# Dennard Abraham

Senior Forward · 6-8, 245 lbs.

Owings Mills, Md. · Notre Dame Academy · Sport Studies Major



Towson's big force underneath ... one of the Tigers' captains this season ... showed marked improvement as his junior year progressed.

**2005-2006 Season:** Played a major role in what went on underneath the basket for the Tigers ... a starter in 27 of 28 games ... 3rd leading scorer with a 12.0 average ... registered his career high of 27 points to show the way in the home win over Virginia Commonwealth ... previous career high was 21 in win at Delaware ... second leading rebounder (6.3) ... scored in double figures 18 times ... had his first double-double (10 boards, 13 points) in the victory over UMBC ... had his second double-double (11 points, 10 boards) in loss to ODU ... 3rd double-double came at George Mason (17 points, 11 rebounds) ... 4th was in the regular season finale against Northeastern (23 points, 11 boards) ... his play picked up as the season progressed ... in the final 6 games of the regular season he averaged 17.7 ppg, 8.7 rpg, 37.2 minutes per game, shot .522 from the floor and sank 9 treys ... likes to shoot the long ball and made 21 of 71 attempts from beyond the arc.

**At South Plains College:** Dennard transferred from South Plains College in Levelland, Texas where he was a first team and honorable mention All-Western Junior College Athletic Conference selection ... in his freshman year he started 10 of 32 games, averaging 11.4 points and 5.5 rebounds ... in 2004-05 he started 20 of 28 games, leading the Texans in scoring with a 17.4 average, and in rebounding with a 7.7 clip ... in two years Dennard scored 850 points (14.2 avg.) and collected 391 rebounds (6.5 avg.) in leading the Texans to a 45-18 record ... "Guys like this don't come along very often," said South Plains coach Steve Green. "He's got excellent skills for a player his size. He can shoot the three as good as he can take the ball to the basket."

**In High School:** Dennard attended Franklin and Owings Mills H.S. in Baltimore County before finishing his prep career at Notre Dame Academy in Middleburg, Va., the same school attended by Towson's recent 1,000-career point scorer, Jamaal Gilchrist (2002-04) ... he averaged 15.0 points, 10.0 rebounds and 3.0 blocks in helping the Dragons to a league championship ... he was a first team All-Conference selection while at Notre Dame Academy.

**Background/Personal:** Surname is Dennard John Abraham ... played on the same AAU Baltimore Select team as Carmello Anthony (Syracuse/Denver Nuggets), Todd Galloway (Florida State), Jai Lewis (George Mason) and Kenny Minor (Manhattan) ... his brother, Dwayne, enjoyed a stellar two years at Howard (Tex.) College ... that 6-8, 240-pounder is now attending Florida Southern and majoring in graphic design ... Dennard and Dwayne went head-to-head in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference four times ... Dennard's South Plains squad won the first three ... Dwayne's Howard team won the final encounter 65-58 ... Dennard works part-time as a sheet rocker and mowing grass during the summer months for his older brother, Manson ... the person he most admires is his mom ... hobbies include ipopping tagsi or shopping ... shares a birthday with Towson teammate Velmar Coleman ... favorite athlete is Michael Jordan ... favorite actor is Denzel Washington ... most memorable experience to date was sinking a three pointer at the buzzer to beat Woodlawn High School 57-54 ... his ambition is to play professional basketball ... son of Patricia Abraham ... born February 22, 1984 in Baltimore.

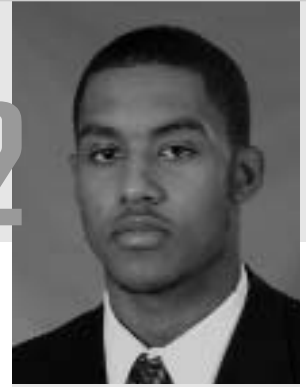

**2005-2006 Season:** A starter in 3 consecutive games against William & Mary, Northeastern and American University ... scored his season high at American University, netting 10 points ... played a season high 28 minutes at AU and also in the home victory over William & Mary ... after the AU game he came off the bench, scoring just 5 points the rest of the way ... averaged 23.7 minutes as a starter and 6.15 minutes as a sub.

**2004-2005 Season:** The first guard off the bench ... started 8 games, averaging 16.1 minutes per game ... started the last 3 games of the season ... scored in double figures 4 times, hitting his season high of 12 points at UMBC ... he matched that in the regular season finale at home against Drexel ... played a career high 39 minutes at VMI, scoring 11 points, grabbing 4 rebounds and registering a career high 7 assists ... netted 10 points in the home victory over James Madison ... did not play in the Norfolk State game.

**2003-2004 Season:** A starter in 9 games during the first half of the season when the Tigers were starting an all freshman backcourt ... averaged over 22 minutes and 7.3 points per game in the first 12 games, averaged half that (11 minutes, 3.5 points) the rest of the way ... registered a number of his career highs in a home game against Virginia Tech ... had career high points (22), rebounds (7) and assists (3) against the Hokies ... also played a career high 34 minutes in that contest before fouling out late ... garnered the only weekly honor for Tiger Basketball in 2003-04 when he was named CAA Rookie of the Week for helping Towson beat Loyola ... Trevan scored 13 of his 15 points in the second half ... that win over the Greyhounds snapped a 12-game road losing streak for the Tigers ... his best showing late in the year came at Drexel when he tallied a team high 16 points, making 8 of 10 free throws.

**At Friendly H.S.:** Trevan averaged 17.6 points, 6.0 rebounds, 7.0 assists and 4.0 steals per game for the Friendly Patriots ... helped team win the Maryland State Class AAA championship with a 25-1 record, beating opponents by an average of 22 points per game ... the Patriots' lone loss was a forfeited victory over DuVal for a team infraction ... Friendly beat

Chopticon High School 66-57 for the state 3A title with Trevan playing against current Towson teammate Jonathan Pease, who started at forward for the Braves ... Trevan had 18 points in the win, Jonathan 12 points in the loss ... the Patriots were ranked first in Prince Georges County, second in the state and 18th nationally by Hoops USA ... Trevan shot 60 percent from the floor including a .400 clip from 3-point range ... his career high was 30 points in a victory over Forestville ... Trevan was a two-year starter for Friendly and a three-year member of its varsity that compiled a 62-12 record during that period ... a first team All-Metro and All-County selection and a second team All-State pick, he started at guard for the Blue Team in the 30th Anniversary Jordan Capital Classic Regional Game in the MCI Center last March

The leading returner scorer in NCAA Division I with a 26.1 average last year ... should be a leading candidate for All-CAA honors including Player of the Year ... picked as the third best shooting guard in the nation by Sporting News College Basketball Preview 2006-07 ... Selected Pre-Season First Team All-CAA ... Ranked as the 46th best college player in collegehoops.net CHN Top 100 ... co-captain this season along with Dennard Abraham.

**2005-2006 Season:** Named Second Team All-CAA despite missing 11 of Towson's 28 games because of the NCAA transfer rule and a foot injury late in the year ... he still managed to lead the Tigers in scoring ... in his 17 appearances he scored a team high 444 points for a 26.1 average ... he averaged a team high 35.3 minutes per game ... he was impressive outside the three-point arc where he connected on a team high 62 of 153 attempts ... he led Towson at the free throw line with an .803 clip (106-132) ... in the final 4:00 of games, he shot 51 of 54 (.944) from the charity stripe ... a transfer from La Salle University ... due to NCAA transfer rule he did not become eligible at Towson until December 21 when the Tigers met VMI ... scored 1,041 points in two seasons at LaSalle ... debuted at Towson with a game high 28 points, scoring 14 points in his first 5:24 off the bench ... tied a Towson single game record by hitting 6 three-pointers in his debut ... accomplished that again in the win over Hofstra ... he later broke that record twice with 7 treys made back-to-back at Drexel and at Hofstra ... also added a career high 8 assists in his TU debut ... the Tigers' top scorer in every game he played for Towson with the exception of the last game when he came off a 20-day layoff ... was sidelined the last four games of the regular season with a foot injury he sustained against Drexel ... he played the entire 40 minutes 5 days later, hobbling through the game but still managed 21 points against James Madison ... scored over 25 points in 11 of his 17 games ... netted 40 points against JMU, the first 40-point game of his career ... he was the only player in the CAA to have a 40-point game in 2005-06 ... his 40-point effort was the 5th highest single game total in Towson history ... scored the go ahead basket with 14 seconds left in 69-66 victory at Lehigh that ended a 14-game losing streak ... led the Tigers to an 86-75 win at the College of Charleston by scoring 30 points including 20 in the second half to hand the Cougars just their 2nd loss in the last 20 home games ... scored a game high 34 points, including 12 points in the last 2:09, in a 94-91 win over Hofstra ... tallied a team high 27 points including 18 in the second half as the

Tigers beat Delaware 96-92 in Newark where Towson won for just the 4th time in 16 trips to the Bob Carpenter Center ... broke the school record with 7 three-pointers in a 31-point effort at Drexel ... was named CAA Player of the Week three times.

**2003-04 Season: At La Salle:** Led La Salle in scoring for a second straight year with a 17.9 average ... earned second team All-Atlantic 10 honors ... the Explorers' top scorer in 15 games ... shot 33.9 per cent from three-point range ... his 32 points against Villanova were a personal and team season high ... led the team in free throw shooting again with a .847 mark, making 111 of 131 attempts ... scored 30 or more points five times ... had 30 points in Explorers' 71-65 win over Chattanooga in the championship game of the Chattanooga Dr. Pepper Classic, earning all-tournament honors.

**2002-03 Season: At La Salle:** Earned Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Year and second team All A-10 honors for leading the Explorers in scoring with an 18.6 average ... registered his career high of 37 points against Xavier ... had 33-point games against Rutgers and Dayton ... starter in 22 of 29 games ... was the Explorers' leading scorer in 17 games ... shot a team high .817 from the free throw line, hitting 116 of 142 attempts ... named as Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Week five times.

Playing time dipped in his junior year ... hopeful of bringing his numbers up in his final season.

**2005-2006 Season:** Played sparingly, appearing in 8 games for a total of 27 minutes ... his only points in the season came in the win over Drexel ... good work ethic ... excellent student who was named to the Colonial Athletic Association Commissioner's List.

**2004-2005 Season:** Holden went from a bench sub in his freshman year to a starter his sophomore season ... as a freshman he played a total of 251 minutes (11.4 per game), the least of anyone on the squad ... in 2004-05, in 27 games, he played 667 minutes (23.8 per game) with 21 starts ... scored in double figures 7 times ... registered at least two points in 26 of his 28 games ... hit his career high of 19 points in the road win at VMI, going 8 of 12 from the field while collecting 8 rebounds ... grabbed a career and game high 11 rebounds at Old Dominion ... a good outside shooter for a big guy, he led the Tigers with a .417 clip from beyond the arc.

**2003-2004 Season:** Gave the Tigers valuable minutes off the bench ... he was the only player on the squad without a start but he made 22 appearances, averaging 11.4 minutes per game ... scored a career high 9 points at George Washington ... grabbed a career high 6 rebounds against George Mason ... scored in 14 of his games.

**At St. Paul's School:** Holden is the first player in St. Paul's school history to receive a Division I basketball scholarship ... a three-year starter for coach Jack MacMullan's Crusaders, he was the last man on the jayvee squad as a freshman but improved where he earned a starting position on the varsity as a sophomore ... credits the many late night hours he spent working under his dad's tutelage for his impressive jump from jayvee scrub to varsity starter in one year ... helped St. Paul's to a 22-5 record in his senior year and a runner up spot in the Maryland Interscholastic Athletic Association iBi Conference championship tournament, averaging 17.9 points and 10.5 rebounds ... over Holden's junior and senior years the Crusaders won 34 straight league games ...

he was a first team All-League selection, a second team All-Metro pick and a second team All City/County choice in his senior year ... selected to the Baltimore All Star team for the Charm City Challenge ... he was the recipient of St. Paul's Stephen H. Towson University is one of many NCAA member institutions using the nickname iTigers.i The tiger is the most popular mascot among American colleges and universities.

However, its obvious popularity was not the real reason the Tiger was selected to represent Towson.

When Towson was a two-year normal school the Baltimore media referred to its teams as the iTeachers.i As the school expanded to three and four year programs, the newspapers granted Towson student athletes tenure, calling them the iProfessorsi and even shortening it to iProf.s.i Later, it was changed again to the iSchoolmasters.i

The iIndiansi and iGolden Knightsi were other nicknames used over the years. But as the tale goes, the moniker was finally decided after a soccer match.

One autumn afternoon a sportswriter was covering the Towson soccer team in an uphill struggle. The next day the writer wrote that although the team had lost the game, iOthey played like tigers.i

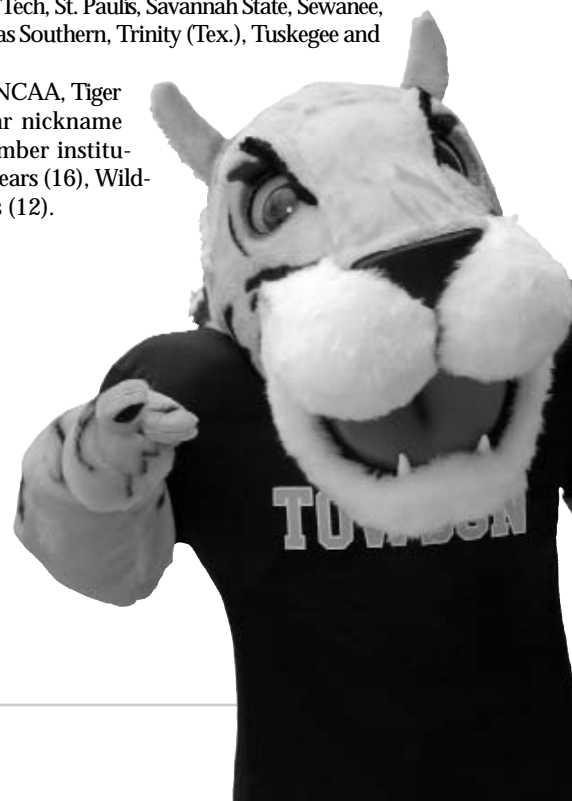
The soccer team appreciated the comment and adopted iTigersi as its nickname. Enthusiasm for it spread throughout the campus and the tiger eventually became the official designated mascot.

The Towson Tiger logo has also experienced change. The current design was adopted in 2002 to reflect a program on the move. Previously aistylistici tiger replaced an upright caricature that had been used since the mid-80s. That took the place of a block tiger which served as the logo from 1979.

The Towson logo is registered. Approval for its use commercially is required. For color reproduction purposes, please contact the Towson University Office of Athletic Media Relations for separation instructions.

Other schools across the country who are also members of the iTigeri fraternity include Auburn, Bishop, Clemson, Colorado College, DePauw, Doane, Grambling, Hampden-Sydney, Jackson State, Lincoln (Mo.), Livingston, LSU, Memphis, Missouri, Morehouse, Occidental, Pacific, Princeton, Rochester Tech, St. Pauls, Savannah State, Sewanee, Tennessee State, Texas Southern, Trinity (Tex.), Tuskegee and Wittenberg.

According to the NCAA, Tiger is the most popular nickname (28) among its member institutions, followed by Bears (16), Wild-cats (12) and Eagles (12).

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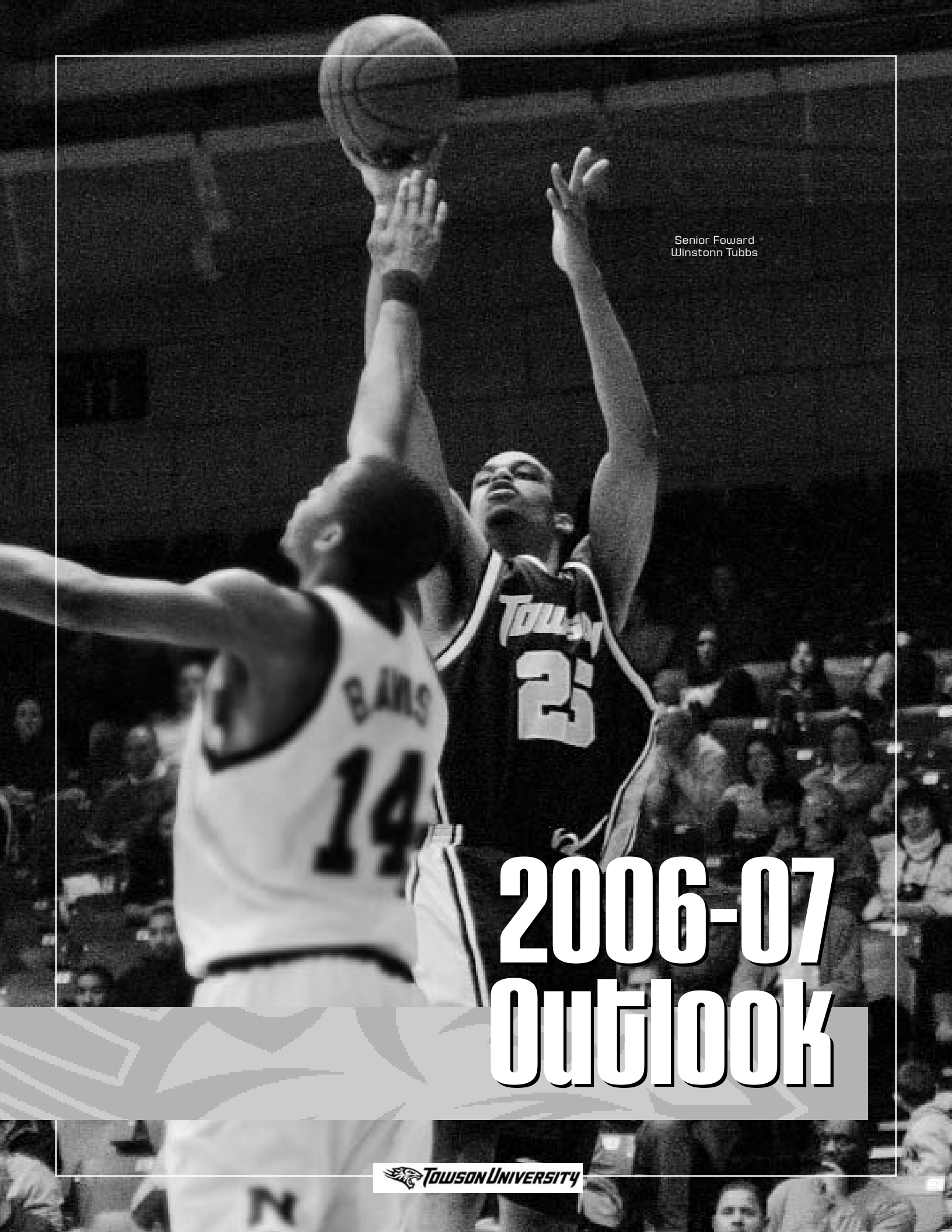

# 2006-07 Outlook



Towson's talent level is up and to the relief of head coach Pat Kennedy, it arrives just in the nick of time as the Tigers prepare to face perhaps their toughest schedule ever. The Tigers are ...

# Up To The Challenge



As if the Tigers' non-conference schedule that includes Kansas, Georgetown and Temple isn't enough of a concern to Coach Kennedy, Towson's Colonial Athletic Association slate poses another huge challenge, a fact highlighted by George Mason's NCAA Final Four appearance last year.

***"Our goal all along has been to get into our league's upper group,"*** says Kennedy, who enters his 3rd season at Towson and his 27th year as a Division I head coach with a 433-351 record. ***"When we get to the top of the CAA we'll put ourselves among the nation's elite."***

All-American Candidate

Towson made significant progress toward achieving its goal last year, posting a 12-16 record after a 5-24 mark the previous season. In fact, the Tigers were the most improved team in the CAA through the 2005-06 regular season. Their 8-10 league record was their best ever in five CAA seasons.

***“If we can stay healthy and come together as a team we’ll be in the thick of things around tournament time,”*** says Kennedy.

With six of their top seven players returning to mix with several impressive newcomers, 2006-07 could be an exciting year for the Tigers.

## Backcourt

Towson hasn’t had a backcourt like this since 1989-91 when Devin Boyd (2,000-point career scorer) and Kurk Lee (New Jersey Nets) led the Tigers to the school’s only two NCAA tournament appearances. This year’s edition features the top returning scorer in Division I, two talented sophomores with 46 starts between them as freshmen, and a NJCAA 3rd Team All-American.

Senior off guard **Gary Neal** (6-4, 200) is the group’s headliner. After averaging 26.1 points per game he is the returning Division I scoring leader. A transfer from La Salle, Gary played in only 17 games last year after joining the squad in late December and then missing four games in February due to an injury. He wasn’t listed among the NCAA statistical leaders since he failed to compete in at least 75% of Towson’s games.

