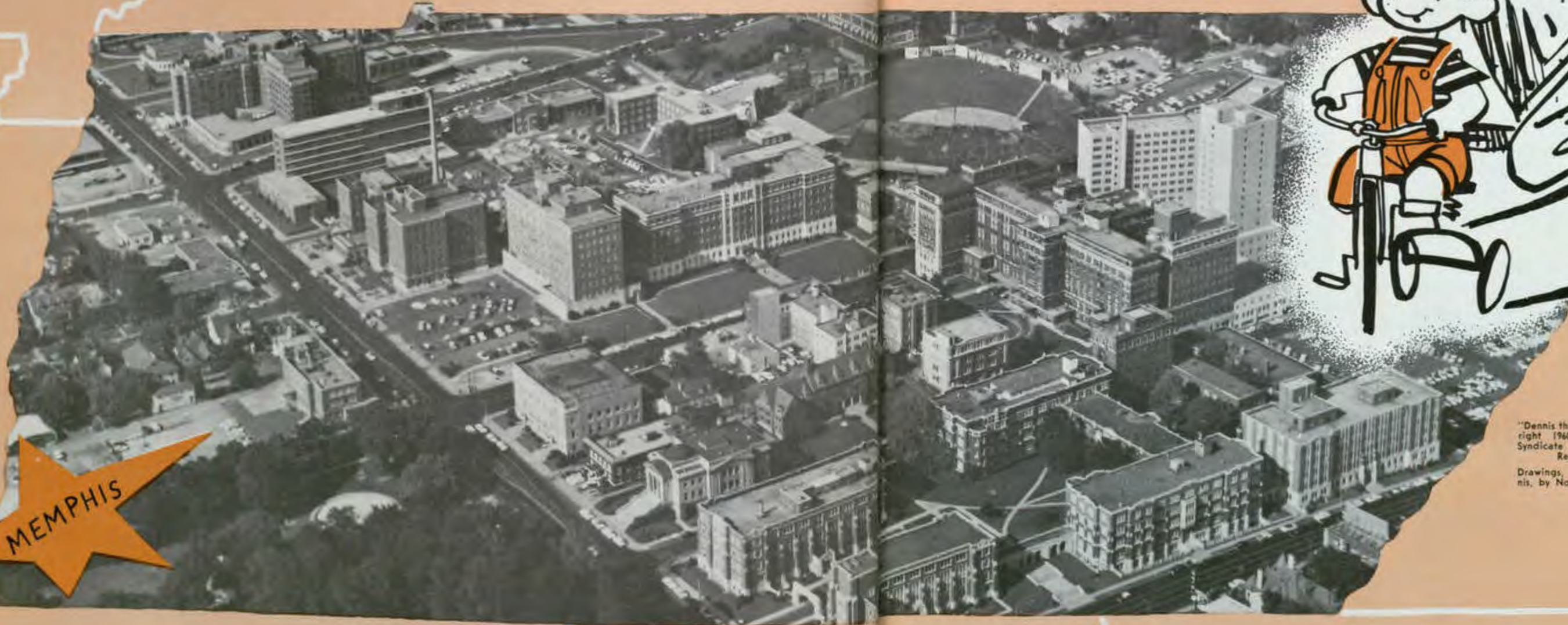

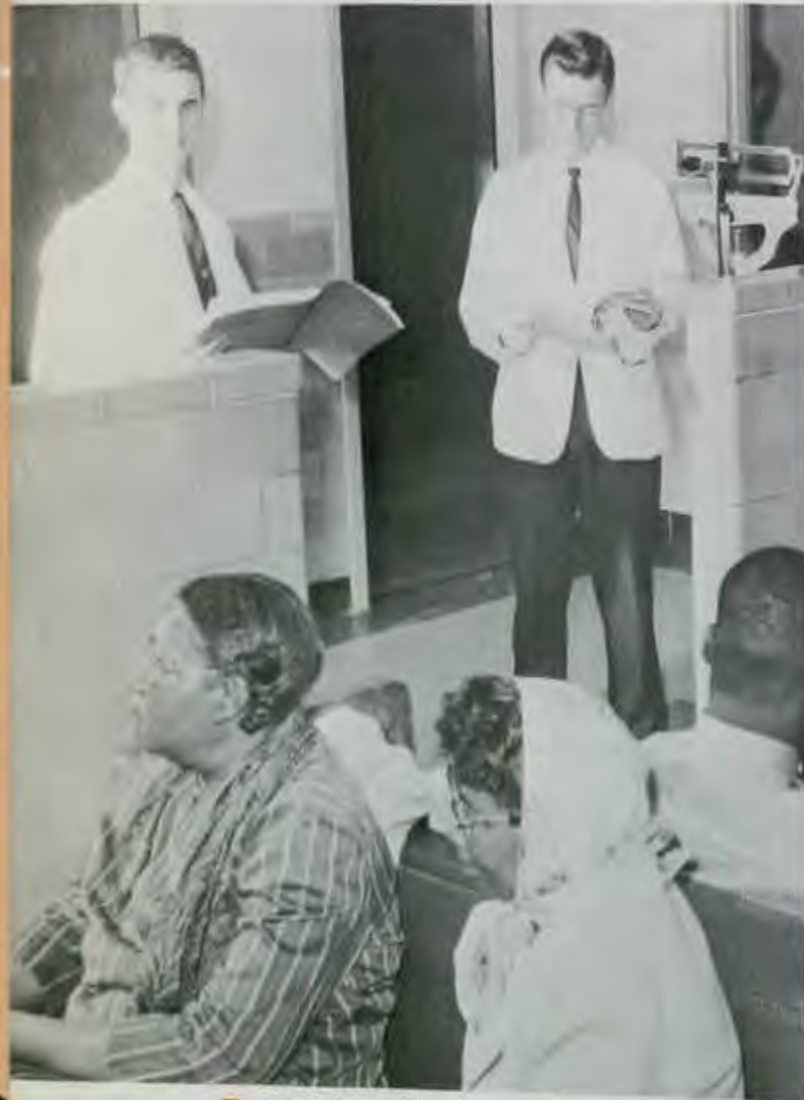

The clinic waiting rooms are always crowded with patients for the student doctors.

