There is only enough of the No. 1 stock to fill a single order - while the No. 2 will barely hold out another month if the present demand continues. Your stock of wrappers on hand, all told, is as follows:

After the bulk of last lot of No. 2 paper had been printed it was discovered that some of the sheets were about an inch short, in length, of the regular size. It is estimated that about 10.000 wrappers will consequently be lost for want of sufficient margin.

Gentlemen:

We received this morning from the Commissioner of Inter. Rev. a letter inclosing yours of the 18th inst asking why stamps ordered by you on the 5th inst had not been sent.

We beg to explain that on the 7th inst we had a requisition from the Commissioner for 110,000 one cent stamps from your private die and of course could not fill it for want of time to prepare the dies etc. This you must have been aware of as we had already communicated to you that we required six weeks time before the stamps could be prepared; the date of your engraving order being Oct. 21. '67.

We are under the impression that some misunderstanding exists at the department about the kind of stamps you ordered on the 5th inst, that you wanted \$1.000 in the common proprietary stamps, and we have so informed the Commissioner.

If our view is correct you had better lose no time in stating to him the fact, that he may change his instructions to us, as we have no authority to send other than private stamps as called for in the requisition.

Your letter of the 16th inst inclosing letter from Messrs A. Underwood & Co, Newark, N.J. requesting us to state why their order of the 5th inst for \$1.000 in revenue stamps, had not been filled, is at hand.

In reply we beg to say that their order, No. 441 Ag, received by us on the 8th inst, called for 110.000 stamps from private die, and has not been filled in consequence of the short interval since their engraving order was made, to wit, the 21st ulto; their design being approved by you on the 23rd ulto.

We communicated to them, at the time, that it would require six weeks to complete their die and have stamps prepared therefrom. It is possible therefore that their order of the 5th inst was intended for common proprietary stamps - the correctness of which view may be determined by a reference to their letter making the order of that date.

In compliance with request, however, we have communicated to them the cause of delay, and probably they will rightly inform you on the subject. If proprietary stamps were required we can return you the present requisition for amendment; but if private stamps are wanted they should be aware that it will be two weeks yet before such can be ready for use.

The only additional expense to you would be our charge of seven cents per thousand for manufacturing the labels. We cannot now, however, execute an order for the reason that the Commissioner of Inter. Rev. has instructed us that inasmuch as it is probable that an early change will be made in the mode of preparing revenue stamps, with a view of preventing frauds in their reuse, it is deemed unadvisable at present to prepare any more new dies.

The letter of Milton Stapp, Galveston, Texas, herein returned, as referred to us by your Bureau on the 14th inst, has been considered, and we beg to inform you that the stamp submitted is undoubtedly genuine.

To prevent misapprehension on part of the Bureau we would also state that its blurred appearance was not caused by a defective plate, as the annexed stamp from our balance will show, and we do not think it can be attributed to bad printing. The manner in which we pack stamps brings all the gummed and printed surfaces together, and we have frequently noticed in the separation of sheets, which have accidentally become glued together, that the gum would draw blotches of ink from many of the stamps on the adjoining sheet, giving them a broken or blurred appearance. We think it quite likely that the stamps referred to by Mr. Stapp have been wet and afterward separated with a like result.

Mr. S. is a dealer in stamps, and has been getting his supply from here at regular periods, always sent him in tin cases hermetically sealed, and we have never heard from him any complaint. From his questioning the genuineness of certain stamps in this instance it appears that he did not get them from us and, perhaps, is uncertain by what means or indirection they reached Texas. Possibly they have endured exposure and rough handling sufficient to make them "puzzles good judges."

In regard to the New Orleans stamps we would state that according to our recollection of the matter there was such a package returned to us sometime prior to Feb 1 1867. We remember having been authorized by the Bureau to receive it according to its endorsement - the lot being so firmly stuck together that it was deemed impossible to count its contents. For the same reason the stamps were not entered in our spoiled a/c, but were merely repackaged, endorsed as originally with letter accompanying pasted on the outside. The package was subsequently placed in an apartment especially devoted to the storage of stamps intended for destruction, and was destroyed with them in February, 1867.

Unfortunately we made no note of particulars other than that endorsed on the package itself. After diligent search we can find no allusion to the subject in our back correspondence, and hence cannot inform you when, or by whom the package was returned, or of its value. A reference to your letter book however would probably give the desired information.

Your letter of the 12th inst stating there was a deficit in stamp order No. 9290, has been referred to us by the Inter. Rev. Bureau.

