

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
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Don't Fall....But If You Do... The Best Way to Break a Fall

KEEP YOUR HEAD UP

This is the primary location of the you. body that you do not want to have • I damaged. You do not want to have your head connect with the ground, particularly if you are falling onto pavement or another hard surface. It is better to bruise your arms than to bruise your head.

- It may be helpful to make a habit of putting one hand on the back of your head when going down backwards. This will help you protect your head against slamming into the ground and losing consciousness.
- Alternatively, tuck your chin to your chest or focus on looking at your belt (so the head doesn't contact the ground when you fall backwards).
- If falling forward, look left or right (this avoids hitting nose/face on ground). Only turn your head slightly, however. If your head hits the ground when you're looking completely to one side or the other, you have a greater chance of injuring your neck.

SLAP YOUR PALMS OFF THE GROUND IF FALLING FOR-WARD

Make sure your whole palm slaps the ground. This is done only for a second to slow your fall the slight bit that it will, and to prevent breaking your wrists. It is not meant to absorb all your weight like a spring, or "catch" you.

Do this also if falling sideways (use left palm if falling left, right if falling right). **Note: Never try to slap the back of your hand against

the ground. Always use the palm or edge of your hand. It is easy to break your wrist if you use the back of your hand.

Don't lock your elbows.

BREATHE OUT

Some people will tell you to breathe out as much as possible, which will tense up your body thus allowing you to "ab-

sorb the impact of the fall". It is more likely, however, that you will damage your body if it's tense. Instead, breathe out normally, just as much as the task of going to the ground requires. This will keep your body flexible and relaxed, and greatly reduce the risk of injury

FOLD YOUR BODY LIKE AN ACCORDION

Bend your ankles, then your knees, then your hips. Fold your body into itself. This decreases the height of your fall. Just imagine: You're 6' tall.



Someone pushes you. What's better? Toppling and risking slamming your head from about 6' height into the ground, or folding into yourself and risk slamming your head from about 2 feet (0.6 m) into the ground?

IF FALL-ING FROM A HEIGHT, ROLL AS YOU HIT THE GROUND

This will distribute the force of the impact throughout your body, instead of just on one place. If falling backwards, try to bend at the knees and squat before the fall. Curl your back and roll on it. Don't try to break the fall with your arms.

PRACTICE FALLING ON A SOFT SURFACE (LIKE A MAT) WHEN YOU AREN'T ACTUALLY FALL-ING

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INGREDIENTS:

Cookie Dough: ¹/₂ cup shortening 1 cup sugar 2 tsp. vanilla extract 2 eggs 2¹/₂ cups flour ³/₄ tsp. baking powder ¹/₂ tsp salt 3 Tbs. soy milk 3 chocolate sandwich cookies, finely crushed

Chocolate Cookie Butter Filling: 12 chocolate sandwich cookies 1⁄4 cup liquid non-dairy whip topping, defrosted (such as rich's whip)

COOKIES N' CREAM HAMANTASCHEN

VIELD: MAKES: 3 DOZEN DIRECTIONS:

Prepare the dough: In the bowl of an electric stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, beat the shortening with the sugar and vanilla extract until light and fluffy. Add in the eggs and mix until combined. Add in the flour, baking powder, and salt and slowly mix on low speed. Pour in the soy milk and mix until a dough is formed. Sprinkle in the cookie crumbs and mix until evenly distributed. You can use the dough right away. If the dough is too sticky, wrap and chill in the refrigerator for half an hour. **Prepare the filling:** In the bowl of a food processor fitted with the blade attachment, crush the 12 sandwich cookies until finely ground. Pour in the ¼ cup of defrosted whip topping and process until smooth. Refrigerate if it is too runny-it will firm up. Filling can be made in advance and stored in the fridge.

Form the hamantaschen: On a lightly floured surface, or on a floured sheet of parchment paper, roll out a piece of the dough until thin. Use a round cutter (2½ to 3 inch in diameter) and cut out circles of dough. Fill each round with a ¾ tsp. of filling and pinch the seams together to form a triangle. Transfer to parchment lined baking sheet and bake in 350 degree oven for 8-10 minutes until the edges begin to brown. Allow to cool and enjoy!* The filling puffs in the oven so if you overfill, you will lose your perfect shape, but they will taste even more amazing! The filling settles in once the cookies are cooled.

