# Dog Sanctuary revisiting site plan

CANTON - Comments at a public hearing on the Town of Canton's new zoning law held Wednesday, June 14, were not about the law itself but concerns about the dog sanctuary on Rt. 68 while new information about plans from the kennel owners were also voiced.

Debbie Bridges, co-owner of Maple Ridge Kennels, informed the town board that modifications have been made to the facility for noise abatement and fencing has been improved. She also noted that plans for the kennel have changed, previous applications have been withdrawn and a new site plan adding permitted services only to the business will be submitted for town planning board review in July.

Previous applications have been withdrawn, Bridges noted.

She said the special use variance will allow for a new vet clinic and animal clinic. She said all the rescue animals are evaluated with no risk of disease and that a 1,000 gallon septic tank will handle the fecal matter.

"There is no disease risk from our animals and no problem with waste," Bridges noted.

Bridges also pointed out that all dogs are enclosed from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. to alleviate the

"Most of the neighbors appreciate our efforts," she said.

# **Potsdam** to notify encroachers

POTSDAM — A few Pierreport residents living next door to the 30-acre Postwood Park lot owned by the Town of Potsdam may be getting a letter from the municipality soon.

A recent survey of the town's Postwood Park acreage in Hannawa Falls shows several encroachments by private residents living adjacent to the park and the town is taking steps to notify them and re-establish the park boundary.

The Town of Potsdam owns the park which is located in the Town of Pierrepont, and runs its summer recreation program from there.

Town Code Enforcement Officer Jeffrey Murray told the town board at the June 13 meeting that when he was remarking the park's border lines he noticed six spots where landowners have ended up extending their own property boundaries into the park. In one spot there is a goat shed built on town land, in another a landowner's propane tanks are sitting in the park.

"Any one of these encroachments, I think there is ... six of them, they are not very big but its just the matter that they are on our land, Town of Potsdam's land, and how do you want me to handle (it)? Do we tell them we don't want them on it? How do you want me to handle that is what I want

# School officials say no to 'Lift Every Voice and Sing' at graduation, mother vows to play it

GOUVERNEUR — The "Black National Anthem" will be played at the Gouverneur Central School high school graduation Friday with or without school approval, a parent of a multi-racial child is vowing.

Tonya House told North Country This Week that in an act of civil disobedience, "Lift Every Voice and Sing" would be played "either on the school's PA system or by some other means, but it will be played.'

House said her daughter, Niciara House-Bowman, asked to sing "Lift Every Voice and Sing" at commencement, but was turned down by Superintendent Jacquelyn Kelly and high school Principal Corey Wood.

"She asked them months ago to sing it along with the Star Spangled Banner and they denied her the chance," House said. Niciara comes from a musical family and has participated in a number of musical groups in school.

Written in 1900 as a tribute to President Abraham Lincoln, "Lift Every Voice and Sing" has come to the forefront in recent years, with both the NFL and NBA having played it along with the national anthem before games. Many social justice organizations nationwide

have lobbied for wider acceptance of the song as a universal symbol of Black culture during special events

and ceremonies. During an interview with NCTW, House and her daughter detailed numerous instances during which they say Gouverneur students referred to Blacks as "monkeys" and the "N word."

"It's progressively gotten worse every year, without a doubt," Niciara said.

She said she went to school administrators a number of times to address the issues.

# Residents express concerns over dog sanctuary

CANTON – Two residents living in proximity to the No Dogs Left Behind animal sanctuary expressed their concerns not only about the facility but for town code for kennels to members of the Canton Town Board at its monthly meeting on Wednesday night, June 14.

James Road resident Margaret Mauch was first to speak, echoing words from a letter she submitted to the board. Her letter reads:

"I understand that the Zoning Board and the Town Board have worked diligently and with much deliberation to produce a comprehensive new Town of Canton Zoning Code. I would assume that you are eager to finalize this project.

"Before there is a final vote on the Code in entirety, I would ask that you consider a proposal and reasons for a delay in regards to kennels/rescues/shelters/animal hospitals.

"On December 15, 2022, NYS passed a law that regulates kennels/ shelters/rescues. It would be advantageous to learn what these new state laws are and to incorporate them into the proposed Code.

"The definitive language in the Canton draft code is confusing and needs to be clarified. There may, also, be conditions that the Town would want to address that are not part of the new State regulations that would be unique to the Town of Canton. Kennels/rescues/shelters must be in compliance by Decem-

ber 15, 2025. It would be helpful to any proposal for a kennel/rescue/ shelter/animal hospital to have the Town and State laws consistent with each other. Doesn't it make sense to align Town Code laws with state regulations at this time?

"In consideration of the lack of clarification and NYS Shelter Regulation Chapter 683, I am requesting that the Canton Town Board initiate a moratorium on the Draft Code until substantive language rekennels/rescues/shelters/animal hospitals, etc. can be incorporated into new law that better protects the Town. Or delay voting on the proposed Code until the next board meeting in order to review the new state laws applicable to this section. Or if the Code is passed, to include

an exception to not put into force that section of the Code until language is examined and determined to be in compliance with the state standards."

A second letter submitted to the board from Ruta Ozola, 405 Meade Road, was read by Town Supervisor Mary Ann Ashley. That letter reads:

"Throughout my 30 plus years at 405 Meade Rd., I have dealt with the annoying barking from Maple Ridge Kennels. The kennel has now become a residence for a very large number of imported dogs. The barking is now ear piercing and heart pounding. Working in my gardens, which should be calming and enjoyable, has become nerve wracking. The barking is so intense that it invades my home as well. A simple meal is sullied by obnoxious barking.