In reply we beg leave to state that our Examiner has a distinct recollection of counting, among other items, 101 40/100 sheets of two cent stamps in the package named immediately before it was sealed up for delivery.

In case you have not already discovered the 1 sheet & 40 two cent stamps, we advise you to look among the five cent stamps for them as we readily conceive how you might be mistaken in the matter for instance the entire 101 40/100 sheets of two cent stamps were at the bottom of the pkge - the 100 sheets being separated from the odd ones by a projecting paper marker - directly over these were the five cent stamps, and the party opening the package has run over the fives and found them correct, but in lifting them off he has removed all the stamps down to the aforesaid paper marker thus leaving the 1 sheet & 40 two cent stamps underneath the fives.

You will therefore please investigate further into the matter, and oblige us by stating whether or not our theory is correct.

Sir:

In reply to your communication of the 28th instant, we would respectfully state that our report of the 26th was not intended to make it appear that we have exchanged revenue stamps with parties desiring exchanges, without authority from your office. All exchanges that have ever been made by us, either with your bureau or private parties, were for sheets returned in consequence of being stuck together by extra exposure in their transmission from this office. In such cases we have soaked the stamps, accurately counted them, and resent in exchange precisely the same denominations and amounts of each. In filling requisitions in a couple of instances we have accidentally sent to proprietors of private dies a sheet or two of mutilated stamps, in which cases they have been returned to us for exchange and we have not hesitated to send them perfect stamps of the same denomination in return. But in no case have we ever exchanged one denomination for another, being sufficiently aware that an opposite course would have conflicted with the regulations and records of your bureau, and at the same time embarrass our own accounts. We never expected to have the subject of these exchanges brought into question, as they were obviously made in the interest of the government, and absolute justice to the parties, whose orders could not be considered executed until they were filled with perfect stamps. It would be a difficult matter at this time to hunt up and cite authorities for every case; to show however, that your office was in the habit of requesting us to make such exchanges, we refer to your letter of March 22nd 65, on the subject of Messrs Cowles & Leetes' order, wherein we are requested in pencil marks to "Please send Henry Fassett, Ashtabula, O. other stamps in place of the damaged ones returned. "Original" letter is herewith inclosed, together with copies of other letters authorizing exchanges.

In regard to the destruction of stamps which have become worthless, and our authority for such destruction, we are unable to determine whether you refer only to the stamps which have been returned for exchange, or to the destruction of spoiled stock generally. If the former we would say that when stamps are exchanged, those returned are placed in the spoiled stock in lieu of the good ones resent, are considered the same in every respect as if spoiled in the process of manufacturing, and no discrimination is therefore necessary when the spoiled stock is destroyed. In relation to the destruction of spoiled stock generally it has been our uniform custom, as it has also been with the manufacturers of postage stamps, to destroy from time to time the accumulation; it being best to do so, both for the security of the government and the manufacturer, and in the absence of any instructions to the contrary, special authority for such destruction has never been deemed necessary.

In view of our uncertainty will you please inform us if your directions in communications of the 28th inst, are intended to prohibit the future destruction of stock which may be spoiled in the process of manufacture.

Bureau to refer to us all applications for private dies, which action, however, does not imply that the Commissioner will authorize us to make the stamp plates. It is merely intended that we shall inform the parties of the terms and regulations, and submit designs to the Bureau for approval. Before we regularly submit a design for your stamp for official consideration we beg to inform you that the Commissioner has instructed us that inasmuch as it is probable that an early change will be made in the mode of preparing stamps it is deemed unadvisable at present to prepare any more new dies, as they might soon become valueless to their owners. You would therefore be required to state to us that you would assume all risk of loss in this respect.

Our price for engraving a private die and making stamp plate complete is three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) payable upon presentation of a proof impression from the finished die. The time usually required to execute an engraving order is six weeks. As we are the manufacturers of stamps as well as dies, the plates are of course retained in our custody on behalf of the government, we keep a three month's supply of private stamps ahead so that proprietors are subject to no delay in getting their orders filled. Orders for stamps are addressed to the Hon E. A. Rollins, Commissioner of Inter. Revenue, Washington, D. C. inclosing the duplicate certificate of a U.S. Assistant Treasurer or designated depository of a deposit made covering the amount of order. The Commissioner then makes a requisition on us and stamps are sent to the parties forthwith. If the stamps are ordinary government size, viz 13/16 of an inch superficial area for one and two cent stamps, or 63/64 of an inch for three and four cent stamps, there will be no extra charge for manufacturing, if, however, the stamp exceeds these areas there will be an additional charge made for the cost of paper and printing. In pursuance of your note of the 2d instant referring to us the letter (herewith returned) of Messrs Root, Anthony & Co., New York City, informing you of complaints made to them that stamps are so easily affected by moisture in the atmosphere; and that one of their customers residing in Texas desires to know whether you will furnish revenue stamps unguammed for the Southern market. We would state, that when stamps leave our office they are always in good condition, the same gum is always used, and the best obtainable; but if improperly exposed to such damp weather as has characterized the past summer it will certainly become soft.

