Primary possible in Ogdensburg

OGDENSBURG — Two former city councilors, a long-time board of education member and a former business owner are running on the Democratic ticket for Ogdensburg City Council.

Longtime city resident Michael Tooley is eyeing the mayoral seat while Jennifer Stevenson and Storm Cilley will run for city council seats. Days later Michael



Weaver announced he'd also be seeking the Democratic nomination.

Seats currently held by Steve Fisher, Bill Dillabough, John Rishe and Mayor Jeffrey Skelly are up for grabs in November. It's unclear at this time if any of them plan to run again.

During their tenure as council members the city has undergone drastic cuts to staff, seen significant cuts to taxes and several legal battles.

City council meetings are often contentious, as is the current relationship between the city and county.

Massena school leaders hope to keep tax levy flat as budget work begins

MASSENA — Massena Central School District officials are hoping for a 0% tax levy increase as they work through budget planning for the district.

Officials say there is a possibility of achieving the feat after assessing Governor Hochul's proposed budget that calls for a sharp increase in school aid.

According to Superintendent Pat Brady, administration and offi-



cials on the finance committee are continuing to work on the budget as they prepare to have it finalized sometime in April.

"Our current projections are based on the governor's proposal released on Feb. 1," Brady said.

Brady said the district is set to receive a significant boost in foundation aid but that half a million dollars is to be used to tutor students who "are at risk of not meeting ELA and math standards in grades three through eight."

Though he noted that funding is very necessary and will likely allow the district to help many students in need, one issue is that the funds

Massena Volunteer Fire Chief Pat O'Brien recently told North Country This Week the department remains in great shape despite the ongoing situation.

'We just want to assure folks it is business as usual for us. We're going to continue to respond to every situation, we will continue to train and we will continue to serve our community.

O'Brien said training is an ongoing process for volunteer and career staff, as well.

Ogdensburg's REDI project will cost local taxpayers roughly \$4 million

OGDENSBURG - What started out as an \$8 million project with a \$400,000 local share to fix issues and reduce further problems by flooding has grown into a \$12.5 million project that will cost local taxpayers more than \$4.1 million.

The massive bond was approved Feb. 13 in a 5-2 vote with Steve Fisher and Bill Dillabough voting against it.

City Councilor John Rishe also expressed disinterest in supporting the measure, but said the contracts were awarded and needed to be

The Lake Ontario Resiliency and Economic Development Initiative aimed to help municipalities hurt by flooding in Lake Ontario and St. Lawrence River Communities.

When it was first announced the funding was welcomed with open

One half of the REDI project which included improvements to the Seawall along the Oswegatchie River and Maple City trail moved forward with little to no issues.

However, the city has had a much different experience in the REDI project that includes the boardwalk and Morissette Park.

Delays in constructions and changes in project scope have pushed the price tag ever upward. In November of 2020 the city was expected to spend just \$415,000.

In December of 2021, the city expanded the project to the tune of \$1.3 million.

In February of 2022, the city added an additional \$1.9 million to the project.

The additions to that point were due to increased material and labor costs and additions approved by council such as changing the grading and replacing the park that was being removed.

Then in November of 2022, the city was hit with a massive unexpected cost when engineers said it was found that additional work would be needed to install a new sheet pile wall and tie-back system to replace the existing wall and allow for the other improvements planned at Morrisette Park to be constructed and designed.

In the past, Mayor Jeffrey M. Skelly described the REDI grant as making a deal with the devil. He said that the project has continually grown into a massive burden for the

"A lot of cost increases. A lot of changes arisen. And not at the best time. While our audit was great for

2021, things are changing quickly for our city," Skelly said.

Deputy Mayor Steve Fisher, who voted against the bond, says the city needs to consider its options as he believes that additional cost was related to failings of the engineers who approved the project.

"That's got the \$1.4 million in it for the sheeting in the front that nobody sent a diver in the water and were (going to) tag the taxpayers for? Just to make sure?" Fisher asked, before saying that he was voting no on the matter.

"They should have put a diver in water. They should be sued."

Mayor Jeffrey M. Skelly said that's something that could be discussed.

Fisher said it was probably better to move such conversations to executive sessions.

BOE and Union reach deal

MASSENA - School board members along with the Massena Federation of Teachers and Massena Building Administrators Association have come to an agreement to modify existing memorandums of agreement related to professional performance reviews.

Officials say the changes come after state officials eliminated a state assessment exam for fourthgrade science.

Prior to the modification to the memorandum of agreement, 50% of evaluations for teachers and principals centered on student performance on Regents exams, as well as the state science assessments for students in grades four through

Following the announcement of the elimination of the fourth-grade exam, Superintendent Pat Brady

established a committee of stakeholders to assess the evaluation

Officials on the committee have now agreed that any further professional performance reviews will be based on Regents exams only.

"I think both the district, as well as the administration, working with teachers, leaders and administrative leaders, agreed that just focusing on the commencement Regents exam as a measure of performance would be the best way to make these changes," Brady said.

All changes made required board approval with a revised plan also being submitted to the State Education Department.

Other criteria for teacher evaluations include principal observations, while principals are rated based on observation by the superintendent.

Ogdensburg gets clean audit, but will need new auditor for this year

OGDENSBURG — Ogdensburg's 2021 audit was clean according to Pinto, Mucenski, Hooper Vanhouse,

The audit did not report any deficiencies in internal controls or compliance.

The audit showed that the city grew the fund balance from \$5.4 million to \$6.62 million in that year.

Ogdensburg Mayor Jeffrey M. Skelly said he was pleased with the results. He said 2021 was a standout year for the city financially.