Despite the abbreviated season the league coaches realized Gary’s impact and named him to the CAA 2nd Team.

***“He’s the purest scorer I’ve ever had,”*** says Kennedy. ***“He can score long, mid-range, going to the basket. He can play the lead guard spot as well.”***

Sophomores **Tim Crossin** (6-2, 170) and **Rocky Coleman** (6-3, 185) are back too.

Crossin, an All-CAA Rookie Team selection last year, was the only player to start all 28 games when he logged a team high 955 minutes at point guard. He’s a natural wing where the Tigers hope to take advantage of his shot. Tim averaged 8.9 points per game with 53 of his 75 made field goals coming from beyond the arc. He is the CAA assist leader among all returning players.

Coleman made 18 starts last year as a swing guard, averaging 6.1 points. Very quick and athletic, Rocky is Towson’s best player in transition. Kennedy is impressed with the progress he has made in the off-season.

Neal, Crossin and Coleman combine to rank third nationally among returning Division I three-man backcourts, averaging 41.1 points per game.

In the mix is junior college transfer **C.C. Williams** (6-1, 180) who the Tigers are counting on to pick up the pace at both ends of the floor.

***“We knew we had to improve on the defensive end and C.C. really helps us there,”*** says Kennedy. ***“He adds a dimension that our team needs in terms of a true point guard with great speed and quickness. He’s going to make a tremendous difference in our team in several different areas.”***

In addition to putting pressure on the ball, C.C. is no slouch when it comes to offense. The all-time leading scoring at Brunswick (N.C.) Community College, Williams led the Carolinas Junior College (Division I Level)

***“The Tigers defied predictions last season by climbing to seventh place in the standings. Now Towson is better prepared to compete in this league than at any time in recent memory.”*** *SportingNews College Basketball Preview 2006-07.*

Conference last season with a 21.8 scoring average. He’s also BCC’s all-time assist leader.

Experience is always a plus and that’s what senior **Treva Jackson** (6-0, 182) offers as a veteran off the bench.

Both Rocky and Tim could wind up playing some lead guard too.

## Frontcourt

With its numerous possibilities, the small forward spot is the most competitive position on the team. Returning starter senior **Marc Pratt** (6-3, 198) is going to be pushed by junior **Jonathan Pease** (6-6, 190) and freshman **Rodney Spruill** (6-4, 218). All three have a legitimate claim to the spot as does Neal who could see duty there when the Tigers go to a three-guard set.

Pratt, the quickest of all the big men, started 21 games last year on the wing but he'll need to score more (4.2 ppg) if he hopes to hold off Pease and Spruill.

*"Marc gives us tremendous depth on the perimeter,"* says Kennedy. *"Consistency will be a key for him."*

Pease sat out last year after undergoing knee surgery. As the Tigers' top outside threat in 2004-05 Jonathan worked his way into the starting lineup only to have his season interrupted by a knee injury. In his first start he scored a career high 25 points at VMI. That proved to be Towson's single game high for the year.

*"Jonathan has had some great moments but because of all the surgery it's a wait-and-see thing with him,"* says Kennedy.

Spruill brings impressive credentials with him. A high school teammate of Coleman's at Walbrook and the Baltimore City Player of the Year as a junior, Rodney averaged 22.0 points, 13.0 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.0 blocks as a senior. A two-time first team All-Metro selection he helped Walbrook to a two-year 47-7 record that included two city championships and one Maryland state title.

*"Rodney is a player with great promise,"* says Kennedy. *"He does a number of different things well."*

Freshman walk-on **Sean Goodrich** (6-4, 195) brings quickness and figures to add depth.

The biggest task up front is to replace power forward Lawrence Hamm who departed the program as Towson's 13th all-time leading scorer (1,318 points) and 4th leading rebounder (788).

## Preseason in the CAA

Kennedy hopes senior **Winstonn Tubbs** (6-6, 210), who was the first big guy off the bench last year, steps up. Winstonn has 31 career starts under his belt.

*"It's his spot to lose,"* the coach says. *"Lawrence had a break out season his senior year. We hope Winstonn duplicates that."*

Junior **Sean Raboin** (6-7, 204) has been moved down to the post area from the wing where he spent his first two years playing sparingly. Kennedy likes Sean's tenacity and toughness.

Sophomore walk-on **Anthony Fair** (6-6, 230), a transfer from Delaware State, adds depth.

The other post spot is well manned by seniors **Dennard Abraham** (6-8, 245) and **Holden Plack** (6-8, 225) plus junior college transfer **Tommy Breaux** (6-9, 210).

Dennard is the returning starter. "I've never coached anyone who grew as a player like Dennard did at the end of last year," says Kennedy. He was Towson's third leading scorer last year with a 12.0 clip. In the final six games he averaged 17.7 points, 8.7 rebounds, 37.2 minutes and shot .522 from the floor.

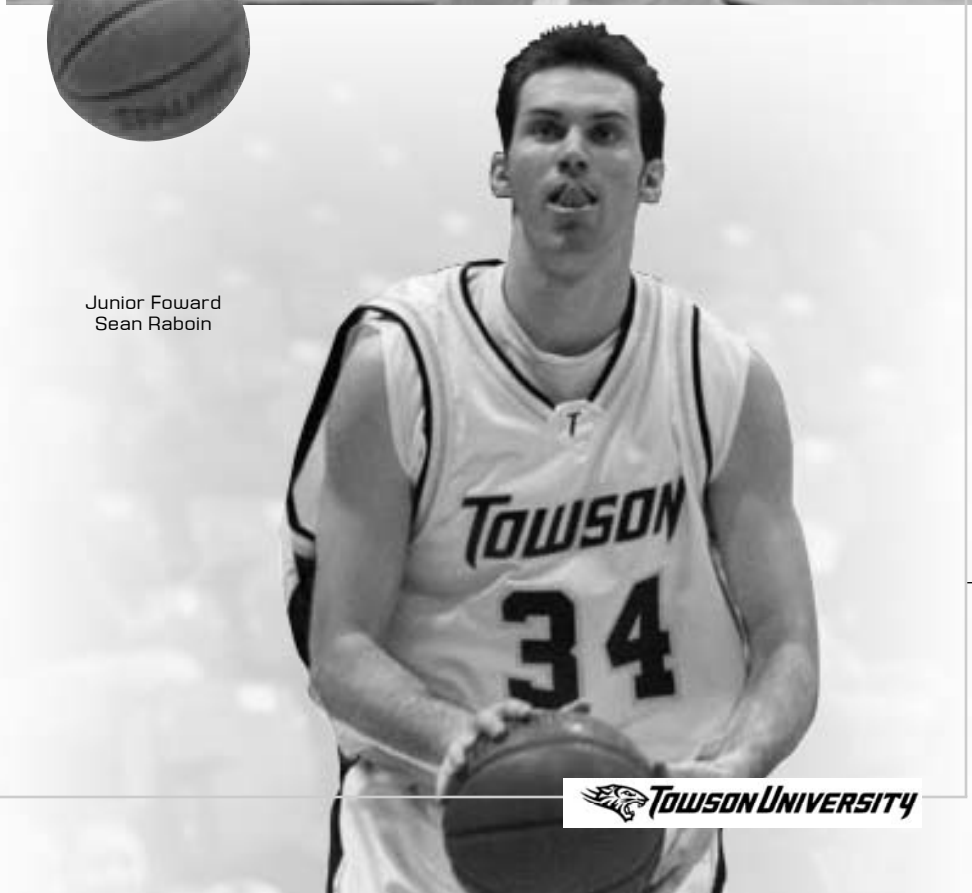
Holden's playing time plummeted to 27 total minutes in eight games last year from an average of 23.8 in 2004-05 as a starter. His academic schedule kept him from making practice. The Tigers hope he returns to form this season.

Breaux led the Region 14 conference in rebounding (13.4 rpg) at Blinn Junior College while averaging 10.6 points. If he develops it would give the Tigers another boost. Both Breaux and Fair are also Towson football players and won't join the team until after the 2006 season is complete.

*"Tommy obviously will give us a bigger presence underneath, both offensively and defensively,"* says Kennedy. "

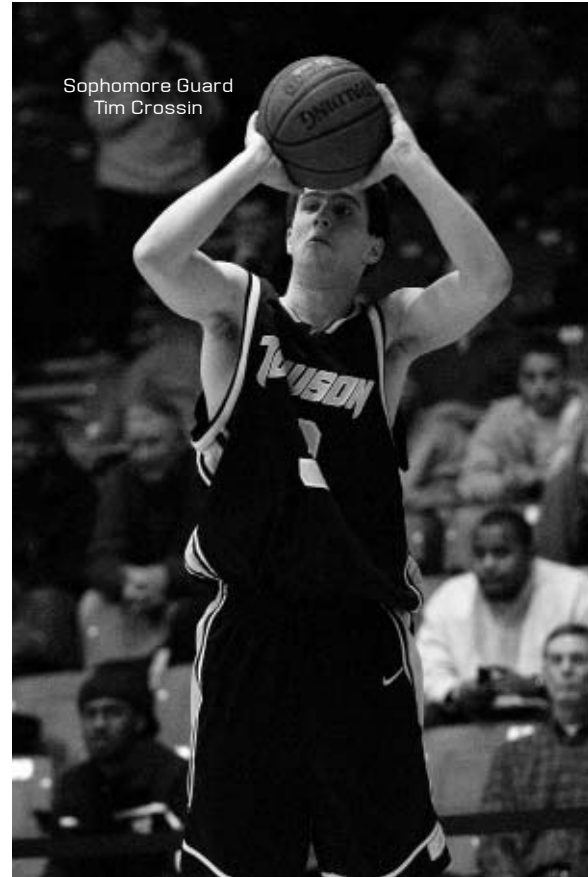

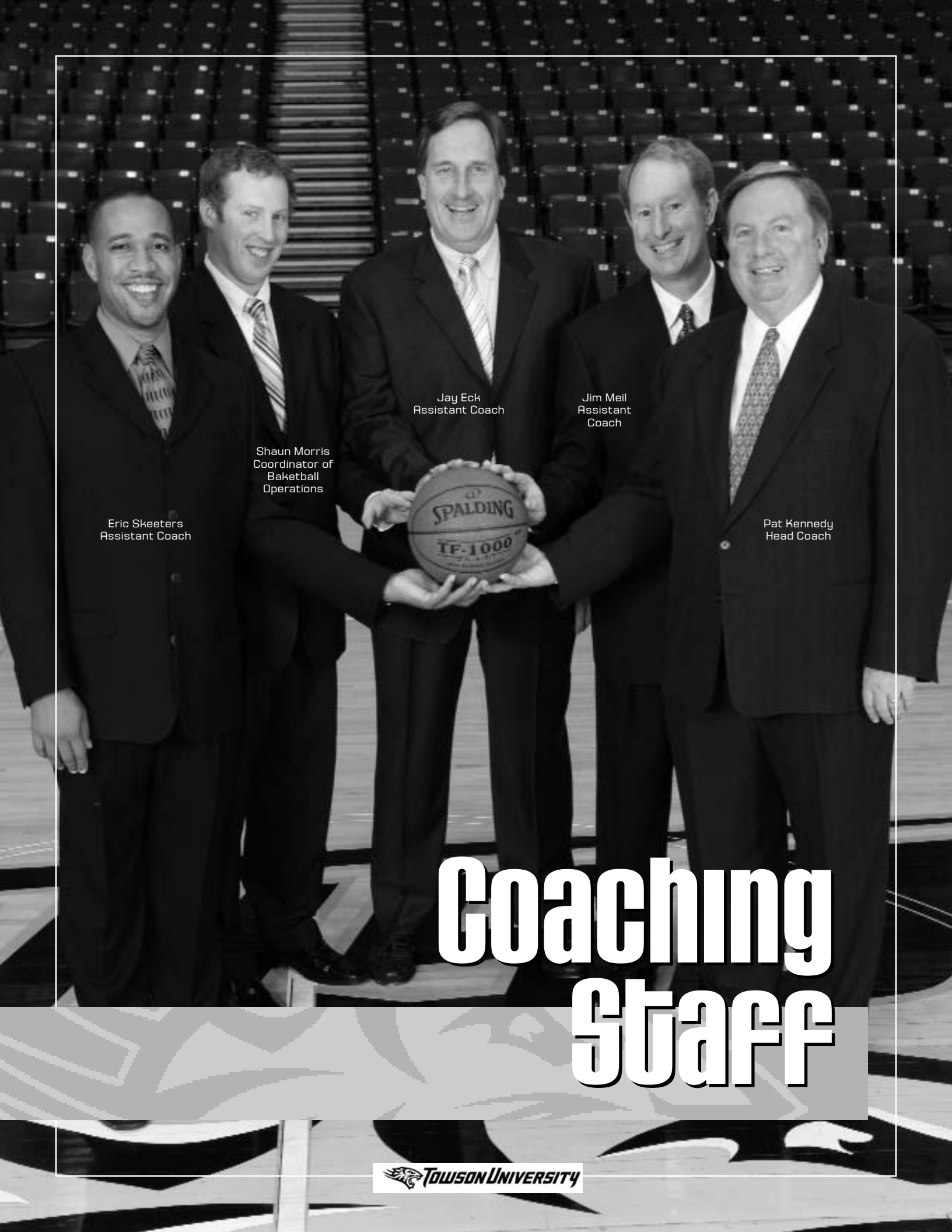

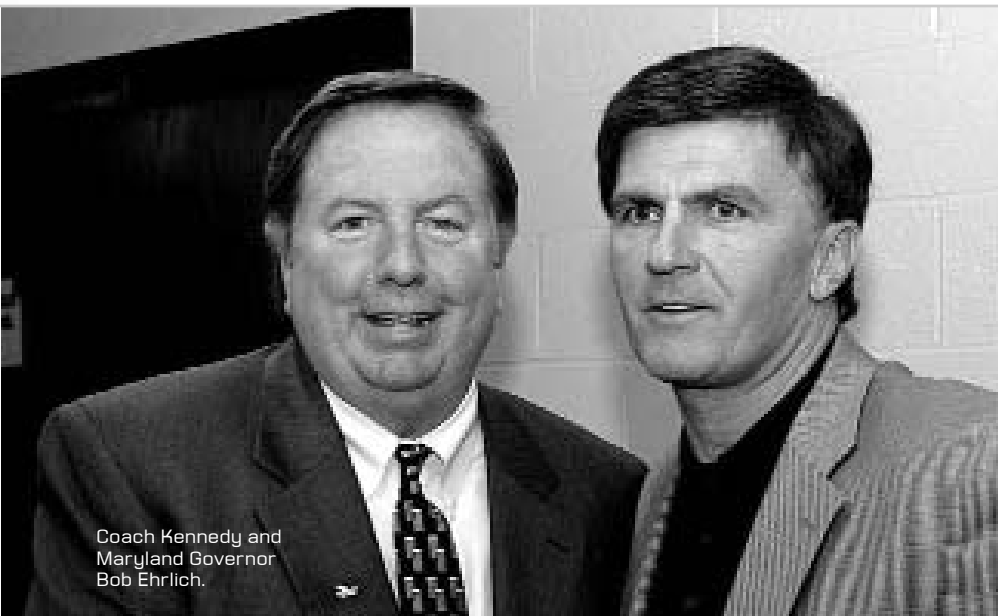

Pat Kennedy didn't receive any consideration for the 2006 National Coach of the Year award. But had there been voting for Coach of the Most Improved Program, his name surely would have been at the top of the list.

This is Pat's third year at rebuilding Towson's program. The progress has been impressive.

His first season at Towson was a bust in terms of the record - a career low 5 wins against a career high 24 losses. Despite the dismal win/loss results, however, Pat and his staff were scoring big off the court.

Those behind-the-scene efforts paid huge dividends in year two. The Tigers rose from the ashes of the Colonial Athletic Association's last place to finish seventh in a league that expanded to 12 schools and sent four of its teams (two to the NCAA, two to the NIT) into post-season play. Towson was the most improved team in the CAA for the 2005-06 regular season with a plus seven.

This is year number three for him. Expectations are high because Kennedy, through recruiting and aggressive scheduling, has created an exciting atmosphere for basketball at Towson. With Kennedy at the controls it promises to be an interesting campaign.

Most coaches go through an extensive development stage, serving apprenticeships as assistants before landing a head job, or they work in the Division III and II ranks prior to moving up. Not so for Kennedy. After two years as an assistant to the legendary Jim Valvano, he was hired as a Division I head coach. Pat has never been anything but a Division I head coach since.

Kennedy continues to rank among the top 25 active winningest Division I coaches with his 434 career victories. His previous 26 years have been more kind to him than not, leaving him with much success and little

disappointment.

Each of Pat's prior coaching assignments presented him with different challenges. He hurdled over all of them at Iona, Florida State, DePaul and Montana, leading his teams to eight NCAA Tournament appearances and five National Invitation Tournaments.

At Florida State, he reached the NCAA's Elite Eight in 1993 and the NIT championship game in 1987. Eleven of his former players have gone to the NBA, including Sam Cassell, a local Baltimore product from the storied Dunbar High School program. A number of his former assistants are now head coaches themselves, perhaps most notable among them Tim Welsh at Providence College.

Kennedy is experienced. There isn't a level of Division I college basketball he hasn't coached on, from the MAAC while at Iona, to the Metro Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference at Florida State, through Conference USA at DePaul to the Big Sky at Montana.

Now the task he has accepted is to raise the Tigers to a competitive level in the Colonial Athletic Association where Towson's conference record is 22-68 after six years in the league. Eight of those wins were earned last year.

The 2004-05 season was Pat's first at Towson. And, it was his most dismal ever. The Tigers struggled to a 5-24 record, their second worst in 25 seasons as a Division I school.

Because he wasn't hired until the spring, Pat was able to bring in just two recruits, a junior college transfer point guard that started 23 of 28 games, and a freshman wing who averaged just 5.9 minutes in 22 games. Three of the returning veterans, with a combined 94 career starts, were sidelined with knee injuries. One of those vets was a 6-10 center

who was a member of the CAA's All-Defensive Team after leading the league in blocked shots the year before. That trio played a total of 205 minutes of the entire 2004-05 season.

Midway in the season a fourth player who was starting on the wing went down with a knee injury, missing eight games and forcing Kennedy to play a walk-on in his stead. The Tigers never recovered from that final blow, losing the last 13 games of the season.

But if one factor has loomed larger than any other in Pat's career, it has been his ability to recruit. His last two incoming groups are testimony to that fact.

Included among his Towson recruits is a 6-8 forward rated the 10th highest junior college prospect in the nation two years ago, a Pennsylvania state player of the year, a first-team all-metro wing who led his high school team to its first state championship, a NJCAA third team All-American and a former Baltimore Metro Player of the Year.

Kennedy was introduced to coaching by Ed Donohue while he was an undergraduate attending King's College of Pa. on a basketball scholarship. After two years on the

Monarchs' squad, Donohue coaxed Pat out of his uniform to coach King's junior varsity, which he did to a 17-4 record. In his senior year Kennedy was elevated to the top assistant on the varsity. From that point on Pat knew what he wanted to do in his life - coach college basketball.

After graduating from King's in 1975, Kennedy took a similar position at Lehigh for one year. Then the Keyport, N.J. native joined the late Jim Valvano's staff at Iona College in New Rochelle, N.Y. He served two years as Valvano's assistant. After the 1979-80 season Valvano moved on to North Carolina State. Kennedy moved up and became the Gaels' head coach at the age of 28.

In six seasons at Iona, Pat led the Gaels to a 124-60 record, two trips to the NCAA Tournament and two NIT appearances. His very first career victory, an upset over South Carolina, was an indication of what was ahead for the Gaels.

Iona posted a 15-14 record in Kennedy's first year. The next four were all 20 plus win seasons and included two NIT appearances plus two trips to the NCAA tournament. He became just the fourth coach in NCAA Division I history to win 100 games in his first five seasons as a head coach.

One of his finest teams was the 1983-84 squad that posted a 23-8 record. That performance put him into the NCAA Tourna-



ment for the first time as a head coach. It also earned him his first recognition when he was selected the New York Metro Area Coach of the Year. The following year his Gaels were 26-5 and made another trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Kennedy was a Heineken Award recipient, an honor symbolic of excellence in college coaching. He followed Valvano, St. John's Lou Carneseca and North Carolina's Dean Smith as an honoree of the prestigious award.

Over 95 percent of his recruits at Iona graduated. USAToday cited Kennedy's program at Iona as having one of the most outstanding graduation rates in college athletics.

While at Iona, Pat developed a penchant for administration, serving five years in the dual role of head basketball coach and associate athletics director. He was also president of the MAAC Coaches' Association and a member of the NCAA Tournament Selection Committee for the Eastern Region.