"Along with the overwhelming barking noise, fear has been introduced into our neighborhood. Before No Dogs Left Behind came to Maple Ridge Kennel, I was never afraid of dogs escaping. Even if they did escape, I knew the dogs were someone's pets and did not pose a risk. The dogs at the kennel now, come from outside the U.S. and could have diseases that are unknown in United States. The dogs may have been vaccinated for rabies, but that does not ensure that the dogs are free of pathogens and parasites. If the dogs are diseased, this will have negative and possibly deadly impact on our pets, livestock and ourselves. I am not trying to be an alarmist. We are all aware how a virus from a foreign country has gravely affected our lives over the past 3 years. Recently, two dogs escaped from the kennel. The public has been warned not to approach these dogs. We don't know if these dogs are aggressive and/or diseased. This is alarming to me.

"Businesses have a right to operate and thrive. Businesses do not have the right to impose themselves in our homes and negatively impact our health and daily lives. To allow Maple Ridge Kennel/No Dogs Left Behind to continue and possibly expand without proper noise mitigation and government oversight of their operation is very concerning. The health and welfare of our domestic animals, our wildlife and our community is at stake.

"The proposed Canton zoning code regarding kennels does not address my concerns regarding noise, environmental impact or the health and wellbeing of our community. It may be in Canton's best interest to table the kennel portion of the proposed zoning code until the new Ag & Markets law takes effect in 2025.

"The new Ag & Markets law addresses not only my concerns, but also includes the proper care of animals that have found themselves in less than favorable circumstances. Should Canton pass the proposed zoning code for kennels, it could pose a liability to the town, as in the case of animals escaping, that have the potential to damage property or harm to members of the community. Under the Ag & Markets law, a kennel must abide by set rules and regulations and it is important to note that Ag & Markets will be responsible for kennel oversight, not local municipalities.

"Again, I urge the Canton Town Board to seriously consider tabling the kennel portion of the proposed zoning code until the Ag & Markets law takes effect. A lot can happen in 18 months that can have a negative impact on our community."

Police said Holmes became irate following the accident and exited his vehicle and yelled at the other party and threw a broken car part at the other person.

Holmes fled the scene but was located and charged at a later date, police said.



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# SLC lawmakers discuss clergy reporting abuse

CANTON — A discussion regarding a state bill to make clergy mandated reporters of child abuse was shut down abruptly after John Burke, R-Norfolk, sought clarification on why the topic was being discussed.

St. Lawrence County Legislator Ben Hull, R-Madrid, brought the matter up for discussion June 12 at the County Operations Committee as "new business."

He said that the legislators had recently been asked to take a look at Senate Bill 3158, which is known as the Child Abuse Reporting Expansion Act.

The bill has been supported by former members of Christian Fellowship Center after senior members of the church chose not to report allegations of child sexual abuse by a member to authorities. It has also been co-sponsored by Sen. Mark Walczyk, R-Watertown, who represents portions of St. Lawrence County.

### Attorney's take

Hull, a deacon at Christian Fellowship Center, asked for an assessment of the proposed state legislation from St. Lawrence County Attorney Stephen Button.

Button said that while the goal of the bill, to protect children from sexual abuse, is laudable; it goes to "attack" certain aspects of "truths," known as the penitent priest exception.

The exemption operates in a similar, but arguably stronger, fashion to attorney-client privilege granted to attorneys.

"Buried inside the bill is language especially concerning for protestant Christians. The bill would make it such that anyone that works within a church setting in the administrative requirement be designated as one of those mandated reporters," he said.

Button said the law would create difficult situations within churches as religious leaders would be at odds with their religious mandates and the law.

# **Opposing views**

Legislator Jim Reagen, R-Ogdensburg, questioned what the bill would mean for Catholic priests and similar religions that include confessions as part of their practice.

"For those religions that have the sacrament of confession how would this affect their priests who have a person come to a confessional and confess their sins?" he said. "It's my understanding that under the vow of secrecy that they vow... when they become priests they will go to jail before violating the sanctity of the confessional."

"This bill arguably makes that unlawful," Button said. "They would have to violate that tenet of

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Reagen then questioned if the CARE Act would violate the First Amendment right of religious freedom.

"I cannot say yay or nay, but I think it could be subject to challenge," he said.

Legislator Margaret Haggard, D-Potsdam, then shared her thoughts on the CARE Act.

"I want to get down to the nitty gritty about this. We are talking about children being sexually abused," she said.

"We have a heinous case in St. Lawrence County about an organization that protected an offender. I think if we had our district attorney in here, he'd have a different take on this situation. Where the perpetrators were allegedly protected and they didn't have access to the victims."

Haggard said as a mandated reporter and a Catholic, she understands the concerns raised by Reagen, but that protecting children trumped those concerns.

"I'm a mandated reporter, there are other mandated reporters in this room, I understand the argument, I'm a Catholic," she said. "When we go to confession it's secret, but when we get down to what we are talking about we are talking about children being sexually abused. I have a problem with this."

Burke then joined the conversation by questioning why it was

being discussed if there was no resolution being brought forward.

"I guess I'm wondering why, is there consideration of sending a message down to Albany that we are opposed to this? Are we just chatting?" he asked.

Reagen then quickly interjected, asking if there was a motion on the floor and said he believed the discussion was out of order.

"What discussion?" Burke asked.
"Whatever it is we are discussing," Reagen replied.

Operations Committee Chair Rita Curran, R-Massena, then moved the meeting forward.

### **CARE Act Exemptions**

Notably the CARE Act, which has failed to make it out of committee for the past four years, provides some exemptions for clergy, despite adding them to the list of mandated reporters of child sexual abuse.

"A member of the clergy, or other minister of any religion or duly accredited Christian Science practitioner, shall not be required to make a report... If the confession or confidence was made to him or her in his or her professional character as spiritual advisor," the bill says.

The bill goes on to say that if a clergy member "has reasonable cause to suspect that a child is an abused or maltreated child based upon any information other than through a confession or confidence... Then such member of the clergy shall promptly make a report... Notwithstanding the

fact that he or she may have also received a report of abuse or maltreatment through a confession or confidence made..."

In other words, the CARE Act does not require a priest taking a confession to report an admission from a sexual abuser if it was given during a spiritual confession. However, if the priest became aware

of the abuse from another means, even if the priest first became aware in confession, they would then be obligated to report the matter.

