



Qualifications for Membership (Extract from the Constitution)

ANY MAN shall be eligible to membership in the Society who, being of the age of *eighteen* years or over and a citizen of good repute in the community, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who was at all times unfailing in loyalty to, and rendered active service in, the cause of American Independence, either as an officer, soldier, seaman, marine, militiaman or minute man, in the armed forces of the Continental Congress or of any one of the several Colonies or States, or as a Signer of the Declaration of Independence, or as a member of a Committee of Safety or Correspondence, or as a member of any Continental, Provincial, or Colonial Congress or Legislature, or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts of resistance to the authority of Great Britain.

Application for membership is made on standard blanks furnished by the State Societies. These blanks call for the place and date of birth and of death of the Revolutionary ancestor and the year of birth, of marriage, and of death of ancestors in intervening generations. Membership is based on one original claim; additional claims are filed on supplemental papers. The application and supplementals are made in duplicate.

Message of President-General

My dear Compatriots:

There is no priority on patriotism. No shortage here. But if rationing was necessary I am sure the members of our Society would all be entitled to "C" cards. For our compatriots are engaged in every kind of war work; more than 10% are active civilian aides to the F.B.I. in preserving internal security. Our members are now studying post-war problems with the hope of helping to establish some plan which will maintain our sovereignty, yet have some promise of preventing future wars.

- THE CONGRESS -

These are the reasons why our National Trustees decided to hold the Congress this year. We must not relax our war activities and it is important that we carry on. Also it is appropriate that the meeting should be a streamlined one-day business session. We hope those who can do so will come to New York and lend support and advice in this important war-time Congress.

- COMMITTEES -

To conserve time, I request all committee chairmen to make a brief report (one page, if possible) and send two copies to me by April 20th. These reports will be duplicated so that each delegate attending the Congress may have a copy and then the substance will be reprinted in the July issue of the Magazine. This will dispense with verbal reports except in a few important instances. In preparing your reports may I suggest that you conclude them with a brief recommendation for activity of your committee during the coming year?

— THANK-YOU —

This has been a marvelous year of action. Reports coming from almost every State indicate that local Chapters and State Societies have carried on the work in spite of other war-time demands. Our membership is increasing and we are rapidly approaching the place where we may all participate more fully in the great work our Society was organized to perform.

To all those who have contributed so much to make this year a success, I give you a hearty "Thank-You". To those who have taken the time to write me hundreds of encouraging and enthusiastic letters, may I express my sincere appreciation? They tell a story of patriotism and loyalty which is especially heartening in these tragic times. May I also apologize for the unavoidable delay in answering some of your very kind letters? They have not been forgotten.

The spirit of unity and cooperation throughout the months of my administration have been a beacon light to guide us in future years. The Executive Committee has said many kind things about the work you are doing. I am sure my entire staff joins me in this message.

May I express the hope that each of you will keep up the excellent work and support my successor as you have so faithfully supported me.

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Thomas Jefferson Bicentennial Celebration

On Tuesday, April 13th, of this year there scientist and inventor and many of his ideas will be celebrated in Washington the Bicentennial of the birth of Thomas Jefferson and elaborate plans have been made for the dedication of the Jefferson Memorial at the Tidal Basin near the Potomac River.

The Library of Congress has issued a number of interesting pamphlets which give in condensed form the many sides of the great Statesman, philosopher, inventor, master of the art of expression, which is so wonderfully shown in the writing of the Declaration of Independence. Each of these pamphlets gives a short résumé of these many phases of character which are comparable in number and kind to those of Benjamin Franklin.

There will be an exihibit of these many phases of Jefferson at the Library of Congress which will be of great interest to the many who will visit the Library during the next few months.

Jefferson is best known to the great mass of people as a Statesman, the exponent of the outstanding 'principles of democracy, as a great President and a liberal thinker both in civic and religious life. Many do not know that he had a wonderful library, most of which was destroyed by fire, but many rare books and pamphlets which were preserved will be included in this exhibit. It is stated that Jefferson was the actual founder of the Library of Congress and when that library was destroyed by fire he offered to give his own private library to replace in part the losses. There will be in this exhibit a collection of material illustrating the several aspects of Jefferson's activity in the domain of law. In this will be Jefferson's will and the original manuscript of his epitaph in which he claims credit for having composed the Declaration of Independence, the Virginia statute of Religious Freedom, and for having founded the University of Virginia.

Another phase of Jefferson that will be shown in his role as a creator of the expanding of the United States, indicated by newlycompiled maps showing the distribution of places and things named for him. There are such memorials on maps of all but two of the United States. In 1940, 2,006,633 people lived in areas in the United States named Jefferson.

