CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF ORDER.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. This organization shall be known as the Lott Carey Baptist Home and Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The object of the Lott Carey Baptist Home and Foreign Mission Convention shall be the fostering of the Kingdom of Christ in all the world, and to do this in co-operation with our Northern and Southern Missionary Societies and all bodies in fellowship with this Convention, or who may hereafter come into fellowship with it.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, one Vice-President from each State or Territory represented, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Statistical Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Auditor, each of whom shall be elected annually, and serve until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall perform the usual duties of such officers. 1.00

SEC. 2. There shall be elected annually two boards, a Home Board and a Foreign Board, of each of which the officers shall be ex-officio members; each of which boards shall be composed of nine members and an additional member from each State and Territory represented. The Home Board shall have charge of the home work of the Convention, and the Foreign Board shall have charge of the foreign work, both on the home and foreign fields.

SEC. 3. The Home Board and the Foreign Board shall together constitute the Executive Board of the Convention, which latter board shall represent the Convention when not in session. The Foreign Board shall be located with a guorum at Richmond, Va., and the Home Board with a quorum shall be located at Raleigh, N. C.

SEC. 4. The Convention shall meet annually on Wednesday before the first Sunday in September, at a place provided by the body or board, at 10 o'clock a. m.

ARTICLE IV-MEMBERSHIP.

SECTION 1. Any Baptist church, Sunday School, Missionary or Educational organization may be represented in this Convention by the annual payment of five dollars per delegate. Any member of a Baptist church may become an annual member by payment of one dollar, and a life member by the payment of ten dollars at one payment.

ARTICLE V.

Visitors may be invited to seats, but not to vote.

ARTICLE VI.

This Convention shall not attempt to settle difficulties that may exist between churches or the leaders.

ARTICLE VII.

The members of this Convention may send to the Treasurer, through the Corresponding Secretary of this Convention, a part or all of their yearly contributions, for which they shall receive a receipt that may be presented at the annual meeting of this body, upon which their delegates shall be recognized, provided the amount be equal to the sum set forth in Article IV.

RULES OF ORDER.

ARTICLE 1. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises and closed by benediction or prayer.

ART. 2. Hiscox's Directory shall control this body in its deliberations.

ART. 3. Enrollment of delegates.

ART. 4. Appointment of committees,

ABT. 5. All committees shall do their work during the recess of this body, and shall not be at liberty to absent themselves without permission from the chair.

ART. 6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes, no more than once on the same subject 'till all have spoken who may wish to speak, without permission from the house.

ART. 7. No discourteous language shall be allowed, and any one persisting in its use shall be dropped from the roll.

ART. 8. Reading and conversation by the members in their seats not allowed during the meeting of this body.

This Constitution may be amended at any meeting, twelve months notice having been given; and the Rules of Order may be amended at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

PROCEEDINGS

Portsmouth, Va., September 1, 1920.

The Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention was called to order by the President, Dr. C. S. Brown, at 10 o'clock a. m., in the Ebenezer Baptist Church.

After some introductory remarks, he requested Dr. H. H. Warring, Rev. S. P. L. Boone and L. E. Keizer to conduct the devotional exercises. Hymn, "Come, Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove," was sung. Dr. Warring read the 6th chapter of Mark. Prayer was offered by Rev. Boove.

Singing, "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart." *Collow*ing which were many expressions of thankfulness and praise for past blessings and prayers for future consecration and usefulness. Singing, "Saved By Power Divine."

At 11 o'clock the President announced that this phase of the meeting would close and, according to program, the welcoming addresses would be delivered.

Hon. W. B. Bates, City Manager, was introduced. He said, in part, "It gives me great pleasure on behalf of the city of Portsmouth to welcome such a body as this. Privileges are extended to you here that are not extended your race in other countries. It behooves you to so develop yourselves that you may extend financial and religious aid to your race in other countries."

On behalf of the Ebenezer Baptist Church, Dr. Somerville said, in part, "From the lowest to the highest, from the least to the greatest, we bid you hearty welcome. We welcome you because you are drawing men to Christ."

In the absence of Dr. J. M. Armistead, Rev. O. C. Jones extended words of welcome on behalf of the Baptists of the city. He said, "You have come to one of the best sections of the country. The religious people are opposed to all the things that are opposed to the religion of Jesus. You have come where there is genuine hospitality. The

Baptists of Tidewater extend to you a most cordial welcome."

Mr. Levi C. Brown, President of the Mutual Savings Bank of Portsmouth, extended words of welcome on behalf of the business men of the city. He said: "We think it fitting that you should meet here as we have more churches than any other city of this size. We have in Truxton, the Negro suburb of Portsmouth, a town managed solely by Negroes, from the city manager down to the street sweeper. It is my prayer that you go away with a greater determination to spread the Gospel. We put all the facilities of our bank at your disposal, not only our stock in trade (money) but also our office and our office force.

Rev. Dr. J. L. Pinn, of Washington, D. C., responded to the welcome addresses. He said: "It is my pleasure to respond to these generous and noble people who have opened wide their doors to us. No citizen can fulfill his Christian duties unless he is imbued with the spirit of Christ. We come with the hope that our brief sojourn will be a blessing to you. We are met for three things: illumination, imitation, and inspiration. We see how marvelous God is using the Convention for the upbuilding of the Kingdom of Christ. We realize that if we give Christ, we must first get Christ. May we give ourselves and our all with the spirit of the One who laid down His life that we may be saved. The Lott Carey Convention thanks you for this glad welcome to Portsmouth."

Dr. O. S. Simms, Vice-President from Pennsylvania, was called to the chair.

The audience sang, "There is Power in the Blood," after which Dr. Simms presented the President to deliver his annual address. The address was written and delivered in the usual forceful style. It was very comprehensive, covering all phrases of the work of the Convention. (See address.)

On motion of Rev. R. G. Adams, seconded by Dr. W. T. Coleman, the address, with its recommendations, was referred to a special committee. Committees on the President's Address, Resolutions and and Officers were announced.

"Blest Be the Tie That Binds," was sung, and the Convention adjourned with benediction.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Devotional services opened by singing, "If Jesus Goes With Me I'll Go." Following which many stirring testimonies were given. This part of the service closed with singing, "Dwelling in Beulah Land."

After a few appropriate remarks by the President, the report of the Corresponding Secretary was called for. The report was full, comprehensive, and contains much valuable information as to the status and work of the Convention. A detailed account of the receipt and disbursement of all money is given. (For a copy of the report address Dr. A. A. Graham, box 177, Phoebus, Va.)

On motion, the report of the Corresponding Secretary was approved.

