RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE IOWA COUNTY BOARD

- Rule 1. The hour of meeting shall be 10:00 o'clock a.m. and 2 o'clock p.m., unless a different hour shall be prescribed.
- Rule 2. The Chairman shall call the meeting to order at the hour fixed for the meeting. (1) The Clerk shall call the roll of members and (2)) a majority being present, the journal of the preceding meeting shall be read, that any mistakes may be corrected, (3) Motions may be offered.
- Rule 3. The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum, and may speak to points of order in preference to other members.
- Rule 4. The Board shall elect at their annual April meeting a chairman and also a vice-chairman who shall act in the absence, disability, death or resignation of the chairman or request to act and possess powers of the Chairman.
- Rule 5. The Chairman with the assistance of the vice-chairman shall appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.
- Rule 6. All questions shall be stated by the chair. If the Chairman doubts as to the voice of the majority he or any member of the Board may call for a vote by either roll call or rising vote on the question to be decided.
- Rule 7. The following standing committees shall be appointed: Committee on Claims, Committee on Equalization, Committee on Treasurer's, Clerk's, and Highway Accounts, Committee on Finance, Taxation and Budget, Committee on Hospital and Home, Committee on Resolutions from without the County, Committee on Tax Claims, Committee on Bonds and Salaries, Committee on Register of Deeds, Clerk of Court and District Attorney Accounts, Committee on Public Property, Committee on Publishing and Printing, Committee on County Highway, Superintendent of Schools Committee, Committee on Agriculture, Committee on Personnel and Sheriff's Committee. The size of committees shall be limited to not less than three nor more than five members.
- Rule 8. After the journal shall have been read the order of business shall be as follows: 1. Letters, Petitions, Remonstrations, Communications and Accompanying Documents. 2. Resolutions. 3. Reports of committee, first standing and afterwards, special committees. 4. Miscellaneous business.
- Rule 9. Every member present shall vote unless excused by the Chairman.
- Rule 10. Every note taken in regard to levying taxes, appropriating money, or dividing or altering the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be taken by Yeas and Nays, and the same shall be entered on the journal.
- Rule 11. The Yeas and Nays on any question shall be entered on the journal at the request of one of the members present.

- 12. No petitions, resolutions or motions having for its object the division or alteration of the boundaries of any town, city or village shall be entered on or considered at the same session of the Board at which it was introduced, but the same shall lie over for consideration at the next regular adjourned or special session of the Board.
- Rule 13. No mention, other than the receiving of petitions, remonstrations, communications, claims, and the reference of the same to appropriate Committees or to adjourn shall be acted upon in the absence of any committee in the regular discharge of their duty unless such motion had been made at a previous meeting and a special assignment had for its consideration.
- Rule 14. No report or resolution appropriating any money shall be acted upon until the next day after presentation without permission of a majority of the members elected.
- Rule 15. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts Rules of Order shall govern in all cases where they are applicable.
- Rule 16. Any of the foregoing rules, except Rules 10 and 12 may be rescinded, changed or suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- Rule 17. Rules Nos. 10 and 12 may be rescinded, altered or suspended by a two-thirds vote of all the members entitled to seats on the County Board.
- Rule 18. The Committee on Equalization shall render their report immediately after roll call on the first day of the session but said report shall not be acted upon on the day which it is presented.
- Rule 19. The Chairman shall appoint two or more members of the Board, who shall visit the County Hospital and Home any time within one month after their appointment and file their written report as to the condition found after their visit. And for each succeeding month thereafter, a like committe shall be appointed whose duties shall be the same as the first committee, but no member shall be appointed on such committee oftener than once in twelve months, the compensation to be \$5.00 per visit in full for said trip.
- Rule 20. No informal ballot cast by this Board shall be declared a formal ballot. In no case shall any official be elected by this Board by casting a unanimous vote in favor of any candidate or nominee.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Duties of the County Highway Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. The County Highway Committee shall have supervision over the maintenance and construction of all road and bridges as provided by the statutes and shall submit to the County Board an annual report including the report of the County Highway Committee of all receipts and expenditures in the County Highway Department and shall submit an annual budget and recommendations for the tax levy for road and bridge purposes to the County Board at the annual session and any other duties as outlined in the statutes or as directed by County Board Action.
- The County Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the Iowa County Traffic Department.
- 3. The Highway Committee shall have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the operation of the County Ambulance.

Duties of the Sheriff's Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. The Sheriff's Committee shall examine all accounts and claims filed against the County by the Sheriff and his deputies, and make report to the County Board at each regular meeting thereof.
- 2. The Sheriff's Committee shall also have jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the county police radio system, and shall act upon such other matters as may be referred to it by the County Board.

Duties of the Resolution Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

 To receive and examine all resolutions from without the County and make report thereof to the County Board.

Duties of the General Claims Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

 To audit, allow or disallow all claims filed in the office of the County Clerk or referred to the committee, and shall file a schedule of such claims allowed, with the County Clerk, for payment and shall make a report to the County Board of all claims audited.

