1. SUMMARY

a. This reporting period saw the 5th Marines serving in the capacities of (1) the 1st Marine Division's reserve regiment; and (2) a line regiment responsible for the right sector of the Division front.

b. In position as the reserve unit near Masan-ni during the first half of the month, the regiment performed the dual missions of responsibility for the construction of defensive positions on the Kansas Line and also providing security for X-ray and Widgeon Bridges across the Imjin River. During this period extensive field training and schooling was undertaken in which individual diplomas were given for the successful completion of the more important subjects. The emphasis was on training and rehabilitation.

c. With the relief of lines of the 1st Marines on 15 June, the regiment assumed responsibility for the Division's extreme right sector, tying in with the 7th Marines on the left and the 1st Commonwealth Division on the right. A strong main line of resistance was supplemented by five

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to ten outposts, aggressive patrolling, ambushes, and up to twenty listening posts.

2. CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE

1 June

a. As the new reporting period opened the regiment was still carrying out its missions as the 1st Marine Division's reserve regiment. This consisted of an extensive training and rehabilitative schedule coupled with the construction of defensive positions on the Kansas Line. Six security patrols were performed by units of this regiment with negative contact. (for routes of patrols see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 89, app.III)

b. First Battalion performed one patrol with negative contact.

Three patrols were performed by Second Battalion, also with negative results.

Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo Peninsula.

A patrol by 4.2 Mortar Company uncovered one case of .30 calibre ammunition, one case of rifle grenades, and approximately ten rounds each of 60mm and 81 mm mortar ammunition in a cave at CT 117046.

Anti-Tank Company also performed one patrol during this period with negative contact.

c. The Commanding Officer visited the Second Battalion command post this afternoon to present certificates of graduation to graduates of the Regimental Snipers School.

d. Directives received this date included: Div. Memo. No. 147-52: meritorious special duty, information pertaining thereto; - Div. Memo. No. 148-52: consumption of commercial electric power; -

2 June

a. Eight patrols were performed within the 5th Marines area of responsibility during this period as the regiment continued in Division reserve. All reported negative contact. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S03 Unit Report No. 90, app. III.)

b. First Battalion performed one patrol with negative contact.

Five patrols were performed by Second Battalion, also with negative contact.

Third Battalion remained on Kimpo Peninsula under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment.

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One patrol by 4.2 Mortar Company performed with negative contact. Anti-Tank Company also performed one patrol with negative results.

## 3 June

a. Five security patrols were performed in the regimental area of responsibility during this period, all with negative results. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 91, app. III)

b. One patrol was performed by 1st Battalion with negative contact.

Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo Peninsula.

One patrol, also with negative results, was performed by 4.2 Mortar Company.

Another patrol, by H&S Company, was performed in its area with negative contact.

c. The Commanding Officer visited the 1st Marine Division command post this morning, returning at 1030I.

d. Directives received during this period included: Div. Bulletin No. 35-52: USO Camp Show, No. 1020;-- Div. Memo. No. 149-52: Disbandment of the 21st Replacement Draft.

## 4 JUNE

a. The 5th Marines continued its missions of the Division's reserve regiment during this period and performed four security patrols within its area of responsibility. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 92, app. III)

b. The one patrol performed by First Battalion reported negative contact.

Second Battalion performed two patrols in its sector, both with negative results.

Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment.

The regiment's 4.2 Mortar Company performed one security

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patrol with negative results.

c. Colonel Staab, Commanding Officer of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment, who arrived at the 5th Marines CP last evening, departed at 0815L.

Colonel Dunlap, Division G-1, and Colonel Wilburn, visited the CP, and Colonel Wilburn was still aboard as the period closed.

d. Directives received during this period included: ALPACFLT 41 DTG 040221Z: requests for China Service Medal; -- Change No. 1 to Div. Training Memo No. 7-52: Non-commissioned Officer's School;-- Div. Memo. No. 151-52: Refrigerators, interim allocations;--Div. Bulletin No. 37-52: Army Special Service Show, "Shoot the Works";--Div Memo. No. 150-52: Equipment, Korean Certificate of Loss etc.

5 June

a. Colonel Culhane, Commanding Officer, issued this warning Order Number 9-52 at 1305L today. This provided for the relief of the 1st Marines on position during the period of 15-16 June. First and Second Battalions will relieve the 1st Marines' first and second Battalion while third Battalion, minus one rifle company which will be attached to Second Battalion will assume the missions of the reserve battalion. Four security patrols were performed during the twenty-four hour period. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report NO 93 app.III.)

b. First Battalion performed one patrol with negative results.

Two patrols were performed by Second Battalion, also with negative results

Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo Peninsula.

One other patrol, by 4.2 Mortar Company, was also with negative results.

c. Colonel Wilburn completed his visit and departed the command post at 0830L this morning.

d. Directives received during this period included: Div. General Order No. 59: 1st Marine Division Brig;--Div. Bulletin No. 36-52: Division Band, play dates;--Div. Memo No. 152-52 "Request for Reproduction Work";--

6 June

a. Construction of defensive installations on the Kansas Line and schooling in combat subjects continued to dominate the schedule of the regiment as the 1st Marine Division's reserve

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unit. Five security patrols were performed by subordinate units. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 94, app. III.)

b. First Battalion dispatched two patrols during the period. Both returned with negative reports.

Second Battalion also performed two patrols, also with negative results.

Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo Peninsula.

One other patrol by Anti-Tank Company, also returned with negative results.

c. The Commanding Officer departed this morning to visit the Kimpo Provisional Regiment and returned to the CP at 1615L.

