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



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Hazard pay for city firefighters nixed

OGDENSBURG - Ogdensburg City Manager Stephen Jellie has ended hazard pay for firefighters claiming that it's a safety clause in the union contract, but not all city councilors are on board with the decision.

City councilors John Rishe, Nichole Kennedy, Michael Powers and Dan Skamperle raised concerns about Jellie's decision and with the fact they were not informed about it prior to implementation.

Instead, the four read about the hazard pay change in a news story on WWNY-TV, which included a press release from the city not shared with other news outlets.

WWNY reported the city would no longer pay hazard pay to firefighters working short-staffed and would additionally require the firefighters to pay a total of \$311,000 to the city.

Jellie said he became aware that money was being improperly paid to the firefighters and decided to take action, which he says is within his purview as city manager.

City Councilor Powers said such decisions should be brought to the board and certainly should be shared with the council prior to disclosing them to the media.

The city is currently in arbitration with the fire department over minimum staffing and is awaiting a decision from the arbitrator on that issue, Jellie said the hazard pay is the next step in the process.

Jellie sought to discuss the matter in executive session, but Powers said that because it had already been made public in a news report the discussion could also be public. Several councilors questioned Jellie if a legal opinion had been sought on the matter, and he replied that there was.

Councilor Kennedy asked if it could be shared, Jellie said it could if there were four votes from council requesting it.

In the end the council voted to have the attorney who issued the opinion attend the next meeting to discuss the matter.

No firefighters spoke out at the meeting, though the caller identified as Jason Bouchard, the firefighter's union rep, did attempt to speak via telephone. It appeared that technical issues were at play when he tried to

Some members of the public also spoke at the meeting expressing concerns about the city manager's action including Greg McNamara who at one point called the mayor "Little Hitler," as well as Doug Loffler who said that the recent actions of the city manager were unprofessional.

No formal action was taken by council to continue paying hazard pay in the meantime, but the issue is expected to be taken up at the Nov. 1 budget meeting.


That District has a contested election between incumbent Republican State Sen. Dan Stec and challenger Democrat Jean Lapper.



Hull running on the Republican ticket for the District 8 county seat

MADRID — Madrid healthcare consultant and Deacon at the Christian Fellowship Center Ben Hull is hoping to secure the District 8 seat on the County Legislature in November.

Republican Hull said he's running for office because he believes in the value of community.

"I learned that lesson from my father who had vision for a handful of run-down buildings in Madrid and, through sweat and hard work, transformed our humble town square into something beautiful. Now that I have three children of my own, I am newly motivated to preserve the freedoms and opportunities we enjoy here and

to continue investing in our community," he said. Hull first came into the public eye when he resigned his position as Director of the Center for Cancer Care at Canton Potsdam Hospital when taking a stance against the state mandate that required health care workers to get vaccinated, specifically because it overruled religious exemptions at the time.

Hull said he could not "violate" his conscience by firing essential healthcare workers who remained unvaccinated.

He said Legislator Kevin Acres approached him about running for District 8 seat soon after that decision.

Hull says he recognizes many problems facing the county in near

future, with staffing of critical positions as a major concern.

"There is a growing concern that we're losing good people because compensation is not competitive. While at the hospital, I managed union-represented staff and successfully negotiated creative solutions that ensured staff were paid fairly and patient care improved. I intend to bring that experience to help get our county departments fully staffed," he said. Hull said the county will also need to be more vocal in Albany in order to better serve the North Country. "In the North Country, we are open to innovation, and we are also practical. We have a legacy of truly sustainable energy production, yet we also want to ensure that people don't

freeze to death because of wood-burning bans. We need legislators who will partner to bring innovative technologies and economic development to the county yet

are also ready to tell Albany when their policies will harm our region"

Hull studied economics at St. Lawrence University and later earned his Healthcare Administration MBA from the Rochester Institute of Technology.

He says his experience makes him a prime candidate for legislator.

"After graduate school, I returned home to work at St. Lawrence Health where I was promoted to Direct the Center for Cancer Care. For four years, I led that department and expanded the cancer care available in our community. In the fall of 2020, I was personally tasked by then-CEO David Acker to overhaul COVID-19 testing operations across SLH's three hospitals - and to do it basically overnight," he said. "With an incredible team, I coordinated an effort that expanded testing capacity and reduced result wait-times from days to hours. Serving my community in that capacity was the most challenging thing I've ever done and remains my greatest professional honor."

When asked what separates him from his opponent Stephanie Petkovsek, Hull said he's been attending board meetings and preparing himself should he be elected.

"I have attended all but one Board of Legislators meeting in the last four months and have yet to see my opponent there," he said. "Last week, she was asked whether she supported the SLC home heating tax cut and confessed she had never heard of it before. I have examined that important proposal at length with several current legislators and community leaders, and I am ready to pursue it and other ways to lower taxes from day one," he said.

"You may have read my letters in this publication on issues from gun control to bail reform. I believe in the marketplace of ideas where we offer clear arguments, engage in debate, and listen actively. My opponent has not taken the same approach. To this day, I've never heard her make an argument for anything. The people of District 8 are electing a legislator to speak for them at the county level, and they deserve someone who has shown they can accomplish that."

One of Hull's letters regarding his opinion that clergy should not be mandated to report sexual abuse has drawn critical responses from some members of the public.

Hull was in the public eye for his stance after former members of the CFC made public that leaders at the CFC did not report sexual abuse allegations. The incident was a catalyst for two rallies advocating to make clergy mandated reporters.

Hull said that if he's elected he'd like to see the county legislators focus more on issues and less on politics.

"We spend too much time bickering about party politics. We need to strive to set party drama aside and be attentive to the most important local issues. Even as a candidate, I have had an open dialogue about important issues with many people (including legislators) from both sides of the aisle," he said. "Our county government's response to Covid was admirable in many ways, but it came along with numerous infringements of Constitutional rights. Our own Public Health Department issued stay-at-home orders to St. Lawrence County residents which criminalized the simple act of going on a walk. Regardless of good intent, that was a gross government overreach which ought never to be repeated."

Hull says if elected he's like to see the county put a real effort into addressing the rising homelessness problem.

"New homelessness placements in our county each month have skyrocketed from 9 in August 2020 to 63 in August of 2022. I will propose that the Board of Legislators establishes a task force to respond to this profound and urgent need. There are many known causes underlying homelessness including mental illness, drug addiction, housing or job insecurity, and unstable relationships. Our existing county services are equipped to respond to many of these needs, and we need to take action to help people

in these difficult situations," he said.

Hull also said that mental illness remains an "ever-present" crisis in the area. "I have spoken personally with Jay Ulrich, Director of Mental Health at the County, and Dr. Jayme Smith, Director of Behavioral Health at St. Lawrence Health about ways to improve care for our community. Overcoming mental illness requires coordination across many services, and I will apply my experience in healthcare to strengthen our efforts on this front," he said.

Hull said that many people underestimate the importance of local government. He says creating and enacting local laws and deciding how to spend taxpayer money are not "inconsequential things."

"And the truth is, at a local level, we can move the needle on developing a healthy, efficient, and accountable local government," he said. "As your legislator, I will focus on financial responsibility, public health and safety, sustainable economic development, and standing up for Constitutional rights."

Hull said that it is important that we respectfully talk to one another about what matters most in our communities. "Speaking of listening, I intend to be reachable as a legislator, but that doesn't have to wait until January. Please reach out to me if you have any questions, concerns, or feedback. 

Verizon cell service raises EMS concerns

MADRID - Problems with Verizon cellular phone service in the Madrid, Lisbon and Morley areas are raising concerns for emergency responders.

For around two weeks residents and commuters have reported disruptions in cellular service.

Madrid Rescue Squad Chief and Canton School Superintendent Ron Burke says the inability to communicate in emergency situations is a concern as many people have dropped traditional landlines to save money and now rely on their cell phones.

