Padget eyes staff shuffle

Does Canton need a full-time grants coordinator in a time of dwindling federal funding?

Could community planning and grants be combined into a single department? How can more industry be lured to Canton?

These are some of the questions covered by a recent proposal by Trustee Robert Padget.

Padget proposes that a new Department of Community Planning and Development be created, combining current functions of grants coordination and taking on "aggressively" the search for industrial development.

This plan — if approved by the Township Board of Trustees — would have a direct impact on the careers of Canton's two planners and the grants coordinator. It is the latest in a series of staff-reorganization ideas which have been surfacing in Canton during recent weeks.

PADGET SAID his suggestion is prompted by what he feels is a "crying need" for an industrial coordinator. He also said that since the Reagan administration is cutting back on federal grants and simplifying regulations, the need for a full-time grants coordinator is not as great as it was.

"Do we really need a person full time on grants?" Padget asked. "I'm not sure it's a good payback for the dollar."

Padget said the reorganization wouldn't call for the elimination of positions. It would, however, consolidate similar functions and create a more efficient and centralized way of handling projects.

He said the grants coordinator, Terry Carroll, currently is working on a

project in which federal funds are being used to purchase lots in the Dye Brothers subdivision near Michigan and Sheldon for future use as an industrial park.

"INDUSTRY in Michigan is never going to be the booming thing of the past," Padget said. "When conditions improve, there are going to be more and more communities trying to get a larger piece of a smaller (industrial) pie."

Padget said some persons have told him that the planner acting as industrial coordinator could be a conflict of interest, but he said he doesn't view it that way.

Affected by the plan — which Padget would like to see implemented within three months — would be the

planners and the grants coordinator.

All three work under a three-year contractual agreement. As explained by Personnel Director Dan Durack, that arrangement allows the Township Board to periodically assess the need for full-time employees in those slots.

Salaries for the chief planner and grants coordinator are in the \$25,000-\$27,000 range.

The Township Board recently approved a new, three-year contract with the chief planner, James Kosteva.

Assistant planner Dave Nicholson is in the second year of his contract. Terry Carroll's contract is up for renewal in mid-August, Durack said.

Carroll declined comment on Padget's proposal. Kosteva said he doesn't have any problem with the plan as it now stands.

"I THINK it can certainly work," said Kosteva, who said that the functions of the planning department go far beyond site-plan approvals.

The planners have been working on long-range projects in such areas as hazardous and solid-waste disposal, farmland preservation, mobile-home guidelines, historical registry and industrial development.

Kosteva said he believes the Township Board needs to set long-range goals and decide how the contract employees will fit into that plan.

"I'm very happy working (in Canton), and I hope whatever the board works out that I can be a part of it," Kosteva said.

Other staff reorganization include the recent merging of ordinance enforcement under the building department.

Also under review is whether police and firefighting functions should be combined into a public safety department.

Davis re-elected president

Carol Davis of Plymouth Township has been re-elected president of the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

Ms. Davis was selected by a vote of the full board of trustees at its annual organizational meeting last Wednesday night.

Glenn Schroeder, also of Plymouth Township, was re-elected treasurer of the board — an office he assumed last year as a freshman trustee.

Elaine Kirchgatter of Canton was elected vice-president, filling the position held by outgoing trustee Steve Harper, who was upset in the June election by new trustee Bill Decker.

Replacing Ms. Kirchgatter as board secretary is Sylvia Stetz of Plymouth Township. Other trustees are Flossie Tonda and Tom Yack, both of Canton.

In other business, the board voted to continue holding its regular meetings on the second and fourth Mondays of each month beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the board offices at 454 S. Harvey in Plymouth.

Named as depositories of various school funds and accounts were National Bank of Detroit, First National Bank of Plymouth, Michigan National Bank and the Plymouth Community Federal Credit Union.

The board also authorized its fi-

ancial staff to invest district funds in U.S. notes, bills, bonds, certificates of deposit and commercial paper.

The firm of Plante & Moran was reappointed as district-auditors as expected, as was Draugelis, Ashton and Scully reappointed general counsel to the board.

Named as advisors on financial and bond issue matters was the law firm of Thrun, Maatsch & Norberg, while the firm of Clark, Hardy, Lewis and Fine was reappointed legal advisor on labor relations.

Members of board standing and special committees will be appointed by Davis at a later date.

Canton police are investigating a bizarre shooting and stabbing incident near Ford and Sheldon last week which left two Detroit men hospitalized with wounds.

Balloon photo contest planned

The entries will be judged by a panel of editors, photographers and reporters from the Canton and Plymouth Observer Newspapers.

The picture entered must have been taken during the Hot Air Balloon Festival, July 10-12.

There is no age limit for contestants, but they must be amateur photographers. Observer and Eccentric employees are ineligible.

The incident occurred at 2:48 a.m. last Thursday. Police Lt. Larry Stewart said the men — aged 24 and 26 — apparently had argued in Detroit earlier and then drove in separate cars to Canton, where they continued their dispute.

Some gunshots were fired, and one man was stabbed. Police arrested both men for attempted murder but delayed seeking warrants until they could obtain more details.

The men were expected to be placed under police guard at Wayne County General Hospital, said Stewart, who outlined the chain of events as follows:

THE MEN apparently arrived at Ford and Sheldon about 2:45 a.m. Moments later, residents of nearby Fellows Creek apartment complex called police to complain they heard

gunshots, said Stewart.

When police arrived, they found a man lying on the roadway bleeding heavily from the forehead. It was undetermined whether he had been struck by a bullet or some other object.

There were two passengers in his car who were unhurt, said police. In the meantime, another man was found hiding behind a utility box at the rear of a nearby Taco Bell, said Stewart. The man had a stab wound to the lower chest.

The two men were arrested and taken by fire department rescue unit to Wayne County General Hospital. The 26-year-old man underwent surgery Thursday for a stab wound.

Police confiscated two knives and a sword. They were unable to locate a firearm.