"I don't know of any other communities in New York State that were able to lower taxes by 10%, raised their fund balance and significantly paid down debt at the same time," he said.

"The results of the audit are a testament to the work of Angela Gray, Steve Jellie and Andrea Smith."

The audit had been a point of contention among council members and the public in recent months as it had not been completed in time for budget preparations.

Pinto, Mucenski, Hooper, Van-House & Co. was hired in October of 2020 to perform the annual audit for the years 2020-2022 for the price of \$24,000 for 2020, \$25,000 for 2021 and \$26,000 for 2022.

However, the firm will no longer be performing the 2022 budget. Interim City Manager Andrea Smith said the firm will no longer be providing the auditing service and a request for proposal has been sent out to find a replacement firm.

At a recent meeting, Ogdensburg resident Steve LaRose criticized the council for failing to complete the 2021 audit prior to passing the 2023

Mayor Jeffrey M. Skelly said that

delays in the audit were unfortunate but said people should be pleased with the results.

"All the hype and rumors spread out there about missing money and misused money were just a distraction from how great our city did at that time," he said.

Skelly said the work done in that vear is significant as the loss of sales tax put a huge dent in the city's revenues.

"We were fortunate that we had the \$1.5 million to use for the 2023 budget. Now we are unfortunately taking \$4.1 million for the REDI project which should have only cost us \$500,000, but that was dropped in our laps," he said.


"It's a good thing that we paid off that debt, that we improved our Moody's rating, that we lowered taxes and gave breathing room in our ability to raise them in the future."

Skelly said without the growth found in 2021 the city wouldn't be able to make ends meet.

"With the inability to make the necessary adjustments to the fire department due to the existing contract, we'll need to take advantage of the room we made to raise taxes," he said.



Troopers sweep river for murder evidence

GOUVERNEUR - The State Police Forensic Identification Unit and Underwater Recovery Team are searching the Oswegatchie River and riverbanks near the Main Street bridge in the village of the Gouverneur.

They are focusing their search for any evidence related to the homicide of Ronald E. Durham, 72, of Gouverneur.

Durham was reported killed by a sharp force injury to his neck and was found in the East Side Cemetery on Van Buren Road around 8:20 a.m. on Feb. 11.

As a result of an investigation of Durham's death, with the assistance of the Gouverneur Police Department, Frederick A. Wing, 22, Gouverneur, was arrested for one count of murder in the second-degree.

Wing was arraigned in the Town of Rossie Court and ordered held in the St. Lawrence County Jail, without bail, pending future court appearances.

This investigation remains ongoing. State Police are asking for anyone with information regarding this incident to please contact State Police at 315-379-0012.

will certainly be missed. That is a big loss for the department," Mayor Greg Paquin said. In her place, officials signed off on the hiring of Marcus LaBrake as a patrol officer with the department. LaBrake will attend the police academy at SUNY Potsdam this fall, officials say.

Officials also agreed to approve a deal with Wright-Pierce Engineering Consultants for on-call engineering services, water intake evaluation, as well as miscellaneous engineering. The deal is to not

exceed \$10,000. In other action, village officials also signed off on an addendum between the village and United Public Service Employees Union (Massena Police Protective Association). Officials say the addendum, dated June 1, 2022 through May 31, 2025 was due to a change in the clothing allowance for each patrol officer, sergeant and investigator employed at the time of ratification.

Ogdensburg man charged with cocaine possession

CANTON — An Ogdensburg man officers said. was jailed on drug charges Feb. 16, according to St. Lawrence County sheriff's deputies.

Kevin C. Guilbert, 40, was arrested around 9 a.m. that day and charged with two counts of third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance, felony, officers said.

He was allegedly in possession of about 13 grams of methamphetamine, four grams of cocaine, digital scales and packing material,

Guilbert was arraigned by Canton Town Judge Morgan and remanded to St. Lawrence County jail without bail, deputies said.

He reportedly has two prior felony convictions, officer said.

Deadly crash investigation continues

LOUISVILLE - National Transportation Safety Bureau investigators have concluded their initial investigation of a fatal accident on State Route 37 that claimed six lives and left eight others injured.

The entire investigation is expected to be completed in 12-24 months, officials say.

According to the NTSB initial report released today, Feb. 16, investigators determined the accident was the result of a 26-foot box truck crossing over the highway centerline, leading to a collision with the driver's side of the bus.

As a result of the accident, six occupants of the bus were killed, two were seriously injured, six more had minor injuries and one was uninjured.

The driver of the truck, now known to be Harley N. Diaz-Baez, 25, of the Bronx, was also seriously injured in the accident.

Police say Christopher Valiro-Torres, 36, of Venezuela was the driver of the bus.

Other parties involved with the investigation included the Federal

Motor Carrier Safety Administration, New York State Police and New York Department of Transportation.

NTSB officials say all aspects of the crash remain under investigation while the NTSB determines probable cause, with the intent of issuing safety recommendations to prevent similar incidents.

According to NTSB spokesman Peter Knudson, investigators were on scene from Jan. 29 until Feb. 6.

"Investigators will continue to gather, collect and evaluate evidence in an investigation that will include survival factors, vehicle factors, human performance and the motor carrier involved," Knudson

Officials say the accident occurred at 6:02 a.m. on Saturday, Jan. 29. The collision, between a 2013 medium sized bus with 15 occupants and a 2021 Freightliner box truck, was originally deemed due to poor visibility and snow and ice covered roads, according to

The six men who were killed were employees of LBFNY, LLC in Weed-

Officials with the company say they were on their way to a solar

project in Madrid.

Dozens of first responders were called to the scene as there were mass casualties. Their efforts were recognized by Mayor Mike Zagrobelny of Waddington.

