On December 6, 2018 at 2115 hours, CAAL-Maquin, Jakelin (DOB 12/07/2011 COC Guatemala) and her father, (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) COC Guatemala) were apprehended within a group of 163 aliens near FOB Bounds. The following are events, times, and involved Border Patrol Agents (BPA).

DECEMBER 6, 2018

- Group of 163 aliens make entry at approximately 2100 hours on 12/6/2018 approximately 0.5 miles to the west of Antelope Wells Port of Entry,
- Group is encountered by BPA (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) at entrance gate to FOB Bounds at approximately 2115 hours,
- On duty at FOB Bounds are BPAs (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) (b)(6);(b)(7)(c)
- Group is moved into the Sally Port on the eastside of Antelope Wells POE and identification of unaccompanied juveniles, single adults, sick or injured aliens, and family units begins; at the time of initial encounter of (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) a medical screening was conducted which (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) denied any illness for himself or CAAL-Maquin,

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated he only travelled with his daughter, but that they were among 30-40 people also travelling toward the U.S./Mexico border. (b)(6);(b)(7)(C) is uncertain of the location where they made entry into Mexico, but that they did not have any trouble coming in.

Where are the OTMs staying during their travel?

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated that while travelling in Guatemala they would stay at hotels for the night. Upon making entry into Mexico, the buses would drop them off on the side of the road or near ranches. Before making entry into the U.S., they walked 3-4 hours on a highway until they spotted lights in a far distance. (b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated that they never suffered extreme weather conditions while travelling from Guatemala into the U.S.

What was the route of travel through Mexico?

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated he did not know the route to the U.S. so he would just ask and follow other people that were also travelling to the U.S.

What was their method/means of travel through Mexico?

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated that they would take buses by day until they would get dropped off on the side of the road. The bus fare was \$1000-\$2000 pesos. He stated that they would walk road in the morning for 30-40 minutes until a bus would pass by and stop.

What TCOs/ASOs are involved in the smuggling of the OTMs?

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated they did not receive any help from any TCO/ASO. He stated he would pay a normal fare for the bus every day and would not receive shelter from anyone. He stated he never saw any armed subjects demanding payment or assisting their travel.

Why did they chose to enter through El Paso/Juarez?

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated they entered at this location not knowing where exactly they were at. He stated he had no exact destination in mind to make entry into the U.S. and was just following the crowd of 30-40 people.

Who told them to come through El Paso/Juarez?

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated he was following the crowd.

Were they a part of the caravan at any time?

(b)(6);(b)(7)(C) stated he was not part of the caravan because the caravan was from another country. He never spoke or travelled with any of the people from the caravan.

While being transported to the Lordsburg Border Patrol Station (LOB) for further processing (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) notified one of the accompanying Border Patrol agents that his daughter CAAL-Maquin, Jakelin Yabeth had a fever and was vomiting. Upon arrival at LOB on December 7, 2018, at approximately 6:25 a.m., CAAL-Maquin began to have seizures.

Border Patrol Emergency Medical Technicians (BP-EMT) were immediately notified and began to provide medical care, simultaneously Hidalgo County Emergency Medical Services (EMS) was notified. The father stated that his daughter had not ingested fluids or food for several days, and every time she did, she would vomit.

BP-EMTs checked the vitals of CAAL-Maquin to include her temperature, which provided a reading of 105.7 degrees. Agents applied ice packs and wet towels in an attempt to lower CAAL-Maquin's temperature.

SYNOPSIS

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG) initiated this investigation after the DHS, Joint Intake Center (JIC), Washington D.C., was advised of the death of Jakelin Caal-Maquin, a seven year-old female undocumented alien (UDA) in U.S. Border Patrol (USBP) custody. On December 7, 2018, Caal-Maquin became ill, had a fever, was vomiting, and began to have seizures while being transported from the USBP Forward Operating Base Bounds (FOB Bounds), Antelope Wells, NM, Port of Entry (POE), to the USBP station in Lordsburg, NM. USBP and Hidalgo County Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) provided medical care at the USBP Lordsburg station. Caal-Maquin was flown by air ambulance to a local hospital where she passed away on December 8, 2018.

The DHS OIG conducted multiple interviews to include all involved USBP personnel. The DHS OIG reviewed all available audio, video and medical records and coordinated with the El Paso County Office of the Medical Examiner. The DHS OIG investigation revealed that Caal-Maquin's father, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), did not advise USBP personnel that Caal-Maquin was ill during the medical pre-screening process, and only did so as they were boarding a transport bus from Antelope Wells to Lordsburg. The investigation determined that USBP personnel provided medical attention to Caal-Maquin as soon as they were able, after learning that she was ill and in distress. The medical examiners autopsy report revealed that Caal-Maquin died from natural causes due to sequelae of streptococcal sepsis. The DHS OIG investigation did not reveal any evidence of DHS employee malfeasance or misconduct.

DETAILS

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG) initiated an investigation on December 17, 2018, after the DHS, Joint Intake Center (JIC) received information from the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S. Border Patrol (USBP) that on December 6, 2018, Undocumented Aliens (UDAs) (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and his daughter, Jakelin Caal-Maquin, both from Guatemala, were apprehended by Border Patrol Agents (BPAs), at Forward Operating Base (FOB) Bounds, Antelope Wells Port of Entry (POE), in Antelope Wells, NM. During transportation to the USBP station in Lordsburg, NM, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) informed USBP that Caal-Maquin had a fever and was vomiting. Caal-Maquin later began to have seizures. USBP Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) in Lordsburg were immediately notified and began medical care as soon as Caal-Maquin arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station. EMTs attempted to reduce Caal-Maquin's temperature of 105.7 degrees Fahrenheit. Caal-Maquin was flown to a local hospital by air ambulance while (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) followed via transport by government vehicle. On December 8, 2018, Caal-Maquin was declared deceased at the hospital. [Agent's note: FOB Bounds and the Antelope Wells POE are structures next to each other on the same piece of property separated by a parking lot and will be used interchangeably throughout this report. Further, there are 93 miles between FOB Bounds and Lordsburg, NM.] (Exhibit 1)

Allegation: Circumstances surrounding the custodial death of Jakelin Caal-Maquin.

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, he worked as the desk officer in the Tactical Operations Center (TOC), at the USBP Lordsburg station, monitoring the radio and telephones. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that he received a phone call advising that a group of approximately 163 UDAs was apprehended at FOB Bounds, Antelope Wells POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that a bus had to be used to transport the UDAs to Lordsburg and the bus took approximately two hours to reach FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that a group of UDAs that large required more than one round trip. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when a large group of UDAs are encountered, BPAs prescreen the UDAs and the information obtained is relayed to the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said the UDAs were processed and provided with hot food and juice at the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) further stated that water and snacks were also provided at FOB Bounds and UDAs had access to food and water in the holding cells.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that after the bus reached FOB Bounds the second time to pick up and transport additional UDAs, he received a phone call from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) Supervisory BPA (SBPA), USBP, Lordsburg, NM, who informed him that there was a sick child who had vomited on the bus and that an EMT should be notified. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he notified (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA Paramedic/EMT, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when the bus arrived, he saw (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) running into the USBP station carrying Caal-Maquin in his arms and into an EMT treatment room. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) opined that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) went "above and beyond" to save Caal-Maquin and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never stopped working to provide her aid. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the USBP initially called

for an ambulance and later for a helicopter to medevac Caal-Maquin to a hospital. [Agent's note: The helicopter arrived approximately 40 minutes after it was requested.]

§ 87(2)(b) stated that § 87(2)(b) was brought back to the USBP Lordsburg station for processing after Caal-Maquin passed away at the hospital. § 87(2)(b) stated that § 87(2)(b) spoke and understood Spanish because he saw and overheard other BPAs speaking to § 87(2)(b) in Spanish and § 87(2)(b) answered the BPAs in Spanish. (Exhibit 2)

The DHS OIG interviewed § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. § 87(2)(b) stated that on December 7, 2018, § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c), BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, asked for a volunteer to drive § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) to the hospital in El Paso, Texas, where Caal-Maquin was taken for treatment. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) volunteered to drive § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) to the hospital. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) said he spoke to § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) in Spanish. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) asked § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) if he had family in the U.S. and § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) responded, "mi tío" (my uncle). § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) identified his uncle as § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) and provided a telephone number in Pennsylvania. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) told § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) that he needed to make a call to Guatemala in order to speak to his father. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) placed a telephone call from the hospital to the Guatemalan consulate in Spanish, but then began speaking in another unidentified language. (Exhibit 3)

The DHS OIG contacted § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c), Annunciation House, El Paso, TX, in an attempt to interview § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) stated that § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) was unavailable and that § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) had obtained an attorney named § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c), Private Attorney, El Paso, TX, to represent § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c).

