THE Western Australian Government Railways Commission, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon it by section 23 of the Government Railways Act, 1904-1959, doth hereby make the following by-laws, to come into operation on the 1st day of September, 1960.

By-laws

- 1. In these by-laws, the Rates, Classifications and General Conditions for the Conveyance of Merchandise and Livestock and the Jetty Regulations, Wharfage Rates and Berthage Dues published as by-law 55 of the Railways By-laws in the Government Gazette on the 27th April, 1951, is referred to as the principal by-law.
- 2. The principal by-law is amended by substituting for the Schedule thereto the following Schedule.

THE MIDLAND RAILWAY COMPANY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA LTD.

The sclaes of charges and the conditions regulating the several matters set forth in the schedule hereto, which by virtue of the Midland Railway Company's Statutory Concession dated 27th day of February, 1886, the Company is empowered to fix and make, shall be those specified in the schedule hereto.

METHOD OF COMPUTATION OF CHARGES FOR GOODS AND LIVESTOCK TRAFFIC HAULED TO, FROM OR VIA THE MIDLAND RAILWAY

1. "Through.. Traffic. (Between Government and Midland Railway stations and sidings) =

Midland Railway:

Freight calculated as for a separate system.

Government ==

Freight calculated on a proportionate throughout mileage basis, with a minimum of 6d. for goods traffic and 10s. for livestock traffic. Where the combined Government and Midland Railway charge is less than the charge on the throughout basis, this shall be maintained and the Government proportion increased accordingly.

2. "Via" Traffic. (From one Government station or siding to another Government station or siding via the Midland Railway)=

Freight calculated as for haulage entirely over the Government line.

- 3. Maximum Charges.—The maximum charge of 4s. 6d. per case or bag prescribed for fruit, tomatoes and vegetables shall be apportioned on a mileage basis thether for "through" or "via" traffic, the minimum Government or Midland Railway charge being sixpence. The maximum of £5 prescribed for "out of gauge" loading in Clause 18 (b) shall be equally divided between the Government and Midland Railway.
- 4. Company's Traffic.—Traffic consigned to the Midland Railway Company shall be freighted on Government lines at the rates shown in Tariff 2 for the appropriate mileage either to Midland Junction or to Walkaway as the case may be.

Wherever in the Goods Rates Book the following terms are used, they shall have the meaning prescribed in the definition or interpretation shown hereunder in respect of each term:—

CLASSIFICATION	••••	The Schedule in this book specifying the various kinds and descriptions of goods and the classes in which they are placed.

TARIFF 1

Effective on and from 1st September, 1960

GENERAL CONDITIONS

Regulating the

CONVEYANCE OF GOODS

1. CONDITIONS TO BE ADHERED TO

All traffic is carried subject to the Government Railways Act, 1904–1953 and the By-laws published by the Commission.

2. NON-LIABILITY OF THE COMMISSION

- (a) The Commission shall not be liable for the loss of or injury to any goods or articles or property of the description following, that is to say :- *Gold and Silver Coin, or any *Gold or Silver in a manufactured or unmanufactured state, or any *Previous Stones, *Jewellery, Watches, Clocks or Timepieces of any description, *Trinkets, *Bills, *Bank Notes, *Orders, *Notes or Securities for the payment of money, *Stamps, Maps, Writings, *Title Deeds, Paintings, Engravings, Pictures, *Gold or Silver Plate or Plated Articles, Glass, China, Silks in manufactured or unmanufactured state, and whether wrought up or not wrought up with other material, Furs or Lace, or any of them which shall have been delivered, either to be carried for hire or to accompany the person of any passenger, when the value of such goods shall exceed the sum of ten pounds, in respect of any parcel or package unless at the time of delivery thereof to the person authorised to receive the same to be carried on the railway, or in case the same accompanies the person of any passenger, before such person commences his journey on the railway, the nature and value of such goods shall have been declared in writing by the person sending or delivering or accompanying the same, and the increased charges hereunder set forth (which are in addition to freight charges) shall have been paid and receipt given for the same.
- (b) The following are the increased rates to be paid on the said articles (which must be properly protected) the amount to be prepaid upon consignment of the goods:—

- (c) In the event of any such consignment tendered for insurance consisting of more packages than one, the description and value of each package shall be declared separately, but the charge for insurance shall be upon the aggregate value of the whole number of packages. The Commission reserves the right of sending a representative to be present at the unpacking of insured articles.
- (d) The above rates are applicable to Intersystem as well as Local Traffic. For intersystem consignments the charge shall be computed on the total through mileage and divided on a mileage basis between the Systems concerned.
 - * See also Clause 25, Page 20.

3. THE COMMISSION SHALL NOT WITHOUT NEGLIGENCE ON ITS PART BE RESPONSIBLE FOR

- (a) Loss or misdelivery of any goods improperly or insufficiently marked, directed, or described, nor for loss of or damage to any goods which the Commission or its employees may consider to be insufficiently or improperly packed or secured; nor shall it be responsible for any loss or damage occurring to goods consisting of a variety of articles in the same package liable by breakage to damage each other or other articles, or arising from leakage due to bad vessels or bad cooperage or to fermentation.
- (b) Nor for damage to any articles of a fragile or brittle nature, such as marble ornaments or statuary, musical instruments, furniture, or toys, which are more than ordinarily hazardous, unless they shall be declared in writing and properly packed and protected. Fragile articles simply covered with canvas, or in frail skeleton frames, shall be treated as unprotected. Except where otherwise specified, goods protected exclusively by paper wrapping shall be accepted only at the Owner's risk.
- (c) Nor for loss of or damage to fruit, fish, flowers, meat, poultry, game, live birds, frozen and chilled products, dairy produce, vegetables, ice and all other perishable articles whatsoever arising from the perishable nature of such articles or from the same not being taken away forthwith on arrival at the destination station.
- (d) Nor for any loss of market, or for any indirect or consequential damages in respect of freight lost, damaged or delayed.
- (e) Nor for the quantity or condition of goods loaded by sender or unloaded by consignee.
- (f) Nor for any loss arising from delay in the delivery of goods which may have been occasioned by flood, storm, tempest, or other unforeseen cause.

The Commission does not guarantee, under any circumstances, the arrival or delivery of any goods (perishable or otherwise) at any particular time, by any particular train or for any particular market; neither does it undertake to advise consignees of the arrival of goods.

- (g) Nor for any loss of or injury to any articles, goods, or things put into wrappers, boxes, packages, cases, or baskets marked, described, returned, delivered, or represented as "Empties."
- (h) Nor for goods to which the provisions of Clause 36 of this Schedule apply and which are not packed in conformity with that clause.

4. CARRIAGE OF GOODS AT OWNER'S OR COMMISSION'S RISK

- (a) The Commission shall not, under any circumstances, accept for conveyance at its risk, any goods specified in this Schedule as being carried at Owner's risk only.
- (b) Subject to Clauses 2 and 3 of this Schedule and to the provisions of this Clause, goods shall only be carried at the risk of the Commission—
 - (i) where tendered for transit in good order and condition and the packing and protection is to the satisfaction of the Commission as prescribed Clause 36 and as defined by packing symbols in the General Classification of Goods, pages 29 to 50; and
 - (ii) where goods are checked at the forwarding and receiving stations by employees of the Commission and the appropriate charges paid.
- (c) All goods, other than those conveyed in accordance with sub-paragraphs (i) and (ii) of paragraph (b) hereof, shall be accepted for carriage at the Owner's risk whereby the sender agrees to relieve the Commission from all liability in respect of loss, detention, injury, delay or damage whether such loss, detention, injury, delay or damage except upon proof that such loss, detention, injury, delay or damage arose from the wilful misconduct of the Commission or its employees.
- (d) Where goods are carried under special contract the conditions of carriage as specified in the contract shall have application.
- (e) Notwithstanding for foregoing provisions of this Clause, the Commission may, in the event of loss, detention, injury, delay or damage to goods accepted for carriage at Owner's risk, agree to accept such liability for that event as the Commission may, in the circumstances and at the time, determine.
- (f) For liability in regard to goods stored, the provisions of Clause 33 of this Schedule apply.

5. CLAIMS

(a) Claims for detention or loss of, or damage to, goods shall not be allowed unless lodged in writing at the office of the Commission, Commercial Agent, or with Station-masters and Goods Agents within fourteen days after the date on which such goods were, or should have been delivered, and no claim shall be allowed if lodged after the goods alleged to have been damaged have been removed from railway premises, and a clean receipt given.

(b) Nothing in this Clause affects the operation of paragraph (e) of Clause 4 of this Schedule.

6. CONTENTS OF PACKAGES TO BE SPECIFIED

The Commission reserves the right to inspect all goods before accepting for transit in order to ascertain that they are in accordance with the declaration on the consignment note. For this purpose the sender shall, on demand made on behalf of the Commission, open any package at his own expense, and, if he refuses to do so, or if the Commission is in any way hindered from inspecting the goods, then the Commission may refuse to accept such goods for transit. The Commission reserves to itself the right to refuse goods which its officers may adjudge to be offensive, unsafe or unfit for transit, or of a dangerous nature.

7. ADDRESSING

All goods shall be fully and distinctly addressed or branded, and at least one article in every five of a consignment shall be fully addressed. The Commission may refuse to accept any goods which are not addressed or branded to its satisfaction.

8. CONSIGNMENT NOTES

- (a) All goods delivered to the Commission for carriage shall be accompanied by a consignment note in such one of the forms prescribed: Provided that if a satisfactory undertaking be given by any senders on the form approved by the Commission, the consignment notes supplied by such senders may, if considered suitable, be accepted in lieu of the consignment notes in the forms prescribed. (See Supplement, page 8.)
- (b) A full and accurate description of the goods so delivered shall be entered on the consignment note, which shall be signed by the sender or by some person authorised by him for the purpose. Any alteration to a consignment note shall be initialled by the sender or his agent.
- (c) The acceptance of a consignment note by or on behalf of the Commission shall not be regarded as evidence that the goods, or livestock specified therein have been received by it, unless the whole of the consignment is delivered to it at the same time with the consignment note, and a receipt therefor has been given by a proper officer of the Commission.
- (d) To obtain the benefit of any special rate applicable to goods made or grown in the Commonwealth, consignment notes shall be endorsed "Produce of the Commonwealth," or as the case may be. Where a lower rate is provided for goods sent for a specific purpose (as, for example, machinery for agricultural purposes), it shall be so declared on the consignment note that goods are being forwarded for the purpose specified, otherwise full ordinary rates shall be charged.
- (e) Any person making a false statement in a consignment note as to the nature, quantity, weight, measurement, or value of any goods is liable to a penalty of fifty pounds, and in addition, special charges at double the ordinary rate shall be payable in respect of the goods.
 - (f) Pads of consignment notes are sold by the Commission at 2s. 6d. each.

9. HOURS FOR RECEIPT AND DELIVERY OF GOODS

(a) Except as provided hereunder and on Sundays and proclaimed public holidays, goods warehouses will be open for the receipt and delivery of goods as under :—

Each week day, Monday to Friday—8 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Saturdays—8 a.m. to 12 noon.

(b) Where, in the opinion of the Commission, the business does not warrant any station to which a goods warehouse is attached being staffed during any portion of the hours specified above, the goods warehouse shall be closed during such hours as the station is not staffed.

10. INTERPRETATION

- (a) In this Schedule, unless a contrary intention appears—
 - "Clause" means any clause of the general conditions regulating the conveyance of goods;
 - "day" includes any fractional part of a day;
 - "hours" means consecutive hours excluding any hours of a Sunday;
 - "pence," in relation to charges, includes any portion of a penny being a halfpenny or more but excludes any portion of a penny being less than a halfpenny;

- "proclaimed holiday" means New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Eve, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Foundation Day, the anniversary of the Sovereign's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day and any holiday observed generally throughout the State, by virtue of any Statute or Proclamation;
- "refrigerated van" means any mechanically, or ice, refrigerated van or container:
- "working hours" means the hours provided by Clause 9 for the receipt and delivery of goods.
- (b) Where by this Schedule a percentage is required to be added or deducted from any rate, that calculation shall be made in respect of the rate per ton only, and not in respect of any other charge.
- (c) Where in this Schedule a tonnage minimum, minimum charge or charge per wagon is shown, that minimum or charge, unless otherwise specified, relates to a four-wheeled wagon only. In the case of an eight-wheeled wagon, the minimum or charge shall be double, and in the case of a sixteen-wheeled wagon, quadruple, that of a four-wheeled wagon.
- (d) Where in this Schedule charges are related to weight, any part of a quarter being under 8 lb. shall not be taken into account, and any part of a quarter being 8 lb. or more shall be charged as for a quarter, except where the total weight of any class of goods is less than a quarter, in which case the minimum charge shall be as for a quarter subject to the classification and the Smalls minimum scale.

11. DETERMINATION OF WEIGHT

- (a) All goods shall, except where otherwise provided, be charged at the actual gross weight, computed at 2,240 lb. to the ton, or at the discretion of the Commission, the weight shall be computed by measurement at 40 cubic feet to the ton (see also Clause 18c); and wherever in the Goods Rates Book it is prescribed in respect of any goods that the weight thereof shall be computed by measurement, by standard, or by a specified number of packages to the ton, the Commission reserves the right to charge at the actual gross weight if considered advisable.
- (b) In respect of traffic of every description, which loses weight in transit through damage, evaporation, or any cause beyond the Commission's control, freight shall be paid on the weight ascertained at the sending station.
- (c) The weight of goods from a station without weighing facilities shall, if necessary, be estimated by the Guard or other employee of the Commission, as the basis for payment of the freight charges.

- (c) Where the carrying capacity of a wagon is less than the minimum prescribed in paragraph (b) hereof, the minimum shall be the carrying capacity of the wagon less 5 cwt. per four wheeled wagon.
- (d) The weights shown for specific types of wagons in paragraph (b) hereof are the minimum weights to be loaded in such wagons to permit of application of the lowest rate specified for the particular commodity, except that where the weight shown is less than that prescribed in paragraph (a) hereof, such reduced weight shall have application only when the total weight of the consignment exceeds 8 tons in the case of traffic freighted at M Class, M Class less one-twelfth and A Class less one-tenth or 5 tons in the case of traffic freighted at A Class.
- (e) Should a consignment be loaded into more than one wagon, the weight in each wagon may be charged for separately or alternatively, provided the minimum requirement for all wagons used is maintained in the aggregate, the specific minimum provided for each class of wagon shall not be maintained separately.
- (f) Where an order is lodged for a wagon to load a consignment of M Class traffic in excess of 8 tons and a low capacity wagon is supplied, the consignment note should be endorsed "8 ton wagon ordered" or as the case may be, when the freight charges shall be assessed on the actual weight despatched, subject to a minimum of the carrying capacity of the wagon, or, where specified, the minimum shown for the particular commodity loaded in a low capacity wagon.
- (g) The services of handling, securing, checking and covering are included in the 1st and 2nd Class rates (unless otherwise provided). Other rates are for haulage station to station only.
- (h) Where a rate below 1st Class, plus the charge for handling, covering and securing or any of those charges, exceeds the 1st Class rate for the same mileage the maximum rate chargeable is that as for 1st Class, and conditions applicable thereto. For traffic between Government and Midland Railway stations, the maximum shall apply to the total rate and not to either system's proportion separately.

