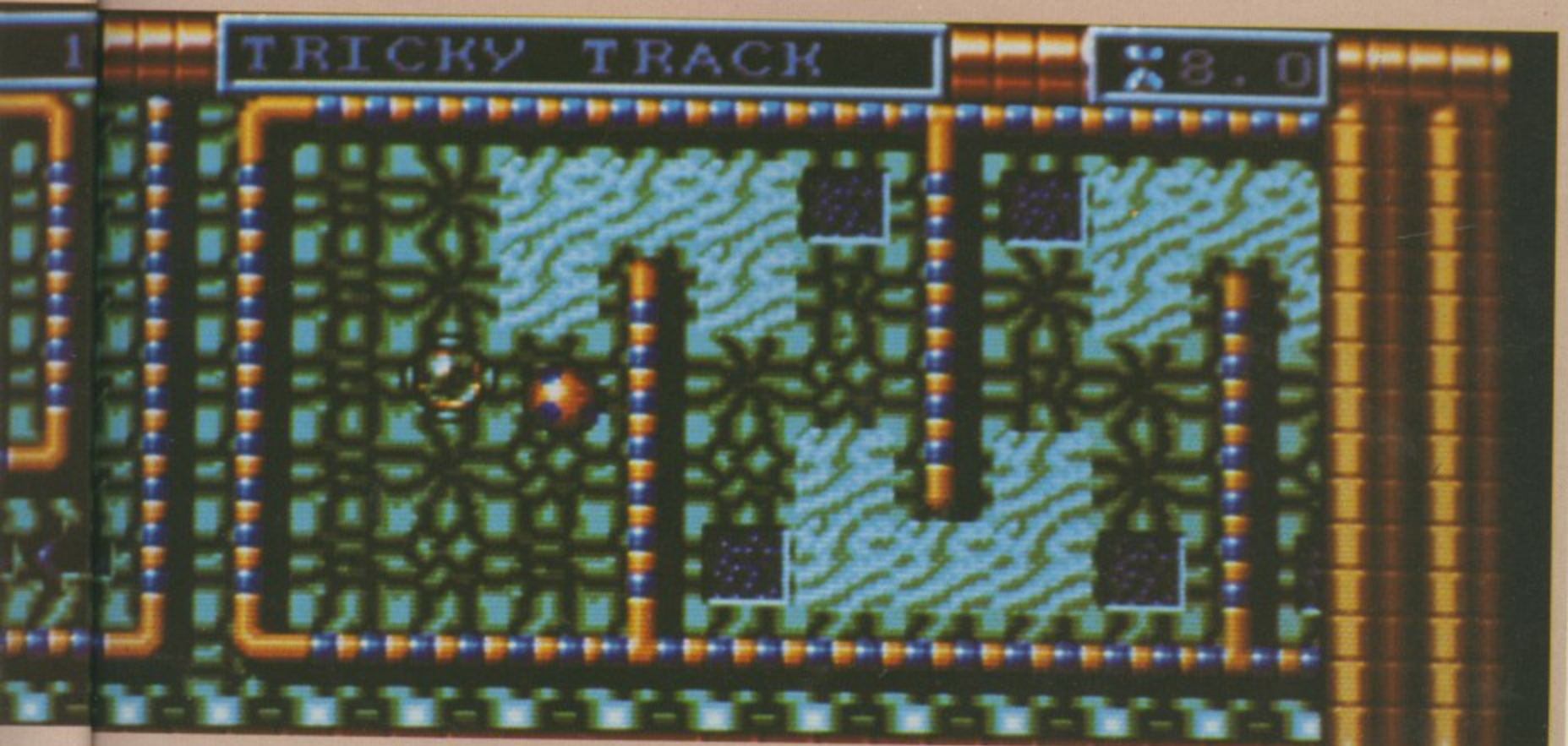

TINTIN ON THE MOON

Blistering barnacles!

HERGE's Adventures of TinTin! used to a familiar cry on children's television long before the current invasion of Japanese transforming catpeople he-man cartoons which proliferate today.

That plucky lad with the strange haircut, and shorts so outlandish that they are bound to be fashionable, had numerous adventurous goings-on with his faithful dog Snowy and other erstwhile companions.

And now, betraying his cross channel origins, that equally French software house Infogrames brings us TinTin on the Moon, a game loosely based on one of his televised epics.

No matter what you might think about French software, it is fair to assume that more than average effort has been lavished on the graphics. TinTin sur la Lune is no exception.

The opening sequence is superb, using animation and sound effects which honestly give the original TV cartoons a run for their money.

It starts with a minimalist French countdown, after which the re-decorated V2 rocket - designed by Professor Calculus and piloted by TinTin and friends - blasts off amid a blaze of pixels and some 2001-type music. The Thompson Twins appear to be absent from the crew list; they must have been at a recording session that day.

The game consists of two stages, each played five times as the ship progresses on its journey to the moon. The first stage is a three-dimensional view of the rocket hurtling through space, dodging

asteroids and collecting spheres of energy.

The energy level is important because allowing it to reach zero will end the game. This stage is easiest to play with the mouse.

The second stage, which is where the real game takes place, is a platform and ladders affair. If you used the mouse for the first stage, you must quickly look around the desk and find a joystick. It's either that or the keyboard, and *nobody* uses the keyboard these days.

The dastardly, anarchical and suicidal Colonel Boris has planted some bombs around the various cabins. As if this wasn't enough, he has started fires left, right and centre while he was at it.

TinTin rushes about the ship in a sort of breakdancing frenzy, defusing the bombs and extinguishing the fires before the ship explodes with suitably terminal consequences.

Snowy is as helpful as always, wagging his tail and going woof. Or is it bark? No matter, the dog is a waste of space and can't even climb the ladders properly. How it is going to put its little doggy spacesuit on, or where it is going to find a lamppost on the surface of the moon is never explained.

To successfully complete this stage, TinTin must deal with all the incendiary devices, as well as freeing anyone tied-up. A type of panic button is available in the form of a zero gravity switch, which causes everyone to float about, hoping Snowy doesn't have an accident.

Attacking Boris is best left to Captain Haddock, who will quite

happily knock the living daylight out of him whenever they meet.

According to the instructions, after completing the fifth stage you will "momentarily lose control" as the rocket makes its final approach to the lunar surface. I certainly did, and danced crazily around the room, shouting "Thundering Typhoons!" for several minutes.

Then the rocket starts its landing phase and you must fire the braking motors as gently as possible to conserve energy. For what does energy make? No, not the greenhouse effect, but points.

Entering your name in the hiscore table is also an out-of-this-world experience. Although your country of origin is determined at the start of the game, the keymap is still laid out for a French Azerty system. The graphics are great, the

sound is reasonable, but the big question is the gameplay. Quite simply, is there any? To be fair, there is something to do during the platform and ladders parts, but not enough to merit the asking price. Once again, it is glossy effects versus gameplay. And gameplay loses.

DAILY DOUBLE

Make mine a large one

EVER since Ug bet Zog a woolly mammoth spleen that his eohippus was faster, horse racing has been a big money business. Since it is well nigh impossible to work out which out of all the starters is going to finish, most of the big money goes from punter to bookie, not the other way, as those in the trade would have us believe as they try to hide their Mercedes AMGs.

Daily Double is an attempt to bring as many factors of the real thing on a computer without having to wade through screeds of confusing options. It uses a simplified

form of the American wager system, which is extremely similar to the British one in that it's still easy to lose.

A horse can win, place or show - that is, come in in the first one, two or three places respectively. Surprisingly enough, you don't win as much money on a horse to show than you would if you'd bet on it to place. Any bookmaker who ignored this would have a snowflake's chance in a furnace.

There are nine different betting systems, three of them being straight wagering on winning, placing or showing. An exacta is wagered over two horses in the one race; the punter must predict which will come in first and second exactly.

The game is not strictly true to

form on this point, because it makes the exacta odds the sum of the standard odds, as opposed to using a separate exacta pool. A daily double is spread over two of the day's races - the named horses must win the chosen races for a payoff. Things start to get faintly confusing when quinellas are brought in. A quinella could be described as an inexacta - two horses in one race are chosen to win or place, but which wins and which places is irrelevant. Well, maybe not quite irrelevant - the winnings on the first horse are staked against the second horse, so the odds should always be as high as possible.

A parlay is the same, but different. Two horses in any two races can be chosen to win, place or

show, and the winnings from the first are the stake on the second. As always, winnings from a showing are very much smaller than from a winning horse.

Betting is simplified by having a large form book, where all the horses' previous results are recorded. There are 80 horses and 12 jockeys, each of which perform differently according to the going.

This form book, which will need to be consulted continuously, is printed on thin paper and will become dog-eared very quickly. The form book is also the key to the game, as entry is gained by knowing a horse and jockey combination in a certain race.

Betting is a simple, icon-driven process, and the runners can be viewed for any of the afternoon's

10 races. The aim is to come away with more money than the opposition - up to three other people - after all the races have been run.

Each race consists of some fairly jerky horses juddering along a track, with the top three horses named as the race progresses. A hissy digitised voice proclaims the winner - the whole thing smacks slightly of being written in Basic and then compiled.

To the jaded gamer, Daily Double would probably elicit amused disbelief at how simple the game presentation is. But as an evening's entertainment for up to four racing fans - settle up afterwards in after dinner mints - Daily Double could provide many hours of solid playing.

DESPITE what Tengen might try to tell you, APB doesn't stand for All Points Bulletin. It is an acronym for Atrocious Plastic Box, for such is its package.

This box is cunningly designed to crease or tear the instructions while dumping the disc on the floor. It's also guaranteed not to close properly. Me and it don't see eye to eye.

Packaging notwithstanding, APB is a slightly ageing coin-op which

is still to be found lurking in university games rooms and other dens of iniquity.

Basically, you control Officer Bob in his adventures as a US traffic cop. He's fairly typical as traffic cops of the American persuasion go, in that his car runs on doughnuts and he runs on petrol. Hang on, reverse that. And spell it donut. Might as well get into the spirit of the thing.

Officer Bob's life is made a mis-

ery both by petty criminals like litterbugs and dangerous criminals like dope dealers and snipers. But worst of all, there never seem to be enough donuts out there to keep a man happy.

You gain a demerit if you do a wrongful arrest. Too many demerits and you're trash. Literally. Every day you must capture your quota of wrongdoers or face the wrath of the sergeant, who's a really nice man when you're in his good books, but isn't when you're not. It would be a very humdrum existence, just ticketing litter louts, and perhaps finding time for the odd donut or seven. That's where APBs come in.

If there's a special criminal to be caught you are told at the briefing at the start of the day - Hill Street Blues fans will warm to this - where the criminals are and what they're driving.

If you manage to find the crimi-

nals and ram them off the road you get the chance to have the rest of the day off, provided you can get a confession out of the scumballs. You do this by using the age-old police technique of "Er, he must have fell down the stairs guv", being careful that guv doesn't find out.

The actual police brutality bit is a standard left-right bash, which gave me acute friction burns off my Konix. I'm suing.

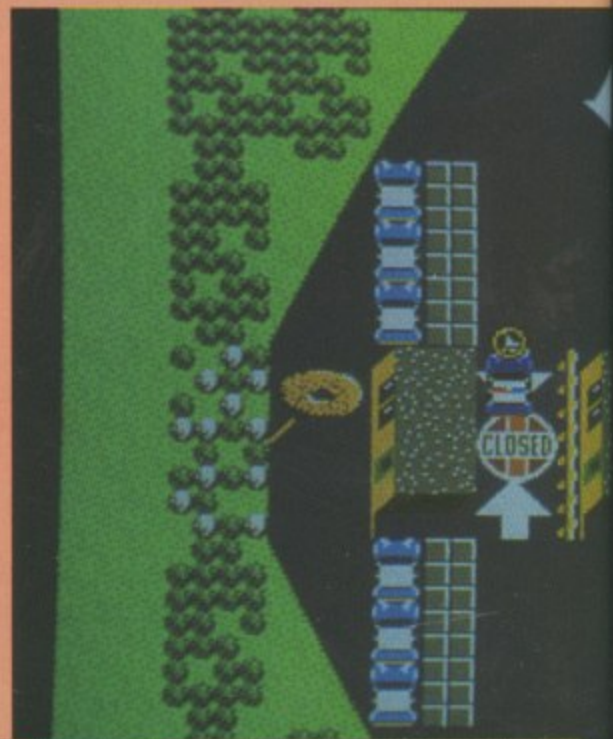

FUN versus accuracy. This is the balancing act which all the creators of the latest genre of driving simulators have to master. Power Drift and Hard Drivin' appeared in the arcades at the same time. One was fun, the other accurate.

Now I'm sure that with plenty of time behind the wheel, Hard Drivin' would be more rewarding. But at £1 a throw I couldn't afford to find out.

So I became hooked on Power Drift, with its huge screen, amazing hydraulics and "faster than the eye could follow" graphics. A machine with more *just one more go* appeal than any other.

It would be a brave man who attempted to convert such a game to a home computer. That man was ZZKJ. He'd been to the brink of technology before with Super Hang On. Now he prepared to dive into his source again. And this wasn't

ketchup. The problem with spritey games, like Outrun for instance, is that they look and feel 2D.

Solid games like Interphase feel better but need some serious processing power. And anyway, Power Drift is intrinsically sprite based.

ZZ managed to find a way to store, magnify and rotate sprites so that they appear solid. Then he calculated the relative positions in the same way as he would for a 3D game.

The upshot of all this technical mumbo jumbo is that if one car cuts a corner, slides past a tree and back on to the track to crash into the next car, the graphics all look right. And you really feel as though you've done something pretty clever.

Missing from the conversion are the rotation, including an Afterburner style roll if you crash, and a small map which shows where the other cars are. Nothing

to worry about.

The frame rate is acceptable in most places, helped by the blitter. Sometimes it slows to a crawl when there is a lot going on. The person with a Commodore processor card in his A2000 will be surprised to learn that not only does this game load, it benefits from the 68020.

It's exciting, spectacular and impressive. One of the compromises made for the sake of playability is particularly generous collision detection. But then karting is supposed to be a non-contact sport.

The game's got instant "grab the mouse and go" appeal, but also has depth. You won't do well until you learn the 27 circuits.

Master the game for a mode which puts you in control of the Afterburner jet or the Super Hang-On bike.

Me? I'm off karting for real. Let's call it research.

any time you are not on the large map page will produce a small box containing graphics of everyone currently in your party. Selecting one of these images will bring up a strip of icons of the different actions that character can perform.

The actions are the usual and fairly straightforward ones – Eat, Talk, Kill and so on – except for Charm. This can be used to worm your way into the affections of someone in order to get their help – a particularly dangerous weapon when used by Roxanna, who has a lethal pout.