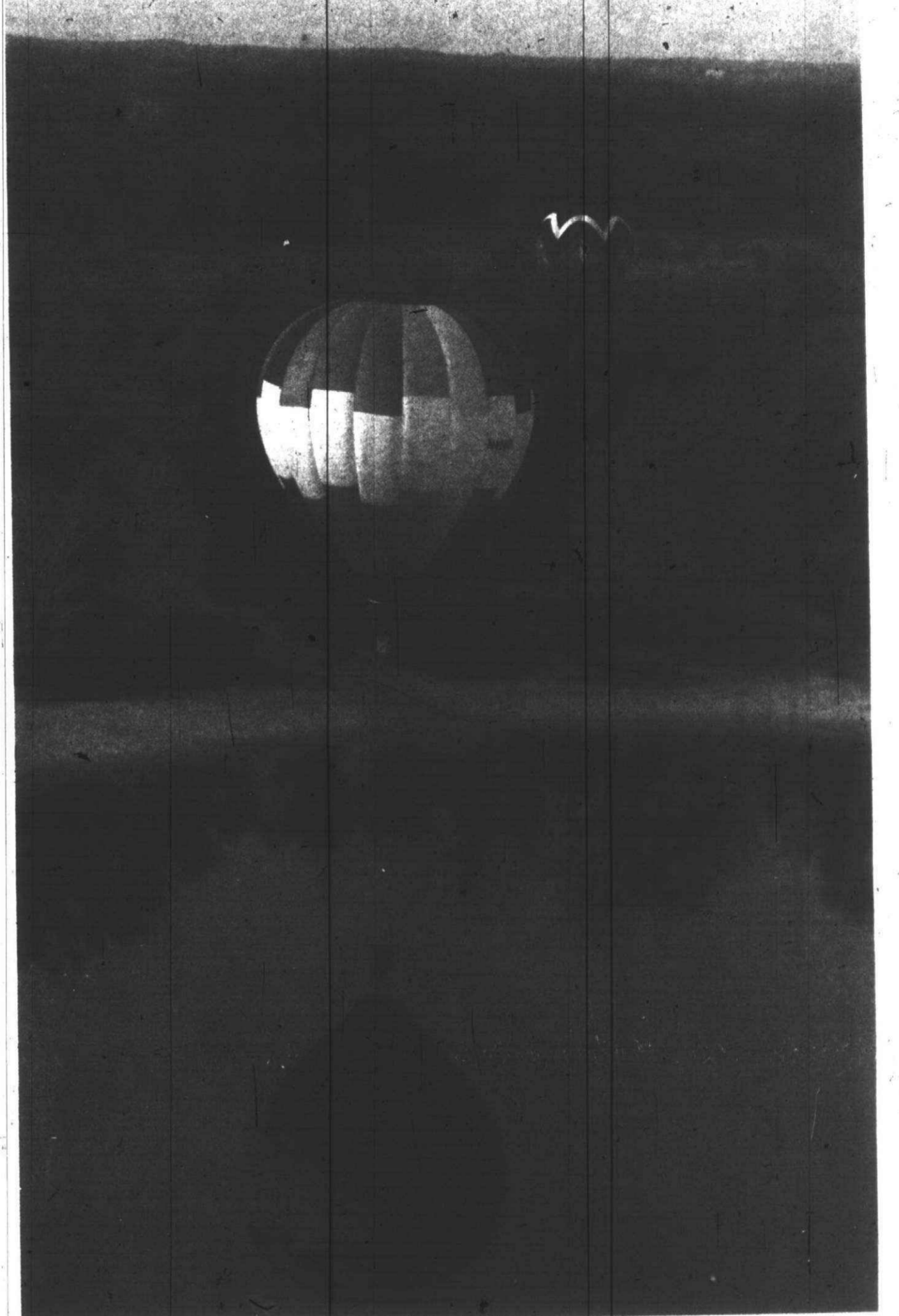

Hot Air Balloon Festival opens Friday with launch

As Friday draws to a close, more than 15 hot air balloons will be launched in the first Mayflower Hotel Hot Air Balloon Festival.

The balloons will be launched

from the field behind Central Middle School at Church and Main at about 6 p.m. Friday and will be visible in the skies from almost any point in the Plymouth-Canton com-

munity.

The festival is being sponsored by the Mayflower with the assistance of professional balloonists Gordon Boring and Steve Hamilton of Canton.

One of the highlights of the three-day series of competitive flights will be the "pick-em-up key contest" in which balloonists will attempt to pick up keys from the top of a pole to win the use of a 1982 Buick Regal for one year, courtesy of Dick Scott Buick.

The second day of activities will be a sunrise ascent Saturday with the balloon sponsors aboard.

And then the festivities will focus on downtown Plymouth with special balloon sales in local shops and the Early Bird Brunch at the Mayflower Meeting House, beginning at 9 a.m.

By mid-day local car dealers will be displaying their new 1982 models in Kellogg Park, and balloon-oriented movies will be featured in the Penn Theatre.

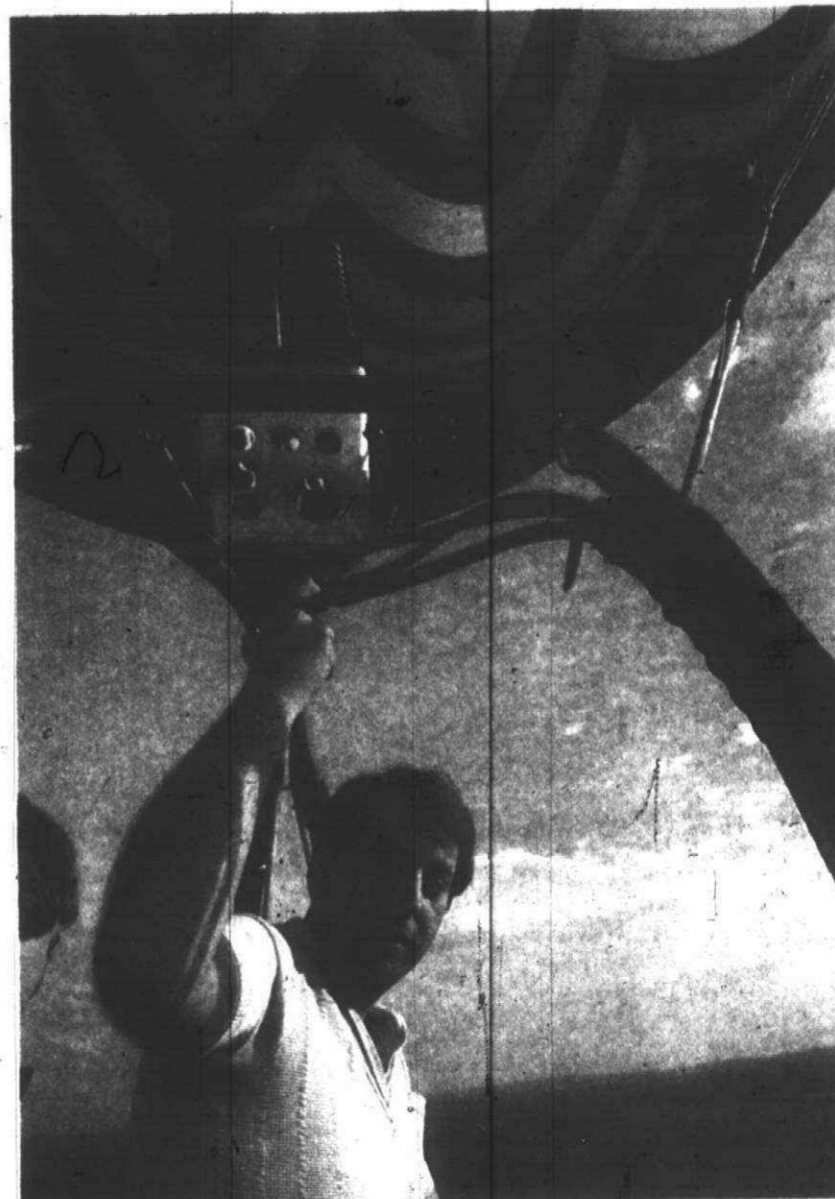
Saturday evening another balloon launch, also at the Central soccer field near the Plymouth Cultural Center, will begin at 6 p.m.

After the evening ascent is completed, a Balloon Ball will be staged in the Meeting House featuring the 17-piece band sound of the Ambassadors, hors d'oeuvres and a cash bar for an admission fee of \$5.

A special attraction Saturday night will be when balloonist Boring walks on top of an inflated balloon, a stunt called a crown walk, during the ball.

The weekend of festivities will end with the Sunday sunrise flight at Sunday Balloon Brunch beginning at 9 a.m. in the Meeting House, and a final ascent Sunday evening, weather-permitting, at about 6 o'clock.

Each balloon participating in the flights is sponsored by a local business and will be covered by \$500,000 worth of liability insurance from Lloyd's of London. Some sponsors will be offering hot air balloon rides as prizes to residents or shoppers, each ride for one hour.

Hamilton, 32, owns a couple of Star Shop convenience stores in Canton and Ypsilanti and with Boring is partner in the hot air balloon firm called Wicker Basket Balloon Center.

A 1966 graduate of John Glenn High in Westland, Hamilton says: "Everybody needs a hobby. My hobby has turned into a business but it's still fun. I spend 30-40 percent of my time with ballooning."

Balloons are powered strictly by wind, he explains, which means they land where the breezes carry them. Most balloon ascents take place at sunrise or sunset because the air is calmest at that time.

The balloons are filled with air heated by propane gas and reach six or seven stories high with inflated.