"Though normally the service is exceptional, in the past two weeks, residents of this area have been reporting significant issues when on calls. Calls made or received within this region are inaudible to the person on the other end of the call," he said.

Burke noted that a person in the bad coverage zones comes through the line garbled making it in possible to gather information necessary as to what level of response is needed.

So while a call may be for something like a lift assist, the rescue squad has to respond as if it's a life or death situation.

Essentially because the communication isn't relayed, the squad must respond as if it's a worst-case scenario.

That's putting a strain on already diminished volunteer organizations.

Burke says Verizon Wireless has been contacted by a number of res-

"They are offering free in-home signal boosters to some, yet the devices have not arrived as promised. They have indicated to others

that there is no issue," he said. "Yet, crews have been seen working on local towers. It has been reported by some residents that they have stopped to talk to the crews. These individuals have stated that the crews report they are making tower upgrades and to expect the issue to last through the end of the year."

Attempts to get comment from Verizon officials by North Country This Week on the matter have been unsuccessful so far.

Burke said he's largely experienced the same regarding the cause but said Verizon did issue him a signal booster.

There has been no proactive communication from Verizon. The reactive communication is a mixed message without relief," he said.

The issue has also drawn attention from State Sen. Patty Ritchie and Assemblyman Mark Walczyk who say they are working with Verizon officials on the matter.

Though it appears not explanation about what is causing the problem, or how long it's expected to last, has been shared by the com-

"Over the past several days, both of our offices have taken calls from concerned residents who are experiencing very poor cell phone service in parts of St. Lawrence County.

In today's day and age, it's critically important to ensure everyone has access to reliable cell coverage, especially when an emergency situation arises," the statement said.

Both of our offices have been in contact with representatives at Verizon on this matter and they are looking into the situation. We stand ready to assist at the state-level to address this issue to ensure those impacted will see service repaired."


Dillon M. St. Ann-Spinner, 21, was charged with third-degree unlawfully fleeing a police officer and numerous traffic tickets follow-

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Petkovsek running on Democratic line for District 8 county seat

MADRID — Democrat Stephanie Petkovsek is challenging Ben Hull for St. Lawrence County's District 8 seat, which is currently held by Republican Kevin Acres.

Although not a native of the area, Petkovsek says she loves the North Country and has been a Canton resident since 2013.

"I grew up in a rural community not far from here and I understand the essential role that local government has in helping people solve problems. I know how to work with people from different backgrounds to identify common ground," she said.

Petkovsek is a Senior Lecturer of History at SUNY Canton and says she's ready to use her experience and passion for working with others in county government.

Petkovsek says she's aware that the county will be facing some challenges in near future.

"The biggest challenge for the legislature is how to help people solve problems without letting politics get in the way. I think that by keeping our focus on that goal we can find lots of common ground. The Quarry apartments in Potsdam were built using the expertise of a private business with funding from state grants and innovative tax arrangements. This created jobs for the company

doing the work and invested in our greatest resource: the people of the region. I think that often the most fiscally

responsible thing elected officials can do is invest in our communities. My 24 years of teaching have shown me we don't know who will be next with a great new idea. What we can do is create an environment where those ideas grow," she said.

Petkovsek said that while she's never held public office she's been extremely active in the unions of which she's been a member.

"As a public high school teacher and member of NYSUT, I was an elected building representative. At my current position at SUNY Canton, I have previously served in several positions and am currently the elected Chapter President. I believe my work representing a wide variety of colleagues has given me a unique ability to consider various perspectives and use them to advocate for policies that will benefit those I am representing. Being an educator also keeps me humble and accountable.

I have to know my subject material well and be able to communicate it, but I also have to be flexible to issues that arise in the classroom and accountable to the various learning needs of my students," she said.

When asked what separates her from her opponent Petkovsek said she's focused on local issues rather than matters at the state and federal level.

"Although I am not personally acquainted with my opponent, the rhetoric from some of his recent letters to the editor takes a very adversarial position toward the governor and federal government on issues that don't come before the county legislature. I guess I just don't think all of our problems come from, nor are they solved by, the state or federal government. Focusing on how much power Albany or Washington, DC have, takes away the power of the people of St. Lawrence County to find solutions that work for our area. Finding a way to work on solutions at the local level across party lines is essential to solving problems in SLC," she said.

Petkovsek said that she believes politics at the county have become too partisan and is hopeful she can help bridge the gap.

"I feel that the board risks being more partisan than it needs to be. I would like the legislature to spend more time on the issues we can control and those that will help the quality of life for the residents of St. Lawrence County. That'll help us work together regardless of party and our county operate more efficiently. Growing up in a small town in Herkimer County taught me to value people over party affiliation. That doesn't mean we agreed on everything. For example, my father and I did not agree on many political issues. He was a conservative guy who grew up on a dairy farm and was the only one of the ten children in his family to go to college," she said.

"He and I would argue politics while at the same time we agreed about the value of hard work and the importance of public service. He got along with people who had really different politics when he was on the local school board, served as an assessor, and in various volunteer organizations. Since we are all neighbors here in the North Country, we don't have to transpose the partisanship that exists at the federal level to this body. One thing I love about living in a small town is that, if your car runs off the road during a snowstorm, no one asks you if you are a Republican or Democrat before they help pull you out. The rural values of helping your neighbor and caring about your community are something I hope we can all agree on."

If elected Petkovsek says she'll have a lot to learn about the work that the county does to promote economic development but says she is interested in the role that colleges in the county can play in creating solutions.

"I know that childcare is a huge issue for families and critical for eco-

nomic development, so I was thrilled to learn that SUNY Canton had received a grant from the state for a future child care center on campus. If we don't have enough safe, reliable places for children, it is impossible for families to be full members of the workforce," she said.

"I also know that an issue facing rural communities is staffing for fire and EMS. The people who volunteer give up a lot of their time and energy to make sure we are all safe every day and we need to make sure that someone is coming when we call 911. I know that many of the EMS volunteers are college students. Is there something colleges can do to further incentivize volunteering? On a personal note, since I have two cats and a dog who were all rescues I would like to learn more about ways that the legislature could work with local shelters to address overcrowding and help find the animals' homes.'

Petkovsek says her love for the area makes her a prime candidate for St. Lawrence County.

"My husband and I chose to move back to this area 10 years ago after living out of state because we love it here. It has been a pleasure to meet so many of you while canvassing and at local events. I have also traveled on several dirt roads that remind me of my hometown! Driving down those roads, we would often reflect on the natural beauty of the area and how happy we are with our decision. I would be proud to represent District 8 if elected. Also, go Bills and Orange," she said.

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Change in health insurance for village employees could save money

MASSENA — A change in health insurance coverage for village employees, retirees and eligible dependents is on the way and officials say it will save money for both the village and those covered.

The new plan through Excellus Bronze 4 PPO Plan will be for active employees and their eligible dependents, as well as non-Medicare eligi-

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create a more

ble retirees. That plan will be effective on Jan. 1, 2023, officials say.

With the new plan, the village will reimburse 100% of the deductible for each employee and dependents. The village will also continue to provide health insurance coverage through the Medicare Advantage Plan with United Healthcare for all Medicare-eligible members and their eligible dependents, officials say.

Officials say under the current plan there are zero deductibles, with

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the village paying out \$3,025,454 annually for premiums on 119 employees.

"Medicare-eligible retirees are not seeing any change. That's a key detail. Those retirees that are currently Medicare-eligible, their plans stay the same," Deputy Mayor Matt LeBire said.

Under the new plan, employees would have a \$7,500 deductible for singles and \$15,000 deductible for families, both of which would be

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The village is slated to pay \$1,738,641 in premiums for employees, a 42.5% reduction according to Zachary Zuckerman, vice president of USI Insurance Services.