Annoyingly, you are only allowed to have one saved game per disc, hardly enough to explore the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune in an adventure such as this where each turn can lead the dusty way to death.

As you might expect from the French, the graphics are superb. Not only are they very detailed and pleasing to look at, but they are displayed with imagination and variety, appearing in different shaped boxes in different areas of the screen.

It shows the thought that went into the layout. It has actually interested me sufficiently to look out for the book.

Well animated sequences appear to break up the journeys, the most impressive of which is when the

party is on foot and the foreground scrolls past the bottom of the screen.

Sounds and effects are both well crafted. Each of the seven kingdoms has its own background track designed to enhance the atmosphere of the current location. They tend to get a bit repetitive and brain destroying after a while, but then so does life.

The plot is a little thin, and solving the puzzles is about half-and-half intuition versus persistence. No incredible vulpine feats of cunning are needed to solve The Quest, but this is not necessarily a bad thing.

Overall, a well designed game which will probably appeal more to the casual adventurer than the hardened one.

SWORDS OF TWILIGHT

Obscured by the clouds

SOLSTICE is almost upon us, and as we peer through hermetically sealed windows at the ever expanding gloom perhaps we should spare a thought for the residents of Albion where the shadows last all year round and the man from Everest hasn't been seen in living memory.

The Queendom is under threat from the malevolent Shadowlord and his merciless minions, intent on destroying the sacred temples, robbing the land of magic and supporting Millwall on Saturday afternoons.

Your quest is to do something about it - nobody is quite sure what - aided by a brave band of merry men.

This is where Swords departs from the regular plot for role-playing, because from the cast of suicidal heroes you choose to direct three, not one. For this is a multi-player role-playing game.

Now you too can invite a few mates round and enjoy the quarrels, bickering and sabre-rattling that were once the exclusive domain of that breed of person who found joy in big books full of tables and even bigger dice.

Alternatively you can elect the computer to control the other two characters and play on your own. This is still not quite like a solo role-playing though because the computer will act under the personalities of the characters it is playing, so they can be just as unhelpful and prone to sulking fits as your mates.

The characters are all chosen from a field of 31, comprising champions, knights and mages. Champions are just knights who are better at knighting, whereas a mage is a generic term for a follower of one of the five brands of magic currently on the market.

Knights come in all skill levels from the belligerent Britomart at sixth level to the lowly Kodak who is still developing. Be careful in your choice though, some weapons are only effective in the hands of a complete novice.

Control is by a sort of menu affair which is activated by pressing the fire button. The options are all pretty basic, pick up and drop stuff, apart from the talk option. This is by far the most important as it handles all the interaction

between you and anyone or anything you should meet.

The computer will intuitively flavour your speech depending on how wary or friendly you are at the time. If you are suspicious, comments about your name or mission will be more guarded.

It is worth noting that other characters will react depending on how you treat them. It is quite possible to charm even the most depraved of slaving hordes by giving them little gifts and saying how pleased you are to see them.

Reputations will be built from all that you spite and everyone you fight - how you treat people can easily decide your fate.

Travel to the other kingdoms, which will be necessary to complete your quest, is via the ancients' alternative of arterial highways, the Rainbow Road. This is actually an excuse for some gratuitous colour-cycling.

The answers to your problems lie in these distant realms, but your first task is to find your way about.

The graphics are more than ade-

quate for this type of game but the painfully grinding Ring movement will have Wagner turning in his urn. It certainly isn't how George Solti used to play it.

The only real criticism of Swords could equally well be levelled at many of the games in this genre - the incessant and aimless wandering about seems to have been overdone a bit. The plot itself is complex and interesting as it unravels, but if the tedium gets to you before the ogres do, then you'll never find out.

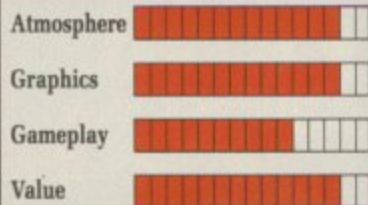
This is a brave attempt at properly reproducing the atmosphere and style of true role-playing. Although not quite perfect, it should find its way into every serious role-player's collection.

FIRE-BRIGADE

Pugh, Pugh, Barney McGrew...

ONLY on a few occasions in the history of mankind have the massed armies of two nations met head to head in pitched battle, most of these in the last century. One such occasion was the battle for Kiev in 1943.

With the defeat of the German army at Kursk during the summer offensive of 1943, the Soviet forces pressed home the advantage and pursued their enemy all the way to the Dneiper river.

Here the Germans hoped to regroup and re-equip their troops before the inevitable bombardment by the Soviets during the coming winter. Stavka, the Russian high command, had other ideas.

So the scene is set for one of the most desperate and potentially decisive engagements of World War II. Can the ruthless and famed German 42nd Korps, nicknamed the Fire-Brigade, turn the tide of the Russian offensive?

Three scenarios are provided, picking up the historical action on progressive dates throughout the winter, effectively deciding how long the game will last. Each turn is a day in game time.

Orders are given to your troops via a complicated system of icons along the bottom of the screen, the sort you have to look up in the manual every now and then to make sure you know what they mean.

Orders are given to the korp commanders, who will then organise their troops in the way they think best to achieve their objectives.

This means that a great deal of your overall strategy depends on your front line commanders, which might not be such a bad thing – after all, most of them are veterans of several years of campaigns.

On the other hand, some of them are useless. Remember, you can transfer units to other korps, so if you find a really bad commander just leave him with a couple of Baldricks and move the good troops elsewhere.

When you have finished your turn the computer will go into the 24 hour game turn. That's 24 hours in game time, not in real, lunch or Greenwich Mean time, though you may be forgiven your mistake because there doesn't seem to be much difference.

If you decide to go away and

make a cup of coffee in this game, you can afford yourself the luxury of grinding the beans, percolating it, savouring every last drop and then having another two or three cups before it's your turn to go up to bat again.

There is an option for occasional battle noise to let you know that things are still happening.

Actually, the reason it takes so long is because it insists on animating the map window, with all the units marching about and flashing and blowing up.

This would not be so bad but for the fact that the window updates are so slow, a condition which seems prevalent on games originally written for the Mac. Balance of Power springs immediately to mind.

This incredibly slow response time becomes unacceptable when it comes to giving orders. Changing the standing order for a unit? Click on its icon, wait up to five seconds while the map is redrawn with the

selected unit inverted, then select your target.

The scroll bars for seeing the rest of the map are just as annoying. Where can all this wasted time be going? Perhaps this is why the Germans lost.

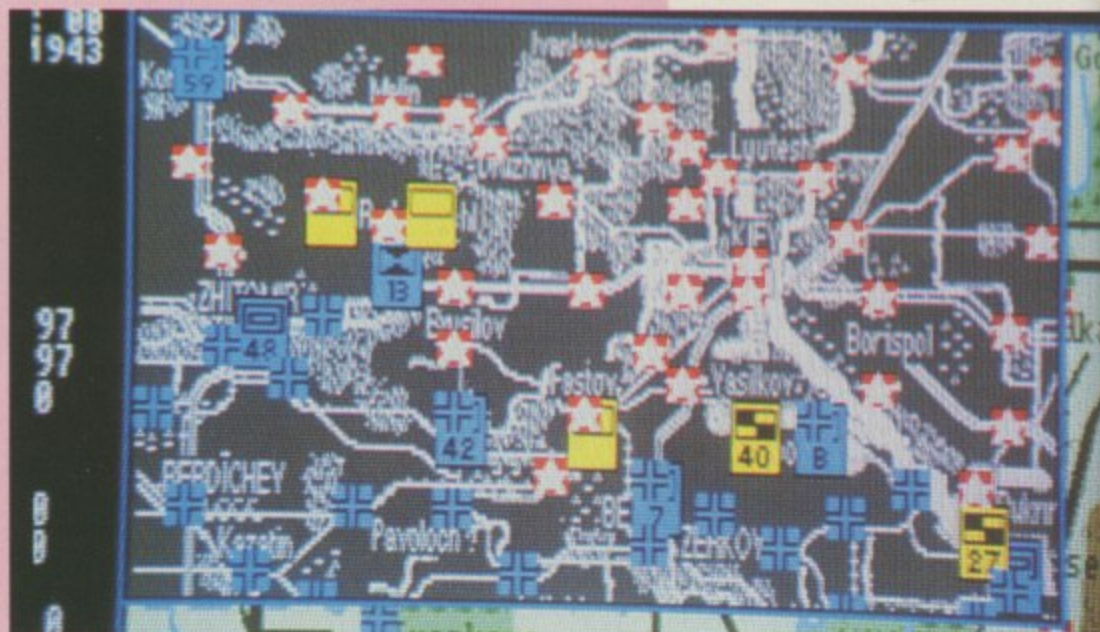
Fire Brigade needs 1 meg to run but doesn't seem to be doing much with it because in several areas it is less impressive than strategy games running on vanilla Amigas.

FACE it, reader-san, ever since you read the book, saw the TV series (again) and decapitated next door's cat with the sword, you've been wondering what it was really like to be an Englishman abroad in the newly-discovered Japans.

Wonder no more, for now Infocom has provided you with a ticket back to the 12th century as a pilot aboard a Dutch trader, the Erasmus. Times are hard – there is a religious war brewing in Europe and on the sea no one can hear you sink.

Spanish and Portuguese and English and Dutch men have been blowing each other out of the water for years now, each protecting their valuable trade routes.

Until now the Portuguese have had the Japanese sewn up by controlling the seas to the west of them, the way east being miles of uncharted ocean which only a madman would cross. Enter one madman.

Pilot of the last ship from a fleet of five, you struggle across wide seas with a pitiful crew, most of them dead, the rest dying. As you brave a fierce storm you suddenly sight land. This is where your adventure begins.

Unless you are a complete land-lubber you should find it pretty easy to salvage most of your ship plus a few of your crew if you are lucky. Capture by the Japanese is a certainty.

As a stranger in a strange land

SHOGUN

If you knew sushi like I knew sushi...

you must learn quickly or die. Your future depends on how quickly you grasp the Japanese way of things, their brutality, their strange code of honour, their odd bathing habits, and their funny curvy swords.

Progress is hampered by your total inability to speak anything even slightly approaching Japanese. A translator is on hand, but he is a Portuguese priest – your sworn enemy on both counts.

Trying to get your point of view across can be a bit difficult when your interpreter thinks you're a heretic pirate. Your overall objective may be fame and riches, but just staying alive would be all right for now.

The text of the game is surrounded by a pretty Japanese-style border, which changes as you progress through each part of the adventure.

Pictures occupy the same part of the screen as the text, and scroll away as the text wraps around them and fills the screen. This gives the impression that you are reading a book or parchment and adds considerably to the atmosphere.

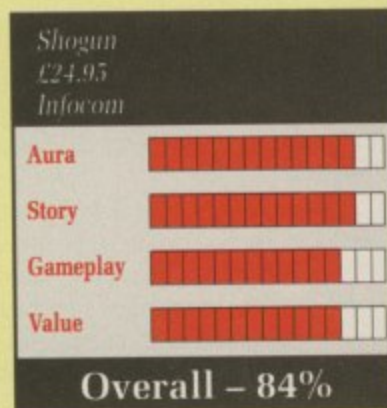
The adventure is split up into different sections or events, like scenes in a play, which must be completed before going on to the next.

At the end of each section you will be told how many points you got out of the number available for that section and your running total before being given various options – whether to continue, whether to get a hint, and so on. You've heard of modular programming? Well this is modular adventuring.

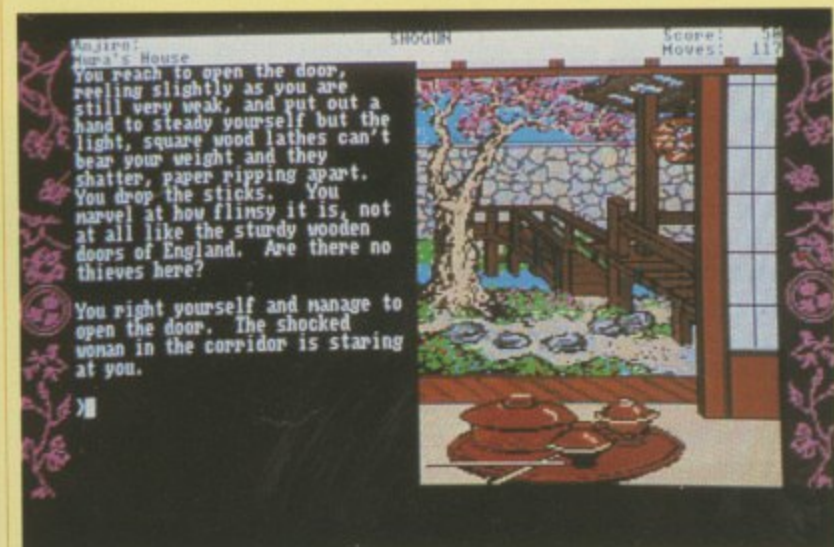
Shogun is an adventure unlike most others in that it is orientated towards solving situations rather than puzzles. That is, it is more important to think and to do than to collect lots of objects and manipulate them in some way. In this respect Shogun is, dare I say, more intellectually challenging than many of the popular adventures.

As one of the last efforts from the team that showed the world what adventures are all about, this is one to be proud of.