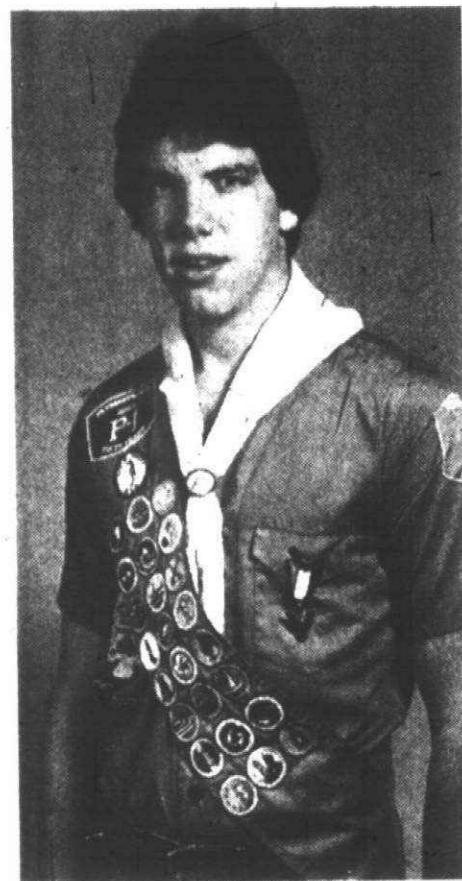

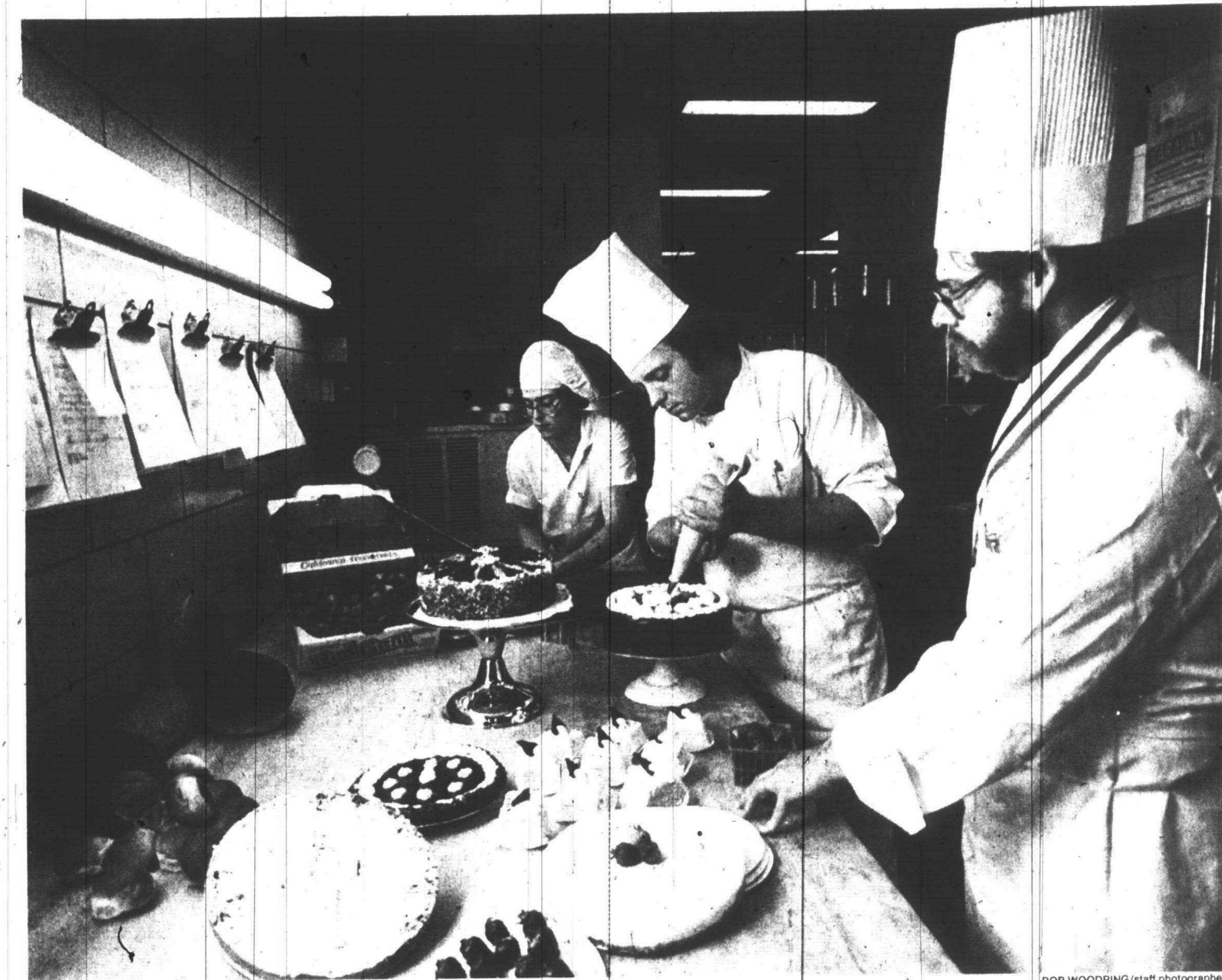
Eagle scout

Hilton chef creates culinary delights

Tim Cleary was one of those lucky kids who always knew what he wanted to be when he grew up.

As far as back as first grade, he was sure he wanted to be a chef — only his spelling wasn't so hot in those days and he spelled it "chief." Now — some 33 years later — it turns out he's both.

Cleary, who lives in Livonia with his wife Nancy, is the culinary wizard at the Plymouth Hilton who recently won a bronze medal at the prestigious National Restaurant Association annual show in Chicago.

AS HEAD OF the Hilton's food services, Cleary says he's more "chief" than "chef" because of the administrative duties that are involved in the supervision of a staff of 45 persons, and the operation of a restaurant, coffee shop, as well as working closely with the catering service, plus servicing an employes dining room and overseeing the purchasing and receiving department.

"Actually, cooking is only 10 percent of my job," said Cleary. But what he does do is to check to see that everyone else is doing their job to his standards. He makes the rounds every day, taste-testing everything.

"The coffee must be good . . . the bacon crisp . . . the vegetables fresh . . . the pastry flaky . . . the sauce delicately seasoned," he says, twirling the long curved ends of a handlebar mustache that adds a dash of old-world flavor to an otherwise youngish chef.

CLEARY PROBABLY has an edge over others in the culinary arts field. Not only he is good at what he does, but he is also very articulate and has strong organizational skills.

Teamwork is important in any operation, he stresses, but more important in the food business. In the four years he has been at the Plymouth Hilton, he has concentrated on developing a properly trained staff and works hard to create an environment that keeps them from moving on.

It will be that kind of a staff and the teamwork involved that will be important when Super Bowl XVI football classic comes to the Pontiac Superdome in January 1982.

THE PLYMOUTH Hilton — with one of the largest ballrooms in the area — will undoubtedly be headquarters for some of the festivities that are being planned.

"We're not sure what part we will play," Cleary said. "We've been told the final decision will be made two weeks before the Super Bowl."

Hilton officials believe they will be asked to host an hors d'oeuvres-cocktail type of party for several thousand visitors rather than a sit-down banquet.

But either way, Cleary said they can handle it. This was proven last year when Detroit hosted the national convention and the Hilton was headquarters for the Massachusetts delegation as well as camera crews and the

editorial staff of Newsweek and Time magazines.

"A sit-down banquet may sound like a lot of work, but actually an hors d'oeuvres reception is harder because they take so much time to make," Cleary said.

Cleary traces his love of cooking to his family life in upstate New York.

"My mother was Italian and my father was Irish. I had three brothers and one sister and the kitchen was the center of our home."

HIS FATHER, he said, was unlike most men of that era who believed that only women should do the cooking.

"He believed that cooking was a great art and he loved to cook," Cleary recalled.

Cleary started cooking at an early age. "With our size family, there was always someone around to sample it."

His first job was as kitchen boy at the YMCA. After that he worked at a bakery with an old-style pastry chef, who taught him many tricks of the baking trade that have served him well in his culinary endeavors, he said.

THE DAY AFTER graduation he left for Ireland where he began a three-year apprenticeship at Dromoland Castle, Newmarket-on-Fergus, County Clare. He has been with the Hilton chain for nine years, four of them as executive chef at the Plymouth hotel.

Cleary's motto is "Fresh food; simply prepared."