Kennedy resigned his position at Iona following the 1985-86 season to accept the head coach's job at Florida State. Prior to his arrival, the Seminoles had made only four trips to the NCAA tournament in the previous 39 seasons. During Kennedy's 11 years at the Tallahassee school, FSU appeared in the NCAA tournament five times, reaching the Sweet Sixteen in 1992 and the Elite Eight in 1993.

The NIT figured into FSU's post-season history as well while Kennedy was at the

helm. In his first season Florida State advanced to the NIT second round. In his last season the Seminoles were 20-12. They reached the NIT finals where they eventually bowed to Michigan.

Up until Kennedy's arrival at Florida State, the Seminoles had never won a conference championship - regular season or postseason. In 1990-91, FSU's last year in the Metro Conference, the Seminoles cleared that hurdle by winning the school's first post-season tournament with a stunning comeback victory against Louisville.

During his tenure at FSU, Kennedy engineered the Seminoles' transition from the Metro Conference to the Atlantic Coast Conference. In 1992 the Seminoles made their ACC debut, finishing with an impressive 22-10 record that included an 11-5 league mark, good enough for a second place finish behind eventual national champion Duke. FSU went to the NCAA tournament where it beat Montana and Georgetown before falling to Indiana in the Sweet Sixteen.

The following year, Kennedy's seventh with the Seminoles, Florida State won a school record 25 games. The 11th-ranked Seminoles (they had been ranked as high as 6th) beat Evansville, Tulane and Western Kentucky to advance to the NCAA regional championship

where the best season in Florida State history ended with a loss to Kentucky.

After compiling a 202-131 record at Florida State, Kennedy left to accept the task of rebuilding the basketball program at DePaul. The year before he arrived (1996-97) the Blue Demons were 3-23.

The 1997-98 season was dismal as the Blue Demons were 7-23. But they opened the campaign with a victory that stopped a 13-game DePaul losing streak. They also beat Memphis and UAB, which were the first and second place finishers in the National Division of Conference USA, on the road.

The following year Kennedy rallied the Blue Demons to the biggest one-season turnaround in DePaul history. They finished with an 18-13 record and participated in the NIT, downing Northwestern before bowing to California in a one-point loss.

The turnaround continued in 1999-2000 when the Blue Demons posted a 21-12 record. They returned to the NCAA tournament for the first time in eight years where they were beaten in overtime by Kansas.

Over a two year period Kennedy was faced with a situation he had never experienced - players leaving early for the NBA. Five of his Blue Demons opted to end their college careers for the professional ranks, including first round picks Quentin Richardson and Steven Hunter. Addition-

ally, high school star Eddy Curry, who had made a verbal commitment to DePaul, opted to enter the draft and was selected fourth overall.

In his final season at the Chicago school, he suspended three of his team's top four scorers for academic reasons. They were eligible by DePaul and NCAA standards, but not by Kennedy's.

After the 2001-02 season, Kennedy resigned from DePaul with a 67-85 record and moved to the Big Sky country, accepting the head coach's job at Montana.

Kennedy coached the Grizzlies to a two-year record of 23-35. He picked up his 400th career victory when Montana downed Portland State 61-49 on January 11, 2003. Montana finished third in the Big Sky Conference in 2004-05 year but won the league's tournament title to earn its sixth appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Four of the five starters for the Grizzlies were Kennedy's recruits. The Grizzlies returned to the NCAA Tournament last year.

Pat has never restricted his work in college basketball to coaching. For over a decade he has served on the National Association of Basketball Coaches board of directors. He served as the NABC's president during the 2004-05 year. He has another year remaining on the board as a past president.

Pat was honored by the Metropolitan

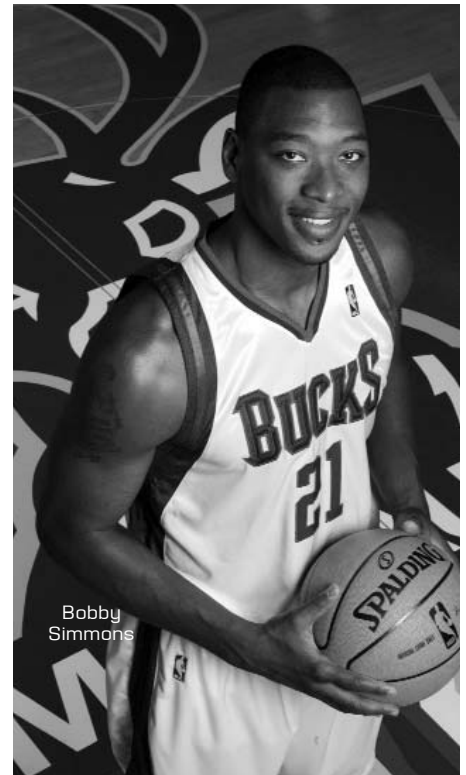

When head coach Pat Kennedy began filling his staff positions, Baltimore native son Eric Skeeters was his first hire.

Skeets' background stretches from the Catonsville Midget League to the Atlantic Coast Conference.

***“Eric brings a wealth of quality experience to our program,” says Kennedy. “We must build bridges with the Baltimore basketball community and I know that Skeets can do an outstanding job in this area. He’s a quality coach and a quality person.”***

Skeets came to Towson from Virginia Tech where he was an assistant under Seth Greenberg for the 2003-04 season as the Hokies enjoyed their first winning record (15-14) in four years. He left the Blacksburg, Va. school just as it finished recruiting for its first ACC season. The Hokies' incoming class was rated 23rd by Rivals Hoop. Skeets' top recruit, Deron Washington, was named to the ACC All-Rookie team that year.

A 1986 graduate of Woodlawn High School, Skeets got his start as the junior varsity coach and assistant varsity coach at Baltimore's St. Frances Academy from 1992-96 under coach William Wells. While there he coached Mark Karcher, a former standout at Temple who was a 1997 USA TODAY first team All-American, a McDonald's All-American and a two-time Baltimore Sun Player of the Year. In Skeets' final season at St. Frances, the team was 30-4 and ranked 14th nationally in the USA TODAY final poll. The ball-boy for the Panthers that year was Carmelo Anthony, the 2003 Big East Rookie of the Year and the third pick in the 2003 NBA Draft.

From 1992-96 Skeets served three seasons as an assistant coach to Ron “Fang” Mitchell at Coppin State. With the Eagles, Skeets assisted in all areas for the team and served as Coppin State's chief recruiter. While at Coppin State, Skeets helped the Eagles to a three-year record of 58-30 and three Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference regular-season championships. In 1997, Coppin State earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament where the Eagles scored a huge upset, beating second-seed South Carolina 78-65.

Skeets left Coppin for Youngstown State where he contributed immediately to the Penguins' recruiting. He was responsible for signing Doug Underwood out of Meade High School. Underwood was named to the Horizon League All-Rookie Team and then first team All-Conference.

In 1994 Skeets directed a team called Baltimore's Best to a 56-team tournament championship, the Midwest Future Showdown & Shootout in Colum-

bus, Ohio. His squad beat defending champion New York Riverside, 65-59 for the title. Members of Baltimore's Best included Shawnta Rogers of Lake Clifton, Alphonso Jones of Douglass, Guy Butler of Woodlawn, Tommy Polley of Dunbar (now a linebacker with the New Orleans Saints), Colin Jones of Patterson and Marvis Thornton of Dunbar plus a St. Frances Academy contingent of Karcher, Keon Chavez, Greg Billups and Tavares Graham.

Skeets was awarded a bachelor's in management science from Coppin State in 1997. He earned an associate's degree in 1991 from Catonsville Community College. At Catonsville, he played lacrosse and basketball for two seasons where he led his region in assists in 1990. He was a standout point guard in basketball and midfielder in lacrosse at Woodlawn High School, earning All-County honors in lacrosse. Skeets played both basketball and lacrosse throughout his competitive career that began as a youngster at St. Mark's School in the Catonsville Midget League. A knee injury that he suffered while at Catonsville C.C. eventually ended his playing career.

Eric and his wife, Marie, a University of Maryland graduate, have two sons, Evan and Miles.



# Jay Eck

Assistant Coach  
Xavier, '73 · 3rd Season



A former head coach at the college and professional levels, Jay Eck is in his third year on the Towson University staff.

***“Jay brings a wealth of experience to our program,”*** said Towson head coach Pat Kennedy. ***“He has a very strong background in every aspect of this business. As both a head coach and as an assistant coach, he has always been extremely successful. We’re very happy to have him.”***

A native of Madison, Wis., Jay is a graduate of Xavier University. He started his coaching career as an assistant at Bradley from 1979 to 1983. In four years with the Braves, he helped Coach Dick Versace win two Missouri Valley Conference championships as Bradley compiled an 83-42 record. In 1980, Bradley played in the NCAA Division I Tournament. The 1982 Braves had a 26-10 overall record and won the National Invitational Tournament championship.

From 1983 to 1985, Jay worked as an assistant coach at Pittsburgh under Roy Chipman. In 1983-84, the Panthers were 18-13 and earned a berth in the NIT. In 1984-85, Pitt posted a 17-12 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. During his tenure at Pittsburgh, he coached All-Americans Charles Smith and Jerome Lane.

Jay became a collegiate head coach for the first time in 1985 when he was appointed at Wisconsin-Stevens Point. In his two years at UWSP, the Pointers were one of the top teams in NCAA Division III with a 45-13 record. They won back-to-back Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships. Jay was honored as the WIAC Coach of the Year in 1986.

In 1987, Jay was named as the head coach at the University of Toledo. In four years at Toledo, he compiled a 62-57 record with three winning seasons. During his tenure, the Rockets earned victories over Minnesota, Pittsburgh, Houston and Cincinnati. In 1991, the Rockets were runners-up in the Mid-American Conference Tournament, losing to Eastern Michigan in the championship game, 67-66.

In six seasons as a collegiate head coach, Jay was 107-70.

In 1991, he became vice-president of basketball operations for the Louisville Shooters of the Global Basketball Association. He also spent one season as the coach of the South Georgia Blues.

In addition to his basketball coaching experience, Jay has an extensive background in broadcasting. He founded his own production company in 1991 called “Championship Coach’s Corner.” Over the years, he

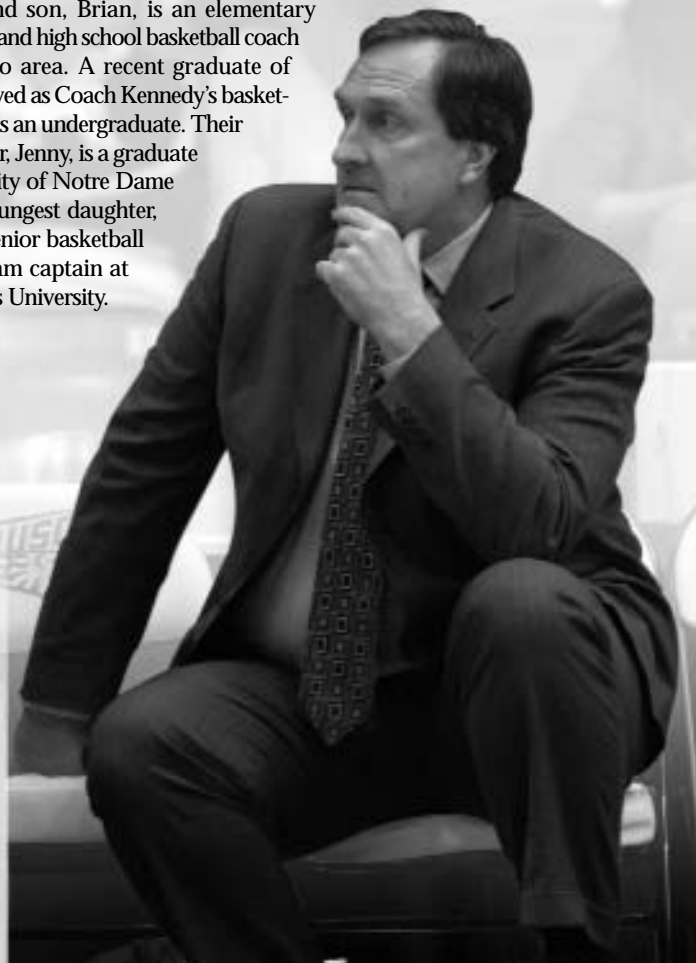
has been part of national and regional broadcasts and has done a variety of sports, ranging from college basketball to major league baseball. His programs have been broadcast on Fox Sportsnet, Comcast and WGN-Radio in Chicago.

In 1995, Eck returned to college basketball coaching when he joined Ken Burmeister’s staff at Loyola University in Chicago. He spent four seasons with the Ramblers and played a major role in the rebuilding of Loyola’s program.

He began his association with Coach Kennedy in 1999 at DePaul. Jay was the Director of Basketball Camps at DePaul while handling the Blue Demons’ television and radio shows.

Coach Eck and his wife, Mary Beth, are the parents of four children. Their oldest son, Jason, is a 2000 graduate of the University of Wisconsin and a former football player for the Badgers. He is currently the tight ends coach at the University of Idaho on Dennis Erickson’s staff.

Their second son, Brian, is an elementary school teacher and high school basketball coach in the Chicago area. A recent graduate of DePaul, he served as Coach Kennedy’s basketball manager as an undergraduate. Their oldest daughter, Jenny, is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame while their youngest daughter, Meggie, is a senior basketball player and team captain at Eastern Illinois University.



# Jim Meil

Assistant Coach  
Lehigh '82 · 16th Season



Jim Meil, an assistant coach at Towson University for 15 years before continuing his career at the University of Miami and Wagner College, is returning to the Tigers' basketball staff.

***"Jim's overall background and success make him a great addition to an already strong coaching staff," says head coach Pat Kennedy. "He also gives us another very familiar face in the metropolitan Baltimore area. Jim was successful at Towson earlier because of his many local connections. He continued to maintain that presence here while at Miami and Wagner."***

A Baltimore native, Jim is a 1978 graduate of The McDonogh School where he was a four-year starter and 1,000-point career scorer for the Eagles under Paul Smith. He was an assistant coach at Towson from 1982 to 1997. He began his stint under Vince Angotti and remained with the program when Terry Truax was hired in 1983.



From 1988 to 1994 Towson posted six straight winning seasons with a record of 112-65 (.633) that included three consecutive East Coast Conference championships, a school record 22-game home win streak and the Tigers' only two trips to the NCAA Division I Tournament.

The success coincided with the appearance of local Baltimore products Kurk Lee, Devin Boyd, Kelly Williamson, Kennell Jones and Terrance Jacobs, among many others, whom Jim was instrumental in recruiting.

Boyd ended his career as Towson's all-time leading scorer with 2,000 points. Lee went on to play in the NBA with the New Jersey Nets before enjoying a lengthy professional career in Finland. Jones was named the ECC's 1990 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for men's basketball. Boyd, Lee and Jacobs, another European leaguer, each won the ECC Player of the Year award during their careers. Boyd and Lee are Towson's only Division I players to receive All-American honors.

Towson finished the 1993-94 seasons with a 21-9 record, the Tigers' only 20-win season thus far on the Division I level. In 1995-96 the Tigers were 16-12 to mark the only winning record for Towson in the last 11 seasons.

In 1997, Jim joined Leonard Hamilton's Hurricanes staff as an administrative assistant while earning a Master's degree in sports administration at Miami. The Hurricanes went to the NCAA Tournament both years he was associated with the program.

In 1999, Meil moved on to Wagner where he has served on the staff for the past seven years, four as an assistant coach and the last three as associate head coach. He was an assistant coach for Dereck Whittenburg for four seasons and Mike Deane for three years. Meil helped the Seahawks win three straight Northeast Conference scoring titles, along with three straight winning seasons, a 2002 NIT berth and the school's first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance in 2003.

Jim is a 1982 graduate of Lehigh where he earned a degree in marketing. He actually got his start in coaching while an undergraduate. After his freshman year, Jim became a student assistant under Brian Hill, currently the head coach of the NBA's Orlando Magic. As a senior, he was named head jayvee coach and directed the Engineers to a 12-6 record that year.



## Shaun Morris

Coord. of Basketball Operations  
Lycoming, '05 · 2nd Season

Shaun was appointed Coordinator of Basketball Operations this past September by head coach Pat Kennedy.

“Shaun has developed an outstanding foundation and background for the game of basketball through his years at Trinity High School and as a student-athlete for his college career at Lycoming College,” says Kennedy. “He is in a long line of young assistant coaches who have come through our program. He has true promise to become an outstanding Division I assistant coach.”

Shaun hails from a basketball family. His dad, John Morris, was a two-year starter at nearby Loyola College. Shaun’s three brothers each helped Trinity H.S. to a Pennsylvania State Class AA championship, and were 1,000-point career scorers in high school. All are currently playing college basketball. John is a 6-2 senior shooting guard at Old Dominion, Kevin is a 6-6 junior small forward at Lycoming and Brian is a 6-6 freshman point guard at Richmond.

Shaun was captain of Trinity’s 29-4 team that won the 2001 state title, averaging 13.0 points, 7.0 assists and 5.0 rebounds. He was named to the All-Conference and All-District teams. On its way to the state title that year, Trinity beat a Gerry McNamara led Bishop Hannan squad in the Eastern Finals. John, as a junior, was the Shamrocks’ leading scorer. Kevin was a freshman member of that team as well.

After a freshman year at Wheeling Jesuit University, Shaun transferred to Lycoming where he was a three-year starter, helping the Warriors to a 53-27 record, a MAC Freedom Conference championship and a trip to the 2004 NCAA Tournament. He finished his college career as the Warriors’ all-time career assist leader with 355. His 154 assists in 2004-05 are a single season program record. He also holds the school mark for assists in a game with 12 against Delaware Valley.

Shaun was a captain in his senior year at Lycoming when he received the school’s Academic Achievement Award for Men’s Basketball. In his junior year the marketing major was the Dutch Burch Award winner. A Dean’s List student, he was also an active member of the Institute of Management Studies.



## Brian Bradshaw

Athletic Trainer  
Salisbury, '02 · 3rd Season

Brian’s year consists of assisting with football and then heading up the sports medicine coverage of the Tigers’ men’s basketball program.

Brian came to Towson from the Baltimore Orioles Baseball Club. He was employed as a trainer at the Orioles’ spring training facility in Sarasota, Fla. where he was primarily responsible for long term rehabilitation and post-surgical care of the players in the organization.

In 2003 Brian was assigned by Orioles owner Peter Angelos to serve as the head athletic trainer for the Greek Olympic Baseball Team during the Athens Games. Angelos was the principal organizer and chief financial supporter for the Greek team.

A 2002 graduate of Salisbury University (Dean’s List student) with a BS in Athletic Training, Brian went on to earn a Master of Science in Education with a concentration in Health Promotions at Virginia Tech. As a sports medicine graduate assistant he was assigned to the Virginia Tech football training staff.

In addition to his teaching experience (“Shoulder: Anatomy, Related Injuries, Assessments and Treatments”) Brian has lectured at symposiums for various athletic trainers associations. His area of concentration has been the shoulder.

Brian is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association, the Commonwealth of Virginia, the State of Florida and the American Heart Association Health Care Provider.

His association with Towson began long before he arrived on campus to join the athletic training staff. Both of Brian’s parents, who continue to teach in Baltimore County middle schools, are Towson graduates. His sister, Megan, a Boston University graduate, served a one-year internship in Towson’s athletic media relations office covering volleyball, women’s basketball and women’s lacrosse. After a year at Villanova, Megan has returned to BU as the Men’s Basketball contact.