Zuckerman presented the plan options to the village board last

An amendment to the resolution was also added at the behest of LeBire, who noted language was missing regarding the potential absence of a collective bargaining agreement.

"Should there be a notation of as defined by collective bargaining agreements or the employee personnel manual in the absence of CBA (Collective Bargaining Agreement) language? I just know over the course of eight years such a simple word has a variety of meanings," he

In the end village officials noted many criteria were considered regarding the decision to change plans, including what benefit there may be for taxpayers as well as employees.

According to Mayor Greg Paquin, meetings are being scheduled to explain the policy changes for employees, retirees and dependents.

"We've tentatively scheduled two days for employee education, Nov. 3 and Nov. 4, and that is throughout the day," Paquin said.

The meetings already scheduled are slated to be held at the Department of Public Works, the fire station and the police station, officials

"We'll make sure we have a letter that we'll send out to everyone regarding that," Paquin said.

Teachers call on district to negotiate for a fair contract

MASSENA - Massena Federation of Teachers representative Randal Freiman has called upon the district to come to the table to negotiate a fair contract with the teacher's

During the rescheduled Board of Education meeting held on Oct. 24, Freiman took the opportunity to address the board and call upon them to negotiate a fair deal with the union.

"The board is aware that staff morale is low," he said.

Freiman went on to describe the conditions teachers were forced to teach under, calling it the "worst time" for many teachers who have had to persevere through pandemic restrictions.

Freiman said many teachers are now dealing with the fallout of students learning remotely, including behavioral and social issues that some students have experienced.

"Your staff has endured and now we are looking to this board for the best contract in the region," he said.

Freiman highlighted a number of figures, including the 2020-21 expenditure budget.

According to Freiman, the school budgeted \$56,664,833 and spent \$52,533,223 in that time frame.

Freiman asked the district why, if the district had over \$4 million remaining, was it out of line to ask for raises in line with what many other districts have given their teachers in years past.

During that same academic year projected revenues were listed at \$54,408,159.

"The district has 4 million dollars in the ERS fund and that actual payments is \$828,748. Why have 4 million dollars for a known budgeted item of just over \$800,000," he said.

Freiman conceded that salaries and benefits are the district's largest expense, saving that teacher salaries topped \$13,827,093 during the 2021-22 academic year however the district budgeted \$14,635,462.

Freiman asked the board why the excess of over \$800,000 could not be used for raises for current staff or to hire new staff to cover the spread.

Healthcare was a similar story, Freiman said. The district budgeted over \$16 million for benefits but only spent around \$15 million.

Freiman spoke further to the over budgeting and the fact new teachers were not hired before being cut off for going over his allotted time by over one minute

Beth Reyes, a special education teacher and department chair at J.W. Leary Junior High also addressed

the board, saying teachers are continuing to put students first despite not having a contract.

"As you know, we reinvented our teaching practices during COVID. We risked our own health when we returned to school and continued to reinvent our practice behind masks, six feet from our students, all while fearing we would get sick on the front lines or worse, bring COVID into our homes," she said.

Reves said the board voiced their thanks for teachers during the pandemic but said it felt hollow now as teachers received no thanks or a new contract.

"We read about it in newspaper articles but that must be for show because we have the most funding we have ever had and yet there is no contract," she said.

Reyes commented that teachers face intense state scrutiny every year, saying that additional scrutiny puts significant pressure on an already exhausted staff.

Reyes also took the opportunity to call out the board, saying board members are elected "to ensure the best possible education for students".

"How can we be expected to put forth our best, knowing it's not valued by the very people elected to

support us," she said. Reves said with the hard working

and dedicated teachers the district has currently the district would cease to function.

"What message are you sending to the community and students when you won't agree on a contract," she

Following the public comment period Board President Paul Haggett took the opportunity to address the

situation with a board statement. "We unequivocally appreciate

and admire the work of our teaching staff. You have done and continue to do marvelous work. Our administrators do as well. Our support staff does as well. We ask the MFT to join the district at the table soon so we can craft a settlement that is fair for everyone. You, the teaching assistants, the students and the taxpayers, we are eager to see your next counter proposal," Haggett said.

Despite the comments from the board, online rumors have continued to circulate regarding the mediation process.

In recent weeks Facebook posts have claimed the school district failed to send a representative to the last round of mediation with the teacher's union, while the union had sent representatives ready for another round of negotiations.

It is unclear at this time when another round of mediation will be held.

Village approves deal with school for resource officer

MASSENA — Massena Village Officials approved a deal with the Massena School District to add a school resource officer from the Massena Police Department.

Though the resolution passed, Trustee Francis Carvel opposed the measure. The final vote was 3-1 with Trustee Christine Winston being excused from the meeting on Oct.

The resolution required two amendments before ultimately being

Both amendments were presented by Deputy Mayor Matt LeBire, who had concerns about potential legacy costs associated with the position, as well as the potential cost of liability

Under the terms of the agreement, all costs for the SRO would fall to the school district.

"We have been saying all along that this will be at zero cost to the taxpayers, which is great. I think the SRO position is badly needed. However, in reading the draft, I have concerns about if and when this is successful, and we have an employee there for 10 or more years, there's going to be certain legacy costs associated," LeBire said.

LeBire said he was concerned that the costs could become "sizeable", which could pose a significant problem in 10 years time if the position was maintained.

As a result of the amendment the school district will be responsible for payment of any and all legacy costs if the village continues to provide SRO services for 10 or more years.

In his second motion, LeBire lobbied the board to raise the total maximum cost from. \$80,000 to \$82,000 to ensure any additional liability insurance would be covered. The fear was that, if the insurance quote were higher than expected, the difference would have to be covered by the village.

The amendment was also approved in that case but not before Carvel raised a few concerns about the total expense of the position.

Carvel mentioned a story pub-

lished last week by North Country This Week that detailed the expenses for a SRO through the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office, which Hermon-DeKalb Central School will pay \$29,181 for.

The resolution from the County Legislature detailed the expenses associated with the position, including the insurance costs, workers compensation costs, benefits, retirement and the requirement of the district to pay all overtime costs incurred by the SRO.

Mayor Greg Paquin said he believed the position at Hermon-DeKalb was a shared one and that the cost was more likely to exceed \$100,000 when additional benefits were factored in.

County officials also approved an SRO for the Edwards-Knox School District in June at a total cost not to exceed \$104,000 for 2022. Total cost to the county is \$79,069, according to the resolution.

Those expenses include more than \$50,000 for administrative costs with the rest being made up of health insurance, retirement and social security expenses.

Carvel also voiced his concerns regarding the additional liability to the village, saying the added cost to taxpayers was something that needed to be considered.

"It's around \$815, Francis," Mayor Paquin told him.

Carvel said his main concern was that the taxpayers would be on the hook for additional expenses, not through the village but more likely through school taxes.

"I don't control their budget. Their taxes haven't gone up in quite some time, and they have more money than they know what to do with,' Paquin said.

Following the approval of the resolution, the school board will discuss the amended agreement and either approve the measure or vote down adding a school resource officer this

"If they accept our changes, we'll have a school resource officer. If they don't accept our changes, then we won't have a school resource officer," Mayor Paquin said.

New satellite office for DSS in Massena

CANTON — The Department of Social Services Children's Services Unit will soon have another satellite office, this time in Massena.

St. Lawrence County legislators on the services committee approved a resolution that will allow the chairman to sign a contract to lease a space located at 280 Main St.

The decision came during the committee's Oct. 24 meeting.

According to Joseph Seeber, Commissioner of DSS, the move comes after the "resounding success" seen with the satellite office in Ogdensburg.

That location was approved last October and was designed to "root employees in the community and situate them closer to both schools and families with an expectation of a six month review to determine if it should continue."

The main offices for DSS, located on Judson St. in Canton, has seen

the Children's Services Unit expand in recent months, necessitating the satellite offices.

