Several weeks ago when the Niles Days Committee held their first meeting to receive and consider requests from the various organizations, both private and public, for a share of the funds which may be made during the 1967 Niles Days festivities, there appeared on the floor of the village chambers an administrator from the Old Orchard School for Unfortunate Children. Mrs. Malloy made a plea for much needed funds to further the education of these unfortunate children, and she reminded the audience that several children from the Village of Niles attend, and that further, both Skokie and Morton Grove contribute to the support of this school every year. Shouldn't the All American City consider its own image?

During the past year the public officials, Chamber of Commerce, and the citizens of Niles have held their heads high with pride in the selection of our town as the All American City. I wonder if in our zealotness we have not overlooked the fact that in being an All American City, it requires more than political speeches, back-slapping, new industry, improved lighting on Milwaukee Avenue, and an excellent public works Department to retain the title and stature that goes with it.

Compassion and thoughtfulness for our unfortunate citizens is necessary.

Presently the local organizations in the village are preparing for the November 7, 1966 meeting of the Niles Days Committee. If rumors are correct, they have already decided among themselves as to how they shall vote on the "spots," and if possible who will get what percentage. One group is seeking a civic center for meeting purposes. Is it necessary when we now have a new library with a large meeting room available, a park district with several rooms, and the Village Chambers also? Next we have the large American Legion Post who desires to open a Youth Center. Shouldn't the Park Commissioners be considering this matter?

May I suggest that on November 7, 1966, a Monday evening, the good citizens of Niles who perhaps do not belong to a local organization, but year after year support the Niles Days activities, express their voices in support of 100% aid to the Orchard School for Retarded Children. This is a most philanthropic endeavor, which requires your wholehearted support. The cost to educate these children is enormous, and without your help their educational activities and those of other youngsters in this unfortunate condition who wish to enter the school will be hampered.

I am sure that the All Americans of Niles can help support their own.

Niles At 'Cleaner Air' Luncheon

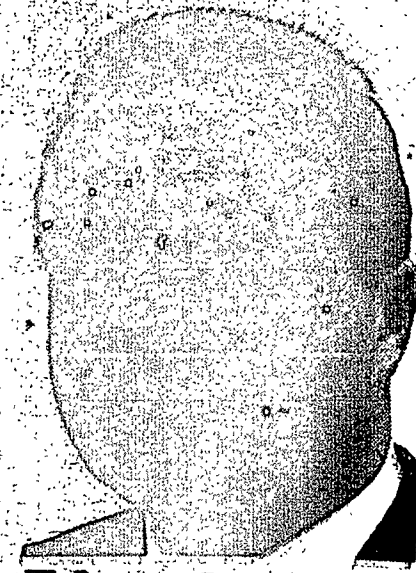
Niles was one of 12 communities represented at the October 24, Cleaner Air Week Luncheon sponsored by the Chicago Association of Commerce and Industry.

From The Left Hand

You wait in line for 45 minutes and that old military syndrome returns.

We showed up at the poll at the temple on Lyons Street on the Niles-Morton Grove border. And the old grooving and griping of 20 years ago when three years of your life seemed like one long line, returned swiftly. As first you laughed and said you were exercising your great American right - standing in line. But the girls in the line weren't quite as jovial. One beckoned those in front to hurry up and get inside, since she was feeling the dampness. She wasn't too happy when she was told the room inside was cluttered with fellow-voters.

The guy in front of me was a veteran of three wars, and regarded our remark of "standing in line" as that of a rookie. He was retired as a "chieft" after the Korean War, and let us know he didn't mind a bit standing in line. But unlike most chiefs we'd met this guy could laugh at himself. He told his wife of 48 years they'd better hurry up and vote as "they were soon ready for the grave". In the span of five minutes we found out without solicitation he was married almost half a century, that "this gal" waited ten years to marry him, that he was the oldest chief on the Narragansett, an aircraft carrier, that the Rabbi was a great chess player...and if we knew of any chess players to send them over to a Glenview Park where the games were hot and heavy. He gave sage advice on other subjects. He thought we should get in and bomb "the hell out of the Vietnamese" and he was sure the Chinese are bluffing and we should turn the world over to the admirals, who knew more about what was going on than "those guys who went to West Point."