Duties of the Equalization Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To have supervision over and make an equalization of the assessments on all property in the county for taxes between the several towns, villages and cities of the county.
- 2. It shall be the duty of this committee to make a detailed report thereof at the annual session of the board.
- This committee shall meet annually with the Supervisor of Assessments and County Assessors at their spring meeting.

Duties of the Tax Claims Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To consider, examine and report to the county board, its findings in all matters of illegal assessments, tax titles and delinquent lands that may come before the board for action.
- To supervise all delinquent taxes returned to the County, supervise the taking of tax deeds, supervise the sale of real estate

taken on tax deed to the end that property is returned to the tax roll and aid in the collection of delinquent taxes. Where the value of the property involved warrants it the Committee shall have the power to appraise the property and in its descretion insure it for the benefit of the County.

- To make appraisals pursuant to Chapter 75.69 of the county owned tax deed lands.
- To sell and dispose to the best interests of the county those lands to which the county has taken tax deeds.
- 5. To employ the services of the county surveyor to establish the location of county owned property when necessary.
- To authorize and recommend the county treasurer at their descretion to assign to heirs, mortgagees or adjacent property owners, tax certificates purchased by the county at the annual sale of tax certificates.

Duties of the Welfare Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To have charge of all matters arising from the care of the poor, and incidental matters and claims for the support and care of the indigent and poor.
- 2. To act in an advisory capacity with the Director of Pensions and Relief when necessary.

(See Resolution (No. 38) combining two committees dated at Dodgeville, Wisconsin, November 14, 1935.

Also ordinance (No. 6) passed in the County Board Sessions of 1941).

Duties of the Finance Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To prepare and present to the County Board at the Annual Session the Eudget and Tax Levy; first in a temporary form, and finally in a complete form as changed during the County Board Session.
- 2. To report upon all resolutions and petitions for appropriations presented to the Board.
- 3. To report and make recommendations on the finances of the County from time to time when required.

Duties of the Bonds and Salaries Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To recommend to the County Board the compensation of County officers and employees.
- To determine the amount of Bonds to be furnished by the County officers to the County and to report on the sufficiency of such bonds.
- 3. To designate and report to the County Board the Banks of Iowa County that may apply as a depository for county funds.

Duties of Agricultural Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

 To perform all duties prescribed by law as further instructed by the County Board.

According to the Statutes the personnel of the County Agriculturual Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the County Board, the Superintendent of Schools and three men actually engaged in farming, one of whom must be a member of the County Board.

The general duty of the Committee is to protect and enhance the financial interest of the county in all things agricultural.

This committee, working in conjunction with state and federal authorities shall according to statute, enter into, consumate and cancel contracts with all extension workers and be the authority in the matter of policy of the extension office.

This committee shall bring before the proper committee requests for appropriations for fiscal years, listing the salaries and estimated expense of each department of extension work.

The agricultural committee shall examine and approve all claims filed against Iowa County by the Extension Department.

The Agricultural Committee has in the past requested the assistance of agricultural leaders of the county in the formation of an agricultural program for the year. This privilege is to continue.

When a county becomes a soil conservation district, the agricultural committee automaically becomes supervisor of said district and must sign all contracts with those who enter into soil conservation contracts.

The Agricultural Committee shall act in an advisory capacity on all agricultural appropriations unless otherwise instructed by the County Board.

Duties of Personnel Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To set the policy of each department when not in conflict with the Statutes or when called upon for this purpose, also to designate the duties and responsibilities of the different offices.
- To hear and consider grievances reported by county departments, county officers and county employees and to make their recommendations to the County Board.
- All matters pertaining to clerk hire, working hours and conditions, departmental problems or questions shall be referred to this committee.
 - 4. To meet annually not later than October 15 of each year.

Duties of Committee on Clerk's, Treasurer's and Highway Accounts It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To meet with the State Auditors to study and examine the report on the accounts of the County Clerk, County Treasurer and Highway Department, and to make a report to the County Board.
- To audit the Accounts of the Justices of Iowa County as provided by the Wisconsin Statutes.
- 3. To approve the reports of the County Clerk and County Treasurer before being presented to the County Board.

Duties of Committee on District Attorney, Register of Deeds and Clerk of Courts Accounts

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

 To approve the reports of the District Attorney, Register of Deeds and Clerk of Courts.

Duties of Public Property Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To supervise and have charge of the Court House, County Jail and the grounds of these buildings and the Gov. Dodge home site.
 - 2. To keep in repair and good condition these properties.
- 3. In order to maintain uniformity of equipment, the Public Property Committee shall purchase the equipment for all the offices in the Court House with the following exceptions no office equip-

ment shall be purchased for the County Agent's office, Welfare office or Highway Department, except when such purchases are made from the General Fund.

 This Committee shall function during the year and when the County Board is not in session.

Duties of County Superintendent of Schools Committee It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To act as an advisory committee on all matters pertaining to the office of the County Superintendent of Schools, excepting those duties governed by statute.
- To check the superintendent's accounts and make recommendations to the board in matters of expense and appropriation.

Duties of the Committee on County Hospital and Home It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To examine the accounts of the Hospital and Home.
- To compare the vouchers as filed with the County Clerk with the records of the institutions and to compare the revenues received at the Hospital and Home with the receipts issued by the County Treasurer.
- 3. To act as an advisory committee with the Board of Trustees in the maintenance, repairs and construction of buildings.
- 4. To report to the County Board, but in no way interfere with the management of the Hospital and Home by the Board of Trustees as established by law.