d. Directives received during this period included: Div. Memo. No. 153-52: Distilled water for use in storage batteries, availability of;--Div. 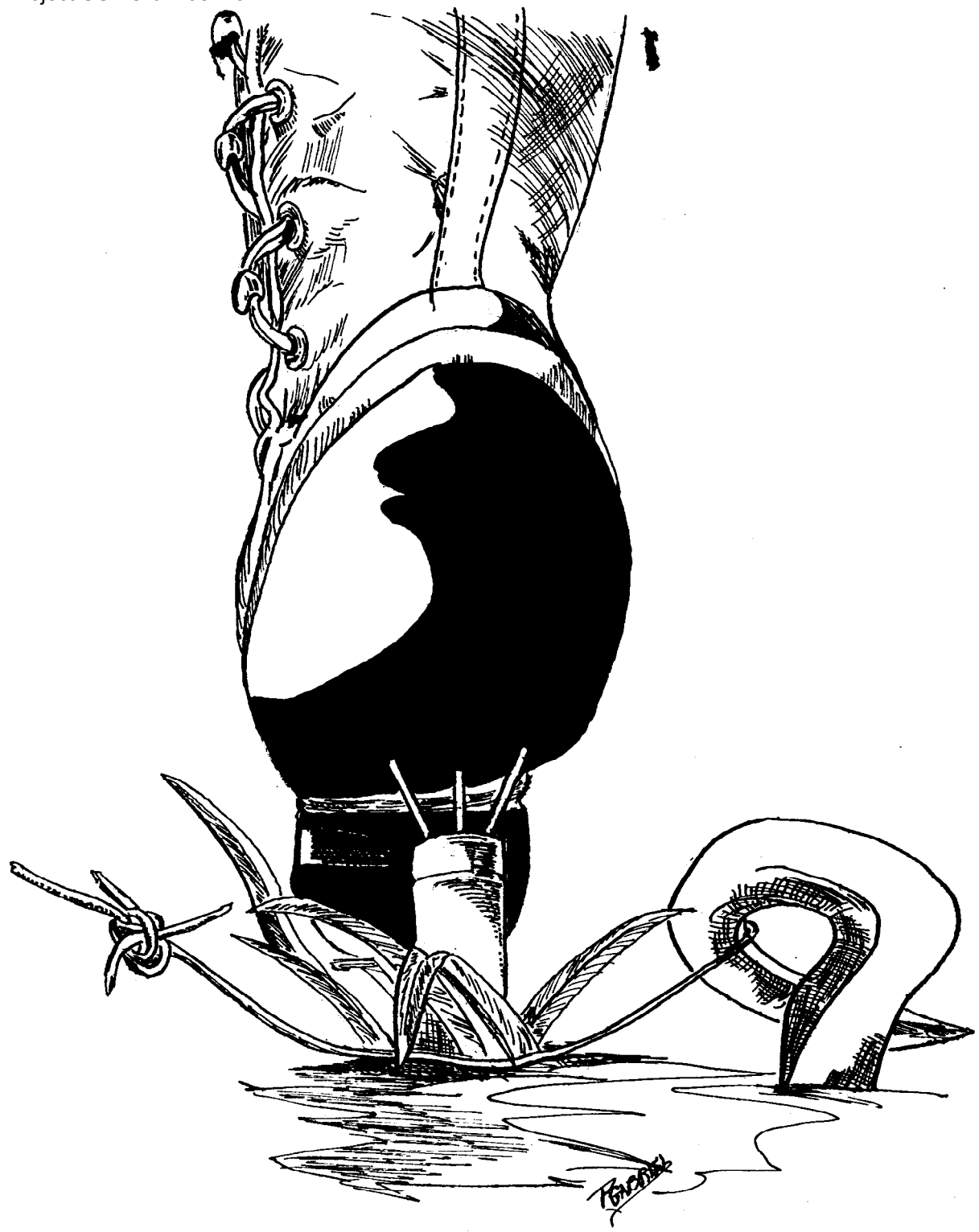
7 June

a. The Commanding Officer today issued Operation Plan No. 8-52 and Operation Order No. 26-52. The Operation Plan listed the details of the missions the regiment would assume when it relieved the 1st Marine. The 5th Marines is to be on the extreme right of Division front, flanked on the left by the 7th Marines and the 1st Commonwealth Division on the right. First Battalion of the 11th Marines will be in direct support along with "B" Company of the 1st Tank Battalion and one company of the 1st Engineer Battalion. The regiment's mission will be to occupy, defend and continue to improve Line Jamestown in its sector. Operation Order No. 26-52 provided for the apprehension of all unauthorized personnel in the 1st Marine Division and 1st Commonwealth Division areas. Five security patrols were dispatched during the period. (For Operation Plan No. 8-52, see app II.) (For routes of patrols performed this period, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 95, app. III)

b. First Battalion performed one patrol during this period with negative contact.

Two patrols were dispatched by Second Battalion, both returning with negative reports.

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Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo Peninsula.

One patrol performed by 4.2 Mortar Company returned with a report of negative contact.

Anti-Tank Company performed one patrol, also with negative results.

c. The Commanding Officer visited the 1st Marine Division and First Battalion, 5th Marines command posts this morning and afternoon respectively.

d. Directives received during this period included: Div. Memo. No. 154-52: Local Security;--

8 June

a. All units (excepting Third Battalion) today instigated activity in compliance with Operation Order 26-52 which provided for the apprehension of all Korean nationals in the 1st Marine Division and 1st Commonwealth Division areas. As a result of this operation, 45 unauthorized persons were taken into custody and delivered to proper authorities. (For battalion areas of responsibility, see Overlay No.1, S-3 Unit Report No.96 app. 111. For routes of patrols performed during this period see overlay No. 2)

b. First Battalion apprehended sixteen nationals during the execution of Operation Order 26-52 and released them to Provost Marshall personnel in the vicinity of Widgeon Bridge. "C" Company of this battalion also discovered an uncharted mine field. (For location of mine field, see overlay No.1 accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 96, app. III)

Twenty-nine nationals were apprehended in the Second Battalion sector of responsibility during this period. Of these 17 were released to Provost Marshall personnel and 12 were delivered to the regimental stockade pending further transfer. Two security patrols also performed by this unit were with negative contact.

Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo peninsula.

One patrol was performed by 4.2 Mortar Company with negative results.

One other patrol, performed by Anti-Tank Company, also returned with a report of negative contact.

c. Directives received during this period included: Div. Memo. No. 155-52: Maps, Tactical, Standard, Initial Distribution of; -- COMNAVFE INSTRUCTION 5720.2: Public Information Instructions;

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9 JUNE

a. Four security patrols were dispatched by subordinate units during this period. All returned with reports of negative contact. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 97, app. III)

b. 1st Battalion performed one patrol with negative contact.

Two patrols were performed by 2nd Battalion, also with negative contact.

3rd Battalion reverted to operational control of the 5th Marines at 2400 in anticipation of amphibious training exercises according to Division Training Order No. 11-52.

One patrol by Anti-Tank Company was performed with negative contact.

c. The Commanding Officer was absent from the command post during this period participating in Landing Exercise Number 1.

d. Directives received during this period included: Change No. 1 to Div. Memo. No. 137-52: Indigenous Civilian Labor Policy; -- Change No. 2 To Div. Memo. No. 35-52: CBR School; -- Change No. 1 to Div. Memo. No. 145-52: Effective Division Memoranda.

10 JUNE

A. Units of the regiment performed five patrols during this period in addition to the construction of defensive installation on the Kansas Line and schooling on combat subjects according to the training schedule. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 98, app. III)

b. Two patrols performed by First Battalion returned with reports of negative contact.

Second Battalion performed one patrol during this period with negative results.

Third Battalion was occupied during this period with carrying out Landing Exercise No. 1 according to Division Training Order Number 11-52.

