Surratt case will stay in juvie court

Matt Surratt, accused of murdering Katina Chavez, will be tried in children's court.

District Judge Robert M. Doughty, in a hearing to determine whether the 17-year-old San Patricio resident should be tried as an adult, said Friday there was "uncontroverted evidence" that Surratt be tried as a juvenile. Judge Doughty, after two days of testimony, refused to transfer Surratt for trial as an adult in district court.

Surratt, if found guilty as a juvenile, faces a maximum two-year sentence at the New Mexico Boys School in Springer. If he had been tried and convicted as an adult, he could have received a life sentence.

Judge Doughty said evidence showed that Surratt, if convicted, could be rehabilitated. According to state law, that determination required him to leave the case in juvenile court, explained Doughty.

Okeydokey Baby captures Kansas

Okeydokey Baby turned in a sizzling performance in the 38th running of the Kansas Futurity Sunday, capturing the triple leg of quarter horse racing's Triple Crown by a 1/4 length margin.

A 2-year-old Zevi-Mayolas Doll Baby filly, Okeydokey Baby was overshadowed in the pre-race publicity by previously undefeated Merganser, who left the gate the Kansas Futurity favorite at odds of 2-5. But when it was all over Okeydokey Baby, with James Lackey on board, had dispatched Merganser and the rest of the freshmen field in impressive style.

"She left the gate fast and no one seemed to challenge her," said Lackey. "They told me that she might drift in by the grandstand and she did just a bit, but she's one fast filly." She covered the 350 yards in 17.690.

Trainer R. Paul Hobbs

conditions Okeydokey Baby for Jeff Hooper (lessee) and the Jalapeno Racing Team II (lessor) of Austin, Texas. The win, worth \$163,000, boosted Okeydokey Baby's career earnings to more than \$182,000. She was bred in Oklahoma by C. Throneberry Jr.

My Dash, a Dash For Cash filly ridden by Jerry Nicodemus, fought it out with Blushing Indian down the lane and prevailed by a head for the place money—a \$69,990 paycheck. She stopped the clock in 17.840. My Dash is leased by Liese Gullikson, the owner of last year's Kansas Futurity winner Shoot Yeah. Jack Brooks trains My Dash.

Blushing Indian, a 17-1 longshot trained by Robert H. Dimitt, got a neck in front of Project Cash to finish third.

Larry Payne was in the irons on the Make Em Blush-Indian Cojo filly. A third-place payoff of \$34,995 awaits owners Bobby and Margaret Whitener of Republic, Missouri.

Council adopts \$10 million budget, cuts staff

In final efforts to pare the municipal budget, the Ruidoso Village Council cut the Engineering Department and the deputy police chief position from next year's budget.

Councillors then adopted the \$10,760,835 budget, and authorized village manager Frank Potter to submit the document to the Department of Finance and Administration in Santa Fe. Potter said the budget was due last week.

During the special meeting Friday, Potter announced he had followed the mayor's and council's instructions by cutting the two-employee Engineering Department.

Potter said the deputy chief slot was eliminated because it is no longer needed under the restructuring implemented by Chief William Newman.

All three jobs are eliminated as of July 1.

Engineer Mike Davalos joined village staff in September 1985, and engineering project inspector John Salas has been a village employee for about 20 years. The two formed Ruidoso's first Engineering Department staff.

Alston has served on the Ruidoso Police force since 1980.

Asked if Deputy Chief Jim Alston has been offered another position in the department, Potter replied a patrol officer job is available.

Potter said the village will save \$76,000 by eliminating the Engineering Department, and according to village budget records, deleting the deputy chief slot will result in savings of more than \$30,000, including salary and benefits.

Also Friday, Potter told councillors that Street Department director Mike Baier had resigned. Potter said he appointed Street Department foreman Charles Armstrong to fill that job.

Baier took over the reins of the Street Department on October 1, 1986, and his resignation is effective June 17. He'll join a San Diego, California, road contractor as an estimator.

"Nothing's wrong here," said

Baier, noting he regrets leaving Ruidoso, but has a great career opportunity in San Diego.

"This is the nicest job I've ever had," said Baier, adding he likes the people he has really liked the people with whom he has worked.

In what Potter said was an unrelated move, the village building inspector Jimmy Neeley was terminated on Friday. Potter said that position is still in the municipal budget, and will be filled.

Potter said Neeley will remain on staff until July 1. Reading from the village personnel rules and regulations, Potter said Neeley was dismissed for "non-cooperation by an employee ... or other personal conduct ... that interferes with another employee."

Although, according to Potter, Neeley had no prior warnings before he was dismissed Friday, the village ordinance requires none.

"We do not have progressive discipline," said Potter, explaining if an employee worked for 22 years with no problems, he still could be terminated over an infraction.

Neeley has served as building inspector for five years. When contacted Sunday, Neeley said he would withhold comment until a later time.

Also during Friday's meeting, councillors heard from Potter that the year-long village computer conversion project is almost complete.

Acting financial director John

Varley explained plans to implement an investment policy to maximize village funds.

Potter said the budget adopted on Friday reflects an overall two and a half percent decrease. He said personal services were cut for the third year in a row.