"As many of you are aware, there was a terrible accident on Rt. 37 in Louisville early this morning," he said in an online statement. "Thank you to all of the first responders from around the county including Waddington Volunteer Rescue Squad and Waddington Volunteer Fire Department who responded, thank you to St. Lawrence County dispatch for coordination of efforts, and hospital workers. Please share thanks with the responders but also grant them the grace to deal with what they may have witnessed. Thank you again for being there at the worst of times."

Troopers were assisted by St. Lawrence County Sheriff's department, multiple fire and rescue teams; Louisville, Waddington, Norfolk, Madrid, Massena, and Seaway Valley.

The victims were reportedly transported to Massena Memorial, Canton-Potsdam Hospital, and Claxton Hepburn Medical Center.

St. Lawrence County DA says seizure money will pay for tech upgrades

CANTON — The St. Lawrence County District Attorney's Office plans to utilize more than \$25,000 from a Discovery Grant for technological upgrades that will make the office more efficient.

District Attorney Gary Pasqua went before the operations committee on Feb. 13 to detail what the grant funding will be used for.

"This deals with the discovery grant we got. As you know, the grant came in for a two-year period and the majority of it went to pay for the discovery position that I got, as well as the Sheriff. But this portion deals with a couple different things. One is the Cellebrite hardware that deals with phone extractions. We put it into the grant and the state approved that. This will allow us to do our own extractions on cell phones and get those to the defense faster," Pasqua said.

"Part of the grant there is a training component, which I will be

sending my investigator to as well," Pasqua said. That training will also be covered by the grant.

Prior to the implementation of the hardware, phone extractions were conducted in Albany or by the Department of Homeland Security, Pasqua told legislators.

Being able to conduct extractions locally will speed up the process for the district attorney's office, allowing them to remain compliant with new discovery requirements, Pasqua said.

"We can send all of the files digitally now as well," he said.

Pasqua said the new tech will be the only way to keep up with new discovery laws but once in place will streamline the workflow.

Of the \$25,431 in state aid, \$6,065 will be used for a laptop, with \$10,625 being used for Cellebrite Universal Forensics Extraction Device (UFED) Program and \$8,742 for storage fees for the PCMS program.



Ogdensburg secures crucial funding for pump house

OGDENSBURG — While the city has recently faced a host of unexpected financial blows, it's found a solid victory in financing a \$1.8 million project to rehabilitate the Main Street pump station.

The pump station was originally slated to be part of the massive Waste Water Treatment Facility project, but was one of many alternates cut from the original plan with hopes of finding grants to offset the cost.

Interim City Manager and Planner Andrea Smith said the move

was a successful one.

She said the pump house was well past its useful lifespan and had been limping by in recent years, but was also crucial to the city as the pump supplies water to the entire western portion of the city.

That includes Claxton-Hepburn Medical Center, the State Police Barracks and dozens of local businesses

In recent years and months ,Smith has been working to find funds for the project. Now \$1.56 million of the project will come from three separate grants.

Most recently, Smith was successful in securing a St. Lawrence

County grant of \$400,000.

The county included some funding for water projects as part of the \$20 million spending plan for American Rescue Plan Act funds.

Although in recent years the city and county have had their differences, the grant may be a sign of improving relationships.

The city and county also recently came to an agreement in which the county provides overnight dispatching for the Ogdensburg Police Department.

Smith offered praise to county officials for using ARPA funds to help bolster local communities that were in dire need of infrastructure suppor

"I think the county has done a nice job, not unlike the city, in being diverse in how they use their funds," she said.

The city used a portion of its much smaller ARPA awards to help homeowners and businesses with critical heating and plumbing projects.

But the county grant is only part of the equation. Smith said the city was also successful in receiving a \$1 million Northern Border Regional Commission grant and \$140,000 State and Municipal Facilities grant.

Combined, the local share of the project is reduced to about \$260,000.

Smith said that the Main Street pump project has already been put out to bid and awarded.

While the city still has other pumps that could use some improvements, those aren't in as dire shape or quite as crucial as the Main Street pump.

She said the next one targeted by the city will be on South Water Street.

Smith said she is always looking for funding opportunities for projects and is hopeful they will find similar success down the road.

To date, there have been no reported injuries and no damage reported but USGS officials said at least one individual reported feeling the quake.



County adds redundancy to improve emergency communications

CANTON - As part of a planned,extensive renovation to the county dispatch center, officials are taking steps to ensure service will be uninterrupted.

During the March 6 operations committee meeting, legislators approved a contract with Slic Network Solutions Inc. for a redundant internet connection and service.

Officials say the redundant connection will be between the primary call 911 center in Canton and the backup center in Massena, allowing them to "share vital data."

"We do have a new phone sys-

tem that is being installed both at the primary dispatch center in Canton and the backup dispatch center in Massena. That requires a redundant internet connection between them both," Deputy Director of Emergency Service Jonathan Mitchell told legislators.

The cost of the contract will include a \$49 setup cost and a monthly cost of \$69.95 per month.

Mitchell told officials the rate from Slic is standard and is the same rate the county was paying previously for redundant service. Officials previously approved the

renovations last year that would see upgrades of technological equipment, office renovations and service upgrades in both Canton and Massena. Officials also approved the purchase of upgraded 911 call-taking solutions for both sites as well.

St. Lawrence Health receives \$10M for obstetrics, rural family medicine

The grant funding will be used to construct a building in the Potsdam area with 16 exam rooms, a conference room, and office space for the program director, administrative support, and residents.