But for the recent Chicago competition, he veered slightly to create a three-part masterpiece that included poached salmon in pink peppercorn sauce, garnished with fresh asparagus, cucumber mousse in a ring of summer squash. His pastry was a barquette — a football-shaped pie shell — filled puree of parsnips and glazed with butter with a carrot knob on top. Along with it he had cream of fresh mussels soup with saffron. Rather than using crackers, he lined a glass bowl with an unsweetened crepe Suzette that called for lemon zest and cognac rather than sugar and served the soup from that combination.

The third part of the competition featured roast rack of lamb glazed with glace de vinand, a pure gelatinous glaze, attained after four days of continuous boiling of natural beef stock. The lamb was garnished with poached pears with chopped fresh mint in creme de menthe.

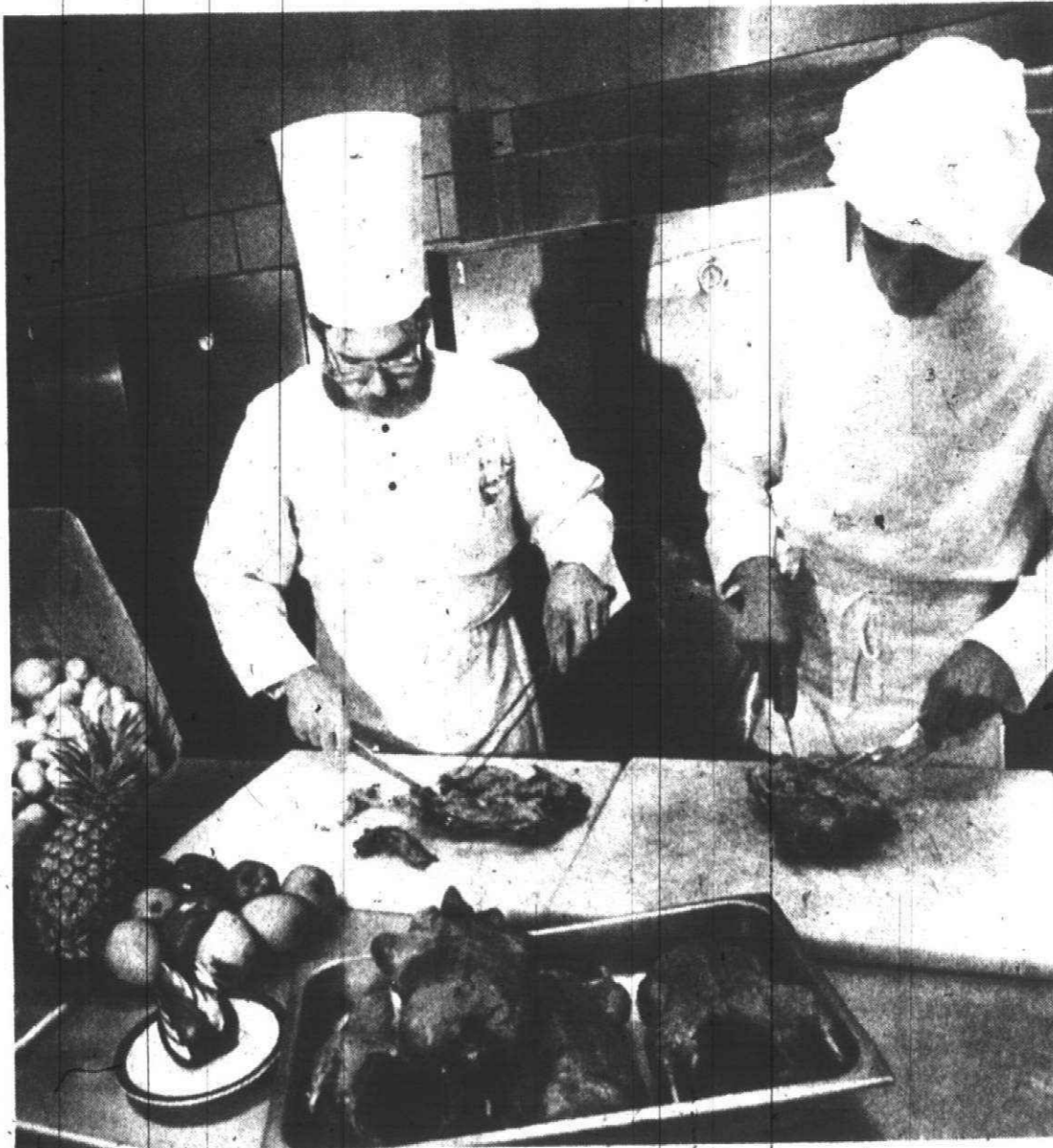
CLEARY SAID he started last March to experiment with the hot dish. When the contest time arrived, it took him three days to set things up and transport the entry via Coleman coolers to Chicago where he then put on the finishing touches. He feels his entry suffered slightly from the three-day waiting period.

There's another competition coming up the fall, but he's not sure he will enter.

Competitions are good because they raise the level of culinary excellence in the U. S., he feels, but he gets more of kick out of cooking for "people you know — the ones you see all the time."

Luxury driveway is real 'find' for local man

John Close looked perplexed as he studied the 5,000 Belgium blocks gathered in piles all over his front yard.

"I've got a real problem here," he said. "I've got 9,000 more stones coming here tomorrow and I don't know where to put them."

Close, who lives in the Beacon Hills area of Plymouth Township, indeed had a problem, but one of his own making.

He had supplied the winning bid on an entire driveway in a June 13 auction involving the former Winifred Dodge Seyburn mansion on East Jefferson in Grosse Pointe.

The driveway consisted of 14,000 Belgium blocks and Close has been hauling the stones to his French County estate home since the auction.

Close estimates he will spend \$7,500 for the bid and transportation of the blocks — each weighing 10 to 15 pounds.

THE COST appears insignificant in comparison to what the piles of blocks

mean to him. His face brightens and his eyes twinkle when he talks about how he will enjoy the driveway when the stones are all installed.

"Some of the tycoons of the auto industry, and presidents, visited the (Dodge Seyburn) home and walked on that driveway," he said in wonderment as he looked over his collection last week. "We're hauling history here."

Close, who is in the electronics business, said he had read about the auction involving the mansion, a long-time landmark, by DuMouchelle Art Galleries of Detroit in a morning newspaper.

"I told my wife, 'Get dressed, we're going.'"

"I knew I wanted something. When we got there, the driveway was the first order of business. We had talked about a cobblestone driveway for a long time."

"After I bid, my wife turned to me and said, 'I'm glad they don't have a bridge.'"

To anyone who wants to question the wisdom of such a purchase, Close has an answer:

"I've done a lot of crazy things. There are a lot of things I've done

wrong. But there are certain things that just need to be done right. Like this. We're talking about quality.

"It's fun to have fun, isn't it? There's a lot of serious people walking around. Hey, we're here only a short while."

A first generation Irish-American, Close developed a sense of humor early. He almost had to. He was born and raised on Zug Island, which today is an island in the Detroit River near Wyandotte inhabited by coal piles and industry.

"I WISH they had a school on Zug Island because I'd like to say I went to Zug State," he quips.

Close taught school in Plymouth before he started his electronics business. His company has ties across the country.

As he reaches down to clean another block with acid (most need to be cleaned off individually before being pressed into dirt), he tells the history behind the blocks.

They were "probably" brought to this country from Belgium on old cargo ships. At one time, ships relied on heavy stones for balance, he said. Once the sea-going vessels arrived in port, however, the stones were tossed overboard. Hence, the the great number of

of cobblestone streets in seacoast towns, Close said.

The blocks most likely were brought to Detroit in this way, he said.

"You could have a typical driveway, but how many chances do you have to have something like this," he enthuses.

Close says his family and wife, Joyce, are supportive of his new venture. He plans on their help in setting the new blocks in the drive.