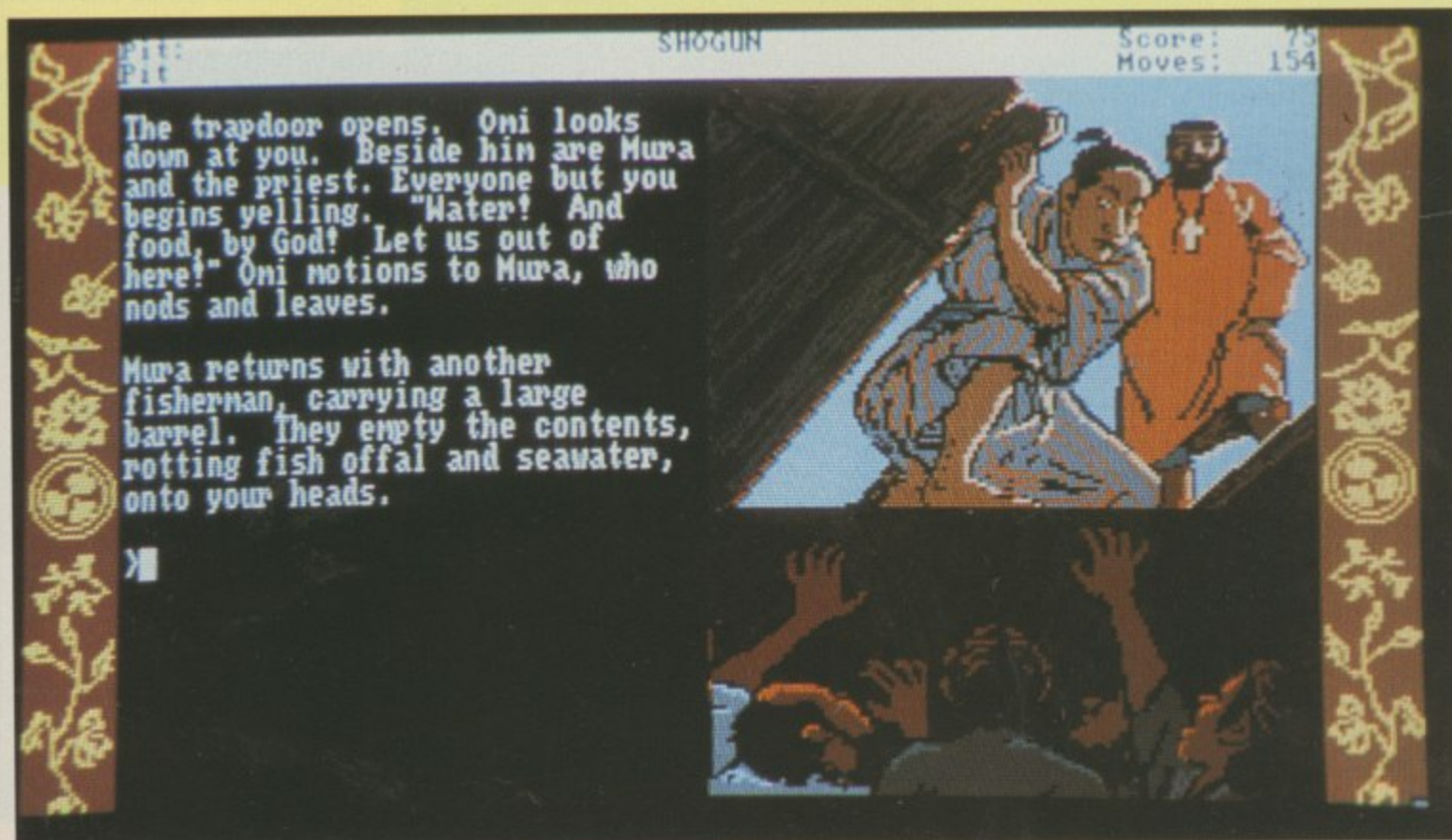

NOW *this* is what I have been waiting for. Chuck away the instructions, we won't need them. Just pop the disc in the drive and flex those wrist muscles.

A few presses of the Fire button and already the game has started. No tedious little animations or jingles here, this is serious arcade gaming. A conversion of a Sega coin-op no less, and for once the arcade feel has been carried through to the home computer.

Ah, the joys of hardware scrolling. It's been a while since there has been a serious attempt to produce a vertical scrolling road game.

This one is just the way I like them - swing a leg over your motorbike and with a squeal of Dunlops you're off, leaving only a treadmark on the gunmetal road.

Sneak up behind a few cars and open up with the cannons, riding through the explosions in search of a few more to take out. Gangs of dispatch riders can be bumped off the road, but pay special attention for the Sunday drivers doing 20 in their red Ladas.

Extra weapons are supplied by a small truck which allows you to ride up inside while the pit crew fit the extra cannons front and rear, guided missiles and a neat line in all-over body shields. The missiles

are especially useful for taking out the helicopters which buzz around dropping the occasional bomb.

Your reward for destroying all the excess traffic is to have your bike upgraded to a car. The obvious insult of having your lovely bike replaced by a cage on wheels is quickly remedied by a press on the spacebar.

Just as in real life, riding a bike has many benefits over the car, although the more cautious and uncool among you may wish to stick with four wheels and the resulting loss of manoeuvrability and acceleration.

The helicopter pilot is obviously in the British Motorcycle Association because he only attacks you when you are driving the car.

Once various little floating letters have been collected, the whole game changes. Now you're flying a jetcar over enemy territory, with cannons and bombsights to match.

The landscape scrolls smoothly underneath, with little gun emplacements and depots to bomb. Airborne mines and fighters attack, but your pitcrew has followed you into the skys flying a large Heliship for those little cosmetic changes...

Finally you cruise over a large software house, err, ocean, where



Aha! A little red flag. Yes. Erm...

the mission objective may be accomplished by destroying three U-boats which rise and fall like Amstrad's profits.

So ends the first level. With four more to go you soon wish for a *Continue?* option. But since there isn't one, you make darn sure that every life counts. Each mission features extra baddies, so there is

always something new to look forward to killing.

The Pause button is essential for background tasks such as eating, visiting the bathroom and drinking coffee, while the President gives you yet another death-defying mission to undertake. (Where is Dan Quail?)

Action Fighter manages to cram every conceivable scenario from every vertical scroller ever written into one jam-packed game.

With five multi-stage missions, it will take a long time for your wrist to recover from this one. It may look five years out of date, but it's true arcade action.

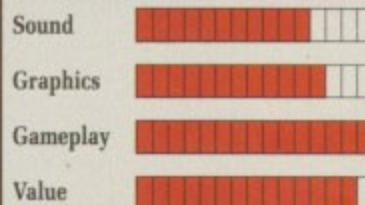

THE copywriter at Virgin must be in a very, very bad way. This poor creature, in all probability locked up in a dingy office and fed on stale chips and cold tea, has spent so long studying computer games that its gone insane.

It can now take a perfectly ordinary arcade game plot – Shoot AS, Rescue BS, for example – and turn it into a deeply moving human drama, with a few bargain basement laughs thrown in for dramatic effect.

So Shinobi, a “shoot anything, rescue children” game has been turned into a mixture of Dirty Harry and The Pied Piper.

It seems that some wayward ninja has stolen all the children from the local ninja academy and is demanding a ransom. This isn't acceptable to the good burghers (this has nothing to do with Wimpy, by the way – I did say good) and it's up to you to do the rest. Gosh.

Your initial weapon against all the bad people is a limitless supply of throwing stars; to call them shuriken is, apparently, incorrect. After you save a few children, you get to throw slightly more dangerous things.

Once per stage you can use a very tedious form of ninja magic, which takes ages to do and is really only an oriental smartbomb. Your

ninja-person says something which probably translates to something obscene or impossible, or both.

At the end of every level – each level has several stages, y'see – you get to meet The Big Baddy who is difficult to kill and will probably kill you first.

Following this, if you have managed to keep some lives, is a boring bit with bouncing ninjas and more throwing stars. It's meant to be a bonus stage, but interest-wise it's zero rated.

Look, let's get this straight – I've nothing against ninjas, not personally at any rate. I mean, I'm ready to believe they're invincible. But then again, when threatened with that metallurgical marvel that is a ninja sword, I'd be apt to

believe anything I was told.

But if I was a ninja, which I'm not, at least not consciously, I'd be somewhat annoyed by all the crappy games about the profession. It's a job, innit? Like quantity surveying, or being a turner? How many games are there like The Last Quantity Surveyor, or Bad Dudes vs Dragon Turner? None.

But even as a non-ninja (a nonja?) I'd be peeved about Shinobi. First off, the music is terrible, sounding like it's being played through a sock. Also, the poor disc drive is forced to make arcane gronks and squeaks by the loader; at first I thought it was part of the tune.

THE DISC



NULL: - a better way to die

NULL: is a new AmigaDos device. SID will run with or without Null: mounted, but it works better with it. Null: doesn't do anything brilliantly useful, it behaves just like Nil: in that you can redirect a program's output to it.

This is often useful to kill those boring and time-consuming copyright messages that clamber down the screen if you initialise a lot of PD stuff in your Startup-Sequence.

For instance, I've used this technique in the Startup-Sequence on this month's cover disc to zap the awful BlitzFonts copyright message:

```
BlitzFonts/BlitzFonts >NIL:
```

But Nil: is not a "real" device. In fact it's not a device at all - it's merely an AmigaDos convention. Null:, on the other hand, is a real device. It has a handler and it has to be mounted.

Null: is very easy to set up. After you've unarchived all the SID files you will first need to copy the file called null-handler into your L: directory. This is the L directory on your normal Workbench boot-up disc.

Next you need to add an entry to your Mountlist, which is nowhere near as daunting as it sounds.

Boot up your Workbench disc, open a Shell or CLI and type:

```
Ed Devs:Mountlist
```

You are now editing the Mountlist file from the Devs: directory on your Workbench disc. Cursor down to the bottom of the file and type in the lines shown in

SID

SID has been in development since October 1988. It underwent nine months of rigorous testing by more than a dozen people. After 26 updates, one complete rewrite, hundreds of hours of work and over 513,810 bytes of C and assembler code spread over 77 modules, SID has emerged into what Timm Martin, the author, hopes you will find is the best directory utility available for the Amiga.

I know I've certainly found it indispensable. It sits there in its shrunken mode all the time on my triple floppy, 3 meg A2000 with 20 meg hard drive (Showoff - Ed). I used to run a mixture of Disk Master and UtilMaster. But no longer.

A few things to make a note of before you start using it in anger. Firstly, SID needs an S: directory. It

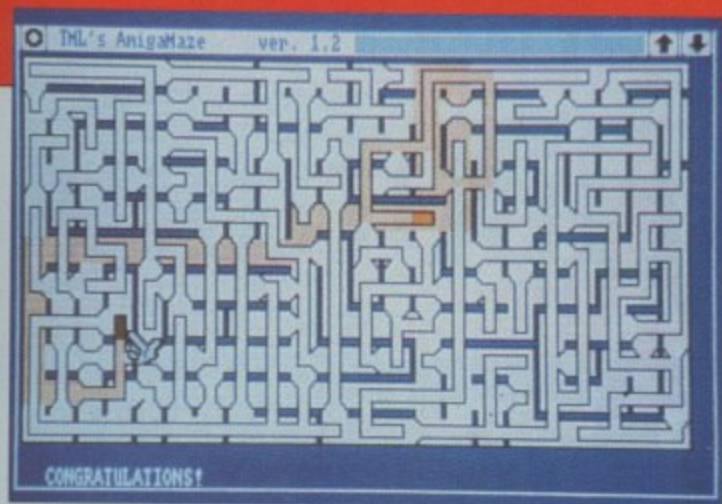
needs it because that's where it looks for SID.config, its configuration file. Therefore, the best thing to do with SID is put it in your C: directory on your boot-up disc and run it from a CLI or Shell. You can supply parameters, like so:

```
sid df0:c ram:
```

If you're not a CLI person put SID and its .info file in your boot-up root directory. Then you can double click on SID after opening the disc window. Simple.

The most difficult part of SID is its configuration. Read the Configs.Doc file thoroughly. You'll soon find that SID can be set up just the way you like it very easily indeed. It's just a question of getting the hang of how to change things. Play around. Have fun. But make a backup first!

All sorts of stuff can be run from within SID - archiving programs like Arc, Zoo and Pak, file and disc editing programs like DiskX, NewZap and Ed for instance, IFF viewers like Display or maybe Show - it's you who chooses what programs will run when you click



Maze

YOU are lost in some twisty passages, all alike. Classic words which will bring a flush of excitement to the cheeks of any adventurer. But today you won't have to make a map or examine anything.

Don't knock it. It's a neat little Workbench toy which fills a gap. It doesn't need an explanation.

Try it.

Figure 1. The # at the end is very important, it marks the end of a Mountlist entry.

When you're finished press Esc and then X and then Return. The new Mountlist will then save back to your disc.

Next we have to alter your Workbench disc's Startup-Sequence so that it mounts the new device. When you've got your CLI or Shell back, type:

```
Ed S:Startup-Sequence
```

If you've got a section where lots of other devices are mounted, like Pipe: and Speak:, then tag:

```
Mount NULL:
```

on to the end of the list. Otherwise enter it just before LoadWB. Press Esc-X and Return to save the new Startup-Sequence and exit from Ed.

Now next time you boot from that disc the Null: device will be mounted. After that, use it from AmigaDos just as you would Nil:

Unarchiving SID

SID and its accompanying files are so large that I felt it best to archive everything into one file. This has the added advantage that it takes up only half the room the unarchived version would have done.

I've written a script file that will unarchive everything automatically on to a blank disc for you. Well, it

doesn't have to be completely blank. As long as there's at least 300k of space there, SID will fit. After last month's successful attempt at an automatic script with Workbench 1.3.2, I feel confident that I'm on to a winner here.

It all works with DF0: and RAM: - no need for second drives or extra memory - and there's only one disc swap, not counting the request to replace CD006 when it's all over.

If you're running an unexpanded A500, you may be flying a bit close to the wind. I've tested it and it works every time, but I wouldn't try multi-tasking, the script will almost certainly bomb out with a rude message.

Now if this does happen to you it is very, very, very important that you don't ring me up and complain. It is not my fault and I will only get upset and throw things at Green.