Singing, "I Am a Stranger Nere."

Committee on Place of Next Meeting was announced.

Visitors were introduced as follows: Rev. Dr. E. W. Moore, of Pittsburg, who is working for racial betterment under the auspices of and in co-operation with the American Baptist Home Society of New York. His message was eloquent and an inspiration to the Convention. A special committee was appointed to consider and report upon the matter set forth by Dr. Moore. Rev. Dr. W. H. Jernigan being presented spoke very encouragingly and gave much food for thought. Mr. W. D. White, of Ithaca, N. Y., also made some fitting remarks. Other brethren introduced were R. Z. Yancy, G. C. Bolling, L. D. Thomas, J. D. Morton, Riddick, Henderson, Tucker, Dr. J. Douglass Herben, Mrs. Means, Rev. W. H. Crawley, of the Bannister Association, Va., made brief remarks, as did also Bro. Robinson, who said he came to unite with the Convention.

Dr. W. T. Johnson presented a donation of two dollars from Mrs. Mary E. Bayliss, First Baptist Church, Richmond, Va.

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The committee on New Bodies made a partial report. (See report.)

Communications were received from Rev. I. S. Riddick inclosing \$100 from his church; Col. J. H. Young, Raleigh, with \$50; Rev. J. J. Hines, Shannon, with \$5; Mrs. J. A. Alston, of Weldon, with \$5.

Committee on Officers reported. (See report.) Adjourned with benediction by Dr. R. Spiller.

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION.

Praise service was conducted by Revs. R. F. Files and C. Z. Parker. "On Christ the Solid Rock I Stand," was sung. Rev. Parker read the 28th chapter of Matthew. Rev. Files offered prayer. "Brighten the Corner Where You Are" was sung.

The hour for preaching having arrived, the President introduced Rev. B. F. McWilliams, D.D., of Toledo. Dr. McWilliams chose as a text Matt. 24:14. His subject being: "The Gospel of the Kingdom and the Requisites for Preaching It." He said, in part: "It is called the gospel of God because it is from God; the gospel of grace because it bestows undeserved favor upon me; the gospel of Christ, the conveyor and purveyor of the gospel; the gospel of salvation, it brings salvation to man. Christ calls it the gospel of the kingdom because it is the gospel of the King. The gospel of the kingdom is the gospel of hope. It is the panacea for all the ills of the world. God's program of the world is the only safe program. Jesus said, this gospel shall be preached, and He will see to it that it shall be preached. Necessity is laid upon all of you upon whom He has laid His finger to preach the gospel. The millions in the heathen lands are crying, 'Hurry, hurry, hurry.' I tell you there is in all the world no bigger job than entering into the enterprise of preaching the gospel of Christ. Have you talent? Lay it upon the altar. Have you money and means? Lay them upon the altar. Away with all these silly nonentities who think they are too great to preach the gospel. God will see to it, through you and me, that every man, woman

and child shall know that Christ died for them. God says there is none too low or ignorant to be touched by the gospel of Christ.

"Requisites: (1). Machinery. In order that His will may be carried out is co-operation—all working together all the time for the gospel of God. When will the time come when we will work 365 days in the year for the gospel of the Kingdom? Satan never takes a vacation; neither does he rest.

"(2) Organization. Something is made of organs. The best object is the human body with its eyes, hands, lungs, brains, etc. We need an organization that has no sick organs. We don't know about many things. It should be the duty of this Convention to give information of all the needs and work of the field. We want an organization that collects and then distributes after it collects. Jesus says the world is the field. Go, ye, therefore, in all the world and preach the gospel.

"(3) We need money. Money is the acid test of religion. Do you want to know how much religion I have? Watch how I use my money. While we make more money than ever we are not giving according to God's Word. In 1918 the Christian forces in all the world gave an average of three cents per member a day for the gospel of the Kingdom, while more than twenty-three dollars per member was spent for fun. America needs one more revival —the conversion of the pocketbook. The tithing plan is only for beginners. As the Christian grows he should go beyond the tithing plan. God is calling upon you and me to give as He has prospered us.

"The great cal of the day is for consecrated men. The time has come when we can no longer shoulder the burden of missions upon the women. There must be laid upon men as well as upon women the program of the work of missions. We need men to rise and say, 'Here am I, send me.' The Holy Spirit operates only through men. If we lie down upon the job there is no other agency for preaching the gospel of the Kingdom. Shall we fail Him?"

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After the sermon a collection of \$225.70 was taken for missions.

Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Thomas were presented to the Convention. Among other things, they told us that the natives of Liberia have the greatest confidence in the Lott Carey Convention. They believe the Convention will do all that it promises. They both heartily thanked the Convention for caring for them so faithfully while they were in Africa.

Dr. Sales, of Washington, D. C., was introduced to the Convention and submitted a few remarks.

After singing, "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow," the Convention adjourned with benediction by Dr. W. J. Howard.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION.

The Convention was called to order at 10 o'clock with the President in the chair.

After reading the 100th Psalm, Rev. Boone led in prayer. Many delegates took part in the praise and song service that followed.

The minutes of the sessions of Wednesday were read and approved.

The subject, "The Missionary Outlook of the Age," was discussed in a very helpful and instructive manner by Rev. A. J. Payne, of Pennsylvania, and Rev. S. L. Parham of North Carolina.

"Since Jesus Came Into My Heart" was sung by the choir, following which the subject, "Stewardship," was ably discussed by Rev. G. W. Watkins, Field Secretary of the Baptists of North Carolina.

Dr. O. S. Simms gave a brief survey of the Convention and its work. His discussion was both interesting and instructive.

Rev. Dr. J. S. Jones, who was to speak on the subject, "A Voice from Pennsylvania," being absent, Rev. J. C. Austin, pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church of Pittsburg, was called upon to speak for Pennsylvania. His remarks were full of inspiration and interest. Dr. W. F. Williams discussed the subject, "The Key Service of the Convention." As the most efficient way of raising money for any purpose, he said, "The preacher himself must be an example to the people. He himself must give liberally if he wishes the people to give liberally. Secondly, the people must be trained to give. The training must be done by the preacher, a task which requires time and patience. The whole business is up to the preacher. He is the key man."

Rev. V. M. Meeds of the Second Baptist Church, Battle Creek, Mich., was introduced and made some remarks. He promised to the Convention the support of the colored Baptists of Michigan.

Rev. B. S. Lean of the Berean Baptist Church, Baltimore, was presented to the Convention. His remarks were encouraging. The church, together with its auxiliaries, sent to the Convention through Rev. Lane \$30.