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

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1,000 YEAR OLD GOLD TREASURE FOUND BY DIVERS IN CAESAREA By: Yotam Rozenwald, Tazpit News Agency

discovered in Israel was found in recent weeks on the seabed in the ancient port of Caesarea. The treasure was discovered by a group of divers which reported their findings to Israel's Antiquities Authority.

Tazpit News Agency spoke to Zvika Fayer, one of the divers which participated in the discovering of the gold coins. "We went diving on February 7, as we do almost every Saturday. We were diving 12, maybe 12.5 meters under sea surface. I saw a flickering on the bottom of the Mediterranean, so I swam there and started digging with my bare hands. Other members of my diving group joined me and we discovered a significant amount of coins. After the dive was over we contacted the Israel

The largest hoard of gold coins ever Antiquities Authority and notified them about our discovery," Fayer told Tazpit News.

> Fayer and his diving group went back into the Mediterranean alongside a diving crew from the Marine Archeology Unit of the Israel Antiquities Authority. "We led the divers from the Antiquities Authority to the location of the gold treasure, we were very pleased to assist them," Fayer told Tazpit.

> Tazpit News Agency spoke to Dr. Robert Kool, an expert numismatic from the Israeli Antiquities Authority, about the historical background that lead such a treasure to the cost of Caesarea. "The coins date back to the Fatimid Caliphate which conquered Israel near the end of the 10th century AD. The Fatimids controlled a vast empire, from Morocco


ly important in the 10th and 11th centuries, because it was the currency of the Fatinid's monetary system," Dr. Kool told Tazpit News Agency.

Dr. Kool states that the treasure is "the largest I've seen found in an Israeli archeological excavation. Nevertheless, I don't think it is of exceptional size considering the Fatimid's trade system. We assume the treasure arrived from Egypt, and was part of a payment for trade services," Dr. Kool told Tazpit News.

The treasure contains approximately 2,000 gold coins of different denominations: a dinar, half dinar and guarter dinar. They are of various dimensions and weight. The earliest coin discovered in the treasure is a quarter dinar, minted in Palermo, Sicily, which was part of the Fatimid Caliphate.

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
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
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




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Esther, One of the Greatest Women of All Time Part One By: Rabbi Moshe Meir Weiss

One of the highlights of Purim and indeed of the entire year is the study of Megillas Esther. The very first question that confronts us about the megillah is, Why is it called Megillas Esther? At the very least, we should call it Megillas Mordechai v'Esther since Mordechai also played a pivotal role in the miracle. Or, perhaps it should have been called Megillas Purim.

In general, we shy away from putting our women in the limelight for the Torah always emphasizes the great principle of "Kol kevudah bas melech penima – The dignity and honor of the Jewish 'princess' is within." The Jewish woman of valor shines in the privacy of her home and through the glory of her modesty. So, why did the sages choose to put Esther up in neon lights by calling the megillah Megillas Esther?

The most elementary reason is because it was due to Esther's petition that the megillah was written. For the Gemora relates that Esther went to the Anshei Kneses HaGedolah and requested "Kivauni l'doros – Affix me for all generations." Esther, inspired by ruach hakodesh, divine inspiration, knew that there were lessons in the megillah that were timeless in nature and were necessary for the development of our nation throughout the ages. And how time has proven this to be correct! Except for the Hagaddah shel Pesach and, of course, the Torah itself, no other work of scripture has as many commentaries as does the Megillas Esther. Its lessons such as the ugliness of pride as seen through the behavior of Haman, the dangers of showing off one's wealth as can be seen from Achashveirosh's feast and consequent execution of Vashti, the effectiveness of fasting and prayer, the importance of achdus, and many others that are applicable for every generation.

Esther also wanted to clear her name so that no one should suspect this Beis Yakov woman of desiring to be the First Lady of the Persian Empire. Thus, the megillah in its encrypted way, lets us know that v'tilakach Esther, each time she was taken to the king, it was against her will. Similarly, the megillah informs us that when she went in for her interview with the king, "lo bikeish davar, she did not ask for any enhancements," for she was dreading an appointment as queen.

