

America's Victory Mail World War II V-Mail 1942-1945

This is a military postal history exhibit of V-Mail.

V-Mail used microphotography to reduce military letters to film.

Rolls of film were sent by air, developed, printed, and

delivered worldwide. V-Mail worked as a morale booster for the troops, and saved air cargo space.


It has been 70 years since WWII. Today's simplified Email makes the complexity of providing those wartime V-Mail service something of great historic significance.

Scope: How V-Mail worked, and an in depth display of V-Mail delivered around the globe.

Format: Military locations and key text are bolded. Quotes from V-Mail text highlighting wartime life and perspective are angled in bolded *italics*. Page headings and subheadings are colored.





British Microfilmed Mail

More than a year earlier than V-Mail, British Airgraph service began in April, 1941. Service terminated on July 31, 1945, before the discontinuance of V-Mail. By service end well over 350 million Airgraphs were sent.

Forerunner: Airgraph used same Kodak system, starting before V-Mail

The reverse is a blank form.
This Holiday Greeting form was used through war.

Instructions emphasize:

- Form will be photographed and reduced in size
- · Write in large, block letters
- · Original will be destroyed

In contrast, V-Mail Service was free.

- The destinations to which the airgraph service is available may be ascertained at any Post Office.
- · Nothing should be written on this side of the paper.
- The whole of the message should be written on the other side below the sender's name and address.
- The name and address to which the message is to be sent should be written in large BLOCK letters wholly within the panel provided. The address should be the same as for an ordinary letter except in the case of airgraphs for personnel of Merchant Navy ships, which should be addressed to the addressee and ship (by name) followed by "c/o G.P.O., London, E.C.I."
- A miniature photographic negative of the message and address will be made and sent by air mail. At the destination end a photographic print, measuring about 5 inches by 4 inches, will be made and delivered to the addressee. It is therefore important that the message should be written very plainly and that the address should be written as large as possible in block letters. Wherever possible, black ink should be used. Very small writing is not suitable.
- The completed form may be handed in at any Post Office, or if preferred, may be forwarded to London in an envelope addressed to: "Airgraphs"

Foreign Section London

In that case it is desirable that a large envelope should be used and that the form should be folded as few times as possible, preferably in the same direction as the writing. As an exception to the general rule that postage is payable on letters addressed to Government Departments, Postmasters, etc., postage is not payable on covers containing completed Airgraph forms addressed to "Airgraphs," Foreign Section, London.

- If it is desired to send more than one sheet, a separate form must be completed, and the name and address of the sender and of the addressee must be inserted on each form in the usual way.
- . The original will be retained by the Post Office and eventually destroyed.







- (1) The Airgraph service is available from Canada to members of the Armed Forces in the United Kingdom.
- (2) The whole of the message must be written on the other side below the double line.
- (3) The name and address of the addressee must be written in the panel provided above the double line.

 The same address as in the case of ordinary letters is to be used.
- (4) Nothing is to be written on this side of the paper.
- (5) A miniature photographic negative of the message and address will be made and sent by air. A photographic print measuring about 5 inches by 4 inches will then be made and delivered to the addressee. It is therefore important that the message and address should be written very plainly. Wherever possible black ink should be used. Very small writing is not suitable.
- (6) A postage stamp or stamps to the value of the fee (10 cents) must be affixed in the space provided above. The completed form is to be handed in at the Post Office wicket in order that the stamp or stamps may be cancelled and the message forwarded.
- (7) If it is desired to send more than one sheet a separate form must be completed and a postage stamp or stamps to the value of the fee must be affixed to each form.
 - (8) The original will be retained and destroyed after the corresponding film has arrived Overseas.


V-Mail Benefits:

Space savings: 37 mail sacks of 150,000 letters reduced from 2, 575 pounds to one 45 pound bag Delivery speed: given specialty processing and expedited air transport Functionality: the stationery functioned both as a letter and as an envelope in one Cost: sent free for the military, encouraging communications to boost morale Safety: was reproduced near the addressees' location, out of harm's way and lightened war zone work




Figure 1. General V-mail flow chart.

Parcels addressed to individuals at A. P. O.'s overseas must be accompanied with the approved written request from the addressee as above set forth when presented for mailing. The request shall be postmerked by the accepting employee in such manner as to prevent its reuse and then be returned to the sender.