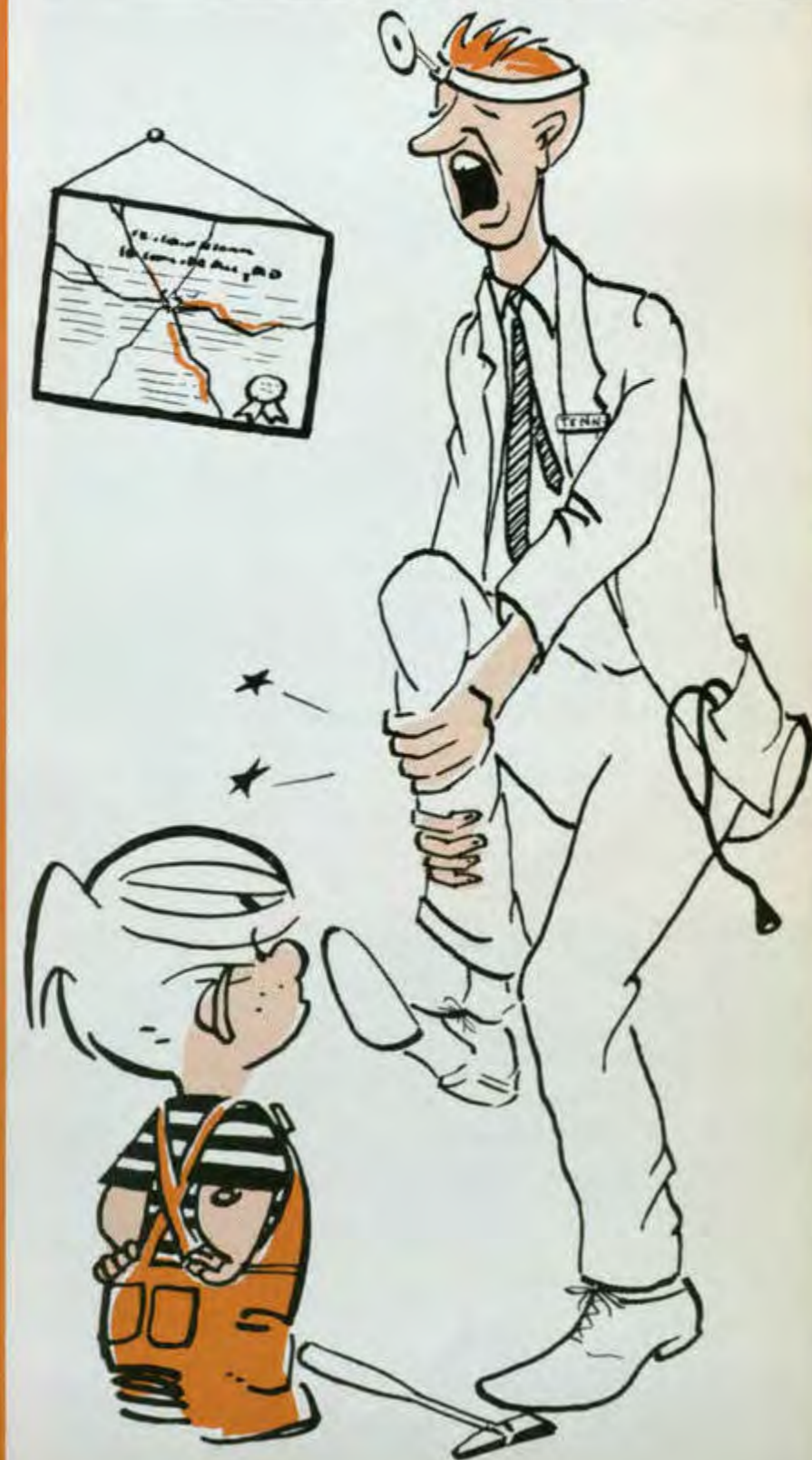
The College of Medicine, since its establishment in Memphis in 1911, has grown into one of the largest medical-educational institutions in the nation, and has become an integral and functioning part of one of the largest medical centers in the south. In the academic year 1958-1959, it officially ranked fourth in the nation in total enrollment, and second in the number of students graduated. In that same year, 72% of the students entering the College of Medicine were residents of the State of Tennessee. From its humble beginning in two-story Lindsley Hall, the College has expanded magnificently into a physical plant worth several million dollars, and, in addition, has long-term agreements with most of the medical units in the medical center, all of which points to the abundance of invaluable clinical experience for the student. Among the institutions operated directly by or in close affiliation with the College of Medicine are: John Gaston Hospital, Gailor Memorial Hospital, Tobey Memorial Children's Hospital, West Tennessee Tuberculosis Hospital, Kennedy Veterans Administration Hospital, LeBonheur Children's Hospital, Memphis Speech & Hearing Center, West Tennessee Cancer Clinic, and Les Passes Center for Neuromuscular Disease; and a welcome addition in 1964 will be the State of Tennessee Mental Health Hospital, presently under construction.