Duties of the Printing Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- To accept bids on the printing of the County Board Proceedings, stationery ,envelopes for county officers and Court Calendars.
- To act on all matters of printing referred to them by the County Board.

Duties of Conservation Committee

It Shall be the Duty of This Committee:

- 1. To audit the accounts of any money appropriated by the County Board for conservation work.
- To supervise the purchase of equipment and supplies in which the money appropriated by the County Board is used.

Duties of Highway Study Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To receive all petitions referred to it by the County Board, by the regular highway committee and any citizen group relating to the construction, relocation, maintenance and repairs of any Federal State or County road in the county and report their recommendations to the next meeting of the County Board.
- To confer with the regular Highway Committee on all allocations and grants of Federal and State funds and on any other highway matters of major importance.
 - 3. This committee is merely advisory.

Duties of the Health Committee

It Shall Be the Duty of This Committee:

- To act in an advisory capacity with the County Nurse on all types of health programs.
- Annually plan and recommend the budget for the health program.

April 16, 1957

The Board of Supervisors met in Regular Session at the Court House in the City of Dodgeville, Iowa County, Wisconsin, April 16, 1957 and was called to order by Honorable Glenn H. James, Chairman of the Board.

Sup. Ralph, King, Sawle, Kamm and Fuchs, new members to the Iowa County Board were introduced.



Roll Call was taken. All members reported present as follows with the exception of a Sup. from the Village of Livingston.

The next order of business was the election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman for the ensuing year.

Sup. C. Harris and Hoyer were appointed tellers.

As a result of the election Mr. Harley I. Hicks was declared elected Chairman for the ensuing year.

Sup. Anding and Bohan escorted the new Chairman to the Chair.

As a result of the election for a Vice-Chairman Mr. Harry Reynolds was elected for the ensuing year.

Sup. J. Harris requested the Board to give Mr. Glenn H. James,

our past chairman, a rising vote of thanks for his services during the past two years. A rising vote was given Sup. James.

The Board then proceeded to the election of a Welfare Committee, one from the towns, one from the villages and one from the cities.

As a result of the election Sup. Hoyer was declared elected member from the towns, Sup. Reynolds member from the villages and Sup. Kislingbury member from the cities.



The County Clerk addressed the Board on the condition of county funds

Chairman Harley Hicks requested Sup. James to represent the Iowa County Board at a Legislative hearing on the Small Claims Court for Iowa County at Madison Wednesday afternoon and excused him from the Board Session for that time.



Sup. Grunow moved a recess to 1:30 P.M.

Sup. Swenson seconded the motion. Carried.

Sup. Reynolds moved that part of Resolution No. 44 of the November 1956 session which states that no allowance for extra help be allowed for janitor services be rescinded and that an outstanding bill of \$8.00 be allowed.

Sup. James moved that the County Board retain the same Public Property Committee as in 1956 and that the office of vice-chairman of the committee be created to act in the absence of the Chairman, Sup. Harry Reynolds to act as Chairman and Chairman Harley I. Hicks as Vice-Chairman.

Sup. Grunow moved the Chairman and Vice-Chairman be directed to appoint Thomas McCutchin as a member to the Agricultural Committee for the coming year.

Motion Lost.



Sup. James moved a sum not to exceed \$100.00 be transferred from the General Fund to the Centennial Account.

Seconded.

Roll Call Vote (No. 1) was taken.

Total votes cast 30; Ayes 30, Noes 0.

Motion carried.

Mr. Richard C. Wilson, Assistant Director for the State of Wisconsin on Civil Defense addressed the Board.

Sup. James moved to adopt Ordinance (No. 2) providing for a civil defense organization.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A CIVIL DEFENSE ORGANIZATION AND FOR PROTECTION AND PROMOTION OF PUBLIC SAFETY, HEALTH, AND WELFARE IN THE COUNTY OF IOWA DURING CIVIL DEFENSE EMERGENCIES

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Iowa Do Ordain as Follows:

SECTION 1. POLICY AND PURPOSE.

- (a) "Civil Defense" shall mean the preparation for and the carrying out of all emergency functions, other than functions for which the military forces are primarily responsible, to minimize and repair injury and damage resulting from disaster caused by enemy attack, sabotage, or other hostile action, or by fire, flood or other natural causes.
- (b) By reason of the increasing possibility of disasters of unprecedented size and destructiveness, and to insure that preparations will be adequate to cope with such disasters, and to provide for the common defense, to protect the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare, and to preserve the lives and property of the people, it is hereby declared necessary:
 - (1) To establish a local civil defense organization,
- (2) To provide for the exercise of necessary powers during civil defense emergencies; and
- (3) To provide for the rendering of cooperation and mutual aid between this county and other political subdivisions.
- (c) It is further declared to be the purpose of this ordinance and the policy of the county that all civil defense functions of this county be coordinated to the maximum extent practicable with existing services and facilities of this county and with comparable functions of the federal, state and county government and other political subdivisions, and of various private agencies to the end that the most effective preparation and use may be made of manpower, resources, and facilities for dealing with any disaster that my occur.