But Potter said he was able to keep the vehicle replacement program, as well as the one-twelfth cash reserves he has been advocating.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr. complemented councillors and village staff for the amount of time spent in drafting and reviewing the budget.

RHS graduates 103

Ruidoso High school graduated 103 students and presented over \$54,000 in scholarships Friday night as a packed house watched.

Salutatorian Cliff Sears addressed the crowd, with the "declaration of independence." He challenged the group not to let "society tell you what to do, but pursue your own future."

Valedictorian Candice Ann Makowski described what life would be like on her 10th reunion. She described herself as a successful lady. Then she defined success as being in the mind of the leader.

She added that money does not mean success. As an example Makowski listed Mother Teresa, who gives everything away, yet is quite successful. She continued her address with a Biblical quote and the description of success: fulfillment, happiness, peace of mind and love.

Makowski challenged the seniors to find positive occupations, to dream, to test limits, to succeed. She said that all the seniors have the potential for success.

"Well done, good and faithful servant," quoted Makowski from Jesus' words.

The main speaker, Dub Williams, introduced himself as a teacher at RHS for 30 years, calling that position "the most important job in Ruidoso."

Unies Rocket top qualifier for Rainbow Silver Cup

Reinsman Richard Vaughn guided Unies Rocket to a convincing win in the first division of the Rainbow Silver Cup Trials, turning in the fastest qualifying time for the June 12th running of the \$150,000 Rainbow Silver Cup.

In other action at the mountain oval, Bold Approach, a 2-year-old maiden by Bolductive set a new track record for 4-1/2 furlongs, 52 3/5, and one lucky fan nailed down a \$52,433 jackpot in Friday's Twin-Trifecta carryover.

Steve Cocanower, a Fort Worth attorney who has been coming to the track for ten years, correctly handicapped the first, second, and third-place finishers in the third and fourth races.

"My biggest payoff before this was the \$170 first half of today's Twin-Tri. After I won that I thought 'it never gets better than this.' I was wrong. I'm shaking like a leaf," said Cocanower. He intends to deposit his winnings in the bank.

The ten 4-year-old quarter horses with the best times in Friday's four Rainbow Silver Cup trial divisions go postward in the final. It promises to be a competitive event, with less than 1/4 second separating the finalists' qualifying marks.

Unies Rocket, a Rocket Wrangler-Unie Model colt, went to the front early and was never headed, covering the 440 yards in 21.610. Johnnie Goodman Sr. saddled the winner for Winning Ways Mare Farm and Lowell W.

Bingham (et al) of Lubbock, Texas.

Like Unies Rocket, Will Be Easy won his division in wire-to-wire fashion, logging the second-fastest time of the day, 21.675. Jerry Nicodemus was in the irons. Arnold Simmons trains the Comin' Easy filly for the Keeling Family Partnership and Kenneth Keeling (et al) of Huntsville, Texas.

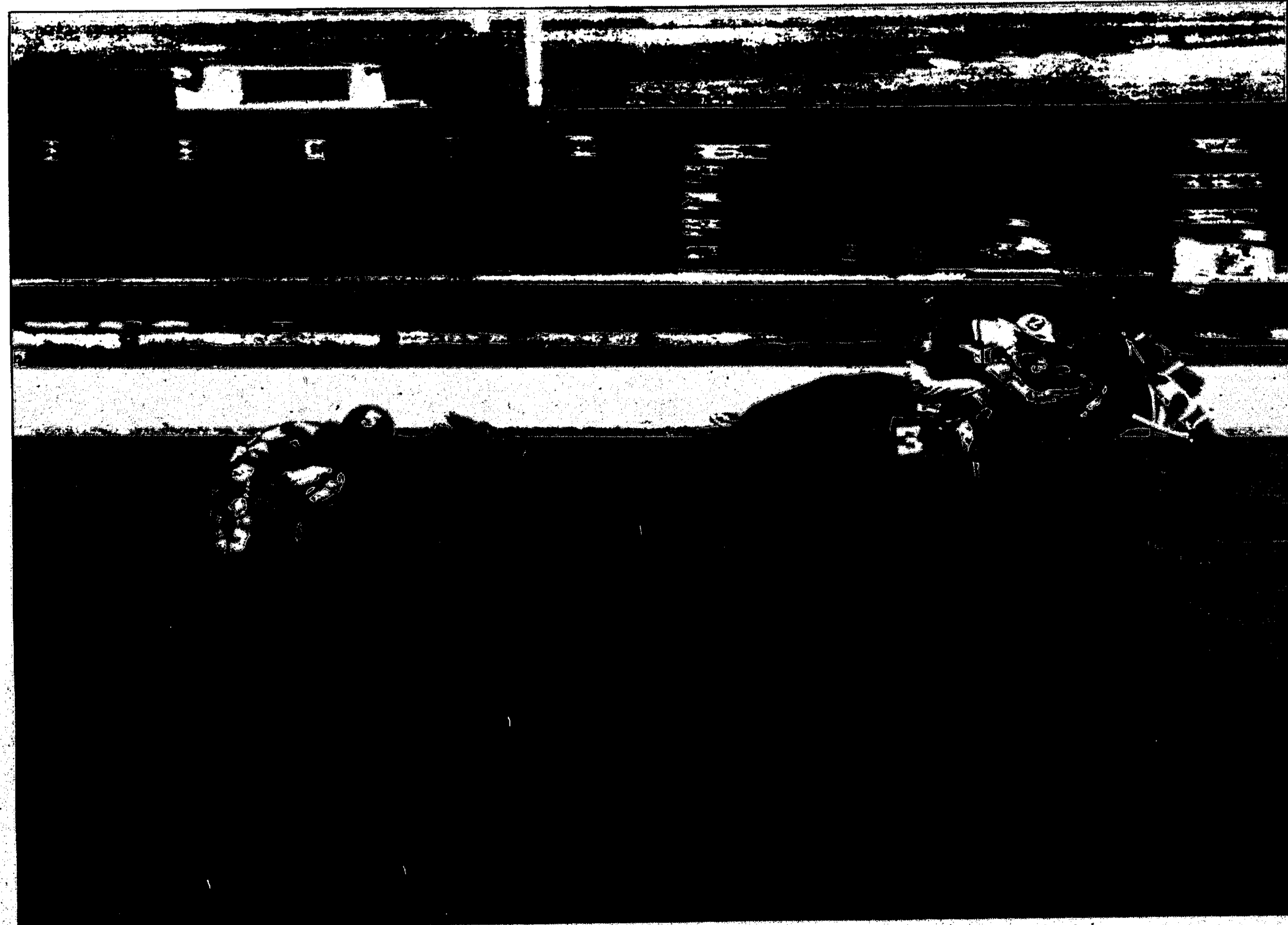
The Widgeon, a Duck Dance gelding, posted the third-fastest time, coming from behind to win the second division by a head in 21.715. George Fryday rode the winner for trainer Verle Bohner and owner Pat H. Appling of Ulysses, Kansas.