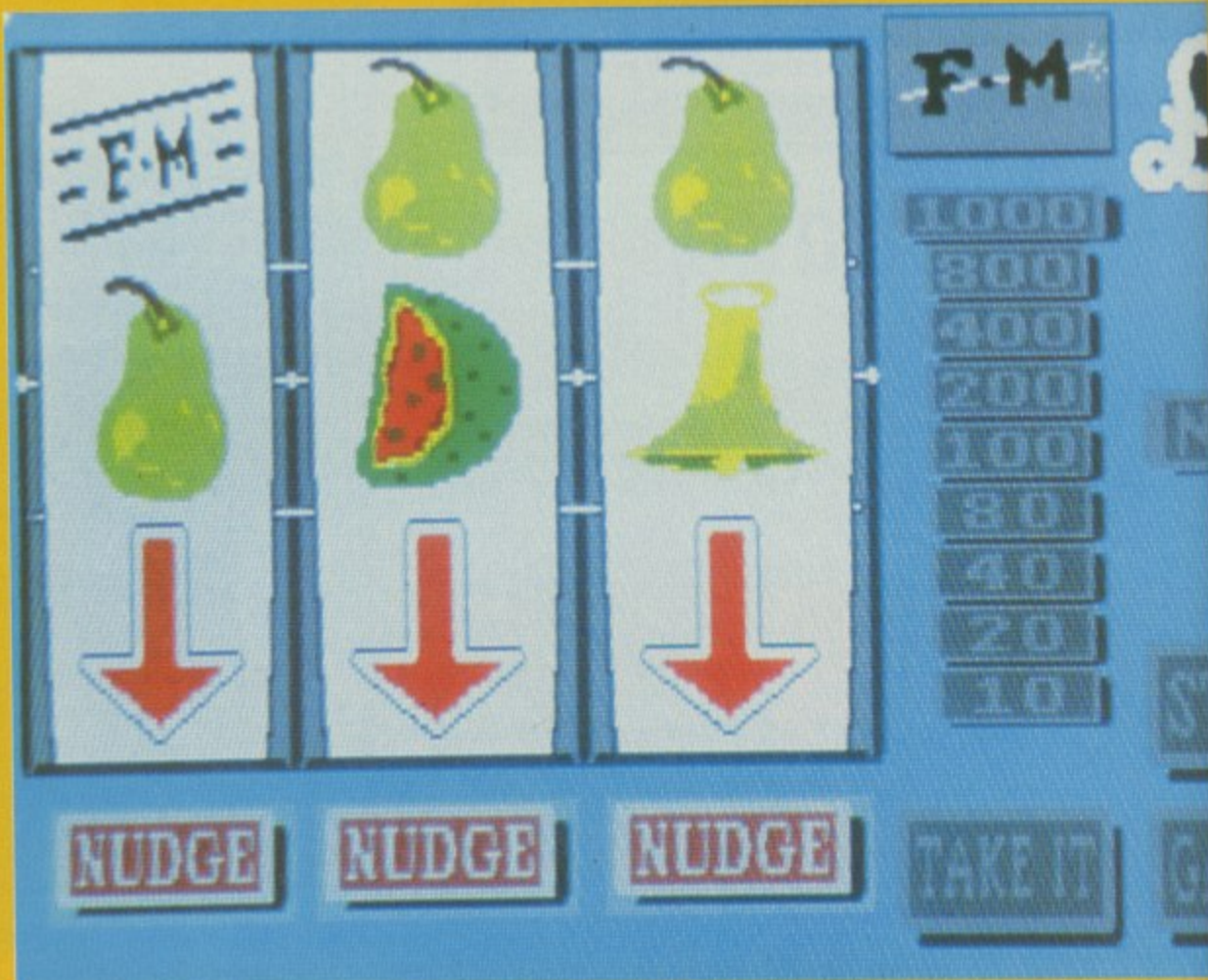
The real fault - surprise, surprise - lies with AmigaBasic. There is a bug in it which seems to let the system get ahead of itself at times.

Budget Banzai



The capitalist ethic of competition over in Japan results in better, cheaper printers over here. Duncan Evans looks at the results

BEWARE the Jap attack. Epson, once the premier printer provider that set standards others were proud to measure up to, is under attack from Citizen and Star. The Eastern front is the race to produce a low cost 24 pin printer. At the 11th hour Epson has replied with new 9 and 24 pin machines.

The Epson LQ-400 retails at the very low price of £345 before your friendly dealer applies the usually substantial discount. This alone makes it something special.

The LQ-400 is no Tardis. Measuring 13.9cm by 39cm by 32cm, it looks quite flat, even with the single sheet feeder attached. But it gets bigger on the outside when the tractor feed and its monstrous cover are fitted. This transparent carbuncle makes the whole thing look like a greenhouse designed by aliens. Still, aside from that, the LQ does at least look like it might do the job asked of it.

Lifting the lid reveals Epson's folly and the extent of the cost cutting.

There's no bail bar, just a ridge leering down from the underside of the cover.

Unfortunately it doesn't leer far enough, so when the auto load – a misnomer as you have to press a button unlike Citizen's Swift-24 – winds the paper on, the guiding ridge is still out of reach and the paper is held to the platen only by the print head. Unless you remember to throw in a few line feeds there's a good chance of the paper fouling. Cheap in the derogatory sense.

This is a heavy baby. Thanks to the copious metal shielding inside the case, the printer weighs in at 7kg.

Typestyles include double strike, emphasised, italics, shadow, outline, double width, condensed, double

height, underlined, strike through and overline. Print quality is fairly good, though not quite as good as the Swift-24, with characters consisting of a 9 by 23 dot matrix in draft mode and 29 by 23 dot matrix in the NLQ modes. However, the print speeds will hardly set the paper on fire, as can be seen from Figure I. Printing doesn't have to be limited to 10 or 12 cpi, it can also be 15 cpi or proportional.

The LQ-400 pauses for thought between printing lines. This overhead means that while the draft speed of 150 cps at 10cpi is particularly disappointing, the NLQ speed of 50 cps is acceptable.

Unlike many competitors, the LQ-400 prints in black only, there being no colour kit options. In fact the only other accessory beside the font cards is a single bin cut sheet feeder. A printer buffer of greater size than the 8k one built in will have to come from a third party supplier. The merely adequate buffer can be switched to 1k

only by using the DIP switches if required, though why you'd want to is anyone's guess.

With the Epson LQ-400 being a new printer there won't be any drivers to support it just yet.

I tested the printer out with the KindWords word processor which uses Workbench 1.3 and the new printer drivers. This was fairly unsatisfactory, producing spurious characters. Scribble wasn't much better, and of the programs I tested only Pagesetter, the DTP package, showed a desire to cooperate fully.

If the software allows you to define your own drivers there should be few problems as the manual gives a guide as to all the codes involved in setting one up. It also lists the LQ's printer codes to enable direct programming.

Remember, AmigaBasic filters out

Knowledge of fonts

USERS who don't bite their fingernails can get to a cut away section which holds the slot for extra fonts cards. Epson offers quite a range, including Courier, Prestige, Script, OCR-B and Multi-font. But at £50 each you are not likely to want to shell out for too many.

Built into the LQ-400 are Epson Roman, Sans Serif and a draft

version of Roman.

Fonts are selected from the three button control panel on the top of the printer, which uses a series of lights to indicate which is being used. Unlike the 9 pin version of this printer, the LX-400, it isn't possible to access the various typestyles except by using the DIP switches on the back or under software control.

ESC codes with LPRINT, so you will have to open a channel. The printer's manual isn't chock-a-block with information mind you, but at least it is written in English.

The Epson LQ-400 is one of the cheapest 24 pin printers and will undoubtedly be discounted. A quick

call around some discounters showed that it should be easy to save £100. It offers a reasonably good NLQ print quality and speed, but a poor draft performance.

The two fonts are nice, and there is the option to buy extra ones. It isn't as sophisticated as other 24 pin printers, but then it is cheaper.

If you can live with the single sheet feeding problems, only have a limited budget, and yet must have the extra quality of 24 pin printing, then the LQ-400 will be good value for money.

Output is good if a little streaky

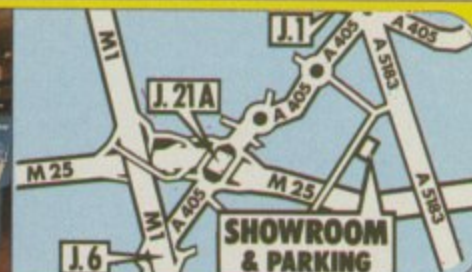

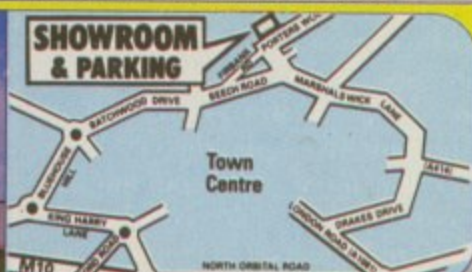

DENISE makes wonderful music. She is the sound chip, but without an external amplifier of sorts you will be unable to hear a single thing.

Users lucky enough to have a stereo monitor (yes, Green, very good, you can put your hand down now) will know the benefits of playing Led Storm in full stereo. The remainder of us can either hum to ourselves or fashion a cunning lead to connect the Amiga to the nearest hi-fi.

Once the computer is wired into the AUX/CD connection of your hi-fi you too can experience the full earth-shattering excitement of being attacked by missiles while playing Falcon.

Of course, to connect your Amiga to a hi-fi you need to have a hi-fi nearby.

If you don't own a suitable music system (shame on you - how can you listen to Pink Floyd?) you are stuck. Until today, that is. For now Green and I proudly present the Amiga Computing Stereo Amplifier Project, a small box which provides two watts of sound - twice that of the Commodore stereo monitor (so hah! Green).

The two watt amplifier is housed in a small box which connects directly to the back of your computer and to a set of small speakers, such as those supplied with a car stereo. (Please remember to ask permission before ripping the speakers out of the nearest car.) The unit can either be powered by a PP3 9 volt battery for total portability, or run from a suitable cheap mains unit.

Admittedly the total portability part is a bit of a con because you will still need to plug in the computer and monitor, but it sounds good. Total cost will be approximately 15 of your Earth pounds. The only snag is that you have to build it yourself. (But I am sure that if you were to send Green 50 quid he will build one for you.)

The recent advances in integrated circuit technology have not only made your incredibly powerful computer possible, but have made life a whole lot simpler for lazy electronic enthusiasts such as Green and myself.

complicated task. All that is needed is some basic soldering skills, a strong desire to burn yourself and a free evening.

It should be noted that unless you try extremely hard indeed it would be impossible to damage the computer by plugging in this amplifier. Of course, if you do manage to destroy your computer – and believe me I'd have to see some pretty conclusive proof before I'd believe it possible – neither myself, Green nor *Amiga Computing* can be held responsible. In fact, there are few very responsible people here at all.

First get all the bits and pieces together and check that they are of the correct value (*A seemingly simple task which you totally failed to accomplish* – Green). All the parts

are easily obtainable from a mail order company such as Maplins or Watford Electronics.

Most electronic magazines will carry advertisements for such companies, so it's only a matter of nipping down to the local newsagent with a pen and paper. You could even buy a magazine if you didn't want to attract undue attention.

The parts list contains all the order codes for Maplins which is a reliable, friendly and efficient supplier.

Once you are sure that you have everything scattered all over the kitchen table you may start. First cut the strip-board to the correct size. It should be at least 24 holes by 24 strips, and small enough to put into

In the past, constructing an amplifier meant soldering lots and lots of transistors and things together. These days a single chip does all the hard work (except the soldering). All we have to do is put some resistors and capacitors around it to keep it company, give it nine volts and turn the volume up. Isn't modern technology wonderful?

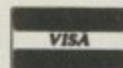

the plastic case you bought to house the unit.

Cutting the circuit board can be done either using a hacksaw or scoring it with a sharp knife and snapping it. The tracks to be broken should then be drilled or scraped away thoroughly.

It is, of course, a lot easier to cut the tracks at a hole in the board – a sharp craft knife should do the trick nicely. Examine the cuts very carefully and make sure that not even the tiniest contact remains.

It is a good idea to check now that the cuts are in exactly the right places, as mistakes can easily be corrected at

this stage but become horrific and possibly expensive when you have already started soldering the components.

Now switch on the soldering iron. Soldering is a skill that takes little time to pick up, but a lot of practice to do well. However, doing it well is not necessarily essential; it just makes things easier.

Solder the IC socket into place, as this provides a useful reference point for all the other components. Next put in the wire connections. Only strip the very ends of the wire and leave the rest of the plastic sleeving on to avoid the possibility of short circuits.

The resistors can then be soldered into place. They do not mind which

way they are connected, unlike the capacitors, which are next. These usually have a dark stripe with a white minus sign drawn down one side. The leg nearest this stripe can safely be taken to be the negative (-) side. In our circuit the negative side of the capacitors is always connected either to ground or to the loudspeakers.

The components used in this project are not very susceptible to thermal damage so don't worry too much about how long you spend soldering them. This was the main reason for putting the chip in a socket – you never have to solder it directly.

Once all the components have been soldered in place, cut some short lengths of wire and connect up the phono sockets, jack sockets and potentiometer. Remember to tin the wire before soldering to the main board by getting a blob of solder on the end of the iron and dipping the wire in to coat it. Try to avoid the cat when you shake the excess on to the lino.

The battery clip and switch

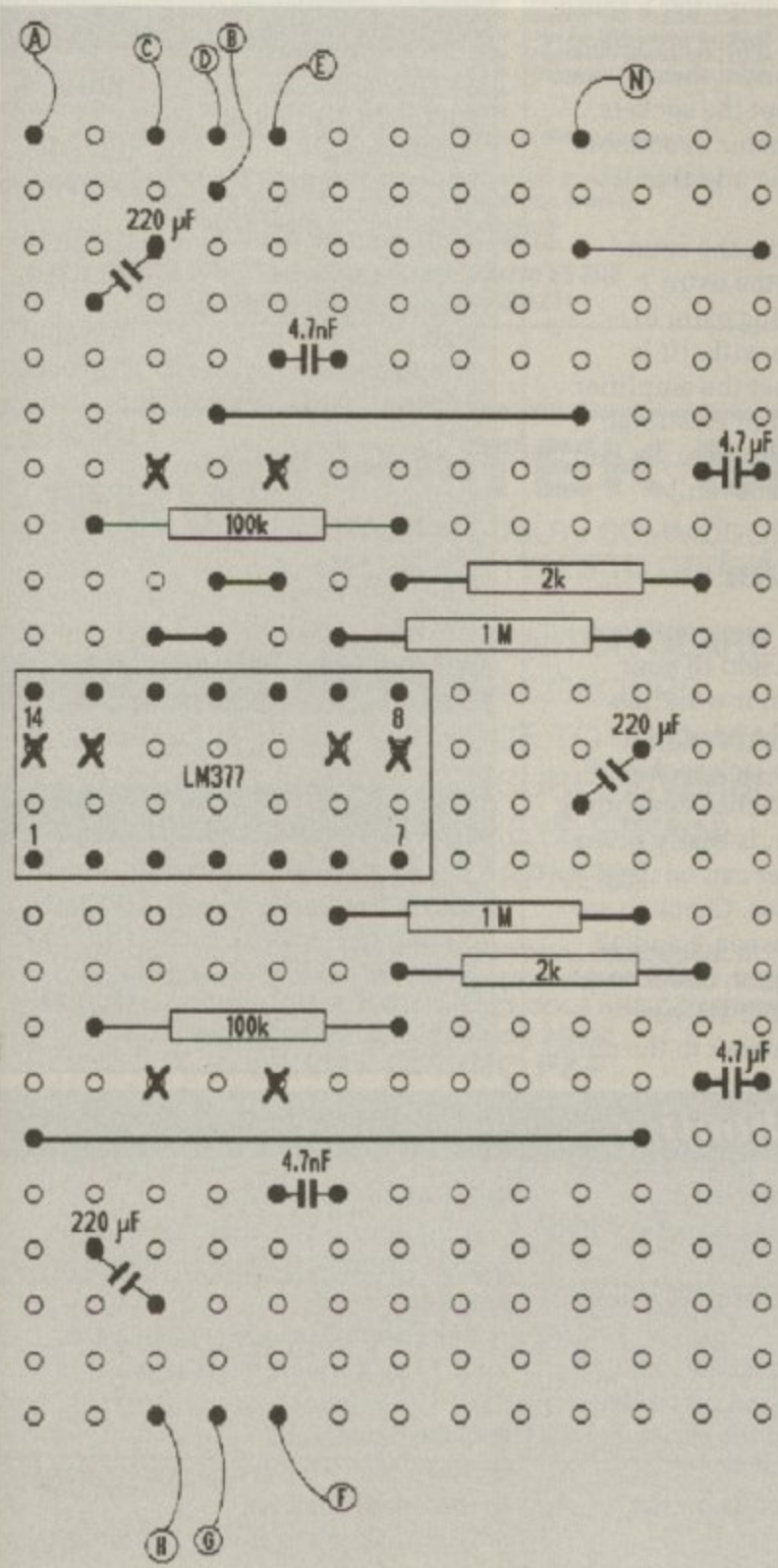


Figure I: Vero board layout – the copper tracks run vertically. X indicates a cut in the track