One patrol dispatched from 4.2 Mortar Company performed with negative contact.

Anti-Tank Company performed one other patrol, also with negative contact.

c. The Commanding Officer remained absent

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from the command post directing the Third Battalion's Landing Exercise.

d. Directives received during this period included: Div. Memo. No. 156-52: Issue of and cashing of U.S. Government Checks by Disbursing Officer;--

11 June

a. All hands remained active with schooling, work on the Kansas Line, and security patrols during this period with the exception of Third Battalion which completed its Landing Exercise and returned to Kimpo Peninsula and operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment. (For routes of patrols accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 99, app. III)

b. First Battalion performed one patrol with negative contact.

Second Battalion performed two patrols with negative contact.

Third Battalion landed at Inchon at the completion of its amphibious landing exercise and was in position at its old command post by 21261 this evening.

Two patrols were performed by 4.2 Mortar Company with negative contact.

One patrol was performed by Anti-Tank Company with negative contact.

c. The Commanding Officer returned to the command post from the landing exercise at 2300.

d. Directives received during this date included: Div. Bulletin No. 39-52: Message by General Van Fleet;--

12 June

a. The Commanding Officer issued Operation Order No. 27-52 at 11311 today. Five security patrols were performed in the reserve area, all with negative contact. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 100, app. III)

b. One patrol performed in the 1st Battalion area during this period with negative results.

In the 2nd Battalion sector two security patrols performed, both with negative contact.

3rd Battalion returned to operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo Peninsula.

One patrol performed by 4.2 Mortar Company with negative results.

Anti-Tank Company performed one patrol, also with negative results.

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c. In the S-4 Section today, plans were made to facilitate the relief of the 1st Marines. Dispatches were sent to the 1st and 2nd Battalions ordering an exchange of certain weapons to equalize the table of equipment.

d. Directives received during this period included: Change No. 3 to Div. Training Memo. No. 4-52, 1st Marine Division Radio Operator's School.

13 JUNE

a. 5th Marines continued in division reserve performing four security patrols with negative contact and constructing defensive positions on the Kansas outpost line. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 101, app. III)

b. One patrol with negative results was performed by First Battalion.

In the 2nd Battalion area, two patrols performed, both with negative results.

3rd Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo peninsula.

One patrol by Anti-Tank Company also performed with negative contact.

c. The S-4 was arranging with the 1st Marines today for the transfer of tentage and other items of gear in order to simplify the forthcoming relief of lines.

d. The Commanding Officer visited the 1st Marines and 1st Battalion, 5th Marines command posts this morning and afternoon respectively.

e. Directives received this date included: Division Supply Bulletin No. 12-52, Quartermaster Information Letter No. 15; -- ALNAV 22 DTG 132021Z, Accounting for Naval Medical Stores; -- Div. Memo. No. 158-52, Division Basketball Tournament.

14 JUNE

a. In its last twenty-four hour period as division reserve, the 5th Marines continued work on the Kansas Line and prepared for the operations that would relieve the 1st Marines of responsibility for its portion of the Division sector. Four patrols were performed with negative contact. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 102, app. III)

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a. 1st Battalion performed one security patrol with negative contact.

Second Battalion's "D" Company came under temporary operational control of the 1st Marines shortly after midnight last night while elements of that regiment relieved our Widgeon Bridge security detail at 0830 this morning.

Third Battalion remained under operational control of the Kimpo Provisional Regiment on Kimpo Peninsula.

One patrol, also with negative contact, was performed by the 4.2 Mortar Company.

Anti-Tank Company discharged one 75mm Recoilless Gun Section to the control of the 1st Marines shortly after midnight last night while one Tank Section assumed positions in its new CP late this afternoon.

c. The Commanding General and the Assistant Division Commander visited the regimental CP for twenty minutes this morning.

d. Directives received during this date included: Div. Memo. 159-52, Generator Capabilities, Installation Requirements and Operating Instructions for Generators within this Division; -- Div. Bulletin No. 40-52 1st Marine Air Wing Band, play dates.

15 JUNE

a. Although responsibility for the Division's right sector would remain with the 1st Marines through this period, Operation Order Number 27-52 was promulgated today directing the movement of the regimental command post to its new position at 1900. Some subordinate units also began their movements to the new positions. Two security patrols were performed with negative results. (For routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 103, app. III)

b. 1st Battalion remained in its reserve position during this period, continued its security responsibilities and performed one patrol with negative contact.

2nd Battalion's "E" and "F" Companies joined "D" Company in the 1st Marines sector this morning and came under operational control of that regiment. The proposed relief of the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines at 1830 was temporarily delayed by the possibility of an enemy attack. "E" Company occupied a blocking position until the threat was past.

3rd Battalion began its move to the new sector early this morning, reverted to parent control at 0500 and, upon arrival in the 1st Marine reserve battalion area, came under operational control of that regiment. "G" Company became attached to 2nd

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Battalion at 1015 this morning.

The 4.2 Mortar Company remained in position and performed one patrol with negative contact.

Anti-Tank Company dispatched one section of 75mm recoilless guns to "D" Company under control of the 1st Marine and its Tank Platoon to the control of the 1st Tank Battalion at 1245 and 1805.

c. The Commanding Officer visited the 2nd and 3rd Battalions of the 1st Marine this afternoon, arriving at the new 5th Marines command post at 1800.

d. Directives received during this period included: Div. General Order No. 68, Ascom City Command; -

16 June

a. Responsibility for the Division's right sector during this period, along with operational control of First Battalion, 1st Marine pending their relief by this regiment's 1st Battalion, 4.2 Mortar Company. The Commanding Officer issued Operation Orders Nos. 28-52 and 29-52, Number 28-52 gave instructions for the planning size, equipment, and conduct of patrols. Number 29-52 ordered subordinate units to conduct fire team size reconnaissance patrols forward of the MLR. Seven outposts were performed with negative results. (For location of unit command posts and location of outposts, see overlays Number 1 and 2 accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 104 app. III)

b. At 0800 the 2nd Section of the 75mm Recoilless Gun Platoon of Anti-Tank Company was attached to First Battalion and by 1015, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines had relieved it of responsibility for the security of Honker and X-Ray Bridges and Devastate "C". Movement to the new area began 2030, the final elements arriving in the assembly area at 2230.

Second Battalion, its relief of Second Battalion 1st Marines temporarily postponed last night by the possibility of an enemy attack, began its relief 0200 this morning and by 0420 all companies were in position and responsibility for the area passed to the Commanding Officer of the Second Battalion, 5th Marines. Seven outposts performed with negative contact. One man was killed and two wounded after the hours of darkness by enemy 76mm Artillery fire.

Third Battalion reverted to parent control and assumed the mission of the regimental reserve at 0450 this morning. Supporting artillery fire accounted for three enemy wounded and two bunkers destroyed during this period.

