Chelsea Area Chamber of Commerce, instrumental in a campaign to encourage registration of local voters for the March 8 general election, will sponsor a Candidates Night Tuesday, Feb. 23, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Chelsea Milling Company's auditorium. At this time, village residents will have the opportunity to meet the 11 candidates seeking village office this coming March.

Firemen Help With Eight Calls

Chelsea Fire Department made a total of eight runs last week, including five rescues and three fire calls.

According to Chamber of Commerce President Sam Johnson, the purpose of this special event is to give interested voters the opportunity to meet those persons seeking village office, incumbents and newcomers alike. This is the first time in recent memory that such an opportunity has been afforded to the general public and the candidates scheduled to vie for their offices in March.

A brief introductory statement or biographical sketch of each candidate will also be heard prior to audience questions and their subsequent responses.

Both Johnson and Rademacher encourage local voters to take part in this special Candidates Night that should provide personal insights and familiarity with the candidates prior to casting ballots at the polls on Monday, March 8.

Chamber of Commerce Board member, William Rademacher, will serve as the master of ceremonies for Candidates Night and will ask each candidate a battery of questions. Each candidate will be notified of the questions to be posed prior to the special meeting so as to formulate some general thoughts, opinions and possible statements upon each query.

Eleven persons have filed petitions as candidates for the eight positions in Chelsea government. John W. Merkel will run unopposed for the office of village president. The three trustee positions to be filled will be elected from the six candidates who have filed.

These six include Stephanie Kanten, Loren Keezer and Joseph Merkel who are incumbent trustees. Others in the trustee contest will include Imael Picklesimer, Herman C. Radloff and Jeanene Riemenschneider.

Incumbent Mary Harris will run unopposed for the office of treasurer. Charles B. Winans, II, will seek another two-year term as assessor.

Fire Dept. Has 24 Calls For January

Chelsea Fire Department reports that a total of 24 runs were made during the month of January. This is 12 runs more than were made one year ago.

Types of calls included 11 rescue requests, two downed wires, one automatic alarm, eight building fires, one rekindled fire and one electrical fire.

By locality, a total of three rescue runs and four fire calls were answered within Chelsea.

Sylvan township was the site of one rescue run and two building fires while two rescues were made to Lima township.

Chelsea firemen handled one building fire in Dexter township and two rescues and three fires were located in Lyndon township.

Variety of Vocational Courses Offered by S & W Consortium

Education in Chelsea is not exclusively open to reading, writing and arithmetic. Instead, a wide spectrum of courses also deal with the aspect of training the individual to live independently, to enter the job market with any number of skills and to be prepared for further educational opportunities.

Vocational Education in Chelsea is the one of the avenues open to the high school student who is eager to become skilled in any of more than a dozen career options and their affiliated preparatory courses. It is an

educational tool adopted to prepare students for future employment.

The week of Feb. 8-12 was designated as Vocational Education Week within the South and West Washtenaw Consortium, of which Chelsea is a part. The consortium is a combination of the vocational education, guidance and administrative resources of five school districts in Washtenaw county, including Chelsea, Dexter, Manchester, Milan and Saline.

The specific purpose of the consortium is to create and imple-

ment quality vocational education programs for the youth served by these districts. By coordinating the various physical facilities and educational resources contained in the separate school districts, the consortium is able to extend to students a large variety of training opportunities in what is broad scope by allowing students to enroll in courses given at the high schools in any of the five member school districts.

There is a considerable flexibility offered to the students with respect to types of courses

available. Thirteen career fields and more than 100 occupational choices are presently represented in the vocational education programs, each entailing a number of courses designed to teach and develop career related skills and experience.

Through these courses, students are prepared either to enter "chosen vocations" upon graduation from high school or to enter post-secondary training programs, such as those offered at junior colleges, technical institutes or four-year colleges.

Each year, well over 900 students participate in the programs offered by the consortium.

Public vocational/occupational education trains youth and adults for employment in fields ranging from the semi-skilled to the skilled, technical and semiprofessional. It also teaches consumer skills. Programs are offered at both the secondary and post-secondary levels and are administered by locally elected boards.