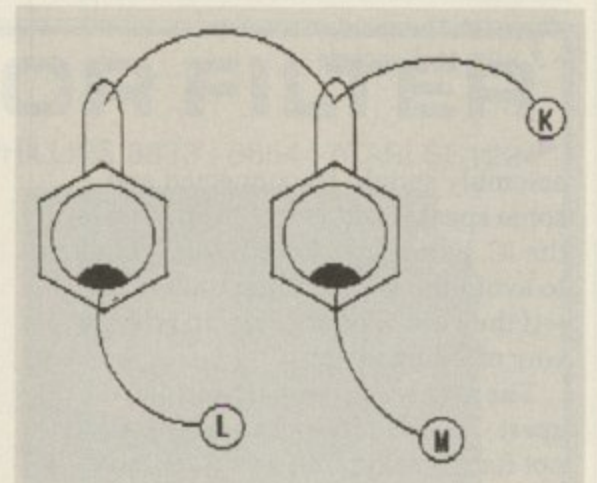


Figure II: Phone inputs sockets

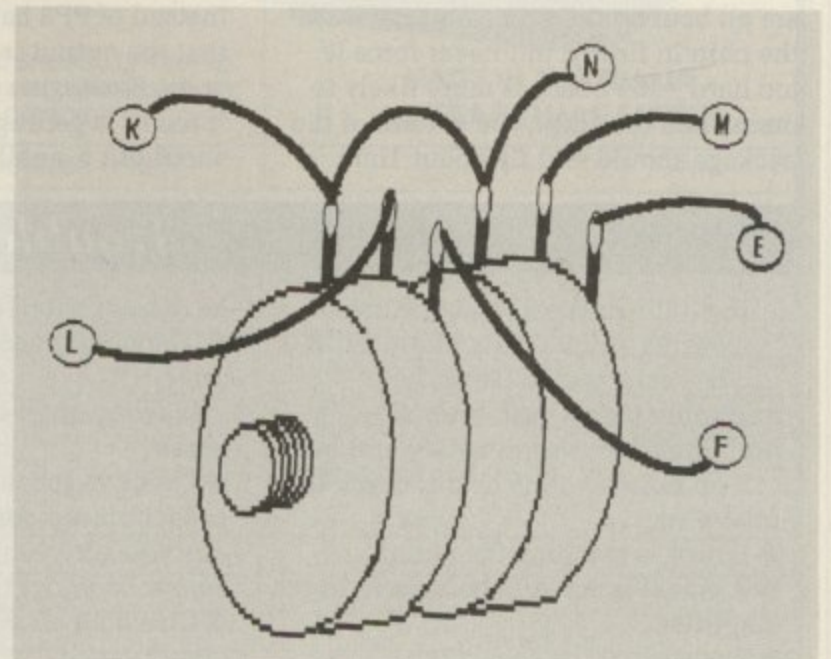


Figure III: The volume control

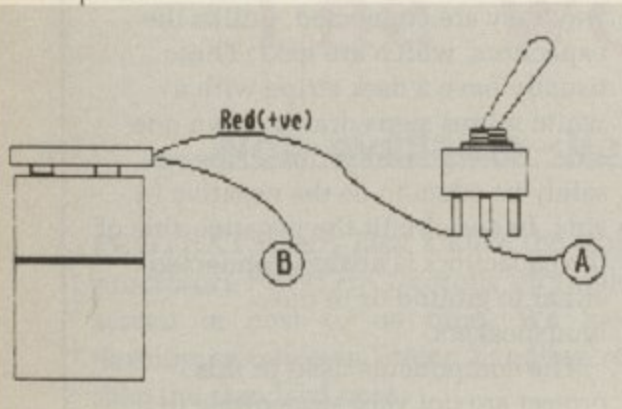


Figure IV: The battery and switch

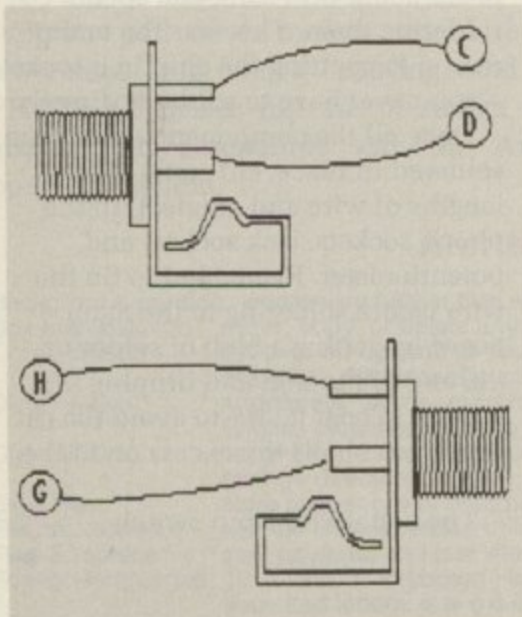


Figure V: The speaker outputs - 3.5mm jack sockets

assembly should be connected and some speakers attached. Next plug in the IC. Extra care should be taken here to avoid the legs bending underneath - if they break off there is no reliable way of fixing them.

The legs are usually quite splayed apart - useful for direct soldering but not for insertion into a socket. Bend them on a flat surface to ensure they are all bent by the same amount. Push the chip in firmly, but never force it too hard - the board is more likely to break than the chip. The bottom of the package should end up about 1mm

clear of the socket.

Turn the volume control to low or halfway and connect the battery. Flick the switch a couple of times. If all goes well you should be able to hear a slight hiss, the volume of which is controlled by the knob. If you hear a howling or whistling sound switch off and check the circuit carefully (see trouble shooting).

Assuming everything is functioning normally, switch off again and connect the computer. Boot up some good music, such as the cover disc demo. Switch on the amplifier and boogie on down!

Finishing touches

SMALL plastic boxes give your lovingly constructed amplifier a sense of importance. These boxes are cheap - usually about a pound a throw - and can be drilled to accept the sockets, switch and potentiometer. A suitable knob and some leterset add that professional finish.

Remember to number the sound level from 1 to 11, as the extra 1 provides that something extra to annoy the neighbours with. (It is extremely unlikely that the amplifier will actually be heard in Australia, but we must do something to get our own back on Jason Donovan.)

Deluxe model

GREEN has designed some optional extras which you can add to your amplifier once you get it working. Simplest is a socket for personal headphones. A stereo jack socket of either 3.5mm or 1/4 inches depending on headphone design, is easily fitted.

A mains transformer can be used instead of PP3 batteries. Check to see that the output is between 9 and 12 volts. If using an adaptor, check to see if the IC is getting hot. If so, you should fit a small heatsink to the chip.

Trouble shooting

THE circuit and construction are reasonably simple. Any likely faults can be easily traced using the minimum of test gear, a small multimeter or even a battery and bulb.

If no noise at all is heard, check the following:

- Power is reaching the circuit.
- A signal is actually being sent to the amplifier.
- Ensure that the speakers

have been wired up properly.

- The potentiometer is correctly wired up.

If a very quiet and distorted sound is heard:

- Check to see if the resistors and capacitors are positioned correctly. Are you sure you read the resistor colour code right?
- Check for short circuits on the circuit board.

Forty meg takeaway

WHEN I grew out of short trousers and old enough to be told the evils of the world, Mrs Tyler, my computer science teacher, let me in on the secret of computer jargon. I'll share it with you.

Everything has three names: The British name, the American name and the IBM name. While IBM hasn't declared UDI yet, it is a xenophobic, autocratic state.

The peripheral most Amiga owners lust after is a hard disc, which some call a fixed disc and to which IBM have attributed the name Winchester because that is where it was invented. Seeing as they did the inventing I suppose they can call it what they like, but the other names are more meaningful.

The "hard" part of the name means that unlike a floppy the magnetic coating is spread over a solid disc. The heads which read and write to the disc don't touch the surface, as they do on a floppy, but float less than a hair's breath above using the effect of magnetism to transfer the data.

A hard disc spins very much faster than a floppy and has a larger diameter, meaning data can be packed more closely together resulting in much higher storage capacity. The result is that data can be read and written much faster.

Simon Rockman discovers that 20 minutes after playing with one hard disc you want another one

The name "fixed" reflects the fact that hard discs cannot usually be removed; they stay fixed inside the machine, which means that when the disc is full you have to delete something to make room for more. Since 5 meg and 10 meg systems are rare, you usually have at least 20 meg to play with. The Amiga can cope with more storage capacity than most people can afford.

ONE of the reasons a fixed disc is fixed is because it works in a partial vacuum. The disc and the read/write heads live in a clean atmosphere, safe from all the nasty things which could damage their fragile co-existence. Things like particles of cigarette smoke and dust.

Panther Peripherals is importing the Syquest disc, which is hard, but not fixed - it's a *removable* hard disc (RHD). This offers the speed and capacity of a normal hard drive, but when it is full you just slot in another

cartridge. And with 45 megs on tap you would only need a few RHDs to hold the entire Fred Fish collection. The best of all worlds?

Well yes, but because the disc needs to be slotted in and out, the drive cannot be a sealed unit. This leaves room for microscopic nasties to creep in. There is also the standard problem with Amiga hard discs: Price. The unit I tested with cables and one cartridge sells for £1374.25.

The expense doesn't end there. It needs a SCSI (pronounced scuzzy) interface. There are several for the A2000, but only one for the A500. Such a device will set you back about £200. Extra RHD cartridges cost a further £99.

But at least after having laid out all that money the thing is simple to install. It was supplied for review with a floppy boot disc, although it will autoboot under 1.3. The provisional documentation contained all the facts about altering your Mountlist and Startup-Sequence to include the new peripheral. You'll have to be au fait with the chants needed to get a hard drive running, but all the basic info is there.

Unless the cartridge is in the drive the system will not boot, something I found a little hard to handle after

being brainwashed into removing floppies before powering on and off. The cartridges, like floppies, can be write protected – an insurance against virus paranoia, but not much use on this kind of medium.

The great advantage of a hard disc is speed. And one of the great failings of the Amiga is slow floppies. Copying a 1.6 meg file from one area of the RHD to another using Workbench 1.3's fast filing system took 190 seconds. This may not look too impressive compared to data transfer rates quoted on a manufacturer's spec sheet, but it is sensibly fast.

When you walk along the Amiga upgrade path a monitor improves the results, a second drive makes the machine easier to use and extra ram means you can do more, but a hard drive transforms your Amiga, being the ultimate peripheral in many users' eyes – really worth saving for.

And while I'd advise anyone to pawn their football boots or sell their younger brother to slave traders to

buy a hard drive, I'm not so sure I'd recommend this particular one. Firstly it is twice the price of its rivals. Secondly, it went wrong.

While copying a large file it produced a read/write error. This error grew until the unit failed to boot. While you can throw away the odd duff 3.5in disc, a £99 cartridge is not something you want to give to the men who spread old newspapers over the garden path every Wednesday.

BESIDES, backing up on to 50 floppies before you bin the cartridge is more boring than your average BBC computer programme. The ideal situation is to have two RHD drives and use one as a backup, but you would have to be a really heavy user to justify that kind of expense.

The system is worth looking at if you do a lot of video work and have large .anim files to save, or if you want to hold a library of shapes for Sculpt 3D.

But for the majority of Amiga users

it is a no-no. In the light of the read errors I suffered I wouldn't even advise buying the Syquest as a second drive for backing up a hard disc. A tape spooler would be a better bet.

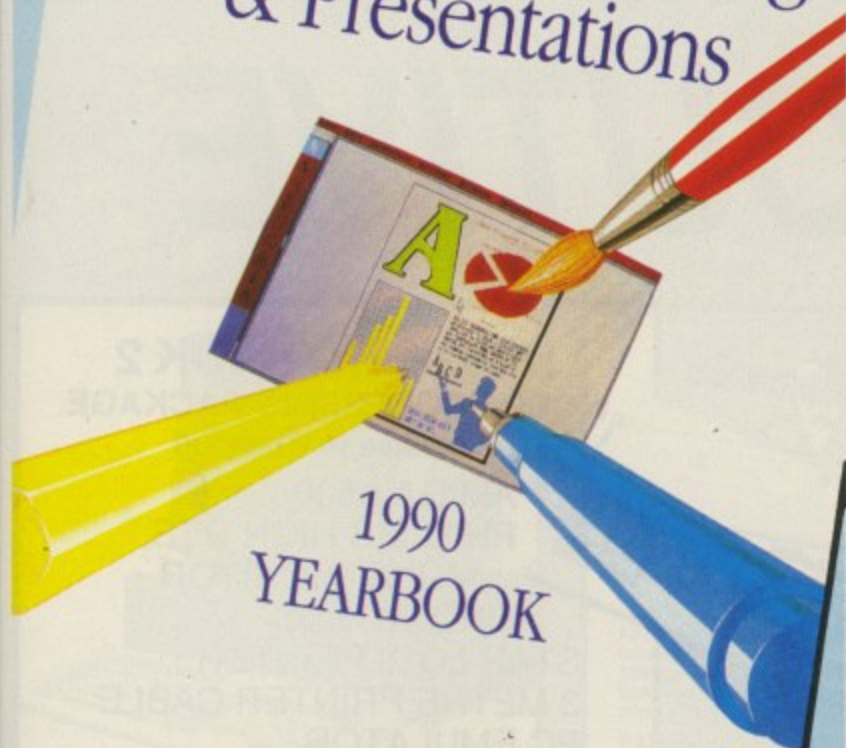

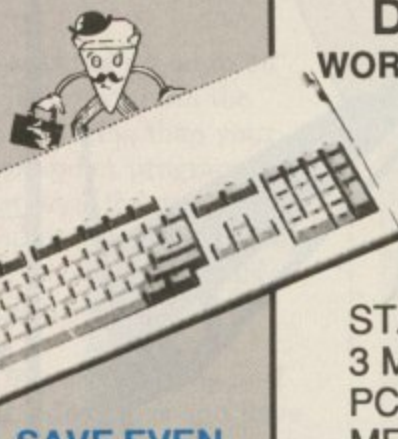

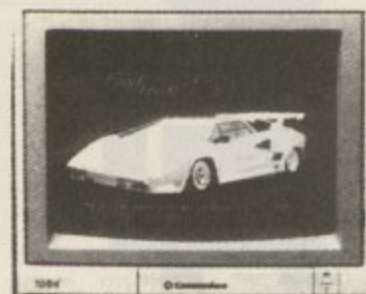

A blit on the side

Shuffling data around memory is what computers are good at. Jolyon Ralph shows you how to use the chip that made the Amiga famous

A BLITTER is something that blits. Blit stands for BLock Image Transfer, which essentially means taking a rectangle of screen data and pasting it somewhere else on the screen. Commodore initially tried to call it a bimber (for Block Image Manipulator) but that was such a stupid name that no one else used it. Eventually Commodore forgot it as well.