It was voted that the joint sessions of the Convention be held tonight at the Zion Baptist church.

Benediction by Rev. A. B. Callis.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Devotional exercises were conducted by Drs. D. J. Avery and J. H. Randolph. Singing, "I Am Thine, O Lord." Dr. Randolph read the 40th Psalm and offered prayer. After a short period of prayer and song service, the minutes of the Thursday session were read and approved.

Resolutions offered by Dr. A. B. Vincent were referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

The Committee on Place reported, recommending that the session of the Convention be held with the Bethany Baptist Church, Newark, N. J., Rev. E. E. Ricks, pastor. The recommendation was adopted.

The committee appointed to reconsider the matter brought to the attention of the Convention by Dr. E. W.

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Moore presented a report which was referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

The Committee on the President's Address made their report, which was adopted. (See report.)

The report on the "Lott Carey Herald" was made by the editor, Dr. W. H. Stokes. He spoke of the growth and circulation of the paper and the cost of operating it during the past year. He urged every pastor to subscribe to and pay for ten copies of the paper for the benefit of his congregation. Dr. E. Payne, Dr. Boone and Dr. Ricks spoke in very commendable terms of the worth and work of the paper. The report on the "Herald" by Dr. Stokes was approved.

The report of the Committee on Enrollment was made.

Rev. W. M. Clark, president of Virginia Union University, was introduced and made some very helpful and encouraging remarks. Others introduced were Dr. Blake, Rev. A. L. Brent, Staunton, Va.; Rev. D. McCreary, First Baptist Church, Williamsburg, Va.; Dr. Madison, representing the National Baptist Convention, and Dr. G. D. Griffin, who said he was inspired by the work and deliberations of the Convention. Dr. Madison said the National Baptist Convention was considering the matter of doing their missionary work through the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention. Dr. J. M. Armistead submitted a few remarks as to his interest in the Convention.

Committee on Resolutions reported. (See report.)

A committee on the Revision of the Constitution was appointed.

After announcements by the President the Convention adjourned.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Some selections were sung by Mrs. Green of Baltimore and Mrs. Means of Alexandria.

After a short period of prayer and praise service Rev.

W. A. Taylor, D. D., of Washington, D. C., was introduced to preach the missionary sermon. He said he would mention three essentials in the spreading of the word. First. The church is the instrument by which and through which God purposes to save the world. The first essential to greater success are apostolic men—men who have the apostolic zeal. Second, The men must themselves be changed, revolutionized before they bring about a change in conditions. Third, There must be more apostolic faith, men who have faith in the possibility and power of the gospel. The Holy Spirit, together with zeal and faith, is also essential to the greater success in modern missionary endeavor. The Holy Spirit is the most essential need of men to successfully preach the gospel of Christ."

After the helpful sermon, Brother Smiley favored the Convention with a very appropriate selection.

Benediction was pronounced by Dr. Junius Grey.

FRIDAY EVENING SESSION.

There was a missionary mass meeting, conducted by the Corresponding Secretary, Dr. A. A. Graham. After a few selections, led by Rev. Dr. L. E. Keiser, Dr. Graham made some preliminary remarks and introduced the following missionaries, all of whom made ten-minute addresses which were full of information and interest: Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Thomas, Dr. C. C. Boone, returned missionaries from Liberia, West Africa; Rev. Q. M. Cele, returned missionary from Zulaland, South East Africa; Dr. D. S. Malekebu and Mrs. Malekebu, who are soon to sail for Africa, and Miss Christian Francois, who will do missionary work in Haiti.

At the conclusion of the services a collection of \$622 was taken.

The Finance Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary reported that the organization had collected \$7,981.30. Of that amount they turned over to the Lott Carey Convention for missionary work \$6,000, for which the Convention gave hearty thanks.

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The Committee on Finance of the Lott Carey Convention made its final report. (See report.)

There being no further business, after a few announcements, the most successful meeting the Convention ever held came to a close.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas, the activities of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention depends largely upon the efficiency of the work of our churches in this country for the successful issue of its program in the salvation of the world; be it

Resolved, That we heartily recommend the work of Rev. E. W. Moore, D.D., under the direction of the American Baptist Home Mission Society.

Whereas, the present status of society is alarmingly restless, unsettled, and at times volcanic, and since these social and economic conditions everywhere present a challenge to the Christian Church to bring deliverance, and

Resolved, That the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention hereby records its sincere thanks for the splendid spirit of hospitality so beautifully manifested here during this Convention.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

Friends and Fellow-workers: Beloved for the Master's sake and honored for your loyalty to a great and glorious cause, and also for your splendid generosity continued through the years that have passed, accept the warmest greetings of my heart, which I extend with the hope that this may be the grandest session in our splendid history. You have come from pressing occupations and grave responsibilities in your distant homes to deliberate on a transcendently important subject—the redemption of mankind. The work is weighty, the difficulties great, and our solicitude is deep. We dare not approach the sacred duties before us without invoking Divine guidance to the end that selfish interest may be totally eliminated and concerted action be secured in devising plans to advance foreign missions. In the beginning let us solemaly resolve that the keynote of every discussion, the inspiration of every resolution, and the burden of every action shall be missions.

As an organization, we occupy a unique position; millions are eagerly waiting to learn the results of this meeting. We must not undervalue our opportunity, nor abuse our high privilege, nor paralyze our endeavors by indiscretion. "For we be brethren; we are one body, animated by one Spirit, even as we are called in one hope of our calling. To us there is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, and through all, and in us all." Let this one indivisible Spirit dominate our entire deliberations, to the end that we may bring into greater prominence the high and supreme calling of the Christian Church, to wit, the evangelization of the world. The great Negro Baptist family of this country, embracing the majority of the Negro church membership of this country, has not caught the vision of duty and responsibility respecting the great world field inviting occupation. We are still caviling over conventions and home field interests while thousands whom we might have saved are sinking down into the black gulf of despair and misery. It seems left to this contingent, inspired by the inspiring example of Lott Carey, our modern missionary apostle, to revive and inculcate this duty which Baptists have so woefully neglected. However great this task may seem, under God, let us bravely assume it. Baptists should lead in the world's redemption. We can do this only by union and co-operation.