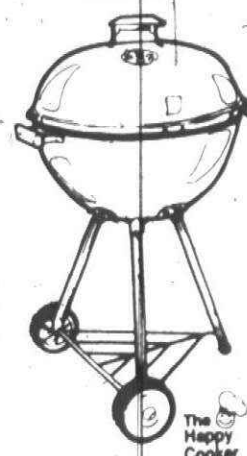
Once the work is completed, the Closes plan a ribbon-cutting ceremony and installation of a plaque describing the driveway's origins.

It's the kind of question that doesn't need an answer.

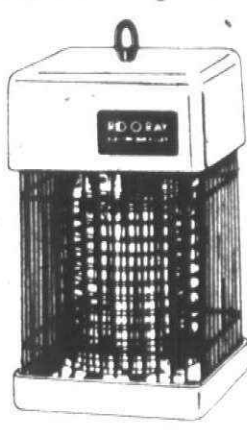

CANKER SORES
The canker sore (or aphthous ulcer) is one of the best known and most persistently annoying dental lesions. It is small and whitish and may occur on the gums, cheeks or tongue. It appears singly and in clusters. A blister usually forms first, without notice, then breaks to form an open sore or canker. Then the acute pain begins.
The open canker sore is especially sensitive to touch and to hot or spicy foods. Fortunately, the lifetime of the canker sore normally runs its course in about a week or ten days.
No good treatment is known for its cure at present. There's not much you can do except to make sure you avoid irritating foods. Some people are especially prone to canker sores. They seem to run in families and there may be a connection between canker attacks and emotional stress, though there is still no definite information on the cause of this puzzling disorder.
A dentist can treat canker sores to relieve the pain. However, certain kinds of cankers tend to persist or come back in spite of any treatment now known.

Charter consensus: Well, it's an improvement

The entire western Wayne County contingent of the county charter commission voted with the winners in the recent 17-2 vote on the proposed charters.

What do they think about it personally? Settle in.

In a nutshell, four commissioners from the western suburbs agreed that while the charter has flaws, it deserves to be approved by voters.

"I VOTED YES in spite of the fact the two largest problems that confront my district are unresolved," said Bart Berg, R-Canton Township.

"I feel there's enough value and goodness come out of this charter to encourage its adoption. I am going to support the charter."

Berg said the two biggest problems are the drain commissioner — an office retained as an elected position in the charter, although it could have been

made appointed — and the three-member county Board of Road Commissioners.

The oft-criticized road commission continues under the charter to control Metro Airport and the county parks. Other charter language allows the road commissioners to be removed at the pleasure of the proposed chief executive, but Berg said he didn't think it was a strong enough rein on the commission's powers.

"You have an idea how powerful the road commission is as it stands now?" Berg asked. "Now what makes you think they're not going to half handpick the executive?"

The charter "leaves a lot of unanswered questions," Berg said. "However, it is a document that turns

in the right direction. Without it, reform likely would be several years down the road.

"I'm going to campaign mostly on encouraging people to study the document and make up their own minds."

Berg offered that the charter commission itself was "over-lawyered."

"THERE ARE many sections of the charter I don't agree with," said Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia.

"I think the tax and finance section is very good. With a strong executive, I think the county has a strong chance for a good beginning."

Bankes said she did not think the controversial charter action which reduced the number of county board of commission members from 27 to 15

was too important. "I've said many times that I felt the number of commissioners wouldn't make much difference," she said.

Bankes said she'll support the charter in November, when voters will decide on it, "and then I'm going to work for more reform. We've got to get rid of the drain commissioner."

Bankes also pointed out that the charter commission itself is 20 percent under its authorized budget.

JUSTINE BARNES, a Westland Democrat and city council member, said the proposed chief executive officer post is "a true reformation."

The charter section dealing with county finances is strong, Barnes said, and she also dismissed the importance

of the number of county commissioners.

"There's no magic number. We are truly a representative government. I think more committed people would be running if there were 15 commissioners."

"I THINK it's a good step forward," said Tim Manning, D-Redford, one of the charter unit's youngest members, "and it's going to open the door to reorganization."

"But I feel we could have done a lot more than we did. We should never have put the hospital in there. We should have tightened the reins on the road commission a little more."

SC settles 2 contracts.

Schoolcraft College has settled two more labor contracts and is negotiating a third.

The board of trustees recently approved two-year contracts with the Operating Engineers union, representing 38 physical plant employees, and the Association of Office Personnel, representing 60 secretaries and clerks.

Both unions' members had ratified earlier. Both contracts run from this July 1 to June 30, 1983.

THE OPERATING Engineers pact provides for raises of 40 cents an hour July 1 and 25 cents the following Jan. 1 both years of the contract, according to Mike Petrack, director of labor relations for the college. For persons earning an average of \$7.09 an hour, the increases are 7.4 percent the first year and 6.9 percent the second.

The contract adds \$25 to the uniform allowance.

The contract makes a vision care plan available to all members and requires a second medical opinion for elective surgery benefits, he added.

The office personnel contract grants increases of \$18 the first year and \$20 the second. For persons averaging \$238 a week, the increases are 7.6 percent the first year and 7.8 percent the second.

In addition, persons with less than full seniority get step increases. And in the second year, persons with 10 or more years service will get \$25 longevity increases, Petrack said.

Some secretarial jobs are being upgraded, he added.

The office contract also makes a vision plan available to all and requires a second medical opinion for elective surgery benefits.

The college is still negotiating with the Operating Engineers, which also represents 11 food service employees under a separate contract.



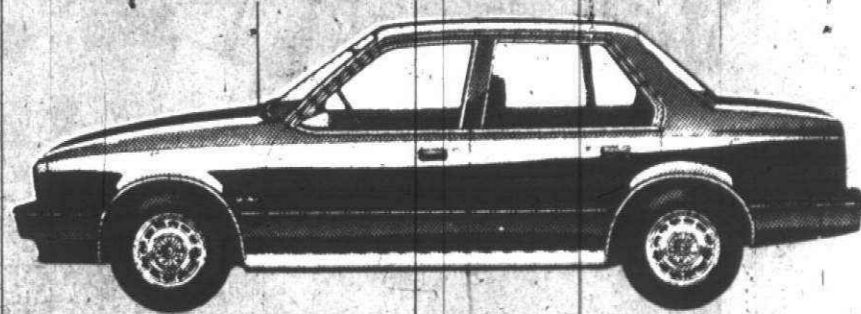

ENTERTAINING IDEAS WITH THE CREAM OF CHEESE



When entertaining, American food is definitely "in."

After years of extolling the cuisines of other countries, food experts are beginning to realize what most of us have known all along — it's hard to beat classic American foods. One of the reasons for this sudden recognition is the fine quality of our ingredients, many of which are known around the world. American steaks, maple syrup, and Maine lobsters are good examples.

Another American "classic" is fresh cream cheese, created over a century ago. Philadelphia Brand cream cheese is available all over the free world, but it is a native American cheese, and one of a small group of packaged grocery products that has been distributed for more than 100 years.

The first commercial cream cheese was created by an upstate New York cheesemaker in 1872. The delicate fresh cream cheese soon became popular throughout the area and, in 1880, was first marketed under the trademark "Philadelphia Brand." At that time the city of Philadelphia was famous for superior foodstuffs, especially dairy products, which were known as "Philadelphia quality."

Over the years there have been steady improvements in the manufacturing and packaging of Philly cream cheese.

Cream cheese has been a favorite for generations, because it goes so well with almost everything and blends readily with other ingredients.

Over the years, the availability of fresh cream cheese has influenced the way Americans cook and entertain — dips, stuffed celery, and canapés become easy party food when made with Philly cream cheese. For instance, an easy Festive Appetizer

Tray offers rich cream cheese with an assortment of simple, savory ingredients such as chopped green onions, chopped radishes, and bacon crumbles; or anchovies, capers, chopped olives, or other favorites as desired. It's an easy hors d'oeuvre for parties, but one that has lots of eye and taste appeal.

Beef Stroganoff is a favorite for dinner parties, but it usually calls for expensive beef filet. Instead, try Meatball Stroganoff, just as delicious, but more budget-wise. The sauce gets its smooth texture from the cream cheese, rather than the conventional sour cream. Top with sliced green onions for flavor, color, and crunch.