13. DIVIDED CONSIGNMENTS

Goods consigned by one sender to two or more consignees, or from different senders to the same consignee, shall be treated as separate and distinct consignments.

14. LOADING, UNLOADING AND CHECKING

- (a) The rates for goods classified in 1st Class or higher, except where otherwise provided, include the services of loading, unloading and checking. The loading, unloading or checking of all other goods shall be performed by the Commission only where approved by it; otherwise the services of loading and unloading shall be performed by the sender and consignee. The charge for loading and unloading shall be 7s. 6d. per ton for each service which charge also includes checking and use of crane, if necessary. Where the owner desires to hire a crane and this is approved by the Commission, charges and conditions as shown in Tariff 3, Page—, shall apply. Where only checking is required to be performed the charge shall be 4s. 6d. per ton for each checking service. The charges for the loading, unloading or checking shall be added to the freight rate per ton. The Commission may charge actual wages cost plus 30 per cent. for these services.
- (b) Where senders at stations where there is a resident staff, do not require a receipt for goods classified at Station to Station rates the Commission will give a receipt only for wagon loads or quantities—condition unknown—and the consignment note shall be prepared accordingly.
- (c) Where a minimum tonnage, being greater than the actual weight, is maintained in the calculation of the freight, the same minimum tonnage shall be observed in computing the charge for loading, unloading or checking.
- (d) No charge will be made for loading, unloading or checking consignments which are subject to the "smalls" minimum scale, Tariff 2, page 3.

15. COVERING AND SECURING OF TRAFFIC

(a) When goods classified lower than 1st Class or goods accepted under station to station conditions, are of such a nature as to need protection and the Commission supplies covering, ropes or nets, irrespective of whether loaded with goods, the freight on which includes the charges for covering and securing, or otherwise, the following scale of charges shall apply to each consignment:—

Covering or nets—3s. per ton, maximum per consignment, 7s. 6d. per net, tarpaulin or four-wheeled covered van.

Ropes—1s. per ton, maximum per consignment, 3s. per rope.

Where one consignment only is forwarded separately in a wagon the maximum charges shall apply irrespective of the weight of the consignment.

- (b) The Commission may require senders to cover, or rope goods classified lower than 1st Class, or goods accepted under station to station conditions.
- (c) If coverings, nets, or ropes are supplied by the Commission, charges shall be made as shown above, but the Commission will not undertake to supply them, or any of them, in all cases.
- (d) Tarpaulins will not be provided to cover barbed wire, machines or other goods, which, from their character, are likely to cause damage to tarpaulins unless the goods are so packed by owners, effectively to prevent any such damage. The cost of any damage to tarpaulins resulting from neglect by owners may be recovered by the Commission.
- (e) The Commission may require senders to provide two tarpaulins for covering lime in transit. Tarpaulins shall be provided by the Commission only on the express condition that senders shall be liable for any damage to such tarpaulins by reason of the lime igniting.
- (f) Hire charges as per Tariff 3, page 8, shall be made when tarpaulins are provided for the protection of goods at stations or sidings.
- (g) The Commission may, by public notice, limit the time for which its tarpaulins will be permitted to be used at stations or sidings for covering goods, and at the expiration of such time, the Commission may, without incurring any liability whatsoever, remove any tarpaulins so used without further notice.
- (h) Tarpaulins, nets, or ropes accompanying wagons under demurrage shall be charged :—
 - 7s. 6d. per tarpaulin or net per eight working hours or part thereof.
 - 3s. per rope per eight working hours or part thereof.

The time allowance provided in Clause 32 for wagons shall also apply to tarpaulins, nets, and ropes accompanying the wagons.

(i) When traffic cannot be secured by the use of ropes due to the awkward nature of the loading, and bolts or other means of securing the loads are resorted to, the cost of materials used, and the actual wages cost plus 30 per cent. shall be charged.

16. CONSIGNMENT OF GOODS IN MORE THAN ONE CLASSIFICATION

- (a) A consignment consisting of goods in more than one classification and loaded together shall be charged at actual weight at the rates for the classes to which such commodities belong, provided:—
 - (i) the total weight charged for shall not be less than the greatest class weight minimum, or the greatest special wagon minimum for specified commodities, whichever is the greater, for any of the commodities in the consignment; and
 - (ii) the smalls minimum charge (Tariff 2, page 3) for the total weight at the highest class is covered by the total freight.

- (b) Where a special minimum is attached to a rate there shall be a sufficient tonnage of that class, or higher class traffic to permit of grouping as provided in paragraph (a) of this Clause.
- (c) Goods may be aggregated in one or more groups, and the total weight of each group charged under the rates and conditions applicable to the goods in the highest class in each such group, if that aggregation would result in a lesser charge.
- (d) If the total actual weight of the consignment is less than the required minimum, the charge for the weight to be added will be based on the rate for the lowest class in the consignment.
- (e) Unless otherwise provided, a package containing goods in different classes of the classification shall be charged at the rate applicable to the highest of such classes.

17. LONG ARTICLES

- (a) The freight on a long article shall be calculated at the appropriate classification rate and conditions, and the provisions of Clause 10 (c), page 14, respecting the use of bogic wagons, observed, irrespective of the fact whether other goods are loaded in the same wagon or wagons.
- (b) Any article of such a length requiring the use of more than one four-wheeled wagon for its carriage shall be subject to a minimum freight charge of two tons at 1st Class for the first four-wheeled wagon, and two tons at 1st Class for each additional wagon, whether such be used in carrying the load, or as a safety wagon.
- (c) The freight on all other goods whether for the same consignee or otherwise in the wagon or wagons is to be included in deciding whether the minimum requirements in paragraph (b) of this Clause are satisfied.
- (d) Should there not be sufficient goods available for loading with such long articles, the sender may endorse the consignment note "To be forwarded at the convenience of the Commission," when the consignment may be held for a maximum of seven days, and should there not be sufficient loading then available, the Commission will forward such consignment and raise charges in accordance with this Clause.
- (e) The provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) of this Clause shall not apply to traffic despatched from Perth and Fremantle. Long articles tendered for despatch at points other than Perth and Fremantle may be freighted in accordance with this Clause for the mileage from the sending station to Perth, plus the rate from Perth to destination if that method is cheaper than the charge for the throughout journey.
- (f) No long article, other than timber, which requires for its carriage the use of more than four wagons, shall be received and carried, except under special agreement.

18. BULKY ARTICLES

- (a) Nothing shall be carried by rail, which, on account of its excessive bulk would be inconvenient to transport, or which exceeds the measurements prescribed in the loading gauge† except with the approval of the Chief Civil Engineering Branch.

- † Loads shall not exceed 12 ft. 9 in. above rail level at one foot either side of centre line and gradually rounded to 10 ft. above rail level at 4 ft. 6 in. either side of centre line. Width of load shall not exceed 4 ft. 6 in. either side of centre line to a height of 10 ft. above rail level. Loads shall not project more than 6 in. over the wagon at each end.

- (b) Where loads exceeding the prescribed height or width measurements are carried, the freight on such "out of gauge" goods shall be computed at the actual mileage hauled and increased by 25 per cent. The maximum surcharge shall be £5 or alternatively, the Commission may charge for the actual cost of the special working and inspections plus 30 per cent.
- (c) Bulky goods, in wagonloads, shall, except where otherwise specially provided in this Schedule, be subject to a minimum freight charge equivalent to two tons at 1st Class rate. (See also paragraph (a) of Clause 11 of this Schedule.)

19. HEAVY ARTICLES

- (a) The loading and unloading of heavy articles at stations or sidings unprovided with proper facilities therefor shall be undertaken by the owners at their own risk and expense, and such articles shall not be received for carriage from or to such stations or sidings unless satisfactory arrangements are made by the owners for loading or unloading, as the case may be.
- (b) No article weighing more than 10 tons, or which requires for its carriage a specially constructed wagon, or any alteration to a wagon shall be received and carried, except under special agreement.

20. WAGONS, ORDERING AND LOADING OF

- (a) Orders for wagons for the conveyance of goods in wagonload consignments shall be lodged on the prescribed form, and accepted for approximate tonnages only. In addition to the approximate tonnages, senders may indicate the class of wagons considered to be most suitable for the loading. Separate forms shall be used for each station and for each day's requirements. The acceptance of an order by any employee of the Commission shall not be taken to imply that wagons will be available at any particular time.
- (b) The Commission will supply the most suitable wagons available for the tonnage ordered but does not undertake to provide any particular class of wagon nor to provide a wagon to accommodate a consignment, the weight of which is in excess of the minimum wagonload governing the class weight as shown in Clause 12 of this Schedule. When larger wagons than those required are supplied by special authority of the Chief Traffic Manager, they shall be treated as supplied at the Department's convenience.
- (c) Wagons shall be loaded to the satisfaction of the Commission and in such manner as to distribute the weight as equally as possible between the wheels and to ensure the safety of the load whilst in transit.
- (d) Where the sender of a consignment has not loaded the wagon to its full carrying capacity, the Commission reserves to itself the right to complete the loading with any other suitable traffic offering for transit.
- (e) The carrying capacity is shown on each wagon, and the loads on wagons loaded by senders beyond their carrying capacity may be reduced by the Commission at the risk and expense of sender or owner. The goods so unloaded will be forwarded to destination when convenient, ordinary classification rates being charged from transhipping station to destination, as for a separate consignment. In addition, the actual cost (up to a maximum of 7s. 6d. per ton on the full original contents of wagon) of transferring from or adjusting goods on wagons detained in consequence of overloading or shifting of load en route shall be paid by the consignee (if consigned to an attended station) or by the sender (if consigned to an unattended station or siding). No charge will be raised for detention to wagons whilst waiting adjustment of load, but the sender will be held responsible for any damage caused by the overloading of wagons. (See Supplement, page 28.)
- (f) In the event of a sender not loading a wagon to the best advantage, or failing fully to load each wagon supplied, the Commission may charge on a tonnage equal to the full carrying capacity shown on that wagon, or may apply any lower minimum weight that it thinks fit, at the rate which would be applicable to the consignment.

21. SPECIAL WAGONS

Where a sixteen-wheeled QX wagon is used, a minimum freight charge shall apply, equivalent to 40 tons at "C" Class rate plus 25 per cent. Where any such wagon is used for consignments on account of the State Electricity Commission. the minimum freight charge shall be equivalent to 40 tons at "C" Class rate.

22. REFRIGERATED VANS AND REFRIGERATED CONTAINERS

- (a) A surcharge of 10 per cent. additional to the freight charge (minimum 1s. per consignment) shall apply on perishable goods required to be conveyed in refrigerated space of mechanically refrigerated vans and refrigerated containers, or in ice-refrigerated vans where the Commission provides the ice.
- (b) Where exclusive use of a refrigerated container or refrigerated van is required for one consignment, the minimum freight charge shall be equivalent to two tons at 1st Class plus 10 per cent., for haulage station to station only.
- (c) Where exclusive use of an ice-refrigerated van is required for one consignment, the minimum freight charge shall be equivalent to four tons at the classified freight rate of the commodity concerned, plus 10 per cent., for haulage station to station only.

23. MILEAGE RATES TO BE CHARGED UNLESS OTHERWISE PROVIDED

- (a) The mileage rates shall be charged in all cases except where other rates are provided by this Schedule or in authorised amendments thereof or additions thereto, or except where otherwise authorised by the Commission.
- (b) Where any charges provided by By-law 60 (Coaching Rates) are less than the charges provided by this Schedule, the former charges shall apply.

24. CONSIGNMENT TO BE BONA FIDE FOR ONE CONSIGNEE

A reference in this Schedule to a minimum weight, in relation to any rate or class of consignment, is a reference to a minimum weight consigned bona fide to one consignee only; and where goods so consigned are, in fact, consigned for the benefit of more than one consignee, the Commission may raise and recover such charges as would have been made, had the goods been correctly consigned, in the first instance.

25. CONSIGNMENTS, SMALL OR SPECIALLY VALUABLE

With the exception of empties charged as per Tariff 3, page 4, skins, and gunpowder packed in accordance with the requirements of the Explosives Act in packages measuring at least one cubic foot, the Commission will not accept for carriage by goods train any consignments weighing less than 14 lb., nor any consignment of gold or silver coin or bullion, gold or silver in a manufactured state, precious stones, jewellery, trinkets, bills, bank notes, orders, notes or securities for the payment of money, stamps, title deeds, or gold or silver plate of any weight, but any such consignment may be forwarded by passenger train at the rates provided by By-law 60 (Coaching Rates).

26. ALTERATION OF DESTINATION OF TRAFFIC WHILST IN TRANSIT

- (a) The Commission may, at the request of either sender or consignee, alter the destination of any traffic.
- (b) When traffic has been so diverted, a charge of 12s. per four- or eight-wheeled wagon shall be made, and this charge booked out, when the consignment

is re-entered to altered destination, in addition to the freight, which shall be calculated on the shortest route mileage from the original forwarding station to the point where alteration of transit is effected, thence by shortest route to the new destination.

- (c) Where less than wagon loads are diverted, a charge of 7s. 6d. per consignment shall be made.
- (d) The Commission does not guarantee to alter the destination of any traffic in transit, nor shall destination be altered in opposition to the known wish of either sender or consignee.
- (e) Whenever the destination or consignee of any traffic is altered in accordance with this Clause the Commission may require the person making the application for such alteration to enter into an indemnity indemnifying the Commission against any loss or damage suffered to the goods or any loss or damage suffered by any person as the result of such alteration being made.

27. GOODS UNDER BOND

- (a) The Commission shall accept for carriage any goods under bond, only where :—
 - (i) the goods are packaged to the Commission's requirements for carriage at its risk, or in the case of goods of a dangerous nature, to the requirements specified on pages 62 to 68 hereof; and
 - (ii) the goods are checked by the Commission's employees; and
 - (iii) the consignment notes for such goods are endorsed to the effect that the goods are under bond.
- (b) The freight charges on a consignment under bond shall be prepaid. Consignments under bond for despatch from, or delivery at, unattended stations, private sidings or wharves, may be accepted by special arrangement with the Commission at its option.
- (c) Goods listed on pages 55 to 61 hereof shall be accepted only when an indemnity is furnished by the sender indemnifying the Commission from all liability in respect of claims, including claims made by the Customs and Excise Department for excise or duty due, in the event of loss or damage of whatever nature occurring to the goods during transit by rail or while on the premises of the Commission.
- (d) Goods under bond shall be delivered only on the written authority of the Customs and Excise Department.

28. GOODS CONSIGNED TO "ORDER"

- (a) Goods may be consigned to "Order" to attended stations only. Such consignments shall be branded with the order number, the actual consignee's name not being shown.
- (b) Delivery shall be given by the Commission only where a written "Order" from the sender authorising the delivery of the particular consignment, is presented.
- (c) The written authority specified in paragraph (b) may be despatched as a C.O.D. parcel as provided for by By-law 60 (Coaching Rates).