In view of this great dedication so soon to take place it was felt timely to show in this issue of our MAGAZINE the magnificent memorial to be dedicated to this great Statesman on April 13th. 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Memorial Day, 1943

The thirtieth day of May was designated by the Grand Army of the Republic in 1868, for the purpose of placing flowers on or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country, when John A. Logan, Commander-in-Chief, issued his famous "General Order No. 11", and has become Memorial Day to all veterans who served in the armed forces of their country.

All veteran organizations have the opportunity to plan Memorial Day programs this year on a scale that will give the American people a new conception of the way Memorial Day should be observed, with the moral support of the families of those four million or more Americans who are now serving in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, and Merchant Marine. Never again should we permit Memorial Day to degenerate into a holiday dedicated solely to self pleasures. The lesson in France should warn us against the danger of neglecting our patriotic traditions.

With the blood of our American boys being spilled all over the world in defense of Freedom in this global war, the time has arrived when Memorial Day should no longer be the signal for a nation-wide carnival of automobile races, baseball games, or picnics.

Let us discharge this patriotic responsibility in a manner that will leave Memorial Day firmly established as a day of homage to those whose sacrifices have guaranteed our security as a free and independent nation.

It is mandatory that all members of the Sons of Union Veterans of The Civil War participate in Memorial Day services with the Grand Army of the Republic, or with other veteran and patriotic organizations, in memory of the honored dead of our country. They should use their influence in every possible manner for the proper and general observance of this day, and that Memorial Day, instituted by the Grand Army of the Republic, shall ever be held sacred by the people of our country. These exercises should help inspire each of us with renewed faith in the ideals for which we are fighting today, and in the words of Abraham Lincoln: "That we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain".

An Historic Charter


Because of its unique character and the historic interest that it should arouse in our members, there is published in this issue of the S. A. R. Magazine a photograph of the Charter granted to Berkshire County Chapter, of the Massachusetts Society by Resolution in June 1897.

It was but a few weeks ago that this Charter which had been lost for many years was found in Pittsfield, Massachusetts, in a dark corner of the Stevenson Block in that City and brought to light.

This was an important find not only to the Chapter but to antiquarians who wish to see preserved relics of such impelling interest.

The story of this Charter and its construction is most interesting. The frame with glass on both sides is 23 by 20 inches in size and was made from a rafter of Faneuil Hall, Boston, built in 1763. Inlaid are pieces of wood from the old Indian House at Deerfield; the John Hancock House, Old North Church and Old South Church in Boston; First Congregational Church, Concord; the Washington Elm at Cambridge, under which General Washington took command of the Army in 1775; the Charter Oak at Hartford; the Peace Party House at Pittsfield; the famous Pittsfield and Boston Elms; the Jane McCrea Pine; the U. S. ships *Constitution, Merrimack*, and *Cumberland*; and his Majesty's ship *Somerset*. Imbedded in the frame is a piece of iron from an oven at Fort Ticonderoga. The frame is fastened together with wrought nails that were removed from the Faneuil Hall rafter.

The idea of such a frame for the Berkshire County Chapter was conceived by the late John M. Stevenson of Pittsfield and many letters which give authenticity to this historic piece of wood imbedded in the frame were kept by Mr. Stevenson, who was deeply interested in historical matters. It is interesting to note that three of the original signers of the application for this Charter are still alive: they are Hon. Allen Towner Treadway, many years Representative in Congress from Massachusetts, Milton B. Warner and Edward H. Bush of Pittsfield.



Colonel Paul P. Newlon

1878-1943

Vice President General, 1938

The passing of Former Vice President General Colonel Paul P. Newlon, of Colorado, was reported as of January 30, 1943, at his home in Denver, after a brief illness.

At the time of his death Colonel Newlon was Executive Vice Chairman of the Colorado Defense Council. He was former Adjutant General of Colorado.

As a veteran of World War I, Colonel Newlon played a prominent part in the State and National Guard. He was appointed Adjutant General in 1921 and served under three administrations. He served on the Mexican border during the 1916-17 troubles as Captain of Infantry, was promoted to major and sent

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to France, remaining overseas a year after the armistice. In 1920 he was Deputy Superintendent of the Colorado Rangers, State Police.

Colonel Newlon was elected Vice President General of the National Society for the Rocky Mountains District at Dallas, Texas, in 1938. His Revolutionary ancestor was Ensign Brintnal Robbins of Connecticut, a Minute Man at Lexington, who served throughout the struggle and received a pension. Colonel Newlon was President of the Colorado Society for three terms, and served in many advisory capacities. His loss will be deeply felt by his many friends and compatriots.