V-Mail Censor stamped and initialed in box left. "Offending" information, as stipulated in V-Mail instruction, was found and obliterated, with heavy black pen. Effectively, after photographing, blacked out text cannot be read.




Censorship Warning Reminder

Next Page: Greetings provide iconic examples of V-Mail. In his most successful design, Lt. Dave Breger, noted cachet artist, used a **combination Holiday Greeting Card and Censorship Warning**. Military sensitive information, especially troop location, would be censored. While not technically correct, this graphic sends a forceful message in a friendly fashion. **Nothing could be physically excised from V-Mail.**

Artwork drawn on early design black V-Mail forms, Lt. Dave Breger is artist for at least five other cachet designs known.




Start Pages and Blank Form Buffer Sheets guide in printing of V-Mail letters. End Pages carry counts: 925 X-Mas, 1319 Total.


Processing: 1,800 V-Mail Letters

Processing the film was not always without its own problems. A **light target** was needed to set the printing. In this roll there are some variations in between light and dark print.

Note remarks: "Many ZP's, Pencil, Typed, Light Stock." Rolls like these needed TLC.

V-Mail instructions stated to write in pen, and use large clear print. For filming and printing, it mattered.

Start & Finish Target, and Density Test Targets. Tools to make the prints clear as possible.





Retakes would be added to another role, and noted on the film roll worksheet.









C. Sending the Film

Protecting the Film in Shipment:

An early V-Mail film box labeled "Kodak Airgraph Film"

This has British Airgraph branding and & "V...- Mail Station" on the same box.

"Post Office Department" which became War and Navy Departments.

"Air Mail" priority given to ship V-Mail by air.

These Sturdy little boxes were relabeled and reused.

C. Sending the Film

A Definitive Reusable Box:

This design, once established, was used through the end of the war: Simplified text and RUSH labeling improved the design.

War & Navy Departments had replaced Post Office Departments.

Kodak and Airgraph branding removed.

Adhesive labels were added, easing repeated usage.



C. Sending the Film

V-Mail was a high priority in air cargo, clear tags and labels to direct the V-Mail to where it need to go.

Destination Tags for Essential Air Mail

V-Mail film roles are small compared to other wartime cargo. Film needed to be clearly identified and carefully controlled. These Special Handling labels and pouch tags were developed for the film's safe travel.

D. Creating Standard Forms

The V-Mail form needed an addressable envelope style exterior for conventional mailing. Multiple design, many printing variations were created by the Government Printing Office and private companies as V-Mail began. Forms "GPO 16-28143-3" government issue, and "Post Office Permit No. 1" held by Wessel Company, Chicago.





Processing Complexity: Highly manual work taking place in a time before computers. The keeping track of millions of servicemen was done using card files. Gonsidering the volume, complexity of military moves, chaos of war, importance of censoring, the lack of technology, and limited resources available, it is impressive to see the effort made to put the mail in the right hands.

B. Filming

The importance and priority of V-Mail:

If a processed V-Mail form was damaged, that V-Mails would have a new negative made from retained original, and added to new role, with its send to, location and contents noted on this summary report. Few of these completed forms remain. Careful tracking and quality processing for V-Mail was a clear priority.

APO 456-NY Bomb Group, 744th Bomb Squadron located in **Stornara**, **Italy**One of the main stipulations with V-Mail service was that there could NOT be any enclosures. The V-Mail letter was filmed and delivered, and an exception was made for the dog tags to be delivered alongside the V-Mail. APO 520-NY in Cerignola, Italy handled the mail for this and other small airfields and units in Italy.

C. Filming Problems

This V-Mail was sent without filming because of an enclosure. This press release was inserted onto the V-Mail form. This was an unauthorized usage as it was expressly prohibited by V-Mail regulations, and was missed at all checkpoints. It is the only recorded item of its kind.

From the U.S.S. Nevada BB-36, this very large vessel was severely damaged during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. It was repaired and played a large role in the Normandy landings and the Okinawa operations.





A. Addressing Mail

The remaining sections 5 through 8 of this exhibit show how the established V-Mail system effectively delivered V-Mail everywhere the troop went. The following sections show V-Mail use through the realities of war, from soldier in camps to casualties. While established as an army post office operation, the next section shows V-Mail use by branches of military, and finally the extension of service around the world shows a comprehensive view of V-Mail service organized geographically by the theaters of war.