The power of the fork can help save the planet

The nutritional, environmental and ethical consequences of consuming animal products

Plant-Based Lifestyle Advocate

Like most of us, I was introduced to Carnism by my parents and unfortunately never really questioned the choice to consume animal products until many years later. As a result, I was Comfortably Unaware (Oppenlander) of the nutritional, environmental, and ethical consequences associated with the choice to consume animal products.

It isn't very often that I see medical and/ or nutritional research which connects what I consider to be the three food choice criteria which are nutrition, the environment, and ethics (animal rights).

Ethically problematic

As a result, I was pleasantly surprised to read an editorial published within the February 1, 2023 edition (volume 188) of The American Journal of Cardiology titled Are We What We Eat? The Moral Imperative of the Medical Profession to Promote Plant-Based Nutrition (Hull, Charles and Kaplan).

The editorial opened with "The typical Western diet, high in processed and animal-based foods, is nutritionally and ethically

Beyond the well-documented cruelty to animals that characterizes the practices of the factory-farming industry, current patterns of meat consumption contribute to medical and moral harm in humans on both an individual level and a public health scale.

We aim to deconstruct, by highlighting their fallacies, the common positive and normative arguments that are used to defend current nutritional patterns.

Animal-based foods promote the mechanisms that underlie chronic cardiometabolic disease, whereas whole-food plant-based nutrition can reverse them. Factory farming of animals also contributes to climate change, antibiotic resistance, and the spread of infectious diseases. Finally, the current allocation of nutritional resources in the United States is

A societal shift toward more whole-food plant-based patterns of eating stands to provide significant health benefits and ethical advantages, and the medical profession has a duty to advocate accordingly.

Although it remains important for individuals to make better food choices to promote their own health, personal responsibility is predicated on sound advice and on resource equity, including the availability of healthy

Nutrition equity is a moral imperative and should be a top priority in the promotion of public health." The nutritional consequences associated with the choice to consume animal products has been very well established for many decades."

Minimizing animal products

Independent peer-reviewed literature has connected the choice to consume animal products with various forms of cancer, arthritis, cardiovascular diseases, diabetes, high blood pressure and other common ailments.

The solution often suggested within this literature is to minimize or eliminate the consumption of animal products while at the same time increasing the consumption of plants in their rawest forms.

The solution too often recommended by the medical profession is a prescription drug which lacks root cause analysis, rather than the suggestion of a lifestyle change related to food choices.

Hippocrates, knowing of the healing properties of foods, who is often referred to as the father of medicine, stated "Let food be thy

medicine, let medicine be thy food."

It would seem that Hippocrates would agree that the medical profession has a moral obligation to promote plant-based nutrition.

What is 'healthy'?

An October 11, 2022. Times Union article titled Commentary: Physicians need better training in nutrition (Barnett, Friedman and Graff) stated "Nearly 80 percent of Americans are confused about which foods are 'healthy.'

Who can blame them, when Time magazine proclaims 'Eat Butter' on its cover? (Tip: Butter is not healthy.) And when people are eventually diagnosed with obesity or heart disease, their physicians are often unprepared to discuss which foods are actually good for them.

It's not the doctors' fault, since medical schools often don't teach our physicians enough about nutrition....With life expectancy in the U.S. dropping for the second year in a row due to conditions including COVID-19 and heart disease, both of which are impacted by diet, continuing medical education in nutrition for physicians is dire-

ly needed."

A February 13, 2023 Boston Globe article titled Could a more plant-based diet help you avoid taking certain medications? (Gagosz) stated "Our research supports that changing to plant-based nutrition can improve your weight, type 2 diabetes, heart disease,

inflammation, sexual function, energy, bowel function, and auto-immune disorders.

We have found that those who participate in the program lose an average of 4 pounds in one month.

Those with a BMI of 30 or more lose an average of 5 pounds over the month. That's healthy — you don't want people to lose 15 pounds at once and then binge eat and gain it all back. But we've also found that people's total cholesterol decreases by 25 mg/dL on average over the month.

In the past, nutrition really hasn't been discussed in great detail in medical schools. A lot of patients who come to me say they were given the option to go on medication or the doctor might say they should look into changing their 'diet' but don't give them any tips on how they could start that process.

Patients are also often told that something could be 'genetic,' which sometimes translates to something they have to accept when that isn't

Lifestyle Medicine is growing

The following was provided to me by Dr. Melissa Sundermann, DO, DipABLM, a physician who is double board-certified in Internal Medicine and Lifestyle Medicine with over 20 years of clinical experience:

"I attended medical school and residency during the late 90s and between those 7 years of medical education, I received approximately 17 hours of nutritional education. Most of this curriculum was focused on biochemical principles and rare diseases that could result from nutritional deficiencies.

Once I entered clinical practice, I felt ill-prepared to actually counsel my patients with regards to a healthful dietary pattern. I have always considered myself quite healthy and I believed I was 'eating clean' according to what I had learned mainly through media outlets. Fast forward to 2018 when I decided to pursue a pathway towards board certification in Lifestyle Medicine.

> This journey required taking a deep dive into evidence-based

nutrition...and I was shocked! So much of what I believed to be true was not supported by science. I learned about the power of plants (fruits, vegetables, beans, wholegrains, nuts/seeds) and their power to not only

prevent chronic disease, but also to possibly reverse diseases such as type 2 diabetes, hypertension, hyperlipidemia and obesity.