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c. The S-2 Section reported today that the enemy units confronting the 5th Marines in this sector are the 1st Battalion, 559th Regiment, 187th Division, 63rd CCF Army and the 1st and 2nd Battalions of the 560th Regiment and the 2nd and 3rd Battalion of the 56th Regiment, 187th Division. These units are supported by four artillery battalions (approximately 4,160 men and 60 guns) of 75 and 76mm artillery pieces.

d. Brigadier General Bare arrived at the 5th Marines command post this morning for a short visit.

e. Directives recieved during this period included: Div. Memo. No. 160-52, Duties of Korean Service Corps Liason Section and administrative procedures for Korean Service Corps personnel attached to the 1st Marine Division; -- Div. Bulletin No. 41-52, Baseball League; -- Change No. 2 to Div. Memo. 139-52, Troop List.

17 JUNE

a. In its new mission defending line JAMESTOWN in the right portion of the division sector, the 5th Marines today performed eighteen listening posts, seven combat outposts, and six patrols, all with negative contact. At 1100 the Commanding Officer ordered the reserve Battalion to occupy blocking position 3 in rehearsal of the blocking and counterattack plan. (For positions of listening posts, combat outposts and routes of patrols, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 105, app; III)

b. After a postponement because of a Division warning of a possible enemy attack, the Commanding Officer ordered the final relief of the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines by 1st Battalion, 5th Marines shortly after midnight. This was accomplished by 0410 although 1st Battalion, 5th Marines assumed responsibility for the sector at 0240. Eleven listening posts and three patrols were performed with negative contact. This battalion suffered one man wounded by a friendly AP mine.

Second Battalion performed seven combat outposts, seven listening posts, and three patrols with one contact with an unknown number of enemy attacked a friendly position at 2208 using hand grenades and 60 and 82mm mortar fire. The friendlies returned with small arms, grenades, mortar and artillery fire resulting in one enemy killed and six wounded. Enemy broke contact at 0430 of the 18th. The battalion suffered four men wounded from enemy artillery fire during the twenty-four hour period.

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Third Battalion as the Regimental Reserve, occupied Blocking Position 3 starting at 1227 on the regimental commander's order and secured at 1500.

The 4.2 Mortar Company accounted for five enemy killed in fire missions which included support of Outpost York forward of the MLR.

Supporting artillery fire cause five enemy wounded and destroyed two enemy bunkers and damaged one.

c. The Intelligence Officer reported the apprehension of five Korean nationals in the reserve battalion area today and pointed out that recent enemy artillery fire to the rear of the regimental area accompanied by observed blinking flashlights brought out the possibility of enemy agents in this sector. Prisoners were living in a well-stocked position overlooking friendly positions. The prisoners were turned over to the CIC with a request for a thorough investigation by Division Intelligence Officers.

d. At 1600 the Commanding Officer ordered the command post local defense perimeter position laid out and fighting holes dug. The drill was secured at 1700.

e. Directives received during this period included: Change No. 2 to Div. Memo. No. 145-52, Effective Division Memoranda;-- Div. Training Order No. 12-52, Amphibious Training Exercise, MARLEX, conduct of;--

18 June

a. Four patrols, two ambushes, ten outposts, and eighteen listening posts performed by units of this regiment during the last twenty-four period resulted in several short contacts in both battalion areas while drawing considerable enemy mortar and artillery fire throughout the sector. (For routes of patrols, and positions of outposts, ambushes, and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 106, app III)

b. A First Battalion outpost, at 1000 this morning discovered a cache of 100 American and British hand grenades, several bayonets and a small quantity of small arms ammunition. The same party received light small arms fire later in the afternoon and returned to the main line of resistance at 1600 without casualties. In the only contact of the period, an ambush at 2100 fired on two enemy with unknown results. Moderate mortar and artillery fire caused four wounded in this battalion's sector. This unit's other ambush, three outposts, and eleven li-

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tening posts were performed with negative contact.

Activity in the Second Battalion area centered around a outpost where 67 rounds of 82mm mortar fire accounted for one man killed and eight wounded in the early morning hours. Two patrols dispatched to evacuate the casualties accomplished their mission by 0730 after several hand grenade engagements. One other outpost accounted for four enemy wounded with small arms fire. During the hours of darkness, a "D" Company patrol suffered three men wounded from anti-personnel mines. The remaining ambush, five outposts, and seven listening posts were performed with negative results.

Third Battalion continued its mission of the regiment's reserve battalion.

Supporting artillery and 4.2 mortars demolished two enemy bunkers and accounted for three wounded and five estimated wounded.

c. Lt. Col. Potter arrived at the regimental command post this morning to inspect H&S, 4.2 Mortar, and Anti-Tank Companies. He departed at noon.

d. Directives received this date included: Div. Bulletin No. 43-52, USO Camp Show No. 1028;-- Div bulletin No. 44-52, Band Concerts, request for;-- CG's Memo. 12-6/1, Cold weather Operations Information, request for;--

19 June

a. The Commanding Officer issued Operation Number 32-52, which assigned the patrols for the period 21 to 25 June. Four patrols, three ambushes, ten outposts, and seventeen listening posts performed with one contact. (For routes of patrols, and positions of outposts, ambushes and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No.107, app. III.)

b. First Battalion received 60mm mortar and small arms fire on two of its three outposts during this period. Neither group received casualties. This battalion's 81mm mortars fired 114 rounds in harrasing and interdiction fire during the period.

Activity in the Second Battalion area centered around an "F" Company outpost where, at 0035, an unknown number of enemy approaching the position were fired on, causing one estimated killed and several estimated wounded. An effort by friendlies to capture enemy wounded was without avail. This outpost wounded one other enemy later in the afternoon. This unit's other six outposts, two ambushes, one patrol, and five listening posts were with negative contact. The 81mm mortar platoon killed one enemy and wounded three during the night.

The Third Battalion continued security patrols and missions of the regimental reserve battalion.