Another obvious reason for the megillah being called Megillas Esther is the fact that it was Esther who made it clear that the episode of Purim was truly miraculous. Everything else could be explained away as natural causes. Haman, the Amaleiki hating the Jews, the Head of the Mordechai Sanhedrin who spoke 70 languages thus enabling him to overhear Bigsan and Seresh's plot against Achashveirosh when they spoke in the rare language of Tarshish, therefore putting Mordechai on Achashveirosh's list of favored people, the effectiveness of the fasting and prayers of Klal Yisroel to overturn the decree for, after all, even the gentile city of Ninveh was

able to abort their destruction when they did sincere repentance. All of these events are eminently natural. But that Esther, a pious modest



Jewish woman, unschooled in the promiscuous licentious ways of the Persian Court, should beat out all of the other women of the realm for the Number One spot in the empire is truly miraculous. Add to that the fact that Esther had to be dragged into the king and yet he was nevertheless enamored with her. This, we recall, is the very same king who had executed Vashti for not coming in, in an obscene way, and so it is altogether unbelievable.

Plus. there was another astounding miracle associated with The Gemora informs us Esther. "Shel'kol echad v'echad nidmasa lo k'umoso – To every individual she appeared like his own nationality. Thus to Achashveirosh, she appeared like a native Persian, while to Haman she looked like a truerblooded Amalikite. (This, says the Chasam Sofer, Zt"l, Zy"a, is the reason why Haman never suspected Esther.) Since it is from Esther that it was clear that the entire saga of Purim was miraculous, we call it Megillas Esther.




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
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




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




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


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HIKIND ASKS FOR NADLER'S SEAT, IF EMPTY, TO HEAR NETANYAHU'S ADDRESS TRAN: EXISTENTIAL THREAT TO THE STATE OF ISRAEL

Dismayed that President Obama continues to obsess with stopping Israeli Prime Minister Bibi Netanyahu from addressing Congress on an issue regarding an existential threat to Israel, Assemblyman Dov Hikind (D-Brooklyn) is asking his representative, Congressman Jerrold Nadler, if he may sit in his chair for the speech should the Congressman find himself unable to attend. Further, if Nadler's fellow Democrats plan to boycott the speech, Hikind says there are plenty of people who would appreciate filling their chairs, too.

"Never in my lifetime can I recall such turmoil in the world as we have now," said Hikind. "Further, I can't recollect a time when America's leaders have taken less of a decisive role in safeguarding long-term American interests on the international stage. While Iran has been long recognized by the U.S. as a terrorist state, and Israel has been our staunchest ally since its in-

ception, an outsider observing the White House's treatment of the two would have a difficult time discerning who we consider our friend."

Hikind noted that



Iran is the world's foremost state sponsor of terrorism, which it uses as a strategic tool in its foreign policy. "Iran allies itself with, and openly supports, recognized terror organizations such as Hezbollah and Hamas. Iran's leaders unashamedly affirm their goal to destroy the State of Israel. As such, U.S. leaders are duty-bound to ensure that Iran is not permitted to develop a nuclear weapon to make good on their threats. Consequently, it's astounding to hear President Obama still talking about 'protocols' for a visiting head of state-an ally-when the lives of millions potentially hang in the balance. This is how we treat our friends? And why be afraid of a speech? What does our President think the Prime Minister might say that we shouldn't hear? Does he fear Netanyahu may convince Congress of something?"

"President Obama's only explanation this week was that it is important to 'main-

tain protocols' and that his decision to refuse to meet with Israel's Prime Minister during this trip is to maintain the U.S.-Israeli relationship and not let it become partisan. But this sends the opposite message. Ignoring a friend in need—a friend in crisis—is not the optimum way to maintain a relationship.

"Given an invitation to speak before Congress in an effort to save his nation from imminent danger is an opportunity no leader of any country would refuse, regardless of protocols. Whether or not Speaker Boehner's invitation to address Congress followed the accepted or expected etiquette, it's time to look past decorum and get to the heart of the matter: It is in the best interest of the United States that we listen carefully to what Prime Minister Netanyahu has to say. I am more than disappointed to read that some of my fellow Democrats plan to boycott this critical address."

In a letter to Congressman Nadler, Hikind asked, "In the unlikely event that you will not be attending Prime Minister Netanyahu's address to Congress, please allow me to sit in your seat for those few hours. Indeed, as some of your colleagues plan to boycott this speech, perhaps you can help secure their seats for others who are terribly interested in this important address. I believe all American elected officials should carefully weigh what our sole Democratic ally in the Middle East has to say, and I for one will be listening closely."