I also learned that 80-90% of chronic diseases are primarily lifestyle related. Yes, genetics do play a role, but to a much lesser extent than lifestyle behaviors. Researchers at the Mayo Clinic looked at data from a representative sample of 4,745 people who participated in the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES)

They found that less than 3 percent of Americans live a 'Healthy Lifestyle' as defined by four qualifications: 1) Moderate or vigorous exercise for at least 150 minutes/week, 2) A diet score in the top 40 percent on the Healthy Eating Index, 3) A body fat percentage under 20 percent (for men) or 30 percent (for women), 4) Not smoking.

These findings suggest we have a lot to do to improve the overall health and well-being for

our patients. Thankfully the American College of Lifestyle Medicine has made great strides to educate clinicians across the globe to help shift the paradigm of medicine from a 'sick-care' model to a 'well-care' system.

Lifestyle Medicine is a medical specialty that uses therapeutic lifestyle interventions as primary modality to treat chronic conditions including, but not limited to, cardiovascular diseases, type 2 diabetes and obesity. Lifestyle medicine certified clinicians are trained to apply evidence-based, whole-person, prescriptive lifestyle change to treat and, when used intensively, often reverse such conditions.

Applying the six pillars of lifestyle medicine-a whole-food plant-predominant dietary pattern, physical activity, restorative sleep, stress management, avoidance of risky substances and positive social connections can help to optimize health and well-being and hopefully not only treat many chronic diseases, but also prevent these disease states from happening in the first place.

I am very grateful to be a part of the growing community of Lifestyle Medicine. We are a passionate and energetic group of clinicians and researchers with the shared goal of not only advancing our patient's lifespans, but more importantly their 'wellspans'.

What is longevity without vitality after all? Martin Luther King, Jr summarized this point beautifully with his quote, 'The quality, not the longevity, of one's life is what is important."

The ethics of eating

I was fortunate as a university accounting faculty member to be involved with a working group which was formed to make recommendations to the Sustainability Accounting Standards Board pertaining to their initial Meat, Dairy and Poultry sustainability reporting standards, as a result I saw literature from around the world with respect to those indus-

I also taught a capstone business ethics course which required students to independently research and discuss the environmental consequences of animal agriculture. The research results consistently established that animal agriculture used excessive amounts of water, land, antibiotics and feed/food inputs. Those industries also excessively polluted water, were a leading contributor to greenhouse gas emissions, land degradation, deforestation and promoted losses of biodiversity.

Given the "well-documented cruelty to animals" that is associated with the choice to consume animal products, I will not mention the various forms of extreme cruelty imposed upon these intelligent, sentient and emotional beings from the time they are born until their lives end at the slaughterhouse.

'Isms' such as racism, sexism, ableism, classism and many others are condoned, yet on a daily basis speciesism is accepted and promoted by the majority of us via the willingness to consume animal products.

An article titled Why the Meat Paradox Causes Cognitive Dissonance (Mackenzie) and the book Why We Love Dogs, Eat Pigs, and Wear Cows (Joy) explain the disconnect associated with the choice to consume animal

Life is life, farm animals are no different than our pets, some farm animals are more intelligent than our pets, and like our pets they have individuality. When you eat meat, the choice you make isn't what type of meat you are going to eat, rather it is who you are choosing to eat. What you choose to put on your fork has lots of power.

Cannon fire lights up the streets in Ogdensburg

OGDENSBURG — When British and Canadian reenactment troops of the War of 1812 attacked Ogdensburg Saturday and Sunday, Feb. 18 and 19, they were met by current St. Lawrence County Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe.

The Battle of Ogdensburg transported the public to Feb. 22, 1813, when British and Canadian forces crossed the ice-covered St. Lawrence River to confront American forces in the town of Ogdensburg.

After much cannon and rifle firing between the two forces, the battle ended with the capture of Sheriff Bigwarfe, who portrayed real-life hero Sheriff Joseph York.

"Sheriff York refused to leave his post, even when he faced possible death at the hands of the invaders," said organizer Timothy Cryderman. "Sheriff York and his wife, Lovina York, were genuine heroes of the War of 1812 who stood up to the British invaders and risked their lives for our community."

On Sunday, Feb. 19, the Battle continued at Van Rensselaer Point, also known as the Lighthouse Point.

That portion of the battle portrayed the attack of the fort itself by the British and Canadian forces, resulting in the retreating of the American forces to Sackets Harbor, New York.

The historic battle was narrated by local historian Jim Reagen.

The Fort La Présentation Association, in conjunction with Forsyth's Rifles Reenactor group, hosted the Battle of Ogdensburg.



How to approach a basement remodel

A fully finished and functional basement is a dream for many homeowners.

Such a space, when completed, can serve as an entertainment space, a man cave, an artist's studio, or any number of additional functions.

In an analysis of data from the U.S. Census Bureau's Survey of Construction, the National Association of Home Builders® found that only around 24 percent of single-family homes built in 2018 have basements.

Homeowners who do not currently have a finished basement but are considering such a project can approach the remodel with a few key factors in mind.

Careful consideration of these factors can ensure the project is budget-friendly and worthy of homeowners' investments.

· Investment value: Conventional wisdom among home renovation and real estate experts suggests that a basement remodel is best if done to satisfy current inhabitants and not necessarily to appeal to prospective buyers once the home is put up for sale.

Remodeling magazine reports that a midrange basement remodel costing around \$70,000 will provide a return of around \$49,000 (or 70 percent) at resale. Though that's not a poor return on investment, homeowners who are remodeling a basement solely for the potential ROI at resale can find other projects that provide a greater return.

· Foundation: The foundation of the home must garner ample consideration before beginning a basement remodel. Certain foundation issues, such as soft concrete, cracked or curved outside walls and cracks in the flooring, are indicative of significant issues with the foundation. These issues can be costly to address, and they must be remedied before the basement remodel can begin.