SECTION 2. CIVIL DEFENSE COMMISSION.

(a) How Constituted.

There is hereby created a civil defense commission composed of the Chairman, County Board of Supervisors and as many additional members as may be determined by the County Board of Supervisors by resolution who shall be appointed by the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, subject to the confirmation of the County Board of Supervisors. The civil defense director shall serve as Chairman of the commission.

(b) Duties of Defense Commission.

The civil defense commission shall be an advisory and planning group and shall advise the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, coordinator and the County Board of Supervisors on all matters pertaining to civil defense. The civil defense commission shall meet upon the call of the chairman.

SECTION 3. CIVIL DEFENSE COORDINATOR.

(a) Appointment.

The office of coordinator of civil defense is hereby created. The coordinator shall be appointed by the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors subject to confirmation by the County Board of Sup-

ervisors and shall receive such salary as may be authorized by the County Board of Supervisors. He shall take and file an official oath.

Deputy and assistant coordinators may be appointed by the coordinator subject to the approval of the civil defense commission, as may be deemed necessary, and such appointee shall receive such compensation as may be determined by the County Board of Supervisors.

(b) Duties and Authority of Coordinator.

- (1) The coordinator shall be the executive head of civil defense organization and shall have direct responsibility for the organization, administration and operation of the civil defense organization subject to the direction and control of the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors and County Board of Supervisors. He shall coordinate all activities for civil defense within the county, and shall maintain liaison and cooperate with civil defense agencies and organizations of other political subdivisions and of the state and federal government, and shall participate in county and state civil defense activities upon request, and shall have such additional authority, duties and responsibilities as are authorized by this ordinance and as may from time to time be required by the County Board of Supervisors.
- (2) The coordinator shall prepare a comprehensive general plan for the civil defense of the county and shall present such plan to the County Board of Supervisors for its approval. When the County Board of Supervisors has approved the plan by resolution, it shall be the duty of all municipal agencies and all civil defense forces of the county to perform the duties and functions assigned by the plan as approved. The plan may be modified in like manner.

SECTION 4. UTILIZATION OF EXISTING SERVICES AND FACILITIES.

In preparing and executing the civil defense plan, the coordinator shall utilize the services, equipment, supplies and facilities of the existing departments and agencies of the county to the maximum extent practicable; and the officers and personnel of all such departments and agencies are directed to cooperate with and extend such services and facilities to the coordinator.

SECTION 5. EMERGENCY REGULATIONS.

Whenever necessary to meet a civil defense emergency for which adequate regulations have not been adopted by the County Board of Supervisors, the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors and in his absence, the coordinator of civil defense, may by proclamation promulgate and enforce such orders, rules and regulations relating to the conduct of persons and the use of property as shall be necessary to protect the public peace, health and safety, and preserve lives and property and to insure the cooperation necessary in civil defense activities. Such proclamations shall be posted in three public places and may be rescinded by the County Board of Supervisors by resolution at any time.

SECTION 6. MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS.

The coordinator of civil defense may, subject to the approval of the County Board of Supervisors, enter into mutual aid agreements with other political subdivisions. Copies of such agreements shall be filed with the state director of civil defense.

SECTION 7. DECLARATION OF EMERGENCIES.

Upon the declaration by the governor, by the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors or the civil defense coordinator in the

absence of the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, or by the County Board of Supervisors of a state of emergency, the coordinator of civil defense shall issue all necessary proclamations as to the existence of such state of emergency and shall issue such other disaster warnings or alerts as shall be required in the civil defense plan.

The civil defense organization shall take action in accordance with the civil defense plan only after the declaration of an emergency and the issuance of official disaster warnings. Such state of emergency shall continue until terminated by the issuing authority, provided that any such declaration not issued by the governor may be terminated at the discretion of the County Board of Supervisors.

SECTION 8. PENALTIES.

It shall be unlawful for any person willfully to obstruct, hinder or delay any member of the civil defense organization in the enforcement of any order, rule, regulation, or plan issued pursuant to this ordinance, or to do any act forbidden by any order, rule, regulation or plan issued pursuant to the authority contained in this ordinance. For a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance he shall forfeit not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, and in default of payment there of, shall be imprisoned in the county jail for a period not exceeding 90 days.

SECTION 9.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and posting.

Sup. Ralph seconded the motion.

Carried.

Sup. J. Harris moved the Civil Defense Committee be limited to three members of the County Board, the County Board Chairman and the coordinator.

Sup. F. Ryan seconded the motion.

Carried.



Mr. Carl Rowe, Trustee of the Hospital and Home addressed the Board relative to sewage disposal at the Hospital and Home and also regarding a transfer of funds from the Hospital Fund to the Building Fund.

Sup. James Harris moved a transfer of \$25,000.00 be made from the Hospital and Home Account to the Building Fund.

Sup. Branger moved the Highway Committee be authorized to proceed with the purchase of a County Ambulance for Iowa County, said purchase to be financed from the Machinery Fund.