29. CONSIGNEES REFUSING TO RECEIVE GOODS

In the event of a consignee refusing to receive goods invoiced to him, such goods shall be returned to the sending station in compliance with the sender's instruction only, and the sender shall, if possible, be advised of the refusal. The sender shall pay to the Commission all charges in respect of freight discharge, carting, demurrage, storage and reloading rendered necessary by the refusal of consignees to receive the goods. (See Clause 35.)

30. CONSIGNEES TO GIVE RECEIPT

At attended stations a written receipt shall be given by a consignee for all goods or livestock received from the Commission. The Commission may demand proof of the right of the person applying for the goods to receive them, or an indemnity note signed by two approved sureties if there be any reasonable doubt as to the person applying for the goods being entitled to receive them.

31. FREIGHT AND OTHER CHARGES TO BE PAID ON DEMAND

- (a) Credit for payment of freight and other charges is allowed only by special arrangement with the Commission, otherwise the authorised charges on all goods must be paid on demand, and in default the Commission has the power to detain and sell the goods on which such charges are payable, or to detain and sell any other property which it may then, or at any future time, have in its possession belonging to the person by whom such charges are payable, in order to realise the amount due. If the amount realised be insufficient to cover all charges, the Commission may take legal proceedings to cover the deficiency. (See also Clause 35.)
- (b) The Commission may require the charges in respect of any goods to be paid at the forwarding station, or it may permit the charges to be collected at the destination station.
- (c) Before traffic is accepted for reconsignment it shall be signed for; also the inwards freight and approved charges, shall be paid before a consignment note is accepted, unless specially authorised to the contrary or the consignee is the holder of a railway credit account.
- (d) Credit accounts may be granted by the Commission on payment of a fee of 10s. per annum for each account, with a maximum of £10 per annum for any number of accounts exceeding twenty which are held by any one credit account holder.

32. DEMURRAGE ON WAGONS

(a) Where loading or unloading of a wagon is, by this Schedule, required to be performed by the sender, consignee or owner, and is not completed within the prescribed time, demurrage charges, as under, shall be paid for each eight working hours, or part thereof (See Clause 9) after the allowed time:— £ s. d.

HC, HD and NF wagons shall be treated as four-wheeled open wagons of up to 10 tons capacity.

Tank cars shall be treated as covered vans, JA, JK, JX, JY and JZ tank cars being treated as of up to 10 tons capacity.

- (b) Demurrage charges shall be due—
 - (i) on wagons which have not been loaded up and consigned within eight working hours; commencing from the time wagons are ordered for or placed in position for loading, whichever is the later, or
 - (ii) on wagons which have not been unloaded within eight working hours from the time placed for unloading after arrival at destination.

When a wagon arrives by special train and consignee is so advised, demurrage shall apply after eight working hours have expired, from time of arrival of wagon, or time of advice, whichever is the later. If not advised, demurrage shall commence eight working hours from the due arrival time of the next tabled train by which the traffic could arrive. When a wagon is released, after the free period but in time for despatch, loaded or empty, by the next available train, in either direction without loss to the Commission, demurrage will not be enforced.

- (c) The conditions of paragraph (b) hereof shall apply to mechanically refrigerated vans and to refrigerated containers except that the "free time" shall be four working hours in lieu of eight working hours applicable to other wagon stock.
- (d) In the event of a wagon or wagons being supplied to meet an order and such wagon or wagons are not used, demurrage shall be paid for the full period of detention up to the time advice is received that wagon or wagons are not required, without any free period being allowed.
- (e) In the event of a wagon being reconsigned, a period of eight working hours will be allowed free for the purpose of reconsigning, after which period demurrage charges shall be enforced at the regulation charge shown above.
- (f) Where a sender or consignee is a private siding holder, wagons shall be deemed to be placed in position for loading or unloading if the wagons, when supplied, or on arrival at destination, are placed as near to the siding as conveniently may be, whenever the traffic exceeds the siding capacity.
- (g) Demurrage charges shall not be payable for detention to wagons on Sundays or proclaimed holidays. (See Clause 10 (a)).
- (h) Should the loading or unloading of wagons be delayed beyond the prescribed time, the Commission may, instead of continuing to charge demurrage, arrange for the loading or unloading to be performed, charging 7s. 6d. per ton, minimum 7s. 6d. per sender or consignee or the actual wages costs plus 30 per cent. whichever is the greater. The Commission does not, however, guarantee to undertake the loading or unloading of any wagons.
- (i) Explosives wagons detained beyond the prescribed period will be charged double demurrage.
- (j) The Commission may waive or reduce demurrage charges in such circumstances as it may, at that time, determine.
 - * See Footnote.

33. STORAGE

- (a) Charges calculated at 2s. 6d. per ton per day, or part of a day, minimum 9d. per consignment per day, shall be paid for storage beyond the following free period after the goods are available for delivery:—
 - (i) Stations Fremantle-Bellevue-Armadale 12 working hours.
 - (ii) All other stations—

Consignees resident within 5 miles of station
Consignees resident 5–10 miles from station
Consignees resident over 10 miles from station
tion 14 days.

(b) Provided the consignee or owner hands to the Commission an indemnity in the form provided relieving the Commission from all liability, the storage charges on goods for which warehouse accommodation is not provided, may be reduced by one-half. The reduced charges shall operate only from the date on which the indemnity is received. Tarpaulins may be provided to protect goods stored under these conditions, in which case the hire charges as per Tariff 3, page 8,

- (c) Liability for goods stored on any premises under the control of the Commission shall, for a period of 12 working hours from the time of availability for delivery, be in accordance with the conditions of carriage of the goods as prescribed in Clause 4 of this Schedule. In no case shall the Commission be liable as an insurer or have a greater liability arising out of loss or destruction of, or injury to goods, than that of a warehouseman or bailee if such goods have been available for delivery at the point of termination of their transit by rail for 12 working hours or upwards, whether discharged out of any vehicle or not. (See also Clause 40)
- (d) Storage charges may be waived or reduced at the discretion of the Commission.
- (e) Temporary leases of land for storage purposes shall be charged at the rates provided by Tariff 3 (page 7) of this Schedule.

34. WEIGHING OF GOODS

- (a) Goods despatched by rail requiring to be weighed for freight purposes shall be weighed free of charge, and the weight of each load entered on both the Consignment Note and the receipt for goods and latter handed to the senders. Where goods which have been or are to be conveyed by railway are weighed at stations for the convenience of the owner, a charge of 1s. 6d. per weighing shall be made and a weighing ticket issued. When the owner requires a weighing ticket in duplicate at the time the original weighing ticket is prepared, there shall be an additional charge of threepence for each duplicate ticket issued, and where an extra ticket is required at a later date, the charge for such ticket shall be 1s. 6d. plus threepence for each further duplicate issued at the same time.
- (b) Goods, other than for despatch by rail, shall not be weighed at stations where there is a weighbridge in the neighbourhood, but where there is no such weighbridge, any goods shall be weighed, when convenient to the Commission, on the railway weighbridge at charges provided in paragraph (a) of this Clause.
- (c) Where senders or consignees require traffic to be reweighed, a charge of 5s. per four-wheeled wagon, plus 1s. 6d. weighing fee shall be charged for the service if additional shunting is involved. If the re-weighing discloses a difference exceeding $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. (2 qrs. per ton) of the total net tonnage of the wagon, such charges shall be waived.
- (d) Where wagonloads of goods are "stop weighed" at the request of sender or consignee, a charge of 1s. 6d. per four-wheeled wagon shall be made for the service. In the event of sender or consignee requiring the tare of a wagon to be checked a charge of 1s. 6d. per four-wheeled wagon shall be made.
- (e) Under no circumstances shall railway weighings for freight purposes be guaranteed for buying and selling purposes except in the case of weighings recorded on the public weighbridge No. 22 at Perth Goods.
- (f) For weighings on public weighbridge No. 22 at Perth Goods (except when weight tickets are requested in connection with traffic received by rail or to be despatched by rail when the charges shall be in accordance with paragraph (a hereof) the scale of charges shall be as follows:—

35. SALE OF GOODS

- (a) Any goods, stored by the Commission which are not claimed and removed by the owner, may be sold by the Commission, in the case of—
 - (i) any goods likely to deteriorate, forthwith; and
- (ii) all other goods, including empties, after the expiration of one month; and, after deducting any amount due on the goods for freight, storage and other charges and the expenses of sale, from the amount realised on sale, the Commission shall on demand pay the residue thereof (if any) to the owner.
- (b) Before any goods mentioned in sub-paragraph (ii) of paragraph (a) of this Clause are sold, the Commission shall cause to be inserted in the public notices column of a daily newspaper circulating in the State of Western Australia, a notice in accordance with Sections 31 and 32 of the Government Railways Act, 1904–1953, as the case may be, of its intention to sell such goods.

36. PACKING OF GOODS

- (a) Where goods are required to be packed, for conveyance at the risk of the Commission, it is intended that they shall only be carried in suitable containers and internal protection provided, as necessary, in the shape of such partitions, wrappers, straw or other such packing material as will afford sufficient protection against damage.
- (b) Containers protecting fragile articles shall be so consigned and marked "Fragile—Handle with Care," or with a similar precautionary remark.
- (c) The following is the standard of packing required by the Commission for the acceptance of goods at its risk, namely—
 - Bags.—Shall be made of jute, canvas, or calico, in good order and condition, and of sufficient strength to carry the contents.
 - Bales.—Shall be of hessian or canvas wholly covering the contents and completely sewn up; the materials used shall be of strength and thickness suitably to carry the contents.
 - Cartons.—Shall be constructed with double walled corrugated fibre or solid fibreboard in new condition or in such order that there are no tears in the fabric, and capable of being sealed. All flaps and joints shall be sealed with adhesive tape or strips of strong gummed brown paper.
 - Cases.—Cases shall be made of wood of strength and thickness suitable for holding the contents securely in place, with solid or closely fitted sides, ends, tops and bottoms, securely fastened without nails or screws protruding. Cases of unusual size or carrying unusual weights shall be strapped with hoop iron or wire binding or otherwise sufficiently reinforced.
 - Barrels, Casks and Kegs.—When made of wood, heads must be made of one piece or of two or more pieces closely fitted, and held securely in grooves (crozes) by hoops. Where these containers are used for articles not liable to loss from leakage or sifting, and heading is one-half inch or more in thickness, head may be countersunk or set below the grooves (crozes), but shall be secured by two or more battens extending completely across the head, and the ends of the battens nailed to the sides of the container, or head held in place by a head liner.
 - Crates.—Shall be of wood, of strength and thickness suitable for holding the contents securely in place. Crates shall protect the contents on the sides, ends, tops and bottoms and no part of the contents shall protrude. The spaces between the battens shall not be more than six inches wide, and when crates of unusual size or carrying unusual weights are used, they shall be sufficiently reinforced with hoop-iron or wire binding and cleats.

Drums.—Shall be made of iron or steel with all joints and seams electrically welded or riveted, and sweated with lead or other substance so as to make a solid joint. Drums shall be in good order and condition and show no signs of leaks and be protected at each end by a strengthened bead or a strong iron or steel drum hoop welded or riveted on to the body of the drum. Each drum shall be provided with a well-fitting wrought iron or forged steel screw bung and a rubber washer and constructed so that the bung is protected from damage when the drum is rolled.

Tins.—Shall be strongly constructed, in good order and condition, and of sufficient strength to withstand ordinary incidence of rail transport.

General.—Articles which, by their nature, do not require packing, may, except where otherwise in this Schedule provided, be consigned for carriage at the Commission's risk, rate and conditions. The absence in the General Classification of Goods of a packing symbol does not necessarily mean that in an unpacked condition the goods concerned will be conveyed at the risk of the Commission. Where a proper officer of the Commission considers that such goods are insufficiently or improperly packed or secured they shall be accepted for conveyance at owner's risk only.

37. ROAD SERVICES

(a) Road services operate in sections shown on pages 28 to 29 of Tariff 6 hereof. Where combined road and rail services are utilised the rate shall be calculated on a throughout mileage basis via the railhead shown in Tariff 6. The minimum rate for the conveyance of traffic by road services or combined rail and road services, shall be Class "B" rate and conditions. Where "M" or "A" Class traffic is conveyed on both rail and road services the "M" or "A" Class rates shall be charged for the rail mileage to the railhead in addition to the "B" Class rate and conditions for the road mileage, if cheaper than the freight at "B" Class rate and conditions for the throughout mileage.

(b) Trailers :-

- (i) Freight charges on goods conveyed on road trailers taken over by senders or consignees shall be assessed to or from points shown on pages 28 to 29 of Tariff 6 hereof. Should a trailer be required at an intermediate point freight charges to or from the next furthest place on the road truck route shall apply.
- (ii) No hire charge shall apply for the use of trailers provided they are returned to the Commission within eight working hours of the trailer being made available, or before the departure of the next appropriate road truck.
- (iii) Demurrage charges shall be paid at £2 per trailer for each eight working hours or part, beyond the free time shown in subparagraph(ii) of this paragraph.

38. COLLECTION AND DELIVERY OF GOODS

- (a) The Commission may collect goods from senders' premises or deliver goods to consignees' premises in which case the conditions of conveyance of the goods to or from such premises shall be in accordance with Clause 4 of this Schedule.
- (b) The Commission reserves the right to deliver goods at the address of the consignee, and to charge for such delivery, in all cases in which the sender or the consignee of such goods does not give notice to the proper officer of the Commission that delivery will be taken at the Commission's premises by the consignee.

39. PRIVATE SIDINGS AND WHARVES

- (a) The loading and unloading of goods at private sidings and wharves shall be done by the owner at his own risk and expense. Goods to or from private sidings and wharves shall be subject to the conditions governing unattended sidings, also to prescribed shunting charges, see Tariff 4. In the case of goods consigned to a private siding or wharf the Commission's liability ends at the point of access of such siding to the main line.
- (b) In cases where consignments ex private sidings or wharves consist of a mixture of classes, the description and weight of each class of goods shall be shown on the consignment note. Freight shall be charged on the aggregate at the rate of the highest class of goods carried, unless the sender has previously entered into an agreement with the Commission for acceptance of weights shown on consignment notes, in which case freight may be calculated on each line of goods. Alternatively, when the lessee wishes the freight to be charged on each line of goods at classification rates, and also in cases where the sender or consignee desires the goods to be checked, this may be done and the full wages costs, plus 30 per cent. added, shall be charged, if greater than the checking charges under Clause 14.
- (c) The Commission does not undertake to deliver or accept consignments of less than one ton at private sidings or wharves, but, where convenient, smaller quantities will be delivered, or accepted, as the case may be, at ordinary classification rates (minimum as for 10 miles) in addition to the ordinary shunting charge.

40. UNATTENDED STATIONS, SIDINGS AND STOPPING PLACES

Consignments forwarded to unattended stations, sidings and stopping places shall be accepted only on the condition that the Commission's responsibility in regard to such consignments ends when the goods are placed upon or left at such unattended station, siding or stopping place, even when the goods are carried at the Commission's risk. All charges on such goods must be prepaid unless otherwise authorised.

41. LIGHT AND HEAVY LINES

- (a) Where alternative wagon minima are shown in Clause 12 (b), the heavy line minima shall have application when the wagons are hauled for the entire throughout journey over heavy lines.