· Existing space: Some homeowners may have bought their homes with partially finished basements or even finished areas that they simply want to remodel. In such instances, a pre-remodel inspection from a licensed home inspector can save homeowners lots of money and heartache over the long haul. Partially finished or even aging finished basements might not have been renovated in

adherence to codes, which could lead to costly violations down the road. An inspection in advance of a remodel can give homeowners an idea of what they will need to do to bring the basement up to code. Local officials also can provide a list of necessary permits and a detailed description of requirements to ensure the remodeled basement adheres to code.

· Soil: Soil surrounding the home should be tested prior to beginning the project. Radon is an odorless gas found in soil that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency notes can increase individuals' risk for lung cancer. Radon can seep into basements and increase that risk even further if it is present at elevated levels in the soil surrounding a home. Radon tests are simple and inexpensive, and no basement remodel project should begin without first conducting such a test.

Finished basements are valuable spaces.

Homeowners who want to finish or remodel their basements should consider a host of factors before beginning the renovation.

What to do about moss in your lawn this spring

A lush, green lawn is a point of pride for many homeowners.

Eye-catching landscaping anchored by a healthy lawn is one of the key ways to improve the value and curb appeal of a home.

In fact, the experts at HGTV say an attractive and well-maintained landscape can add as much as 10 percent to the value of a home.

Maintaining a thriving lawn takes effort, and that means recognizing when the green in the yard may not necessarily be coming from soft blades of grass.

Invasive greenery, including moss, can infiltrate a lawn and that can be problematic if left unaddressed.

A mossy lawn is a sign that certain conditions are ripe for the moss, but not necessarily the grass, to grow.

According to Lowes, moss thrives in certain conditions, which should be addressed if homeowners hope to corral it.

· Moss does well in acidic soil, more so than traditional grasses. A soil test can confirm if the pH needs to be adjusted to make it more hospitable to grass and less friendly to moss.

Compacted soil and excess thatch can make it easier for moss to take root. These conditions also can make the soil damp and restrict drainage, something that promotes moss growth.

· Moss can grow in shady conditions. If patches of the lawn have been overrun by moss, there could be too much shade in the area. Trimming back trees or shrubbery may help; otherwise, homeowners may need to look into hardscape or plants that thrive in such conditions to remedy shady and damp areas on portions of their land-

Moss typically can be removed the same way one would dethatch a lawn. It involves rigorously raking or agitating the lawn to loosen the moss. This can be done by hand with a rake, or in the case of a lot of moss or a large lawn, with a dethatching blade attachment for a lawn mower.

Aerating the soil will help keep moss that was removed from returning. In addition, amending the soil so that it has a more dense nutritional profile by adding compost, as well as improving drainage and adjusting the pH, are keys to keeping moss from returning.

For pesky moss, The Spruce suggests making a solution of one box of baking soda to two gallons of water and spraying this solution on the patches of moss. It is a natural alternative to using chemical products. Certain sources indicate a glyphosate herbicide could work on moss, but the World Health Organization considers glyphosate to be a probable human carcinogen and it is prohibited in certain areas.



the chief fiscal officer for the Ogdensburg Diocese.

He also served as business manager for Morristown Central School and served on the Ogdensburg City School District Board of Education for 10 years.

Tooley says he's hoping things can be less personal if he's elected mayor. He knows disagreements can exist but wants to see them handled with less animosity.

"When people disagree with one another there is no need to make the disagreement turn personal,"

Tooley said that in recent years he's seen council members make personal attacks on social media, use the city website as a platform to criticize county legislator candidates and create a poor atmosphere between council and staff. He says such actions are inappro-

Tooley, who frequents city council meetings and often provides critiques, criticisms suggestions and sometimes praise, said that he tries to be balanced in his approach.

Tooley has been vocal in sharing his concerns about the city's decision to cut taxes by 20% in recent years and as well as the city's decision to keep this year's hike to just 2%. He said the cuts were too aggressive given the uncertainty of the city's new sales tax formula.

Tooley thinks council has done too much, too fast, but added that he believes their intention was to make the city a better place.

"I think every council has made attempts, in their own way, to make things better and I do think that is true with the current council. I just don't agree with everything that they've done to get there," he said. "I want to see if a new city council can take a step forward and help things in the city improve," he said.

Tooley is a long-time Republican, but recently switched parties. He said he's always considered himself a moderate as far as poli-

Storm Cilley, a former city councilor who served on city council from 2010 to 2013, has a lengthy background in education and is a long-time member and chief of the Ogdensburg Volunteer Rescue Squad. He has been among those who have shared their criticism of former City Manager Stephen Jellie and the many decisions made by council in the past three years. He said he was urged to run for office by members of the public.

"After these guys kind of started destroying our city, I got frustrated with it," he said.

Cilley said many approached him about running for mayor, but said he believed Toolev had a stronger background for that seat.

Like Tooley though, he said he wants to rebuild relationships between state and county officials that he believes have been destroyed in recent years. Even more, Cilley wants to rebuild trust with staff and citizens of the City of Ogdensburg.

Cilley says recent cuts to public safety jobs have hurt the city, whether it be reductions in the police force or the fire department. He said the city lost a lot of great employees who can't easily be replaced.

Cilley said he's also skeptical of the current council's presentation of numbers. He wants to see the comptroller's position restored and adequately staffed.

"I feel with my experience and the community's support we can get things back on track," he said. Cilley said he would make no

promises about "fixing" all the city's problems, but said he wants to see the city council become a more honest and open govern-

Stevenson is owner of Blue Heron Realty and community volunteer. She has often criticized council for its lack of decorum and had encouraged council to seek guidance on government operations as well as how to properly run meetings.