No resolution was put forward in support or condemnation of the CARE Act. There was no indication as to whether the matter would be addressed again at a later date.

MASSENA - Massena International Airport is slated to receive \$966,128 in federal funding.

The largest investment will come in the form of \$9,294,391 for the Syracuse Hancock International Airport.

# Rt. 11 safety study options

POTSDAM - Three levels of improvements to traffic and pedestrian safety along Route 11 out to the Walmart and Tractor Supply intersection are now available for public comment.

Students from the Clarkson Construction Engineering Management Consulting Group (C3G) recently presented three sets of proposed improvements to the town board at its June 13 meeting.

The group, led by Clarkson Civil Engineering Professor Eric Backus, was tasked with studying traffic along the roadway and developing solutions to make the route more safe. The town, village, and the Health Initiative each chipped in

the main vehicle traffic lanes by a

The most robust design ideas also call for a roundabout at the nexus of Sandstone Drive, Clarkson Avenue and Pine and Maple streets, more extensive improvements to the Clarkson University back entranceway and the Walmart intersection, and a new access to the Potsdam-Morley Road direct off the Walmart intersection, with the current connection of Potsdam-Morley to Route 11 being closed off.

The state DOT has suggested the alternate access to Potsdam-Morley in the past and has a plan in place for it, Town Highway Supervisor John Keleher and Backus said.

Rebecca Kaminsky, one of the Clarkson's C3G student team members, told the board that public feedback on safety improvements to the corridor thus far had included some concerns about maintenance, snow issues and pedestrian safety on the roundabout, and concerns about damage to the wetlands just

Backus said the group would like to leave that questionnaire open for responses at least through Potsdam

He anticipated the group presenting final presentations to the town and village in August or September.

# Medication treatment costing county more than expected

CANTON — The state mandated Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) program, aimed at treating inmates with opioid addiction, is likely to cost the county far more than the state will reimburse.

Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe told county legislators on the Operations Committee that the program is working but the cost is outweighing what the state will pay back.

The five pronged program, which also includes counseling and clinical support, peer support, discharge planning and re-entry and transitional support, currently includes 55% enrollment with the total population in St. Lawrence County correctional facility, Bigwarfe said.

Multiple treatment options approved by a physician are available, including the use of Suboxone, Subutex, Sublocade, Methadone, Vivitrol, Naltrexone and Campral.

All seven drugs are used to treat opioid addiction.

As of April 14, five inmates were being treated with Suboxone, 27 were being treated with Subutex, an additional 27 were being treated with Sublocade and two were prescribed Naltrexone, Bigwarfe said.

No inmate is required to participate in the program and none are forced to take any drug, he said.

"What I really want to stress here is that MAT is a voluntary, strictly voluntary program. You cannot force inmates to go on the MAT program. If the inmates choose to not go to counseling, you can't take away their prescribed drugs," Bigwarfe said.

Despite high enrollment and high costs, Bigwarfe said the county is number two in the entire state and stands as a model for the rest of the state.

"When the commissioner of the program says you're a model for the rest of the state, that tells you you're doing something right," Bigwarfe said.

Salaries for employees who administer the program are a large expense.

When factoring in the cost of prescription medications from Jan. 1 through the end of April, the average cost was over \$47,000, Bigwarfe said.

That cost is based on a high jail population with over half of inmates enrolled.

Bigwarfe also said calculations for October through December 2022 were low because not every inmate's treatment was tracked and it was a slow process to compile the data and calculate.

"Those months were likely light counts," he said.

While it appears a six-month expense for the program sits around \$370,000, Bigwarfe said that number is likely closer to \$400,000 due to the ongoing calculations from last year.

"It likely costs \$800,000 to facilitate this mandate. We're not getting anywhere near \$800,000 from the state. We only received \$100,000 from them to start the program," he said.

Currently, 61 inmates are enrolled in the program with 89 discharged. Many have also been released directly to rehab as part of court orders, while 32 discharged have followed up with physicians, he said.

"There is some correlation to getting more help. I wouldn't say that is a big number but there are some going to rehab," Bigwarfe said.

Bigwarfe also noted that the rate of fights among inmates, attacks on officers and sharing of contraband has declined significantly.

Since the program began, fights are down 36% while contraband is down 63%.

"A decline of two-thirds is very significant, I can tell you that," he

Legislators questioned how the program will be paid for and how much it will cost.

According to County Administrator Ruth Doyle, funds from an opioid settlement and budgeted month from Community Services help offset the cost while only \$100,000 of the program's budget was accounted for through the tax levy.

# New generator needed at town sewage plant

POTSDAM — Chewing rodents have the town board considering either repair or replacement of its backup generator at the town's sewage disposal plant on Sissonville Road in Unionville. The animals have damaged the existing generator but a new one could cost the town about \$30,000.

In addition, Town Code Enforcement Officer Jeff Murray told the town board at their meeting June 13 that if the town opted to replace the current generator with a new one, the wait time could be as long as 63 weeks.

Murray said a repair of the existing generator would still cost the municipality at least \$7,000 to start. "But the tech said he knows as soon as tears into it that there will be more issues," Murray said.

"That generator is about 17 years old," the code enforcer said. He said the estimated life for generators of

this type are between 20 and 25 years before replacement is needed.

"The cost of a new one is about 30,000. And you will have the same problem unless you do something to rodent proof that generator," Murray said.

"If we just put another one there like there is now, the rodents are just going to come in and do the same thing again and chew it up," he told the board.

Murray said the town should also construct a set-up to allow a quick hookup for a portable generator to the sewer plant system in the event an emergency power outage lasts for an extended period of time while they wait on a new or repaired backup generator. He said currently the town would have about 2 days of work in store to connect a portable generator to the system.