While we were still in line "the chief" began marking his judge's ballot. When we verbally reported his markings to the rest of the line one of the judges objected to these public announcements but he said he didn't know why he objected, just that he "knew it was wrong". When we asked "the Chief" about his judge selections he said, "If a guys gotta Irish name he must be okay". He then proceeded to vote "No" after John Boyle's name saying, "I don't like that guy". While we followed one of the local Chicago newspaper's judges sections we weren't convinced "the chief's" method was not just as good as ours.

Monday night we met our daughter's teachers at Maine East. In retrospect we went away from the school equally impressed as we were last year. While some teachers spoke only in terms of grades, adjustment, participation, "the child is out going", one teacher gave us an excellent report which confirms much of the testing results we've seen thru the years. Often it has crossed our mind whatever happened to the myriads of tests of aptitude we took when we went to school. We

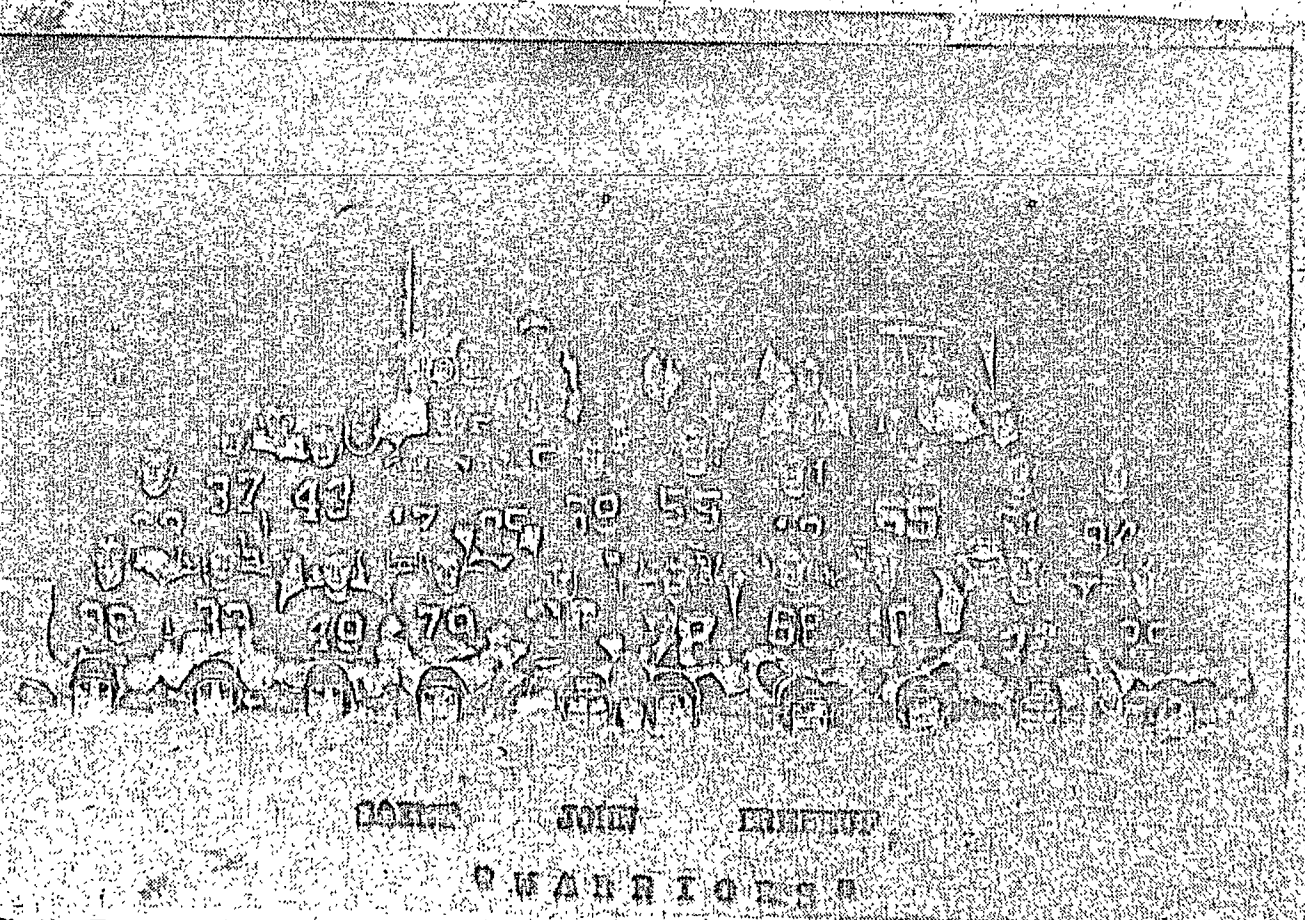

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Carroll, Simmons, Juckett, Warman Local Winners

As of Wednesday morning with half the polls reporting in Maine Township, Republican Chuck Percy led incumbent Senator Paul Douglas by a 3 to 1 margin, 18,641 to 6,491 with 51 of 110 precincts reporting. In normality, Democratic Niles Township Percy also led Douglas 10,507 to 8,137 with 42 of 113 precincts recorded. In the state treasurer's race Adlai Stevenson III was behind his opponent Harris Rowe by a 2-to-1 margin in Maine Township, while leading by 2,000 votes in Niles Township.