THE INTERCHURCH MOVEMENT

The interchurch movement which appeared fraught with such wonderful possibilities for the speedy redemption of a lost world, and which received our most hearty endorsement because of its high and hopeful plans, has suddenly collapsed. Various reasons have been advanced for its failure, and many Protestant Christians seem to rejoice in its downfall. But any reflective mind must feel keenly

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that the failure of this great movement reveals a sad weakness among the nominal followers of the lowly Nazarene. Christians are not spiritually prepared for organized action against the "powers of darkness in this world." The chief charges preferred were: "Its program was too large"; "It was top-heavy"; "It was led by millionaires"; "It commercialized Christianity"; "It was anti-Christian"; "It sought to standardize Christianity," etc., but these charges had no foundation in fact. Their chief design was to discourage a movement that demanded men to put into actual every-day practice the foundation principles of Christianity-the consecration of mind, soul, body, and means to human uplift and regeneration of the world. The survey made was the most extensive scheme ever devised to place before the Christian world the true condition and needs of humanity; and if nothing more had been done than that, the movement would have deserved our grateful appreciation. Personally, I have no regret for the attitude that I took regarding the movement, and the humble assistance rendered in advancing its interest. I am a Baptist through and through, and yet I fully believe it to be my moral duty to co-operate with every agency designed to bring the Master's kingdom to earth. I am indeed grateful for the assistance you gave to help us put 'our drive over.' Our Interchurch obligation extended only to the extent that we raise for our own work the full budget that we had voluntarily planned. I am fully convinced that the kingdom of Christ will never be set up among men until all Christians shall realize a unity and kinship contemplated in the plans of the Interchurch Movement. Caustic criticism and merciless ridicule cannot destroy this fact. Men and money are needed to save this world. We have both if it were possible to collect them. Our best opportunity, I fear, has passed. A Baptist to me is no more than a heathen if he acts no better than a heathen. Practical christianity is far better than ritualistic christianity, for "faith without works is dead."

THE CONSECRATION OF MEANS.

Sentiment is a powerful element in christianity. It is easy to feel that too much emphasis is placed on human efforts and physical means, and to charge the Church with trying to buy the Kingdom with money; but the fact remains clear that the Divine plan to save the world is by the use of men and means. "They first gave themselves" indicates the order of procedure. To qualify for work, men must surrender fully and wholly to the Lord without reservation. They must become willing to be used in any way, in any place, and at any time, as God may direct. This is called consecration, or sanctification. This state of Christian development also implies the consecration of wealth and money without reservation. The gospel cannot go without money, and it is the business of the leaders to see that sufficient money is collected. The last thing the devil wants the Church to have is money enough to send missionaries into all the world. Big collections worry the devil. His satanic majesty went into convulsions when the Christian forces in this country announced a year ago their program to raise three hundred and thirty million dollars for world uplift. The most solemn duty before the Christian world today is the consecration of wealth to the glory of God. Men are robbing God—withholding tithes and offerings—in order to pile up fortunes, to indulge vanity, and serve the flesh. We have pastors who work harder for a big collection for their vacation than for a big collection for missions. How long shall such hypocrisy be tolerated!

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The Presbyterian Church calls attention to these "terrifying totals." In 1919, Americans spent a half billion dollars for theater tickets, \$275,000,000 for jewelry, \$175,000,000 for perfumery; and all the Protestant churches combined raised only \$250,000,000 for missions. The average daily gifts to the Church for all purposes is less than three cents per member.* Surely a low estimate is placed on religion. The supreme task before us now is to awaken Christian consciousness to this lamentable weakness in our struggle to give the gospel to mankind.

OUR HAITIAN FIELD.

Interest in the Haitian field continues to grow. Mr. Inman, of the Interchurch Survey Department, declares this to be the most needy field in the world. By mutual consent, the Federal Council of Churches has allotted this territory to Baptists for evangelization. The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has agreed to co-operate with us in this work by paying the salary and expenses of a superintendent in Haiti. We are also assured that the Northern Baptists will help in Haiti. We must not relax our efforts in behalf of Haiti. A general convention should be held in the near future in behalf of civil and political conditions among these people. Reports indicate that Haiti is not receiving "A square deal" by those who represent our Government in the Island. The Negro people of the United States should take deeper interest in Haiti. It is the only Negro government in the Western World. We should rejoice in the part we have taken to rescue Haiti from sin and destruction. Our commission, including our Corresponding Secretary. should go over there as soon as possible to plan for enlargement of our work.

AFRICA AND THE MISSIONARY OUTLOOK.

The evangelization of Africa is still a big subject because of what has been done, and because of the immense amount of work yet to be done before we can feel that Africa's dark peoples have had a chance to learn of Christ. It is stated that there are more heathen

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in the world today than there has ever been. More children are born into the world daily than are born into the kingdom of grace. Geographically considered, Africa is four times larger than the United States, embracing one-tenth of the earth's area and onethirteenth of the earth's population. This vast and mighty continent of unlimited natural resources, practically untouched by labor and commerce, is the natural inheritance of the black race. Africa and the Negro race are indivisible terms, which, by association, represent but one conception. The white race, in search of wealth and power, has exploited Africa for centuries, stole thousands of her stupid subjects and sold them in slavery, and pushed trade lines far into the interior, and sent drugs and millions of gallons of rum in. that men and women might grow more sinful and hardened and forget God. To meet Africa's distressful needs the recent survey declares the call goes out for 280,000 teachers, which provides one teacher for every fifty children in her estimated population, and a whole army of preachers and physicians. Trade and commerce, with gun and sword and rum, have penetrated the jungles and plains. and scattered the social evils of civilization as they went, until Africa's sable population is cursed with prostitution and rotten with foul diseases. The devil has pushed his foul propaganda far more vigorously than the Church its mission. We have scarcely begun to redeem Africa. We are shut out from large areas by the strong arm of human laws. We find little welcome in our Fatherland save in the Republic of Liberia. Here let us concentrate our work. Let us reinforce our workers. The Negro race is not a dving race. The Divine mandates declares, "Princes shall come out of Egypt; Ethiopia shall soon stretch forth her hand unto God." This "Sleeping Giant," the Dark Continent," will some day awake in power, might and glory. It is our duty to sow the seed; it is God's business to insure the harvest. The harvest follows as "the night the day." Other reports to follow give detailed information of the work we have done there.

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

It gives me supreme pleasure to speak of the splendid achievements of our Woman's Auxiliary, which is being done to aid the parent body in the prosecution of its far-reaching plans. Mrs. Randolph, our good president, and her faithful associates deserve our sincere appreciation and encouragement.

This is indeed a great day for woman. In the transformation of public sentiment with regard to woman's relation to man, and with regard to her social and civic status, the gospel of Christ has wrought a miracle of inconceivable magnitude. Compare the women of heathen lands with the women of Christian America, and you will be forced to exclaim: "What hath God wrought!" I rejoice in woman's exaltation and progress, and most heartily welcome her into the broad field of public service, with the hope that her wonderful influence may be devoted solely for human uplift. Let the noble women who labor with us in the Lord receive from us due consideration, encouragement, and support; and may there continue to exist the closest and most harmonious relations between the Auxiliary and the parent body. We must be one in work and plans. In this way only can we work and prosper. "In union there is strength."