The University of Tennessee College of Dentistry is located in the heart of the Memphis Medical Center, one of the biggest and best medical centers in the world. The modern building with its adequate facilities enables the excellent staff to give the student a dental education of unexcelled caliber. Each department and each division has its own separate facilities for more efficient instruction of the student in his own particular phase of dentistry. Each department, Oral Diagnosis, Oral Surgery, Periodontics, Operative, Pedodontics, Crown and Bridge Prosthesis, Full Denture Prosthesis, and Orthodontics contributes to the student's appreciation of the patient as a whole.

The latest in materials and equipment is available to the student so that he may learn modern, practical dentistry and, thus, be better qualified to correctly and efficiently treat the ever-growing number of prospective patients.

The closeness of the college, both in proximity and cooperation, to the Colleges of Medicine and Pharmacy, the School of Nursing, the numerous hospitals and other facilities such as the West Tennessee Cancer Clinic, Institute of Pathology, and Cancer Research Lab make the University of Tennessee College of Dentistry an ideal school for training in the profession of dentistry.

College of Pharmacy

The College of Pharmacy has been in the midst of radical changes during the 59-60 school year. New courses have been added, rearranged or improved and several new faculty members have joined or will be joining the staff this year. Already Dr. Joe Haberle has joined the Department of Pharmacy Formulation and Manufacturing. In addition Drs. Lasslo, Quintana, Taylor and Mr. Joe Mackey will be on the active staff starting in the fall 1960.

The College of Pharmacy is accredited by the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education and is a member of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy. Membership in the association is limited to schools which maintain the high standards of instruction accepted by the association.

The College of Pharmacy offers one of the most extensive and well-rounded programs in pharmaceutical education in the entire south. Students gain valuable experience by actual compounding of prescriptions as well as studying the hows and whys of the pharmaceutical world.

This year has also seen the start of a school publication, "The Triturations," which promises to bring the pharmacy student body up to date on happenings in and around the University of Tennessee. The school also can be proud of 100% membership of all students in Student Branch of the American Pharmaceutical Association

School of Nursing

Since the first students graduated from the Memphis City Hospital Training School for Nurses, the forerunner of the present program, the University of Tennessee School of Nursing has developed into a truly collegiate school. Learning from the clinical areas, in conjunction with knowledge gained from science and liberal arts courses, prepares graduates of the program to function as professional personnel in beginning positions of nursing.

In 1957 the contract between the University and the City of Memphis Hospitals was amended with the result that student nurses are required to pay for their own maintenance and are released from all nursing service obligations. In addition the faculty is now responsible for student experience in the clinical areas.

The sound program now in existence reflects continued efforts of the faculty. Each department in the school is directed by a professor with a master's degree in that field. Each instructor holds at least a Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

The quality of the students and the program continues at a high level. Now students are ready to enroll in nursing programs on a graduate level. Current emphasis is on graduating a nurse who is fully qualified to perform staff nursing in any medical setting.