Locally, Park Ridge publisher Bill Carroll defeated Skokie attorney Phil Goldstick. While returns were not complete Carroll led THE BUGLE he expected a 4 to 1 or 5 to 1 margin in Park Ridge, his home area, while conceding Goldstick would win by about 2,000 votes in Niles Township.

In the race for the state house, incumbent Republican Arthur Simmons led all candidates. Newcomer Bob Juckett, a Park Ridge attorney and alderman, was also elected, as was incumbent Ed Warman, the Lone Democrat.

At Maine Township Democratic headquarters Tuesday night, Committeeman Nick Blase told his workers he was "very happy" with their efforts. He congratulated all the workers for their efforts and said, "the next 4 years we will do better."

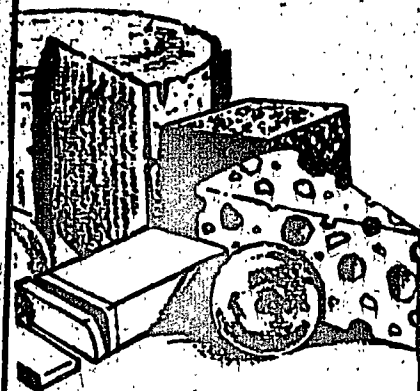

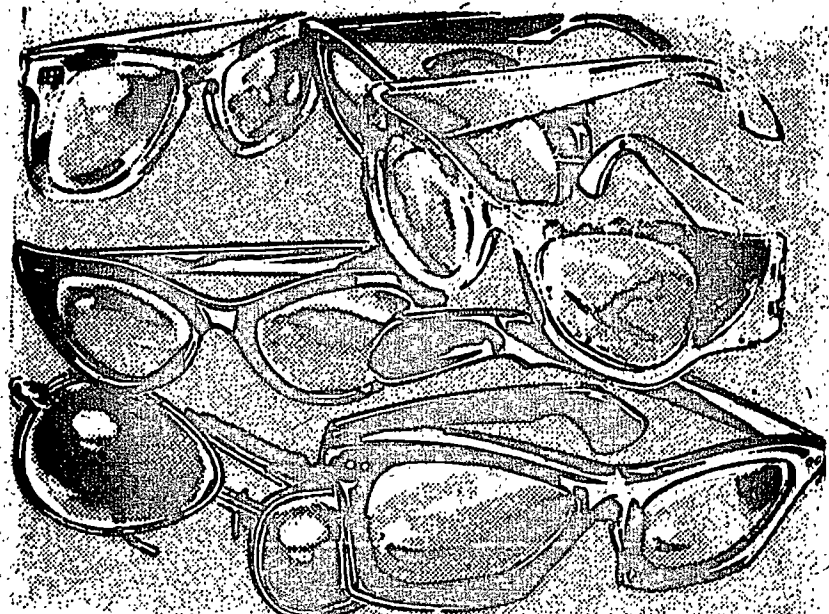
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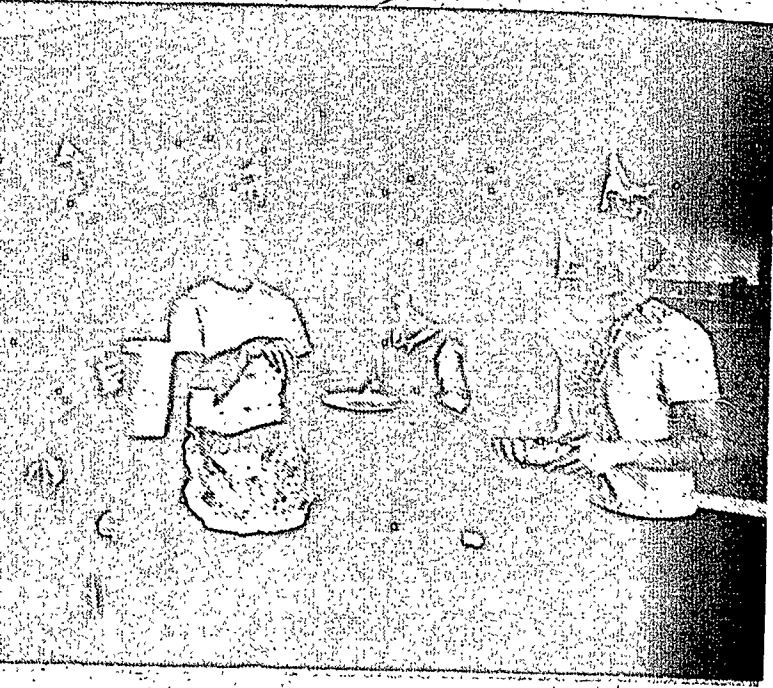