THINGS THAT HINDER.

The home field has its embarrassments. In undertaking to present the gospel to the heathen, we find ourselves confronted with the challenge, "Physician, heal thyself." Africa has been grossly wronged for centuries by the nominal Christian nations, until in the breast of millions in that dark land is a deep resentment against "the white man's religion." An eminent authority says: "The exploitation of the peoples of the non-Christian world is a blot against christendom. The Christian missionary has to live down a long history of purveyors of drugs and rum, dishonest traders, unscrupulous diplomats."

So lon gas we tolerate crime and keep our journals full of horrible tragedies and brutal lynchings, so long will the heathen have cause to doubt the genuineness of our religious professions. Our American churches must assert their high purpose to make christianity a potent force in maintaining law and order, and insuring the peace and happiness of the people.

Then, too, our missionaries are greatly hindered in their work because of the lack of support. Many are sent with no equipment except a Bible and a hymn book. They are discouraged just as soon as they reach their field and discover their needs. One has well said, "That mission work was like breaking new ground. It is hard labor, but is necessary. The first missionaries are the ones who toil and sow the seed, but see no harvest. But their works last for all time." It therefore behooves us who remain at home to make the burdens of our missionaries as light as possible.

It may be that the social, economic, and racial unrest among us is a plan of Providence to force us to set our faces toward the Fatherland. Again, the doctrine of "Africa and Africans," a doctrine that will not down, savors of treason to the foreign governments that have laid their iron hands on that unfortunate country and created a condition hostile to the friendly admission of Negro missionaries among the natives. The right of backward races to "self-determination" evidently does not refer to Africa. It is true that education and christianity beget love of liberty and freedom, and an irreconciliable hatred for bondage and oppression. The gospel must be kept from the people if they are to be held down and exploited mercly for commercial purposes. Hence faith, prayer, and

sacrifice indefinitely extended will be required to overcome the difficulties confronting christianity in the superhuman effort to evangelize the heathen world. "We must not be moved by any of these things, but push with all of our might our well-begun work with the full assurance that the Lord will give the increase."

Our immediate duty is as follows:

1. Concentrate and strengthen our work in Liberia and Haiti, making a few central stations strong and permanent, from which points workers may radiate and extend missionary operations.

2. Demand the full time of our Corresponding Secretary so that he may apply himself with diligence to our work, and by study and visitation he may become a proficient and reliable authority on the needs of the fields.

3. Choose as speedily as possible a superintendent for the Haitian field, whose salary will be paid by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

4. Provide and employ as many missionaries as possible both for Liberia and Haiti. Their service is absolutely indispensible.

5. Cultivate closer co-operation with the Liberian Baptist Convention and enlarge our annual compensation toward their work. Aid them to support Ricks Institute.

6. Provide permanent mission headquarters in Liberia, which, if done, will establish confidence in the stability of our organization.

In conclusion, with nobleness of purpose, let us enter into the business of this Convention, subordinating every selfish interest or whim, to the end that our united strength and influence may be utilized to the devising of plans and the raising of means to give our neglected brethren and sisters in darkness an opportunity to enjoy the blessings of our glorious Christian civilization.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I-NAME.

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Lott Carey Foreign Mission Convention of the United States.

ARTICLE II-OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of the Auxiliary shall be to assist the brethren to foster the Kingdom of Christ at home and especially in Africa.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The officers of the Auxiliary shall be a President, and one Vice-President from each State represented, and one from the District of Columbia; a Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, Lecturer and Organizer. The duty of these officers shall be such as are common to the office they occupy.

SEC. 2. All officers shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected.

SEC. 2. There shall be elected annually an Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to carry out the purposes and work of the Auxiliary in its absence.

SEC. 4. The Executive Board shall be composed of nine members, of which the officers of the Auxiliary shall be ex-officio members. Five members shall constitute a quorum to do business for the body.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. The Woman's Auxiliary shall meet with the Lott Carey Home and Foreign Mission Convention on Thursday succeeding Wednesday in the same week in which the Lott Carey meets.

SEC. 2. Any Baptist church or Sunday School Missionary or Educational Organization may be represented in the Auxiliary by the annual payment of \$3.00. Any member of a Baptist church may become an annual member by the payment of 50 cents and a life member by the payment of \$5.00.

SEC. 3. Visitors may be invited to seats, but not to vote.

SEC. 4. The meeting shall be opened by devotional exercises.

The Auxiliary reassembled in Zion Baptist Church. Consecration service conducted by Mrs. P. G. Anderson, Mrs. C. S. Brown, and Mrs. A. J. Goode. After several songs, Mrs. C. S. Brown read a part of the second Chapter of Phil. Prayer by Mrs. A. E. Weeks.

Mrs. Brown stated the object of the meeting was to get a deeper spirituality and a greater vision of the work. The sisters responded heartily in songs, expressions, prayers, and Scripture quotations. The meeting was a great spiritual feast.

The President, Mrs. J. H. Randolph, took up the program. She asked the missionaries to take the choir

stand. The minutes of the previous sessions were read and adopted.

The following committees were appointed: Temperance, Education, New Bodies, Obituary, Scholarship, Cradle Roll, Resolutions, Annual Members, and Lott Carey Herald.

Singing by the Auxiliary.

The following subject was ably discussed by Mrs. E. J. Bradford and Mrs. P. G. Shepard: "How Can We Best Interest Our People in Foreign Missions?" Some of the many good things which Mrs. Bradford brought out are these: "(1). By the proper preaching of the Gospel. (2) The right program executed. (3) The proper organization. (4) Correct report of money raised and of work accomplished." The points were developed with much emphasis, which showed the necessity of prosecuting the divine program fifty-two weeks in a year. Mrs. P. G. Shepard began by asking, "What are missions?" "It is carrying the good news of Jesus Christ who died for us to others," she said. "Study God's Word, that we may know Him for ourselves. The badge of love is the Christian badge. She had several Scripture selections read, bearing upon the subject of carrying the Gospel to the lost world. She closed by saying, "Our task is a great one. Let us see to it that we execute the great commission of our Lord and Saviour."

A vote of thanks was tendered the speakers for their helpful thoughts.

Dr. C. S. Brown, President of Lott Carey Convention, was presented. He said, "You are doing a great work. I urge you to continue. Study the mission fields. Get a vision. The object of our convention is Foreign Missions. May God bless you. Go on and do more."