The DHS OIG contacted § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) requested copies of the forms § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) signed while in USBP custody and any USBP generated reports regarding his client's apprehension before he would allow § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) to be interviewed by the DHS OIG. [Agent's note: The DHS OIG did not provide the USBP reports to § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) therefore § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) did not make § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) available for interview.] (Exhibits 4 and 5)

The DHS OIG interviewed § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c), BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) stated that on December 6, 2018, he was assigned to USBP Zone 40 as a Scope Operator/Camera Operator located in Rodeo, NM. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) stated he heard on the radio that a large number of UDAs were apprehended at FOB Bounds and he volunteered to assist in the processing of the UDAs. § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) assisted in the processing of approximately 10 to 12 UDAs by filling out the UDA intake forms. After the intake forms were completed, the UDAs had a brief medical assessment memorialized on Form I-779. [Agent's note: Form I-779 is a legacy Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization Service form used to pre-screen UDAs for medical issues. The form was last updated on January 22, 1988, but is still used by the USBP.] § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) believed that § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c), BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, completed the I-779 forms. [Agent's note: The I-779 forms and the USBP Lordsburg station detainee field interview forms pertaining to § 87(2)(b), § 87(2)(c) and Caal-Maquin were provided to the DHS OIG with the initial complaint documents and are attached to this ROI in Exhibit 1.] A review by DHS OIG of the I-779 forms

signed by (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) revealed that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that both he and Caal-Maquin were in good health.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he left FOB Bounds and transported three individuals back to the USBP Lordsburg station for prosecution. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he did not have contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) or Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not notice anything out of the ordinary while processing the UDAs and did not hear any of the UDAs complain of being ill. (Exhibit 6)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), SBPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised that on December 7, 2018, at approximately 6:30 a.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, were in a hallway near the detainee processing area of the USBP Lordsburg station. Another agent (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could not recall the name of the agent, entered the hallway and notified them that there was an emergency. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), both EMTs, ran to their offices to obtain their medical equipment. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then ran back to the processing area and entered a medical room where he saw (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) holding Caal-Maquin. Caal-Maquin was moaning, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) asked (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) in Spanish, "what happened to Caal-Maquin?" (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) responded in Spanish, and stated that Caal-Maquin did not feel good and had a temperature. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then left the medical room and ran to get oxygen for Caal-Maquin. However, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) encountered (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) who was already on his way back to the medical room with oxygen. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) returned to the medical room with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) placed the oxygen mask on Caal-Maquin.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) asked (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) in Spanish if Caal-Maquin had eaten or had water to drink. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) responded in Spanish and stated Caal-Maquin had been throwing up for the last two to four days and had not eaten. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could feel the heat from Caal-Maquin's body and took her temperature. The thermometer registered a temperature more of than 105 degrees Fahrenheit. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) applied ice packs to Caal-Maquin in an effort to reduce her temperature. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that Caal-Maquin's pupils were dilated but reactive. Caal-Maquin began having seizures and then stopped breathing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) laid her on her side to ensure her airway was clear. Caal-Maquin then began breathing again. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) continuously monitored Caal-Maquin's blood pressure and pulse. Hidalgo County Emergency Medical Services (EMS) arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station and placed Caal-Maquin on a gurney and took her to the ambulance. The EMS personnel then began to administer an intravenous drip. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said Native Air was contacted in order to expedite Caal-Maquin's transport to the hospital. [Agent's note: Native Air is an emergency medical aviation transport service, which is part of the larger parent company Air Methods LLC. This Native Air helicopter was based in Silver City, NM, at Native Air base 32, which serves Southwestern, NM.] Native Air deployed after making a determination they could fly safely in the weather at that time. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated it took approximately 40 minutes for Native Air to arrive from Silver City, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) remained with Caal-Maquin in the ambulance, but was not allowed to fly in the helicopter. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was transported in a vehicle to the hospital. (Exhibit 7)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated on the day of the incident he was approached by an SBPA in the evening and directed to drive the bus to FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he drove from the USBP Lordsburg station toward FOB Bounds, which took approximately two hours. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated when he arrived at FOB Bounds he was handed the files/paperwork for the UDAs that were to be transported on the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said he boarded approximately 48 UDAs onto the bus, which consisted of unaccompanied minors and adults. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said all UDAs had either water, food or both in their possession when they boarded the bus. During the two-hour trip to the USBP Lordsburg station, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not observe anyone who appeared sick or who requested medical attention. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated once they arrived at the Lordsburg station, all the UDAs were given food, water and were processed. During the processing phase, BPAs asked UDAs once more about any health concerns. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) started to assist with processing the UDAs but was relieved a short time later by another BPA when his shift ended. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he never observed the mistreatment of any UDA nor did he have any contact with Caal-Maquin. (Exhibit 8)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, Fort Hancock, TX. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, at approximately 9:15 p.m., she received notification that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, El Paso, TX, apprehended a group of 163 UDAs near FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) who was assigned to work in the control room at FOB Bounds, went to assist (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that she and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) escorted the UDAs to the sally port at FOB Bounds for processing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, El Paso, TX, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, Fort Hancock, TX, assisted in processing the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived to assist at approximately 11:00 p.m. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was responsible for completing the I-779 forms after she arrived and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) only completed the USBP Lordsburg station intake forms. Food, water and juice were available for the UDAs at FOB Bounds.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the UDAs were asked as a group if anyone was sick, pregnant, or was an unaccompanied child. [Agent's note: Children who are not accompanied by an adult are referred to as Unaccompanied Alien Children (UACs)]. No sick UDAs came forward or were identified. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that the UDAs were also asked individually if they were sick when the I-779 form was completed. Per USBP Lordsburg station protocol, if someone reported being sick, USBP agents at FOB Bounds were to notify a supervisor, evaluate them, and place them on the first bus to Lordsburg, which was reserved for UDAs who were sick, pregnant or UACs. [Agent's notes: The DHS OIG was informed by USBP that no documentation existed, which memorialized this protocol.] (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember coming in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) or Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) went off duty at 1:30 a.m. and was not at work when the bus departed with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin. (Exhibit 9)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), SBPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, at approximately 10:00 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) entered the TOC, at the USBP

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Lordsburg station. The TOC supervisor, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C); SBPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that BPAs at FOB Bounds had requested additional blank I-779 forms and asked (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to deliver the I-779 forms to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) made copies of the I-779 forms and drove to FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived at FOB Bounds, on December 7, 2018, at approximately 12:00 a.m. and delivered the I-779 forms to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and an unidentified female agent from another USBP station were completing intake forms for the 163 UDAs. [Agent's note: The second female agent was later identified as (b) (6), (b) (7)(C).] (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never saw or interacted with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) or Caal-Maquin. (Exhibit 10)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, Fort Hancock, TX. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, he woke up at approximately 9:45 p.m., to get ready for the start of his midnight shift. [Agent's note: BPAs assigned to work at FOB Bounds temporarily reside there due to the remote location of the FOB.] At this time, another agent (who (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was not able to identify) arrived and advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that a group of 163 UDAs turned themselves in at the gate to FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived before his midnight shift to assist with the intake of the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) assisted with the intake of the remaining UDAs by documenting their names, date of birth, country of origin and place of birth. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that once the intake was completed, the UDAs were taken to the lobby of the POE and their names were placed onto a spreadsheet that was sent back to the USBP Lordsburg station. After the intake process was completed, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) provided the UDAs granola bars. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that there was potable water available for the UDAs to drink at multiple areas within the POE.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that shortly after midnight, on December 7, 2018, a USBP bus arrived to transport the first group of UDAs from FOB Bounds to the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) had a Commercial Driver's License and was authorized to drive a passenger bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) rode on the bus to the USBP Lordsburg station to drive the bus back to FOB Bounds. On the return trip to FOB Bounds, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, rode with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) on the bus.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that he arrived with the bus at FOB Bounds between 4:00 a.m. and 4:30 a.m. and parked near the southbound sally port of the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) exited the bus and had the second group of UDAs follow him. The second group of UDAs boarded the bus, while (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stood by the door. During the boarding process, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Caal-Maquin was sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when he spoke with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), they spoke in Spanish. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he is fluent in Spanish and uses Spanish daily. After (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was advised that Caal-Maquin was sick, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that there was a sick girl on the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to take the group to the USBP Lordsburg station, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) would notify the USBP Lordsburg station of the situation. After receiving instructions from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) returned to the bus and noticed a "spot of water" on the ground. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Caal-Maquin had vomited. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) returned to the southbound sally port to get a plastic bag. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not recall whom he talked to in the southbound sally port, but did mention to some BPAs that a girl had vomited and needed a plastic bag. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) obtained a plastic bag, gave it to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), and told him to use the bag if Caal-Maquin got sick again. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that he (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C)

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were going to take them to Lordsburg to get his daughter help. [REDACTED] explained to [REDACTED] that they could not do anything at the FOB Bounds and Caal-Maquin would be tended-to in Lordsburg.

[REDACTED] recalled that [REDACTED] and Caal-Maquin sat in the area behind the driver's side of the bus. [REDACTED] stated after [REDACTED] notified [REDACTED] Caal-Maquin's illness, they never spoke again during the bus ride to USBP Lordsburg station. [REDACTED] advised that no one checked on Caal-Maquin on the bus ride. [REDACTED] sat behind [REDACTED] so [REDACTED] could keep an eye on the bus passengers. [REDACTED] stated that it was hard for him to see the passengers because he looked forward while driving due to the hazardous driving conditions on the road to the USBP Lordsburg station. [REDACTED] explained that the road (NM Highway 146 and 81) was a two-lane highway with a narrow 6 to 7 inch unpaved shoulder with curves that were sudden and sharp and presented other hazards such as lack of illumination and roaming wildlife and cattle.

[REDACTED] reported that when the bus arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station, [REDACTED] carried Caal-Maquin off the bus first. [REDACTED] stated that [REDACTED] did not speak to anyone when he walked off the bus. [REDACTED] noticed that Caal-Maquin had less clothes on than when she first boarded the bus. [REDACTED] and Caal-Maquin were accompanied by BPAs who bypassed the processing area in the sally port and were taken to a small side room. [REDACTED] stated that Caal-Maquin appeared to be asleep when brought on the bus at FOB Bounds and again when taken off the bus in Lordsburg, NM. (Exhibit 11)

The DHS OIG interviewed [REDACTED], BPA Paramedic/EMT, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. [REDACTED] stated that he worked the midnight shift, at the USBP Lordsburg station, on December 7, 2018. During his shift, [REDACTED] was notified that approximately 163 UDAs had been detained at FOB Bounds. Between 4:30 a.m. and 5:00 a.m., [REDACTED] was notified that there were two sick children aboard the transport bus that was driven by [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was told that one of the children had bronchitis and the other had a fever and was vomiting. [Agent's notes: The DHS OIG was unable to identify or obtain further information regarding the child on the bus with bronchitis.] The bus arrived at approximately 6:00 a.m. and [REDACTED] approached the bus and was contacted by [REDACTED] who was carrying Caal-Maquin. [REDACTED] informed [REDACTED] in Spanish that Caal-Maquin was not breathing. [REDACTED] did a quick assessment and determined that Caal-Maquin was still breathing but was having difficulty doing so. [REDACTED] instructed [REDACTED] to follow him to room 232 at the USBP Lordsburg station, which contained [REDACTED] medical supplies. [REDACTED] then asked someone to call 911.