Sup. L. Rowe moved to ammend the motion that funds for the purchase of a County Ambulance be taken from the Machinery Fund with the understanding that the money be refunded the Machinery Fund when the condition of the General Fund will warrant such transfer.

SUBJECT: Estimated 1958 Allotment for State Trunk Highway System.

You are hereby notified that the estimated allotment in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1958, under the provisions of Section 20.420 (75) and 84.03 (3), for expenditure on the State Trunk Highway System in your county is \$83,000.00.

By joint action of your county and the State Highway Commission, such allotment in the sum of \$19,000.00 has previously been authorized to be advanced for the improvement of portions of State Trunk Highway 191 between Dodgeville and County Trunk Highway "Y." No further action is required with reference to such advance.

- (b) The duties of the said agency shall include planning and arranging for the welfare and care of residents of this county or of other counties or State who may be evacuated through or into this county.
- (c) The Agency in performance of civil defense activities may employ additional administrative staff, either full time or part time. Such staff shall be employed under the merit system classification and salary range, pursuant to Section 49.50(2) to (5), and Rule PW-PA10.
- (d) The County Agency in the performance of civil defense activities may also make use of voluntary workers who shall receive no salary, but who may be paid necessary and usual out-of-pocket expense incurred in performing this work; such payment to be made from the administration account of said agency.
- The said County Welfare Agency shall cooperate with the State Department of Public Welfare in any activities or duties car-

ried on by said State Department under Section 46.03 (16), or such other responsibilities as may be delegated or provided by law.

RESOLUTION NO. 8

COUNTY AID CONSTRUCTION & MAINTENANCE DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1958

Notice:

Section IX on page 4 of this resolution authorized the County Highway Commissioner, subject to supervision and control by the County Highway Committee, to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate county highway personnel. This change in form was made in view of Attorney General's opinions dated March 6 and March 24, 1945. If this form conflicts with any existing general rules or civil service plan, or if the County Board wishes to limit the authority which would be conferred by this provision, the attached form should be appropriately altered in consultation with the District Attorney.

Attention is directed to the fact that any action taken by the County Highway Committee in exercising its powers must, to be effective, be recorded in the minutes of the County Highway Committee's meeting.

SECTION I. The County Board of Supervisors of Iowa County, Wisconsin, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain that such funds as may be made available to the county for highway work in the year 1958 under the provisions of Section 20.420 and Chapter 83 of the Statutes and the additional sums herein appropriated shall be expended as hereinafter set forth:

SECTION II. COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY ALLOTMENT. WHEREAS the State Highway Commission has notified the County Clerk that a sum of money estimated to be One Hundred seventy-six thousand five hundred Dollars (\$176,500.00) will become available at the end of the fiscal year under the provisions of Sections 83.10 and 20.420(83) and (84) of the Statutes, for the county trunk highway system in the county, but the actual amount will not be known until the close of the fiscal year June 30, 1958.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Committee is authorized and directed to expend the said sum to the extent required, to match and supplement Federal aid for construction, right of way, and other costs on any Federal projects located on the county trunk highway system of said county, which are not recovered from Federal funds, and to expend any balance for constructing, repairing, and maintaining such county trunk highway system and the bridges thereon, including snow and ice removal and control, as directed in Section 83.10(1) of the Statutes, and to reimburse the general fund for

any expenditures that may be made therefrom pursuant to Section 83.01(6) of the Statutes.

SECTION III. WHEREAS it appears that certain additional highway improvements in the county are necessary and warranted,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Board does hereby appropriate the following sums for the purpose hereinafter set forth:

- (1) For the maintenance of the County Trunk Highway System and matching Federal Aid Secondary Funds, Snow and Ice Control, the sum of One Hundred seventy-thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$170,-000.00).
- (2) For emgerency road or bridge repairs or construction, the necessity for which is determined by the County Highway Committee and for which other funds are not available, the sum of Ten thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$10,000.00).
- (3) For the purchase of machinery, not to exceed \$100,000 and for machinery repairs, the sum received from machinery rentals.
- (4) For the purchase of county gravel pits and stone quarries the sum received from sale of materials.
- (5) For administration, including salaries, per diem, office and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of Twelve thousand and no/100 dollars (\$12,000.00).
- (6) For County Traffic Regulation the sum of Thirteen thousand six hundred fifty and no/100 dollars (\$13,650.00).

Total Authorized in this Section \$205,650.00.

SECTION IV. WHEREAS the various highway activites for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work cannot be known at the time of making the appropriation therefor,

BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropriation for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed may be used by the County Highway Committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement, which is part of the same item in the county budget, for which provision is herein made, and any balances remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year.

SECTION V. WHEREAS the exact amount of the funds that will become available from the state for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes will not be known until on or after June 30, 1958.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments for the purposes for which such funds are to be used, as hereinbefore authorized, from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purposes for which appropriated prior to August 1, 1958, and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the sums received under Section 20.420 of the Statutes.