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c. Intelligence reported that items found by a Third Battalion security patrol included: (1) a copy of the Division Shackle code for 9,10,14,15 June; (2) a booby trapped bunker in an area where blinking lights had been observed frequently; and (3) a dead oriental soldier with several stick grenades and ammunition belt containing 196 rounds. The S-2 Section stated that there is no question that CCF and any other unfriendly elements behind our MLR are armed. The possibility also exists that the entire code for June has been compromised.

d. The Commanding Officer departed the command post at 0845 to visit the First Battalion, returning early in the afternoon.

e. Directives received during this period included: CG's Memo Ser:16673, Division Recreation Council, appointment of;-- CG's Memo SerL 16675, Enlisted Recreation Committee, appointment of;-- Addendum No. 1 to Div. Memo. No. 110-52, Care, Preservation and Reporting of Captured Enemy Material;--CG's Memo Ser: 16674, Marine Corps Exchange Council, appointment of;--CG's Memo Ser:16674, Unserviceable and unsightly clothing, wearing of;--Div. Memo. No. 163-52, Missing Government Property;-- Div. Memo. No. 164-52, Rotation of duty of unrestricted officers within the Division ;-- Div. Memo. No. 165-52, Payment Procedures;-- ALPACFLT448 DTG190243Z, classification of Pacific shipping information;--

20 June

a. Light contact in two battalions was a result of six patrols, two ambushes, ten outposts, and twenty-two listening posts performed during the period. ( For routes of patrols and positions of ambushes, listening posts, and outposts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit No. 108, app. III, )

b. Two patrols, three outposts and twelve listening posts performed in the First Battalion area with the following reports: At 1020 a friendly patrol detonated an antipersonnel mine resulting in one friendly wounded; At 2230 a listening post engaged an unknown number of enemy with small arms fire. This resulted in no friendly casualties and no known enemy casualties.

Enemy attention to two Second Battalion outposts was the highlight of activity in that sector. At 0830 one outpost silenced enemy small arms and automatic weapons fire by calling in 4.2 mortar fire. Another outpost manned by this unit accounted for four enemy wounded during an enemy probe on this position. The enemy used 60mm mortar fire to cover the

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recovery of its casualties. The remaining five other outposts, four patrols, two ambushes, and ten listening posts were performed with negative contact.

Third Battalion continued as regimental reserve.

c. The regiment received light artillery and mortar fire during this period.

d. The S-3 and S-4 along with subordinate S-4's were at I Corps CP during this period to witness an airlift demonstration.

e. Directives received during this period included: CG's Memo. Ser.:16816, Roster of Staff Non-Commissioned Officers; -- ALMAR DTG 201530Z, Promotional Cutting Scores.

21 JUNE

a. One heavy contact in the Second Battalion area during the period was one result of the seven patrols, three ambushes, ten outposts and nineteen listening posts performed by units of the 5th Marines. (For routes of patrols and positions of ambushes, outposts and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 109, app. III)

b. All of 1st Battalion's three outposts, one patrol and one ambush were with negative contact. Both 60mm and 81mm mortars fired a total of 63 rounds during the period. "G" Company of the 2nd Battalion had one ambush engaged by an estimated platoon of the enemy at 2145 tonight forcing the ambush to withdraw to a friendly outpost. The intensity of enemy fire and the nature of the terrain, however, caused the group to be separated as fourteen of the sixteen-man party were wounded. A patrol sent out from the main line of resistance succeeded in evacuating all casualties. This battalion's other six outposts, six patrols, two ambushes and seven listening posts were with negative contact. This unit's 81mm mortars accounted for two estimated enemy killed during a fire mission on an active machine gun.

3rd Battalion continued its security patrols and the missions of the regimental reserve battalion.

c. The S-2 Section reported the apprehension of one Korean civilian observing the construction of field fortifications in the 3rd Battalion area. He was turned over to CIC along with one KSC who was discovered listening to a platoon commander brief his squad leaders on a secret operation.

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It was requested that he be investigated thoroughly.

d. Colonel Culhane departed the command post this morning to visit the 2nd Battalion area, returning shortly before noon.

e. Directives received during this period included: Addendum No. 1 to Division Memorandum No 129-52: Support of assigned or attached Korean personnel and furnishing of rations to prisoners of war; -- Div. Memo. No. 166-52: Return of the 18th Rotation Draft to the United States; Division Bulletin No. 45-52, Engagement Stars for the Korean Service Ribbon; -- CG's Memo Ser:16839, Covenant with Korean Nationals.

22 JUNE

a. The execution of Operation Sleeper (33-52) which provided for the recovery of the body of a friendly belong to the 1st Marines from a point well forward of the main line of resistance, was accomplished during this period, as were ten patrols, five ambushes, ten outposts and nineteen listening posts. (For routes of patrols and positions of ambushes, listening posts, and outposts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 110, app. III)

b. Two patrols, three ambushes, three outposts and twelve listening posts performed in the 1st Battalion with one contact at 2200 tonight. A friendly listening post threw one grenade at a small group of enemy and withdrew to the main line of resistance. This unit suffered one man killed and one wounded by enemy artillery and a booby trap respectively.

c. Although eight patrols, two ambushes, seven outposts and seven listening posts were performed in the 2nd Battalion area, the successful execution of Operation Sleeper was the most noteworthy incident. At 0415 this morning a patrol from "E" Company crossed the line of departure and, supported by Air, Mortars and Artillery, after its discovery by the enemy, reached its objective at 0546 and removed the remains of the friendly. Shortly thereafter, an estimated 55 enemy were sighted when a machine gun commenced firing on the patrol. This was silenced by a friendly heavy machine gun and the withdrawal begun using grenades, small arms, automatic, machine guns, mortars and artillery.

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The firefight ended at 0650 with the patrol closing the main line of resistance fifteen minutes later. Enemy casualties were estimated at 20 killed, and 15 wounded. Friendlies suffered one man killed and one wounded.

Third Battalion continued in the mission of the regiment's reserve battalion. At 0415 "I" Company went in a blocking position to cover "E" Company's activity.

c. The regiment received moderate artillery fire.

d. Captain Taylor, USN, arrived at the regimental command post for a visit at 1530.

e. Directives received this date: none.

23 June

a. Two patrols, three ambushes, ten outposts, and twenty listening posts were performed in the 5th Marines area of responsibility during the period with the enemy activity centering on a Second Battalion ambush. (For routes of patrols and positions of ambushes, outposts, and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 111. app. III.)

b. 1st Battalion executed two patrols, one ambush, three outposts, and thirteen listening posts, all with negative contact except for 15 rounds of mixed 60 and 82mm mortar rounds landing on an outpost between 0915 and 1205.

Six patrols, two ambushes, seven outposts, and seven listening posts were performed in the 2nd Battalion area with two <sup>wish</sup> enemy contacts. A five minute fire fight on the outpost Yoke resulted in the enemy withdrawing. No friendly casualties were incurred and no known enemy casualties. At 2245 tonight approximately sixty enemy approached small "F" Company ambush and friendlies engaged them in a fire fight employing small arms, automatic weapons and grenades. Both sides withdrew after fifteen minutes. The enemy had suffered two counted killed, five estimated killed, and twenty estimated wounded. Friendly casualties were three men wounded, of which two were evacuated by helicopter from outpost Yoke under cover of smoke.

3rd Battalion continued its missions as the regimental reserve battalion.