In the room, [REDACTED] again assessed Caal-Maquin and observed that Caal-Maquin was flexing or stiffening her body. [REDACTED] stated that Caal-Maquin was not having convulsions but was stiffening her body and had labored breathing. [REDACTED] went to his truck to get more medical equipment to include an airway and trauma kit and defibrillator. [REDACTED] also called for more assistance. [REDACTED] said that [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], both EMTs, responded to assist [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] continued to assess Caal-Maquin and tried to determine what had caused her

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distress. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) did not have pediatric supplies and was unable to utilize his blood pressure cuff or his blood/oxygen device because they were adult size. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) worked basic assessment methods with his stethoscope and ensured a clear airway. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) could hear that Caal-Maquin had lung function. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that Caal-Maquin had a heart rate of 180 beats per minute (bpm) and a temperature of 105.7 degrees Fahrenheit. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) requested oxygen with a mask, ice packs and wet towels, which were applied to Caal-Maquin in an attempt to cool her down. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) only had children's Tylenol and tried to provide Caal-Maquin with a dose by way of a dropper in order to reduce her body temperature, but was unsuccessful because Caal-Maquin could not swallow.

(b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that Caal-Maquin continued to have trouble breathing and he instructed (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) to turn Caal-Maquin on her side. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) said that (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) held Caal-Maquin the entire time and never left the room. Caal-Maquin stopped breathing due to an airway issue caused by her flexing, a condition (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) referred to as decerebrate posturing. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) was unable to intubate Caal-Maquin because any manipulation of her mouth would have caused her to vomit. Soon after Caal-Maquin was placed on her side, she again began to breathe on her own.

(b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that Hidalgo County Emergency Medical Services (EMS) arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station approximately 10 minutes after the 911 call. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) requested a suction device, kept Caal-Maquin on her side, and advised EMS of the situation. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6); (b) (7)(C), EMT, EMS, Hidalgo County, NM, placed Caal-Maquin on a stretcher and moved her to the ambulance. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) preformed life support measures, which included oxygen and intravenous fluids (IV). (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) recommended Caal-Maquin be transported by ground, but (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) recommended air transport due to Caal-Maquin's medical condition. Native Air was contacted for air ambulance assistance. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that Native Air had to wait for clearance to fly, which took approximately 15 minutes. Native Air arrived at the Lordsburg station helipad approximately 25 minutes after obtaining clearance to fly. While waiting for the air ambulance (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) administered 5mg of Diazepam (Valium, a muscle relaxer) to Caal-Maquin through her IV but the Diazepam had no effect on Caal-Maquin's flexing. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that he had no other remaining protocols, so he could then only assist EMS personnel.

(b) (6); (b) (7)(C) remained in the ambulance with Caal-Maquin the entire time. Caal-Maquin was placed on a heart monitor and still had a heart rate over 180 bpm and a blood pressure reading of approximately 96 over 50. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that Caal-Maquin's medical condition was called decompensated shock and that her high heart rate had actually kept her alive. Caal-Maquin was moved via ambulance to the helipad where she was transferred to the air ambulance and then transported to El Paso, TX. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) said the Native Air flight was staffed with a flight medic and a flight nurse. (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) advised that (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) was transported to El Paso, TX, in a USBP vehicle driven by (b) (6); (b) (7)(C).

(b) (6); (b) (7)(C) stated that a search of (b) (6); (b) (7)(C) personal belongings revealed multiple medications, including two blister packs of acetaminophen, two blister packs of an antibiotic, which had 11 pills missing, and a blister pack of Diclofenaco Potasico (an anti-inflammatory drug) with 1 pill

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missing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) neither appeared to be, nor stated he was ill. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) believed the medications were used by Caal-Maquin and that 11 missing antibiotics from the blister packs would be a normal dosage of two a day for five days. [Agent's note: One of the questions listed on the I-779 form pertains to medications taken, and Caal-Maquin's form indicated that she had taken no medications.] (Exhibit 12)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), SBPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, at approximately 9:30 p.m., he was awoken and advised that a large group of UDAs were apprehended at FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that at approximately 2:00 a.m., on December 7, 2018, he walked from FOB Bounds to the POE even though he was not supposed to start his shift until 4:00 a.m. When (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived at the POE, he observed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) processing the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the UDAs had access to restrooms, water, juice and snacks. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that at approximately 4:30 a.m., the transport bus arrived at the POE with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) on board the bus. As the UDAs boarded the bus, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) approached him and told him that one of the passengers (Caal-Maquin) had thrown up. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) instructed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to drive the bus and the UDAs to the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then called the USBP Lordsburg station and advised them that there was a sick child onboard the transport bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that approximately five minutes later, he spoke with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) who told him that she had also contacted the USBP Lordsburg station and advised them that there were two sick children onboard the transport bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never had any contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) or Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the I-779 form was routinely completed at the USBP Lordsburg station, but (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) requested that the forms be completed at the POE to expedite the UDA processing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that this was the first time the I-779 forms were completed at the POE. (Exhibit 13)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he was assigned to FOB Bounds on December 6 and 7, 2018, and his shift was from 6:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was working the forward-looking infrared camera unit when he overheard radio transmissions that a group of UDAs had surrendered outside of the gate area of FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) drove to FOB Bounds to assist with processing the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when he arrived he observed a large group of UDAs standing/sitting in the cement area/driveway adjacent to the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) walked into the POE and opened the southbound sally port door because it was misting/sprinkling outside. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated all the UDAs were directed inside the sally port area in order for the initial intake processing to occur. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) overheard one of the other BPA's yell out in Spanish to ask if any of the UDAs were sick, but received no response. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said once the UDAs were processed, he escorted the UDAs from the north bound sally port to the south bound sally port and the UDAs were given beverages and a granola bar. Several of the UDAs had water bottles and he allowed them to refill them at the water fountain. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) also allowed the UDAs to utilize the restroom. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) neither observed, nor did any UDA's report, being sick.

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(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said several of the BPAs shifts ended after the first transport bus departed and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) were left monitoring the remaining UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) asked the remaining UDAs health screening questions. The second bus arrived at approximately 4:00 a.m., but since Farmer's shift had ended, he was not involved in boarding the UDAs on the second bus. (Exhibit 14)

The DHS OIG interviewed several UDA's in the group detained with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), from Guatemala, stated she observed several children who were sick and vomiting throughout the trip from Guatemala to the U.S. border. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the UDAs were treated well by the USBP and that they were fed and given water while they were detained. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know of a little girl (Caal-Maquin) passing away, and did not observe any children on the bus while she was transported by the USBP. [Agent's note: (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not indicate whether she was on the first, second or third transport bus from FOB Bounds to the USBP Lordsburg station.] (Exhibit 15)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), from Guatemala. The DHS OIG showed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) a photo of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), and he recognized (b) (6), (b) (7)(C)z in the photo. However, he did not know (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) personally, nor did he know (b) (6), (b) (7)(C)' name. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) remembered (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) traveling with his daughter (Caal-Maquin) in Mexico. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) had no recollection of Caal-Maquin being sick, and said he saw Caal-Maquin walking with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that the BPAs treated the UDAs well, and he had no complaints regarding how the BPAs treated the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he was transported on the third bus from FOB Bounds to the USBP Lordsburg station. (Exhibit 16)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) from Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that she and her father, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), departed Guatemala, on December 1, 2018. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said there were hundreds of other UDAs and many children in the group traveling with them. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C)z recalled one small girl (Caal-Maquin) in the group who appeared to be ill, as she was vomiting and had a fever. As they moved closer to the border, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) overheard the girl's father (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) ask other UDAs traveling in the group if they possessed medicine to help his sick daughter. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the father was able to obtain medicine from those present to assist his daughter. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained she did not know what medicine he gave to his daughter, but overheard the girl's father later saying she was feeling better.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said she was placed on the same bus to Lordsburg, NM, as Caal-Maquin. As they were being transported by bus to the USBP Lordsburg station, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) witnessed the girl's father stand up and walk to the front of the bus to speak with an official. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C)z heard the father tell the official his daughter was severely ill and requested medical attention. According to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), the official responded that there was nothing they could do (on the bus) but would get her medical attention as soon as they reached the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) witnessed Caal-Maquin having difficulty breathing.

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The DHS OIG showed a photograph of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and asked her if she recognized the male in the photograph. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) z replied that the man in the picture was the father of Caal-Maquin she described earlier in the interview but did not know his name. (Exhibit 17)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), from Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he and his daughter, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), departed Guatemala on December 1, 2018. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said the USBP treated the UDAs well and provided them with water and food. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the group was transported by bus (to the USBP Lordsburg station) and that while they were being transported, a male (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) began to yell out that his daughter (Caal-Maquin) was sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) saw a little girl vomit, and the male had his daughter in his arms. The USBP immediately treated the little girl as soon as the bus arrived at the next processing station (USBP Lordsburg station). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said as soon as they arrived at the station, the man and girl were taken in one direction and he and his daughter in another. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) z said he recalled seeing the male and the little girl in a shelter in Veracruz, Mexico, where they stayed while in route to the U.S. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know them personally and did not know the little girl's health situation while at the shelter. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was aware of the fact that a young girl had passed away, but he did not know if this was the same little girl on the bus. (Exhibit 18)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), from Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that she, her daughter and granddaughter traveled via pickup truck and bus from Guatemala through Mexico to the U.S. border. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said there were hundreds of other UDAs and many children traveling in the group. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) observed several sick children in the group of UDAs throughout the trip to the U.S. border. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the UDAs self-surrendered to BPAs when they reached the U.S. border, where they were fed, given water, and were treated well by the USBP. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated she did not know of a little girl in the group of UDAs who passed away and that there were no sick children on her transport bus. (Exhibit 19)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), from Guatemala. (b) (6);(b) (7)(C) stated that he departed Guatemala with his 16-year-old son on December 1, 2018. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said they arrived at the U.S. border around December 6, 2018, and turned themselves in to USBP. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that BPAs took everyone's information, provided water and cookies, and treated everyone in the UDA group very well. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he did not see any sick children at FOB Bounds.