If one honors his parents by feeding them and helping them live longer, he will merit to live longer himself.



The Chinuch and Chayei Adam are of the opinion that the mitzvah of "kibbud av ve'eim" is stemming from "hakaras ha'tova." They bring proof from the Yerushalmi in Kiddushin perek aleph. Rav Avin says the mitzvah of "Kibbud av ve'eim" is like paying a debt. The Ksav Sofer and Meshech Chochma differ and say that it is a "gezeiras hakasuv." That is why Hashem gave this commandment in Marah where the parents had very little say regarding the material possessions of their children since everything was provided by Hashem. (Mohn, the clothing grew with them etc ...) Nevertheless, one is still required to honor his parents.

In conclusion, honoring your parents is like honoring Hashem. Do it while you can so you can have it done to yourself longer.

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Building Our Children's Self-Esteem

It's hard to believe that very soon it will be the shloshim for the much loved Dovid Winiarz, Dovid Avrohom ben Chiya Khas Z"L ZY"A, who departed from us so suddenly several weeks ago. When we improve ourselves from the way he lived his life, we know it brings an aliya, an uplifting to his neshama. So, I would like to share with you one extraordinary lesson that all of us can better ourselves from.

"With so many followers, who has time to do the homework and take the kids for pizza?"

We have heard much about how Dovid impacted thousands through Facebook and many other ingenious means of outreach. Very often, when someone is so involved with the masses, their immediate family tends to suffer. After all, with so many followers, who has time to do the homework and take the kids for pizza? However, such was not the case with Dovid and his ten children.

This reminds me of the famous question asked when we make a sivum on any masechta. In the siyum's ritual language, we mention Rav Pappa and his ten sons. This is very odd for, what does Rav Pappa's family have to do with the finishing of a tractate? One answer is given that the gematria of Rav Pappa's ten sons' names is the numerical equivalent of all the dafs in Shas. Another amazing answer, given by the Topiker Ray, is that in ten places in Shas there are arguments where one sage says 'one way' and another sage says 'another way' and Rav Pappa says, 'Therefore let's do them both.' Since he was such a great peacemaker - ten times - he was rewarded with ten children who finished Shas. But, I like the beauty of the simple answer which is: Even though Rav Pappa was very

busy with his ten sons, he was still able to finish Shas.

Likewise, with Dovid, it went both ways. Even though he was busy with ten children, he still had 12,400 followers on Facebook. And, even though he had 12,400 followers on Facebook, he still set a beautiful example as a loving Abba.

We should never lose sight of our priorities in life. Rabbi Wein, Shlit"a,

sites a Harvard study where they tracked 1,500 children over the course of their development. In the first stage of the study, when the child was coming out of pre-1A and entering first grade, the child was asked how he felt about it. Eighty-two percent answered in the positive. Then, the study took a shocking turn. The second stage of the study was when the children went from 8th to 9th grade. The results, amazingly, were just the opposite: Eighty-

two percent of the children answered that they were feeling very poorly about themselves. Only eighteen percent felt good about themselves. Finally, in the last stage of the study, the situation deteriorated further. By the time they left high school, only eight percent of the children felt good about themselves. This study reveals how fragile are the feelings of self-esteem that our young ones cradle and how they get buffeted by the pressures of school and home.

In this area, Dovid, as an Abba, set a great example. He always chose to shine the light on the aspect of strength of each of his children. One of his daughters told me that she has seven binders of notes that her father left on her pillow, messages of encouragement, poems that he wrote for her, sayings that he found for her, tips to strengthen her. He was an Abba who supported and didn't harass his children. Sadly, I can think of parents who, if their children come home with a score of 89 on a test, they are berated with 'Why couldn't you get a 90?' If the child gets a 93, they hear, 'What careless mistake did you make again, that you couldn't get a 100?' Or, there are parents who unwisely say to a child, 'Why can't you be like your older brother?' or the unthinking parent who

says, 'You know, you'll never change.' It's our role as parents to boost the morale of our children, to make them feel special. That confidence implanted by parents will serve their



children well as spouses, as employers and employees, as friends and as good servants of Hashem.