Conditions for the Carriage of Explosives and Goods of a Dangerous Nature

- 1. The words and expressions used in the following conditions shall respectively have and include the several meanings assigned to them in the Explosives Act, 1895, the Government Railways Act, 1904–1953, as amended, the by-laws thereunder, and in any Act dealing with explosives and goods of a dangerous nature, and by any by-law or condition made in pursuance thereof.
- 2. The term "goods of a dangerous nature" includes inflammable liquid and any goods other than explosives mentioned or referred to in this division and such other goods as in the judgment of the officer or employee of the Commission receiving same may be of a dangerous nature.
- 3. The term "owner" when used in relation to explosives and goods of a dangerous nature includes any sender, consignee or agent for the sale or custody, loading or unloading thereof, as well as the owner.
- 4. The term "portable magazine" means a receptacle for explosives requiring not more than two men to carry the same when full, substantially made of wood, galvanised iron, or of other materials approved by the Explosives Department, so as effectively to protect the explosives contained therein from accident by fire from without, lined internally with resilient material provided with a substantial close fitting lid, secured with an efficient lock or bolt, and having no exposed iron or steel in the interior thereof.
- The Commission is not a common carrier of explosives or goods of a dangerous nature and such traffic shall only be received and carried under and subject to the provisions of the Explosives Act, 1895, and the regulations thereunder, and the Railways Act, 1904-1953, and the by-laws, and conditions of the Commission in force at the time of consignment and to the condition that the sender shall relieve the Commission of and shall indemnify the Commission against and shall compensate the Commission for damage, loss or injury to or of the goods so received and carried, and shall so relieve and indemnify and compensate the Commission for all damage, loss or injury to or of any railway property and shall relieve and indemnify the Commission of and against all actions, claims, suits or demands made or brought against the Commission by any persons whomsoever for or in respect of or in relation to any injury to the person or any damage, loss or injury to or of the property of any such persons, arising from or in any way connected with or incidental to the said explosives or goods of a dangerous nature being on any part of the premises of the Commission or in any vehicle of the Commission for such carriage.
- 6. No person shall send or bring to the Commission any consignment of explosives, unless he has given to the Commission 48 hours previous notice, in writing, of his intention so to do, stating the time when, the true name, description and quantity proposed to be sent or brought and giving his own name, and address and also the name and address of the proposed consignee and has had an intimation in writing from the Commission, in the form of a permit, that it is prepared to receive such consignment.
- 7. Explosives shall be sent to the forwarding station, and will be received only at such times during the hours of daylight, that is to say, between sunrise and sunset, and at such places as the Commission may appoint; and every consignment and package containing any explosive proposed to be conveyed by rail shall be delivered to and received by the Commission's servants authorised to receive goods of a dangerous nature, and by no other person whatsoever.

- 8. No explosive shall be loaded or unloaded on the railways by the sender or consignee thereof or their servants, except by the special permission of the Commission; and when the loading or unloading of any explosive is undertaken by any person other than the employees of the Commission, all due precautions shall be taken by such person, by carefully loading and unloading and otherwise, to prevent and secure such explosive from being brought into contact with or endangered by any other article or substance liable to cause fire or explosion.
- 9. The conveyance of explosives, other than those despatched in portable magazines, shall be restricted to carriage in covered vans of a type and construction approved by an Inspector of Explosives appointed under the provisions of the Explosives Act, 1895 or amendments thereto. To both sides of all such vehicles containing explosives ("O" and "Y" type vans excepted) senders shall affix a placard, on which shall appear the word "Explosives" in 4 inch red letters on a yellow background.
- 10. Magazine boots shall be provided at the loading stations, and must be used by all men appointed to do the loading. The boots must be sent with the van, and must be worn by all men whenever they have occasion to enter the van, and must be returned in the van.
- 11. In loading or unloading any explosive, the casks and packages containing the same shall, as far as practicable, be passed from hand to hand, and not rolled upon the ground, and in no case shall any such casks or packages be rolled unless hides, cloths, or sheets have been previously laid down on the platform or ground over which the same are to be rolled. Casks or packages containing explosives shall not be thrown or dropped down, but shall be carefully deposited and stowed.
- 12. No person whilst employed in loading or unloading any explosive shall wear boots or shoes with steel or iron nails, steel or iron heels, or tips of any kind, or have about his person any lucifer match, explosive, or means of striking a light; and all persons employed in the loading or unloading of any explosive shall, while such loading or unloading is going on, abstain from smoking.
- 13. While the loading, unloading, or conveyance of explosive or goods of a dangerous nature is going on, all persons engaged in such loading, unloading, or conveyance shall observe all due precautions for the prevention of accidents by fire or explosion, and for preventing unauthorised persons having access to such goods so being loaded, unloaded, or conveyed, and shall abstain from any act whatever which tends to cause fire or explosion, and is not reasonably necessary for the purpose of loading, unloading, or conveyance of such goods, or of any article carried therewith, and for preventing any other person from committing any such act; and such other person who, after being warned, commits any such act shall be deemed to commit a breach of these conditions.
- 14. The loading or unloading of explosive into or out of any van, when once begun, shall be continued with all due diligence until the same is completed.
- 15. The Commission does not guarantee to receive explosives or goods of dangerous nature at any time, either on appointed days, which may be altered from time to time as considered necessary, or otherwise, unless the necessary vans are available in which to place the same, and reserves to itself the right to delay the despatch of any consignment, after being received, so long as it may think proper.

- 16. The Commission does not guarantee to despatch explosives or goods of a dangerous nature at any particular time or by any particular train, nor will it allow consignments, whether carried or to be carried, to remain on the railway premises longer than is absolutely necessary. If packages containing explosives or goods of a dangerous nature carried by railways be not accepted and removed by the consignee within twelve hours, they may be immediately removed by the Commission at the owner's risk and expense, or otherwise disposed of as it thinks fit for securing the public safety, or returned to the sender, who shall be required to remove them at once from the premises and pay the whole charges incurred in connection therewith.
- 17. Explosives shall not be left at any place where there is not an officer-in-charge, unless there is someone present to take delivery, but shall be taken on to the next station, and left there at the owner's risk and expense. After the expiration of 12 hours, they shall be dealt with as shown in the preceding paragraph.
- 18. The Commission may refuse to receive, forward, carry or allow to be brought or carried upon the railways, any carriage or package which it may suspect to be marked, packed or sent, or to contain any article or thing packed or sent, in contravention of the Acts and Regulations dealing with explosives or goods of a dangerous nature, or any of these conditions, or not in accordance therewith; and in case any carriage or package which the Commission suspects to be so packed or sent or to contain any such articles or thing as aforesaid, shall be upon the railways, the Commission may open or require such carriage or package to be opened to ascertain the fact.
- 19. The Commission may at any time during the conveyance of explosives or goods of a dangerous nature, or while they are on the premises of the Commission, detain and stop the further handling and delivery of packages which appear defective. The Commission may remove and store such packages at the cost and risk of the owner.
- 20. Explosives shall be forwarded as quickly as possible after receipt, and shall not, under any circumstances, be kept on hand during the night, at forwarding stations.
- 21. Explosives remaining undelivered at a receiving station overnight shall be specially guarded and watched until delivery is effected.
- 22. Freight of a dangerous nature shall not be received for conveyance unless packed in packages made so strong and secure that no part of the contents can escape under all reasonable conditions of transport, and marked to indicate clearly to railway employees the name and, where necessary, the properties of the contents, and where specified packed as hereinafter prescribed. In the event of senders neglecting to pack and mark each package according to these conditions, the Commission may decline to carry same, and direct its removal, and if not removed the package and contents may be forthwith removed by the Commission or otherwise disposed of as it may think fit for securing the public safety, at the risk and expense of the owner.

- 23. No inflammable liquid shall be loaded or unloaded on any railway premises (by the sender or consignee thereof or their servants)—
 - (a) except between the hours of sunrise and sunset, without the permission in writing or under the conditions approved of by the Commission's representative;
 - (b) unless and until the wagon in which it is to be loaded, or from which it is to be unloaded, shall have been thoroughly ventilated by opening doors and allowing sufficient time for the escape of any vapours.
 - (c) unless and until all the pipes or other appliances used for handling in bulk are free from leakage;
 - (d) except under other conditions as may be imposed by the Commission's representative.
- 24. Any person convicted of an offence under these by-laws shall be liable for the first offence to a penalty not exceeding £10, and for a subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding £20, and to a further penalty of £10 for each day during which the offence continues, together with the forfeiture of all explosives or goods of a dangerous nature in respect to which such offence has been committed.
- 25. All explosives or goods of a dangerous nature delivered to the Commission for carriage shall be accompanied by a special consignment note (25 G2), setting out in form that such goods are carried solely upon the conditions mentioned in these conditions, provided that if a satisfactory undertaking be given by any sender on the form approved by the Commission, the consignment notes supplied by such sender may, if considered suitable, be accepted in lieu of the consignment notes in the form prescribed as aforesaid. No employee of the Commission is authorised to receive or undertake the carriage of explosives or goods of a dangerous nature, or to give any receipt or acknowledgment for such goods, unless the sender or person bringing them to the railways has signed a consignment note as hereinbefore mentioned.
- 26. (a) Hire charges of departmental equipment, which are additional to the ordinary freight charges on the contents:—

Explosives Vans-20s. per 4-wheeled van.

Portable Magazines—7s. 6d. per magazine.

(b) Portable Magazines going on to Private Companies' lines (Midland Railway Company excepted) and not returned within eight working hours from time of handing over shall be charged demurrage at 7s. 6d. each eight working hours or part thereof, in excess of the time allowed.

Packing Clauses for Goods of a Dangerous Nature

Clause No. 1.

Tank cars constructed and maintained in accordance with the Australian and New Zealand Railways' Manual of Standard and Recommended Practice—Section G.

Clause No. 2.

Glass or earthenware bottles, securely closed, each containing not more than one gallon, packed in sawdust or other cushioning material in strong cases. Each bottle to be separated by a wooden partition not less than half inch thick. If the bottles each hold half a gallon or less, this partition may be omitted, but the bottles shall be surrounded by not less than one inch of packing material on all sides.

Clause No. 3.

Glass or earthenware bottles, securely closed, each containing not more than one gallon packed in Kieselguhr, whiting, sifted ashes or other non-combustible cushioning material in strong cases. Each container to be separated by a wooden partition not less than half an inch thick. If the bottles each hold half a gallon or less, this partition may be omitted, but the containers shall be separated by not less than one inch of cushioning material on all sides.

Corrosive liquids packed under this clause shall not be enclosed with other articles in the same outer container unless each bottle containing such liquid is well cushioned in whiting, Kieselguhr or other non-combustible material in a tightly closed metal container. This does not apply to nitric and perchloric acids over 4 per cent. strength which shall not, under any circumstances, be packed in the same outer container with any other article.

Sulphuric and Hydrochloric acids may be packed together provided that the bottles are either cushioned with at least $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches of whiting, Kieselguhr or other non-combustible packing on all sides or separated by wooden partitions at least half an inch thick and cushioned in non-combustible packing. No other article shall be included in the package.

Clause No. 4.

Glass or earthenware containers securely closed, packed in sawdust or other cushioning material in strong cases. Each container to be surrounded by not less than one inch of cushioning material on all sides.

Clause No. 5.

Glass or earthenware containers with screw caps, clip-on lids or other non-combustible seal, packed in Kieselguhr or other non-combustible cushioning material in strong cases. Each container to be surrounded by not less than one inch of cushioning material on all sides.

Clause No. 6.

In bottles, each containing not more than three lb. securely closed, packed in sawdust or other cushioning material in a strong wooden case. Each bottle to be surrounded by not less than one and a half inches of cushioning material on all sides.

Clause No. 7

In bottles, each containing not more than three lb. securely stoppered, packed in Kieselguhr or other non-combustible cushioning material in a strong wooden case. Each bottle to be surrounded by not less than one and a half inches of cushioning material on all sides.

Corrosive liquids packed under this clause shall not be enclosed with other articles in the same outer container unless each bottle containing such liquid is well cushioned in whiting, Kieselguhr, or other non-combustible material in a tightly closed metal container. This does not apply to nitric and perchloric acids over 4 per cent. strength, which shall not, under any circumstances be packed in the same outer container with any other article

Clause No. 8.

Carboys suitably packed and protected.

Clause No. 9

Earthenware jars, not over three gallons capacity, with leak-proof stoppers packed in strong wooden crates, not more than two jars to a crate.

Clause No. 10.

Sealed tins, not over one gallon capacity, packed in strong wooden cases, or new fibreboard cartons.

Clause No. 11.

Sealed tins, not over four gallons capacity, packed in strong wooden cases.

Clause No. 12

Metal tims or cans, securely closed, press-on type lids to be secured by at least two spots of solder, packed in strong wooden cases.

Clause No. 13.

Strongly made cardboard or fibreboard boxes or cartons, packed in strong wooden cases.

Clause No. 14.

Strong wooden cases or casks lined with tin plate or other sheet metal, which must completely protect the wood and be sift-proof.

Clause No. 15

Wooden cases or casks, lined with waterproof paper to render them sift-proof.

Clause No. 16.

Strong jute sacks.

Clause No. 17.

Strong jute or double hessian sacks, lined with waterproof paper to render them siftproof.

Sodium nitrate in heavy jute sacks may be accepted in wagon lots only, provided bags are so stacked by senders in dry wagons to give a proper pitch for tarpaulin which shall be utilised, and consignees take delivery on arrival, thoroughly cleaning wagon after unloading. Where jute sacks of single thickness only are used, consignments shall be loaded in steel wagons only.

Clause No. 18.

Double paper bags of siftproof construction, inner bag to be of waterproof paper, packed in strong wooden cases.

Clause No. 19.

Fibreboard cartons, with inside glass, earthenware, or timplate containers. Paint in fibreboard cartons in timplate containers, maximum weight per carton 70 lb. Paint in three-ply corrugated cardboard cartons in timplate containers, maximum weight per carton, 56 lb.

Clause No. 20.

Wooden barrels (wet type) lined with pitch and free from leaks.

Clause No. 21.

Sealed metal drums.

Clause No. 22.

Sealed aluminium, or aluminium-lined drums.

Clause No. 23.

Sealed stainless steel drums.

Clause No. 24.

Sealed metal drums in wooden crates or cases.

Clause No. 25.

Under kerosene in bottles or tins, packed in Kieselguhr or other non-combustible cushioning material in strong wooden cases, or under kerosene in drums protected by strong wooden crates.

Clause No. 26.

Accumulators and charged wet batteries must be insulated to prevent short circuits and packed in sound wooden cases with gable tops or strong fibreboard containers with gable tops, and conspicuously marked "Battery containing corrosive liquid"—"This side up."

Clause No. 27.

Hermetically sealed metal containers in wooden cases or crates, marked "Calcium Carbide—Dangerous if not kept dry."

Clause No. 28.

Charcoal, when freshly prepared, shall be exposed to the air for at least three days before being consigned. The charcoal shall be dry and wet charcoal shall not be accepted for transport. Charcoal conforming to these requirements can be packed in paper bags, sacks, drums, cases or in wagon lots. Charcoal shall not be loaded into wagons which have held bagged consignments of sodium nitrate or any fertiliser containing sodium nitrate.