Cream cheese also lends its delicate flavor to this cold Grasshopper Soufflé. Crème de menthe gives it the "grasshopper" name, but you might like to experiment with other flavors. Substituting liqueurs such as crème de cacao or orange flavored liqueur are two tempting possibilities.

MEATBALL STROGANOFF

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/3 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/3 cup milk
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1/4 cup oil

- 2 tablespoons green onion slices
- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese, cubed
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 4-oz. can mushrooms, drained
- 4 cups (8 ozs.) noodles, cooked, drained

Combine meat, crumbs, milk, egg, Worcestershire sauce and seasonings. Form into 24 meatballs; brown in oil. Cook 10 to 15 minutes or until done; remove meatballs. Drain fat, reserving 1 tablespoon. Add green onion; cook until tender. Add cream cheese, water and mushrooms, stirring over low heat until cheese is melted. Arrange meatballs over hot noodles; cover with sauce. Top with additional green onion slices, if desired. 6 to 8 servings

GRASSHOPPER SOUFFLÉ

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 2 cups cold water
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 eggs, separated

- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1/4 cup crème de menthe
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Soften gelatin in 1 cup cold water; stir over low heat until dissolved. Add remaining cold water; remove from heat. Blend in 3/4 cup sugar and beaten egg yolks; cook 3 minutes over low heat, stirring constantly. Gradually add to softened cream cheese, mixing until well blended. Stir in crème de menthe. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat egg whites until foamy. Gradually add remaining sugar, beating until stiff peaks form. Fold egg whites and whipped cream into cream cheese mixture. Wrap a 3-inch collar of aluminum foil around top of 1-1/2-quart soufflé dish; secure with tape. Pour mixture into dish; chill until firm. Remove collar before serving.

FESTIVE APPETIZER TRAY

- Lettuce cups
- Crisply cooked bacon slices, crumbled
- Green onion slices
- Chopped radishes
- Assorted crackers
- Party-size bread slices
- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
- Pimiento strips

Fill lettuce cups with bacon, onion and radishes. Arrange on serving tray with crackers, bread and cream cheese topped with pimiento.

"PHILLY" PASTRY

- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 cup margarine
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Combine softened cream cheese and margarine, mixing until well blended. Add flour and salt; mix well. Form into ball; chill. Divide dough in half. On lightly floured surface, roll out each half to 11-inch circle. Place in two 9-inch pie plates. Trim and flute edges; prick bottom and sides with fork. Bake at 450°, 12 to 15 minutes or until golden brown. Two 9-inch pastry shells

Variation: For tart shells, divide dough into sixteen balls. Roll out each to 6-inch circle. Place in 4-inch tart pans. Trim and flute edges; prick with fork. Bake at 450°, 8 to 10 minutes or until golden brown.

FROZEN PARTY SALAD

- 1 cup salad dressing
- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 20-oz. can pineapple chunks, drained
- 1 16-oz. can apricot halves, drained, quartered
- 2 cups chopped maraschino cherries
- 2 tablespoons sifted confectioners' sugar
- Few drops red food coloring (optional)
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Gradually add salad dressing to softened cream cheese, mixing until well blended. Stir in fruit, sugar and food coloring; fold in marshmallows and whipped cream. Pour into 9x5-inch loaf pan; freeze. Unmold onto serving platter. 10 to 12 servings

Variation: Substitute 1 16-oz. can peach slices, drained, for apricots.

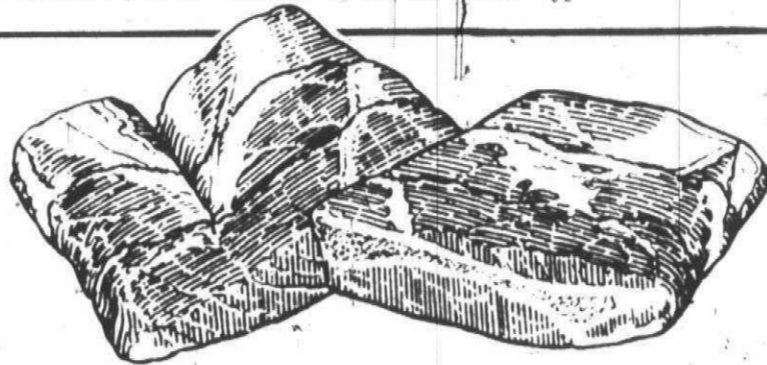

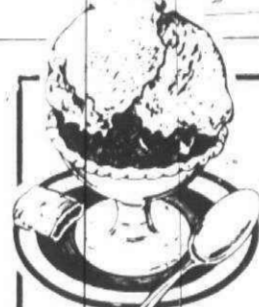

A Question of Taste

Don't sulk! Try an easy-on-the-cook week

When my youngest son was about 4, I made him a robe of quilted material printed with Richard Scary figures. Scary's book, "Busy, Busy World," which spoofs the stereotypes of various nationalities, was one of our favorites at the time. My husband has even done interpretive readings on Saint Patrick's Day of the story of Patrick Pig, who kisses the Blarney Stone and never stops talking again.

I have always had a problem trying to correspond pattern sizes with ready-to-wear sizes. Consequently, he was just growing into the robe when, after three years of hard wear, it began to disintegrate.

As his 7th birthday approached, he requested a new robe — one that I would make, not buy. Touched that I cared that I make it, I went out and — in a fit of, "Nothing's-to-good-for-my-boy" — I bought the plushiest, most expensive terry cloth in the store. I spent the next four weeks force-feeding the too-thick terry cloth through my machine.

I finally arrived at the home stretch last night and had him try it on so that I could adjust the hem. As soon as it was

on his back, he whined that it was too hot, gives him a headache and he doesn't want to wear it.

THERE ARE TWO appropriate responses to such an announcement.

One is to respond that he is going to wear it because you're going to wrap it around his neck. The other is to respect his decision and simply resolve to never — ever — sew anything for him again. In fact, never try to do anything at all nice for him ever again.

This same situation arises frequently in regard to cooking.

Spend a week cultivating your own wild yeast for salt-rising bread. Your family will not only enjoy a special taste treat but will have a better understanding of what the pioneers went through before commercial yeast was available for bread-baking.

If you are fortunate enough to get as far as the baking stage before someone disposes of the foul-smelling potato-starter, you should end up with a fragrant, crusty loaf which is likely to be met with up-turned noses and the question, "Why can't we just have plain, white store-bought bread like Grandma

puts out on a plate at dinner?"

Anyone who spends any amount of time in the kitchen has his own examples of such lack of appreciation, of course. The options here are not as simply as with sewing, however. It is simply not practical to "force" anyone to eat anything.

Nor is it practical to refuse to food your family.

THE BEST YOU can do is retreat — or sulk, if you will.

This is not the best time to embark on any new ambitious cooking experiments. On the other hand, it is not recommended that you go too far in the other direction. Presumably you are eating the same food you are serving. Even a few days of hot dogs, canned soup, and packaged macaroni and cheese would add unbearable insult to injury.

Instead, plan a week of easy-on-the-cook, easily-identifiable, tasty dinners. You will benefit from the extra time away from the kitchen and your children, especially, will probably not mind a week without special favors for dinner.

You might try some of the following recipes during that week: None are especially unusual, nor do they require much fuss. They are delicious nonetheless and worth keeping on file for periods of sulking or simply for days when you are pressed for time but still want the pleasures of a good meal.

TOSSED SEAFOOD AND FRESH VEGETABLE SALAD

Serves 6

- Salad greens
- 1 1/2 cups sliced celery
- 1 cup shredded carrots
- 1 1/2 cups cooked potato balls or diced potatoes
- 1/2 cup chopped green onions (bulbs and tops)
- 2 cups fresh or canned lobster, shrimp, crabmeat, or tuna
- 1 1/2 tsp. fresh lemon juice
- 4 tsp. salad or olive oil
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. ground black pepper
- Tomato slices or wedges
- Fresh parsley
- Sour cream (optional)

Line a bowl with washed dry salad

greens. Top as desired with the vegetables and seafood. Combine lemon juice, oil, salt, and black pepper. Pour over salad. Toss lightly. Garnish with fresh tomato slices or wedges and fresh parsley. If desired, serve with sour cream or mayonnaise, or a mixture of both.

