While his profile did not fit the one's of the reported victims, nevertheless Niles notified Milwaukee police about the missing Nilesite But upon further investigation Niles police located the man who is now living in Chicago.

Niles police reported to the man's family he has been found and he is safe and well. However, the missing man did not want his family to know where he's now living and the police respected his wishes.

Police Commander Bill Reid told The Bugle Niles police did not think the missing man was among the victims. Nevertheless, their notification he was missing was a shot in the dark. Actually, Niles' renewed interest in the case led to their finding the man who has been missing since 1988. He took off from his home without letting anyone in his family know he had left.



PREVENTIVE CARE: ARE YOU COVERED?

According to a recent report, the good health of Americans today and in the next century "relies substantially on improved access to, and increased use of preventive services." Yet, it is estimated that only 1 percent to 3 percent of our annual health-care bill goes for .

Many Americans cannot afford preventive care because they are uninsured or their insurance doesn't cover preventive tests. Éven Medicare has been slow to pay for early detection and preventive care. Health insurers and Medicare reason that you know in ad-'vance if you need an annual preventive procedure, so you can bud- 🕌 get for it. Yet, many people put off or neglect to get services that are not covered by insurance.

Studies indicate that preventive services could be provided for with less that a 5 percent increase in health care insurance premiums. For seniors, preventive service such as influenza vaccine, pneumoccal vaccine, glaucoma screening, and colon cancer screening are well worth budgeting for and paying for out of your own pocket if your insurance policy doesn't cover them. If more people demand coverage for preventive service, insurance companies might be more willing to offer these benefits. 

administrative costs have gotten out of hand.

Actually, salaries in all school districts have gotten out of hand. Despite enrollments being much lower than in the past, administrative costs keep mounting. In school District 63, when enrollment was more than double what its present enrollment is, the superintendent's salary has now more than doubled. A \$40,000 superintendent's salary, when enrollment was around 7,000, is now more than \$90,000 when enrollment is just above the 3,000 mark.

In school District 71 in Niles the superintendent of two schools with 350 students is over \$100,000.

There's something basically wrong with these disproportunate salaries.

School people can argue a 1970 salary at \$40,000 would merit a \$120,000 figure by 1994 if we allowed a 6% cost of living increase each year. But managing half the number of students and half the number of schools seems to change the equation in setting sala-

In Niles school District 71 the plus \$100,000 salary for the superintendent is on top of

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two principal's salaries in the two-school-district. Such top heavy salaries in a 350-student school district seems quite out

The District 71 people approving the salaries contend the superintendent also fills other jobs such as the business manager's job, which are separate positions in other school

The professionals who run the school districts are in complete command. Public board members, who supposedly supervise them, are manipulated and maneuvered and are little more than rubber stamps for the policies set by the superintendents and their staffs.

If you attend a Maine Township high school board meeting, board members are little more than marionettes on strings manipulated by the administrators. There's an air the administrators are the professionals and the board members are little more than dilet-

We've often fantasized these professionals get together at their private meetings and set policy which applies throughout the area. If superintendent 'A' gets a peak salary, the professionals return to their boards, and not too sub-







|Children need more than good grades to attend college

If your child is an above average academic achiever, don't start packing his or her bags for college just yet. These days it takes more than good grades to get a degree.

If your child will begin attending a state university within the next four or five years, you'll pay roughly \$26,000 for a four-year education. That's quite a burden when you consider the average annual income per two-salary household is less than \$45,000.

Worse yet, college costs continue to climb. If your child won't start college for another 15 years, you'll pay nearly the same amount, \$24,000, for one year of college education. Remember these are the costs of state universities; the price tag for a four-year private school is even steeper.

While there is no way to completely eliminate the sting from saving for your child's education, a number of investments are available for making the savings process as painless as possible, including zero-coupon bonds, annuities, and mutual funds.

There are two types of zero-coupon bonds. Both offer tax advantages. The first type of zeros, zero-coupon government bonds are backed by the U.S. government. With this investment you set aside a smaller sum today. The money grows at a compounded rate to a much larger sum by the time your child finishes high school. The interest is automatically reinvested, so your money grows more quickly than if you take possession of your earnings. Best of all, you don't have to pay state income taxes on the earnings.