The blitter chip doesn't do anything that can't be done with the processor, but it can do it a heck of a lot faster. In its simplest method of operation – a straightforward data copy – it can move over 15 million pixels a second.

But the blitter inside the Amiga is much more versatile than this. It can perform logical operations – so it can mix the blitted data with the data currently on the screen in various different ways – and it can draw lines and fill areas.

It is also not confined to working with graphic memory and can be used on anything residing in chip ram. Decoding raw data read from the disc drive is one task the blitter is put to by the Amiga.

Block image transfer is only one small part of what the Amiga's blitter can do.

Like almost every other part of the hardware, the blitter uses Direct Memory Access (DMA) to perform its electronic miracles. As with bitplanes and sprites, all you do is tell it what to do and start it off, then you can forget about it while it happily blits away in the background.

The blitter uses four DMA channels. Three of these are inputs called A, B and C, which take data from memory into the blitter, and there is one output from the blitter back to memory, called D. You can use three, two, one or even none of the inputs at

a time by disabling the DMA channels that are not needed. There are even times when you may want to disable the output, channel D.

To use the blitter you have to set up the various hardware registers which tell it exactly what you want to do. First check that the blitter is not already busy – especially important in multi-tasking programs.

Remember that the blitter is used by the operating system for all sorts of unusual purposes and changing blitter registers while it is busy is rather like trying to put a load of dirty clothes in a washing machine while it is half way through running another wash. All you end up with is a spectacular mess.

To see whether the blitter is busy you must test bit 14 of the hardware register \$dff002. To make it simple, use the little loop below, it will wait until the blitter has finished before carrying on with the program.

After executing this you can safely set up the blitter for your own use. Firstly, set the DMA pointers for the blitter I/O channels. You only need to set the channels that you are using. Next you must tell the blitter about the rectangle you want to blit and where you want to blit it to.

To work out how to set aim for a particular rectangle you must understand how the Amiga's screen is laid out.

A standard lo-res bitplane consists of 200 horizontal lines of 320 pixels each line. This is stored in memory as a block of 8,000 bytes, where each line is stored as 20 words.

The blitter, which must be told where the image you want to move is in memory, works by moving a word at a time, so you can only move to and from even word boundaries.

The blitter window is defined in a similar way to a bitplane (see Figure I). As with bitplanes, you can set a modulo for each DMA channel which will skip a set number of bytes at the end of each line. This is important if the area you want to blit is not the full width of the screen.

The modulo is the value added to the blitter address registers after each line of the window is read. To calculate the modulo you need to take

the width of the screen in bytes, remembering to add on any bitplane modulo (if you have set one) for the off-screen bytes, and subtract the width of your blitter window in bytes. This is the value you should use for the blitter modulo.

The next thing to set are the registers called BLTAFWM and BLTALWM, which stand for Blitter A channel First Word Mask and Blitter A channel Last Word Mask. If the area you want to blit does not start or end horizontally exactly on a word boundary, you can mask off the unwanted area at the sides of your blit area to make up the area to word boundaries.

IF the first word mask is set to \$ffff (all bits set) the first word of each line will be printed normally. If the first word mask is set to \$00ff, the first byte of each line will not be read but replaced with zeros in the blitter calculations.

Two control registers tell the blitter what sort of operation you want to perform on your data. As you probably suspect already, these control registers are fundamentally important. The makeup of BLTCON0 and BLTCON1 are shown in Figure II.

You tell the blitter which DMA channels to enable by setting the USEA to USED bits. Remember, the less channels used the faster the blitter will operate. For a straightforward data copy normally only A and D are used.

Bits LF7 to LF0 are called the minterms. They determine the logic operations that the blitter carries out on the data. Each of the eight bits determines whether a bit will be set in the destination or not. The panel below details what the eight minterms stand for.

LF7 LF6 LF5 LF4 LF3 LF2 LF1 LF0

A means the bit tested from source A is set, a means the bit tested from source A is clear, and the same for B and C. This means that if only LF7 is set, the destination from the blitter will only set a bit if the corresponding bits of A, B and C are set.

If you are using less than four DMA channels you will have to check for 0 or 1 in the unused channels. For

In this example, assuming the window was used as the A source, BLTAPTR would be START+46 (2*23). There are 11 words between each line of the blitter rectangle, so the blitter modulo, BLTAMOD, would be 22. The blitter window is 9 words wide and 3 lines deep, so the correct value for BLTSIZE would be 9+3*64, or 201.

example, if you want to set a bit when both sources A and B are set, but you are not using source C, you will have to set LF7 and LF6 (for ABC and ABc) so that the corresponding bit in the destination will be set whether the bit from C is set or not.

Most of the common minterms can be worked out like this. For a straightforward data copy – that is, $D=A$, destination taken straight from source A without alteration – you would only enable DMA channels A and D and you would set minterms LF7 to LF4.

The minterm value which you put into the BLTCON0 register would be \$f0, taken from regarding LF7 to LF0 as binary digits. This will set the corresponding bit in the destination when A is set, regardless of the settings from the B and C sources.

If you want to use the blitter to clear an area of memory you don't need to

enable any DMA sources, only the destination D. As you always want a zero to be written to memory, you don't enable any minterms, so the minterm value is \$0.

If you want to copy from the A source to D destination, but only the bits where the B source is set as well – which is a very simple form of masking, defining a mask showing which parts of a picture you want transferred – you would use the logic operation $D=A \text{ AND } B$. D is only set when both A and B are set. This would need just the minterms containing AB, or LF7 and LF6. The minterm value would then be \$c0.

So far you can scroll smoothly vertically, as shown in the example listing, by moving the data to a position 40 bytes back in memory – 40 bytes is the width of a standard lo-res

screen. You can use the same technique to scroll an area horizontally by 16 pixels, but you can't do smooth horizontal scrolling this way.

To do smooth horizontal scrolling you need to use the barrel shifter. This rotates the data held in the blitter by up to 15 pixels at a time. The highest four bits in BLTCON0 determine the horizontal shift for source A, and the highest four bits in BLTCON1 are for source B.

Note that all shifts are to the right, so if you want to scroll smoothly to the left you will have to scroll roughly by one word to the left and scroll smoothly to the right by however many pixels you need to make up to the position you want.

The bits EFE/IFE/FCI and LINE are for using the blitter to fill areas and draw lines. This is beyond the scope of this article. If you want to investigate these areas you should

read the Amiga System Programmers Guide by Abacus.

Don't use the old Addison-Wesley Hardware Reference Manual for this - it has several serious mistakes in the blitter line drawing chapter which will cause severe problems for anyone trying to master the blitter. The new Hardware Reference Manual is in the shops. I'll check it out and report back to you asap.

The last bit to talk about is DESC. This determines the way the blitter works. If you are copying one part of memory to another part and the two areas do not overlap you have no

problems. However, if the areas do overlap you must make sure the blitter is working in the correct direction - that is, top to bottom or bottom to top.

If not, the destination can write over the bottom of the source before it is used. Setting DESC means the blitter works backwards, so ensuring that it will not overwrite itself.

As a general rule, if the source and destination overlap, then set DESC if the destination is lower down the

screen (higher up in memory), and clear DESC if the destination is higher up the screen (lower down in memory).

The example listing shows how to set up a simple blitter operation to move a block of memory - the middle of the screen in this case - up by one line (40 bytes, remember, because 40 bytes is a line in a lo-res screen). In this example, source and destination are overlapped, and destination is higher up the screen so DESC is 0.

Kiddie Paint



Art and the Amiga go together like Tom and Jerry, so what better way to start your children computing? Ian Hugo tries My Paint out on his kids

THEIR faces lit up. "Brill" and "Great" were the instant reactions to MyPaint, a paint program for kids from Prism. Three days later my children had stopped using it, which sums up the strengths and the weaknesses of the program.

The disc arrived in an attractively packaged box boldly proclaimed to be "kid tested". "OK", I thought and, after looking to see that the program loaded properly, I left Carl, aged eight, and Natalie, ten, to get on with it.

Needless to say, neither started by

reading the small book of instructions, and immediately hit a snag. The opening screen doesn't tell you what to do next. Neither does the booklet. Obviously, what you need is a surface to paint on; but how do you get one?

Fortunately, there is a big Help icon in the middle of the screen and they clicked on that. The program immediately started to step through each of the facilities shown and a Dalek-like voice explained what each did. That revealed that the disc icon was the one needed.

Shrieks of delight at this discovery but how could they stop Help droning on? It didn't seem that they could; so, heavy sighs while Help continued to the end of its routine.

Thereafter it was all pure delight. They started with the mystery feature, a gift box which you unwrap by rubbing over it with the brush to reveal one of the 28 drawings stored in the colouring book. Using the painting facilities was extremely simple, and they soon went through a variety of drawings each. They were genuinely pleased with the pictures and had a lot of fun colouring them in.

I insisted that they try out all of the facilities and it took a couple of hours for both to do so. They managed to make all the facilities work for themselves, apart from saving a picture. And then that was that; there was little more interest.

On offer are a thick and thin paint brush, an eraser, an "oops" facility, fill-in, mirroring effect, flashing effect, multi-colour brush and a sound effect, plus a dozen colours to choose from and, of course, the colouring book. Some

facilities and effects worked better than others.

The paint brushes are adequate rather than good. My kids have been used to Photon Paint, with eight thicknesses of brush, and so were not very impressed. The same can be said of the range of colours - 12 is an adequate rather than a generous number, and there is no opportunity to mix new colours. As the program runs in low resolution (320 x 200) mode this is not due to memory restrictions.

The multi-colour brush has essentially the same effect as a multi-colour pencil; it's interesting for a minute or so.

The eraser is slightly disconcerting, since it erases all colouring on a drawing. That came as quite a shock when they tried it to rub out only part of their colouring. The "oops" facility undoes only the last brush stroke, so it's not very helpful when second thoughts occur slightly late.

However, it didn't take them long to work out that colouring in white would have the same effect as a more constrained eraser. Given the obviously intended market for the program, that might usefully have been spelt out somewhere.

SOUND effects were the least successful of the facilities. Clicking on it produced a noise related to the drawing currently displayed. The sounds were rather rudimentary, however, and their Dalek quality often required an effort of imagination to link them to the picture.

Mirroring on the other hand, was first class. It apes the effect of four mirrors, as though the screen were divided into four quarters, so that a



mark made at one point on the screen appears at four points simultaneously. The kids managed to achieve some very striking designs with that facility.

The flashing effect also provoked some creative work. It does not really make the colours flash, but changes seven of them in rotation. This succeeded in suggesting interesting alternatives to the usual colours for the sky and grass.

The colouring book had the kind of range of pictures that you might expect to find in a child's colouring book or an ST owner's library – plenty of animals, country scenes, a zoo scene, a space scene, dinosaurs and boats.

The fill-in facility was just that but it did work commendably quickly, noticeably faster than it does in Photon Paint, not difficult since Photon uses HAM. Where young children are concerned, that is an important touch.

THE surprise picture facility held attention longer than I expected. They tended to use that rather than page through the book, using the simple back and forward arrows provided. It should be added, in passing, that it is possible to paint extra features over the drawings to be coloured.

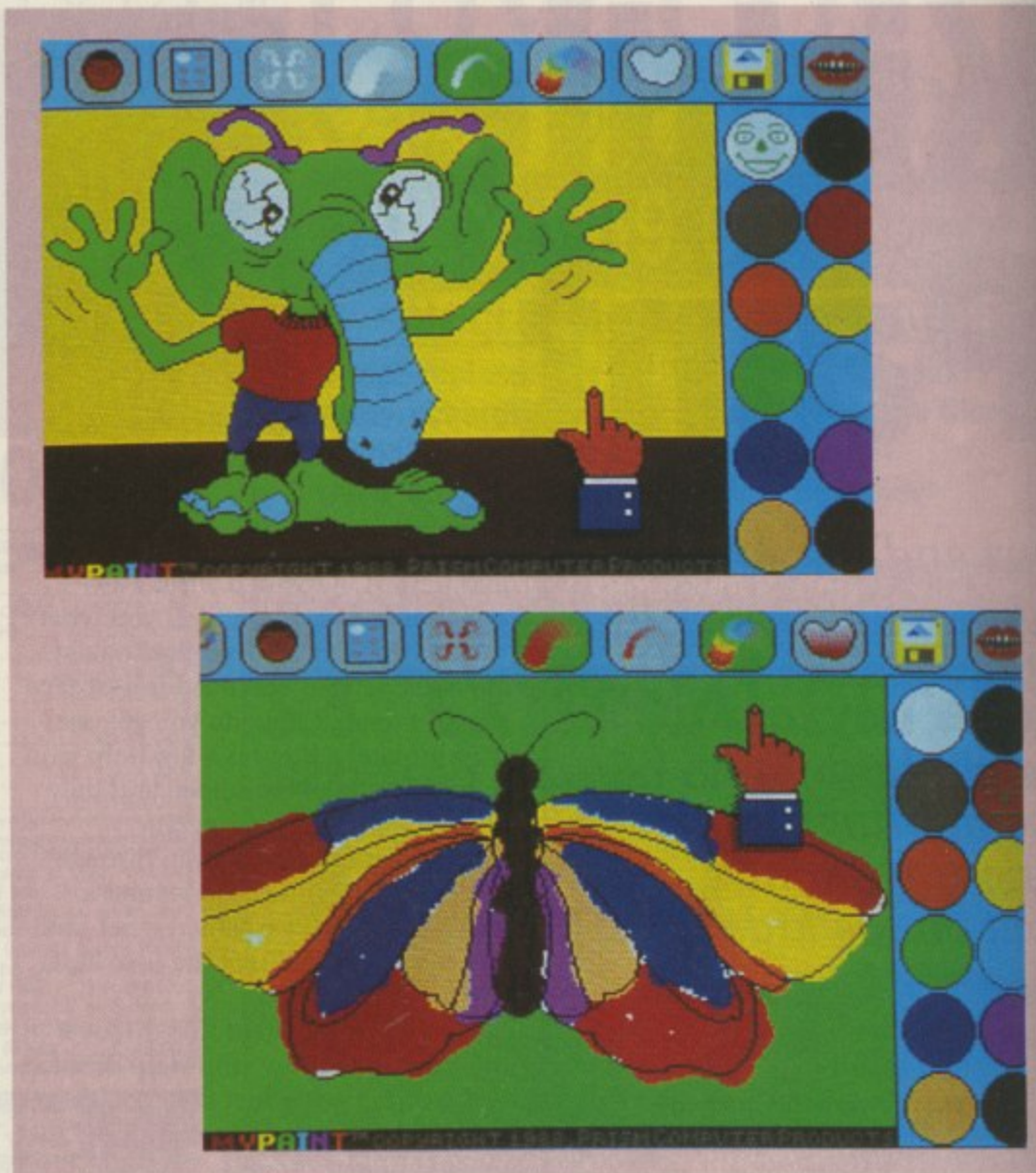
Probably the principal criteria in judging such a program is whether it can and will be used over a reasonable period by its intended market. Clearly, it is for very young children, but ones who, nonetheless can use a mouse and such conventions as clicking on a brush and a colour in order to paint.