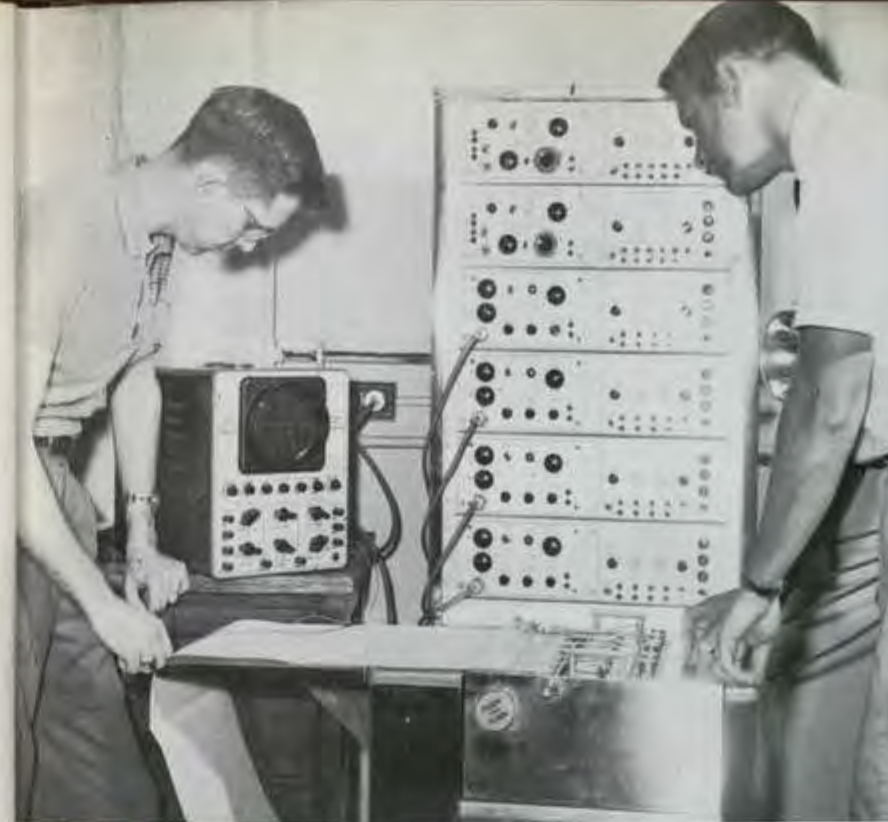




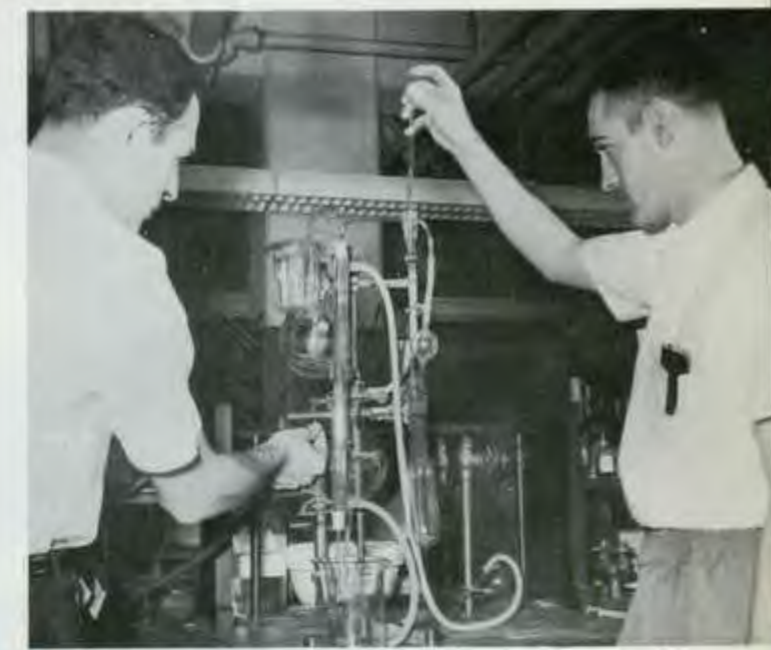

College of Medicine

The College of Medicine operates largely on the learning-by-doing principle. Although the student's pre-clinical quarters are necessarily occupied by essential didactic lecture material and extensive laboratory training, he begins his contact with hospital patients early in his career, and his junior and senior years are composed mainly of diagnostic and laboratory studies and management and treatment of hospital and out-patient department patients. All of these clinical activities are supervised by the full-time university staff and volunteer members of the medical profession of the Mid-South.

In addition to his hospital and clinic training, the student is afforded a phase of medical training which is unique in medical education in the United States. This is the Family Care Program, pioneered at the University of Tennessee, and affording the experience in over-all patient management that is so vital in the practice of medicine. In this program, the student becomes the "Student Doctor" for an indigent family carefully screened and selected to provide a broad "family medicine" experience, and as such, assumes responsibility for every aspect of his family's medical care for a twelve-month period.

Observing an interview of a psychiatric patient helps prepare the student to handle such cases in the clinic and later in his practice.