"We had been exploring expanding our services again to different parts of the county," Seeber said.

Seeber said his office has heard it is difficult for many families around the county to come to the main DSS office, leading the department to assess options on how to better serve the community.

According to the resolution, the SWOT analysis conducted by County Administrator Ruth Doyle demonstrated the pilot program in Ogdensburg was a success, leading to the immediate recommendation to grow the location while also searching for a second location in Massena.

Officials say the Massena location would allow the department to decrease response times and create inclusive practices with the Massena community.

"I think it will serve our needs very well and this resolution is to ask the chair to be able to sign that lease effective Nov. 1, we're hoping with a targeted move in date of Jan. 1," Seeber said.

The space is 2,400 square feet and will house a unit from each area of Children's Services with space for ancillary services to rotate in availability, including staff from Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Temporary Assistance (TA), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and other units, officials say.

The lease agreement will run from Jan. 1, 2023 through Dec. 31, 2027 with additional one-vear options available. Payments are set to begin upon occupancy of the location. Cost of the contract will be \$16.25 per month per square foot or \$39,000 annually, with a 2% increase annually built into the

The resolution will require full board approval before DSS can close on the location and begin moving in.

Juvenile charged for Heuvelton vandalisms

HEUVELTON -- A juvenile is reportedly suspected of recent vandalism at Heuvelton Central School, according to district Superintendent Jesse Coburn.

Coburn issued a statement to district families Oct. 24 and said law enforcement informed him that the suspect had been identified and charges are pending.

"Because this is a police matter and the suspect is a juvenile, I am not able to comment further," he

State Police investigators, St. Lawrence County Sheriff detectives and Federal Postal Service Investigators were all investigating multiple breakins in Heuvelton.

Aside from the school, vandalism was reported at Amvets Post 1997, the Post Office, and Doug's Tavern.

Police have not released information related to those incidents.

Superintendent Coburn addressed families who may have questions.

"While we cannot comment on the particulars of this situation, it's important to remind students that acts of vandalism are a crime punishable by law and also violate the district's code of conduct. Consequences for such behavior according to the code of conduct include suspension and/or expulsion," he said.

Any student upset by recent events who needs additional support, can reach out to the building principal who can connect a student with counseling staff.

"I want to thank the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Department and local New York State Troopers for their diligence in investigating this situation. As a district, we have strong relationships with both organizations, and I am grateful for their ongoing involvement in ensuring

school safety," Coburn said.

Coburn said school safety would be a topic at Monday night's Board of Education meeting, including a brief overview of the recent School Resource Office survey.

"I also want to thank our staff for their commitment to keeping school as "normal" as possible for students despite recent events. There is no doubt these incidents have left many people feeling unsettled. However, it's important to remember that safety and security are always a top priority at Heuvelton. We have strategies and protocol in place to keep our school safe, and we are taking additional steps to make it even safer. Our greatest asset, however, is our staff; a team of caring professionals who are committed to understanding and meeting individual student needs every day," Coburn said.



Retired town employees in Massena concerned about new insurance

MASSENA — A group of roughly a dozen retired town of Massena employees voiced their frustrations over a potential new health insurance policy during the town board meeting on Oct. 19.

The group of retirees, who are all over the age of 65, say the new plan would result in higher copays across the board and would nearly double the cost of an overnight stay in hospital.

The 20 or so retirees are all over the age of 65 and argued the decision to change just their policy is purely discrimination due to their ages.

Many said the plan was unacceptable and demanded the town board revert back to the original healthcare plan.

Under the proposed insurance plan for Medicare age retirees, the Medicare Advantage Plan will be provided through AARP United Healthcare with a number of provi-

As before, retirees will be responsible for the first \$500 of out-ofpocket expenses for prescription drugs. The town of Massena will also

continue to reimburse retirees for up to \$1,500 associated with out-ofpocket expenses.

Some changes that come with

the policy would include the retiree enrolling in the New York State EPIC program, as well as the retiree paying annual AARP membership fees.

The change in policy could save the town almost \$88,000, officials say. But the group of retirees argued that their service to the town warrants a better insurance policy. Members of the group questioned Town Supervisor Sue Bellor about the impact the change would have on the tax rate. Bellor said she could not provide specifics off the top of her head and that budget negotiations were still ongoing. Two more budget workshops are currently scheduled for the coming weeks.

"You're making budget decisions

and you can even tell us that," one retiree chided Bellor.

While discussing the effects the healthcare plan would have on taxes, Deputy Supervisor Pat Facteau also pointed out that both the Harte Haven Plaza and Archonic received a combined assessment reduction of \$6.1 million dollars. That reduction in assessed value will have a significant adverse effect on the budget, he said.

'We also haven't received our compact funding since the end of 2019, which is a huge loss for us," Bellor said.

Bellor said the hospital liability the town inherited from the sale of Massena Memorial was a huge drain on the town, leaving a zero balance in the fund balance.

The retirees questioned whether a fund balance existed, accusing the board of gross mismanagement that "comes back on us as retirees."

Bellor said the decision to settle \$1.7 million in existing trailing liabilities was a difficult but necessary choice for the town. The payment covered remaining liabilities for workers compensation back payments, as well as back payments to the New York State retirement

"That decision comes back on the entire community. We have 12,000 people in this community. We have looked through every scenario and this one will help us all," Bellor said.

Many retirees suggested the liability and the subsequent fall out was not their fault and should not be their problem.

"You're trying to balance the budget on the backs of retirees and that's not fair," one retiree said.

The retirees also questioned whether Board Member Deb Willer should be allowed to vote as a former hospital employee. Willer served 27 years at Massena Memorial and retired as the Director of Respiratory Care in 2015.

"I planned to abstain when we vote and I will do so when the time

Willer attempted to put them at ease, saying United Healthcare provides exceptional coverage with a broad network.

"There are very few hospitals out of network with United Healthcare. There is no HMO with this plan and no matter where you are there will be a facility in the network," Willer said.

Under the new plan retirees will also receive vision and dental insurance, however many said they would gladly give the two up to have the old plan again.

Officials say that wouldn't make up the difference in cost and the town would still have to pay a significant amount more for the coverage.

Other retirees told the board that a hospital stay would wipe out savings accounts, arguing that their pensions would not cover the added expenses a serious illness would

"I understand, I only have so much coverage myself," Bellor told the retirees.

One of the retirees went so far as to suggest grandfathering in the old plan for the 20 or so existing retirees over 65, while suggesting future retirees use a different plan like the one proposed. Some of the retirees also pointed to hosting fees paid out for fishing tournaments, as well as paid sponsorships as another drain on funding. According to Bellor, the hosting fees and sponsorships have largely been covered already through grant funding from the state, with additional grant funding expected in the near future from the Market NY program.

After much back and forth that lasted over 35 minutes town officials agreed to table the resolution to allow for further discussions.

fire departments to battle wildfires, and this grant program is a great way to help fire personnel across the state," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "These grants bolster local capacity to fight wildland fires, protecting property and communities.'

The Volunteer Fire Assistance grant program is funded by the U.S. Forest Service and administered by DEC Forest Rangers. Fire departments will receive 50/50 matching funds up to \$1,500.

Last year, the program provided \$1,500 grants to 412 fire departments.

Only expenses directly related to wildfire suppression efforts are eligible for funding. These include the purchase of portable pumps, portable backpack pumps, hand tools, hoses, approved lightweight fire-resistant clothing, hard hats, turnout gear, portable radios, generators, and dry hydrants. Expenditures not directly related to firefighting, such as search and rescue, acquisition of land, construction of buildings and facilities, major apparatus purchases, and maintenance items are not eligible for funding.