"I don't know how long we can go without that sewer plant actually having power to it. So we should be ready for it at least in case of an extended emergency," Murray said. He said National Grid and Dow Electric both have generators the town could borrow in an emergency. He said he would get an estimate from on how much a new quick connection setup would cost to install.

The plant currently serves 36 residences in the town's Unionville Sewer District, but once the Route 56 Sewer District is in place, the plant will be upgraded to take on the sewage from the residences and businesses in that district.

"The new generator, if we order one, will take 63 weeks to arrive. So we are going to be without one for a while. What the repair schedule is? I don't know yet. We've got to make a choice on which one we are going to go with," Murray said.

Town Deputy Supervisor Marty Miller said there may be grant money available that might help with costs and he would get details for the board.

No decision was made at the meeting on purchase or repair of the backup generator.

# Canton officials continue work on anaerobic digester local law

CANTON – A local law in the Town of Canton dealing with anaerobic digesters will have to wait a month or more after the town board on Wednesday night, June 14, decided to hold off on adopting the measure.

The delay forced town officials to extend a moratorium to Aug. 31.

"They are going in everywhere. There is no local law in St. Lawrence County," said Deputy Town Supervisor James T. Smith. "We want to get it right."

Town attorney Eric Gustafson agreed.

"Several comments, especially from the county, were well thought out recommendations. We will make the appropriate changes," he stated.

The moratorium date will give the town board two potential board meetings to finalize a local law.

Smith has pointed out that a \$25 million digester project is in the works in the Town of Canton by an out-of-town developer. He said the facility would be operating 365 days of the year with manure coming from at least five different farms.

"This type of development is mostly regulated by the New York State DEC. We appreciate all the time conducting due diligence on this issue. It's complicated and layered and we need to make sure everyone's questions are answered," Town Supervisor Mary Ann Ashley told North Country This Week earlier.

Anaerobic digestion is a process through which bacteria break down organic matter-such as animal manure, wastewater biosolids, and food wastes-in the absence of oxygen. Anaerobic digestion for biogas production takes place in a sealed vessel called a reactor, which is designed and constructed in various shapes and sizes specific to the site and feedstock conditions. These reactors contain complex microbial communities that break down (or digest) the waste and produce resultant biogas and digestate (the solid and liquid material end-products of the AD process) which is discharged from the digester, as defined on the **Environmental Protection Agency** 

# Potsdam board holds off on bridge jump fencing

POTSDAM — Jump barrier fencing along the bridges over the Racquette River won't be installed by the village at this point.

Village officials discussed the issue again at their June 20 meeting. Trustees and the village administrator agreed that due to high costs, dubious effectiveness given the extensive river shorelines cutting through the center of the community and the question of whether they even can add fencing to the bridges which are on a state roadway, that the municipality will not pursue the issue at this time.

"As you know we had a real brief discussion last time (May board meeting) about a request by one of our residents on the jump fences on the bridges," said Village Administrator Greg Thompson.

The idea of lining the bridge walkways with more extensive jump barriers was suggested by a resident in May following the disappearance of Justin Howard, a 22-year-old Clarkson student from Vermont, who went missing in the river while swimming near the Maple Street bridge on May 5.

His body was found near the West Dam the following day after an extensive search by first responders from multiple agencies, law enforcement and village employees. It was suggested the village use some of its ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds to foot the bill for barriers along the bridges in the hope it might prevent a similar tragedy in the

At the meeting in May, Thompson said he would try to get prices on jump barriers, however at the June 20 meeting the administrator pointed out the challenges of putting up fencing along the spans.

"I said I would get prices. I'm still willing to do so. (But) one of the things we have to realize is, obviously, the bridges are part of a New York State highway. So, we can't do anything. We can't just go and put these jump fences up. It's going to be very time consuming," Thompson told the board.

"I would like a little bit of board input before I move further on whether you think that is time well spent or whether you think perhaps we should, you know, we've got our signs up. The buoys are out. The lines are across," Thompson said. "I'm under the impression that the board would just-as-soon I did not pursue that at this time?"

"I concur," said Village Trustee Abby Lee

"I just wanted to run that by you. It's not an impossibility but it would have to go through New York DOT planning in Watertown and then work its way back to us," Thompson said.

"You can't put a fence behind Stewart's," Village Deputy Mayor Steve Warr said, pointing out how easy river access is in the village in other spots besides the bridges.

"And we are a community that lives split by a river," Lee said.

"And the small amount of research I did, was to have a really beautiful aesthetically pleasing barrier. Which they make. But it's very expensive," said Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke.

# New SLC fire investigator software coming soon

CANTON — St. Lawrence County Emergency Services fire investigators will soon have new case management software.

St. Lawrence County legislators on the Operations Committee approved the purchase of Blazestack Inc. case management software during the committee's meeting on June 12.

According to the resolution, St. Lawrence County established the Fire Investigation Team in 1981 as part of state law to assist local fire chiefs to determine the cause of fires.

Ten New York State and nationally certified investigators currently serve on the team, according to Emergency Service Director Matt Denner.

enner. The new software will allow investigators in "diagraming a scene, photographing and taking field notes to be used to document scene findings or to prepare written reports."

Last year investigators prepared 30 reports, Denner said.

The new software will allow for more accurate reporting, reflecting the facts, data and scientific principles on which investigators rely, the resolution states.

Data gathering and report writing requirements will also be met with the use of the new software, Denner said.

Blazestack Inc. is an all-in-one case management solution that will cost the county \$2,900 for the ten investigators.

The resolution was approved unanimously.

In other action, legislators also approved an intermunicipal agreement with the Cranberry Lake Fire District, Town of Fine and Village of Potsdam for sites to construct interoperability towers in each location

According to the resolution, the three towers will allow for enhanced emergency communications throughout the county.

Environmental Assessment Forms have been drawn up, identifying and assessing potential adverse environmental impacts associated with each site.

Departments who assisted in preparation of the EAF and incorporated data include the Department of Environmental Conservation, New York State Office of Parks and Recreation and Historic Preservation, along with FEMA.