Clause No. 29

This clause concerns small quantities of goods of a dangerous nature, included in mixed consignments of chemicals, drugs and medicinal preparations.

Liquids.—The requisite air space shall be allowed in each container. All bottles shall be securely closed, stoppers and bungs tied down or otherwise secured and cushioned in a suitable material to prevent contact with each other or the side of the case. Tins shall be effectively sealed. The contents of any one container shall not exceed one gallon.

Solids.—Glass, earthenware or tin containers effectively sealed, packed in a suitable cushioning material. Paper bags shall be double thickness, new, and of heavy quality paper, the inner bag to be of waxed paper. The contents of any one container shall not exceed 10 lb.

Cases.—To be strongly constructed of sound timber, close jointed, and bound with hoop iron or wire.

Exceptions.—Substances which react dangerously shall not be packed in the same case. Commercial or concentrated nitric, perchloric, sulphuric or hydrochloric acid over 4% strength or carbon bisulphide phosphorous, metallic sodium, potassium, calcium or barium and 100 volume hydrogen peroxide shall not be included in mixed consignments.

Marking.—Each case shall be conspicuously marked "Danger"—"Chemicals"—"This side up"—"Handle with Care."

Clause No. 30.

This applies to film in quantity; snapshot film interwoven with paper on spools may be treated as non-dangerous goods.

- (a) Closed metal cans to hold 2,000 feet each; metal cans to be packed in metal boxes lined with heat insulating material.
- (b) Metal cases lined throughout with fibreboard at least \{\frac{1}{8}\)-inch thick. Where metal partitions are used, they shall be the same thickness as the body of the case and similarly lined.
- (c) Metal cans with lapped detachable covers. The lid shall be firmly held in place and each metal case is packed singly in a strong fibreboard carton. Clause No. 31.

Approved gutta percha, wax, plastic or lead lined bottles, securely sealed, packed in sawdust in sound wooden cases bound with hoop iron or wire. Lead lined drums may also be used.

Clause No. 32.

Packets of one dozen boxes to be packed in wooden cases or strong fibre-board cartons lined with waxed paper and banded with hoop iron or wire. Labelled "Safety Matches"—" Inflammable."

Clause No. 33.

Packets of one dozen boxes to be packed in strong wooden cases lined with waxed paper to exclude air.

Clause No. 34.

Matches to be wrapped in paper before being placed in a box. Boxes to be placed in a tin and not more than four tins packed in a strong wooden case.

Clause No. 35.

Self-heating hair waving materials shall be packed in strong wooden cases, and the activating liquid or substance shall not be packed in the same case as the satchets.

Clause No. 36.

Cylinders for the storage and transport of compressed gases shall be manufactured and maintained to the requirements of S.A. A. Code C.B.4 or other appropriate British or Australian Standard specification.

Clause No. 37.

Hermetically sealed tins each containing not more than 150 starters with a maximum of ten tins in a strong felt-lined case.

Clause No. 38.

In bulk, covered with two waterproof tarpaulins. To go in steel wagons whenever possible.

Clause No. 39.

Packed as prescribed by the Explosives Act and amongst other things shall be contained in outer packages consisting of kegs or barrels closely bound or hooped without any iron or steel about them; of quarter, half or whole barrel sizes, the staves to be of half inch minimum thickness; or in canisters made of tin, copper, zinc or other suitable metal; or in cardboard boxes, strong and impervious to leakage, enclosed in strong wooden cases; or in metallic cylinders or packages made otherwise of such strength, construction and character that will not be broken or accidently opened, or become insecure whilst being conveyed and will not allow any explosive to escape.

Clause No. 40.

Except in the case of safety cartridges, safety fuse for blasting, railway fog signals, percussion caps and manufactured fireworks there shall not be any iron or steel in construction of any package unless the same is covered with suitable material, as effectually to prevent the exposure of such iron or steel.

Clause No. 41.

Accepted for conveyance in powder vans containing explosives only or portable magazines loaded in covered goods vans containing explosives only but in quantities not exceeding 250 lb. in any one consignment may be conveyed along with ordinary goods traffic, if packed in a double package and enclosed in a metallic canister or portable magazine of approved pattern.

Not more than 1,100 cases of explosives shall be permitted at one time on any one train, or in any one shunting yard in the Metropolitan Area, bounded by Fremantle, Midland Junction and Armadale (excluding Jandakot Branch) nor more than 1,400 cases at one time on any one train or in any one shunting yard outside the abovementioned Metropolitan Area.

Clause No. 42.

Accepted for conveyance along with ordinary goods traffic in covered vans provided no explosive of any other class or division and no other goods of a dangerous nature or inflammable materials are present; otherwise see packing Clause No. 41.

Clause No. 43.

Accepted for conveyance to attended stations along with ordinary goods traffic in covered vans if packed in tins in metal lined cases and secured against movement, provided no other explosives or goods of a dangerous nature or infiammable materials are present; otherwise see packing Clause No. 41.

Clause No. 44.

Accepted for conveyance along with ordinary goods traffic in covered vans if securely packed in strong wooden cases (the maximum weight of each package and contents not to exceed 56 lb.) with a sift-proof inner container of tin, galvanised iron, zinc, waxed paper or plastic, or if imported, in the original package which has not been opened or damaged; provided that no other explosives or goods of a dangerous nature or inflammable materials are present; otherwise see packing Clause No. 41.

Clause No. 45.

Detonators in small consignments of less number than contained in an original case, shall only be accepted when in the original tin boxes, and provided these tin boxes are enclosed in double packages of wood at least half an inch in thickness, fastened with brass or copper nails, and the space between the inner and outer wooden packages is filled with dry sawdust.

Clause No. 46.

Packages shall have affixed to them, in conspicuous characters, by means of a brand or securely attached label, or other mark, the name of the sender and address of the consignee and, except in the case of gunpowder and safety fuse, the word "EXPLOSIVE," the name of the explosive and the number of the class and division to which it belongs.

Clause No. 47.

Packages of explosives classified in different classes or divisions shall not be carried in the same wagon or explosives van except that:—

Classes 1, 2, 3 and Class 4, Division 1, may be grouped.

Class 6, Division 3, may be loaded in the same van with other explosives provided both are properly magazined and placed as distantly apart as possible.

Class 7, Divisions 2 and 3, may be grouped.

Class 4, Division 2, Class 5 and Class 7, Division 1, are not accepted for rail transport.

Clause No. 48.

Polythene containers, securely stoppered, each containing not more than one gallon, packed as a neat fit in a strong fibreboard, or two-ply corrugated carton. Gross weight of carton and contents shall not exceed 65 lb.

Clause No. 49.

Poisons containing specified maximum percentages (see Clause (a) (i)) and those shown in Clause (a) (ii) packed in accordance with Clause (b) and labelled in accordance with Clause (c) may be classified as Class B poison and may be accepted for transit on normal receiving days, but where possible they should not be loaded in wagons containing foodstuffs, foodstuffs empties, explosives, textiles, paper goods or with any merchandise in paper, wood, fibreboard or cardboard packages. Should suitable loaded wagons not be available, then it is permissible to load in wagons containing the aforementioned items provided that the poisons are segregated and stowed as far distant as possible from other traffic.

(a) (i) Maximum Percentage of Poison.—Only poisons containing not more than the following maximum percentage of poison shall be labelled, consigned or accepted as Class B poison:—

- (ii) Baits, Dingo (Strychnine)—See packing clause b vi. Copper Sulphate 100%—See packing clause b v.
- (b) Packing Requirements.—Class B poisons shall be packed as follows when accepted on normal receiving days:—
 - (i) 44 gallon drums. Only new steel drums of not less than 18 gauge shall be used. Drums with severe dents due to rough handling shall be rejected.
 - (ii) 4 gallon drums. Only new drums, lined where necessary shall be used. Drums with severe dents due to rough handling shall be rejected.
 - (iii) 1 gallon tins shall be packed in wooden boxes or new corrugated cardboard or fibreboard cartons of sufficient strength to give adequate protection. Wood shavings or sawdust may be used and the tins shall be tightly packed so that they cannot move in the cases. Not more than six tins shall be packed in one outer container.
 - (iv) Small packages in tins, bottles or cartons shall be packed in wooden boxes or new fibreboard or corrugated cardboard cartons of adequate strength to protect the contents from crushing or breakage. The individual containers shall be separated by wooden, corrugated cardboard or fibreboard partitions and sawdust or other packing material may be used. The contents of the case shall be tightly packed so that no movement is possible inside the package. Not more than two gallons in bottles or six gallons in tins shall be packed in any one outer container.
 - (v) Powders must be packed in strong jute or hessian sacks, lined with waterproof paper to render them siftproof.
 - (vi) Strychnine dingo baits, consisting of a pellet of strychnine in a piece of fat, each bait individually wrapped in greaseproof paper, will be accepted in the original unbroken wooden boxes. If the quantity is less than a case lot, the baits shall be repacked in sealed metal containers.

(c) Labelling.—Class B poisons containing not more than the maximum % of poison as shown in Clause (a) and packed in accordance with Clause (b) shall be labelled as follows in red lettering.

The minimum charge shall be calculated as for one hour except that where steam has to be raised specially, a minimum as for eight hours is required in connection with the 25 and 60 ton cranes, with a minimum of four hours for other steam cranes.

- 2. The rates for power cranes shall include the services of a driver. cost of other employees required in connection with the hiring of cranes shall be computed at the actual wages cost plus 30 per cent.
- 3. When a crane is supplied at other than its ordinary depot station, the movements by rail to and from the depot station shall be paid for at "M" Class rates and conditions. EXHIBITS

Conditions respecting the carriage of exhibits for Agricultural Shows, including Stock Parades, Egg Laying Trials and horses competing in ring events.

- The undermentioned conditions shall be applicable in respect of agricultural machines and implements, machinery, produce, live-stock (including dogs, poultry and other birds), wagons, and other goods of a like nature, sent for exhibition to Agricultural Shows.
- When the exhibits are consigned on the forward journey, sender shall declare on the consignment note therefor, that they are for exhibition, specifying the Show for which they are intended, and the entry shall be endorsed accordingly. The sender shall also obtain from the Station-master or Goods Agent, a certification of the station of the stati ficate on the prescribed form. For exhibits sent from unattended stations, sidings or stopping places, owners shall obtain certificate from the Station-master at destination station.
- The ordinary freight charges and conditions shall apply in respect The ordinary freight charges and community shall be prepaid. On the forward journey and freight charges shall be prepaid. On the forward which are of the forward journey and freight charges shall be prepaid. On the return journey any exhibits, or portion thereof, which are certified by the Secretary of the Show as having been exhibited and not sold, shall be carried free to the station whence they were forwarded, provided the journey is completed at any time within one month from the date of despatch on the forward journey. In the case of cereal exhibits which have to be milled before exhibition at the Royal Show, the period is extended from one to six months. A certificate in the approved form shall be handed in when the exhibits are consigned handed in when the exhibits are consigned.
- If a greater number of vehicles be used for the carriage of exhibits on the return journey than was used on the forward journey, ordinary freight charges shall be imposed in respect of exhibits carried in the additional vehicles. All exhibits, or part thereof, which have been sold, or are not accompanied by the aforesaid certificate, shall be subject to the ordinary freight charges on the return journey.
- Exhibits may be forwarded on from one show to another, subject to the conditions as prescribed in Clause 2 above, and when the final destination is reached they may be returned "free" to the original despatching station, conditionally on the observance of the provisions of Clause 3 above. If, however, in proceeding to another show, such exhibits be returned over any portion of the line in respect of which the full freight charges have been paid on the forward journey, the exhibits may be sent free over such portion of the line.

GOVERNMENT WAGONS RUNNING OVER PRIVATE COMPANIES' LINES

When Government wagons are used by private companies over their own lines (Midland Railway Company excepted), the charge shall be fifteen shillings for the first 24 hours or part thereof and thirty shillings for each 24 hours thereafter or part thereof. Senders of ores, concentrates and minerals carried at the following rates shall, when the rate is governed by the value of the consignment, be required to declare the "free on rail" (F.O.R.) value per ton in Australian currency, or an estimated value per ton and the rate will be applied accordingly. Where the estimated value only is shown, a certificate from the assayer or other documentary evidence approved by the Commission shall subsequently be produced. The Commission may, if desired, dispense with the necessity to provide assay or other certificates. The time allowed for supply of such certificates shall be as follows:—

INTERSYSTEM RATES

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CONDITIONS

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Intersystem Rates and Conditions

1. Conditions of Carriage.—All intersystem traffic shall be carried subject to the Railways Acts and By-laws in force on each System.

2. Method of Freighting:

- (a) Goods shall be freighted at the sum of each System's local rates, unless it is cheaper to charge as per (b) or (c) of this paragraph. Where local rates are charged for the Western Australian portion of the journey, the mileage shall be calculated to or from Parkeston.
- (b) Where goods are forwarded from a capital city in one State to a capital city in another State (or a station within the radii shown in paragraph 10), the classification of goods, also the tonnage minima prescribed on the Systems concerned, shall apply in respect to the portions of the through journey over the respective Systems. Charges for such consignments shall be calculated from the schedules of Intersystem Rates shown in paragraph 10. In this connection, Fremantle, Kalgoorlie and Geelong shall be regarded as capital cities.
- (c) Goods forwarded to or from stations other than capital cities shall be charged the ordinary local rates to or from a capital (or radius if mentioned), plus the through rates between the capitals.
- (d) Traffic between Western Australia and New South Wales or Queensland shall, as a general rule, be freighted via Broken Hill. When, through washaway or other cause, this route is unavailable or senders direct accordingly, traffic shall be freighted via Albury at the cheapest combination of rates, e.g., Perth to Adelaide, plus Adelaide to Sydney, via Albury, Intersystem Rates, if less than Perth to Melbourne plus Melbourne to Sydney Intersystem Rates. Each Intersystem Rate must be used in its entirety.
- 3. Trans-Australian Railway Traffic.—Traffic in either direction between Western Australian stations and sidings, and stations and sidings on the Trans-Australian Railway (Commonwealth) shall be charged the sum of the local rates.

4. Special Rates:

- (a) Railway Time Tables, Pamphlets and Tourist Literature.—Packages of Australian literature, railway time tables or pamphlets despatched by Railway Administrations or Government Tourist Bureaux to other Railway Administrations or Government Tourist Bureaux shall be conveyed throughout the Commonwealth free.
- (b) Printed Matter for Commonwealth Departments.—Printed matter for Commonwealth Departments forwarded by the Government Printer from Canberra or Melbourne to other capital cities shall be charged two-thirds of the ordinary local rates on each System unless it is cheaper to charge the full Intersystem Rates.
- (c) Advertising Material.—Advertising material to or from the Railways Advertising Officer, Perth, shall be carried free in Western Australia, and at quarter parcels rates on other Systems.
- (d) Country Women's Association.—Handicraft exhibits, addressed and declared as being for exhibition only, forwarded to or by the Country Women's Association, shall be charged at ordinary rates on the forward journey, and free on the return journey.
- (e) Library Exchanges.—Travelling libraries to or from Western Australian State Schools at Coonana, Zanthus, Naretha, Rawlinna and Reid shall be carried free.