Eligible fire departments include: those that serve a single town with a population under 10,000; those that serve multiple communities, one of which is a rural town of less than 10,000 residents; and fire departments in towns with a population of 10,000 or more that meet the application requirements. Fire departments that receive a grant award must complete all required grant paper-

School board signs off on resource officer

MASSENA — The Massena Central School District will soon have a school resource officer again after the Board of Education signed off on the position Oct. 24.

School officials unanimously approved the position following a public comment period that saw no one speak from the community.

The officer will be provided by the Massena Police Department and is to not exceed \$82,000 annually.

The position will be entirely paid for by the school district, according to officials.

Village trustees had approved the position during the board's Oct. 19 meeting after adding two amendments to clarify language and terms of the deal.

Trustee Francis Carvel was the lone No vote on the resolution after he raised concerns about the potential liability cost of the position. Carvel also cited previous North Country This Week articles that highlighted other districts in the county that have opted to sign contracts with the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office for SROs

District and village officials had previously attempted to find a retired police officer for the SRO position in Massena, however both were unable to find a part-time officer to fill the role as outlined in the contract, according to Superintendent Pat Brady.

"We had one candidate we thought was going to work, but it didn't end up working out," he told the

board

Brady said the decision to move forward with a fulltime SRO was bolstered by interest from a number of officers who were interested in the position.

Brady informed the board of the two amendments added by the Village Board, including a \$2,000 increase to ensure the district would cover all insurance policies, as well as a clause that stipulates the district pays any potential legacy costs, if the position were to remain for a decade or more.

The legacy expenses would include paying retiree health insurance, among other expenses.

"That's an area that's discussed as possibly negotiable down the road, but it is in the contract that the village board passed last Tuesday. The village would give us the cost each year," Brady said.

District officials also opted to add a 30-day termination notice clause to the annual agreement, which will allow either the village or district to terminate the contract if either party deems it prudent.

"Per our counsel, we also added some language on data privacy because the SRO will come into contact with student information, and we need to have a data privacy policy as an addendum to the agreement," Brady said.

Board members approved the measure unanimously. "I think there's a lot of support in the community for a school resource officer among our staff, an additional resource to support our students and also enhance the safety of our school," Brady said.

Public hearing for potential food truck regulations

MASSENA — A public hearing is scheduled for Nov. 15 at 5:30 p.m. for village residents to address potential regulations for food trucks

and mobile food vendors.

The village board and Code Enforcement Officer Aaron Hardy say the regulations come after state officials began to crack down on the vendors and put in place more stringent Department of Health regulations.

Hardy told the board the mobile food scene has "exploded" in recent years, including locally.

"This is kind of the state's going to force our hand and add it to our code. It's there and we have to do it," Hardy said.

Deputy Mayor Matt LeBire also commented on the new requirements placed upon municipalities, saying the village was prompted to add the regulations to follow state requirements.

Hardy praised Village Administrator Monique Chatland for finding a way to slide the regulations into the code book in a way "so it makes sense."

"I think she's done a really good job finding a location for it. It looks pretty tidy. I think it's basic enough," he said. Though the regulations as written by the state are not perfect, Hardy said, the framework is there for the village to implement effective regulations.

"There's been some issues and they've had to clarify a few things. We can kind of play with it. If we need to add more, we can add more down the road," Hardy said.

Some of the regulations include a requirement to have an operating permit anywhere in the state, as well as a permit issued by a local municipality to sell food.

Food vendors interested in selling food in Massena will be required to apply for a license through the village board. A license will be \$250 per year or \$25 per day.

Fuel truck explosion injures one man

FOWLER - An explosion blew open the back end of a fuel truck tank at Tripp Fuels LLC at 1461 County Route 22, just off State Route 812, Tuesday, Oct. 18.

Gouverneur Fire was called to the scene at 10:22 a.m. The department reports on their Facebook page that the initial call reported that people were down from the explosion.

The department dispatch requested a general second alarm to release workers for a possible major emergency event. Mutual aid was requested for engines and tankers from

Richville, Edwards and Harrisville Fire departments.

Gouverneur Fire Department's Engine 17 reported on the scene of a fuel truck on fire within five feet of a

Gouverneur Fire Incident command stood down Richville and Harrisville fire department and requested Edwards Fire to set up draft on Little York Road and their tanker respond to the scene.

Crews from the department's Engine 17, TA-6 and ETA-101 provided fire suppression on arrival. Engine 18 and Rescue 4 were assigned to establish a landing zone for a Life-net 7-10 chopper in the parking lot.

Crews contained the fire to the involved truck and remained on scene until 15:35 to assist the New York State Fire Investigation team.

Other media reports state that one person was injured during the incident and was airlifted from the scene to Upstate University Hospital in Syracuse for treatment.



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Unwanted October Accents - the Asian lady beetle or ladybug

It is oval-shaped, mostly orange, and a common sight leading up to Halloween. Nope - not a pumpkin. It's Harmonia axyridis, better known as the multicolored Asian lady-beetle or ladybug. This insect, while beneficial to gardens, is no treat when it masses by the hundreds on and in homes each fall.

First brought to North America by the US government in 1916 to control pests on pecan trees and other crops, the black-dotted orange ladybug, darling of small children everywhere, didn't turn into an ogre until the mid-1990s. Apparently,

there is evidence that the current, more problematic, ladybug mob is a newer strain which was accidentally released at the Port of New Orleans around 1993. Whatever their origins, they're in season now along with corn shocks and jack-o'-

Ladybugs don't carry disease, damage structures, suck blood or sting, and they eat harmful garden pests. However, they stain, give off a foul odour when disturbed and will even bite one's skin on occasion. It's their sheer numbers, though, swarming an exterior wall, huddling in corners of your pantry, garage, or living room, and coating the insides of picture windows,

that unnerve and irritate so many people.

Managing lady bugs, it turns out, will cut our heating bills. Ladybugs are indoors primarily because they're looking for a warm, rent-free place to spend the winter. The thing is that if a draft can get in a house, so can these characters.

It's important to caulk around windows, vents and where cable and other utilities come through the wall, as well as between the foundation and sill-plate. Ensure that door sweeps and thresholds are tight, and check for cracked seals around garage doors. Install screens on attic vents and inspect all window screens. Careful sealing of the house exterior will pay off tremendously in excluding ladybugs

as well as cluster flies, and you'll likely notice it is easier to heat your home (vinyl siding makes it hard to find and fix entry points; you may have to caulk indoors around window trim, etc.).

If the beetles are already indoors, don't swat or crush them or they'll release a smelly, staining defensive fluid. For a variety of reasons including the ladybugs' habit of seeking inaccessible areas, indoor pesticide use is strongly discouraged. Instead, use a broom and dustpan, vacuum cleaner or shop-

A knee-high nylon stocking inserted into the vacuum wand and secured tightly with rubber bands or duct tape makes a reusable "mini-bag." Empty it into soapy

water as soon as the vacuum is turned off. From experience, I can say this makes a big difference in just two days. Black-light traps are also suggested; find instructions at: http://www.ars.usda.gov/is/ pr/2001/010130.htm

This fall, I think researchers should decorate giant pumpkins to look like massive multicolored Asian lady-beetles in hopes of frightening the actual pests away. So, if you see a 100-pound ladybug this Halloween, it could be a pumpkin decoy – or a dangerously large mutant bug. Either way, don't swat

Protect landscapes from wildlife and more over the winter

Landscapes are vulnerable to the elements during the cold weather months. Everything from de-icing products to hungry animals to the weight of snow can affect trees, shrubs and other plants. Just because certain greenery will go dormant during the winter doesn't mean landscape main-

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tenance ends when the mercury dips. Homeowners can take certain actions to winterproof their properties and safeguard landscapes so they recover more readily when spring arrives.

When resources are scarce, animals will be on the hunt for anything that's edible, and that includes whatever greenery is growing on a landscape. Physical barriers in garden beds and around trees can help prevent damage caused by moles, voles and deer. Line the bottom and sides of garden beds with garden cloth to prevent ground-burrowing animals from getting in from beneath, suggests the gardening resource I Must Garden.