Training emphasis is primarily in occupations for which a demand exists in Michigan business and industry. Historically, in Michigan, manual training, agriculture, home economics, industrial and health occupations have been taught since the early 1900's.

At Chelsea High school, a number of vocational education programs are offered to interested students. These programs include agricultural production and the agricultural co-operative component, auto mechanics, building trades, the

Immunization Clinic Set For Feb. 25

At its Jan. 18 meeting, the Chelsea Board of Education passed a resolution which will exclude from school attendance on April 13 all students who are new to the Chelsea School District who have not presented evidence of required immunizations. This Board action is in compliance with state law.

To assist parents in obtaining proper immunization for their children prior to the April 13 exclusion date, the Chelsea School District, in co-operation with the Washtenaw County Health Department, will offer a free immunization clinic on Thursday, Feb. 25, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon at Chelsea High school. The date of the clinic has been changed from Feb. 13 following the heavy snowfall and resulting school closure.

Pre-schoolers over the age of two months are welcome to participate in this clinic.

Parents are urged to review the immunization of their children and, if necessary, to update them in order to comply with the law.

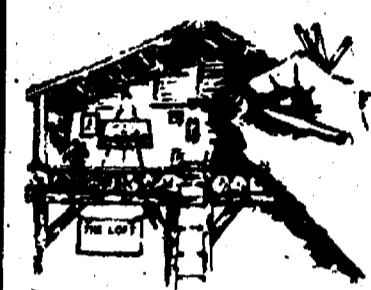

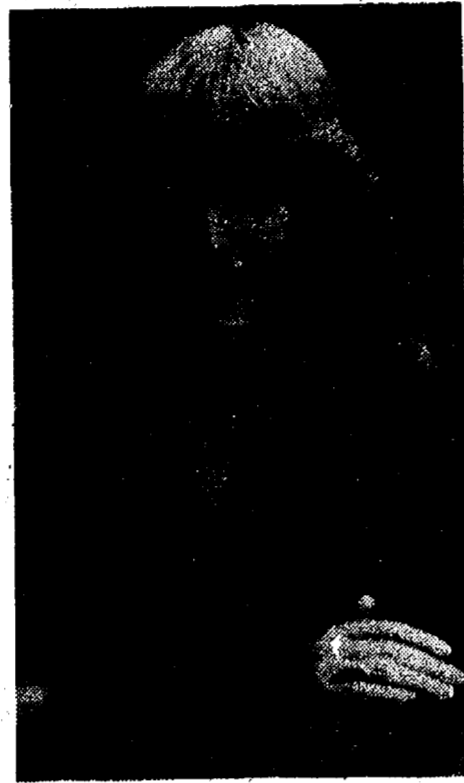

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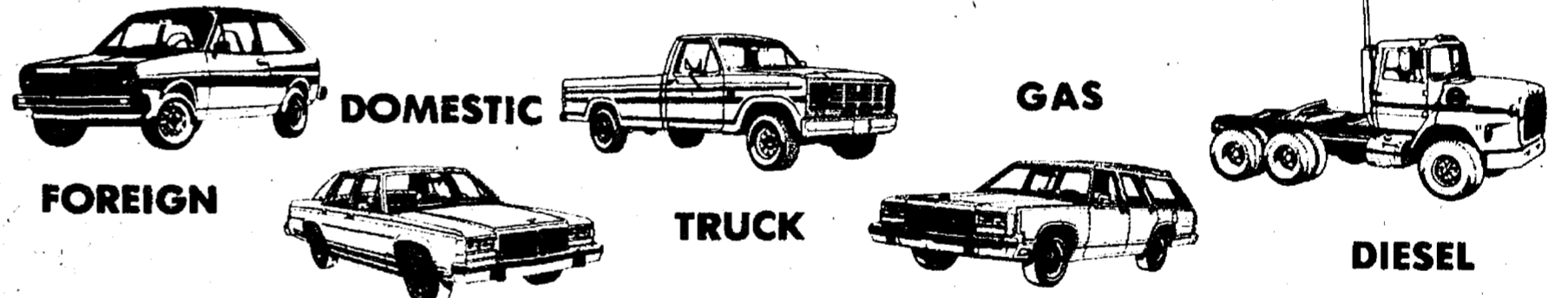