5. Exemptions from Intersystem Rates.—The rates in paragraph 10 do not apply to explosives, vehicles or to the commodities listed hereunder which shall be charged at each System's local rates and conditions.

PRIVATE SIDINGS

REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO PRIVATE SIDING ACCESS

- 1. A limited number of private sidings only will be granted, and such sidings will only be granted as the Commission, after full consideration, finds can conveniently and safely be allowed.
- 2. No siding access will be permitted unless formal application is made, and the consent of the Commission, in writing, is first obtained thereto; and no consideration will be accorded to applicants upon the plea that they have incurred expense in anticipation of obtaining such consent.
- 3. The applicants shall pay to the Commission the whole cost of constructing the siding and its connections.
- 4. A fee of £10 (ten pounds) per annum shall be payable quarterly in advance for the right of access to the Railway system by means of any private siding.
- 5. Upon the expiration of the term for which any existing rights have been granted by the Commission, the lessees may renew their tenure under these Regulations at the option of the Commission, but, failing the Commission's approval thereto, the siding shall be removed by the Commission.
- 6. Sub-leases of private sidings may be granted subject to the approval of the Commission and lessee upon payment of £5 (five pounds) per annum, payable quarterly in advance, by the sub-lessee.
- 7. Every application shall be made upon the printed form, which may be obtained on application at the Commission's office.
- 8. The applicant shall be the sole user and the right of access shall be exercised solely and exclusively in connection with the business of the applicant as approved in writing by the Commission.

SHUNTING CHARGES

- 1. Traffic to and from private sidings shall be subject to the provisions of Clause 39.
- 2. The charges as shown in this schedule shall be made for shunting loaded wagons to or from private sidings, wharves or special points in station yards before or after main line haulage and are additional to ordinary freight charges. Except in the case of livestock (which will be charged inwards and outwards) and unless otherwise provided, one shunting charge only shall be made when a wagon is sent loaded into a private siding, and after being unloaded there, brought out again with a load for main line transit by rail.
- 3. Except where otherwise provided herein all other services, such as covering, handling, checking, etc., shall be charged for at the prescribed tonnage rates in addition to wagon hire, shunting and/or wharf haulage charges.
- 4. Wagon hire charges shall be computed as per charges shown in Tariff 3, page 8.
- 5. If a wagon load, after arrival at a station, is re-consigned to a private siding or wharf, a charge of 5s. per four-wheeled wagon shall be made in addition to the appropriate private siding shunting or wharf haulage charge. When a wagon, after arrival, is required by the consignee to be moved to another point in the station yard, a charge of 10s. per four-wheeled wagon shall apply. If detention arising out of such re-consigning exceeds eight working hours, demurrage charges as per Clause 32 (e) shall be charged.
- 6. When a wagon is loaded in a station yard or premises for the purposes of transferring to another point in the same yard, the charge shall be for wagon hire plus 10s. per four-wheeled wagon.
- 7. In the event of a wagon being shunted from a private siding or wharf to a station yard or premises or vice versa, wagon hire charges plus 5s. per four-wheeled wagon shall be charged in addition to the siding shunting or wharf haulage charge.
- 8. Traffic shut out of ship or which from any other cause is returned from wharf or jetty shall be charged wharf haulage plus 5s. per four-wheeled wagon for placement at a point in the station yard or the siding haulage charge if placed to a private siding.
- 9. Wagons shunted from a private siding adjacent to a station yard to another adjacent siding or wharf or vice versa shall be charged the appropriate siding shunting and wharf haulage charges except as provided for in paragraph 2 above, in addition to wagon hire charges.
- 10. When a wagon load from a private siding consists of several consignments the siding shunting charge may be spread *pro rata* over the various consignments.
- 11. Small consignments conveyed on shunters' floats between station yards or premises and wharves shall be charged first class rate as for 10 miles.
- 12. Whenever a special shunt is required outside the recognised hours set down for shunting a siding, a minimum charge £1 10s. shall be enforced.
 - 13. Charges to special points in station yards are indicated thus:—‡
- 14. Where, in the following schedule, a tonnage rate is provided for a point to point movement, in lieu of charges as per paragraphs 6, 7 and 9 hereof, wagon hire charge shall not be due.
- 15. When a wagon is ordered for placement at a private siding or special point in a station yard and is not loaded, shunting charges shall be paid in addition to any demurrage charges due.
- 16. Station code numbers for private sidings, wharves, or other shunting points will be the same as the station or siding under which they are listed. Exceptions are specially shown in the following schedule.

LIVESTOCK

CONDITIONS OF CARRIAGE

(Supplementary to the General Conditions of Carriage)

- 1. Livestock shall be conveyed at the rates and conditions prescribed herein, and only between such stations as have accommodation for loading and unloading, which shall be performed by senders and consignees respectively, and the responsibility for ensuring that all fastenings are properly secured shall rest entirely with the sender.
- 2. The Commission is not bound to receive any livestock for carriage to or from any railway station which is not equipped with platforms, yards, or other suitable facilities for loading or unloading livestock: Provided that, at the option of the Commission, livestock may be received for carriage to or from such places if the owner accepts all risk and undertakes the loading and unloading, and signs the special requisition form prescribed.
- 3. Livestock shall be brought to a railway station or siding only on condition that the owner accepts all risk of injury to such livestock whilst on railway premises; and, unless the value of the stock shall have been declared by the sender thereof; and the increased charges for carriage at Commission's risk, as prescribed in Clause 4 of this Tariff (which are additional to the ordinary charges) are paid at the time of delivery of the stock at the railway station or siding for carriage, livestock shall be conveyed solely at Owner's risk whereby the Commission is relieved of all liability in the event of loss, detention, injury, delay, or damage of any nature whatsoever, and howsoever occurring to the stock, either before or after loading, during transit or unloading or at any time while on railway premises, except upon proof that such loss, detention, injury, delay or damage arose through the wilful misconduct of the Commission, in which case the limit of the Commission's liability shall be as follows:—

^{5.} The Commission reserves the right to refuse to accept any livestock for carriage at its risk, and animals exceeding in value £100 shall be insured only under special agreement.

- 6. When livestock is conveyed at its risk, the Commission reserves the right to limit the number of animals which shall be carried in each van, and the Commission shall not, without negligence on its part, be responsible for any loss or injury which may occur to such stock either before or during loading, or during or after unloading, or during transit, when such loss or injury arises from fear or restiveness of the stock, or through such livestock being suffocated or trampled upon by others.
- 7. A sender shall be responsible for ensuring that livestock are not overcrowded and that the number of animals in any van is so limited that the gross weight of the stock does not exceed the weight carrying capacity of the van.
- 8. The Commission shall not be responsible for any particular number of livestock specified as being loaded into any van for carriage by rail.
- 9. No person shall place, keep, or suffer to remain or permit or procure to be placed or kept, in any livestock van in which any animal is being carried, or has been placed for carriage, any hay, straw, or other inflammable material. The Commission shall not be liable, through fire, for the loss of or injury to any animal which has been carried or placed for carriage in any van in which hay, straw or other inflammable material has been placed, kept or suffered to remain contrary to by-law.
- 10. The Commission does not guarantee the arrival or delivery of livestock at any particular time, by any particular train, or for any particular market; nor does it undertake to advise consignees of the arrival of livestock.
- 11. All livestock shall be unloaded within three hours after arrival; otherwise, such livestock may be unloaded by the Commission at the Owner's risk, and a charge of 15s. per four-wheeled van made for that service.
- 12. All livestock shall be removed from the Railway premises immediately after being unloaded, or if left, shall remain at the owner's risk and expense, and may be sent to agistment or livery. The cost of such sending and of such agistment and livery shall be paid by the owner and such cost shall be paid on demand as part of the authorised charges; and such stock, if not removed within seven days, may be sold by auction by order of the Commission, and the proceeds applied in payment of all expenses incurred, and the balance thereof handed over to the owner on demand.
- 13. Rugs, bridles, saddles or other trappings forwarded with horses or other animals shall be carried entirely at the risk of the owner and the Commission accepts no responsibility for damage done to these articles, unless forwarded and charged for as a separate consignment.
- 14. Notwithstanding Owner's risk conditions, the Commission may, in the event of loss, detention, injury, delay or damage, agree to accept such liability for that event as the Commission may, in the circumstances at that time, determine.
- 15. Applications for conveyance of livestock per livestock or goods trains shall be made on the form provided for that purpose. Those sent by telegram or letter shall be subject to the same conditions as if made on the printed form. The acceptance of an order is subject to the discretion of the Chief Traffic Manager but no order shall be accepted when a longer period intervenes than 21 days in advance of the date upon which conveyance is required.
- 16. Applications for vans to load livestock for the markets at Midland Junction shall be received at the Chief Traffic Manager's Office, Perth, only, and shall be lodged by a recognised stock agent, authorised to sell at such markets.
- 17. Each order shall be lodged four clear working days before date of loading, and unless otherwise provided, must be accompanied with a deposit as under:—
 - £3 for each eight-wheeled van.
 - $\pounds 1$ 10s. for each four-wheeled van.
- 18. Where alternative routes are available, the van order shall show route required and charges shall be computed on the mileage travelled.

- 19. The acceptance of any requisition or cash deposit by an employee of the Commission at any station shall not be taken to imply that the required vans will be supplied on any specified date.
- 20. Any requisition for the carriage of livestock, which has been lodged with and accepted by the Commission, cannot be withdrawn; nor can the required number of wagons be reduced, nor the specified destination station altered, except as follows:—
 - (a) When notice is given of any desired withdrawal or reduction, prior to supply of the van or vans, the requisition may be cancelled or reduced as desired conditionally on the payment of 10s.
 - (b) When notice is given after van or vans have been placed in position or have been moved to meet the order, the requisition may be cancelled or reduced as desired conditionally on the payment of £2 in respect of each four-wheeled van not required for loading on the day for which ordered. In the case of a reduction from a full four-wheeled van ordered to a half or third van; or from a half van ordered to a third van, the charge shall be 10s.
 - (c) The destination station may be altered prior to despatch of livestock on payment of a charge of 7s. 6d. per four-wheeled van (maximum 10s.). Should alteration of destination be requested whilst livestock is in transit, charges and conditions as provided by Clause 26 of the Schedule to By-law 55, shall apply.
- 21. The Commission reserves to itself the right to charge for all vans ordered and not used on the date and at the station specified in the order, as if used.
- 22. Livestock shall be yarded in ample time to be loaded and despatched by trains specified by the Commission. If not loaded as arranged, the Commission reserves the right:—
 - (a) to remove or otherwise use the vans and charge full rates to destination station to person who lodged the order; and
 - (b) to charge for detention to trains, as per page 4, Tariff 3.
- 23. Mixed stock will, at the request of the sender, be carried together in the same van, provided the whole consignment belongs to one person, and the Commission is specially relieved of all responsibility occasioned thereby.
- 24. The Commission may refuse to carry any horse, cattle, sheep, swine, bird, or other livestock, which it reasonably believes to be diseased. No person shall wilfully or negligently drive or bring, or cause, or permit to be driven or brought upon or into any station yard, shed, or premises of the Commission, any horse, cattle, sheep, swine, bird or other livestock, having or suffering from any disease whatsoever. Any person guilty of a breach of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.
 - 25. The Commission may recover from the sender the cost of—
 - (a) removing and disposing of the carcase of any animal which may die whilst on its premises;
 - (b) killing of any animal when such action is rendered necessary owing to injuries sustained and of disposing of the carease; and
 - (c) all treatment which, in the opinion of the Commission, is necessary to any animal which may become disabled or sick whilst on its premises and all such costs and expenses incidental to such treatment and any extra freight incurred in connection with the reconsignment of such animal after treatment.
- 26. In the case of livestock carried conjointly over the lines of the Commission and the Midland Railway Company, the minimum Government proportion in respect of any charge shall be 10s. per four-wheeled van.
- 27. On furnishing an application on prescribed form from the sender or his agent, drovers in charge of livestock will be issued, without charge—
 - (a) one second-class return ticket for a consignment of two to ten fully loaded bogie vans;
 - (b) two second-class return tickets for consignments exceeding 10 fully loaded bogie vans.

Each drover will be entitled to have two dogs carried free of charge. The ticket shall be available on condition that a drover travels at his own risk and over the same route as the livestock.

- 28. Camels, donkeys and mules shall be charged at the same rate as horses.
- 29. Railway tarpaulins shall not be used to cover livestock in vans except that condemned tarpaulins may, when available, be supplied at a charge of 5s. per tarpaulin.
- 30. A certificate is required in respect of any livestock consigned from Western Australia to any of the Eastern States, and such certificate may be obtained by sender at the office of the Stock Branch, Department of Agriculture, South Perth, or from the Inspector of Stock at Kalgoorlie.
- 31. Poultry and birds shall not be accepted for the Eastern States unless they are accompanied by a Certificate of Health (signed by the Chief Inspector of Stock, or an Inspector of Stock) securely attached to the waybill. In the case of native or imported game (viz., all birds, other than domestic poultry and pigeons) a permit from the Chief Warden of Fauna, Fisheries Department, Adelaide Terrace, Perth, also is necessary. A permit is not required for domestic poultry and pigeons.
- 32. Animals, poultry and birds consigned from the Eastern States to Western Australia shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Health and examined by an Inspector of Stock on reaching Kalgoorlie, or, when this is impracticable, on arrival at Perth.
- 33. When livestock in transit is specially placed for attention at a station en route, shunting charges of 5s. per four-wheeled van haulage to special point and 5s. per four-wheeled van haulage ex special point shall apply.
- 34. The Commission reserves to itself the right to decide what space is to be charged for, according to the number and size of animals accepted for conveyance.
- 35. When a van is only partly occupied by a consignment, the Commission reserves the right to complete it to its full carrying capacity with other stock if the full van has not been paid for.
- 36. Livestock for his Excellency the Governor of Western Australia shall be carried free.

SMALL CONSIGNMENTS

In Four-wheeled Livestock Vans: Minimum charge, £2.

Bulls, cows, horses and oxen:

One animal—One-third full van rate.

One animal (exclusive use of van required)—Half van rate.

Two, three, four or five animals—Half van rate. (See also Livestock clause 34.)

Six or more animals—Full van rate.

Goats, sheep and pigs:

Not more than seven in number—One-third full van rate. (See also Livestock clause 34.)

More than seven animals, but no more than half van load (one deck)—Half van rate.

More than half van load-Full van rate.

In Owners' Crates:

1st Class rates and conditions. (Conveyed in accordance with Livestock Conditions of Carriage.)

PIGS AND RAMS

- 1. Consignments of pigs or rams loaded by different senders at one station or siding, or at different stations or sidings, to one consignee, may be charged as one consignment from the farthest point of loading, such loading to be from not more than four points on the same line.
- 2. Train detention charges as shown in Tariff 3, page 4, shall be imposed when trains are detained for loading purposes.

KALGOORLIE ABATTOIRS (377 MILES)

1. No livestock shall be dealt with at the Binduli Abattoirs Siding at 377 Mile, E.G.R., other than consignments railed from South Australia, or Robbs Jetty, and any other infected stock, approved by the Agricultural Department.