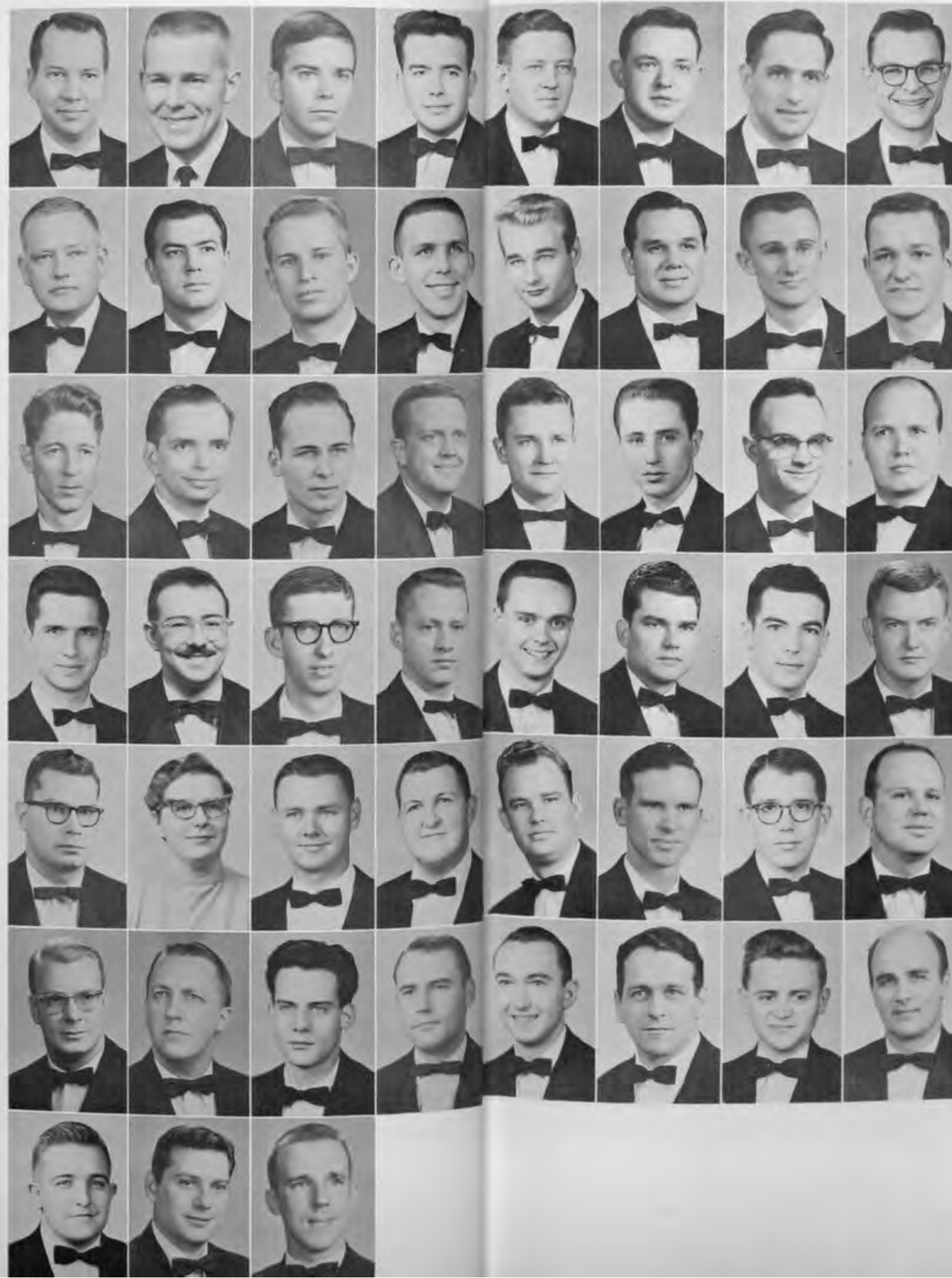

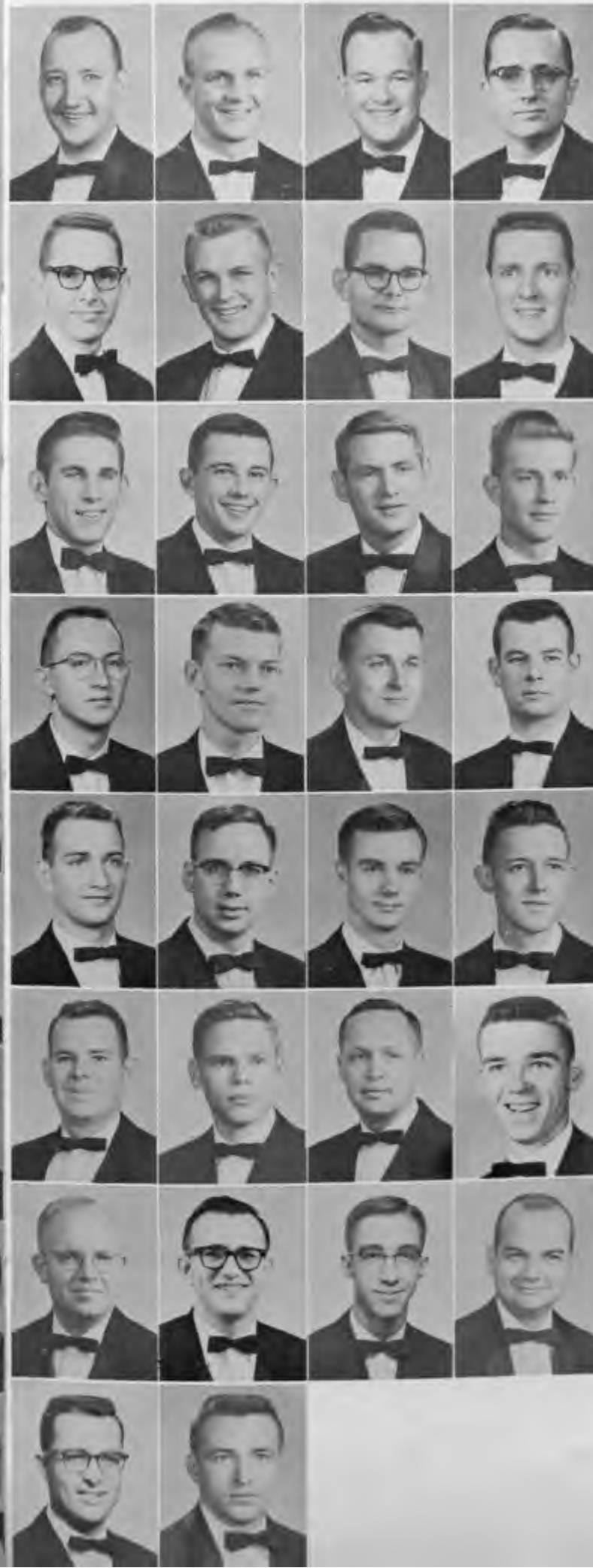

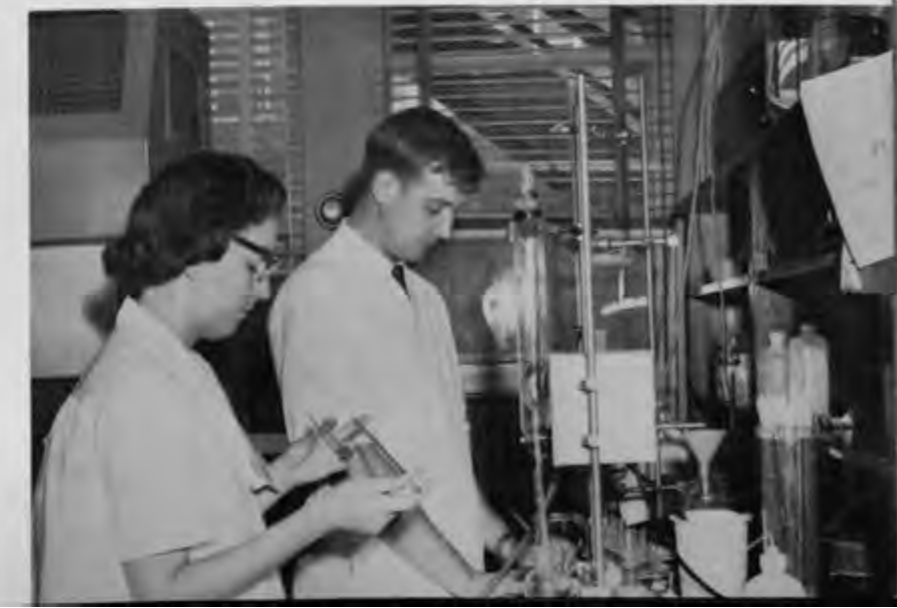

College of Dentistry

It is generally agreed that a graduate of the University of Tennessee College of Dentistry is an operator of unexcelled ability and technique. The position of relative superiority which a graduate of the school assumes is a result of several different factors. The excellent staff of instructors is aided in its task of preparing the students for careers in dentistry by a progressive administration which has as its aim the graduation of men who have the ability to combine correct diagnosis with sound treatment.