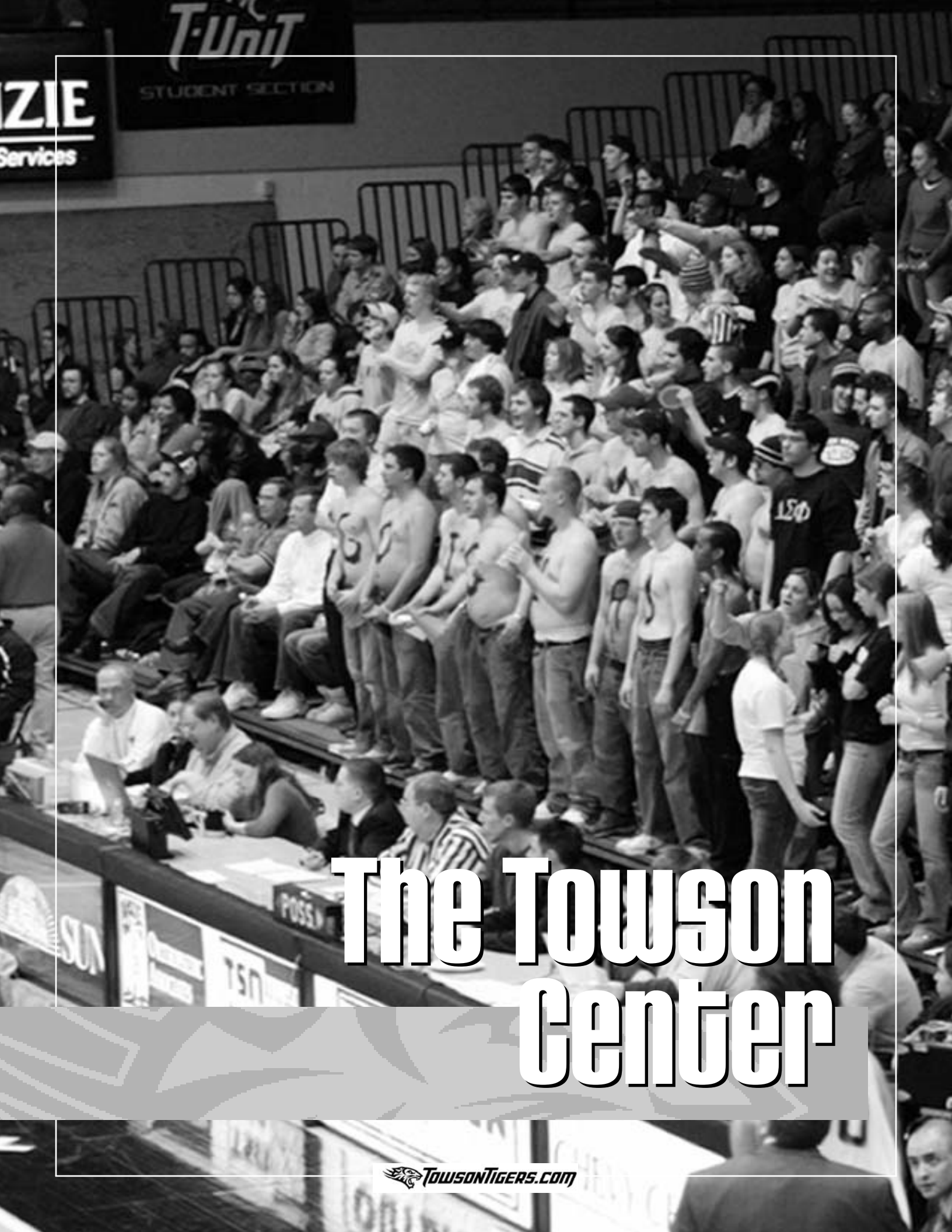

# The Towson Center

With a seating capacity of 5,000 for basketball, the Towson Center is the official home of the Towson University Tigers.

In its 30th season of hosting college basketball games, the Towson Center has experienced a few changes. Most noticeably, a portable wooden floor was placed over the Towson Center's Versturf surface nine years ago.

The Towson Center arena is part of a complex which is situated on 24 picturesque acres of ground. It was opened for use in October, 1976. Since then, the Tigers have a 226-139 record in it, including a 111-73 mark over the last 14 years.

The entire complex includes the arena, 11,000-seat Johnny Unitas Stadium, ten tennis courts (five lighted for evening play), and separate fields for football, lacrosse, soccer, field hockey and softball.

Inside the arena, which has 165,000 square feet of floor space, there are six classrooms, a research lab, a curriculum center, a fitness center, varsity and other weight rooms, a training room, a gymnastics room, plus 16 locker rooms, six racquetball courts and six squash courts. The main arena is sufficiently lighted for television. The facility houses

nearly 75 faculty and staff members.

Along the west side of the arena is a 60-foot long elevated press box with sliding glass windows which can seat a dozen writers, facilitates two radio stations and a camera crew. The arena has built-in concession areas, ticket booths, a large four-faced scoreboard suspended over the basketball court, a message board, arena-size rest rooms and numerous auxiliary rooms.

The floor of the main arena is designed to accommodate basketball, gymnastics, indoor track, tennis and volleyball. Two large carpeted platform risers with armed chairback seating sections weighing 35 tons each, are unique features. Fully-mechanized, they are among the largest of their kind in the world. There is also additional bleacher seating on the floor and concourse levels.

Over the years, the Towson Center has played host to numerous conference basketball tournaments. From 1984 to 1991, the Towson Center played host to the East Coast Conference Tournament. Hosting the ECC Tournament provided the Towson Center with national exposure as ESPN televised the 1988, 1989, 1990 and 1991 cham-

pionship games live.

In addition, it has hosted the NCAA Division II South Atlantic tournaments in 1977 and 1978, and the NCAA Southeast regional gymnastics meet in 1995.

Through the years, the Towson Center has been a popular venue for numerous high school basketball tournament, including the Charm City Classic.

# The Towson Center

In the 2006-07 season, the Tigers will be playing their 30th season in the Towson Center this year. In honor of the Towson Center's 30th anniversary, here is a list of the top 30 (or so) moments in the last 30 years, listed chronologically.

**October 15, 1976:** A National Basketball Association exhibition game between the Washington Bullets and the New York Knicks officially opens the Towson Center.

**December 11, 1976 - Towson 101, C.W. Post 72:** The Tigers make their Towson Center debut with a convincing 101-72 win over C.W. Post as Roger Dickens scores 20 points. Savia Sharp had the honor of scoring the first basket in the Towson Center.

**February 5, 1977 - Towson 68, Baltimore 65:** A sell-out crowd of 5,079 watches the 3rd-ranked Tigers edge 4th-ranked Baltimore in a battle between top of the top teams in NCAA Division II. Brian Matthews leads the Tigers to the win with 18 points and 11 rebounds.

**February 26, 1977 - Baltimore 100, Towson 96:** In the Mason-Dixon Conference championship game, Baltimore hands the Tigers their first-ever Towson Center loss with a thrilling 100-96 win before a crowd of 4,950. The Tigers' Pat McKinley is named

as the tournament MVP as he scores 21 points with 14 rebounds and four blocked shots.

**March 5, 1977 - Towson 92, Baltimore 87 (OT):** Led by a 35-point performance by Roger Dickens, the Tigers edge Baltimore in the NCAA Division II South Atlantic regional championship game. After rallying from a 78-72 deficit in the final minute to force overtime, the Tigers use eight overtime points by Dickens to win the title. Brian Matthews adds 28 points and 15 rebounds before a crowd of 4,419.

**February 18, 1978 - Towson 80, Cheyney 78:** Ranked 2nd in NCAA Division II, the Tigers received a 25-point effort from Brian Matthews as they edged 4th-ranked Cheyney, 80-78. Coached by John Chaney, Cheyney went on to win the NCAA Division II national championship.

**February 25, 1978 - Towson 74, Mount St. Mary's 66:** In the Mason-Dixon Conference championship game, the Tigers won their first Mason-Dixon title with a 74-66 win over Mount St. Mary's. Roger Dickens scored 22 points and was named as the tournament's MVP.

**March 4, 1978 - Elizabeth City 84, Towson 73:** Hosting the NCAA Division II South Atlantic regional for the second year in a row, the Tigers lost to Elizabeth City in the finals, 84-73. Tom Blue of Elizabeth City was the tournament MVP as he scored 13 points with 13 rebounds. Brian Matthews led the Tigers with 22 points and 10 rebounds.

**December 1, 1979 - American 66, Towson 63:** In their debut as an NCAA Division I program, the Tigers fell to Coach Gary Williams and American University, 66-63. All-American Boo Bowers led the Eagles with 33 points and ten rebounds while Mike Lyles scored 16 points for the Tigers.

**February 13, 1980 - Towson 74, Baltimore 69:** Led by a career high 18-point, 12-rebound performance from Joe Miller, the Tigers beat the University of Baltimore, 74-69, to present Coach Vince Angotti with his 200th career victory. The winningest coach in Towson basketball history, Angotti finished his career with 231 wins in 16 seasons.

**December 14, 1981 - Villanova 85, Towson 55:** Before a crowd of 3,442 that was held down because of a snow storm, the Tigers

hosted their first major college program in the Towson Center as they faced Villanova. Led by All-Americans Ed Pinckney and John Pinone, the Wildcats shot 61.7 per cent from the floor as they handed the Tigers their worst-ever Towson Center loss, 85-55. A future NBA star, Pinckney shot 11-for-11 from the floor and scored 22 points while Pinone had 25 points. The nucleus of the Villanova team that played in the Towson Center went on to win a national championship in 1985.

**January 8, 1983 - Towson 55, Bucknell 54:** In their first season as members of the East Coast Conference, the Tigers earned their first-ever ECC win as they rallied from a 12-point deficit in the final ten minutes to edge Bucknell, 55-54. Donald Leslie led the Tigers with 14 points while James Bruce scored 13 points with seven assists.

**February 11, 1984 - Towson 71, American 62 (2 OT):** Freshman guard Bill Leonard scored a game high 20 points and hit a 30-bank shot to send the game to a second overtime period as the Tigers earned their first-ever win over American University. Leonard's desperation shot at the end of the first overtime banked in and tied the game at 58-58. In the second overtime, the Tigers went on a 13-4 spurt to earn their first win over the Eagles in 19 meetings.

**March 10, 1984 - Rider 73, Bucknell 71 (OT):** In the first of eight consecutive East Coast Conference Tournaments played in the Towson Center, senior Kevin Thomas scored 31 points to lead Rider to a 73-71 upset win over Bucknell in the championship game. On his way to a 31-point effort, Thomas made 15 of 16 free throws and was named as the tournament's MVP. Bucknell ended the season with a 24-5 record.

**March 7, 1987 - ECC Semi-Finals Doubleheader - Bucknell 103, Lehigh 100 (2 OT); Towson 70, Lafayette 66:** Bucknell and Towson advanced to the East Coast Conference championship game by winning thrilling semi-final contests. In the first semi-final, Bucknell overcame a Towson Center record scoring performance by Lehigh's Daren Queenan to pull out a 103-100 win in double overtime. Queenan scored 49 points in the game as he made 17 of 31 shots from the floor. The game featured 31 lead changes and

16 ties before Ted Aceto scored five points in the final 37 seconds to clinch the win. In the second semi-final, junior guard Marty Johnson scored a career high 24 points to lead the Tigers to an upset win over Lafayette. With the win, the Tigers ended a seven-game losing streak to the Leopards and reached the ECC championship game for the first time. Michael Fink added 18 points for the Tigers.

**March 8, 1987 - Bucknell 86, Towson 74:** Despite a career high 27 points from senior guard Bill Leonard, the Tigers dropped an 86-74 decision to Bucknell in the East Coast Conference championship game. The loss ended the Tigers' improbable march to the finals as the sixth-seeded Tigers defeated third-seeded Rider and second-seeded Lafayette in the first two rounds. Chris Seneca of Bucknell was the tournament MVP after scoring 14 points with eight assists in the finals.

**December 5, 1987 - Towson 76, Loyola College 60:** In the first college basketball game televised from the Towson Center, the Tigers edged local rival Loyola College. The Tigers' home opener was televised locally on WBAL-TV with Vince Bagli and Chris Thomas handling the broadcast. A crowd of 3,485 saw the Tigers jump out to a 15-3 lead and never look back. Led by Adrian Basey, who scored 12 points, the Tigers shot 51 per cent from the floor.

**March 8, 1988 - Lehigh 84, Towson 78:** With a crowd of 4,271 and a national ESPN audience watching, the Tigers lost to Lehigh in the first East Coast Conference Tournament championship game televised by ESPN. Daren Queenan led Lehigh with 37 points while Marty Johnson and Tommy Jones each scored 19 points for the Tigers, who finished as ECC runners-up for the second year in a row.

**December 7, 1988 - Towson 74, Navy 69:** Playing in just his second Towson Center game, junior guard Kurk Lee exploded for 36 points as the Tigers ruined Navy's first trip to Towson with a 74-69 win. Lee made 12 of 22 shots from the floor, including six three-pointers.

**February 1, 1989 - Towson 101, Lehigh 77:** In a rematch of the 1988 East Coast Conference championship game, the Tigers rolled to a 101-77 win over Lehigh. Six Tigers scored in double figures, led by Kurk Lee, who had 24 points. The win over Lehigh was one of six times the Tigers scored 100 or more points in the 1988-89 season.

**February 26, 1990 - Towson 92, Lehigh 82:** In their final regular season home game, the Tigers raced to a 40-24 halftime lead and cruised to a 92-82 win over Lehigh to clinch the East Coast Conference regular season championship for the first time ever. Kurk Lee led Towson with 31 points as the Tigers protected their lead by making 31 of 36 free throws in the second half.

**March 6, 1990 - Towson 73, Lehigh 60:** Led by East Coast Conference Tournament MVP Kurk Lee and his 22 points, the Tigers earned their first ECC championship and a berth in the NCAA Tournament with a 73-60 win over Lehigh. Although the Tigers never trailed in the second half, they did not have a comfortable lead until a three-point play by Lee with 3:40 remaining made it a 60-51 game. Sophomore Devin Boyd scored 13 points and was named to the all-tournament team. The Tigers won the first of their three straight ECC championships in front of a crowd of 4,435 and a national ESPN audience.

**December 1, 1990 - Towson 62, Loyola 60:** Junior guard Devin Boyd scored 18 points as the Tigers defeated Loyola, 62-60, to win their second straight Baltimore Beltway Classic championship. Boyd was the tournament MVP. William Griffin added 16 points and was named to the all-tournament team, along with Chuck Lightening.

**January 16, 1991 - Towson 75, Rider 71:** In a bizarre atmosphere created by the pre-game news that Desert Storm had begun, junior guard Devin Boyd scored a career high 32 points as the Tigers edged Rider, 75-71.

Boyd, who made 10 of 16 shots from the floor, scored the 1,000th point of his college career with 12:51 remaining as he became the 14th player in Towson history with 1,000 career points.

**March 5, 1991 - Towson 69, Rider 63:** Appearing on ESPN in the East Coast Conference championship game for the third time in four years, the Tigers used last minute heroics to hold off Rider's upset bid and earn their second straight trip to the NCAA Division I Tournament. With the Tigers trailing by 61-59 and 1:06 left, Devin Boyd hit a short jumper, was fouled and made the free throw to put the Tigers ahead to stay. With 45 seconds left, Chuck Lightening made a steal and a breakaway slam dunk to ignite the crowd of 3,425 and send the Tigers on to victory. Boyd and Lightening were named to the all-tournament team, along with junior Terrance Jacobs.

**February 15, 1992 - Towson 113, UMBC 103:** In the highest-scoring game ever played in the Towson Center, the Tigers outscored UMBC, 113-103. The Tigers, who shot 56.1 per cent from the floor, were led by senior Terrance Jacobs, who scored 39 points to set a record for the most points scored by a Tiger player in the Towson Center. Included among T.J.'s 39 points was the 1,000th point of his career at Towson. For UMBC, Derell Thompson set a school record with 43 points.

**February 15, 1993 - Towson 75, Liberty 69:** Playing their final home game of the season, the Tigers clinched the Big South Conference regular season title with a 75-69 win

over Liberty. The win upped the Tigers' Big South record to 11-2 and marked their eighth straight win at home. Scooter Alexander scored 23 points to lead the Tigers.

**February 21, 1994 - Towson 75, UNC Greensboro 74:** In their final home game of the season, the Tigers won their 19th consecutive home game with a 75-74 win over North Carolina Greensboro. The victory also put the Tigers in position to win their second straight Big South regular season title and enabled the Tigers to finish the season with an 11-0 record at home. Ralph Blalock led the Tigers by scoring 26 points on 12-for-13 shooting from the floor.

**December 17, 1994 - Towson 84, Delaware 83:** For the third time in three weeks, Ralph Blalock connected on a game-winning three-point basket in the final seconds to lead the Tigers to their 21st straight Towson Center win, an 84-73 victory over Delaware. Blalock, who also hit game-winning shots against Mount St. Mary's and West Virginia, drilled a 23-foot shot with four seconds left to lift the Tigers past the Blue Hens. The home court winning streak would reach 22 games before the Tigers lost to Radford on January 7, 1995.

**January 30, 1995 - Towson 81, Louisville 69:** In what was considered one of the biggest upsets of the 1994-95 college basketball season, the Tigers stunned Louisville, 81-69, before a delirious crowd of 4,281. The Tigers rallied from an 11-point first half deficit to pull away down the stretch. Trailing by 59-55 with 9:16 remaining, the Tigers outscored the Cardinals by 26-10 the rest of the way. In the final 1:36, the Tigers made nine of ten free throws. Ralph Blalock led the Tigers with 26 points and five steals while DeRon Robinson scored 20 points off the bench.

**February 16, 1997 - Towson 80, Maine 70:** Led by a 21-point performance from Ralph Biggs, the Tigers edged Maine to present Coach Terry Truax with his 200th career victory. The Tigers' coach for 14 seasons, he compiled a record of 202-203 and led Towson to two NCAA Tournament appearances and three conference championships.

**November 24, 1997 - Michigan 75, Towson 72:** Before a record crowd of 5,086 and playing on their new portable wooden floor for the first time, the Tigers nearly pulled off a major upset as they dropped a 75-72 heart-breaker to Michigan in the final minute. The Tigers entertained the sellout crowd and a local TV audience on WMAR by grabbing a 37-32 lead at halftime. A three-pointer by Derrick Newton with 2:57 left gave the Tigers a 66-65 lead before the Wolverines scored seven straight points to make it a 72-66 edge. However, a Marlin Wise three-pointer cut the lead to 73-72 with eight seconds left. Robbie Reid made two free throws for Michigan with five seconds left to clinch the win. Led by Raul DePablo, the Tigers made 13 of 25 shots from three-point range. DePablo led the Tigers with 18 points.

**December 1, 2001 - Towson 60, Rider 58:** In Coach Michael Hunt's home debut as the Tiger coach, the Tigers erased a 31-11 first half deficit to edge Rider, 60-58. After trailing by 20 points with 5:21 left in the first half, the Tigers cut the margin to 37-23 at halftime. Sam Sutton, who scored a game high 25 points, hit a jumper with 1:55 remaining to put the Tigers up by 58-56 and they went to win.

**January 12, 2002 - Towson 68, Drexel 62:** Playing their first-ever Colonial Athletic Association game in the Towson Center, the Tigers shot 59.2 per cent from the floor and led for all 40 minutes in a 68-62 win over Drexel. The victory ended Towson's 15-game losing streak against Drexel, a streak that dated back to January 23, 1991. Brian Allen led the Tigers to their first CAA victory by scoring 15 points with eight assists.

**January 19, 2004 - Towson 57, UNC Wilmington 55:** A rebound basket by Derrick Goode as time expired lifted the Tigers to a stunning 57-55 upset win over two-time defending Colonial Athletic Association champion UNC Wilmington. The Seahawks, who came into the game with a 9-5 overall record and a CAA-leading 4-1 mark. Lawrence Hamm led the Tigers with 24 points and 11 rebounds as the Tigers ended a five-game losing streak against UNCW.

**November 19, 2004 - Towson 69, Norfolk State 58:** In Coach Pat Kennedy's home debut as the Tigers' coach, Lawrence Hamm



and Cantrell Fletcher each scored 17 points to lead the Tigers to a win over Norfolk State. The victory was the Tigers' seventh straight win in a home opener. Playing all 40 minutes, Hamm shot 6-for-11 from the floor and grabbed nine rebounds.

**January 5, 2005 - Towson 86, Delaware 66:** In their Colonial Athletic Association home opener, the Tigers used an early 17-0 run to hand rival Delaware a decisive 86-66 loss. The margin of victory was Towson's largest in 51 games against the Blue Hens. Mike Green scored 16 of his 20 points in the first half as the Tigers took a 49-32 lead at intermission. Lawrence Hamm added 23 points while Jonathan Pease scored 15 points with 14 rebounds.

**December 3, 2005 - Towson 76, William & Mary 45:** Senior Lawrence Hamm scored a career high 29 points on 13-for-15 shooting from the floor to lead the Tigers to a 76-45 win over William & Mary in their Colonial Athletic Association opener. Freshman guard Tim Crossin added 19 points and seven assists for the Tigers, who led by 42-20 at halftime.

**January 12, 2006 - Towson 94, Hofstra 91:** Led by the heroics of Gary Neal, the Tigers pulled off a thrilling 94-91 Colonial Athletic Association win over Hofstra. Neal scored 34 points as he nailed six of eight three-point attempts. He scored 12 points in the final 2:09 to lead the Tigers to the win. After giving Towson an 84-80 lead on a three-pointer with 2:09 left, he made 9 of 10 free throws the rest of the way. Freshman Tim Crossin added 10 points and 10 assists as the Tigers overcame a school record three-point shooting effort (15-for-27) by Hofstra. Hofstra went on to post a final record of 26-7 and advance to the NIT quarter-finals.