Ex Parkeston Stockyards-

By special train.—Ordinary rates and shunting charges, minimum 10 four-wheeled vans, maximum 24 four-wheeled vans.

By tabled train.—Ordinary rates and shunting charges, plus £5 when a special shunt between Kalgoorlie and Parkeston is required.

- Ex Quarantine Area, Robbs Jetty.—In addition to the ordinary freight and shunting charges, a toll of 6d. per beast (Agricultural Department's charge) on cattle is to be levied.
- Ex Other Stations.—Cattle from other stations may be unloaded at this siding provided they are placed in quarantine pens for immediate slaughter. There is no restriction respecting sheep which may be railed either to or from the siding.
- 2. Disinfecting charges in accordance with the clause "Cleaning of Livestock Vans" shall be charged.
- 3. Should it be necessary for livestock in transit from the Quarantine area to the Abattoirs to be unloaded en route, the unloading must be performed in the presence of a Stock Inspector, Health Officer or Police Officer, and the Chief Traffic Manager ("Stock"), Perth, immediately advised by telegram. Any cattle which cannot be reloaded must not leave the railway stockyards alive.
- 4. All charges shall be prepaid unless the consignees have a railway credit account at Kalgoorlie.

CLEANING OF LIVESTOCK WAGONS

When it is necessary, in accordance with the Stock Department's regulations for the Commission to hose out and scrape, steam-cleanse or disinfect wagons, a charge of 5s. per four-wheeled van will be levied. Minimum charge 10s. per consignment.

WATERING

No additional charge shall be made for the watering of stock by owners before the loading of the stock, or after discharge at destination, viz., one watering at each end. The following rates will apply when stock are watered other than above (at Owner's risk):—

- (a) When the Commission supplies labour (by special arrangement)— Horses, cattle and large animals, 2s. 6d. per head. Sheep, pigs and small animals, 3d. per head.
- (b) When the Commission does not supply labour— Horses, cattle and large animals, 9d. per head. Sheep, pigs and small animals, 2d. per head.

STOCK YARDS—HIRE OF

1. When railway stockyards are used for other than railway purposes, the charges shall be :— $\,$

Horses cattle and large animals—1s. per head per day. Sheep, pigs and small animals—3d. per head per day. Minimum—£3 per day.

Maximum—£7 10s. per day.

2. Charges for watering shall be additional to the above.

LIVESTOCK TO AND FROM THE EASTERN STATES

- 1. Livestock to and from the Eastern States are transferred at Parkeston (383 miles from Perth).
- 2. Western Australian rates shall be calculated to or from Parkeston and appropriate shunting charges paid.

LIVESTOCK FROM MIDLAND JUNCTION TO FREMANTLE AND NORTH **FREMANTLE**

- 1. Livestock which has been railed to Midland Junction may be despatched from that station to Fremantle or North Fremantle for shipment at the rate of £2 per four-wheeled sheep or cattle van.
 - 2. Declarations shall be made on consignment notes accordingly.

RATES

- 1. The rates on pages 9 to 11 hereof are for livestock conveyed in fourwheeled livestock vans in full and half-van loads. Livestock in eight-wheeled vans shall be charged double the full van rate.
- 2. Orders shall not be accepted for the following types of vans, but should they be supplied and utilised, reductions as shown hereunder on the full van rates will be allowed :-
 - \mathbf{C} . . . **.**
 - Reduction of one-ninth. S Reduction of one-ninth from the eight-wheeled van rate.
- 3. Orders will be accepted for CXB vans, in which case the rates shall be increased by 12½ per cent.
- 4. Orders will be accepted for TA vans, in which case the eight-wheeled van rates shall be increased by 20 per cent.
- 5. Orders will be accepted for Midland Railway vans when such are normally supplied for traffic on, to, or from the Midland Railway Company's line. When such vans are ordered and supplied the rates on pages 9 to 11 hereof shall apply except as shown hereunder:-
 - Reduction of $33\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. CA $^{\mathrm{CB}}$ Reduction of $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.
 - CM Reduction of 20 per cent. from the eight-wheeled van
 - D and DX Reduction of one-ninth from the eight-wheeled van rate.

Wharf Regulations, Wharfage Rates, and Berthage Dues

REGULATIONS FOR THE WORKING OF WHARVES UNDER THE CONTROL OF THE RAILWAYS COMMISSION

BERTHING DUES, etc.

Berthing Dues at Sea Wharves

(a) All vessels exceeding 300 tons gross register using any of the wharves
of the State under the control of the Railways Commission for
loading or discharging cargo shall pay berthing dues at the following
rates:—

9d. per ton on all cargo landed or shipped. Minimum, £3 10s. per day of 24 hours or part thereof.

Vessels not exceeding 300 tons gross register shall pay berthing dues as above but the minimum to be imposed on such vessels shall be £2 10s. per day of 24 hours or part thereof.

Fishing boats not exceeding 50 tons gross register—10s. per week. Ship's Boats—4s. per day of 24 hours or part thereof.

Small motor boats or fishing vessels, no berthing dues.

Vessels of war of any nationality and vessels owned by the Government of any of Her Britannic Majesty's States or Dominions, provided such vessels are not engaged in trade or carrying goods under freight or charter on presentation of certificate from the Master or Department concerned, no berthing dues.

(b) Coal hulks, tugs, and dredges—£14 10s. per annum.

Launches for public hire—£7 10s. per annum.

These fees are payable half-yearly in advance, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July.

Hulks, tugs, and other non-seagoing vessels shall not be allowed to occupy berths when vessels with cargo or passengers require same.

(c) In the case of vessels using any of the wharves, but not loading or discharging cargo, the following Berthage Dues are to be raised:—

Vessels of 300 tons, gross register, and over, £3 10s. per day of 24 hours or part thereof.

Vessels of less than 300 tons, gross register, £2 5s. per day of 24 hours or part thereof.

Fishing Boats not exceeding 100 tons, gross register, when taking stores only (including ice), 6s. per day of 24 hours or part thereof.

- (d) When vessels berth or depart outside ordinary working hours the amount of overtime incurred by the wharfinger shall be payable by the shipping agent or others.
- (e) Harbour Improvement Berthing Dues.—A special Harbour Improvement Berthing due of 9d. per ton on all cargo landed or shipped shall be payable in addition to charges provided for above, by all ships (including Coasters, Overseas and Interstate vessels) using any wharf.
- (f) Computation of Berthing and Tonnage Dues.—In the computation of berthing and tonnage dues for cargo-carrying vessels, the Commission shall have the option of proceeding on a weight basis of 2,000 or 2,240 lb. to the ton (according to trade usage), or a measurement basis of 40 cubic feet to the ton, for the cargo in respect of which such dues are levied, except as follows:—

Timber, at per ton of 40 cubic feet.

1 bullock, cow, steer, heifer, or such like animal-1 ton.

3 calves or foals—1 ton.

15 sheep, pigs, dogs, goats, or such like animals-1 ton.

Caneware-

Chairs—8 to the ton.

Tables—8 to the ton.

Lounges—4 to the ton.

Articles N.O.S.—8 to the ton.

Hides (raw), loose-48 to the ton.

Hides (raw), in bags-16 bags to the ton.

Hides in bales—5 bales to the ton.

Horns and tips, in bales—5 bales to the ton.

Horns and tips, in bags-15 bags to the ton.

Skins, in bales—4 bales to the ton.

Skins in bundles—8 bundles to the ton.

Bulk kerosene and other like oils, including crude fuel oil—250 galls. to the ton.

Wool, in bales—5 bales to the ton.

Wool, in bags or pockets—10 bags or pockets to the ton.

Corn sacks and wool packs, or bags, etc., in bales—15 cubic feet each.

Beer, in kegs or casks—

Reputed 5-gallon kegs—30 to the ton.

Reputed 10-gallon kegs or firkins—15 to the ton.

Reputed kilderkins-7 to the ton.

Reputed half-hogsheads-5 to the ton.

Reputed hogsheads—3 to the ton.

Tar, oil, grease, etc., in reputed 40-gallon casks—to be taken as 11 feet 11 inches each.

Bran bags, in bales—18 cubic feet each.

Cement—per ton of 2,240 lb. gross.

(Note.—In regard to all other goods, Berthing and Tonnage Dues will be computed on the same basis as laid down in Wharf Regulation No. 6 for Wharfage and Handling Charges.)

Vessels Transhipping Cargo to Pay Berthing Dues

2. Except as otherwise provided herein all vessels lying alongside the wharves and transhipping cargo to or from lighters or other vessels, shall pay the like berthage dues in respect thereof as if the said cargo had been landed on or taken off the wharves, in place of being taken from or placed in such lighter or vessels as aforesaid. Lighters handling cargo to or from vessels not lying alongside wharves, shall be charged berthing dues.

Control of Berthing, etc.

- 3. The Harbour Master or his deputy, or other officer acting for the Harbour Master, shall have the entire control of berthing and removing all vessels coming to any wharf. He shall also appoint the berth which each vessel shall occupy, and shall have the power to remove any vessel from a berth, or alter the berth of any vessel whenever he may deem it necessary and shall think fit.
- 4. The Master of any vessel berthed at any wharf shall cause the discharge or loading of such vessel to be commenced and continued until completed, by working such hours and in such manner as the Harbour Master may direct.
- 5. The Master of every vessel upon the completion of the loading or discharging of his vessel, shall at once remove his vessel from and vacate the berth occupied by it unless he has received permission from the Harbour Master to delay such removal.

RATES FOR WHARFAGE AND HANDLING CHARGES

6. All goods landed from or snipped into any vessel shall except where otherwise provided herein, pay wharfage dues and handling and haulage charges as scheduled, the handling charges being subject to adjustment in accordance with variations in the wages of waterside workers. As from the 16th December, 1959, the increase to be added to the handling charges is 22 per centum. Such wharfage dues, etc., except where otherwise provided herein, shall be levied on ship's measurement weight or on actual weight calculated at 2,240 lb. to the ton at the option of the wharfinger or officer in charge.

The following exceptions shall apply to outwards cargo:-

Goods wholly manufactured within the State, also grain, flour, agricultural and horticultural produce and coal (the product of the State), shall be free of wharfage dues on shipment to any other port.

(Note.—The term "wholly manufactured within the State" means goods manufactured within the State of Western Australia from articles or ingredients the product of the State, or from raw materials imported which have not gone through any process of manufacture for the particular purpose of the manufacture of the ultimate finished article.)

All other goods shipped to ports within the State of Western Australia shall pay wharfage at the rate of 2s. 6d. per ton.

- NOTES.—(a) Cargo transhipped overside from a vessel in distress to another vessel for convenience or for conveyance to destination, or temporarily, 1s. 6d. per ton wharfage.
 - (b) Cargo landed on wharves from a vessel in distress or for convenience of a vessel, and reshipped by same vessel, Is. 6d. per ton wharfage. (This rate includes three days' storage in wharf shed.) Handling charges shall be made according to the method of dealing with the cargo on the same scale as other cargo.
 - (c) Cargo landed in error from a vessel and subsequently reshipped shall be charged 1s. 6d. per ton wharfage and handling charges as scheduled for each service, i.e., inwards and outwards.

[†] Or actual cost if greater.

- (d) Transhipment cargo is cargo appearing as such upon a vessel's manifest, or declared in writing to the Commission before being landed as intended for transhipment into a vessel, but does not include cargo landed for land transport to another port.
- (e) No wharfage dues will be charged in respect of ballast in the shape of stone, sand, shingle, or such like material transhipped overside vessel to vessel.
- (f) The Commission shall not supply labour to handle cargo transhipped overside vessel to vessel.
- (g) Cargo is allowed 48 hours' free storage in wharf sheds, except transhipment cargo, which is allowed 72 hours.
- (h) For the purpose of computing charges on specified rates, see Wharf Regulation No. 1.
- For extra handling and other charges on goods, see Wharf Regulations Nos. 1 and 9.
- (j) Special Note re Handling Charges.—The scale of handling charges set out in the above schedule is intended to include only normal handling and stacking and delivery of cargo, but occasions arise when the Commission is called upon to find storage space or to deal with heavy or special cargoes, to stack cargo higher than under normal conditions. It is, therefore, enacted that in the case of wool, skins, gunnies, or other baled goods of a like or heavy or cumbersome character, as well as case or general goods of a heavy or awkward character, the schedule charge shall apply only to a stacking of one tier high, and if it is desired by the owners, or is necessary in the opinion of the Pier Master, to stack the goods higher than one tier, there shall be paid, in addition to the schedule charge, an extra handling charge of 4s. per ton for each tier above the first.

Discharging from Railway Wagons.—In all cases where the Commission provides labour to discharge cargo from wagons into sheds or stacks for subsequent shipment, a charge of 7s. 6d. per ton shall be made on goods handled additional to all other charges applicable at schedule rates.

7. Australian Stevedoring Industries Authority Surcharge.—The handling charges shown in the Cargo Schedule, exclusive of any percentage variations as per Wharf Regulation 10 (d) hereof, shall be subject to a surcharge to cover the special levy raised by the Australian Stevedoring Industry Authority under the Stevedoring Industry Charge Act. On and from the 27th July, 1959, the surcharge to be added to the handling charge shall be $12\frac{1}{2}$ per centum.

GENERAL

8. Passengers' Luggage—Charges for.—Passengers' luggage, not appearing on the manifest of the ship, shall, except where carried by passengers, pay a fixed sum of 4d. (fourpence) per package to cover all wharfage and handling charges, but all luggage appearing on the manifest shall pay wharfage dues at the rate of 2s. per ton weight or measurement and handling charges as ordinary cargo. The term luggage shall not include commercial travellers' sample packages, theatrical companies' scenery and properties, furniture or merchandise. The same charges shall apply to outwards-bound luggage. Free storage will be given for 48 hours

after luggage is landed, but if luggage is left on the premises of the Commission for a longer time than 48 hours the same storage rates as for ordinary cargo shall be charged. The weight of flour, bran and pollard is to be computed for wharf haulage purposes on a basis of 2,000 lb. per ton.