Supporting 4.2 Mortar and artillery fire during this period accounted for seven enemy killed, two estimated killed, and five wounded.

c. The S-2 made the report today that enemy combat efficiency is excellent and morale is considered good.

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"Indications are that the enemy will continue to defend his present positions; however, the enemy is capable of attacking at anytime with 18 infantry battalions supported by four artillery battalions. The enemy will conduct limited probes of our lines and initiate raids in order to capture prisoners, disrupt communications, and provide cover for infiltrators.

d. The S-4 reported today that the shower unit was forced to move from the Second Battalion area because of lack of water.

e. Brigadier General Bare arrived at the regiment and was accompanied by the Commanding Officer on a visit to the main line of resistance and observation posts of "A", "E", and "G" Companies.

f. Directive received this date include:  
Change No. to Div Memo. No. 133-52. Rotation Drafts departing the First Marine Division.

24 June

a. During this period the regiment's two MLR battalions performed a total of twelve patrols, three ambushes, ten outposts, and twenty listening posts with heavy contact in the 2nd Battalion area. (For routes of patrols and positions of ambushes, outposts, and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 112, app. III)

b. First Battalion performed five patrols, one ambush, three outposts and twelve listening posts, the only consequence being twenty round of mixed mortar fire which fell on patrol. Members withdrew to a friendly outpost without casualties. This battalion's 81mm mortars fired thirty-two rounds at enemy mortars and troops. Result: area well covered, casualties undetermined.

Seven patrols, two ambushes, seven outposts, and eight listening posts were performed by 2nd Battalion, all with negative contact. One man was wounded by one round of 76mm artillery fire. The major activity took place on outpost Yoke which was manned by thirty-four members of "F" Company. When attacked and surrounded on three sides by an enemy estimated at battalion size, the small group was forced to withdraw to the bunkers on the reverse slope of the outpost where both a defensive box barrage and VT fused fire on the position was called in.

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The seige began at 2205 and continued with only brief interruptions until 0500 on the morning of the 25th when the enemy withdrew with 12 counted killed, 50 more estimated killed, and 100 estimated wounded. During this period 1,918 rounds of mixed mortar and artillery fire fell in the sector. Friendlies suffered nine killed with every other member of the outpost being wounded. All casualties were successfully evacuated at dawn and the outpost reoccupied with fresh troops.

3rd Battalion continued its mission of the regiment's reserve battalion.

c. An interpreter with a loudspeaker was used in the 2nd Battalion sector today in an attempt to induce the surrender of three enemy who were sighted about 700 yards in front of the main line of resistance. The attempt was unsuccessful and the Intelligence Section drew the following possible conclusions: (1) the enemy may have been used as a lure; and (2) the enemy may have been trying to obtain a closer look at our main line of resistance position and reconnoiter avenues of approach on preparation for his attack on Yoke.

d. The regimental ordnance officer today made a complete survey of the unit's needs in weapons and ammunition.

e. Directives received during this period included: Div. Memo. No. 172-52, Personal effects stored in Ascom City, individual recovery of;--

25 June

a. Eight patrols, one ambush, ten outposts, and twenty listening posts were performed with negative contact in the regimental area during this period. (For routes of patrols, and position of ambush, outposts, and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 113, app. III.)

b. In the 1st Battalion one patrol, one ambush, three outposts, and twelve listening posts were the only activity being ineffective machine gun fire delivered on the patrol as it returned to the main line of resistance. One round of enemy 82mm mortar fire caused one man wounded at 1830.

2nd Battalion performed seven outposts, and eight listening posts, and seven patrols with negative contact, exclusive on last night's activity on outpost Yoke. At 1655 an enemy 82mm mortar round wounded two Marines and one KSC.

3rd Battalion continued its mission as the regiment's reserve battalion with the exception "I" Company which was released to the control of 2nd Battalion from 0300 until

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1901 for the support of "F" Company.

Rockets from the 11th Marines fired 288 rounds at enemy troops early this morning and forward observers reported the area well covered.

Supporting artillery during this period killed seven enemy, wounded eleven, verified and another 79 estimated. Two bunkers were destroyed and three damaged.

Three air strikes in front of outpost YOKE today expended eight 1,000 lb. bombs, forty-eight 250 lb. bombs, 125 100-lb. bombs, nineteen rockets, sixteen napalm bombs, and over 7,000 rounds of 20mm ammunition to destroy sixteen bunkers, damage seven, destroy six mortars, two possible gun positions, three automatic weapons and 900 feet of trench line.

c. Although outpost YOKE reported that the enemy had used tear gas in its attack last night, the S-2 Intelligence Report issued today concluded that, in spite of the fact that hostiles had carried and worn gas masks, the only fumes present were from white phosphorous.

d. The S-4 arranged for enough barbed wire and bunker materials to rebuild the defenses on outpost YOKE.

e. Major General Selden arrived at the 5th Marines for a twenty minute visit this morning before visiting the "F" Company command post.

f. Directives received during this period included: Div. Memo. No. 173-52, Classification of Addendum #1 to Div. Memo. No. 129-52.

26 JUNE

a. seven patrols, one ambush, ten outposts, and nineteen listening posts were performed during this period with light contact. (For routes of patrols, and positions of ambushes, outposts and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 114, app. III)

b. 1st Battalion performed one patrol, one ambush, three outposts, and twelve listening posts, all with negative contact. One man was wounded by a round of 122mm artillery fire. This unit's 81mm mortar fire damaged two bunkers.

Six patrols, seven outposts, and seven listening posts were performed by 2nd Battalion, the only contact at outpost X-ray where friendlies killed one enemy and wounded one other with small arms.

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Supporting artillery today killed three enemy and wounded eight. Another five were estimated to be wounded.

c. Colonel Culhane departed the command post at 1430 to visit the 2nd Battalion. He returned at 1715.

d. Directives received during this period included: CG's letter A14-2, Enemy material, destruction, capture and reporting of.

27 JUNE

a. Five patrols, one ambush, ten outposts, and nineteen listening posts were performed with negative contact. Twenty casualties were caused by mines and booby traps. (For routes of patrols and position of ambush, outposts and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 115, app. III)

1st Battalion's three outposts, one ambush, twelve listening posts were with negative contact although five men were wounded from detonating mines.

In the 2nd Battalion seven outposts, four patrols, and seven listening posts performed with negative contact. One officer was killed and fourteen men were wounded (eight of them not seriously enough to be evacuated) by mines and booby traps placed on outpost YOKE during the night. The men were forced into the trapped bunkers by enemy mortar and artillery fire. Engineers were called to clear the position. One man was later wounded on the same outpost in the afternoon by 82mm mortar fire.

Third battalion continued in its mission as the regiment's reserve battalion.