Wrapping shrubs in burlap or covering them in temporary netting can deter deer, who will seek accessible food sources over the winter. Erect fencing around new trees to keep deer away from the bark and lower branches.

Make the yard less attractive to deer and burrowers by opting for fat-based suet cakes to feed birds rather than loose seeds and berries in feeders, which herbivores will enjoy. Also, don't overwater or mulch landscapes too early. The loose soil and warmth of the mulch may entice moles and voles and other rodents to stick around in those areas and feed on plants.

Investigate options in snowmelt products, as traditional rock salt

can injure buds and branches and kill lawns. In addition, avoid piling salted snow in one area of the land-scape, as it will concentrate the salt in that spot. Spread out snow piles to help minimize the damage to delicate plants.

Harsh winds and battering snow can damage young plants. Use stakes and lattices to secure them so they'll be better able to withstand the weather, suggests Total Landscape Management, a commercial and residential landscaping company.

Promptly remove snow from branches to help trees and shrubs; otherwise, the weight of ice and snow can break off branches and cause irreparable damage.

Erect a snow barrier

Prior observation tends to educate homeowners about which areas of the landscape are most vulnerable to snow drifts and blustery winds. During the winter, winds often blow in from a northeasterly direction, but each homeowner can make his or her own assessment. Put up a tarp between two stakes to serve as a "snow fence" that protects vulnerable areas of the landscape from blowing snow.

Wrap plants in burlap, garden blankets and plant domes to insulate them from cold weather and some animals. Move container plants into a garage or shielded area for the winter.

Basement remodeling tips

Careful consideration of these factors can ensure a basement remodel project is budget-friendly and worthy of investment.

· Investment value: Conventional wisdom among home renovation and real estate experts suggests that a basement remodel is best if done to satisfy current inhabitants and not necessarily to appeal to prospective buyers once the home is put up for sale.

· Foundation: The foundation of the home must garner ample consideration before beginning a basement remodel. Certain foundation issues, such as soft concrete, cracked or curved outside walls and cracks in the flooring, are indicative of significant issues with the foundation.

· Existing space: Some homeowners may have bought their homes with partially finished basements or even finished areas that they simply want to remodel. In such instances, a pre-remodel inspection from a licensed home inspector can save homeowners lots of money and heartache over the long haul. Partially finished or even aging finished basements might not have been renovated in adherence to codes, which could lead to costly violations down the road.

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County Jobless Rate at 3.4%

According to a state Department of Labor report issued this week, the county's unemployment rate decreased 0.7 percent when comparing Sept. 2021 to Sept. 2022.

The state unemployment rate is 4.3 percent.

In neighboring counties, the unemployment in Jefferson County is 3.2 percent, down 0.7 percent from 3.9 percent in Sept. 2021. Franklin County's unemployment rate is 3.0 percent, a drop of 0.6 percent from 3.6 percent in Sept. 2021.

Rates are calculated using methods prescribed by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The State's area unemployment rates rely in part on the results of the Current Population Survey, which contacts approximately 3,100 households in New York State each month.

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Massena Town Board focused on computer system upgrades

MASSENA - The Massena Town Board took action on a number of agenda items that will see the town made crucial computer system upgrades.

The move to upgrade the infrastructure is one that is long overdue, officials say.

The board approved a computer system upgrade quote from ABS, along with a two-year extended warranty on all systems.

Officials are also poised to upgrade the town's server, approving the measure during the Oct. 19 board meet-

The final step was approving an IT contract with ABS, who will be responsible for all upgrades and repairs to town government systems.

No specific details were readily available as of press

According to Town Supervisor Sue Bellor, ABS was on site last week to assess the existing system and to walk through potential changes with town employees.

Three St. Lawrence Health hospitals designated 'Age-Friendly Hospitals'

POTSDAM – The three hospitals that make up St. Lawrence Health were among the 44 New York healthcare facilities recently recognized as 2022 Age-Friendly Health Systems by the Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI).

The Healthcare Association of New York State (HANYS) made the announcement that includes Canton-Potsdam Hospital, Gouverneur Hospital, and Massena Hospital.

"This achievement is realized through the hard work of St. Lawrence Health Director of Nursing Operations Laura Kiely and her devoted team," stated St. Lawrence Health and Canton-Potsdam Hospital President Donna McGregor.

Four evidence-based elements are used to determine the status of Age-Friendly Health Systems in caring for older adults. The elements are known as the "4Ms": What Matters,

Medication, Mentation, and Mobility. Age-Friendly facilities that implement the 4Ms see improvement in patient experience scores and quality outcomes such as readmissions, emergency department utilization, and length of stay.

Participant teams receive group education through monthly webinars and topical coaching calls, and attend a half-day virtual summit. Teams then perform tests of change to identify which approaches work best in their unique care settings. Under the expert guidance of HANYS and their faculty, teams

then scale and spread 4Ms care across their facility, transforming the care delivered to older adults.

"It is so important that older adults have the opportunity to meaningfully participate in their own care," noted HANYS President Bea Grause, RN, JD. "These healthcare providers have fully embraced evidence-based elements of care that have demonstrably improved care for older adults and their loved

Durant, who was born and raised in the North Country, said she chose to raise her family here and has a "great sense of pride in my community and what it has to offer."

Of the major challenges the county is faced with, Durant said staffing levels at the county level are of major concern. "Emergency Management Services across the county will continue to be an issue as so many of our EMS is done on a volunteer basis," Durant said.

Durant said, if elected, she "would offer greater level of support to our Emergency Management Services."

Durant also calls for St. Lawrence County to continue pushing for further tourism.

"St. Lawrence County needs to work on attracting tourism and economic development. I think that the multi-use trail system is one source of economic development for District 13 and the county," she said.

The multi-use trail system was long championed by current District 13 legislator Tony Arquiett who has opted to not run for another term.

Durant said she would continue to drive for more growth of the trail system if elected.

"I would support and advocate for the growth of the multi-use trail system to provide greater economic development for not only District 13 but the county as well," she said.

Durant's experience is centered around her time as a union representative for the last 20 plus years, which she says has allowed her to develop a varied skill set "such as negotiating, deliberative dialogue, and looking at things from all perspectives."

"I have sat on various committees in my role as a Union representative and have learned to work collaboratively with a variety of people who may have differing opinions. I currently am Vice-Chair of the SUNY Potsdam Child Care Center and understand the importance of creating budgets, being fiscally responsible and working together as a group," she said.

Though Durant acknowledged that a wide variety of issues affect the residents of St. Lawrence County, she said her approach would push the county to focus on more local issues as opposed to state and federal level concerns.

"I have been attending the St.

Lawrence County board of legislator meetings for the past couple of months and one of the things I would like to see is a greater focus on the county issues that we can address and less on the national issues that we really have no control over," she said.

When compared to her opponent, Durant said she doesn't personally know him, however she spoke to her passion for the community.

"I can only tell you that I am a lifelong resident of District 13, have a strong passion for my community and will work tirelessly to protect and enhance the services offered by St. Lawrence County for the residents of not only District 13 but the entire county," she said.

Durant also said she hopes to be in a position to advocate for additional resources for the Department of Social Services while calling for greater transparency by DSS.

In the end, however, Durant said it's not about political party affiliation but taking a "non-partisan approach to getting things done."

"I will always be open and approachable to all residents of District 13. I respect the role of legislator as being that of a steward for the future of St. Lawrence County and recognize that every decision I make will affect the future generations of St. Lawrence County," Durant said.

GENNETT...

Gennett currently works as an engineer for Corning in Canton. He said he wants to ensure fiscal responsibility at the county level to ensure services are not only maintained but expanded.

He also hopes the county can continue to improve on infrastructure, while lowering taxes for residents in the county.