The reports found no adverse environmental impacts would occur and each tower is not to exceed 200 feet to ensure no impact.

The resolution passed unanimously.

# Credit union merger town halls planned

CANTON — Members of the St. Lawrence Credit Union are invited to a town hall meeting Monday June 26 at 6 p.m. at the 800 Park Drive Branch in Ogdensburg and at 10 a.m. June 27 at the 33 Court Street Branch in Canton.

The meetings will provide an opportunity for discussion regard-

ing the potential merger between SeaComm and St. Lawrence Federal credit unions.

In a March, St. Lawrence Federal Credit Union's Board of Directors announced that they voted to move forward with a merger into Sea-Comm Federal Credit Union.

St. Lawrence Federal Credit

Union has \$226 million in assets, 12,289 members, 52 employees and six retail branch locations throughout St. Lawrence County, including two most recently opened in Heuvelton and Hermon. SeaComm, with \$770 million in assets, 52,977 members and nine retail branch locations, serves St. Lawrence, Franklin, Essex, Clinton, Jefferson and Lewis Counties, in NY and Grand Isle, Franklin and Chittenden Counties in Vermont.

No St. Lawrence Credit Union branches will close, or will any staff lose their jobs due to the merger, Seacomm officials said.

Under the terms of the agreement, which was approved by the boards of directors of both credit unions, one St. Lawrence Board Director will join the SeaComm Board. There will also be an advisory committee formed from the current St. Lawrence Board providing advice and counsel on the overall effect of the merger. The combined organization will operate under the SeaComm brand.

SeaComm's 30 Stearns Street location in Massena, will be the overall headquarters with St.
Lawrence's, 800 Commerce Park Drive in Ogdensburg as a major operations center. SeaComm has an additional operations center located on Smithfield Blvd in Plattsburgh, to support its eastern Vermont operations.

The merger plan has garnered support and criticism from members in recent months.

CANTON — St. Lawrence County legislators extended the county's state of emergency on June 9 in response to the expiration of Title 42.

Title 42 was a Trump-era order that prohibited individuals from entering the United States from Canada and Mexico during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Title 42 was allowed to expire on May 11 after President Joe Biden chose to not extend the order.

County officials opted to declare a state of emergency in order to receive financial support and FEMA funds in the event that migrants enter the county seeking support.

According to a previous press release, St. Lawrence County legislators also opted to declare the state of emergency due to the fact that the county ranks among the top-ten poorest in the state. Lack of support, funding and resources are a primary concern from St. Lawrence County officials.

While St. Lawrence County may not see a huge immigration jump compared to the southern border, officials say the county is ill equipped to meet the needs of people entering the U.S. locally. Increases in immigration would strain the limited resources available, county officials say.

With an increase in immigration to New York City, state and city leadership have begun to explore housing options for those who have been bussed to New York by Texas Governor Greg Abbott.

State lawmakers say over 72,000 migrants have been bussed to New

York City from Texas. Those 72,000 migrants were initially placed in shelters to be cared for. However, 28,000 have since gone missing after leaving the shelters, and lawmakers do not know where they are, according to a previous interview with County Attorney Steve Button.

"The city of New York lobbied hard to get additional funding from the federal government to care for the migrants being bussed to the city and did receive it," Button previously told North Country This Week

Local emergency orders may be issued by the Chair of the Board of Legislators as well, according to the release.

No emergency orders currently exist, officials say.

To date, 31 counties have declared a state of emergency with most also passing local laws that will not allow migrants to be housed in hotels as the governor originally planned.

St. Lawrence County does not have a hotel provision to accompany the state of emergency.

State officials are still looking at housing options for the remaining 44,000 migrants that are known to reside in shelters in New York City currently, with state officials reaching out to SUNY officials to assess current vacancies on campuses.

Federal officials recently announced \$104.6 million in FEMA funds for New York City to assist with housing asylum-seekers. The city's allocation will come through the new federal Shelter and Services program, according to Politico.

# Tips for getting your 'letter to the editor' published

# Support your claims, don't be nasty, keep it local

St. Lawrence County is in the midst of one of the most heated primaries I've ever seen as Undersheriff Sean O'Brien and Sheriff's Investigator Patrick 'Rick' Engle face-off for the Republican nod for sheriff in Tuesday's primary.

But this year, things were already getting heated in March. One of the most difficult parts of running a newsroom during tough political races is moderating our

letters to the editor section. Lately I've spent hours fielding phone calls, returning emails, requesting documentation and

working with submitters to edit their letters in a fashion that we can publish them.

Oftentimes I'm met with anger when I ask for evidence to support claims in a letter that I can't easily verify. Sometimes I'm accused of bias or favoritism, but I genuinely work toward balance.

Defining the line between allowing people to share their opinions without allowing the spread of false information is a lot trickier than it sounds. On the whole, I think humans are pretty bad at that -- we see it all the time on social media.

For instance, someone might say they "believe" something rather than acknowledge it as a hard fact, which makes it an opinion.

Then again, if that belief can easily be verified as false, it's crossing a line we'll probably need to edit or tone down depending on the severity of the claim.

Sometimes it can be more com-

plicated, such as when someone says something occurred, but there is no recording or paper trail to support the claim.

In general, these sorts of things may stay in the letter or be removed based on the severity or impact they may have.

Conversely, in the middle of a political race where varying interests are looking to discredit each other, we're going to have a higher level of scrutiny.

Sometimes we'll include an Editor's Note saying we couldn't verify a claim.

Sometimes we'll ask the submitter for supporting evidence.

Frequently, the letter writer is repeating third-hand knowledge as fact, but has not him or herself actually been provided with evidence outside of the hearsay.

In most cases, letters can be modified or rewritten to express the same point of view without including the unverifiable claims,

or by presenting them in a less specific matter.

While I'm hopeful the tone of the letters we receive in political races will improve after the primary elections, I thought it might be helpful to offer some tips for getting them published without

We have a limit of 400 words per letter. We also require a name and hometown.