California invader Brace Your Glass won the fourth division in 21.850, a time good enough to secure the Raise Your Glass filly the tenth and last qualifying spot. Brace Your Glass is a Russell Harris trainee, owned by Delellis and Ryan Albrecq of Newhall, California.

The rest of the Rainbow Silver Cup field qualified as follows: Doctor Bright (21.740), Charmin Too (21.745), Freedom Flyer (21.770), Bully Bullion (21.780), Hicclass Girl (21.835) and Naviaux (21.850).

In the co-feature, the Norgor Derby trials, High Wire Acrobat, with Larry Payne on board, won the first 6 furlong test in 1:12. Salustio Burgos piloted Arrowhead's Pro to victory in the second trial in 1:11 4/5.

Prosperous sprints to Kansas Futurity Consolation win



Jockey James Lackey pilots undefeated Prosperous to a win in the \$100,000 Kansas Futurity Consolation Saturday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track. Prosperous, a two-year-old filly conditioned by Blane Schvaneveldt, won the 350-yard dash in 17.680.

Jockey James Lackey, fresh off the plane from California, piloted undefeated Prosperous to a tight win over favorite Rime to capture the \$100,000 Kansas Futurity Consolation.

In the co-feature, the \$50,000-added Rio Grande Futurity for 2-year-old New Mexico-bred thoroughbreds, Mike Lidberg guided Masked Parade to the wire in front of Fly Dragoness and Christian Leader. Masked Parade covered the 5 furlongs in 59 seconds. The Masked Native colt is trained by Cecil Crabtree for owners Cleber J. and Patricia A. Massey. The victory was worth \$24,739.

Prosperous, a 2-year-old filly conditioned by champion trainer Blane Schvaneveldt, battled down the straightaway with Rime, holding off his driving challenge to prevail by a head. The winning time for the 350 yard dash, 17.680, matches the seasonal best time posted by Merganser in the Futurity trials.

A Super Sound Charge-Juno Reward product, Prosperous has two wins in two tries. She won her her only other career start convincingly, breaking her maiden in the trials by three lengths. Saturday's grueling consolation victory was worth \$35,000 in first-place prize money. She is owned by George Aubin of Houston, Texas.

Rime, a Jack Brooks trainee, clung to Prosperous the entire trip, but could not find enough to pass the winner.

Jacky Martin rode the Dash For Cash colt for owner Jacqueline Spencer of Alto. The second-place finish, run in 17.780 seconds, was good for a \$16,000 slice of the purse.

Sailin Star, the second-longest shot on the board at 47-1, surprised the crowd by running a solid third, two lengths behind Rime. Sailin Star, a filly by Sail On Bunny, was one of three consolation entrants from Jack Brooks' barn.

She is owned by Kerry Reed of Levelland, Texas. Her third-place showing was good for an \$11,000 paycheck.

The rest of the Kansas Futurity Consolation field, with jockeys, finished as follows: Rainbow Stakes (Cardoza), Super De Kas (Layton), Dashes Dimples (Myles), Sweet Relief (Nicodemus), Goosebump (Baldillez), Dark Scott (Fuller) and Brilliantly (Sumpter).

School Board considers \$8.2 million budget

Nob Hill Elementary School students will return to school this fall with a new kitchen facility, thanks to the Ruidoso Board of Education.

Board members Stormy Edwards, Don Swalander, Lynn Willard, Mike Morris and Rod Adamson reviewed and approved four different remodeling and maintenance contracts at a special meeting Tuesday.