Variety of Vocational Courses Offered by S & W Consortium

trained and industrial co-operative, health careers, nurses aide, home economics and the stenography, steno-clerical and office co-operative components.
The following is a brief course description of two basic pro-

grams offered at Chelsea High school.
Students studying Health Careers are provided with an avenue to better understand the health community, to develop skills and to gain knowledge directly related to career choice and to gain understanding of con-

structive interpersonal relationships.
Health Careers includes theory followed by clinical experience and health care exploration through classroom exposure and clinical rotation, emphasizing the diversity of disciplines in the health field. Opportunities in

selected specialty areas are provided and prepare students to function as nursing assistants, thereby affording experiences which may be required to enter the chosen health field. As a direct result, students are provided with the opportunity to gain self-awareness, self-assessment, career awareness, career exploration and career decision-making skills.

According to instructor Judy Oakes, "Our students are fortunate to have the support of community resources, specifically that of Chelsea Community Hospital, Family Practice Center, and the Chelsea United Methodist Retirement Home. Placements in local doctor's offices have also begun this year. Positive support of these school programs contributes significantly to the success of this and all vocational education programs."

Another example of the local vocational education programs is Ann O'Hagan's Consumer Home Economics courses that are designed for a number of reasons including 1.) a large segment of the population chooses homemaking as a career; 2.) everyone needs to learn the basic skills for personal, independent living; and 3.) it serves as a preparatory avenue for a number of other related occupations. A total of three foods classes encompass commercial foods, consumer buying and nutrition.

Three clothing classes are also taught and include such things as alterations and garment construction. Interior decorating includes blueprint and floor plan reading, decorating styles, art principles and elements, colors, furniture and floral arrangement, participation in a national table setting contest and the like. A highlight to this section of the Consumer Home Economics program will include the complete design of a front window at Merkel's Furniture and Carpets.

Your World and Money is the name of a popular consumer class which includes money management, insurance purchase, savings and investments and banking and includes a mock banking experience through the help of Chelsea State Bank which assists with the class-designated checking projects.

A child care class provides participants with practical experience through work at the Chelsea Community Hospital Child Care Center while a parent readiness program offers students the opportunity to understand the responsibility of parenthood including child development in the social, emotional, physical and intellectual spheres. Another class, Marriage and Family, is a course which emphasizes personal living.

Of those students studying Consumer Home Economics, the foods classes are composed of boys while Your World and Money is comprised of half boys and half girls. The other courses offered are usually made up of a majority of girls.

These and all vocational education classes are designed to teach participants some of the basic elements of the field(s) covered and practical field work is emphasized as a key to the learning experience.

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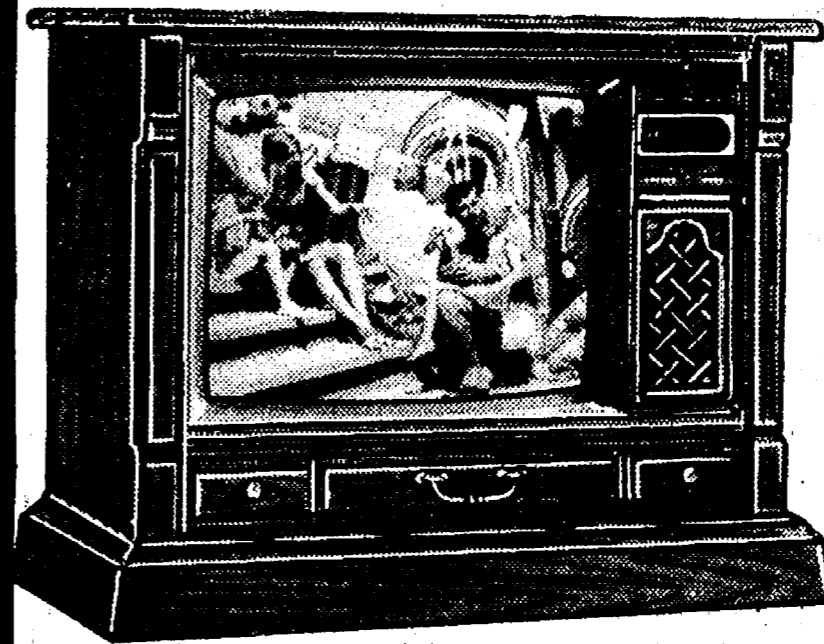