The complaints coming from their customers in Texas may no doubt be attributed to want of care on the part of Messrs Root, Anthony & Co. themselves, in packing stamps for transmission to a humid climate. They should invariably be hermetically sealed in tin cases to protect them against the subsequent conditions of moisture and heat to which they are exposed in transit. This is our mode of packing for such places and no complaint insues. As it has never appeared that stamps were in bad condition when Messrs Root, Anthony & Co. received them from us, we cannot justly be held accountable for those that are retransmitted by them packed in a manner over which we can have no control.

We have never charged for any stamps except those delivered upon requisition of the Internal Revenue Bureau: on the contrary, have repeatedly borne the loss of resending good ones for those that have been accidentally spoiled in their transmission.

As we are not aware that any stamps have been returned to us, and others sent upon requisition in their stead, since the 1st of August, 1863, we, of course, have no returns to make. But there were returned to us, by your direction, on the 5th of May, 1867, from C. M. Kibbom, Philadelphia, Pa. thirty five packages marked letter "E" containing in all 1,351,700 stamps, representing a value of \$36,750. We are the Gov't agents to manufacture revenue stamps and stamp plates. Our charge for engraving a private die, and making stamp plate complete is, uniformly, Three hundred and fifty dollars (\$30). There is also an extra charge for printing at the rate of 13/16 of an inch superficial area of stamp free, and 3 1/8 inches ten cents per thousand stamps, all other sizes in proportion. For stamps larger than the Government sizes there is a charge of three cents per thousand for extra perforation.

When the price of goods is diminished or increased, the denomination of stamp can be changed on the die at a cost of about two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

We cannot now, however, execute an engraving order for the reason that the Comm'r of Inter. Rev. has instructed us that, inasmuch as it is probable that an early change will be made in the mode of preparing dies, no new ones will be approved for the present: but will put the application on file and notify you when the prohibition has been withdrawn.

In answer to your favor of the 15th inst we have the honor to state that we are the Government Agent to manufacture revenue stamps and stamp plates.

Our charge for engraving a private die and making stamp plate complete is uniformly three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) payable upon presentation of a proof impression from the finished die. The time usually required to execute the work is six weeks. The Government furnishes stamps of the ordinary size without charge for printing, but when they exceed  $13/16$  of an inch superficial area for one and two cent stamps, and  $63/64$  of an inch for other denominations, we are authorized to charge at the rate of ten cents per thousand for stamps  $3\frac{1}{8}$  inches superficial area for extra printing and three cents per thousand stamps for perforating.

The Government allows a commission of ten per cent on all orders for stamps over \$500 at a time.

We cannot now, however, execute an engraving order for the reason that the Commissioner of Internal Revenue has instructed us that "inasmuch as it is probable that an early change will be made in the mode of preparing stamps no new dies will be approved at present". We can therefore only suggest that, if you are entirely willing to assume the risk of losing the use of the die by reason of the said probability, you are at liberty to state that fact to the Commissioner and he may grant special permission in your case.

We shall place your order on file in the meanwhile and duly advise you when the prohibition has been removed.

In reply to your letter of the 30th inst, respecting the stamps received by us May 5th 67 from Mr. C. McKibbon, and forwarded to your office on the 24th inst, we beg to state that the identical stamps were not sent to you for the reason that they came to us in thirty five small packages of \$1050 each, folded in the middle of the sheets, and remained in that condition until the receipt of your letter of the 20th inst. We then counted the stamps and found that in the long interval of nearly two years they had become so dry and hard, and the creases in the folds so firmly set, as to render them unfit for handling until they had stood awhile in bulk, or been repressed. Not wishing to delay their shipment we deemed it expedient and proper to send you a like amount from our stock and retain the others. We did so and the original stamps are still on hand except 800 sheets of two cents, a few of the fives and all the twenty-fives, which, during the last few days were used in filling orders.

The returned stamps were of course not included in our stock a/c, nor in our monthly report to your office. Upon receiving them from Mr. McKibbon we merely entered them under the head of "Suspense a/c" and upon their delivery credited the a/c accordingly.