The Nob Hill kitchen remodel contract was awarded to T.E. Arrington of Ruidoso, for a low bid of \$72,017. The project involves rearrangement of the kitchen, installation of modern plumbing, painting, ceiling repair, new tile and new kitchen appliances.

Superintendent Sid Miller told the board the "ancient utensils" also will be replaced to fix the kitchen as "it should be."

Other physical plant contracts awarded will not be as obvious as the kitchen, but are as essential. Ruidoso Middle School will get a new roof, with Van Winkle Roofing of Roswell doing the job for the low bid of \$53,976.

A roof maintenance contract, which is for two years and requires regular inspection and minor repairs, was awarded to Allen Roofing of Roswell for \$10,500.

To finish the exterior of the Mid-School, J.M. Brook was awarded the bid for \$56,878 to paint and repair.

Miller told the board the projects will be financed by capital improvements funds.

More capital improvement

projects were discussed, with White Mountain elementary and intermediate schools on the list to be repainted, repaired and remodeled. The gym floor also will be considered in the projects.

On May 25, the board, administrators, principals and central office staff met with state officials to review the \$8,275,715 proposed 1988-89 school year budget.

James Sanchez, New Mexico Board of Education member; Bonnie Brock Wood of the state legislative Finance Division; Michael Davis of the Instructional Services Division and Isaac Martinez, an officer of the school Finance Division, were in Ruidoso for the meeting.

Davis commented that Ruidoso is a good accredited school district, despite recent budgetary problems due to a reduced enrollment.

Miller explained the 1988-89 budget process as it related to the district needs and the impact of the Educational Standards of New Mexico and the Reform Act. Budget committee members Judy Radtke, Kay Carter, Cindy Eggleston, June LeCrone, Kathy Travis, Dean Hood and Susan Keeton were recognized.

Miller emphasized the drastic changes and sacrifices in the school programs that were made because of the enrollment decrease of 41 students by the 40-day count last school year. The changes included a 1.5 percent cut in pay across the board, spending cuts in the budget and no additional raises in 1988-89.

Davis commented favorably on the school district's strictness and flexibility in preparing the budget.

Wood commented that with 93 percent of funding coming from the

state, schools must be willing to change and restructure. She added that Ruidoso teachers' salaries are sixth among the state's school districts and first in the state for schools with 1000-2000 students. Davis added there is a great financial burden to support such a high salary ranking.

Davis also discussed competency and curriculum concerns and deficiencies in the district which were met. He noted a 36 percent mobility rate for students in the Ruidoso Schools, a major concern for program and budget considerations.

School finance officer Martinez complimented Snow on her budget preparation and indicated that the budget was well prepared. No changes were made to the proposed budget at the review.

In the proposed budget the teachers' salaries reflect a decrease of two full-time teachers, one special education teacher and the salary cut from last year. Funding for textbooks increased almost \$5000 from last year. Funding for travel was increased.

In all, the direct instruction line items decreased \$3000 from last year, with a total of \$2,902,470.

Instructional support, which includes administrative personnel such as principals, librarians, guidance, special education aides, nurses, secretaries and teachers aides, as well as purchased services, library, supplies and materials and travel, totalled \$580,033 which is \$28,417 less than last year.

The administration line items,

which include the superintendent, administrative assistants, aides and secretaries and services, supplies, travel and board expenses totalled \$195,741 which is \$4,527 more than last year. The increase is due to purchased services, travel and board expenses.

Other budget increases were experienced in plant operation in the heating, electricity, telephone, other purchased services and supplies.

Social security and insurance costs were a major part of the budget increases, mainly in group insurance and workmen's compensation charges.

In the non-instructional student support line item, such as athletics and other activities, the budget increased to \$112,600 from last year's \$105,605. The line item includes travel and other activity expenses for all school activities.

Transportation services will increase due to higher insurance costs, an additional bus and higher operations costs. All funds for transportation are completely reimbursed to the school by the state, said Snow.

Capital outlay projects are half of last year, as some projects, such as the Nob Hill remodel, were completed in the last school year budget. Funds left this year will go for the additional remodels and maintenance.

The grand total budget of \$8,275,715 is \$594,027 less than last year's budget. The decrease reflects the modest 1767 enrollment projected for the 1988-89 school year.

The "Century" portion of the meet will begin at 10 a.m. on June 11. In addition to the top two finishers earning a spot in the state event, average winners will be awarded buckles.

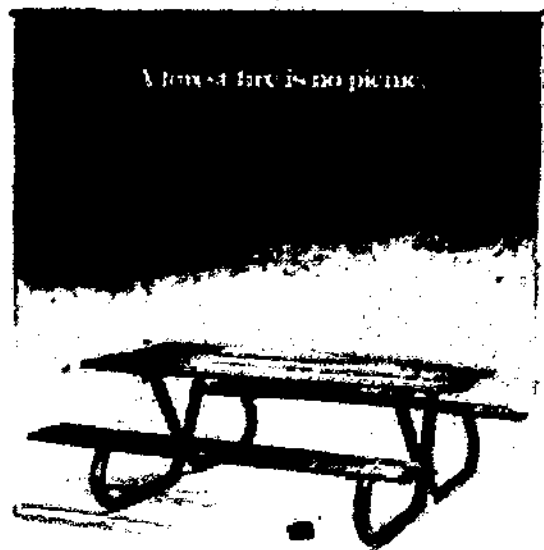
Lincoln County novice roping

RSD seeks ad agency to entice retirees

The Retiree Services Division, (RSD) an arm of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, is expected to make a decision today (Monday) on an advertising agency for its push to attract retirees to Ruidoso.