A lot of thought has been given to making the facilities simple. All have clear icons except perhaps the disc icon which produces the painting surface.

An image of a painting book might have been better.

The booklet notes that children using the program may not be able to read, which is presumably why the Help facility not only explains each feature in text but also reads it to you. Still, it's a nice touch.

Documentation is basic. The booklet is for older children or adults who are lending a helping hand. It is simple and well laid out but has a couple of small glitches given the criterion of extreme simplicity. The "getting



started" section doesn't really get you started, it just gets you to the opening screen, where you need Help.

Secondly, the section Quitting The Program cheerfully states "You may safely turn off your computer at any time within Mypaint to end the program". With the disc still in it? We didn't test this in case that proved to be the end of the test, but a young child might do just that.

A FINAL point is to consider what facilities might reasonably have been put into the program that weren't there. A paint mixing facility would have added a little more interest and it would have been nice to have a small library of common shapes so that children could compose their own drawings.

Essentially, what Mypaint gives you is an electronic colouring book with a few bells and whistles. I felt that Carl and Natalie were slightly too old for it – they tend not to use colouring books any more.

However, it does have "instant" appeal and could well be a very

attractive program for a five or six year old, who would find a more sophisticated painting program too daunting but would need some help with this.

Horsey takes king prawn

Alastair Scott pits his wits against the latest pretender to the Amiga chess crown



You can change the colours to your heart's delight

RIGHT from the start Oxford Softworks' Chess Player 2150 has unusual features. After negotiating the password protection scheme, you are given a very clear 2D board. Select the first menu item and the board switches to a 3D representation which is much better than those of Colossus Chess X and Chessmaster 2000.

Here there is no jerky piece movement, no doubt about whether one piece is passing in front of or behind another, and no question as to which piece or square is being pointed at.

Another advantage over the other programs is that the board can be rotated, shrunk or enlarged without perspective being distorted. The 2D board has only standard chessmen, the 3D board has an unusual choice of two Staunton sets, spacemen, farmyard animals or toys, the last two presumably for child appeal.

All choices are made from menus, with no Amiga key shortcuts. Requesters with buttons appear on screen when needed and filenames are chosen from a standard menu. Dialogue boxes are a little flickery.

I've Gurbed a couple of times while replaying loaded games, and copies of the master disc occasionally have to be loaded twice before working properly. I found no other bugs.

YOU should have no problem in finding a suitable type of play from the five available. Firstly there is Weak Player, which has 10 sub-levels which force the program to play random but legal moves.

The other four are more conventional: Tournament allows you to enter a move time between one second and infinity, which the program will, on the whole, match; Average makes it take the same time over every move; Matching matches both players' times per move; Infinite

makes it think until Esc is pressed.

In addition, Chess Player 2150 can be told to avoid draws at all costs, always play for the draw, or anything in between, and can be handicapped by being prevented from thinking in its opponent's time.

While a game is in progress you are free to select most menu items. Moves can be taken back and played forward, sides can be swapped, the program can play itself or monitor two human players.

There is some horrific Frank Bruno style digitised sound which will have you reaching for the menu to replace it with a bleep. The board colours can be changed.

It would have been helpful to be able to store such alterations in a preferences file, but no such option is available.

By selecting the menu option you can switch to the information screen, which shows moves made, time taken, depth of search and current line.

Chessmaster is still the only Amiga program which uses proper algebraic notation – Chess Player 2150 uses the unambiguous but ancient D1G4, F3D4 form. Hardcopy uses the same notation, but with the neat touch that the time taken for each move is printed beside it.

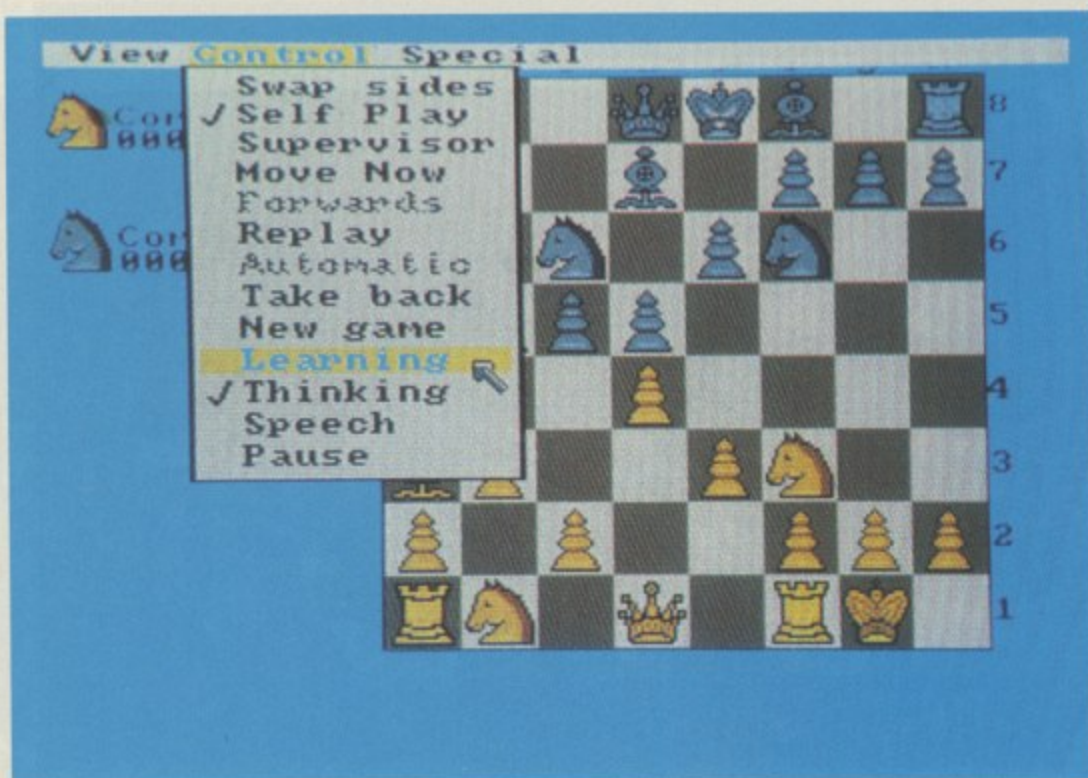
BUT Chess Player 2150 has features which set it aside from the competition. Provided a copy of the program disc is used, any unexpected moves can be added to the openings library.

Although the library is 93,000 bytes (not moves!) long, it has some surprising gaps. For example, *1.e4 d6 2.d4 Nf6 3.Nc3 g6 4.f4* takes the program out of book.

More important is the option which allows you to test both your playing strength and that of the computer at any skill level. This involves solving 24 chess problems by giving up to four possible moves for each at two minutes maximum per move.

The manual says this is enough to estimate a grading to within 50 points. While this is true for my grading – it overestimated by 35 points – I can't see how it can possibly work in all cases.

For example, computers and people have completely different methods of tackling chess problems. People are

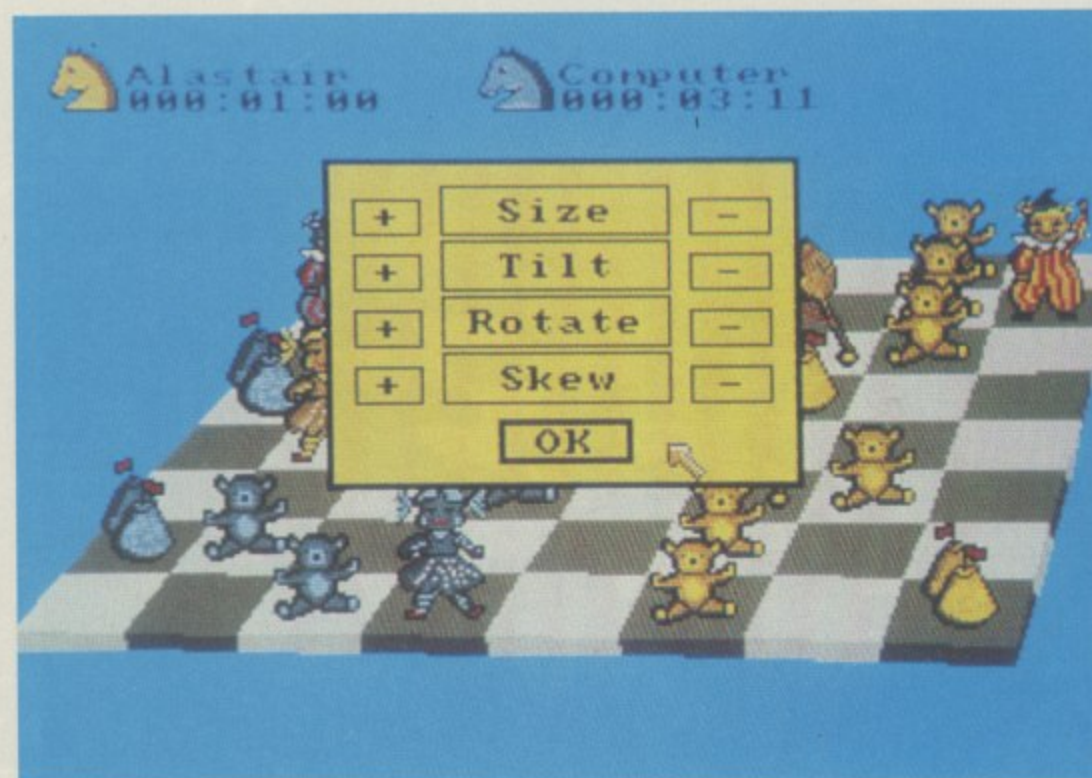
analytical, computers are more brute force and ignorance. Giving the same test to both seems unjustifiable. I would be very wary of reading anything into results obtained with it.

There is no substitute for safety in numbers – many games against many graded opponents, both computer and human, together with a mathematically sound method of grading.

The final curiosity is What If? This allows you to search the tree of moves and find out why the program rejected a line of play, possibly forcing it to play that line and see what happens.

This option was put in at the development stage and tidied up for the release version. Although difficult to use, it does give you a feeling for what goes on behind the fancy graphics.

CHESS Player's playing strength cannot be disputed. There is a good variety of openings, mostly standard, although with a few exotic lines. Middlegame play is excep-

tionally good. The program seems to be able to calculate much deeper in the time given than its rivals, and the Variable Draw option gives you all types of play from speculative to dull.

Endgame play is even more impressive. Looking at the demonstration games on the disc, it is surprising how often its opponents hold their own until the latter stages of the game and are then ground down relentlessly.

My tests showed that Chess Player 2150 could calculate 12 ply (half-moves) whereas my Fidelity Designer Excellence, a dedicated chess computer with a 6502 processor, could only manage seven or eight in the same time. Even allowing for the 16 bit processor's extra power, this is a significant difference.

The disc has all 30 games of three matches CP Software arranged between Chess Player 2150 and Chessmaster 2000 (it won 9-1), Chessmaster 2100 (it won 6½-3½) and Colossus Chess X (it won 9½-1½) ready to play through and analyse.

I find it odd that, although the Swedish grading list issued last June showed that Psion Chess was the strongest microcomputer chess program at that time, with a statistically verified grading of 1925, there was neither a Chess Player 2150 vs Psion Chess match on the disc nor

a match with any of the 15 dedicated chess computers placed above Psion Chess in the list.

My test results at 30 to 45 seconds per move, the same as CP's tests, came out like this:

- Colossus Chess X:** (Estimated grading 1600, advertised 1850) 5½-1½
- Sargon Chess III:** (Estimated grading 1650, advertised 1983) 4½-1½
- Chessmaster 2000** (Swedish grading 1693, advertised 1990) 4½-1½
- FDE Computer** (Swedish grading 1833, advertised 1987) 5-1
- Alastair Scott** (Scottish grading 1770, advertised 1770) 4-2

With all these numbers flying around, I estimate Chess Player 2150's real grading at approximately 1900-1950 and state, without proof, Uncle Alastair's Law for Chess Program Adverts, which cuts through the mists of claims and counter-claims: *Actual grading = Advertised grading minus 400m*, where *m* is the phase of the moon (0 to 1) at the time of reading the advert.


Seriously, until someone takes all the commercially available chess programs and chess computers and sticks them in a room with an equal number of graded players of all abilities in order to play a gigantic tournament, all the claims, of varying degrees of exaggeration, about playing strength should be suspended. The


results, however, speak for themselves: Chess Player 2150 thrashes both myself and the opposition.


If you want an example of what Chess Player 2150 can do, try replaying its eighth match game with Chessmaster 2000, which is a beautifully played endgame with a striking finish. At 79 moves, it is too long to reproduce here. Again, it shows how far Chess Player 2150 can look ahead in simplified positions.

The ram forgets

FIRST there was RAM: then there was RAD: now there is DM0:. While the original ram disc has the advantage of growing to accommodate more files, RAD: does not forget its data when you reset the machine. Unfortunately nothing can survive a flick of the mains switch.

Until now. The German company Combitec has developed a device which can be used like RAD: but which survives your big toe snagging the power cable.

To perform this trick needs special ram chips. Normal dynamic ram (Dram) stores its information in a capacitor. This is a component which holds electricity like a little battery. If there is some electricity in the capacitor, it is set to a binary one, if not it is a binary zero. Unfortunately capacitors leak, so Dram has to be topped up all the time.

Some computer circuitry has the boring job of checking all the ram in the computer and topping up all the bits which are set to one. This little nudge from the computer every now and then, which allows it to remember what is in ram, uses a fair bit of power.