We provide some flex on length when needed, but if you're over that limit, we're probably going to ask you to cut it back.

Don't include personal attacks. Criticism of public figures is welcome, but don't be nasty just to be nasty. Share your concerns in a civilized manner. It will have more impact to other readers if you do.

Provide evidence if you're making a claim or accusation; the more substantial the claim, the greater the need for supporting documentation.

If you are making a claim presented as fact, provide some proof. If you have enough evidence to include it in your letter, share it with me, so I can have it as well.

I understand there are times when you may have witnessed something, but one person's account of a situation isn't always going to be enough if the claim being made has potential ramifications. People lie to me often, it's part of the job.

Finally, try to focus on the local impact of an issue or stick to local topics.

I appreciate those who submit letters. I think they are an important part of our paper and I hope we continue to be the main source for moderated public discussion in the county. But maybe help us out a bit and do a bit of homework prior to submitting them.

### Let's protect our water

Last week (June 5-9), wildfire smoke darkened our skies making being outside unpleasant to downright unhealthv.

We experienced what it's like when something fundamental, that we take for granted, such as clean air, isn't available. Here in the North Country, far from big cities, we expect clean air; yet we were powerless to do anything about the air pollution we were suddenly suffering.

Similarly, clean water is fundamental to our well-being and we expect our waterways to be clean and healthy, but clean water is under threat. "About half of all the river and stream miles and lake acreage in the U.S. fail to meet water quality standards because of pollution, which means half the country's assessed waterways do not support intended uses like aquatic life and drinking water." (Environmental Integrity Project, April 16, 2023).

We cannot assume that federal and state protections and agencies adequately protect our waterways and their ecosystems. First, we can't necessarily rely on those protections to continue to exist. For example, the recent Supreme Court decision https://www.nytimes. com/2023/05/25/us/supremecourt-epa-water-pollution.html?smid=nytcore-ios-share&referringSource=articleShare) significantly reduced the EPA's ability to protect water through the Clean Water Act. Second, funding and staffing shortfalls hamper the ability of those agencies to do their job and enforce protections. For example, the NY State Comptroller's 2021 report admits that, "... resources may not be adequate to fully cover required agency activities or maintain them over time." -resulting in: "...declines in certain types of inspecting and findings of environmental violations."

The good news is that, unlike the helplessness we may have felt experiencing the recent air pollution, we are not helpless with respect to protecting our water. We can help to protect waterways in our communities by advocating for the passage of local laws that recognize the rights of waterways to exist, to flourish,

By codifying that entities of nature, such as rivers, have rights, citizens can act on their behalf in a court of law if the river's rights are violated. This gives communities the power to protect local waterways. These sorts of Rights of Nature laws have been passed in a variety of places in the U.S. and other nations. The Town of Potsdam has already passed a resolution recognizing the rights of the Racquette River! Water sustains life. It is not being adequately protected. Let's hope other communities will follow Potsdam's example.

# Consult your own conscience

"All American voters should read the full text of the Trump indictment, and then consult their own consciences. If Trump has done what has alleged, he should be convicted and punished," tweeted conservative Republican John Bolton, President George W. Bush's U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations and President Trump's own National Security Advisor.

Taking his advice, I read the indictment last evening. Two important takeaways: One is the decision to indict came not from President Biden, Merrick Garland, or even Jack Smith, but from a grand jury made up of ordinary American citizens in Florida. Thankfully, that is the way the American legal system works.

Second, the evidence against Trump is entirely from inside sources, including evidence of shockingly sloppy storage of national security documents. Text messages between Mar-A-Lago employees reveal Trump's orders to move boxes. Video footage reveals Trump's aide and alleged co-conspirator, Walt Nauta, removing 64 boxes of documents from the storage room shortly before an inspection of that room by Trump's lawyer, Evan Corcoran, footage which later triggered the FBI search warrant of MAL. Extemporaneous notes taken by Corcoran indicate he was intentionally made unaware of the removal of the boxes by Nauta when he made a so-called "diligent search" of the storage room, he was discouraged from inspecting other areas, and Trump suggested he (illegally!) "pluck out" any of the 38 classified documents located that might be "bad." And it continues----all evidence collected inside Trump's circle.

Since the evidence is from Republicans, I will let Republican voices of integrity speak for me here:

"If this indictment is true, if what it says is actually the case, President Trump was incredibly reckless with our national security," former United Nations Ambassador under Trump, Nikki Haley said.

"If he has anything like...what the indictment alleges then he has committed very serious crimes. The documents Trump retained could contain the most important secrets we have, directly impacting national security and the lives and security of our military and civilian population." (Bolton on CNN)

"If even half of it is true, then he's toast. I mean, it's a very detailed indictment, and it's very, very damning. This idea of presenting Trump as a victim here -- a victim of a witch hunt -- is ridiculous." (Former Trump AG William Barr on FOX News)

Outpatient options are not great either. And many are run by one place. So, if it doesn't work for you - you are out multiple options out of the already very few you had to begin with. This is extremely worrying and depressing to someone who is already on the edge of ending their life.

Some therapists in St. Lawrence County have told me and four of my friends that we were 'too severe' to be treated. Or, they attempted to treat and when the first try didn't work they told you that you were beyond hope. Beyond hope.. every single one of us has been told that by at least one shrink in this county.

That worries me. I wish it would worry someone who was in charge who could actually change this.

Take people seriously when they talk about how depressed they are. Call 988 or 911, or your local police. Be there. Listen.

It's nice to wear a green ribbon in May for awareness month, but the mentally ill are suffering and nobody seems to be listening. Shouldn't something good come out of this Awareness?

# Local ham radio operators to broadcast

CANTON — Ham radio operators from St. Lawrence County Radio Amateur Radio Civil Emergency Service in Canton will participate in a national amateur radio exercise from noon on Saturday, June 24, until noon on Sunday, June 25.