# The CAA

Coming off one of the most successful seasons in its 21-year history, the Colonial Athletic Association continues to enhance its reputation as one of the nation's top collegiate conferences.

With a geographic footprint that stretches from Boston to Atlanta, the CAA encompasses five of the nation's nine largest metropolitan areas. On the playing field, the conference has produced 16 national team champions in five different sports, 33 individual national champions, 12 national players of the year, 11 national coaches of the year and 12 Honda Award winners. Even more impressive, however, are the honors accumulated away from competition, which include five Rhodes Scholars and 19 NCAA post-graduate scholars. In 2005-06, the CAA had 11 ESPN the Magazine Academic All-Americans and more than 1,500 of our 4,000 student-athletes posted at least a 3.2 grade point average while lettering in a varsity sport and received the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award.

The landscape of the conference stretches along the majority of the East Coast, and includes six of the nation's top 25 media markets - New York (1), Philadelphia (4), Boston (5), Washington, D.C. (8), Atlanta (9) and Baltimore (23). The number of television homes in the CAA market exceeds 19 million.

The CAA conducts championships in 21 sports. Male athletes compete for championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and wrestling. Female athletes battle for conference titles in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and volleyball. The CAA will also begin sponsorship of a 12-team Division I-AA football league in the fall of 2007.

The conference made its presence known nationally in men's basketball, with four teams advancing to post-season play for the second year in a row. George Mason became the first mid-major program since 1979 to reach the Final Four, knocking off powerhouses Michigan State, North Carolina, Wichita State and Connecticut along the way. The Patriots were ranked #8 in the final ESPN/USA Today Top 25 poll, which was the highest ever for a CAA team. UNC Wilmington claimed its third league title in the past five years before dropping an overtime decision in the NCAA Tour-

nament. Old Dominion became the first conference team to reach the final four of the NIT, defeating league member Hofstra in the quarterfinals. Drexel was the first CAA squad to



make the final four of the NIT Pre-Season Tip-Off Tournament, where it dropped close decisions to national powers Duke and UCLA. The CAA was ranked eighth out of 31 conferences in the final RPI with six teams among the top 88 in the country.

In women's basketball, the CAA had a league-record four teams earn post-season berths and was ranked #8 in the final RPI. Perennial power Old Dominion, which claimed its 15th consecutive conference title, has a storied history that includes three national championships (1979, 1980, 1985) and a national runner-up finish in 1997. Delaware, James Madison and Hofstra received berths in the 2006 WNIT.

The conference also excels in many other sports. CAA squads have won 10 field hockey national titles since the championship began in 1981 and Old Dominion advanced to the national semifinals in 2005. In baseball, James Madison's Kellen Kulbacki was chosen as the Co-National Player of the Year and the league had 28 players chosen in the 2006 Major League Baseball draft. The CAA is annually ranked among the nation's top 10 conferences in men's and women's soccer, and traditionally sends multiple teams to the NCAA Tournament. Hofstra's men's lacrosse team was ranked #2 in the nation last season and tied an NCAA record with 17 victories while CAA women's tennis players Megan Moulton-Levy of William & Mary and Tatsiana Uvarova of VCU both earned All-America honors after facing off in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship. In 2005-06, 21 league teams earned NCAA Tournament berths in 16

sports. There were 37 CAA student-athletes who earned All-America honors.

CAA member institutions are committed to excellence in the classroom. The Colonial Academic Alliance was created in 2002 by the league's presidents with a goal of expanding their partnership to all aspects of university life outside of intercollegiate athletics. Among the programs already established are an undergraduate research conference, coordination of study abroad programs and granting visiting academic status to student-athletes traveling to an away contest so that they have access to libraries, academic resource centers and computer labs.

In 2002, two faculty members from CAA institutions were awarded academia's most coveted distinction - the Nobel Prize. John B. Fenn, a research professor in the Department of Chemistry at Virginia Commonwealth University, received the Nobel Prize for chemistry, and Vernon Smith, a professor of economics and law at George Mason University, shared the Nobel Prize in economic sciences.

Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager has guided the CAA since its inception. Long-time members George Mason University, James Madison University, the University of North Carolina at Wilmington, Old Dominion University, Virginia Commonwealth University and the College of William & Mary were joined by the University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University in 2001. Georgia State University and Northeastern University became members of the conference on July 1, 2005.

The CAA traces its roots back to 1983 when three of its current members - George Mason, James Madison, and William and Mary - were aligned with East Carolina University, the United States Naval Academy and the University of Richmond as a basketball league (ECAC South). During the next two years, the league added 11 sports, acquired two new members (UNC Wilmington and American University) and decided to form a new association. The transformation from ECAC South to CAA took place on June 6, 1985. Old Dominion became a member of the CAA in 1991-92 and VCU joined the conference prior to the 1995-96 season.

From all-star athletes to Nobel Prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who stand out both on the playing field and in the classroom.

# CAA Seeking To Build on Last Years Success

Coming off the most memorable season in the conference's 21-year history, the CAA enters the upcoming campaign with excitement and high expectations. Consider the number of milestones reached a year ago:

**Highest RPI Ranking:** The CAA was the 8th-ranked Division I conference in the final RPI last season, which was the best in the league's 21-year history. Six of the CAA's 12 teams were ranked in the top 88 of the RPI (George Mason - 15, Hofstra - 30, UNC Wilmington - 31, Old Dominion - 52, VCU - 80, Northeastern - 88).

**Final Four Again And Again And Again:** The CAA was the only conference to have a team in the Final Four of the NCAA Tournament (George Mason), the

post-season NIT (Old Dominion) and the pre-season NIT (Drexel) in 2005-06.

**George Mason Makes Historic Run To The Final Four:** George Mason became the first CAA team to reach the Final Four and the first "mid-major" squad to advance to the Final Four since 1979. The 11th-seeded Patriots joined the 1986 LSU team as the lowest seeds in NCAA Tournament history to make the Final Four.

**Knocking Out The Champs:** George Mason became the first team in NCAA Tournament history to eliminate the past two national champions in the same year when it defeated Connecticut (86-84 in ot) in the regional finals and North Carolina (65-60) in the second round. If you add in Mason's first round win over 2000 champ Michigan State (75-65) and UConn's 1999 title, the Patriots beat programs that had captured four of the previous seven national crowns.

**Four CAA Teams Earn Post-Season Berths:** A league record four CAA teams participated in post-season play for the second year in a row, including two squads making the NCAA Tournament field for the first time since 1986. CAA champion UNC

Wilmington earned its fourth NCAA trip in the past seven years, while regular season co-champ George Mason was in the field of 65 for the third time in eight seasons. Old Dominion became the first CAA team to reach the semifinals of the NIT, while Hofstra advanced to the NIT quarterfinals after winning its first two post-season games ever at the Division I level.

**100+ Wins For Top Four Teams:** The CAA was the only conference in the nation to have four teams with 24 or more wins last season. NCAA Tournament participants George Mason (27-8) and UNC Wilmington (25-8) set new school records for victories, while Hofstra (26-7) tied its school record for wins. NIT semifinalist Old Dominion went 24-10 on the heels of a school-record 28-6 mark in 2004-05. Two other conference teams - Northeastern (19-11) and VCU (19-10) - won 19 games giving the CAA six squads with 19 or more victories for the first time in league history.

**Non-Conference Success:** CAA teams combined to win nearly 60% (76-52) of their non-conference contests last season. Making the mark even more impressive is that 60% of those games were played either on the road or on neutral courts. That success continued in the post-season when the league went 8-3 versus non-conference opponents, which was the second-highest winning percentage of any Division I conference. CAA teams defeated entries from the ACC (North Carolina), Big 10 (Michigan State), Big East (Connecticut), Big 12 (Colorado and Nebraska), Missouri Valley (Wichita State), Atlantic 10 (Saint Joseph's) and MAAC (Manhattan).

**On Guard:** Five players who earned all-conference honors a year ago return to the CAA this season, and all are guards. Hofstra senior Loren Stokes was a first-team All-CAA selection for the second year in a row after ranking among the league's top 20 in scoring (17.4 ppg/3rd), rebounding (5.1 rpg/20th), assists (2.8 apg/14th) and steals (1.6 spg/10th). Returning from the All-CAA second team are Towson senior Gary Neal, who averaged a sensational 26.1 ppg but didn't qualify for NCAA or league statistical rankings after playing in only 17 contests, and Hofstra junior Antoine Agudio, who netted 17.2 ppg and drained a school-record 91 three-pointers.

Back from the All-CAA third team are UNC Wilmington senior T.J. Carter (13.6 ppg), who was also the MVP of the CAA Tournament, and Drexel senior Dominick Mejia (15.3 ppg), who buried a league-best 92 treys.

**Neal Leads All Returning Scorers:** Towson senior guard Gary Neal is the top returning scorer in Division I after averaging 26.1 points per game last season. Neal played in 17 games last season, but isn't listed among the NCAA's statistical leaders because he failed to compete in 75% of the Tigers' contests. The La Salle transfer joined the squad in late December and then missed four games in February due to a foot injury. A second-team All-CAA pick, Neal scored 25 or more points 11 times and topped the 30-point plateau in seven games. He shot 40.5% from beyond the arc, hitting 60-of-148 threepointers.

**CAA Teams Featured 56 Times On Television:** CAA teams appeared on television a league-record 56 times in 2005-06, including 18 national telecasts. ESPN featured CAA teams on 12 occasions, including the popular BracketBuster series and the pre- and post-season NIT championships. UNCW and George Mason showcased their talents nationally on six CBS telecasts during the NCAA championship. Nearly 40 CAA matchups aired on the Comcast regional networks and numerous other outlets.

### Hofstra, Towson Feature 2 of Nation's Highest-Scoring Backcourts:

Both Hofstra and Towson have two of the three highest-scoring three-man backcourts in NCAA Division I this season. Senior Loren Stokes (17.4 ppg), junior Antoine Agudio (17.2 ppg) and senior Carlos Rivera (11.7 ppg) are back for Hofstra after combining for 46.3 points per game in 2005-06. The Tigers return the third highest-scoring backcourt trio at 41.1 ppg with senior Gary Neal (26.1 ppg) and sophomores Tim Crossin (8.9 ppg) and Rocky Coleman (6.1 ppg).

**Tigers Were CAA's Most Improved:** Entering last March's CAA Tournament in Richmond, the Tigers were the most improved team in the CAA. The Tigers finished their CAA schedule with eight wins, a dramatic increase from the previous season when they earned only one CAA victory. The Tigers finished seventh in the CAA with an 8-10 record as they tied for seventh place with Drexel. The Tigers' eight CAA wins were more than they had in their three previous CAA seasons when they were 7-47. The Tigers became known as a dangerous team last year as they upset CAA finalist Hofstra and edged Virginia Commonwealth, damaging the playoff hopes of both teams.

**Gary Neal Honored As CAA Player of the Week Three Times:** The Tigers' Gary Neal made quite a name for himself in CAA circles last season as he earned CAA Player of the Week honors three times. He earned the award for the first time on January 9 after

leading the Tigers to wins over the College of Charleston and James Madison. He scored 30 points at Charleston and a career high 40 at JMU. On January 16, he was honored for the second straight week after scoring a total of 61 points in back-to-back wins over Hofstra and Delaware. On February 6, he averaged 34.5 points per game in two contests, a loss at Virginia Commonwealth and win over Drexel. Prior to last season, only one Tiger had been named as CAA Player of the Week in four years.

**Tim Crossin Named As CAA Rookie of the Week Twice:** The Tigers' Tim Crossin was named as the CAA Rookie of the Week twice last season. Crossin earned the award for the first time on December 5 after the Tigers won two of three games. In his three-game week, Tim averaged 14.3 points and 5.3 assists per game as the Tigers beat Morgan State and William & Mary. Tim earned his second Rookie of the Week award in mid-January after helping the Tigers post back-to-back wins over Hofstra and Delaware. In the Tigers' win over Hofstra, he scored 10 points and had 10 assists. In a win at Delaware, he had five points and nine assists. In the two games, he played 76 minutes and did not commit a turnover.

**All-CAA Honors:** In their first four seasons in the CAA, the Tigers did not have anyone selected for any of the All-CAA teams. Last season, two Tigers, Gary Neal and Lawrence Hamm, were honored. Neal was named second team All-CAA while Hamm was a third team All-CAA pick. In addition, freshman guard Tim Crossin was named to the CAA's All-Rookie team. Crossin was the first Tiger to be named to the All-Rookie team since Hamm earned the honor as a freshman.

**Long-Range Bombers:** Led by Gary Neal, the Tigers set school records for three-point field goals made and attempted in a season. The Tigers made 185 three-pointers in 543 attempts for a .341 percentage. Neal led the way by making 60 of 148 attempts. (.405). Gary also set the school record for three-pointers made in a game as he hit seven three-pointers in a game twice.

**Offensive Explosion:** In the Tigers' 99-84 win at James Madison on January 7, the Tigers recorded their highest point total since a 105-86 win over Washington College in 1995. It was also the Tigers' third-highest point total in a road game. Gary Neal and Lawrence Hamm led the way as they combined for 69 points. Neal scored a career high 40 points for the Tigers' first 40-point outing in 13 years. Neal's 40-point outing was the 12th 40-point game in CAA history and a CAA high for the season. Hamm matched his career high with 29 points.



**ESPN BracketBusters:** All 12 of the CAA schools will participate in the 2007 ESPN BracketBusters series on February 16-17, 2007. This year's event will include a pool of 102 teams representing 16 different conferences. Now in its fifth year, BracketBusters is an ESPN television property that provides NCAA Tournament-caliber teams the opportunity to face off in a two-day, 51-game event. A total of 13 games will be televised. While teams have already been pre-designated as being at home or away, the pairings won't take place until January 29. Eight CAA teams participated in BracketBusters last year and the CAA had a 6-2 record. The CAA earned national attention by winning all three nationally televised games as VCU edged Albany 70-67, Old Dominion beat Marist 84-71 and George Mason nipped Wichita State 70-67. The first BracketBusters in 2003 featured 18 teams and the 2004 event grew to 46 teams, including 2003 CAA champion UNC Wilmington. Three CAA teams, Drexel, George Mason and VCU, were among 64 participating teams in 2005.

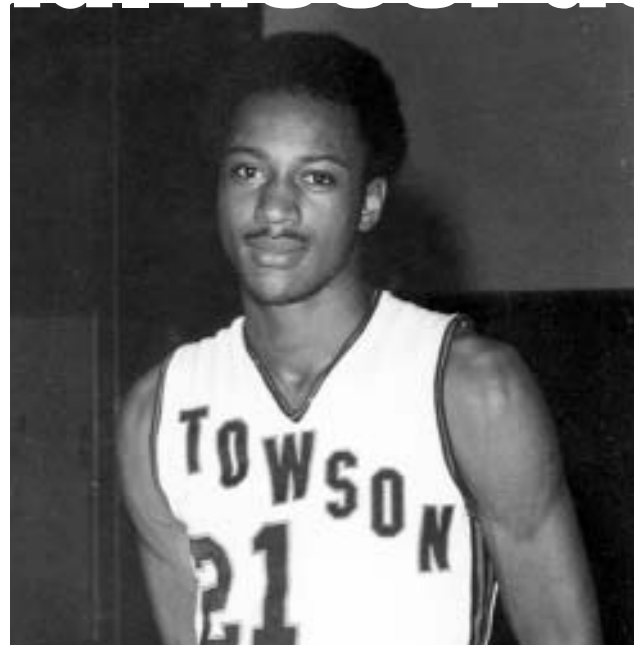

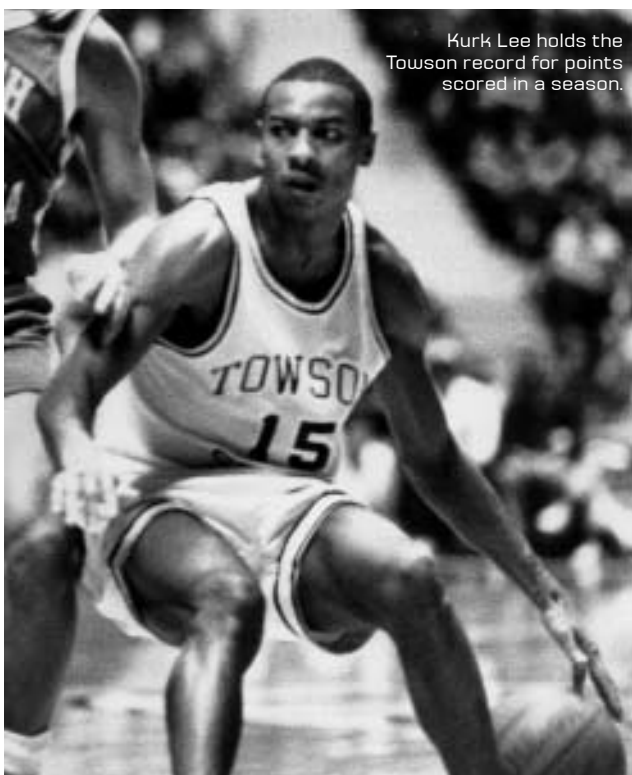

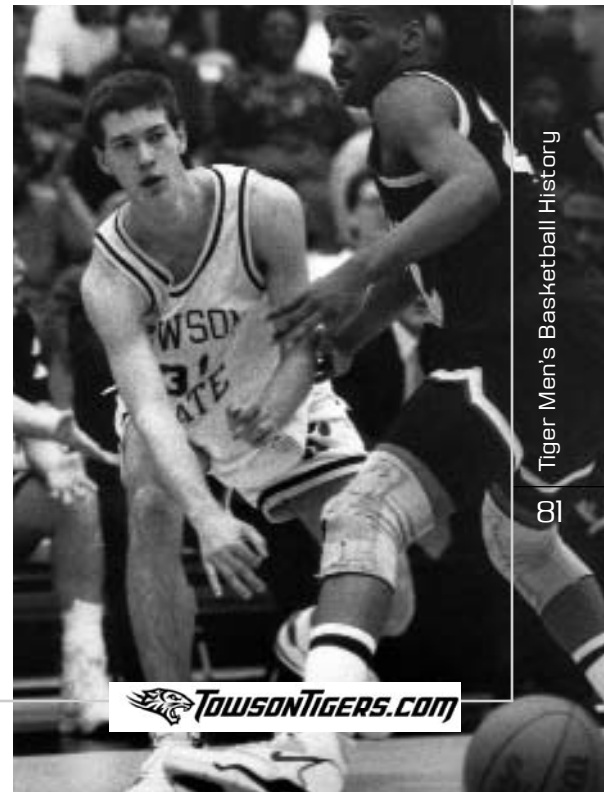

Since joining the NCAA Division I ranks in 1979-80, the Tigers have made two trips to the "Big Dance," participating in the NCAA Tournament two years in a row.

As East Coast Conference champions, Coach **Terry Truax** and the Tigers qualified for the NCAA Tournament in 1990 and 1991, facing nationally-ranked teams on each occasion. During both seasons, the Tigers won the conference championship in the Towson Center before a large crowd and a national audience on ESPN. In 1990, the Tigers beat Lehigh before a crowd of 4,435 in the Towson Center. In 1991, the Tigers earned their NCAA berth with a win over Rider College before a crowd of 3,425.

On March 14, 1990, the Tigers played number one-ranked Oklahoma at the Erwin Center at the University of Texas. Towson entered the game as a decided underdog to the Sooners, who were 27-4, the top seed in the regional and had a NCAA-leading 101.3 scoring average.

However, the Tigers represented themselves well in their first NCAA Tournament game. Rallying from a 14-point halftime deficit, they cut the lead to two points several

times in the final six minutes before the Sooners held on for the win. In his final college game, **Kurk Lee** scored 30 points against the Sooners. Lee, the 13th-leading scorer in Division I, averaged 26.0 points and was the ECC Player of the Year as well as the ECC tourney MVP.

The Tigers' performance impressed Oklahoma's colorful coach, **Billy Tubbs**. After the 77-68 OU victory, he said "they outthrustled us, they outfought us, and we were lucky to hang on. Late in the game, I was confused as to who was the number one seed. I thought they had it backward."

The 1990 Tigers were led by Lee, who captained the team along with **Kennell Jones** and **Kelly Williamson**. Jones, who had 11 points and 10 rebounds in the loss to Oklahoma, was the ECC Scholar-Athlete for basketball and averaged 8.7 points with a team high 6.8 rebounds. Williamson averaged 10.9 points while 6-8 Mike Morin averaged 4.0 points.