The DHS OIG showed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) a photograph of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) but he was unable to identify (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) as the person in the photograph. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said he was on the second bus to leave FOB Bounds to the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never saw (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) approach or talk to any BPA regarding the health of Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised that he sat on the second to last row at the back of the bus but fell asleep and did not observe anything. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when the bus was getting close to the USBP Lordsburg station, he heard a child crying and noticed that the child (Caal-Maquin) was taken off the bus first. (Exhibit 20)

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The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED], from Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] stated that she departed Guatemala for the U.S. on December 1, 2018, and surrendered to the USBP on December 6, 2018. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said there were approximately 150 UDAs in the group that originated from Guatemala and included several young children. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] never observed any sick children during the journey through Mexico and could not identify (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] in a photograph. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] stated once she surrendered to the USBP she was processed and provided water and a Nutri-grain bar. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] stated that the USBP personnel were courteous and professional.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said she was part of the UDA group that was transported on the second bus to the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] stated that prior to departing the POE, she observed a man (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] approach a BPA and tell him that his daughter (Caal-Maquin) was sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said that the BPA advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] that his daughter would be provided assistance once they arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said she was seated near the front of the bus and once they arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] and Caal-Maquin were separated from the group by the USBP. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] stated that the BPA's on the bus never mistreated anyone. (Exhibit 21)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED], from Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said he departed Guatemala for the U.S. with his daughter on November 30, 2018. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said that after entering the U.S. from Mexico, they were apprehended by a BPA and were processed by a male officer. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] and his daughter were asked for identification and if he or his daughter were sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said both he and his daughter stated they were not sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said they were treated well by the BPAs, were provided pure water, burritos, granola bars, and sopa (soup-based pasta) and they used the restroom as needed. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] stated in Spanish, "The officers are good people."

The DHS OIG showed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] photographs of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] and Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said he did not recognize them, but he had seen a photo of the child (Caal-Maquin) on the internet and was saddened by the news of her death. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] said he never saw (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] or Caal-Maquin on their trip or at the time that they were processed by the USBP. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] was on the second bus to the USBP Lordsburg station, but never saw (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] or Caal-Maquin on the bus. (Exhibit 22)

The DHS OIG re-contacted SBPA (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] advised the DHS OIG that he provided the names of the medication seized from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] to the Office of the Medical Examiner, El Paso County, TX, on December 10, 2018. (Exhibit 23)

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] stated that the medication included:

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1. Metronidazole; an antibiotic used to treat bacterial infections of the skin, vagina, stomach, joints, or respiratory tract and sometimes used with other medicines to treat stomach ulcers.
2. Diclofenaco Potasico; a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug used to reduce swelling and to treat pain
3. Dimetrol; used for pelvic area infection, parasitic infections, irritable bowel syndrome, cramps in the stomach, gas, bloating, changes in bowel habits, contractions related to the small and large intestines, pain related to the small and large intestines, infections of gum and dental cavities and other conditions
4. Acetaminophen

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, El Paso, TX. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, he was assigned to work the 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. shift, at FOB Bounds. At approximately 9:00 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) encountered a BPA assigned to the USBP Lordsburg station whose name he did not recall. The BPA advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that a group of 163 UDAs had been apprehended. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) shift had ended and he was off duty but volunteered to assist the BPAs with the processing of the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived at the POE at approximately 9:30 p.m., and observed that the UDAs were being processed in the sally port of the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) documented biographical information from the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he processed approximately 30 family groups before midnight. At midnight, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) returned to his living quarters and was off duty when the buses arrived to pick up the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember coming in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) or Caal-Maquin. Many of the UDAs were coughing and sneezing, but (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember observing anyone who was sick or vomiting. (Exhibit 24)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, at approximately 9:00 p.m., she was advised that a group of UDAs had been apprehended. On December 7, 2018, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to work from midnight to 10:00 a.m., but volunteered to go to work early. At approximately 9:30 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) walked to the sally port of the POE and observed a large group of UDAs, which was the largest group she had ever encountered while working at FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) asked her co-workers questions regarding the intake procedures and told her co-workers, "Let's do this the right way." (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told her co-workers that they should process UACs, prosecutable aliens, pregnant women and anyone who was sick first. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then spoke in Spanish to the large group of UDAs, which included (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin, and asked that anyone who was a UAC, pregnant or sick to raise their hand and come forward to be processed. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said the first group of UDAs were processed and then sent on a bus to the USBP Lordsburg station for further processing including medical evaluations and completion of form I-779. At the time, it was standard operating procedure (SOP) for the I-779 forms to be completed by USBP personnel at the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that after the initial intake, all the UDAs were provided apple juice and

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granola bars as well as access to restrooms and water in the holding cells adjacent to the sally port.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) decided to complete the medical intake and I-779 forms for the group of UDAs who were to be transported on the second bus to USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) remembered coming in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin during the medical intake form questioning. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) understood Spanish because all the questioning was conducted in Spanish and all of his responses were in Spanish. Caal-Maquin was asleep when (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that neither he, nor his daughter were sick and claimed that they were both in good health. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not tell (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that he was in possession of multiple medications or that he and/or Caal-Maquin were taking the medications. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) observed Caal-Maquin when she was awake prior to the interview of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and she did not appear to be sick. As (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin boarded the bus, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) approached (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and told her that Caal-Maquin was sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that they would get Caal-Maquin medical attention in Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated there were no EMTs or paramedics at FOB Bounds and she followed the policy, which was for sick UDAs to be transported to Lordsburg for medical attention.

Approximately 5 to 10 minutes after (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin boarded the bus, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Caal-Maquin had vomited. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) notified (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Caal-Maquin had vomited and was ill so that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could notify the USBP Lordsburg station that Caal-Maquin was sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that the SOP for the USBP Lordsburg station is for BPAs to notify an SBPA when a sick individual was identified. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then provided (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) with a trash bag just in case Caal-Maquin vomited again. After the bus departed, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) followed up by calling the USBP Lordsburg station and advised them that there was a sick child on the second bus. [Agent's note: Had (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) or Caal-Maquin reported being sick, or presented symptoms of being sick, they should have been transported on the first bus to the USBP Lordsburg station.]

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that since that day when (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) started completing the I-779 forms at FOB Bounds, the USBP Lordsburg station has changed its SOP and has begun completing the forms at FOB Bounds for all UDAs processed at FOB Bounds. [Agent's note: The DHS OIG does not have a copy of this SOP as it is not memorialized in writing.] (Exhibit 25)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, USBP, El Paso, TX. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, he was assigned to work the 4:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m. shift at FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to work a local ranch area that evening and had returned to FOB Bounds to eat dinner. After eating dinner, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was driving out of FOB Bounds to return to the local ranch area, when he observed a large group of UDAs emerging through fencing on another ranch across the road from FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) encountered the UDAs and called for assistance over the radio. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) responded to assist (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) with the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and

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another BPA from the USBP Fort Hancock, TX, station, whose name [REDACTED] did not recall, also responded to assist soon after the UDAs were encountered.

[REDACTED] opened the gate to FOB Bounds and escorted the UDAs to the sally port of the POE. [REDACTED] stated that FOB Bounds and the POE are within the same fenced area and are separated by a parking lot. The family units were kept together and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] requested that everyone under the age of 17, those pregnant or sick, and single adult males come to the front of the group. [REDACTED] and the other BPAs completed the USBP intake forms, a customized intake form created at the USBP Lordsburg station, which was referred to as the LOB – Detainee Interview Form. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] attempted to identify those detainees who were sick and to determine their type of illness. [REDACTED] stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] created an intake spreadsheet that annotated which detainees were reportedly or apparently sick. After the detainees were processed, they were moved to another area of the sally port, so that they would not be confused with those that still needed to be processed. [REDACTED] stated that once processed, the detainees were provided with a snack and a beverage. [REDACTED] did not remember coming in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] or Caal-Maquin. [REDACTED] said there were a few detainees who were sick, but [REDACTED] did not remember specifically who those were. (Exhibit 26)

The DHS OIG interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. [REDACTED] stated that on December 7, 2018, he was scheduled to work the midnight shift at the USBP Lordsburg station. At the beginning of his shift during muster, [REDACTED] was advised that a large group of UDAs had been apprehended at FOB Bounds. During muster, [REDACTED] was assigned to assist the bus driver on one of the trips to transport some of the UDAs from FOB Bounds to the USBP Lordsburg station. [REDACTED] did not remember the name of the BPA (later identified as (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED]) who drove the bus because the BPA was from another USBP station and was on a temporary assignment assisting the USBP Lordsburg station. [REDACTED] assignment was to keep the bus driver awake and to monitor the detainees during transport.

[REDACTED] and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] arrived at FOB Bounds in the early morning hours, but could not remember the exact time. [REDACTED] retrieved the detainee intake sheets and medical prescreening forms for those detainees who boarded the bus. After boarding, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] approached [REDACTED] and tried to speak to [REDACTED] in Spanish, but [REDACTED] Spanish language skills were limited, so (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] spoke with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] instead. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] informed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] that Caal-Maquin was ill. [REDACTED] then told [REDACTED] that Caal-Maquin appeared to be very sick, but did not elaborate. [REDACTED] believed, but could not recall specifically, that [REDACTED] contacted the USBP Lordsburg station and advised them that he was transporting a sick child aboard the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] repeatedly told [REDACTED] that he was worried about Caal-Maquin during the approximately two-hour bus trip. [REDACTED] stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] attempted to make the trip as quickly and safely as possible, thereby reducing the travel time to 90 minutes.

[REDACTED] sat behind and to the right of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] on the bus. The detainees were seated behind [REDACTED] and were separated from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] by a security partition. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] and Caal-Maquin were seated in the first row directly behind [REDACTED] and the security partition. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) [REDACTED] never spoke to

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(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) during the trip. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not hear Caal-Maquín say anything or make any sounds. No other detainees said anything on the trip and the bus was quiet as most of the detainees were sleeping. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not hear anyone coughing and did not have any knowledge of a child with bronchitis on the bus.