Dr. A. W. Pegues, Secretary of Lott Carey Convention, was presented. He spoke of the necessity of making our minutes as concise as possible on account of the high cost of printing. He urged us to study the Bible. He mentioned the Missionary Training School, Shaw University, as a suitable place to prepare for the mission field. Mrs. C. S. Brown presented ten (\$10) dollars from Mrs. Dora Newsome, Ahoskie, N. C.

Dr. W. T. Johnson congratulated us. He said, "You have caught the vision."

Miss Julia A. Watson, of the Fireside School, Nashville, Tenn., was introduced and spoke of her work.

Mrs. W. H. Thomas, returned missionary from Liberia, was presented and was received by a standing ovation from the Auxiliary. She related some of the difficulties encountered in laboring on the foreign field. She also told that the Sallie Mail Building was not erected because of the high cost of material. But, said she, "the money is still on hand."

Dr. C. C. Boone briefly told of the work on the foreign field as a medical missionary, and asked the Auxiliary to stand by him in this important feature in the work.

Rev. Tishe, from South Africa, said he came from Africa to learn of Jesus Christ, in order to help his people to know the Saviour of the World.

Mrs. Ora B. Stokes, Statistician, submitted her annual report. This is a new feature of the work. But this, her first report, showed that the Baptists of the country are increasing at a rapid rate, both numerically and financially. A vote of thanks was tendered the Statistician for her very intelligent and extensive report.

Mr. Smily sang, "You Need Not Look For Me Down in Egypt Sand."

Mrs. Lucy B. Lewis was asked to welcome the new bodies on part of the Auxiliary. In a timely and pleasant manner, with choice words, she gave a most cordial welcome to the messengers of the new bodies, and extended them a hearty hand-shake.

Dr. J. C. Austin, of Pittsburg, Pa., was introduced. He made some encouraging remarks. Said he, "I bring to you greetings from the largest Negro church in America. I have become one of you by joining the Lott Carey Convention. I bid you God-speed."

Benediction by Rev. Bradford, D.D.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Devotionals were conducted by Miss Martha Fowlkes, Mrs. Matilda Matthews, and Mrs. Annie Macklin. "How Firm a Foundation," was sung. Mrs. M. R. Johnson read a selection of Scripture. Prayer by Mrs. Matilda Matthews. Miss Martha Fowlkes led in singing, "Work for the Night is Coming." After several songs, testimonies, and Scripture quotations, the praise service closed by singing, "Go Preach My Gospel."

The President presented Dr. O. S. Simms. He brought greetings from his wife, who was sick in the city. He spoke of the mission work of his church as in a prosperous condition.

A motion prevailed that we organize the children into a Junior Missionary Department.

The following officers were elected: President, Miss Elizabeth Bullock; Vice President, Miss Margaret Louise Hoffman; Secretary, Miss Madge Maloy; Treasurer, Miss Emma J. Brown. Mrs. O. S. Bullock was appointed by the Executive Board Supervisor of the Junior Department.

Mrs. Lucy L. Lewis appropriately installed the newly elected officers of the Junior Department.

Mrs. Rebecca Gray offered a very fervent prayer for their success. Then the children rendered the following program:

Miss Elizabeth Bullock, Margaret Louise Hoffman brought greetings from the Sunshine Band of St. Paul's Baptist Church, Gastonia, N. C., and sang a beautiful solo. Elizabeth Bullock, High Point, N. C., presided at the piano.

Emma J. Brown and Margaret King recited.

Solo by Emelia Mitchell, "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow."

Elizabeth Bullock brought greetings from Junior Circle of First Baptist Church, High Point, N. C. Mrs. A. B. Randolph read a letter of greetings from the Junior Society of Mt. Moriah Baptist Church, Washington, D. C.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS.

Dear Co-Workers: There is no happiness so great, no joy so divine, no pleasure more anticipated in the daily thoughts of our work, than the occasion which brings us together today.

Eight years ago we met as a Convention in this beautiful edifice, the guest of Dr. J. M. Armistead and his good people, who spared no pains in entertaining us royally. We have come at this time to be the guest of the Ebenezer Baptist Church and their excellent pastor, Dr. C. C. Somerville. Because of the growth of this splendid body of Christian women, and the impossibility of both organizations meeting at one church again we find ourselves comfortably gathered in the same place where we assembled eight years ago, which I am sure meets the approval of all. As we gather here our hearts go out in gratitude to God for bringing us to the close of another conventional year and to begin anew the work which is ours to accomplish.

Truly, we have climbed the ladder, round by round, of Christian endeavor, until our eyes have seen the light of a new day dawning upon us, and our imaginations lead us to realize that our ideals, if worked upon faithfully, will materialize and bring us greater results in the future for our work than ever before.

The Christian people of today are thinking more seriously on the great problem of soul winning and how to formulate plans to reach the unreached, and to keep alive the spirit of Christian giving and self-abnegation, than at any other period of Christendom. Great achievements in any phase of work can only be accomplished by those who have vision, who are optimistic, who know no defeat, and are willing to sacrifice all to win in the great struggle before them. We should see no defeat in striving to place Jesus Christ, the Saviour of the World, before all men, for we have God as our Father, Jesus as our fortress and shield, and the Holy Spirit as our Comforter, and we should be fully satisfied because faith and prayer lead to the throne of all power.

In our desire to save the World for Christ, we must have a large vision, a vision compatible with the program of Christ, "Go ye into all the world and make disciples of all nations." We must work and sacrifice together that Christ may be Lord and Master of all. If this is to be realized we must unite our moral and religious forces to counteract all evil tendencies in our national and international life which cause so many disturbances, such as strikes, race riots, and desecration of the Sabbath. We must clean out vice and crime of whatever kind, and in their stead establish those high ideals taught by Christ in the Sermont on the Mount, which

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make for peace, good will and universal brotherhood. For we should make life worth while in this beautiful world which God has given us. "Christ gave us life to use for Him" and the social betterment of those about us; therefore, it should not be spent frivolously, but cautiously.

"Life is real, life is earnest And the grave is not its goal; Dust thou art to dust returnest Was not spoken of the soul."

As Baptists, we have the greatest opportunity of any other religious denomination to indoctrinate the world in the simple teachings of our Saviour, because of our belief and adherence to the faith and practice of the New Testament. Our doors are opened to men and women of all conditions and in every walk of life; therefore, we should consider the opportunity as "golden," for since Christ died that we might live, He died not for us alone, but for all the world. In Him we live and move and have our being, and the glow of His love must so permeate us that the reflection will lead others to see our good works and glorify our Father which is in Heaven.