She served on the city council from 2012-2020. She said she was asked by city residents to run for council in recent years.

Stevenson said that if elected she wants to see the council work toward balancing expenses with services and rebuild relationships with county and state officials.

"I know it's a struggle for most people to pay taxes, water and sewer but there has to be a balance between taxes and services," she

Stevenson said she also wants to see civility return to the council.

'We have to work as a team, whether it be council, mayor, city staff, other municipalities, elected officials. We need to be able to have civil conversations."

Michael Weaver announced his plans to run for a council seat Feb.

"My name is Michael Weaver. I am a resident of Ogdensburg. I am a retired entrepreneur, former business owner, and security officer. I am presently on the Ogdensburg planning board, Elks Lodge House committee, Knights of Columbus member, Pride and Beautification board. I am a former Rotary president and board member," a statement issued by Weaver said. "If elected I would like to work on reducing taxes, work to rebuild infrastructure, work on improving the riverfront, I would like to see an amphitheater built. These are some of the things I would like to work on if elected, bring normalcy back to council."

It's unclear at this time if the incumbents will seek reelection, however should Rishe decide to run, a primary would be likely as only three council seats would be available for the four Democrats.

However, it's likely the seat held by Nichole Kennedy will also be up for grabs as she recently shared plans that she'd be moving from the area at the end of the school year. However, that would likely have no impact on a primary.

So far, no one is officially on the ballot as petitions will still need to be circulated, signed and filed.

posted on their Facebook page that it is business as usual for the department.

"Louisville Volunteer Fire Department would like to thank the community for the support and encouragement we have received. Your 100% volunteer fire department will continue to respond to all emergencies we are called upon in the town of Louisville and the surrounding communities as we always have. If you need assistance don't hesitate to contact us," the post read.

Attempts to contact the department were unsuccessful.

Massena FD Foreman Aaron Hardy, who serves as a professional firefighter and code enforcement officer, praised the work being done by both professional and volunteer staff, along with the unity among the department.

"These guys have had some very tough situations in recent weeks, some very hard scenes to work and I have to say that everyone keeps showing up with a smile on their faces. They all come to do the job,

day in and day out," Hardy said.

According to Hardy, this is the best relationship between volunteer and career staff that he's seen in his time with Massena.

"Everyone gets along great, the communication has been awesome and it's just one big team. We're all supporting each other and working together to help the community the best we can," Hardy said.

Town of Massena officials said they had no comment on the potential lawsuit.

It is unclear at this time if Perez will file a lawsuit against the Louisville and Massena Fire Departments, as well as the Towns of Louisville and Massena. But the claim he filed gives him the ability to do so.

Perez is being represented by Jorge Marquez and John Keenan of the Warren Law Group, based in New York City.

The notice was filed against Louisville and Massena fire departments, along with the towns of Louisville and Massena for \$4.5 million by Dr. Wilfredo Perez, owner of the Java Veterinary Cen-

Also put on notice were the Akwesasne, Potsdam, Madrid, West Stockholm, Norfolk, Brasher-Winthrop, and Waddington fire departments.

The Java Veterinary Center, located on Route 56 just outside of Massena, was declared a total loss following a fire on Oct. 28. The fire, initially reported just after 3 a.m., was put out before rekindling around noon. The fire rekindled again a few hours later, leading to a total loss, according to officials at

In court documents obtained by North Country This Week, the claims against the towns and fire departments "are for negligence and other related causes of action in light of the fact that the firefighters who responded, and the way they responded to the fire, created a special relationship with Dr. Perez such that liability attaches.'

Responding departments for the initial call included Massena, Louisville, Akwesasne, Potsdam, Madrid, West Stockholm, Norfolk, Brasher-Winthrop and Wadding-

When the fire rekindled, Massena Louisville, Norfolk, Brasher-Winthrop, Madrid and Waddington responded, with Massena Volunteer Fire responding with an aerial truck as well, documents

Court documents attempt to bring into question why area fire departments that responded initially to the fire had removed their personnel and resources from the scene prior to the first rekindle around noon that day.

Documents also state, "upon information and belief, only the Louisville Fire Department responded to the second rekindling that occurred on Saturday, October 29, 2022. Thus, the aforementioned fire departments may bear some or all responsibility for the loss suffered by Dr. Perez.'

No injuries were reported but at least two dogs were lost in the fire. Java Veterinary Center also offered boarding services for North Country Residents.

In an exhibit attached to the court documents, Assistant Chief Patrick O'Brien of the Massena Volunteer Fire Department wrote a letter addressed to Dr. Perez, explaining the "Chief of Louisville Fire will make the final determination as to cause of the fire utilizing the investigative reports provided to him by the fire investigators from the St. Lawrence County Fire Investigation Team as well as the New York State Office of Fire Prevention and Control," per New York State General Municipal Law §204-D.

According to the letter, the clinic was within the Louisville Fire District, leading other departments to act in support of Louisville.

"The mutual aid departments responding to assist Louisville Fire are not involved in the cause and origin determination or subsequent fire investigation," O'Brien wrote.

The GoFundMe, established by Perez shortly after the fire, has since ceased accepting donations after experiencing severe backlash

A benefit dinner was also held on Nov. 13 at Evland's restaurant in Massena, with many local businesses and local residents participating. Seven different dishes were served, along with baskets and prizes for raffles. Donated items included a 55" TV, Adirondack chair set with a firepit, a "basket of cheer", lotto ticket tree, doggie baskets and a 50/50 raffle.

On Dec. 3 the Moose Lodge hosted a Skillo Bingo fundraiser, which also included surprise raffles and 50/50 tickets.