"Being fiscally responsible is the number one issue. We have to make sure we're investing in the right projects in a responsible manner and bolstering our infrastructure like our roads and broadband," he said.

Gennett said improving the infrastructure is the best way to attract new businesses and ensure larger businesses stay in the North Country.

"We have the land, we have plenty of power and we have great people up here. There is so much opportunity to tap into," he said. Gennett is originally from a small town in Pennsylvania and said he has seen the effects when large businesses leave.

"We lost steel mills and there was literally nothing left, people left and small businesses closed," he said.

Gennett also pointed to his education as a key component of what makes him a strong candidate.

"I have an MBA from Syracuse University. I know the ins and outs of business and why responsible oversight is necessary to ensure fiscal stability," he said.

Prior to his work at Corning, Gennett was an officer in the Marine Corps. During his timing as a Marine, Gennett said he oversaw many large scale, taxpayer funded projects

"We had government transparency on those projects, which is something we are not entirely used to honestly. But that's what we need in the county, so that people know where their dollars are going, how much is being spent and just what is the project," he said.

Gennett said it has been seen in recent years with a number of bridges receiving repairs across the county.

"I know it's an inconvenience that the bridges may be closed for weeks, sometimes even months at a time. But if they fall apart it's game over. We have to rebuild our roads and bridges and we have to ensure we have the resources available to maintain them during the winters," he said.

Gennett said he also learned first hand just how difficult it is to find affordable housing in the North Country.

After moving to the area for his job at Corning, Gennett was forced to live at the Best Western in Canton for over two months before he was able to find a home.

"They were great at the Best Western, they took great care of me and I enjoyed my time there but it's not sustainable. I learned how hard it is to find a home and just how limited we are for affordable housing," he said.

If elected, Gennett said he wants to ensure affordable housing projects are a priority and programs that can assist individuals and families alike to find housing are properly funded.

According to Gennett, programs that assist veterans and individ-

uals with disabilities are complex with "convoluted processes to go through."

"We saw first hand how well these projects can turn out with the old Snell building in Potsdam. If we can retrofit old buildings like that it may be the best way forward," he said.

Gennett said he will assist in securing additional funding to ensure projects like the Snell apartment building project can move forward in a timely manner.

"If we are able to lower taxes we won't see people leaving the area like they are now. We're taxed at absurd levels and when one person leaves it falls to everyone else to maintain the tax base, so more people keep leaving. I know taxes are necessary for public services but we need to find a better way to cover that spread," he said.

When asked about the differences between himself and his opponent, Gennett said there are not many but the differences that do exist are big.

"We have a lot of similar ideas and support a lot of the same projects. I'm an outdoorsman, so the multi-use trail system is something I want to support. We're both very community focused and want to see the North Country flourish. But what sets me apart is my background as an engineer, my education and business acumen and my experience overseeing large scale projects as an officer in the Marine Corps," Gennett said.

Though he calls himself a financial conservative and is registered as a Republican, Gennett said he will work across the aisle on any potential legislation.

"I'm willing to work with anyone who has the people's best interests in mind. I'm fiscally conservative on many things but I want to hear all sides before making any sort of decision," he said.

Gennett said he chose to live in the North Country because of the

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charm of the area and the people who live here. It's because of that charm that he chose to run for the county legislature.

"It's always felt like home to me and I want to help make it a better place," he said.

can still be a pest when they make it into a home," he continued.

Hamilton-Honey encourages homeowners to seal their homes to prevent them from getting in and it helps with air leaks and other pests.


But be somewhat cautious if you decide to crush them or sweep them into a pile.

"Crushing them or sweeping them up causes them to release a yellow substance as a defensive measure which can stain walls and smells. This smell attracts other lady beetles, so cleaning where they have been is a good idea. The easier way to get rid of them is to vacuum them up," Hamilton-Honey explained.

He added that populations vary from year to year depending mostly on food availability but also temperature. Larvae eat aphids and adults eat a number of different things.

"This year was an exceptionally good year for aphids, therefore a very good year for the beetle," he stated. The USDA released these beetles as a biological control measure for aphids in the late 70's and 80's. Since the 90's we have had large breeding populations throughout the East Coast. The Asian lady beetle is considered a garden and agricultural beneficial insect due to its aphid control.

She was arraigned in Canton court by Judge Morgan, who suspended her license due to a refusal of a breath



questions to get a bead on where she stands on issues important to North Country voters.

Abortion rights

We asked Lapper to define her position on the recent Supreme Court ruling concerning the Roe V. Wade case precedent. The ruling dissolved any federal guarantees to abortion and put the matter back into the hands of state legislatures. We also asked her to describe where she stands on abortion rights in general.

"I am pro-choice and am committed to protecting and defending a women's access to the full range of reproductive healthcare services," Lapper said. "I will fight to ensure people can make personal decisions for themselves and their families without government interference."

Mandated reporting

Questions about whether or not clergy members should be mandated reporters, separation of church and state and other moral considerations have been raised over a recent controversy regarding the Madrid-based Christian Fellowship Center. The CFC leadership are under fire for not disclosing that one of their congregation was accused of child sexual abuse. The issue has many former church members and community residents calling for clergy to be made mandated reporters when they learn of such things.

We asked Lapper for her stance. "The situation with the Christian Fellowship Center is disturbing. Making clergy mandated reporters is something that certainly deserves further serious consideration," she said.

Criminal justice

The state's bail reform law has drawn a great deal of criticism, recently from St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua. Called a catch and release program, it can be argued that sky high crime rates since its passage have been facilitated by this policy. We asked the candidate if she supports the current Bail Reform policy or a more traditional bail system.

"The bail system was set up to keep the public safe and ensure people return for future court appearances, but it has become a punitive tool for those who can't afford to pay bail," Lapper said.

"The new law certainly needs some improvement and I have questions about the discovery aspects of the language," she said. "We could – and should – be having a genuine conversation that actually seeks to address real problems in our society and criminal justice system."

"When elected, I will work with law enforcement, our district attorneys, and social justice advocates to help strike the correct balance in the law. My door will be open to all," Lapper said.

North Country This Week asked the challenger if she had any reform policy ideas to try to curb criminal recidivism.

"Crime rates in the North Country are not what they are in other parts of the state. I will work to keep them that way as our next senator," she said. "Much of the crime is related to drug and alcohol offenses. I will focus on greater access to mental health and substance use disorder care - especially in areas of the North Country that have so few mental health providers, they are considered 'access deserts."

Health insurance

"The skyrocketing cost of health insurance is troubling," Lapper said when asked what the state could do to cinch up a coverage gap experienced by the working poor in the North Country.

Currently there is a reported gap in affordable coverage for people who work one and sometimes two jobs at low wages. Those in this demographic can obtain insurance through NY State Health, but the premiums are often too high and the deductibles are out of sight for low wage earners.

"When I become a member of the Senate Majority Conference, I will ask to serve on the Insurance Committee to work to make health insurance more affordable for all New Yorkers and to improve the laws to make it more accessible through business and professional groups," Lapper said.

Tax exempt properties

While a number of tax-exempt properties in Ogdensburg left abandoned by the state sit just outside the newly configured District 45 boundary, what happens with those buildings and lots will have an effect on many of the residents who live in the new Senate District. The aging psych center is in desperate need of repair and no plan has been presented by the state to redevelop the shuttered Ogdensburg Correctional Facility. We asked Lapper what could be done at the state level to get some action on these properties.

"As a state senator, I will work with Empire State Development, the governor's staff and local leaders to put land back on our local tax rolls or develop a PILOT (payment in lieu of taxes) program to help attract employment opportunities - especially in the green economy sector," she said.

North Country economy

The challenger's top platform issue is the economy and Lapper is looking to technology development to improve the financial futures of the region.