The group listened to proposals last Tuesday from the Phil Price Advertising agency, based in Lubbock, Texas, and Prime Design Advertising of Roswell.

Roy Crocker, chairman of the group, said he expects some debate on the issue because the Price agency included \$20,000 in its proposed budget that the group hopes to obtain in state matching funds, but still hasn't received. The RSD currently has approximately \$40,000 in its budget, and the Price agency submitted a proposed budget of \$60,000, based on the matching funds.

Crocker, in a sparsely attended meeting at Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center, said the group has a long road to travel before it sees any results of consequence, but that its goal is to see its first retiree relocation within six months of the first ad, which is expected to run in national magazines and newspapers in October. He expects an additional two per month thereafter.


"We've got a whole lot of work to do to handle a very big administrative job," Crocker said.

He also said the group will have full say in directing the ad agency in whatever the group chooses as its theme, and that they plan to

direct a portion of their advertising at various military installations within a 500-mile radius of Ruidoso.

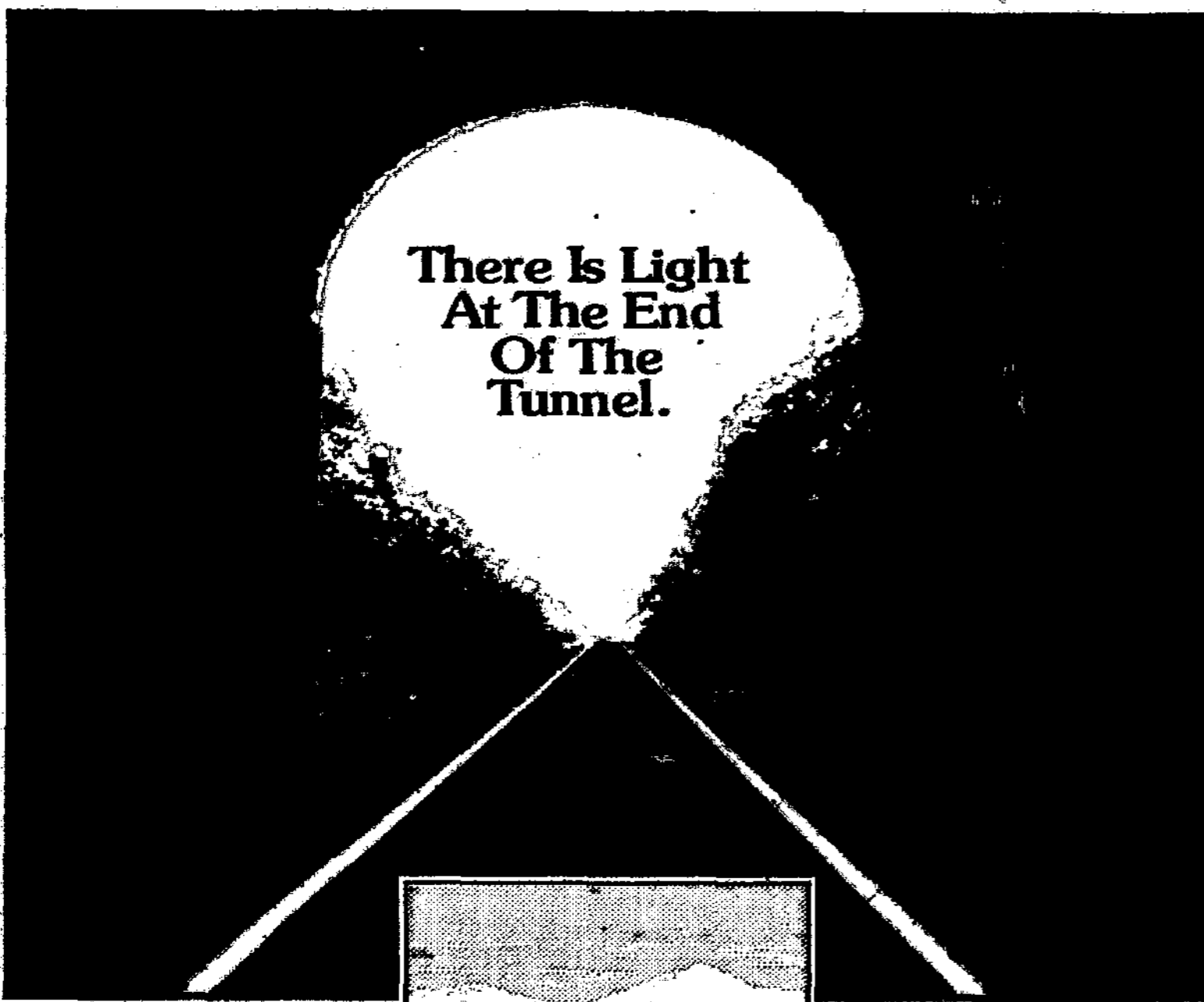

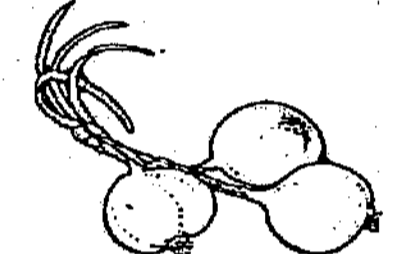

A Word About New Mexican Cooking

Dead fish turn up in Rio Ruidoso, Upper Canyon

Environmentalists investigate

State environmentalists were in Ruidoso late last week to investigate reports of hundreds of dead fish in an Upper Canyon stretch of the Rio Ruidoso.