Medals Have Advanced in Price!

Our original supply of Good Citizenship Medals is exhausted and in order to supply our demands and not disappoint the hundreds of Medal winners all over the country we have been obliged to arrange for a new supply at an advanced cost of \$1.50 and \$1.75 each.

The design will be the same, but the new medals will be smaller, suspended by a ribbon, and will be of silver at \$1.50 and with brown rose gold plating at \$1.75 each. The usual discounts will be allowed on lots of a dozen or more.

R. O. T. C. Medals will be provided in the same materials and prices.

We feel assured that this unavoidable advance in price will not deter the presentation of the many awards which have become such an important feature of the partiotic programs of many of our societies. The value of the Medals as character building aids in our public schools cannot be overestimated. We urge your continuation of your accustomed awards.

Special attention is called to the announce- in the number of graves located and to be marked with marble or granite headstones. There have been eight applications for headstones sent to the quarries from Cuvahoga County and an equal number from Geauga County but no markers have as vet been received. Brief Book Reviews

"A Prophet and A Pilgrim," by Herbert W. Schneider and George Lawton; published by the Columbia University Press, New York City (\$5).

This is an amazing story of Thomas Lake Harris and Laurence Oliphant and their followers. History is replete with instances of small bands of idealistic men and women who, having rejected the main ethical, religious and economic codes of their day, have followed a prophet out into the wilderness to hew out in peace and privacy a life

nearer to their dreams. Of such intrepid but doomed groups, the Brotherhood of the New Life was one of the most curious and relatively successful. While no utopia ever had a more ambitious ideology, Harris was apparently a shrewd manager and the members cooperated intelligently and industriously in promoting their community.

Our Flag's Development*

FLAGS OF OUR COUNTRY

1. Sebastian Cabot landed at Labrador. 1497, and planted on North American soil the Red Cross flag of England, the Ensign of King Henry the Seventh.

2. The flag of England, our Mother Country, was our flag from the landing of Capt. James Smith and his associates in the establishment of the first permanent English speaking colony in America in 1607, at Jamestown, Virginia; and from the landing of the Pilgrims in the Mayflower at Plymouth, Mass., in 1620, and continued to be our Flag until June 14th, 1777. In 1606 Scotland was added to England, and the White Cross of St. Andrew was placed upon the National Flag, changing the field from white to blue, by order of King James I, and was called Union or King's Colors. It was used in Massachusetts Colony in 1634.

3. 1707 the color of the flag was changed from blue to crimson, and the two crosses on a blue field were placed in the upper corner. This flag was called the "Cromwell Flag". 4. The Colonies used the King's Colors, and when the Cromwell Flag was adopted (1707) used it with modifications-placing a pine tree on a white field in lieu of the crosses. This, and

5. The plain white flag with pine tree, were regarded as the flags of Massachusetts Colony for some time. In 1775 the Pine Tree flag was decided on for our vessels.

6. The Southern States, or then Colonies, from 1776 to 1777, used the Snake flag.

7. The first striped flag was raised at Washington's Headquarters, Cambridge, Mass. January 2, 1776. It was called the "Cambridge Flag", and known in England as the "Rebellious Stripes". Lieutenant John Paul Jones hoisted this flag on his vessel, the "Alfred", and said "The flag of America floats for the first time over an American Man-of-War.'

8. June 14, 1777, Betsy Ross made the first flag of thirteen stars and thirteen stripes.

9. Vermont was added to the Union in 1791, and Kentucky in 1792. In consequence two additional stars and stripes were added to the flag, making a flag of fifteen stars and fifteen stripes. This was the flag of the War of 1812, and was known as "The Star-Spangled Banner".

10. April 4, 1818, a bill was passed by Congress, reducing the number of stripes to thirteen, and increasing the number of stars to one for each State.

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Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution

Held at the Hotel Plaza in New York City, on January 14, 1943

Present: President General Sterling F. Mutz, presiding.

Louis Annin Ames, New York; Wallace C. Hall, Michigan; Laurens M. Hamilton, Florida; Smith L. Multer, New Jersey. Also, Secretary and Registrar General Frank B. Steele, Treasurer General George S. Robertson and Chancellor General Henry R. Dutcher.

President General Mutz called the meeting to order at ten a. m.

Voted: To approve the minutes of the last meeting of the Executive Committee, as published in the July issue of the S. A. R. Magazine.

Mr. Steele read his report as Secretary and Registrar General which on motion duly carried was received and ordered placed on file.