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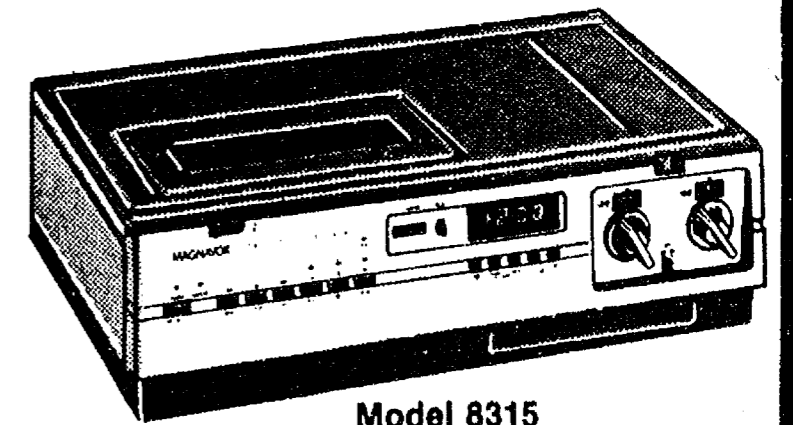


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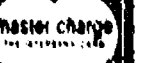
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Albert Schiller To Be Honored On 90th Birthday

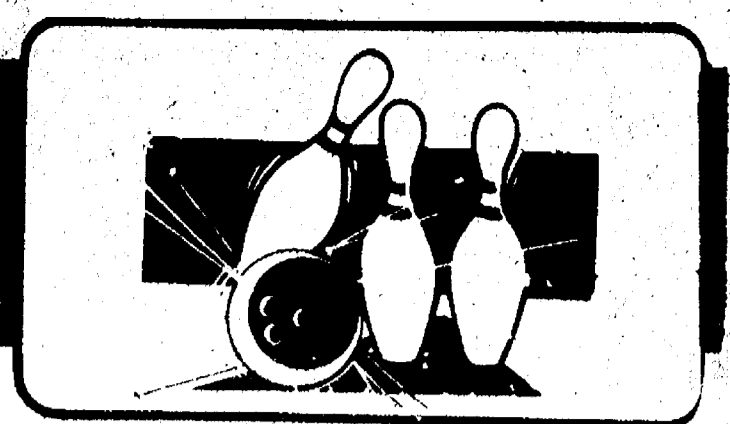
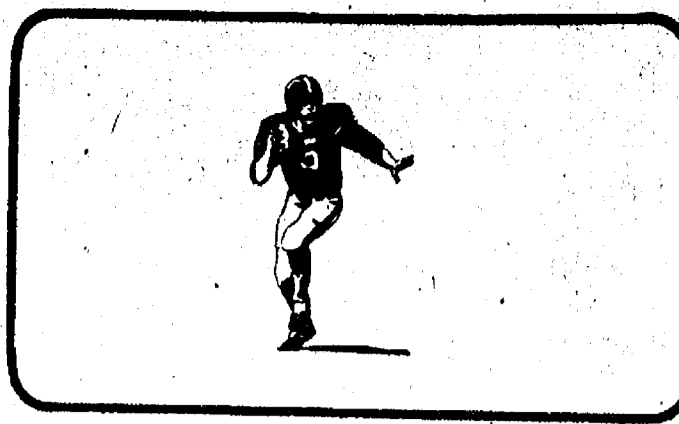