"We lost about a mile of river," said Miles McInnis, Southeastern area fisheries biologist with the New Mexico Game and Fish Department. McInnis said all the fish were dead from the second Upper Canyon bridge up to North Loop Road. He estimated the loss at 2,000 fish.

McInnis did some preliminary testing Thursday, but said he isn't ready to talk about possible causes. He said he'll be working in Ruidoso on Monday and Tuesday. McInnis notified the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) and the Army Corps of Engineers.

Charles L. McAdoo, an Upper Canyon resident, said he noticed

the dead fish last Wednesday in a pool right below his Singing Pines home. McAdoo said he saw the water muddied and then the dead fish.

"We reported it to Village Hall," said McAdoo.

Jim Edwards of the Ruidoso office of the EID also did some field testing. He checked the pH levels in several locations, identifying a trend. Checking from the reservation line to Two Rivers Park, Edwards said the level was lower above the point where dead fish were found and higher where the fish were dying.

pH measurements indicate how acid or alkaline the solution is, with the low end (0) being acid and the high end (14) basic, or alkaline.

Although village crews were installing new water lines in the Upper Canyon, investigators didn't note any connection between that project and the changes that apparently were killing fish.

The hearing was in district court in Alamogordo, where Surratt has remained in Otero County Jail since February, when he was charged with the February 20 murder of Chavez, a 15-year-old neighbor and classmate.

After testimony from San Patricio neighbors and Lincoln County Sheriff's Office investigators, Doughty made his ruling. He released Surratt into the custody of family members with the terms that he remain outside of Lincoln County for his own protection until the murder trial.

The case will be heard within 90 days in Childrens Court before District Judge Richard A. Parsons in Carrizozo.

Assistant District Attorney Scot Key said Doughty acted "according to state law." Key added the state had to have "probable cause" to try Surratt as an adult.

Surratt's attorney Gary C. Mitchell said he was "extremely happy" and looking forward to the trial. He said the hearing gave even more evidence of Surratt's innocence.

Mitchell maintained Surratt's innocence, claiming investigators involved with the case can solve the murder with the cooperation of the people in Hondo Valley.

"There is no state's evidence to find him guilty," Mitchell opined.

Mitchell added the reason for removing Surratt from Lincoln County was the "fear that the people who killed Katina might kill him (Surratt)."

"The hearing was good," Mitchell said, adding the hearing helped the Chavez family realize Surratt's defense is not trying to hurt them.

"The people (in the Valley) realize there is no case against Surratt and that we're trying to find the killers," Mitchell concluded.