SECTION VI. WHEREAS the County Highway Committee and County Highway Commissioner are charged with the duty and responsibility of carrying out the construction and maintenance of highways for which provision is made, and other related supervisory and administrative duties,

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Commissioner shall have authority to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate such personnel as he deems necessary for such purposes, provided, however,

that the County Highway Committee may by action recorded in its minutes determine the number of persons to be hired and may also at any time by action so recorded order the County Highway Commissioner to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate any such person. The term "personnel" or "person" shall include all patrolmen, laborers, foreman, clerks, stenographers, or other employees necessary to carry on such activities.

ORDINANCE NO. 10

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE TRAFFIC UPON THE HIGHWAYS, STREETS AND ALLEYS IN IOWA COUNTY, WISCONSIN

SECTION 1. Enacting Authority. This ordinance is enacted pur-

SECTION 3. Speed Limits. State Speed Limits Adopted. The proprivisions of Sections 346.57, 346.58 and 346.59 of the Wisconsin Statutes, relating to the maximum and minimum speed of vehicles are hereby adopted as part of this Section if fully set forth therein, except as specified by Section 349.11(3)(C) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

SECTION 4. Penalty.

- (a) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00, together with the costs of prosecution, and shall be imprisoned in the County Jail until said forfeiture and costs are paid, but not to exceed ninety days, provided that the minimum forfeiture for a violation of any provisions of Section 3 of this ordinance shall be \$10.00, and the minimum forfeiture for a violation of any provision of Section 2 of this ordinance, described and defined in Section 346.62 of the Wisconsin Statutes, shall be \$25.00 and the minimum forfeiture for a violation of any provision of Section 2 of this ordinance described and defined in Section 346.63 of the Wisconsin Statutes shall be \$100.00.
- (b) The provisions of Section 345.16 of the Wisconsin Statutes shall apply to the adjudication of the violations of any provisions of this ordinance.

(e) Bail Bonds. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the right of the proper authorities to accept bail bonds, deposits or certificates for money deposits as provided in Sections 66.114, 345.13 or 345.15 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Pursuant to these Sections of the Wisconsin Statutes the proper authorities may in their discretion refuse to accept a stipulation of guilt and forfeiture and demand that the offender post bail when the violation is deemed to be sufficiently important to demand a Court determination of penalty.

SECTION 6. Reference to Statutes. The term "Wisconsin Statutes" wherever used in this ordinance shall mean the Wisconsin Statutes of 1957.

SECTION 7. Severability. The provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and it is expressly declared that the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Iowa, Wisconsin, would have passed the provisions of this ordinance irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid, and if any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any provision or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions to other provisions or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 8.__Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances. All ordinances regulating traffic upon the streets, alleys and highways of Iowa County heretofore enacted by the County Board of Supervisors of the County of Iowa, Wisconsin, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 9. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.

Communication (No. 14) relative to the Iowa County Jail was read

September 11, 1957

Mr. Harley Hicks, Chairman of the Iowa County Board, Dodgeville, Wisconsin

Dear Sir:

In accordance with Section 46.17 (3) of the Wisconsin Statutes,

the Iowa County Jail was inspected on August 13, 1957, and the following conditions were found:

- Section 53.42 of the Wisconsin Statutes and the Attorney General's opinion in regard to these Statutes, which held that a jailer must be present, on duty, and awake whenever prisoners are confined, is not being complied with.
- The jail does not have facilities for the separation of criminals from non-criminals and first offenders from hardened jail-wise prisoners as required by Section 53.36 of the Statutes.
- The fire-exit door was stuck and could not be opened. The sheriff stated this would be corrected immediately.
- 4. Fly and insect screens were on only three of the six windows of the jail. There were screens stored in the basement but these were not of proper size for the three windows which at present do not have screens. The windows are not mesh protected to prevent the passage of articles of contraband into or out of the jail.
- The metal floors of the cell block are sagged and the walls are buckled. The stone slabs of the floor are uneven and it is difficult to maintain the floors in a sanitary condition.
- 6. The cell-door locks which have been installed are of the "snap-lock" type and can be opened by prisoners. The cells are small and dark and the lighting system is inadequate.
- 7. The steps from the fire escape to ground level have sagged and there is a three-inch gap between the stairs and the jail building.
- 8. Toilet and layatory have been installed in one cell; all other prisoners must use facilities in the bullpen or guard corridor.

It has been requested by county officials that this Department recommend such improvements as will bring the Iowa County Jail into compliance with Statutory and Department requirements. Because of the physical arrangement of the jail, minor changes cannot accomplish this and complete remodeling would be necessary.

This remodeling must meet the following minimum requirements of the Statutes and this Department:

- Separate segregated sections in the jail should be provided for the separation of criminals from non-criminals and first offenders from the hardened criminals or the sexually deviated prisoners to provide for detention in accordance with Section 53.36 of the Wisconsin Statutes.
- Single occupancy cells which have a minimum size of 5½ feet by 7½ feet and provide 400 cubic feet of air space for each cell should be provided.
- Each cell shall be furnished with institutional type toilet and lavatory with integral drinking spout and single bunk of rigid construction securely fastened to the wall or floor.
- Protected tamper-proof light of sufficient wattage to permit a prisoner to read in each cell should be provided.
- Personnel to comply with Section 53.42 of the Wisconsin Statutes should be provided.