4.2 Mortar fire killed six enemy during the period.

Supporting artillery, firing at 76mm positions, killed ten enemy and wounded ten more.

c. Major General Selden and Colonel Honsowitz arrived at the command post at 0955 and departed at 1020.

d. During this period 2nd Lt. Detrio, the Food Director, arranged for more fruits and juices to be supplied to the battalions on line.

e. Directives received during this period, none.

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28 JUNE

a. The Commanding Officer issued Operation Plan 9-52 which has as its mission the continued defense of Line Jamestown and the seizure of critical terrain forward of the main line of resistance to deny its use to the enemy and to protect the MLR. Thirteen patrols, two ambushes, ten outposts and nineteen listening posts were performed during this period with negative contact. (For routes of patrols, positions of ambushes, outposts, and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 116-52, app. III)

b. 1st Battalion performed one patrol, one ambush, three outposts and seven listening posts with negative contact.

2nd Battalion performed nine patrols, one ambush and seven outposts and seven listening posts with negative contact.

3rd Battalion performed three security patrols with negative contact and continued in its mission as the regiment's reserve battalion.

Supporting artillery killed six enemy during this period.

c. Enemy artillery and mortar fire was described as "moderate".

d. Colonel Culhane departed the command post this morning to visit the 1st and 2nd Battalion CP's.

29 JUNE

a. Twelve patrols, two ambushes, ten outposts, and nineteen listening posts performed during this period with light contact. (For routes of patrols, positions of ambushes, outposts and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 117, app. III)

b. One patrol, one ambush, three outposts, and twelve listening posts performed by the 1st Battalion. Shortly after noon outpost QUEEN received 50 rounds of .50 calibre machine gun fire. Friendlies expended 200 rounds of light machine gun return fire with unknown results. All other activity was with negative contact.

2nd Battalion performed eight patrols, one ambush, seven outposts and seven listening posts. At noon outpost X-RAY received sniper fire from an unknown source causing one friendly wounded.

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3rd Battalion performed three patrols with negative contact and continued in the mission of the regiment's reserve battalion.

4.2 Mortars killed five enemy and wounded two during the period. Another five were estimated killed.

c. Major General Selden and Colonel Honsowitz arrived at the command post and departed with Colonel Culhane to visit the 1st Commonwealth Division.

30 JUNE

a. Eleven patrols, four ambushes, ten outposts, and nineteen listening posts performed in the regimental area of responsibility during the period with one contact. (For routes of patrols and positions of ambushes, outposts, and listening posts, see overlay accompanying S-3 Unit Report No. 118, app.III)

b. 1st Battalion performed three patrols, four ambushes and three outposts, and twelve listening posts with negative contact.

In the 2nd battalion, a "G" Company patrol contacted four enemy working at 0755. Friendlies opened fire with small arms and grenades and withdrew twenty minutes later with one man wounded because of sniper fire from another point. The enemy suffered four men killed. At 0820, friendlies on outpost YOKE observed four enemy setting up a machine gun and killed two of them with small arms fire.

3rd Battalion continued the mission of the regiment's reserve battalion.

Supporting artillery killed one enemy and wounded three during the period with another three estimated wounded.

c. The S-2 Intelligence report today stated that the enemy combat efficiency is excellent and morale is considered good.





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

NUMBER.....46) : SOP For Operations and Training Section

1. PURPOSE

a. The purpose of this standing operating procedure is to prescribe the mission, individual duties, and operation of the Operations and Training Section.

2. MISSION

a. The Operations and Training Section is charged with those functions of the staff which relate to organization, training, troop movements and combat operations. It is responsible for tactical and training inspections as directed by the Commander.

b. Detailed missions of the section are prescribed in Chapter 2, Staff Manual, 1948, NAVMC 1022-DPP.

3. DUTIES

Duties of members of the S-3 Section are set forth in the following paragraphs.

a. Operations Officer (S-3):

He will formulate plans and orders for approval of the Commanding Officer and carry out the appropriate specific duties as set forth in paragraph 219, Staff Manual, 1948. He will detail the various assistants so as to remain free of minor details insofar as practicable in order that he may concern himself primarily with the overall tactical situation. He will keep the Commanding Officer and the Executive Officer informed of the tactical situation and changes thereto at all times.

b. Assistant Operations Officer:

(1) The Assistant Operations Officer will perform the following functions:

(a) Assist the Operations Officer in the preparation of plans and orders and in other necessary operations work that occurs.

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ANNEX C TO REGIMENTAL GENERAL ORDER NO. 46CONT'D  
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(b) Oversee the enlisted personnel in conjunction with the Senior NCO of the section.

(c) Insure that the S-3 Section is informed of the location of Supporting Arms Officers at all times.

(d) Take charge of the rear echelon of the section during displacements.

(e) Assume the duties of the S-3 whenever that officer is absent and will be present in the Command Post during such absences.

(2) The Assistant Operations Officer will be concerned with training in conjunction with his other duties. At the direction of the S-3 he may be required to prepare plans and orders for the training of personnel within the regiment. In this connection, he will insure that directives of higher headquarters are complied with and that training accomplished is adequate. He will witness as much of the training program as his other duties will permit and recommend to the S-3 such additional training as seems necessary. He will insure that the prescribed training syllabus is being observed.

(3) The Assistant Operations Officer will closely supervise the routine functioning of the operations section and will keep himself informed of the situation at all times. He will make (frequent) checks of the "Action" and "Info" boards, the telephone message log and the rough journal to insure prompt action is being taken and that proper records are being maintained. He will insure that the prescribed periodic and spot reports are being made and received, and will be prepared to brief the S-3 and other officers at any time. He will check the smooth journal for accuracy and completeness.

c. Chemical and Radiological Warfare Safety Officer:

(1) This officer's primary duties are to keep the Commanding Officer informed of all CBR information. He will work in close harmony with Battalion Chemical and Radiological Warfare Safety Officers and ascertain that CBR defense is in conformance with existing directives, and will insure that continuous instruction in CBR defense is carried out consistent with the tactical situation.