The proper technique for research and the presentation of the results of that research is a basic part of the early dental education. Manual dexterity is refined by courses in dental anatomy, dental materials, and other courses in basic technical dentistry. The laboratory application of dental theories and techniques is continued throughout the second year of instruction. Oral pathology, periodontics, exodontics, and anesthesia are studied extensively during the second, third and fourth years. All students receive instruction in pedodontics and orthodontics, as well as surgery and anesthesiology, and graduate courses in these specialities are available. Also, the opportunity which the school offers to work with a student dental hygienist provides valuable experience. The well organized intergration of the different phases of dentistry makes a graduate of the University of Tennessee College of Dentistry a man well qualified to assume his professional responsibility in the maintenance of the health of the general public.

College of Pharmacy

The pharmacy student who emerges from the University of Tennessee College of Pharmacy is most qualified to begin work in any area of pharmacy. Students are trained in many fields and course-work is varied to fit the students' needs. The first year of professional training is more or less introductory including courses in official preparations, organic chemistry, quantitative chemistry, bacteriology, pharmacognosy and other courses. The second year finds the student beginning to actually fill prescriptions in junior dispensing. Also background courses in biochemistry, physical pharmacy, medicinal products and physiology are offered to better acquaint the student with the working of the human body and the principles involved.

The senior year is spent almost entirely preparing the student to meet the public from fields of hospital pharmacy, retail pharmacy and for some manufacturing and research. The addition of a modern dispensing laboratory enables the senior student to fill prescriptions encountering actual trade-name products. The Model Pharmacy includes some 8000 items of various companies. Phones have been installed to familiarize the student with procedures doctors use in phoning in prescriptions. As a step to better relations between the health professions, dental and medical students are invited to write prescriptions at least once a quarter for the pharmacy students to fill. The meetings and discussions which follow enable the students to understand the problems confronting the medical professions.

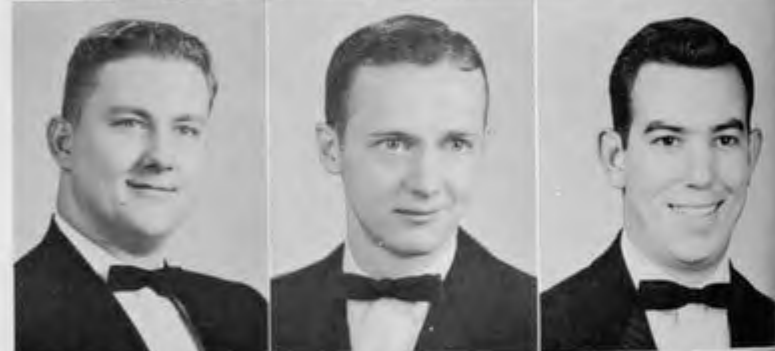

School of Nursing

The first year of the current program is spent on a general college campus where students complete the necessary pre-nursing freshman courses. At the beginning of the sophomore year, students then enter the University of Tennessee at Memphis. At this time the study of nursing subjects is begun accompanied by courses in organic and biochemistry, anatomy and physiology, and microbiology. Each subject is supplemented by laboratory experience. Liberal arts courses at a local state university are carried in the junior and senior year.

The nursing portion of the curriculum begins with three quarters of Foundations of Nursing. Clinical experience during the study of medical-surgical nursing is gained by giving complete patient care in John Gaston Hospital and the outpatient clinics. In the junior year, students begin study of nursing specialities. One quarter each is spent in the study of maternity nursing and pediatric nursing. Psychiatric affiliation is gained through the facilities of Gailor Psychiatric Hospital while public health nursing consists of field practice in the Shelby County Health Department. Throughout the curriculum are planned field trips for additional learning. The final quarter is devoted to senior rotation nursing experience in the City of Memphis Hospitals with emphasis on past learning.

Since the organization of the School of Biological Sciences in 1928, graduate instruction leading to the Master of Science degree and the degree of Doctor of Philosophy has been offered at the University of Tennessee Medical Units. In January, 1960, graduate study was organized under an associate dean and a Graduate Medical Sciences Council. At this time Dr. Roland H. Alden was appointed to the position of Associate Dean of The Graduate School-Medical Sciences.

The faculty of the Graduate School consists of those members of the several faculties who are actively engaged in research and the instruction of candidates for the M.S. and Ph.D. degrees.

A little toddy for the body

The Phi Delta Chi Fraternity was founded on November 2, 1883, at the University of Michigan. Eleven men were gathered here to effect an organization to advance the science of pharmacy and to foster and promote a fraternal spirit among its members. From this beginning, the fraternity has grown to a present size of forty active chapters, serving the major colleges of pharmacy in the United States.