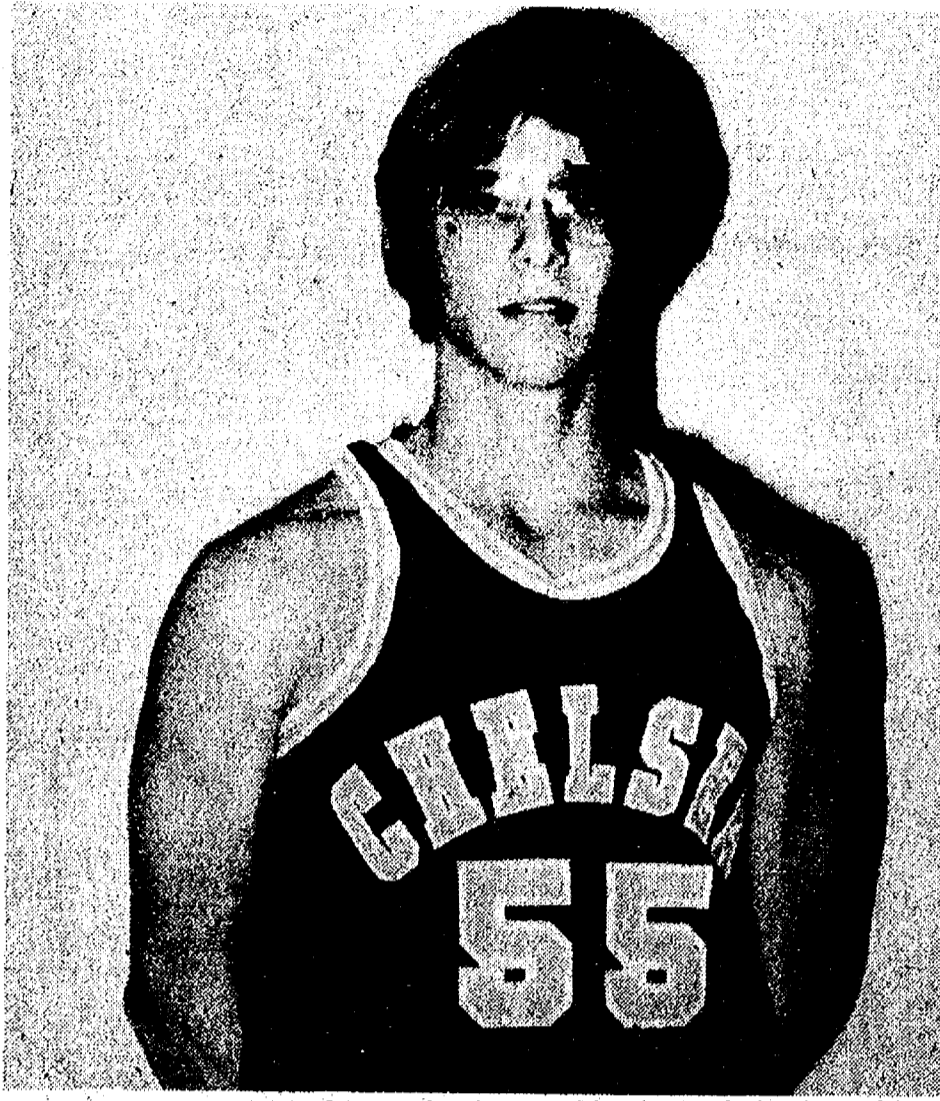

By the fourth quarter, Chelsea

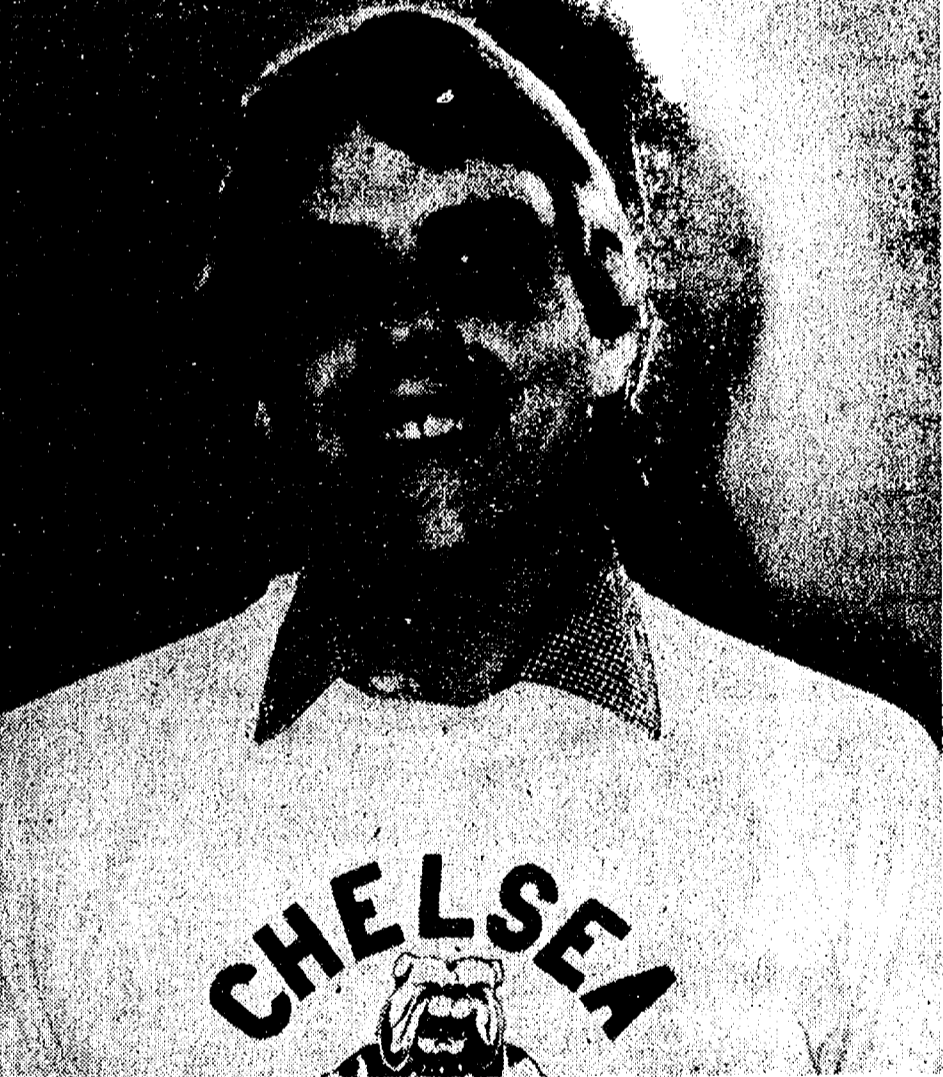

Today's Investor

Q. Two years ago I reasoned that the companies which would have the fastest growing business and make the most money would be the companies that made equipment for drilling oil wells. As I looked at the different companies I came to the conclusion that Hughes Tool was a company solidly in that business and it had a good record. I bought shares in the company at \$28 1/2. The stock has been up as high as \$48, but has dropped back steadily from that price, and as I write this letter it is just \$32. As I look at the figures the company seems to have done very well, but I thought the stock price would really grow. Did I do something wrong?
A. In my opinion, your reasoning was excellent. And the company has done an excellent job in living up to your expectations. In just the two years since you bought the stock, revenues have grown from \$805 million to \$1,759 million. That is more than doubling in just two years. Earnings per share have grown even faster. They were \$1.94 a share in 1979 when you bought the stock and this past year were \$4.60. You will have a hard time finding a stock that has done much better than that. I can understand your concern since that kind of record could be expected to produce a two or three times increase in the price of the stock.
As I read remarks by various security analysts, I believe the problem is that a good number of them, particularly those who heavily influence institutional buying, have come to the conclusion that the reduction in the use of oil that has taken place will soon be reflected in a big drop in the volume of drilling for oil, and this in turn will produce a substantial drop in demand for Hughes products.
There may be some truth in such thinking. However, I would guess that any let up in drilling for oil will be temporary. The world is still likely to continue to use oil in substantial quantities. The supply of oil in the world is limited and while a temporary glut is producing a decline in prices, it would seem like the long term trend in price and demand is still up. Also there is a lot of pressure to increase the supply of oil in areas of the world that are more secure for Western markets.
Hughes Tool has been a very well managed company, and my guess is that you will see its stock price go higher.