When the bus arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) parked next to the sally port. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquín were the first passengers to get off the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was carrying Caal-Maquín, who appeared to be unconscious. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) requested help from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) who directed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), who was in the sally port. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) assisted (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and took (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquín to the medical room inside the processing area of the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) finished off-loading the other detainees from the bus and then entered the Lordsburg station and observed multiple BPAs in the medical room treating Caal-Maquín. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) had no further contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) or Caal-Maquín. (Exhibit 27)

The DHS OIG received the autopsy report from the Office of the Medical Examiner, El Paso County, TX. The autopsy report revealed that Caal-Maquín's cause of death was determined to be sequelae of streptococcal sepsis and the manner of death was due to natural causes. The autopsy report stated that Diazepam, Nordiazepam and Lorazepam, sedatives often used in emergency room settings, were found in Caal-Maquín's system. The medical examiners found that Caal-Maquín had a rapidly progressive infection, with prompt systemic bacterial spread and substantial clinical deterioration, with development of serious sequelae resulting in multiple organ dysfunction and death. The opinion also noted that "subsequent ancillary testing revealed the presence of Streptococcus in major organs, including the lungs, adrenal gland, liver and spleen." (Exhibit 28)

A timeline of events revealed:

- On December 6, 2018, at approximately 9:15 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquín were encountered after illegally entering the U.S. at FOB Bounds.
- On December 7, 2018, at approximately 5:00 a.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) notified USBP agents that Caal-Maquín was ill and vomiting, as the transportation bus was preparing to transport (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquín to the USBP Lordsburg station.
- On December 7, 2018, at approximately 6:30 a.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquín arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station where Caal-Maquín was treated by a USBP paramedic and USBP EMTs. USBP requested an ambulance from Hidalgo County EMS.
- On December 7, 2018, at approximately 6:40 a.m., Hidalgo County EMS arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station.
- On December 7, 2018, at approximately 6:50 a.m., USBP contacted Native Air and Native Air advised that their response time would be approximately 1 hour.
- On December 7, 2018, at approximately 7:30 a.m., Native Air arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station.

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- On December 7, 2018, at approximately 7:45 a.m., Native Air departed the USBP Lordsburg station for Providence Memorial Hospital in El Paso, TX.
- On December 7, at approximately 8:50 a.m., Native Air arrived at the hospital.
- On December 7, 2018, at approximately 11:00 a.m., Caal-Maquin went into cardiac arrest, but was revived by hospital personnel.
- On December 8, 2018, at approximately 12:35 a.m., Caal-Maquin passed away at the hospital.

During transport, UDA (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) stated UDA Caal-Maquin had a fever and was vomiting. On December 7, 2018, UDA Caal-Maquin began to have seizures. Border Patrol Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) were immediately notified and began medical care. BPAs attempted to bring UDA Caal-Maquin's 105.7 temperature down. UDA Caal-Maquin was transported to a hospital by air ambulance where she went into cardiac arrest and was revived. It was reported UDA (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) followed via transport by government vehicle. DETAILS OF INVESTIGATION:

On December 12, 2018, the Joint Intake Center (JIC), Washington, D.C., became aware of the death of a seven-year-old female in Customs and Border Protection (CBP) Border Patrol (BP) custody, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that a group that large would take more than one round trip. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when a group is encountered BPA's would begin prescreening the individuals and the information would be relayed to the USBP Lordsburg station. At the station, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the individuals were fully processed and were provided with hot food and juice. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) further stated that water and snacks were also provided at the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that in addition to the food, water was contained in the holding cells.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that after the bus reached the POE the second time, he received a phone call from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to the FOB. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) informed him that there was a sick and vomiting child on the bus and that an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), should be notified. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he notified (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA EMT, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when the bus arrived, he saw (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) running into the USBP station carrying Caal-Maquin in his arms and into an EMT treatment room. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he observed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) going what (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) called above and beyond to save Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he observed that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never stopped working on Caal-Maquin. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that an ambulance was called and by the time it arrived, a helicopter was called to medivac Caal-Maquin.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) appeared extremely nonchalant while in holding cell. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he knew for a fact that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) spoke and understood Spanish because he saw and overheard other BPA's speaking to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) in Spanish and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) answered the BPA's in Spanish.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, he was assigned to (b) (7)(e) (b) (7)(e) located in Rodeo, NM. This location is approximately one hour to one and half hours from the USBP Forward Operating Base, near the Antelope Wells, NM Port of Entry (POE). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that during his shift, he heard on the radio that a large number of aliens had been apprehended at the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he volunteered to assist in the processing of the aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when he arrived at the POE he assisted in the processing of approximately 10-12 aliens by filling out the alien intake form. On December 7, 2018, at approximately 6:30 a.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, were in a hallway near the alien processing area of the Lordsburg station. Another agent (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could not recall the particular agent, came into the hallway and notified them that there was an emergency. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) both Emergency Medical Technicians ran to their offices to obtain their medical equipment. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then ran back to the processing area and entered a medical room where he saw (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala, holding (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) daughter Jakelin Yabeth Caal-Maquin, Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was already in the medical room as his office was closer to the processing area. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could feel the heat from Caal-Maquin's body and had a fever of 105.7 degrees Fahrenheit. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) used ice packs in an effort to bring down Caal-Maquin's fever. Caal-Maquin's eyes were dilated but her pupils were reactive. Caal-Maquin started having seizures and then stopped breathing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) laid her on her side and made sure her airway was clear. Caal-Maquin then began breathing again. blood pressure and pulse. Hidalgo County Emergency Medical Services (EMS) arrived at the Lordsburg station and placed Caal-Maquin on a gurney and took her to the ambulance. The EMS personnel then started an intravenous drip. Native Air was contacted in order to speed up Caal-Maquin's transport to the hospital. Native Air deployed after verifying that they could fly in the weather at that time. It took approximately 40 minutes for Native Air to arrive from Silver City, New Mexico, which was a fast response time. (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) remained with Caal-Maquin in the ambulance but was not allowed to fly in the helicopter and was transported by ground to the hospital.

(b)(6);(b)(7)(c) believed that (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) was behaving strangely. (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) was just standing around and showed no emotion. (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) stated that if it were (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) he would have been hysterical. (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) believed it was possible that (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) was not Caal-Maquin's father due to (b)(6); (b)(7)(C) strange behavior and because there had been 25 fraudulent document cases in the Lordsburg area of responsibility since October 20, 2018.

On December 19, 2018, Special Agents (SA), (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) with the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG), El Paso, Texas, interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Border Patrol Agent (BPA), Lordsburg, NM, in reference to the incident that occurred between December 6, 2018 thru December 8, 2018, and the death of Jakelin Caal-Maquin. In attendance was (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) union representative (b) (6), (b) (7)(C). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) declined a voluntary interview and was issued the Kalkines warning in which (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) signed and dated.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he has been employed as a BPA since 2009. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated on the day of the incident he was approached by a BPA supervisor in the evening and directed to drive the bus to the Border Patrol Forward Operating Base (FOB) located in Antelope Wells, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that BPA's at the FOB had a large group of illegal aliens that were taken into custody. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he drove from the Lordsburg BPA station toward the FOB which took approximately two hours. [Agent's Note: (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the stretch of road from Interstate 10 to the FOB is a desolate road with no lighting and on that specific day was wet due to rain in the area. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the only illumination of light was from the bus he was driving. Additionally, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that at night a person drives slower because of the cattle, deer and buffaloes one can encounter.]

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated when he arrived at the FOB he was handed the detainees files/paperwork. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said he loaded up approximately 48 detainees which consisted of unaccompanied minors and people who had crossed alone and were going to be prosecuted for illegal entry. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said he observed all the detainees with either water, food or both when they were being loaded up into the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated a BPA assigned to the FOB drove back with him to the Lordsburg station. During transportation, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he did not observe anything out of the ordinary. Additionally, no one appeared sick and no one requested medical attention of any sort. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated transporting the detainees back to the Lordsburg station took approximately two hours drive time.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated once they arrived at the Lordsburg station, all the detainees were offloaded and given food, water and processed. During the processing phase, they are asked once more about

any health concerns. [Agent's Note: (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated sometimes people are apprehended in the field that show no signs of health concerns and once they are processed at the Lordsburg station show signs of sickness.] (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he started to assist with processing people but was relieved a short time later by another BPA due to his shift being over.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) described the arrest, process, and intake procedures to the DHS OIG. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated when they detain an individual or group of individuals they identify themselves as BPA's and attempt to obtain their citizenship. They ask and try to find out where the individual crossed from Mexico into the U.S., and ask if they have medical issues or need medical attention.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated they transport the person to the Border Patrol station, give them water and food, take inventory of their property and then process them for illegal entry.

[Agent's Note: (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated they carry a five gallon water jug in their BPA units for people they apprehend in remote areas.]

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated if they encounter an individual in the field that is showing signs of sickness, they immediately notify the Lordsburg station and request an EMT. At times, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he has requested for an ambulance however, he said when the person is apprehended in a remote area, Border Patrol EMT personnel respond quicker than an ambulance to administer aid.

The DHS OIG asked (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) if he was familiar with the Immigration and Naturalization Service I-779 form. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he was familiar with the form and that it was filled out at the Lordsburg station as part of the intake process. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated once the form was completed it would be incorporated as part of the person's immigration packet.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he is fluent in the Spanish language and uses it daily as part of his work. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated all the detainees spoke and understood Spanish. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he never observed any detainee get mistreated nor had any contact with Caal-Maquin.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the following:

On December 6, 2018, at approximately 9:15, p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, El Paso, apprehended a group of 163 aliens near USBP Forward Operating Base (FOB) Bounds in Antelope Wells, New Mexico. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), who was assigned fire watch duties in the control room at FOB Bounds, went to assist (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) escorted the aliens to the sally port at FOB Bounds for processing. There was nothing unusual about the group of 163 aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, El Paso, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Fort Hancock, assisted in processing the aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived to assist at approximately 11:00 p.m. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was responsible for completing the I-779 medical intake forms after she arrived and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) only completed the Lordsburg station intake forms.

The aliens were specifically asked as a group if anyone in the group of 163 aliens was sick, pregnant or a child unaccompanied by an adult. No sick aliens came forward or were identified. The aliens were also asked individually if they were sick when the I-779 form was completed. If someone had claimed to be sick the agents at FOB Bounds would have notified a supervisor, evaluated them and placed those aliens on the first bus to Lordsburg, which is reserved for aliens who are sick, pregnant or children unaccompanied by an adult.

Food, water and juice were available for the aliens at FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) saw agents handing out granola bars to the aliens.