The Omega Chapter, the twenty-fourth chapter of Phi Delta Chi, was founded in 1922 at the University of Tennessee at Memphis. Dr. R. L. Crowe, Dean of the School of Pharmacy at that time and later Grand President of Phi Delta Chi, was influential in founding the Chapter.

Omega Chapter has shown its ability to lead in that Brother Frank Baker was elected as Vice-President of the Student Council. Other members of the Chapter also hold offices in the Student Branch of the A.Ph.A. and Rho Chi, National Honorary Pharmaceutical Society.

Omicron Kappa Upsilon is a society of dentists whose purpose is as stated in the preamble of the society's first constitution. "To encourage and develop a spirit of emulation among students in dentistry and to recognize in an appropriate manner those who shall distinguish themselves by high grade of scholarship."

The society was organized in 1914 at Northwestern University Dental School. The official insignia adopted in 1915 embodies the spirit of the society. The insignia is a key with the letters, O (Omicron), K (Kappa), and U (Upsilon) by the Greek letter S (Sigma). The first three initials, which indicate the name of this society, are derived from three Greek words, Odontos (teeth), Kai (and), and Hygie (Health). The encircling letter S (Sigma) derives from the Greek word Soteria (conservation or preservation), and represents the all-embracing ideal of conservation which is the chief concern of the dental profession and its oral health service.

There are 46 chapters with approximately 9,500 members. Psi Chapter was founded May 15, 1929, and now has a membership of 114. Its charter members were R. S. Vinsant, R. D. Dean, C. P. Harris, J. F. Biggo, W. E. Lundy, L. J. McRae, J. J. Ogden, J. D. Towner, and W. J. Templeton.

Election to the society is not only a recognition of accomplishment as a student, but also an insignia of both promise and expectancy of leadership in dentistry after graduation.

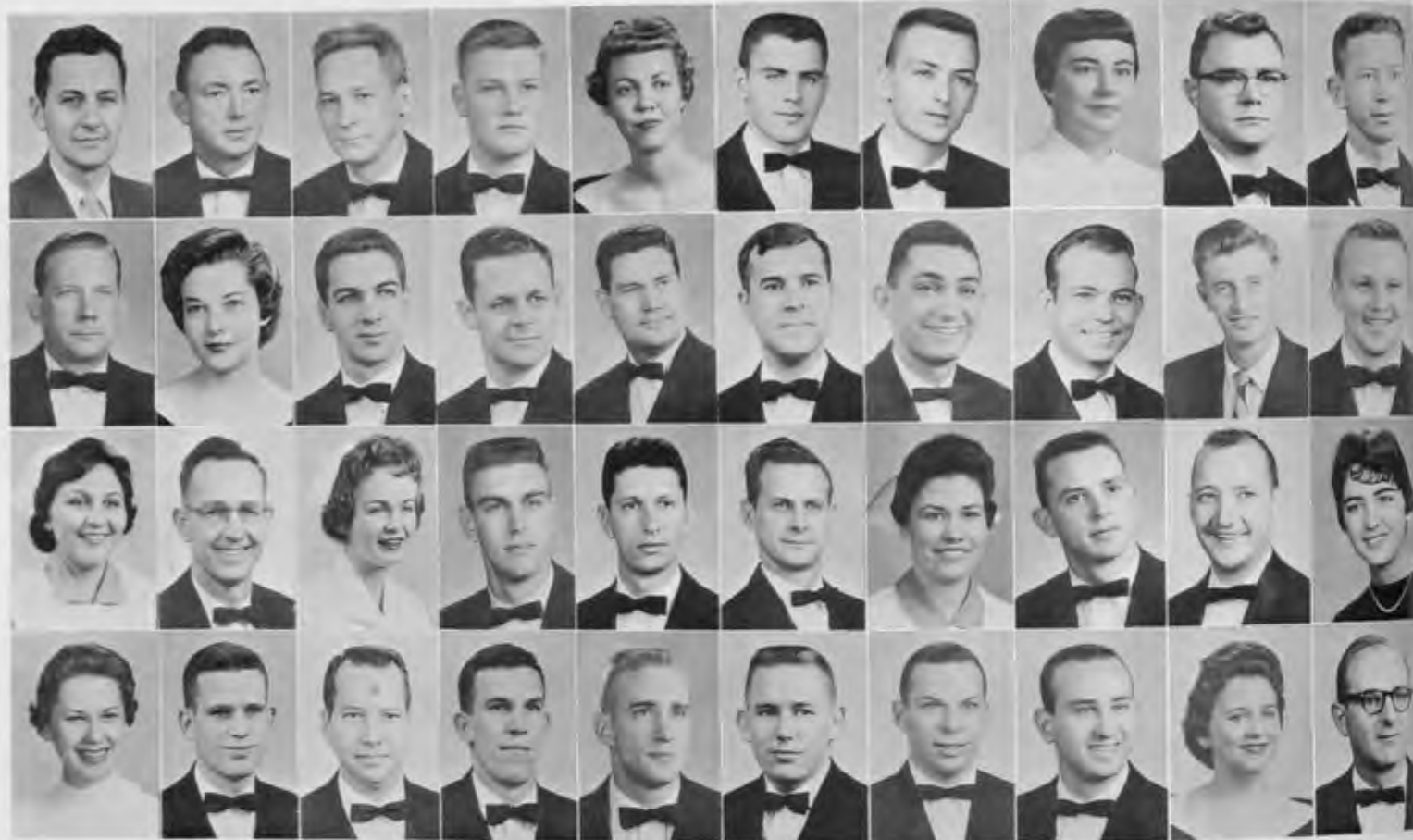

In 1939 a group of young women, sharing the common bond of being medical students' wives, formed a small social club at the University of Tennessee—the original Junior Medical Auxiliary. A year later it became inactive as its founders left Memphis for internships in distant cities.