Sophomore guard **Devin Boyd** was the team's second-leading scorer with an 11.7 average while averaging 2.9 assists and 1.9 steals. Off the bench, sophomore forward

**Chuck Lightening** averaged 8.5 points with a .502 field goal percentage and junior guard **Lewis Waller** was a very valuable "sixth man," averaging 7.1 points.

# March Madness

Despite the loss of four senior starters, the Tigers returned to the NCAA Tournament in 1991. For the second year in a row, the Tigers won the ECC regular season championship as well as the tournament crown in the Towson Center.

While a trio of seniors led the 1990 Tigers to the NCAA's, it was a trio of juniors that sparked the return trip. **Devin Boyd**, the only returning starter from the first NCAA Tournament team, led Towson and the ECC with a 20.7 scoring average. He was the league's Player of the Year and was named to the ECC Championship all-tournament team for the second straight year. **Chuck Lightening** was the team's second-leading scorer with a 16.1 average and led the Tigers with 6.3 rebounds. He joined Boyd on the All-ECC first team. **Terrance Jacobs**, a junior guard who transferred in from Allegany Junior College, earned all-tourney honors and provided outstanding defense while averaging 15.9 points. Coach **Terry Truax**, the ECC Coach of the Year, also received strong efforts from a pair of freshmen, **Matt Campbell** and **John James**. They were each named to the ECC All-Rookie team.

For the second year in a row, the Tigers found themselves matched up with a national power in the NCAA Tournament.

Sent to the Midwest regionals for the second straight year, the Tigers went up against Big Ten Conference champion Ohio State. The Buckeyes were ranked second in the nation behind Nevada-Las Vegas and were led by **Jim Jackson**, a future NBA all-star. On top of that, the game was played in Dayton, Ohio.

But for the second year in a row, the Tigers made an excellent accounting of themselves. The Buckeyes led most of the way, but were hard-pressed to pull out a 97-86 victory. Ohio State led by 45-37 at halftime and opened up a 64-46 lead with 12:36 remaining. But Lightening, who was the high scorer for the game with 26 points, led a 24-11 run that trimmed the Buckeyes' lead to 75-70 with five minutes remaining. However, the Tiger comeback fell short when Boyd fouled out after scoring 17 points in just 21 minutes due to foul trouble. Lightening was named as the CBS-TV Player of the Game while Jacobs chipped in with 22 points.

Despite the loss, the Tigers impressed Jackson. He said, "They could have given up when they were down but they really stuck with it. I have a lot of respect for the way they played us and attacked us offensively."

## Tigers in Division I

This is the 28th season for Towson University as a member of the ranks of NCAA Division I.

Since becoming a Division I program, the Towson basketball team has enjoyed much success that includes seven winning seasons against challenging schedules, five national television appearances, three conference championships, three regular season league titles, two NCAA Tournament bids, a Pre-Season NIT win and some other dramatic moments.

During that time, the Tigers have been affiliated with five different conferences. Three different players were conference players of the year. One of those players went on to compete in the National Basketball Association.

The Tigers have hosted four ESPN telecasts from the Towson Center. They appeared in the first game ever broadcast on ESPN2.

Along the way, the Tigers have thrived in the role as an underdog, and even come out on top once in a while, i.e. wins over St. John's in the Pre-Season NIT, Louisville in the Towson Center and West Virginia. They've fallen short too as they did against top-ranked Oklahoma in the 1990 NCAA Tournament, Syracuse, North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland and Michigan before a record crowd in the Towson Center.

After several seasons at the top of Division II basketball, the Tigers made their Division I debut on December 1, 1979 against American University. Vince Angotti, the winningest coach in Towson history, returned from a sabbatical leave to lead the Tigers. Towson lost its Division I debut to American, 66-63.

In the second season, there was more improvement. Led by Tony Odrick, the Tigers posted a 13-14 record.

After the Tigers' first season in the East Coast Conference, Angotti announced his retirement from coaching, with a 16 year 231-178 career record.

Terry Truax succeeded Angotti as the head coach and set about establishing the Tigers in the ECC. Although Towson struggled to a 10-19 record in his first season, freshman guard Bill Leonard brought hope for the future as he was named ECC Rookie of the Year. Leonard would go on to score 1,469 points in his career and earn all-conference honors twice.

Progress came slowly in Truax's first three

years as head coach. However, in 1986-87, the addition of Marty Johnson, a transfer from the University of Richmond, helped Towson post its best Division I record with a 14-16 mark. The Tigers, who finished sixth in the ECC, came up just short of their first trip to the NCAA Tournament as they beat Rider and Lafayette in the conference tourney. However, Bucknell beat Towson in the championship game.

In 1987-88, Johnson was honored as the ECC Defensive Player of the Year while averaging 17.6 points and 5.0 assists per game. He also led the Tigers to their second straight appearance in the ECC Championship Game. Before a near-sellout crowd and a national audience on ESPN, the Tigers dropped an 84-78 decision to Lehigh as they finished as ECC runners-up for the second year in a row.

The 1988-89 season was pivotal for the Towson basketball program. The addition of transfers Kurk Lee, Kennell Jones and Kelly Williamson, all Baltimore area high school stars who came home, plus freshman guard Devin Boyd enabled Towson to post its first winning season at the Division I level. TU went 19-10 and finished second in the ECC, but an overtime loss to Lafayette in the ECC semi-finals ended it abruptly. Lee was honored as the ECC Player of the Year after leading the conference in scoring with a 25.4 average. Boyd was the ECC Rookie of the Year and Truax was Coach of the Year.

In 1989-90, Towson won its first ECC championship earning its first NCAA Tournament trip. Led by Lee, a repeat selection as ECC Player of the Year, the Tigers rolled through the ECC Tournament, beating Rider, Delaware and Lehigh by a total of 38 points. Lee was the tournament MVP, scoring 83 points in the tournament. Making its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament, Towson was paired with top-ranked Oklahoma. Led by Lee's 30-points, the Tigers gave the Sooners all they could handle before falling 77-68.

The Tigers won their second straight ECC title in 1990-91 led by ECC Player of the Year Devin Boyd and first team All-ECC Chuck Lightening. Towson dropped a 97-86 verdict to Big Ten champion Ohio State despite a 29-point performance from Lightening, the CBS-TV Player of the Game.

With the breakup of the ECC, the 1991-92 season found the Tigers in the Big South

### Close Calls

#### March 17, 1990 - Oklahoma 77, Towson 68 (NCAA Midwest Regionals):

Paired with number one-ranked Oklahoma in the first round of the NCAA Midwest Regionals, the Tigers gave the Sooners all they could handle before falling in the final minute. Playing his last game for the Tigers, Kurk Lee turned in a dazzling performance as he scored a game high 30 points with seven rebounds. Senior Kennell Jones, the 1990 ECC's Scholar Athlete of the Year for men's basketball, had a "double double" for the Tigers with 11 points and 10 rebounds. The Tigers trailed by just 70-68 with a minute to go before the Sooners put the game away at the foul line.

Conference. Towson rolled through the regular season and won the regular season title with a 14-2 Big South record as Boyd and sophomore Terrance Alexander were named first team all-conference. However, the Tigers' 18-9 season ended with a shocking loss to eighth-seeded Winthrop in the Big South quarter-finals. Boyd ended his career as Towson's scoring leader with 2,000 points.

Towson further enhanced its improving national image in November of 1993 when the Tigers pulled off a stunning 66-65 upset win at St. John's in the Pre-Season NIT. Towson ended St. John's streak of 23 straight wins in Alumni Hall and its 62-game Alumni Hall winning streak against non-Big East teams. The win earned Towson a trip to the University of Massachusetts for a quarter-final game against the Minutemen. The game was the first basketball game to be broadcast on the new ESPN2 network. Towson went on to win its second straight Big South regular season title and post only the third 20-win season in school history. But a semi-final loss to Liberty in the Big South Tournament ended that year at 21-9.

In their final Big South season, the Tigers struggled to a 12-15 finish, ending a streak of six straight winning seasons. It was a strange season with wins over West Virginia and Louisville among the dozen victories. The highlight was the 81-69 win over the Cardinals, one of the biggest upsets during the college basketball season.

Towson entered the North Atlantic Conference in 1995-96, posting a 16-12 record that included an 11-7 league mark, good for a third place tie. The Tigers reached the semi-finals of the NAC Tournament before losing to Drexel. The NAC became America East

## **November 24, 1997 - Michigan 75, Towson 72:**

Before a Towson Center record crowd of 5,086 and a regional television audience on WMAR-TV, the Tigers nearly pulled off an upset of the Wolverines. The game marked the Towson Center debut of Coach Mike Jaskulski. In a game which saw 18 ties and eight lead changes, Michigan trailed most of the way before pulling out the win. The Tigers set a school record by making 13 of 25 three-point field goal tries as Raul dePablo led the way with six three-pointers in an 18-point effort.

prior the 1996-97 season, Truax's last as the Tiger head coach. Towson had its worst season in 11 years with a 9-19 record.

The 1997-98 season was the first for coach Mike Jaskulski, who debuted with a 51-48 come-from-behind win at American University. Two nights later, Towson battled Michigan to the wire before dropping a 75-72 decision.

In 2001, Towson took another step up in terms of conference affiliation with its move to the Colonial Athletic Association, ending a six-year relationship with America East. The Tigers moved to the new league with long-time rivals Delaware, Drexel and Hofstra.

In May, 2004, the Tigers hired veteran Coach Pat Kennedy to lead them to success in the CAA. Coach Kennedy came to Towson as an experienced Division I coach with more than 400 victories on his resume.

In 24 seasons as a Division I head coach, he worked the sidelines at Iona College, Florida State University, DePaul University and the University of Montana. He led Iona, Florida State and DePaul to the NCAA Tournament.

In their first two seasons under the direction of Coach Kennedy, the Tigers have added some impressive victories to their list, including a 94-91 win over Hofstra and a 59-57 victory over Virginia Commonwealth last season. The Tigers also won four consecutive road games in their second season under his direction.

In fact, the Tigers posted their best record in nearly ten years in Kennedy's second season as coach.

### **1 - March 6, 1990 - Towson 73, Lehigh 60 (ECC Championship Game):**

Led by a 22-point effort from Tournament MVP Kurk Lee, the Tigers earned their first NCAA Division I bid by winning the East Coast Conference championship in the Towson Center before a crowd of 4,435 and a nationwide audience on ESPN. The Tigers led most of the way but a three-point play by Lee with 3:40 left gave Towson a 60-51 lead which it never lost.

### **2 - November 18, 1993 - Towson 66, St. John's 65 (Pre-Season NIT):**

Scouter Alexander scored a team high 18 points and Matt Campbell hit a clutch free throw with 35 seconds left as the Tigers stunned St. John's at Alumni Hall. The Tiger win ended St. John's 23-game Alumni Hall win streak as well as its 62-game home win streak against non-Big East teams. In a close game in which neither team ever led by more than six points, the Tigers built a 65-60 lead with 2:44 remaining before St. John's tied the contest at 65, setting the stage for Campbell's go-ahead free throw. Towson stopped St. John's twice in the final 30 seconds to hang on for the win. Stevie Thomas added 10 points for the Tigers. Ralph Blalock had 12 points.

### **3 - January 30, 1995 - Towson 81, Louisville 69:**

Ralph Blalock scored a game high 26 points and the Tigers shot 59 per cent in the second half as they stunned former national champion Louisville before a crowd of 4,281 in the Towson Center. The Tigers overcame an early 27-16 deficit to shock the Cardinals with a second half comeback. Towson took its first lead of the game at 60-59 with 7:32 remaining and never looked back. Over the last ten minutes, the Tigers outscored Louisville 32-14 and hit 14 of their last 16 free throws. DeRon Robinson added 20 points off the bench for the Tigers while Quintin Moody's nine points included two three-point baskets in the last seven minutes.

## **4 - March 5, 1991 - Towson 69, Rider 63 (ECC Championship Game):**

Led by a 17-point effort from junior Devin Boyd, the Tigers rallied for a win over Rider to earn their second straight trip to the NCAA Tournament. Boyd's three-point play with 1:06 left in the game gave Towson a 62-61 lead it never lost. A steal and breakaway slam dunk by Chuck Lightening gave Towson a 64-61 lead with 45 seconds remaining. The Tigers to protect their lead by hitting free throws down the stretch. Playing before a crowd of more than 3,300 and national TV audience on ESPN, the Tigers won their ECC championship in a row.

## **5 - December 5, 1994 - Towson 81, West Virginia 78:**

The game was billed as "Gale Catlett Night" as the West Virginia coach "hosted" Towson at Shepherd College. However, Ralph Blalock turned it into his night as he scored 20 points and hit a game-winning 30-foot shot at the buzzer. Blalock hit two three-pointers in the last 24 seconds as Towson rallied for the win against the previously undefeated Mountaineers. West Virginia came close to settling the issue early, grabbing a 35-18 lead late in the first half. However, Towson chipped away and took its first lead when Blalock's first three-pointer made it 78-76 with 24 seconds left. WVU tied the game with seven seconds left, setting the stage for Blalock's game-winner. Freshman Ralph Biggs also had a hand in the win, scoring 16 points on 6-for-7 shooting from the floor.

## **6 - January 31, 1980 - Towson 88, Richmond 83:**

The Tigers pulled off their first Division I road win in the Robins Center. Freshman guard Donald Leslie scored a game high 30 points on 12-for-15 shooting from the floor. It was the best game of his career. Another freshman, forward Michael Sharpe, added 25 points and three steals. Towson used a 56-point second half to pull out the win.

## **7 - March 9, 1992 - Towson 69, Hofstra 63 (ECC Championship Game):**

Overcoming a quick 9-0 deficit, the Tigers made their ECC finale memorable by winning the championship for the third year in a row. The 2nd-seeded Tigers outscored the top-seeded Dutchmen by 31-14 over the last 15 minutes of the first half to take control. After Hofstra closed to within 54-51 in the final six minutes, Towson responded with a 6-0 run to restore its nine-point lead as Chuck Lightening scored all six points. Lightening had a game high 22 points while Terrance Jacobs scored 19 points in his final college game. Freshman Scooter Alexander was named as the tournament MVP as Towson became the first team in ECC history to win three straight titles.

## **8 - March 2, 1996 - Towson 85, Delaware 78 (AMERICA EAST Tournament):**

In their first AMERICA EAST Tournament game, the Tigers stunned host Delaware with a come-from-behind win in the Bob Carpenter Center. In a game that featured nine ties and 11 lead changes, the Tigers avenged two regular season losses to the Blue Hens. Towson used a 14-3 run late in the second half to break away from a 63-63 tie and take a 77-66 edge with 4:54 left. Senior Stevie Thomas and junior Michael Keyes led the Tigers with 17 points each.

## **9 - December 29, 1987 - Towson 58, Jacksonville 51:**

Marty Johnson had eight points, seven assists and six steals as he outdueled future NBA star Dee Brown and led the Tigers to a win in the Jacksonville Coliseum. Towson forced 20 turnovers while committing just five en route to the win. Michael Fink led the Tigers with 14 points while Tommy Jones came off the bench to score ten points.

## **10 - January 2, 2006 - Towson 86, Col. of Charleston 75:**

Just one game removed from ending a 14-game road losing streak, the Tigers stunned the College of Charleston by handing the Cougars a through 86-75 loss at Kresse Arena. The loss was only the Cougars' sixth loss at home in their last 46 games. Charleston came into the game with 18 wins in its last 19 home games. In his fourth game as a Tiger, Gary Neal exploded for 30 points, including 20 points after halftime. The Tigers, who trailed by seven points in the first half, were tied at 35-35 at halftime. All five Tiger starters scored in double figures as Tim Crossin scored 15 points while Lawrence Hamm had 14 points and eight rebounds. Dennard Abraham also scored 14 points as the Tigers shot 53.3 per cent from the floor.

# Towson Tigers from A-Z

# History

## **A is for Angotti.**

Vince Angotti is the winningest coach in Towson basketball history. The Tigers' coach from 1966 to 1983, he had a career record of 231-177 and was twice honored as the NCAA regional Coach of the Year. From 1971 to 1978, he led the Tigers to seven consecutive winning seasons.

## **B is for Boyd.**

A four-year starter at guard, Devin Boyd finished his career as TU's all-time leading scorer with 2,000 points. Two-time first team all-conference he was the 1991 ECC Player of the Year. He is also TU's career assist leader.

## **C is for Chuck Lightening.**

First team All-ECC as a junior and senior, Chuck scored 1,305 points in his career. He was a key member of the NCAA Tournament teams in 1990 and 1991 and was the CBS Player of the Game after scoring 29 points against Ohio State.

## **D is for Dantley.**

Adrian Dantley, one of the top players in NBA history and a former All-American at Notre Dame, served as an assistant coach at Towson from 1993 to 1996. He scored 23,177 points in a 16-year professional career with seven teams. He spent seven seasons with the Utah Jazz. The NBA Rookie of the Year in 1977, he was the ninth-leading scorer in league history when he retired. He is currently an assistant coach with the Denver Nuggets.

## **E is for East Coast Conference.**

The Tigers' home from 1983 to 1992. TU hosted the ECC Tournament eight years in a row. The Tigers also became the only team in ECC history to win three straight ECC titles in 1990, 1991 and 1992. The ECC folded in 1994.

## **F is for Fink.**

Michael Fink was a co-captain of the 1987-88 Tigers who finished the season as East Coast Conference runners-up. A solid outside shooter, he finished his career with 1,029 points, 20th on Towson's all-time scoring list.

## **G is for George "Bucky" Kimmett.**

George "Bucky" Kimmett was the first player in Towson history to score more than 1,000 points in his college career. A Baltimore native who started for four years, he scored a total of 1,529 points in his career, a 15.8 average. As a senior, he averaged 18.6 points per game, setting a school record. He went on to become an outstanding high school coach in the Baltimore area for 31 years. He compiled a 333-313 record at Poly High School, including the 1995 state championship.

## **H is for Hamm.**

A four-year starter at forward, Lawrence Hamm led the Tigers in rebounding all four years he played at Towson. The fourth-leading rebounder in school history, Lawrence was a four-year team captain who finished his career with 1,318 points and 788 rebounds. He was named third team All-Colonial Athletic Association as a senior when he was the CAA's second-leading rebounder with a 9.2 average. He was also second in the CAA with a .574 field goal percentage in his senior season. As a freshman, he was named to the Colonial Athletic Association's All-Rookie team. In his career, he played in 114 games and started 109 of them.

## **I is for Isaac.**

There have been two players in Towson basketball history named Isaac. Isaac Miller played for Towson during the 1925-26 season. Isaac Schlonen was a member of the basketball team from 1940 to 1942.

## **J is for Jacobs.**

Terrance Jacobs was the 1992 East Coast Conference Player of the Year. "T.J." helped the Tigers win back-to-back ECC championships and led the ECC in scoring. He scored 1,170 points in just two seasons as a Tiger and went on to enjoy a successful playing career in Europe.

## **K is for Kennedy**

Coach Pat Kennedy is in his third year as Towson's head coach. Coach Kennedy brought to Towson 24 seasons of NCAA Division I head coaching experience. He has won 433 games as head coach, including 202 wins at Florida State.

Terrance Jacobs, '92 was the East Coast Conference Player of the Year in 1992



**L is for Lee.**

The Tigers' first Division I All-American, Kurk Lee was the ECC Player of the Year in 1989 and 1990. He averaged 25.4 points per game as a junior and 26.0 points as a senior. After spending one year with the New Jersey Nets in the NBA, Kurk went on to enjoy a fine playing career in Finland.

**M is for McKinley.**

Pat McKinley was a four-year starter for the Tigers from 1973 to 1977. A first team Division II All-American in 1977 and a three-time pick as first team All-Mason-Dixon Conference, he finished his career as Towson's all-time leading scorer (1,832 points) and rebounder (1,421 rebounds). He was an eighth round draft pick by the Washington Bullets in the 1977 NBA draft.

**N is for Neal.**

Gary Neal joined the Tiger basketball program in December of 2005 and made a tremendous impact in only 17 games.

**O is for Oklahoma and Ohio St.**

Oklahoma and Ohio State were the Tigers' first round opponents in their back-to-back NCAA Division I Tournament appearances in 1990 and 1991.

**P is for Pre-Season NIT.**

The Tigers made their only appearance in the Pre-Season NIT in 1993 and pulled off a major upset, beating St. John's in Alumni Hall.

**Q is for Q.D. Thompson.**

Q.D. Thompson was one of the Tigers' top players from 1939 to 1942. A member of the Towson Athletic Hall of Fame, he also played baseball and soccer for the Tigers. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1968.

**R is for Ralph.**

Ralph Blalock and Ralph Biggs were both 1,000-point scorers in their careers. Ralph Blalock was a three-year starter who finished his career with 1,498 points. Ralph Biggs finished his career with 1,387 points. Both Ralphs went on to enjoy successful basketball playing careers in Europe.