We notice from the trend of missionary operations by other denominations in Africa that they are centralizing their forces in the Republic of Liberia, and are sending some of their best men and women who are thoroughly equipped educationally, and well supplied financially, to establish themselves in a manner which will appeal to the natives and other religious workers. While our Convention is not one whit behind the other forces at work on the field in having men and women thoroughly prepared to prosecute the work, yet we must be up and doing that our missionaries may be better prepared for service. They should have every equipment necessary to perform the work before them without embarrassment.

We as women are still cherishing the idea and longing to see the day when we shall erect our building in Africa, which shall be dedicated to God as a memorial to the unselfish toils of the women of our Lott Carey Convention. We know that the work has been greatly handicapped by the World War and the high cost of material, but the prospects are growing brighter and, like the busy little bee and the industrious little ant, we must continue to lay in store money, so that when the time comes we will be able to construct a splendid building as a home for our girls.

A few weeks ago on visiting the Battlefield of Antietam, we saw magnificent monuments erected in honor of the men who had fallen in battle in the Civil War. Every State that had soldiers in that battle placed a monument along the field over their dead. These fell in carnal warfare, but you are engaged in a moral and religious conflict in helping to wipe out superstition and ignorance among the people at home and abroad, and this building will be a monument to perpetuate your memory, "for to live in hearts of those we leave behind us is not to die."

OUR DUTY TO THE HOME FIELD.

While we lay great stress upon our duty to the foreign field, we must not forget our relations to the home field, for they are inseparable. The field is ripe for service and reapers are needed to garner in the sheaves. There are large numbers who can do it if they can be given a vision of the work to be done. With the proper information, inspiration and enthusiasm which they must receive from those of ripe experience and Christian endurance.

I wish to call your attention especially to the boys and girls who come from other cities and the rural districts to your communities and churches. Invite them to your young peoples' meetings, both social and religious. Let them realize that although they are away from home somebody is thinking of them. If this interest is not manifested by us we should not be alarmed if they go astray and unite themselves with others of evil environments and become a menace to the community. The time has come when we must make our homes and churches so attractive that our young people will love to dwell therein. This in an age of social service, and the home or church that ignores this tendency will fail to attract and win some of the tenderest branches for growth in the Kingdom.

OUR CHILDREN.

Year after year we have been inspired by the encouraging reports which they make and the intelligent way in which they are presented. De have come to the place where we cannot let them remain unorganized longer, for we must train them that they may grow to be filled with the spirit of prayer, of service, and to be consecrated to do both home and foreign mission work. If this is done it will carry with it an added task and responsibility to you who know the needs of the young, and yet I believe that many of you will gladly adjust yourselves to the task and do it.

CRADLE ROLL DEPARTMENT.

The Cradle Roll Department is increasing. We feel grateful to those who are interesting themselves in the little babes, who if properly cared for will grow to love God, His cause and His people.

There is a class of boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 18 who feel that they are too large and old to be members of the Junior Societies. My advice is to organize, if possible, those children into intermediate societies in your churches, so that they may also be trained to cherish a fondness for missions, and render service in every capacity that is essential to Christian progress. From this group they will pass into the Senior Missionary Society.

EDUCATION.

An unselfish spirit on the part of our Convention to give educational opportunities to the children of Africa has caused them to establish a Scholarship Fund, which is meeting the approval of a large number of the members of this Auxiliary and other persons. Each year we find that there is an increase, which means that large sums will be donated for that purpose. Every cent spent in this direction means spreading knowledge that will not only help those who receive, but those who are come after them.

If we believe that a Christian education is essential to the development of the moral, spiritual, and intellectual life of the children of our own fair land, then it is doubly needed in Africa, our fatherland, and Haiti, where the debris of superstition and ignorance holds sway, and can be removed only through the Gospel.

OUR MISSIONARIES.

At this session of our Convention we have several of our returned missionaries, who have served faithfully and well during the most trying period for missionary work in the history of our organization. We greet them joyfully and congratulate them for the victories achieved in their labors of loving service. We pledge to them anew our most loyal support, and hope that their stay among us may be pleasant, and that success will attend their every effort.

To the missionaries who will soon leave for the foreign field, we bid you God-speed on your journey to carry the message and glad tidings to the heathen. We shall pray for you, and work that you may accomplish the purpose for which you are going.

INTER-CHURCH WORLD MOVEMENT.

In the interim of this body, by the direction of Dr. A. A. Graham, the Corresponding Secretary of the Lott Carey Convention, five of the women of the Auxiliary were invited by Miss Nannie H. Burroughs to be present March 3, 1920, to meet with representatives of the Auxiliary to the National Baptist Convention. The object of this meeting was to have the two auxiliaries to co-operate with the parent bodies in the Inter-Church World Movement. We were organized and the work was launched. The aim of this movement was to strengthen a spirit of Christian fellowship, to educate, to give information and inspiration to exalt Christ. While this movement did not accomplish all for which it was originated, yet we believe it has accomplished some good through the literature and the speakers, who have traveled over the country enlighteneng the members of our churches along the line of education and Christian stewardship.

NOBILITY OF WOMAN.

Not she with traitorous kiss the Saviour stung, nor she denied Him with unholy tongue, but she, while Apostles shrank, would danger brave, last at the Cross, first at the grave.

> What fitting tribute hall we bring? To crown her deeds of gold? While lasting praise to her we sing— For goodness manifold?

To mission's cause, her heart is given— In sacrifice and love. She raises men from Earth to Heaven To reverence God above.

On battlefield, she wields the sword, She stands in halls of fame; She knows the sciences and arts, In history's carved her name.

For could there be a hall of fame, Or school of skill and art: If mother's true and tender love, Had failed the trusting heart?

Had not inspired her boy to rise-Not taught his brain to think; To struggle onward for the prize, Nor falter, fall, or shrink?

Then praise be hers, whose name we lisp, First with our infant breath; And praise be hers whose name we grasp, With our last dying breath.

Our needs for each day must be supplied, our tasks for each day must be fulfilled. We are the instruments which can and must be used for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom in social, moral and evangelical development. Women are beacon-lights, moulders of sentiment, teachers, the perpetuators of all that is noble and true. This is evidenced by the women of this Auxiliary, who are determined to go forward and achieve great victories for the Kingdom of God.

Woman is taking her place side by side with man in the political world in deciding what is best for our country's welfare. It is a part of her task to decide whether present conditions in the world shall exist or be made better. In the business world she is making great progress. In the religious world women are giving information, alleviating the needs of the poor and the suffering and are sending the Gospel to the heathen lands.