In our opinion, major remodeling of the present jail or construction of a new jail will be necessary to provide facilities which meet the above requirements.

If within ninety days officials of Iowa County do not initiate plans to provide suitable jail facilities which will meet Statutory and Department requirements for jails, the Iowa County Jail will be condemned for jail use. This would leave the alternative of arranging for the detention of prisoners in an approved jail in a nearby county, with the cost of such care to be paid for by Iowa County as provided in Section 53.34.

It is requested that immediately following the fall session of the

Iowa County Board, this Department be notified of whatever action has been taken.

Your Civil Defense Committee and Coordinator report as follows: As authorized by you last spring we have proceeded in organizing Civil Defense in Iowa County on a limited basis consistent with safety and have had splendid cooperation. All town, village and city officials were urged to attend a mass meeting at the Court House on the evening of June 10, where the necessary steps were outlined by state and local officials. The meeting was well attended and a suggested plan for organization was handed out. This included securing directors, supervisors and assistants for every center.

To date centers have been arranged in eleven communities which comprise every village, town and city in the county with the exception of one village and one town. The directors and assistant directors are as follows:

Avoca Village, Pulaski and Clyde Towns—John Pechan and Irvin Marklein

We have secured a complete 200 bed hospital unit from the Federal Government to be used in connection with the two Dodgeville Hospitals. It is expected to arrive immediately and will be stored in the General Hospital, St. Joseph's Hospital and Highway Shop. It provides all equipment necessary to operate a modern hospital including an auxiliary electric generating plant.

The total expenses of the coordinator to date are \$10.33 postage and supplies, \$1.67 telephone calls, \$15.50 mileage and \$84.00 salary for a grand total of \$112.94.

Volunteer Firemen in Dodgeville and Mineral Point will complete Red Cross first aid training in January and will then be available to teach classes in every Civil Defense center. Each community can go as far as it desires in a preparedness program and we have laid the groundwork to care for evacuees in a war emergency which we sincerely hope will never happen.

We wish to recommend that an appropriation of \$5,000.00 be made for the upkeep of the Home and care of the home inmates. We further recommend that an appropriation of \$23,456.32 which is the amount due the hospital fund for the care of county patients at the County Hospital be made. The anticipated state aids for the Hospital is \$134,832.86. The anticipated farm revenue is \$30,000.00. The total of the above mentioned appropriations and anticipated revenues will give the Iowa County Hospital a working fund of \$184,175.73 for the year 1958.

Three of the deaths in Iowa County during 1957 resulted from the driver running off the roadway, two were pedestrian, one a passenger on a tractor drawn wagon and one as a result of a head-on collision, the first person killed in this manner since 1954.

The first ten months of our accident report shows the average age of a driver involved in an accident in Iowa County to be 38.7 years of age, driving a car for an average of 21.4 years, indicating long driving experience.

Examination of speeds of 80 cars involved in accidents show

an average speed prior to the accident of 34.5 miles per hour, injuries being more severe at higher speeds, but common at any speed.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Iowa County, Dodgeville, Wis. Gentlemen:

We herewith submit the annual report of the Iowa County Public Welfare Dept. for the year 1957. We have attempted to present a concise, meaningful report which reflects the performance and responsibilities of this agency. There are numerous areas which we would like to elaborate on, however, we believe this would be cumbersome and perhaps, in some instances, uninteresting.

We wish to make special mention of the greatly improved office space with which we were favored during the past year. The partitions are now complete and we invite you in to see the finished product. This improvement has already paid dividends in volume of work put out, and equally important, the clients and workers have some privacy during interviews and working hours. The addition of dictating and transcribing equipment is now an indispensable part of our daily regimen, and for this we also wish to express our gratitude. We are confident the expenditures for these items will pay huge dividends in the form of increased quantity and quality of staff performance.

CHILD WELFARE

On August 1, 1957 we obtained the part-time services of a staff member to provide casework services in the Child Welfare area. One might suspect that we would have difficulty finding a sufficient number of cases to provide a "proving ground" for the worker, but quite to the contrary, we had an over-supply. These referrals came to the office in a matter of a few months and sad but true, many were not serviced because of lack of staff.

During the last quarter of 1957 we had a total of 45 children under care. In addition to these, we had a back-log of cases which needed service but were not considered active because of lack of staff time. There is only one way which this caseload will go and that is up! These cases have been in the county but probably not heard of since there was no place to which they could be referred. We have a large number of children in our Aid to Dependent Children and General Relief cases who also need service, but we have provided service in only those which seemed most urgent.

From our experience in the past few months we have become increasingly aware of the need for service. This has been obviated by the fact that we had to begin training an inexperienced worker, and the demands for services were much greater than even an experienced worker could have serviced.

Then, too, we must remember that this type of service does not produce miracles overnight. It takes years for parents and/or children to get to the point where there is a need for a referral to a caseworker agency. Why then, or how, can one expect that the agency can transform the personalities of these persons in a comparatively short time.