**S is for Sandusky.**

Gerry Sandusky played one year of basketball for the Tigers. He is currently the sports director at WBAL-TV (Channel 11) in Baltimore, a position he has held for 15 years. He is also handling the play-by-play for Towson games broadcast on WBAL-Radio this year.

**T is for Truax.**

Terry Truax was the coach from 1983 to 1997. In 14 seasons, he compiled a record of 202-203. He coached the Tigers to NCAA Tournament appearances in 1990 and 1991. He was the ECC Coach of the Year in 1989 and 1991 and the Big South Conference Coach of the Year award in 1992 and 1993. "Coach T" was inducted into the Towson Athletic Hall of Fame in October.

**U is for Underdog.**

Through the years, the Tigers have thrived in the role of underdog. In 1990 and 1991, the Tigers nearly pulled off major upsets in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. In 1993, Towson scored a major upset in the first round of the Pre-Season NIT with a 66-65 win at St. John's. In 1995, Towson shocked national power Louisville, 81-69.

**V is for Valentine.**

Craig Valentine, a guard who was one of the Tiger co-captains in 1993. An excellent student, Craig was named to the Verizon Academic All-America District 2 team twice.

**W is for Witherspoon.**

Larry Witherspoon, who finished his career with 1,546 points, was the first Towson basketball player drafted by an NBA team. A Baltimore native, he played for the Tigers from 1971 to 1974. He still holds the Towson single game scoring record with 51 points in one game. A two-time All-Mason-Dixon Conference first team selection, he was tenth round draft pick by the Philadelphia 76ers in 1974.

**X is for explosive.**

The 1976-77 Tigers were the most explosive team in school history. En route to a 27-3 record, they averaged 86.3 points per game while setting a school record with 2,590 points scored. In 1976-77, the Tigers scored more than 100 points in a game five times.

**Y is for Yingling.**

David Yingling, a member of the Towson Athletic Hall of Fame, was a four-year stand-out at guard for the Tigers. He was a member of the basketball team from 1952 to 1956.

**Z is for Zacharko.**

Daniel Zacharko was a member of the Tiger basketball team who played from 1946 to 1948.

# 2005-06 in Review



## GAME 1: Loyola Controls Boards, Hands Tigers 80-67 Loss

**TOWSON, Md.** - Maryland transfer, senior guard Andre Collins, made his first three shots, all from beyond the arc, to give Loyola an early lead it would not relinquish as the Greyhounds went on to down Towson 80-67 in the season opener for both teams.

It was the 56th meeting between the two schools. The win stopped a two-game losing streak for the Greyhounds in the series that Loyola now leads, 31-25. It was Towson's first loss in a home opener since 1997.

While Collins, who scored 19 of his 22 points in the first half, was showing the way for the Greyhounds in the scoring column his teammates were pounding the boards. Loyola outboarded the Tigers 47-28, a figure that included 19 offensive rebounds producing 21 second chance points.

Dennard Abraham gave the Tigers the lead when he scored the game's opening bucket on a short jumper. A minute later freshman guard Tim Crossin put the Tigers on top 5-4 with a three-pointer. That was to be Towson's last lead.

Collins then ignited a Loyola run with three consecutive treys to help the Greyhounds to a 15-7 lead. Loyola held the lead the rest of the way despite several Towson rallies that brought the Tigers to within two.

Hamm paced Towson, matching his career high with 24 points. He also led the Tigers with 9 rebounds. Coleman added 16 points and a game high 5 assists. Abraham finished with 14 points and six rebounds.

The crowd of 3,898 for the season opener against Loyola was the largest in the Towson Center since 5,086 showed up to see TU battle Michigan in 1997. TU's bench played a total of 24 minutes against Loyola, scoring 3 points and grabbing 3 rebounds while the LC subs accounted for 50 minutes, 19 points and 16 rebounds.

## GAME 2: Tigers Hold Off UMBC 60-55 To End Losing Streaks

**TOWSON, Md.** - Lawrence Hamm scored a game high 16 points to lead Towson to a 60-55 victory over local rival UMBC, ending a nine-game losing streak for the Tigers against the Retrievers.

Towson's victory ended a 14-game losing streak that stretched back into last season. The Tigers' last win was last January when they thumped James Madison 86-69. The win also ended a record six-game losing streak in the Towson Center for the Tigers.

There were three ties and five lead changes before a Tim Crossin three-pointer snapped a 23-23 tie and gave the Tigers a lead they would not relinquish. Towson went on to a five-point lead, 32-27, at the break.

A Jerrell Dinkins layup and a Chris Pugh jumper at the outset of the second half quickly evaporated Towson's lead to one, 32-31. The Retrievers got as close as 59-55 with 16 seconds left but it wasn't enough as Towson hung on.

Hamm showed the way for the Tigers with his 16 points and nine rebounds. Abraham posted the first double-double of his career at Towson with 13 points and 10 boards as the Tigers outrebounded the Retrievers 43-32.

Dinkins led UMBC with a career high 13 points and a team high six rebounds.

The Tigers rebounded from a dismal showing on the boards against Loyola with a 43-32 dominance in the UMBC victory. The Tigers had 19 fast break points against the Retrievers.

## GAME 3: Tigers Pound Boards, Outmuscle Bears 71-66

**TOWSON, Md.** - Lawrence Hamm and Dennard Abraham combined for 30 points and 20 rebounds to lead Towson to a 71-66 victory over local rival Morgan State. The win enabled TU to even its series with the Bears, 11-11.

The Tigers flexed their muscles, pounding the ball inside to Hamm and Abraham. Hamm finished the game with 14 points and 11 rebounds, recording his ninth career double-double. Abraham, meanwhile, registered a team high 16 points and grabbed nine boards. Towson outrebounded Morgan 39-19 for the game.

Morgan countered with its backcourt tandem of Timothy Mathis and Joseph McLean. Mathis scored a career high 22 points. McLean pumped in 19. The Bears, were 9 of 21 beyond the arc.

A Mathis three-pointer lifted Morgan to a 28-26 lead with 5:44 left in the first half. That lead ballooned to eight points with 1:41 left before a Trevan Jackson free throw and a Sean Raboin layup cut it to five, 39-34, at intermission.

The Tigers attacked the Bears underneath in the second half. Hamm and Abraham combined for 22 points in the final 20 minutes. A jumper by Hamm put TU on top 48-46 at the 13:30 mark. The Tigers did not give up the lead after that. Morgan tied the game at 52-52 with 8:24 remaining but a Towson basket by Abraham propelled the Tigers to the front again.

Towson led by as much as seven, 66-59 with 3:02 on the clock but the pesky Bears wouldn't go away. It took a pair of free throws by Tim Crossin with three seconds left to really seal the victory. He was a perfect 9-9 from the charity stripe.

Crossin missed his first two attempts at the free throw line as a college player and then came back to hit all nine against Morgan. He became the first TU player in 2005-06 to play 40 minutes.

## GAME 4: Spartans Steal Home Opener From Tigers 78-49

**NORFOLK, Va.** - If the Tigers couldn't have played any worse, Norfolk couldn't have played any better as the Spartans beat TU 78-49, coming up with a school record 20 steals to do it.

The loss was Pat Kennedy's worst in his two years as Towson's head coach. It was Norfolk's home opener after four road losses.

Norfolk's stealing, that contributed to 31 Towson turnovers, wasn't the only factor. The Tigers simply went cold, especially early. They didn't score until the game was almost four minutes old when a Marc Pratt three-pointer lit up Towson's side of the scoreboard.

The Tigers never led but tied the score twice in the early going when Norfolk was off to a slow start too. A 10-0 run finally vaulted the Spartans into a 19-7 lead at the 9:36 mark of the first period. Seven minutes later NSU was up by 14. Treys by Tim Crossin and Rocky Coleman helped to thin the Spartan's margin to 11 at the break.

In the second half the Tigers fell ill to the foul bug. By the 10:00 mark starters Crossin, Lawrence Hamm and Dennard Abraham, the guts of the Tigers' offense, were on the bench with four fouls each. Sensing the weakness the Spartans closed in for the kill. It came at the 7:30 mark when Keith Young sank a three-pointer to put NSU up by a dozen. The Spartans outscored Towson 27-10 the rest of the way.

Crossin was the only player in double figures for the Tigers with 12 points, scored by hitting four treys. Towson shot 33 per cent from the floor. Young and Calvin Brown shared game high scoring honors with 15 points each.

## GAME 5: Hamm Nets Career High As Tribe Falls 76-45

**TOWSON, Md.** - Lawrence Hamm scored a career high 29 points to lead Towson to a 76-45 victory over William & Mary as the Tigers won their Colonial Athletic Association league opener for the first time.

The 31-point difference was the first 30 point plus margin for Towson since March 7, 1992 when the Tigers beat Buffalo 122-58 in the opening round of the East Coast Conference Tournament. It was the first time the Tigers had allowed less than 50 points in a game since a 60-45 win over UMES on December 12, 2002.

Tim Crossin's first three-pointer put Towson out front 7-4 and started an 18-1 run for a 17-point lead with 11:10 left in the first half. The Tribe cut the lead to 10 points, 24-14, at the 7:58 mark but never got closer the rest of the game.

TU went on to 42-20 halftime lead with Hamm and Crossin combining for 29 points. Hamm's dunk with 4:29 remaining in the game gave Towson its biggest lead, 34 points (72-38).

The Tigers shot 50 per cent from the field, led by Hamm's 13 of 15 showing. Crossin, who pumped in a career high 19 points, was 7 of 8 from the field including a 5 for 6 effort from beyond the arc. He also dished out 7 assists, collected 6 rebounds and had 6 steals. Hamm grabbed a game high 8 rebounds.

Forward Sean Raboin came off the bench to score a career high nine points. Rocky Coleman recorded a team high nine assists.

# 2005-06 in Review

# REVIEW

## Did You Know This About Last Season ...

**An Even Dozen:** 12 wins were the most for Towson in five years.

**Most Improved:** Towson distinguished itself as the most improved team in the CAA in 2005-06 regular season. The Tigers vaulted from 5-24 in 2004-05 to 12-16, a plus 7.5 difference, tops in the league. Their 8-10 record in league play was the Tigers' best in five years of membership in the CAA. The 8 wins were more than the three previous CAA seasons when Towson was a combined 7-47.

**First Honors:** Gary Neal and Lawrence Hamm became the first Tigers ever named to an All-CAA post-season basketball team. Neal was selected to the 2nd Team and Hamm to the 3rd Team. Tim Crossin was named to the CAA's All-Rookie team and was given serious consideration for the league's Rookie of the Year award. In the previous five years the only honor earned by a Towson player was Lawrence Hamm's All-Rookie Team selection in 2003.

**Players of the Week:** The Tigers piled up CAA Player of the Week honors in 2005-06. Heading into the last week of the season Towson's Gary Neal was the only player in the CAA named Player of the Week three times. Tim Crossin was cited twice as Rookie of the Week. The four years prior TU had received just one Player of the Week honor.

**Beyond the Arc:** The Tigers set program records for 3-point field goals made (185) and attempted (543) in a season. Gary Neal showed the way, shooting .405 (60 of 148) from beyond the arc.

**Attendance Records:** Pat's Cats caught the fancy of college basketball fans in the area. The Tigers drew 24,626 for the season, a dramatic increase over the 17,091 in the previous year. The crowd of 4,006 for the home finale was the largest Towson Center audience since 1997 when 5,086 fans attended the Towson-Michigan game.

**Road Kill:** Tigers went from one road victory in 2004-05 to 5 road wins in 2005-06. The 69-66 win at Lehigh ended a 14-game road-losing streak and marked the 425th victory of coach Pat Kennedy's career. It was one of 3 losses (11 wins) at home for Lehigh last year.

**A Rare Loss:** In their very next outing the Tigers upended the College of Charleston 86-75, snapping a 7-game home winning streak in Kresse Arena where they have lost less than 40 games since that facility opened 24 years ago. In the last 4 years the Cougars were 41-5 at home. They were 18-1 the last 2 years.

**VCU Stopped:** Virginia Commonwealth was the only opponent in the CAA that Towson had never beaten. The Rams entered the February 15th showdown in the Towson Center with a perfect 10-0 record against the Tigers. Dennard Abraham scored a career high 27 points to show the way. VCU's streak ended with a 59-57 Tigers' victory.

**Dukes Decked:** The Tigers' impressive 99-84 win at JMU stopped a 29-game road-losing streak against CAA opponents. Gary Neal scored a career high 40 points. It proved to be the only 40-point game in the CAA and the league's single game high for 2005-06, marking the 12th 40-point effort in CAA history. The 99 points were the most allowed by the Dukes all year, and the most points scored by the Tigers in a game since they pounded Washington College 105-86 in 1995.

**Pride Hurt:** After tagging James Madison, the Tigers returned home to the Towson Center where they stung Hofstra 94-91, ending the Pride's 6-game winning streak it brought into the contest, and halting a 6-game winning streak against TU. Towson was one of just four CAA teams to hand Hofstra a loss, and it was the Pride's worst defeat of the entire year. It was the only time Hofstra gave up 90 or more points in a game all season. It marked the first time since 1991-92 that Towson had scored in the 90's in consecutive games. Hofstra went on to play in the NIT. The Pride's loss to Towson, by the way, probably cost Hofstra the NCAA at-large bid.

**Tribe Humbled:** The Tigers' 76-45 victory over William & Mary was the first 30-point plus margin of victory for Towson since March 7, 1992 when the Tigers beat the University of Buffalo 122-58 in the opening round of the East Coast Conference Tournament. It was the first time the Tigers had allowed less than 50 points in a game since a 60-45 win over UMES on December 12, 2002. Also, it marked the first time Towson had ever won its league opener in CAA play.

## GAME 6: High Scoring Huskies Top Tigers 89-67

**BOSTON, Mass.** - The Tigers squared off with the highest scoring team in the CAA but couldn't slow the Huskies down as Northeastern came away with an 89-67 victory.

It was the Huskies largest margin of victory over Towson in the 15-game series which the Tigers still lead, 8-7.

The Huskies, off to their best start in 23 years, came out running and gunning, jumping off to a 13-0 lead in the first 2:22 of the game. The Tigers trimmed the lead to six, 13-7 but a 10-2 run opened it up again for NU. Towson cut the margin to a single digit, 23-22, with 7:54 to play in the first half but that was as close as the Tigers would get the rest of the way.

The Huskies steadily pulled away in the second half building to their largest lead, 89-63, with 34 seconds left in the game.

The Huskies were led by the CAA's top scorer, senior guard Jose Barea who registered a game high 27 points. He also dished out 11 assists and collected 7 rebounds. His backcourt mate, junior Bobby Kelly, added 18 points, hitting 4 of 5 three pointers.

Dennard Abraham paced the Tigers with 16 points. Lawrence Hamm and Tim Crossin each netted 15. Hamm grabbed a game high 8 rebounds.

Northeastern, the leading field goal shooting team in the CAA with a .514 clip, shot 52.6% from the floor. On the defensive end, the league's top shot blocker, Shawn James, blocked 8 shots.

It was the sixth time in Hamm's career he has played the entire 40 minutes of a game. Rocky Coleman did not make the trip due to academic commitments.

## GAME 7: AU Sprays Treys To Beat Tigers 74-70

**WASHINGTON, D.C.** - American University figured the best way to beat Towson's zone was to shoot its way out and that's exactly what the Eagles did as they drained a school record 15 three pointers to defeat the Tigers 74-70.

The Tigers got off to a great start, jumping out to a 10-0 lead in the first 2:40 of the game. The Eagles then concluded that to score they had to shoot the ball. They inserted Garrison Carr into the game and he immediately began firing three-pointers. He didn't stop until he'd scored a career high 25 points.

TU's lead slowly evaporated under the barrage. The Tigers held off the Eagles until the final 12 seconds of the first half. That's when Andre Ingram hit a trey to send AU into the lockerroom with 31-30 lead.

Lawrence Hamm scored the first points of the second half on a putback, giving Towson its final lead of the contest, 32-31. Brayden Billbe got the lead right back for AU with a layup. That ignited a 17-5 run fueled by four three-pointers. By the 10:00 mark of the second half the Eagles were up by their biggest margin, 17 (61-44).

The Tigers then rallied behind Hamm, Dennard Abraham and Marc Pratt who combined for the rest of Towson's points. The Tigers cut AU's lead to two points twice. Abraham's jumper with 1:05 left to play lifted the Tigers to within 72-70. But Billbe got the two points right back for AU when he scored on a layup on a nifty assist from Carr with 32 seconds left.

On their last trip down the floor TU failed to rebound a missed shot with 14 seconds remaining. AU controlled the ball the rest of the way.

Carr led all scorers with a career high 25 points, making 6 of 10 threes. Ingram added 15 points, all from beyond the arc. As a team AU made 27 field goals of which 15 were good from three-point land. Pratt finished with a career high 18 points.

## GAME 8: Neal Debuts With 28 Points But Keydets Prevail 80-78

**TOWSON, Md.** - Despite a memorable debut by junior guard Gary Neal, visiting VMI rallied from a 17-point first half deficit to post an 80-78 win.

A transfer from LaSalle Neal scored a game high 28 points in 29 minutes, registering 14 points in his first 5 minutes on the floor. He shot 10-for-18 from the floor, grabbed 5 rebounds and had a career high 8 assists. He also tied TU's single game record with six three-point baskets.

However, Reggie Williams countered with a team high 27 points and nailed four clutch free throws in the final 39 seconds as VMI notched its fifth game in a row, stretching its longest winning streak in nine years.

VMI took the lead for good with 1:14 remaining when Travis Holmes made an acrobatic layup driving down the lane, giving VMI a 73-71 lead. The Keydets were a perfect 9 for 9 from the charity stripe in the final minute of the game.

Led by Neal, the Tigers threatened to blow the game wide open in the first half. Neal entered the game at the 14:42 mark and exploded for 14 points in his first 5:24 as Towson opened up a 28-11 lead. Neal made his first four shots from the floor, including three three-pointers.

However, Williams led a VMI rally as the Keydets closed the half with a 14-2 run to cut the Tigers' lead to 34-32 at halftime. VMI held Towson to one basket in the final eight minutes of the half. Over the final eight minutes of the game, there were 5 ties and 6 lead changes.

Lawrence Hamm was almost overshadowed by Neal's performance. He shot 8-for-10 from the floor.

The Tigers' 73.9 per shooting from the floor in the second half was their best half from the field since shooting 72.7% for a 20 minute period at Delaware on December 12, 1993.

## GAME 9: Tigers Buckle Under Orange Crunch, 86-52

McNamara finished the game with 20 points and 7 assists to the delight of the 8,209 who showed to watch him perform. Demetrius Nichols actually had the game high, 25 points.

Gary Neal, making his first start for Towson, was the only Tiger in double figures, netting 19 points and 7 rebounds. Freshman guard Tim Crossin, the other hometown player in the game, finished with 6 points.

The loss dropped Towson's record against Big East opponents to 2-13. Towson's Big East wins are against St. John's in the 1993 Pre-Season NIT and against West Virginia in 1994 in a game played at Shepherd College on a neutral floor.

## GAME 10: Tigers' 69-66 Win At Lehigh Is Kennedy's 425th

**BETHLEHEM, Pa.** - The Tigers watched an 18-point lead disappear and then rallied in the waning moments to down Lehigh 69-66 in the Stabler Center, ending a 14-game road losing streak to present Towson head coach Pat Kennedy with his 425th career coaching victory. The win was the first for Towson on the road since the Tigers slammed VMI in Lexington 84-69 on December 11, 2004

The Tigers never trailed but had to overcome a stubborn Lehigh group who fought back from a 26-8 deficit to tie it twice in the final 5 :00

Lehigh scored the game's first points on a three-point basket by Kyle Neptune. The Tigers then grabbed a lead they would not relinquish with an 11-0 run. Towson increased its lead to 18 points at the 7:13 mark before the Engineers started to hit some shots and close the gap to 11 (33-22) at halftime.

In the second half foul problems piled up (26 for the game, 16 in the second half) and continuously put Lehigh (14 of 20 in 2nd half) on the free throw line, allowing the Engineers to creep back into the race. Greg Page's 3-pointer with 5:10 left to play finally knotted it at 55-55.

From there the Tigers worked to a 5-point lead twice but they couldn't stretch it. Jose Olivero, the Patriot League's second leading scorer, tied it again on a trey at 64-64 with 44 seconds left.

Gary Neal answered for the Tigers with a layup with 14 ticks remaining. Lawrence Hamm then rebounded an Olivero desperation shot and was fouled with 2.6 seconds remaining. He connected on both free throws. A slow clock allowed Lehigh to run the floor and score with 0.4 seconds left. Hamm was fouled on the inbounds and hit the front end of a two-shot foul to end the scoring.