Teen Center To Open Nov 10

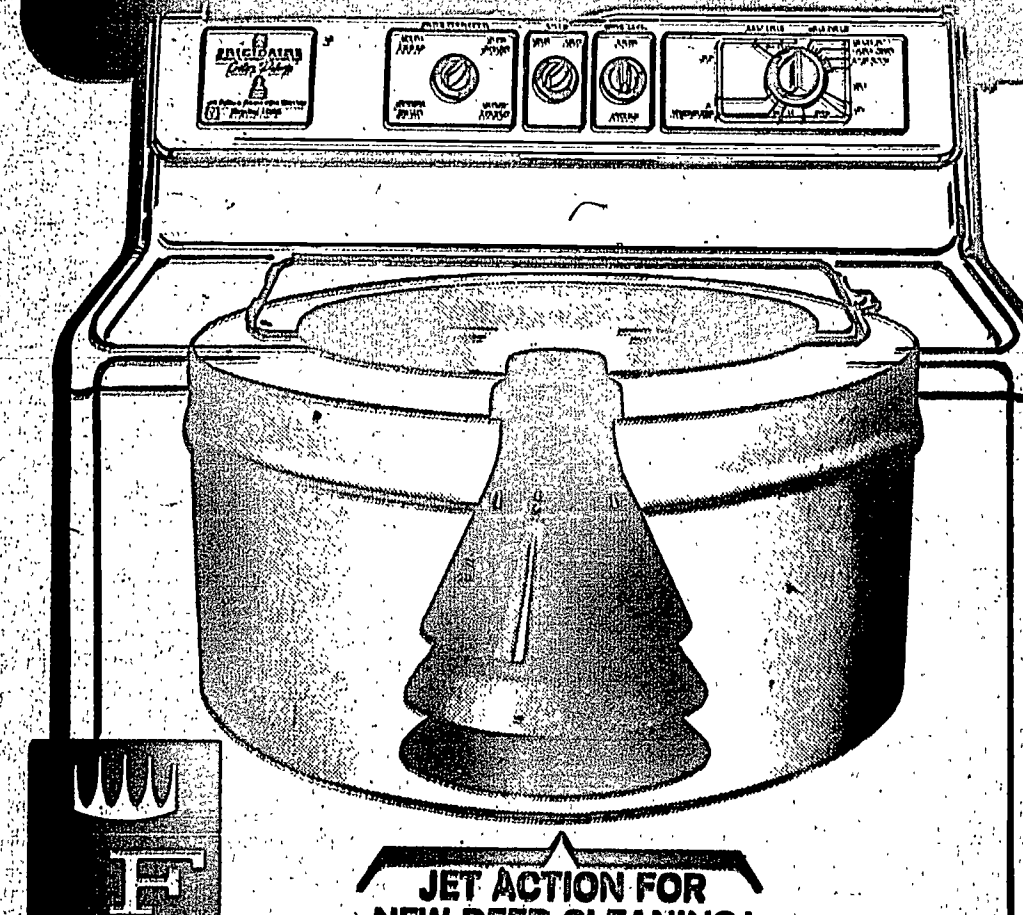

Ray Elliot assumed duties as Assistant Director of Athletics at the University of Illinois January 1, 1960, following retirement from active coaching after 28 years of service, 23 of which were at his alma mater, Illinois.

As head football coach at Illinois from 1942 through 1959, Elliot won or shared three Big Ten titles, and produced decisive victories in the two Rose Bowl games in which his teams appeared. Earlier, while serving as one of Bob Zuppke's line coaches, he also was head hockey coach and assistant baseball coach.