Wartime V-Mail Delivery: Delivery of V-Mail is simple in concept, but has complexities as shown in this section. Wartime addressing of mail to troops on the move, forwarding of mail, returning mail are all complicated by the changes of circumstances of war across the globe. This section highlights these complexities.

Military troops were on the move, so address changes were frequent. **Keeping mail properly addressed** called for specific forms. By the end of the war, over 4,000 form types had been used.







These two V-Mails showcase **the effort made to deliver the mail to the serviceman**. Interestingly, in this correspondence between two brothers, the **sender and the receiver both changed addresses** during the course of the mail delivery.

To: Private Rogers at APO 668-NY, 86th Medical Battalion, **Casablanca**, **Morocco**. The 86th Battalion had shifted to the fighting underway, **moving to Tunisia**.

Private Rogers was wounded, and sent to the 21st General Hospital in **Oran, Algeria.**He was transferred to Harmon General Hospital, **Longview Texas**. From Algeria to Texas, the mail was sent to Port of Embarkation, **New York,** and into the civilian postal system.



From Lebanon, this V-Mail between relatives is sent with Lebanese franking from a Charitable Mission in **Beruit**, **Lebanon**. Written to Corporal Freidinger, APO 73-SF, in **Batangas**, **Philippines**. By the time the V-Mail got to him, he had returned to his home in Kentucky, and the V-Mail forwarded. This V-Mail made **Three Ocean Crossings**.



Rate: Airmail rated two 12½ p surcharged on 7½ p issues, and an overprinted 5p on 30c as Postal Tax.



As this was civilian to civilian mail, there was a fee of 3c mailing. The top V-Mail has an additional 6c for airmail service from sender to the New York military gateway postal facilities.







Missing in Action - P.O.W Germany

In this section, Realities of War, V-Mails that indicate "Missing in Action", "Prisoner of War", and mail from refugee camps, as well as those marked as casualties are displayed.

APO 34-NY, 168th Infantry. Endorsed "Missing in Action" and later "Prisoner of War." These P.O.W.s were first held by the Italian Army, later transferred to the German Army. The Germans sent the P.O.W.s to Arveits Kommandos (Labor Camps) at Stalag VII-A in Moosberg, Germany, then onto Stalag II-B in Hammerstein.

Private Kattman was in the 423rd, part of approximately 6,500 US troops captured in the Schnee Eifel salient.





V-Mail to Servicemen:

Redirected V-Mail written to Private Foster, 34th Infantry Division, which at the time was located in Omagh, North Ireland. V-Mail envelope indicates Air Mail service requested for air delivery within United Kingdom.

By the time the V. Mail caught up with the unit, now in North Africa, Private Foster had been declared P.O.W. at the hands of the Axis troops, and the V-Mail returned, with 166 day transit time.





To: APO 7-SF, 32nd Infantry Regiment, at this time on Okinawa, about six weeks after landing. From a Guard Detachment at a P.O.W. Camp housing German Soldiers in Brady, Texas. Sent May 14, 1945.

Dear Sis, Louie and Lorraine,

Just a few lines to say "hello" and to let you know that all is going well with me and that I am in the best of health. For some unknown reason we are not getting any letters for some time now and it seems so strange to be continuously writing to ones who never answer. But I know that some of your letters have been delayed and I surely will get them maybe to-morrow or within the next few days.

I hope that all is going OK at your home and I bet Lorraine is already thinking of school. Before we will realize it will be fall and summer will be just a memory. With all those rationing etc, I imagine that you couldn't do much in enjoyments the past few months. Here 's hoping that next summer will be different. Now that we are in control of Sicily, I wonder where we will be going next? I do not suppose that we would be here any length of time, now.

The first night we were here in the new biwouac area, we had a bombing raid for about an hour. The next day we all made sure that we dug our fox-holes. Butwe haven't had any more raids since then.

To-day proved quite an eventful day for us as we had none other than the commander of the United States 7th Army, Lt Gen. George S. Patton, Jr speak to us. He gave a great speech. He told us that we were now seasoned troops and have proven ourselves to be among the best fighting men in the world. He praised the division for the splendid work we did here. Of course that is great for the moral of the soldiers to get such praise from their commander.

We are quite busy at the office as pay day is just around the corner, and we are still paying on time. Now that the fighting is over, we will be getting a little liberty and I am expecting to go to one of the towns for a half a day. I am hoping to be able to take in a movie, to sit at a table and eat a meal to be finished with some real ice.cream. V ...- M A I L