"As a small business owner and certified public accountant, my top priority when I am elected to the state Senate, will be to do all I can to bolster our North Country economy," Lapper said.

"Not only will I work to ensure our state tax dollars remain here, but I will fight for increased economic opportunity to attract young people to build their lives and raise their families here," she said.

"First, we need to invest in broadband," said the challenger. "Our economy cannot grow without a more robust broadband network.

"Also, I am supporting the Environmental Bond Act which will provide critical funding to protect our natural resources, provide clean air and drinking water and modernize our infrastructure. This investment in the clean energy sector will pay large dividends for the North Country," Lapper said.

Lapper said one of the main issues of concern she hears about from the public on the campaign trail deals with the environment.

"When I am our senator, I will work to promote sustainability, attract green jobs, and invest in our water and sewer infrastructure. I will work with local municipalities to make sure they get the resources they need for these infrastructure and affordable housing projects," she said

With a recession predicted to be on its way, or already here, many voters in North Country communities are worried about the future. Lapper says one of the answers will be more jobs and a better tax code.

"As an accountant, I see every-day the impact the economy has on the people and businesses of our community," she said. "When I am our senator, I will have many suggestions for the state on how we can make our tax code less onerous for families and small businesses. The best tool to combat inflation is good paying jobs. Good paying jobs

are provided by investment in education and training, small business and infrastructure."

"The Supreme Court ruling on Roe v. Wade is obviously a passionate issue for many New Yorkers. My belief, and state laws back this up, is that the decision to overturn Roe v. Wade has no impact on abortion rights in New York. These were codified into law in January 2019 as part of the Women's Equality Agenda," Stec said.

Mandated reporting

The recent controversy surrounding the Christian Fellowship Center situation where they had not reported instances of past sexual abuse allegedly committed by one of their congregation has raised the question about whether or not clergy members should be mandated reporters to the state in suspected cases of abuse.

The issue raises questions regarding separation of church and state and other moral considerations. We asked Stec where he comes down on this issue.

"I have supported legislation, S1399, that adds clergy members to the list of mandated reporters of suspected child abuse and maltreatment," the incumbent Senator said.

Criminal justice

North Country This Week asked Stec for his stance on key criminal justice issues which affect St. Lawrence County voters, as well as residents throughout the state. Chief among these is the oft-criticized state bail reform law, which many refer to as "catch and release." The policy which allows many accused offenders to be released without bail following arraignment as they await further court dates has been blamed as a contributing factor in skyrocketing crime rates around the state.

"I voted against bail reform as an Assemblyman and in the Senate, sponsor a full repeal of this ill-conceived measure," the senator said.

"We've all seen the headlines and reports: since taking effect, there has been a measurable increase in crime and repeat offenses. District attorneys statewide, of both parties, attribute this to bail reform and have pushed for substantive changes," Stec said.

Stec believes the state must provide judicial discretion and allow prosecutors and law enforcement the flexibility they need to keep our communities safe from violent, repeat offenders. "None of our Sheriffs or DAs were consulted or asked to provide any insight on this ill-conceived legislation, and going forward any criminal justice measures must include their voice and recommendations," the senator said.

We asked Stec to provide ideas to help curb criminal recidivism for the convicted and if he had any specific reform policies in mind.

"First and foremost, we need to provide a disincentive to prevent crimes from occurring. We cannot reward this type of behavior, which is what we're currently seeing," he said. "Expanding public-private partnerships to help provide job-training skills and opportunities is a great way to ensure that incarcerated individuals have a chance for a better future upon release and are less likely to end up committing another criminal

Health insurance

With many of the working poor in St. Lawrence County unable to afford premiums and deductibles of insurance obtained through the marketplace and yet making too much money for free insurance through the state, many residents in St. Lawrence County struggle to make ends meet and still may for medical expenses.

"As health insurance costs continue to rise, narrowing this gap will continue to be challenging," Stec said. "As state leaders, we need to re-examine the current eligibility guidelines with our health insurance policies to see how they can be improved to ensure affordability."

Tax exempt properties

The state currently sits on acres of tax exempt land and structures in Ogdensburg and in other areas of the county and local leaders are pushing to have them paint or get off the ladder. While the abandoned psych center and prison properties are not in Stec's district, what is done or not done with the land will have wide reaching repercussions for residents in District 45. We asked Stec if he had any ideas for redevelopment of these properties.

"While Ogdensburg is not in the 45th Senate District, I am aware that the state has a lot of abandoned properties within the city, two of the largest being the Ogdensburg Correctional Facility and a former state psychiatric center," Stec said. "One proposal is for the state to pay the city through a PILOT program."

"It is my understanding that Senator Ritchie will be introducing legislation that will address this issue. I will certainly support and co-sponsor this legislation," the incumbent said.

North Country economy

"As Senator, I've focused on promoting initiatives that would strengthen local jobs and our local economies," Stec said. "I'm a proud supporter of the upcoming FISU World University Games and have worked with state and local officials to ensure that this isn't just a successful sports and recreation event, but a major economic boon to the Lake Placid region."

"Additionally, I'm focused on responsible environmental stewardship and partnerships that balance our environment with boosting our region's great tourist industry and creates opportunities here in the North Country," the senator said.

"From a policy standpoint, we need to make NY more competitive by rethinking our approach to economic development initiatives to investing in our crumbling infrastructure. We need to reduce our regulatory burdens and offer incentives that will restore job creation and allow businesses to expand," Stec said.

"I support initiatives that lower costs on small businesses and family farms, helping them to invest their money back in their home communities to create good-paying jobs and ensure our residents have access to the products and services they need and deserve," he said. "Going forward, I'll continue working to ensure that state government doesn't impede our local character and economic growth.

With a recession predicted to be on its way (or perhaps here already) the senator was asked what he felt is the state's role in taxation and regulation and what can be done to help cushion the economic downturn for average residents.

"For too long, New York State has taxed and spent far too much," Stec said.

"Our FY23 state budget was \$222.2 billion, which was more that Texas and Florida's combined state budgets. Given our current economic outlook, now is the time to address this issue."

"That means reining in state spending and the unwieldy taxes and fees that have made job growth lag and led to stagnating earning potential," he said

"Earlier this year, I helped pass an acceleration of a tax cut for middle-class families and a gas tax holiday. We must continue to utilize ideas like this in order to put money back into our resident's pockets," Stec said.

"By addressing the root causes of unaffordability in our state – high property taxes, excessive costs on everyday items and on businesses – we can mitigate the effects of the national economic downturn," he said...

SLC warns public of lead poisoning

CANTON — St. Lawrence County has proclaimed Oct. 23-29 as National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week.

County legislators approved the measure during the full board meeting on Oct. 3.

St. Lawrence County Public Health hopes to bring awareness to the issue, citing the potential developmental effects lead can have on children.

"Health problems caused by elevated blood lead levels are often invisible and irreversible in children," officials say.

Public Health officials continue to work to protect children by "encouraging parents to have young children screened for elevated blood lead levels at one and two years of age."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates approximately half-a-million children living in the U.S. have lead levels high enough to cause learning disabilities, behavioral problems, developmental delays and, at very high levels, seizures, coma and even death, according to the resolution.

"The Public Health Department joins the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in encouraging parents to learn more about lead exposure prevention," officials say.

Themes for the week include "Get the Facts," "Get Your Home Tested," and "Get Your Child Tested."

Parental consent not needed for Monkeypox vax

CANTON – On Oct. 6, New York State Public Health and Health Planning Council voted to add monkeypox to the list of sexually transmitted infections (STIs). The amendment was adopted as an emergency regulation and is in effect for 90 days, with the possibility of extension.

In New York State, minors under 18 years old generally cannot access vaccination, testing, or treatment without consent from a parent or guardian. STIs represent an exception. This action was proposed by the New York State Department of Health as a means of ensuring that minors under the age of 18 can consent to their own monkeypox related services.