Neal led Towson with 19 points. Rocky Coleman added 13 off the bench. Hamm posted 11 points. Olivero had the game high, 24 points.

## GAME 11: Tigers Hand CofC Rare Loss In Kresse Arena, 86-75

**CHARLESTON, S.C.** - Last year the College of Charleston pounded Towson by 20, 78-58, in the Towson Center. This time around the Tigers exacted revenge, stunning the Cougars 86-75.

The win was the second in a row on the road, enabling the Tigers to equal their victory total for all of last year. The win also snapped a seven-game home winning streak for the Cougars who dropped to 7-5 on the year with the loss.

The Tigers played the Cougars even in the first half. Charleston worked to a seven-point lead three times in the period but Towson managed to battle back each time. Gary Neal's put back with 1:30 left gave the Tigers their only lead, 33-31. Neal scored again with 10 seconds left to send the two teams into the locker room deadlocked at 35-35.

But the second half belonged to TU which played stout defense, shot well and took care of the ball.

Neal got Towson going with a three-pointer to start the second half. That got the Tigers off on their way to a nine-point lead, 53-44. The Cougars clawed their way back, tying the score twice. After the last deadlock, 60-60, Neal, Lawrence Hamm and Dennard Abraham took over, combining for 22 of Towson's last 26 points. The Cougars closed to within three points, 66-63, at the 5:20 mark but from there the Tigers went on a 15-3 run to earn the game's largest lead, 14 points (81-67) with 42 seconds remaining.

Towson held the Cougars' high scoring junior guard, Dontaye Draper from Baltimore's Walbrook High School, to 19 points. He scored 17 in the first half. He was 0-10 in the second half, netting just two points on a pair of free throws he made with 10 seconds left in the game.

**TOWSON, Md.** - Isaiah Hunter scored a season high 22 points to lead the hot-shooting Monarchs to their 7th straight win over the Tigers, 85-71. The victory marked ODU's 15th win in 16 games against the Tigers. The Monarchs never trailed.

Led by Hunter, the Monarchs raced to a 36-16 lead in the first 11:14 of the game as they made 13 of their first 17 shots from the floor. Hunter, who hit 6 of his first 7 shots after going 0-9 from the field in his game at Towson last year, helped ODU grab the early lead by scoring 15 points in the first 12 minutes of the game.

The Tigers staged a rally late in the first half to cut the deficit to 38-31 with 3:52 left. However, the Monarchs answered by scoring the final 12 points of the half and grabbed a 50-31 lead at intermission. The Monarchs took advantage of 15 Tiger turnovers in the first half and scored 25 points off those turnovers. Old Dominion shot 56.3 per cent from the floor before halftime, hitting 18 of 32 shots.

The Tigers' hopes of a second half comeback were dashed in the opening minute of the half when junior guard Gary Neal was called for his fourth personal foul. He spent the next nine minutes on the bench as ODU built its lead.

In the second half, ODU took advantage of Neal's absence and extended its lead to 76-51 with 6:53 remaining. With Old Dominion leading by 85-64, the Tigers scored the game's final seven points over the last 2:13 to cut the final deficit to 85-71.

Neal led TU by scoring 25 points. Dennard Abraham helped the Tigers out rebound the Monarchs 41-34 as he recorded his second "double double" of the season with 11 points and 10 rebounds. Rocky Coleman added 12 points and 4 assists off the bench in only 13 minutes.

## GAME 13: 28-Game Road Losing Streak Snapped at JMU

HARRISONBURG, Va. – Towson's road success continued in an impressive fashion as the Tigers beat James Madison 99-84 behind career high performances by Gary Neal and Lawrence Hamm to end a 28-game CAA road slide.

The win was the third in a row on the road and the first against a CAA opponent in 29 road games. The Tigers, who shot 62.5 per cent from the floor, scored their most points in a game since they pounded Washington College 105-86 on December 12, 1995.

The victory pushed the Tigers to 6-7 on the year and 2-2 in the league to exceed its victory totals from 2004-05 when the Tigers were 5-24.

Neal finished with a career high 40 points, scoring 27 in the first half. He was 13 of 21 from the floor and 10 of 11 from the free throw line. It was the first 40-point game by a TU player since Devin Boyd got 46 against UMBC in 1993.

Hamm took over in the second half when he scored 23 of his 29 points. He also grabbed 10 rebounds to record the 11th double-double of his career, the third this season.

It was close out of the gate with both teams scoring at a furious pace. Neal tallied Towson's first 12 points within the first 3:08 of the contest. There were six ties and eight lead changes in the opening session before Neal converted a four-point play with 38 seconds left to send the Tigers into the locker room with a 46-45 lead.

The Dukes tried to wrestle the lead from the Tigers in the early stages of the second half. There were two ties and four lead changes before Towson went on a decisive 13-1 run that vaulted the Tigers to a 74-63 lead at the 8:05 mark. Four minutes later the Tigers had a 13-point lead, 84-71. JMU would get no closer the rest of the way.

The loss negated a career effort by the Dukes' Ray Barbosa who had 28 points, hitting 7 treys. JMU tied its single-game record for three-pointers with 13. They broke the JMU record of 31 three pointers attempted by launching 34.

## GAME 14: Tigers Halt Hofstra's 6-Game Wins Streak, 94-91

TOWSON, Md. – Hofstra came roaring into the Towson Center with a 10-2 record, a 6-game winning streak and a 6-game winning streak against the Tigers but Gary Neal scored 12 of the last 13 points in the final 2:09 and a game high 34 to lead TU to a 94-91 stop of the Hofstra train.

Neal, who gave the Tigers an 84-80 lead when he nailed his 6th three-pointer of the game with 2:09 remaining, made 9 of 10 free throws in the final 1:25 as Towson held off the Pride.

With eight seconds remaining, senior Aurimas Kieza canned Hofstra's 15th three-pointer cutting the lead to 92-91. The Tigers were able to inbound and Neal was fouled again. With five seconds left, he hit both free throws for the 94-91 edge.

When Antoine Agudio's long three-point attempt at the buzzer rimmed off, the Tigers clinched their fourth win in the last five games.

The Tigers, who shot 56.9 per cent from the floor, had to overcome foul trouble and a record three-point shooting performance by Hofstra to beat the Pride for the first time in six tries.

While Hofstra set a school record with 15 three-point baskets in 27 attempts, the Tigers were called for 25 personal fouls. In fact, with 6:56 remaining in the game, four Tigers had four personal fouls. Neal was sidelined for five minutes when he was called for a 4th foul with 9:20 left.

Neal topped the 30-point mark for the third time in the last four games. He shot 9-for-18 from the floor and made six of eight three-point field goal tries. He shot 10-for-13 from the foul line and had four rebounds.

Tim Crossin recorded the first double-double of his career with 10 points and a career high 10 assists. Velmar Coleman added 8 points, a career high 9 rebounds and 5 assists. Agudio and Carlos Rivera had career highs of 29 and 25 points. It was first time TU has scored in the 90's in consecutive games since 1991-92.

## GAME 18: Neal Sets 3-Point Record But Dragons Win 69-61

**PHILADELPHIA, Pa.** - In spite of a record-setting shooting performance by Gary Neal that produced a game high 31 points, the Tigers were unable to pull off a road victory at Drexel as the host Dragons rallied for a 69-61 win.

Playing their third game in five nights, both teams got off to sluggish starts. The Dragons broke on top on a 9-0 run but the Tigers shook that off and tied the game at 17-17. A 9-0 Tigers' run down the stretch of the first half, capped by Dennard Abraham's layup with 3 seconds left, sent Towson into the locker room with a 26-24 lead, its first of the game. Drexel was scoreless in the final 5:12 of the half.

Drexel, 0 and 8 when the trailing at the half, put together a 12-0 run early in the second period that vaulted the Dragons to an 8 point lead, 44-36. The Tigers caught them at 56-56 but a subsequent 11-2 run widened the gap again.

The start of the game was delayed 34 minutes when Randy Hampton broke a backboard during warmups while attempting to dunk.

Drexel committed only four turnovers while the Tigers had 14 turnovers.

The Dragons won the game at the foul line where they made 15 of 19 attempts while the Tigers were just 5-for-10.

The victory was Drexel's 7th straight over the Tigers. Towson is 1-10 at Drexel since the series was renewed in 1995-96 when Towson joined the America East conference.

## GAME 19: Pride Gets Revenge, Downs Tigers In Rematch 82-70

**HEMPSTEAD, N.Y.** - Hofstra got revenge for the earlier season loss to the Tigers and stretched its home winning streak to 15 with an 82-70 win in the 43rd meeting between the two schools.

The 13-4 start matches Hofstra's best-ever record through 17 games in its 33 years at the NCAA Division I level.

After the score was knotted at 18-18 the Pride broke to the front and never looked back, building to a 13-point lead late in the period. Hofstra took a 40-31 lead into halftime on the strength of Loren Stokes' 23 first half points.

Stokes finished with 31 points and 11 rebounds but his individual performance was overshadowed by Gary Neal who put up 36 points. Neal tied the Towson single game record for three-pointers made that he had just set the previous game at Drexel when he sank 7 of them.

Lawrence Hamm recorded the 13th double-double of his career with 15 points and 11 rebounds.

Neal and Hamm combined to score 51 of Towson's 70 points. It was the Tigers' 4th game in 8 days with 3 of those contests on the road.

## GAME 20: Tigers Run Out Of Gas, Bow to Blue Hens 76-61

**TOWSON, Md.** - Playing their 5th game in nine days, the Tigers ran into a red-hot Delaware team that used a second half rally to earn its first road win of the season, a 76-61 CAA victory. Rulon Washington led Delaware as he matched his career high by scoring 20 points in the win.

Leading by just 30-29 at halftime, the Blue Hens opened the second half with a 14-4 run to take a 44-33 with 15:55 left in the game.

Led by Harding Nana, who scored 16 of his game high 23 points in the second half, the Blue Hens extended their lead to 56-41 on a Nana three-point basket with 9:50 remaining in the game. ## GAME 21: VCU Holds Off Tigers To Keep Home Slate Clean

**RICHMOND, Va.** – B.A. Walker matched his season high with 22 points to lead VCU to an 81-75 over Towson despite another impressive scoring effort by Gary Neal.

Towson jumped to a 10-4 lead before the Rams scored 10 straight points to take a 14-10 advantage, giving VCU a lead it would not relinquish. The Rams led by as many as 16 in the first period before Walker nailed a three-pointer just before the end of the half to give VCU a 42-28 cushion at the break.

VCU maintained a double-figure lead through the first 15 minutes of the second stanza. The Rams pushed their advantage to 21 at 66-45 with 12 minutes left in the contest. VCU had a 68-47 lead before the Tigers put together a 19-4 run to trail 72-66 with 2:45 remaining. The Rams went 8 for 8 from the free throw line in the final two minutes to maintain their lead. Towson closed to within four at 79-75 with 11.8 seconds left before Walker sank two foul shots with 8.5 seconds remaining to make the final 81-75.

Walker hit five field goals, including four three-pointers, and was perfect from the line in eight attempts for his 22 points. Alexander Harper had 15 of his season-high 17 points in the second half. He also had seven rebounds and five assists. Nick George left the game early in the second half with a sprained ankle and finished with 12 points.

Neal led all scorers with 36 points, the second-highest total for an opponent in the seven-year history of the Alltel Pavilion at the Stuart C. Siegel Center. He was 11-22 from the floor, 4-8 from behind the arc and 10-11 from the charity stripe. Lawrence Hamm had 14 points and Dennard Abraham added 13 points for Towson.

VCU outrebounded Towson 39-29, the largest rebounding margin of the season for the Rams.

The victory stretched the Rams' lead to 10-0 in this series. Towson is 2-9 all-time when playing in the city of Richmond (0-5 vs. VCU, 1-4 in the CAA Tournament and 1-0 vs. Richmond Spiders)

## GAME 22: Tigers End 7-Game Losing Streak To Drexel

## GAME 23: Tigers' Come Up Short In Rematch With Dukes

**TOWSON, Md.** – Despite a "double double" performance by Lawrence Hamm, the Tigers couldn't protect a late lead and dropped a 76-68 contest to James Madison, giving the Dukes their second win in a row after snapping a school record 12-game losing streak with a victory over Delaware in their previous outing.

Freshman Kyle Swanston scored a career high 18 points and connected on a clutch 3-point basket with 1:15 remaining as the Dukes rallied from a nine-point second half deficit.

The Tigers, who led for most of the game, owned a 68-64 lead with 2:32 remaining when Dennard Abraham scored on an inside layup. Senior guard Daniel Freeman cut the deficit to 68-67 when he nailed a three-pointer with 2:15 remaining.

The Dukes took their first lead since early in the second half when Swanston hit a 3-pointer one minute later as the Dukes went ahead by 70-68. After Gary Neal missed a trey, senior guard Jomo Belfor was fouled and made two free throws with 47 seconds left for a 72-68 lead.

With 23 seconds left, Belfor made two more free throws to put the Dukes up by 74-68. Swanston clinched the win when he made two free throws with 12 seconds left.

The Dukes, who won their first road game of the season, outscored the Tigers by a 12-0 margin over the final 2:15 as they avenged a 99-84 loss to Towson earlier this season.

Bothered by a foot injury, Neal led the Tigers with 21 points but scored only four points in the second half, all at the charity stripe. Hamm shot 6-for-9 from the floor and recorded his 7th "double double" of the season with 18 points and 12 rebounds. It was the 15th "double double" of his career.

The game was tied six times and the lead changed hands nine times. Towson has never swept the Dukes. Neal, who scored 40 points in the first game at JMU, played the entire 40 minutes despite being hobbled by a foot contusion he suffered against Drexel.

## GAME 25: Abraham's 27 Leads Tigers To 1st Win Over VCU

**TOWSON, Md.** – Dennard Abraham poured in a career high 27 points to lead the Tigers to their first victory ever over Virginia Commonwealth as Towson hung on for a 59-57 win.

The win was the first in 11 tries for the Tigers over the Rams who lead the series 10-1.

The Tigers, who led for the final 31 minutes of the game, were forced to hold off several Ram rallies in the final moments of the game.

With 2:27 remaining, a three-point basket by Abraham gave the Tigers a 55-46 lead. However, the Tigers turned the ball over on three consecutive possessions as the Rams went on an 8-0 run to pull within 55-54 with 1:04 left on a three-point basket by VCU's Jamal Shuler.

With 38 seconds Tim Crossin sank two free throws to up the Tigers' lead to 57-54. On their next possession, the Rams missed three shots as Lawrence Hamm finally grabbed the rebound with eight seconds left. He was fouled immediately and made both free throws to give the Tigers a 59-54 lead.

B.A. Walker kept the Rams' hopes alive when he nailed a three-pointer with two seconds remaining. After a time out by VCU, Walker intercepted the Tigers' length-of-court inbounds pass. However, his 60-footer at the buzzer was off target and the Tigers escaped with the win.

Led by Abraham, who scored 14 points in the first half, the Tigers surged to a 32-18 halftime lead, holding VCU to 25 per cent shooting from the floor.

Abraham, who shot three-for-five from three-point range and made all four free throw attempts, also had seven rebounds. Crossin added 13 points as he shot three-for-six from three-point range and went four-for-four at the foul line. He also had eight assists and two steals.

The Tigers' 11th win of the season matched their highest single season total since the 2001-02 season when Towson finished 11-18.

# 2005-06 in Review



## GAME 26: Freshmen Guards Lead The Way In GSU Victory

**ATLANTA, Ga.** - The Tigers overcame the emotions of senior night at Georgia State, climbed out of a huge hole in the second half by getting veteran play out their two freshmen guards and hung on to beat the Panthers 70-69 in the Sports Arena.

The Tigers' 8th CAA win of the season marked their highest total in a CAA season and their 12 victories are the most in six years.

The Tigers were in command 23-21 when the Panthers caught fire, finishing the half with an 11-4 run sparked by Herman Favors' six points in the final 3:28 of the period as GSU assumed a 32-27 lead at the break.

The hole deepened for TU at the outset of the second period as the GSU raced to a 44-30 lead. After Pat Kennedy picked up a technical for disagreeing with an official the Tigers scratched back with a 10-0 run. Boyd Copeland's 3-pointer stopped the bleeding for the Panthers but the Tigers mounted another attack, led by Rocky Coleman who dropped 4 treys in the final 15:00.

Rocky's 4th 3-pointer put the Tigers out front 58-57 with 6:41 left. Towson would not surrender the lead again, although the score was tied twice before the final whistle.

Winstonn Tubbs, from nearby Marietta, Ga., hit a free throw and scored on a put back for a 67-64 lead with 1:26 on the clock. The Panthers' D'Andre McGrew then answered with a three-pointer to tie it up at 67-67 at the 1:09 mark.

The Tigers inbounded the ball quickly. Tim Crossin was all alone in the corner and let fly with a three-pointer that hit with 51 seconds left and a 70-67 lead. With time running down Copeland tallied for the Panthers underneath. Georgia State fouled Dennard Abraham on the inbounds with 2.5 seconds left. Dennard missed the front end of the 1 and 1. The Panthers rebounded but had no chance of making a three-quarter desperation shot at the buzzer.

Coleman led all scorers with a career high 20 points.

## GAME 27: Second Half Surge Carries Huskies To 86-70 Win

**TOWSON, Md.** - Despite a combined 48 points and 21 rebounds from senior Lawrence Hamm and junior Dennard Abraham, the Tigers dropped their regular season finale at the Towson Center as Northeastern rallied for an 86-70 victory. The Tigers finished the regular season with a 12-15 overall record and tied for seventh in the CAA with an 8-10 record.

Sophomore forward Shawn James scored 23 points, grabbed 11 rebounds and blocked six shots to lead the Huskies to the win before a crowd of 4,006 at the Towson Center.

The Huskies, who trailed 37-35 at halftime, used a 12-6 run early in the second half to grab a 56-49 lead. From that point on, the Huskies, who shot 54.2 per cent from the floor in the second half, gradually pulled away. The Huskies, who made 27 of 31 free throws in the win, made their final nine free throws in the last 3:43 of the game.

Senior guard Jose Juan Barea, the leading scorer in the CAA, scored 14 of his 20 points in the second half. He also had nine rebounds and seven assists.

Playing in his final college home game, Hamm posted his 8th double double of the season and the 16th of his career by scoring 25 points with 10 rebounds. Hamm shot 11-for-18 from the floor against the Huskies and had 8 offensive rebounds.

Abraham added 23 points and 11 rebounds for the Tigers.

The Tigers who shot 41% in the first half, made only 35% in the second half. After shooting 6 for 16 from three point range before halftime, the Tigers were 0 for 12 in the second half.

With 8 CAA wins, the Tigers had their highest single season total of CAA wins since joining the CAA five years ago.

Towson had its largest home crowd of the season on hand with 4,006 attending the final home game. The win enabled the Huskies to pull even (8-8) with the Tigers in the series.

## GAME 28: Towson's Season Ends In CAA Tourney Loss To GSU

**RICHMOND, Va.** - Eight days prior, the Tigers found themselves trailing Georgia State by 14 points in the second half before coming back to pull out a 70-69 win.

The Panthers owned an identical 14-point second half lead in the first round of the CAA Tournament at Richmond Coliseum. However, the Panthers did not allow a repeat performance by the Tigers as tenth-seeded Georgia State advanced to the quarter-finals of the CAA Tournament with a 72-64 win over Towson.

The loss ended Towson's best season in five years as the Tigers posted a 12-16 overall mark.

The Tigers took the early lead but GSU's Herman Favors started popping three-pointers. His first trey lifted the Panthers to a 5-4 lead. Georgia State never looked back, protecting its lead the rest of the way. Favors hit all five of his game's three-pointers in the first period, helping the Panthers to a 38-29 lead at the break.

GSU improved its lead in the second half, building to a 14 point lead, 53-39, with 14:27 left. TU put forth a great effort to cut the deficit, eventually trimming GSU's lead to three points, 64-61, on two Lawrence Hamm free throws with 3:22 remaining but a 6-0 run punched the lead back to 9 points with 45 ticks left.

Hamm, the Tigers' only senior playing his final game in a Towson uniform, closed out his outstanding college career with a double-double, scoring a game high 22 points and grabbing a game high 14 rebounds.

Dennard Abraham netted 18 points and collected eight boards. Towson's top scorer, Gary Neal who has been sidelined the last 20 days with a foot injury, added 10 points in 29 minutes on the floor. Favors paced the Panthers, who improved to 7-21 with the victory, with 20 points.

NOTES: The Tigers took both regular season games against Georgia State, marking the only sweep for Towson for 2005-06 ... It was the 4th time in 5 years that TU has been beaten in the first round.