THE Combitec unit uses static ram (Sram) which stores its information in a pair of transistors. These need minuscule amounts of power to hold the information, and no topping up. The memory only needs a squirt of electrical juice when the value is changed. And since only one location is changed at any one time, this isn't very often. When everything is switched off nothing changes, so very little current is needed to retain the contents of the Sram.

Static ram does have some problems. The two transistors for each bit are much bigger than one capacitor. Remember we are talking about components which are made using a reduced photograph and are so small they need a large microscope to see. But "bigger" is a relative term and two transistors are a lot bigger when you have a quarter of a million of them.

As a result, the chips are larger and you need more of them. Such devices consume more silicon, and so cost

more. Sram is also very sensitive to static electricity, so greater precautions have to be taken in manufacture and storage than with Dram. Static ram is expensive. The Combitec comes in two flavours, a 512k version for £279 and the 1 meg version, reviewed here, which costs £429.

The whole unit plugs neatly into the side of an A500 with a through-bus so that further peripherals can be

added. Combitec hopes you will use this for its hard disc.

There is a power socket which allows you to keep the memory active for as long as the mains supply lasts. Most users won't need this because the principal method of providing power to the ram is through some huge capacitors.

This turns the problem of leaky capacitors into an advantage. The gentle flow of escaping electrons is



that never

enough to keep the memory happy. The capacitors take their charge from the computer and will hold enough current to last the memory a couple of months. To get the capacitors fully filled you will need to leave your Amiga on for 20 hours. After that your data is safe.

You can even unplug the ram pack and take it round to a friend's house where, if you plug it in straight and carefully, it should be possible to read

the contents back. Not a reliable method of data transfer, but a neat party trick.

More use is the trick of auto-booting. With Kickstart 1.3 it is possible to boot an Amiga from any external device, providing it has suitable roms. The Combitec Sram has them. So you can load all the necessary bits of AmigaDos into the DM0: device.

Booting from this takes about 10

seconds. Booting from an A590 takes more than twice that. For a floppy user, booting from ram is like a dream come true, but then if you can afford the Combitec unit you might be better off with a hard disc.

THIS is an interesting product, but will probably only find a home in a few select applications. A showroom might want to hold a program in the static ram which runs from boot-up.


Whereas a disc left in the drive might become corrupted or be stolen, the solid state ram disc is safe. It is ideal for turnkey systems, which only ever run one program.


With a similar price to the cheaper hard drives, it is difficult to justify the cost of the Combitec. A hard drive is slower, but it offers 20 times the capacity and you can easily add up to 2 meg of system memory.


The best thing about the Combitec Static Ram unit is that it exists – it opens up new possibilities for selling A500s to users with specialist needs.

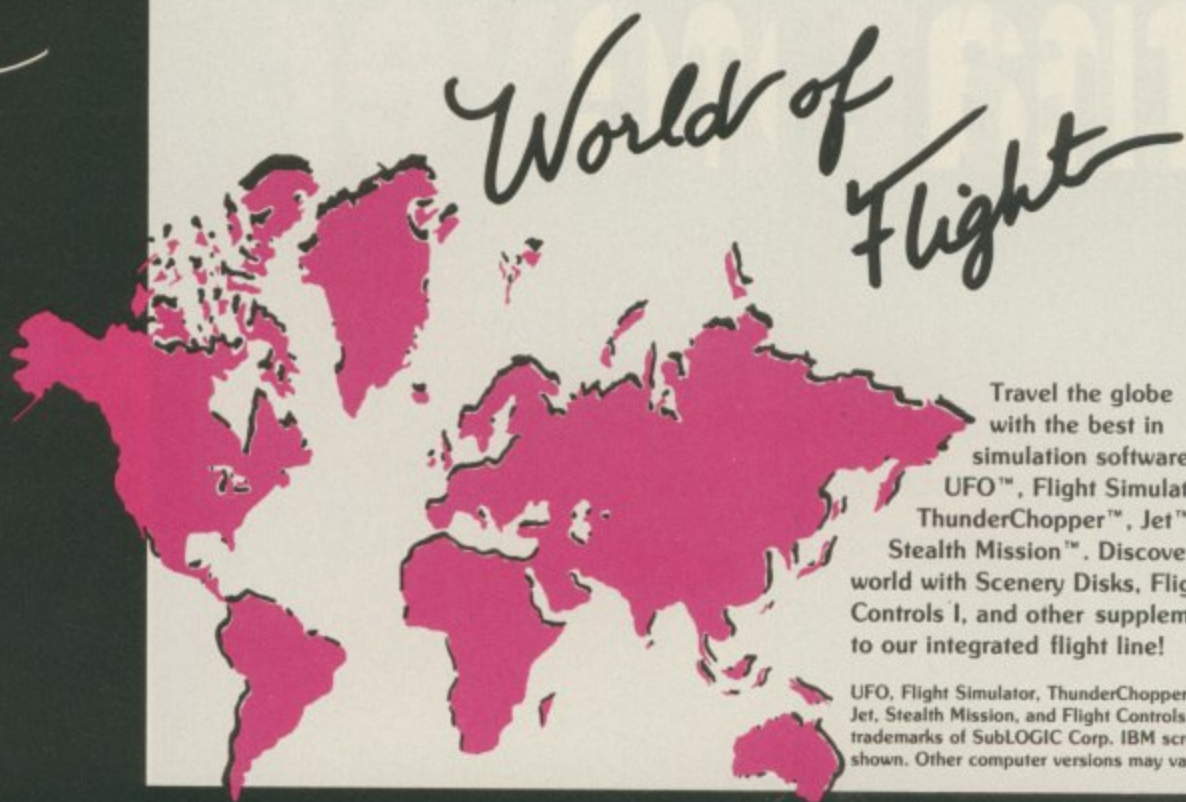
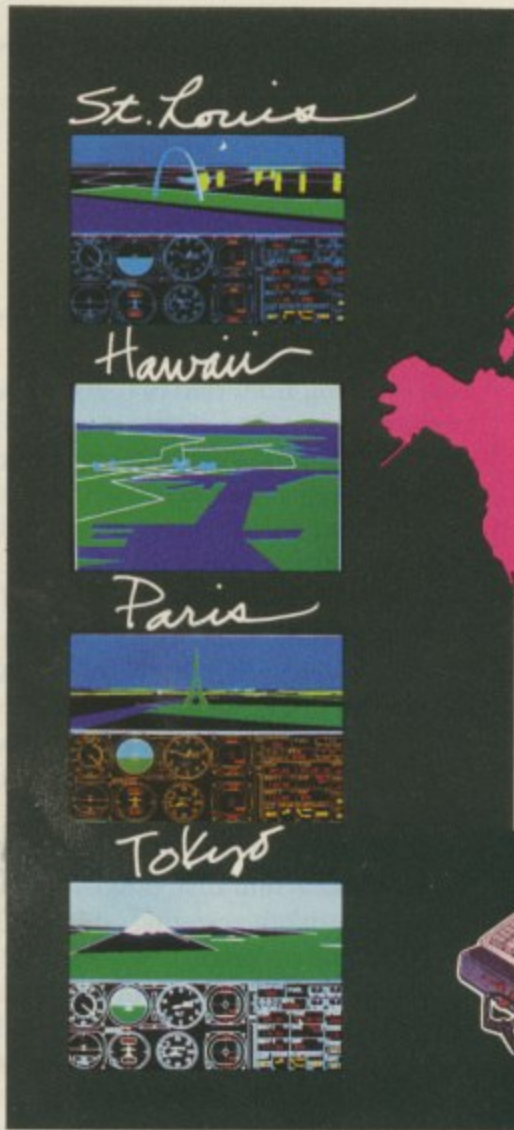

It's good of you to realise that support costs and that the profit Datel makes on a £35 interface doesn't really allow much scope for them to help you. As this is the interface Commodore has chosen to bundle with the education pack it must be a pretty good buy. Although there is one incredibly naff thing in that pack - you can always throw those magazines away.

I'd say your interface is broken. Send it, together with photocopies of whatever paperwork you have, back to Datel and ask for it to be repaired or replaced. You only need a special printer lead if you have an Amiga 1000, otherwise an IBM cable is tickerty-boo.

The most powerful processor is the A2620, although I've heard rumours that the even more powerful A2630 is already on the production line. The system to go for is an A2000 with an A2630 processor card and 4 meg of 32bit ram and to use the 2091 hard disc controller which has space for 2 meg. This will give you a super-fast 7 meg system. You could then squeeze the last 2 megs in with another card.

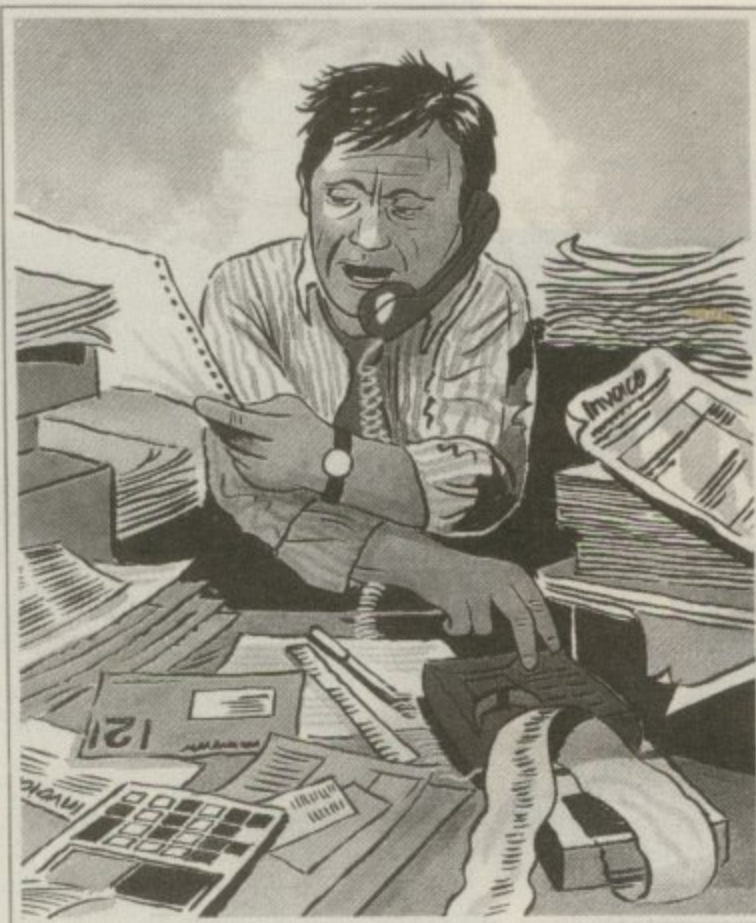
The only A500 accelerator which got a half-decent review was the Third Coast one in our November issue. If you want to stay with the A500 - and if you are serious enough to spend £400 on the Sculpt software I think this is a mistake - avoid the processors and settle for an A590 or the cheaper Triangle Turbo drive with 2 meg in it and a 2 meg internal expansion from either Club 68000 or Memory Expansion Systems.

This will give you a 4.5 meg system which should be plenty. In the Amiga Computing office we have one, three and five meg systems. For normal applications three meg has always been plenty.

This is scandalous behaviour by Commodore, since one of the main reasons for the purchase of an A2500 is the 1 meg of chip ram enabling full 16 colour, hi-res, overscanned screens?

Not only that, but the flicker fixer and multi sync monitor do not work if the Amiga is genlocked (come back 1084, all is forgiven.) A ridiculous situation considering that the video industry must be a major market for the 1 meg chip ram Amiga.

Could you clarify the situation with an explanation of the many official A2000/2500 configurations. Which ones are guaranteed 1 meg chip ram etc? Plus any alternatives to the unacceptable A2090A.

And what news of an Amiga version of the 16 million colour Parsec graphic interface or Commodore's ECS?

And how about a dedicated 2000/2500 page or two to unveil these kind of problems. Both Commodore and my dealer have been particularly unhelpful on these matters.

Tangled in technology my friend. The A2090a was designed before the 1 meg Agnus chip. You can either wait for the 2091 or go for the splendid Microbotics Hardframe, widely held to be the fastest HD controller available. It is available from Oasis (on 01-859 4936).

The flicker fixer is designed to be compatible with multi-sync monitors. Genlocks have a very definite idea of what they want the sync rate to be.

Unless the world settles on a sensible standard for high definition television, which looks unlikely, I'm afraid we are always going to suffer this kind of problem. The alternative is to use dedicated TV hardware which is many, many times more expensive.

New A2000s should all offer 1 meg of chip ram. Sometime soon A500s will also get these. The Parsec graphic interface is being worked on, but it will need its own genlock - a standard Amiga one won't work.

You should be able to genlock a signal from ECS, but that needs Workbench 1.4 which looks a long way off. Some smart money says April.

Bent copper

I HAVE been an Amiga 500 owner for a least a year now. I use it mostly for programming in assembler. I started 68000 code by reading *Amiga Machine Language by Abacus*. I found this interesting though it discouraged programmers from using the hardware directly.

I wanted to learn more so I started reading the Amiga Hardware Reference Manual from Commodore. This is interesting but there were very few practical examples.

I read Jolyon Ralph's Copper tutorial in the September issue of *Amiga Computing*. The article was useful and easy to understand, though I tried the assembly language example but it did not work. I used Devpac 1.21 to assemble the code.

I WAS just reading your letter section about Mr Chi Chung Wong's problems with a presumably blown custom chip. I have experienced exactly the same problem as he described it, but since I was working with a program, and did not have time to send my Amiga to be repaired, I decided to fix it myself.

I have been working with many computers, and when some one of them breaks down it is usually because of bad contact between a chip and the socket. To solve this you only have to press the chip down again.

Consequently, I opened my Amiga and started to press softly on all chips. Voila, it worked! It was not a blown custom chip. This little operation saved me a lot of money and trouble, and it took less than five minutes.

Run Diskcopy from CLI, then when it asks for a disc put the cleaner in. You'll get some errors but retry until the drive has had its 30 seconds. Do not over-use disc cleaners, they can screw up the heads.

Asking for a memory map shows that you have moved up from an 8 bit machine. The Amiga is a very different beast, things don't work in the same way because the memory map shifts around. To start with you will need an assembler, either Devpac or ArgAsm (see special offers). This will cost you £70ish.

Then you will need a book on 68000 assembler - see my reply to Peter Trowe's letter - and a book on programming the Amiga. Compute!'s Amiga Machine Language Programming Guide is a good bet. All in all you are looking at £100.

Some programs, well pretty much every game, grab the Amiga by the electrons and take over. NDOS stands for Not Disc Operating System. This means it doesn't use the standard Dos which Workbench understands. You need to put such a disc into the drive when the Amiga hand appears.