Elliot graduated from the University of Illinois in 1932 and started his coaching career at Illinois College, Jacksonville. He served one year as assistant football coach, then was promoted to the head coach.

Science-In-Service Report At Dist. 63 Meeting

New Guinea Missionary To Speak At St. John Lutheran

The Reverend Pastor Otto Hintze, former missionary to New Guinea, and now a professor at Concordia Seminary at Springfield, Illinois, will deliver the sermons at St. John Lutheran Church, 7423 North Milwaukee Avenue, on Sunday November 13th, at 8 a.m., and 10:30 a.m. There will be an illustrated lecture between the two services, beginning at 9:15 a.m. The public is invited to any of these.

Pastor Hintze received his call to New Guinea in 1948, and served the area near Wabag in the Western Highlands. He spent over 14 years at Yaramanda during which time he helped give the people a written language (Enga) and with God's help established 8 congregations and a number of preaching stations. He trans-

lated a Bible History and the Standard Scripture Lessons for reading on Sundays, other parts of the Bible, Luther's Small Catechism and congregational orders of worship while at Yaramanda. He moved to Irelya at the beginning of 1963 to take up work of translating Scriptures and other literature. He wrote a short introductory grammar and a longer one of the Enga Language with an abridged dictionary for use in teaching fellow staff members to speak the Enga; developed lessons for this purpose also; taught a 3 month course to 71 new and old fellow missionaries. He helped check the translation of four books of the New Testament and translated two of them. During the summer of 1966, while on furlough, he attended a Summer Institute of the Linguistic course at the University of Oklahoma, and wrote a booklet on baptism among the Enga people.

Pastor Hintze is married, and the father of 5 children. His wife is a teacher, and has helped with women's work in the mission in New Guinea, grew fruit to assist other missionary families.

Before arriving in the States for a furlough the Hintze family traveled through southeast Asia and other countries. In January of 1966, they moved to Springfield Illinois, where Reverend Hintze began work in his new calling as Professor of Missions, at Concordia Theological Seminary, and was installed there January 30th, 1966.

The Dons, currently ranked 4th in the Chicagoland area, captured their 8th victory utilizing a staunch defense and a quick-hitting offense.

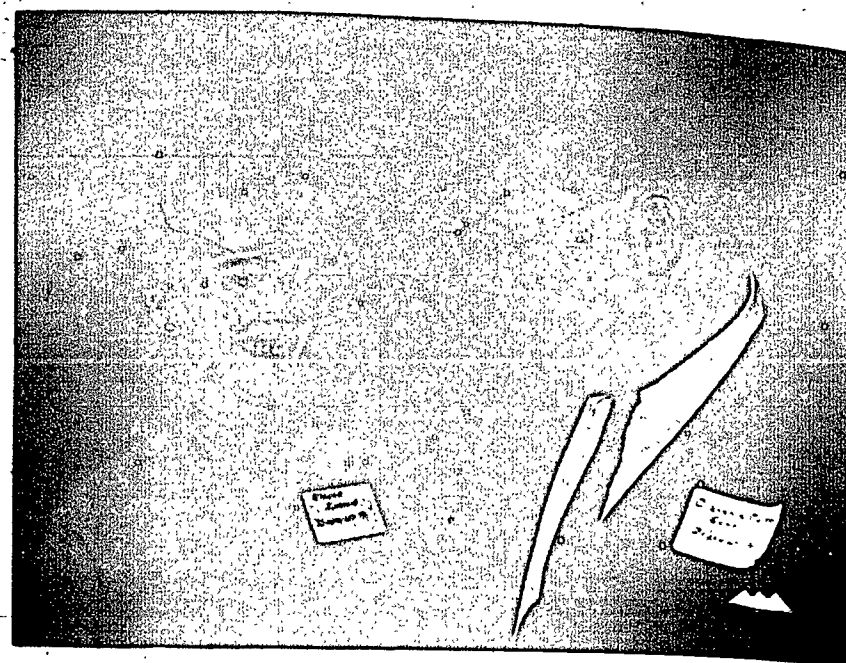
Marmion penetrated into Dons' territory only 3 times, but never beyond the 25 yard line.

In the final quarter, halfback Mark Havillis slashed through the line for 6 yards and scored the last Notre Dame touchdown.

With Hurley's 6 extra points, the final score read 45 - 0. Next week, St. Procopius stands between Notre Dame and the first undefeated season since 1962.