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On December 19, 2018, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) Special Agent (SA), Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG), El Paso, Texas, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) SA, DHS, OIG, El Paso, interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Supervisory Border Patrol Agent (SBPA), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S. Border Patrol (USBP), Lordsburg, New Mexico. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was provided with and signed INV FORM-26 (Advice of Rights Kalkines). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the following:

On December 6, 2018, at approximately 10:00 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) entered the tactical operations center (TOC) at the USBP Lordsburg station. The TOC supervisor, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) SBPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Forward Operation Base (FOB) Bounds in Antelope Wells, New Mexico had requested additional blank I-779 medical intake forms. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) asked (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to deliver the I-779 forms to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, who was working at FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) made copies of the I-779 forms and drove to FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived at FOB Bounds, on December 7, 2018, at approximately 12:00 a.m. and delivered the I-779 forms to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and another female agent from another USBP station were completing intake forms for the 163 aliens that were apprehended. The USBP bus was already at FOB Bounds when (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived and was preparing to take the first group of aliens to Lordsburg. The bus takes unaccompanied children, pregnant women, and any sick individuals on the first bus and then the remainder on subsequent buses.

Everything at FOB Bounds was operating smoothly and there were no commotions or sick individuals to his knowledge. FOB Bounds has water, juice and food available for the aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never saws or came in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala nor (b) (6), (b) (7)(C)' daughter Jakelin Yabeth Caal-Maquin, Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was only at FOB Bounds for approximately 15 to 30 minutes before (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, transported three criminal aliens from FOB Bounds to Lordsburg. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) went off duty at approximately 3:00 a.m.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was one of their best new agents and was a super person.

On December 20, 2018, reporting agent interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Border Patrol Agent (BPA), U.S. Border Patrol (USBP), Fort Hancock Station, Fort Hancock, TX. The interview was in reference to the December 6, 2018, thru December 8, 2018, incident that involved the death of Jakelin Caal-Maquin. Also present at the interview was (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Special Agent, Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG), El Paso, TX. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Esquire, El Paso, TX, was present as (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) union representation. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) declined a voluntary interview and was issued the Kalkines Advice of Rights (INV Form-26), which (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) read, acknowledged, and signed.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that he has been a BPA for approximately 17 years. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) is assigned to the Fort Hancock USBP station. On December 4, 2018, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to the USBP Bounds Forward Operating Base (FOB), located in Antelope Wells, NM. The Bounds FOB is located along the U.S.-Mexico International Border, in a remote location, approximately 90 miles away from Lordsburg, NM. BPAs assigned to the Bounds FOB, live and work at the FOB for a week.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that he was assigned to the midnight to 10:00 a.m. shift, on "fire watch" duties. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) described "fire watch" duties as, making sure the building is secure, relaying information back to the USBP Lordsburg station, answering the phones, and apprehending and processing undocumented aliens that turn themselves in at the FOB. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that on December 6, 2018, he woke up at approximately 9:45 p.m., prepared a meal, and started getting ready for the start of his midnight shift. As (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was preparing a meal, another agent (could not recall) arrived and advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that a group of 163 undocumented aliens turned themselves in at gate to the Bounds FOB. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) got ready and arrived before his midnight shift to assist with the intake of the undocumented aliens.

The Bounds FOB is located on the same property as the Antelope Wells Port of Entry (POE), Antelope Well, NM, along the U.S-Mexico border. The Bounds FOB is approximately 150 yards from the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that a majority of the undocumented aliens were being held in the northbound sally port at the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) assisted with the intake of the remaining undocumented aliens, by documenting their names, date of birth, country of origin, and place of

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birth. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised that he helped intake approximately four family groups. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) recalled several BPAs assisting with the intake process. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that once the intake was completed, the undocumented aliens were led into the lobby of the POE, and their names were put onto a spreadsheet that was sent back to the USBP Lordsburg station. After providing their names in the lobby, undocumented aliens were placed in the southbound sally port at the POE. Unaccompanied minors were placed inside holding cells inside the POE, away from adults and family units.

During the intake process, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not ask any of the undocumented aliens any medical questions, only biographical information. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know if anyone in the lobby of the POE, or in the southbound sally port, was asking medical questions to the undocumented aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he personally did not ask medical related questions, but did not know if other BPAs were asking medical welfare questions. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) estimated it took approximately two hours to conduct the intake of the 163 undocumented aliens.

After the intake process was completed, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) walked from the POE to the Bounds FOB to get boxes of granola bars to feed the undocumented aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that there was water at the POE in the bathrooms, water fountains, and inside the detention cells. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know if anyone at the POE provided water to the undocumented aliens.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he started his shift early at approximately 11:00 p.m., and shortly after midnight, now December 7, 2018, a USBP bus arrived to transport the first group of undocumented aliens from Bounds FOB to USBP Lordsburg. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) has a Commercial Driver's License, and is authorized to drive a passenger bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to ride on the bus to USBP Lordsburg, in order to drive the bus back to the Bounds FOB.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that the first bus group had approximately 55 passengers, composed of unaccompanied minors, since they were a priority, and a few families. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that group on the bus was mainly quiet, and could not recall if they were talking a lot because the bus can be noisy. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the bus arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station without incident, and the passengers were taken to the sally port for processing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he did not assist with the processing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that after the passengers were unloaded, went inside the USBP Lordsburg station to use the restroom, gassed up and cleaned the bus, fixed the heater on the driver's side of the bus, and got some coffee. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated it took him approximately 30 to 45 minutes after unloading the passengers, and servicing the bus, to drive back to the Bounds FOB.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that during the first trip from Bounds FOB to the USBP Lordsburg station, nobody made any statements about being sick or in distress.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that from the USBP Lordsburg station, to the Bounds FOB, it is approximately 90 miles, and can take anywhere from one hour and 45 minutes, to two hours, of driving time. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that the road (NM Highway 146 and 81) is a two-lane highway with about a 6-7 inch shoulder that is not paved. It had been raining that night and there was a

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possibility of being stuck in the mud if you drove off the road. There are no streetlights or any other sources of illumination. The only lighting available is the light cast from the bus headlights. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that once you are on NM Highway 81, it is open range, meaning there are no fences to keep cattle or wildlife away or off the road. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said it is a common occurrence to encounter black cows, deer, buffalo, and other wildlife on the road or run across the road, while driving. Curbs are sharp and sudden. Due to these conditions, it is unsafe to drive at a high rate of speed, which could cause the bus to crash and injure passengers.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that he is an experienced bus driver and drove passenger bussed for Greyhound for approximately seven years, prior to joining the USBP. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the road to and from the Bounds FOB are not "normal conditions" most bus drivers face. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that when he worked for Greyhound, this road would be considered dangerous, and they would not be allowed to use that road. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised that Greyhound used major roadways.

On the return trip from USBP Lordsburg station to Bounds FOB, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, rode as a "co-pilot" on the trip. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that there are always two agents on a bus trip.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that he arrived with the bus at Bounds FOB between 4:00 a.m. and 4:30 a.m. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) parked the bus near the POE southbound sally port. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) exited the bus and had the second group follow him to the bus. The second group of undocumented aliens were then loaded into the bus, while (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stood by the bus door. During the loading process a man (later identified as (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) father of Jakelin Caal-Maquin) advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) in the Spanish language that his daughter (Jakelin Caal-Maquin) was sick. [Agent's Note: (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Jakelin Caal-Maquin's names. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) referred to them as father and daughter.] After (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was advised of a sick girl, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Supervisory BPA, Lordsburg, NM, that there was a sick girl on the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to take the group to the USBP Lordsburg station, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) would notify Lordsburg of the situation. After getting instructions from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) returned to the bus and notice a "spot of water" on the ground. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that the girl (Jakelin Caal-Maquin) had vomited. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) returned to the southbound sally port to get a plastic bag. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not recall whom he talked to in the southbound sally port, but did mention to some BPAs that a girl had vomited and needed a plastic bag. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) obtained a plastic bag and returned to the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) provided the father (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) with the plastic bag and told him to use the bag if his daughter (Jakelin Caal-Maquin) gets sick again. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that we (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) were going to take them to Lordsburg to get his daughter help. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that they could not do anything at the Bounds FOB and his child would be attended to in Lordsburg.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) recalled that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Jakelin Caal-Maquin sat in the area behind the driver's side of the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that after talking with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never said anything else to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) on the entire trip from Bounds FOB to the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised that nobody checked on Jakelin Caal-Maquin on the bus ride. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) explained that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) sits behind (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) so (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) can keep an eye on the bus passengers. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that it is hard for

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him to see the passengers because he looks forward and, because of the hazardous driving conditions, he keeps his attention focused on the road ahead.

██████████ reported that when the bus arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station, ██████████ carried Jakelin Caal-Maquin off the bus first. ██████████ stated that the father didn't say anything to anyone when he walked off the bus. ██████████ estimated it took ██████████ to exit the bus with his daughter less than five minutes. ██████████ did notice that Jakelin Caal-Maquin had less clothes on when she first boarded the bus. ██████████ did not know if ██████████ talked to anyone when he exited the bus. ██████████ did not know the status of Jakelin Caal-Maquin. ██████████ later noticed that ██████████ and his daughter bypassed the processing area in the sally port, and taken to a small side room. ██████████ stated that Jakelin Caal-Maquin looked asleep when she was brought on and off the bus.

██████████ stated that when they were on the bus, there was no call out for an EMT or any other assistance. ██████████ explained that there were no cameras on the bus and that the bus radio was broken. ██████████ used his walkie-talkie as communications. Once all the passengers were off the bus, ██████████ checked the bus, used the restroom, and drove back to the Bounds FOB.

██████████ arrived at the Bound FOB, picked up the third group of undocumented aliens, and returned to the USBP Lordsburg station. ██████████ stated that there were no issued or problems with the third group. No one in the third group made any complaints.

██████████ reported that he is not a trained Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). ██████████ also reported that this was the first time he had to transport a busload of people from the Bounds FOB to USBP Lordsburg station.

Reporting agent asked ██████████ that if there were an emergency in the area around the Bounds FOB while driving the bus what would be a reasonable action. ██████████ explained that there normally is not an EMT on the bus, and since ██████████ is not an EMT, he would call USBP dispatch for assistance. Reporting agent asked if ██████████ would stop the bus. ██████████ said that would be a personal decision, since the area is so remote, it would be better to drive further toward the interstate and civilization, when help would be more readily available.

Reporting agent asked ██████████ what he thought of when someone says EMT. ██████████ stated that he thinks of USBP EMTs. When asked why he would call a USBP EMT and not a local ambulance, ██████████ reported that USBP EMTs are closer to respond, know the area better, and have vehicles that can access remote areas. Local ambulances would take too long to respond.