On the other hand, it has been gratifying to hear reports of marked improvements in home situations that we initially believed might be next to hopeless. We are also happy to report that we have formulated some very definite plans in a number of cases and the entire program is definitely "taking shape." We have some very clearly defined goals and during the next year we expect the entire area of child welfare services to broaden.

It is quite apparent that punishing or institutionalizing problem children and/or parents is not the most practical method of attempting to get at the basic problems. These areas can best be alleviated by working through the problems on a direct contact basis in the person's own home and then, and only then, can we expect that we shall make strides in correcting an already serious situation. We can point to quite a number of families in Iowa County who have already derived benefits from casework services and you may rest assured that this area will be of even greater concern in the ensuing year.

GENERAL RELIEF

The Board of Public Welfare and the Director discussed the entire area of General Relief in the February and March 1957 meetings. The philosophies and the general theory upon which the Board wished the program administered was founded. The members were in general agreement that they wanted people provided for, but felt strongly that able bodied persons should be made to assume the responsibility of supporting themselves and their families.

During the past year there has been a very noticeable reduction in relief expenditures. Perhaps the best measurement can be provided by monthly statistics compiled by the State Department of Public Welfare, as listed below:

From this chart it will be noticed that the number of persons and the amount of money spent denoted substantial increases state-wide, while Iowa County experienced a decrease of over one-half in both number of persons and amount of money expended. Total gross expenditures dropped from \$44,294.31 in 1956 to \$19,755.61 in 1956, and the average caseload decreased from 59 cases to 27 cases per month.

WELFARE BOARD AND IT'S FUNCTION

Under the very able guidance of the Board of Public Welfare, the County Department has shown improvement in numerous administrative areas. As you know, those persons now serving on the Board of Public Welfare are Mr. Harry Reynolds, Chairman, Mr. Warren Hoyer, secretary, and Mr. James Harris, Jr. This group has been most helpful to the department in taking a definite stand on guiding philosophies and board administrative policies, which are so necessary in the operation of a public agency.

The group has met a minimum of once a month, and more frequently, when the need arose. In our regular meetings, this group has scrutinized and studied numerous issues, policies, and financial matters. It is most heartening to work with a committee composed of intelligent, questioning, individuals who do not subscribe to a "rubber stamp" type of operation. These men have met with various professional men, studied problems referred, and have always given the director a definite answer on questionable areas involving the operation of your department.

The entire staff appreciates the fine cooperation and mature judgment exercised by this group.

Undoubtedly the most important function of the Board of Public Welfare is the statutory duty to "supervise the working of the county department of public welfare and shall be a policy-making body determining the broad outlines and principles governing the ad-

ministration of the functions, duties and powers assigned to said department, etc."

What are the elements of good administration and how can we attain them? It appears that there are certain fundamentals which are basic to a successful administration: (1) effective relations in policy-making and determining the "broad outlines and principles" between the Welfare Board and the Director; (2) ability of the Director to adapt and incorporate these policies formulated by the Board into workable, usable tools on the operational level; and (3) skill of the director or supervisors in winning the collaboration of the staff members so the objectives of the policies can be successfully accomplished.

From the above, it will be noted that every member of the staff—yes, the Welfare Board members are considered a part of the staff—has clearly defined, specific responsibilities and authorities, and if any member fails, the entire scheme of operation suffers. If, on the other hand, each person accepts and shoulders his part of the load, we shall then have reached the epitome in administration. Our jobs are to serve the public and we, in those jobs are functioning as servants of policy. This then, to determine these policies, is the reasoning behind the importance of the task set before your Board of Public Welfare.

Sup. C. Harris, member of the Bonds and Salaries Committee moved that the janitor's salary be increased to \$3000.00 per year effective January 1, 1958.

ORDER

In the Matter of the Iowa County Jail:

WHEREAS, The Iowa County Jail has been inspected periodically for the past ten years pursuant to Section 46.17 (3) of the Wisconsin Statutes, and

WHEREAS, The State Department of Public Welfare under date of September 11, 1957, sent a report and recommendations to Mr. Harley Hicks, Chairman of the Iowa County Board, with copies to the County Clerk, District Attorney, Sheriff, and Chairman of the Property Committee; which report included the following recommendations:

- Separate segregated sections in the jail should be provided for the separation of criminals from non-criminals and first offenders from the hardened criminals or the sexually deviated prisoner to provide for dentention in accordance with Section 53.36 of the Wisconsin Statutes.
- Single occupancy cells which have a minimum size of 5½ feet by 7½ feet and provide 400 cubic feet of air space for each cell should be provided.
- Each cell shall be furnished with institutional type toilet and lavatory with integral drinking spout and single bunk of rigid construction securely fastened to the wall or floor.
- Protected tamper-proof light of sufficient wattage to permit a prisoner to read in each cell should be provided, and

WHEREAS, the Iowa County Board has not notified this Department that it has authorized requested remodeling nor given any assurance that such recommendations would be complied with,

Now, Therefore, It Is Hereby Ordered That, effective six months from the date of this order the Iowa County Jail is condemned for all jail purposes unless work is commenced on either required remodeling of the present jail or the construction of a new jail in accordance with Section 46.17 (3) of the Wiconsin Statutes and the Wisconsin Building Code.