Note: I used left-over white fish, flaked, for the fish in this salad and found the results delicious.

VEGETARIAN BASKETS

Serves 4

- 1 large onion, chopped (1 cup)
- 3/4 cup margarine
- 1 1/2 cups shredded Swiss cheese
- 1/2 cup toasted wheat germ
- 3 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
- 2 tsp. minced parsley
- 1 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 can (8 oz.) refrigerated buttermilk biscuits

Cook onion in margarine until lightly browned. Mix with the next six ingredients; set aside. Grease four 6-oz. custard cups. Press 2 biscuits into each cup, covering bottom and sides completely. Fill with cheese-egg mixture. Cut remaining two biscuits in half and stretch over filling. Bake at 450° de-

grees until biscuits are lightly browned and cheese is melted, about 10 minutes. Serve with a hearty soup and green beans.

PEPPER-CHEESE HASH

"a vegetarian Sloppy Joe"

Serves 4 to 6

- 3 tsp. peanut oil
- 2 onions, chopped
- 8 large mushrooms, sliced
- 4 to 6 Italian sweet peppers
- 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce
- 1 tsp. oregano
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- Salt
- Freshly ground pepper
- 6 oz. mozzarella cheese

Saute the onions and mushrooms in the oil until limp. Cut peppers in half, cut into 1-inch pieces. Add to the onion-mushroom mixture. Stir in the tomato sauce, oregano, garlic, salt, and pepper. Cut the cheese into chunks and place them on top of the mixture. Cover the pan and simmer for 15 minutes.

Just before serving, stir together and ladle over hot buttered toast or use between halves of crusty bread.

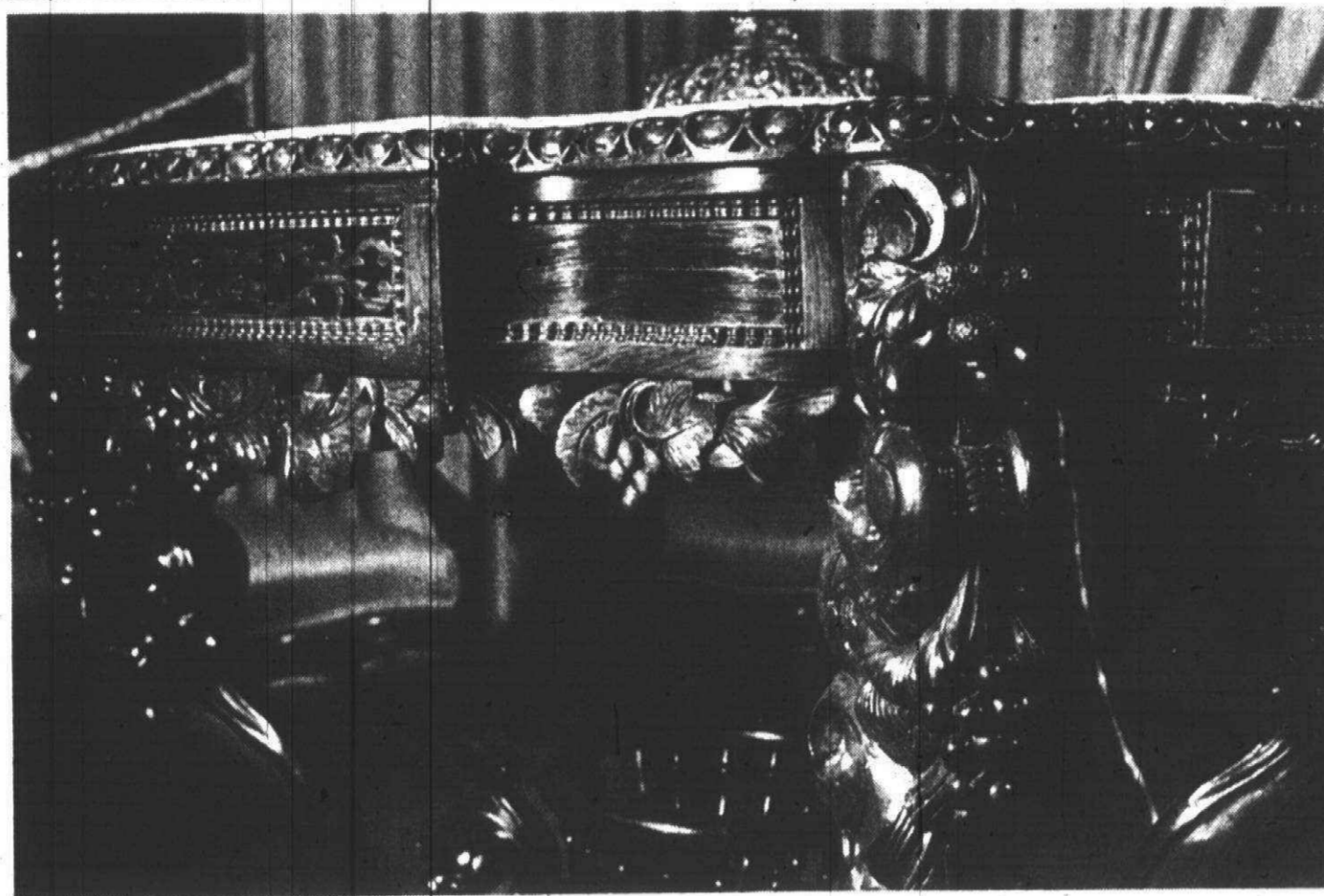

It's a whole new life opening up now for the Rev. Dawn Pooley and her husband Robert.

They're leaving their home in Canton and their long-time ties with Good Hope Lutheran Church of Garden City. Bob is leaving his job on the line for Kelsey-Hayes in Romulus.

Their new home will be at Brown City, a thumb area community of 1,200. It is 60 miles northeast of Detroit. There Mrs. Pooley is taking over as pastor of the 128-member Trinity Lutheran Church, and Bob will be looking for work.

"His being willing to follow me to my first call has been more of a mind-bender for people than my going into the ministry," said the former parish worker. She is one of seven clergywomen in the Lutheran Church in America has ordained in Michigan and one of 140 nationwide.

"But we have a very strong marriage. My husband has been very supportive. He's very competent in the gifts he has and is in no way threatened by the work I do.

"We think we can make a good role model for our kind of marriage."

IN FACT, said Pastor Dawn, it was her husband who pushed her toward the ministry, "when I was dragging my feet because I knew it would mean separation for a while."