The other type of zeros is zero-coupon municipal bonds. These bonds are backed by the city, state or local government that issues them or are quaranted by an insurance company. Zero-coupon municipal bonds save you tax dollars. All zero-coupon municipal bonds are exempt from federal income taxes.

Although annuities aren't as familiar to us as CDs, they also provide an excellent means of accumulating wealth over a longer period of time. Plus, with annuities all taxes on your earnings are deferrred until you begin withdrawing them. There are basically two types of annuities. Both combine insurance coverage with the opportunity to invest. Fixed annunities guarantee the return of both principal and interest. The return of variable annuities, on the other hand, fluctuates because it is dependent upon market performance.

Yet another type of investment that offers potential rising income and appreciation of principal is mutual funds with growth or growth-and-income objectives. Because mutual funds represent the pooled investment dollars of many investors, you gain the advantages of professional management and diversification. Many conservative funds have excellent records of staying ahead of inflation and the rising costs of education.


Depending on your situation, any one or a combination of these investments can provide an opportunity for you to save for your child's college education. What is vital is that you begin studying the costs now. It doesn't take a lot of money to start these savings programs, but it does take action.

The beautiful and rugged land-scape of the Wisconsin Dells Scenic Riverway was met with great admiration over 100 years ago.

Travelers with adventurous

spirits would stop by the Dells and rent a row boat to navigate through the winding river of mysterious cliffs, canyons and caves.
As the scenery of the river gained popularity, more and more visitors flocked to the Dells to see these spectacular sight. these spectacular sights.

Local residents saw a need to accommodate the visitors, so commercial boat tours began in 1873 and resorts and rooming houses were built. By the turn of the century Wisconsin Dells was

a prospering "tourist town".

George Crandall came to Wisconsin Dells as an employee of the Milwaukee Railroad in the late 1800's. Crandall fell in love with the river scenery and felt it was important to preserve the land along the river.

He purchased all the river bank property he could including old

Riverway is not a state park. It is property acquired, maintained and preserved by private enter
cottages, resorts and unused acreage. Crandall funded a conservation project to reforest acres of land by planting over 100,000






Some of the sandstone layers are inclined and some are horizontal. This feature is due to original deposition by Cambrian ocean currents and is not due to tilting. These sloping layers are known as crossbedding.

The Dells are situated on the extreme eastern margin of the Driftless Area, that unique portion of this state and its three neigh bors, which was never covered by the glacial ice sheets.

On the east these came within about four miles of the river. which was then cut off from its the melting of the glacier fur-

This Glacial Lake Wisconsin had its northeast point near Wispoint near the Black River, and one southern extremity just north of Stand Rock. The waters of this great lake were blocked by a sandstone ridge through which they cut a new channel. This channel is the Dells.

At first the main flow of water urned west opposite the Cold Water Canyon, making a wide sweep to the southwest through Rocky Arbor Canyton and joining the present river bed through the flat land below town. Later the river found a shorter course, entering the present channel at the Old Dell House.

trol them naturally. Stanek and Mickelson said that the weeds are an indication of a problem. The water in the recently installed big game pond is too clear. It needs to be a little turbid, the interns said, to allow for the growth of phytoplankton, a tiny plant eaten by little fish which are in turn food for the game fish.

The interns can't kill all of the weeds at once, because dying plants use up oxygen. To keep the chain working naturally, the weeds need to disappear a little at

The amur grass carp sounds as though it would be the ideal solution to weed control. It eats two to three times its own weight in reeds each day and can get as large as 30 to 40 pounds. When the weeds are gone, the fish has a tendency to jump out of the water

and eat the grass along the banks.

The problem with the fish is that it's illegal in Wisconsi n. A laboratory in the state has been experimenting with the fish and has developed a triploid or sterile

The big game pond contains pike, walleye, large mouth bass, blue gills, crappies, cat fish and brown trout. The other ponds contain rainbow trout in varying sizes from a half pound to one and one half pounds. There's also a natural pond containing brook trout where customers can use their own tackle and experience fishing in the wild.

The ponds are fed by a tributary of Hubbard Creek and were dug when I-90/94 was built so the earth could be used as fill. The ponds are spring fed.