Farmers, Fishermen Must File Income Tax Return Soon

Certain farmers and commercial fishermen must file their 1981 federal income tax returns and pay tax due by March 1, 1982, the Internal Revenue Service says.
Persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1980 or 1981 gross income from farming or fishing and did not make an estimated tax declaration by Jan. 18, 1982 (or who made a declaration by Jan. 18, 1982 and underestimated their liability) must file their return and pay all tax due by March 1, 1982, to avoid paying a penalty.
Free IRS Publication 225, Farmer's Tax Guide, 525, Tax Guide for Commercial Fishermen, and 505, Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax, provide additional information.

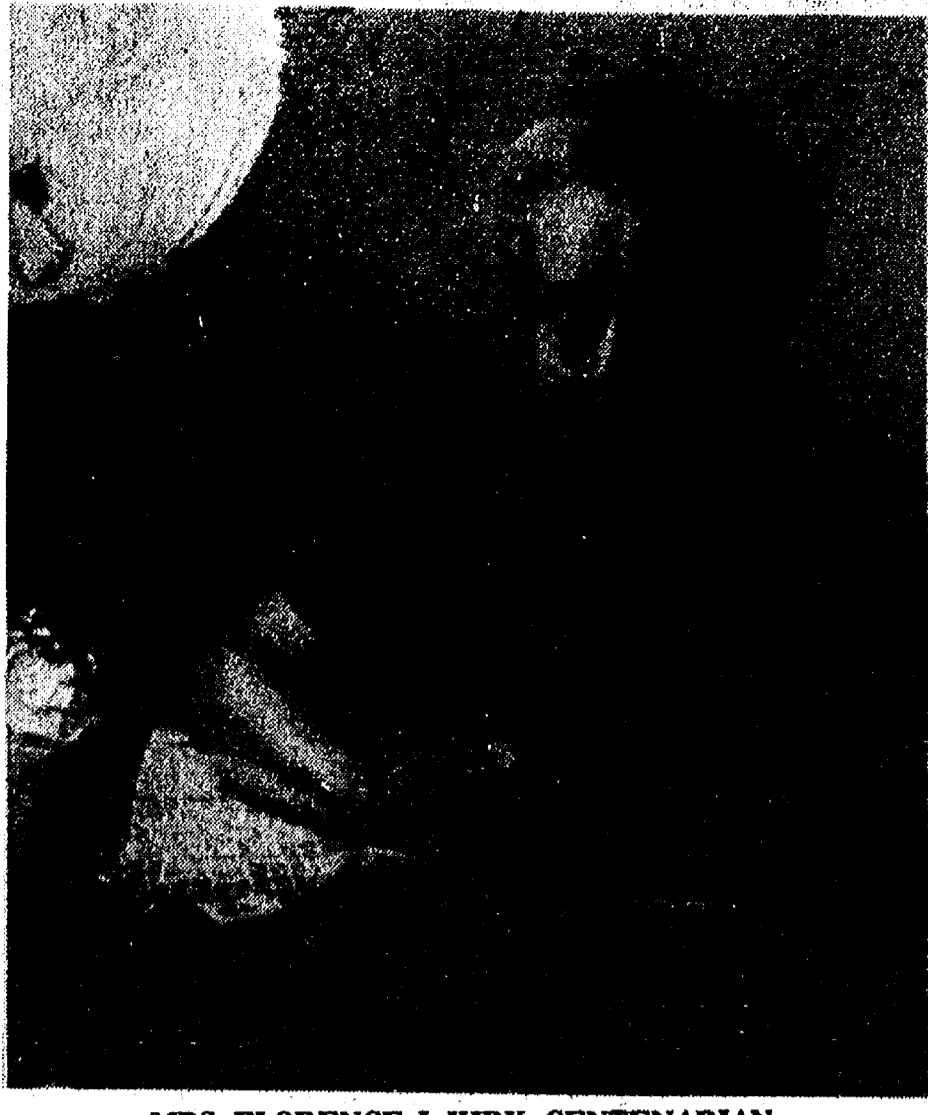