- 9. Haulage.—(a) In all cases where wharfage dues are not levied, 2s. 6d. per ton haulage (minimum 5 tons per wagon) will be charged in addition to handling charges.
- (b) Where goods (whether liable for wharfage or otherwise) are loaded from ships' slings into railway wagons for consignment off the wharf, or are received for shipment direct from wagon without being handled through shed, a charge of 2s. 6d. per ton haulage (minimum 5 tons) will be levied in addition to wharfage or other charges payable.
- 10. Computation of Dues.—(a) Wharfage dues, unless otherwise specified, shall be computed in accordance with the schedule under Wharf Regulation No. 1 (f) headed "Computation of Berthing and Tonnage Dues."
- (b) In all cases where extra wages are payable or extra expense is incurred by the Commission under an order or award of the Court of Conciliation and Arbitration, a Board of Reference, or any other competent authority, for the handling of any special cargo, the extra cost thus incurred shall be payable by the consignee or the shipper of such cargo.
- (c) When salaried officers are called upon to work overtime in the interests of vessel or consignees, such overtime shall be paid for at award rates existing at the time.
- (d) All rates of handling charges shall, for each complete penny variation in the ordinary hourly rate of pay to Waterside Workers based on the said rate of pay (viz., 9s. 2d.) as in operation from the eleventh day of June, 1956, be increased or decreased as the case may require, by one per centum.
- (e) In all cases where a vessel is worked for less than six hours the Master or Owner of the said vessel shall pay to the Commission the cost of the labour employed during the time not worked, to maintain a minimum of six hours.
- (f) When inspections are made outside the official hours shown in Wharf Regulation No. 19 hereof, and when a watchman is employed, in connection with vessels loading or unloading inflammable liquid, the cost of such inspections and of the employment of the watchman shall be payable to the Commission at the actual wages costs plus $33\frac{1}{3}$ per centum.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

- 11. Wharfage and other charges on all goods must be prepaid to the Pier Master or officer in charge, unless the consignee or consignor has a duly authorised credit account with the Railways Commission.
- 12. Before commencing to discharge or tranship inward cargoes, or pror to the clearance of any ship in the case of outward cargoes, ship masters or their agents shall hand to the Pier Master or officer in charge a certified copy of the manifest of the cargo, which shall include mark-number, shipper, consignee, weight, or measurement.
- 13. The Master of any vessel shall not discharge, nor shall any consignor deliver for shipment, a package or article of a gross weight of one ton (2,240 lb.) or over unless such package or article shall have the exact weight marked thereon in legible characters not less than one inch in size; provided that where it is not practicable to weigh any package or article the weight of which is more than one ton (2,240 lb.) the gross weight of such package or article may be stated approximately within a limit of one ton, that is to say "over one but under two tons" or as the case may be.

- 14. Inward cargoes shall be delivered into railway wagons or trolleys, and, as far as it is practicable, ship masters shall deliver cargoes according to the entries on bills of lading or manifests.
- 15. To insure prompt and correct deliveries to consignees, special efforts shall be made by ship masters to deliver goods of the same nature and branded together, *i.e.*, where bag stuffs are available they shall be delivered together, where cases are available they shall be delivered together, etc.
- 16. Outward cargoes to be delivered in the same order as inward cargoes. Goods for different ports to be kept separately.
- 17. No goods shall be landed or placed on the wharves without the written authority of the Pier Master or officer in charge.
- 18. If it shall appear that goods are being landed and cannot, in the opinion of the Pier Master or officer in charge, be removed in time to prevent a "block," the Pier Master or officer in charge may give notice, in writing, to the masters or persons in charge of vessels or lighters from which goods are being discharged to stop discharging cargo, and, upon such notice being given, no further cargo shall be discharged until such time as the Pier Master or officer in charge may direct.
- 19. The official hours for trucking will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., with an interval of one hour for dinner. On Saturday the hours will be from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.
- 20. On all goods trucked after hours, or on Sundays, or on any day on which the railway goods sheds and yards are not open for the receipt and delivery of ordinary traffic during ordinary working hours, at the request of shipping agents or others, the Pier Master or officer in charge shall levy, in addition to the ordinary rate, 1s. per ton on all goods landed or shipped, and the amount of overtime charges incurred. The charge of 1s. per ton will not be levied in cases where the shipping agents, or other persons wishing to work after hours, indemnify the Commission against all claims arising from such working. The indemnity must be signed before the work begins, otherwise the 1s. per ton will be charged.
- 21. A charge of 40s. per hour (minimum 25s.) will be levied in all cases for use of a locomotive after hours, or on Sundays, public holidays, or any day on which the railway goods shed and yards are not open for the receipt and delivery of ordinary traffic during ordinary working hours, and, in addition, the shipping agents or others are to be debited with the wages of shunters and enginemen engaged and/or other employees brought on duty specially, on Sundays and/or public holidays, and half ordinary wages on Saturdays except between ordinary working hours, 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

When a tractor is utilised in lieu of a locomotive during the same periods and under the same conditions as shown in the preceding paragraph, a charge of 30s. per hour, minimum 15s., shall be levied.

When only one ship is working, that ship must bear the cost of locomotive hire incurred. When two or more ships are working, the locomotive hire is to be borne proportionately by each ship, according to the work done for each.

22. Vessel's lines will only be handled at the request of the ship's agents, and at the vessel's risk.

Charge for handling vessel's lines will be actual cost incurred, minimum £1 5s.

23. Delays caused by ships to be paid for.—The loss in wages paid by the Commission due to delays caused by ships during the course of handling cargo, owing to breakdown of gear, or the time occupied in the rigging of gear, or more than average time occupied in handling cargo, shall be paid to the Commission by the master or owners of the said ship.

- 24. Delays caused by shippers to be paid for.—The loss in wages paid by the Commission due to delays caused by shippers during the course of handling cargo, owing to breakdown of gear, or the time occupied in rigging of gear, or more than average time occupied in handling cargo, shall be paid to the Commission by the shippers of the said cargo.
- 25. Cargoes which are partly free and partly for bond shall be taken to the receiving warehouses, where they will be tallied by officers representing respectively the Customs and Railways Commission.
- 26. Storage Charges.—If free goods are not removed from the receiving warehouses within 48 hours from the time they are placed therein, a storage charge of 2s. 6d. per ton or 9d. per package per day will be made.

Storage charges on goods waiting shipment will be 2s. 6d. per ton per week or part of a week, except that bagged wheat waiting shipment shall be stored at the following rates:—

- (a) For Shed Storage—one-fifth of a penny per bag per week or part of a week;
- (b) For open air storage—one-tenth of a penny per bag per week or part of a week.

Salt for Export.—The rate on salt for export to be three pence per ton per week on each shipment, to be arrived at on a basis of half the total shipment per week from date of receipt of first portion of shipment to date last portion of shipment is finally removed from the Goods Shed. All handling and tallying to be done by the exporters.

Superphosphates.—Free storage of superphosphates to be allowed for a period of eight weeks, with a minimum charge of 2s. 6d. per ton to cover necessary handling.

Storage Charges on Overlanded Cargo.—Overlanded cargo stored at ports until picked up by the next boat is to be charged at 2s. 6d. per ton per week, calculated at dead weight or measurement, at the option of the Commission.

- 27. Goods not cleared at the Customs House will be kept in the receiving warehouses for 48 consecutive hours after delivery ex ship, to enable the consignees to clear same or enter them for bond. If at the end of 48 hours goods are uncleared they will be delivered to Customs, and a charge of 3s. per ton, minimum 3s. per consignment, will be made for haulage from the receiving warehouses to Customs. When cargo is placed in bond shed direct from ship's side, haulage charge will not be raised.
- 28. The railway officer shall, if requested, give receipts for all deliveries ex ship during official working hours.
- 29. The Railways Commission will deliver bonded goods to Customs between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. On Saturdays, work shall cease at noon.
- 30. Hire of Cranes.—Charges and conditions as shown on page 4, Tariff 3, shall apply.
- 31. Springs and Winches—Storage, etc.—Springs and winches may be allowed on the wharves and jetties at owner's risk, but a charge of 5s. per day or part of a day will be made in the case of winches whilst working, and 2s. 6d. per day when not in use. If a wagon is required to move them from one place to another, the usual haulage charges will be enforced.

Conditions and Charges for the Hire of Mooring Springs.—All vessels berthing at wharves under the control of the Railways Commission, at which mooring springs are provided by the Harbour and Light Department, shall, for the safe berthing of such vessel, use such mooring springs.

The Officer-in-Charge shall decide the number of springs to be used by any vessel and, should it appear to him necessary at any time, may order additional springs to be used.

The springs will be available on the wharf from which position the vessel will pick them up, and a receipt for same shall be given by or on behalf of the master of the vessel to the Officer-in-Charge.

The master of the vessel using the springs will be responsible for the laying of the springs and replacing same after use, failing which the Railways Commission shall be empowered to replace same at the expense of the master of the vessel.

No officer or servant of the Railways Commission, or other person, unless otherwise directed by the Officer-in-Charge of the jetty, or wharf, or berthing operations, shall be allowed to halt or walk within 12 feet of any bollard, or any other place under the jurisdiction of the Railways Commission to which any mooring spring or rope may be made fast.

The Commission will not be responsible in regard to persons or vessels for any loss, damage or accident, from whatever cause arising in consequence of the mooring springs being permitted to lie on the jetty.

The Railways Commission will not be responsible for any damage done to any vessel or damage or loss caused by any vessel to any other vessel, thing, or person, arising from the defective condition of any spring or springs provided by the Railways Commission.

The master, owner, or agent of any vessel using the springs will be responsible— $\,$

- (a) for the maintenance of such springs whilst in his or their possession;
- (b) for replacing such springs after use to the Railways Commission in good order and condition;
- (c) for any damage caused to the springs from whatever cause arising.

Eighty-five shillings (85s.) per spring per day, or part thereof, will be charged for the use of each spring and will be payable to the Harbour and Light Department or its authorised representative by the master, owner or agent of the vessel, except in the case of vessels using the springs for a period not exceeding 12 hours, when the charge will be reduced to 45s, per spring.

Every vessel when shifting berth will be responsible for the removal to the new berth of the mooring springs then in use. Should this course not be pursued, however, the vessel in question may be held responsible for replacing the springs in use at the time of shifting berth.

- 32. No person shall fish from any wharf.
- 33. Stones, bricks, clay, sand, lime, coals, coke or other fuel shall not be landed or placed on the fioor of the jetties. Firewood for the use of passenger steamers and other vessels or boats shall be taken direct from the wagon to the vessel. No goods shall be handed over the rails of the wharves.

- 34. No person shall make fast any tackle, purchase, or other gear to any part of the crane, or place, or use any private derrick, crane, or other lifting machine without special permission obtained from the Pier Master or officer in charge.
- 35. (a) Subject to subclause (b) hereof no person shall drive, ride or impel a machine on any wharf except with the written permission of the Commission and subject to the person entering into an indemnity, indemnifying the Commission if so required.
- (b) A machine may be taken across any wharf to any vessel or boat moored thereto to be loaded into such vessel, or from a vessel after discharge therefrom.
- (c) The term "machine" shall include a bicycle, tricycle, velocipede, perambulator, or any road vehicle.
- 36. No bullock or horse teams, or any wheeled vehicle, other than a railway wagon, drawn by any quadruped or quadrupeds, shall be driven on to or permitted to go on, the wharves, and no riding on horseback will be permitted thereon.
- 37. No person shall land, or place, or cause to be landed or placed upon any wharf, or upon the approach to any wharf, any decaying or decayed vegetables, or other thing whatsoever likely to become a nuisance.
- 38. Live stock in limited quantities may be landed on the wharves by permission being obtained from the Railways Commission and under the terms and conditions imposed by such authority.
- 39. No person shall stack or bring or cause to be stacked or brought any timber whatsoever on or on to any wharf without the written permission of the Pier Master or officer in charge.
- 40. Every person by or on whose behalf any timber shall be stacked or remain on any such jetty as aforesaid shall, unless he has the right to retain it thereon, forthwith after demand made by or on behalf of the Commission, remove such timber from the place on which the same is so stacked or remains as aforesaid.
- 41. Stores for consumption by the vessel by which shipped are free of wharfage dues, but handling and haulage charges shall be payable at ordinary cargo rates, according to services rendered.
- 42. **Lighting Wharf.**—45s. per hour, including approach lights; approach lights only, 25s. per hour.

Private Special Trains.—Fifteen shillings per mile will be charged, and ordinary fare for each passenger in addition, but the total cost will not be less than 20s. per mile for the forward journey, and 10s. per mile for the return journey, provided it is undertaken within 12 hours; minimum charge, £20. Detention of train beyond the time fixed will be charged for at the rate of £5 per hour. The distance which a train has to be run empty to commence a service will be charged for at the rate of 10s. per mile, but such charge is not to be in addition to the prescribed minimum, if the combined full and empty charges do not exceed that sum.

In the event of any Private Special Train being required to run to a place at which there is not a siding or platform, a special undertaking, relieving the Commission from all liability, shall be given; and if it is necessary for it to return or advance to another station, full rates will be charged for the additional mileage run.

In computing charges for Private Special Trains to be run on Sundays, 25 per cent. will be added to the foregoing, and the minimum charge will be £50.

Circus Special Trains.—See Goods Rates Book, Tariff 3, page 3.

Special Trains for Adult Excursions, Shows, Races, etc.—Special Trains for Adult Excursions, Shows, Races, etc., may be run at the convenience of the Commission under the following conditions, viz.:—

Hired Special Excursion Trains.—For a train of not less than four standard second-class carriages, 7s. per mile per carriage each way; all extra coaches above four to be charged 5s. per mile each way; such number of carriages only to be run as the Commercial Agent may approve. Minimum charge, £50. Fifty per cent. on the above rates will be charged for first-class carriages. The distance which a train has to be run empty will be charged at the rate of 10s. per mile, but such charge is not to be in addition to the recognised minimum if the combined full and empty charges do not exceed that sum.

In the event of a train being required to run to a place at which there is not a siding, and it is necessary for it to be run to a station in advance, full rates will be charged to that place.

In computing charges for Special Trains hired to run on Sundays, 25 per cent. will be added to the foregoing, and the minimum charge will be £50.

Guaranteed Special Excursion Trains to Agricultural Shows, Race Meetings, etc.—Special Excursion Trains may be arranged in connection with Agricultural Shows, Race Meetings, Football Matches, etc., on a guarantee of £1 per train mile, plus 10s. per mile for the distance the train has to run empty (minimum £20) being furnished to the Commercial Agent.

In the case of Guaranteed Special Trains run in connection with Country Agricultural Shows a 25 per cent. reduction on the above rates will be allowed. The minimum guarantee of £20 must, however, be maintained.

In computing charges for Guaranteed Special Trains to be run on Sundays, 25 per cent. will be added to the foregoing, and the minimum charge will be £50.

Special Trains for School Excursions.—Special Excursion Trains will only be run as traffic arrangements will permit, and it will be necessary for parties requiring them to give seven days' notice to the Commercial Agent.

Deposits with Orders for Special Trains.—When application is made for a Special Train it will be necessary to make a deposit, the amount of which will be fixed by the Commercial Agent. Should the Special Train be postponed or cancelled, the deposit may be forfeited at discretion of Commercial Agent.

Coaches on Goods Trains.—Coaches will be attached to goods trains when required and if convenient to the Department, on payment of deposit equal to

at least twenty (20) single fares for the full distance the coach has to run in conveying the passengers. Minimum charge for each second class coach, £3, and each first class coach, £4 10s.

When a deposit is lodged for a first class coach to be attached to a goods train, passengers travelling in such coach must hold first class tickets; failing this, the difference between second and first class fares must be paid.

Diesel-Electric Rail Cars (Government Lines only).—Diesel-Electric Rail Cars and Steam Coach may be hired at times suitable to the Department. Quotations on application to the Chief Traffic Manager.

Urgent Medical Cases (Government Lines only).—In urgent cases of sickness or accident, when it is necessary to run a special train, or motor trolley, the charges are :—

Special Train—7s. per mile, minimum £10.

Motor Trolley-ls. 6d. per mile, minimum £2 10s.

Total train or trolley mileage to be charged for. These charges include free conveyance of patient and attendant (if any).
