Current through August 13: Edvard Munch Exhibition

Large retrospective exhibition of the work of the late Norwegian expressionist, Edvard Munch, consisting of 65 oils and watercolors and more than 50 etchings, woodcuts and lithographs circulated in this country by the Boston Institute of Contemporary Art and sponsored by the Norwegian Government. Third floor.

Current through September 4: Three Modern Styles

An exhibition planned for circulation throughout the country under the supervision of the Museum's Department of Circulating Exhibitions. Includes characteristic painting, sculpture and design from each of three modern styles; Art Nouveau, Cubist-Geometric and Free Form. Auditorium Gallery.

*Current through October 1: Work by Children and Young People

Painting and design done by children and young people aged 12 to 16 in classes at the People's Art Center. Young People's Gallery, second floor.

Current through October 29: Exhibition House, architect: Gregory Ain

House built by California architect in the Museum Garden, sponsored jointly by the Museum and the Woman's Home Companion. Designed for a housing development, this 3-bedroom, 1-story house avoids the usual monotony found in such developments by use of glass exterior walls, sliding inside walls, good modern furniture, etc. Museum Garden, 4 West 54 Street.

*Current through November 5: Recent Acquisitions

A new group of recent acquisitions: work by younger American artists; including Richard Lippold's Variation Number 7: Full Moon; Rico Lebrun's Figure in Rain, and recent paintings by Jimmy Ernst, Richard Pousette-Dart and J.M. Hanson. The important Harlequin painted by Picasso in 1915 is included along with a letter he wrote to Gertrude Stein about the picture. First floor.

Current in Chicago: Good Design at The Merchandise Mart

Many new additions of home furnishings products made since January went on view at The Mart in June. This program, sponsored jointly by the Museum of Modern Art and The Mart, maintains on continuous public exhibition the best examples of modern design in all the phases of home furnishings. Examples chosen to conform to the standards of the Museum-appointed Selection Committee: "Design intended for present-day life, in regard to usefulness, to production methods and materials and to the progressive taste of the day." Eleventh floor of The Mart.

August 2 through September 10: Carvers-Modelers-Welders: A Selection of Recent American Sculpture

Fourteen works by established artists such as Mary Callery and Theodore Roszak and young artists just receiving recognition are in a variety of styles and new materials. To go on tour in the fall as a Museum Circulating Exhibition. First floor.

August 2 through September 17: Young American Photographers

One hundred prints by 51 young photographers including recent photographs, abstractions, documentary work, architectural studies, etc. First floor.

August 30 through October 15: Exhibition from the Museum Collection, including special groups: American Painting; British Painting and Sculpture; Italian work; Latin-American art; "Primitives," etc. Third floor.

A selection of paintings from the Museum Collection is always on view on the second floor; of sculpture, on the third floor and in the Garden.