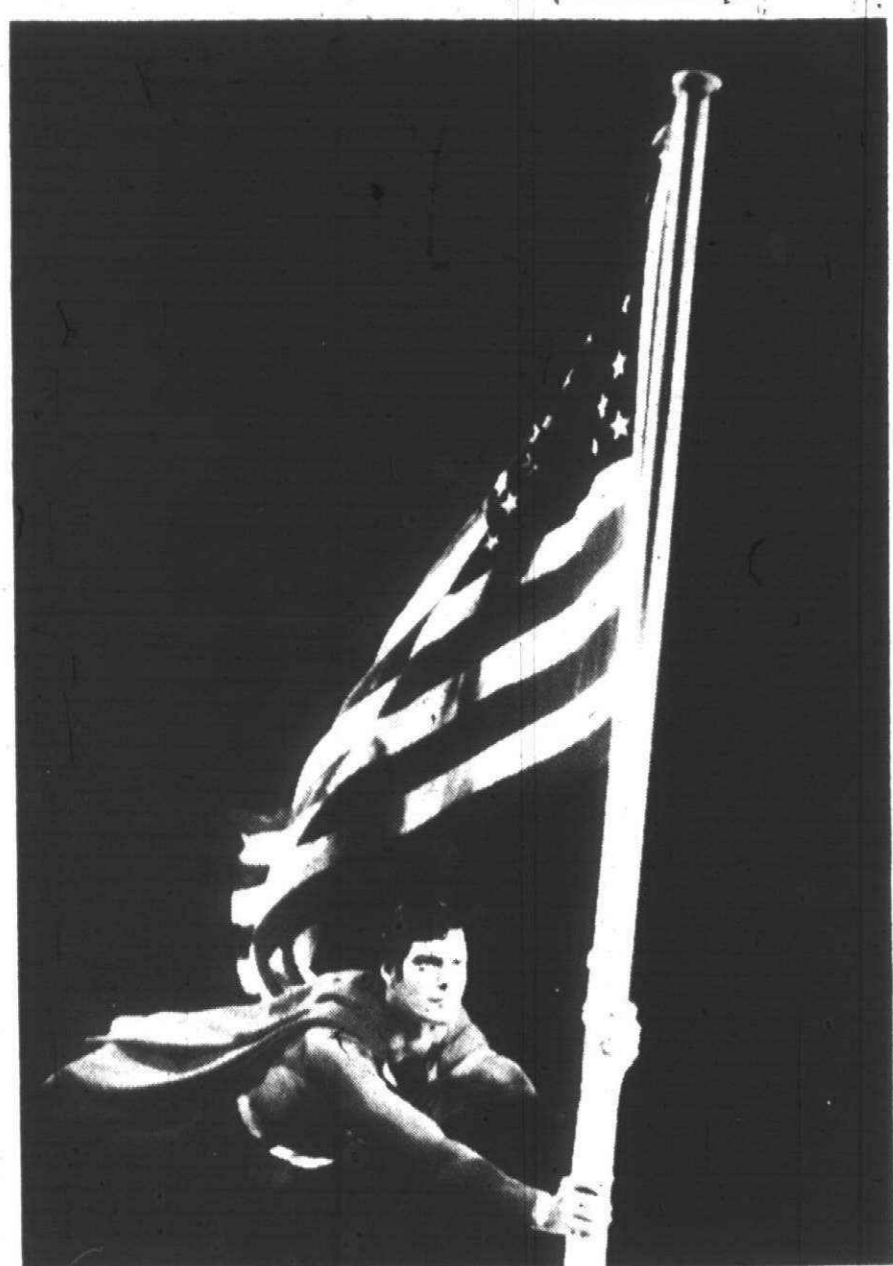

The fun continues in 'Superman II'

The hero with the capital S on his chest is back, and this time he has more to contend with than the evil schemes of Lex Luthor, although Luthor is still scheming.

In "Superman II" (PG), however, Christopher Reeve meets three villains with powers equal to his own. General Zod (Terence Stamp) and his two cohorts (Sarah Douglas and Jack O'Halloran) are archcriminals from Krypton, Superman's own planet.

They have made their way to Earth, where their immense destructive force has brought all world governments into submission. Can Superman prevail when the odds are 3 to 1? Where is Superman anyway? He is oblivious to what is happening because he and Lois Lane (Margot Kidder) are secluded happily in his Arctic retreat.

Yes, the love story comes to fruition in this movie. Lois Lane did not get to be the Daily Planet's No. 1 reporter by wearing blinders. She figures out who the meekish, klutzy Clark Kent really is.

SHE CONFRONTS Kent/Superman with her discovery and her love. Superman or not, he succumbs to his feelings and suggests they go to his place. Sooner than you can say "whoosh," they are in his crystalline home somewhere near the North Pole.

Meanwhile, General Zod is wrecking havoc in the world, and Luthor (Gene Hackman) has tipped him off about the presence of his fellow Kryptonian, Superman, on planet Earth. In return for his help, Luthor is seeking some beach-front property — Australia.

Everything is set up for the confrontation between Superman and the villains. It's a battle which won't disappoint viewers because "Superman II" sparkles with the same high spirits and spectacular effects that characterized its predecessor.

As with any sequel, the specialness and the novelty have been lost. The movie has gained, however, in humor provided by Ned Beatty and Gene Hackman. Beatty plays Luthor's bumbling pal and is seen in some slapstick episodes at the beginning, before Luthor makes his escape from prison.

Hackman shows a lot of finesse in the Luthor role, and he knows how to underplay for maximum effect. When, for example, he enters an office after the terrible threesome have nearly demolished it, he mutters, "When are these dummies going to learn to use doorknobs?"

AS LOIS LANE, Kidder with a deep voice and brash personality makes a fine foil for Reeve as Kent/Superman. Reeve continues to display the strong appeal he demonstrated in the original movie. His Superman exhibits an attractive combination of sweetness and strength, and his Clark Kent is still the bespectacled schlemiel nobody notices (except Lois).

Richard Lester directed the movie with his usual deft touch for balancing heroics and humor, a skill he sharpened in the Beatles' and Musketeers' movies.

The result is a thoroughly enjoyable "Superman II" that is pure, lighthearted escapist entertainment.

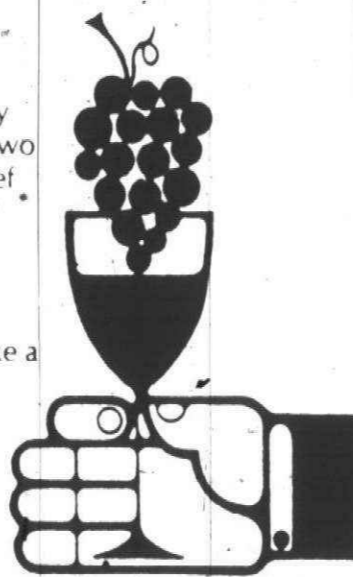


Christopher Reeve as Superman and Margot Kidder as Lois Lane find romance and visit his Arctic pad.

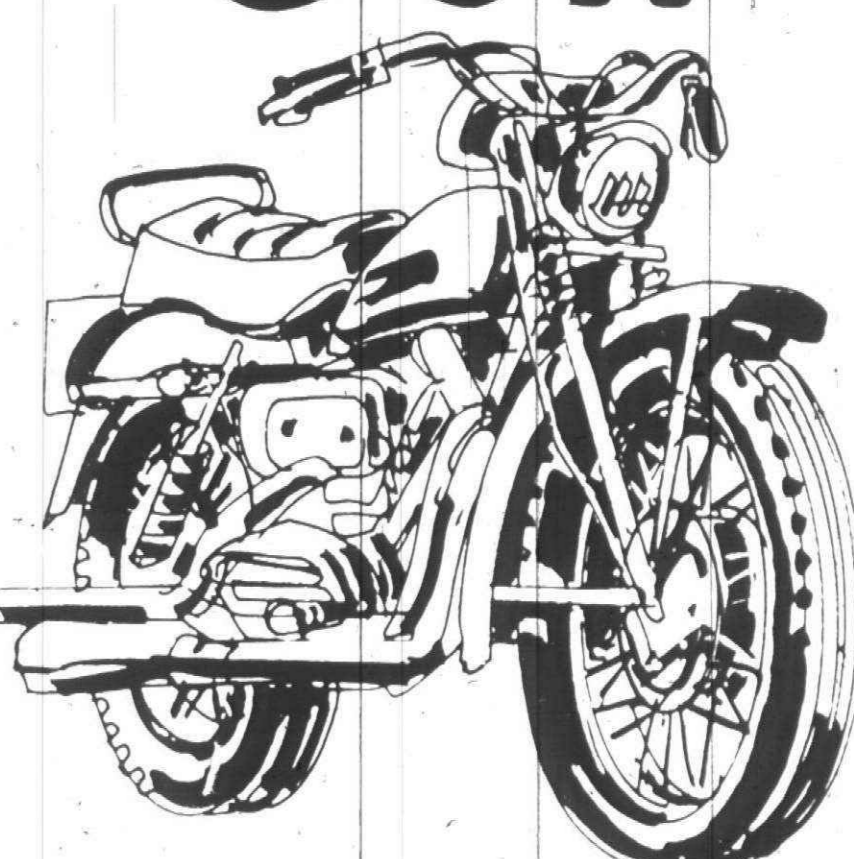