(2) At those times when his primary duties do not require his presence or immediate attention, the Chemical and Radiological Safety Officer will assist the Assistant S-3 as required and directed. Additional assigned duties will not, however, be such as to interfere with his primary duties in Chemical-Radiological Warfare and Defense. This officer will keep himself informed at all times

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of the tactical situation so that he may immediately assume the duties of Assistant S-3 when required. He will be the representative of the S-3 Section in the Regimental Quartering Party and carry out the duties prescribed in this connection.

d. Operations Chief:

The Operations Chief, as senior non-commissioned officer of the section, will supervise the functioning of the enlisted personnell of the section and will detail the work to those concerned. He will keep the rough journal, and all correspondence (dispatches, letters, memoranda, etc.) will pass through his hands prior to delivery. He will insure that all correspondence originating from this section is properly prepared. He will insure that the Assistant S-3 receives all incoming and outgoing correspondence, and will keep close check on the "Action" and "Info" boards, and the telephone message record. He will be prepared at all times to assist the Assistant S-3 when required, and will be prepared to furnish that officer with all information of what transpired during his absences from the Command Post. He will prepare the Daily Operations Report, and any other such report as required.

e. Chemical Warfare and Radiological Safety NCO

This individual will assist the Chemical Warfare and Radiological Safety Officer as that officer directs. As the situation dictates, but not to the detriment of his primary duties, he will assist the Operations Chief as directed. He will assume the Operations Assistant's duties when required, and will be responsible for the proper pitching and striking of the S-3 Work Tent.

f. Operations Assistant (Sgt)

The Operations Assistant (Sgt) will man the telephone continuously except at such times stipulated by the Operations Chief, in which case he may be relieved by available personnel. He will keep a log of all incoming and outgoing telephone messages, and will refer all incoming messages to the watch officer for necessary action.

g. Topographic Draftsman

The draftsman will be responsible for the production of overlays and any other such duties that may be assigned. He will see that the S-3 Situation Map and the Commanding Officer's map are kept up to date.

**3. OPERATING PROCEDURE**a. Records

Only such information is extracted and recorded as is necessary to identify the source. Incidents are recorded as they occur. The detailed treatment of various types of source material for the journal is discussed below.

(2) Telephone Message Form - On such form as may be prescribed, a written record of all important telephone messages, both incoming and outgoing, is kept. In the case of messages of considerable importance it is preferable to keep a verbatim copy of the conversation. In all cases the names of both parties to the conversation and the time of delivery or receipt, should be recorded. The need for neatness and legibility in this record cannot be overemphasized. Such of these telephone messages as are considered important are recorded in the journal. All such messages are filed in a telephone message journal.

(3) "Action" Board - The action board is a clip board or suitable container wherein are kept all current dispatches requiring action by the S-3.

(4) "Info" Board - The info board is similar to the action board except that only current dispatches which are of information value to the S-3 are kept therein.

(5) Files - Files are maintained with material separated by subject matter and originator.



1. PURPOSE

a. The purpose of this standing operating procedure is to pre-  
 scribe the mission, individual duties, and operation of the Opera-  
 tions and Training Section.

2. MISSION

a. The Operations and Training Section is charged with those  
 functions of the staff which relate to organization, training,

c. Chemical and Radiological Warfare Safety Officer:

(1) This officer's primary duties are to keep the Commanding Officer informed of all CBR information. He will work in close harmony with Battalion Chemical and Radiological Warfare Safety Officers and ascertain that CBR defense is in conformance with existing directives, and will insure that continuous instruction in CBR defense is carried out consistent with the tactical situation.

(2) At those times when his primary duties do not require his presence or immediate attention, the Chemical and Radiological Safety Officer will assist the Assistant S-3 as required and directed. Additional assigned duties will not, however, be such as to interfere with his primary duties in Chemical-Radiological Warfare and Defense. This officer will keep himself informed at all times



G-2 was informed of this incident. G-2 was requested to insure that CIC conduct a thorough investigation and interrogation of the prisoners, particularly in view of the following facts:

- (1) Prisoners were captured north of the Imjin.
- (2) Artillery fire (9 rounds 76mm) had been received during a ten (10) minute period immediately preceding the capture. Artillery fell in vicinity of tank positions.
- (3) Enemy radio traffic, at a very rapid rate, was heard over the 3/5 SCR 300 an instant after the capture.
- (4) A few minutes after the capture more enemy artillery (11 rounds 76mm) were received in the same sector, on line with but about 1,000 meters above the tank position, and enemy mortar fire (11 rounds 82mm) were received about 500 meters above the tank positions.
- (5) Prisoners were located in vicinity minefields (will be checked by 3/5 to determine if mines have been disarmed, booby trapped or tampered with in any way).
- (6) Prisoners were located on reverse slope of a hill (elevation over 100 meters) affording observation north and south of the Imjin.
- (7) Blinking lights (presumably flares) have been observed south of the IMJIN (5 June 52).
- (8) In the vicinity of area where blinking lights were observed an NK officer and two (2) Chinese were seen (31 May 52).
- (9) Accurate high caliber artillery fire has been placed on a FA battery (15 June 52). This fire was on line with location of prisoners and artillery fire mentioned in paragraphs (2) and (4), above.
- (10) Facts and suspicious circumstances surrounding incidents described above: in view of fact that enemy TLO's should be presumed to be in our sector, more so because of enemy's lack of aerial observation and necessity for observation.
- (11) Friendly TLO's have succeeded in penetrating our OPLR and MLR, reaching regimental rear areas without detection or interference.
- (12) All KSC personnel cannot be presumed to be friendly.
- (13) Movements and activities of enemy TLO's and KSC personnel can and may be factors contributing to: enemy attempts, and successes, in placing accurate and near accurate fire on friendly installations, compromise of pass words and shackle codes.



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(14) Lack of maximum security placed on KSG camps, especially during hours of darkness, to limit their activity within confines of camp.

(15) Other incidents indicative of enemy activity well behind the MLR: estimated 5 enemy firing small arms vicinity "B" battery (5 June 52) and two (2) hand grenades thrown in Devistate "C" camp (6 June 52) and incidents mentioned in (7) and (8) above.

"The enemy was equipped with gas masks (Japanese style) and the assault group which approached the command post bunkers wore these, extra changes of clothing, a roll of food...."

The above was reported by the Second Battalion.

COMMENT: Inquiry conducted by this headquarters does not lead to the conclusion that "tear gas" was in fact employed by the enemy. Among the enemy items submitted to division was a burned out grenade canister which proved to be the remains of a WP grenade. This item was found on the reverse slope of the outpost, approaching the command post bunker where, as per the above report, the "gas grenade" was thrown.

Friendlys who were on the outpost asserted:

- (1) The enemy wore gas masks during two (2) assaults.
- (2) "Tear gas" grenades followed concussion grenades.

However, there was no report or evidence that the friendlys were adversely affected, any more than they would have been affected by battle smoke. The considerable amount of friendly and enemy fire falling in and around the area certainly produced noxious smoke and fumes. Notwithstanding the fact that this was the first instance in which the enemy carried, or wore, gas masks and pending the results of any further investigation, it cannot be categorically stated that the enemy employed "tear gas".

As for the "extra change of clothing and a roll of food," an apparent conclusion can be drawn that the enemy came to our outpost to stay. He has indicated this desire and intention for quite some time. He certainly retains the capability of attacking in our sector with sizable forces supported by considerable artillery and mortar units.