The event is ARRL Field Day (www.arrl.org/FieldDay), an annual amateur radio activity organized since 1933 by ARRL, The National Association for Amateur Radio in the United States.

Hams from across North America ordinarily participate in Field Day by establishing temporary ham radio stations in public locations to demonstrate their skill and service.

Their use of radio signals, which reach beyond borders, brings people together while providing essential communication in the service of communities.

Field Day highlights ham radio's ability to work reliably under any conditions from almost any location and create an independent, wireless communications network.

Some hams from the Northern New York section will also use the radio stations set up in their homes or taken to their backyards and other locations to operate individually or with their families.

Many hams have portable radio communication capability that includes alternative energy sources such as generators, solar panels, and batteries to power their equip-

This year's event is also noteworthy given that a particularly active hurricane season is predicted, said organizers.

"Hams have a long history of serving our communities when storms or other disasters damage critical communication infrastructure, including cell towers," said Matt Denney, Assistant Emergency Coordinator/Secretary, St. Lawrence County Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (KA2AUB).

"Ham radio functions completely independently of the internet and phone systems and a station can be set up almost anywhere in minutes. Hams can quickly raise a wire antenna in a tree or on a mast, connect it to a radio and power source, and communicate effectively with others," Denney said.

During Field Day 2021, more than 26,000 hams participated

from thousands of locations across North America.

According to ARRL, there are more than 750,000 amateur radio licensees in the US, and an estimated 3 million worldwide.

Among the tenets of the Amateur Radio Service is developing and practicing skills in radio technology and radio communications, and even contributing to international goodwill.

Hams range in age from as young as 9 to older than 100.



MASSENA — Hydrogen production company Air Products is set to receive property tax relief from the St. Lawrence County IDA as part of a planned \$500 million facility that could bring as many as 65 jobs to the area.

Industrial Development Agency board members unanimously approved the resolution during a May 23 meeting. IDA members also agreed to assist Air Products seek a sales tax exemption.

"They're seeking a PILOT that is a deviation from a standard 10-year PILOT," Pat Kelly, CEO of the IDA said.

Instead, Air Products will seek a 15-year PILOT.

According to Kelly, the next steps will include hammering out a final deal regarding a PILOT for Air Products before holding a public hearing on the potential tax breaks. Following that, a vote will

be held by the IDA board to officially approve the tax breaks.

Kelly commented on the low key nature of the project, saving that it appeared the public was not aware of just what would potentially happen in Massena.

"I think more is being said outside of the area and other areas that might also be potentially affected," Kelly said.

Board Member Ernie LaBaff noted that many residents in the North Country are likely jaded after years of potentially industrial development and job creation, only to be continually disappointed.

"I get calls all the time about this project and that project. They're anticipating something happening with all the land and substance down there from the past mills, the past plants," LaBaff noted.

According to LaBaff, residents are skeptical because nothing has really gained momentum since losing numerous jobs at Alcoa and Arconic, as well as the closing of

the GM plant in 2007.

LaBaff said the potential creation of 65Bjobs in Massena would be a huge boost to the local job force and local economy.

"You bring 65 jobs here and they'll pin a medal of honor on you," Labaff told Kelly.

Kevin McAuliffe, an attorney from Barclay Damon in Syracuse, who represents Air Products, elaborated further on the company's plans for Massena.

According to McAuliffe, Air Products will initially hire 65 employees but expansion plans will allow for continued workforce growth.

As production ramps up, Air Products will eventually utilize all land available and could potentially double the scale of the operation.

"I don't think it would double the employment but it certainly would add a lot more jobs," he

McAuliffe also clarified that all

previous presentations, including one held with the Massena Town Planning Board, were for a "doubled project size" that would utilize the entirety of the land available to Air Products.

"We're not committing to doing that now because, as all of you know, the use of liquid hydrogen in trucks and buses is relatively new to the market. We have to ascertain how quickly this will be absorbed in New York," he said.

That doesn't mean that the project will not fully expand, McAuliffe noted.

"We'd be happy to be back to you in a couple of years to modify the PILOT, to modify the relationship and on land that will be the leased premises, to build an expanded plant," he said.

"So we could potentially anticipate more jobs, I've got no problem with that," Labaff said.

In regards to the environmental impact, Kelly also noted that Air Products is an environmentally

friendly company with plans to implement a green project.

'This is a nearly totally green project as well," Kelly said.

"I don't think anyone will care if they're black, white or blue. This would be big for Massena," Labaff

Air Products previously announced the facility will produce 35 metric tons per day, with commercial operation of the facility is targeted to begin in 2026-27.

The New York Power Authority has already approved 94 megawatts of low-cost hydroelectric power for Air Products in a move that will assist in bringing the facility to Massena.

Air Products was founded in 1940 but first began producing hydrogen in the early 1960's, first shipping product to market in

Air Products operates in 50 countries with 21,000 employees and a net value of nearly \$13 billion dollars.

### Still kennel concerns

First to speak was Janes Road resident Margaret Mauch who asked the board to hold off on adopting the new zoning law to include provisions governing kennels, rescue centers and animal hospitals.

She requested that a new state law addressing the aforementioned be incorporated in the town's new zoning law.

"I would like the town board to delay this until the next board meeting. There is new information I would like you to consider," she

Mauch and a contingent of residents living near the No Dogs Left Behind sanctuary, housed in the former Maple Ridge Kennels, 1734-NY 68, have publicly voiced their displeasure with the facility, mainly complaining about the noise of barking dogs.

Numerous complaints have resulted in a June 26 court date for owner Jeffrey Beri, who was in attendance at Wednesday's meeting but did not comment.

Adoption of a new town zoning law is expected at the town board's July 12 meeting.

Other revisions centered around written concerns from EDF Renewables, developers of the 240-megawatt solar center on the Rich Road.

Project developer Jonathan Geldard, via Zoom, said language in the new town zoning law have been identified that would affect EDF's negotiations with the town.