Yet, the need for a social club for wives of medical students remained strong, and in 1943 the organization was begun anew with an active membership of 31. They elected officers to direct their group, formed working committees and adopted a Constitution. The purpose of the Auxiliary, it read, was "to promote friendship and better fellowship among the wives . . ."

As the organization grew, so did its aims and projects. To keep pace with the expansion, the by-laws were revised in 1955. The Auxiliary's objects now are described as threefold: "To encourage friendship and good fellowship . . . to prepare for the future role as physicians' wives, and to serve the community and the medical school."

The Auxiliary now is big business. The Constitution and By-Laws were revised in 1958 and its active membership totals near 150. The Auxiliary's regular activities include welfare work with the children's ward of the college's teaching hospital and a Universitywide Book-Exchange for the resale of textbooks. Once each quarter the members enjoy a luncheon, and the Executive Board serves as hostess at an Afternoon Tea. Perhaps JMA's greatest service was the establishing of a loan fund for medical students in January 1958. At this time we gave \$2,000 to the University Loan Fund. February 1959 brought a donation of \$1,700 into this fund. March 1959 saw us installed as a Chapter to the Women's Auxiliary to the Student American Medical Association, and we will enjoy being one of the largest and most active chapters.

The Memphis Chapter, Student American Medical Association, formerly the Junior Medical Auxiliary, is a vital organization fulfilling the needs of its members for companionship, entertainment and purposeful activity.

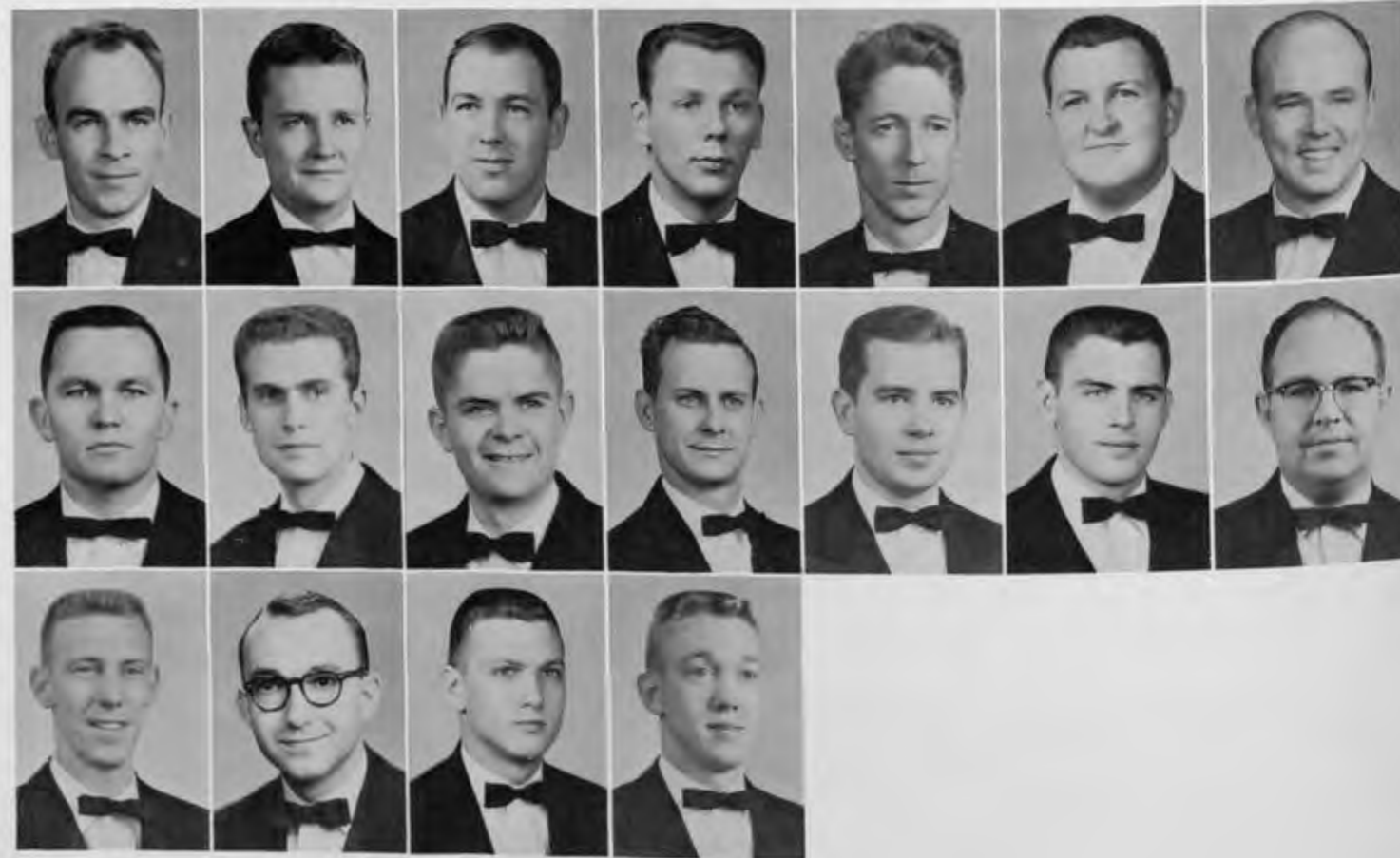