Voted: To ratify the mail votes of the preceding meeting of the Executive Committee, as follows:

June 15, 1942 (Mail Vote)

1. Approved, the creation of departments and committees as outlined and attached.

2. Approved, the announcement in the magazine of our aid in the war effort.

3. Approved, the announcement in the magazine of our plan to increase membership.

4. Approved, the expenditure of needed amounts for printing, mimeographing, postage, supplies and necessary clerical help in the work of increasing membership, not exceeding \$200 per month for a test period of six months, to be spent only upon the approval of a majority of the following; President General; Secretary General; Treasurer General; and Chairman of the Department of Organization, it being understood that no salaries will be paid to anyone for this work.

5. Voted, to award the following as an aid to the membership plan:

- Gold Medal—Cost not over \$15.00 To one securing most members
 Silver Medal—Cost not over \$10.00

 Shiver Medal—Cost not over \$10.00 To one securing next most members
 Bronze Medal—Cost not over \$5.00 To one securing next most members
 25 additional prizes—costing not more than an average of \$1.00 each.
 Certificate of Honor—Costing only a few cents each to everyone securing three or members.

October 19, 1942 (Mail Vote)

1. Approved, necessary painting of Headquarters' trim in Washington, 1227 16th Street, N. W., at the sum of \$320.70.

2. Authorized, expenses of Frank B. Steele, Secretary General, to attend the ceremonies at the installation of new chapter at Oswego, New York.

Special Mail Vote-July 1, 1942

A vote favoring purchase of War Damage Insurance.

Voted: That the Registrars of the State Societies and the Secretary and Registrar General be authorized to approve applications for membership signed by a duly authorized representative of the applicant, who during the present war emergency is in active service in the armed forces of the United States.

The Report of Mr. Robertson, Treasurer General, was received and filed.

Voted: That we invest a sum not to exceed \$3000.00 of the cash balance of the Permanent Fund in Series G Victory Bonds.

Voted: To allow the Treasurer General to purchase new books to keep his records.

Voted: To authorize the Redemption Committee to redeem as of July 1, 1943, certificates to the amount of \$3000.00 which represents \$2000.00 annually provided for and \$1000.00 taken from the surplus of the money in the Redemption Fund.

Mr. Hall made a verbal report on his Department of Organization, stating that the results, while not quite up to their earlier optimistic expectations, were quite gratifying. According to reports from various State Societies the National Society could expect to add 1500 new members for the fiscal year. He mentioned that among the applications received recently were those of Senators Taft, Nye and Austin. He commented particularly on the good work of certain State Societies, and expressed his appreciation of the cooperation received from Mr. Steele, Mr. Robertson and Mr. Mutz at all times in connection with the work of his department. He reported that there were nine new chapters now in process of organization, and Mr. Mutz stated that a Society was being formed in the State of Nevada and would soon be ready for a charter. Mr. Multer reported on the reorganization of the Abraham Clark Chapter of the New Jersey Society.

Second: That we pledge a renewal of our faith in the Constitution of the United States, as written by the founding Fathers, as the greatest protection for our people against oppression and tyranny, in time of peace as well as in time of war;

Third: That we deplore and condemn as utterly un-constitutional and unamerican any delegated or other citizen or any person of life, liberty or property without the process of law as provided in the Fifth Amendment of the Constitution; Fourth: That we deplore and condemn as utterly un-

constitutional and unamerican any attempt to limit or restrict freedom of religion, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, or the right of the people to peaceably assemble as provided in the First Amendment of the Contsitution. We declare our belief that without freedom

of the press our liberties would not endure. *Fifth:* That we express our appreciation and our approval of the recent action of the House of Representatives in appointing a Committee to inquire into the sacrifice of Constitutional Rights or Constitutional authority by so-called delegated Bureaucratic authority, and we urge the Congress to take the necessary steps, after a full investigation, to repair or restore such rights wherever necessary, as soon as possible. Sixth: That we earnestly urge that the three Depart-

ments of our Government, the Legislative, the Executive and the Judicial, remain separate and apart, in spirit as well as in truth, as provided in the Constitution, neither Department encroaching upon the rights, duties or pre-rogatives of the other;

Seventh: That we urge the Congress of the United States to take whatever steps are necessary, under the Constitution and the laws, to see that our Constitution is preserved and maintained in full force and vigor, with-

out regard to party or partisianship, including the Bill of Rights, and all the rights guaranteed thereunder, whether specifically mentioned in these resolutions or not enumeration of certain rights herein, not being intended to exclude other rights under the Constitution Eighth: That these resolutions be printed in the local press, the local and National Bulletins and the Con nal Record.