William Buchan, the town's attorney for solar projects, via Zoom, recommended the board table the zoning law so he can explore concerns, especially with the EDF solar project.

Although school officials did not wish to be interviewed for the story, Kelly provided the following statement.

# **School responds**

"There was a request from a graduating senior to sing a solo (or possibly a duet) at our graduation ceremony. We have a structured graduation ceremony that recognizes every student and the achievements they have made over the course of the past thirteen years of their educational careers. The culmination is when each student is called up to receive their diploma. Our structured ceremony does not incorporate any individually requested songs or activities to be performed.

"The ceremony will follow the same traditional format and content as seen in past years. This includes the Pledge of Allegiance, the National Anthem, a group performance from our high school choir, various speakers, and of course recognition of our graduates.

"I'm so proud of each and every one of our one hundred Gouverneur High School graduates and all they have accomplished while completing their high school education. I am looking forward to celebrating their achievements as a community at our graduation ceremony."

House says that simply playing a recording of the song was also denied by the school.

# **Speaking with Superintendent**

In conversation with Supt. Kelly two weeks prior to graduation, that House recorded and shared publicly, House questioned why the "Star Spangled Banner" would be per-

formed but even a simple recording of "Lift Every Voice and Sing" could not be played.

Kelly replied that the graduation ceremony historically did not include solos or duets, which would be the case if Niciara performed the Black national anthem.

But House refuted the claim in the recording. She said solos and duets were performed when she graduated from Gouverneur years ago and her son performed a solo at a more recent graduation ceremony.

Kelly then told her it was too late to add an additional song to the ceremony. House maintained there was ample time.

"They just don't want to play it, they're worried about offending people. It's not like we want them to remove the 'Star Spangled Banner,' we just want them to include the Black National Anthem as well," she told North Country This Week.

At one point, House said school officials decided not to include the "Star Spangled Banner" in this year's commencement ceremony, because it had no relevance to the academic achievements of the stu-

But ultimately, Kelly told House that the decision was made to include the national anthem to keep the ceremony traditional. Kelly said community input led to the re-inclusion of the national anthem during the ceremony.

"You yourself are now valuing one version of America over another," House said in the recording.

Kelly rebutted the claim, saying administrators had to be responsive to the statements being made in the community. She said she didn't believe it was discriminatory to include the national anthem.

# Conversation with Principal

Earlier, during a June 7 phone conversation that House recorded and shared publicly, Niciara told Wood that numerous schools are playing "Lift Every Voice and Sing."

Wood said he was responsible for the graduation program, but the music choices would fall to the three faculty members in the music department.

That was questioned by House, who said Niciara spoke to the music department faculty and they appeared to be okay with the inclusion of "Lift Every Voice and Sing."

"Then she was told it would be discussed among the board, and Corey (Wood) would have the final say," House told NCTW.

Wood told House and her daughter in the recorded phone conversation that they "get how our community is" and that many residents would perceive the inclusion of "Lift Every Voice and Sing" as a "jab" at the national anthem.

Niciara acknowledged some people "would sort of be combative against it" and that would have to be taken into consideration.

"How many times have you come down to my office to discuss racism?" Wood asked her.

Niciara confirmed she did multiple times, detailing a racist incident during which students tore down her posters that promoted the Diversity, Equality and Inclusion Club.

Niciara founded the DEI Club, which has roughly 20 members in grades 9-12.

# **History of 'Lift Every Voice'**

"Lift Every Voice and Sing" was originally a hymn written as a poem by NAACP leader James Weldon Johnson.

"The song was first performed by a choir of 500 schoolchildren at the segregated Stanton School, where Johnson was principal in Jacksonville, Florida, to celebrate President Abraham Lincoln's birthday," according to the NAACP.

route was ice-free for the first time in recorded history in 2007, without the need of an ice-breaker.

"The Northwest Passage is even more pristine and untouched than Alaska. It is the last place we humans haven't messed up," said Visser. "It's the only time climate change might be my friend. If it weren't for our greenhouse gas emissions, the Northwest Passage would not be passable."

The expedition is expected to take 100 to 120 days to complete.

The international team trained together in February and April in the Gulf. Team members include Visser, 53, two Texans in their 60s, and a U.K. man in his 30s.

An expedition manager and technologist are also crucial in the success of the trip. They will guide the kayak route, based on weather conditions, coordinate logistics and guide communication.

"The biggest determining factor of success is the weather, with the ocean conditions, waves up to 20 feet, and wind in your face," said In bad weather, they plan to stop

and stay in tents for up to several

in a tent for days." Another challenge is staying safe from polar bears.

'We have motion detectors, air horns, and guns as a last resort for protection from the large carnivores," Visser said.

The two tandem kayaks they will be paddling will also carry a 60-day supply of dried food and fuel for boiling water before reaching their first Inuit village to resupply, 1,000 miles into their trip.

"It will be the first place I can have a shower," she laughed. "The best scenario is a 2,200 mile trip distance, but we may have to detour to other Inuit villages for supplies if needed."

An Alaska native raised off the grid, Visser left at age 16, and has been a Potsdam resident and St. Lawrence University biology teacher for the past 25 years.

"Now that my children are grown, this is a new chapter in my life. When I heard they were looking for kayakers for the expedition, I said it's calling me. If only it could be me, so I threw out an email with my resume to see. What do I have to lose?" she said.

Visser has participated in similar, smaller ventures in the past, taking second place finish in the 444-mile race on the Yukon River in 2018, beating all but one man.

Her paddling resume described her previous race results, and it also included possibly her greatest strength - her grit.

"When the going gets hard, I have the spunk to get through it," she

To her surprise, a few days after applying for the expedition she got a call to set up a video interview. Following the two hour interview, she was ecstatic to be selected to join the team.

She is thankful to St. Lawrence University for granting her some time off during the fall semester for

compared to the period in 2022, according to an analysis recently released by State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli. Overall, collections totaled \$6.18 million, down \$200,000 compared to the same period last year.



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