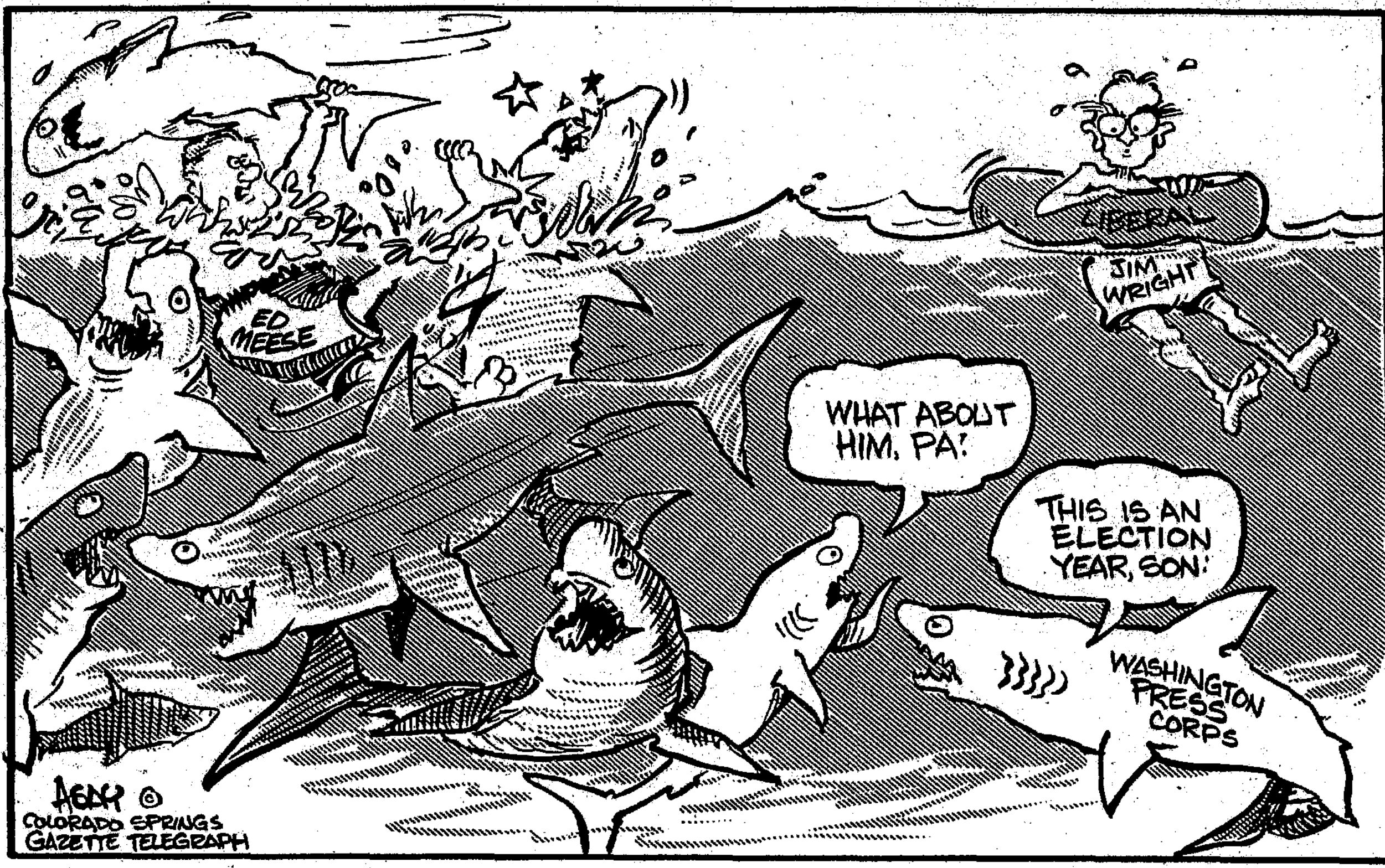

Eye On The Capitol

"MONTHLY FOLLOW UP"

State representative Barbara Casey (Democrat, Chaves and Eddy), wrote me about **Eye on The Capitol's** three-part series on New Mexico's lady legislators. Casey is one of the eleven female lawmakers in Santa Fe. She is also a Roswell teacher, and has sued to invalidate Attorney General Hal Stratton's Opinion that public school employees can't be legislators. On May 20, District Judge Bruce Kaufman let stand Casey's lawsuit. The case will be heard in a few months.

"I really feel you 'captured' our personalities quite well," Casey wrote. "Perhaps it's because you're both sympathetic and empathetic." Well, you know teachers: then came the inevitable "however":

"I do have one minor correction -- I lost my first election by one vote and won by three votes on the recount, not 48. (48 would have been much better!)"

I remembered the loss and recount, alright. It was even on TV. So, why did it say 48?

I looked at the 1984 elections returns book printed by the Secretary of State's Office. The correct totals: 2,693 for Casey, 2,690 for Salas.

Then I noticed something. The vote tallies are handwritten. "9" looks a lot like "4" and "7". And the harder I stared, the more a "1" resembled a "7".

Darn that Secretary of State, I sympathetically and empathetically reasoned. It's all her fault. Not for the Casey/Salas numbers, but rather for those on my VISA statement: \$349.72 for bifocals from Ancient City Opticians in Santa Fe.

That number, sadly enough, is very correct.

Mr. Perfect. **Eye on The Capitol** for May 6 gave the 1988 attendance records of all 70 state representatives for roll call votes on the State House floor. I couldn't find a single absence, excused or unexcused, for Representative Lee Rawson (Republican, Dona Ana).

Was I right? I called Rawson. "I did not miss anything -- for sure," he said. Was Rawson consciously trying to set a standard? "I didn't make it a point to have perfect attendance," he said, "but the end result is the same."

Mr. Perfect's philosophy: "My number one responsibility is to be there. . . I will not walk on a vote. I'll take the heat." They say records are made to be broken.

But Lee Rawson's never will be.

Another case of perfection? **Eye** reported that the state Democratic Party now has nearly completed a computerized voter file with the phone number and verified mailing address for each registered voter in New Mexico.

Early this month, I had the opportunity to see some of the voter lists. I pulled a random sample, and checked the phone numbers and mailing addresses.

Those I examined were 100% correct. Anybody who ever worked with big computer lists knows that's a remarkable achievement. **Eye** gave credit to Anne Watkins, Executive Director of the Democratic Party, and her numerous volunteers. Recognition must also go to Research and Polling, Inc., based in Albuquerque: they performed the computer work.

Back in March, Anne Watkins told me the project was "well off the ground."

"If they use the data," I wrote, "Democratic candidates will find themselves in a similar condition."

Hot primaries. I started the series on primary elections around New Mexico because there was no central place for information about legislative candidates.

Sure, if you live in Clayton, Angel Fire or Tucuman, you will get news about the local state senate battle of incumbent Johnny Morrow.

If you live outside the Morrow district, too bad.

I don't mind telling you, I had strong doubts about doing it. Would anybody in Artesia, Carlsbad or Portales, for example, care about the Morrow race? Or vice-versa?

I am happy to report that not a single person complained about the series. Quite the opposite. "You are onto something," one editor told me.