Another beautiful trait that Dovid employed in his home was a Loshon Noki Club, the Clean Speech Clan. He would not tolerate use of a word like 'dumb.' He never said that he had a 'bad' day. The children told me that they knew that things were not going his way if he just answered with the words, "Hodu l'Hashem - Thank the Lord." If they asked him whether he got the grant he was working on and he replied 'Hodu Hashem,' they knew things weren't going his way because otherwise he was effusive with an enthusiastic response about what was going on. It is certain that he was so successful in his kiruv conquests because he had such a positive approach and he pointed out the promising potential in every person that he spoke with.

So let us all try to emulate this skill and see how we can bring out in our children their latent strengths and impress upon them their fine qualities to succeed in making them the very best that they can be. In that merit may it be the will of Hashem that we should be blessed with long life, good health, all kinds of Yiddishe nachas.

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


CRACKING UP Dear Editor:



Recess...So Important!

School is where children spend most of their time, and a typical school day lasts about 7 hours. Many children ride a bus to and from school, some with ride times of greater than 30 minutes each way. This equals at least 8 hours of relatively sedentary, non-active time for children every day. All of this translates into school being a place where kids need to exercise. Recess has become an important opportunity for movement for today's children.

Yet some teachers routinely withhold recess for lack of work completion or behavior issues. We should step back and think about recess in terms of whether it's a right or a privilege, and consider the school's responsibility toward teaching healthy lifestyles for each student. Missing recess on occasion is probably not an ethical dilemma. However, if a student is missing recess more than once a month due to behavior problems or failure to finish classroom assignments, this could be considered taking away a child's right to move and have unstructured break time in his school day.

THE IMPORTANCE OF BREAKS

Teachers are under much pressure to show progress for students. Their job security depends on it. Teachers are also dealing with larger class sizes and fewer resources. They struggle with ways to help students get work done, and many choose to use recess as a privilege earned for completed classroom work or good behavior. If school is the workplace of children, then recess is their break from that work. Labor contracts usually include breaks and lunch periods for teachers. Teachers cannot be told to work through their contracted break time.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor,

nine states have laws mandating break time in all workplaces after 3-4 hours worked.1 Although optional, most companies allow for 10-15 minutes of break time after 4 hours of work is completed. Utab's Child Labor Law requires a 10-minute break for every 3 hours of work a child completes, and a 30-minute lunch after 5 hours. The United Nations Standards of Human Rights recommends that every prisoner receive at least one hour of exercise outside each day.2 If, as a society, we realize the importance of letting prisoners get outside, shouldn't we give the same right to our children?

EDUCATIONAL GUIDELINES

Thirteen states now have laws that mandate recess time during the school day. Eight additional states have recommendations for movement in schools, including California and Vermont, which encourage daily recess for students. The remaining states have no written policy or recommendation regarding daily movement breaks in schools. The American Academy of Pediatrics and The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend nationally that districts provide at least 20 minutes of daily recess for all students in elementary schools. Schools should inform teachers of state mandates and recommendations about break time, but teachers should also be responsible for knowing their state's guidelines. Individual school policies may also cover recess parameters. Schools are responsible for teaching children facts, but they should also strive to teach children how to be creative, hard-working, and healthy adults. Modeling a healthy lifestyle, including physical fitness, is a part of this.

Obesity is on the rise in this country. Chil-

dren today are more sedentary and overweight than at any time in history. Kids who are overweight also suffer from low muscle tone and have a harder time paying attention. These are the students who lean their heads on their hands and seem "spaced out" during class. Going outside helps activate their core muscles and wakes up their under-responding nervous systems. Getting them moving will help them get thinking. In every classroom, there is a child who is very off-task. He looks everywhere in the room but his paper, is bouncing, talking, tapping, and being a general distraction to other kids. This child does not typically get his work done during class time. To make matters worse, this is the same child who doesn't often bring homework back to school. Distracted children have a higher need for movement than other kids. Their bodies are unable to sit for long periods and still retain information. Very distracted kids can usually sit still or listen, but not both at once. Taking movement breaks away from these students can bring learning to a standstill.


Recess is meant to recharge and rejuvenate each child in order for them to be ready to work again. Instilling a healthy lifestyle, including breaks for our children, will help them become the amazing adults they have the potential to be.