And now my sisters, let us guard with vigilance the opportunities and privileges which we have in common with our brethren in prosecuting the work of our Convention. Let us never waver, never

falter, until the world shall recognize our God-given power in every phase of Christian endeavor.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Having talked with some of our missionaries from the foreign field, and of conditions touching the wearing apparel of the natives, and of their needs, I have been impressed to make the following recommendation to you: That we inaugurate a missionary shower to take place at our next meeting in 1921, consisting of clothes (new and old), buttons, needles, bed linen, table linen, thread, and such things that may be used by our missionaries for dressing the children. The articles to be sent to a committee under the direction of the pastor of the church in which the meeting is to be held.

I recommend further that we arrange to supply the present missionaries who are going out with whatever necessities for the work that may be in our power.

I wish to recommend that for the next year we make our budget \$1,800.

The Lott Carey Herald has been of valuable aid in keeping our work before the public, and will recommend as many persons in the several States that subscribe to this paper so that they may at all times receive first hand information. Recommend \$100 be given for His work.

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REPORT OF SECRETARY OF THE AUXILIARY. Mrs. A. J. Felton.

Mrs. President, Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention:

Dear Co-Workers: It is with a feeling of deepest personal concern at this momentous hour I greet you. For some reason better known to you than to myself—I trust according to the purposes of God—I was chosen one year ago to take up the work of Corresponding Secretary, which previously had been so faithfully performed by Sister Anna L. McGuinn for more than thirteen years, but who, because of failing health, had laid the burden down. I could hardly believe at first that you really meant for me to take it, but after being repeatedly assured that I was called to the task I trembling took up the thread of an intricate fabric in the missionary work and began to adjust myself to the situation to the best of my ability. How well I have performed the task should be measured by my zeal, my desire to make the work effective, and the report that is to follow.

I am happy to say that your sympathy for me and your cordial co-operation in making responses to my notices have made it possible for me to appear here, speaking in words of highest praise for what has already been accomplished and for what the future holds in promise for us all. While the work has been arduous, yet the cause for which it stands has made it a positive pleasure to serve in this capacity, stimulating the work already begun and carrying an uplifted torch into those sections and among those people where the name of Lott Carey has been an entire stranger. Among the forces for evangelism both at home and abroad none have been more potent than the missionary, and upon none does the Master expect more fruitage and a greater harvest.

The Christian Church must be the living dynamo beating out a pulsation that must be felt in the furthest confines where humanity has found habitation, but to the missionary is given the little torch that must light up the gloom of every dark corner wherever man is found.

To the strong arm of the Lott Carey brethren is given a twin sister, the Woman's Auxiliary, who by her faith, her work, and her optimism has become an indispensable adjunct; and without her the great Convention would lose its vitality, its strength, and almost its right to exist. Where the men have gone into benighted and idol-ridden regions, conquering and to conquer in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the women, through their organization, have been in evidence as a close second, and by the splendid part they have played in co-operation they have made it possible to preach the Gospel to thousands of heathen who have never heard of the Saviour of men.

My experience in this short period has brought in its plainest light to me the sorrowful condition of the countless hungering millions who are crying, yea dying, for the bread of life. The ever increasing need of sacrificing men and women who will take their lives in their hands and go as if to an unknown land to seek and save that which was lost; those who are willing to go they know not where, but, like Abraham, willing to go anywhere the Lord leads, that in the going God may get the glory and His Kingdom may be extended.

It has also brought to me the need of greater contributions from individual Christians who believe that money given for missions is but bread cast upon the waters to be gathered after many days, if not by the present, by future generations, and getting their wider vision, this clearer insight into the awful realization of a lost world, I feel like rededicating myself to its redemption until the shout of salvation shall come from the uttermost isles of the sea.

Since meeting you in our last Convention, I have tasted the waters Marah and passed through the furnace of affliction, having lost an ouly brother and suffered the pain of a woman whose husband's feet have almost touched the chilly waters, while I myself have been under a great nervous strain, and yet with the power to continue to work, to hope, and to pray, a gleam of hope flashes through the rift of the clouds in God's word and His promise when He says, "Whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth;" and "He tempers the wind to the shorn lamb."

MISSIONARIES.

During the year, through the great effort of our Corresponding Secretary, Dr. A. A. Graham, transportation was made possible for Mrs. F. B. Watson and Rev. and Mrs. Burke who were sent to Brewerville, Liberia, West Africa, to relieve Rev. and Mrs. Thomas, who were well worn and badly in need of rest. We have other missionaries ready to go—Dr. and Mrs. D. S. Mallekebu and Mrs. Elizabeth Coles Bony and others, but must wait for an opportunity to get transportation.

We shall be entertained next Friday evening by our returned missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. W. If. Thomas, Brewerville, Liberia, West Africa; Dr. C. C. Boone, Monrovia, West Africa; Prince M. L. Cele, Zalu Land, East Africa; Dr. and Mrs. D. S. Mallekebu, Nyassaland, Central Africa. Let us come with prayerful hearts and hear the message from the different fields and be inspired to do more and better work for the evangelization of both Africa and Haiti.

LOTT CAREY HERALD.

I kindly ask that we make the *Lott Carey Herald* a stronger paper by giving our support more generously. I am glad to report that through our feeble effort and by the kind assistance of Sister Addie White Elliott, of Grove Baptist, Churchland, Va., we sold 415 *Heralds* since last October, and by so doing we were able to send its most efficient editor, Dr. William H. Stokes, \$20.25. Now let us resolve to do more for the *Herald* another year, for it is our organ through which we hear from our various fields.

NEW CIRCLES

Holding office of Corresponding Secretary and Organizer, being assisted by Sister A. L. Somersville, we are glad to report three new circles as follows: New Hope Baptist Church Missionary Circle, Pughsville, Va.; Mrs. Boswell, president; Rev. G. W. Burrell, pastor. Celestial Baptist Church Missionary Circle, Portsmouth, Va.; Mrs. F. M. Jones, president; Rev. F. M. Jones, pastor First Baptist Church Missionary Circle, West Norfolk, Va.; Mrs. Mary Fleming, president; Rev. Givens, pastor. We are glad to say, though young, the three circles are doing well.

THE ALEXANDER CHAPEL.

Since this building is so well equipped, it would be well for us to turn our attention toward erecting a home or headquarters for our missionaries, those embarking or entering Africa. Such a building is much needed in Monrovia.

AFRICAN SCHOLARSHIP.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon this particular phase of our work. Dr. A. A. Graham, our Corresponding Secretary, has planned to have the photos of these children who are being educated by you, that you may have them yourselves, select and name them.