Reporting agent asked ██████████ if encountering a large group, similar to the 163 undocumented aliens encountered on December 6, 2018, was a normal occurrence. ██████████ stated that the large number of apprehensions is not normal, that normal was more like 50. ██████████ explained that there was a group of approximately 250 caught recently, and that was not normal. ██████████ felt the large numbers of undocumented aliens was associated with the large caravans.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could not recall if there was a permanent EMT assigned to the Bounds FOB.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that on the evening of December 8, 2018, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Jakelin Caal-Maquin had passed away. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the first indication he thought Jakelin Caal-Maquin was in distress, was when the BPAs at the Lordsburg station took her to the room next to the processing area.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that when he was driving the bus, he could hear people speaking in Spanish and "their own dialect." (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that when he spoke with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) they spoke to each other in the Spanish language, and that they both understood each other. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he is fluent in Spanish and uses the Spanish language on a daily basis.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) has been assigned to the Bounds FOB five times in the last three years. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could not recall any other time a detainee has been sick or reported being in distress.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that after he reported Jakelin Caal-Maquin's illness to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know what (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did after that.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he only saw Jakelin Caal-Maquin on the bus when he took (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) the plastic bag. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) again stated that Jakelin Caal-Maquin looked asleep at that time. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised that he is not an EMT and could not tell if Jakelin Caal-Maquin was sick or not. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know if there was an EMT at the time he departed. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not think any other BPAs knew Jakelin Caal-Maquin was sick, until (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) before getting on the bus.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) had no further information at this time.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was provided with his Kalkines warnings, which he acknowledged understanding by signing. The Kalkines warning is contained within this investigative file.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he has been a certified USBP trained Paramedic/EMT since 2009. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he is required to take continuing education classes and be recertified every two years through the National Registry.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he worked the midnight shift on December 7, 2018. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he was notified that approximately 163 aliens had been detained at the USBP Forward Operating Base Bounds (FOBB), near Antelope Wells, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that at approximately 4:30 am-5:00 am, he was notified that there were two sick children aboard the transport bus that was driven by (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he was told that one of the children had bronchitis and the other had a fever and was vomiting. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the bus arrived at approximately 6:00 am. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he approached the bus and was contacted by (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), non-DHS employee, Guatemala, who was carrying his child, Jakelin Caal-Maquin, non-DHS employee, Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) informed him that Caal-Maquin was not breathing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) spoke to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) in Spanish. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he did a quick assessment and determined that she was still breathing but was having difficulty. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he then went to his truck to get more medical equipment to include an airway and trauma kit and defibrillator. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he called for more assistance. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C), EMT's, BPA's, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA's, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM were also in the room. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he continued to assess and tried to determine what had caused Caal-Maquin's distress. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he didn't have pediatric supplies and was unable to utilize his blood pressure cuff or his blood/oxygen device because they were adult size. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he worked basic assessment methods with his stethoscope and ensured a clear airway. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he could hear that Caal-Maquin had lung function. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that Caal-Maquin had a heart rate of 180 beats per minute (bpm) and a temperature of 105.7 degrees. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he called for oxygen with a mask and ice packs and wet towels, which were applied to Caal-Maquin in an attempt to cool her down. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he only had children's Tylenol and tried to provide Caal-Maquin with a dose by way of a dropper, but was unsuccessful because Caal-Maquin could not swallow.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that Caal-Maquin continued to have trouble breathing and instructed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to turn Caal-Maquin on her side. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) held Caal-Maquin the entire time and never left the room. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that at that point, Caal-Maquin stopped breathing due to an airway issue caused by her flexing. A condition that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) referred to as Decerebrate Posturing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that he was unable to incubate Caal-Maquin because any manipulation of her mouth would have caused her to vomit. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that after Caal-Maquin was placed on her side, she began to breathe on her own.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) preformed life supporting measures to include oxygen and an IV. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that Hidalgo EMS recommended Caal-Maquin be transported by ground but (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) recommended that air transport would be required. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated Native Air was called. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that Native Air had to wait for clearance which took approximately 15 minutes. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that Native Air arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station helipad approximately 25 minutes later. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that while they waited he administered 5mg of Diazepam, (Valium), to Caal-Maquin through her IV. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the Diazepam had no effect on Caal-Maquin's flexing. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that at that point there was nothing left in his protocols that he could do, so he was left to only assist. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was transported to El Paso, TX via a USBP vehicle driven by (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) called her hard working and conscientious. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that the USBP Medical form I-779 was routinely completed at the USBP Lordsburg station. It was (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) who made the request to fill the forms out at the FOB to speed up the detainee processing.

[REDACTED] stated he is not a native Spanish speaker but does speak Spanish. [REDACTED] stated to his knowledge, the detainees spoke and understood the Spanish language. [REDACTED] stated there was no EMT on duty at the FOB during his shift.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised that they paid 30,000.00 Guatemalan quetzals (\$3,877.85 U.S. dollars), to a smuggler in Guatemala, to be smuggled into the U.S. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) met the smuggler via a friend, but had no information on the smuggler. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that they crossed into Mexico near Frontera La Mesilla, at the Guatemala-Mexico border. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that there was no Mexican immigration when they crossed into Mexico.

From the Guatemala-Mexico border, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that he and his brother were taken by guides via cars and trucks, to the U.S.-Mexico border. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said he remembered they stopped once and slept in a very cold building while in Mexico. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said there were many children, as most family units had children with them. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said he noticed several of the children were ill and thought it was a result of the very cold shelter they slept in. After leaving the house the next morning, the group of immigrants were transported by bus towards the United States/Mexico border. while being transported, a male began to yell out that his daughter was sick. [REDACTED] said he saw the little girl vomit, and the male had his daughter in his arms. The USBP immediately treated the little girl as soon as the bus arrived at the next processing station (Lordsburg Border Patrol Station). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said as soon as they arrived at the station, the man and girl were taken in one direction and he and his daughter in another. [REDACTED] said he recalled seeing the male and his daughter at the cold shelter that they stayed in while in Veracruz, Mexico. He did not know them personally, nor did he know the little girl's health situation while at the shelter. He stated that he was aware of the fact that a young girl had passed away but he did not know if this was the same little girl he saw on the bus.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) traveled with her 28 year old daughter (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), and 2 year old grand-daughter (b) (6), (b) (7)(C). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) is (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) wife's son from another marriage, and not a blood relative. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised the he arrived at the U.S.-Mexico border on approximately December 6, 2018.

(b)(6);(b)(7)(c) reported that he paid a guide 15,000 Guatemala Quetzals (\$1,942.57 U.S. dollars), for him and (b)(6);(b)(7)(c) to be taken to the U.S.-Mexico border. (b) (6);(b) (7)(C) stated that he observed many children that travelled in the large group. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not pay attention, and did not recall any of the kids being sick in the group.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that the guides left the group on a road near the U.S.-Mexico border, south of Antelope Wells, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) recalled that the group walked for approximately 40 minutes, crossed the border into the U.S., and turned themselves in at the U.S. Border Patrol (USBP), Bounds Forward Operating Base (FOB), Antelope Wells, NM. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) reported that the Border Patrol Agents (BPA) took everyone's information and provided water and "galletas" (cookies/snacks) to everyone in the group. She stated that she purchased food and water throughout the duration of the journey but was never provided anything by the smugglers. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said they rode on buses throughout Mexico until they were dropped off just south of the U.S. borderline.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated she was never checked or never observed Mexican immigration officials along the border of Guatemala and Mexico, and the caravan freely crossed without hesitation. - Metronidazol (aka Metronidazole)- Metronidazol is the generic form of the brand name drug Flagyl, which is used to treat bacterial infections of the skin, vagina, stomach, joints, or respiratory tract. The drug is sometimes used with other medicines to treat stomach ulcers. Metronidazol is an antibiotic, which works by killing bacteria in your body. (Convulsive seizures and peripheral neuropathy have been reported in patients receiving oral or IV Metronidazol.)
- Diclofenaco Potasico (aka Diclofenac) - Diclofenac is a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID). It is used to reduce swelling and to treat pain. It may be used to treat osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, mild to moderate pain, and painful monthly periods. (NSAIDs cause an increased risk of serious cardiovascular thrombotic events, including myocardial infarction and stroke, which can be fatal. This risk may occur early in treatment and may increase with duration of use. Diclofenac is contraindicated in the setting of CABG surgery. NSAIDs also cause an increased risk of serious gastrointestinal (GI) adverse events, including bleeding, ulceration, and perforation of the stomach or intestines, which can be fatal. These events can occur at any time during use and without warning symptoms. Elderly patients and patients with a prior history of peptic ulcer disease and/or GI bleeding are at greater risk for serious GI events.)

On December 6, 2018, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to work the 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. shift, at the USBP Forward Operating Base (FOB) Bounds, in Antelope Wells, New Mexico. After his shift, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) went back to his living quarters and ate dinner and took a shower. At approximately 9:00 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) encountered a BPA assigned to the Lordsburg station whose name he did not recall. The BPA advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that a group of 163 aliens had been apprehended. Even though (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) shift had ended and he was off duty, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) volunteered to assist the BPAs with the processing of the aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived at the Antelope Wells Port of Entry (POE) at approximately 9:30 p.m., and observed that the aliens were being processed in the sally port of the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) obtained a clip board and started taking biographical information from the aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he processed approximately 30 family groups before midnight. At midnight (12:00 a.m.) (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he returned to his living quarters and was not on duty when either of the buses arrived to pick up the detainees.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember coming in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala, or (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) daughter Jakelin Yabeth Caal-Maquin, Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala. Many of the aliens were coughing and sneezing but (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember observing anyone who was very sick or vomiting. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) only took biographical data and was not involved in the medical screening of the aliens. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not know which BPAs were responsible for or conducted the medical screening of the aliens.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, and the other BPAs assigned to work at FOB Bounds were "squared away" and all good agents.