Regions should stand up for their interests. But only by knowing what's going on elsewhere in New Mexico, can you really understand what's happening in your own area.

And in finding out about other places, the New Mexico interest emerges.

Several editors have asked me about the political aspirations of Congressman Bill Richardson. They were curious because they are receiving press releases from the congressman's office, even though

their newspapers are not located in Richardson's district.

On Saturday, May 21, the congressman and I met for 45 minutes at the El Dorado Hotel, near the Capitol.

He is seriously considering running for either the governorship or, if vacated, the U.S. Senate seat presently held by Pete Domenici.

But a Richardson for governor or senator campaign is by no means a certainty. He just may decide to hang onto his seat in Congress.

In the political business, the tide can change swiftly. Example: only a year and a half ago, **The Gallup Report** showed that among Demo-

crats and Democratic leaners, Gary Hart was the leading contender for the Democratic nomination with 53%, followed by Lee Iacocca (29%), Mario Cuomo (23%), Jesse Jackson (21%), Bill Bradley (11%), Charles Robb (6%), Sam Nunn (5%), Dale Bumpers (4%). A gentleman named Michael Dukakis was the choice of only 3%. (Jan. Feb., 1987, pp. 28-29).

Richardson is an astute and pragmatic politician. He'll see how the waters are moving, and make his decision at the appropriate time.

That means this: it won't be tomorrow.

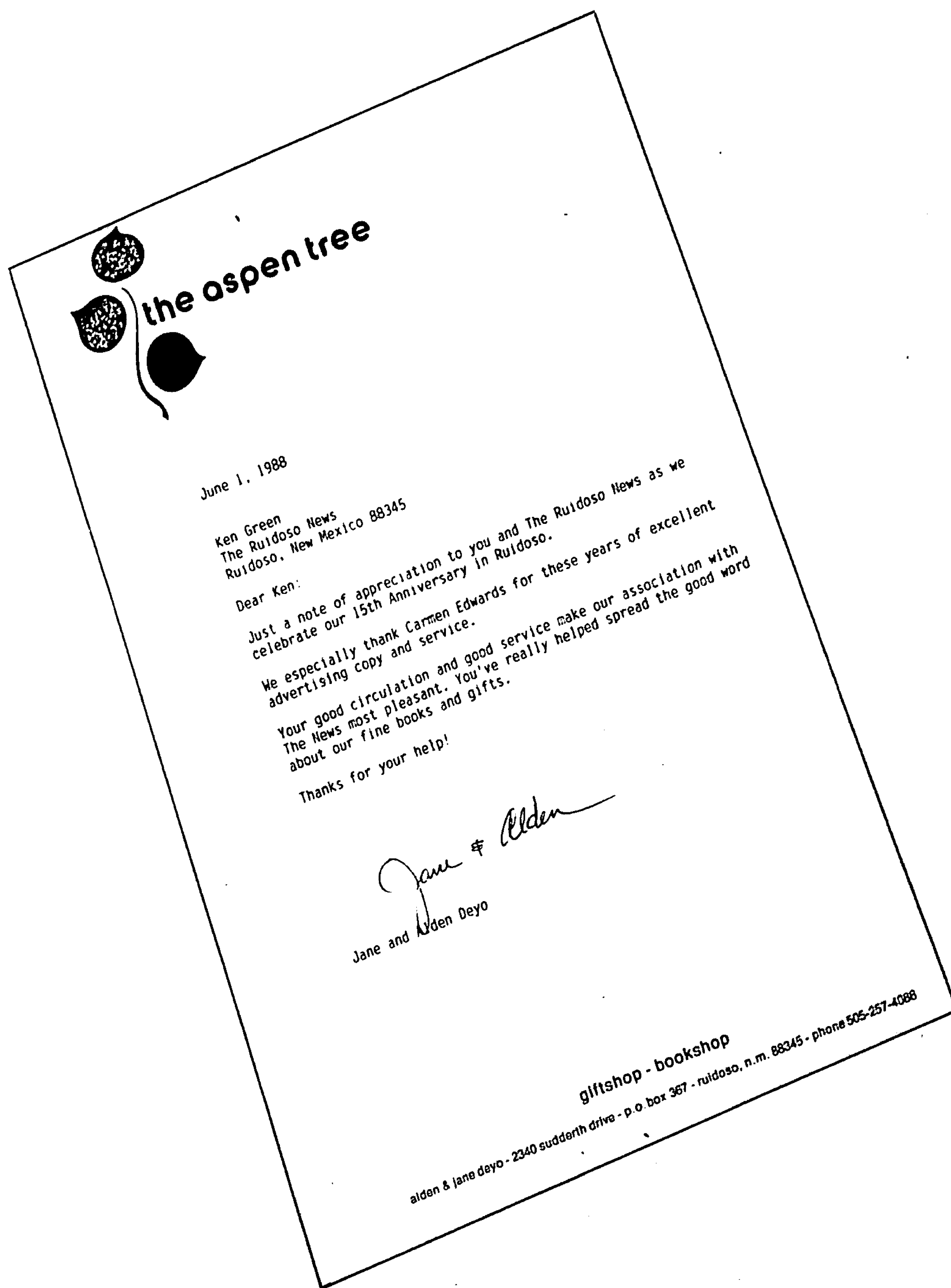