Local musician Tracer James hosted a lap steel Christmas concert on Dec. 9, selling tickets for \$10 each to benefit the rebuilding efforts of the Java Veterinary Cen-

It is unclear if any of the funds obtained by Perez were used in the pending legal case.

Perez posted to his GoFundMe on Jan. 28, updating the community on progress being made on a new structure being built just behind the original Java clinic

Construction began in November 2022 just weeks after the fire. Your generous donations have helped cover 1/5th of the total cost which is approximately \$300,000. Loans and earnings generated from our clinic operations in its temporary location have helped cover the remainder of the costs. will be restricted.

Brady said the district is still awaiting final word but if the funding is as restricted as expected it is a concern for the district.

Officials say the district is set to receive \$34.7 million in foundation aid, a rise of nearly 18% compared to last year.

Expense-based aid will likely be over \$8.5 million, which is an increase of 9.42%, Brady said.

Building aid is currently estimated to be \$6,752,375, an increase of 29.96%, due in large part to the ongoing capital project. Officials say the project should be completed sometime this fall.

"I want to also temper that with the fact that we're looking at these vears where there could be some issues with funding, and this is not a final budget. I want to be clear on that. This is the governor's proposal. Where it ends up in April with the Legislature is not quite clear yet, but we certainly hope our legislative leaders will support it," Brady said.

Officials noted administrators have submitted budget requests that total around \$1.7 million.

Brady said the finance committee is continuing to work through budget requests, noting that those requests will need to be decided on during the budget process.

Revenues for the district are expected to be over \$68.5 million, with total expenditures totaling

Appropriated fund balance money will have to be used to cover the remaining \$472,786, Brady said.

The remaining \$472,000 is actually a decrease compared to this year where fund balance appropriations to balance the budget totaled \$988,000.

Brady also said that salaries are expected to increase 10.4%, while the Employee Retirement System will see a 19.7% increase. The Teacher Retirement System will see a 7% increase, while workers' compensation will increase 10.6%, Social Security will rise 13.1%, health insurance will increase 8.9% and total benefits will increase 9.6%.

"Our TRS rate is going up, but that's more related to the fact that in this budget we're looking at adding some staff, and when you add staff and payroll, that means your TRS rate goes up," Brady said.

Despite many hardships and uncertainty over the state budget, officials are hopeful they can maintain the current tax levy.

Officials say the estimated tax cap from 2023-24 is 3.92%, bringing in over \$581,000 more than 2022-23.

Officials will be holding a second public budget forum on March

Section of St. Lawrence Centre mall to turn into warehouse

MASSENA – The St. Lawrence Centre mall will soon be home to warehouse space after Town of Massena Planning Board members approved a site plan for modifications.

According to planning board documents, the former Hills end of the mall will be turned into warehouse space. Demolition is already underway with LaVack's Custom Builders on site to install the six approved truck loading docks.

Architect Brooks Washburn designed the project, according to documents.

Mall officials say 161,000 square feet of the mall would be used in the project, leading to the total demolition and rebuild of the former Hills wing of the mall through and including the former food court.

According to documents, the project will use a staged building permit meaning that the project will progress in phases.

Phase one includes the installation of the truck loading docks, with phase two encompassing the redesign of the middle area between the food court and former Hills store.

Phase three would include the demolition and use of the food court, according to documents.

Fork lifts will be used mall officials said they would only use electric models, not combustion models, documents state.

Additional security will also be added for door permissions and access to ensure the space is safe. No shelving will be used either, with only large, bulk products being stored in the area.

Mall officials and Washburn told the planning board the space will hopefully be utilized by larger companies like Amazon or WalMart.

Additional lighting will also be added over the loading docs, Washburn told planning board members.

According to documents, the planning board also set a number of stipulations, including a requirement that existing outdoor lighting must be maintained by the mall. Signage must also be changed out on and around the building to identify warehouse traffic and unused signage on the east end of the mall must be removed.

All new signs added must also follow town code and not be dynamic LCD/LED flashing signs, planning board officials said.

Planning board members also stipulated that all materials stored in the warehouse must follow S1 and S2 occupancy guidelines, meaning no flammable or explosive materials can be stored.

No timetable was given for project completion, nor was any specific company mentioned in meeting minutes confirmed to already be utilizing the space.

A call to mall management and planning board officials for comment was not immediately returned.

Farm worker overtime regulations finalized

The New York State Department of Labor (NYSDOL) had adopted final farm labor overtime regulations, codifying Commissioner Reardon's order that accepted the Farm Laborers Wage Board's report and recommendations in September

22

The phased-in, gradual reduction in the overtime pay threshold will begin on January 1, 2024, with the threshold set at 56 hours. The process will continue with the overtime threshold limit reducing by 4 hours every other year until reaching 40 hours in 2032.

Beginning in 2020, the Farm Laborers Wage Board held public hearings to gather testimony from farm owners, workers, advocacy groups, and academic researchers. Recordings of these hearings and additional materials are available on the NYSDOL's webpage.

In her State of the State Address, Governor Hochul announced a series of new initiatives designed to bolster demand for New York State foods, increase the purchasing of local farm products, and encourage investments to modernize New York's farms. The Governor and the New York State Legislature also recently enacted new tax credits to assist farm employers to ease the implementation of the lower over-

time standard.

The Investment Tax Credit was increased from 4 percent to 20 percent for farm businesses, providing an encouragement for potential automation of farm production.

The Farm Workforce Retention Tax Credit was increased to \$1,200 per employee to provide near-term relief to farmers.

A refundable tax credit was established for overtime hours paid by farm employers at the level established by the new regulation up to 60 hours.