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On January 16, 2019, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Special Agent (SA), Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG), El Paso, Texas, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), SA, DHS, OIG, El Paso, interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Border Patrol Agent (BPA), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S. Border Patrol (USBP), Lordsburg, New Mexico. Also, present during the interview was (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) USBP Union Attorney, El Paso. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) declined a voluntary interview and was provided with INV FORM-26 (Advice of Rights Kalkines). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the following:

On December 6, 2018, at approximately 9:00 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was asleep in her living quarters at the USBP Forward Operating Base (FOB) Bounds, in Antelope Wells, New Mexico, when she received a text from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg. The text from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) read, "How many you got?" (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not respond to the text but instead exited her room and walked to the stairs and yelled out, "Do we have subjects?" (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Fort Hancock, Texas, advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that they had apprehended a group of aliens.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) who was assigned to work the 12:00 midnight to 10:00 a.m. shift, at FOB Bounds, on December 7, 2018, volunteered to go to work early. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) showered, changed clothes and got coffee. At approximately 9:30 p.m., (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) walked to the sally port of the Antelope Wells Port of Entry (POE). When (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived at the POE she observed a large group of aliens, which was the largest group she had ever encountered at FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said she has been assigned to the FOB Bounds approximately three times. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) started asking her co-workers questions regarding the intake procedures and stated to her co-workers, "Let's do this the right way." (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told her co-workers that they should process unaccompanied children (UACs), prosecutable aliens, pregnant women and anyone who was sick first. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then spoke to the large group of aliens (in the Spanish language) and asked that anyone who was a UAC, pregnant or sick to raise their hand and come forward to be processed. The first group of aliens were processed and then sent on a bus to the Lordsburg station for further processing including medical evaluations and completion of medical intake form I-779. At the time it was standard operating procedure (SOP) for the I-779 forms to be completed by USBP personnel at the Lordsburg station. After the initial intake,

all the aliens were provided apple juice and granola bars. The aliens also had access to restrooms and water in the holding cells adjacent to the sally port.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) decided to complete the I-779 forms at FOB Bounds for the group of aliens who were being transported on the second bus to Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) remembered coming in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) daughter Jakelin Yabeth Caal-Maquin, Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala, during the medical intake form questioning. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) understood the Spanish language because all the questioning was conducted in the Spanish language and all of his responses were given in the Spanish language. Caal-Maquin was asleep when (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was interviewing (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that neither he nor his daughter were sick and claimed that they were both in good health. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not tell (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that he was in possession of multiple pharmaceutical drugs/medicines or that he and/or Caal-Maquin were ingesting the pharmaceutical drugs/medicines. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) had observed Caal-Maquin when she was awake prior to the interview of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and she did not appear to be sick. As (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin were being boarded onto the bus, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) approached (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and told her that Caal-Maquin was sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that they would get Caal-Maquin medical attention in Lordsburg at the Border Patrol station. Caal-Maquin was covered in a red blanket. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated there were no emergency medical technicians or paramedics at FOB Bounds and she followed the policy which was for sick aliens to be transported to Lordsburg for medical attention. Approximately 5 to 10 minutes after (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Caal-Maquin boarded the bus, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Fort Hancock, advised (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Caal-Maquin had vomited on the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) notified (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Supervisory BPA (SBPA), CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, that Caal-Maquin had vomited and was ill, so that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) could notify the Lordsburg station that Caal-Maquin was sick. The SOP for the Lordsburg station is for BPAs to notify an SBPA when a sick individual is identified. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then provided (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) with a trash bag just in case Caal-Maquin vomited again. After the bus departed, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) followed up by calling the Lordsburg station and advised them that there was a sick child on the second bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated that it was not uncommon that BPAs encounter aliens that they apprehend during the course of their duties who are sick and vomiting.

Since December 6, 2018, when (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) started completing the I-779 medical intake forms at FOB Bounds, the Lordsburg station has changed its SOP and begun completing the medical intake forms at FOB Bounds for all aliens apprehended at FOB Bounds.

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On January 28, 2019, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Special Agent (SA), Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG), El Paso, Texas, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), SA, DHS, OIG, El Paso, interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) Border Patrol Agent (BPA), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S. Border Patrol (USBP), El Paso, Texas. Also, present during the interview was (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) USBP Union Attorney, El Paso. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) declined a voluntary interview and was provided with INV FORM-26 (Advice of Rights Kalkines). (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the following:

On December 6, 2018, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to work the 4:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m. shift, at USBP Forward Operating Base (FOB) Bounds, in Antelope Wells, New Mexico. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to work the Hurtz Ranch area that evening and had returned to FOB Bounds to eat dinner. After eating dinner (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was driving out of FOB Bounds to return to the Hurtz Ranch area, when he observed a large group of undocumented aliens (UDAs) coming through some fencing on another ranch across the road from FOB Bounds. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) exited his vehicle and identified himself as a BPA and asked the group where they were from. Members of the group identified themselves as being from Honduras and Guatemala. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then called for assistance over the radio advising that he had apprehended a large group of UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Fort Hancock, Texas, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, El Paso, responded to assist (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) with the UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), BPA, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, New Mexico, and another BPA from the USBP Fort Hancock station whose name (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not recall also responded to assist with the UDAs soon after the UDAs were apprehended.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) opened the gate to FOB Bounds and walked the UDAs to the sally port of the Antelope Wells Port of Entry (POE). FOB Bounds and the Antelope Wells POE are within the same fenced area and are separated by a parking lot. The UDAs were counted and totaled 163 people. The UDA family groups were grouped together at the POE. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) then requested that everyone under the age of 17, pregnant, sick and single adult males (prosecutable aliens) to come to the front of the group of UDAs. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and the other BPAs completed intake forms and obtained the names, ages, dates of birth and the names of their fathers and mothers. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) were identifying the UDAs that were sick and determining the types of illness they were suffering. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) created an intake spreadsheet that annotated

which UDAs were sick. After the UDAs were processed, they were moved to another area of the sally port, so that they would not be confused with the UDAs that still needed to be processed. Once processed, the UDAs were provided with a snack and something to drink.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember coming in contact with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala, or (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) daughter, Jakelin Yabeth Caal-Maquin, Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala. There were a few UDAs that were sick but (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember specifically which UDAs were sick. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember which BPA was doing the medical prescreening paperwork. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember if he (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was on duty when the bus arrived to transport the UDAs to the USBP Lordsburg station.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said that over the last few years it is more common for BPAs to encounter sick UDAs because they are entering the U.S. in large groups. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) said the procedure when encountering sick UDAs is to try and determine what they are sick with and report the information to a Supervisory BPA (SBPA). The SBPA then decides the next course of action depending on the circumstances.

On June 5, 2019, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Special Agent (SA), Department of Homeland Security, Office of Inspector General (OIG), El Paso, Texas, and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) SA, DHS, OIG, El Paso, interviewed (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Border Patrol Agent (BPA), U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), U.S. Border Patrol (USBP), Lordsburg, New Mexico. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was provided with INV FORM-26 (Advice of Rights Kalkines), which he read and signed. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated the following:

On December 7, 2018, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was scheduled to work the midnight shift at the USBP Lordsburg station. At the beginning of his shift during muster, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was advised that a large group of undocumented aliens (UDAs) had been apprehended at Forward Operating Base Bounds (FOB Bounds) in Antelope Wells, New Mexico. During muster, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was assigned to assist the bus driver on one of the trips to transport some of the UDAs from FOB Bounds to the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not remember the name of the BPA (previously identified as (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) BPA, CBP, USBP, Fort Hancock, Texas) that drove the bus because the BPA was from another USBP station, who was on a temporary assignment assisting the USBP Lordsburg station. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) job was to keep the bus driver awake and to guard the UDAs being transported.

(b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) arrived at FOB Bounds in the early morning hours but he could not remember the exact time. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) retrieved the UDA intake sheets and medical prescreening forms for the UDAs who proceeded to board the bus. After the UDAs were on the bus, a male UDA, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala, approached (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and tried to speak to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) in Spanish but (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) Spanish language skills were limited so (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) spoke with (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) instead. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was advised by (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that his daughter, Jakelin Caal-Maquin, was ill and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) told (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) that Cal-Maquin appeared to be very sick but did not elaborate. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) believed that (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) contacted the USBP Lordsburg station and advised them that he was transporting a sick child but (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated he was not sure. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) sat behind and to the right of (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) on the bus. The UDAs were seated behind (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and were separated from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) by a security partition. The bus was dark and it was difficult to see the UDAs in the back of the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Cal-Maquin were seated in the

first row directly behind (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and the security partition. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) never spoke to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and never said anything during the trip. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not hear Cal-Maquin say anything or make any sounds during the trip. None of the other aliens said anything on the trip and the bus was quiet as most of the UDAs were sleeping. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) did not hear anyone coughing and did not have any knowledge of a child with bronchitis on the bus.

When the transportation bus arrived at the USBP Lordsburg station, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) parked next to the sally port. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Cal-Maquin were the first UDAs to get off the bus. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) stated (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) was carrying Cal-Maquin, who appeared to be unconscious. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) requested help for Cal-Maquin from (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) proceeded to refer (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) to (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Border Patrol Agent, CBP, USBP, Lordsburg, NM, who was in the sally port. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) assisted (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and took (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) and Cal-Maquin to the medical room inside the UDA processing area of the Lordsburg station. 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On March 29, 2019, (b) (6), (b) (7)(C), Special Agent (SA), Department of Homeland Security, Office of Inspector General, El Paso, Texas, received a copy of the autopsy report pertaining to Jakelin Caal-Maquin, Non-DHS Employee, Guatemala, from the County of El Paso, Office of the Medical Examiner and Forensic Laboratory.

The autopsy report revealed the following regarding the death of Caal-Maquin:

- Caal-Maquin’s cause of death was determined to be sequelae of streptococcal sepsis and the manner of death was due to natural causes.
- The medical examiners opinion showed that the autopsy findings were those of a rapidly progressive infection, with prompt systemic bacterial spread and substantial clinical deterioration, with development of serious sequelae resulting in multiple organ dysfunction and death.
- Caal-Maquin’s adrenal glands had hemorrhaged due to Waterhouse–Friderichsen syndrome and streptococcus bacteria was observed in the adrenal gland.
- There were patchy areas of intra-alveolar hemorrhage and streptococcus bacteria was also observed in the lungs.
- Streptococcus bacteria was also found in the kupffer cells of the liver and in the spleen.
- There was mild to moderate meningeal edema with dilated/congested meningeal vessels.
- There was multifocal acute proximal tubular necrosis and congestion of the kidneys.
